



WELCOME EVERYONE TO KENILWORTH ROAD

A WARM welcome back to Kenilworth Road, for what we hope will be another memorable evening of cup football against Premiership opposition.

Cup games at Kenilworth Road have been magic so far this season and anybody who has been to one has gone away exhilarated, so let's hope we can do that again tonight.

If we can turn in a repeat performance of either Saturday's win over Nottingham Forest or our games against Northampton, Charlton and Sunderland then we know we stand a chance.

At home, we are playing some good football. We have criticised players on certain performances, but they have certainly deserved the plaudits after those games.

I think for all the teams left in the competition, everyone is thinking that there are only three more games to go until you're in the Final. I don't see any reason why we shouldn't go into this game thinking as big as everyone else.

I would like to welcome David Moyes, his staff and players to Kenilworth Road this evening.

They are a Club with great tradition and David is doing an excellent job at Goodison Park. I would like to wish the Club the best of luck for the remainder of the season, but hopefully we can make their trip back to Merseyside an even longer one.

I went to watch Everton on Sunday against Derby and they won the game comfortably. I would have preferred it to have been a bit of a

tougher game for them, but at the end of the day this is a cup game at Kenilworth Road.

We have dominated sides here this season. It was pleasing that during Saturday's game against Forest, they never really had a sniff at our goal, and apart from Doncaster, when we didn't play particularly well, we have dominated teams at home.

In the second half against Forest we were very resilient and strong and went on to get all three points. We had the better chances in the second half, but if we could finish off our approach play we would win a lot more handsomely.

We have scored 15 League goals at home, which only one other club in our division has achieved, so we know that side of our season is good. We clearly know where we need to resurrect the rest of it and if we can do that, and win just four or five of our away games, then we will be in the Play-Offs.

We sit here right now three points off the Play-Offs and one game away from the Quarter-Finals of the Carling Cup, which no other teams from outside the top two divisions, have achieved and that is full credit to the players.

I was there at the League Cup triumph in 1988, so I know how much this competition means to a lot of

people. With a healthy crowd expected inside Kenilworth Road, we can hopefully create a great atmosphere.

Finally, I hope fans will come down and support our Youth team on Friday evening when they take on Leyton Orient in the First Round of the FA Youth Cup at Kenilworth Road.

Chris Cummins and his team are enjoying a good season, having extended their unbeaten run at the weekend to six games and they have qualified for the next stages of the Puma Youth Alliance Cup.

Friday's game is a big occasion for all of our young players and with your support we can hopefully make it two massive cup fixtures in the space of a few days.

We have a more experienced squad this time around and that could be vital. Although some of our players will have played on the big stage before, everyone is excited at this fixture.



I didn't think Forest really threatened us that much. They had two shots at our goal and I thought Brilly made key saves to keep us in the match.


It was good to see Chris Perry get among the goals. I heard afterwards that it was his first goal in over two years – but by the way he took it, you wouldn't have guessed it.

Enjoy the game – and as always get behind the team.





The Everton story from 1878 Beginnings

IN May 1878 St Domingo School played its first match in a corner of Stanley Park, with players carrying goalposts and erecting them before the game. In November 1879 at a meeting in the Queen's Head Hotel, near the tower on the club crest, they changed their name to Everton, and won their first game 6-0 against St Peter's. In 1888, the leading English clubs formed the Football League with Everton as founder members. Their first League game was a 2-1 win over Accrington Stanley in September 1888.

Top player

ALAN Ball did it all. A World Cup winner for England in 1966 when he was just 21, he was snapped up by Everton from Blackpool and went on to become a Goodison Giant. He helped them lift the League title in 1969-70, beating Leeds into second by nine points in the days of two for a win. He died at 61 in April this year, but his memory will live on forever.



Top manager

HOWARD Kendall was already a Goodison favourite as a player, making 250 appearances for Everton and winning the League title in 1969-70. As Everton manager from 1981-87, he won the League twice (in 84-85 and 86-87), the FA Cup (84) and the European Cup Winners' Cup in 1985. He remains the last English manager to win a European trophy with an English club.

Top game

Everton 3-1 Rapid Vienna European Cup Winners' Cup Final: May 15, 1985

HAVING reached the final with a dramatic come-from-behind victory over Bayern Munich, Everton faced Rapid Vienna in Rotterdam. Andy Gray gave Everton the lead on the hour and Trevor Steven made it 2-0 on 72 minutes. Vienna pulled one back with seven minutes left and things looked dodgy, but inside a minute Kevin Sheedy made it 3-1. The game was won.

DESPITE recent defeats to Liverpool and Newcastle, Everton remain one of the toughest competitors in the Premier League, with a squad fashioned in the style of their manager, David Moyes. Much like the former Preston boss, the nine-times League champions are a combative mix of skill and steel that has seen the club compete in the higher reaches of the top tier over the past few seasons.

After taking over from former Rangers coach Walter Smith in 2002, Moyes has developed a side that plays a tight, compact game and pressurises opponents at both ends of the pitch, but which also leaves room for flair players, such as the outstanding Mikel Arteta.

Moyes took over at Goodison Park after impressing as manager at Deepdale, where he had also performed with typical grit at centre-half towards the end of his playing career. After taking the founder members of the Football League out of League Two and to within a whisker of the Premiership – Preston lost the 2001 Play-Off Final to Bolton – Moyes took charge of an Everton side languishing near the bottom of the table.

Avoiding relegation that year was a major feather in his cap, and the side's subsequent progress has marked him out as a shrewd tactician who places high stock in the importance of fitness, work-rate and commitment. Guiding Everton back into the upper levels of the English game has not gone unnoticed by his peers, and he has been named the League Managers Association Manager Of The Year twice, in 2003 and 2005.


with £11.25m record signing, Yakubu, leading the line, the combative Lee Carsley and Phil Neville in midfield, and veteran Alan Stubbs at the back. Stubbs is usually partnered by the new England international Joleon Lescott, who is also the club's leading scorer with six.

Providing the guile and goals from midfield are Leon Osman and Mikel Arteta, with the latter in particular being pivotal to Everton's recent success. The club's Player Of The Season for the past two years, Arteta is deadly from open play or dead-balls, and his venomous shot and range of passing give the Merseysiders a potent attacking threat.

The Stanley Park club that left Anfield behind

NOT many Everton fans want to remember, but their side used to play home games at... Anfield. They began at Stanley Park in 1878 and then in 1881 the club moved to Priory Road, which had dressing rooms and even a grandstand. They then played at Anfield for nine seasons from 1883 to 1892 before finally moving to their present home in 1891. It is now a magnificent stadium holding 37,000 spectators.

How have the Toffees found the first few months of the season?

With so many new players arriving during the summer, it was inevitable that there would be some teething troubles but things have started to settle down in the last few weeks and, as a result, both performances and results have improved significantly. Given that key players like Tim Cahill and Thomas Gravesen have also returned from injury, Everton appear to be in good shape.

What are Everton's aims for this season?

The aim, as always, is to finish as high up in the Premier League as possible but both players and management are craving to give Everton's supporters a long run in one of the cup competitions. There is also a determination to become firmly established in the top six.

Who was your most important close-season signing?

Yakubu was a club record signing when he arrived from Middlesbrough for £11.25m but getting Tim Cahill and Mikel Arteta to sign new contracts was equally important. They are two hugely influential performers.

Who do you think will be your star players this season?

Arteta would be the obvious answer but Cahill's ability to score goals from midfield is priceless, while Yakubu – if he repeats his performances for Middlesbrough and Portsmouth – could be the elusive 20-goal-a-season man.

Who do you think will win the Carling Cup this season?

If Everton don't, Blackburn might go close.




THE KEY MEN FOR

THE SKIPPER:
18 PHILIP NEVILLE

ENGLAND international who arrived at Goodison in August 2005. He brought a wealth of European and international experience to Everton when he completed his transfer from Manchester United. During his time at Old Trafford he earned 52 England caps and made 78 appearances in Europe. After signing professional forms, he made his senior debut in an FA Cup game against Wrexham at Old Trafford in January 1995. Later that season Phil captained Manchester United's junior team to FA Youth Cup glory. Despite being a consistent performer for Everton, he was omitted from the England squad for the World Cup in Germany in 2006, but he was recalled by Steve McClaren for the 2006-07 season and took over the club captaincy at Goodison from David Weir.

KEEPERS

24 TIM HOWARD: After originally joining on a season-long loan in the summer of 2006, Howard made a permanent move to Goodison Park in February 2007. He arrived from Manchester United, where he had fallen behind Edwin van der Saar in the

goalkeeping pecking order. He began his career in his native USA, playing for the New York/New Jersey Metrostars. He moved to Man Utd in 2003 and replaced Fabien Barthez. In the summer of 2007, Tim collected his first piece of silverware since his move to Goodison. The goalkeeper was an instrumental figure for the USA as they beat Mexico 2-1 to win the CONCACAF Gold Cup.

12 IAIN TURNER: Highly rated young goalkeeper, who arrived at Goodison Park in January 2003 from Stirling Albion. Capped at Under-16, Under-18 and Under-21 level by Scotland.

30 JOHN RUDDY: Joined Everton in the summer of 2005 for a fee of £250,000 from Cambridge. Has been on loan to Walsall and Chester to gain match experience.





21 LEON OSMAN: A product of Everton's Academy, Osman scored Everton's first goal of the current campaign in a win against Wigan.

26 LEE CARSLEY: Became one of former Everton boss Walter Smith's final signings, joining from Coventry in February 2002 for £1.9m.

THE DEFENDERS

5 JOLEON LESCOTT: Signed from Wolves for an undisclosed fee, Lescott has been in rich form. His five goals this season earned him an international call-up to England, and he played in last month's Euro 2008 games against Estonia and Russia.

2 TONY HIBBERT: Originally a midfield player, Hibbert has forged a successful career at Goodison Park after progressing through the Academy. He was a member of Everton's successful 1998 FA Youth Cup winning side.

3 LEIGHTON BAINES: Signed on a five year deal from Wigan, he had originally been on the books at Everton as a teenager. He made his debut at the age of 17 for Wigan, going on to make nearly 150 appearances for the Latics, where he forced his way into the England Under-21 set-up.

4 JOSEPH YOBO: After declining offers from Arsenal and Juventus, Yobo joined Everton in the summer of 2002. A Nigerian international, he arrived at Goodison Park from Marseille and in the 2003-04 season he was Everton's Young Player Of The Year.

15 ALAN STUBBS: Released by Everton as a teenager, Stubbs is in his second stint at his boyhood club. Has spent time at Sunderland, Bolton and Celtic, where he won an array of honours including the SPL Championship and the Scottish Cup.

5,842 is the number of days since Everton last played here at

Kenilworth Road. It was a League match in 1991-92 and the visitors went home with maximum points thanks to a solitary goal from Robert Warzycha. An interesting note from this game was that Everton had to play in Luton's away kit due to a colour clash.

12 previous matches have been played on this date, with just two in Cup competitions. Luton drew 0-0 with Bury in the League Cup back in 1973, and lost 3-2 at Dagenham & Redbridge in the LDV Vans Trophy in 2001. It's a better record in the League, with four wins, four draws and just two defeats. Amazingly ten of these 12 games were played at Kenilworth Road.

Goodison to the Kenny movers

9 players have left Everton for Luton, and they have an average of more than 100 games for the Hatters. Tom McInnes and Richard Williams played in Luton's first League season in 1897-98. George Cummins moved in the 1950s, played more than 200 games and scored 30 goals before a move to Cambridge City. John Bramwell and Alec Ashworth played in the early 1960s with Bramwell also notching more than 200 Luton games. Jimmy Husband and David Lawson moved in the 1970s but Lawson's five games seriously affects the overall average. Alec Chamberlain had five seasons at Luton, making 158 appearances before a move to Sunderland in 1993. Alan Harper is the most recent, and he made 48 appearances, scoring one goal, before a move to Burnley.

6 players have moved north, starting with Hugh Moffat in the 1920s after 34 games for Luton. Archie Clark followed a few years later, being just eight games short of 100 for the Hatters. George Turner followed in the early 1930s, before Luton legend Billy Bingham moved in the 1960s. Bingham played 102 games, including the 1959 FA Cup Final, and scored 33 goals for Luton. Andy King scored nine goals in 42 games before moving in the mid 1970s, and the last was Matthew Jackson, who played 12 Luton games before Everton paid £600,000 for the 19-year-old defender.




Hatters and Toffees past

Everton's glittering past includes an amazing NINE Division One titles: in 1890-1, 1914-5, 27-8, 31-2, 38-9, 62-3, 69-70, 84-5 and 86-7. Apart from finishing eighth out of 12 in the first Division One in 1988-9, their low point came with a 16th place in Division Two in 1952-3. Luton's low point came with a 17th place in Division Four in 1966-67 and their high a top flight 7th place in 1986-87.

SIX of the remaining ten Premiership sides in the Carling Cup face lower-ranked opposition, but with Aston Villa, Manchester United, Derby and Wigan all losing at home to Championship opposition in earlier rounds, and Sunderland going out to League One **LUTON**, the rest will be wary of complacency.

Holders **CHELSEA** remain the favourites for Wembley glory after securing a 4-0 win at Hull City in the last round in Avram Grant's first match in charge, thanks to two goals from Salomon Kalou, and one each from Scott Sinclair and Steve Sidwell. This time they host a **LEICESTER CITY** side briefly under the control of Gary Megson and now managerless after he took off for Bolton, and though the Foxes are struggling for results and goals in the League, they pulled off a stunning 1-0 win at **ASTON VILLA** in Round Three, thanks to Matt Fryatt's goal.

LIVERPOOL are the other side to have dominated the Carling Cup in recent seasons, and are second favourites, although even they lost to Championship Crystal Palace two seasons ago. This time, Robbie Fowler makes an emotional return to Anfield with **CARDIFF CITY**, where his potentially formidable strike partnership with Jimmy-Floyd Hasselbaink has ignited in recent weeks. City collected an excellent 4-2 victory at West

Bromwich Albion in the last round, with Fowler scoring twice, Hasselbaink getting another and Trevor Sinclair completing the scoring. Despite the top flight experience in the Welsh side's ranks, the Reds should still have more than enough to progress despite the Bluebirds being stronger away from home, as they surged to a 4-2 win at Reading to set up this game, with a superb Fernando Torres hat-trick. Yossi Benayoun got the other goal.

ARSENAL must travel to **SHEFFIELD UNITED**, in yet another Cup meeting between the sides. The Blades' expected promotion challenge has yet to materialise, but James Beattie is a proven Premiership striker, and is at the top of the Championship scoring charts. He didn't feature in the last round as United saw off Morecambe 5-0 to end League Two interest in the Carling Cup this season. Billy Sharp and Luton Shelton both scored twice, and Lee Hendrie got the other. United also beat the Gunners in the Premiership last season, but as Liverpool among others know only too well, even a modified Arsenal side can be very difficult to contain, especially as they remain unbeaten in all competition, and were too strong for Newcastle in Round Three as Nicklas Bendtner and Denilson set up a 2-0 home win.

TOTTENHAM HOTSPUR, in contrast to their north London rivals, have



Georgios Samaras goal was all that separated them with Norwich last time around. The other clash sees



YOU don't hear too many players with more than 500 senior games behind them say: "You can never stop learning."

But that's how Luton midfielder Steve Robinson sees it. And perhaps that's why he has just fought his way back into the Northern Ireland squad after more than two years out in the cold.

Robbo, 32, has been rejuvenated by the new regime at Kenilworth Road this season and loves playing and training alongside the experienced players around him.

"You always learn, especially from people who have played at the highest level," he says. "How can you not learn from them? Every day in training you pick up things."

"John Carver's come in with some brilliant coaching ideas and you can't help but learn."

"And Furs is an absolutely brilliant example. You see him on the training pitch and he's like a 19-year-old. He's just the same in training as he is in games. He's a credit to himself and the profession because he really is an example to every youngster."

And so the born-again Robbo got the call earlier this month to join up for Northern Ireland's Euro 2008 qualifier in Sweden, which finished in a 1-1 draw in Stockholm.

It was a great moment for him and he thinks that it had something to do with the new Irish boss Nigel Worthington.

"Yeah I was delighted. It's a big compliment. I thought my time had gone for Northern Ireland. The last game I was involved in, the last big one, was when we beat England 1-0 and Azerbaijan 2-0 in the World Cup qualifiers in 2005. I played against Azerbaijan, so it has been a while but it's been worth the wait."

"I've played against Norwich a lot of times when Nigel Worthington was manager there and he must have

remembered me so it was a big boost."

"I used to room with Nigel – that shows how old I am – I roomed with him when I first got in the Northern Ireland squad at 18 and in games so he's obviously kept me in mind."

Robbo has also fitted into new Luton manager Kevin Blackwell's side and is one of the relatively few players to keep his place as a regular from the old guard of last season.

"I looked at the team list the other day and I think there was only myself, Coyne and Springy in it from before. So it's all been big changes. There's been a lot of people in and a lot of people out and it does take time to gel, it does take time to get the right combinations. But I'm still in there."

In fact he's been there ever since Joe Kinnear paid £50,000 to sign him from Preston in June 2002, since when he's played 167 League games for the Hatters. It was a strange start at Luton, though, as Kinnear always played Robbo on the right, in spite of his protestations that he was a central midfielder.

"I was never a right winger. I don't know where Joe got that from but you play where you're put because you want to play and that's what you're getting paid to do. But centre midfield is my position."

"This year I've played a lot deeper and that lets Dave Edwards go forward so it suits me and I'm enjoying it. But there's a lot more competition in the middle now. A lot of good players have come in."

"Springy's done well, Dave Edwards is a good player and Don Hutchison as well so there's a lot of pressure, and you've got to be on your toes to try and keep in the team."

"With all his experience, though, Robbo is as puzzled as everyone else by Luton's away form."

"I think it's hard to put your finger

on the reason. We produce some brilliant performances against the teams that allow us to play more football like your Sunderlands and Charltons but unfortunately at this level you can't play football until you've won the battle and I think that's what we've got to do first of all."

"We have to turn it around, it's as simple as that. We have to turn it around away from home sooner rather than later. Whether we go a little bit more solid or not that's down to the manager."

"We've got a lot of flair players here, a lot of attacking players. At home it's brilliant because we're on the front foot."

Meanwhile, the big games keep coming and Robbo relishes the challenge of more Premiership opposition tonight under the lights.

"It's always nice, the surface is always good for good football and obviously Everton being the class team they are they will be knocking it about so it gives us the chance to test ourselves with nothing to lose. We've just got to go and enjoy it. Hopefully it will be a decent crowd and they will get behind us."

Robbo is a big fan of Everton boss David Moyes, who as Preston manager paid £375,000 to take him back in May 2000.

"I know David Moyes. He's one of the top British managers in the country and a nice bloke as well but one thing about him is that he wants to win everything."


"I think Everton is one of those teams that have always taken the Carling Cup seriously."

"He will definitely be putting a very strong team out, and it will be a big test for us."



LUTON TOWN BOARD REPLIES TO TRUST IN LUTON



IRSTLY before we get into detail, we must congratulate the whole team on another fine home performance last Saturday. Well done!

After reading the pamphlet distributed at the ground on Saturday by TIL, we feel that the matters raised in it provide the club with the opportunity to respond on a wider basis to all our supporters.

When the Chairman decided to acquire a controlling interest and to help this Club, he believed, and he still believes now, that it was with the blessing of the majority of our supporters. It is our belief and vision that we (that's all of us) could turn the tide and over the next five years get this Club to where it belongs – in a New Stadium at Junction 12, and fighting to be in the Premiership. This still remains our principle objective.

Unfortunately, it has become evident over the past six months that there is an external faction that seems to have a different agenda from the current Board.

Consequently we would ask you this:

If you support this Club, would YOU (as a supporter) make public statements outside it urging supporters not to buy their season tickets, to boycott games, and threaten the club with protests, which have driven up the cost of both policing and stewarding games. These actions have significantly contributed not only to increased costs, but also to lost revenue. It is no surprise, therefore, that the Club faces losses greater than those identified at the time of the Chairman's takeover.

Transfer sales income received to date have all been used to help meet the Club's ongoing financial commitments and overheads, which include all payments related to the football business.

We are fully aware of the extent, and on-going reason for the trading position the Chairman inherited, and all the staff at the Club are working hard to address these recognised

issues. Not least of which are the increasing costs associated with the maintenance, running, and refurbishment of an ageing stadium, which we do not own.

Accordingly, we address the points raised by TIL in the order set out in their leaflet.

1 Losses have increased largely due to a fall in revenue as explained above.

2 Running costs (with the exception of Policing, Stewarding and Stadium) have not increased and are at a level anticipated prior to the recent takeover. However, we do have a continuing substantial liability for long-term player contracts, which cannot be sustained at our current revenue levels. Consequently, we are continuing to work towards a playing budget commensurate with our League status and revenue streams.

3 Player sales are an unfortunate necessity for a Club such as Luton in its current home with its limited revenue streams and commercial opportunities. All of the funds received have been utilised in meeting the ongoing fiscal commitments of the Club. NONE of these monies have been taken out of the Club.

4 Yes, the planning application for Junction 12 has been delayed for three months. With the exception of the application made by David Kohler, no other application has been submitted by previous owners, therefore this short delay is insignificant and irrelevant. Previously there have just been a succession of pipe dreams.

However, we have been advised by the professional team that the application **will** be submitted in January. Yes, we were previously advised it would be earlier, but we have to be guided by Goodmans (formerly known as Rosemount), the developer who are responsible for all costs other than the stadium design. 5 The original projected stadium costs were an early estimate, which have increased due to incorporating other facilities, which will increase the stadium's turnover and profitability (conference & banqueting rooms, exhibition facilities, additional bars etc). After viewing the stadium Fly-Through, we are sure you will agree it is worth the additional costs

given the scale and impact of the new stadium.

The stadium cost currently stands at £55 million and will be covered by the contracted enabling contribution, naming rights and grants etc. Variances to previous estimates as stated by TIL are simply the inclusion of both the hotel and onsite training ground costs.

6 We have never said that we OWN the training ground, but that it is our OWN!

Again, in the past, no one has ever put any thought into having a dedicated training facility or had the foresight to deal with these issues. We have!

Previously the team has had to drive some distance to share pitches and changing rooms, with no physiotherapist facilities, no weight room, kitchen, teaching rooms etc. We now have our own bespoke training facility, which has clearly lifted the players' morale to new heights. Significant investment has gone into the new facility, which will pay for itself over the next three years saving the Club circa £200,000 per year going forward. This is clear evidence of some of the ideas being put into practice, to reduce the running costs of the Club, while also improving efficiency and control.

7 A statement has never been issued quantifying the price paid by the Chairman for control of the Club nor will it be as this remains private and confidential information. The previous loans made by the Chairman were prior to his takeover and assisted the cash flow requirements of the Club at that time. The Chairman has a controlling interest in the Club and has many times described his dream to assist it to improve and stabilise its financial condition, also for it to be run in a more commercial and prudent fashion. His ultimate aim is to move the Club to an impressive new stadium, which can be the springboard for a more successful and less volatile future. He will not commit funds unconditionally – who would? However, he has agreed to support the Club going forward with finance, management skill, contacts, ideas and commitment. Foresight and a desire to secure the long term future of

the Club has seen much work and investment being put into it over the past six months, including:

- 1** Upgrading the majority of the hospitality facilities at the Club.
- 2** Investing in the new training facility.
- 3** Stadium sound system installation.
- 4** Real expansion and development of our Youth program.
- 5** Strong local community engagement.
- 6** Working partnership with Active Luton (Luton Borough Council).
- 7** Developing relationship with local Chamber of Commerce.
- 8** Ongoing investment in stadium design for the Club's Junction 12 relocation.

TIL representation on the Board:

We publish our previous press release (October 19) on this matter, which is self explanatory:

"Following recent comments, The Board of Luton Town Football Club today wishes to clarify its position regarding the above and the recent reference to a 'TIL seat on the Club Board'.

In order to clarify any misunderstanding, the Club has already made it clear to TIL that for the time being it has no intention of appointing any new directors to the Board. TIL had a representative on the Board who resigned in January 2007 and since then there has been no representative nominated by TIL for consideration by the Board as a replacement.

The Board understands that feelings may run deep on this issue, however, it is also conscious of its commitments and the sensitivities that surround the Club at the present time. In particular, the importance of any potential conflict of interests in respect of the Club's intended relocation and therefore it has to ensure that no other agendas are being pursued.

The Board is currently looking at ways of involving all of its supporters more in the Club and of increasing its communication to them on a regular basis.

Finally, in respect of TIL's request for further financial information to what has already been provided to them, the Chairman of the Club David Pinkney will be forwarding a communication to

the Chair of TIL on this matter".

In the answer to the questions raised on the back page of the leaflet, we comment as follows: Our "story" (but we prefer to use the term "business plan") remains consistent. We are not aware of any broken promises although in this business, as in all others businesses, things do change on a regular basis. As mentioned previously in this summary, we are fully aware of the magnitude and reason for our current business position. The new stadium cost currently stands at £55 million and will be covered by the contracted enabling contribution, naming rights and grants etc. Any shortfall will be underwritten.

The Board has not hidden and has no intention of hiding anything. We trust that this reply will resolve that concern.

The previous Board made a decision to pursue a development opportunity that gifts the Club a 30 acre freehold site and £25 million (guaranteed) towards the stadium construction costs (combined value £50 million plus). In monetary terms no other local development can come anywhere close to this opportunity. The current Board agree with the previous decision and will support it through to its conclusion.


The FA investigation remains a concern and we would also welcome a speedy conclusion.

As previously stated, player sales are a necessity for a Club like Luton in its current home, with its limited revenue streams and commercial opportunities. All of the funds received have been utilised on meeting ongoing fiscal commitments.

The current financial constraints are well understood by both the Board and the football management. While new players have been brought in, the economics of this are well understood. The Club, in the future, will have to be prudent and able to live within its means, thus ensuring no repeat of our previous "Yo-Yo" existence.





Fozzie beats the Everton jinx

STEVE Foster wheels away after scoring against Everton in March 1986 with the release of 12 months frustration etched in his face.

Foster's frustration, along with the rest of the Hatters players, was well known as the Toffees had knocked the Town out of the FA Cup in controversial circumstances at the Semi-Final stage the previous season and to add to that misery had edged past them again in a Sixth Round replay only ten days before.

The Town's players and supporters felt hard done by at this double heartbreak and a crowd of 10,949 turned up to see if table-topping Everton could finally be suffered.

The first half passed with Everton fortunate to be on level terms with goalkeeper Neville Southall saving his side with a string of brave stops on the newly-laid artificial surface.

Saves from Tim Breacker and Ricky Hill were world class but the Welsh international goalkeeper could do nothing about a Mick Harford header that hit a

post and another that thundered inches over the bar.

The second half was only a minute old when the Everton jinx seemed to have struck once more when the visitors went ahead completely against the run of play. The goal was a complete fluke as well with Kevin Richardson firing in a speculative drive which took deflections off two Hatters defenders, Rob Johnson and Steve Foster, before wrong-footing Les Sealey in the Luton goal.

Fortunately the Luton players did not let this setback upset their rhythm and they continued to dominate play but were disappointed by Everton's play acting as their midfield and defence were swamped. In the space of a few minutes four Luton players were booked as Everton men rolled over in

apparent mortal pain only to mysteriously recover as the yellow cards were waved!


With nine minutes left it seemed that the Toftees were set for another fortunate win but a thumping header by skipper Foster from a Hill free kick lifted the gloom and after that there was only one likely winner.

The clincher came on 85 minutes and was again instigated by Foster who saw his goalbound header from a David Preece corner touched in by the predatory Mike Newell.

Everton finished two points behind champions Liverpool at the season's end and also lost in the FA Cup Final to the Reds. Perhaps they felt like I did after that Semi-Final defeat in 1985!

Bell then seemingly put the game beyond doubt when he calmly slotted beyond the reach of Forest goalkeeper Paul Smith, before Bennett struck.


This was Forest's first away League defeat of the season, and maintained Luton's impressive home form – this victory resulting in their eighth win from ten matches at Kenilworth Road.

Although born in Australia, David moved to England as a youngster before being spotted by Luton's John Moore leading to his signing professional forms for the Hatters in May 1986.

David came to the fore during the 1987-88 campaign, netting twice in a Simod Cup tie at Everton and then scoring the equaliser in a 1-1 draw at Anfield. An unorthodox running style, deceptive pace and the ability to strike from deep led to big money bids being received with a £600,000 offer from Manchester City in March 1989 too good to refuse. He only stayed a year at Maine Road before meeting up with his old mentor David Pleat at Leicester, where he enjoyed five good years until a £150,000 bid from Luton's Terry Westley brought him back to Kenilworth Road.

David is still turning out for Stafford Rangers at the age of 39!

**Sidney (Sid) OTTEWELL**

Sid had made only three League appearances for Chesterfield before the war but as a PT instructor during the hostilities he managed to turn out for a number of clubs as a guest player. An aggressive and hard-shooting inside-forward, Sid top-scored for Chesterfield in 1946-47, leading to a £5,000 move to Birmingham in June 1947, before another move to Luton six months later. Despite scoring four goals in 15 League appearances, Sid never settled at Kenilworth Road and was soon off to Nottingham Forest, then to Mansfield and Scunthorpe.

Sid later played for and managed several non-League outfits in the midlands, including Spalding and Lockheed, and he now lives in retirement in Nottingham.

Mark John OVENDALE

Leicester-born Mark first caught the eye at Wisbech where his shot stopping abilities led to him joining Northampton in August 1994. After failing to win a regular place at Sixfields, he accepted a free transfer to Barry, where he established a League of Wales record by going 1,072 minutes without conceding a goal in 1995-96.

Starring as his side won three consecutive titles, Mark was then subject to a £30,000 move to Bournemouth in 1998 before an amazing £425,000 bid from Ricky Hill's Luton was accepted in August 2000.

Although Mark helped the Hatters to promotion in 2002, he could never claim the number one shirt as his own and was released in 2003.

Since then Mark has appeared for York, Tiverton and Newport but had to retire from the game through injury in June this year.

Sydney (Syd) William OWEN

After service with the RAF during the war, Syd joined his local club Birmingham on demob but due to the large number of professionals on the books at St Andrews at the time managed only five League appearances with the Blues.

Age 25 and needing to play football, Syd gratefully accepted a £1,500 move to Luton, which proved money well spent as he went on to make more than 400 starts for the Hatters and pick up a host of major honours.

Initially played at wing-half, it soon became obvious that his strength in the air, cool distribution and leadership meant a move to centre-half and eventual captaincy. Leading the Club to promotion to the top flight, playing for England in the 1954 World Cup and finally skippering the Town in the 1959 FA Cup Final marked a glittering playing career.

Sadly, a spell in the hot seat at Luton was not successful but his next job, coach at Leeds during their glory years, was.

Syd retired in 1982 and died in Leeds in 1998.

**David (Dave) PACEY**

After playing for Luton schoolboys, Dave was developed by Hitchin Town, where he made their Athenian League side as a wing-half before National Service in the Army.

Hearing that Dave was having trials at Arsenal, Luton director Tom Hodgson travelled to his Army station at Newton Abbot to make sure he signed for the Hatters!

After making his League debut in a 0-3 defeat at Old Trafford on Christmas Day 1957, Dave became a mainstay in the Luton half-back line over the next eight years, injuries permitting. Scorer of the Town's goal in the 1959 FA Cup Final, Dave tried manfully as the Hatters dropped down to Division Four by 1965 but then decided to call it a day before enjoying three years with Kettering.

Dave worked for many years at Electrolux and now lives in Newport Pagnell in retirement.

Garry Stuart PARKER

Born in Oxford, cultured midfielder Garry signed as an apprentice for the Hatters in 1982 and full professional forms a year later. Due to the form of the likes of Ricky Hill and David Preece, he failed to earn a regular place at Kenilworth Road and so stepped down a level in 1986, joining Hull who were managed by his old Luton skipper Brian Horton.

Such was his form at Boothferry Park that he was soon back in the top flight with Nottingham Forest, where he was on the fringes of the full England side and also starred in the 1989 Littlewoods Cup win against the Hatters! Further big money moves to Aston Villa and then Leicester followed, much to the disgust of Luton fans, before he brought his career to a close in Oxfordshire non-League circles.

Garry now runs his own building company and manages Kidlington reserves.

**Darren James PATTERSON**

Belfast-born Darren was taken on by West Brom from school but after failing to make the grade moved on to Wigan, where he first tasted League football. He played so well at Springfield Park that Crystal Palace put in a £225,000 bid for him in 1992 but then, surprisingly, left him in the reserves for two years.

Darren finally managed to force his way into the Eagles Premier League side in 1994-95 but as he was now a full Northern Ireland international needed the guarantee of regular First Team football.

Turning down the offer of a fresh contract at Palace, he instead accepted a £150,000 move to Terry Westley's Luton in 1995 but the strong full-back or central defender was never truly regarded as a first choice although a succession of injuries did not help his cause.

After spells at Dundee United, York and Oxford an Achilles injury ended his playing career. Darren is now first team coach at Oxford.

Trevor PEAKE

In a long, glorious football career, Trevor holds the record as the oldest player in the Hatters history when turning out against Wrexham at Kenilworth Road in 1997 at the age of 40 years 222 days. Starting off at his home town club Nuneaton, Trevor made his League debut with Lincoln, who paid £27,500 for his services. After 171 League games for the Imps, a £100,000 fee in 1983 took him to Coventry, where his displays at centre-half earned him legendary status plus an FA Cup winners medal in 1987.

When Luton manager David Pleat was looking for an experienced head in his young Hatters side, he turned to Trevor, who went on to play 179 League games for the Town, picking up several Player Of The Year awards along the way. After taking up a coaching job at Kenilworth Road, Trevor returned to Coventry in a similar position.

**Reginald (Reg) Stanley PEARCE**

Reg came late into the professional game as he was almost 25 when Luton scout George Martin spotted him playing for Winsford in the Cheshire League and encouraged him to sign for the Hatters in 1954.

Although originally signed as an inside-right, Reg played in six positions for the First Team before turning out in his rightful position, but given the form of Gordon Turner he eventually had to settle for a wing-half slot where he proved a revelation. Reg was on the verge of international recognition when relegation-threatened Sunderland came in for him in February 1958. The Town felt that young Dave Pacey was an adequate replacement and so allowed him to leave, although £20,000 helped.

Sunderland were relegated at the end of that season and Reg failed to hit the high spots again, finishing his career at Cambridge City and Peterborough. Reg lives in Cambridge in retirement.

**Andrew (Andy) John PEARSON**

Andy came up through the ranks at Luton, signing professional forms in November 1978 under the watchful eye of David Pleat. After earning good reviews in the Hatters Reserve side, Andy eventually made his First Team debut coming on as substitute for Steve White at QPR in March 1980. The Town were 0-2 down at the time but the substitution worked as Andy's performance on the wing inspired his side to a 2-2 draw in front of the cameras.

He was rewarded with a start at home to Burnley the following week but with mercurial winger David Moss returning from injury that was as good as it got for Andy, who left for Hitchin Town the following summer and then on to a career in the police force.







THE Blues make the long trip from the North West coast sitting proudly on top of League One but between now and when they come to Kenilworth Road next Tuesday they have the little matter of a home game against Leeds United on Saturday that will be a stiff test for both teams. New manager Greg Abbott, who took over in August, is hoping for a Play-Off position at least come the end of 2007-08.

The Cumbrians finished eighth in May, but wins against Oldham 1-0, Huddersfield 2-0, Cheltenham 1-0, Bournemouth 3-1, Millwall 4-0, Gillingham 2-0 and Southend 1-0 have built a strong foundation for their drive towards promotion.


Carlisle's last visit to Kenilworth Road was in January 2002, ending in a 1-1 draw, Luton equalised with a Russell Perrett goal to share the points. The Hatters had picked up all the points Brunton Park on the opening day of the season, winning 2-0 and going on to automatic promotion from League Two, finishing second with 97 points just behind Plymouth on 102.

The Blues have a good mix of pace and strength in their squad with Danny Graham leading the goal tally at the moment with nine. Graham is one of Carlisle's playmakers. Tall and strong, the former Middlesbrough player could prove a handful for the Luton defence. Joe Garner is another to watch, the former Blackburn Rovers and England schoolboy striker has a thunderbolt of a shot and is tenacious in his play. Garner collected the Goal Of The Season award at Brunton Park last season for an awesome strike against Port Vale.

Two other players to look out for are Kevin Gall and Danny Livesey. Gall is a former Newcastle trainee and signed from Yeovil Town in 2006. He spent two years at Bristol Rovers, before moving to Somerset. A Welsh Under-21 player, he has blistering pace and has picked up three goals this season so far. Livesey is a spot kick specialist and provides a cool head in attack. The former Bolton Wanderers man is always calm under pressure and gives some of the younger players someone to look to when things get hot.

The Cumbrian defence has a Basque tinge to it with Zigor Aranalde. The Spanish player signed from Walsall in 2005 and is a talented left-back. His speciality is long throw-ins and he is another who remains calm under pressure. The Blues keeper is Kieren Westwood. He signed from Manchester City in 2004, is quick and agile and has managed to keep more than 40 clean sheets in the last two seasons.

It should be another fascinating contest. Carlisle have an excellent away record having won three and drawn two of their League games on the road this season, while Luton's home record is the second best in the division with five wins and a draw from seven games. Something has to give...
