



However, we know that we have to repeat that performance again tonight and not let it be a one-off.







Plans for Independent Football Ombudsman revealed



An Independent Football Ombudsman (IFO) is to be created in time for next season, and will replace the existing Independent Football Commission (IFC).

The IFO will have a clear remit to receive and adjudicate on complaints from football supporters and participants which have not been resolved by the football authorities, and to raise any policy issues which have been highlighted by those complaints, directly with The FA, Premier League and The Football League.

This change, made in agreement with DCMS, recognises the considerable work done by all the football authorities in recent years since the IFC was formed in 2001.

In that time, often prompted by the good work of the IFC, the football authorities and clubs have become much more effective in the way they deal with their supporters, have adopted customer charters and improved their formal complaints procedures.

Current IFC Chair Professor Derek Fraser and IFC Commissioner Alan Watson will take on the role of IFO and Deputy IFO respectively, to provide continuity.

The creation of an Ombudsman will maintain a position as the independent and final arbiter of football complaints. The football authorities continue to be committed to the highest standards of self-regulation that have seen only 26 complaints referred to the IFC since 2001.



MY FIRST MATCH

Luton Town v Manchester City
Football League Division One
Saturday 26 April 1975

I was born in Luton in 1955 and, according to my dad, was taken to my very first match as a tiny lad in short trousers at some time during the 1958-61 period.

My family moved away from Luton during my childhood, but as I grew up I chose to support the club from my place of birth. Once I was old enough to drive, I returned to Kenilworth Road in the mid-1970s to begin watching the Hatters regularly.

Thus I count as my first 'official' match the end-of-season thriller between Town and Manchester City in April 1975. We needed to win to have a

good chance of avoiding relegation from the top flight and the tension and excitement was so great that I was instantly hooked and have been a regular ever since.

By now horrendous orange shirts had become the first-choice kit – rumour had it that comedian and director Eric Morecambe had designed them. Funnily enough I later took ownership of one of these shirts – one that had actually been worn by the legendary No.10 Bob Hatton. My brother gave it to me after 'liberating it' from the dressing room area after a match!

Getting back to my 'first' match... it was actually the final Saturday of 1974-5 and it was essential we beat City this sunny April day to have a chance of staying in the top division. A recent surge of good form meant Chelsea and Carlisle were now below us in the table, and the last relegation spot would go to either us or Spurs.

The atmosphere was electric. Inspired by the buccaneering front-running of Aussie international Adrian Alston, Luton had recently chalked up some great wins and looked capable of pulling off a shock by avoiding the drop. City, however, were near the top and had stars like Rodney Marsh and Colin Bell in their ranks.

Things got off to a bad start when Hatters winger Jimmy Ryan made a mistake that led to Dennis Tueart opening the scoring. Roared on by the anxious crowd of 20,000-plus, Luton tried desperately to get back on terms.

The equaliser finally came on 72 minutes and the roar nearly brought the Main Stand down. Big Joe Corrigan was caught off his line by eagle-eyed Ryan, who made up for his earlier blunder with a glorious lob from 30 yards out.

Young local lad Andy King came on as sub for his debut and Haslam pushed men forward in a bid to snatch the winner. But City somehow held firm and we were all left frustrated. Our season was over and we found ourselves one point ahead of Spurs. The Londoners played their last match 48 hours later and – to the horror of Luton fans listening on their radios – beat a disinterested Leeds 4-2, which kept them up and sent Luton down.

After the City game my brother and I hung around the Maple Road car park to catch a glimpse of the players. There was great excitement when Paul Futcher emerged and asked us to hold his packet of crisps while he signed autographs. We thought about running off with this 'souvenir', but the exhausted Futcher looked like he needed the nourishment so we thought better of it.

The fascinating 1974-5 season ended that day, but my Luton-fixation had only just begun. Thirty-three years and 600-plus games later, I'm still here.

WELCOME TO MILLWALL

The MILLWALL Story
Beginnings: 1885

SCOTS workers at Morton's Jam Factory on the Isle of Dogs in East London formed Millwall Rovers in 1885. Being Scottish, they chose blue and white as their colours to match the Scots flag. They changed their name to Millwall Athletic and later simply to Millwall. The club played initially in the Southern League, although they had some early successes in the FA Cup, reaching the Semi-Finals in 1903 before losing 3-0 to Derby. In 1920, they became founder members of League Division Three.

Top Player: Sheringham

TEDDY Sheringham scored 111 goals for Millwall in almost eight years. Those strikes saw the Lions rise from the old Division Three to a 10th place finish top-flight. The elegant and exciting striker was a huge crowd favourite and left Millwall £2m in the bank when he joined Nottingham Forest. He went on to win 50 England caps as well as picking up a Champions League medal with Manchester United in 1999.

Top Manager: Graham

BEFORE he went on to a glittering career with Arsenal, Leeds and Tottenham Hotspur, George Graham's first managerial job was with Millwall. He took over in December 1982 when the team were floundering in Division Three, and not only kept them up but revolutionised the club, won promotion two seasons later to Division Two and set them on the road to Division One.

Top Game:

Millwall 3-2 Queen's Park Rangers
Division One: October 1, 1988

HAVING been promoted as champions of Division Two the season before, Millwall got off to a great start in their first-ever season in the top flight, with three wins and two draws in their first five games. Top Game:

HAVING been promoted as champions of Division Two the season before, Millwall got off to a great start in their first-ever season in the top flight, with three wins and two draws in their first five games. This victory, with goals from Tony Cascarino (2) and Teddy Sheringham, briefly put them top of Division One as they went on to finish the season in 10th place, their highest-ever position.

MILLWALL fans haven't really had much to shout about this season. But the arrival of Kenny Jackett as Manager has certainly given a new wave of optimism around the New Den.

With only one win in their first ten matches, manager Willie Donachie was sacked with Richard Shaw taking over temporarily. It looked as if the Lions could be in for a long, hard season.

But on November 6, Manchester City reserve team coach Jackett took the reins at the New Den, charged with stabilising the club and moving them up the table.

He had mixed fortunes in his first two games in charge.

First he saw his side come from behind to beat 10-man Altrincham 2-1 in the FA Cup. Then they led at Bristol Rovers for 70 minutes before conceding two late goals to give Rovers their first home win of the season.

But victories over Yeovil, Bournemouth and Leyton Orient immediately had helped lift some of the gloom.

However, inconsistency in recent weeks has meant the pressure has returned to the New Den and the

Lions are now in the thick of a relegation battle.

And with tricky matches against Leeds United, Swansea City and Carlisle United all around the corner, it could go right down to the wire for the men from South London.


The last couple of years at the Den have been turbulent both on and off the pitch, with changes in management as well as a plethora of new signings and loan deals to strengthen their squad.

Times were already tough for the Lions on their last visit to Kenilworth Road back in August 2005 when Luton beat the Londoners 2-1, with goals from Warren Feeney and Curtis Davies.

Jackett has made plenty of changes in the January transfer window and strengthened his team in many areas - including adding some familiar old Luton faces to his squad.

Ahmet Brkovic made the short move down the M1 whilst Adrian Forbes,

who had played a pivotal role helping Blackpool win promotion to the Championship last season, moved to the New Den to help bolster Jackson's striking options.

Marcus Bignot is another player who has plenty of experience in League One and has bolstered the Lions back-line whilst David Martin looks to be a bargain after moving from Crystal Palace in a £50,000.

The on-form player for goals at the moment is defender Alan Dunne. The Republic of Ireland man had a frustrating time at the start of his career at Millwall with recurring ankle injuries, but has blossomed into a capable and solid player since.

Alongside Dunne is Millwall's Player Of The Year Richard Shaw. Popular with the fans, he has teamed up with Paul Robinson at the back.

Andy Frampton commands the midfield for the Lions after signing in

the summer from Brentford. On-loan striker Will Hoskins has repaid Jackett with three goals so far since his loan deal from Watford. After scoring 16 goals for Rotherham last season, Hoskins moved to Vicarage Road in January.

Another force to be reckoned with is Gary Alexander. Originally a West Ham youth player, Alexander signed this summer from Leyton Orient, where he was top scorer for the third time in 2006-07.

Now Jackett will be looking to these players to start showing they can turn things around and keep the Lions out of the third tier of English football.

How has this season gone?

What are Millwall's aims this season?

I'm not that good at making predictions, but Nottingham Forest was my tip at the start of the season so I will have to stick with them. If Swansea can hold onto their manager then they will be up there as well.

The Captain

Paul
05 Robinson

Despite making his debut for the Lions in January 2003, Paul Robinson had to wait some considerable time before really establishing himself as a Millwall regular. After working through the Academy and Reserve sides, it wasn't until Millwall hit a list of injuries that Robinson got his break. In the absence of Stuart Nethercott, Joe Dolan and Mark Phillips, he grabbed his opportunity with both hands. He continued his excellent form during the 2003/04 season until damaging his cruciate knee ligaments at Norwich City in November 2003. Having made a full recovery, Robinson has now re-established himself as a vital member of the first-team and was a regular in the side during the last two seasons, during which he has also taken over as team captain. He has also spent time on loan at Torquay United, where he made 12 appearances.



Goalkeepers

Lenny Pidgeley

A former England U21 international goalkeeper who joined The Lions in the summer of 2006. Previously with Premiership giants Chelsea, he gained some valuable first team experience whilst on a season-long loan at Watford.

Chris Day

Began his career at Tottenham before moving on to Crystal Palace. Chris Day enjoyed a significant spell at Queens Park Rangers where he clocked up nearly 100 senior appearances before heading north to Preston and Oldham. Joined Millwall in 2006.

Defenders

Danny Senda

Started his career as a trainee striker at Southampton and joined Wycombe in 1998 to improve his chances of regular first-team football. He stayed at Wycombe for several years, before he moved to Millwall.



Zak Whitbread

American born defender who started his career at Liverpool. Despite finding it difficult to establish himself as a regular at Anfield, he quickly settled in at Millwall, where he initially joined on loan. He made the move permanent when he signed a three-year contract in June 2006.

Andy Frampton

After being spotted by Crystal Palace at the age of 11, Andy Frampton eventually broke into the first team at Selhurst Park and made 35 appearances from 1998-2003 before switching to Brentford. He was signed in the summer of 2007 by Millwall.

Zoumana Bakayogo

A pacy defender, who has previously spent time on-loan at Brighton.

Zoumana Bakayogo

Was the Club's Caretaker Manager prior to Kenny Jackett's appointment. The defender began his career at Crystal Palace, where he graduated from an apprentice. He then moved to Coventry and spent over 11 years at the Midlands club, making over 300 appearances.

Marcus Bignot

Enjoyed the best part of his career at QPR, where he had two spells. He is currently on-loan from Loftus Road, recently agreeing to extend his stay at the Club. He previously helped Rushden & Diamonds win the League Two title.


Scott Barron


Snapped up by Millwall in July 2007 from Leyton Orient after finishing as The O's top scorer for the third time in 2006/7 to further cement his reputation. Gary signed for the O's in January 2003, and went on to hit 16 goals in his first full season at Brisbane Road. Although an ankle injury meant he spent much of the following campaign on the treatment table, he still made it into double figures. Promising midfielder who is rated highly by all at the New Den and is predicted to have a promising future within the game. A Ghanaian midfielder, Ali likes to get forward at any opportunity and support the Lions attack.



Strikers

Neil Harris

Neil returned to his beloved Millwall for a second time in January 2007 - nearly two years after leaving the club for Nottingham Forest. He first joined The Lions in a £30,000 deal from non-League Cambridge City prior to the transfer deadline in 1998. Barely two years later, Harris had established himself as one of the most feared marksmen outside the Premiership, scoring 25 League goals in 1999/2000, and attracting offers of over £1 million for his signature. Instead of moving on, Neil signed a new improved four year deal with Millwall in May 2000, and netted a further 28 goals in 2000/2001, sharing the 'Golden Boot' with Jamie Cureton as joint-top League goalscorer in Division Two (27). Less than a week after signing yet another improved deal came the bombshell news that Neil had testicular cancer and following an operation he embarked on a course of radiotherapy treatment. He returned to action before Christmas and scored a sensational goal during The Lions 4-0 win at Watford on New Year's Day - his first in Division One. A former Liverpool trialist, Harris had been trialed by a number of League clubs, but it was Millwall's Senior Scout Bob Pearson who was most convinced of the striker's potential, which was revealed with 18 goals in his first full season, landing him the Player of the Year accolade in 1999/2000.




Lewis Grabban



Hatters tame table-topping Lions

Date: Saturday September 3, 1936
Place: Kenilworth Road

The Hatters team line up during their record breaking 1936/37 campaign when they won the championship of Division Three (South) and with it promotion to the old Division Two. One of the major turning points of an eventful season was a clash with heavyweight fellow promotion contender Millwall at the old Den.

Although the Town's early season home form had been superb, away from Kenilworth Road results had not been too clever and leading up to the visit to Millwall on 21st November the Town had suffered three defeats in succession.

Millwall, on the other hand, were enjoying their best season for years and a massive crowd of 32,504 turned up to see if the Lions could go clear at the top. But the Luton players had other ideas by winning the game 2-0.

'Chiltern', reporting in the 'Luton News' confirmed that the Town played "with a relentlessness and determination

hitherto unknown in their away games this season and ran the home side to a standstill." The Town defence soaked up a fair amount of pressure but kept the Millwall forwards at arms length with Luton skipper Jack Nelson following the dangerous Dave Mangnall everywhere.


With swift counter-attacking causing endless problems to Millwall it came as no real surprise when Fred Roberts put the Town into the lead with an unstoppable shot a minute from the interval.

The second half mirrored the first with the Town emphasising their superiority and doing more of the attacking. The game was eventually settled ten minutes from the end when Joe Payne hit a centre from Jack Ball on the volley past the stationary Duncan Yuill in the Millwall goal.

The home crowd were finally given something to get excited about when Mangnall, presumably out of frustration, engaged in "a bout of fisticuffs" with Nelson. The referee did not have a clear view of the incident and decided to book both players rather than send them off, but a large crowd gathered outside the ground afterwards to have a word with Nelson as he made his way to the coach.

Mangnall defused the situation however, by escorting Nelson up the steps and shaking his hand. Unfortunately the matter did not end there because Stanley Rous, then Secretary of the FA, was attending the match and subsequently arranged for both players to attend a hearing where they received lengthy suspensions.

The ramifications of this 'underhand' punishment reverberated around Fleet Street for weeks afterwards. I wonder what everyone would have thought about today's 'trial by television'?







Not far behind was keeper George Harford who played 107 games from 1929-1934 before he moved to Carlisle. Harry Bailey, another keeper, appeared 89 times in 1920-22 before joining Exeter. William Stewart returned to Kenilworth Road from Millwall in 1899, after just a season away. In 1897-98, he scored 12 goals in 33 games for the Hatters, and in his second spell he played 20 times without scoring. Trevor Aylott hit 11 goals in 35 matches in two seasons from 1982-84. 





The Hatters came within ten minutes of picking up a well-earned draw, but a Thomas Butler strike broke Luton hearts.

Luton's cause wasn't helped when Sol Davis was sent-off for a second bookable offence, but at least the Hatters showed glimpses of their former self with a stubborn performance.

Chances were few and far between and it took 16 minutes for the first shot of the game to arrive when a weak Ferrie Boddie effort was comfortably saved by Hatters shot-stopper Dean Brill.

Luton responded by going close to an opener on 20 minutes when Davis found space down the left flank to whip over a cross that was headed over the bar by the unmarked Drew Talbot.

The second half started in a similar fashion to the first half with Swansea looking bright on the ball, but without creating much in front of goal.

Luton soon began to enjoy their best spell of the game and on 58 minutes Sam Parkin found space down the left and his cross was helped on by Talbot and found David Bell, whose shot was charged down by Marcos Painter.


Talbot's pace was causing the Swansea defence problems and on 66 minutes the former Sheffield Wednesday man made a darting run inside the area, but his acute angled shot flew straight into the arms of Dorus De Vries.

Luton's chances of taking home a point were made tougher when Davis picked up his second yellow card of the game, just eight minutes after picking up his first booking.


On 78 minutes, Luton were saved by a splendid Brill save as Alan Tate stole in at the front post to guide a bullet header towards the Hatters goal.



An interview with

DREW TALBOT

ALTHOUGH it was another defeat on their travels, Luton certainly did themselves proud with a spirited performance against League One leaders Swansea on Friday night.

The Hatters were more than a match for the Welsh club, a side that had opened up an 11 point gap at the top of the division prior to the start of the game.

And for striker Drew Talbot it was a display from the Hatters that sent out a clear message to everybody in the division that their fight to stay in the league is clearly not over.

With back-to-back home games coming up, Talbot believes now is the perfect opportunity to close the gap on the teams directly above them in the League One table.

Speaking after the 1-0 loss at the Liberty Stadium, Talbot said: "I don't think you should be playing football if you're going to quit."

"The lads are gutted, because everyone has worked their socks off, given 110% and in a moments lapse of concentration we have conceded the goal.

"We keep saying that we need to win this game, but we are running out of time. We have to keep knuckling down and keep going. If we don't win soon we know we will be in trouble - it's as simple as that."

Talbot believes there were many positive factors that Luton could take from the match, but admits that Lady Luck is currently not with the Hatters.

The striker added: "Swansea are top of the league, you've got to respect that. We came here with a game plan and we did alright, I didn't think we looked like we were going to concede a goal to be honest."

"The click is not there at the moment, but if we can continue playing like that I think we can beat most teams in the division, so

hopefully we can put in more performances like that.

"I think if anybody was watching the game tonight they could see that we are a team who are close to winning games.

"We've got to get back to how we used to be at home, where teams came and left Kenilworth Road with nothing, and we snatched a win."

can take the Swansea performance into their remaining games this season.

But the former Sheffield Wednesday man knows how more important it is to recapture the form at Kenilworth Road that had been so impressive at the start of the season.

He continued: "It's down to us to keep repeating performances like that every week. We have got to keep our fingers crossed that we can get a win against Millwall tonight, because it's a massive game."

"We've got to get back to how we used to be at home, where teams came and left Kenilworth Road with nothing, and we snatched a win or ended up being comfortable. Its got to get back to that stage."

"I don't think the spirit in the camp has ever been the problem. We are a good team, we pushed Liverpool all the way and we have got the ability to get ourselves out of trouble."

"The fight is absolutely not over. You know you're in the wrong business if you're just going to quit. All the lads in the dressing room, even the lads that are injured, are fighting to get back and help us out and we'll fight to the death to be honest."

Meanwhile, Talbot confirmed that there was interest in him during the January transfer window to go to Italy, but he chose to help Luton in their League One survival campaign.

"I didn't even consider it. How can you make a decision in 48 hours to move and go to a different country? That was just never on the cards really."


"I wanted to stay and help Luton out. I didn't come down here for the short term and I signed on a three-and-a-half year deal so I am here for the long term."

"We deserved to go a goal in front at the break and even though it took us a while to get into our stride we deserved the win.


"Ryan is in good form at the moment. He is scoring goals for fun and I am pleased with his progress."

Millwall 3 Port Vale 0



M**Scott WARD**

Harrow born Scott came up through the ranks at Luton before signing professional forms in October 1998 and became highly regarded at Kenilworth Road as a goalkeeper of promise.

Scott enjoyed a remarkable introduction to League football when coming off the substitute's bench after Mark Ovendale had received a red card at Brentford in May 2001. His first job was to face a penalty from the Bee's Lloyd Owusu which he turned round the post before acquitting himself well in an eventual 2-2 draw.

Sadly, Hatters manager Joe Kinnear preferred to use the more experienced Ovendale and Carl Emberson between the sticks the following season leaving no chance for the frustrated Scott who departed from Luton in 2002.

Scott was last playing for London Colney.

John WARNER

Another player who made only a single appearance for the Hatters, Ashington born but Hemel Hempstead raised John made a meteoric rise from the club's fourth team to making his League debut in a Division One clash at home to Burnley in October 1959.

A part-time professional, John had been pushed into a friendly match against Banik Ostrava at Kenilworth Road earlier that season and had starred on the left wing. This gave rise to his elevation to the League eleven but the occasion was a little too much for him and he was not given another opportunity.

After leaving Luton, John had spells at Yiewsley and Amersham before returning to Hemel Hempstead where he lived until recently.

Charles (Charlie) WATKINS

Charlie made his name at Glasgow Rangers in war-time football but after the end of hostilities he found that he was often marginalised at Ibrox due the huge professional playing staff there at the time.

Following the advice of old playing colleague Billy Arnison, Charlie accepted a move to Luton in 1948 and there began a love affair with the town which never waned apart from a five year spell in South Africa in the late 1950's where he went as a coach.

A clever and skilful wing-half or inside-forward, Charlie made over 200 League appearances for the Hatters and signed off with two goals against Bristol Rovers in 1955 which virtually assured promotion to the top flight.

Charlie held a physiotherapist and chiropodist practice in the town for many years, came back to Kenilworth Road as a coach under George Martin and was still playing football for the local Round Table well into his 60's.

Charlie sadly passed away in 1998.

Julian WATTS

Tall and mobile central defender Julian had played only a handful of games for Rotherham when he was snapped up by Sheffield Wednesday in 1992 for £130,000.

Julian found it tough to break through at Hillsborough but it was still a surprise when he moved to Leicester in 1996 and the Owls fans were proved right when he helped his new club to promotion to the top flight.

After moving on to Bristol City in 1998, Julian came to Luton a year later and was virtually ever present for 18 months until falling out with new manager Joe Kinnear and deciding on a fresh start with Northern Spirit in Sydney. After returning to these shores in 2004 Julian set up a business in Worksop.


Mark Robert WATTS

After several brilliant displays on the wing for Luton reserves, Welham Green born Mark was suddenly thrust into the Hatters first team in a home FA Cup Third Round clash with Peterborough in January 1983 replacing the injured David Moss.

With Moss still injured the teenager, who had come up through the ranks at Kenilworth Road, did enough to keep his place the following week for the visit of Tottenham in a top flight League fixture.

The return of Argentine maestro Ossie Ardiles to the Spurs line-up for the first time since the end of the Falklands war swelled the gate to 21,231, a figure never subsequently bettered at Kenilworth Road, and in this tense atmosphere Mark set up the Luton goal in a 1-1 draw.

Surprisingly, Mark was never given another first team chance and he is now living in Cheshunt and works in London as a market trader in fruit and vegetables.



OF LUTON TOWN

player to have appeared for THE HATTERS in the Football League

William (Billy) Lindsay WAUGH

Stationed at Bicester during the war, Billy was alerted to Luton officials by his father leading to him signing for the Town in 1944.

A super-fast winger, Billy was nicknamed 'Rabbit' by the Hatter's fans and although not a prolific goalscorer, laid on many chances for the likes of Hugh Billington. After becoming the first Luton player to top 100 League appearances after the war, Billy fell out with manager Dally Duncan and transferred to QPR in 1950.

Following a three year spell at Loftus Road, Billy enjoyed a season at Bournemouth before several stints at non-League clubs combined with a job as an insurance agent. Billy then spent thirty years as general secretary for Electrolux Sports before retiring in 1986. A sprightly 86, Billy has recently moved from Luton to Felixstowe.


**Roy Connon WEGERLE**

Born in South Africa, Roy was only young when he moved to the USA but after starting his footballing career playing for the University of South Florida he was picked up by Tampa Bay Rowdies where his displays soon alerted European clubs.

Roy was then poached by Chelsea but was used only sparingly at Stamford Bridge leading to Luton taking a gamble on him in 1988. After a slow start, Roy suddenly burst into life with his superb close control, balance and scoring ability, especially on the Kenilworth Road artificial surface, and his performances helped the Hatters to a second successive date at Wembley for the Littlewoods Cup final.

Sadly, finances dictated that a £1 million bid from QPR, a record for both clubs at the time, was accepted in December 1989 and Roy went on to become a favourite at Loftus Road before becoming less successful following further big money moves to Blackburn and Coventry.

Roy re-invented himself when returning to the States, becoming a star in the MSL and earning call-ups for the national side. Now involved in media work in the USA, Roy is also a golfer of note.

**James (Jimmy) WEIR**

Glasgow born Jimmy was playing for Clydebank Juniors when Fulham scouts enticed him to Craven Cottage but after three years and three league appearances he moved on to York in 1960. Winger Jimmy proved a revelation at Bootham Crescent, netting 38 goals in 82 starts for the Minstermen, and the supporters were mightily disappointed when he left to join Mansfield who he helped to promotion to the old Division Three.

Joining Luton at the end of August 1963 for £5,000, Jimmy failed to show his previous form as a goalscoring winger in a poor Luton side and after losing his place to teenager Ray Whittaker moved on to Tranmere. Jimmy finished his football career at Midland League side Scarborough, and then settled in the town working as a coachbuilder until retirement.

Michael (Micky) Graham WEIR

Micky joined his local club, Hibernian, from school and after working his way up through the ranks at Easter Road embarked on a long time infatuation with the club and its supporters.

Already a terrace favourite at Hibs, the 21 year old was not happy when contract terms broke down leading to a tribunal set £230,000 move to Luton in 1987.

A classic Scottish winger, Luton fans never saw the best of him although he did score the goal at Wigan that set the Town up on their road to Wembley in the 1987/88 Littlewoods Cup. Four months after signing for Luton the homesick Scot returned to Hibs to resume what was to become a long career which only ended when he took on a coaching role at Motherwell.

Alan WEST

After being spotted by Burnley scouts while playing for his school team in Hyde, Alan joined one of the best youth set-ups in the country and became part of the Clarets side that lifted the FA Youth cup in 1968.

A midfielder of skill and vision, Alan made over 50 appearances for Burnley and picked up an England Under-23 cap before a big bid from Sunderland was accepted in 1973. Amazingly, Alan failed a medical because of a back problem but Luton manager Harry Haslam immediately stepped in, leading to an eight year stay at Kenilworth Road and 285 League appearances!

Since leaving the professional game, Alan has been a church minister in Luton for many years and has recently recovered from serious illness.

You can only sit and admire the job that former Hatters defender Richard Money is achieving at Walsall.

Money, who played at Kenilworth Road during the early 1980's, is spearheading a promotion charge to the Championship that many Walsall fans wouldn't have predicted at the start of the season.

On a shoestring budget, Money has built a squad that combines a mixture of youth and experience and is surprising many within the game by Walsall's impressive form this season.

In late October, Walsall embarked on a 17 game unbeaten run that has seen them reach a play-off position and has given the Saddlers a real optimistic belief that they can make it into the Championship.

Although there has been blips against Swansea and Carlisle in recent weeks, Walsall are still one of the most inform teams in the division and at the Bescot Stadium boast one of the most impressive home records, not losing there since mid-October.

And the success Money has brought to Walsall this season has even attracted interest elsewhere with Coventry City linked with an approach to the former Scunthorpe boss following the sacking of Iain Dowie.

One of the reasons for Walsall's run of good results has been the form of Tommy Mooney. The much travelled striker is enjoying one of his best seasons for many years with ten goals so far this campaign.

Mooney, who has played at Wycombe, Oxford and Swindon, has been assisted by another experienced striker, Michael Ricketts, whose career earlier this season looked to be over after being released by Oldham.

Ricketts, a former England international, has contributed with seven goals, and along with Edriissa Sonko's five goals from midfield this season, Walsall have a well balanced outfit.

Fans favourite Darren Wrack, approaching his tenth full season as a Walsall player, is still going strong in the heart of the Saddlers midfield whilst in Clayton Ince, the Club have one of the best goalkeepers outside the top two divisions.

Luton were winners when the two sides last met at Kenilworth Road when a Kevin Nicholls penalty settled a 1-0 win in 2005.
