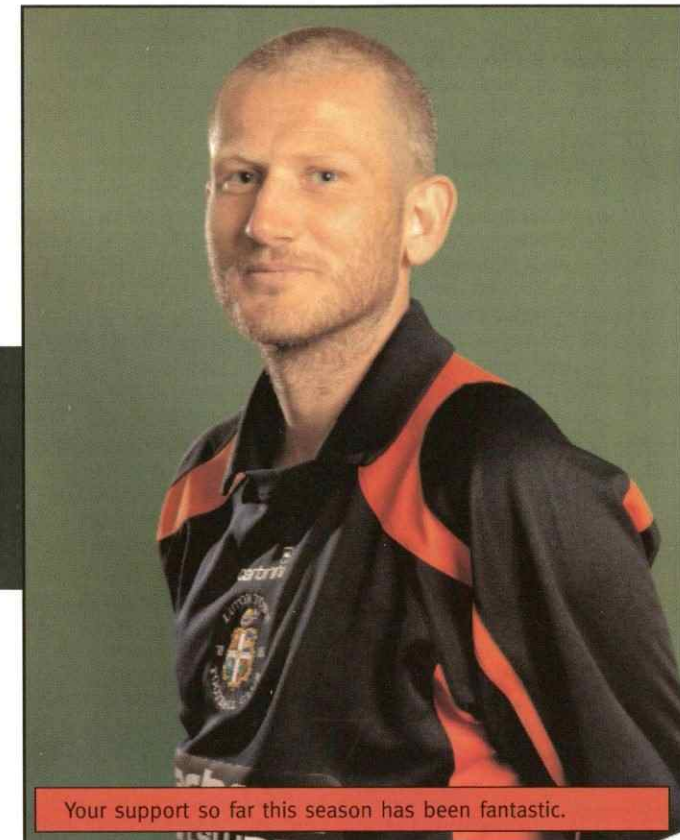

Dear Hatter,

I hope this programme note finds you well and that you enjoy the game today, which will hopefully result in another three points in our battle against the harsh and completely disproportionate points deductions we have suffered over the summer.

It is a cliché but it is certainly never dull supporting Luton Town and I think that it is fair to say that we have one of the most interesting histories of any football club in the whole country, although, unfortunately, not always for good reasons!

I am pleased to have this opportunity to give some background on what the Trust is and what it does.

Trust in Luton History

Many of you may not be aware of TiL and, even if you are, might not know what the Trust do or, indeed, what the Trust has done in the past.

TiL has been a huge influence over the club since its inception in 2003. The organisation was formed in response to the takeover of the football club by John Gurney. TiL played a major role in ousting Mr Gurney, of whom I'm sure you all have fond memories (!), and fought for a fans' shareholding at the club, which was later to prove very important.

Last year, TiL used its shareholding to look into Jayten's running of the football club. Our shareholding meant that we could ask to see the

accounts and, after much delay from Jayten, they were made available, albeit in a very draft form. They showed that the club was running at huge losses and being run in such a way that led us to the point where we publicly questioned the competence of the then custodians. The FA charges (and the FA's subsequent verdict), amongst other things, fully vindicated the questioning line that TiL took at the time. This action, we felt, was taken in the nick of time, before something worse than being -30 in League Two happened - i.e. the death of the football club.

During this time, two people had become involved in TiL. Gary Sweet and Stephen Browne's influence was vital in winning our club back and their past involvement with us speaks volumes for how much of a fans concept '2020' is and why it is so refreshing to see them in the board room of LTFC. This is a perfect illustration of how influential TiL can be.

What does the Trust do?

TiL's remit is to promote and represent Luton Town and its fans in the wider community. This involves community sponsorship opportunities, such as the sponsoring of local youth clubs' football shirts and attending appropriate events. Clubs to benefit this year include Biggleswade United U15s, Woburn Lionesses U10s and Luton United U9s. We hope to be able to expand our sponsorship in the future.

In a drive to engage with local children, TiL is running a 'design-

a-TiL-logo' competition. This is open to 250 local schools within Bedfordshire and the winner will be announced later this year/early next year. The winner receives a VIP day out to a 2008-09 Luton game for themselves and their whole class. There are runners-up prizes, as well as a family ticket for each school that participates, to be distributed how the school sees fit. Further information is available on our website or by contacting us at info@trustinluton.org. Several schools have already expressed an interest, so get your entries in by 30 November 2008!

The community role is absolutely crucial in influencing future generations to support Luton. We are a non-profit organisation and ask for just £10 per year for membership with funds going towards community projects like those mentioned above.

Through TiL, we also represent your views to the club and we will, again, have a shareholding in Luton Town FC in the very near future. The current owners are keen that the Trust takes that shareholding in the club and we thank them for that.

TiL also represents you in wider discussions with the football authorities. We recently met with the Football League where we had the opportunity to express our views on the points penalty. TiL have also been talking to Luton Borough Council about various issues related to the club and its fans. An ongoing

dialogue has been established and we want to build on that to benefit the future development of the club within the town.

We also work closely with Loyal Luton Supporters Club and Luton Town Supporters Club and this partnership has proved very fruitful. I'd like to thank my counterparts in those organisations, Kev Lennon and Kev Barrett, for their efforts over the past 12-18 months. The unity we have shown, whilst maintaining our separate identities, has, I think, been a huge influence in ensuring that we have a club owned by fans who hold the long term interests of LTFC dearly and who promise much-needed stability after yet another damaging episode in our history. The three of us will be meeting the FA towards the end of October to discuss the FA's 10 point deduction, thus ensuring that the diverse Luton fanbase is fully represented.

The Trust's Future

As mentioned previously, we will continue to own a shareholding in the football club and we really want to hear your views and ideas on how best the club should move forward. 2020 have already made great strides, not only in putting out the many fires left by the previous owners, which threatened to engulf the club, but also in improving the

experience for all Luton fans. They are very open to new ideas and a great way for you to express those is through us. The bigger we are the louder our voice will be, so your support will be welcomed and valued and new members are always welcome.

We hope to continue to engage in community projects in order to spread the name of Luton Town FC throughout Luton, the rest of Bedfordshire and even beyond. With the dominance of the so-called 'big four' in the media, this work takes on even more significance and the people on the Trust board that represent you in this area are doing a terrific job.

We are also looking at ways of making us more accessible. We plan to have a membership table at most home games, as well as looking at easier ways to pay membership fees. Our membership year runs up until 30 June, so please don't forget to re-join if you have, previously, been a member!

We are proud to be able to say that John Moore is TiL's President and it's fantastic to be able to work with the man. To take this concept further, we want TiL to have a 'team' of Vice Presidents who can help spread the word about Luton Town in an ambassadorial role.

TRUST IN LUTON

We are delighted that Kevin Nicholls has already agreed to sign up to the Vice President team – the man truly is a Luton legend! We have got several more names that we want to chase but if you have any ideas on who else could make up our VP XI, then feel free to get in touch at info@trustinluton.org. If you would like to find out more about us, please take a look on our website at www.trustinluton.org. And if you want to join TiL, a membership form can be found on our website or, if you are a season ticket holder, in your season ticket packs.

Before I sign-off, I would like to thank you for continuing to support Luton Town FC, urge you to continue doing so in the future and be assured that 2020's business model will see better times come our way in the not-too-distant future. There will be ups and downs but if we stick with it and get behind the boys on the pitch, we have every chance of maintaining our long and illustrious presence in the Football League. Luton Town's history is something of which we should be rightly proud.

LUTON TOWN RETIRE SEAT FOR THE SEASON

Paul Vann, a Luton Town fan for nearly 40 years, sadly passed away in June this year from meningitis. Luton Town have decided as a mark of respect to retire his seat for the season.

Paul, 48, had been a season ticket holder for nearly 40 years and was regularly seen at away games. He sat in the main stand block D, originally with his Father and then with his long standing friend Kim.

"We first met way back in 1971, when we were both late for the coach going to York City" Kim told the club. "Fortunately we managed to catch the coach and have been best friends ever since. Paul was a larger than life character who loved this football club. We sat next to each other for years so for 2020 to offer to retire his seat for the season would have meant a lot to Paul. He was a real friend and fan who will be missed by everyone who knew him."

Luton Town director, Antony Brown, who also travelled to games with Paul, added "Often in football people praise players for showing loyalty to clubs and as a gesture after 10 years you might earn a benefit year, I don't believe enough is made of the fans that show loyalty to a club for say 30 or 40 years or even longer. Paul was a true fan in every sense of the word and as a mark of respect we have offered to retire his seat for the season. Whether or not we draw Manchester United at home in the cup there will be one empty seat in the ground with Paul's name on it".

After back-to-back years fighting for their Football League status, Chester City fans will be hoping that this season will bring about better fortunes.

Since storming to the Conference title in 2004, the Blues have failed to make a real impact in the Football League.

But a quick glance at this season's squad suggests that they could spring a few surprises with former Luton midfielder Simon Davies, the current Chester boss, assembling some strength in depth.

Davies, who started his career as a player as Manchester United, has the experience of former Shrewsbury favourite Ryan Lowe in attack, who has been in inspirational form this season, scoring four goals in eight games.

Lowe is in his second spell with the club,

Chester play their home games at the Saunders Honda Stadium.

The club offices are the only section of the ground which is situated in England.

This stadium was originally known as the Deva Stadium, but was renamed the Saunders Honda Stadium, due to a sponsorship deal with the company.

However the deal collapsed towards the end of the 2006-2007 season, as supporters and the media still referred to the ground as the Deva (the original Roman name of the city).

The club have recently unveiled plans to invest many millions of pounds into developing the stadium.

It is intended to expand the stadium to four tiers, and to also expand the complex to include office facilities, along with a gym, cafes, and retail developments.

The development is currently in the early planning stages.

TheBlues

having originally joined in March 2005, scoring 17 goals in 42 appearances.

Lowe is currently partnered by the inexperienced Paul McManus in attack, who scored in his first appearance of the season against Shrewsbury last week.

Luton will have to be wary of the form of Kevin Ellison this afternoon.

The former Leicester and Hull player is another midfielder who is in his second spell with the club, having originally joined in 2004.

Ellison is currently in a rich run of form, scoring a hat-trick in an impressive 3-1 away win against Grimsby recently, to add to his previous strikes against Rotherham and Barnet.

In defence, Chester have high hopes on the future of Kevin Roberts, who has blossomed as a first team regular since making the breakthrough from the youth system whilst the experience at the back comes from Paul Butler, the 35-year-old who has spent time at Bury, MK Dons, Wolves and Sunderland.

The Manager

Although born in England, Davies was capped for the Welsh national team against Switzerland in 1996. After leaving Manchester United in a six-figure sum to Luton Town, Davies struggled to recapture his early promise and his league career was to end with spells with Macclesfield Town and Rochdale. In 2006, Davies joined the coaching staff at Chester City, predominantly as part of the youth set-up. In April 2007 he was appointed as the club's caretaker-manager after the departure of Mark Wright. He took charge for the final game of the season, as Chester lost 2-0 at Lincoln City. Despite the loss, Davies was offered an interview for the job on a permanent basis but Bobby Williamson was subsequently appointed, although Davies remained at the club as youth team manager. The following March, Davies was again appointed as Chester's caretaker manager following Williamson's sacking. Despite losing his first two games in caretaker charge, Davies was named manager until the end of the season on 11 March 2008.

John Danby

John Danby spent five seasons at Kidderminster Harriers before joining City in May 2006. Danby became an ever present during the 2006/7 season. In August 2007, Danby penned a new deal which will see him at The Deva Stadium until May 2009.

Paul Butler

Paul joined City just prior to the start of the 2007/8 season and in March 2008, he was given the additional job of assistant manager to Simon Davies.

Laurence Wilson

Chester City signed left winger Laurence Wilson from Everton in May 2006. The England Under-19 signed

professional terms with Everton in November 2004 and has featured in their reserves team on a regular basis. He is seen as a bright prospect and he put on some pleasing displays in his first season at the club.

Paul Linwood

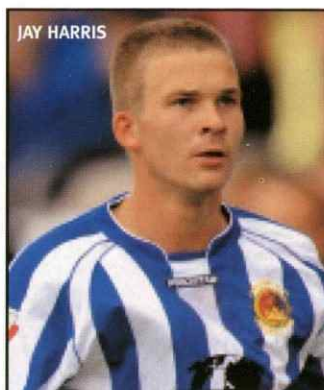
His arrival at City was the subject of a Football League tribunal who adjudged that Rovers should receive a fee for the centre half.

James Vaughan

James made more than 50 appearances for Tranmere Rovers reserves, before leaving Prenton Park in December 2005. He made several appearances towards the conclusion of the 2006/7 season and demonstrated his abilities well and has continued to impress during the early part of the current campaign.

Kevin Roberts

He is a bright young prospect who has made countless appearances in the Youth Team this season and has received favourable comments from the Team Manager. Roberts has made an instant impact within the senior squad, he has the physique, the footballing brain and ability that will no doubt see him play at a much higher level in years

to come.

Shaun Kelly

A product of the youth system at Chester City. Kelly was drafted into the squad having impressed the management. He is an able defender and has made numerous appearances at Puma Youth Alliance level prior to joining the senior squad on pro-terms.

Richie Partridge

City's pursuit of Partridge finally paid off after a degree of speculation linking him with a move to the club stepped up a gear when the his former club, Rotherham United released him. Partridge has also played for his country at Irish Under 21 level.

Kevin Ellison

Kevin Ellison is a left-sided midfielder with more than a

touch of class. He re-signed for Chester City at the end of June 2007, he had been at the club previously during the 2004/5 season and was sold to Hull City later the same season.

Mark Hughes

24-year-old Dungannon-born Mark Hughes joined Chester City after a period on trial in the run up to the 2007/8 campaign. Hughes, who has two caps under his belt for Northern Ireland, commenced his career at Tottenham Hotspur in 2001 as a trainee and he went on to spend 4 years at White Hart Lane.

Stephen Vaughan

Several clubs showed an interest in Stephen when he was released by Liverpool at the end of 2003/4 but he settled for The Deva Stadium. A right sided player, Stephen had been with Liverpool since the age of 9 and had progressed to play

for England at under 15,17 and 19 levels and had established himself as a regular in the reserve side at Anfield.

Paul Rutherford

Paul was a product of the Chester City Youth Development Programme and has hardly put a foot wrong since stepping through the door at Chester City. He has been consistent throughout his time at the club which is why he was elevated to the first team.

Paul McManus

McManus had impressed the City management with some quality performances at both Puma Youth Alliance and Pontins Reserve League levels making regular appearances and scoring quite a number of goals prior to gaining his first pro-contract. His ability to create and finish is impressive and it is a credit to the Youth

set-up at Chester City that McManus has been able to make the grade.

Anthony Barry

Barry made 64 league appearances for the Glovers, before being released in May 2008. This stint included an appearance at Wembley Stadium in the Football League One play-off final against Blackpool in 2006-07. On June 19, 2008 Barry signed a 2-year contract with Chester City.

Ryan Lowe

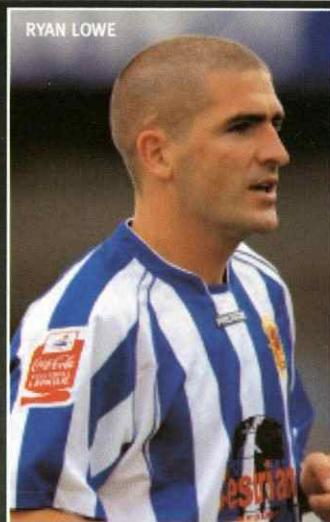
On July 2, 2008, Lowe returned to Chester on a two year deal. Lowe scored twice in his first home game back for Chester against Leeds United in the Carling Cup on August 12, 2008 and repeated the feat in a 5-1 thrashing of Barnet later in the month.

David Mannix

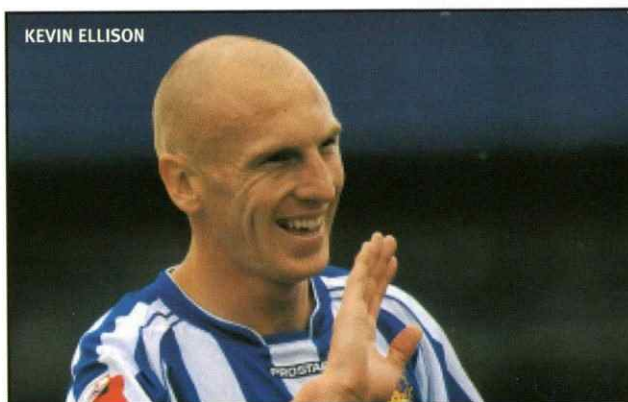

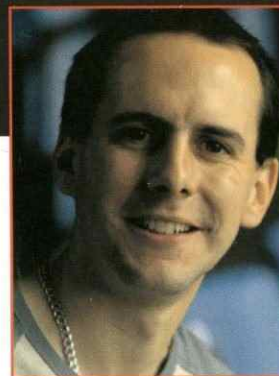

7 The most number of goals scored in this fixture. It was actually the first ever competitive meeting between the two sides and Luton were 5-2 winners at Kenilworth Road in January 1966. Graham French and Tony Read netted, before John O'Rourke scored the fifth hat-trick of his Luton career.

1 Just one player has made his debut in a fixture against Chester, Brian Johnson. He featured for the first time in a goal-less draw at Chester in 1966/67. He only made a further nine league and two FA Cup appearances

3 Luton have only entertained Chester three times in the league, winning twice and drawing once. The Hatters have scored six goals and conceded twice.

13,266 The biggest attendance for this fixture, came in April 1968, as Luton were closing in on the Division Four Championship. The match ended goal-less, and extended Luton's unbeaten run to 16 matches.

1 The sides have met once in a Cup competition, and it was the only time Chester have beaten the Hatters. It was January 1977 and the home side were victorious, 1-0, in a FA Cup 4th Round tie.

3 The number of players to have been transferred from Chester to Luton. Ron Davies was the first, in 1962, and he went on to score 21 goals in 33 appearances for the Hatters before moving on to Norwich City a year later. The Fletcher brothers, Ron and Paul, moved from Chester in 1974, and they featured for four seasons before moving to Manchester City. Paul scored just one goal in 142 appearances whilst Ron managed 43 in 133

before joining Darlington.

In both 1965/66 and 1966/67 the Hatters won at home and drew away, whereas in 1967/68 Luton drew at Kenilworth Road and then won 3-1 at Chester. 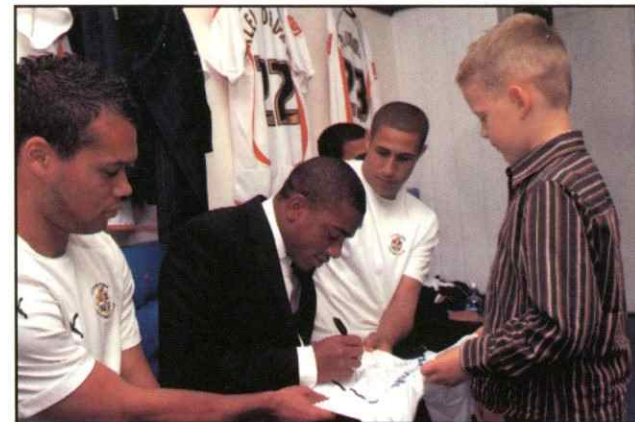

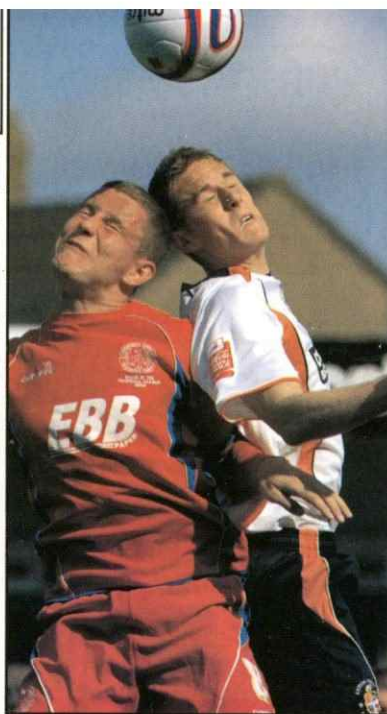

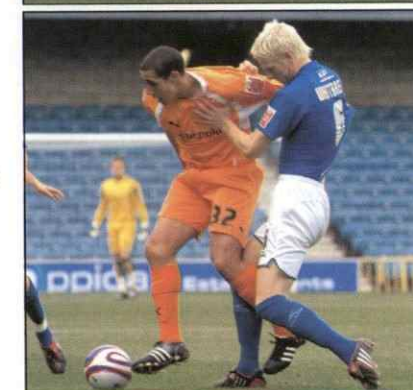

There's no better way to start a footballing career than scoring on your home debut, and the pacey forward did just that last season.

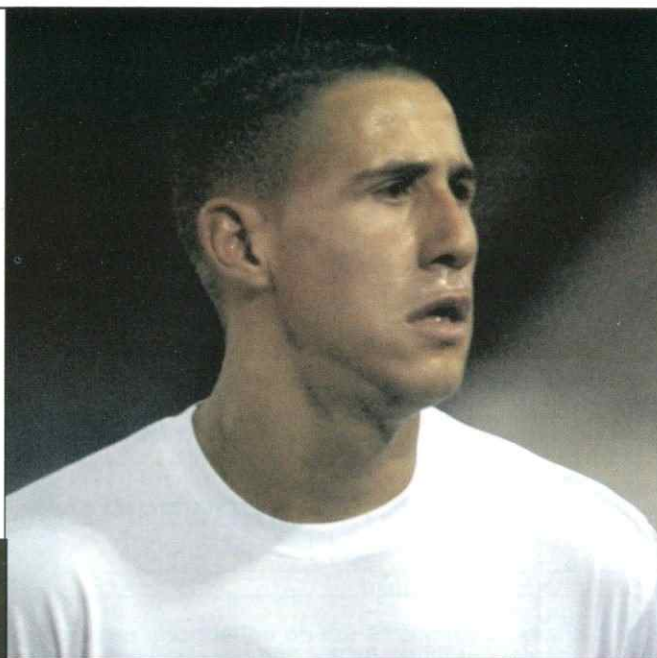

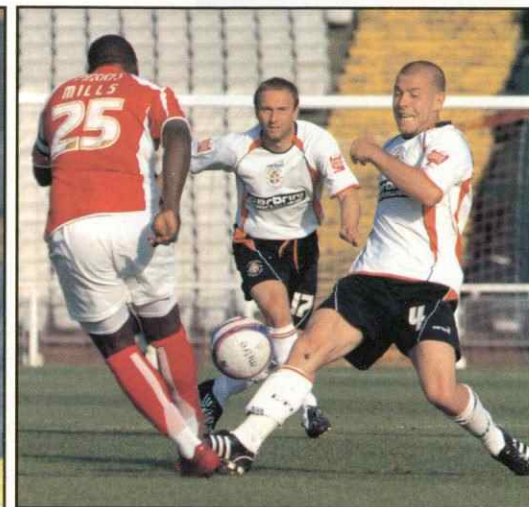

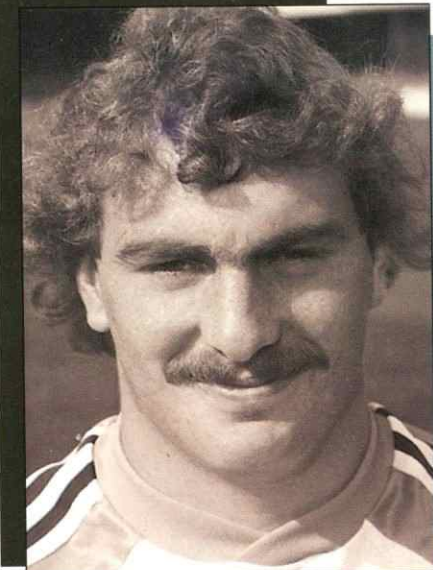

Club Historian Roger Wash looks back at Clive Goodyear's first game for the Hatters

Lincoln born Clive was turning out for local side Lincoln United when his manager Graham Clapham, an old friend of David Pleat, recommended that the commanding centre-half be considered for trials at Kenilworth Road.

This led to 17 year old Clive signing on for the Hatters in October 1978 where he made his way up through the ranks leading to his League debut



in April 1980 in a Division Two clash against Wrexham at Kenilworth Road.

The Town had narrowly missed out on promotion to the top flight and in this, the final home game of the campaign, David Pleat decided to blood two teenagers, Neil Madden and Clive Goodyear.

"I was told a couple of days before that I was being drafted into the first team to replace Mike Saxby," recalled Clive.

"Wrexham had a good side at the time and I was to play up against Dixie McNeil who had been a hero of mine from his days as a prolific scorer at Lincoln City, who I followed as a youngster."

"I felt I played well that day and certainly held Dixie. We kept a clean sheet and I should have scored with a header which would have made it a real dream debut."

Clive was back in the reserves the following season as the Town again just missed out on promotion but did

eventually win a regular first team slot in 1981/82, taking the place of the badly injured Mike Saxby.

The Town walked away with the championship of Division Two that season and it is to Clive's credit that Saxby was never missed.

Retaining his place as the Hatters clung on to their top flight status following that never to be forgotten last day win at Manchester City, Clive eventually lost his place to Paul Elliott and moved on to Plymouth in 1984.

Clive then enjoyed a spell at Wimbledon, where he won an FACup winners medal, before closing his playing career at Brentford.

A qualified physiotherapist, Clive has worked for a number of clubs, including the Town, and now has his own practice in Bletchley.

The game Luton Town 2 Wrexham 0 26th April 1980

After a nerve-jangling end to the 1978/79 season, David Pleat's first full campaign in charge when the Town just managed to avoid relegation, it came as a breath of fresh air to see the manager's ideas start to take shape in 1979/80.

With a settled side, the

Hatters were in the top three for most of the season and were still in pole position as late as February.

Sadly, the players ran out of steam and consistency as the campaign drew to a close and after a monumental struggle at fellow promotion contenders Birmingham on 19th April, which was lost 0-1, David Pleat had to admit that a return to the top flight would have to wait.

For the last home game of the season against Wrexham, Pleat decided to hand debuts to 18 year old Neil Madden and Clive Goodyear, who was a year older.

It was Goodyear who caught the eye, as Wrexham adopted a stifling 4-4-2 formation, winning just about everything in the air and limiting the prolific Dixie McNeil to only

one chance which the 19 goal striker spurned.

At half-time most of the crowd of 9,049, which was higher than would normally be expected due to a price reduction, were still feeling short changed but what was said by Pleat to the players during the interval made the second period far more entertaining.

The Town now seemed to find an extra yard of space in midfield forcing Wrexham to defend in depth, and with forwards Brian Stein and Bob Hatton pulling defenders all over the place

a string of openings were created as the Hatters piled forward.

Surprisingly, it took until the 65th minute for the deadlock to be broken with David Moss angling a perfect chip into the far corner of the net from the left wing.

Wrexham spent the rest of the game defending for their lives and only the brilliance of goalkeeper Eddie Niedzwiecki kept the score down.

The brave goalkeeper was finally beaten again in the final minute when Stein rammed the ball home from close range following a Madden headed pass.

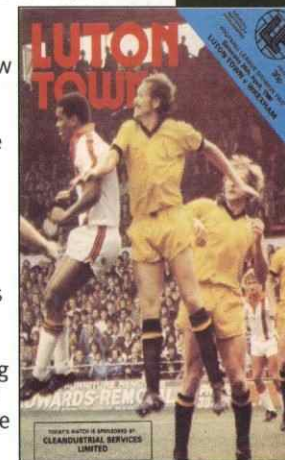
This second goal triggered a pitch invasion of delighted supporters and their enthusiasm was echoed by Pleat afterwards who was starting to see all his hard work and forward thinking finally bearing fruit.

Luton played a very energetic and young Northampton side and the whole team put in good performances.

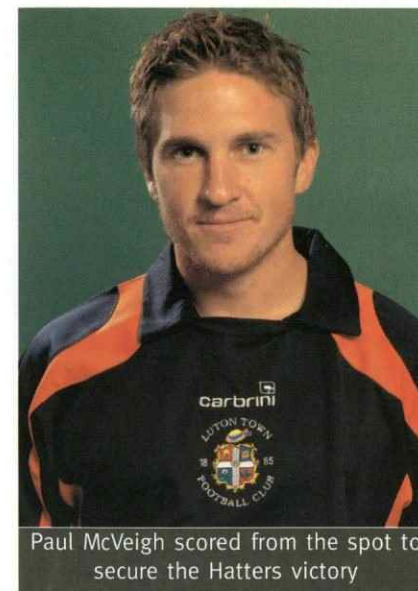
Our experienced players showed great attitude and a desire to play well and to help the young lads.

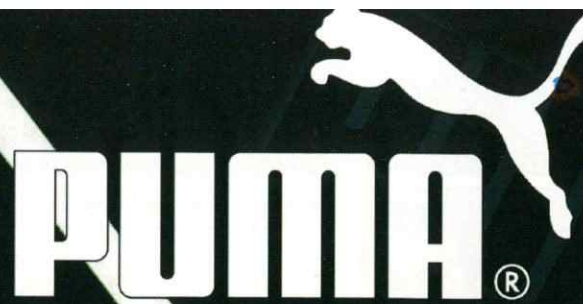

RIGHT BACK

Tim Breacker

An outstanding full back in probably the best side Luton ever had. Rarely missed a match, and missed tackles from Tim were even more rare. Spent many successful seasons with Luton and makes this team easily.

CENTRE BACK

Mal Donaghy

The word 'legend' is used on occasions and Mal was certainly a legend with Luton Town. A quality defender who was a major part of Luton winning the Littlewoods Cup in 1988 and our regular survival acts in the First Division. He even gave away the penalty in the Final to add to the drama. Went onto to be a big part of the early success of Manchester United under Alex Ferguson.

CENTRE BACK

Steve Foster

Sid Owen was the first name I wrote at centre half but I probably didn't see him play enough to put him down against Steve who was not only a fearless defender but also the best captain and motivator I have seen at Luton Town. The successful years coincided with Steve arriving at the Club and it was not difficult to know

why when you saw him play.

LEFT BACK

Richard Harvey

An able performer from our most successful First Division days during the 1980s and early 90s. A reliable and consistent defender (my daughter cannot believe I haven't included Matt Taylor here but to me he was a better midfielder than full back and he didn't play at the top level for us) Richard was from our youth set up under John Moore and I would have loved to have John included in my team if only for his total dedication to Luton Town FC and his successful managerial days.

RIGHT MIDFIELD

Graham French

Graham didn't play at the top level but his type of ball playing dribbling winger is sorely missed in modern football. He was the Cristiano Ronaldo of the 1960's and scored the best goal ever seen at Kenilworth Road; fortunately I was in the ground to witness it. I am sure I recollect that BBC Radio 5 Live ran a competition to find the best ever goal and Graham won it.

CENTRE MIDFIELD

Ricky Hill

Maybe the most gifted ball playing midfielder to have graced a Luton Town shirt. He was outstanding in our best ever team and the plastic pitch was made for his quality passing technique to be so effective. It was a shame that he came back as an unsuccessful manager but he will always be remembered most for his playing skills.

CENTRE MIDFIELD

Bruce Rioch

Went on to prove his talents at the very highest level and could set a match alright with his devastating runs and his stunning

shooting that resulted in many breathtaking goals. My earliest memory was not the best though as my first away match was at Lincoln in 1966/7 and Bruce scored a stunning goal to give us the lead but we went on to lose 8-1, still a record defeat.

LEFT MIDFIELD

Ray Whittaker

A major member of the successful Fourth Division Championship side of 1968. Amazing tiny winger who contributed with lots of vital goals and could run many a defence ragged with his dribbling skills. Jean Louis Valois had to be close to selection if only for the stunning goal on debut against Torquay. A cricketing team mate and Watford fan was supporting Torquay that day and said on leaving the ground how good Jean Louis was praise indeed.

STRIKER

Malcolm Macdonald (Supernac)

I have been told I can only pick Malcolm once, what a Shame!! Supernac had everything a centre forward needed. He could score with either foot or his head and had explosive pace. My favourite all time footballer who would feature in any team I had to pick and was worth the entrance money on his own. I was also lucky enough to be at St James's Park Newcastle for his home debut when he scored a hat trick against Liverpool.

STRIKER

Brian Stein

Played in of our most successful team and a Luton all-time hero. An exciting striker who has to be picked for his two goals in the final against Arsenal in the League Cup. They would seal his selection in front of any other goal scorer and in front of Mick Harford, sorry Mick.

The Under 12's were also victorious with a 5-0 away win at St Albans City.

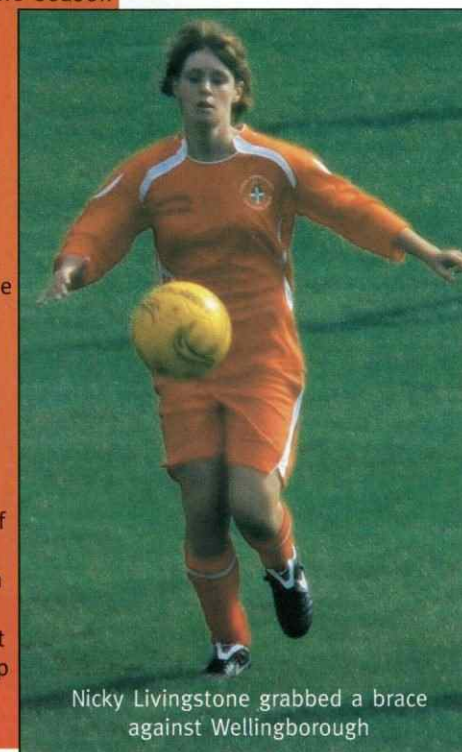

The Under 11's got off to winning ways over a strong Hampstead side with a 3-1 victory.



Published by Desert Island Books, it is an illustrated hardback of 256 pages, selling at £14.99.

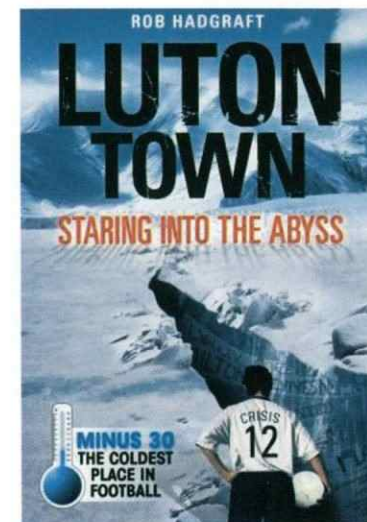
The foreword is written by Town director Stephen Browne.

2003 is a real eye-opener, when events surrounding the club caused consternation and amazement in equal measure.

Author Rob explained that this is the 11th sports book he has had published, but his very first about his favourite club.

Rob was born in Luton during the Hatters' very first spell in football's top flight and he was introduced to Kenilworth Road as a toddler by his dad.

Although his family then moved to Essex, he remained a loyal fan and after passing his driving test in 1973 was able to become a regular at home games ever since!

What's the Ground Like?

The ground has been now been completely re-built since the mid 80's, but the initial impression is that one side is twice as big as the other. The Kop End (or now known as the Carlsberg Stand), is a relatively new two tiered stand, that is simply huge and looks quite superb. With the corner between these stands also being filled, one has a truly impressive spectacle. The rest of the ground now looks somehow rather out of place. The Midland Road (East) is a covered single tiered stand, which has windshields to each side. At the remaining end is the TL

Dallas stand which is an odd looking small 'double decker' type stand. This two tiered covered stand has the upper tier largely overhanging the lower tier, giving this 'double decker' effect.

What Is It Like For Visiting Supporters?

After many years of being housed in the TL Dallas Stand, away fans are now accommodated in part of the Midland Road Stand at one side of the pitch. Around 1,300 supporters can be accommodated in this area of the Midland Road Stand.

Where To Eat & Drink?

There is the Carlton pub which is only a few minutes walk from behind the Kop Stand. It does allow in away fans. There are also a couple of hotels with bars, all about a ten minute walk away. They are the Park & Cartwright hotels. Just continue to walk on the main road by the ground away from the town centre and at the traffic lights where the entrance to the park is, turn right and you will see them in a row on your right.

How To Get There By Car?

Turn onto the A505 towards the M1. Join the M1, heading North. Continue on the M1 until you reach junction 42, here join the M62, signposted Manchester. Leave the M62 at junction 27 and merge onto the A62. Continue forward until the second roundabout. Here take the first exit onto the A650, signposted Bradford. Continue on the A650 for 4.5 miles. Turn left onto the A647. At the first roundabout take the 2nd exit onto the A6181, continue forward. At the traffic signals continue forward onto Manningham Lane (A650) then turn right onto Valley Parade

Car Parking

After finishing in the play-offs last season Darlington began this campaign as one of the favourites to be involved in the end of season shake up once more.

The Quakers finished 6th in League 2 last season on 78 points, making the Play-Offs but lost out to Rochdale over two legs in May, losing 5-4 on penalties after both legs ended 2-1 to the home side. Dale then went onto lose 3-2 to Stockport County and Darlington took full advantage of the (other) Hatters success, signing three of their players in the summer.

Adam Proudlock, David Poole and Adam Griffin all played their part in Stockport's fine form last season and will be hoping for another promotion come May. They were joined at Darlington by Robin Hulbert (Port Vale), Jason Kennedy (Middlesbrough) and Clayton Fortune (Leyton Orient).

All those players have done their bit so far but the star man so far has been striker Billy Clarke, on loan from Ipswich Town who has bagged seven goals in just nine games. Four of those came in 6-0 demolition of Macclesfield at Moss Rose and earned the Irish youngster a nomination for the August Powerade Player of the Month award.

Two more goals in last weekend's 3-0 home win over Accrington Stanley, have

seen him continue his good form and prove to be an inspired signing by boss Dave Penney.

Penney is in his third season at the Darlington Arena after replacing Dave Hodgson in October 2006. His only other managerial experience came at Doncaster Rovers, where he spent five years in charge between 2001 and 2006, taking Rovers from the Conference to League 1.

The two sides have only met nine times in all competitions, the last coming in January 2002, when the two sides were last in the bottom tier of English football. On that occasion Darlington ran out 3-2 winners at their old ground Feethams. Steve Howard and Jean-Louis Valois were amongst the goals for the Hatters but it

was all in vain.

The last meeting at Kenilworth Road came in October 2001 and saw Luton complete an emphatic 5-2 victory, with five different players all on the scoresheet. It was the visitors who took the lead through Daniel Mellanby before Matt Spring sent in Luton 1-1 at the break. Howard, Crowe, Nicholls and Valois completed the scoring.

In the complete head to head Darlington have won three, of the nine meetings but have never won at Kenilworth Road. The Hatters have won on five occasions, while there has been just one draw, that coming in the FA Cup in 2000 before Luton went on to win the replay 2-0.
