





Once again there is strong competition for places which can only be a good thing. Matthew Spring has recovered from the flu and so we welcome him back into the side. Keith


Keane is slowly getting to full match fitness and is challenging for a place in the starting line-up.

We have a proud home record to try and maintain, but Forest have a great away record so we know it's going to be a real battle.


There has been some great games under the lights this season and we are confident we can recreate that magic tonight.

Les Shannon

12th March 1926 - 2nd December 2007

Everyone at Kenilworth Road was saddened to learn of the death of Les Shannon who for several years was in charge of scouting for the Hatters.

Les started his football career with his home town club, Liverpool, who he joined just as the war was coming to an end. He eventually made his League debut for the Reds in April 1948 but managed only eleven more appearances before his contract ended in November 1949.

Luckily, he had played well in a reserve game against Burnley earlier that season and was soon invited to Turf Moor where he went on to make over 250 League appearances for the Clarets over the next ten years, most of which in his favoured wing-half position.

Tough tackling Les, who used to walk to Turf Moor with his boots under his arm before a match, was reserve for the Football League against the League of Ireland in September 1956 and also won three England 'B' caps in a long playing career which ended in 1959.

Always interested in coaching, Les then took up roles at Everton and Arsenal before winning his first managerial job at Bury in 1966 and then taking over at Blackpool who he steered to the top flight in 1970.

After resigning from the post at Bloomfield Road, Les worked as a coach in Greece for many years before returning to England and taking up the Chief Scout role at Kenilworth Road.

Les was still living locally at the time of his death.



The Forest story from 1865

Beginnings

A group of "shinney" players – a sport like hockey – met at the Clinton Arms in 1865 and voted to switch to playing the new game of football. They chose their colours as Garibaldi Red after the Italian freedom fighter. Forest applied to join the Football League when it began in 1888 but were turned down and instead joined the Football Alliance, which they won in 1892. They applied again and this time were accepted. Six years later, they won their first major trophy – the FA Cup, beating Derby 3-1 at Crystal Palace.

Top player

SO many to choose from but many fans think that giant keeper Peter Shilton was one of the main reasons that Forest not only won, but retained the European Cup in 1979 and 1980. A massive presence and great shot-stopper, Shilts played in both finals, won 125 England caps and ended his career with more than 1,000 League appearances to his name, 202 of them for Forest.



Top manager

BRITAIN'S most charismatic and best-loved manager ever was 'Ol Big Head' Brian Clough. He took over at Forest in 1975, won the Second Division title in 1976 and the First Division a year later, followed by the European Cup in 1979 and 1980. As a player he had scored 251 goals in 274 League games.

The word legend just doesn't say enough about him somehow. He was far bigger than that.

FOREST'S first European trophy. £1m buy Trevor Francis made his European debut in place of Martin O'Neill, where he managed to put Forest ahead by rising beyond the far post to head in John Robertson's cross just before half time. Brian Clough called it the most satisfying moment in his career. The team of legends was: Shilton, Anderson, Lloyd, Burns, Clark, Francis, McGovern, Bowyer, Robertson, Woodcock, Birtles.

WITH Premiership giants Liverpool awaiting the winners of today's FA Cup Second Round tie against Nottingham Forest, this game has all of a sudden taken on a bit of extra significance.

Forest, who were beaten 2-1 by the Hatters at Kenilworth Road in October, have been on an impressive run of results and have kept with the leading pack in the League One table.

Impressive home wins against Tranmere Rovers and Southend United, two teams who are predicted to be challenging for promotion this season, as well as a win against Lincoln to reach this far in the Cup, have been recorded.

And with Nathan Tyson in a rich run of form, Forest could well keep that momentum going beyond their match at Kenilworth Road.

Tyson, who shot to fame with Wycombe Wanderers, had endured a slow start to life at the City Ground, but the nippy striker is all of a sudden repaying a large junk of the £675,000 price tag Forest paid for him in January 2006.

Tyson scored a brace in the 3-1 win over Lincoln in the FA Cup and is

currently one of the inform strikers in League One.

And with players such as Kris Commons, Grant Holt, Matt Lockwood and Neil Lennon amongst their ranks, Forest certainly have a hugely talented squad.

Honours between the two sides have been pretty much even with Forest edging out the Hatters 24 to 20 in their 59 previous encounters.

And Forest have a decent record of victories at Kenilworth Road. In 1993,

Luton old boy Kinglsey Black scored one of the Forest goals in a 2-1 victory over the Hatters.

And in 1989, Forest edged out the Hatters in a five goal thriller at Kenilworth Road, the same season in which they beat Luton in the League Cup Final.

Forest are a club with great tradition. They are two-time winners of the European Cup and have had great domestic success including winning the FA

Cup on two occasions.

But it has been a roller-coaster ride for Forest in recent years, with five seasons in the Premiership in the Nineties, before tumbling out of the top flight in 1999, and now striving to get back to the Championship.

Having narrowly missed out on promotion last season through the play-offs, the pressure is certainly mounting on the Reds to make it on this occasion.

The long run from the Racecourse to the City

FOREST played at six different grounds in their first 30 years but have now been at the City Ground for 120 years. They began at the Forest Racecourse ground, which gave the club its name. Over the next 25 years, they played at The Meadows, Trent Bridge, Parkside and Gregory in Lenton, the Town Ground and moved to the City Ground in 1897. The site has been hugely developed into a 30,000-seater stadium.




THE SKIPPER: 6 IAN BRECKIN

Joined Forest from Wigan in the summer of 2005. He reached a personal milestone last season when he made his 600th senior appearance. A seasoned central defender, Breckin's first campaign at The City Ground saw him score a career best ten goals and scoop the Club's 'Player of the Year' award. He relinquished his grip on that title last season and contributed just three goals to the Forest cause but his defensive displays drew widespread praise and earned him a place in the PFA's 'Team of the Year for League One'. He was an integral part of the Wigan side that clinched promotion to the Premiership but knowing that opportunities to figure in their top-flight side could prove few and far between, he opted for a £350,000 move to Forest. He launched his career with his hometown club Rotherham.

KEEPERS

1 PAUL SMITH: Started his career at Brentford, where he made 87 League appearances before a move down to Southampton where he was understudy to Antti Niemi and played 22 games for the Saints. Colin Calderwood made Smith his first signing when he took over as Forest boss in July 2007 and the keeper made 52 appearances in his first season at the City Ground.

Although that ended in the disappointment of Play-Off defeat, he established himself as the Club's first-choice goalkeeper. He kept five clean sheets in his first seven League One appearances for Forest.

30 DALE ROBERTS: Smith's understudy spent last season out on loan with Alfreton Town, making 47 appearances for the Conference North side and impressing many. A product of the Forest Academy, he is still waiting to make his First Team debut for the Club.



TOP SCORER: JUNIOR AGOGO

23 JUNIOR AGOGO: Ghanaian international. Junior scored 10 goals for Forest last season before a pelvic injury in March ended his season. He scored 20 goals for Barnet in 2002-03, then 41 in 126 League games for Bristol Rovers before joining Forest in August 2006. Forest paid Bristol Rovers an undisclosed fee for a player, who had spells with Sheffield Wednesday and QPR earlier in this career - as well as a two-year stint playing in America.

THE STRIKERS



LIVELY... Tyson

10 GRANT HOLT: Last season's Player Of The Year arrived at Forest via Workington, Halifax, Barrow, Sheffield Wednesday and Rochdale, costing £300,000 from Scotland. Has hit 18 goals in 75 League games.

9 NATHAN TYSON: Two serious knee injuries have disrupted Nathan's career, which started at Reading. Joined Forest in January 2006.

11 SCOTT DOBIE: Scottish international striker, who launched his playing career with Carlisle and then spent three seasons at West Brom. He arrived at Forest from Millwall.

THE MIDFIELDERS



EXCITING... Commons

8 KRIS COMMONS: Played much of his football for Forest on the left-side of midfield, but boss Calderwood lets him roam and has also used him as a striker. He was on Forest's books as a youngster, a before Stoke offered him a scholarship. He made 41 League appearances for The Potters.

15 CHRIS COHEN: A classy play-maker, Chris started at West Ham, making 18 League appearances for them. He had a successful loan spell with Yeovil - which included helping them knock Forest out of the Play-Offs last May - before moving to the City Ground in summer 2006.

16 SAMMY CLINGAN: A talented midfielder, who established himself in the Northern Ireland line-up under Lawrie Sanchez. Joined Forest from Wolves in January 2006 after producing an eye-catching display for loan club Chesterfield against Forest at the City Ground.

17 LEWIS MCGUGAN: One of Forest's brightest Academy prospects, he made 18 First Team appearances last season, including 13 starts, and scored two spectacular goals.

18 NEIL LENNON: Joined Forest in June 2007, apparently turning down the chance to join his former international teammate Roy Keane in the Premiership at Sunderland. Came to promise at Crewe Alexandra, before signing for Leicester and then enjoying a successful career at Celtic. Neil signed a one-year contract with an option of another year at Forest.

THE DEFENDERS

5 WES MORGAN: His ankle injury at the end of last season allowed Luke Chambers to establish himself alongside skipper Ian Breckin in central defence. Forest has been Morgan's only full time club, and he has played more than 160 League games.

2 KEVIN WILSON: Frustrated by lack of First Team action at Preston, Kevin moved to Forest for £300,000 in the summer. Born in Nottingham, he played more than 80 games for Notts County before moving to Preston, where he played 27 League games.

4 LUKE CHAMBERS: Colin Calderwood signed Luke from his former club Northampton in January. Made his debut for Northampton at 17 and was soon made captain. Played more than 120 games and helped them win promotion to League One in 2006.

29 JULIAN BENNETT: A cult hero to many fans, left-back Julian was at the Forest Academy, then joined Walsall at 14 before rejoining Forest in January 2006.

7 JAMES PERCH: Made more first team appearances last season than any other player with 54 (including 51 starts). Made his Forest debut as a central defender but can also play at right-back and in midfield.

With a healthy number of Non-League sides involved, there was always likely to be an upset, and HAVANT & WATERLOOVILLE did the honours with a win at NOTTS COUNTY.

Tony Taggart scored the only goal, three minutes from time, as Blue Square South HAVANT reached the Third Round for the first time in their history; with a 1-0 win at League Two NOTTS COUNTY.

HEREFORD caused a minor shock in their 2-0 home victory over League One HARTLEPOOL. The Bulls went ahead through John McCombe just before the break, and Theo Robinson settled it with 85 minutes played.

Ryman League HORSHAM made it into through after their 1-1 home draw with League One title-chasers SWANSEA. Guillem Bauza put the Swans ahead in the 41st minute, but the Hornets earned their second chance as Lewis Taylor converted a penalty, five minutes from time.

Blue Square Premier BURTON will hope to make the most of a replay at Underhill as Liam Hatch's opener in 19 minutes for League Two BARNET was cancelled out four minutes from the end by the hosts' captain Darren Stride, in a game which saw the Bees' Nicky Nicolau dismissed in stoppage time.







FLASHBACK

ROGER WASH tells the stories behind some special moments in Hatters history



Forest scrape through in a classic.

THE Hatters ace marksman Malcolm Macdonald looks on in amazement after Forest full-back John Winfield crashes into the back of the net and snaps the goalpost at the same time. At least this brought about a stoppage in a breathless 180 minutes of cup football that flowed backwards and forwards before Forest finally came through at the death.

Division Two pacesetters Luton had been drawn away to top flight Forest in the FA Cup Third Round in 1970/71 and were confident of victory as their hosts had gone eleven games without a win.

A crowd of 23,230, including several special train loads from Luton, watched as Forest ran rings around the Hatters on an icy pitch and took a deserved lead on 18 minutes through Jimmy McIntosh.

The broken goalpost incident, after half an hour, gave the Town's coaching staff time to re-organise things on the pitch and after the re-start it came as a

surprise when it took until the 70th minute for Macdonald to equalise and take the tie back to Kenilworth Road.

This time 23,483 turned up to see a contest of high speed, thrust and parry with the Town attacking from the start but leaving themselves wide open for the counter attack.

After 15 minutes of sustained pressure, during which Forest goalkeeper Jim Barron pulled off some wonder saves, Forest broke away and scored a soft goal through Peter Cormack. Macdonald levelled five minutes later only to see substitute Gary Collier and then Barry Lyons net twice within a minute to give the away side an apparently unassailable lead.

The Town were made of strong stuff,

though, and a penalty from Macdonald after a foul on Jimmy Ryan opened the game up again. Supermac was rampant and seemed to be playing the Forest defence on his own and the roof was lifted when he bagged his hat-trick goal with six minutes to go to level the tie.

Manager Alec Stock went down to the bench to supervise extra time but watched in horror as Forest winger Ronnie Rees raced through from a seemingly offside position to bang in the winner at the death.

Coach Jimmy Andrews said afterwards: "We over attacked. It was a great game for spectators, but not a great professional game. At times we were murdering them.

"We played well enough to win and badly enough to lose. Attacking football is great if you are not too worried about the result."



It was a first goal of the season for both as Luton kept a third consecutive clean sheet.


The bad news for Kevin Blackwell's injury-hit side is that both Dave Edwards and Don Hutchison limped off.


Brentford piled on the pressure in the closing stages of the game, but were unable to break through Luton's solid defence.




SURGING FORWARD... Dave Edwards mounts a Hatters attack

WHEN it comes to staring adversity in the face, Drew Talbot is no stranger. Having dealt with a serious back injury whilst on the books for Sheffield Wednesday, which ruled him out for a whole season, he returned to the Owls' frontline, and following a loan spell at Scunthorpe, earned himself a £250,000 move to Kenilworth Road.

So you won't be surprised to know he remains upbeat about the current situation the Hatters find themselves in, and reminiscent of the mood in the dressing room, they are more than ready to do their bit to keep spirits high, whilst the chips are supposedly down.

"Having had the ten point deduction, it's good to be having this run of form at the moment," commented the former Barnsley trainee.

"That kind of form is what we need at the moment so fingers crossed we can keep that run going.

"We also have this cup run; it is important that we can keep this going as well so tonight is really important. It breeds more confidence and that can only be a good thing.

"I watched the cup draw on television and I think this game has now taken on added significance. The draw against Liverpool has given us all that extra incentive to go on and beat Nottingham Forest.

"If we can win tonight, it will give us that extra confidence boost that can help us climb up the League One table."

And with the games coming thick and fast it can be a make or break time for a club's ambitions for the current campaign. Emerging out of the festive period with an unbeaten run ranks high on the list of priorities. But with away trips to unbeaten Cheltenham, Bristol Rovers and Port Vale, all sides in and around where the Hatters currently sit, and home games against mid-table Tranmere and Yeovil it represents a tough test.

"Christmas is always a hard time of the season, but you just have to get on with it," explained the 21-year-old. "You play about six games in two weeks, but when you're on a good run of form that is exactly what you want."

"It's important to head into the period on a bit of a high, which is why these next few games are so vitally important. There is no reason as to why we can't keep that run going."

"It is a tough time for everybody. Everyone really needs to stick together. In many ways, I think that is why we are probably on this run at the moment."

"It's important that we do keep together because it is an important time."

Talbot is hoping that a run of form for the Hatters in these matches can coincide with a regular run in the side for himself, as he looks to put his injury and illness problems behind him and play his part in helping Town climb back up the table.

"I hope it's the end of it now. I had a mixture of different illnesses. It all came together at once and it wasn't good for me at all."

"It was three weeks before I was even allowed to come back to training so I'm just glad to be back now. I'm nearly there, but compared to what I was, I just feel so much better."

"When you're playing every week, throughout training as well, your fitness levels are sky high and obviously it can be a bit of a shock when you come back from a long time on the sidelines."

"It takes a while to get back into the swing of things and it was hard for me being out for so long."

"It's not until you get back out on the field, playing matches, that you appreciate all that extra work on the training ground."

"I managed to play against Brentford in the FA Cup and that has done me the world of good, but I'm on the mend and getting back to some kind of full fitness."

"First of all I had Influenza. I managed to get rid of that, but then I had sinusitis. I was speaking to the doctors and they said the problem could take three weeks to get over, but I happened to get a really bad case of it."

"I couldn't get rid of it at all. I came into

training, just to do a little bit of running, but it struck me hard and if anything it made the situation even worse. It was just a case of taking antibiotics and getting rid of the illness."

"Luckily, since I have been at Luton, I have been very fortunate with injuries. The illness was just one of those things that happens, it just comes along and there is nothing you can do about it."

With the arrival of nine new faces in the summer, two of which are out and out strikers in Paul Peschisolidi and Paul Furlong, and two very attack minded midfielders, Paul McVeigh and Darren Currie, Talbot could be forgiven for feeling a little dejected by their arrival just six months after his own. However, unsurprisingly given his competitive nature, he has relished the challenge of the additional competition for a starting spot.

"The gaffer has changed things around now and then, but I have felt that I have needed to fight my place because everyone is pushing hard to get into the starting line-up."

"If you only sign a few players at the Club and you think your place is safe in the team, then there is a possibility that players may not play to their full potential."

"It's good that so many players have come in because you have to be at the top of your game all the time."

"It was a daunting move at first, because I left my home in Barnsley. But I have settled in here really quickly. I have made some good friends and that has helped me out a lot."

"I know a new manager has come in, but that hasn't really bothered me. New managers bring in new ideas. The manager is a good coach, and together we can move away from the relegation zone because we know we are a better team than that."


SIMON'S STATS



6 Luton have twice scored six goals in a FA Cup match at this stage of the competition whilst playing at home. In 1926/27 Northfleet United were beaten 6-2, and a year later Norwich City conceded six without reply.

8 is the number of FA Cup Second Round ties played at Kenilworth Road whilst Luton have been a League side. Luton have won six, with just one defeat and one draw. The Hatters have scored 23 goals, and conceded just nine in these eight matches. A further four replay matches at this stage of the competition have also been played when Luton have been the home side.

2 There have been two hat-tricks at this stage of the competition, and they both came in the two matches mentioned above! Harry Woods netted three against Northfleet with Syd Reid scoring twice and Andy Rennie the other. Reid was to go one better against Norwich as he repeated Woods' hat-trick feat, whilst Woods himself was also on the scoresheet. Jimmy Yardley and George Dennis completed the scoring against the Canaries.

1 Luton have only played Forest once before at Kenilworth Road in a FA Cup tie, and that was a third round replay in 1970/71. Malcolm MacDonald scored a second half equaliser at the City Ground, after a broken goal post had delayed the game in the first half. MacDonald netted a hat trick in the replay, but this wasn't enough for Luton to progress to the next round as Forest scored late on to win 4-3.

12,035 is the biggest attendance for an FA Cup second round match at Kenilworth Road. It was in December 1968 against Gillingham, and the Hatters were 3-1 winners courtesy of a brace from Mike Harrison, after Graham French had opened the scoring.


8 It's eight years since the Hatters last played at home at this stage of the competition. Lincoln City were the visitors, and despite being a league below the Hatters, twice took the lead. Gary Doherty was the hero though with a brace to take the game to a replay. Stuart Douglas ensured there was not going to be an upset as he netted a late winning goal at Sincil Bank.





8 The number of players who have moved from Forest to Luton on a permanent basis. George Dennis, Randolph Galloway, John Green, Joe Mills, Gerry Morgan and Tommy Roe all moved in the 1920's. The only player to really feature for Luton from those six was George Dennis who made 150 appearances and scored 44 goals. The other two players both moved in the 1960's, Stuart Imlach made just 9 appearances in the 1960/61 season before a move to Coventry City. David Pleat made nearly 80 appearances and scored 10 goals for Luton during the mid 1960's before a move to Shrewsbury Town. Pleat was of course to have two spells in charge of the Hatters.

6 Players have moved from Luton to Forest, although two of these came over 100 years ago, namely Herbert Holdstock and Bill McCurdy. Horace Gager, and Syd Ottewell both moved in the late 1940's. Barry Butlin had made 72 appearances, and scored 28 goals for Luton between 1972-74, before a move to Forest. Kingsey Black had come through the ranks at Luton, and made 157 appearances and scored 31 goals during a five year spell in the Hatters first team.





Hatters and Forest past...

THIS week's **LIFELINE** shows how Luton and Forest's fortunes have risen and fallen over the years. Forest's high point came when, under Brian Clough they won the old Division One in 1977-78 by seven points from Liverpool. Their low was in 1913-14 when they finished bottom of Division Two, then the lowest division in the Football League. Luton's low point came with a 17th place in Division Four in 1966-67 and their high a top flight 7th place in 1986-87.

After an unsatisfactory first-half Cummins made adjustments to his side and threw on Dean Hamilton after the restart.



Joseph (Joe) Cumpson SCOTT

After failing to make the grade at home town club Newcastle, Joe dropped down to non-League football with Spennymoor where he was spotted by Luton Town's scout in the north-east and brought back to Kenilworth Road. Although he scored on his League debut in a 2-4 defeat at Swansea in September 1952, National Service and injuries meant that it was while before Hatters fans saw the clever inside-forward get an extended run in the side. When he did get in the side it was invariably out of position so he was pleased to go to Middlesbrough for £5,000 in 1954 where he became a consistent goalscorer.

Joe now lives in Acklam in retirement.

Leslie (Les) Jessie SEALEY

A marvellous goalkeeper for nine different League clubs over a twenty year playing career, Les is warmly remembered at Luton where he made over 200 appearances in, undoubtedly the best ever Hatters side in the club's history.

Although a Londoner, the brave, positive and loud goalkeeper started his career as an apprentice at Coventry before moving to Luton in 1983 for £120,000. He missed out on the 1988 Littlewoods Cup triumph through injury but was between the sticks for the Town at Wembley twelve months later.

After leaving Luton for Manchester United he added both an FA Cup winners medal and a European Cup Winners Cup medal to his collection.

Les finished his playing career back home at West Ham but sadly died in 2001 at the young age of 43.

John SEASMAN

With everyone at Tranmere thinking that Luton scouts were watching winger Steve Coppell they were mildly surprised when a £14,000 bid came in for midfielder John Seaman.

John made his full League debut for the Hatters at Wolves in March 1975, scoring in a 2-5 defeat, but although highly rated by the fans and the local press he was often overlooked by the Luton management until he was told that the cash-strapped Town would have to pay Tranmere an extra £10,000 once he had made ten appearances!

At his next stop, Millwall, John became a crowd favourite helping the Lions to promotion a feat he also achieved at Rotherham.

After drifting down through the divisions, John became chief scout at Blackburn before working for football agents Base Soccer.

Dino SEREMET

Slovenian goalkeeper Dino was plying his trade with NK Maribor in his home country when he was invited over to Luton for trials in the summer of 2004 which proved successful.

As understudy to Marlon Beresford, Dino made six League appearances during the Hatters League One championship winning season of 2004-05 to cover for injury to the number one, plus one in the final game of the season 3-3 extravaganza at Doncaster. In the following campaign Dino could not force his way into the side and was allowed to move to Doncaster and then Tranmere on loan.


Dino left Luton in 2006 for Greek side Kerkyra who play in Corfu.

David (Dave) John SEXTON

Although Dave turned out for five clubs over an eleven year period taking in almost 200 League games along the way his playing career pales into insignificance compared to his coaching and managerial career afterwards.

Dave's playing career started at Newmarket Town before he was snapped up by Luton from Chelmsford in June 1951. After only nine first team starts in two years the bustling inside-forward moved to West Ham before eventually hanging up his boots while at Crystal Palace in 1962.

It was as a coach and manager that Dave came to the fore, though, leading Chelsea and Manchester United, amongst others, to glory before he became part of the England set-up in 1983 and was last assisting Sven-Goran Eriksson as a scout.

Donald (Don) SHANKS

An England Youth international defender, Don was surprisingly released by Fulham at 17 in 1970 but was instantly signed by Luton who had been following his progress via scout Harry Haslam. Don won the 'Little World Cup' with England Youth the following year before making his League debut for the Hatters in August 1971.

A tough tackling marauding full-back, Don helped the Town to promotion to the top flight in 1974 but was then surprisingly sold to QPR for £35,000 in November of that year.

Don enjoyed a successful seven years at Loftus Road before a period at Brighton followed by football in Hong Kong, USA and Malta.

With a reputation as a playboy in London gambling circles and a former Miss World as a previous girlfriend, Don now lives in South London.

Walter (Wally) George SHANKS

Although born in Malta, Wally was raised in Scotland and was on the point of joining Aberdeen when war broke out. At the end of hostilities he followed his pal, Scottish international Tommy Walker, to Chelsea but with 70 professionals on their books at the time he decided to drop down a division and joined Luton in October 1946.

After biding his time with only an occasional first team game, Wally made the breakthrough in 1949 in his favoured defensive wing half position and apart from injury was an automatic choice until 1957 when he joined the Town's coaching staff.

Following relegation from Division One in 1960, Wally left Kenilworth Road and then concentrated on his sports shop that he ran with record Luton goalscorer Gordon Turner. Wally later ran the 'Brown Owl' shop and now lives in Luton in retirement.

Laurence (Laurie) Joseph SHEFFIELD

Much travelled Welsh striker Laurie was not kept on as a youngster at Bristol Rovers so moved on to non-League Barry from where he was brought back into the Football League by Newport, making his debut in 1962.

A prolific goalscorer who was good in the air for a relatively short man, Laurie was in much demand and moved around frequently. A £10,000 cheque brought him to Luton in 1969 and he scored 12 goals in 29 starts alongside Bruce Rioch in the Hatters forward line in his first season.

The discovery of Malcolm Macdonald and the signing of Matt Tees spelled the end for him at Kenilworth Road and he was on his way again. A broken ankle eventually finishing his career while he was with Peterborough.

Subsequently Laurie has been a coach with Doncaster, a mortgage adviser and now lives on the golf course.

Paul David SHEPHERD

Joining his local club Leeds United from school, full-back Paul won England Youth caps but managed only one League appearance which came in a 0-3 defeat at Arsenal in October 1996.

Loan spells at Ayr and Tranmere then followed leading to a permanent transfer to the former club after which Paul threw in his lot with Keflavik in Iceland.

With Luton needing full-back cover as they fought to avoid the drop to the football basement in 2001 Paul was picked up on a short term contract by Hatters manager Joe Kinnear and played the last seven games of a disastrous campaign.

Paul was released that summer and has since turned out for Scarborough, Leigh RMI and Harrogate and was last at Stalybridge.

Steven (Steve) Edward SHERLOCK

After serving his apprenticeship with Manchester City, Birmingham born Steve could not find a way past consistent Scottish international full-back Willie Donachie at Maine Road so jumped at the chance to join David Pleat's Luton over the summer of 1978.

Making his debut, along with six others, on the opening day of the 1978-79 campaign Steve had little to do in the Hatters defence as the forwards went rampant, banging in six second half goals against luckless Oldham.

Steve unfortunately lost his place to Mark Aizlewood after the Town's second game, a 1-3 defeat at Crystal Palace, and he eventually joined Stockport the following summer where he became a terrace favourite making nearly 250 League appearances before moving to Cardiff and finally Newport.

Steve still lives in South Wales.

TRANMERE ROVERS

TRANMERE ROVERS become the last side to visit Kenilworth Road in 2007 when they arrive on the last Saturday before Christmas.

Ronnie Moore's men currently occupy a mid-table position in League One and with three wins, three draws and three defeats – at the time of going to print – at both Prenton Park and on the road, they will be as confident of getting a result here as they would be on home soil.

With nothing to choose between their home and away form every indication is Rovers will prove to be a good marker for the Hatters as they look to claw their way back up the table following their ten point deduction.

Tranmere haven't lost an away game since their trip to tonight's opponents, Nottingham Forest, back at the start of November and their form owes as much to goal scoring prowess of seven goal top scorer Chris Greenacre as it does to their thrifty defence and custodian Danny Coyne.

Greenacre, who made his name at Mansfield Town, may have grabbed the headlines this season but he will owe a lot to his strike partner, Gareth Taylor, as they continue to develop what is proving a productive combination up front. The pair were both briefly on the books of Manchester City at the same time and both have seen their careers prosper since leaving Maine Road. Taylor, has ten Welsh caps to his name and over 100 career goals, mainly from spells at Sheffield United, Burnley and Nottingham Forest.

Behind the front two lies a midfield that is held together by former Hatter Paul McLaren, who arrived at Prenton Park via spells at Sheffield Wednesday and Rotherham United and that also boasts tricky diminutive winger Chris Shuker.

At the back, long serving defender Ian Goodison has been ever present in the league this season and continues to marshal the line effectively. The former Jamaican international now has over 150 appearances to his name, since arriving in February 2004.

Tranmere hold the upper hand over Luton this season having recorded a 2-1 win back in September. Two goals in three minutes from Craig Curran and Antony Kay in the latter stages of the game gave them the points, despite Paul Furlong fifth minute opener for Luton.

That though will count for nothing going into the match, Tranmere haven't actually won at Kenilworth Road in the league since December 1993. In the five league games that have been played here after that game, Luton have won three and drew two, the most recent match being a 1-1 draw in January 2005 when a Kevin Nicholls' penalty cancelled out another fifth minute goal scored by the away team's centre forward, on this occasion Eugene Dadi.
