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

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
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## THE FARMERS MATCH

## A word with the Chairman



Tonight's visitors, Luton Town, have indeed experienced a difficult season as they fell into administration and suffered the loss of points. I do sympathise with them and extend to their officials, players and supporters a very warm welcome to Brunton Park.

What an experience it was last Monday evening at Nottingham when our players turned in a strong performance for the third game in succession. The group of players we have at present is one of the best there has been in my time at the club, and the bond to succeed as a team comes out very strong. I think we have seen this in recent games and, together with John, Gregg and Dennis out-thinking the opposition tactically, it has been a great advantage.

The only black spot at Nottingham to spoil the evening was due to a drugs test. The team coach did not leave the city ground until 11.30 pm and it was after 3am when we arrived back at Brunton Park. You do not know when these tests are going to come along but, on arriving at the ground, we found at that it was happening, and two players from each team had to be selected to go through the procedure after the game. It is well known that these tests can take well over two hours and this turned out to be the fact on Monday.

I think the FA drugs section are completely out of order in selecting tests to be carried out at games, especially evening matches, when clubs, as we did, have long journeys home. I did approach the drugs team and expressed my displeasure,

saying that we had a 3 hour journey home, but was told I could do nothing except write to the FA, which we will do. I did say our driver was running out of permitted hours and the reply was that if the test lasted over another half hour they would provide the players with taxis home. I couldn't believe what I was hearing.

One of the latest topics raising its head again in football is police charges and the league are fighting back in an effort to protect clubs. It is an extra cost that we, as a club, are unable to stand, especially when we have no control as to which matches and how many officers are to attend. Many clubs feel that football clubs provide enough services within the community for the police to provide their services at no extra cost.

It is only a few years ago that we were being told by the Football Licensing Authority that clubs would be replacing police with their own stewards, as at other entertainment events. This has been carried out and Carlisle United now have approximately one hundred stewards on their books, who are all trained to the recommended standard. It does appear to me that the police authorities are looking for ways to raise money and football clubs, like motorists, are an easy target. I would say that at Carlisle we have a pretty good relationship with the police, and I hope it can be kept that way.



We encourage supporters to report any misconduct they might witness to the club.

### CUFC RACISM POLICY

Carlisle United Football Club wishes to stress that it will not tolerate any form of racist behaviour whatsoever. Anyone using racist behaviour will be ejected from the Stadium and reported to the relevant authorities. If you hear or see racist behaviour at Brunton Park please report it to the nearest Steward and help us to Kick Racism out of Football.

### EMERGENCY PROCEDURE

In the event of an emergency occurring at the Stadium the Public Address system will be used to broadcast information and instructions to the spectators. Such broadcasts will be preceded by a three-tone chime. When the chimes are heard please be silent, pay attention to what is said and obey any instructions. An example of this alert will be carried out just before kick off and at half time and it will be clearly stated that the announcement is for instructive purposes only.



# Meet the Manager



MICK HARFORD

Since hanging up his boots, Mick Harford has twice had a spell on the coaching staff at Luton, initially as Assistant Manager under Joe Kinnear and more recently as Director of Football for Mike Newell.

During his first spell at the Club he helped mastermind the Hatters' promotion back to the Second Division in 2001/02 and as Director of Football and First Team Coach he played his part in building the side that secured promotion to the Championship, running away with the League One title during 2004/05.

Harford left the Hatters in November 2004 to be re-united with Kinnear at Nottingham Forest. He then took over as Caretaker Manager at Forest in December 2004, replacing Kinnear, for a total of six matches before Gary Megson was confirmed as the new manager at the City Ground.

Having left Forest in January 2005, he had intended to spend the rest of the season helping out old friend Andy King at Swindon Town, however, after a couple of months at the County Ground, he became Manager at Rotherham United, whose relegation from what is now the Championship had already been confirmed.

The eight month spell in charge at Millmoor was the first managerial job he held in his own right and on leaving the club, he had a short spell coaching the forwards at Millwall before he hooked up with his former Derby County team-mate, Geraint Williams of Colchester United in Summer 2006, as his number two, a position he held for a year before the opportunity arrived to join John Gregory - again as an Assistant Manager - at Queens Park Rangers in June 2007.

In October 2007, Harford took caretaker charge at QPR for one month following Gregory's dismissal, losing only once in five games before he himself left the Club when Luigi De Canio took over as a manager.

He will now be in charge of Luton Town until the end of the season 2007/08 season and will be assisted by former Portsmouth and QPR defender Warren Neill.



# The Hatters squad

**CALVIN ANDREW**

After scoring an incredible eight goals in three games for the Under-18 side, Calvin Andrew made his Luton debut in September 2004, making 11 appearances. Andrew was sent out on loan to Grimsby and Bristol City during the 2005/06 season. He scored his first Luton goal in April 2006 but injury at the start of the 2006/07 season hampered his progress under former boss Mike Newell, before he enjoyed an extended run-out during the back end of the season.

**ED ASAFU-ADJAYE**

Ed Asafu-Adjaye is in his first year as a professional footballer having made significant progress through the Club's youth set-up. The full-back, who spent a short time on-loan at non-league side Walton & Hersham, made the breakthrough into the first team under former boss Mike Newell. Kevin Blackwell gave him a one-year contract.

**RICHARD LANGLEY**

Richard Langley signed for Luton Town in July 2006 after being released by former club QPR. A hard working midfielder, Langley started his career at Loftus Road after progressing through their youth ranks. He became a firm favourite at QPR and it was his form that year which prompted Cardiff to splash out £200,000 for the midfielder and which led to him gaining international caps for Jamaica. At the start of the 2003/04 season, Langley scored for Jamaica in international friendlies against Cuba and Paraguay and went on to score six goals for his new club that season.

Unfortunately, Langley couldn't repeat that form for Cardiff in the following season and was transferred back to QPR in August 2005. During his first season at Kenilworth Road, Langley made 21 first-team starts.

**SOL DAVIS**

It was a huge disappointment to Swindon Town, and a coup for Luton, when the highly-rated defender decided to leave the County Ground after his contract expired at the end of the 2001/02 season. Davis had joined Swindon as a trainee in the summer of 1998, and made rapid

progress through the youth and reserve teams to become a regular in the Nationwide League. Sol was unfortunately involved in a serious incident during the 2006/07 season when he suffered a stroke on the team bus prior to the Club's visit to Ipswich Town. Sol however made a miraculous recovery and was back in action against Cardiff City on New Years Day, 2007.

**DARREN CURRIE**

Darren Currie became Kevin Blackwell's third signing of the summer when he signed a two-year deal at Kenilworth Road in July 2007. The experienced midfielder started his career at West Ham United as a trainee. His first senior appearance was with Shrewsbury Town, where he made 66 appearances at Gay Meadow, scoring eight goals during two years at the Shropshire club. An unsuccessful spell at Plymouth followed. During four years at Barnet Currie scored 21 goals in 141 appearances before being transferred to Wycombe in a £200,000 deal, where he scored 20 goals in 143 appearances. After four years at Wycombe, Currie moved to Brighton. His impressive form alerted the attentions of Ipswich boss Joe Royle, who signed the midfielder in a £250,000 deal.



Lewis Emanuel arrived at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2006 after deciding to leave his home town club Bradford City, the place where the defender started his career. Lewis made over 150 appearances for Bradford in six-years at the club, scoring four goals. In his first season at Kenilworth Road he made 40 appearances, scoring twice.

Paul Furlong became the fourth signing by Hatters boss Kevin Blackwell. The striker started his career with non-league Enfield before moving to Coventry City in a £130,000 deal. During his year spent at Coventry, Furlong made 44 appearances, scoring four goals as the Club managed to stave off relegation from Division One during the 1991-92 season. A move to Watford followed and during his time at Vicarage Road he made 92 appearances, hitting the target 41 times before a money spinning move to Chelsea followed. The London club splashed out £2.3 million on the striker and during two years of playing in the Premiership he made 85 appearances and scored 17 times. Birmingham City broke their record transfer fee in July 1996 and took Furlong to St Andrews when they splashed out £1.5 million for his services. At Loftus Road, Furlong became a real fans' favourite. After a

frustrating start to his career at the London club due to injury, he made just short of 200 appearances, scoring 55 goals.

## ALAN GOODALL

Alan, who signed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road, started his career at Welsh club Bangor City in 2001, spending four years at Farrar Road, where he scored ten goals in 91 games. Goodall has also tasted European football as he was part of the Bangor side that lost to Serbia side FK Smederevo in their 2002-03 UEFA Cup campaign. The defender moved to Rochdale in 2004 and went on to become a fans favourite at Spotland, making 131 appearances and scoring eight goals.

## DON HUTCHISON

Don Hutchison became Kevin Blackwell's seventh signing of the summer after he impressed on a trial at the Club during a pre-season tour of Norway. The experienced midfielder signed a one-year contract at the Club as Luton became his ninth club of his illustrious career. Hutchison started his career at Hartlepool United as a trainee, but was quickly spotted by Liverpool in 1990, before moving to Sheffield United and Sunderland. The midfielder signed for West Ham United for a club record transfer fee of £5 million in August 2001. He had previously broken the club's record transfer fee - £1.5 million - when he signed for his spell at the club in August 1994. He joined Millwall in August 2005 after being released at the start of the 2005-06 season by West Ham. He left Millwall in November 2005 and signed for Coventry. During his career, Hutchison played 26 times for Scotland, scoring six goals.

## RICHARD JACKSON

Richard Jackson, one of nine summer signings made by Kevin Blackwell prior to the start of the season, had a distinguished career at Derby County. The full-back was the longest serving player at Pride Park prior to completing a signing a two year deal at Kenilworth Road. Jackson joined Derby in March 1999 from Scarborough after playing only 24

senior games for the Seaside club.

## PAUL MCVEIGH

McVeigh, who signed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road, started his career at Tottenham Hotspur where he made three appearances, before he enjoyed a successful career with Norwich. He joined Norwich in March 2000 on a free transfer and helped Norwich win promotion to the Premiership the following season. During his spells at Tottenham and Norwich, he was capped by Northern Ireland 20 times in total.

## DEAN MORGAN

Morgan moved to Kenilworth Stadium from Reading in July 2005 after seeing his opportunities limited at the Madjeski Stadium. The former Colchester striker scored three league goals in 13 starting appearances for the Royals. Morgan, who once had a trial with the Hatters earlier in his career, came through the ranks at Colchester where he scored six goals in 25 appearances. Dean is a skilful midfielder who likes to get forward at every opportunity.

## STEPHEN O'LEARY

Stephen O'Leary is a skilful midfielder, who has spent time on-loan with Tranmere Rovers. O'Leary joined Luton as a 13-year-old, when he was spotted playing for Barnet Schools and he was awarded a Scholarship in the summer of 2001 along with Kevin Foley. During his time with the Hatters he has also been a regular at schoolboy level for the Republic of Ireland. He was rewarded for his displays at the end of the 2006/07 season when boss Kevin Blackwell handed him a one-year contract.

## SAM PARKIN

Ex-Chelsea trainee Sam Parkin is a forward with a prolific goalscoring record. Unfortunately, Sam's career at Kenilworth Road has yet to get going after a serious injury meant he played only eight games since signing under former boss Mike Newell. After signing for League One side Swindon Town in August 2002, Parkin set the Football League world alight, scoring 67 league goals in 120

appearances. Parkin signed for Ipswich Town in the summer of 2005 for £550,000. Following Joe Royle's departure at the end of last season, the new Blues boss Jim Magilton made it clear that Parkin would not get regular football at Portman Road. After fees were agreed with both Preston and Luton, he signed a three-year deal at Kenilworth Road, costing the club £340,000.

## CHRIS PERRY

Chris Perry brought plenty of experience with him when he signed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road. In 1991 Perry started his career at Wimbledon and went on to make more than 200 appearances for the club before moving to Tottenham Hotspur in 1999. He joined Charlton Athletic in September 2003. During his time at White Hart Lane, Perry made 146 appearances, scoring four times. After initially joining Charlton on-loan, a £100,000 fee was agreed and he became a popular figure at the Valley, making 76 appearances during his three-year stay. Perry later joined West Bromwich Albion on a two-year deal.



## DAVID BELL

Talented young midfielder David Bell signed a three and a half year contract with the Hatters in mid-January 2006 after joining from Rushden & Diamonds. He rose through the ranks at Diamonds to quickly establish himself as a firm favourite at Nene Park. Bell, who has been capped by Republic of Ireland at U19 and U21 level, made 121 starting appearances for Rushden,

scoring ten goals. Bell can play in the centre, left and right side of midfield and his performances for Rushden led to two trial spells with Middlesbrough.

## PAUL PESCHISOLIDO

Experienced striker Paul Peschisolido joined Luton on a one-year deal in July 2007. The Canadian-born striker joined from Derby, where he played a big part in lifting the Rams into the Premiership, playing the first hour of the 1-0 Play-Off final victory over West Brom in May. Peschisolido is vastly experienced, with more than 500 appearances in English football, in a career spanning almost 15 years. After starting his career in the Canadian Soccer League with the Toronto Blizzards, Peschisolido joined Birmingham City, where he scored 16 league goals in 43 appearances. Stoke City paid £400,000 for him in 1994. After a brief return to Birmingham, he then moved on to West Bromwich Albion, then on to Fulham in October 1997, for a £1.1 million transfer fee. A succession of loan spells followed, as he enjoyed spells at QPR, Norwich and Sheffield United. He made a permanent move to Sheffield United in 2001. In March 2004, Peschisolido joined Derby County.

## STEVE ROBINSON

Luton paid £50,000 to Preston North End in the summer of 2002 for a player who had been capped five times by Northern Ireland. He had made his name at Bournemouth after joining the Cherries on a free transfer from Spurs. Preston paid £375,000 for him but he failed to make the same impact in two years at Deepdale, and jumped at the chance to get his career moving again when Luton came in for him.

## MATTHEW SPRING

Matthew Spring returned to Kenilworth Road in January 2007 after leaving the club in 2004 to join Leeds United. Matthew had been at Luton since he was a schoolboy. After a league debut when still only seventeen, he soon became a regular in Luton's Second Division

team, and his first 100 appearances were clocked up while he was only twenty. Matthew joined Watford in August 2005 where he rediscovered his form from the early stages of his career, helping the Hornets into the Premiership in 2006. Matthew joined Luton on a two-and-a-half year contract in a deal worth £200,000.



## DREW TALBOT

Drew Talbot signed for Luton Town in a £250,000 deal in January 2007 from Sheffield Wednesday. Originally on the books of Barnsley, Talbot drifted out of football after injury but came back with Sheffield Wednesday's academy in the 2003/04 season. During the January 2007 transfer window, Talbot signed a loan-contract with League One promotion-chasers Scunthorpe United before signing at Kenilworth Road.

## PAUL UNDERWOOD

Luton Town fought off competition from a number of clubs to complete the free transfer signing of Paul Underwood from Rushden & Diamonds on transfer deadline day. The Wimbledon-born defender joined Rushden for £50,000 in the summer of 1997 from Enfield. During his time at Nene Park he was a regular in England semi-professional squad as Diamonds progressed up the non-league pyramid and in 2002/03 he led the club to the Third Division Championship and was named as Rushden's Player of the Season. Paul's career with Luton has been put in some doubt when he contracted a blood infection after undergoing a routine operation last summer and as a result missed the entire 2006/07 season.





United Boss John Ward was forced in to making one change to the starting eleven that sent Leeds United packing at Brunton Park on Saturday with Kev Gall coming in to replace Joe Anyinsah on the right hand side.

Luton created the first half chance of the night in the 4th minute when Bell got a yard of space on the right and whipped the ball in. Andrew moved towards it, but he was well marshalled by Murphy and Livesey and he couldn't quite make a connection.

Bell almost scored from nothing in the 6th minute when his cross, from tight on the touchline, curled wickedly and dipped towards the far post. Westwood scrambled, but he was able to watch in relief as it went behind for the goal kick.

United broke quickly themselves in the 11th minute, forcing the Hatters in to a defensive error that gave Hackney the chance to cross early. His ball in fell between the keeper and his back line and they were happy to see it away for a corner as Garner steamed in.

The Cumbrians could have taken the lead in the 18th minute when Garner spotted Gall on the overlap on the right hand side. He found him with an accurate pass, but the first touch let the United man down and the chance was gone.

Superb football brought a fantastic save from Brill in the 20th minute, sparked by an incisive pass from Bridge-Wilkinson. Graham shielded it and got it out to Hackney, and his cross was met on the full by a rising Joe Garner. It was a cushioned header, and the keeper rose to full stretch to tip it over the bar.

Bridge-Wilkinson drilled a low 23rd minute effort wide as Carlisle settled

in to their game, but they still had to be wary as Bell was finding joy out wide. Andrew was denied a header on target in their next attack as Raven got to it moments before him.

A Murphy mistake on 25 minutes left Westwood exposed and he was stranded as Currie latched on to it 6 yards out. With just Raven to beat it was heroics from the Cumbrians right back as he spread himself and blocked what was a certain goal.

David Edwards almost took Westwood by surprise on 37 minutes with a 40 yard dipping volley that appeared to be heading for the top corner. The Carlisle stopper remained calm, and watched with disinterest as it missed his nets by some margin.

Edwards was the man on the spot again as half time approached when he cushioned a long ball forward with his right foot before spinning, 12 yards out, and shooting early. It was a decent piece of skill, but he couldn't keep it down and it angled towards the United fans behind the goal.

Hackney opened the second 45 minutes with a hopeful, over the shoulder volley that was difficult for him to control, followed by a chip from the edge of the box after a tussle for possession from Garner. Neither effort had enough on it to trouble Brill. Play was then placed on pause as youths outside the ground threw fireworks in to the ground, putting the stewards in real danger.

Carlisle broke at pace in the 48th minute when Lumsdon made the ball his own in midfield. He fed it to Graham, but he delayed the shot and it was deflected wide when it came.

It was another great game for Westwood and he somehow pulled off a magical save on the hour when Calvin Andrew trapped the ball and spun quickly. His shot cannoned off Murphy, and it headed goalwards until the athletic stopper intervened and pushed it away.


Luton were looking good with the ball and Coyne was next to go close when he made a far post free kick his own, nodding towards the top corner. Westwood had to get there again to palm it away.

Luton manager Mick Harford has warned his players their "reputations are on the line" as they slip ever closer to relegation from League One.

Harford has yet to oversee a win at Kenilworth Road since taking over from Kevin Blackwell in January and the club are now 11 points from safety with the prospect of a further points deduction to come.

Harford said: "The whole team is feeling sorry for themselves and they are down at the moment. We get one good game out of them and then one poor game. It is very frustrating but the players' reputations are on the line and there has to be a massive improvement from them."

Luton Town are close to being taken over by a consortium fronted by TV presenter Nick Owen after a deal was reached with the club's administrators.

The Luton Town Football Club 2020 Limited, led by Owen, has had an offer for the club conditionally accepted. Contracts were exchanged before Luton's 1-1 draw with Millwall on Tuesday and the Football League is expected to confirm the deal in the next few weeks.

"We are on the way to being owners," Owen told BBC Radio 5 Live. "The bottom line is that Luton Town Football Club is secure and will live to fight another 100 years."

Luton remain in administration and the consortium will not take control until the takeover is completed. The Hatters suffered a 10-point deduction after going into administration and have seen several players sold to balance the books during a difficult period for the club.

"Basically we are in and it's a very exciting thought but we still have to get out of administration and that takes time," added Owen, who is the public face of LTFC 2020 Limited. There will be people from our consortium working in the offices and taking decisions now. Unfortunately we won't be able to sign players, even on loan, before the deadline which is a real blow as we've

lost half a team. I would never say we're resigned to relegation but it does remain a huge possibility - we have to keep going despite the 10-point deduction and the fact that we're down to 15 or 16 fit players."

Luton boss Mick Harford, who replaced Kevin Blackwell at the helm in January, said the development was a major boost to the club.

"I'm absolutely thrilled for the 2020 lads. They have worked tirelessly for the club behind the scenes over the last seven or eight months," he said. "I know it is fronted by Nick but there are a lot of others there too and I can say to the fans that the club is in great hands and has a safe future as far as I'm concerned. They have got a magnificent business plan and prospectus which I have read at length and they are keen to secure a new stadium and put the club on the right road."


The administrator for Luton has admitted that it could take until the end of the season for the club's takeover to officially go through.

Under Football League rules, clubs exiting administration have to be awarded back their football share - which permits them to take part in the league - and Guilfoyle has admitted that this could take some time.

Leeds were docked 15 further points by the League last summer for not complying fully with the process and that penalty could still be handed out to the Hatters as well.

Administrator Brendan Guilfoyle said: "The future of the club has been settled. However, the administration process is quite long and still has a way to go."

"I will formally hand over the club to LTFC 2020 once the Football League reissues the club with the 'Golden Share'. We expect this to happen sometime between Easter and the end of the season, as both the Football League and the previous managements' creditors have a large say in the timescales. However, once we exit this final period of administration, Luton Town will be control of its own destiny."



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# Marketingtemplates?

As I write these notes I am smiling like the proverbial Cheshire cat after witnessing what has to be one of the best team performances from a Carlisle team in recent times, I'm talking of course of the 1-0 victory at Nottingham Forest, courtesy of a Danny Graham strike. It truly was a pleasure to see the team play with such confidence and as one unit, for me there were eleven men of the match. The team has now firmly established itself as genuine contenders for promotion, and whilst it is still way too early to contemplate such things, I believe that promotion, be it through an automatic place or via the play-offs is very much in our own hands, or feet as the case may be.

For sure, I would prefer the automatic position, as it is somewhat easier on the heart and less of a lottery. I may be old fashioned in my thinking but I still think that the final league table speaks for itself, a football season is long enough and maybe, instead of the play-offs it should simply be the case that the top three go up. Although no one can deny the wonderful emotion of winning the play-offs, I'm thinking of our days in non-league football here. Yet what of the losers, it must be soul destroying for them, how do they pick themselves up for a challenge the following season? It must be hellish to know that potentially, over an entire season you have won more points and games than the team that may eventually win through and possibly three league places higher too. How hard must that be to take! No give me automatic promotion every time please.

I want to mention the blues support who attended the Nottingham Forest fixture last week, it was outstanding considering it was a Monday night and live on sky or and on the radio, it was a fine turn out, noisy, passionate and enthusiastic throughout they deserve high praise. So who says attendances are falling are as result of live football on television? I think the almost full house at the City Ground has determined that to be something

of an urban legend. There are many incentives football clubs can implement to attract new support, be it home or away. The Forest idea of charging an entrance fee of five pounds only undoubtedly paid dividends, programme sales would soar. Matchday purchases (food, drinks, merchandise) vastly increased and more importantly, the club had a captive audience to sell its ambition to, an opportunity to get new supporters onboard. The policing and stewarding costs may increase as a result of the bigger attendances, but the overall profit margin and benefits a significantly larger crowd brings outweigh such costs.

As an additional part to my current role in the Scottish game I am carrying out a full review of attendances throughout football and what the clubs are doing locally to address the falling attendance syndrome. In essence it's all about refreshing the club image and proper marketing techniques, selling to a whole new audience and making the whole matchday experience unique and special. Clearly each club has different demographic circumstances that is unique to its own district or area, thus the marketing has to be different in every case. There is no generic marketing template that will or can provide solutions. In many cases I have found the clubs tend to blame it on a variety of reasons; the local economy, apathy within the community, live football on television, smoking in public bans, even cases of inclement weather, there was a with one club being honest enough to state that the football on offer was poor with little hope of improvement in the immediate future!

I am aware that similar concerns are being expressed in the English game with many clubs committed to finding a generic solution, this, as stated previously, does not exist. It's clear that in general, football is no longer just a part-time interest for investors it's business, in many cases, big business. It's curious to note how some serious investors in football run their clubs, one


would assume that a successful business person would be careful to run an equally profitable football club. In many cases they seem blinded by the desire to succeed and look to win popularity among the fan base, all but forgetting the basic objectives of running a business. Sadly, from my perspective, the marketing and communication aspect is one of the most obvious omissions to what is a team of more than able volunteers.

In the Premier League football clubs are properly marketed, it's a full time business, maintaining the clubs profile, both locally and nationally even internationally. Some are good at it, others not so good. Professional Marketing directors or Managers have become an accepted part of the game and gradually such roles are being created throughout the football pyramid. At our level Doncaster Rovers is the most recent club to create and look to appoint to such a position. At Carlisle we are somewhat fortunate to have a football club that is run successfully both on and off the field with astute directors and club staff continually looking to the future and who are adaptable to change, marketing in such an environment is not an issue.

Three points this evening against a resilient Luton Town team would be most welcome.





The regular London Branch monthly meeting in February started on a low and never recovered. The current venue was chosen as it served, at least, a limited selection of real ales each month. At 7.45 pm the barman pulled the spluttering remains of the last barrel. The manager had warned that he was closing for refurbishment at the beginning of March but had badly misjudged his stock by about two weeks. Given the state he was in when he came to explain what was happening after the refurbishment we must be thankful that the pub had any stock. He apologised profusely for the fact that the upstairs room would become a restaurant and as a consequence we were on the street.

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


# Are you getting your share?

I THINK WHAT SUMMED IT UP FOR ME WAS THAT I WENT IN THE BOARDROOM AFTERWARDS AND THE CHAIRMAN SAID THAT HE WISHED HE'D HAD SIXTEEN WATCHES TO GIVE OUT, BECAUSE HE THOUGHT WE ALL DESERVED ONE

I suppose there's only really one place to start and that's the Youth Cup.

It was an unbelievable run while we were in it, and to beat the sides of the calibre we have is something that I'm sure none of us will ever forget. Everyone will always pick out the Man United game, but I look at the whole competition and we had Sheffield Wednesday and Southend as well, who were very, very good sides.

Those games helped lift our whole season. Every so often with the Cup run we'd beat someone else and get this massive lift, and we've just carried that right through. When we got knocked out we were all really disappointed, but then you sit down and look at the crowd that was there and you realise that they came down to watch you. They came down to support us because we were doing well, and that is unbelievable. It shows you what a good reputation our side is building for itself.

I think it also makes us realise just what a good side and even what good players we are. Sometimes I think you can fall into a lull and start thinking: 'Oh well, they must be better than us because they play for a Premiership side, or an academy,' and then you play against them and beat them and you start thinking: 'Well, actually, why shouldn't we be playing and winning!' I suppose that's what confidence does for you.

I looked back at the Villa game, and even though we were beaten we still made as many chances as them, and I don't think we were outclassed. We had a very bad first ten minutes, which has cost us, but I look at the other 80 minutes and we held our own.

People have mentioned the penalty and the referee, but we didn't defend as well as we should and we got punished, so you can't look back and blame other people. I didn't even see the handball that their lad is meant to have made in the second half. We had our chances and we didn't take them, and as I say at the other end we didn't defend as well as we would have liked for the first ten minutes. After the second goal went in we got together as the defence,

and we played much better. Ultimately it just wasn't our night, and give Villa some credit because they had some excellent players.

At the end of the night I was gutted, and then I found out I'd got Man of the Match, so I was a bit taken aback. It was nice to win though, because there were some important football people there, but I think what summed it up for me was that I went in the boardroom afterwards and the Chairman said that he wished he'd had sixteen watches to give out, because he thought we all deserved one. I have to say, I think he's right. We're a close bunch of lads and we play, win and lose as a team. I think the award and the watch is definitely something I'll hold on to, I probably won't even wear it, I'll just keep it in the box as a memento, because it means a lot.

What we have to do now though is to use our experiences to keep our season going, because it's not all over for us and I think we're all determined not just to let the season slide away, just because we've had one disappointment. As an individual, part of that is down to yourself not to take your foot off the gas. This season has been great for me and I don't want to regret anything at the end.

At the start of the season I found it a little bit difficult to adjust to the full-time nature of the course. I had to get used to being here, day in day out, and working and training, because before that my experience of football had simply been to go in to an academy one or two days a week.

It's like anything else though, you get used to it and you start enjoying it, and before long you feel like a professional. The club runs the course in such a way that you feel like a footballer and you begin living for the games at the weekend. Ok, we're only a centre of excellence, but people shouldn't be fooled because it feels like a professional environment when you come here, and it is run in a professional way. Everything is focused towards your footballing ability and developing that, and that's the way it should be, because at the end of the day that's what it all comes down to.

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


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## S port for All

**S** Huge strides have been made in the last hundred years to promote the equality of men and women in society.

The suffragette movement at the beginning of the last century led by Emily Pankhurst campaigned for many things on behalf of women, not least that women should have the right to vote in political elections. This came about in 1928, though we may now look back with amazement asking ourselves why women should have been denied the right to vote in the first place! Inequality and injustice always seem easier to identify when looking back in history.



EMILY PANKHURST OF THE FOOTBALL WORLD WAS A WOMEN CALLED NETTIE HONEYBALL WHO FOUNDED THE EARLIEST RECORDED WOMEN'S FOOTBALL TEAM IN ENGLAND IN 1894 WHO WERE CALLED THE BRITISH LADIES FOOTBALL CLUB



When the first world war broke out the role of women changed dramatically as men left jobs to go off to war. As a result the number of women employed increased from 3,224,600 in 1914 to 4,814,600 in 1918 and the vast majority of the increase of working women went into munitions factories. Women's football first became popular on a large scale during the first world war when munitions factories put together women's football teams and the most famous of these teams was the Dick, Kerr's Ladies, of Preston. Mr Dick and Mr Kerr were two Scottish factory owners who allowed and encouraged women to play football to keep up moral during the war period. Despite playing to crowds of 53,000 at times and being widely popular in the years following the war the English FA and the Scottish FA banned women's football in 1921 declaring it was bad for their health! Though the women were banned from

playing on FA controlled club grounds they formed their own English Ladies Football Association and continued to play in parks and some rugby grounds, slowly the popularity of women's football diminished but importantly still continued.

We would be forgiven for thinking that the development of women's football was a recent one, but as we can see this isn't the case. After the interest generated following the 1966 world cup success of the men's team the English Women's FA was formed in 1969 and the FA's ban on women playing on FA controlled grounds was lifted in 1971, fifty years after it was imposed. Italy were the first country with professional women players though they were part time, and the USA were the first country to have full time women team, and so the revival rather than the beginnings of women's football began.

The first women's world cup was held in China in 1991 and was won by the USA. The third cup was held in the USA in 1999 and drew world wide television audiences and the final was won by The USA in front of a 90000 crowd at Los Angeles. The current Women's football world champions are Germany who won in China last year with England reaching the quarter finals. The Women's FA is now affiliated to the FA and the women's game is now so strong it has long had its own leagues including a premiership league which is at the moment headed by Arsenal. Football is the top female sport and in the 'active people survey' of 2006 there were 250,000 women and 1.1 million girls playing some form of football in the UK, with some 26 million women playing football world wide of which 4.1 million are playing affiliated football for clubs. So let's get it right women's football has been going on since the very inception of the FA and football in this country, and why not. Through the football in the community programme at Carlisle United and other local teams girls and women are active in football, and playing at all levels of the game. Emily Pankhurst and Nettie Honeyball would be proud of them all.

## In Reserve

**R**eserve Boss Eric Kinder talks about the 1-0 win over Rochdale:

The manager likes his teams to be winning at this club. If all three teams can keep it going for another six or seven weeks, then it will be a very successful end to the campaign.



THE Gretna story, part 783. The soap opera that is the club along the road continues to intrigue and the latest developments have been as amusing as they have been farcical.

To enter the Scottish Premier League (SPL) you must have an all-seater stadium comprising of 6,000 seats and undersoil heating as well as a reserve and youth team set-up. Of course, as we know, the Black and Whites do not have the ground and currently share with Motherwell FC, an agreement that has done nothing to alleviate the suffering of the battered Fir Park pitch.

A complaint was apparently made to the authorities by Partick Thistle after the Glasgow outfit's fans raised concerns at the state of the ground. They believed supporter safety was possibly at risk and having spoken to fans of other teams, it is a common viewpoint.

So we could have the bizarre situation of Gretna, the club that "lives the dream" being refused entry to the First Division should they come down. That would be a real sore one in the eye, that's for sure. What would happen next is anyone's guess although I would imagine that Gretna will put in place anything that would prevent such an embarrassing episode.

Club owner Brooks Mileson - who has been seriously ill recently - has done a lot for his club and football across the north of England with the amount of money he has invested in terms of sponsorship with the Northern League a case in point.

Hopefully he will return to full health as soon as possible for that is the most important thing. As for Gretna, it is going to take a while for them to be given the all-clear, particularly if they suffer the dreaded drop.

'Finding Nemo' as Brunton Park went underwater. Well, it was more like finding a Goldfish but let's not get picky.




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
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## with Andy Hall

I t was interesting, when using the 'listen again' feature on the Radio Cumbria website last week, to hear Derek Lacey, James Phillips and Paul Newton discuss the fact that Joe Garner had returned to the field of play down at Crewe, despite the fact that he'd suffered an injury as serious as the one that our in-form striker had picked up on that night.

Now, I'm no expert, and I would never pretend to be, but I can speak from a position of some authority when it comes to anterior cruciate ligament injuries, because I've been there myself.

Back in the days when I played the game at amateur level, in what we thought was a half decent team, we reached the semi-finals of a fairly prestigious cup competition and, if I'm being honest, had that arrogant feeling that we were the only team in it.

Our opponents in the semis were from the Republic of Ireland, and they had a widespread reputation for 'mixing things up.' We'd never played them before, but the manager of the team they'd knocked out was a very good friend of our manager, and he filled him with stories of scything tackles, flailing elbows and tactics that would have had Norman Hunter cringing.

So be it, we thought ... if that's what they wanted, then that's what they were going to get, and we all continued to plan our Cup Final goal celebrations as if we were already there.

The day of the game brought the usual nerves, but I started to feel much better once I saw the lad who was going to be marking me. Short and ... err ... chubby, is probably the best description.

Being a left winger of the 'hug the touchline and don't move unless it's put on a plate in front of me' variety I envisioned a comfortable afternoon of tapping the ball beyond him, racing past him with a wave, all to be followed by a delivery of Beckham-like quality for our striker to nod in to the top corner. Visualisation, such a wonderful thing.

Actually, the first time I received the ball, that's pretty much what happened. Minus the Beckham-like cross. I sent it to the far post whilst our centre forward cut across his marker to the near post, and the moment was gone. Never mind.

Anyway, when walking past my friendly little marker he said something along the

lines of: "You won't be doing that again." Some verbals followed, and we came to the conclusion that we didn't really like each other.

About two or three minutes later we broke from a corner and, spotting that I was one on one with the weeble, I screamed for the ball. Over it came. The intention was to trap it, turn quickly and then leave him in my dust as I headed gloriously for goal. Well, as the ball came towards me, at chest height, all I could hear behind me was what sounded like the 7.32 West Coast express as it comes down off Shap. Next thing I knew, I was on the floor, in pain. Lots of pain.

This is where the conversation that the Radio Cumbria lads had fits in. Initially, I hadn't felt anything like it. I thought the bottom half of my leg had been ripped off, or at least smashed, because it refused to budge for a good 30 seconds or so. However, over the course of the next few minutes, and particularly following the application of the sponge from our physio, it started to ease off.

My fears that I was severely damaged began to subside rapidly, and I made the usual comment of 'give me five minutes, I think it's alright' and gingerly got up to test the water. A quick jog up and down the touchline left me feeling more than encouraged, and back on I went.

Shortly after that I made one run towards the ball, which brought no reaction whatsoever, and was at the point where it was all but forgotten. I'd even managed to throw a bit more abuse at my nemesis, in to the bargain.

That's when it all went wrong. By now I'd been back on the pitch, following treatment, for about 5 minutes. We broke down the right, so I cut in to the box from my wide position to give another option for the cross and, with absolutely nobody else even within touching distance, I felt a jolt of pain that was like a bolt of lightning to the knee, and ended up in a heap on the floor. That, for me, was game over. Follow up scans showed that Jabba the Hut had not only managed to snap my anterior cruciate, but he'd added a tear to my medial ligament and stretched the posterior cruciate as well.

So, there you go, that's why Joe was able to get up and carry on. Something, I have no idea what, masks the pain and damage immediately after the injury occurs, and before the swelling sets in, that fools you in to thinking that it might not be that serious after all. I know that, because it happened to me.

**U**nited captain Danny Livesey continues with his regular diary update:

## PaddockPatter

atching the Championship game on SKY between QPR and Stoke at Loftus Road last weekend got me thinking, perhaps that's why I got a headache and needed a sleep two minutes later. The incident that got the rusty old hamster wheel turning being the red card shown by referee Andy D'Urso to Potters defender Luke Griffin for what was actually a perfectly legitimate challenge on Rangers winger Hogan Ephraim.

The three match suspension has since been rescinded after Stoke's appeal to the Football Association, so all is well and good from that perspective but what about the actual game itself? Now Stoke were already 2-0 down when Griffin got his marching orders so it could be argued that City being reduced to ten men just before half-time made little difference to the actual result of the game. Who are we to know that though?, teams come back from two goal deficits all the time.

What can we do about it then? Just because it was QPR 2-0 Stoke in the Championship it doesn't mean that the same couldn't happen in a play-off final or the last match of the regular season, games which are extremely important and can make or break a club in some instances. Imagine Carlisle at Wembley in May, well don't actually - imagine us being promoted automatically, and one of the United players being sent off incorrectly and it might change your mind on having TV replays in the game.

Now I know that a lot of you (the three of you) reading this will think that American Football is Rugby Union for big softies who have wear pads and helmets to tackle but they have a very good replay challenge system that works well. Although one quick point is that coaches in the NFL can be punished for incorrect appeals by the loss of a timeout, something that we obviously don't have in football in this country.

Both teams are allowed two challenges per half where they are allowed to get a decision overturned if it is deemed wrong by the referee who watches a replay of the incident on a sideline camera, and if they get both challenges right then they are awarded another one. As already mentioned, if they get one wrong then they lose one of the three timeouts that they are

allowed per half, so making the coaches have a good think about it before they decide to risk making a challenge.

The difference between the two sports is obviously where the system would need a bit of tinkering if you wanted to use it. American Football is a stop-start game whereas English football isn't, but in the time that Griffin made his way from the scene of the non-foul across the pitch to the tunnel TV replays had already showed that the decision to send him off was wrong. So there is plenty of time to look at such things, especially after goals have been scored as well.

Goals change games they say, which always seems to be one of the most obviously correct clichés, so what is to stop us having a quick look at a goal to check it while the scoring team trots off celebrating and the conceding side wait for the kick-off. Goals and sending-offs are the only things really that I'd like to see checked, bearing in mind the stoppage of the game anyway, you wouldn't even need to have to such a thing as a challenge system anyway.

The speed of the game has got much faster now, and although some referees are full-time you can still hardly expect a 40-year old to be able to keep right up with play when running after a 21-year old professional footballer. It's also worth realising that a retina retains an image for 1/16th of a second before a new image can be imposed on it. So even if the official is in the right place it's possible to miss it, and then you have to bring basic human error into the equation.

Technology is surely there to be used, otherwise what is the point of inventing it in the first place? It's surely time to stick a camera underneath (or in) the crossbar to check whether or not a "goal" has crossed the line. To me, although the media themselves have to take some of the blame, football has become so big these days financially that taking a look at a sending-off or a goal, and not really stopping the clock doing it, seems a sensible idea. Don't forget the ex-Carlisle manager who once said: "Some people believe football is a matter of life and death. I'm very disappointed with that attitude. I can assure you it is much, much more important than that."



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## Refwatch

**A**t time of going to press Graham Laws (Tyne & Wear) had been in charge of 24 games, showing a total of 61 yellow cards and 2 reds.

Our first record of a meeting with him was way back in December 1998, when Cambridge came calling. It was a difficult period for the club, so a goal from Paul McGregor lifted spirits as he earned a 1-1 draw in a game with no bookings.

We met up with Mr Laws three times during the 02/03 campaign. October 2002 brought Swansea up here, and 8 yellows were flashed in this clash. Baldacchino, Birch, Byrne, Murphy and Taylor had their names taken for the Cumbrians, whilst Magennis and Farrell scored the goals to help claim a 2-2 draw.

Later that season we lost 2-1 at Hartlepool, and only Lee Maddison was booked on this occasion. Jamie Burt scored our goal.

5 yellows were produced in our League Trophy meeting with Shrewsbury in February 2003, as Adam Rundle scored the only goal of the tie. We met again in April 2004 when

Kidderminster came North, but we sent them packing, with a Craig Farrell goal enough to snatch the much needed points. No cards on this occasion.

October 2005 brought a depressing 3-1 home defeat at the hands of Bristol Rovers, and Alan O'Brien scored his only goal for the club as we got off to a great start. Bookings for Aranalde and Murphy did little to improve the atmosphere.

We came across Mr Laws twice last season - once at home and once away. He was in the middle for our 2-1 defeat at the hands of Millwall in October 2006, when Jermaine Beckford both scored and got himself booked. We also saw him at Blackpool, in another 2-1 defeat, at the end of December. Hawley scored our goal, and Lumsdon, McDermott and Raven saw yellow.

Our last meeting with him was the 4-0 October victory over Millwall (John Ward's first game in charge and the start of our epic home run). Garner, Graham (2) and Bridge-Wilkinson got the goals with Joe Garner also going in the book.

## The Big Number 9

**T**here used to be a time when going to football gave you bragging rights. Be that at work, home, pub or school.

If you didn't go, you were left out of the conversation and debate. After match discussions - Questions like: 'Was the big number 9 really offside when the ref disallowed that goal?' 'Was that foul really inside the box?' 'When that ball hit the bar and bounced down, was it really over the line?' And finally 'Was Paul Bannon really only one yard from goal, when he hit the back of the stand?'

When was the last time a Premier League fan could use the argument: 'I know cos I was there?' or 'What do you know, you weren't even there?' when having a debate about football? The questions sometimes didn't even wait for the pub, they were often the subject of many a half time discussion over a luke warm pie, a cup of dodgy Bovril, and a bag of Tudor crisps (remember those?). Football really was a matter of opinion.

Nowadays the answers to the questions are sent via text half a dozen times, by someone watching the game on TV!

Example:-

1970's - 25th minute - Was the big number 9 really offside when the ref disallowed that goal? I'm not sure, we can debate it at half time, or in the pub later. We can discuss it for weeks, and even skit each other about our opinion for weeks afterwards. Whole friendships were built on whose side of the debate you are on, and lifelong enemies were made if you disagreed. You would meet someone in the street weeks after the game, and your first remark would be 'He was never off.'

2008 - 25th minute - Was the big number 9 really offside when the ref disallowed that goal? Well first of all, the chances of it being number 9 are remote. It's more likely to be number 49, 69 or 99 (which player will make history by becoming the first to wear a three digit number on his shirt?) By the 26th minute, the incident has been replayed 5 times on television in super slo mo. You will have been sent a text or 6 by mates watching at home, or in the pub, who will have cast iron evidence about whether he was or wasn't offside.

The sad thing is that by the time you get to

the pub to join your mates, you already know the answer, and the debate has ended. In fact by going to the game, you are suddenly the outcast, because you have not had the benefit of a hundred TV replays and an Andy Gray dissection.

TV has its role to play in the modern game, but I have a certain nostalgia for when Match of the Day highlights on Saturday night covered 3 games of football, and all four divisions got a look in over the course of the season. The Big Match on Sunday, broadcast highlights of your local team depending on the ITV area you resided in. Wednesday nights you had Sportsnight with Coleman (eerrrrr ... remarkable), which showed highlights of major European ties and cup replays as well as a wider sporting selection. That was pretty much it - The FA Cup Final, the annual England/Scotland international, and major European Finals were the only games broadcast live in their entirety. Then every four years came the bonanza of the World Cup Finals.



# Mad as Hatters

**O**ur opponents tonight are yet another club who have hit hard times of late financially having gone into administration in late November. The obvious consequences of that being the ten point penalty and subsequent player sales in the January transfer window that have seen the Hatters drop down from a mid-table slot to a seeming three-way fight for the League One wooden spoon with fellow ten point victims Bournemouth and Port Vale.

A deal with The Luton Town Football Club 2020 Limited has recently been accepted by administrators The P&A Partnership though and the Kenilworth Road club look likely to come out of administration within the next few weeks, the two recent FA cup ties with Liverpool no doubt helping matters. The Hatters, according to TV presenter Nick Owen who is fronting the consortium, still won't be able to sign players on loan ahead of the traditional Football League deadline Thursday near the end of March however.

That makes it seem even more obvious that the end of this season will simply be a case of tidying up the books and getting things back on an even keel for the 2020 consortium. Also rumbling on in the background is a proposal from Cliff Bassett, and a construction company, to push through plans for a new ground on green belt land near Junction 12 of the M1. The potential stadium, near the Bedfordshire village of Harlington, being a suggested 20,000 all-seater that would cost around the £30 million mark. As if things weren't complicated enough, 2020 haven't actually given their backing to these plans, as they want to conduct site feasibility studies ahead of any agreement.

Like many clubs have found recently though, especially Brighton in their efforts to leave the Withdean Stadium, opposition comes from all quarters with mid-Bedfordshire MP Nadine Dorries actually presenting a 3,100 strong name petition to parliament to try to stop Luton Town in their tracks. Dorries commenting on the potential new ground:

"Once the application has been submitted I will be encouraging local residents to make their representations to the planners opposing this development. This is the wrong development in the wrong place and would severely undermine the quality of life for residents in Toddington and Harlington."

The 2020 consortium say that they are ahead of target though, as they hope to submit their planning application in July after initially expecting to be setting the wheels in motion

later in the year. It looks like being a long fight between the Hatters, the planners and local residents however, with villagers from the area desperate to retain a strip of treasured green belt land which provides a natural barrier between Harlington and the M1.

Bournemouth are another club under severe financial pressure in the bottom reaches of League One that we still have to play at Brunton Park this season. After many years of continuing struggles to pay the bills the Cherries finally went into administration at the start of last month with debts at around the £4 million mark. The appointed administrator to the club being the infamous Gerald Krasner of Leeds United fame.


The Dorset side having little option but to hit the ten point penalty buffers after being issued with a winding-up petition from HM Revenue and Customs. Chairman Jeff Mostyn commenting: "We are extremely disappointed at the stance taken by the Revenue in issuing the petition without any consultation or negotiation to reach a reduced settlement. We understand the stance taken by the Revenue applies to all football clubs in as much as they will not negotiate unless they receive preferred status."


The Cherries were forced to take their medicine though with Krasner actually revealing that the club could have gone into liquidation without the recent injection of a six-figure sum from Mostyn to keep the wolves at the door. All this despite their Dean Court ground being sold to London-based property company Structadene in December 2005 in a desperate attempt to keep AFC Bournemouth afloat and pay off some of their reported £6.5 million worth of debts at the time.

Gillingham are a side we travel to play at the end of this month who are also down at the wrong end of the table, and they are another side whose ground has recently changed hands. Chairman Paul Scally selling the Priestfield Stadium to a company of which he is the sole owner, for £9.8 million - and then leasing it back to the club. The deal seeing just under 74% of the football club's £13.3m debt transferred to Priestfield Developments Limited.

That will now reduce the club's running debt to no more than £3.5m, with interest payments also falling from £800,000 a year to £200,000, the lease of the stadium back to the Gills being for an initial ten years. Scally planning to stabilise debts at the Kent outfit before making some progress towards planning and building a new ground, with the Priestfield Stadium then presumably being sold for housing. 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

**W**ith only a quarter of the season remaining the battle for promotion and survival is heating up. As clubs battle for every point, time is slowing running out for clubs to achieve their goal. Meanwhile some clubs are already planning for the future and for next season.



Brighton & Hove Albion have completed the signing of Leeds midfielder Ian Westlake on loan until 5th April for their hectic spell of nine league games in a month. The 24-year-old former Ipswich man had signed in time to feature in the game against Gillingham at the Withdean last Tuesday. Manager Dean Wilkins said, "He is exactly the calibre of player we want to bring in to strengthen the squad." Westlake is not eligible to take on Leeds at Elland Road on 29th March under the terms of the loan deal.

Brighton striker Glenn Murray has been named as League One's player of the month for February. Murray, signed from Rochdale in late January, scored four goals in five games for the Seagulls during February. Including games for Rochdale, the in-form front man has scored 10 goals in his last 14 appearances. The other contenders for the award were Southend forward Lee Barnard, Bristol Rovers striker Rickie Lambert and Blues striker Danny Graham.



Leeds United's Jermaine Beckford has been named League One Player of the Year at the Football League Awards. The 24-year-old striker received the award after being ranked 24th in the Top 50 Football League players, announced in London last Sunday evening. He also won goal of the year for his strike against Rotherham United last year while on loan at Scunthorpe. "I didn't set any targets at the start of the season, other than to prove myself," he said.

Meanwhile, the club are waiting on the results of a scan on new loan signing Stephen O'Halloran's knee injury. The 20-year-old Republic of Ireland left-back injured himself in the warm-up ahead of Leeds' win at Swindon. It would have been the Aston

Villa player's debut for the West Yorkshire club, but he was forced to watch from the sidelines on crutches. "We've informed Villa and our fingers are crossed that's it's not too bad," said Leeds boss Gary McAllister.



Leyton Orient defender Alton Thelwell has put his knee operation on hold in order to try and help Martin Ling's side reach the play-offs. The 27-year-old former Tottenham man made his first appearance for two months against Brighton last weekend, and believes he has had enough rest for the troublesome knee to get through to the end of the season without requiring an op. Thelwell said, "I had a couple of injections that helped settle it down, we will look at things again at the end of the season and I may have to have an operation then if it still isn't right. But at the moment I feel comfortable with it and I'm sure it won't be a problem for me to last until May. "It feels the right thing to do, because we still have a chance of securing a play-off place and hopefully I can help us get back on track."

Former Orient player Carl Hoddle has sadly passed away of a suspected heart attack at the age of 40. Hoddle, the younger brother of former England manager Glenn, played 29 games for the O's between 1989 and 1991 before returning to Barnet, the club he joined after leaving Tottenham Hotspur. His best ever performance in an O's shirt came on October 21st 1989, where he produced a sparkling display and a goal against Reading. Prior to that Hoddle like his brother Glenn had been a talented midfielder with Spurs. He was with the north London club as a youth and reserve team player from 1983 to 1989. He faced Glenn in 1994 when Barnet took on Chelsea in an FA Cup tie and later worked with him as a scout and coach at Wolverhampton Wanderers.



Millwall striker Neil Harris has been told he will not be offered a new contract and does not feature in boss Kenny Jackett's first-team plans. Harris approached Jackett in a bid to resolve his long-term future as his current deal expires

in the summer. Jackett told Millwall's official website, "I told him I could not offer him a contract and that also, at the moment, he is not going to feature in my first eleven, if he wants to go out on loan I am happy for him to do that." But the door has not been completely closed on Harris, who is in his second spell at the club. Jackett added: "If he wants to stay here and fight for a place in the team, I would be equally pleased. There is still a long way to go this season, and our experience with injuries and suspensions suggests there will be opportunities for players who are not currently in the team."

Defender Krystian Pearce has extended his loan spell at Port Vale for a further month. Parent club Birmingham have given the green light for the centre-back to continue his stay at Vale Park. Manager Lee Sinnott told a local radio station, "He is mature beyond his years and he is learning all the time he is here. We are pleased he is staying." The 18-year-old, who has made four appearances for Vale, will now stay on at the club until the end of March.



Southend United striker Alex Revell is set to miss at least a month of the season because of injury. Revell, a £150,000 January signing from Brighton, missed his side's 2-1 win against Bournemouth and is likely to need surgery on a hernia problem. Boss Steve Tilson told the club's website, "We're pretty certain Alex has a hernia and is likely to be out for a month, it's obviously disappointing because he's only just come to the club but it's best to get it sorted right now."

Swindon Town have awarded nine youth team players professional contracts ahead of their FA Youth Cup fifth-round tie at Charlton. Swindon's youngsters have been attracting a lot of interest from bigger clubs in the last 12 months. Striker Lukas Jutkiewicz joined Everton last summer while defender Ben Tozer joined Newcastle in January. Youth team boss Paul Bodin said, "It's great news for the kids, they're all very talented with great potential. They still have to do their academic stuff and their apprenticeship but they're on the first rung of the ladder in terms of professionalism." The players who have been awarded contracts are: Kurt Hammonds, Jake Hyde, Ben Joyce, Callum Kennedy, Lloyd Macklin, Sam Morris, Shaun Morrison, Mark Scott and Jack Winter.

Meanwhile, Weymouth have signed young Swindon striker Jake Hyde on loan until the end of the season. Hyde was recently handed a professional contract at the County Ground, which will see him tied to the Robins until the summer of 2009. Swindon boss Maurice Malpas told the club's official website, "He needs to go out and get some experience. Weymouth could be the ideal place for him to get some games under his belt."



Walsall have completed the signing of former Aston Villa striker Stefan Moore after he impressed on a week's trial. The 24-year-old was released by QPR in January, and Saddlers boss Richard Money admits he is happy to bring back Birmingham-born Moore to the Midlands. He said, "Stefan is a very intelligent front man. I have known him for a long time and know what he's capable of. His movement is excellent and he will get into the right positions to score goals." Moore started his career at Villa alongside younger brother Luke, who has just joined Walsall's neighbours West Bromwich Albion on loan. They were both part of the Villa team who saw off an Everton team including Wayne Rooney to win the FA Youth Cup in 2002. After making 30 first team appearances for Villa, Moore went on to enjoy loan spells at Chesterfield, Millwall and Leicester City before joining QPR in the 2005 close season.



Walsall defender Rhys Weston has signed an extension to his contract that will keep him at the club until 2010. The 27-year-old initially signed for a year when he joined the Saddlers from Port Vale in the summer of 2007 and is thrilled to be staying. Weston said, "I'm delighted. It's a nice feeling to have my future sorted out and I can now concentrate on the run-in and helping this club get promoted, "I've had a great start to my Walsall career so far." The Wales international has also had spells with Arsenal and in Norway with Viking FK and has been an integral figure in Walsall's bid to win promotion to the Championship this season. Saddlers' boss Richard Money added, "Rhys has become an important member of the team, his performances have become more and more consistent as the season has progressed and we hope that, over the next two years, he will continue to be an important player for Walsall."

## HINTS AND TIPS

THE TOPIC THIS WEEK IS ...

### SPORTS MASSAGE THERAPY

An athlete, before a performance, is under immense stress emotionally and physically and the body is also prone to injuries. Practices before the event lead to constant build-up of tension in the muscles and cause stress on joints, ligaments, tendons, as well as the muscles themselves. Apart from muscle tension, the athlete is also bogged down with fatigue and injuries which may hamper the main performance. Sports Massage is a specific type of massage which is generally rendered before, during, and after athletic events to help prepare the athlete for desired performance, to relax the nerves and prevent injuries. This type of massage can be rendered only by a professional who has a thorough understanding of anatomy and physiology and particularly the muscular and skeletal systems.

Sports Massage works deep to eliminate toxins embedded in muscle fibers, remove adhesions, and minimize scar tissue buildup. Muscle lengthening in sports

massage helps restore a range of motion and overall flexibility. Sports massage also leads to improved circulation which aids better cell nutrition, greater elasticity of muscle fiber, and reduced recovery time.

Sports Massage is a blend of Swedish massage and Shiatsu specifically designed to cater to the needs of professional athletes. Depending on the needs of the athlete, a variety of techniques are used including classic Swedish strokes, cross-fiber friction, pressure-point work, and joint mobilization.

#### TYPES OF SPORTS MASSAGE

Sports massage therapy includes pre-event, post-event, maintenance and rehabilitation techniques that promote greater athletic endurance and performance, reduced chances of injury and faster healing.

#### Pre-Event

Pre-Event sports massage helps warm up the muscles by stretching them and making them flexible for optimal athletic performance. A pre-event massage also stimulates the flow of blood and nutrients to the muscle, reduces muscle tension, loosen the muscles and produce a feeling of psychological readiness. A pre-event

massage is best done up to two days prior to the main event.

#### Post-Event

Post- event massage focuses on relieving muscle soreness, minimizing the effects of fatigue and reducing the stress levels in the body. It also helps reduce swelling, maintain flexibility, promote blood flow to the muscle to remove lactic acid and waste build-up and reduce cramping. This also helps faster healing.

#### Prevention

This is more of a maintenance massage which can be done at least once a week as a regular part of athletic training programs. Preventive massage increases the flow of blood and nutrients to the muscle and helps repair small tears due to strenuous physical activity. It also keeps tissue loose so that different layers of muscle slide over each other.

#### Rehabilitation

Sports massage is also used as a last resort in the event of injury. Sports massage helps rehabilitate by minimizing the adverse effects of scar tissue and adhesions caused to the athlete and helps regain lost flexibility and strength.

#### Techniques in Sports Massage

There are three main techniques of massage frequently used in sport, namely effleurage, petrissage and frictions. Most of the massage techniques ensure the main pressure is directed towards the heart to increase the venous and lymphatic flow. The strokes also ensure that excess pressure does not cause any damage to blood vessels. While effleurage is a preparatory background stroke, petrissage allows detail work on the body in releasing tension followed by friction.

#### Benefits of Sports Massage

The benefits of sports massage impact the physical, physiological and psychological levels. A state of well being is achieved only when all the three aspects are in balance.

#### Physical effects of massage are:

- Deep massage causes the pores in tissue membranes to open, enabling fluids and nutrients to pass through enabling removal of waste products such as lactic acid.
- Deep massage encourages the muscles to take up oxygen and nutrients which promote faster healing
- Sports massage stretches muscles to release tension or stress caused due to excess physical activity
- Sports massage helps break down scar tissues which usually affect the muscle, tendons and ligaments which impair performance.
- Sports massage helps improve elasticity of tissues.

#### Physiological effects of sports massage are:

- Sports massage helps reduce pain.
- Muscles are relaxed after a sports massage

Psychological effects of sports massage include:

- Reduced levels of anxiety and stress caused due to relaxed muscles and nerves.
- Sports massage stimulates a sense of well being and health.
