THE VIEWS OF LATICS MANAGER
JOHN SHERIDAN

Consistency and confidence are two key elements of football and we are beginning to show a little bit of both.

Not that I am getting carried away, far from it. But we are going into tonight's game against Luton looking to stretch an unbeaten run to

seven games.

It has helped us climb away from the relegation places and also book a third round tie in the FA Cup, so we are making some progress. Of course, there is still a lot of work to be done but the signs are encouraging.

We played well to knock Doncaster out of the Cup in a replay -- the first time we had ever won at their place -- and put in another pleasing performance four days later to end Crewe's hopes with a 1-0 win last Saturday. I thought we were excellent in the first half of that game when we scored one and it could even have been two or three.

Our tempo was very good and we got at Crewe knowing they are a good team who, like Doncaster, like to pass the ball around. We kept possession very well, created chances and, overall, I thought we thoroughly deserved the win.

It was important to get through to the next round because we all know what the financial side is like for clubs in our position.

We had a little bit of good fortune in the first minute following a mix-up between Stefan Stam and Reuben Hazell which left one of their players with only our keeper to beat but he put his shot wide.

If they had gone 1-0 up it could have been a totally different game, so we have to stay switched on all the time.


But after that both did very well and Mark Crossley didn't have a save to make.

Crewe have been winning games themselves, one defeat in seven, but we made them look pretty ordinary.

I asked the lads to take the game to them and that's just what we did. I kept Chris Taylor at left back and I have to say that he looks very comfortable there, to be fair to him.

But he still gives us that threat when he goes forward in a higher position up the pitch. Mark Allott also did very well again even if we do look a little unbalanced, but having said that we never looked in any real danger. I told the players afterwards that for all our

dominance we could have used the ball better, got in different areas to pick people out and take full control by getting a second goal.

For example, we had a lot of the ball in the second half but people were trying to do silly things.

I say to the players that if you play it simple you won't make mistakes, or at least not as many. I always say that good players play it simple when they have to.

No disrespect to the players in this division, but sometimes they try the difficult things when it is not on.

It is probably not nice to hear my voice all the time but I will keep on telling them until I see an improvement.

I am not having a go at anyone, I just want them to see things and improve as players.

STRONG MIDFIELD

Lee Hughes got the only goal of the game just before half-time and I am sure it will be a big boost for his confidence.

He is greedy at times, but that's goalscorers for

you and on another day he might have had a couple more.

He reacted very well for the goal and probably a touch of rustiness prevented him from scoring again.

But that will come because you can see he wants to score goals and he will, I have no doubts about that.

Midfield also looked strong and it was good for the defence to keep another clean sheet. We came in at half-time thinking the game should be over, but two halves are never the same and that was proved.

Crewe brought on Nicky Maynard, who is always a threat, and there was a concern that something late on could cost us.

When you are on top and there is only one goal in it, you are always scared they might just nick an equaliser.

Then they got a free kick that goes straight across the box with almost the last kick of the game and had it gone in we would all have been devastated.

We have had two good wins but, to tell the truth, I wish they had been league games and we had picked up six points!

But I am not grumbling, we are beating teams and are on a bit of a run, with confidence in the camp growing.

Deane Smalley has only had a handful of first team games and looks to be improving all the time.

I feel he's got everything you want in a player and he showed it.

He just glides past people when he wants to and he can be frightening.

Deano will grow up and playing regularly will do him good.

If he can get a bit more belief in himself he has a great chance of playing at a higher level. He still has a lot to learn but he is a kid who keeps his feet on the ground, he's in the team now and it is up to him to stay there.

MERSEYSIDE ADVENTURE

Everybody will want to be playing in the next round of the FA Cup when we travel to Goodison Park to face Everton for what promises to be a cracking contest.

Being realistic, we are not going to win the competition but I still want us to go as far as we can.

I believe we have a chance, you have to think like that, and it will be a great test against one of the best and in-form teams in the Premiership.

It is not too far to travel and I am sure we will take a big following to Goodison Park because our away support so far this season has been fantastic.

It will be a great occasion, a great day out and a welcome opportunity to make some much-needed revenue at the same time.

It is back to league action tonight and that will always be our priority.

We extend a warm welcome to Luton Town manager Kevin Blackwell, his board of directors, players and fans who have made the long trip north.



They have had their problems recently and found themselves bottom of the table after going into administration and being docked 10 points. But their response was swift with a 1-0 victory






1. Deane Smalley takes on Alex defender Billy Jones

MEMBERS GAME

7 is the number of teams from Coca Cola League One definitely through to the third round of the FA Cup. They are Tranmere, Bristol Rovers, Huddersfield, Millwall, Swindon, Brighton and, of course Latics. And five more live to fight another day as Swansea, Northampton, Walsall, Port Vale and Southend are involved in second-round replays.

85 minute penalty from landscape gardener Lewis Taylor earned non-league Horsham an FA Cup replay against Swansea as the Ryman League part timers caused a massive upset by holding opponents from four divisions higher in the footballing pyramid. The other surprise was Port Vale only drawing at home to Chasetown who took Latics to a replay two seasons ago.

2 goals apiece for Chris Greenacre, Nicky Forster, Phil Jeavons and Ricky Lambert helped Tranmere, Brighton and Bristol Rovers to FA Cup victories. Greenacre scored twice in Tranmere's 3-0 win at Bradford, Forster got both the goals which earned Brighton a 2-0 victory at Torquay United in the all-South Coast clash, on-loan Jeavons two for Huddersfield in a 3-0 triumph against Grimsby and Lambert the last two of Bristol Rovers' haul in a 5-1 home success against Rushden & Diamonds.

9 is the maximum haul of points which earned Nottingham Forest's Colin Calderwood the Coca Cola League One manager-of-the-month award for November. Forest won all three league games and also won an FA Cup tie against Lincoln City after a replay. Huddersfield's Andy Ritchie, Martin Ling, of Leyton Orient and Walsall's Richard Money were all short-listed for the award.

200,000 pounds is the transfer fee Southend United have apparently agreed for the transfer of striker Leon Clarke who is currently on loan at Roots Hall from Sheffield Wednesday. Clarke had a successful loan spell at Boundary Park last season and he has been in a rich scoring vein for the Shrimpers.

15 is the number of previous attempts Latics had failed to win at Doncaster before finally breaking their duck in the FA Cup, first-round replay. In their previous matches at both Belle Vue and the Keepmoat Stadium, Latics had drawn seven times and lost eight.

13 has been far from unlucky for Crewe whose haul of 13 points from their last six league matches makes them the form team in League One. Doncaster and Leeds, both with 12 points, have run them close while at the bottom of the form table are Port Vale, Hartlepool and Tranmere, each with four points from six matches.

27,816 is the average attendance of Leeds United with their highest 30,319 against Millwall and lowest 24,036 for the visit of Southend. They are well clear of second-placed Nottingham Forest whose average is 19,664.

10 is the number of clean sheets Nottingham Forest keeper Paul Smith has kept, the highest total by any team in League One. Walsall, Leeds and Carlisle are next in the pecking order with seven shut outs apiece.

10,000 pounds raised by Nottingham Forest chief executive Mark Arthur and four supporters on their 900-mile sponsored bike ride from John O'Groats to Lands End when they were accompanied by professional cyclist David Millar. Forest are aiming to collect £50,000 towards the £500,000 needed to develop a performing arts school for youngsters in memory of Danielle Beccan, the 14-year-old Nottingham girl killed in a drive-by shooting in the city in 2004.

Sean Gregan has had to relinquish the Latics captain's armband due to a frustrating spell on the sidelines.

The 33-year-old defender's injury-enforced absence has meant a watching brief in recent weeks after what initially appeared an innocuous challenge. Gregan was caught on the Achilles by Huddersfield Town's Danny Cadamarteri but soldiered on and completed the match at the Galpharm Stadium.

CHILDHOOD

WHICH TEAM DID YOU SUPPORT AS A CHILD? Middlesbrough is my home-town team and I have followed their results for as long as I can remember.

FIRST PROFESSIONAL MATCH? I think it was Middlesbrough v Everton in the FA Cup when they were still playing at their old ground, Ayresome Park. Those were the days when Bernie Slaven, Tony Mowbray, Gary Pallister and Colin Cooper were in the team. Tommy Wright was also playing then, and I give him stick about that!

FIRST JUNIOR TEAM? Stockton West End when I was about 11 years of age. Quite a few of the lads from my school played on the team which was run by one of the dads.

FIRST POSITION? I started out as a midfield player and it was only when I went to Darlington as a YTS that I was converted to a central defender. And my career has been spent chopping and changing between those two positions.

SCHOOLBOY HONOURS? I had trials for Cleveland Boys, but never made it into the team, though they played me right back in the trials. But I helped, St Michael's, Billingham, reach the semi finals of the English Schools when we lost to a team from Liverpool who went on to win it. We had a good side which included Jamie Pollock who later played for Middlesbrough and a couple of other lads who were at League clubs but who never made it.

WHAT OTHER SPORTS DID YOU PLAY? As it was an old fashioned council estate school, there was never anything like Rugby Union. It was always a football or tennis ball in the playground. Our PE teacher also ran the school football team so we always played five-a-side and games.

FAVOURITE SCHOOL SUBJECT? If you ask most footballers, they weren't interested in school. And it was always PE and playing football.

EARLY INFLUENCES? There has only ever been me and my mum Anne and she would buy me boots when money was tight and take me to games and, if she couldn't, she would always get lifts for me.

FIRST FOOTBALL SHIRT? The England shirt for the 1982 World Cup when my uncle bought me the kit. I think I wore it every day for the next six months or may be even to the next World Cup.

DID YOU EVER HAVE A SATURDAY JOB? I had a paper round seven days a week and from what I can remember I earned £5.50.

But three days later Gregan had to concede defeat as he limped off in the early exchanges of the Johnstone's Paints Trophy tie at Doncaster Rovers. Gregan has seen a specialist who says that time will be the healer as he is forced to be patient and play a waiting game.

"I have to be careful and not rush back too quickly which could risk snapping my Achilles which would mean a long lay off. It is frustrating, but there is not a lot I can do," he explained. Here Gregan, who has plenty of time on his hands, joins us in the Latics Lounge to discuss various aspects of his life, both on and off the field.

ON THE PITCH

DO YOU HAVE ANY PRE-MATCH SUPERSTITIONS? None. I am not one of those people who puts one boot on first or does any other quirky thing like that.

PRE-MATCH MEAL? If it is a home match it is usually beans on toast. Away it is something similar but may also be with a piece of chicken. Most players tend to eat a good meal the night before a match and that gets you through.

LEAGUE DEBUT? Darlington away to Huddersfield Town at the old Leeds Road ground where I was up against Ify Onoura and Iwan Roberts which was a baptism of fire as I was playing centre of defence against those two so it was quite a battle. It was great experience for what was to come!

BEST-EVER GAME? When I was at Preston, we played Birmingham City in the play offs. We lost at St Andrews but won a dramatic return match at Deepdale. The game went to extra time and it looked as though we were going out until we scored to take it to penalties. I scored one of the penalties and we went through to the final at Wembley so that stands out as a good one.

BEST STADIUM? I have been lucky to play at the old Wembley and Millennium Stadium, but I would probably go for Old Trafford.

TOUGHEST OPPONENT? I have been lucky to play in the Premier League against all the top strikers, the likes of Alan Shearer, Thierry Henry and Michael Owen. I would rather play against Shearer, when you would have a battle than Owen who is very quick and difficult for somebody like myself to come up against.

BEST GOAL? When I was at Preston I once scored a goal from the half-way line with my left foot. I saw the keeper off the line and unleashed a big swinger and it went in.

BEST THING ABOUT BEING A FOOTBALLER? Everybody would like to get paid well for something they love doing which is probably the stock answer from most footballers. You also get plenty of time off to be with your family.

WHICH FIXTURE DO YOU MOST LOOK FORWARD TO? It depends on what league you are playing in at the time. When I was at West Brom and they were playing in the Premier League I looked for Middlesbrough for obvious reasons. In the Championship I would always look for when we were playing at Preston where I spent a lot of my career. Here it is Leeds United and going back to Elland Road on New Year's Day.

EMBARRASSING MOMENTS ON THE PITCH? When I made my debut for West Brom we were warming up behind the goal and I got my feet caught in the ladders we used to step in-between. I tripped up and went head over heels so that wasn't the best of starts on my debut.

OFF THE PITCH

WHEN DID YOU LAST PAY TO WATCH A MATCH? Last season for the FA Cup tie here against Wolves when I bought tickets for my mother-in-law and her family.

IF YOU COULD PLAY FOR ANY TEAM IN THE WORLD, WHICH WOULD IT BE? Middlesbrough as they are my home-town team and it would have been nice to play for them.

WHEN YOU RETIRE, WOULD YOU LIKE TO BECOME A MANAGER? I don't know, but hopefully I won't have to make a decision for a few more years. It is difficult to break into management, particularly the top jobs when clubs go for big-name players or foreign names.

HOW DO YOU PASS YOUR TIME ON AWAY TRIPS? I usually read the papers or watch a movie. I have done it for 15/16 years and the worst thing is boredom and you tend to get hardened to it.

ARE YOU A GOOD SPECTATOR WHEN INJURED? I hate watching and have been fortunate not to have had any major injuries in my career, but when I am out I find it very frustrating. I am the same as anybody else who simply wants to play.

BEST FRIEND IN FOOTBALL? Mark Rankine who was a team mate for six

years at Preston. He is doing some agency work and I still see him from time to time and we keep in touch.

FIRST FOOTBALLING IDOL? Kevin Keegan who was like the David Beckham of the day.

FAVOURITE SHIRT NUMBER? I was No 6 for six years at Preston so, given the choice, I would go for that.

WHICH MEMBERS OF YOUR FAMILY GO TO GAMES? My wife Melissa only comes to matches occasionally as she finds it difficult with having three children, the youngest two only being aged two and three. It is impossible to keep them entertained all afternoon, especially if they come with me as I have to be at the ground for one o'clock and don't leave until six.

ANY YOU STILL INVOLVED WITH ANY JUNIOR TEAMS? I have done a little coaching at my daughter Hannah's school in Leeds, but I prefer to spend time at home with the kids.

PERSONAL

FIRST CAR? A Ford Fiesta which my mother bought me after I passed my driving test. Then when I signed my first professional contract I bought my first car which was also a Fiesta.

CURRENT CAR? A VW Golf as Melissa has the large one, a Range Rover as that is better for the kids.

IF MONEY WERE NO OBJECT, WHAT WOULD BE YOUR DREAM CAR? An Aston Martin.

FAVOURITE BAND? I am not big into music and if I am driving the children usually have The Tweenies or Thomas The Tank Engine on in the car.

WHICH NEWSPAPER DO YOU READ? The Sun which is mainly for the gossip.

FAVOURITE TELEVISION PROGRAMME? I like programmes like Property Ladder and Location, Location as I like to see people's ideas when it comes to doing work on their homes.

BEST PLACE VISITED IN THE WORLD? Mauritius on my honeymoon which was a lovely part of the world.

HOBBIES? When you have a young family all your time is spent trying to occupy them so there isn't a lot of time for doing anything else.

COULD YOU LIVE WITHOUT SKY TV? It would be hard, but I suppose I could.

LAST CD/DVD YOU BOUGHT? It would have been one for the kids. My little boy loves dinosaurs and there is a DVD 'Long Before Time' so it will probably have been that.

LAGER OR BITTER? Lager.



CUP MAGIC

The magic of the FA Cup rubbed off on Latics when they were handed a dream third round tie against one of the biggest clubs in the country.

John Sheridan will take his side to Everton's Goodison Park, a game that will bring back fond memories of the heady days of the Premiership. It could hardly have been better with fans not having to fork out too much on travelling expenses as well as not having to trek to the other side of the country.

It will also provide a massive revenue boost to the Boundary Park coffers.

Ex Latics and Everton manager Joe Royle commented "What a great tie" as he rang Goodison to book his seat in the Directors box. And veteran keeper Mark Crossley summed up the players mood, revealing: "The place was buzzing when all the lads came in for training yesterday morning.

"It is a brilliant draw."

Totally different then from the feeling after Latics had blown a 2-0 lead in the first round against Doncaster Rovers.

It looked all over for the visitors until they came back to snatch a draw when James Hayter grabbed his second goal with just four minutes left on the clock.

Hands up those who thought it was all over? Latics were off to South Yorkshire for a replay against a side who they had never beaten in their own backyard.

Rovers, sixth in the table and going well, were immediately installed as the bookies favourites to go through and it looked like the odds were certainly stacked against them when the home side took the lead.

It was beginning to look like the Johnstone Paints Trophy KO time again in which Donny had celebrated a comfortable 3-0 victory.

But they soon discovered that Latics were in no mood to lie down and roll over and goals from Neil Kilkenny and Gary McDonald put them in the next round to host League One rivals Crewe. Sheridan and his coaching staff then masterminded another victory against Crewe Alexandra and although the scoreline read 1-0 it was probably the most one-sided contest seen here this season.

Crossley, who has made 40 appearances in the FA Cup, said: "It all goes to show that it was well worth putting the effort in against Doncaster because we thought at one stage we could have been knocked out of the competition. "We showed great spirit to go over there and beat them.

"Then against Crewe we totally dominated the game but just couldn't get the ball in the net again to really finish them off after going in front through Lee Hughes.

"I had nothing to do, the first minute was the only time they had threatened our goal when a

mistake let their lad through and he really should have scored, but thankfully, put his shot wide.

"It has paid off now with a fantastic match in prospect and to go to Goodison in front of say 25,000 fans is going to be great for both the lads and fans.

"But on a purely personal note I would have preferred getting a non-league club at home then going to Everton in the fourth round." The trip to Merseyside will bring back memories of the 1989/90 season when Latics finally beat Everton after two replays.


And, remember, Joe Royle's boys reached the semi-final that year!

But the much-needed windfall that the game will generate will be a blessing for a club that is losing more than £70,000 a month. Is that magic .. or what?




An A to Z guide of Latics' players past and present with Leigh Edwards and Gordon Lawton

CRAIG FLEMING

Versatile defender Craig Fleming helped Oldham Athletic take Manchester United to an FA Cup semi-final replay in 1993-94. A former Halifax Town trainee, he made his League debut in their 5-1 win at home to Scunthorpe in January 1989 and moved to newly promoted Latics for £150,000 in August 1991. He helped consolidate top-flight status, overcoming injury problems to score once in 164 League outings while at Boundary Park before being sold to Norwich City for £600,000 in June 1997. Ever-present in their 2003-04 First Division title triumph, he was loaned to Wolves prior to joining Rotherham United in January 2007.

MIKE FLYNN

Tall central defender Mike Flynn featured as Oldham Athletic took Everton to a Littlewoods Cup third round replay in 1988-89. Locally born, he turned professional at Boundary Park in February 1987 and scored once in 40 Second Division games prior to joining Norwich City for £100,000 in December 1988. He moved via Preston to Stockport County for £125,000 in March 1993 and twice helped them qualify for the Second Division play-offs. Captaining Stockport to promotion and the Coca-Cola Cup semi-finals in 1996-97, he joined Barnsley in March 2002 and has

since played for Blackpool and Accrington Stanley.

TERRELL FORBES

Tough-tackling right-back Terrell Forbes played for Oldham Athletic during the 2005-06 campaign. A former West Ham trainee, he featured in their 1999 FA Youth Cup final triumph and was loaned to AFC Bournemouth before moving to QPR in July 2001. He helped them reach the Second Division play-off final in 2002-03 and win promotion in 2003-04. Joining Grimsby Town in September 2004, he moved to Boundary Park in July 2005 and made 39 League One appearances for Latics before reuniting with Russell Slade at Yeovil Town in July 2006. He starred as they qualified for the League One play-offs last season.

JIMMY FRIZZELL


Jimmy Frizzell gave Oldham Athletic marvellous service as both a player and manager. The versatile inside-forward played for Morton before moving to Boundary Park in May 1960. Leading marksman in 1961-62, he featured in Latics' 1962-63 promotion success and netted 56 goals in 317 League outings prior to becoming coach in September 1968. He was appointed manager in December 1969 and guided Latics to promotion in 1970-71, then the Third Division title in 1973-74. The second-longest serving boss in the Football League when sacked in June 1982, he was later assistant-boss and manager at Manchester City and Jimmy still visits Boundary Park on a regular basis.

JIM FRYATT

Much-travelled centre-forward Jim Fryatt was leading marksman in Oldham





Athletic's 1970-71 promotion success. Initially with Charlton Athletic, he moved via Southend to Bradford PA in June 1963 and was ever-present in 1963-64, scoring the League's fastest-ever goal against Tranmere. He played for Southport, Torquay, Stockport and Blackburn before moving to Boundary Park in February 1970. Netting 40 goals in 76 League outings for Latics, he rejoined Southport in November 1971 and starred in their 1972-73 Fourth Division title triumph. He played and managed in the United States, becoming a croupier in Las Vegas.

PAUL FUTCHER

Former England U-21 central defender Paul Futcher had a spell as Oldham Athletic's captain. Both he and his twin brother Ron signed professional for Chester in January 1974, moving to Luton Town in a joint £100,000 deal in June 1974. He returned to the top-flight after joining Manchester City for £350,000 in June 1978, moving to Boundary Park for £150,000 in August 1980. Scoring once in 98 Second Division games for Latics, he joined Derby County for £100,000 in January 1983, then played for Barnsley, Halifax and Grimsby. He managed Darlington, Gresley Rovers, Southport, Stalybridge Celtic and Ashton United.

RON FUTCHER

Striker Ron Futcher was Oldham Athletic's leading marksman in 1985-86. Signing professional for Chester with his twin brother Paul in January 1974, they moved to Luton Town in a joint £100,000 deal in June 1974. He followed Paul to Manchester City for £75,000 in August 1978, then played for NAC Breda, Barnsley prior to joining Latics for £15,000 in July 1985. Scoring 30 goals in 65 Second Division games while at Boundary Park, he moved to Bradford City for £40,000 in March 1987 and later played for Port Vale, Burnley, Crewe Alexandra and Droylsden. He rejoined Bradford City as youth development officer.

SHAUN GARNETT

Big central defender Shaun Garnett featured in Oldham Athletic's 1996-97 relegation battle. A former Tranmere Rovers trainee, he turned professional in June 1988 and featured in their 1990 Leyland/DAF Cup final success, 1990-91 Third Division play-off final triumph and 1993-94 Coca-Cola Cup run. He joined Swansea City for £150,000 in March 1996, moving to Boundary Park for £150,000 in September 1996. Scoring nine goals in 173 League outings for Latics until sidelined by a serious knee injury, he moved to Halifax Town in September 2002, then played for Morecambe before joining Tranmere's coaching staff as youth coach.

COLIN GARWOOD

Ex-England Youth striker Colin Garwood was leading goalscorer in Oldham Athletic's 1973-74 Third Division title triumph. Signing professional for Peterborough United in July 1967, he was top scorer in 1970-71 and moved to Boundary Park in July 1971. He netted 35 goals in 93 League games for Latics prior to joining Huddersfield Town in exchange for Les Chapman in December 1974. Moving to Colchester United in February 1976, he starred in their 1976-77 promotion success, then played for Portsmouth, Aldershot, Boston United and King's Lynn. He has since worked for an engineering firm in Wisbech.

ERIC GEMMELL

Centre-forward Eric Gemmell was leading marksman in Oldham Athletic's 1952-53 Third Division (North) title success. A former Manchester United amateur, he turned professional with rivals City in March 1946 and moved to Boundary Park in June 1947. He was top scorer on four occasions, netting 109 goals in 195 League outings for Latics, including a record seven in the amazing 11-2 win at home to Chester in January 1952. Joining Crewe Alexandra in February 1954, he later played for Rochdale, Buxton and Nantile Vale. Settling in Denton, he held Oldham Athletic's goalscoring record until overtaken by Roger Palmer.

Injured Latics goalkeeper Les Pogliacomi believes he has been safe in the hands of specialist Steve Bollen.

The Aussie is delighted with his recovery from knee surgery and expects to be able to resume training this month.

"Steve is one of the best surgeons and has saved the careers of a number of high-profile players and hopefully he has sorted me out as well," explained Pogliacomi who has yet to make a first-team appearance this season.

Pogliacomi was injured pre-season and then had to abort his comeback when his knee trouble flared up again requiring surgery.

"I came back and played a couple of reserve-team games but knew something was not right as I was experiencing discomfort and swelling," he explained. Pogliacomi describes the period since pre-season as a "nightmare" and he cannot wait for 2007 to end with the hope the New Year heralds a new start and improved fortunes.

Here Pogliacomi selects 20 numbers at random from a list of 50 questions to give us a glimpse into some of his innermost thoughts.

3: Have you thought what you will do after retiring? Yes as when you are out injured for a long spell, as I have been, you worry about the future. I have a couple of plans and one is to go into business with my wife Lia's parents, though I have been told it is not a good thing to mix families and business. They have a well-established company in Adelaide, Australia, selling mainly bricks but also tiles and paving stones. The construction industry is in good shape in Adelaide and their business is well established. As Lia's parents are both in their sixties I think they would welcome help running it.

1: How high in the list of priorities is money when negotiating a new contract? Probably about 50/50 as there are other things also to take into account. You have to decide whether it is the right

move for your career, what division the team is in and who is the manager. Sometimes you can chase the money and not end up happy, though I have never been in that position. But I know cases where that has happened.

26: When you are ill/injured, what sort of patient are you? Lia's says I am a good patient, though there are times when you get frustrated and annoyed. When that happens I bottle it up and try not to take it out on Lia - but the sofa suffers!

20: Describe what signing your first contract meant to you? As kids you always had aspirations and mine was


always to be a professional footballer so this meant the dream was alive. My first pro contract was with Sydney club Marconi with whom I had been since the age of 12. I had always dreamed of playing in their first team and this was another step to making the dream come true.

40: What single thing would improve your quality of life? Living next to the beach as that is something I miss big time. Having the opportunity to go to a beautiful beach on any given weekend would be wonderful as would be the sunshine.

31: What has been your weirdest experience with a fan? On Facebook you can write to somebody asking them to be your friend, and you can either confirm or reject the request. I had 10 requests from one Blackpool fan despite me keeping rejecting it. There was also a young girl supporter from a southern-based team who wanted me to sign her programme. And when the team played at Boundary Park she was waiting for me again outside the ground.

49: Are you a shopaholic or shop shy? I would say I am shop efficient. When I need something I will get it, but I am in and out of the shop as quickly as possible as I hate crowds when you are shopping.

50: What has been your most romantic gesture? Lia says I have got less romantic as the years go by. I would say taking her to Paris for our fifth wedding anniversary.

23: Are you a good cook? Yes. I do a lot of cooking which I enjoy and find therapeutic as I have a glass of wine when preparing a meal. As a footballer I am lucky to have plenty of time on my hands so don't have to rush. I also enjoy it when the meal I am making turns out well.

10: Are you interested in politics? Not at all. I don't have a high regard for politicians who are only good at one thing which is talking and not taking action.

29: With whom would you like to be stuck in an elevator? Obviously Lia, but other than her Robin Williams as he would make me laugh and the time would pass so quickly. He is amusing and the great thing is that it is spontaneous and he doesn't need a script for material.

44: Are you addicted to anything like a certain food or television programme? My PSP (Play Station Portable) which I am never off. I also love food and winning, but would describe that as an appreciation as opposed to addiction.

47: Do you believe in alternative medicines? Some yes, some no. I have found acupuncture helps if I have a muscle problem as it eases the tension. But I think there are a lot of other things which are a sham.

33: Would you rather be rich and famous or poor or anonymous? Rich and anonymous would be the perfect combination. I would say rich and famous because money helps improve your quality of life.

42: If you had a son, would you encourage him to be a footballer? I would encourage him to play football and, if he wanted to pursue it, I would be there for him, though it would have to be his choice. We are sporting as a family, Lia and myself and also my parents whether it be football, rugby or cricket, but his first ball would definitely be a round one!

7: Are you good at managing money? I would like to think I have the right balance because I don't throw it away on cars and other such luxuries yet I am not the tightest person and some say I am probably too generous. I think I am a modest spender, though I never think twice about good food and wine.

22: Was there a defining moment when you realised you were famous? If I played in the Premier League, I might consider myself famous. But I am just an ordinary Aussie battler doing his job, though 5,000 home fans pay to see me do it, usually every second week at Boundary Park. Sometimes when I am out doing an errand in Manchester city centre an Oldham supporter will shout 'hi, Poggy' which I find odd.







LATICS' AMAZING LINKS WITH THE SCOTTISH FOOTBALL ASSOCIATION...

In the second of two articles on influential figures in the Scottish Football Association with links to Latics, Tony Bugby talks to David Kells who is commercial director of the Scottish FA and a director of Hampden Park Limited.



Latics' defeat to Blackpool in the Coca Cola League One play-off semi finals was a massive disappointment to David Kells as it denied him a dream double visit to Wembley.

David already had one date pencilled in when his second team Morecambe made it to the Nationwide Conference play-off final where they defeated Exeter City to win Football League status for the first time in the club's history.

"I was hoping we would beat Blackpool to make it two trips to Wembley in the space of a couple of weeks," he explained.

The reason for David supporting Latics and Morecambe is that he was born in Oldham before his parents moved to Morecambe, though he would return frequently during school holidays to stay with relatives.

Though David has lived in Scotland for 40 years - he went to become assistant catering manager for Edinburgh firm Mackies - he has never forgotten his roots and always followed the fortunes of the two clubs and he remains as passionate as ever about them.

David's business commitments means he only occasionally gets to games, but there is little at Boundary Park that escapes his attention.

He explained: "Though it is difficult to get to games, it doesn't stop me supporting Latics. And when they are playing in the North of England I make a special effort to get to the games.

"I was at Carlisle and had hoped to get to Hartlepool but was unable to make that one."

David has also gone to extraordinary lengths to follow the fortunes of Latics in his time in Scotland. He had relatives and friends sending him rolls of newspapers containing back pages of the Chronicle and the Green Final sports paper when it was in existence as well as subscribing for

the football programme for many years.

Today with the advent of the internet, David finds it far easier to keep up-to-date with events at Boundary Park as he regularly logs on to the Latics website.

It was hardly surprising David ought to take a keen interest in football as his uncle was Ron Marler who broadcast hospital radio commentaries from both Boundary Park and Watershedding, the former home of Oldham Rugby League Club.

David's first attended matches at Boundary Park in the 1950's and his earliest memories are as a boy walking to the ground from the Ratcliffe Street/Henshaw Street area. He says the first match he can recall was the FA Cup tie against Liverpool in January 1962 when Latics lost 2-1 in front of a crowd of 41,733 at Boundary Park.

Later that year there was the 11-0 Boxing Day win against Southport on a snow covered pitch when Bert Lister scored six goals.

And of all the players David has seen he says the late Bobby Johnstone was the one who has made the lasting impression.

The heady days under Joe Royle is the era David savoured most, especially having initially watched them in Third Division North and Division Four. He managed to get to both Wembley appearances and also many of the

other epic cup ties in that never-to-be-forgotten period.

And when work prevented him travelling, David also went to ingenious means to see the games as they happened.

"As I was living in Scotland the games weren't shown here so through my connections with the television companies I would go to the studios to watch the live feeds of matches as they were being played," he explained. David, who also spent five years as commercial director at Celtic, added that it causes puzzled looks when he says he supports Latics.

He continued: "When you live in Scotland the assumption is that you support either Celtic or Rangers. "Sometimes fans say they follow

Partick or Clyde as cover to camouflage the fact they really follow Celtic or Rangers, but when I tell them I support Oldham it is not what they expect to hear."

David added that when he was working at Celtic one of his former bosses inquired whether he was a fan or supporter and that prompted him to make a statement of his commitment to Latics.

Though David rarely gets to Boundary Park, he buys two season tickets each year with the proviso that the club uses them to help needy fans or some worthy cause.

David still dreams of Latics recapturing the glories of the late 1980's and early 90's and hoped last season might be the catalyst had it ended with promotion.

And he says that the recent revival in fortunes of the Scottish national team, which has had years in the doldrums, ought to be an inspiration for Latics. He added it is an exciting time for him to be involved with the game North of the Border, though he says he never takes success for granted.

"I have a framed snakes and ladders board on my office wall. And that constantly reminds me when you think you have cracked it there is a snake waiting for you," he explained.

INSIDE THE OLDHAM SUNDAY LEAGUE...

If it's entertainment you are after when watching Sunday League football, then keep an eye out for where Waggon and Horses are playing. Two matches already this season involving the High Crompton based side have yielded no fewer than 26 goals - the first game a 5-5 draw with Steven Caine FC, the second an amazing 11-5 away success against Clarksfield. Unfortunately for Waggon, the side has been on the wrong end of some equally incredible scorelines.

Now managed by Jack Bamford, who played regularly in the league for Greenacres and Copster Villa, Waggon entered the Oldham Sunday League in 2003 and the first season was a bit of a disaster in terms of results.

Said Bamford: "I wasn't the manager in that debut season but it's fair to say the team got some hammerings.

"We lost one match 22-0 and, in fact, lost every game bar one, our only victory coming against a side who were hungover from the night before.

"Things have got better since then and we're just about getting a squad of players that is beginning to look like something.

"Yes, it is about turning up and enjoying the game, but it's also nice to win."

Dave Ranstead, who scored five of the Waggon goals in the defeat of Clarksfield, is one of the side's regulars, along with Tony

Heywood and Bamford's son, Darren. Shaw FC's longevity - they entered the Oldham Sunday League in 1983 - is down to a family spirit within a club that can boast one of the best, if not the best, grounds in the league. Shaw use the excellent facilities at the home of Crompton Cricket Club on Glebe Street, a ground that is also used on Saturdays by Royton Town of the Manchester League.

Despite Shaw's facilities, club secretary Stuart Whitehead is not too happy with many of the other sites that are used in the league. Whitehead said: "I don't think Oldham Council is helping matters where facilities are concerned, but the league itself does fantastically well when you consider it is run by volunteers.

"It is well organised and well run and that is another reason why we've stayed in the league for so long."

Shaw haven't won an awful lot in those 24 years, but Whitehead added that, for them, it's about turning up, having a laugh and enjoying the game.

One player in particular who obviously values playing for Shaw is Shaun Kershaw - he re-signed for the club this season having made his debut in the team's first-ever match almost a quarter of a century ago.



Latrics reserves went close to causing a cup upset when they faced local rivals Manchester City.





Local lad Deane Smalley was a sports-mad all-rounder at school and no dunce either when it came to lessons -- but he always wanted to be a footballer.

The dream has now become reality for the teenager who has come through the ranks at Boundary Park.

Smalley started playing at St. Margaret Mary's Primary School, New Moston, and then and Our Lady's just down the road at Royton.

In his spare time he also played for Middleton Colts before moving on to Blackley-based North side.

It was their manager Francis Egan who got him a trial at Latics where he was later signed on YTS forms under the supervision of coach Tony Philliskirk. He was converted from winger to striker and last season topped the goal charts when the youth team won the Northern Championship.

Smalley's scoring exploits also brought him his senior debut at Bournemouth back in February.

But the 19-year-old made the big breakthrough in the current campaign and has made four starts and been on the bench for eight games.

He scored in only his second outing, a 4-1 win over League Two Mansfield in the League Cup.

But he quickly learned about the downside of the game when he damaged knee ligaments in another cup round at Burnley where he made his first-ever start.

He was expecting to be left out or on the bench at best but was told in the dressing room not long before kick-off that he was playing.

It lasted 25 minutes and Smalley recalled: "I was running down the wing and as I was about to cross the ball one of their lads came in and we both connected with the ball at the same time.

"There wasn't a lot of pain and I wanted to carry on, but physio Lee Nobes had obviously seen something and knew straight away that I had to come off.

"I was out for seven weeks and it was the most boring time of my life." Plenty of rehab work in the gym followed before Smalley was back to fitness -- and back in manager John Sheridan's team plans.

Then injury to veteran Andy Liddell opened the door for another crack at establishing himself in the first team. Smalley is the first to admit that he wasn't at his best in the recent game against Port Vale (neither was it the best team performance) and was a target of the boo-boys. He revealed: "The manager called me into his office the following Monday morning and told me I was a good player and they all had confidence in me, it was down to me to prove I could do it.

"Fans pay a lot of money to see a good performance and I suppose are entitled to have their say.

"I never gave up and kept trying to lift myself but in the end I was brought off.

"I still have a lot of confidence in my ability."

Smalley has taken step up from the reserves in his stride but admits: "The pace of the game is quicker and you are playing against more physical players.

"Some of the older ones might not be the fastest but they can be pretty cute and you definitely don't have as much time on the ball."

"I will learn from the experience and it will improve me as a player."

Unfortunately I haven't been sticking the ball in the net as much as I did for me.

last year and I need to start doing that sooner rather than later."

Smalley, who played basketball, rugby and cricket at school, also came out with eight GCSE's and one 'A' level, has always been supported by the sporting family Smalley.

Mum Sonia, a Manchester City fan, late father Mike an avid Red, brothers Dominic, 18, and 21-year-old Tino also play football for local sides and sister Victoria, a talented dancer, gave non-stop encouragement.

Even his cousins (one played for Man Utd and made the England Ladies bench), nieces, not forgetting grandad, join in to shout from the terraces.

It is not surprising that Smalley, also a United follower, lists Cantona, Giggs and Beckham as his boyhood heroes. He might not attain their level but insisted: "My confidence is building and I think I can stay in the first team. "I was quite scared when I first played in front of thousands of people but the more you play the less you think about that.

"This is what I have wanted since being a kid and I just want to play well for the manager, coaching staff and fans."

Smalley has seen other former youth team players like Chris Taylor, Matt Wolfenden and Neal Trotman elevated to the first team.

He added: "I am fighting for a place now and my job is to keep Andy (Liddell) out.

"He is a quality player and it isn't going to be easy.

It is his job to keep me out of the team and vice versa because we both want to be playing.

"He has helped me a lot but right now I am in there and I will be doing my hardest to stay in.

"We haven't made the start to the season we wanted but if we could make promotion at the end of it, that really would be the icing on the cake for me.



It is back to league action tonight after a ten-day break for the FA Cup, and Allott is confident of making further progress. Latics have recently beaten Tranmere and Bournemouth and, while there was disappointment at being held by Port Vale, a point without playing well came as a bonus. December is always a busy and important month, so Latics are aiming to hit peak form at the right time in Coca Cola League One. Allott has found himself in and out of the starting XI over the last few weeks, but his form is strong and he is contributing fully to the run. And Mark said: "The lads have taken a lot

of confidence from what has happened because seven points from nine is a decent total.

"It is more like the standard we hoped to reach at the start of the season and has come at a difficult time with injuries.

"When you think we have had players like Sean Gregan, Andy Liddell and John Thompson all out, that's a lot of experience to take away from the squad. "The younger lads have really stepped up, in both the league and FA Cup, so they deserve a lot of credit for themselves.

"Neal Trotman has been massive for us in defence and Deane Smalley has done well since he got his place in the side.

"Deane has got a big chance at the moment with Lidds being out injured, and I am sure he is determined to grab it.

"You forget some of our players are so young because they play week in, week out, but there is the likes of Chris Taylor and Neal Eardley who have had to do the job as well.

"We have been a bit more consistent, which is what the manager asked from us, and hopefully it bodes well for the future." Latics went six games without a league victory ahead of the game at Tranmere, but the display at Prenton Park was tremendous.

Next came Port Vale (a 1-1 stalemate) and

then Bournemouth (a 3-0 win), and Mark looked back with overall satisfaction. He recalled: "At the time we went to Tranmere nothing was going for us, but we started to turn things round.

"We outplayed them and made a lot of chances. And, with Craig Davies scoring right at the end, it proved you can get what you deserve if you just keep going.

"Hopefully we will look on that as a major turning point because of the performance, as well as the result, in a difficult game.

"Port Vale at home was disappointing, especially as we went 1-0 up, but at least we came out of it with a point.

"Down at Bournemouth last week we made chances in the first half without taking them and, at half time, the manager had a word.

"We knew what we had to do, and everybody went out with a very positive attitude which got us the right result.

"I was pleased for Lee Hughes to score a couple of goals because that will be beneficial for him personally, which is good news for the team.


"If Craig keeps scoring and Hughes starts banging them in as well, we should not have too many problems getting goals.

"At Bournemouth they both wanted to take the penalty, which is a good sign. It was just a matter of who got there first.

"And we also have Matty Wolfenden in there who has proved he can come on and do the business, so hopefully our league form will keep improving.

"One thing we definitely need is to pick up at home, where maybe our confidence took a knock when we had a few poor results.

"But young lads gain experience from every situation and I know for a fact we are good enough to sort it out."

PENNINE WAY TO WEMBLEY WAY? PINCH ME PART ONE...

at the start of the 1989-90 season, and told you that Athletic would appear in one Wembley final, almost make another and almost make the play offs. Rather than head off for the bookmakers with these tips, you would be forgiven for trying to get this soothsayer sectioned under the Mental Health Act!

Yet the season started off in traditional fashion with a sale as Tommy Wright moved to Leicester City, amongst other transfers. Wright's original transfer had been financed by a local businessman who stumped up the cash in exchange for a return of his investment and percentage of the profit. Not bad business, considering that a profit of £270000 was made. Perhaps one defining factor of this season was the theme of partnerships. In the same way that Oldham Council should be working in partnership with Athletic today. On the pitch partnerships were developing as well. The pairings Bunn and Ritchie, Barlow and Holden, Adams and Irwin, Milligan and Henry, and Warhurst and Barrett were to become the legendary partnerships of this era at Boundary Park, and proof that Joe Royle had indeed assembled his strongest squad ever at Boundary Park.


Of those names, Neil Adams and Ricky Holden were the newest additions to the Athletic squad. Adams had arrived from First Division Everton. In truth Adams 'owed us one' after scoring the goal which knocked Athletic out of the Littlewoods Cup two seasons earlier. But Adams delivered

totalling 178 starts for Athletic and weighing in with 31 goals. Adams also became one or the rare breed of headband wearing footballers when he was patched up after allegedly diving into an empty swimming pool whilst on holiday! Holden was an eve of season signing from Watford. On the opposite wing to Adams, Holden was himself a rare breed of footballer...he had a degree in Human Movement. This might help to explain how he managed to jink past full backs time and time again before delivering pinpoint crosses for the forward pair. Perhaps I am using rose tinted hindsight, but Holden would put at least 10 decent balls into the box per half! His graduate status would also help to explain his dress sense as he was often singled out as the worst dressed player in programme interviews with his team mates and Andy Barlow also commented that there was a unique fragrance at the club when Rick arrived. He had also taken to wearing a trilby hat and driving an orange Skoda Favorit, but he was perhaps the brightest star in the impressive Athletic attack, himself making 209 starts and scoring 35 goals in two spells at the club.

In goal Andy Rhodes was making the number 1 shirt his own as Jon Hallworth recovered from knee ligament injury

sustained in a pre season friendly against Tranmere. It was suggested that Hallworth be sent 'on his bike', but this was a physiotherapy exercise to strengthen the muscles around his knee, and Skidmore cycles were kind enough to spot a publicity opportunity by selling Big Jon a bike at a special knock down price.

The season began slowly and with little promise of the successes that were to come. From the first four matches Athletic amassed a return of just 2 points and were plumbing the depths of 19th in the division, but it was not long before the promise of the team was showing a return on the pitch. Through September, October and November Athletic lost only twice, and both of those were away from home. Ice Station Zebra was becoming something of a fortress, and perhaps a foundation for a promotion campaign. Indeed by December, fuelled by goals from Andy Ritchie amongst others, Athletic had risen to the dizzy heights of fourth in the league. But there was something overshadowing this mighty ascent through Division Two. For as long as I had been going to Athletic matches we had specialised in Cup Walks, Cup Strolls and occasionally Cup Stumbles, but never a Cup Run. Whilst Liverpool and United fans might wistfully remember big cup nights (usually European) under the floodlights of Anfield or Old Trafford, Athletic fans had little to compare or reminisce about. Even the Littlewoods Cup draw had a familiar ring to it as we were paired with...LEEDS UNITED again for the third time in four seasons. The home leg saw what Bob Young described as a "gritty" performance. Leeds had had a multi million pound refurbishment overseen by Howard Wilkinson, and this team would blossom to be the side which won the Division One Championship in 1992. With names such as Gordon Strachan, Vinny Jones and David Batty in their line up another short lived campaign might have been expected. Yet, Athletic fought back from a Gordon Strachan opener to win two-one with goals from Ritchie and Rick Holden. The return leg at Elland Road was stylish rather than gritty as again Ritchie and Frankie Bunn hit the goals in a 2-1 win. Surely that was it for the cup run? Holding to tradition, we

had beaten our Trans-Pennine rivals, and this feeling that it might be over was underlined when Athletic were drawn at home to Scarborough. Scarborough had beaten First Division Chelsea in the previous round and the Midweek Sport Special TV cameras came to Boundary Park in the hope, and perhaps expectation, of another giant killing. But they did not account for Frankie Bunn. In truth we didn't account for him either. But he went on to hit a double hat-trick in the 7-0 annihilation of the East Coast outfit. Even the scoreboard acknowledged Frankie's feat at half time declaring the score 'Bunn 5 Scarborough 0'.

Surely the cup jog would end with the next fixture as League Champions and Division One Leaders Arsenal came to Boundary Park in November. But the 'yard dog' mentality and creativity meant that The Gunner's were not simply edged out, but blown away by Athletic. Never allowed to feel comfortable on the ball, Arsenal went behind to an Andy Ritchie goal in the first half. Early in the second, Andy Rhodes made three stunning saves which kept the score 1-0 until a clearance from an Athletic corner fell at the feet of Nick Henry. Henry had not yet scored for Athletic, and was perhaps the player you did not want to have a 30-yard shooting opportunity, but he hit it true, the ball hit the net, and the score became 2-0. A third Athletic goal from Ritchie put the game beyond doubt, despite a late Niall Quinn consolation, and Boundary Park erupted as the referee blew


the final whistle. Now Athletic fans had 'nights to remember', now Athletic would appear on the back pages of the national press and now Boundary Park saw a rare celebratory pitch invasion.

But December also saw a potential problem. Because Athletic were becoming the focus of national attention, so too was Joe Royle and in early December it was assumed that Big Joe would be leaving Boundary Park for the vacant managerial post at Maine Road. On Friday 1st December, Athletic faced Blackburn at Boundary Park and rumours of Royle's departure was the talk of the terraces. So much so that a number of fans clubbed together to have the message "Please Joe, DON'T GO" on the electronic scoreboard that had become a beacon on those glory nights. One fan even stayed outside the ground on that freezing night to ask Joe to stay,

clad only in a t-shirt. Next morning, Royle made the decision that would go onto shape the rest of the season, and the immediate future of the club. He turned City town, remaining in partnership with the club he had been at for 8 years. From the Pennine Way to Wembley Way, for optimists and pessimists alike, this partnership would give Athletic fans the journey of a lifetime...

ABOUT MILLWALL...

Millwall is an area in London, on the western side of the Isle of Dogs, in the London Borough of Tower Hamlets. It lies to the south of the developments at West India Docks, including Canary Wharf. Originally known as Marshwall, its name derives from the large number of windmills built on the river wall, in the 19th century. Corn was brought along the River Thames to be ground into flour here, before being delivered to bakers who kneaded the dough. On January 31, 1858, the largest ship of that time, the SS Great Eastern designed by Isambard Kingdom Brunel, was launched from the yard of Messrs J Scott Russell & Co, of Millwall. The 211 metre (692 ft) length was too wide for the river, and the ship had to be launched sideways.

Millwall gained some notoriety when, in a council by-election in 1993, Derek Beckon won the British National Party's first council seat there. After a major anti-fascist campaign, the BNP lost the seat at the following full council election. Like other parts of the Isle of Dogs, substantial redevelopment has been more or less ongoing since the 1980s, resulting in modern industrial and commercial buildings and hastily constructed contemporary housing beginning to dominate the remaining early 20th century "two up, two down" homes that once housed the dock workers and supporting communities of this area.

Millwall F.C. moved to The Den at Cold Blow Lane in 1910. Since their formation in 1885 they had occupied 4 other grounds! They moved to the New Den in 1993, the first new football stadium to be built in London since the Second World War. Originally nicknamed 'The Dockers', Millwall became "The Lions" in 1900 when their giant killing acts saw them reach the semi-final of the FA Cup.



Emma Hough admits her first meeting with boyfriend Chris Taylor four years ago was in a far from romantic setting.

"It was in a chippy in Waterhead," recalled Emma who added it was through friends that they were introduced.

"I was with a friend who knew somebody who was with Chris and that is how we began talking and it ended with me giving him my telephone number," explained Emma who celebrates her 19th birthday on Thursday.

Emma, who is from Springhead, admitted she had no interest in football before she met Chris who had just joined Latics as a trainee when they first began dating.

"I am quite patient by nature and I don't think Chris would have the patience to do my work."

Emma says the only downside of going out with a footballer is that their respective jobs clash when it comes to taking holidays.

"I have most of my holidays in July and August when Chris is back training pre-season and playing so there is only one week at Whit when can go on holiday.

"I am not complaining because Chris is living his dream and we work things out so it isn't a problem between us.

"I think it is great that I can go and support Chris in the job he does. I am his biggest fan and even have a shirt with Taylor on the back!"







Classic Campaigns

Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS selects ten post-war Luton Town 'Classic Campaigns'.

1954/55

Gordon Turner scored 32 goals as Luton Town won promotion to the top-flight for the first time in 1954/55. The Hatters began with a 3-0 victory at home to Nottingham Forest and soared up the Second Division table with six straight wins. Gordon Turner grabbed a hat-trick as Luton trounced Blackburn 7-3 and they triumphed 5-1 at Nottingham Forest. Dally Duncan's side maintained their challenge, slamming four goals past Hull City, Rotherham, Liverpool and Port Vale. Tom Aherne and Shay Dunne were ever-present as Luton pipped Rotherham to the runners-up slot on goal average with a 3-0 win at Doncaster.

1958/59

Luton Town were FA Cup finalists for the first and only time in 1958/59. The Hatters were unbeaten in their opening ten First Division games, trouncing Manchester City 5-1 and scoring four goals past West Ham and Preston. They recovered from a lean spell to beat Arsenal 6-3 and

clinching the title with a 4-0 victory over Crewe.

1969/70

Malcolm Macdonald scored 25 times as Luton Town won promotion in 1969/70. The Hatters had narrowly missed promotion the previous season and Bruce Rioch was sold to Aston Villa for a record fee, with Alec Stock signing Malcolm Macdonald, John Ryan and John Collins. Luton were early leaders after remaining unbeaten in their opening 13 matches, recruiting Chris Nicholl from Halifax and Matt Tees from Charlton. Malcolm Macdonald grabbed hat-tricks in 5-0 wins over Bradford City and Reading, with Luton unbeaten in their last six matches and clinching promotion as Third Division runners-up with a 0-0 draw at Mansfield.

1973/74

Luton Town regained top-flight status after an absence of 14 years in 1973/74. The Hatters recovered from a 4-0 defeat at Nottingham Forest on the opening day to hammer Carlisle 6-1, embarking on an eight-match unbeaten run.

Harry Haslam signed Alan West from Burnley and Jimmy Husband from Everton as Luton maintained their promotion challenge. Husband netted a hat-trick in a 3-1 victory over rivals Orient, then leading marksman Barry Butlin scored three in a 4-2 win over Preston. Alan Garner and Bobby Thomson were ever-present and other stars included Peter Anderson and John Ryan as Luton finished runners-up.

1981/82

David Pleat guided Luton Town to the Second Division title in 1981/82. The Hatters had narrowly missed promotion in the previous two years and Tony Grealish was swapped for Brighton's Brian Horton. They raced to the top by winning their first three games and hammered rivals Watford 4-1, then Steve White scored four times in a 6-0 demolition of Grimsby. Richard Money arrived from Liverpool and was an influential figure as Luton were unbeaten in their last 14 matches. Leading marksman Brian Stein, Mal Donaghy, Kirk Stephens and Steve White were all ever-present as Luton won the title with 88 points.

1987/88

Ray Harford plotted Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph. Danny Wilson replaced Peter Nicholas in midfield, while

Micky Weir arrived from Hibernian and Mike Newell moved to Leicester. The Hatters won 5-2 at Oxford and Ian Allinson was signed from Stoke in October, with Luton losing just twice in 12 matches including a 7-4 win in the return match against Oxford, finishing ninth in the top-flight. They defeated Wigan 5-2, Coventry 3-1, Ipswich 1-0, Bradford City 2-0 and Oxford 3-1 in the Littlewoods Cup before beating Arsenal 3-2 in the final. Luton were also FA Cup semi-finalists and Simod Cup finalists.

1988/89

Luton Town were Littlewoods Cup finalists for the second consecutive season in 1988/89. Departures were Brian Stein, Mark Stein and Andy Dibble, while newcomers included Roy Wegerle, John Dreyer and Steve Williams. Luton's first home win was 1-0 against Liverpool and they beat Southampton 6-1 in January but First Division form was generally disappointing, with the Hatters narrowly avoiding relegation by winning three of their last four games. Luton defeated Burnley 2-1, Leeds 2-0, Manchester City 3-1, Southampton 2-1 and West Ham 5-0 in the Littlewoods Cup before losing 3-1 to Nottingham Forest in the final.

2001/02

Steve Howard scored 24 times as Luton Town won promotion in

2001/02. Joe Kinnear's side were early leaders after winning their opening two matches and newcomer Carl Griffiths netted a hat-trick in a 5-1 win over Torquay. The Hatters briefly regained pole position after beating Darlington 5-2 in October, signing Chris Coyne from Dundee, Jean-Louis Valois from Lille, Dean Crowe from Stoke, Ahmet Brkovic from Orient and Dave Bayliss from Rochdale. A run of 12 successive wins, slamming five goals past Halifax and Mansfield, took Luton back to the top with two games remaining but they finished runners-up to Plymouth.

2004/05

Mike Newell managed Luton Town to the League One title in 2004/05. The Hatters stormed to the top of the table, winning 10 of their first 12 games before three successive defeats. They beat Bradford City 4-0 and Wrexham 5-1, then Steve Howard netted a hat-trick in a 4-1 win at MK Dons. The 1-0 victory over Port Vale in December heralded a 14 match unbeaten run and Luton bounced back from a 3-1 defeat in the return fixture to hammer Bristol City 5-0. Briefly displaced as leaders by Hull, they triumphed 4-1 at Torquay and secured promotion with four games remaining. Luton won the title with a record 98 points.

MANAGING TO SUCCEED

Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS profiles ten leading Luton Town managers

NED LIDDELL

Ned Liddell managed Luton Town to the Third Division (South) title in 1936-37. A former centre-half, he played for Whitburn, Southampton, Gainsborough, Clapton Orient, Southend United and Arsenal before rejoining Southend as manager in April 1919. He was appointed QPR's boss in April 1920 and guided them to the FA Cup quarter-finals in 1922-23, then scouted for Fulham before becoming their manager for two years in May 1929. After a period scouting for West Ham, he managed Luton from August 1936 until February 1938, then scouted for Chelsea, Portsmouth, Brentford and Spurs. He died in November 1969.



Allan Brown

SYD OWEN

Long-serving England international centre-half Syd Owen was both a player and manager at Luton Town. Signing professional for Birmingham City in October 1945, he moved to Luton in June 1947 and starred in their 1951-52 FA Cup run, 1952-53 promotion near-miss and 1954-55 promotion success. He was voted 'Footballer of the Year' as Luton were FA Cup finalists in 1959 and netted three goals in 388 League games before becoming manager for a year in May 1959. Later Leeds United's chief coach under Don Revie until October 1975, he then coached at Birmingham, Hull City and Manchester United. He died in August 1998.

DALLY DUNCAN

Former Scotland international winger Dally Duncan managed Luton Town to the top-flight in 1954-55. Signing professional for Hull City in August 1928, he moved to Derby County in March 1932 and featured in their 1946 FA Cup final success. He became Luton's player-boss in October 1946 and steered them to eighth place in the top-flight in 1957-58. Appointed Blackburn Rovers' manager in October 1958, he led them to the 1960 FA Cup final and remained in charge at Ewood Park until sacked in June 1960. He later scouted for Luton and ran a guest-house in Brighton, residing there until his death in January 1990.

ALLAN BROWN

Ex-Scotland international inside-forward Allan Brown managed Luton Town to the Fourth Division title in 1967-68. He was a Scottish Cup finalist with East Fife shortly before joining Blackpool in December 1950 and moved to Luton in February 1957. Appearing in the 1959 FA Cup final, he netted 51 goals in 151 League games for the Hatters prior to joining Portsmouth in March 1961. He helped win the Third Division title in 1961-62, then had a spell as Wigan Athletic's player-boss and was Luton's manager from November 1966 until December 1968, later managing Torquay, Bury, Nottingham Forest, Southport and Blackpool.


ALEC STOCK

Alec Stock managed Luton Town to promotion in 1969-70. He was a forward with Charlton and QPR before becoming Yeovil Town's player-boss, plotting their epic 1948-49 FA Cup run. Appointed Leyton Orient's boss in August 1949, he led them to the FA Cup sixth round in 1953-54 and Third Division (South) title in 1955-56, returning from spells at Arsenal and Roma. He became QPR's boss in August 1959, taking them to the top-flight and League Cup glory, then managed Luton from December 1968 until April 1972. Guiding Fulham to the 1975 FA Cup final, he later managed AFC Bournemouth and died in April 2001.

HARRY HASLAM

Popular manager Harry Haslam guided Luton Town back to the top-flight in 1973-74. Initially with Rochdale, the full-

back played for Oldham Athletic, Brighton, Leyton Orient, Guildford City and Hastings United, then managed Eastbourne United, Barry Town and Tonbridge before becoming Fulham's chief scout. He assisted Alec Stock at Luton prior to succeeding him as manager in May 1972, remaining in charge of the Hatters until leaving in January 1978 to manage Sheffield United. He scouted for England under Bobby Robson and died in September 1986. His son Keith is now Mansfield's managing director.





DAVID PLEAT

Articulate manager David Pleat managed Luton Town to the Second Division title in 1981-82. A former winger, he played for Nottingham Forest, Luton, Shrewsbury, Exeter and Peterborough before becoming Nuneaton's player-boss. He rejoined Luton as coach in July 1972 and became manager in January 1978, guiding the Hatters to the FA Cup semi-finals in 1984-85. Taking charge of Spurs in May 1986, he led them to the 1987 FA Cup final, then managed Leicester City before rejoining Luton in June 1991. He took the Hatters to the FA Cup semi-finals again in 1993-94, leaving in June 1995. Now working in the media.

RAY HARFORD


Ray Harford plotted Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph. A centre-half with Charlton, Exeter, Lincoln, Mansfield, Port Vale and Colchester, he was appointed youth team coach at Layer Road. He joined Fulham in a similar capacity in June 1981 and was manager for two years before moving to Luton as assistant-boss in July 1986. Becoming manager in June 1987, he also guided them to the Simod Cup final and FA Cup semi-finals in 1987-88, then the 1989 Littlewoods Cup final. Sacked in January 1990, he later managed Wimbledon, Blackburn Rovers, West Brom and QPR. He died in August 2003.

JOE KINNEAR

Former Republic of Ireland international right-back Joe Kinnear plotted Luton Town's 2001-02 promotion success. Signing professional for Spurs in February 1965, he helped them win the FA Cup in 1967, League Cup twice and UEFA Cup in 1972. He moved to Brighton in August 1975, then coached overseas before assisting Dave Mackay at Doncaster. Joining Wimbledon as coach in September 1989, he became manager in January 1992 and led them to the semi-finals of both the FA Cup and League Cup in 1996-97. He left after a heart-attack, then managed Luton from January 2001 until June 2003 and later Nottingham Forest.

MIKE NEWELL

Ex-England U-21 striker Mike Newell managed Luton Town to the League One title in 2004-05. Initially with Liverpool, he moved via Crewe to Wigan Athletic in October 1983 and scored in their 1985 Freight Rover trophy final triumph. He played for Luton, Leicester City and Everton prior to joining Blackburn Rovers in November 1991, helping win promotion in 1991-92 and the Premiership title in 1994-95. Later with Birmingham City, he became Hartlepool's boss in November 2002, plotting their 2002-03 promotion success. He rejoined Luton as manager in June 2003 and remained in charge until sacked in March 2007.

ANALYSIS

CRISIS-RIDDEN Luton Town are focussed purely on survival after a ten-point penalty deduction banished them to the foot of League One, writes the Advertiser's Carl Marsden. A turbulent period culminated in chairman David Pinkey placing the Hatters into administration on November 22 – and kick-started the fraught process of attempting to find a new buyer for the club.

Kenilworth Road had been thrown into chaos just days earlier after the FA announced more than 50 disciplinary charges were being brought against the club, former chairman Bill Tomlins, and three ex-directors, following an investigation into ex-manager Mike Newell's claims that illegal payments are rife in the game.

On-the-field Luton have also toiled to adjust to life in League One under new boss Kevin Blackwell.


Relegation from the Championship has prompted a serious hangover despite the

recruitment of several quality players including Darren Currie, Paul Peschisolido, Chris Perry and Don Hutchison.

Injuries have also been unkind with the long-term absences of Sam Parkin and Peschisolido meaning they have over-relied on nine-goal Paul Furlong and arrive today still seeking their first away league win.

The Hatters have picked up just two draws in eight attempts and scored a paltry three goals on the road. However, the players' reaction since entering administration has been to jump off the bottom of League One with a home win over Southend – and make progress in the FA Cup with a 2-0 win at Brentford.

Kevin Blackwell said: "It's been an unbelievable few days to go from one crisis to another with the FA to administration. But I don't think anyone can say the players haven't shown heart, passion and commitment for a club that needs a lot of it right now."



SKIPPER

CHRIS Coyne (6) is enjoying regular first-team football again after being injury-plagued last term.

The 29-year-old club captain is an inspirational figure whose presence was sorely missed during the Hatters' ill-fated relegation battle.

Brisbane-born, he came to England in 1996 when West Ham paid Perth SC £150,000 for his services.

However, he failed to make a start for the Hammers and – following loan stints with Brentford and Southend – then spent 18 months in the SPL with Dundee.

A bargain £50,000 brought him to Bedford in 2001 and he has since amassed more than 200 appearances, proving to be a rock-like presence in central defence and a huge fans' favourite.

VETERAN reserve 'keeper Marlon Beresford (NA) recently made six loan appearances for Latics before sustaining a hamstring injury. Additional cover is provided by untried 19-year-old Zac Barrett (NA).

Well-built Polish centre-back Jaroslaw Fojut (31) is on-loan from Bolton until January. The 20-year-old no-nonsense defender made his senior bow for Wanderers in a Carling Cup tie last season. Ex-Bangor City left-back Alan Goodall (3) celebrated his 26th birthday on Sunday. Also capable of operating in central defence, he was signed from Rochdale during the summer.

Injury-plagued Paul Underwood (24) spurned an approach from Latics to join Luton in 2004. The 34-year-old ex-Rushden defender

missed all last season through a blood infection.

Popular Sol Davis (26) is an excellent marker who suffered a stroke last term. The 28-year-old, who recently had a spell with Peterborough United, is a tough-tackling left back who cost £600,000 from Swindon Town in 2002.

Richard Jackson (12) is another left-back and a summer signing from Derby County. The 27-year-old ex-Scarborough trainee had cost a £30,000 fee in 1999 and made more than 100 Rams' first-team starts.

Lewis Emanuel (17) rejoined Brentford on-loan last week for a second time. The 24-year-old full-back played more than 100 games for hometown Bradford City before becoming a Hatter in 2006.

Energetic David Edwards (16) has made a big impression since arriving from Shrewsbury Town. The 21-year-old played a key role in the League Two side reaching the play-offs last term with six goals in 51 appearances.

Keith Keane (21) can operate at right-back, in central defence, or midfield. The 21-year-old, one of the Hatters' most improved players, is at his most dangerous when surging forward.

Utility man Marc Wilson (33) recently signed on a short-term loan from Portsmouth. The 20-year-old is an Eire U21 international who has had two loan stints with Bournemouth in 2007.

A loan spell by Croatian midfielder Ahmet Brkovic (18) at Millwall is set to end today – but the 33-year-old is reportedly keen to see it extended.

Much-travelled Paul Peschisolido (11) joined from Derby in July. The 36-year-old Canadian international has played for Birmingham, West Brom, Fulham, Sheffield United and several other clubs on loan.

loan stints with Millwall, Wycombe, Oldham and Northampton, he left Chelsea for Swindon in 2002 before netting 67 times in 120 games.

Dean Morgan (7) has joined Southend on-loan until January. The 24-year-old ex-Reading striker had started just six games this season without finding the net.



ATTACK

PAUL McVeigh (28) signed from Norwich City in August. The 30-year-old, an ex-Tottenham trainee, netted 36 league goals in 148 starts for the Canaries. Clever and skilful, the Northern Ireland international is an inventive force in possession.

Calvin Andrew (20) is enjoying a rare extended first-team run.

The pacy 20-year-old, a prolific scorer at youth level, netted his first league goal of the season in last week's 1-0 win over Southend. Drew Talbot (19) cost £250,000 last January from Sheffield Wednesday. Originally on Barnsley's books, the 21-year-old drifted into non-league football before Owls' coaching staff spotted him at Dodworth. A tenacious prospect, his stamina makes him a constant menace to opposition defenders.

RON BAYNHAM: England international goalkeeper who was a key figure as Luton Town were FA Cup finalists in 1959. He impressed with Worcester City before moving to Kenilworth Road in November 1951 and contested a first-team slot with fellow England keeper Bernard Streten as Luton gained top-flight status for the first time in 1954-55. Missing just one match in both 1955-56 and 1957-58, he was capped three times and also represented the Football League. He made 388 League appearances for the Hatters until injury ended his career in May 1965 and subsequently worked as an interior decorator in Bedfordshire.


KIRK STEPHENS: Attacking right-back who was ever-present in Luton Town's 1981-82 Second Division title triumph. Initially with Nuneaton Borough, he helped them finish Southern League runners-up in 1974-75 and followed David Pleat to Kenilworth Road in June 1978. He was voted Luton's 'Player of the Year' in 1978-79 and 1983-84, scoring twice in 227 League games for the Hatters before moving to Coventry City in exchange for Ashley Grimes in August 1984. Later rejoining Nuneaton as player-manager after a knee injury ended his top-flight career, he also had a spell at Barnet and worked for his father's building firm.

MITCHELL THOMAS: Versatile England U-21 international left-back who had two spells at Luton Town. Born locally, he signed professional at Kenilworth Road in August 1982 and starred as Luton reached the FA Cup semi-finals in 1984-85. He followed

helping to win the League Championship in 1974-75. He played for Everton, Derby again and Torquay, since managing Middlesbrough, Millwall, Bolton Wanderers, Arsenal, Norwich City and Wigan Athletic.

SYD OWEN: Long-serving England international centre-half who skippered Luton Town in the 1959 FA Cup final. Signing professional for Birmingham City in October 1945, he moved to Luton in June 1947 and starred in their 1951-52 FA Cup run, 1952-53 promotion near-miss and 1954-55 promotion success. He was 'Footballer of the Year' in 1958-59 and netted three goals in 388 League games before becoming Luton's manager for a year in May 1959. Subsequently Leeds United's chief coach under Don Revie until October 1975, he then coached at Birmingham, Hull City and Manchester United. He died in August 1998.

BRUCE RIOCH: Influential midfielder who was capped 24 times by Scotland after leaving Luton Town. Signing professional for Luton in September 1964, he starred in the 1967-68 Fourth Division title triumph and netted 46 goals in 149 League games prior to joining Aston Villa for £100,000 in July 1969. He was a key figure in their 1971-72 Third Division title success and moved to Derby County in February 1974,

at Leicester City in August 1990 and later as a coach at Sheffield Wednesday and Spurs, he briefly rejoined Luton as manager.

BRIAN STEIN: England international striker who scored twice in Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Edgware Town in October 1977, he was leading marksman in Luton's 1981-82 Second Division success and also starred as they were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88. He joined Caen in July 1988 and moved via Annecy back to Luton in July 1991. Voted 'Player of the Year' for the second time in 1991-92, he netted 130 goals in 427 League games overall for the Hatters before joining Barnet in August 1992. His younger brother Mark also played for Luton.


Sunderland, Coventry and Wimbledon. He later coached Luton, then managed Rotherham.

MALCOLM MACDONALD: Ace marksman who was capped 14 times by England after leaving Luton Town. Initially with Tonbridge, he joined Fulham in August 1968 and moved to Kenilworth Road in July 1969. He was Luton's top scorer in two consecutive seasons including the 1969-70 promotion success and netted 49 goals in 88 League games before being sold to Newcastle United for £180,000 in May 1971. An FA Cup finalist in 1974, he joined Arsenal for £333,000 in August 1976 and was an FA Cup finalist again in 1978 before injury ended his career. He subsequently managed Fulham and Huddersfield Town.

PAUL WALSH: England international striker who was capped five times while at Luton Town. Signing professional for Charlton Athletic in October 1979, he starred in their 1980-81 promotion success and moved to Luton in July 1982. He was 'Player of the Year' in 1982-83 and leading marksman in 1983-84, netting 24 goals in 80 First Division games for the Hatters prior to joining Liverpool in May 1984. Helping to win the League Championship in 1985-86, he joined Tottenham Hotspur in February 1988 and was an FA Cup winner in 1991. He later played for Portsmouth and Manchester City until injury ended his career.

MICK HARFORD: England international striker who played for Luton Town in consecutive Littlewoods Cup finals including the 1988 Wembley triumph. Signing professional for Lincoln City in July 1977, he had spells with Newcastle United, Bristol City and Birmingham City prior to joining Luton in December 1984. He starred as the Hatters were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88, moving to Derby County in January 1990 and returning to Luton in September 1991. Joining Chelsea in August 1992, he later played for


