
However, we have to take one game at a time and we must focus our attentions on Brentford this afternoon. They will provide us with a stern test and have a decent squad of players.

we wish them both the best of luck.



The Brentford story from 1889 Beginnings

IN October 1889, the Brentford Rowing Club discussed forming a football club to give members something to do in the winter. It was agreed to hold a meeting the following week and this approved the new club. A week later, third meeting decided by eight votes to five to play Association football rather than Rugby. The new club's colours were the same as the Rowing Club's: salmon, claret and light blue. They played in the Southern League until in 1920 they were elected to the Football League Division Three (S).

Top player

RODNEY Marsh may have been at the end of his career when he played 81 games for Brentford, but he is still one of the finest and best-loved players ever to pull on a Bees shirt. Flamboyant both on and off the pitch, he could electrify crowds and light up a match with his dazzling brilliance. He scored 127 goals in 505 matches but won just five England caps. Many thought it should have been more.



Top manager

FORMER referee Harry Curtis became manager of Brentford in 1926 when they were a small club in Division Three (South). In 1929-30 his side won all 21 of their home games. Three seasons later they won the division. Two seasons after that, they made it to the top flight (Third to First in three years) and in 1935-36 they finished fifth – their highest-ever placing and a point above Arsenal, who had just won three titles in a row. No wonder he is still a club legend and there is a Harry Curtis Lounge at Griffin Park.

Top game

Brentford 2-1 Arsenal
Division One: November 2, 1935

BRENTFORD had reached the top flight and now played Arsenal for the first time ever. The Gunners were THE team, triple champions and full of internationals. But 30,000 supporters saw the Bees go in 2-0 up at half time. Arsenal threw everything at them and scored 10 minutes from time, but gallant Brentford held out and went on to finish one place above Arsenal to become the top club in London.

If the Brentford players' ears look as red as their shirts today, it will be because manager Terry Butcher has been telling them what he thinks of their performance at Macclesfield on Tuesday night.

They lost 1-0 and afterwards Butcher apologised to his own supporters.

"The fans cover the length of England on these long journeys and don't deserve 90 minutes of that. I can only apologise to them. We started slowly and got worse.

"The only positive is that if there was a Luton scout here tonight they'll hopefully think that all they have to do on Saturday is turn up."

Butcher is having what he has called a roller-coaster season. He says there have been so many highs and lows they should rename the club Alton Towers FC, and the last week underlines what he means.

A fine away win at Bradford last Saturday had taken their unbeaten streak to four games and moved the Bees up to 13th in the League Two table.

Defeat on Tuesday still leaves them in 13th place but they and the five clubs below them are covered by just two points. Another slip and they could easily find themselves in 18th place and flirting with the wrong end of the table.

And at the back of Butcher's and the fans' minds will be the way the season has gone in runs of wins or defeats. They began the season unbeaten in four games. After that, they lost four out of five. Up they went again and were unbeaten in four. Another bad five games is not what the manager is looking for.

Butcher joined the Bees in May this year and took over a side that had finished

bottom of League One, having had three managers in a year after Martin Allen left for MK Dons in summer 2006.

Former England central defender Butcher won 77 caps and never gave half an inch in his playing career.

He immediately set about creating his own team, bringing in seven players, all on free transfers. Defenders Craig Pead (Walsall) and John Mackie (Orient), keeper Simon Brown (Hibs), midfielder Gary Smith (MK Dons), strikers Alan Connell (Hereford) and Lee Thorpe (Torquay) and Ricky Shakes (Swindon) were all added to the squad.



They first played at Clifden Road, then Benns Fields, Shooters Field, Cross Park and Boston Park were all home for a time. The fan's view

Bees World commentator

How have Brentford found the first few months of the season?

We knew it wasn't going to be easy. A good start gave way to a poor run and things are now just starting to turn round. We've been competitive, especially recently, but haven't dominated games. We're probably better than our current mid-table position suggests.

What are the Bees' aims this season?

Realistically a top 10 finish would be encouraging, especially if the signs were there for a good go at promotion next year. However there isn't much in League Two to be frightened of and any team that puts a run together will have a chance of top seven at least.

Who was your most important close-season signing?

At the moment, Lee Thorpe looks like the main man. He's a real presence in an attack which is otherwise a little on the small side.

Who do you think will be your star players this season?

Thorpe has been good so far, and could end up as top scorer, and Matt Heywood has been rock solid at the heart of defence. Charlie Ide, Alan Connell and Sammy Moore have bags of potential and could be really exciting on their day. But I have a sneaking feeling Glenn Poole might be a name that becomes well known at places other than Griffin Park by May.

Who do you think will win the FA Cup this season?

On their day, Arsenal are the best team in the country by a distance. If they get a good run and actually put out their First Team, they will take some stopping. It's hard to look outside the "Big 4".

THE KEY MEN FOR

5 JOHN MACKIE

In the 2005-06 season, Mackie made a formidable partnership for Leyton Orient with Gabriel Zakuani, and went down in Orient folklore by captaining the Os to their first automatic promotion in 36 years. He was released by the club at the end of the 2006-07 season. In May 2007 he signed for Brentford on a two-year contract. He started his career in non-League football, having spells at Crawley Town before making the move to Sutton United. His first break into professional football came when Reading spotted his potential and signed him in 1999. He made the step-up with ease and went on to play more than 70 games for the Royals, scoring three goals, before moving to Orient in 2004. At Brisbane Road he became a popular figure with Os supporters and made 122 appearances, scoring 11 goals during his stay with the club.


with more than 140 starts with Colchester United. Brown has also had a spell with Lincoln City.





THE STATISTICS

SIMON PITTS finds some fascinating facts about today's teams



19 is the number of FA Cup First Round ties, excluding replays, at Kenilworth Road, with the Hatters winning 11, drawing three and losing five. Luton have notched 55 goals and let in 32.

9 is the most number of goals scored by Luton at this stage of the FA Cup. Clapton Orient were the team thrashed 9-0 in 1927, with four goals from Jimmy Ardley. George Dennis and Syd Reid both scored a brace, with Harry Woods one.

4 is the number of Luton hat-tricks in the FA Cup First Round. Jimmy Yardley scored the first (see above), before Andy Rennie did the same a year later. Lewis Bedford added to Rennie's four goals as Luton beat Southend 5-1. Keith Allen scored his three against Ware Town in 1968-69, with Alan Slough scoring twice, after George Potter hit the first. Potter played few games for Luton and his goal came in his only FA Cup appearance. The final hat-trick was scored in a replay, against non-League Thurrock in 2003-04 when Adrian Forbes scored three in a 3-1 win.

3 is the number of draws at this stage and they all finished 2-2. These matches were against Coventry in 1919-20, Clapton Orient 1930-31 and Kingstonian two years later. Luton progressed in all of the replays, with 1-0, 4-2 and 3-2 victories.

13,394 is the biggest crowd for a First Round tie at Kenilworth Road and came against Oxford City in December 1967. It was played on a Thursday night after a postponement the weekend before. Oxford were drawn at home but Luton refused to play under their floodlights, so the tie moved to Kenilworth Road. The visitors took the lead just after the interval but Luton hit back on the hour through Bruce Rioch. Five minutes later, Ian Buxton scored the winner – his only FA Cup goal for Luton.

5 is the number of years since Luton were drawn at home in the First Round. Non-league Guiseley AFC were the visitors but there was no Cup upset as the Hatters won 4-0. Matthew Spring opened the scoring with just three minutes played, before Ahmet Brkovic and Tony Thorpe made the game safe in first half stoppage time. Brkovic scored again in the second half to complete the scoring.


Each way movers

2 players have moved to Luton from Brentford. Jimmy Drinnan scored 12 goals in just 31 appearances for the Hatters during 1929-30 after his transfer, while Bert Lawson made just a solitary appearance in a 4-2 defeat at Exeter in December 1933 before moving to Bedford Town.

4 players have moved from Luton to Brentford. George McLeod scored eight goals from 60 appearances for Luton in the 1950s, while David Court and Jim McNichol both featured for the Hatters during the 1970s, making 59 and 17 appearances respectively. Ian Benjamin may have made only 17 appearances for Luton before his transfer to Brentford, but he will always be remembered for "that header" against Watford at Kenilworth Road in November 1992...



2 visiting teams only have kept a clean sheet at this stage of the competition. Bolton Wanderers were the first back in January 1898 as they won 1-0. This score was repeated in 1997-98 when Division Three Torquay caused an upset by beating Lennie Lawrence's Division Two side with a 74th-minute Paul Gibbs penalty.



Hatters and Bees past...

THIS week's **LIFELINE** shows how Luton and Brentford's top flight Division One fortunes have risen and fallen over the years. Brentford's high was in their golden years in the Thirties when they came fifth in 1935-36 (which was followed by two sixth-place finishes in the next two years). Their low was 19th place in Division Four in 1973-74. Luton's low point came with a 17th place in Division Four in 1966-67 and their high a top flight 7th place in 1986-87.



A look back at Brentford's last visit to Kenilworth Road

CHAMPIONS!

...but Brentford came so very close to spoiling the Hatters' celebration party

WHEN Brentford last came to Kenilworth Road, it was one of the hottest tickets in town.

With promotion already secured, Luton has just two more objectives to achieve in their remaining two games that season – to win the League title and to get 100 points for the season.

The first of these objectives could be achieved against Brentford. The equation was simple – beat the Bees and the League One title was heading to Kenilworth Road.

The problem was that Brentford had something of a hoodoo over the Hatters at the time. Of the last seven games

Ahmet Brkovic put Luton into an early lead, there was a real sense of belief that Luton's first League in 23 years could be very close.

The Croatian midfielder relieved much of pressure around Kenilworth Road when he got on the end of a Steve Howard flicked header to hit a shot into the ground which looped over goalkeeper Stuart Nelson and into the back of the net.

But the Bees, who went into the game on a decent run of form, were not there to watch the Hatters party, and they took a half-time lead through strikes from Sam Sodje and Deon Burton.

Firstly, Sodje knocked home a loose ball from inside the area after John Salko's telling cross from the right.

Then Brentford seized on a mistake by Kevin Nicholls and Michael Turner's surging run was neatly finished off by Burton, side-footing a shot into the corner of the net.

Stringing five men across midfield in the second period, the Bees tried to hang on to their lead as the Hatters began to get frustrated.

As Nicholls and Steve Robinson both struck the woodwork, the party finish that Luton fans had so desperately craved looked as if it was falling flat.

But, with just six minutes remaining, Robinson was brought down by Michael Turner inside the box. If there was one thing that Kevin Nicholls didn't do, it was miss penalties, and there was little doubt where the ball would finish up. It did. 2-2. Six minutes to go.

And that was just the start of a dramatic end to the game that would live long in the memories of Luton supporters.

In the final minute of the game, Enoch Showunmi buried a header past Nelson and straight from the restart Robinson side-footed a fourth to send Luton's joyous fans wild.

After the final whistle, Luton fans made the most of the party, spilling onto the Kenilworth Road pitch after the Hatters

lifted the trophy. Unfortunately, Luton could not break the elusive 100 points total.

In their final game they drew 3-3 at Doncaster, although most supporters didn't seem to care as they turned out in their hundreds to witness the champions on their open-top bus ride through the town.

330-minutes to take sting out of the Bees

LUTON goalkeeper Bernard Streten clears the ball at Highbury during the concluding part of an epic three game FA Cup battle with the Bees in 1952. Charlie Watkins looks on anxiously while the Bees' Ken Coote and in the centre Jimmy Hill (yes that one) wait for a mistake.

No-one could foresee what was to be in store when, in the first game in this Fourth Round tie Gordon Turner netted after 18 minutes at Kenilworth Road and then watched as Brentford's veteran goalkeeper Ted Gaskell performed miracles keeping out three goal-bound efforts from Bert Mitchell, George Stobart and Jack Taylor.

When Taylor made it 2-0 after the break the game seemed over but the Bees' Billy Sperrin, whose son was to play for Luton, scored two to force a replay.

The replay was almost cancelled on February 6 due to the death of the King that morning but frantic phone calls to the FA confirmed that the match should take place and in the

event a sombre 31,143 turned up at Griffin Park but were soon roaring as the contest swung from end to end.

The Town started the brighter but the Bees came into the game as the interval approached with Billy Dare hitting the woodwork twice. The Luton defence stood firm and were then able to set up attacks with Taylor proving a thorn in the side of the Bees.

Extra time could not separate the teams, who were still going at it as the referee blew the final whistle with the ball bouncing around in the Bees' penalty box. No penalty shoot-outs in those days, so a second replay was arranged at Highbury.

This time an intrigued crowd of 37,269 were present to see the Town take the lead after only 30 seconds when Taylor's shot was deflected past Gaskell

by full-back Kenny Horne. Dare levelled on the half hour but within five minutes Bernard Moore put the Hatters back into the lead. With seven minutes remaining Dare levelled the tie once more and again the punch drunk supporters were about to witness another period of extra time.

Finally, the pace of the game began to slacken off and the battle was confined to the midfield. With only seven minutes of extra time left, Bob Morton picked up the ball on the halfway line and with no-one challenging him advanced to the edge of the area before unleashing an unstoppable left foot shot for a goal which deserved to win any game.

Brentford conceded that the Town had deserved to win this third clash and wished us well as we faced Swindon in the Fifth Round. For the record we saw off the Robins 3-1 before going out to Arsenal at Kenilworth Road in the Quarter-Final in front of a then record crowd of 28,433.



FORTY intriguing ties bring together the full set of League One and League Two sides with a selection of non-League clubs.

The draw serves up three all-League One affairs between sides of contrasting fortunes, as surprise promotion chasers **LEYTON ORIENT** host **BRISTOL ROVERS**, who have struggled to acclimatise to their new surroundings after promotion. **OLDHAM**, meanwhile, have found goals hard to come by, and they host **DONCASTER**, now moving towards the Play-Offs, while **CHELTENHAM**, now under the charge of Keith Downing, face a **BRIGHTON** side who are efficient on the road.

Clashes between League One and Two sides feature extensively, as **WALSALL** host a **SHREWSBURY** side who have faded after a bright start to the campaign. **CARLISLE**, meanwhile, top the League One table, host a **GRIMSBY** side who have struggled away from home. Fellow promotion chasers **SOUTHEND** will be confident of progress at home to **ROCHDALE**, while **CREWE** have a home tie with League Two leaders **MILTON KEYNES**, whose manager Paul Ince will look for a cup run to inspire League success.

Eight League One sides visit League Two teams, as **LEEDS**, who suffered only their first League defeat last Saturday, travel to **HEREFORD**, who are staging a surprise

promotion push. **NOTTINGHAM FOREST** face an intriguing derby at a **LINCOLN** side struggling at the foot of the table, but sure to be inspired by new manager Peter Jackson, while **PORT VALE**, also under new management, will hope that a second trip of the campaign to **MORECAMBE** doesn't add to the Johnstone's Paint Trophy elimination they suffered there. **GILLINGHAM**'s visit to **BARNET** continues the new manager theme, as Mark Stimson looks to guide his new side to victory at a club who enjoyed a best ever FA Cup run last season.

A trans-Pennine encounter matches **ACCRINGTON**, who have been in solid form of late, with a **HUDDERSFIELD** team whose away form has been mixed so far. There is another local derby between **WYCOMBE** and **SWINDON**, while two other League Two sides will welcome the chance to test themselves against higher opposition as **DARLINGTON**, unbeaten at home, and with only five goals conceded in their opening 13 matches, host **NORTHAMPTON**, boasting Golden Boot contender Andy Kirk. **CHESTERFIELD**'s Jack Lester also tops the scoring charts, and he could be the decisive factor against **TRANMERE**. In contrast, there are only two all-League Two matches, as **BRADFORD CITY**, surprise strugglers, entertain top three **CHESTER**, who are undefeated away from home. **PETERBOROUGH**, pushing for the

Play-Offs, host a **WREXHAM** side in serious trouble near the foot of the table.

The pick of the extensive non-League involvement sees League One **YEOVIL** travel to **TORQUAY**, pressing hard for an immediate return to the League. Fellow League One **HARTLEPOOL** travel to a **GAINSBOROUGH** side in Blue Square North mid-table, while struggling **AFC BOURNEMOUTH** visit **BARROW**, who are finding life in Blue Square North equally challenging. **MILLWALL** find themselves fighting off relegation again, a fate which their hosts, Blue Square Premier **ALTRINCHAM**, also face, having lost seven of their nine home matches. The quartet of games is completed by promotion-chasing **SWANSEA**'s trip to Ryman Premier **BILLERICAY**, featuring in the First Round for the third time in 11 seasons.

Four League Two sides have home advantage against non-League opposition, as **BURY**, with inconsistent home form, play a **WORKINGTON** side pushing for promotion from Blue Square North. **MANSFIELD** face a repeat of a Second Round tie two seasons ago, which they won 3-0, as they face Blue Square Premier **GRAYS**. Out of form **STOCKPORT** may be less confident, though, as they play Ryman Premier **STAINES**, who forced one of the few upsets in the last round with a win at

WOKING, and have the best defensive record in their division. **NOTTS COUNTY**'s home tie with Blue Square Premier **HISTON** completes the picture, with the visitors looking to emulate their best ever run of three seasons ago.

Three further sides must travel away, most notably **MACCLESFIELD**, who lost 5-0 at Mansfield last week, and go to **RUSHDEN & DIAMONDS**, managed by Garry Hill, who has caused a few FA Cup upsets during his career. Hill's former side **DAGENHAM & REDBRIDGE** travel across London to Blue Square South **HAMPTON & RICHMOND**, pressing for a second successive promotion, and perhaps sensing an upset given the Daggers' slow start to League life. **FOREST GREEN** boast Blue Square Premier's most prolific marksmen, Stuart Fleetwood, as they face a Play-Off challenging **ROTHERHAM** side who have lost only once away.

Ten all Non-League ties means healthy representation in the next round. There are four all-Blue Square Premier ties, with Peter Taylor's **STEVENAGE** travelling to fellow promotion hopefuls **EXETER**, while **CAMBRIDGE UNITED** against **ALDERSHOT** is another sub-text to the race for League football. **HALIFAX** face **BURTON**, in a reverse of last season's tie which saw Albion earn a 1-0 home win over the

Shaymen. Mid-table **OXFORD UNITED** host **NORTHWICH**, whose only win in any competition this season came in the last round at **SOUTHPORT**.

Blue Square Premier **YORK** host mid-table Blue Square South side **HAVANT**, in the First Round for the second consecutive season, while three other sides who came to prominence in recent seasons are in action again. Southern One Midlands **CHASETOWN**, who enjoyed a best ever run two seasons ago, travel to Southern Premier **TEAM BATH**, participants at this stage in 2003. In the same year, **HARROGATE RAILWAY ATHLETIC** enjoyed their best run too, and the Unibond One side host Blue Square Premier strugglers **DROYLSDEN**. Keane

THERE'S never a good time for a player to be out injured, but for the unfortunate Keith Keane, his current injury couldn't have come at a more irritating period of the season.

With Hatters boss Kevin Blackwell making massive changes to the Hatters squad in the summer, Keane could have easily been left out in the wilderness at Kenilworth Road.

But after waiting patiently for his chance, the full-back made an immediate impression when right-back Richard Jackson was forced off during the Carling Cup win over Sunderland.

Keane took his opportunity with both hands, and just when it looked as if a breakthrough would come – disaster struck in the most cruel way.

After picking up a abdominal strain in the defeat to Leeds, Keane then went down with a hernia problem, compounding to weeks on the sidelines.

However, the youngster can finally see some light at the end of the tunnel as he continues to fight his way back to training.

The 20-year-old said: "I'm coming back slowly but surely. I have just started training with the youth team for the last two days so that has been slightly encouraging.

"I'm still not 100 per cent, but I am starting to get there. It's taking a lot longer than I first thought, but with these type of injuries you just have to be patient

"At first, when I pulled up against Leeds, I had an abdominal strain, but then that brought through a hernia.

"The medical team dealt with the hernia, which we thought would deal with everything, but it didn't. I have

never been injured more than a week – if that. For me it's particularly frustrating because I have had to wait for a chance and after playing just three games, I go and get injured with this.

"I thought I played well in the three games I was involved in, but against Northampton in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy I was really struggling. I couldn't run freely at all, and I have been really struggling since then."

Knowing the seriousness of the injury, Luton acted fast and Keane was sent for treatment immediately.

But Keane's destination for treatment wasn't local. In fact, the Republic of Ireland Under-21 international jetted off to Germany to visit a specialist in hernia injuries.

The defender was sent to Dr Ulrike Muschawek, who became known among football fans for being the surgeon who treated Newcastle and England striker Michael Owen on his return from a stomach injury.

"It was Harry Stockman our physio who was the first one who recommended that I should go to Germany and visit Dr Ulrike Muschawek.

"Harry looked more and more into it and in the end he found out that it was cheaper, quicker and better all round.

"A lot of people made a big deal about it because it was in Germany and was the same place that Michael Owen went to, but at the end of the day it was stupid not to if it was going to help me get back into action quicker."

For now, Keane is fully concentrating on returning to fitness and winning his place back in the Luton side.

Only then, will the former Hatters trainee concentrate on winning his place back on the international set-up.

The defender was called by his country for Under-21 duty earlier this season,

but withdrew as he went through the pain barrier.

"I got called up by Ireland, but obviously that came at a frustrating time in the season for me. There was a chance that I could have been fit, because the game I was due to play in was 12 days after the operation.

"However, because I was injured three weeks before I had even had the operation, it was felt that it was best to rule me out because even if I was able to play, I wouldn't have been able to do myself justice.

"I'm not thinking too far ahead on the international scene. I would love to eventually play for the senior side, but I feel I have to sort out getting back into the Luton side first and only then can I start to move on and look further ahead."

Keane doesn't have to look far for his inspiration of playing at the highest level. He was part of a crop of players that came through the youth ranks at Kenilworth Road, joining Calvin Andrew, Dean Brill and the recently departed Leon Barnett and Kevin Foley.

And Keane is still in constant contact with his former colleagues.

The full-back added: "There aren't many more of us now. It's a little strange and just shows how quickly time moves on.

"I went to watch Kevin Foley at Wolves when I had a weekend off recently and he is doing very well up there. He is loving it at the moment.

"I haven't gone to see Leon yet, but he has been back in Luton a few times and he tells me he is enjoying the experience. I believe he is doing equally well up at West Brom.

"Every player's ambition is to play at the highest level, but my first aim is to get back into the team on a regular basis. It's been that way now for several years, which is why it is very frustrating to be out at the moment."

The ever-improving Calvin Andrew was deservedly voted Man Of The Match by Luton fans for his constant battling and his tireless running for the cause.







M**George Ross POTTER**

Tough-tackling full-back George had been earning good reviews while turning out for Forfar leading to him being invited for trials at promotion-bound Luton in March 1968.

The Hatters liked what they saw when he appeared in a Beds Professional Cup game against Dunstable and offered him a contract and an almost immediate First Team call-up in midfield as replacement for the injured Alan Slough.

Although never letting the side down, George found it difficult to win a regular place in a Hatters side moving up through the divisions and so moved to Torquay in 1969 and on to Hartlepool two years later where he went on to make more than 200 League appearances.

George emigrated to Australia in 1977 and is now a dollar millionaire, owning three McDonald's restaurants in Brisbane!

John Anthony (Tony) POUNDER

Luton Town scouts took a liking to Atlas Sports (Sheffield) winger Tony and after asking him to Kenilworth Road for trials encouraged him to sign a professional contract at a Sheffield hotel on Boxing Day 1955 just before the Town were due to play at Bramall Lane.

Fast and direct, Tony was given his Division One baptism the following April in a 1-0 home win over Portsmouth and made two further appearances in 1956-57 before moving on to Coventry in search of more regular First Team football.

He did not last long at Highfield Road but made up for it with a long playing career at Crewe, Yeovil, Dorchester and Crewkerne and then watched as his son, also Tony, turned out in almost 200 games for Bristol Rovers and Hereford.

Tony now lives in Yeovil in retirement.

Neil Anthony POUTCH

Dublin born Neil joined Luton Town from school and worked his way up to becoming a regular in the Hatters Reserve side as a cultured full-back.

A severe injury crisis at Kenilworth Road, with eight First Team regulars out of the side, meant that manager Jim Ryan needed to blood some youngsters for the trip to high flyers Aston Villa in March 1990. This led to full League debuts being awarded to Tim Allpress and Ceri Hughes and a place on the bench for Irish Under-21 international Neil. Neil got his chance on the hour, replacing Jason Rees, but could do little to affect the game with the Town already two goals down.

That was the only chance that Neil was given and he returned to Ireland with Shamrock Rovers that summer before moving to Drogheda in 1992.

Neil is now involved with property in Spain.

David William PREECE

David joined Walsall from school and after signing professional forms for the Saddlers in July 1980 as a 17-year-old, enjoyed four years at Fellows Park which included appearances in the Semi-Finals of the Milk Cup.

A Luton bid of £150,000 plus forward Steve Elliott was accepted by Walsall and David made his way to Kenilworth Road in December 1984.

After making his Luton debut in a 1-0 home win over Aston Villa, scoring the only goal, David went on to make 395 First Team appearances for the Hatters including one in the Littlewoods Cup Final win over Arsenal in 1988.

The tiny but hugely talented midfielder also won England B honours during his time with the Hatters. Following a testimonial game against Manchester United at the end of the 1994-95 season he decided to move to Derby before enjoying spells with Cambridge and Torquay.


David sadly passed away earlier this year.

Paul Terence PRICE

Paul was a schoolboy prodigy feted by several clubs but the St Albans born defender opted for Luton, making his League debut on the last day of 1972-73.

He had to wait three years, though, before earning a regular place in the side but once established he remained virtually ever-present until a shock, and disappointing, £200,000 move to Tottenham in 1981.

By now a Welsh international, Paul won an FA Cup winner's medal at White Hart Lane before slipping down the pecking order and trying his luck in the USA. Spells at Swansea and Peterborough followed before moves to non-League Wivenhoe and St Albans. After a time at Hitchin as joint manager, Paul emigrated to Australia where he has been for the last four years.

Jesse PYE


Jesse had already enjoyed a full and successful career when he joined Luton for £9,000 in 1952 but even though he was 32 at the time he was soon regarded as one of the finest players to pull on a Hatters shirt.

Born in Rotherham, Jesse turned out for Sheffield United and Notts County before a big money move to Wolves in 1946 where he scored 95 League goals, two in the 1949 FA Cup Final as well as receiving an England call-up.

Showing superb ball control for a big man and a fine football brain, Jesse top-scored for Luton in his first season and was instrumental in the training and teaching of future Hatters record scorer Gordon Turner.

Citing the health of his wife, Jesse moved to Derby in 1954 before spending nine years at Wisbech with the last six as manager.

Jesse passed away in 1984.

**George McIntosh RAMAGE**

Brave goalkeeper George started out with the now defunct Third Lanark in Scotland before being picked up by Colchester in August 1961.

George had to wait 18 months before being given the chance to replace the popular Percy Ames in the U's goal but, once established, he was given a good run in the side. Joining Leyton Orient in 1964 turned out to be a mistake as a change of manager meant that his appearances were limited and a move to Luton a year later was hardly more successful as he made only seven League appearances at Kenilworth Road as understudy to Colin Tinsley.

George emigrated to Australia in 1967 and after finally hanging up his gloves became an electrician for the council in Woonona near Sydney.


John Anthony (Tony) READ

After failing to make the grade at both Sheffield Wednesday and Peterborough, goalkeeper Tony joined Luton in March 1965, but such was the malaise sweeping through Kenilworth Road it was a while before they discovered their new signing had arrived with a broken bone in his foot!

Tony always fancied himself as a striker and got his chance the following season and netted 12 goals in only 20 starts, including a hat-trick against Notts County at Kenilworth Road.

The rich vein of form did not last and it was back in goal for Tony, who became a firm fans' favourite over the next six years while seeing off several pretenders to his throne in that time with his spectacular shot stopping and athleticism.

Tony is now retired in Dersingham where he continues to practise his golf swing.

**Barry Reginald Frank REED**

Peterborough-born Barry started his footballing career at St Neots before being spotted by Leicester who he joined in 1955.

A cool full-back with good distribution, Barry became a mainstay in the Foxes Football Combination side but was never able to earn a First Team chance. After six years at Filbert Street he accepted a free-transfer to Luton but such was the form of Brendan McNally that he made only one League appearance for the Hatters in a 1-4 home defeat at the hands of Southampton in September 1961, where he acquitted himself 'moderately well'.

Barry is perhaps better known for managing Barton Rovers to the FA Vase Final in 1978.

Now retired, Barry still lives in Luton.


Jason Mark REES

Jason was yet another youth player who came off the production line at Kenilworth Road following the recommendation of legendary scout Cyril Beech.

Born in Aberdare, Jason signed on for the Hatters in 1988 before making his League debut as a substitute in a 1-2 defeat at Everton on New Year's Day 1990. A busy, aggressive midfielder, Jason did not earn a regular place in the Luton side until the Town were relegated from the top flight in 1992.

When he found himself out of the side once more Jason, by now a Welsh international, moved to Portsmouth for First Team football in 1994 and finished his League career with a tour of West Country clubs Exeter and Torquay.

After spells at Tiverton and Taunton, Jason is now manager of Cullompton Rangers.

AFTER another action-packed League One programme in mid-week, teams now focus their attentions on FA Cup action and eye a potential money-spinning campaign in the competition.


Despite a blip last weekend against **CARLISLE UNITED** (1st), **LEEDS UNITED** (7th) still remain the in-form team in the division.

"The lads are really enjoying being involved in it and it's even more fun to see all the coaches, physiotherapists and kit managers below all the players.





Luton Town v
SOUTHEND

SOUTHEND came down to League One with Luton last season, but find themselves 12 places above the Hatters this time around for one simple reason. Their away form.

The Shrimpers have picked up 13 points on the road compared with 12 at Roots Hall, where they have been beaten three times already this season.

It was a rocky start for manager Steve Tilson's side. After losing talismanic striker Freddy Eastwood to Wolves for £1.5m in the summer, they started life in League One by losing three of their opening four games.

But they then got their act together and went on a storming run in September and October, winning six and drawing one of eight matches.

They have had mixed fortunes in their last three games, losing 1-0 at home to leaders Carlisle, winning by the same score at Northampton and then getting whacked 4-1 at Forest on Tuesday night. But if that sounds like a thrashing, it doesn't tell the whole story.


Southend took the lead after just three minutes and held it until four minutes before the break. Then in two minutes after the hour they conceded a second that they are convinced was offside and had their top scorer Leon Clarke sent off for an off-the-ball incident. Forest pounced and added two more to give the scoreline a flattering look and leave Southend aggrieved.

The good news for Luton is that Clarke – on loan from Sheffield Wednesday and on fire this season with seven goals from 11 games – will miss three matches and the third is at Kenilworth Road.

Tilson took over at Roots Hall in his first managerial job in November 2003 and it hasn't been dull since with two promotions and a relegation in three years. In his first full season, Southend went up through the Play-Offs, beating Lincoln in extra time in the Final thanks to goals from Eastwood and ex-Hatter Duncan Jupp.

Next season they ran away with League One and finished as Champions before crashing back down last season.

Southend's last visit to Kenilworth Road finished in a goalless draw just before Christmas 2006, but Hatters fans will remember the last meeting between the two sides. It came at the end of last season when goals from Calvin Andrew, Matthew Spring and Bezian Idrizaj gave the Hatters a 3-1 victory. It's the last time Luton won away from home in the League.
