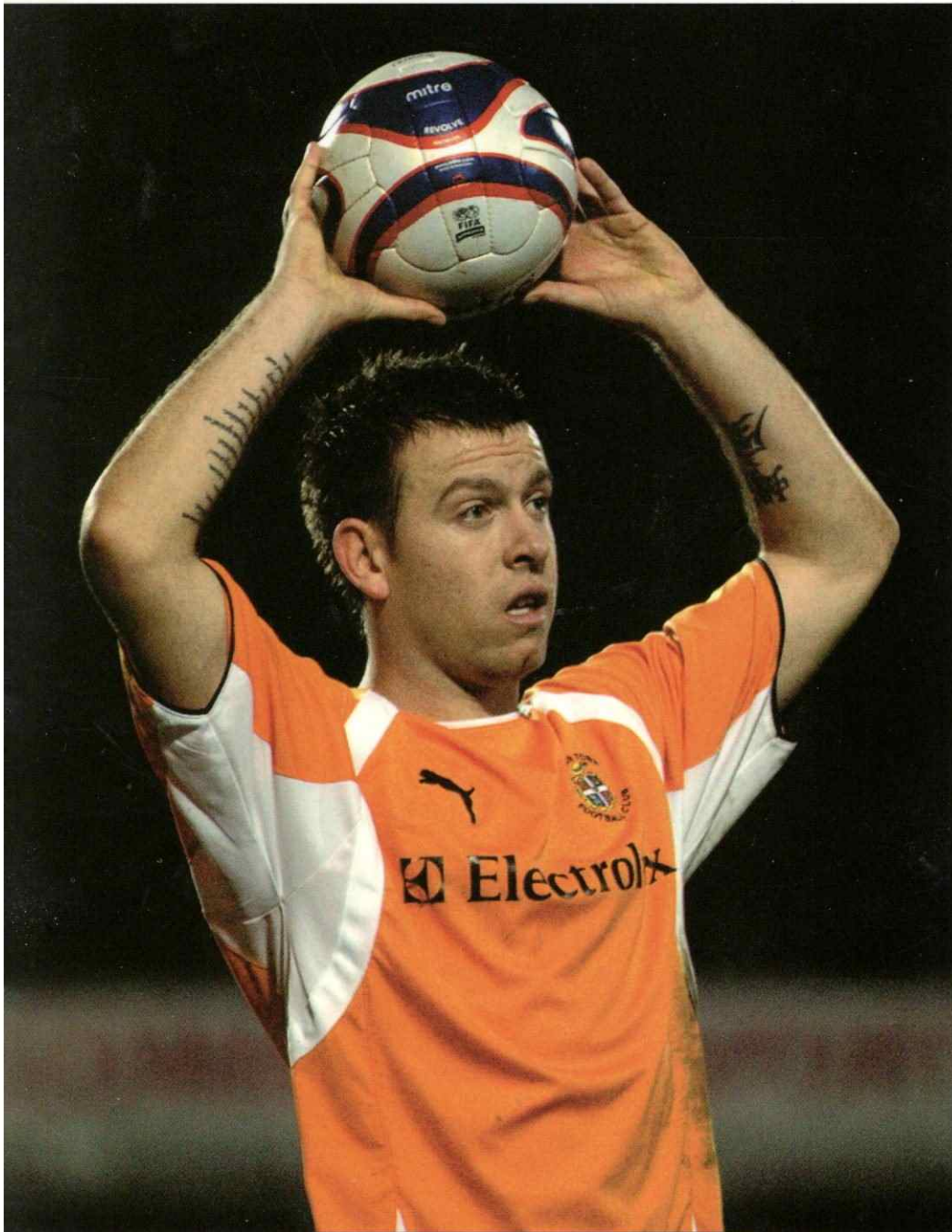

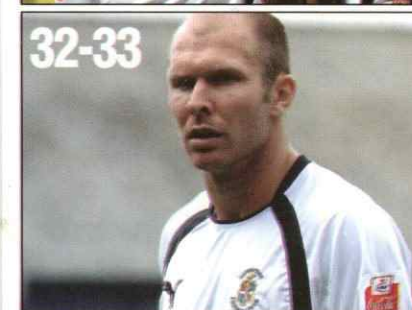
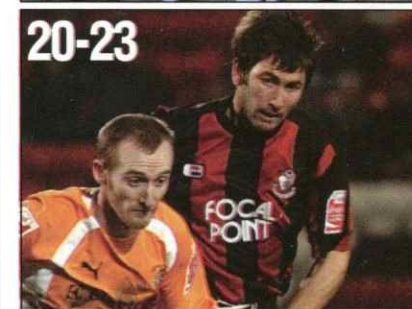

I know he has been so unfortunate with injuries since he arrived at Kenilworth Road, but he is desperate to do well for the Club.

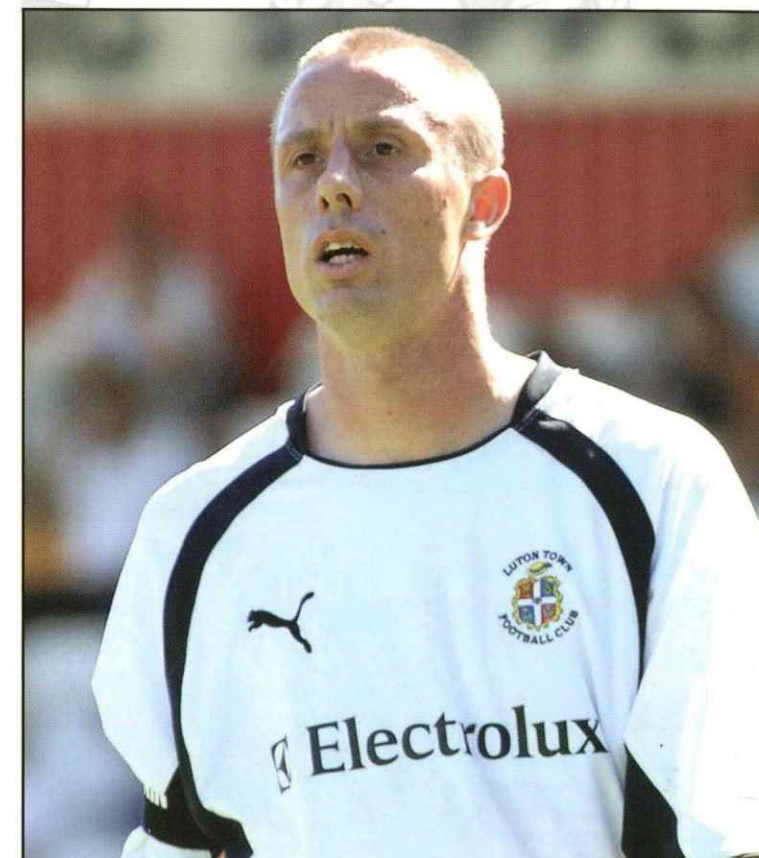
He is constantly in the gym working on his fitness and his goal was a huge reward for his determination and effort to get back into action.

TODAY'S MATCHES

Full service resumes this evening in League One after a disrupted programme at the weekend due to the FA Cup.

The pick of the games comes at the City Ground, where the top two come face to face in what could be a mouth-watering encounter.

SWANSEA CITY (1st) are 11 points clear of NOTTINGHAM FOREST (2nd) having gone on an impressive 12 game unbeaten League run, including a 4-0 demolition job of DONCASTER ROVERS (6th) on Friday night.

The Welsh side are seemingly riding on the crest of the wave and travel to Forest having won eight away games, losing only two, this season - the best away record in the division.

Forest however have a strong home record, losing just one League game at the City Ground and know that victory will give them a realistic chance of taking the League One title.

In their last game at home, Forest smashed four past LEYTON ORIENT (7th) with Grant Holt grabbing a brace for Colin Calderwood's team.

Elsewhere, SOUTHEND UNITED (9th) face a tricky home game against LEEDS UNITED (5th)

Southend are in desperate need of the points to keep in touch with the play-off pack having won only once in their last eight games.

Leeds meanwhile have been inconsistent themselves with only two victories in their previous seven games.

OLDHAM (14th) will be looking to bounce back from their FA Cup disappointment over the weekend, losing narrowly to HUDDERSFIELD TOWN (17th)

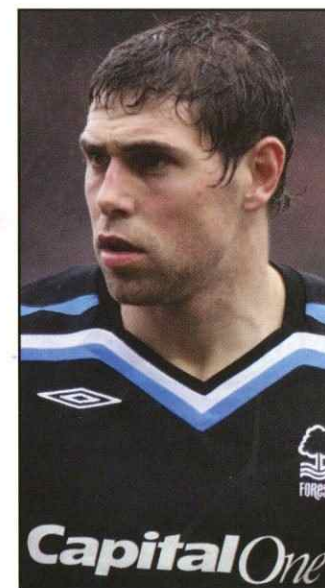
The Latics have struggled at Boundary Park this season, winning just two League games at home - their last coming back in September.

They take on CARLISLE UNITED (3rd) who need to pick up points on their travels to keep in touch with the leading pack in League One. The Cumbrians have won just three times on the road.

PORT VALE (24th) face a must-win game against YEOVIL (10th) who now see themselves nine points adrift of safety.

A home defeat to BOURNEMOUTH (22nd) at the weekend means Vale manager Lee Sinnott has won just three games out of 17, since his arrival from Farsley Celtic.

Yeovil, who lost to TRANMERE (8th) at the weekend, have been pretty poor on their travels having won only one away game in their last 11.

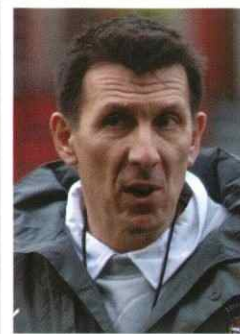

WARREN NEILL

When Mick Harford arrived at Kenilworth Road, he brought with him a highly regarded coach and player who has carved out a successful career at QPR and Portsmouth. Warren Neill worked with Mick during their time at QPR and between them played a pivotal role at Loftus Road when John Gregory lost his job at the Club. Now the duo hope to work their magic at Kenilworth Road in Luton's bid to maintain their League One status next season.

Warren, can you explain how your move to Kenilworth Road has come about?

I helped Mick at QPR and we got on well. I was his assistant when he was placed in charge following the departure of John Gregory. We did well in the short time we were at the helm, but it didn't work out with various people. However, we kept in touch and he telephoned me to ask if I could help him out here and I was delighted to team up with him again.

Was it a difficult decision to come to Kenilworth Road?

Not really. It is currently a short-term position until the end of the season so we will see what happens after that. Hopefully it can become something long-term, but at the moment we have to concentrate on trying to stay in the division. Mine and Mick's future can be talked about at a later stage.

Tell us a little bit about your career?

I started as a kid at QPR coming up through their ranks and went on to have a good career at Loftus Road. I was fortunate enough to have been part of the

Rangers side which won the Milk Cup in 1986 and played in the 1982 FA Cup Final. I also played for Rangers in the UEFA Cup and I made 224 appearances, before I moved to Portsmouth in 1988. At Portsmouth I got to the semi-final of the FA Cup where we lost to Liverpool. I spent six years there before I was forced to retire from playing at the age of 31.

And then you moved into coaching.

I went to QPR to work as the assistant to the Academy Director: Richard Langley was one of my players and during my time in that role we won the Academy League Cup Final. Unfortunately, QPR went into administration and the Academy was abolished and I was made redundant. When John Gregory went to QPR he called me to speak about coming back and I returned.

What skills does Mick Harford bring in terms of a manager?

He brings with him a wealth of knowledge. He was a player who played at the highest level and he has already proved to be a good coach and a fantastic manager. He has high expectations of his players and he expects them to meet them. He can also



bring the best out of players, which is a hard quality to have.

What have you made of the Luton squad?

There is certainly enough quality and we have been encouraged by what we have seen so far. We are obviously short of a centre-half, but we are all sticking together and if the lads can continue to play the way we know they can, then we have every chance of staying up.

Has it been difficult having so many game so quickly since your arrival?

I wish we knew what we do now about the players when we first arrived. We do have a good squad and we will be fighting together.

What are your memories of Kenilworth Road?

Well the dugouts have obviously moved to the other side of the ground because on Saturday I started making my way down the wrong touchline. I didn't have particularly fond memories of playing against Luton as I have scored two own goals in my career and they were both against Luton. Kenilworth Road was never a ground teams used to like playing at because the atmosphere could be intimidating at times, and that is what we now need from the fans until the end of the season.

The SWINDON Story

Beginnings: 1879/81

Swindon Town Football Club was founded by Reverend William Pitt between 1879 and 1881, with the club officially using the latter date. Confusion over the original date arose in the mid-1990s and continues to arouse controversy, with the club accepting the earlier date and then reverting back to the original during the late 21st century.

Top Player: Fjortoft



Jan Åge Fjortoft will probably go down as Swindon's greatest ever player; the Norwegian was very much loved by the Club's supporters. He joined Swindon in the summer of 1993 following their promotion to the Premiership and was their top scorer during the 1993-94 season as the

Robins were relegated. The powerful striker also helped Swindon reach the League Cup semi-finals and played 72 games for the Club, scoring 28 goals. He later went on to enjoy spells with Middlesbrough, Sheffield United and Barnsley.

Top Manager: Hoddle



Glenn Hoddle arrived at a troubled club when he was appointed manager of Swindon Town, who had been badly affected by a financial scandal which had seen them stripped of promotion to the First Division at the end of the 1989-90 season. Hoddle prevented Swindon from slipping into the Third

Division and further improvement throughout the 1991-92 season saw the Wiltshire club finish ninth, just missing out on a play-off place. Swindon reached the new Division One play-offs in 1993 and beat Leicester City 4-3 at Wembley and were then promoted to the Premier League.

Top Game:

March 15, 1969
Arsenal 1 Swindon 3
League Cup Final, Wembley Stadium

On paper the 1969 League Cup final appeared something of a formality as Arsenal, riding high in the first division, were faced with the task of overcoming third division Swindon Town. The Robins went in front through Roger Smart and looked to have won the tie before Bobby Gould scored for Arsenal just before full-time. That meant the game went into extra time, which Swindon dominated. Don Rogers put the underdogs in front but Swindon were firmly on the back foot in the second period of extra time. However, Rogers grabbed a third on the counter attack to complete a historic victory.

WELCOME TO SWINDON

Despite only winning twice on the road so far this term, Swindon Town will be hoping that tonight's match can ignite a push for the play-offs.

After promotions, relegations and administrations in the last few years, Robins' fans have endured their fair share of thrills and spills but, with just a little more consistency on the pitch, Maurice Malpas's side could sneak into the top six come May.

Malpas took over at the County Ground earlier this month following the departure of former Southampton boss, Paul Sturrock, who left in November after guiding Swindon to automatic promotion last season.

Sturrock upped a division to move back to another of his previous clubs, Plymouth, and his loss was keenly felt by many at the County Ground. However, despite the relatively disappointing form on their travels, the 1969 League Cup Winners remain in a comfortable position, and Malpas's brief tenure has already included an impressive defeat of second-placed Nottingham Forest.

The new boss himself was a Rolls Royce defender who excelled for Dundee United and Scotland in a career that spanned over twenty years.

A winner of 55 international caps and

a UEFA Cup runners-up medal with United, Malpas was previously Motherwell manager and also has a short stint as Scotland Under-21 coach on his CV.

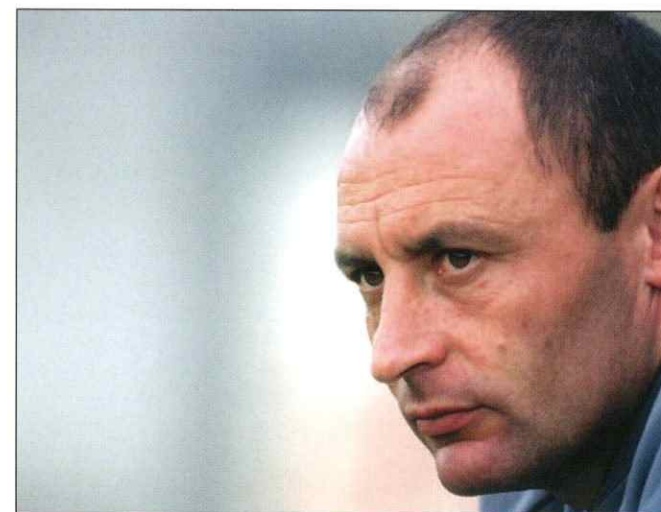
In the interim period between ex-Tannadice teammates Sturrock and Malpas, club skipper Andy Williams took temporary charge, although the former Reading and Wales stalwart has only actually played once this term.

Ex-Manchester United youth player, Hasney Aljofree, wears the captain's armband on the field, and the athletic defender has been a consistent performer since his move from

Plymouth last year.

Malpas's biggest headache is up front, where the failure to permanently secure the talents of on-loan Reading striker, Simon Cox, has depleted the Robins' firepower. Cox netted eight times in 18 games for Swindon - the last a 90th minute penalty to secure a draw against leaders Swansea on New Year's Day - and his cool finishing made him the apple of many fans' eyes.

Even though both parties are still rumoured to be keen on a move, the twenty year-old's continued absence means that Malpas is likely to turn to Irish youngster Barry Corr, who has



been in fine goal-scoring form since making his own loan spell from Bristol City permanent. Alongside him, former Hull and Southend forward, Billy Paynter, will be looking to recapture the sort of form that saw him net a hat-trick on his Robins debut back in September.

Paynter, in fact, notched his first goal since November in last week's FA Cup tie against Barnet, although the night ultimately ended in disappointment as the League Two strugglers ran out winners on penalties after a 1-1 draw in normal time.

Craig Eatson has also strengthened the midfield department and has been a consistent member of the Swindon side.

Putting an end to that sort of away-day misery will be top of Malpas's priority list as we head into the business end of the season.

It seems as if Swindon are quickly adapting to Malpas's style of play meaning Luton could be in for another difficult test at Kenilworth Road this evening.

Recent meetings between the two sides have been evenly balanced. The Hatters will be looking to gain revenge for their 2-1 defeat earlier in the season, in a match that Luton should have gone on to win.

The most recent fixture at Kenilworth Road between the two sides was in March 2005 when goals from Kevin Nicholls, Ahmet Brkovic and Peter Holmes sealed a 3-1 win.

How has this season gone?

I think with the arrival of the new owners, most Swindon fans believe that there is some light at the end of the tunnel. It's been a difficult season. The football has been good at times, particularly at home, but our away form hasn't really been good enough. I think Paul Sturrock going back to Plymouth didn't help, but early signs look pretty good under Maurice Malpas.

What are Swindon's aims this season?

If we could get into the play-offs then it was be a massive achievement, particularly as we had a transfer embargo placed upon us earlier in the season. I'm not sure we have the quality within the squad to make the step up and maybe another season in this division would make us stronger for a proper push to the Championship. I think a top half finish would be satisfactory, particularly with the rollercoaster season we have had to date.

Who is your key signing?



Billy Paynter for me has had a good season. He has looked an exciting player since he arrived from Southend United and added a bit of firepower to our attack. I have also been impressed with Jon-Paul McGovern, who we signed from MK Dons in the summer.

Who will be your star players?

Most likely to score for Swindon this evening would be Paynter, but Craig Easton has been brilliant this season and if he can see plenty of the ball then he could dominate the game. In defence, Hasney Aljofree has been solid and I think he will play a key role tonight.



Who will win the League One title?

I can't see anybody piping Swansea to the title. They look an excellent strong side and have one of the best managers in the leagues. It could then be one of about seven teams who join them. We lost 3-0 to Carlisle United earlier in the season and on that day we were beaten by a good side. You also have to be impressed by Walsall this season and although I'm not sure if they can last the pace, they played well when we travelled there a few weeks ago.



The Captain **6** *Ady Williams*

Named on-field Captain by former manager Dennis Wise in mid-July, Ady Williams brought with him a wealth of footballing experience to the County Ground. He signed from Coventry City in pre-season 2006. The former Welsh International has had successful spells with Wolves and Reading and despite being injured against Hartlepool United in February which ended his season, he has a major hand in Town's promotion. Williams forged a successful central defensive partnership with Jerel Ifil and his experience was a significant influence on the squad and the club. He is currently recovering from surgery and making good progress on the training ground ahead of a return to action.



Goalkeepers

Phil Smith

Joined Swindon in July 2006 from Crawley Town, where he made 74 appearances during a two-year stay, which followed a year's spell at Margate where he made 35 starts.

Peter Brezovan

A giant in goal at 6'7, Peter Brezovan signed on a year's loan from Czech club FC Brno in the summer of 2006. The Slovakian has become a fan's favourite and was named PFA Fans' Player of the Month for September.

Mark Scott

A promising young goalkeeper who is highly-rated at the County Ground and is waiting to make his debut for the senior team.

Defenders

Jack Smith

Signed from Watford in the summer of 2005, and added youthful experience to the Town side. He made 38 league starts for Town last season in a variety of positions including right back, left back and midfield.



Jamie Vincent

Jamie Vincent arrived at The County Ground in the summer of 2006 as one of Dennis Wise's first signings. Vincent began his football career as a trainee at Crystal Palace before making the switch to AFC Bournemouth, where he made over 100 appearances between 1996 and 1999. He then made a £500,000 switch to Huddersfield Town which was followed by an £800,000 deal which saw him move to Portsmouth in 2001. Spells at Derby County and Millwall then followed.

Jerel Ifil

Powerful defender Jerel Ifil joined Town in the summer of 2004 after enjoying three loan spells with Town previously from 2002-04. Ifil has now played over 100 games in a Town shirt and was a rock at the back throughout the 2006/07 season. Signed a new three-year contract in May 2007.

Miguel Comminges

A French defender, who came to the attention of former boss Paul Sturrock during a scouting mission to France towards the end of last season. Miguel Comminges has previous experience with Amiens SC and then signed for Reims in 2003 and made a total of 74 appearances for the Second Division side.

Hasney Aljofree

Hasney Aljofree joined Swindon Town from Plymouth Argyle and the defender is an experienced player who has over 200 appearances under his belt. Aljofree spent a short time at Dundee United before moving to Plymouth.

Top Scorer

Billy 20 Paynter

Signed for Swindon Town in August 2007 for an undisclosed fee from Southend United. The striker was restricted to just five league starts at Roots Hall after signing a three-year contract with the Blues from then Championship rivals Hull City in August 2006. He also spent a successful loan spell at Bradford City last term where he scored four goals in 15 league starts. Paynter began his career at Port Vale where he scored 30 goals in 119 league starts for the club. He initially



moved on loan to Hull in November 2005 before signing permanently for an undisclosed six-figure fee less than two months later. He has an impressive goal scoring record in League One and hit 14 goals during the 2003/04 campaign and followed hat up with 13 goals the following campaign.

Midfielders

Craig Easton

Craig Easton arrived at The County Ground in June 2007 and adds further experience to the central midfield area. The former Scotland Under 21 International has over 300 league appearances under his belt. He started his career at Dundee United where he came up through the ranks to make 162 league starts before departing in the summer of 2004 to spend a year at Livingston before joining Leyton Orient in July 2005.



Jon-Paul McGovern

Joined Swindon Town in August 2007, just hours before the close of the transfer window from MK Dons. A lively winger who can operate out wide or through the middle, Jon Paul McGovern has had spells with Sheffield Wednesday and Sheffield United.

Michael Pook

An energetic 'box-to-box' midfielder, Michael Pook signed a professional contract ahead of the 2005-6 season and was a consistent performer for the youth team and reserves prior to joining the professional ranks.

Chris Allen

A highly promising midfielder who has progressed right through the Swindon Youth ranks to secure a first team contract. Allen was handed his full debut against Brentford in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy in September 2007.

Sofiene Zaaboub

Impressed during an initial three month loan spell in November 2006, Zaaboub signed an 18-month deal at Swindon Town. Zaaboub has spent time at French club St Etienne.

Strikers

Lee Peacock

Lee Peacock joined Swindon Town in January 2006 on a free transfer from Sheffield Wednesday. The experienced frontman started his career at Carlisle United as a trainee, but after scoring 11 goals in 52 appearances he made the switch to Mansfield Town in October 1997 for £75,000. It proved to be a productive spell with The Stags with 29 goals in 80 appearances attracting Manchester City who parted with £500,000 for his services. However, his time at Maine Road was not as successful as he would have liked due to injuries, but his next stop certainly was. A £600,000 move to Bristol City in August 2000 heralded the start of a successful four year spell at Ashton Gate. 54 goals in 131 league starts was the result of his stay with the Robins before moving to Sheffield Wednesday, who he joined on a free transfer in the summer of 2004, on a free transfer.



Christian Roberts

Cardiff-born striker joined Swindon in October 2004 in a £50,000 switch from local rivals Bristol City. Formerly with Exeter City where he scored 18 goals in 67 league starts for the Grecians from 2000 - 2002. Started the 2007/08 season well, netting from the spot at Northampton Town on the opening day of the new campaign and has now established himself on the flank.

Blair Sturrock

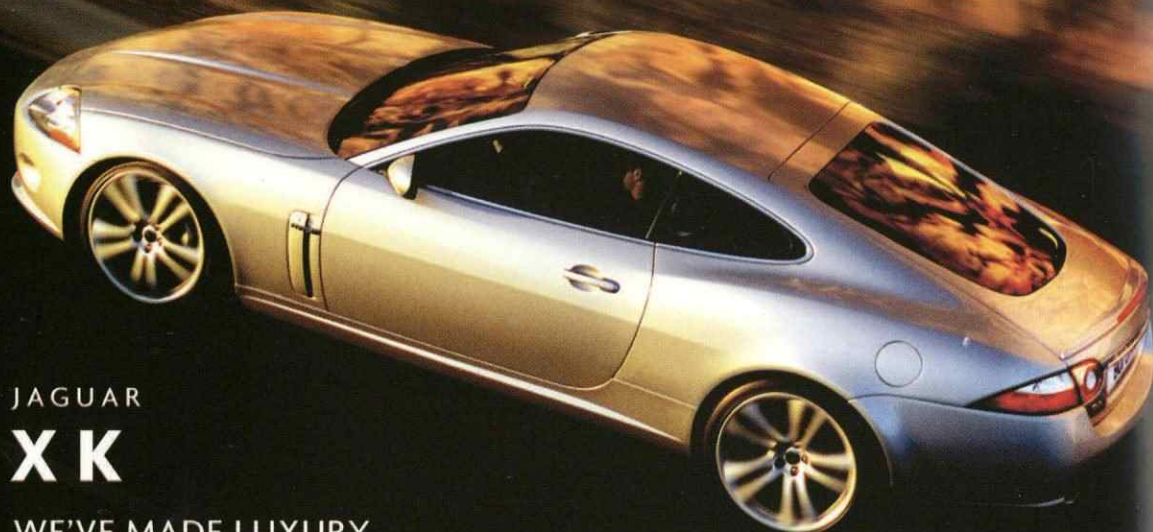
Blair Sturrock arrived at The County Ground in November 2006 from Rochdale. The striker joined Dundee United as a trainee before spending time at Brechin on loan. Sturrock then had a three-year spell on the south coast with Plymouth Argyle making most of his appearances as a substitute. ROGER WASH tells the stories behind some special moments in Hatters history



Hatters swagger through against the Robins

When the Town were promoted from Division Four in 1968 they started the following season where they left off and quickly established a place at the top of the table.

Boosted by some big money signings the Hatters went eight games unbeaten before going down 0-1 at Brighton, but then a combination of injuries and sudden loss of form meant that a pattern of win at home and lose away became the norm much to the increasing frustration of the fans.

Manager Allan Brown dipped into the transfer market once more in a bid to freshen up the squad but the 'one step forward, two steps back' combination continued.

By the time of the visit of pacesetters Swindon to Kenilworth Road in early November the Town had dropped back to sixth spot and were desperate to

remain in touch with the leading pack.

A crowd of 17,250 turned up on a murky day to see if the Hatters could at least maintain their 100% home record and they were treated to a full-blooded contest with a belligerent home side attempting to bludgeon their way through to victory.

Home striker Laurie Sheffield was guilty of a couple of glaring first half misses and it looked as though the Town would live to regret this wastefulness when the Robins came out of the blocks much the stronger in the second half.

Only some smart saves by Luton goalkeeper Sandy Davie prevented mercurial Swindon winger Don Rogers from opening the scoring and it was therefore against the run of play when the Town went 1-0 up on the hour.

Sheffield had been guilty of some heavy

challenges on Swindon goalkeeper Peter Downsborough and while he was still groggy the Town forwards exploited this weakness and pumped a succession of high balls into the area.

From one of these, Sheffield took advantage of some hesitation and smacked a volley into the net.

Swindon now had to attack for all they were worth and consequently left gaps in defence which were increasingly exploited by the Luton forwards. From one such counter attack Luton's own mercurial winger Graham French beat two defenders and laid on an inch perfect pass for the wily Brian Lewis to put the result beyond doubt with ten minutes to go.

Whereas Allan Brown spoke of 'a fine all-round performance' after the match, the national press preferred to concentrate on the less savoury aspects of the clash – particularly Sheffield's foul on Downsborough and the running battle between Lewis and the Swindon skipper Stan Harland.

MANAGER'S VIEW



"Luton Town getting beaten tonight, in the way we did, is minimal in terms of the existence of the football club. It's a massive, massive challenge but we're in it together, we'll fight together and we'll be OK. Going forward we look a decent outfit but we have one centre-half at the football club. It's very, very difficult to keep clean sheets when you're hanging around with one centre-half. The players showed a hell of a lot of spirit to come back from two goals down. We didn't play particularly well first half but the story of the game was obviously in the last two or three minutes. I won't criticise any of my players, they've worked admirably. Luton had victory within their grasp but suffered an amazing defeat in a seven goal thriller against Bournemouth at Dean Court.

With just two minutes on the clock, Jo Kuffor found space in midfield and slipped out a pass to Sam Vokes, whose first time cross from the right was met by a delightful finish from the unmarked Max Alain Gradel at the back post.

Drew Talbot twice went close before Bournemouth extended their lead on 32 minutes. A long ball forward from Vokes sent Kuffor racing for goal, leaving Hutchison in his wake, to calmly lift a shot past the onrushing Dean Brill.

But Luton were to make a breakthrough just before the interval. Morgan's cross from the right saw Russell Perrett give away a needless foul inside the area as he was adjudged to have pulled the shirt of Furlong.

Bournemouth fans were stunned by decision to point as Matthew Spring buried his kick straight down the middle.

The second-half saw Luton back on level terms on 60 minutes when a clever cross from the right by Currie found Morgan at the back post who had stole behind the Bournemouth defence to calmly slot home a shot from six yards.

Luton then completed a remarkable comeback as they went in front on 79 minutes. After Perrett was robbed of possession by Talbot, the Luton striker whipped over a cross that was headed towards goal by Spring.

It looked as if Spring's effort had been saved by Ryan Pryce, but Paul Furlong was quick to react to a spillage from the rookie to lift a shot into the roof of the net from close range.

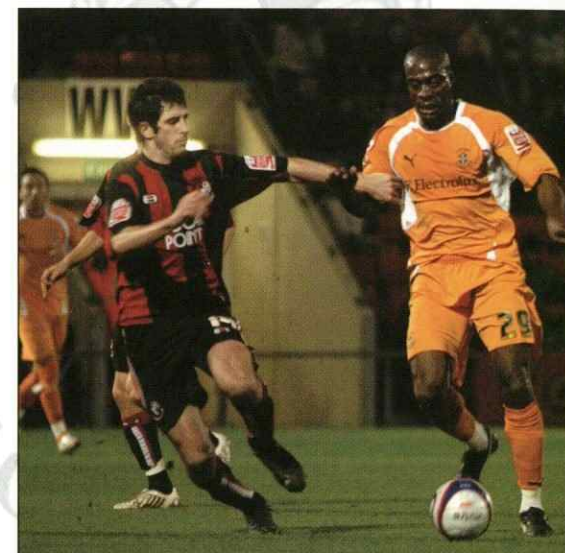

SIMON PITTS finds some fascinating facts about today's teams

SIMON'S STATS



5 The most number of goals scored by one player in this fixture. Tommy Tait netted all but one of the goals in a 6-0 win in April 1932. Fred Kean scored the other. Tait's hat-trick was the first of three in this fixture. Just two days short of a year later, Andy Rennie netted the ninth hat-trick of his Luton career, in a 6-2 win. Four years on and another prolific Luton scorer, Joe Payne, repeated the feat with his seventh Luton hat-trick in a 5-1 win! Three days later and Payne hit another hat-trick in a 5-0 win against Newport County when, co-incidentally, Bert Dawes and George Stephenson netted the other two goals as they had also done against Swindon!

17,250 The biggest attendance for this fixture, in November 1968, when Luton won 2-0 courtesy of goals from Laurie Sheffield and Brian Lewis. Despite failing to score against Luton, the reverse fixture ended goal-less, in that season Swindon were to pip the Hatters to promotion by just three points. The lowest recorded attendance is just 2,547 for this fixture, and they saw a 1-1 draw, with Luton's goal scored by Lewis Bedford, the last of his 17 goals in his Hatters' career.

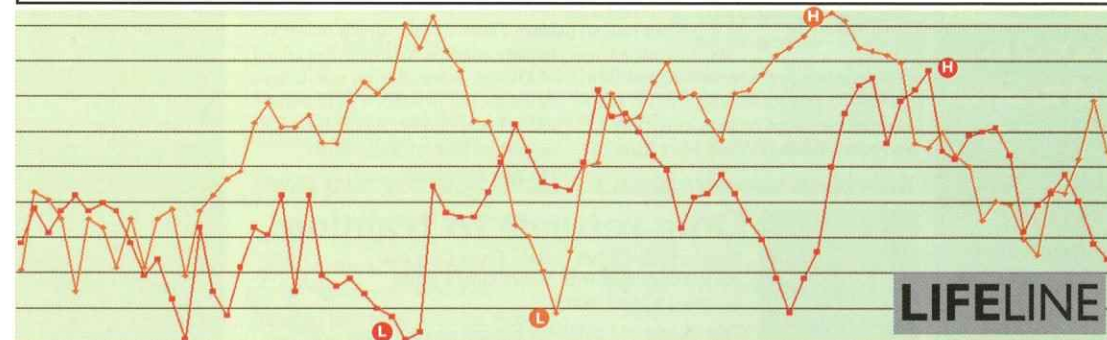
6 The number of penalties scored by Luton in this fixture. In the first league match between the sides, at Kenilworth Road, Syd Hoar opened the scoring from the spot before Allan Mathieson added the second in a 2-0 win. George Dennis scored the next penalty, in a 4-1 win, during the 1925/26 season. In May 1971 Don Givens scored from the spot just before the half time interval, but the visitors equalised after the break to earn a draw. The deadlock was also broken from a spot kick in October 1973 when John Aston netted, and although Swindon equalised just two minutes later Luton were victorious courtesy of a goal from Peter Anderson. Steve Robinson scored his first goal for Luton with a late penalty in September 2002. Kevin Nicholls netted his sixth league spot kick of the season. Ahmet Brkovic doubled Luton's lead before Swindon pulled a goal back through Michael Proctor.

17 The number of consecutive years that Luton and Swindon were in the same division. From 1920/21 to 1936/37 inclusive the sides were both in Division Three (South), before Luton won the league and were promoted to Division Two. During these 17 years the Hatters had been unbeaten for the first 13 meetings at Kenilworth Road, winning ten and drawing three, before Swindon won 3-2 in 1933/34. Luton won the next three meetings, and then had to wait over 30 years to make it four in a row as the sides didn't meet again until 1968. There's been just ten league meetings here between the sides in the last 39 years, with four wins for Luton, whilst Swindon have been victorious three times.

Each way movers

5 The number of players to have moved from Swindon to Luton over the years. The first, Bert Davies, only made four appearances during the 1927/28 season. Three years later and Fred Dent scored three goals in his first two appearances for Luton after his transfer; and both came in 3-1 wins. Dent went on to make a further 14 appearances and scored two more goals. It wasn't until 1964/65 that another player made the move, and Billy Harber made 33 appearances and scored two goals in two seasons at Luton. David Moss moved to Kenilworth Road in the summer of 1978, and scored twice on his Luton debut in a 6-1 win at home to Oldham. Sol Davis is the most recent signing, after he joined in August 2002.

6 The number of players to have moved from Luton to Swindon. Two of these players featured in Luton's first season in the Football League in 1897/98, James Coupar made 29 appearances and scored nine goals, whilst Tommy Little scored 10 goals in 25 appearances. Dan Kirkwood scored on his debut after joining from Brighton but made only one more appearance for Luton before moving to Swindon. Mike O'Hara only made four appearances in goal for the Hatters during the 1960/61. Another goalkeeper to move to Swindon was Jake Findlay, who had made 187 appearances in six years at Kenilworth Road.



Hatters and Swindon past...

THIS week's **LIFELINE** shows how Luton and Swindon's fortunes have risen and fallen over the years. Swindon's high point came when, under John Gorman, they suffered relegation from the Premiership, finishing bottom having collected only 30 points. Their lows were in 1932-33 and 1955-56 when they finished bottom of Football League. Luton's low point came with a 17th place in Division Four in 1966-67 and their high a top flight 7th place in 1986-87.

The two clubs had agreed a fee for the 25-year-old, who has scored 13 goals in 44 games for City but has not been a regular in their starting line-up. BBC Radio Leeds reports that Showunmi has opted to stay at Ashton Gate and fight for his place.

Leeds took the lead after 26 minutes with their first real chance of note when defender Paul Huntington planted a free-header past Dean Brill from a Peter Sweeney free-kick, after arriving in the box unmarked.

A long distance effort from Matthew Spring was kept out by Casper Ankergren and then Calvin Andrew shot wide from 20 yards out as the Hatters continued to press for an equaliser.

The Hatters made a bright start to the second period when Drew Talbot flashed a shot that ended up on the roof of the net.

After an hour, Leeds' defence continued to stand firm as David Prutton deflected another Spring shot wide and from the corner Darren Kenton was able to clear.

Morgan was introduced to the action after 68 minutes, replacing Darren Currie in a straight swap before Parkin returned to action in the place of Andrew, for his first league appearance since the opening day of the season.

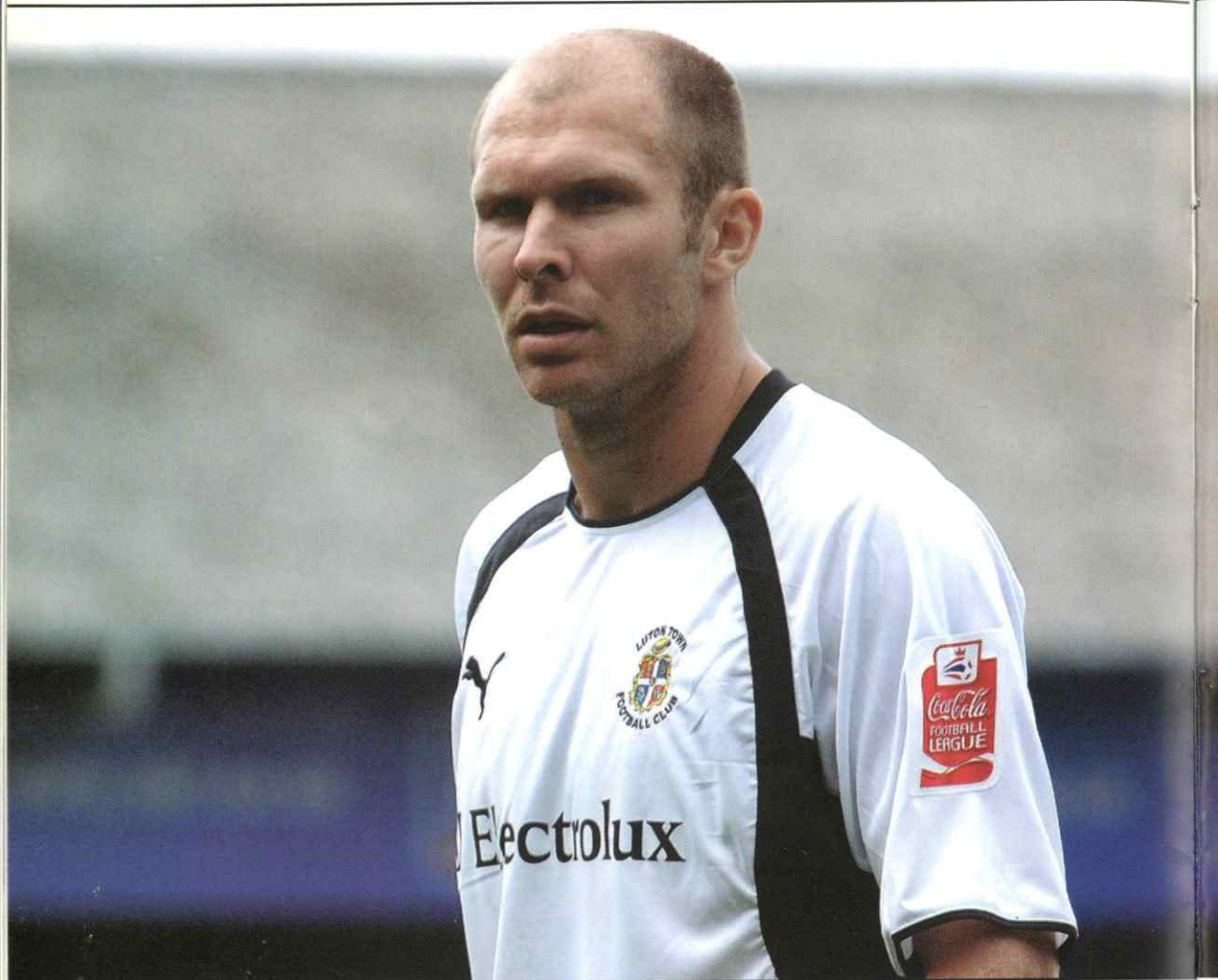

An interview with

SAM PARKIN

Sam Parkin's last ditch equaliser against Leeds United on Saturday is a story which journalists crave for.

Having been out of action for five months with an ankle injury, the Hatters striker grabbed the headlines with virtually the last touch of the game, on his return to action, to help Luton to a vital point.

It brought to an end another frustrating time on the sidelines for the former Swindon man and a huge relief for the striker who hasn't had the best of luck since his arrival at Kenilworth Road.

Now the striker wants to banish the memories of his time on the treatment table and start to pay back some of the £340,000 the Hatters splashed out for him in August 2006.

"It's a massive relief," said a beaming Parkin after his late equaliser on Saturday. "I've had two years of hardly any football. I think it was clear for everyone here to see how much it meant to me. Hopefully there's a few more to come.

"I have been working hard to get myself back. It's been very frustrating, but I hope the goal on Saturday is the start of me banging in a few goals for the Club.

"I'm not sure if I can play back-to-back 90 minutes matches yet, but I will be ready to go if the manager wants me to play. I came through a reserve match against Grays OK and if I can get some more time under my belt then it will all help."

Parkin still firmly believes that the Hatters have what it takes to pull away from the predicament that the Hatters currently find

themselves in.

However, the striker knows just how important it is to maintain the Club's impressive home form this season.

"We deserved to get something from

the Leeds game. I thought we played well enough to go on and get more than a point, but we will take anything we can get.

"It was a credit to everyone the way that we stuck in after going a goal down and never let our heads drop.

"Nobody is giving up on the fight. Everyone within the squad believes we can beat the drop, but it is imperative that we keep our good home form going."

Not for the first time since his move to Luton, Parkin has battled back from a course of rehabilitation work that has eventually seen him back into Mick Harford's first-team plans.

But on this occasion, the striker went through a tougher than normal schedule which included a variety of different workouts.

"It was important to work the whole body so I was put through a stern test of rehabilitation work which included exercises such as boxing and swimming.

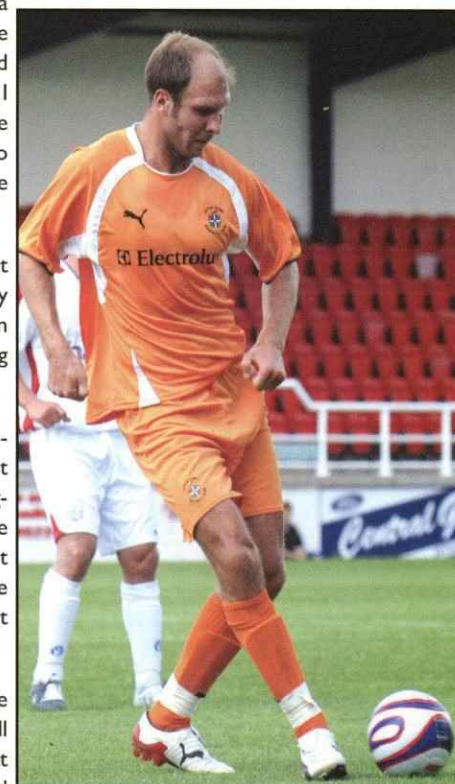
"It's been a tough comeback, but I am just glad to have gotten through it. Hopefully this time luck can be on my side and I can play some part for the remainder of the season.

"I need to keep plugging away and hopefully I can build up my fitness."

Parkin will be hoping to play some part in this evening's fixture having become a firm favourite with the Swindon fans during a three year stay at the County Ground.

The striker scored 73 goals in 142 appearances for Swindon before he was transferred to Ipswich Town.

Parkin added: "It was probably the best spell of my career. I'm looking forward to this evening and hopefully I can play some part."

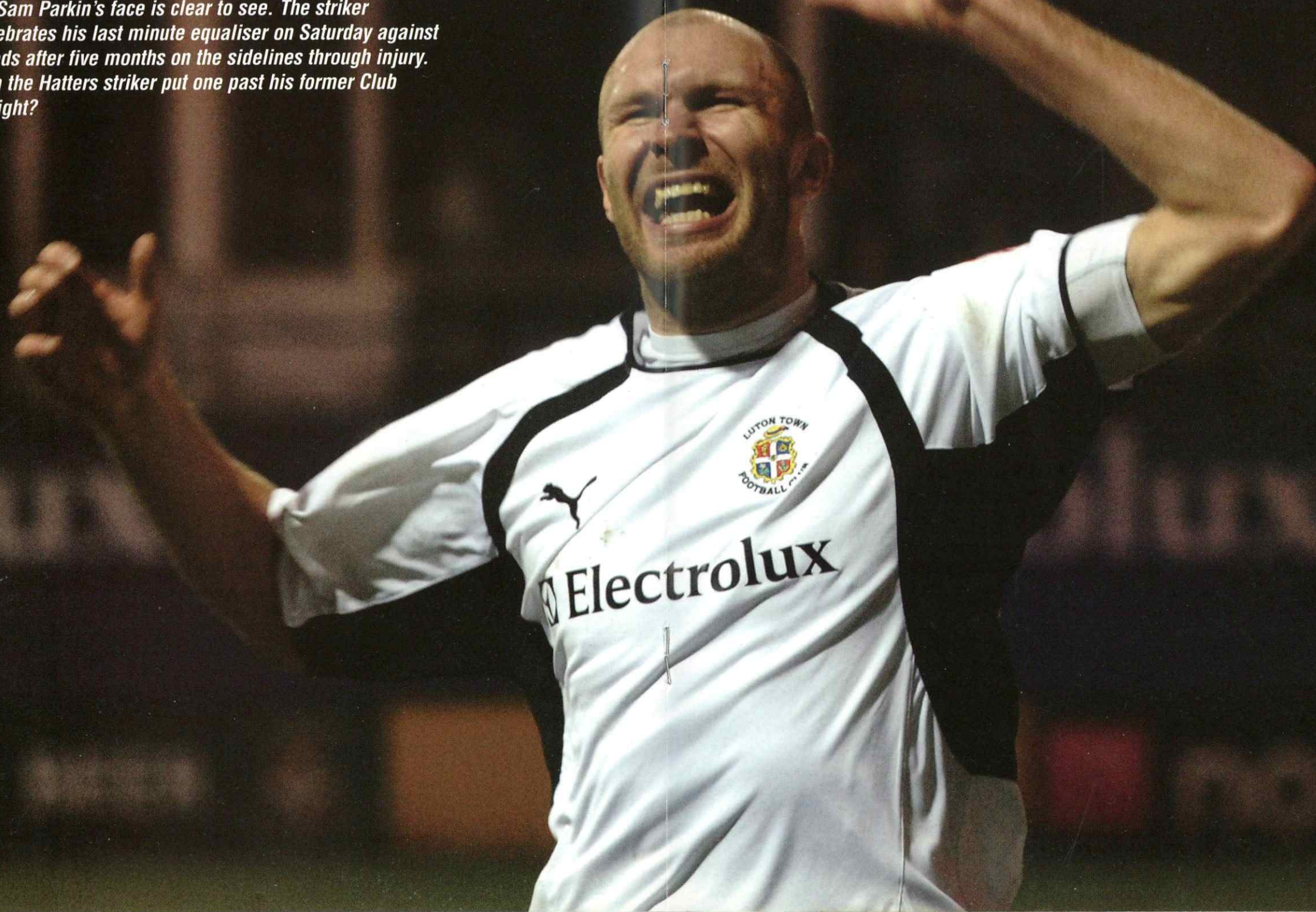

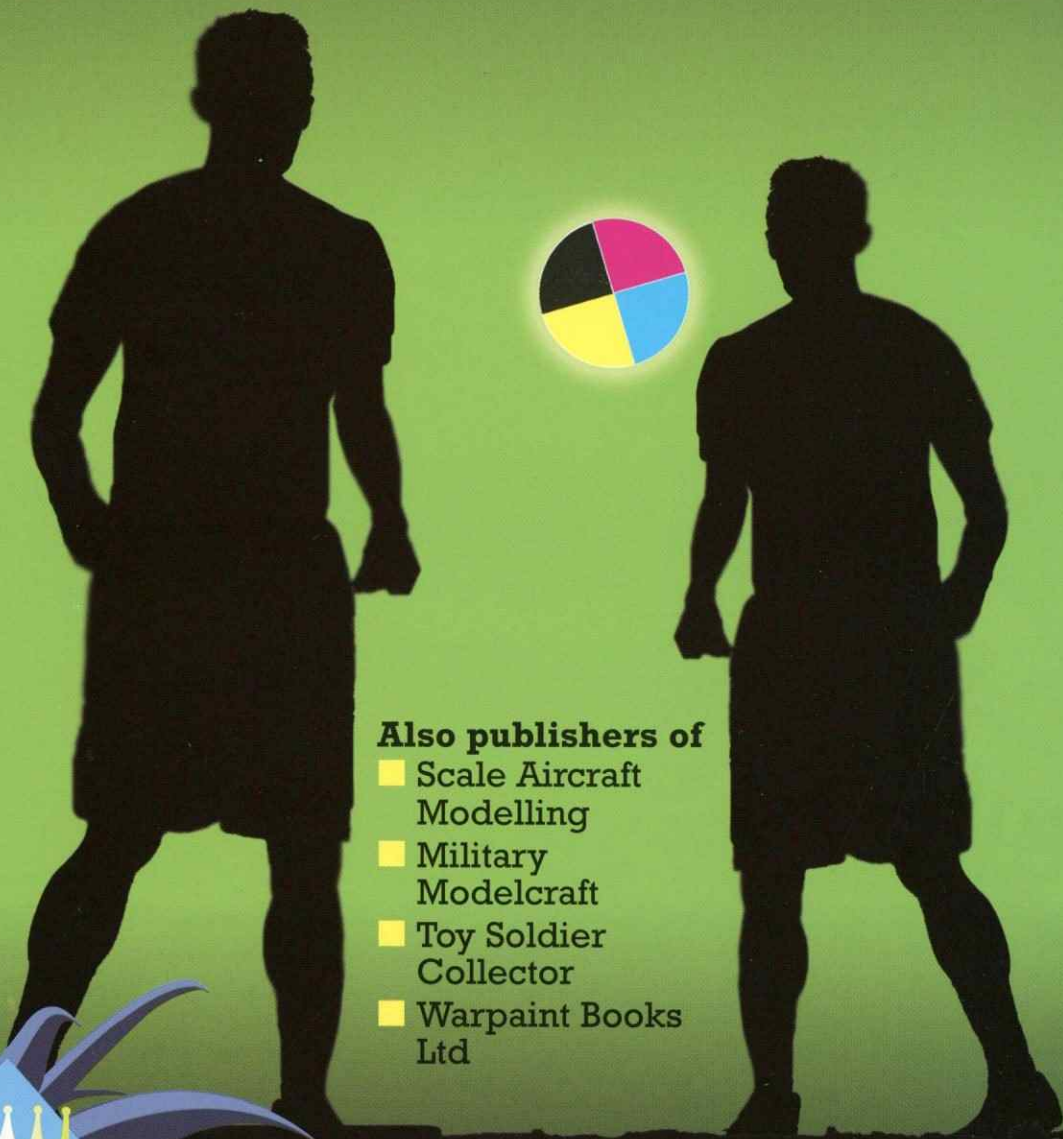

Town then struck the woodwork on two occasions and it was prolific striker Hickling who made it 2-0 at the break.

And so congratulations to the team on reaching the final at their first ever attempt in the County Cup.

Tommy Mooney opened the home side's account to gift them a 1-0 advantage at half-time.


Their second did not come until the 72nd minute courtesy of Edrissa Sonko.

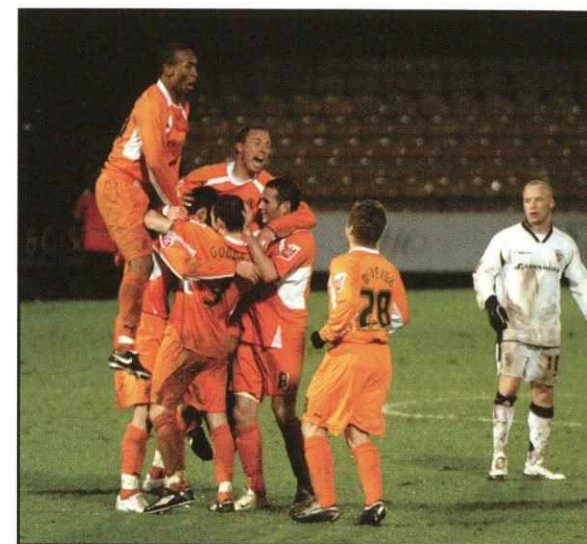

THE A-Z

ROGER WASH looks at every post-war

William (Billy) Donnachie TAYLOR

Billy started out his goalkeeping career with St Johnstone in 1958 and won a Scottish Second Division championship medal with them in 1963. Two years later he won another Second Division medal, this time with Stirling Albion, before joining Partick Thistle.

Luton manager Allan Brown was desperate to sign another goalkeeper, preferably Scottish, to provide competition for Tony Read and with Taylor out of favour at Partick following an injury, the big shot-stopper signed for the Hatters in December 1967.

An injury to Read gave Taylor an immediate chance in the Town's Division Four side but he was never able to win a permanent place in the team and after six appearances in two years he joined Epping Town.

Billy worked at Luton Airport for many years until retirement.

Matthew (Matt) TEES

Matt Tees did not look like a 'goal machine', as he was called on the terraces, being slight and not particularly tall but he was tremendously brave, very strong and phenomenal in the air.

Joining Grimsby from Airdrie in 1963, Matt soon formed a prolific partnership with future Hatter Rodney Green leading to the pair of them moving to Charlton for a joint fee of £23,000 in 1967.

Luton manager Alec Stock, looking for a partner for his young striker Malcolm Macdonald, managed to prise Matt from Charlton for £25,000 in 1969 and he proved a wonderful tutor as well as weighing in with his share of goals as the Town won promotion from Division Three in 1970. Job done, Matt moved back to Grimsby, where he had earned legend status, to finish his playing career and he still lives in the area in retirement.



Paul Norman TELFER

Paul came to Luton Town as a Youth Trainee in 1988, along with his Edinburgh youth club playing colleague Darren Salton, before signing professional forms in November of that year.

A genuine utility player, Paul made his League debut for the Hatters in a 0-1 defeat at Everton in May 1991 and soon made a first team spot his own, usually playing on the right side of midfield and regularly getting on the goalscoring charts.

It was with great regret that the Town sold the remarkably consistent and popular performer to Coventry for £1.5 million in 1995 and since that time the Scottish international has continued to play top flight football in England and Scotland until this campaign when he signed on for Bournemouth.



Anthony (Tony) Charles THEAR

After failing to make the grade at Arsenal, the Edmonton born striker was snapped up by Fourth Division Luton in 1966 as a hoped for replacement for the recently departed John O'Rourke.

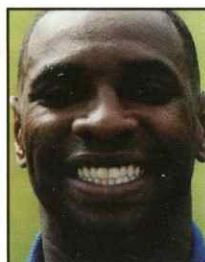
Tony burst on the Kenilworth Road scene in remarkable fashion scoring twice on his full League debut during a 4-0 win over Aldershot in September 1966 and followed it up with another pair in his next game when Rochdale were seen off 3-1. Sadly that was as good as it got for Tony who scored only once more before losing his place in the aftermath of the horrendous 1-8 thrashing at Lincoln in December 1966. New manager Allan Brown then brought in ex-England international Derek Kevan and allowed Tony to move on to Gillingham in February 1967.

Finding it tough at Priestfield, Tony moved on to Bedford and Folkestone before becoming player-manager of Dunstable. Tony now lives in Ascot.

Mitchell Anthony THOMAS

Local boy Mitchell joined Luton Town from school and made his League debut at 18 in a 3-2 win at West Ham in December 1982. After earning a regular place in the Hatters top flight side during the following campaign the tall and elegant full back was looked on as a future England international and his standing was enhanced further when Steve Foster joined the Town and bullied him into even greater efforts. Mitchell controversially left Luton in 1986 to join ex-manager David Pleat at Tottenham but came back to Kenilworth Road seven years later, via West Ham, this time in the Foster role!

After finishing his first class career at Burnley, Mitchell became a players agent.

Alan THOMPSON

Although born in Goole, Alan was brought up in Luton and came to the attention of the Hatters when starring for West Park Juniors, a local youth side.

After initially signing on for the Town as an amateur, Alan signed professional forms in December 1949 but two years on National Service, a broken leg and severe competition for places meant that the quick-tackling full-back had to wait until March 1957 before making his League bow.

Playing at left back in a 0-2 defeat at Preston turned out to be Alan's only first team game and he joined Bedford in July 1957 before working for many years at Whitbread.

Steven (Steve) Anthony THOMPSON

Following ten years at Bolton, who at the time yo-yoed between Divisions Three and Four, cultured midfielder Steve probably thought that his chances of playing in the top flight had passed him by until Luton manager David Pleat stepped in with a bid of £180,000 in August 1991.

It soon became apparent that he lacked pace at the top level, and so after five games Steve was swiftly off-loaded to Leicester in exchange for Des Linton and Scott Oakes. At Filbert Street Steve helped the Foxes to three successive play-offs with the third successful at which time he moved on to Burnley!

Steve finished his playing career with spells at Rotherham and Halifax.

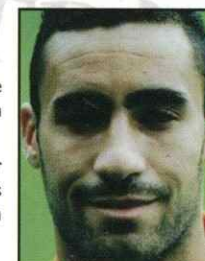


Peter David THOMSON

Rejected by his home town club Bury, tall striker Peter drifted into non-League football with Chorley and then Lancaster before a bizarre £25,000 move to Dutch club NAC Breda.

He got over a broken leg to score goals in the Dutch Eriversi before Luton manager Ricky Hill paid £100,000 for his services in September 2000. Playing in a poor Hatters side, Peter sadly did not look the part and his only League goals for the club came in a shock 3-1 victory at Stoke in December 2000.

After being sent out on loan to Rushden, new Luton boss Joe Kinnear allowed him to leave and he later turned out for Southport and more recently Altrincham.



Robert (Bobby) THOMSON

Menstrie born Bobby started his playing career with Partick Thistle before winning a dream move to Bill Shankly's Liverpool in December 1962.

A teak tough full-back, Bobby made only six Division One appearances for the Anfield club so was glad to accept a move to Luton in August 1965 to gain regular first-team football.

The Hatters had been relegated to Division Four that summer but made a brave albeit ultimately unsuccessful bid for immediate promotion aided by the uncompromising right-back play of Bobby.

Season 1966/67 proved to be the Town's worst in their history and although Bobby performed well he became part of the major cull at the club in the summer of 1967 and emigrated to Australia where he still lives in retirement.

Robert (Bobby) Anthony THOMSON

Classy full-back Bobby joined Wolves from school in 1961 and went on to make 278 League appearances at Molineux in a long career as well as pick up a host of representative honours including eight caps for England.

Bobby moved on a £40,000 transfer to Birmingham in 1969 but within two years was a forgotten man in Blues reserves until he was rescued by Luton manager Harry Haslam in 1972.

Enjoying a new lease of life, Bobby was ever-present during his first two seasons at Kenilworth Road as an overlapping left back, during which time the Hatters won promotion to the top flight and it was only the increasingly loud claims from the talented Steve Buckley that eventually saw him lose his place.

After leaving Luton, Bobby had some success in the USA, was player manager of Stafford Rangers and ran a sports shop in Sedgley

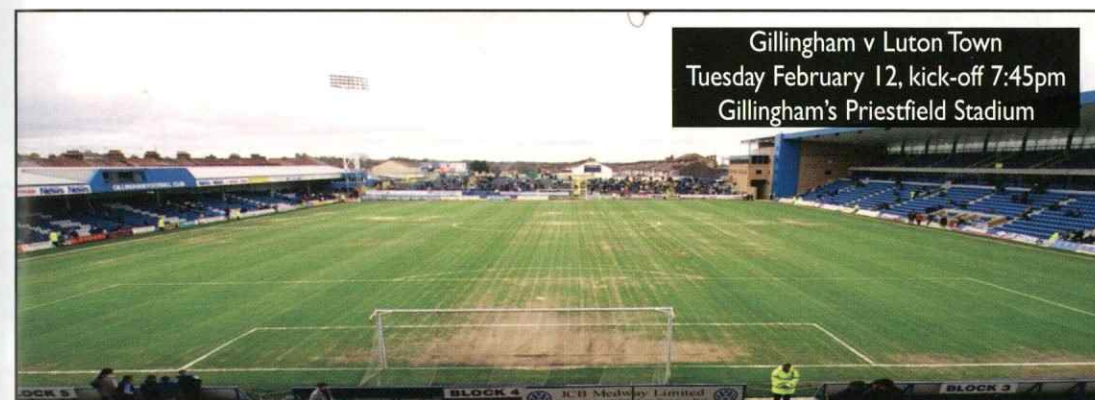

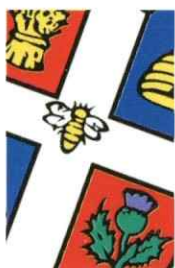

With the Club seemingly on the brink of administration, Bournemouth have responded to their troubles off the pitch with some much-needed points on it.

The Cherries have recorded back-to-back wins in recent days to leapfrog the Hatters in the League One table.

Although fans continue to be despondent with their manager Kevin Bond, the players have remained focused on the job in hand to give them some hope of avoiding the drop.

A ten point deduction will probably seal their own fate, but with administration not yet confirmed, Bournemouth have not given up hope on remaining a League One side next season.

The Club were recently given more time to try to stave off the threat of administration.

A second notice of intention to appoint an administrator has been accepted in court - giving them a further period of protection from their creditors.

Rumours have been rife in Bournemouth that Bond was leading a consortium to buy the troubled club, a story which has certainly not gone down well with the Cherries fans.

But Bond has quashed rumours that he and his father John are investing in the club.

The Bournemouth boss said: "Neither have we got the funds or the inclination to get involved in taking a football club on.

"I've got it all on at the moment, and it's not on my agenda whatsoever."

Meanwhile, Bournemouth's players recently showed a support of unity by backing their under pressure boss.

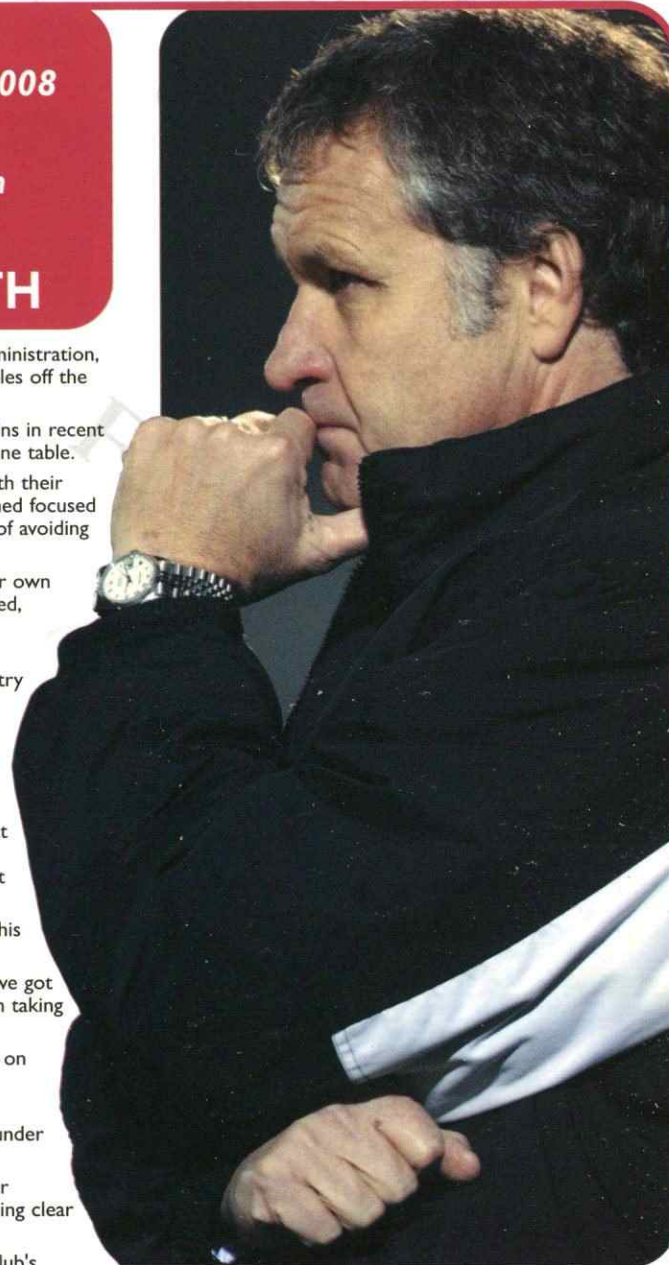
Cherries supporters stayed behind after their recent victory over Luton to make their feeling clear that they didn't want Bond as their manager.

And midfielder Danny Holland's insists the club's unhappy fans shouldn't direct their anger at the manager.

Holland said: "It's a bit unfair towards the gaffer. There are 11 players out there and we are all in this together.

"It's unhelpful when the fans vent their frustrations in this way. We need everyone to get behind the team at this critical period in the season."

If Bournemouth can continue to pick up points on the field, it will certainly go a long way to easing the frustration around Dean Court at the current time.
