



over 9000, otherwise this club will never achieve the stature it deserves.


This is a painful situation for everyone and I stand by what I said yesterday –

But we now must forget about the past and concentrate on working as a unit and do what is best for the Club.


You only have to look at our performance against Walsall last week to show that we have a lot of fight within us.

So congratulations must go to the Youth team's excellent progression in the FA Youth Cup.







GOOD afternoon to everyone.

Firstly, can I advise you of FA Cup match arrangements.

The change of date for the Brentford FA Cup replay from Tuesday November 20 to Tuesday November 27, due to international call-ups, meant the postponement of our Pontin's reserve match with Milton Keynes, this has not yet been re-scheduled.

Should we proceed to Round Two of The FA Cup next week, the match is scheduled to be played on Saturday December 1 and our opponents would be either Nottingham Forest or Lincoln City, who also replay on Tuesday.

Therefore there would only be four days before the next round. Bedfordshire Police have requested the required ten days notice for this match, so if we were successful the match would take place on Tuesday December 11, with a 7.45pm

kick-off. Any replay would take place on Tuesday December 18 and therefore put the Third Round of the competition back on track, to be played on Saturday January 5 2008.

This week is Anti-Bullying Week from November 19th to the 25th. In a recent survey by OFSTED, 30% of children and young people said they were bullied. Luton Schools and the Local Authority support the week each year, and this year Luton Town have been asked to support the activities being undertaken to help Luton's children and young people to feel safer in the community, which we are happy to do.

This year's slogan is "Being Safe Together. Being Safe Wherever." The major event this year is a conference for pupils from Luton high schools, organised by the Police and the Children and Learning Department of Luton Borough Council. It will seek the views and ideas of young people about how they think that life

in Luton can be improved and how they can feel safer within the community.

A reminder that the Club's 11th Annual Carol Service takes place at St. Mary's Church, Church Street, Luton (opposite the Arndale Centre) on Thursday December 6, commencing at 7.30pm. Everyone is welcome and we will be joined by the Luton Gospel Choir and the Leagrave Primary School Choir.

With Christmas nearly upon us, New Year is just around the corner, meaning supporters will begin planning holidays, so just to let you know that The Football League have this week confirmed that the start of the 2008-2009 season will be on Saturday August 9 2008.

Enjoy the game and get behind the team.

Supporting clubs provide behind-the-scenes tours, motivational talks, signed merchandise and player appearances to attract young people to complete The Prince's Trust Team programme.

"Seeing behind the scenes at the Club and how it operates as a business, signed merchandise and work experience can really help them to complete the course as well as boost their confidence and motivation."

The Southend story from 1906

Beginnings

PUB landlord Oliver Trigg gets the credit for the birth of Southend United, calling a meeting at his Blue Boar pub on May 19, 1906. This set up a club to replace Southend Athletic, the town's amateur team who had just folded. United joined Southern League Division Two and won it in their first two seasons, being allowed up after the second. In 1920, they were founder members of the Football League's new Division Three. A year later this split and Southend stayed in Division Three South until 1958.

Top player

SOME fans would give it to recent legend Freddy Eastwood, but Stan Collymore not only did it on the pitch, where he banged in 18 goals in 33 games between 1992 and 1993, he also did a lot to secure the Shrimpers' financial future. They snapped him up from Crystal Palace reserves for just £750k and sold him on to Nottingham Forest for £3.57million. He went on to play for England.

Top manager

If current boss Steve Tilson achieves much more it will be him, but three-times Southend boss David Webb just shades it. He led the Blues from Division Four to Division Two with successive promotions and kept them in the second tier for six seasons that the fans are still talking about. Webb, a tough Chelsea defender, even took them to the top of the Division One table for a few hours...

Top game

Southend 4-0 Newcastle
Division Two (old): January 1, 1992

DRAWING 0-0 at home to European champions Liverpool in the FA Cup Third Round in 1979 runs it close, but many fans think this game under manager Dave Webb was as good as it gets. Two goals from Brett Angell, and strikes from Keith Jones and Andy Ansah sent Ossie Ardiles' Geordies packing. Best of all, it was a morning kick-off and left Southend top of the second tier for a whole three hours.

only out of an automatic promotion place on goal difference.

Since then it's been mixed. Clarke has continued to be a real find with seven goals in 11 games, but a straight red card at Forest in early November has seen him miss three games, today's visit to Luton being the third.

Defeats to top clubs Tranmere, Carlisle and Forest have been offset by wins against Crewe, Walsall and Northampton, and a stirring comeback from 2-0 down at home to Cheltenham last Saturday to earn a point.

It leaves Southend fifth in the table, in a Play-Off spot and only two points behind




PUTTING DOWN ROOTS: Southend have played at Roots Hall since 1905 with one 34-year gap

the leaders, but in a tight bunch where three points cover the top seven sides.

Boss Steve Tilson is in his first managerial job after taking over at Roots Hall in November 2003. So far he has taken Southend up through the League Two Play-Offs, seen them promoted again as League One Champions, then relegated a year later, and now he is pressing for a third promotion. Not bad in less than four seasons.

But Southend fans want to be back in the Championship and the belief is growing that they are on the verge of building a side to rival David Webb's in the early 1990s. If they can keep Leon Clarke beyond January, they may just be right.

Blues back to their Roots after allotments take-over

SOUTHEND started out at Roots Hall, their current ground, but had to move out in 1919 when the site was turned into allotments. They moved next door to the Kursaal Pleasure Park, where the ground was dwarfed by a giant water-chute. They then played at the town's greyhound stadium from 1933 to 1954, when they returned to Roots Hall with the move entirely funded by the supporters club. The ground holds 12,300.

How has this season gone?

We have done quite well after a bad start. After relegation, we were on a downer and lost three of the first four. It was not until Leon Clarke joined on loan from Sheffield Wednesday that things started to pick up. He scored seven in his first eight games and added real quality to the attack. The first third of the season has gone well and we are in a position to push for promotion.

What are the Shrimpers' aims?

To go up is the No 1 aim. Everyone enjoyed the Championship last season even if the results weren't the best. It was great going to the Stadium of Light and the Ricoh Arena, and now heading to Hartlepool and Cheltenham isn't quite as appealing. That's why promotion is the target but this is a very competitive League and extremely hard to get out of.

Who is your key signing?

The best close season signing was mid-fielder Nicky Bailey from Barnet. He has been brilliant, never seems to stop running and has been our best player. The best other new recruit has to be Leon Clarke, who joined on loan in September until January. Whether we keep him will have a massive say on where we finish.

Who will be your star players?

There are quite a few players making a real impact. In previous years Freddy Eastwood hogged the headlines but everyone gets a fair share now. At the back Peter Clarke and Adam Barrett have been outstanding. Bailey and Leon Clarke are stars and so is Alan McCormack. He gets the rest of the team going with his energy. And with quality players like Mark Gower and Kevin Maher, I believe we have the best midfield at this level.

Who will win League One?

I'm rubbish at predictions but I would go for Nottingham Forest. They have a big squad full of quality players and have some really excellent strikers. They also have excellent support and the finances to strengthen when required so I'll go for them – which probably means they will end up about seventh!

THE KEY MEN FOR

THE SKIPPER:
8 KEVIN MAHER

WITH more than 440 games to his name and all of them for Southend, Irish Under-21 international midfielder Kevin Maher has been nothing if not loyal to the Shrimpers since he made his debut at Burnley in January 1998. Southend's longest-serving player, he made his 400th appearance for the club in the Championship at Leeds last season. Maher began his career at Tottenham as a trainee but in three years at White Hart Lane could not manage to break into the First Team and so joined Southend on a free transfer. Maher has won four Ireland Under-21 caps along the way. As Southend club captain, his experience and drive have been key factors in his side's rise to the Championship. Playing in the heart of midfield, he is a good passer of the ball and always reads the game well.

KEEPERS


1 DARRYL FLAHAVAN: Former Southampton trainee Darryl played 111 League games for the Shrimpers and was then released at the end of 2002-03. But three months later he was back at Roots Hall and has since played 158 more League games. Not the tallest at 5ft 11ins, he makes up for it with agility. He first joined Southend from non-League Woking in 2000

and has been a vital part of the Southend side. He capped a superb campaign in winning League One in 2005-06 when he was the division's PFA Player Of The Year. He was also in the division Team Of The Season


and picked up the Players' Player award. He kept his 88th clean sheet in the 2-0 Carling Cup win over Watford in August, beating Paul Sansome's 10-year-old club record.



Richard Jackson kept his place in the side with Alan Goodall returning to the bench after completing his one match suspension.



But Luton gritted it out, scored their late equaliser and get another chance to face Lincoln or Nottingham Forest at home in the Second Round.





28 is the number of previous League meetings between the sides at Kenilworth Road with Luton winning 15, losing just four and drawing nine. The Hatters have scored 54 and conceded 29.

8 is the highest number of goals in this fixture and came in an amazing 4-4 draw. It was December 1923 and Rob Millar scored Luton's first with his only goal of the season, before Andy Kerr hit the Hatters' second. Syd Hoar netted the other two. This was to be a rare away point for the Shrimpers as they managed only one win and two other draws on their travels all season.

14,461 is the highest attendance,

and came on the opening day of the 1936-37 season. Luton won by a solitary Joe Payne goal. This was the first of a record 55 goals that Payne scored in just 39 League appearances that season. Luton finished as Champions of Division Three South on goal difference, while the Shrimpers were 13 points behind in 10th.

3 is the number of different tiers of the Football League in which the sides have met in the last three meetings at Kenilworth Road. Last season both teams were in the Championship, and the match finished goal-less. Back in 2001-02 Luton won promotion from the bottom flight and beat Southend 2-0 with goals from Carl Griffiths and Andrew Fotiadis. Four years earlier, the sides had met in what was then called the "New" Division Two – the current League One. Stuart Douglas scored the only goal of the game in August 1997.

12 clean sheets have been kept by the Hatters in this fixture. Three of these matches were goal-less draws in 1926-27, 1927-28 and then last season. The Hatters meanwhile have failed to score on only five occasions. As well as the draws, Southend won 3-0 in

It wasn't until the second half that the game came to life with the best chance falling to Mooney as he forced Brill into a breathtaking save to his right.







And in Luton's first game of the season at home to Hartlepool, Furlong partnered Peschisolido up front, with Parkin, Talbot and McVeigh on the bench... and Andrew in the stands. Watching. "It was a bit of a knock-back," he remembers, "because I had come back from an injury and played the last couple of games of last season. Then to start a new season and see six strikers on the list – I knew I was going to have to work hard and start again from scratch and see how far I could get up the pecking order."

"I thought: if I start a match this season, that's great."

He needed to be patient. In August and September, Luton played 12 games and – apart from a start in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy – Andrew played for just 59 minutes.

So if you'd told him then that come mid-November he would have started six out of the last nine games and played on his own up front in three of them, he might not have believed you.

"It's been unfortunate for some of the other lads who have picked up injuries, but I've been given my chance. I'm grateful and I'm just going to have to keep up the good work and improve. It's my turn to show what I can do and I've just got to go out there and do it."

"Playing on your own up front is very hard, but I'm a strong character. In football you wait for your opportunity and it's not always going to be easy when your turn comes around. Now for me it has come around and I've been put up there

on my own so I'm just going to have to try to prove what I can do."

"The lads have helped me and the coaching staff have helped me and it's about being in the right frame of mind to go and play football."

And the up-side of being thrown in at the deepest of deep ends is that you learn very quickly. Many have said he seems to be improving with every game. Does he agree?

"I think I improve every day, let alone every game. I come in and I train and pick up things from the staff and from the experienced players and I try to implement into my football. I think at this stage in my career that's the key to make sure I'm improving."

"This is great experience for me. Every game you play, no matter whether it's Reserves or First Team, it's always great experience."

That improvement led to Andrew scoring the most important goal of his young career – the late strike that kept Luton in the FA Cup by earning a draw at home to Brentford and setting up a replay at Griffin Park next Tuesday.

It was also his first senior goal at Kenilworth Road.

"Yes, I was very pleased. It's a bit of a milestone to score for the first time in front of the home fans, but hopefully that's the first of many."

"The goal couldn't have come at a much better time. That was a hard game. Hopefully we can now go on and win the replay and do what we couldn't do at home."

"I had a good weekend after that goal and I just couldn't wait to get back and play football. I couldn't wait to get back into training."

It has been a fast rise for Andrew – who will be 21 six days before Christmas – since he was spotted playing down the road at Barton.

"I was playing left midfield for Barton Rovers, and I scored a couple of goals and played quite impressively. And then I was given

the chance to go to Peterborough and try to get in there."

"They offered me a deal, but I played against Luton for the Youth Team and scored and I got the chance to come back here. I spent a season on a non-contract basis, and then five months as a YT before I was offered a pro contract."

"It was very nice to come back home. I'd only just got into the whole playing football professionally and it was a lot of travelling to get to Peterborough. It's always a dream to play for your home town in front of your home fans and people you know. This is a dream come true."

"It's been a long couple of years for me, and I'm just relieved that I've got that goal out of the way and now hopefully I can go on a roll and get some more goals."

Meanwhile, all those other strikers at the Club are busy passing on invaluable tips.

"Definitely, definitely. Paul Furlong especially is helping me with my game – not only the football but mentally as well. He's helping me to be focused. I'm indebted to him really. It's nice to have a person like that around the Club to mentor you and help you through."

But Andrew is also not getting carried away by the good times. He knows that there is a chance later in the season that the rest will come back from injury and that he could be back on the bench and watching football for a living again.

"You've got to deal with those things. Unfortunately in football those things happen but I'm keen to go out there and show my worth and prove my point and do as well as I can."

Then he adds with a huge grin but just a touch of steel in his eyes: "And so when the other players do come back they'll have to wait their turn!"

Who knows what the rest of the season will hold for a player who expected to be watching from the stands this season but is quickly turning into the one to watch.







7-6 90 mins, Mark Marshall: Another tap-in at the far post as a ball from the right beat everyone.

7-7 90+2 mins, Mark Marshall: With the final kick of the game Marshall fired home Grant's cut back.





Jamie McGuinness then went on to score his first goal of the season to put Luton in the lead just before half-time.

Second-half substitute Ashley Harrison-Barker and Ryan Charles made it 4-1 after the break, adding to an impressive performance by the youngsters.

And Youth boss Chris Cummins was full of praise for his side who had dominated the game.

"We created a lot of chances but we need to be more clinical in front of goal."

"We played well as a team and deserved the win."

After Luton produced numerous chances in front of goal it seemed unfortunate that they found themselves 1-0 down. But a cross from the right allowed Farthing to tap in the ball on 44 minutes.

Charles found enough space to cross the

ball into McGuinness who turned to knock the ball into the bottom right-hand corner, giving Luton a well deserved lead in stoppage time.

The second half started with a somewhat slower pace and it took Luton another 33 minutes before they found the back of the net again. This time it was Harrison-Barker who knocked the ball in, after receiving a cross from a lively Elliott Osborne-Ricketts.

Luton youth striker Charles finished off a well rounded performance with a diagonal shot just inside the area which flew past the keeper in the 90th minute.

After the game Cummins was delighted with the result, and praised the performance of McGuinness.

"Jamie is a great player, he does everything you ask of him and hopefully this will give him a bit more self belief."

Safely through to the third round the Hatters now wait to see whether they will host Leeds or Walsall. But Cummins admitted that he was hoping his side would meet former FA Youth Cup winners Leed:

He said: "Hopefully we will get Leeds because it would be a good test for us."

During September we acquired new software/video technology to be used at every match. This equipment allows us to store the performance of each player during a game and gives us the opportunity to review it with the individual afterwards.



- Allowing us to develop the department into a truly county-wide community project and not one that covers only the Luton area.


- Maintain control of our massively-successful Development Centre Programme, which in 15 months has provided the Centre of Excellence with 30 new players.

ROGER WASH looks at every post-war

John REID

Fleet-footed inside-forward John started his professional football career with Hamilton Academical from where he joined Bradford City in 1957.

Becoming a crowd favourite at Valley Parade it needed a big bid to prise him away but upwardly mobile Northampton paid £5,000 in 1961 which proved money well spent as John helped them to promotion two years later.

Luton, newly-relegated to Division Three, paid a massive £13,000 for his services in November 1963 but he was continually playing in a poor Hatters side, although he always showed 100 per cent commitment and flashes of ability.

Spells at Torquay and Rochdale followed as well as a managerial appointment at Market Rasen Town before he became a newsagent in Bradford. John now lives in Keighley in retirement.

**Gordon George RIDDICK**

Watford-born Gordon came to Luton as a 17-year-old and worked his way up through the ranks at Kenilworth Road before making his League debut in a 1-2 defeat at Rotherham in December 1962.

Gordon made more than 100 First Team appearances for the Hatters over the next five years but the crowd never warmed to him despite his whole-hearted effort and some vital goals.

Gillingham paid a record fee to take him to Priestfield in 1967 and from there he played for a further four clubs in fairly quick succession, finishing with Brentford. A minor counties cricketer of note, Gordon ran his own building firm as well as working behind the scenes on Sky TV sports events.

**Bruce David RIOCH**

Born in Aldershot but raised in Luton, Bruce made his League debut as a 17-year-old for the Hatters in November 1964 and soon had the scouts flocking to Kenilworth Road where they admired his pace, power and fierce shooting.

After helping the Town to the championship of Division Four in 1968 and seeing his colleagues narrowly miss out the following year, Bruce accepted a record fee move to Aston Villa.

Further big money moves to Derby and Everton followed as well as the honour of skippering Scotland, the country of his father.

Bruce then entered into a second career, managing amongst others, Middlesbrough, Bolton, Arsenal and Norwich with some success and has recently returned to his home in Norfolk after a spell with Odense.

**Vidar RISETH**

Luton manager Terry Westley paid £110,000 to bring Vidar from Norwegian club Kongsvinger in October 1995 but within weeks the manager had gone leaving the tall striker floundering in a Hatters side destined for relegation.

Town fans never saw the best of Vidar, who left for Linz the following summer on a free transfer, but other clubs certainly have with Celtic, TSV Munich and Rosenborg paying large fees for his services.

With over 50 caps for Norway under his belt, Vidar, now a steady influence in midfield, recently caught the eye in a Champions League tie at Chelsea, where he helped Rosenborg to a 1-1 draw.

**Alan Desmond RIVERS**

Big, no-nonsense centre-half Alan joined Luton from school before signing professional forms for the Hatters on his 18th birthday in January 1964.

Alan made his League debut, deputising for the injured Matt Woods, in a 2-1 home victory over Newport in September 1965, before going on to make 30 appearances for the Town over the next two seasons.

With new manager Allan Brown wishing to bring in his own players, Alan moved on to Watford in 1967 but managed only two games as substitute for the Hornets before a spell at Rangers in South Africa and then a short stay at Crewe.

Alan is now back in South Africa, where he watches the career of his son Mark, of Crewe and Norwich fame, from afar.

Benjamin (Ben) James ROBERTS

Goalkeeper Ben holds an unwanted record, having conceded the fastest ever goal in an FA Cup Final when Chelsea's Roberto Di Matteo scored after only 42 seconds against his Middlesbrough side.

Joining Boro as a Youth Trainee, Ben found it difficult to earn a regular spot between the sticks at Ayresome Park and was farmed out to five clubs on loan including the Hatters, for whom he turned in 14 assured appearances at the end of the 1999-2000 campaign.

Transferred to Charlton in the summer of 2000, Ben fared little better at the Valley leading up to more loan moves including a shorter spell at Luton in 2002.

Ben finally earned a permanent goalkeeping spot at Brighton in 2003 but sadly had to retire from the game at 29 following a persistent back injury.

**Graham RODGER**

Graham made his League debut for Wolves but due to the financial problems at Molineux was allowed to move to Coventry in February 1984.

At Highfield Road, Graham had difficulty in breaking the central defensive partnership of Brian Kilcline and Trevor Peake but he did manage to win an FA Cup winner's medal there, coming on as substitute as the Sky Blues beat Tottenham in the 1987 Final.

In order to gain a regular First Team place, Graham accepted a tribunal-set £200,000 move to Luton in 1989 which turned out to be a disaster. A succession of injuries severely cut back his appearances and he was probably glad when Grimsby rescued him from his nightmare in 1992.

With the Mariners, Graham enjoyed a far more injury-free playing career and was later appointed coach then manager at the club. Graham is now Football in the Community officer at Grimsby.

**David Charles ROWLAND**

Stotfold-born David first caught the eye while forming part of a left wing partnership with future Hatter Roland Legate at Arlesey Town.

West Ham were quickest off the blocks for his signature but he failed to make the breakthrough at Upton Park and so accepted the chance to join Luton, signing professional forms in January 1958.

David made a League debut for the Hatters as a 17-year-old in a 1-2 home defeat at the hands of Manchester City in March 1958 but that was as good as it got for the ball playing inside-left who returned to the 'A' team.

Going on to play for Bedford after leaving Kenilworth Road, David now lives in Potton in retirement.

Keith ROWLAND

Northern Ireland international Keith joined Bournemouth as a youngster and soon impressed as a tireless left-back or left sided midfielder leading to a big money move to West Ham in 1993.

At Upton Park, Keith became a favourite despite injuries punctuating his appearances but after being kept on the sidelines by Julian Dicks, he moved to QPR along with ex-Hatter Iain Dowie in an exchange deal which took Trevor Sinclair to the Hammers.

Further injury problems hindered his time at Loftus Road and he moved to Joe Kinnear's Luton on loan in 2001 to get some match practice. Playing 12 games in a relegation-threatened side, Keith made a positive contribution in midfield, scoring two important goals along the way.

Spells at Chesterfield, Barnet, Hornchurch, Dublin City and Dagenham then followed and Keith was last at Welling.

**Simon Ernest ROYCE**

Veteran goalkeeper Simon is now with his seventh club after joining Gillingham during the summer following a loan spell from QPR.

Starting off with Heybridge Swifts, Simon then enjoyed seven years at Southend, where his shot stopping abilities eventually earned a move to Charlton in 1998. A transfer to Leicester then followed, as well as loan spells at Brighton and QPR, and then back to Charlton.

After falling down the pecking order at the Valley, Simon accepted an SOS call from Luton in October 2004 and came on loan for two games where he had little to do as the Hatters rattled in nine goals against Bradford City and Wrexham.

TODAY'S MATCHES

ONE of the big encounters in League One this weekend is at Whaddon Road as **CHELTENHAM** (24th) take on high-flying **LEEDS** (4th).

There is no doubt that the odds are heavily stacked against the Robins. They are searching for their first League win since mid-September, a run that has stretched back 12 games.

During that spell they have conceded 21 goals, leaving new boss Keith Downing the difficult task of getting their season back on track against one of the in-form teams in the country, let alone the division.

Leeds's season continues to go from strength to strength, despite a shock FA Cup defeat at the hands of League Two side Hereford on Tuesday night.





**Luton Town v
MILLWALL**

MILLWALL come to town in early December after a less-than-impressive start to the season. With only one win in their first 10 matches, manager Willie Donachie was sacked with Richard Shaw taking over temporarily. On November 6, Manchester City reserve team coach Kenny Jackett took the reins at the New Den, charged with stabilising the club and moving them up the table.

He has had mixed fortunes in his first two games in charge. First he saw his side come from behind to beat 10-man Altrincham 2-1 in the FA Cup. Then they led at Bristol Rovers for 70 minutes before conceding two late goals to give Rovers their first home win of the season.

The last couple of years at the Den have been turbulent both on and off the pitch, with changes in management as well as a plethora of new signings and loan deals to strengthen their squad.

Times were already tough for the Lions on their last visit to Kenilworth Road back in August 2005 when Luton beat the Londoners 2-1, with goals from Warren Feeney and Curtis Davies. Millwall won a tough and competitive return fixture by the same margin.

Jackett will be looking to make some changes in the January transfer window, but with limited funds, loan deals will be his most likely option. Luton's own Ahmet Brkovic is currently on loan at the Den with one goal under his belt so far. He is due back at Kenilworth Road before Millwall arrive.

The on-form player for goals at the moment is defender Alan Dunne. The Republic of Ireland man had a frustrating time at the start of his career at Millwall with recurring ankle injuries, but has blossomed into a capable and solid player since.

Alongside Dunne is Millwall's Player Of The Year Richard Shaw. Popular with the fans, he has teamed up with Paul Robinson at the back.

Ex-public schoolboy Andy Frampton commands the midfield for the Lions after signing in the summer from Brentford. On-loan striker Will Hoskins has repaid Jackett with three goals so far since his loan deal from Watford. After scoring 16 goals for Rotherham last season, Hoskins moved to Vicarage Road in January.

Another force to be reckoned with is Gary Alexander. Originally a West Ham youth player, Alexander signed this summer from Leyton Orient, where he was top scorer for the third time in 2006-07.

Now Jackett will be looking to these players to start showing they can turn things around and keep the Lions out of the third tier of English football.
