Eager to be back in home action

I hope that you all enjoyed a very Happy Christmas, and would like to welcome you all to the Memorial Stadium for our Boxing Day match against Luton Town.

The last game we played, before writing my notes for this afternoon, was against Huddersfield and we went into that game having had a couple of weeks off due to the postponement of our home fixtures against Cheltenham Town and Swansea City.

We were missing two players through suspension and a couple more through injury, but we suffered a disappointing defeat at the Galpharm Stadium. We were a little bit slow out of the traps, which may have been due to our enforced lay off, but in the second half we came strong and had enough of the game to have taken something from it. However we still lacked quality, in and around their penalty area, to create and score goals.

Having got back on level terms though we thought we were going to go on and take something, but it was a blow to concede a second goal so soon after our equaliser and that's now happened on numerous occasions.

With the prospect of two home games following our FA Cup wins against Leyton Orient and Rushden & Diamonds, we were keen to continue our form. The postponements meant that didn't happen.

The cup games and the Huddersfield match gave one or two of our younger players the chance to be involved, and although we now have players on the way back from suspension and injury, they have to use that experience as a little taster of what they can do, what they can achieve and where they can play.

They are going to be needed again

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throughout the season, though maybe not week in, week out. Things change very quickly in football, though, and you can go from having a fully fit squad to having a number of people out in a short space of time and they have to be ready when that chance comes.

What they gave in the chance they have already had was very encouraging and, obviously, they are hoping they get another chance.

Tom Parrinello, in particular, has had to be very patient for his chance. He's been with us for a while now and he's progressing well. He had a little bit of involvement last season and it was pleasing to get him on against Rushden.

He's shown tremendous application and attitude since he's been with us and he has a very good mentality in training and in games. Nothing fazes him, and he has the mental strength needed to be a footballer. We are pleased with Tom's contribution and hopefully this is the start for him.

Matt Groves missed the majority of pre season through injury and experienced a lot of injury problems last year as well, but gradually he's got fitter and stronger and has produced some good performances in the reserves.

When he came on against Rushden he looked lively and showed some nice touches and good movement. At Huddersfield he went on in difficult circumstances when we were chasing the game, but it's all part of his learning process. He can be pleased with the start he's made and, hopefully, there's a lot more to come.

We face a Luton side this afternoon who have been playing very well. We had a good game against them up at Kenilworth Road earlier in the season, when we were delighted to come away with all three points.

Rickie Lambert scored a great goal that day but they showed then what a good side they are. They pass the ball very, very well and they have some very good individual players, so we know that it's going to be a tough game.

Despite their ten point deduction they

I hope that you all enjoy the game this afternoon and look forward to seeing you back here again on Saturday, when we take on Carlisle United.



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

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Disappointment at Huddersfield



The last game we are able to report on, due to the Christmas shutdown at the printers, is the defeat at Huddersfield some two weeks ago.

Rovers went into that match with successive FA Cup wins under their belt, but had been out of action for a fortnight following the postponement of home games against Cheltenham and Swansea.

Defender Joe Jacobson returned to the starting lineup at the Galpharm Stadium, after serving a one match ban, and was disappointed with the outcome.

Confidence was high after those two wins in the FA Cup, and then there was a little break due to the postponements. The fact that we hadn't played for two weeks shouldn't really have affected us at Huddersfield because we prepared for the game in exactly the same way we prepare for any game.

Unfortunately, it turned out to be one of those days when we didn't really get it right and we never really passed the ball well, and a few lapses of concentration cost us the game.

Both sides started the game slowly, and Huddersfield's opener came out of the blue when Ronnie Wallwork's shot took a wicked deflection to wrong-foot Steve Phillips before ending up in the back of the net.

I think we seemed pretty comfortable up until that point and we hadn't had any problems with their set pieces. I thought we were coping well until the goal and the shot took a deflection on its way into the net, which seems to be the way things have been going for us in a lot of games this season.

There were a few scares for Rovers in the final minutes of the first half, and Joe managed to get a block on a thundering drive from Wallwork and, after Steve Phillips had saved well from Michael Collins, he made a fine tackle to deny veteran striker Andy Booth a goalscoring opportunity.

We regrouped at half time and pulled a goal back. I thought we deserved that, but we conceded a second goal after some poor defending following a long throw. We'd been dealing situations like that throughout the game, which made it worse. There was a delay before the throw was taken, as David Pipe needed treatment, so perhaps people were a little bit slow to react, I don't know. Once again, though, goalscorer Phil Jevons benefited from a lucky ricochet as the ball went straight back to him after his initial shot and he put the ball into the net with his second effort.

After the second Huddersfield goal, Rovers enjoyed a great deal of possession, but couldn't make the breakthrough for an equaliser.

When we pushed forward we couldn't quite get a good goalscoring opportunity. We huffed and puffed, but that last bit of quality just evaded us. We limited Huddersfield to long range efforts, and they benefited from a number of fortunate little ricochets. The ball seemed to bounce for them a bit more around our box than it did for us around their box.

Away from home, we've been playing well and we go into every away game full of confidence and thinking we can win. It was the same for this game, and maybe we didn't quite get it right, but we were in the game at 1-1 and we thought if we could hold on to that, there was a belief we would go on and win so to come away with nothing was very disappointing.

There was no time to dwell on defeat, as preparations began immediately for a return to Yorkshire and last Saturday's game against Leeds United.

They are regarded as the best team in the league, and it will be our hardest game of the season. We will prepare for the game in the right way and go there wanting to win the game.



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


Footballing glory and a watery grave

Just before five o'clock on the last Saturday in May 2007, Bristol Rovers' Sammy Igoe collected the ball on the edge of his own penalty-area in front of a crowd of 61,589 at the newly-reopened Wembley and made the most significant run of his footballing career.

'Sixty yards, two look-ups and a slight swerve to the right later, he let go a shot that, by the time it rolled in, had secured the fourth promotion of Rovers' 87 years in the Football League' (1).

There was a brief moment, as the ball trickled accurately and gently towards the goal-line and then came the most explosive eruption of sound. Igoe disappeared beneath a mound of players.

the crowd became ecstatic, 'Goodnight Irene, I'll see you in my dreams' was sung by the collected masses and Rovers had returned to League One, so ending a dismal six seasons entrenched in the basement division.

For many beyond the confines of the Memorial Stadium, an awareness of the role of 'Goodnight Irene' in all things Bristol Rovers and an understanding of its significance is something of a mystery.

Yet, unlike the story of many club songs, the tale of this crowd favourite appears to have a clear beginning.

On 4th November 1950, Plymouth Argyle arrived at Eastville with an accordion player, who performed contemporary songs around the edge of the pitch prior to the start of the match. One of these songs was the Huddie William 'Lead Belly' Ledbetter record 'Goodnight Irene', sung by Argyle supporters by dint of the fact that The Weavers, featuring Pete Seeger, had on 26th May 1950 released their own version, which reached number one in the American charts. As Argyle took a first-half lead, their supporters used the song to taunt home fans. Three Rovers goals in eight second half minutes provoked a rendition of 'Goodnight Argyle' and the song soon caught on.

When Rovers played at Newcastle United before a crowd of 62,787 in that season's FA Cup quarter-final, the Magpies bowed to pressure and played the Jo Stafford rendition of the song during the pre-match build-up.

crossbar ten minutes after half-time. Bill Roost then set up Lambden fifteen minutes from time to secure an improbable 3-0 victory.

This set up the tie at St James' Park and the largest crowd ever to watch a game featuring Bristol Rovers saw the underdogs from the south-west hold the cup favourites to a goalless draw. Apocryphal tales report of over 100,000 supporters attempting to purchase tickets for the Wednesday afternoon replay and of companies grinding to a halt that day. Just over 30,000 fortunate spectators witnessed Geoff Bradford's opportunistic goal after a quarter of an hour and 'Goodnight Irene' reverberated around the ground. Sadly for Rovers, the Magpies were too strong and three goals

End continued to sing 'Goodnight Irene' and this was certainly the case through the two memorable League Cup runs of the early 1970's.

In 1970/71, Rovers brushed past Brighton, Newcastle, Norwich and Birmingham before losing to Aston Villa in a League Cup quarter-final; the following season, victories over Exeter, Sunderland, Charlton and QPR brought Gordon Banks' Stoke City side to Eastville. A crowd of 33,624 sang 'Goodnight Irene' in fine voice, but were drowned out by four Stoke goals, though late strikes from Robin Stubbs and Brian Godfrey lent an air of respectability to Rovers' inevitable defeat.

Twelve months later, Rovers drew with Manchester United in the same tournament and then defeated them 2-1 at Old Trafford, after Dick Sheppard had saved a George Best penalty. However, as the vocalists began to migrate from the Tote End to the North Enclosure, so the legend of Irene began to wane at Eastville. Supporters relate that they sang the anthem on the pitch in April 1974 after an end of season 1-1 draw with Brighton, having secured promotion to Division Two in the previous game at Southend, but this is the last remembered public rendition for about fifteen years.

The rebirth of 'Goodnight Irene' came in the spring of 1989. Nomadic by name, Rovers had been relocated to Bath and there was a need to summon any community spirit and support this ailing club. Gerry Francis, an emotive manager, looked at ways to summon up the

courage and bravery that had earned the club success in previous eras. In March 1989, the team was taken to a recording studio in Surrey to create a version of 'Goodnight Irene' that was featured on the opening sequence of the first Screen Soccer video.

The 1989/90 season saw Rovers promoted to Division Two as champions, losing just five matches all season. Undefeated all campaign at their new home, Twerton Park, the club played to renewed support and reached Wembley that May for the first time in the club's history, losing 2-1 to Tranmere Rovers in the Leyland Daf Trophy Final.


The 1990's saw the club move back to Bristol, led at first by manager Ian Holloway, a man of enormous stature locally, and the song once again became increasingly popular. Nowadays, the version of 'Goodnight Irene' performed by Maximum Roverdrive, a motley assortment of Rovers fans, is played before each home game and the popular version is generally preceded by a well-rehearsed prelude: 'we're Rovers supporters, we're faithful and true, we'll always follow the boys in blue, we all made a promise, that we'll never part, so Goodnight Irene, I'll see you in my dreams...'

So, who was this songwriter Lead Belly? His biography is shrouded in mystery, as befits a man who spent several stints in jail. What is clear is that he was born on a plantation near

Mooringsport in Louisiana in January 1888 (perhaps 20th, 21st, 23rd or even 29th of that month) (2) - his gravestone says 1889 - and died in New York on 6th December 1949.

A blues and folk musician, who sang about everything from women to alcohol, cattle herding to politics, and could play guitar, piano, mandolin, accordion, harmonica, violin and concertina, his arms were like big stove pipes, his face was powerful and he picked the twelve-string guitar' (3). The son of Wesley Ledbetter, a black plantation worker, and Sallie Brown (or perhaps Pugho), a half-Indian, he was brought up with his step sister Australia Carr, left home at eleven and had fathered two children by Margaret Coleman before marrying Aletha Henderson, a fifteen year old, in 1908 ('I asked your mother for you - she told me that you was too young', as one verse of 'Goodnight Irene' goes); he later married the evocatively named Martha Promise in 1935. Boastful, quick tempered and proud, Lead Belly killed a relative, Will Stafford, in a fight and was sentenced in January 1918 to seven years in a prison in Dallas. It was in jail both that his sobriquet originated, on account of his physical toughness, and that he was 'discovered' by musicologists John and Alan Lomax in 1930, whilst Lead Belly languished in a Louisiana penitentiary on a homicide charge; 'Goodnight Irene' was recorded in July 1933. His burgeoning music career, however, was hampered by a later sentence, between 1939 and 1940, for assault.

There are many apocryphal tales as to why exactly this song is so central to the Bristol Rovers story. Most appear to revolve around one particular verse, which announces that 'sometimes I have a great notion to jump in the river and drown'. The proximity of Rovers' spiritual home at Eastville to the River Frome is critical in the club's early history.

During the course of the 1896/97 season, Rovers purchased a sixteen acre site on heavy red clay soil amidst the watercress meadows of Eastville for £150 from Sir Henry Greville Smyth of Ashton Court, an extensive landowner in late

Lead Belly started recording for Capitol Records in 1944 and set off on a European tour in 1949 only to fall ill after a few days and die on his return to the States. 'The murderous old minstrel Lead Belly' (4) is buried in Shiloh Baptist Church cemetery at Mooringsport, in the only grave on that site facing the rising sun.

There is some anecdotal evidence to suggest that Lead Belly's source for 'Goodnight Irene' was the 1886 song 'Irene, Good Night', written by an African American songwriter from Cincinnati,

Gussie Lord Davis (1863-1899). All songs, though, need inspiration and what better source than old spirituals - 'old songs, the precious music of the heart!' (5) Lead Belly himself claimed to have learned 'Goodnight Irene' in 1918 from his uncle Terrell Ledbetter, who had encouraged his early musical interest.

Indeed, Lead Belly's untimely death in 1949 meant that his fame as the self-proclaimed 'king of all twelve-string guitar players' was almost entirely posthumous. In 1950, three versions of the song, those by The Weavers, Jo Stafford and Dennis Day, all made the top thirty in the Billboard Charts in the USA as American music appeared to pay homage following the musician's death. James Booker, ironically whilst serving time in a Louisiana prison for drugs offences, also released a version in 1976; artists as wide-ranging as Bryan Ferry, Half Man Half Biscuit, Jerry Lee Lewis, Bob Hope, Carl Perkins and Lonny Donegan have produced their own versions. Van Morrison's first childhood performance was a rendition of 'Goodnight Irene'.

There were to be further problems of this nature in 1936, 1937, 1947 and 1968. In addition, there was water seven feet deep on Rovers' pitch on 21st November 1950. The Bristol Flood Prevention Acts of 1885 and 1890 promised a series of schemes but it was to be the Northern Stormwater Interceptor, inception in 1962 and completed shortly after the floods six years later, which finally solved the problem. Much of the Frome is now intercepted at Eastville and taken underground to join the Avon at the Portway below Clifton Downs.

Drowning appears to form a leitmotif through the history of this corner of Bristol. Next to Eastville lies the district of Fishponds, whose name originates from two flooded quarry pits; one was drained in or around 1800 on the orders of Elizabeth Somerset, wife of the fifth Duke of Beaufort, after a small girl had slipped off the weir and drowned. In October 1844, William Tilly, who farmed eleven acres at Ashley Down, heard that his twenty eight year old daughter Hester was seeing a farmhand named Williams and banned her from his house.

In October 1882, just months before Rovers' formation, the Baptist Mills and Eastville areas were reported to be badly affected by flooding. Frederick Hunt, landlord of the 'Black Swan' on Stapleton Road, where Rovers were to be based until 1910, had stated he was ruined, as all his stock was under five feet of water. An area of some 200 acres was flooded in March 1889 as snow thawed and Sevier Street was reported as impassable by 9th March; on 8th April 1889 it was reported that a Floods Relief Fund had raised £11,700.


More central than any pond, though, was the ever flowing Frome and the ledbetteresque temptation to 'jump in the river and drown'. One fatality in late Victorian times was nineteen year old Frederick Foot who, whilst attempting to deliver bread from Williams' bakery of Lower Easton, was swept away by floodwater, along with his pony, from beside the railway bridge in Mina Road on 25th October 1882. Despite rescue attempts made by three locals and a policeman, both deliveryman and pony were drowned. On a lighter note, there is

newspaper evidence of the story of an unnamed spectator at Rovers' 5-3 win at home to Norwich City in the Southern League in March 1920, a match in which both Norwich's debutant defender George Dexter and Rovers' Tom Brandon had conceded own goals. Five minutes from time, in attempting to stop the ball as it flew out of play, the unfortunate man fell headlong into the murky waters of the river Frome, emerging safe and sound, but very wet and with his pride in ruins.

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Boxing Day Highlights – Lucky 13?

I would like to wish all supporters, players and management here today a very Merry Christmas.

I hope you enjoyed yourself yesterday and I hope we are in for a festive goals feast this afternoon. Over the past decade Rovers have enjoyed themselves on Boxing Day, having suffered just one defeat on this festive day, at home to Northampton Town in 2003.

Since 1997 Rovers have sent their fans home happy, with five victories and three draws. Last season a trip to Hereford United ended in a goalless draw, which was the first on that day since 1989 when Birmingham were entertained at Twerton Park. The goalless day at Edgar Street was the first time since 1996 that Rovers had failed to score on Boxing Day. On that occasion, we suffered a single goal defeat at Bournemouth.

Since entering the Football League, in 1920, Rovers have been involved in 66 matches on Boxing Day. The best win on this day was a 6-1 hammering of Bury in 1956 which was remarkable, as 24 hours earlier we had been on the end of a 7-2

hammering at Bury's Gigg Lane. Revenge was swift, and no doubt sweet, for manager Bert Tann and his team.

Rovers have never played Luton Town on 26th December, but the teams did meet on 27th December back in 1975, in a Second Division fixture played at Edgar Street, watched by 11,044 fans.

Rovers manager Don Megson had made three changes to the team beaten 3-0 at Southampton on Boxing Day, replacing Frankie Prince, Gordon Fearnley and Dave Staniforth with Trevor Jacobs, Alan Warboys and Andrew Evans. He also reintroduced two wingers to his team, in Kenny Stephens and 18 year old Evans, who both enjoyed good performances.

Luton included the Futchers twins, Ron and Paul, in their team. The latter's son is Ben Futch, who has played against Rovers in recent seasons for Lincoln, Grimsby and Boston. Their left winger that day was John Aston, who was a member of the Manchester United side that won the European Cup in 1968.

The Hatters went away with a single goal victory brilliantly scored, just two minutes from time, by Andy King, the former Everton player and in more recent times, former Swindon Town manager. One notable absentee for Rovers was the commanding centre half Stuart Taylor, who was injured and missed both Christmas matches.

Fortunately Rovers other central defender, Graham Day, and goalkeeper Jim Eadie were both in tremendous form and made it very difficult for a commanding Luton side.

The two teams lined up as follows:

Luton: Barber, Ryan, Buckley, Chambers, Faulkner, Futcher (P), Husband, King, Futcher (R), West, Aston.

Trolls talks to the fans

A update on the new stadium, the Colerne training facilities and even the shirts being too tight were all discussed at our AGM.

Paul Trollope, Lennie Lawrence and club directors all gave full answers to a number of interesting questions from the floor following the formal business at last week's meeting.

What is the state of the youth set-up?

Paul Trollope said youngsters have not had the chance to feature yet this season in the Rovers line-up because of the success of the current players. He told the members that

both he and Lennie Lawrence were committed to the development of young players.

In reply to a question from the floor about the state of the youth set up at the football club, the chief coach replied that:

when he and Lennie joined, they were and are committed to youth team players coming through, and felt they contrasted with previous managers Ian Atkins and Ray Graydon.

Lennie admitted he knew Graydon well and felt that:

he was only interested in managing the first team.

Trolls added that Chris Lines and Sean Rigg had not featured more because of the performances of Craig Disley and Stuart Campbell.

Should we have signed Stuart Fleetwood?

Another question related to Rovers' interest in former Hereford striker Stuart Fleetwood. Trolls said he was a very good player in a team that played a certain way, with Fleetwood scoring most of his goals through one-on-ones with the 'keeper.

He felt the cost of signing him was now prohibitive and that Forest Green would retain him until their cup run was over at least (they lost at Swindon last Saturday). Lennie said:

I had Fleetwood when he was at Cardiff, but he played one game and was injured subsequent to me leaving Cardiff before David Jones released him.

What did they think of the Colerne facilities?

Paul Trollope defended the recent criticism by Steve Phillips of the training facilities at Colerne by claiming:

the facilities are excellent in all respects other than the pitches at the moment, due to a maintenance machine breaking down and staffing issues which had both been resolved.

Trolls said he believed the goalkeeper's views were not shared by all and felt he had reacted on a day when a ball bounced up and hit him in the face!

What is the latest on the stadium re-development?

Director Ed Ware said they hoped the 106 planning agreement would be signed very soon and that the document was out for engrossment.

Club chairman Ron Craig confirmed that all the timescales were still ok and Geoff Dunford added that the delay in the 106 being signed has helped with focussing on areas where costs could be trimmed. For example the extent of excavations and the resulting level of spoil needed to be disposed of had been reduced and also some alterations in the

Youth gets a chance

The Christmas and New Year issues of The Pirate give us an opportunity to look at the progress being made by the youngsters attached to the club, from the Centre of Excellence, through to Filton College and the first team squad.

This afternoon Head of Youth Kevin Hodges gives us an insight into the work being carried out, and on Saturday it will be the turn of Centre of Excellence Manager Stewart Naughton.

A great deal of work goes on behind the scenes in the youth set up, something that Kevin is well aware of.

I think everyone involved in our youth setup deserves a big pat on the back for the work they do and I hope they, along with their families, have enjoyed a very Happy Christmas.

I would also like to wish the parents of all of our younger players a Happy Christmas, as they travel to support their sons, in all winds and weathers and are fully supportive, and appreciative of our coaches.

We are fortunate to have so many people helping us, and they give up a lot of their own free time to spend with the young players. It's quite a commitment, as they are involved every Sunday and there is quite a lot of travelling for them as we play matches all over the south west.

It would appear, though, that their dedication is paying off, as there are a number of promising, and talented, youngsters coming through.

In all honesty I believe they are being rewarded. It's five or six years now since Stewart Naughton took on the role of Centre of Excellence Manager and we are now beginning to see the benefits of his hard work. There are some really good young players coming through, in all age groups, and I know that because I have spent a number of weekends watching their matches.

In fact, I'd go as far as to say that we are becoming a benchmark for all age groups, from U-9's through to U-15's. Whilst we don't really consider the results for those age groups to be all important, because we are essentially trying to develop them as players.

results do give you a bit of a marker.

If you were to look at the results of all age groups, then you would see that we are winning almost all of the games we play every weekend. That's pleasing and it's been consistent up until Christmas, now we want that to progress into the New Year. There's been a lot of hard work undertaken at that level, so well done to everyone, but we still have along way to go and we are still looking to improve. We have a lot of catching up to do with our neighbours south of the river, but we are now beginning to see some benefits from the hard work put in by a number of people.

It's coming up to a crucial time for many youngsters, though, as decisions have to be made on their futures.

The groups I'm really looking at now, are the U-16 and U-18 sides as Lennie, Paul and I have to make decisions about them early in the New Year.

As far as our U-16's are concerned, they had a good start to the season but their form has dipped a little recently. However I'm aware that Stewart is making a few changes, and assessing the squad, as he's done with some of the younger groups as well.


To be honest, though, I've been a little bit disappointed with our U-18's, especially since they were knocked out of the FA Youth Cup. Defeat in that competition was a little bit of a disappointment and they don't seem to have recovered from that. It's something we need to address, because they are an important group and are our next intake.

It's very rewarding to see some of the youngsters go on into the first team, and when you look at our squad, no fewer than twelve of them have come up through the ranks. Lewis Haldane, for example, has made over 100 league appearances and is one of the more senior members of the squad in terms of games played, which is tremendous.

Sean Rigg has just started to force his way into the team on a more regular basis, while Chris Lines has pushed on again and is almost a regular in the squad.

Tom Parrinello and Matt Groves both made their first senior appearance against Rushden & Diamonds, while Charlie Reece and Alex Kite have both been included on the bench, and it's been so rewarding to see so many of the younger players making an impression.

Time, though, is of the essence and

with January and February fast approaching it can't be denied, there is a great deal of pressure on those players. The lads themselves are aware of that, and they have to be able to cope with pressure like that if they actually make it through to the pro ranks.

What is encouraging is that a number of players who have graduated through the Centre of Excellence and Filton, have joined the pro ranks and are pushing for a first team spot.

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Now that they have had a taste of it, they have to continue their progress and keep learning and, hopefully, we will see one or two more pushing for a regular spot and, to be honest, that has to be the aim of all the youngsters.'

It's not only been a good experience for those involved, but for those who have yet to earn a first team call up.

Suspensions and injuries can mean that situations can, and do, change very quickly in football and I've always tried to make the point to our younger players that they are very much a part



Manchester City's Colin Bell graced the front cover of the December issue of Charles Buchan's Football Monthly, whilst Newcastle United's John Tudor was featured on the back cover.

Readers had voted for the top ten goalkeepers in the country, with Gordon Banks heading the list at number one, closely followed by Pat Jennings and Peter Shilton.

Derek Dougan was the subject of an in depth article in this issue. The Wolves and Northern Ireland international was also Chairman of the Professional Footballers association at the time and looked back on a career that had seen some controversial moments.

Sure, I've bucked the Establishment and been branded a rebel but, thank God, I've always been an original.

I was the first footballer to own a Jaguar, the first to sport a Mexican moustache and the first to wear trendy shirts and kipper ties. George Best and all the other young players around today are only doing what I did ten years ago.

Fans of Luton, then in the Second Division, and Third Division Rovers, were also

catered for in this issue.

The list of transfers show that the Hatters had signed Gordon Hinsdon from Newcastle and, underneath a photo of Don Givens was this caption.

No player likes leaving Manchester United, but Don Givens, who joined Luton, then in the Third Division, in April 1970, now has hopes of regaining First Division status. He didn't make it at the end of the 1971/72 season, though, as Luton finished in sixth place.

Rovers interest centred around Alan Impey, a name to note according to the author.

The young Bristol Rovers centre forward has made a lot of progress since joining the Eastville club.

If Impey, who comes from Cardiff, reaches international level a few questions will be asked in the Welsh capital. Alan played in the Cardiff Boys team, but when Cardiff approached him they found he had already joined Rovers on a schoolboy form.

It is to the Bristol club's credit that they stepped in for Impey at such an early stage.

Unfortunately, Impey never progressed to League, let alone international, football!

Alec Findlay

Born on this day

When the great Cliff Britton was missing from the Rovers side to face Norwich City in February 1930, manager David McLean replaced him with a 27 year old Scottish wing half.

His replacement was Alexander Findlay, born on Boxing Day 1902 in Wishaw. Stephen Hendry's home town. Findlay had spent three seasons with Musselburgh Rose before joining the delightfully-named Musselburgh Bruntonians in 1929. It was from this club that he signed for Rovers in a £35 deal shortly before his League debut. David McLean had himself played for several Scottish clubs and had been manager at East Fife, so Findlay was just one of a number of Scots given a break into League football at Eastville. Findlay's debut for Rovers resulted in a single goal defeat, inside-left Andy Thompson, the former Spurs forward, scoring the only goal after half-time. In 37 League games for Rovers, Alec Findlay scored nine times, including two against Thames Association on this day in 1931, his twenty ninth birthday.

During the summer of 1932, Findlay signed for Wrexham, for whom he scored four goals in 22 Third Division (North) matches over a period of three years. The final goal of his League career came at Southport in December 1934, and his final appearance was on this day seventy years ago, his thirty second birthday, when Wrexham lost 3-1 at Mansfield Town. Winding down his career at Cheltenham Town and Gloucester City, he settled in Bristol, where he died in October 1985, aged 82.

It was fifteen years ago today that an opponent last scored four times in a Football League game against Rovers.

Joe Payne famously scored ten times for Luton Town in April 1936, Blackburn Rovers' Tommy Briggs scored seven goals two decades after that and Liverpool's John Evans scored all his side's goals when Rovers crashed 5-3 at Anfield in Division Two. However, the ninth opponent to score four times in a league game, Portsmouth's Guy Whittingham, was on his way to a club record 42 goals in a season.

Lowly Rovers were forced into one change before kick off when Justin Channing was ruled out and Vaughan Jones returned to the side, with Richard Evans making his first appearance of the season when he played as substitute. Spurred on by their highest home crowd so far that season, 14,288, Pompey recalled the experienced trio of Warren Aspinall, Mark Chamberlain and Ray Daniel to their side. Despite a John Taylor goal, Rovers trailed 2-1 at half-time before Whittingham completed his third hat trick of the season. He scored all his side's goals in a 4-1 victory and his fortieth goal of the campaign, scored past Rovers' keeper Andy Beasley at Twerton Park in April, set a new club seasonal record. Pompey finished third, but missed promotion through the play offs, whilst Rovers finished bottom and were relegated.

On the same day in 1992, our visitors Luton Town were without a game, as their lunchtime kick off at home to Swindon Town succumbed to the inclement weather. Two days later, though, the Hatters were to draw 2-2 at West Ham in Rovers' division. After a goalless first-half, Ceri Hughes and John Dreyer scored for Luton, with two defenders, Julian Dicks (penalty) and Tim Brecker, responding for West Ham.

the practices of certain football agents. However, after five defeats in a row, Newell's fragile position was exposed, and he was sacked in March of this year. Despite his often ill-advised comments, you had to sympathise with Newell, who had built the club's best team in years, only to see £9m worth of talent depart in the form of Curtis Davies, Rowan

Vine, Carlos Edwards, Steve Howard and Kevin Nicholls.

Luton's nightmare became even worse last month, when the club went into administration. More than 50 charges were levelled against them and two directors stepped down as a result. The penalty was a crushing 10-point deduction, which sent Luton to the bottom of the table. However, just as Leeds appear to be doing, the Bedfordshire club have gained new strength in adversity, finding some very encouraging form of late, the highlight of which was an FA Cup victory over Nottingham Forest which has booked them a home tie with Liverpool in the Third Round. Boss Kevin Blackwell said after that success that he could now expect his players to be paid for the first time in six weeks.

With Rovers also at the wrong end of the table, this is clearly a huge game today, and we could all do with a start like the one provided by Rickie Lambert in the first meeting this season at Kenilworth Road. I have never seen a Rovers player score a goal like that in my life. Rickie kept an eagle eye on the ball as it dropped from the heavens, hitting a shot on the full from 30 yards so powerful and so accurate that Luton goalkeeper David Forde didn't stand a prayer.

Despite all he has achieved for the club since arriving from Rochdale, I still hear

people occasionally complain about Rickie's lack of pace. My reply is always simple: if he was quicker, he would not be with Rovers, or indeed playing at League One level. His touch and technique are of the highest quality, and he is arguably the best crosser at the club as well as being our top scorer. At Lincoln City in the play offs, he scored one and made three. And when was the last time a Rovers player struck a ball as he does? His penalties are a joy to watch, almost breaking the net.

Like Luton, Rovers also have the prospect of an FA Cup tie against Premier League opposition to savour. Within just five days, Rovers scored eight goals, six shoot-out penalties and saw the emergence of Hintonio as a new striking option, setting up a trip to Fulham on January 6th. Craven Cottage has been a lucky ground for me, having seen Rovers play there three times and win on each occasion. That was long before the arrival of al Fayed and his millions, of course, but I am not discounting an upset as Rovers lift their game very well against quality opponents these days, particularly on a good pitch.

However the game goes in West London, Paul Trollope can be proud of his record in the FA Cup. He has now won six of his eight FA Cup ties, five of which had seen Rovers drawn away from home. This equates to a 75% success rate in the competition, while very few Rovers bosses have signed off with greater than 50% success, one of them of course being Bert Tann, who led Rovers to two Quarter finals in the 1950s. Only Fred Ford has a better record under these criteria, as he won 80% of his ties in charge during a memorable run to the Fifth Round in his solitary season at the helm, 1968/69.

May I close by wishing everyone a happy, healthy and prosperous 2008, a year that we hope will see the stadium refurbishment go ahead as planned, and Rovers establish themselves in League One.

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
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A busy time ahead




Welcome, LUTON TOWN

The Hatters are enjoying a welcome distraction from their problems off the field as they savour the prospect of meeting Liverpool at home the weekend after next.

The vital goal against Nottingham Forest which clinched the third round FA Cup meeting with the Reds came from **Calvin Andrew** who was born in Luton and progressed through the Hatters' youth set up. In the 2005/2006 season he went out on loan to Grimsby and Bristol City. The former Coventry, Watford, Chelsea, Birmingham and QPR striker **Paul Furlong**, 39, who was suspended for the Forest game, was replaced by **Darren Currie**, a close season signing from Ipswich. Had things turned out differently, **Currie** could have been playing alongside **David Beckham** for LA Galaxy. **Currie's** career has taken him from West Ham via Shrewsbury and Leyton Orient to Plymouth, Barnet, Wycombe and Brighton. He joined Ipswich late in 2004 and was released the end of last season after playing three friendlies for LA Galaxy in between loan spells at Coventry and Derby. Another

signing from the Tractor Boys, **Sam Parkin**, joined the Hatters in August 2006. He is a former Chelsea junior who had loan spells at Millwall, Wycombe, Oldham and Northampton before playing for Swindon and Ipswich. Injuries are likely to rule out **Parkin** and the Canadian international **Paul Peschisolido** this afternoon. **Peschisolido** was released by Derby at the end of last season after scoring the goal that ended our FA Cup run in January. His previous English clubs include Birmingham, Stoke, West Brom, Fulham and Sheffield United. **Drew Talbot** was a £250,000 signing from Sheffield Wednesday last January, shortly after three outings on loan for Scunthorpe. Former Northern Ireland international **Paul McVeigh** was released by Norwich in the summer after scoring three in eight games during a loan spell with Burnley. Young striker and Weetabix fan **Ryan Charles** has yet to make a senior appearance but aims to be the Hatter's top marksman.



Meet the Manager Kevin Blackwell

If you were asked to name football's most colourful characters the chances are that Ron Atkinson, Barry Fry and Neil Warnock would be high on the list.


The man in the Kenilworth Road hot seat has worked with all three, most notably with Warnock whom he assisted at seven clubs. Kevin Blackwell was a goalkeeper under Atkinson at Cambridge United before combining non-league football at Bedford Town with work as a

bricklayer. Fry signed him for Barnet and he moved to Boston United before Warnock took him to Scarborough in November 1986.

Blackwell followed Warnock to Notts County in 1989 and Torquay early in 1993. Later that year the pair were working together again, this time at Huddersfield, where Kevin's playing opportunities were few and far between

but he also took on a coaching role. Blackwell's next move was to Plymouth, again under Warnock, as player/youth coach. Warnock moved on but Blackwell remained as assistant to Mick Jones. In 1998 Blackwell left Home Park when Kevin Hodges, now Rovers' Head of Youth, took over. Warnock later took Kevin to Bury and Sheffield United.


Blackwell progressed from coaching at Leeds to take over as caretaker boss after Eddie Gray's dismissal in 2004. His appointment was later confirmed and he led his side to the Championship final last year, losing 3-0 to Watford. After a poor start to the 2006/07 campaign, his contract was terminated in September and he studied training techniques in Europe before succeeding Mike Newell as Luton boss in March this year.



He scored six in 51 games for the Shrews, helping them to reach the League Two play-off final. He also captained the Welsh U-21 side in a 4-0 victory over Northern Ireland and was named in his country's full 26 man squad for the Euro 2008 qualifying games against the Republic of Ireland and San Marino. Jamaican international **Richard Langley** came through the ranks with QPR and spent three years with Cardiff before returning to Shepherd's Bush two years later. **Langley**, who signed for Luton in July 2006, has yet to appear in the current campaign after breaking a leg.

Last month the Hatters brought in loan signings **Marc Wilson** and **Anthony Grant**, from Portsmouth and Chelsea respectively. Republic of Ireland U-21 international **Wilson** had two loan spells with Bournemouth last season, scoring three in nineteen games in the first of them. **Grant**, an England youth international, made his senior debut for the Blues against Manchester United in May 2005 and played two games on loan for Oldham early last year. He spent the whole of last season on loan with Wycombe. **Matthew Spring** started his career at Luton before leaving for Leeds in July 2004. Twelve months and fifteen appearances later he joined Watford and helped the Hornets to reach the Premiership in 2006. **Stephen O'Leary**

Football historian LEIGH EDWARDS profiles ten leading Luton Town managers

NED LIDDELL

Ned Liddell managed Luton Town to the Third Division (South) title in 1936/37. A former centre-half, he played for Whitburn, Southampton, Gainsborough, Clapton Orient, Southend United and Arsenal before rejoining Southend as manager in April 1919. He was appointed QPR's boss in April 1920 and guided them to the FA Cup quarter-finals in 1922/23, then scouted for Fulham before becoming their manager for two years in May 1929. After a period scouting for West Ham, he managed Luton from August 1936 until February 1938, then scouted for Chelsea, Portsmouth, Brentford and Spurs. He died in November 1969.

**DALLY DUNCAN**

Former Scotland international winger Dally Duncan managed Luton Town to the top-flight in 1954/55. Signing professional for Hull City in August 1928, he moved to Derby County in March 1932 and featured in their 1946 FA Cup Final success. He became Luton's player-boss in October 1946 and steered them to eighth place in the top-flight in 1957/58. Appointed Blackburn Rovers' manager in October 1958, he led them to the 1960 FA Cup final and remained in charge at Ewood Park until sacked in June 1960. He later scouted for Luton and ran a guest-house in Brighton, residing there until his death in January 1990.

SYD OWEN

Long serving England international centre-half Syd Owen was both a player and manager at Luton Town. Signing professional for Birmingham City in October 1945, he moved to Luton in June 1947 and starred in their 1951/52 FA Cup run, 1952/53 promotion near miss and 1954/55 promotion success. He was voted Footballer of the Year as Luton were FA Cup Finalists in 1959 and netted three goals in 388 League games before becoming manager for a year in May 1959. Later Leeds United's chief coach




under Don Revie until October 1975, he then coached at Birmingham, Hull City and Manchester United. He died in August 1998.

ALLAN BROWN

Ex-Scotland international inside-forward Allan Brown managed Luton Town to the Fourth Division title in 1967/68. He was a Scottish Cup finalist with East Fife shortly before joining Blackpool in December 1950 and moved to Luton in February 1957. Appearing in the 1959 FA Cup Final, he netted 51 goals in 151 League games for the Hatters prior to joining Portsmouth in March 1961. He helped win the Third Division title in 1961/62, then had a spell as Wigan Athletic's player-boss and was Luton's manager from November 1966 until December 1968, later managing Torquay, Bury, Nottingham Forest, Southport and Blackpool.

ALEC STOCK

Alec Stock managed Luton Town to promotion in 1969/70. He was a forward with Charlton and QPR before becoming Yeovil Town's player boss, plotting their epic 1948/49 FA Cup run. Appointed Leyton Orient's boss in August 1949.



he led them to the FA Cup Sixth Round in 1953/54 and Third Division (South) title in 1955/56, returning from spells at Arsenal and Roma. He became QPR's boss in August 1959, taking them to the top flight and League Cup glory, then managed Luton from December 1968 until April 1972. Guiding Fulham to the 1975 FA Cup Final, he later managed AFC Bournemouth and died in April 2001.

HARRY HASLAM

Popular manager Harry Haslam guided Luton Town back to the top flight in 1973/74. Initially with Rochdale, he played for Oldham Athletic, Brighton, Leyton Orient, Guildford City and Hastings United, then managed Eastbourne United, Barry Town and Tonbridge before becoming Fulham's chief scout. He assisted Alec Stock at Luton prior to succeeding him as manager in May 1972, remaining in charge of the Hatters until leaving in January 1978 to manage Sheffield United. He scouted for England under Bobby Robson and died in September 1986. His son Keith is now Mansfield's managing director.

DAVID PLEAT


Articulate manager David Pleat managed Luton Town to the Second Division title in 1981/82. A former winger, he played for Nottingham Forest,



Luton, Shrewsbury, Exeter and Peterborough before becoming Nuneaton's player-boss. He rejoined Luton as coach in July 1972 and became manager in January 1978, guiding the Hatters to the FA Cup semi-finals in 1984/85. Taking charge of Spurs in May 1986, he led them to the 1987 FA Cup Final, then managed Leicester City before rejoining Luton in June 1991. He took the Hatters to the FA Cup semi-finals again in 1993/94, leaving in June 1995. He is now working in the media.

RAY HARFORD

Ray Harford plotted Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup Final triumph. A centre-half with Charlton, Exeter, Lincoln, Mansfield, Port Vale and Colchester, he was appointed youth team coach at Layer Road. He joined Fulham in a similar capacity in June 1981 and was manager for two years before moving to Luton as assistant boss in July 1986. Becoming manager in June 1987, he also guided them to the Simod Cup final and FA Cup semi-finals in 1987/88, then the 1989 Littlewoods Cup final. Sacked in January 1990, he later managed Wimbledon, Blackburn Rovers, West Brom and QPR. He died in August 2003.


**JOE KINNEAR**

Former Republic of Ireland international right-back Joe Kinnear plotted Luton Town's 2001/02 promotion success. Signing professional for Spurs in February 1965, he helped them win the FA Cup in 1967, League Cup twice and UEFA Cup in 1972. He moved to Brighton in August 1975, then coached overseas before assisting Dave Mackay at Doncaster. Joining Wimbledon as coach in September 1989, he became manager in January 1992 and led them to the semi-finals of both the FA Cup and League Cup in 1996/97. He left after a heart-attack, then managed Luton from January 2001 until June 2003 and later Nottingham Forest.

MIKE NEWELL

Ex England U-21 striker Mike Newell managed Luton Town to the League One title in 2004/05. Initially with Liverpool, he moved via Crewe to Wigan Athletic in October 1983 and scored in their 1985 Freight Rover Trophy Final triumph. He played for Luton, Leicester City and Everton prior to joining Blackburn Rovers in November 1991, helping win promotion in 1991/92 and the Premiership title in 1994/95. Later with Birmingham City, he became Hartlepool's boss in November 2002, plotting their 2002/03 promotion success. He rejoined Luton as manager in June 2003 and remained in charge until sacked in March 2007.






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

For the visitors... Suspense should be over

The postponement of the home games against Cheltenham and Swansea earlier this month kept **Steve Elliott** and **Richard Walker** on the sidelines for longer than expected after both players served three match suspensions after their dismissals at Swindon last month.

Hopefully their bans were completed at Huddersfield eleven days ago.

The central defensive positions have been a particular headache for First Team Coach **Paul Trollope**, whose problems started when the partnership of Elliott, formerly with Derby County and Blackpool, and Welsh U-21 cap **Byron Anthony**, who was released by Cardiff City at the end of the 2005/06 campaign, was disrupted by injury in October. Anthony broke his fifth metatarsal during the Johnstone's Paint Trophy defeat by Bournemouth, giving former Kidderminster Harriers' defender **Craig Hinton** the chance to return to the starting line up. Trollope turned to the loan market to bring in Hull City's **Danny Coles**, a former Bristol City trainee who played against Rovers when on loan at Hartlepool in October. During the defeat at Swindon Elliott saw red and Coles suffered a cheek injury in an incident unseen by the officials.

Four of those defenders should be available this afternoon, the exception being **Anthony** who hopes to be fit to face Fulham in the FA Cup at Craven Cottage next month. The only other recognised central defenders in Rovers' squad have no first team experience. They are **Ryan Paddock**, 19, who was once on Aston Villa's books, and **Alex Kite**, 18, an unused substitute in the FA Cup victory over Rushden & Diamonds early this month. **Kite** is the son of Rovers physio and former goalkeeper **Phil**.

The right back position has been occupied by ex-Hereford United defender **Ryan Green**, who suffered from a broken jaw in an incident last month, and **Aaron Lescott**, a former Stockport County midfielder. **Lescott** has also played at left back but we are more likely to see **Joe Jacobson** or **Chris Carruthers** in that



spot this afternoon. Welsh U-21 international **Jacobson**, whose loan move from Cardiff City in February was made permanent in the summer, and **Carruthers** have both been used in central defence in recent weeks. **Carruthers**, a former England youth international, initially joined Rovers on loan from Northampton Town on transfer deadline day in 2005. Local Filton College graduates **Tom Godsell**, 19, and 18 year old **Tom Parrinello**, are regular full backs for Rovers' reserves. **Parrinello** made his senior debut against the Diamonds.

Keeper **Steve Phillips**, Rovers' Player of the Season in 2006/07, made over 250 appearances for Bristol City before crossing the river in the summer of 2006, having spent the best part of ten years with the Robins after joining them from non league Paulton Rovers. His deputy, 19 year old **Mike Green**, has yet to make his senior debut. Goalkeeping coach **Steve Book**, the former Forest Green and Cheltenham keeper, has been registered as a player in case of emergency.

Skipper **Stuart Campbell** is a Scottish U-21 international who started his career with Leicester City. He had two outings as a substitute on loan for Birmingham before joining **Lennie Lawrence**, now Rovers' Director of Football, at Grimsby. Originally a right winger, **Campbell**, now in his fourth season with the Gas, operates in the centre of midfield alongside **Craig Disley**, a former Mansfield Town youngster who arrived at the Mem a few days after

Campbell. Former Portsmouth, Reading, Swindon and Millwall midfielder **Sammy Igoe** is also at home in central midfield but gives **Trollope** another option on the right wing where Welsh international **David Pipe** has been playing since his summer signing from Notts County, apart from one game at right back. Filton College scholar **Chris Lines**, who had eight League Two outings last season, has started three games so far this term. He came off the bench to replace Welsh U-21 international **Lewis Haldane** in the FA Cup against Leyton Orient and Rushden. **Haldane** is a former Southampton schoolboy, whose pace is now usually employed on the flanks although he was originally a striker.

Richard Walker, a former Aston Villa trainee and last season's leading scorer, will be hoping to get back into the starting line up after serving his suspension. He came off the bench in the five games before his dismissal at Swindon, having scored four so far this term, all from the penalty spot. **Andy Williams**, a summer signing from Hereford, has been up front alongside Rickie Lambert in the absence of 19 year old Filton College graduate **Sean Rigg** with a torn hamstring. Another 19 year old College graduate, **Matt Groves**, made his senior debut against Rushden recently when he came off the bench to replace **Williams**. **Lambert** arrived from Rochdale in a £200,000 deal in August last year after **Junior Agogo**'s move to Nottingham Forest. **Josh Klein-Davies**, who was released by Bristol City in the summer, has been on loan at Yate Town.

Rovers' management duo is keen to encourage the youngsters in the squad, who include England Schools and Colleges trialist **Charlie Reece**, 19, who spent eight years with Aston Villa and was on the bench against Leyton Orient last month. 18 year old **James Fraser**, a former Worthing midfielder and England Schools U-18 captain, was given a six month contract in August. **Charlie Clough**, 17, from the club's Centre of Excellence, has signed a two year deal and the left sided **Adam Mahdi**, 18, graduated to the professional ranks through the Centre of Excellence and Filton College.

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Playing on plastic



One of the many excuses wheeled out as to why England failed to qualify for next year's European Championships was that, apart from the team itself not being good enough, we had to play on an artificial pitch for the 2-1 defeat in Russia.

That was the first time England had ever played an international on astroturf and the surface seems to be making a comeback in top level football as developments in synthetic pitch research make them ever more realistic in mimicking natural grass.

The Luzhniki Stadium is owned by Torpedo Moscow with perennial nomads Spartak also playing there as tenants, and features as one of UEFA's 27 prestige five-star rated venues - indeed it hosts this season's Champions League Final, although a grass surface will be laid for this game at the behest of president Michel Platini.

In inclement corners of the globe, durable artificial surfaces provide a lifeline to clubs otherwise at the mercy of Mother Nature and are commonplace in Scandinavia. Tromso and HJK Helsinki are two of the main clubs that use them, while further south Salzburg, Young Boys of Bern and Borussia Mönchengladbach also boast FIFA-accredited surfaces.

The hi-tech pitches you see nowadays are a far cry from the experimental 'plastic pitches' of the 1980s, something which today's opponents Luton Town were well-known for. Astroturf replaced grass at Kenilworth Road in 1985 and followed the lead of pioneers QPR, who laid Omniturf at Loftus Road in 1981.

In only their second season on the surface, QPR won the 1982/83 Second Division title by a massive 10 points and went on to finish fifth in the top flight the following year, qualifying for the UEFA Cup.

Unfortunately UEFA prohibited them from using their pitch in the competition and Rangers instead played at Highbury, although this did not seem to hinder them as they thrashed KR Reykjavik 4-0 and then Partizan Belgrade 6-2 there in the Second Round before crashing to a 4-0 defeat in the Yugoslav capital and going out on away goals.

Oldham and Preston were the other two league clubs to convert to astro, both in 1986, a year after Luton. Boundary Park saw its 5.5 metre slope levelled to accommodate the new pitch whereas Deepdale went all plastic after the club sold the ground to the council, who wanted it used by the local community as well as the local team.

Once again the conversion seemed to give the sides a huge advantage with Oldham ending the 1986-87 campaign in third just outside the Division Two promotion places, while North End were runners-up in Division Four.

The pitch may not have been the only advantage they enjoyed at Kenilworth Road because away fans had been banned since a match against Millwall ended in a riot in 1985. This self-imposed ban saw Luton controversially omitted from the 1986/87 League Cup.

In 1987/88, the Hatters lost only three home games in 28 league and cup matches at the ground as they reached the Semi-Finals of the FA Cup, the Final of the Simod Cup (the JPT for the top two divisions while English clubs were banned from Europe) and won the League Cup, although they had to play their home Third Round tie against Coventry at Leicester's Filbert Street because of the issue over travelling supporters.

Oldham and Preston were the other two league clubs to convert to astro, both in 1986, a year after Luton.

give the sides a huge advantage with Oldham ending the 1986-87 campaign in third just outside the Division Two promotion places, while North End were runners-up in Division Four.

QPR dispensed with their expensive turf in 1988 and reverted to grass before the authorities outlawed the use of artificial pitches in the top flight in 1991, when Oldham, who had just won promotion, and Luton were forced to rip theirs up.

Lower league Preston were given an extension to the deadline and the last match played on artificial turf in English football was the Third Division Play-Off Semi-Final against Torquay in May 1994, which North End won 4-1.

Aside from the competitive advantages of playing on synthetic pitches, both Oldham and Luton utilised their surfaces for enviable financial gain by hiring them out on non-matchdays without fear of them being in poor condition when Saturday came around, unlike the current pitch at the Mem.

A festive goal feast?


Christmas has always been a great time to watch football, although several foreign managers of our Premiership teams moan that there are too many games played over such a short period of time.

But fans like to get out as a family on Boxing Day for the fresh air after a day of over indulging, and maybe spending too much time in front of the television.

Yet people like Arsene Wenger would be horrified to know that at one time games were also played on Christmas Day (plenty of public transport in those days) with the return fixture just 24 hours later.

At one time Rovers would often play four games over a six day period at Christmas. In 1939 we drew 2-2 away at Torquay on 23rd December, lost 3-4 against Swindon Town at Eastville on Christmas Day (only 2,000 turned up because the War was on), drew 1-1 away to Swindon on Boxing Day and made it a Merry Christmas and Happy New Year by beating Bristol City 4-2 at home on 30th December.

The most incredible turn around in the back to back fixtures, I believe, was in 1956 when we got thrashed 7-2 against Bury in Division Two at Gigg Lane on Christmas Day, with Alfie Biggs and George Petherbridge getting our goals.


Rovers then faced a long trip home from Lancashire and the chance for revenge less than 24 hours later, with no time to lick their wounds or have any Christmas pudding. With no big squads in those days, Rovers only change for the second game was Norman Sykes replacing our Welsh international Dai Ward at inside-left.

But those tired Pirates came out fighting in front of a Boxing Day crowd of just under 20,000 to come out on top 6-1 with Peter Hooper (3), Barrie Meyer (2), and Biggs getting our goals. We had even played three days before that Christmas Day fixture, beating Doncaster Rovers 6-1 thanks to a Ward hat-trick.

Inevitably, the Christmas season always seemed to throw up high scoring games as the season of goodwill prevailed. The last time Rovers turned out on Christmas Day was in 1957 when we lost 6-4 at Swansea Town, as they were known then, with Ward, Biggs, Meyer and Peter Sampson netting for the visitors at the Vetch Field.

Yet again on Boxing Day we turned things around, beating the Welshmen 3-0 in front of 22,000 at Eastville thanks to goals from Petherbridge (2), and Meyer.

Christmas the following year was a busy time for Bert Tann's boys, who were faced with the long haul across country (no fixture computer to blame then!) to face Ipswich Town on Boxing Day. But the long journey didn't affect our boys as we pulled off a 2-0 win at Portman Road

with goals from Hooper (penalty) and Geoff Bradford. We drew the return game the following day 1-1 (Ward), in front of just over 20,000.

The harsh winter of 1962 meant that Rovers did not take the field between December 15th (lost 5-2 at Hull) and February 9th, when we beat Brighton 4-1 at Eastville with goals from Biggs (2), Keith Williams and Bobby Jones.

Players worked hard over the festive season, but also tried to let their hair down. One story that is still often recalled by those veterans Bill Roost and Josser Watling, who can still be seen at the Mem on matchdays, revolves around a reserve team game (yes, even the stiffs played on Christmas Day). Bill was being sent off after disputing a goal at Brighton, but Josser is alleged to have told the ref:

He's deaf, how will that look in the papers tomorrow if you send a deaf player off on Christmas Day.

Bill said the ref showed some Christmas spirit and called him back. Bill said:

Every time there was a corner or free kick after that, the ref would look at me, holding the whistle up and pointing at it, asking 'all right number nine?' I was glad when the game was over.


Probably the most historic Christmas Day football was when troops fighting in the trenches during 1914 in the First World War put down their arms for 24 hours, exchanged food and drink, then several games of football were staged against the Germans before fighting resumed the next day.

The first recorded Christmas match was in 1860 when a local derby took place between Hallam FC and Sheffield FC. It is goes without saying that it is the oldest local derby and is still played every year on the same Hallam ground.

We first played today's opponents, Luton Town, in the Southern League in 1900 (won 1-0) but for some reason we have never played the Hatters on Christmas Day or Boxing Day before today although we have twice met on December 27th.

In 1975 we lost 1-0 and in 1980 we were again beaten, this time 4-2, with both matches staged at Eastville. The Gas are due their revenge today and we will wish them a Merry Christmas afterwards.

you would like to check out their website, it can be found at www.rfct.be. Mind you, I couldn't understand a word of it! We played them at Eastville on 16th August 1966, in a public practice match.

Tractor Depot

This was a wartime friendly played at Eastville, in September 1917.

Tranmere Rovers

Apart from two, all the games we have played with Tranmere have been league encounters and have taken place within a relatively short space of time.

The first was a Division Three game at Prenton Park in November 1967 and we continued to meet until our promotion to the Second Division in 1974.

It was to be the end of the 1980's before our paths crossed again and during 1989/90 the two Rovers sides battled it out for a place at the top.

As far as we were concerned, the right Rovers managed to win the title and move up to Division Two, while the Rovers from Merseyside failed at the last hurdle and lost in the play off final. They did, however, win promotion the following year to join us in the newly named Division One. Unfortunately we were relegated at the end of the 1992/93 season and that was the last time we met them in a league encounter, though we will resume our rivalry, at Prenton Park on 11th January next year.

As previously mentioned, there have been two other games with Tranmere. The first of these was in the Second

Round of the FA Cup, in December 1931, when 13,200 fans witnessed a 2-0 win for the club from the Wirral.

The other game was seen by a lot more people than that, as over 48,000 fans made the trip to London to see the lads run out at Wembley for the very first time in May 1990. Sadly, we lost 2-1, but it was a day that those of us who were there will never forget.

Treharris

Once again I have to say thanks to someone for providing me with a copy of the front cover of this programme. Trouble is I can't remember who it was, sorry! The game was staged at the Commercial Ground in Treharris on 6th May 1953, and the programme cost 3d. Now if that kind person is reading this, what we all want to know is; How big was it, and how many pages did it have? Please get in touch.



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Bearing fruit

Over the second half of November, The Football League called all member clubs to one of a series of information sessions regarding the newly formed Football League Trust. We were originally invited to attend a session at Wycombe but, realising the number of clubs with comparatively long distances to travel from the West and South Wales, an additional event was held here in Bristol.

I admit to having jumped the gun a bit a few weeks earlier. Mark Arthur, who is the Chief Executive at Nottingham Forest, had been elected Chairman of the Trust in October. Knowing Mark reasonably well, I made my way to the City Ground to meet with him and to get some first hand information from him. I also took the opportunity to express some concerns that we had here at Bristol Rovers with particular reference to organisational structure, support from the League and funding. I have to say that Mark dealt with our concerns very well and that answers to my questions were further reinforced very satisfactorily at the Bristol meeting.

The Support Unit for the funding of Community activities ceased with effect from 30th November. This came about as a result of press release in July when The Premier League announced a solidarity package with The Football League. The new mechanism is to ensure that a proportion of Premier League income is redistributed down the professional football pyramid.

The funding structure will facilitate Football League Youth Development and individual League Club's youth investment to include Football in the Community. On the organisation and support side, the Trust is presently recruiting ten regional managers, five of whom will support Youth Development and five of whom will support Football in the Community. Each regional manager will be allocated to in the order of twelve to fifteen clubs.

There is no doubting the emerging success of our Youth Development programme over recent years. It is fair to say that past managers have seemed


reluctant to bring our own Bristol and surrounding area young players through into the first team. Lennie Lawrence, as Director of Football at the club, is responsible for the direction issues to take the club forward in this vitally important area. I can assure you that Lennie is not backward in coming forward when putting his proposals and concerns on these matters to the Board. Lennie comes across, to me, as a football professional who believes in youth development and in giving home grown younger players their chance.

Kevin Hodges, as Head of Youth, and Stewart Naughton the Centre of Excellence Manager, are strongly committed to the task. It is good to see Chris Lines and Sean Rigg being given their chance with Tom Parrinello, Matt Groves and Charlie Reece also beginning to feature on first team sheets. Kevin reports to the Youth Management Group on a monthly basis. The Group has ultimate responsibility to ensure the internal management systems and the overall monitoring of the programme is dealt with appropriately.

All proposed policy, practices and procedures are presented to the Management Group who in turn make recommendations to the Board.

Stewart Naughton is responsible for the day to day management and administration of the programme. Stewart joined Bristol Rovers from Southampton some four to five years ago and the hard and diligent work that he has put in is beginning to show, and is clearly bearing fruit. The schoolboy coaching programme takes place at the Wise Complex, New Road Filton on three nights of the week and matches take place at Golden Hill, Horfield on Saturday mornings. The sports hall and other indoor facilities at Filton are very good indeed.

It is the view of Stewart, our Management Team led by Lennie and the Board, that clubs like Bristol Rovers must develop their own players and bring them on into the professional game. Stewart will tell you that he is not in a results orientated business and that he is much

more interested in individual and team performance. However, I must tell you that all eight teams from U-9 to U-16 have played 100 matches so far this season between them against the likes of QPR and Brentford to the east, Swansea to the west and Plymouth to the south. In all, the results recorded show defeats in single figures; some going, in any standard of football.

Very well done and thank you to Stewart, his team of coaches, and to the boys and their parents. Rovers fans in general are made welcome at Golden Hill at all times when matches are being played. Please get along if you can to support the boys and to appreciate the good work that is going on in our Centre of Excellence.

On December 6th Stewart, Jim Chappell and myself went along to the Weston super Mare Supporters Club Branch AGM. Weston Gas have raised over £1,000 in each of the past two years to sponsor firstly the U-18's and, this year, the Rovers Centre of Excellence. This gesture from our fans in Weston is tremendous and gratefully received. We were very pleased to take questions from the floor about our Youth Development programme and other Bristol Rovers matters. We were made very welcome and the evening was most enjoyable. Thank you to Wilf and all at Weston, very much indeed.



Playing for the Gas

RAY SEATHERTON

Centre-forward Ray Seatherton played for Bristol Rovers during the 1955/56 campaign. Initially with hometown Tiverton, he joined Minehead in July 1954 and was a prolific scorer in the Western League. He moved to Eastville Stadium in February 1955 and netted twice on his debut for Rovers reserves against their Reading counterparts, then a hat-trick in the 3-0 victory over Aldershot reserves. Scoring in both his League games, a 3-0 win over Lincoln and 1-1 draw with Barnsley, he lost his place after a knee injury and rejoined Minehead in July 1956, then played for Taunton. He is now a retired motor engineer in Tiverton.

RICKY SHAKES

Trinidad & Tobago international winger Ricky Shakes had a loan spell at Bristol Rovers during the 2004/05 campaign. A former Bolton Wanderers trainee, he scored on his first-team debut in their FA Cup Third Round replay defeat at home to Tranmere six months before turning professional in July 2004. He was loaned to Bristol Rovers in February 2005 and his solitary League appearance was as a substitute in that month's 2-1 defeat at Macclesfield. Also loaned to Bury that season, he joined Swindon in August 2005 and made his international debut against Iceland in February 2006. He helped them win promotion last season.





MARTIN SHAW

Teenage midfielder Martin Shaw briefly appeared for Bristol Rovers during the 1978/79 season. Locally born, he attended Whitefield School in Fishponds and became an apprentice at Eastville Stadium. He turned professional in September 1978 and was given his League debut as substitute in Rovers' 1-0 defeat at home to Preston in May 1979. Also playing in that month's 1-0 victory at Wrexham, he failed to make any further first team appearances and followed Stuart Taylor to Bath City in July 1980. He was one of several former Rovers players at Twerton Park, later playing for Forest Green Rovers and Banbury United.

SCOTT SHEARER

Scotland B international goalkeeper Scott Shearer missed just one match for Bristol Rovers in 2005/06. Initially with Tower Hearts, he joined Albion Rovers in July 2000 and moved to Coventry City in July 2003. He failed to maintain a regular first-team slot and was loaned to Rushden & Diamonds before joining Bristol Rovers in July 2005. Displaced Steve Phillips last season, he was loaned to Shrewsbury Town in October 2006 and starred as they reached the League Two play off final but was denied the

chance to appear against Rovers which was a condition of his deal. He moved to Wycombe Wanderers in July 2007.

DICK SHEPPARD

Goalkeeper Dick Sheppard was ever present for Bristol Rovers in 1970/71. Signing professional for West Brom in February 1963, he played in the 1967 League Cup final and moved to Eastville Stadium in June 1969. He starred as Rovers reached the League Cup Fifth Round in two consecutive seasons and won at Manchester United in the 1972/73 League Cup Third Round replay. Also featuring in the 1972 Watney Cup final triumph, he made 151 League appearances until suffering a head injury in January 1973. He played for Weymouth, Portway Bristol and Paulton Rovers, residing locally until his death in October 1998.

JEFF SHERWOOD

Right back Jeff Sherwood contested a first team slot with Neil Slater while at Bristol Rovers. Locally born, he played for Minehead, Taunton Town and Bath City before moving to Eastville Stadium in June 1982. He was given his League debut in Rovers' 2-2 draw at Preston three months later and made 19 Third Division appearances prior to rejoining Bath City in September 1983. Moving to Yeovil Town in August 1987, he featured in their 1987/88 Isthmian League double triumph and joined Gloucester in November 1990. He returned to Yeovil in August 1992, then played for Clevedon, Bath, Brislington and Trowbridge



Kite flying high!

The FA Cup ties against Leyton Orient and Rushden & Diamonds saw a number of the younger members of the squad included in the first team squads.

Central defender Alex Kite was on the bench for the Second Round tie, had been close to making the squad for the replay against Orient just a few days earlier.

His name was included in the list of 18 players on duty for that game, and although he eventually missed out on a place in the final 16, it was a big day for the young central defender.

It was a fantastic feeling. When I first went into the dressing rooms at Coleraine, I wasn't really expecting anything. I knew there were a few injuries and suspensions, but to walk in and see my name in the squad for the game was a great experience and I was buzzing from then on.

Then, when I walked into the dressing room on the night of the match it was a little bit strange to see a shirt with my name on hanging from the peg, it was a fantastic feeling. I didn't make the 16, but that wasn't a problem because the experience of going out on to the pitch, warming up with the lads, and being involved in front of a decent crowd was just a great experience. I wasn't disappointed in the slightest that I wasn't in the actual squad, as just being involved was a great feeling.

It was a totally different feeling to the

one you get when appearing for the reserves at the Memorial Stadium. For a start, there was a much bigger crowd and it's a fantastic feeling to walk out on to the pitch and hear them cheering. Everyone is buzzing, and it gives you a tremendous lift.

Naturally, those feelings were even greater when he made the bench for the Rushden game, when he was one of four substitutes who had never made a senior appearance. I'm sure someone will correct me if I'm wrong, but I doubt that there's ever been a younger, or more inexperienced, bench than that one. It shows that, at last, we do have young players coming through the ranks who have a genuine chance of making it through to the first team.

For those of you who are unable to get along to our reserve team games, Alex has been associated with the club since he was 12 years old.

I joined the Centre of Excellence then, and went on to Filton College and played for the U-18 side. I think I did reasonably well, but I picked up a few injuries. I came back, though, and did well again and was fortunate enough to be offered a pro contract in the summer. Since then I've kept my head down and worked hard, and have been playing regular reserve team football.

We have been fortunate in that, unlike last season, we have been able to play games on a regular basis as Kevin Hodges has been successful in arranging friendly fixtures when we haven't had league games. That's important, as it enables you to maintain your fitness levels and helps you to improve as a player.

He's the first to admit that the senior pros at the club have been a big help.

In the reserves, I've played alongside Craig Hinton a number of times, and he's been fantastic. He's been helping me through every single game, giving

me advice and he's been absolutely brilliant.

Aaron Lescott has also been a big help, as he passes on advice about positioning and, to be honest, all of the senior pros are great about helping the younger players.

Making the transition from youth team player to full time pro is difficult, but, he says, it gets easier as time passes.

It was quite difficult at the beginning, because your body isn't used to training every day. It's been a fantastic experience, though, and I just love training and coming in every day and it has become easier as I've got used to it.

He's not been short of advice, as his father Phil, a former Rovers goalkeeper and now the club's physio, has always been there for him.

He's always supported me and helped me along and his football background has been a great help. He's helped me since I was very young, and continues to help me now. He lets me get on with things, but still gives me pointers now and again, for which I'm very grateful.

He's already played a number of strikers who have had first team experience with their clubs, including Bristol City's Lee Trundle and Enoch Showunmi.

That was a good test, but I felt I did alright against them and the experience can only help improve my game.

Having had a taste of what it's like to be involved with the first team squad has made him even more determined to make it a regular happening, though he knows it's going to take a lot more hard work.

Playing for the reserves is a big step up from youth team football, and making it through to the first team is another big step to take. Everything changes, and the players around you have more technical ability, but I'm willing to give it everything to get the chance.



Past...

Rovers and Luton's first meeting in the Football League came on 1st January 1921, and today is the 78th league fixture between the clubs.

Rovers have won 19 of their home games against the Hatters, have drawn 12 and lost seven. In September this year, Rovers won for the sixth time at Kenilworth Road, where they have drawn nine games and lost 24, a figure which includes the 12-0 defeat on Easter Monday 1936. At that time, it was the joint biggest win in Football League history, though it has since been surpassed by Newcastle's 13-0 victory over Newport in 1946. Every time Rovers have won at Kenilworth Road, they have gone to complete the double over the Hatters and go into today's game with hopes of completing their first double of the current campaign.

Present...

Luton's last game before we went to print was a 1-0 defeat at Whaddon Road, Cheltenham, where Andy Lindegaard scored after only two minutes.

Speaking on Luton's official website, manager Kevin Blackwell said:

We have dominated a team away from home and we haven't got anything yet again. I wish we were playing tomorrow, because we would have won that game nine times out of ten. Cheltenham were lucky tonight and it would be nice if we could have a bit of it at the moment.

Future...

It's a hectic few days for Rovers as we take on Carlisle United, here at the Mem, on Saturday (ko 3.00pm) then travel to Southend for a New Year's Day fixture (ko 1.00pm).

That's followed by a trip to Craven Cottage on Sunday 6th January for the FA Cup Third Round tie against Fulham (ko 2.00pm).

TUESDAY 4TH DECEMBER

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The top ten games

Gerard Butler looks at the ten key games which have helped to shape the League One promotion race so far.

The promotion race has brought a few surprises, with Leeds United's 15 point deduction not hindering their progress into the promotion picture. Nottingham Forest and Swansea have figured as expected, after going close in recent seasons, whilst Doncaster, Carlisle, Yeovil, and, unexpectedly, Leyton Orient, have featured too.

1) Saturday 25th August, Nottingham Forest 1-2 Leeds

Less than ten years ago, this would have been a top flight game, but, in any case, there was a huge crowd, as Leeds claimed their fourth successive win in all competitions. Tresor Kandol put the visitors ahead in the first half, but Kris Commons levelled for Forest, before Jermaine Beckford struck with just a minute left. For Forest, their promotion challenge would take time to emerge, but the visitors had already chipped away at that points deduction.

2) Friday 14th September, Swansea 2-1 Carlisle

After just missing out on the play offs last season, despite a strong finish under Roberto Martinez, this win marked the start of a run of just one defeat in 11, and was United's first away defeat, although they stayed third. Danny Graham looked to have put the Cumbrians on track for victory, but goals in the last nine minutes from Daryl Duffy and Paul Anderson earned the Swans a priceless victory.

3) Saturday 22nd September, Leeds 2-0 Swansea

This was a highly significant result, being City's only loss in an 11 match spell, whilst it meant United maintained a 100% league record, with seven wins from seven, equalling a club record from the Don Revie era in the process, as they moved from -15 points to six points in credit. Jermaine Beckford and David Prutton scored the goals which kept the Swans just outside the top seven as United's momentum showed no signs of slowing.

4) Saturday 6th October, Leyton Orient 0-5 Swansea

The O's led the table, but were well beaten by the Swans, who were proving to be far more dominant on the road than at the Liberty Stadium. Tom Butler scored twice, with other goals from Paul Anderson, Darren Pratley and Warren Feeney, as City moved up to fourth spot and into the heart of the title race, whilst Orient's third defeat of the season knocked them off the top of the table.

5) Saturday 27th October, Southend 0-1 Carlisle

Southend were doing well after last season's relegation, whilst John Ward had kept Carlisle in the heart of the promotion race following his move from Cheltenham at the start of the month. Joe Garner scored the goal which took the Cumbrians to the top of the table, but even after that defeat, the Shrimpers were still only two points behind, despite their fifth spot, in an extremely congested top six.

6) Saturday 3 November, Carlisle 3-1 Leeds

At this stage, Leeds United were still unbeaten, and 11 wins from 13 had taken them into the top six, but it was Carlisle who were leaders, and they handed the visitors a 3-1 defeat. Jermaine Beckford gave the visitors an interval lead, which was only cancelled out on the hour by Simon Hackney. Joe Garner put the home side in front, whilst Marc Bridge-Wilkinson added another in stoppage time, as the Cumbrians maintained a one point lead at the top of the table.

7) Tuesday 15th December, Doncaster 1-0 Leyton Orient

Continuing the theme of excellent results in the crucial games, the Cumbrians moved above both Nottingham Forest and Orient into second spot thanks to Joe Garner's goal early in the second half, with the striker second in the scoring charts. It left the O's in fourth spot with identical home and away records, as consistency continued to elude them, despite their lofty position, whilst United celebrated a seventh home win from nine league matches.

8) Tuesday 4th December, Walsall 1-0 Nottingham Forest



Carlisle United

The final match of a truly memorable year provides the opportunity to pit our wits against promotion candidates from Cumbria and a few familiar faces.

In charge will be our former management team from the Twerton Park days of John Ward and Dennis Booth. They have largely travelled their separate ways for over a decade since leaving the West Country but were reunited when Ward took charge at Brunton Park in October. On the pitch we should expect to see striker Kevin Gall and defender Richard Keogh.

Kevin has often been warming the bench this term due to the competition he faces from three summer signings, Joe Garner, Danny Graham and Danny Carlton, but he usually gets the chance to bring his pace in to the attack at some stage. Teenager Garner heads the scoring chart following his move from Blackburn Rovers. Graham, recruited from Middlesbrough, has been the most preferred partner in the starting eleven but was edged out by Carlton who made his first Football League start at Brighton last month. In May he scored the decisive goal for Morecambe in the Conference Play off Final at Wembley.

Keogh had only just returned to Bristol City after playing ten games on loan at Huddersfield Town when he agreed a further temporary move to Carlisle until New Years Day. He arrived at Ashton Gate from Stoke City two years ago and last season captained the Republic of Ireland U-21 international team and was voted City's Young Player of the Year.

A special day out at Blackpool

Most Rovers fans of a certain age will remember this goal, scored by Paul Nixon, at Blackpool.

Rovers had clinched promotion to the Second Division just a few days earlier, on 2nd May 1990, with a 3-0 win against Bristol City in front of a crowd of 9,831.

The win set up an intriguing final day of the season and on 5th May, Rovers travelled to Blackpool knowing that a win would clinch the Third Division title. More than 5,000 Rovers fans made the trip to Bloomfield Road, and as the official attendance was only 6,776, Blackpool could have been forgiven for thinking they were the away side!

David Mehew gave Rovers the lead after 28 minutes with his 21st goal of the season, and Phil Purnell made it 2-0 two minutes before half time. The second half, described in one newspaper report as 'one long party' remained goalless until the final minute when Nixon, on as a second half substitute, scored a third with a sensational volley.

As you can see, from the photo, Rovers supporters were already on the

touchline waiting to mob the team at the end of the ninety minutes, and this is how the final act in an outstanding season was described in the local press:



When Paul Nixon fired in the third goal in the 89th minute, Rovers fans couldn't contain themselves any longer. They poured on to the pitch hugging their heroes, each other and even the Blackpool players, who could only look on bemused. The Division Three title was theirs and they were loving every minute of it.

The goal was only one of six scored by Nixon in just over two years with the club. His only appearance in 1988/89 came against Northampton, when he was used as a substitute. In the promotion season, he appeared in 27 league games and there were another 16 appearances in 1990/91.
