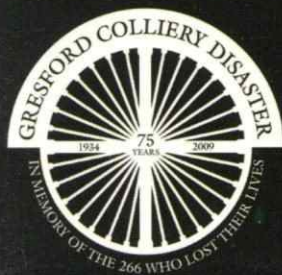
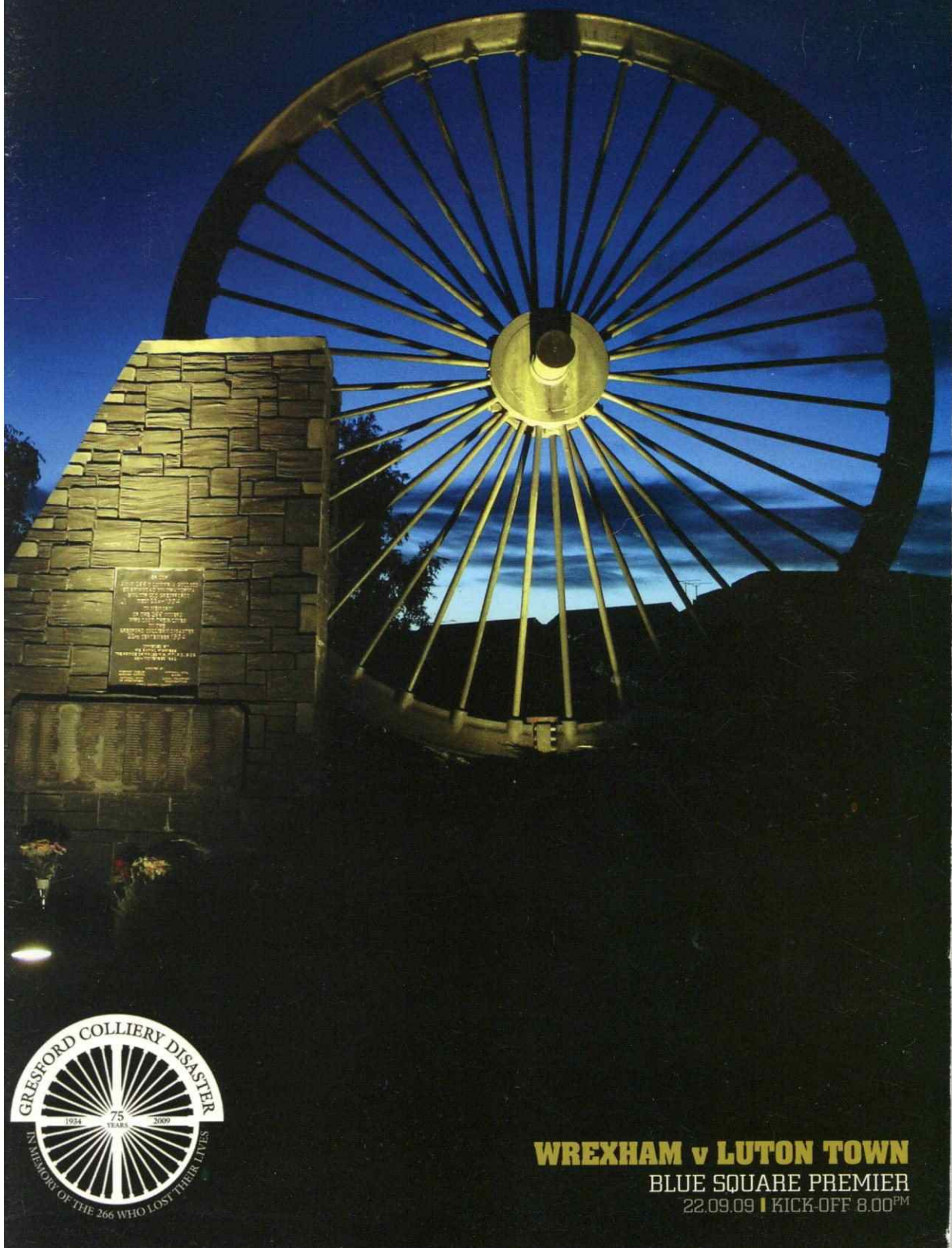


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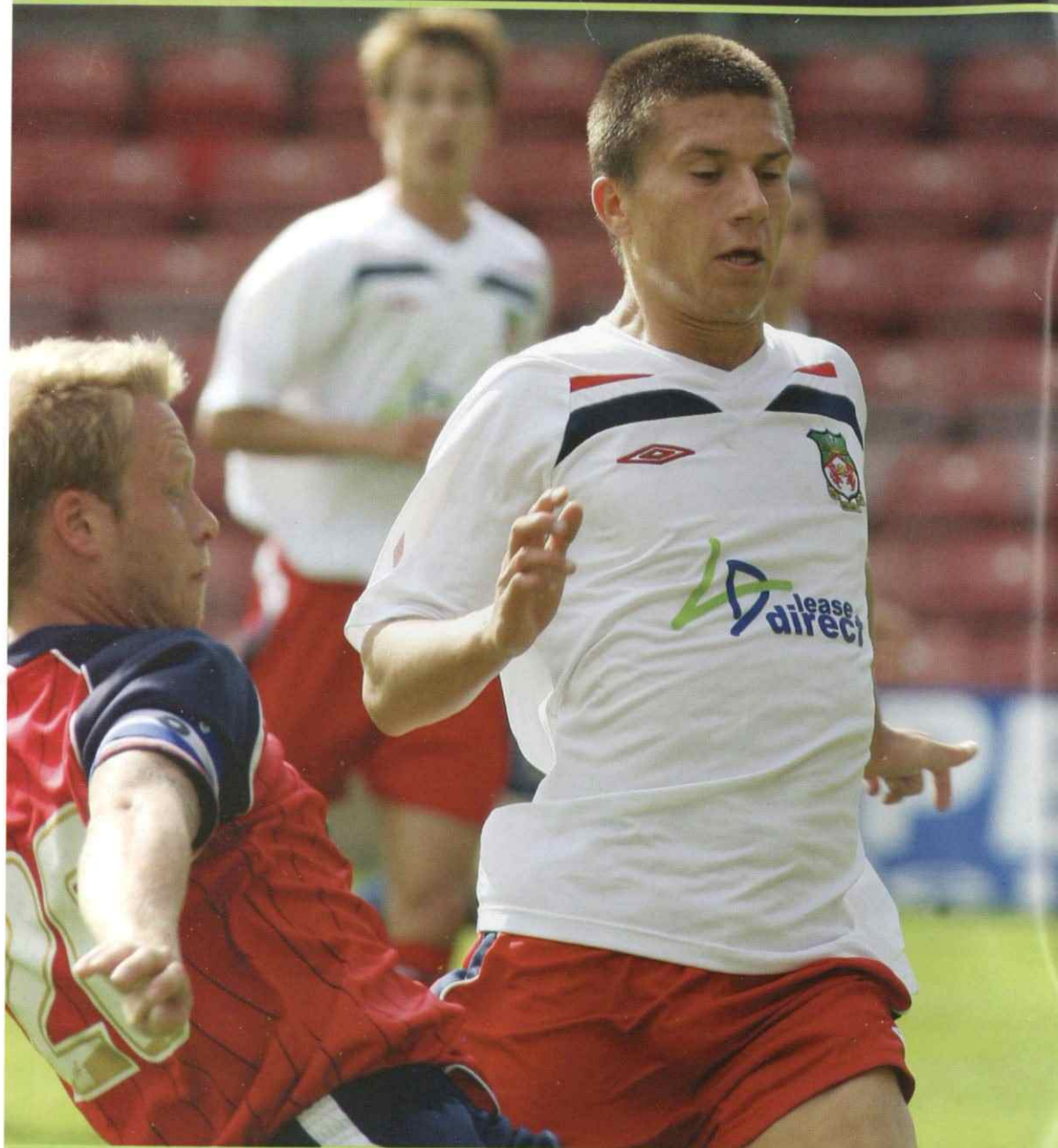


WREXHAM v LUTON TOWN

Tonight we are gathered here at The Racecourse for a football match; indeed

just being able to go to a game is something we all take for granted. Yet for many Wrexham fans 75 years ago this very day, their hopes of watching their team play were cruelly extinguished.

This area has long been synonymous with the mining industry, and consequently hundreds of the club's supporters worked at the nearby Gresford Colliery. With the side due to face Tranmere Rovers on the afternoon of Saturday, 22 September, 1934, many miners were working back-to-back shifts so that they could finish in time to make the match.

Indeed, the club's regular 3.15 p.m. start time was scheduled with those same miners in mind; the extra fifteen minutes giving them the chance to get from the colliery to the ground after the shift had ended.

Tragically, that day, they didn't make the kick-off.

An explosion in the Dennis Shaft in the early hours was followed by a raging fire which trapped 261 miners, all of whom perished in the ensuing blaze. Four more died in the futile rescue attempts, whilst a further surface worker was killed by flying debris from a secondary explosion three days later.

This evening we pay our respects to those 266 people who lost their life in what became known simply as the Gresford Disaster.

As supporters, we pass our tales of great games and famous players on to each generation. For those in the Dennis Shaft, their memories may have died with them but we will not forget.

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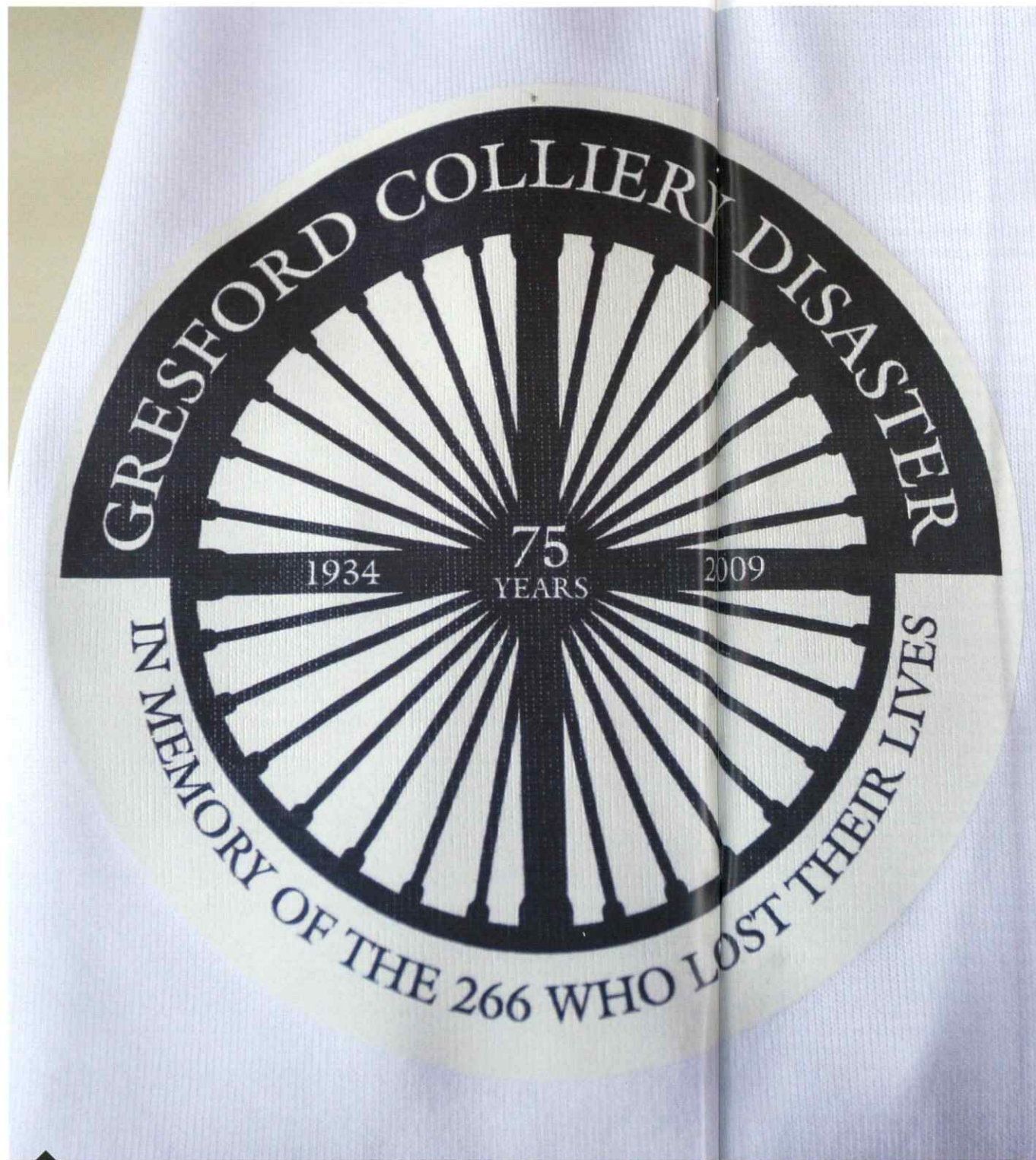

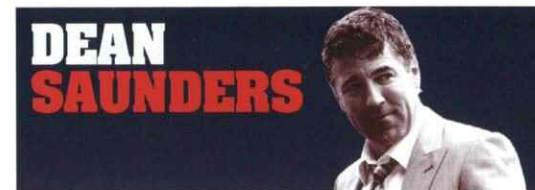

Good evening and welcome to what is a very special night here at The Racecourse. As footballers, we are fortunate enough to lead very privileged lives and are paid for playing a game we all fervently love; something most people can only dream of.

Being brought up in South Wales myself, you naturally have an affinity with the coal mines because they have been the lifeblood of the valleys since the last century. It's the same here in the north where the pits were an integral part of the local community. The miners led a very harsh existence and few would envy their day's work.

Tonight we pay tribute to the 266 men, many supporters of the club, who lost their lives in the Gresford Colliery Disaster exactly 75 years ago. It's an event which is with us every day because our training ground, Colliers Park, sits on the site of the former pit and was named in tribute to those very same miners.

For many, it will be an emotional evening and I hope that both sides can produce a match worthy of the occasion. However, if we are to do that then we need to improve significantly on Saturday's disappointing display at Cambridge.

Despite looking lively in the opening stages, we conceded another poor goal from a free-kick and once again found ourselves having to chase the game. That's always difficult at any level but we still managed to create a number of chances to have got back on level terms, and certainly had the better of the exchanges in the second-half before letting in a second goal late on.

It was very quiet on the coach on the way back to Wrexham; we all know we are capable of playing far better than we did but we're struggling to find the right balance at the moment. That's why I'm having to make changes to the starting line-up each week.

No manager wants to do that because when you've got a settled side it invariably means that the team is playing well and, more importantly, winning.

Football is a results business and irrespective of all the hard work that has gone on behind the scenes since my arrival last October, ultimately every manager is judged on results.

Our last home match with Oxford showed that we are capable of competing against the top teams in this league. Again we started brightly, with a good tempo, and had the better of the play only to give away another set-piece goal when the officials failed to spot an infringement on Chris Maxwell.

Worse was to come after the interval when Frank Sinclair was shown a second yellow card for the most innocuous of challenges; in my opinion it wasn't even a free-kick let alone a bookable offence. I went to talk to the assistant referee about what he had seen and found myself following Frank down the tunnel. That made it doubly frustrating but, try as we might, we couldn't engineer an equaliser.

We added Lamine Sakho and Angelos Tsiaklis to the squad last week and both featured in the defeat at Cambridge. Lamine has come through a rigorous fitness schedule and showed excellent close control to engineer a couple of goalscoring chances against The U's.

Aneglos had a brief spell with us last term and is a skilful midfielder who works hard for the team and has a creative edge to his play. He has initially signed a monthly contract and we will assess the situation from there.

As for tonight's visitors Luton, they started the season as overwhelming favourites for promotion and with that comes the burden of supporters expected to see their side win every week; that can be difficult for the players to cope with. Mick Harford's side have made a solid start to the campaign and will prove us with another stern test but it's one we have to be able to cope with.

Enjoy the game!

UPFRONT

THE GRESFORD DISASTER



Tonight's match falls on the 75th anniversary of the Gresford Disaster. In the first of a two-part article, we look back at the chain of events surrounding the disaster, its impact on the local community and the football club.

It was ten o'clock on the evening of Friday, 21 September, 1934 when the night shift began at the Dennis Section of the Gresford Colliery. First opened in November 1907, and named after Mrs Dyke Dennis who had cut the first sod, the shaft was completed to a depth of 2,263 feet by the summer of 1911 and now proved work for over 2,200 local people.

The dangers of working so far below ground were self-evident with an average of one thousand killed in British pits each year, each miner having a one in seven chance of being seriously injured. But times were hard and jobs scarce; for most men it was a risk worth taking to make sure that they could feed their families.

At least they could look forward to watching their beloved football side. Wrexham, resplendent in their dark blue jerseys, were playing host to Tranmere Rovers in a top of the table clash in the Third Division (North) the next day. Both sides were undefeated and a big crowd was expected at The Racecourse.

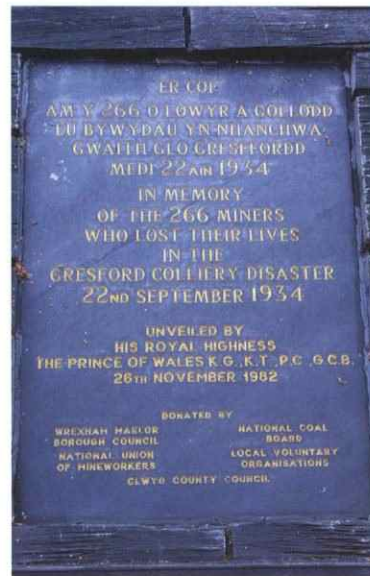
For many of the miners, it was an opportunity too good to miss and several were working double shifts – two consecutive eight-hour stints – in order to watch the game. This was, of course, illegal but everybody turned a blind eye to it because money was tight and football a welcome relief.

The Gresford site had two main shafts sunk less than 50 yards apart. The Dennis was the downshaft and carried both men and fresh air to the coalface; it was also the main route for bringing the 'black gold' out of the ground. Just a short distance away, the southern Martin upshaft, named after Sir Theodore Martin, primarily brought stale air back to the surface but was also utilised for getting men and supplies underground.

The men had stopped for 'snapping', the mid-shift meal break, at 2.00 a.m. on the Saturday morning when the Dennis Section was rocked by a load explosion just a matter of minutes later.

Fred Davies, who was in his cabin at the bottom of the shaft, heard and felt the explosion; he left the cabin to find out what

had occurred, but couldn't see anything as he was completely enveloped in dust. Davies rang the surface to warn them that an explosion had taken place. He then rang the 'Clutch' where the haulage machine was but his second call remained answered.



Above ground, news began to spread that an accident had occurred. Families began to gather at the pithead desperate to find out information about what had happened to their loved ones and to see if they could aid the rescue attempt in any way.

Knowing instinctively that the chance of finding any survivors amongst the near 300 men and boys beneath the surface was slim, the rescue teams nevertheless worked tirelessly during the night but were forced back by fumes, fires and rock-falls.

Three of the rescuers were killed during an attempt to explore the return airway to another mining district; a rescue operation that saw the only 11 bodies recovered. In each case the cause of death was found to be carbon monoxide poisoning and probably the toxic gas sent to sleep all those who were

not killed by the initial explosion. However, we will never know what really happened to the men down the Dennis.

Apart from a handful of miners working near the pit bottom, and one deputy and five men who managed to escape from the Section itself, every man on the shift was killed – all 261 miners.

Amazingly, the six had managed to escape after they made their way through the cramped return airway from the 29s district, clambering over roof falls, climbing ladders up the fault that passed through the pit and just keeping one step ahead of the deadly gas following in their footsteps.

The rescue operation was still in full swing when Wrexham and Tranmere took to the field at The Racecourse, less than two miles away from the site of the disaster. Some 10,100 attended the match but many argued that the game should have been called off, the local Wrexham League having already taken the decision to postpone all its scheduled matches as a mark of respect.

Others felt that it was an opportunity to take peoples minds off the tragedy and allow them to seek solace with missing friends and family; in some cases men who would have been stood next to them on The Racecourse terracing but for the disaster. The thoughts of those buried underground no doubt remained in the minds of those at the game throughout the ninety minutes play.

Both teams appeared from The Turf dressing rooms wearing black arm bands and the players, along with officials and directors, walked out onto The Racecourse pitch to line-up in the centre of the field. The crowd removed their hats and caps and stood bareheaded for a two minutes silence which was impeccably observed. Ironically, the pre-match music was to have been provided by the Gresford Colliery Silver Prize Band.

As for the football, both teams maintained their unbeaten records courtesy of a 2-2 draw. George Frewin and George Snow scored Wrexham's goals, whilst Urmsion and Baker netted for Tranmere. Snow also missed a penalty for Wrexham, Welsh international keeper Albert Gray saving it before Snow shot the rebound over the bar.

The Wrexham team that fateful day was: Ted Adams; Alf Jones, Jim Hamilton; Jim Bulling, Hugh McMahon, Matt Lawrence; Bill Bryant, George Frewin, Tommy Bamford, George Snow, Harry Waller.

Following the final whistle, many supporters made their way to Gresford to seek news of survivors but the rescue attempt was by now growing ever more dangerous. Despite the determined efforts of over 200 men to control the raging fires, there was little they could do but let the fire burn itself out.

As such, at 7.45 p.m. on the Sunday evening, William Bonsall, the colliery manager, Sir Henry Walker, the Chief Inspector of Mines and Edward Jones, the Miners' Agent agreed to abandon and seal off the pit.

Explosions had been heard inbye (further in to the pit) of the rescue work during the afternoon and there was a fear that unless the rescuers got out, the death toll could be greater still. The pit was duly sealed but two days later the build up of gases saw the seal blown off the Dennis shaft with the resultant debris killing a surface worker.

In all, the disaster had claimed the lives of 266 men.

*You've heard of the Gresford disaster,
Of the terrible price that was paid;
Two hundred and sixty-two colliers were lost,
And three of the rescue brigade.
It occurred in the month of September;
At two in the morning the pit
Was racked by a violent explosion

Now the gas in the Dennis deep section
Was packed there like snow in a drift;
And many a man had to leave the coal-face

The collier manager had them destroyed,
To cover his criminal ways.
Down there in the dark they are lying;
They died for nine shillings a day.
They have worked out their shift
and now they must lie,

To help out the children and wives;
The owners have sent some white lilies,
To pay for the poor colliers' lives.
Farewell our dear wives and our children,
Farewell our dear comrades as well.
Don't send your sons down the dark dreary Pit;
They'll be damned like the sinners in hell.*

BBC Wales' Football Editor IAN GWYN HUGHES reflects on tonight's special memorial to the victims of the Gresford Disaster

We have all done it of course; had a real moan about our club. That they're not doing this, not doing that and that they pay no attention to what the fans really want. But, on this occasion, Wrexham Football Club and chief executive Paul Retout have got it spot on, one hundred percent right and they deserve plenty of praise.

I am of course referring to the club and the tribute being paid tonight to the 266 people who lost their lives in the Gresford Colliery tragedy, 75 years ago this very day. My father was just three at the time, my father-in-law would have been four, both living in the Coedpoeth, Rhosllannerchrugog area of Wrexham.

Too young of course to have witnessed the tragedy, too young to have realised its significance, but they do recall the feeling in the respective households. "Mae rhywbeth mawr wedi digwydd yn Gresford," which translated means "that something big has happened in Gresford."

Over the years at sporting events tragedies are remembered. In football we have plenty, in recent memory the Hillsborough Disaster and the Bradford Fire. I can recall hearing about the spectators being killed during a crowd surge at a Glasgow derby between Rangers and Celtic after a Colin Stein goal in the early 1970's. And I was watching Bolton versus Stoke on Saturday in the Premier League, a game which recalled sad memories of another tragedy at Burden Park in the middle of the last century.

Some are remembered in a high profile way and gain much publicity, others like the Bradford Fire in a quieter more sombre, reflective manner. This evening is somewhat different. It is a remembrance of an event that affected the community in a huge way, and Wrexham Football Club is part of that

community. It did not occur at The Racecourse but affected many families who used to come to watch Wrexham play.

So many of the younger members of the BBC Sports Department in Cardiff have asked me at work why the kick-off tonight is being put back to 8.00 p.m. They were fascinated when I explained that

Wrexham used to start matches at 3.15 p.m. on a Saturday afternoon so that miners could finish their shift and get to the match at The Racecourse in time for kick-off.

I pointed out that community, not television, determined the kick-off time. It's so very different today of course when TV can dictate that some fans might not get back on a Sunday night until the early hours of the morning before having to go to work.

And the fact that the football club is playing such a central part in the day is huge. It shows that it is and wants to be part of the community, that Wrexham Football Club exists day-in, day-out, and that it is not just somewhere to go once or twice a fortnight to watch ball being kicked.

It is part of the fabric which makes Wrexham what it is as a town – and in the surrounding area – and what it should be and it's a reason for supporting the club through thick and thin. It is part of history.

And that is why, come eight o'clock, once the referee blows his whistle, we will all cheer or praise what is good, get frustrated and moan when things go wrong, or when someone makes a mistake or a wrong decision. Because it is something we all care about.

But come ten o'clock, win – hopefully secured with the style Steve Fox showed in a 3-1 win here some 30 years ago with a memorable chip over Jake Findlay – lose or draw, we should all remember that it is only a game. And there will be another chance.

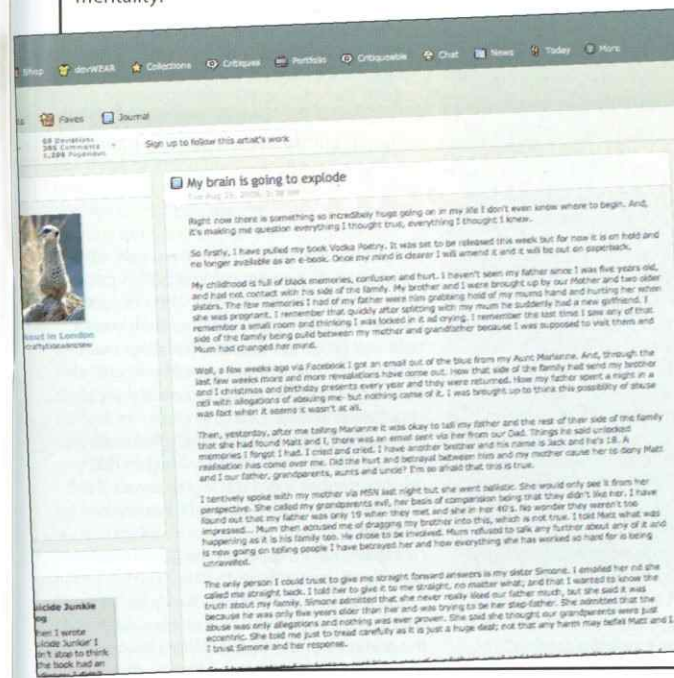

Last Line Of Defence

Oxford's first win at The Racecourse, after twelve attempts stretched over forty-five years, was certainly memorable, if not for the right reasons. As a catalogue of bizarre incidents disfigured the game it even became hard to follow for those in the thick of it, as Andy Fleming attests.

It was on the testimony of the assistant referee that Sinclair was given a second yellow, and Fleming admitted to being as flummoxed as everyone else by the decision.

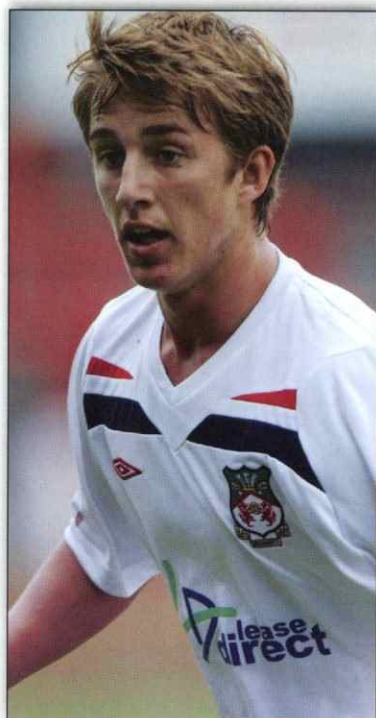
"It was an incident on our left wing: their player got played in and I thought the ref was going to blow for a foul for us but there was a challenge, then a scuffle with Frank and the linesman called the ref, who didn't see it, and he sent him off. It was all very confused!"

The ensuing reorganisation had to be carried out in the absence of Dean Saunders, who was dismissed in the subsequent melee and therefore couldn't keep his hand on the tiller. It led to Fleming having to fill a rather unexpected position, as the diminutive midfielder was asked briefly to fill in at the back in a three-man defence!

"It got a bit confused because Frank got sent-off and we pushed Mani up front. There was a bit of a hole at the back and I filled in! "It was disappointing – it always is when you lose, of course. Taking into account the chances that we had, we could've won the game or, at worst, got a draw out of it."

"It was a shame there was no midweek game, so we could get out there and put it right. We need to get our heads up and try to start getting results."

concerned him, as Dean Saunders' side, which looked compact and capable of striking on the break, conceded early on. "It was a sloppy mistake again. It was a free-kick and I'm not sure whether Maxi couldn't see it or not, but it got through the wall and it was a sloppy way to go a goal down away from home."

"If that hadn't happened the game would have developed differently."

Jones is at a loss to explain just why the slide has occurred though, as he has no doubt the pedigree of the squad is more than adequate to propel a promotion push.

Trading Places

For Welsh Under-21 international Marc Williams our last home game against Oxford United was a new experience as the flame-haired striker was deployed a little

further back than usual in an unfamiliar role in the centre of the pitch.

"I've played off the striker before, which is probably my preferred position, but playing in midfield was a new experience for me. It's a bit different

when you are tracking runners going the other way, but if that is the way that I can get in the team then I'm not going to complain," he explained.

"Hopefully from there I can try and make my way back up front."

"I have been working on my sharpness with Mal (Fitness Coach Mal Purchase) in training every day, doing short stuff, so as the weeks go on my sharpness should come back. After that then hopefully I can reproduce the form that I showed last year before I got injured."

Saturday saw Marc return to the subs' bench for the visit to Cambridge before he was introduced at the expense of new boy Angelos Tsiaklis with 25 minutes left. He so

nearly made a dramatic entry as he almost grabbed an equalising goal within minutes of his introduction when he pounced on Lamine Sakho's shot but unfortunately his effort was scrambled off the line by a home defender.

"It just got cleared away but that's my luck at the moment. I've had a few chances here and there but they've either been cleared off the line or the keeper's made a save so I've just got to keep going and I'm sure that they will go in eventually."

"This result has come on the back of last week's defeat and that's not good enough. We have to start somewhere and going into Tuesday, which is a big game against Luton, we have got to start picking up three points."

"It was a scrappy game and I don't think that either side played well, it was two scrappy goals, but that is just the way things are going for us at the moment. It is up to the players that we've got at the club to turn it around and, like I said, hopefully we can start on Tuesday."

"It's a big week for us. We were looking for the lads to start the week with a win today to take us into the Luton game but now we are going to have to concentrate on the next two. We need to look to get maximum points from them and hopefully that will kick-start the season from there."

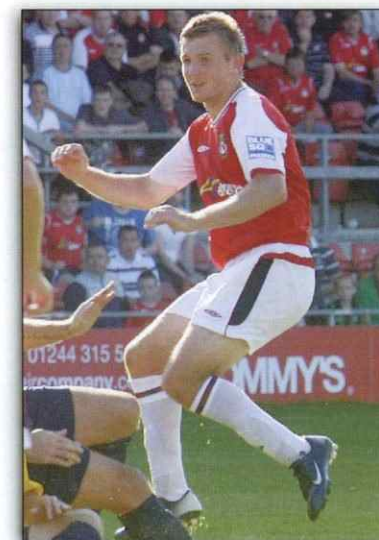


"It's so frustrating because we've definitely got the players. We've got pace in the team, we've got people who can score goals. We just don't play to our strengths at all. You could probably say exactly the same thing after the last three or four games. It's just not good enough."

While the strikers aren't hitting the target, Jones is quick to suggest that the quality of service they're receiving is a key part of their inability to find the net, particularly in the case of the club's new target man.

"We've got a quality striker in Gareth Taylor and we're just not using him properly or working off him properly. Gareth's played at a really high level, but instead of playing it in to his feet we're trying to stick it on his head and he's stretching for it all the time. I don't know why this keeps happening!"

"At least we've got the Luton game coming up pretty soon after the Cambridge game to try and make up for it. They're a good side, so hopefully they'll come out and play, and allow us to play too, unlike some teams that come to The Racecourse. It's a home game and it's a game we've got to win. We've got to start picking up points. Hopefully it's a massively improved performance."



At least with Jones back on board there's no doubt that Wrexham have, at their heart, a committed talent determined to haul The Dragons back to the Football League.

Obviously Saturday's result speaks for itself. We keep talking about being contenders for the Championship but if we can't go to places like Cambridge and get a result then we're kidding ourselves, to be honest. It's up to us the players to get us out of this situation – no one is going to do it for us – and we need a reaction tonight against Luton because Saturday simply wasn't acceptable.

If you look at Cambridge's side individually and you look at ours, then we all believe that we have the better players man-for-man but it's simply not happening out there on the pitch. It's not the fault of the manager or the coaching staff, rather as a group of players we're letting everybody down at the minute and we need to turn it around quickly.

We've lost five times already this season, so every game now becomes must win if we're to be the promotion contending side we think we are. That starts here and now with Luton, a side who are also coming to terms with the demands of playing Conference football.

There's quite a few of the lads at Luton that I know having played alongside George Pilkington for Port Vale, whilst Fred Murray was with me at both Northampton and Stevenage. Last year I actually did my pre-season with The Hatters, so I'm sure I'll see a lot of familiar faces tonight but the time for renewing old friendships will be after the final whistle.

The only thing I'll be thinking about tonight is three points and, just as importantly, the whole team putting on a good performance for you the fans. Given that we're also marking the 75th anniversary of the Gresford Disaster, it's vital because we train each day on the site of the former colliery and the players know how much this means to the people in the town.

Whether I'll be fit enough to play remains to be seen. I twisted my knee early on against Cambridge and it swelled up quite badly. Hopefully, it will have cleared up in time because this is a match I desperately want to play in.

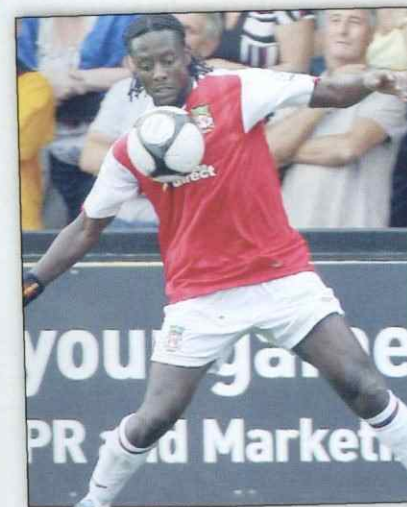
LOOKING FOR THE FINISHING TOUCH

Sitting in the bottom half of the table wouldn't have been what Wrexham supporters would have envisaged after the first nine games. Indeed, with the players at his disposal, manager Dean Saunders would have been hoping that a place in the top six wouldn't be beyond his side's reach at this stage.

Whilst results so far have been indifferent, performances on the whole have left the Wrexham faithful frustrated that their team haven't yet 'clicked'. However, but for a poor display against Barrow, our play has seen us create chances and keep things tight at the back. Today's opponents Luton Town will present another stern challenge after the tests of Oxford and Cambridge in the last ten days with Oxford the only side to inflict defeat on The Hatters this term, a feat Wrexham will be hoping to repeat this evening against a side relegated from the Football League last May.

Whilst Luton's free weekend saw them drop to sixth place in the fledgling BSP table, Saunders' frustration was only heightened after a disappointing showing

at Cambridge where Wrexham slumped to their fifth defeat of the campaign.

"We're still struggling to find that winning formula," admitted the former Welsh international striker following the final whistle at the quaintly named R Costings Stadium. "It's easy when you're winning games because the side almost picks itself.

"But at the moment, I'm not getting what I want from the players and so that's why we're making changes. We've shown glimpses of what we're capable of which makes it all the more frustrating for me, the coaching staff and the players themselves."

But it's a positive result which he will crave most tonight as he hopes that the team can kick-start their season in front of their home fans.

Wrexham do have the luxury of two games in hand but it is the confidence of the team going into those games that will concern Saunders. He knows that a good performance resulting in a win for the Dragons tonight will go a long way to strengthening the belief of his players.

Should we fail to take anything from tonight then we will be well adrift of the top places, and may struggle to reel in some of the teams vying for promotion.

But it can only take 90 minutes for a side to put their season back on the right track, and Wrexham fans can play their part in what could be a pivotal night in our campaign at The Racecourse as we hope that your support can pave the way for all three points.

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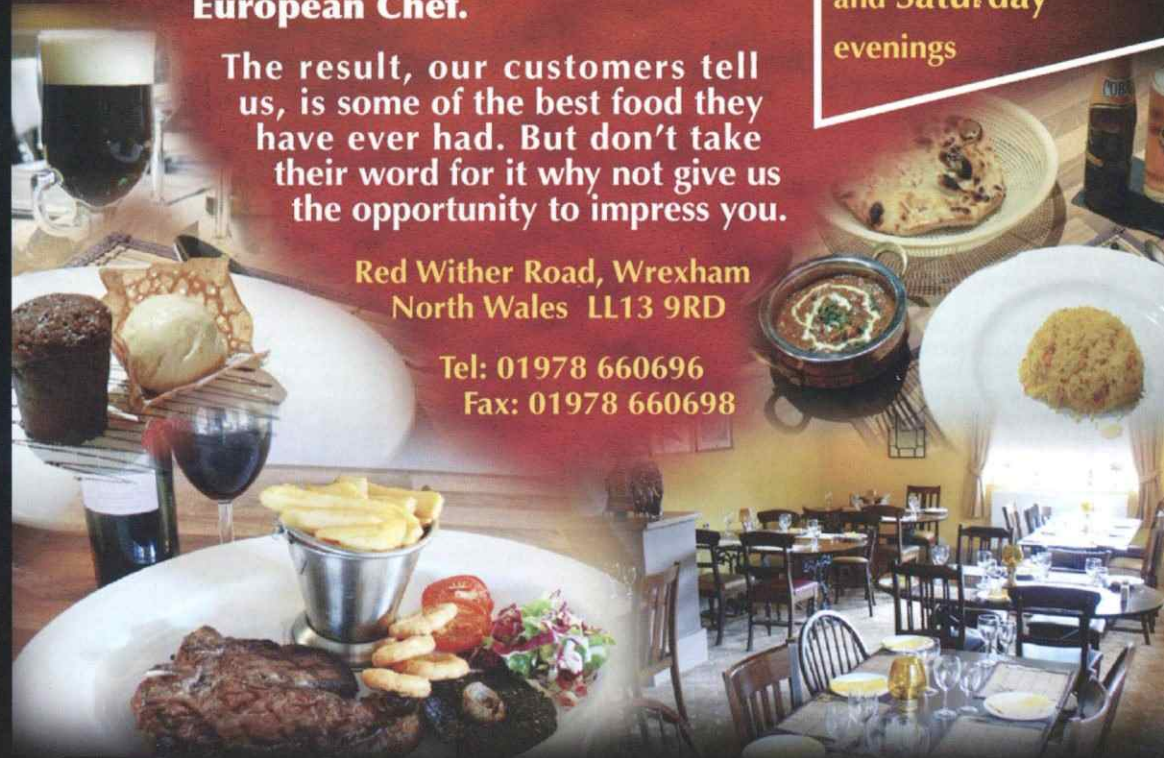
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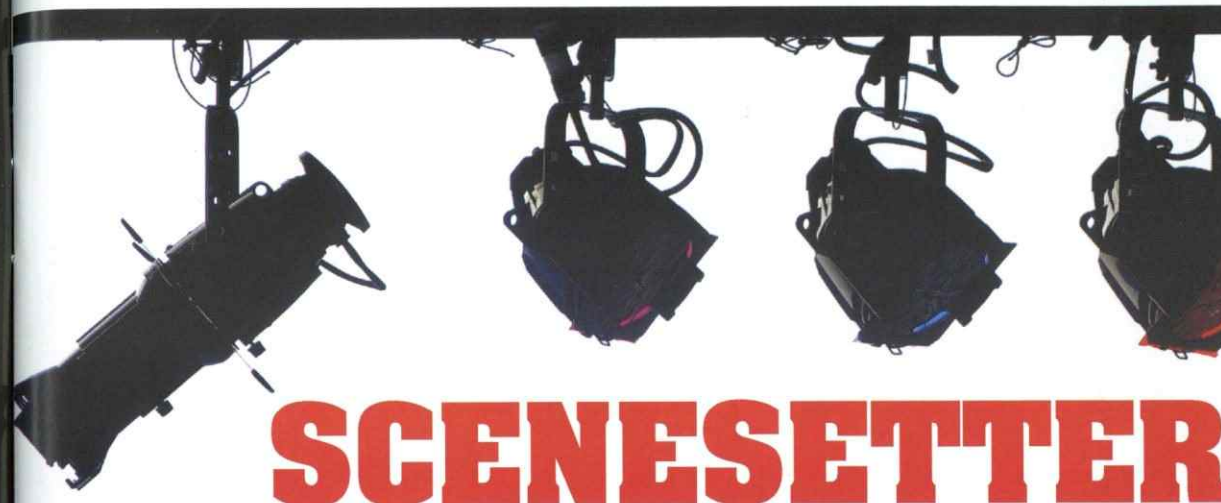

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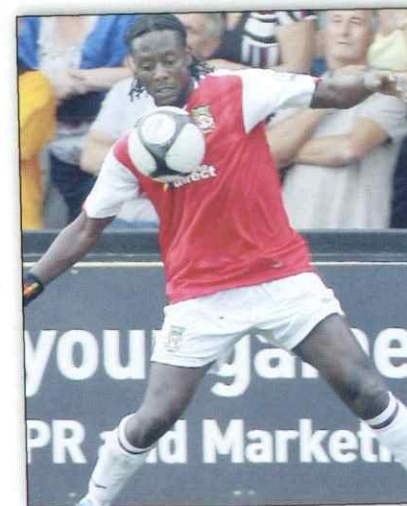

Cult Hero

Steve Foster



Mention the name Steve Foster and you immediately think of a white headband; indeed, it became the centre-back's trademark during a career which saw him make over 600 senior appearances. Born in Portsmouth in September 1957, Foster began his playing days with his home town club before joining Brighton & Hove Albion in 1979. At the Goldstone Ground, he became a cornerstone of the Seagulls team which reached the FA Cup Final in 1983 only to miss the final through suspension. Thankfully for the giant defender, the game ended in a 2-2 draw but there was to be no happy ending, as Foster's return couldn't stop Manchester United winning the replay 4-0 and Albion also being relegated. Eager to remain playing top flight football, he had a brief and unhappy sojourn at Aston Villa before signing for Luton in November 1984. The move to Kenilworth Road saw him produce some of the best football of his career and he captained The Hatters to Littlewoods Cup glory in 1988. Foster retired in 1996 after further spells with Oxford United and Brighton.

Luton Town

Having lost to Oxford United in our last home match, Wrexham now face another challenge from one of the Conference's genuine title contenders when Luton come to town, and you don't just have to take that from me! United's manager Chris Wilder warned that Luton have the wherewithal to mount a title challenge when he described them in glowing terms to BBC Oxford recently.

"They have good players all over the pitch, and they move the ball really well. They are a top side and I do believe that any team that finishes above Luton will be champions. There are a quality team from back to front, and Mick Harford is a fantastic manager who will have his side fired up to get results."

Town will be bolstered by the return from injury of Liam Hatch. The target man was hailed as perhaps the most impressive of a series of summer coups as Luton showed they intend to bounce straight back to the Football League at the first time of asking by signing a number of players with fine pedigrees for Conference football.

The 27-year old, who has previously hit the target at The Racecourse for Barnet, arrived on a season-long loan from Peterborough United with a view to a permanent deal, but was struck down by injury soon after arriving at Kenilworth Road.

He required keyhole surgery when bone fragments were found in his ankle, but he has recovered sooner than expected to lead The Hatters' line.

"I don't think any footballer likes being inside and stuck in the gym," he told BBC Three Counties Radio. "It's great to be out there and great to come back into a winning side. When they talk about four to

12 weeks, you sit there and look back, and think not again.

"I've missed four weeks. It's a quick recovery and now it's all right. As soon as I could get outside, and felt I could run, I wanted to be back involved. Luckily the physiotherapists let me come back in and it's been all right. I've had no reaction from it, so it's been good."

Hatch made his debut as a late substitute in Luton's previous game, against Barrow, and his arrival was something of a coup for Harford, as he told Luton's official website: "We've trailed him for a long time. He's had success where ever he's been and it's fantastic that we got him.

"Negotiations had been ongoing for several months and we've got the option to sign him permanently. It was always our aim to get a player of Liam's ability to the club. He'll be a massive influence for us and a striker that will complement the other forwards we have at the club. Liam is ready for the challenge and is desperate to play for us."

Town director Antony Brown reiterated Harford's point: "It's a testament to what we're trying to achieve here at this football club to be able to attract a player of Liam's ability to Kenilworth Road. To be able to beat off competition from clubs in the upper half of League 1 for a player of Liam Hatch's quality shows the ambition and attraction that Luton Town still has."

The match against Barrow which saw Hatch make his first Luton appearance ended in a hard-fought 1-0 win as the Cumbrians showed the same tenacity they'd already exhibited at The Racecourse this season.

Indeed, the solitary goal came about in rather fortuitous circumstances, as the only way Luton could beat the magnificent Tim

Still, it was a result which went some way towards erasing the memory of a disappointing 2-0 defeat to league leaders Oxford in their previous match, as Newton told Dunstable Today: "It was meant to be a cross. I obviously didn't get my foot round it enough! If the keeper did get a touch to it he was unlucky."

"It's nice to bounce back as a team after Tuesday's disappointment. I think we set out from the first few minutes that we wanted to win and took the game to them. "It's nice to get off to a start and getting a goal for Luton Town and I hope to get a few more in the near future. Any goal is a goal. As long as I keep putting them in the back of the net for Luton Town I would be more than happy!"

Since that match Luton have suffered a lay-off enforced not by international call-ups or a widespread bout of the flu, but political problems.

Their scheduled match against York last Saturday could not take place as banned protest group the English Defence League threatened a march through the town on that day.

The police were concerned that they would not be able to handle both the march and the match, and Town were asked to postpone the fixture, which will now take place next month.

The Home Office have barred the extreme right wing group from holding a march in

Luton, but their website claimed it would hold a "march against the ever growing population of Islamic Extremists, and the home of some of the most unsavoury Al-Qaeda supporters in the UK."

The EDL have already caused chaos on town centres this year; ninety people were arrested in Birmingham a fortnight ago after they clashed with counter-demonstrators and the weekend before the police clashed with groups who had gathered following rumours of a proposed right-wing march in the Bury Park area of Luton.

With their scare tactics clearly causing disruption already, it made sense for the game to not take place, especially as Luton has been a centre of their activities since March, when a small group of Muslim extremists disrupted a homecoming parade by the Royal Anglian Regiment from Iraq, and in subsequent disturbances an Islamic

centre was gutted by an arson attack. There were further disturbances in May, which also led to arrests.

Still, there might be a silver lining to the cloud, for The Hatters at least, as the blank weekend might help Luton to prepare for tonight's game!

Apart from Hatch, Town have Andy Burgess and Lewis Emanuel struggling to regain their fitness, and the extra breather might give them a chance to feature tonight.

Hatters' director Antony Brown told Dunstable Today: "We would always prefer to play a game on a Saturday. But with everything taken into account we think its fine."

"We will use it to our advantage. We will have a little change around in training and it can only be to our advantage. We have key players injured and it gives us an extra four or five days to get them fit."

GOALKEEPERS

Mark TYLER

The 32-year-old keeper has been in outstanding form this season, going 488 minutes without conceding a goal up until the 1-1 draw at Salisbury. The Norwich-born gloveman joined The Hatters on a two-year deal in the summer after 15 years and 483 appearances with Peterborough United. A former England youth international who had spells on loan at both Bury and Watford last term, Tyler was reportedly the number one transfer target for Luton boss Mick Harford during the close-season.

Shane GORE

Born in Ashford, Gore began his playing career with Wimbledon making his solitary appearance for the Dons in a 6-2 defeat at Grimsby in March 2002, conceding three goals in a nine-minute cameo after Ian Feuer had been dismissed. A highly rated keeper in non-league circles, he has also played for St Albans City (loan), Peterborough (loan), Barnet, Stevenage, Havant & Waterlooville, East Thurrock and Maidenhead. The 28-year-old joined Luton on the eve of the season and recently signed a new one-month deal.

DEFENDERS

Claude GNAPKA

Gnapka will forever have a place in Hatters folklore having scored the extra-time winner in the Johnstone's Paints Trophy Final victory over Scunthorpe last April when coming on as a substitute for Tom Craddock. Marseille-born, he joined the club in August 2008 after having helped Peterborough United to promotion the previous term. Whilst he can play at centre-back, the 26-year-old prefers the right-back berth having plied his trade across Europe with Montpellier, Racing Santander, Deportivo Alaves and FC Vaduz.

Alan WHITE

A summer signing from his home-town club Darlington, White is an experienced, no-nonsense right-sided central defender who has formed a strong partnership with George Pilkington in the heart of the Luton defence. A former Middlesbrough trainee, he initially joined The Hatters in the summer of 1997 for a £40,000 fee, making 93 appearances before

leaving for Colchester some three years later. Dominant in the air, the 33-year-old has also worn the colours of Leyton Orient, Notts County and Boston United.

George PILKINGTON

A centre-back with an eye for a goal, Pilkington has already netted four times this season to make him Luton's joint leading scorer. An England youth international who was on Everton's books as a trainee, he joined the Kenilworth Road club in August 2008 after 223 making appearances for Port Vale. The 27-year-old defender was club captain at Vale Park and twice named Valiants 'Player of the Year'. After struggling with injury last term, Pilkington has been an ever present this season on the left side of defence.

Fred MURRAY

With Lewis Emanuel sidelined by a broken toe, manager Mick Harford moved quickly to bring in Murray on a six-month loan deal from Grays Athletic and the left-back made his Luton debut within hours of signing in a 4-1 home win over Mansfield last month. Somewhat bizarrely, the 26-year-old Irishman had only joined the Essex club a few days earlier and left without having even played for them! Murray is a graduate of Blackburn's youth system and can also include Cambridge, Northampton, Stafford, Stevenage and Exeter amongst his list of former clubs.

Lewis EMANUEL

Emanuel turned down offers from a number of Football League clubs to sign a new one-year deal with The Hatters this summer, only to then find himself sidelined for two months after breaking his toe in the opening day draw with AFC Wimbledon. The Bradford-born right-back emerged through the ranks at his home town club to register over 150 appearances for the Bantams before joining Luton in a £100,000 deal in July 2007. Still only 25, he had a brief loan spell with Brentford in October 2007 and can also play on the left side of midfield.

Callum REYNOLDS

The Luton-born defender will be well known to the Dragons' management team after having spent a month on trial with Wrexham earlier this year. The 19-year-old began his career with

Rushden & Diamonds before signing for Portsmouth in the summer of 2007. Eager to gain first-team experience, he joined Luton in August on a six-month loan deal and was handed his Hatters debut on the opening day of the season. Sent-off in his first home start against Mansfield, he has made four appearances to date but has not figured in recent games.

Shane BLACKETT

A talented player who can play anywhere along the back four, Blackett has also seen red this season having been dismissed in the season opener at AFC Wimbledon. The ex-Dunstable, Arlesey and Dagenham & Redbridge defender first came to prominence with the Daggers, whom he put on the path to promotion from the Conference before joining Peterborough in January 2007. Hampered by injury during his spell with The Posh, he signed for his home-town club this summer on a two-year deal which was partially funded by a friendly between the two sides.

Jake HOWELLS

Born in Hemel Hempstead, the 18-year-old left-back has come through the ranks at Kenilworth Road, signing his first professional contract this summer. Howells made his first-team debut on the final day of the 2007-08 campaign as a late substitute in a 1-0 home defeat against Huddersfield. Primarily used from the bench again last term, he figured prominently in the closing weeks of the season making a total of 36 senior appearances.

MIDFIELDERS

Asa HALL

An extremely versatile player who has also played in both attack and defence for The Hatters, Hall is likely to figure on the right-side of a three-man midfield this evening. Born in Dudley, he joined Birmingham City as a trainee eventually signing professional forms for the St Andrews club in November 2004. An England international at both U19 and U20 level, he enjoyed loan spells with Boston United, Ashford Town and Shrewsbury before

moving to Luton last August. Scored 10 goals in 42 league games and opened his goal account this term against Gateshead.

Keith KEANE

Keane is a locally-born midfielder who has been at the club since the age of nine and was handed his full debut when just 16-years-old by ex-boss Mike Newell. An Irish U21 international, he won a League 1 championship medal with the Hatters in season 2004-05 and his versatility has since seen him make over 150 appearances for the Kenilworth Road outfit. A determined ball winner whose ability to read the game allows him to time his tackles well, Keane began the current campaign in central defence but has been the midfield anchor in Kevin Nicholls' absence.

Rossi JARVIS

Norfolk-born Jarvis started his career at Norwich City, making his reserve team debut for the Canaries when aged just 14! He had to wait a further three years for his senior bow which came in a League Cup tie at Birmingham which Norwich lost 2-1. After loan spells at Torquay and Rotherham, he joined Luton on a free transfer in August 2008 since when the combative left-sided midfielder has made 44 league appearances. Despite netting twice in cup competitions, Jarvis's only Hatters league goal to date came in a 1-1 draw at Barnet last April.

Kevin NICHOLLS

The tough-tackling midfielder made a surprise return to first-team action last month after recovering from a long-standing back injury. Currently serving a three-match suspension after his recent dismissal against Oxford, the Luton skipper was also handed a five-game ban and a £1,000 fine by The FA last March after allegedly applauding Luton fans for throwing missiles at the match officials following a 3-3 draw with Bradford City. Now in his second spell at Kenilworth Road, the 30-year-old can also include Charlton, Brighton

(loan), Wigan, Leeds and Preston on his footballing CV.

Andy BURGESS

A self confessed Hatters fan, Burgess was Mick Harford's first signing in the summer after being released by Rushden & Diamonds where he was captain last term. An England C International, the 27-year-old left-footed midfielder player had two spells at Nene Park, interspersed with a year at Oxford United, and played a significant part in Diamonds' Conference and League Two title winning sides in 2001 and 2003 respectively. Burgess has been sidelined recently, missing Luton's last four games after suffering a badly torn hamstring in training.

FORWARDS

Kevin GALLEN

Gallen is a vastly experienced striker who, despite the club's relegation from the Football League, signed a one-year contract extension with The Hatters last May. Hammersmith-born, he spent almost 14 years in two separate spells at Queens Park Rangers playing over 400 times for The Hoops and scoring 97 goals in the process. A proven goalscorer who will be the fulcrum of the Luton attack, he celebrated his 34th birthday yesterday and has been ever present this term, netting against Gateshead and Salisbury respectively. A former England U21 international, he has also played with distinction for Huddersfield, Barnsley, Plymouth and MK Dons.

Tom CRADDOCK

Joint top scorer for Luton so far this season with four goals, Craddock will be remembered by Dragons fans for his loan spell here back in October 2006 when he scored the decisive goal on his only appearance against Bristol Rovers. Unfortunately a knee injury cut short his time at The Racecourse and he returned to Middlesbrough, the club where he started his career. The Darlington-born striker arrived on loan at Kenilworth Road last October before completing a permanent £80,000 move from Boro in the January transfer window. In all, he scored 12 goals for The Hatters last term, including one at Wembley in the JPT final, and has recently been playing on the left-side of a three-man attack.

Adam NEWTON

Completing the attacking trio will be Adam Newton, a St. Kitts & Nevis international who scored his first goal for The Hatters in the recent 1-0 home victory over Barrow. The 28-year-old signed a two-year deal in the summer after recording back-to-back League 2 promotion winning seasons with Peterborough and latterly Brentford. Often utilised on the right-hand side of a midfield four, Newton has made almost 300 league appearances in a career which has also seen him represent West Ham, Portsmouth (loan) and Leyton Orient. The former England U21 international actually scored for Brentford against Luton in their final League match.

Liam HATCH

After signing a season-long loan deal from Peterborough, the Hitchin-born striker injured his ankle in training but made a quicker than expected recovery from keyhole surgery to make his debut from the bench in the recent win over Barrow. The 27-year-old arrived at London Road via successful spells at Gravesend & Northfleet and Barnet, where his goals helped the Bees regain their Football League status. Hatch scored nine goals in 29 appearances on loan at Darlington last season after failing to break into Darren Ferguson's promotion winning outfit.

Steve BASHAM

Another familiar name to Wrexham fans having played five games for the Dragons whilst on loan from Southampton during the 1997-98 campaign, Basham is an experienced striker whose career has been sadly plagued by injury. When fully fit, there is little doubt that he is a proven goalscorer whose movement and awareness makes him a handful for any opposition defence. Signed from Exeter City on a free transfer during the close-season, the 31-year-old has also played for Preston and Oxford gaining a Division Two championship medal with the Deepdale club back in 2000. Five of his six appearances this term have been from the subs' bench.

Mick Harford has seen his beloved Luton start their first season of non-league football for 89 years in fine fashion, his reshaped Hatters' side having suffered just one solitary defeat against league leaders Oxford United in their opening ten matches.

The former talismanic targetman is a Luton legend; voted their greatest ever player in a fans poll, he had two separate playing spells with the club helping them to a Littlewoods Cup Final win over Arsenal in 1988 as well as two FA Cup semi-final appearances.

Luton were an established top flight side in those days but when the Sunderland-born Harford took over as manager, in January 2008, the club was not only in administration but in the process of fighting an unsuccessful battle against relegation from League 1.

Hit by a further 30-point penalty on the eve of the 2008-09 season for financial irregularities, a second successive relegation proved impossible to avoid.

An England international with two caps, the tall striker served nine other clubs. It was at his first club Wimbledon that Harford first struck up a partnership with then Dons' boss Joe Kinnear which saw ultimately him move onto the club's coaching staff; this was revived in 2001 when the duo achieved Luton's first promotion in over 20 years, taking the Hatters back into League One.

A new consortium took over the following term and Kinnear and Harford were controversially sacked. Despite a late u-turn by consortium head John Gurney, Harford declined an offer to return only to find himself back at the club some two months later following Gurney's departure. Installed as Director of

Football and first-team coach to Mike Newell, the pairing guided Luton to a creditable tenth place in the first season together.

But the temptation of working once again with Kinnear proved too strong and, in November 2004, Harford joined Nottingham Forest after turning down a five-year contract with The Hatters. With his former boss under mounting pressure at The City Ground, Harford's arrival came to late to save his managerial mentor from the sack some two months later. Initially installed as Forest's caretaker-manager, he too departed some six games later.

After a brief spell as Andy King's assistant at Swindon, Harford was appointed Rotherham United manager in April 2005 but left at the year's end following a 17-match winless run. Further assistant-managerial roles followed at both Colchester United and QPR before he took the helm at Kenilworth Road.

Alec Swann, Sports Reporter for the Luton News, gives us the lowdown on The Hatters...

After the traumas of the past two seasons, how have Luton adapted to life in the Blue Square Premier?
At the time of writing, Luton are sitting second in the embryonic Blue Square Premier table, which is a fair indication that they've taken to the non-league game pretty well. It would've been far too easy after the perceived injustice of last season for Mick Harford's side to have approached this campaign with a substantial chip on their shoulder, but that hasn't been the case. They have approached each game in the right manner and given their opponents the required amount of respect. There has been enough to suggest that Luton are not going to have it all their own way and that, as it is often said, the Blue Square will indeed be a hard division to get out of.

What are the biggest changes you noticed from your Football League days and how are the Luton players adapting to the fans' expectations that they should win every game?

The expectation among the Hatters' faithful, from the moment relegation from the Football

league was confirmed, was that promotion should be a formality. There have been instances of booing at Kenilworth Road suggesting that there is less than satisfaction with what is being produced. And to a certain extent they would be right.

There has been a lack of fluency in Luton's performances which has manifested itself in the number of goals – 13 – that have been scored in 10 games. A switch from the preferred 4-4-2 to 4-3-3 has been forced to a certain extent by the absence of Andy Burgess with a hamstring injury, but it has compromised the strengths of Tom Craddock who has found himself out wide rather than the central role he is used to. That being said, although going forward there is plenty to come, they have looked solid at the back which has enabled them to churn out results.

Keeper Mark Tyler has proved to be an excellent acquisition and centre-half George Pilkington has been in superb form throughout. There is a good platform to work from, but the fans want domination not pragmatism and this

will continue whether they are at the top of the table or not. Some of this is a hangover from being a Football League club and there is a reluctance to accept that some sides will attempt to spoil rather than match like for like, but that was the same at times last year. If there is any difference to League Two it is that more sides will employ a more direct style, but that was known all along. As for promotion back to the league, anything less will be seen as a failure.

Finally, which sides do you see as your main rivals for promotion?

Harford did well to keep a large proportion of his squad at the club and has made a few decent signings. Luton have the resources to make their stay in the Blue Square a brief one and their agenda will contain little else. As for rivals, it is difficult to see past Oxford United. After the 2-0 defeat earlier this month, Harford stated that whoever finishes above Oxford will go up and it looks, even at this early stage, as if this will be the case.

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The Premier League giveth and ESPN taketh away...

There have been plenty of stories flying around the Conference in the last ten days, both on and off the field, but its matters of high finance that have been making the most headlines with the failure to arrange a new TV deal offset by the largesse of the Premier League.

Last week the Conference Board declared that they were "on the brink of a major television deal" but any hopes of securing a replacement for the now defunct Setanta collapsed at the eleventh hour, Disney-backed ESPN declaring that televising Blue Square Premier games did not fit into their "portfolio for the forthcoming season."

With the likes of the Europa League and European domestic football to choose from, and add to that its 46 game Premier League deal, you wonder quite where the Blue Square Premier would have fitted into the ESPN schedule?

For the moment that will remain an unanswered question but the news came as a bitter blow to the Conference clubs, many hoping that the ever-increasing number of high-profile former Football League sides would have clinched the deal.

"We have a lot of top quality football at present, but we decided that it did not make business sense for us to show this league on our channel at this time," continued the ESPN press release.

profile of the league and for the clubs. But most clubs had probably accepted they weren't going to get any TV money."

What the clubs certainly didn't expect was a £1 million windfall from the Premier League, which occurred just hours after the collapse of the TV deal was announced. The one-off donation will be distributed amongst all 68 of the Conference's member clubs with Premier League chief Richard Scudamore explaining the thinking behind the decision.

"The Conference is an integral part of the football pyramid; it was absolutely the right thing to do. The Premier League clubs discussed the difficulties facing their counterparts in the Conference, and were happy to be in a position to offer them some financial support."

He went on to emphasise the importance of football at this level, adding: "All 68 clubs are extremely important to their local fans and their communities."

Conference Chairman Brian Lee was clearly delighted by the gesture: "It's a gift of solidarity; the Premier League had a meeting and it was asked what more could be done to support non-league football. This present comes at a time when perhaps it is most needed."

"This is no gimmick, it is a gesture of comradeship, and it is one which we are extremely grateful for. There are a lot of clubs feeling the pinch, it has not been a wonderful week, but their generosity will no doubt help soften the blow," he told The Non-League Paper.

The Conference will now consider a number of options including live internet streaming for its games, however such a solution will need the help of a suitably experienced broadcast partner to give it the level of professionalism needed to enhance the league's image.

The Premier League cash itself will not replace the funds lost by the Setanta collapse, therefore the member clubs will still be keen to push for a sale of broadcast rights as a matter of urgency to help fill the financial void.

Oxford United chairman Kelvin Thomas told the Guardian this week that: "The exposure is important to the league and the Setanta deal demonstrated that. The exposure is good for sponsors, for the

One Conference club certainly feeling the pinch of late are Ebbsfleet United, born out of an internet idea conceived in times when ready cash was in abundance, albeit at the click of the mouse.

The Fleet have found the going far from easy in recent months with its 'membership' numbers dwindling significantly, making Liam Daish's job as manager of the Kent outfit that much harder.

Enter then the local council who this week bought the Stonebridge Road ground in a bid to keep it out of the hands of property speculators who had been expected to acquire the ground when it came up for auction later this year.

Gravesend Council also confirmed that the club will pay a peppercorn rent of just £1 per annum, albeit with a caveat that they have to raise funds to purchase the stadium within a set time structure.

Ebbsfleet chairman Duncan Holt was naturally delighted to have secured the deal, stating that: "This leaves the club in a very strong position and our thanks must go to the council."

Councillor Mike Snelling told of why the deal was done: "We have taken the decisive action to resolve a huge problem, which was threatening the very existence of our local football club. This gives them the

opportunity to secure the long term future as well as protecting the site for the community as a major sporting asset."

Whilst many neutrals might find it difficult to term Stonebridge Road as a "major sporting asset," the deal is a salutary lesson for such clubs to maintain a healthy working relationship with their local council.

The ground was previously owned by property firm Land Securities and, whilst it remains unclear as to how much was paid to avoid the site going to auction, the council was at pains to reassure its tax payers that it would not financially impact upon them.

As for Daish, the former Republic of Ireland international gave the news a cautious welcome: "My job is to look after events on the field; I'm really pleased for the club but the priority is on the pitch, getting to mid-table, then pushing on from there."

"I'm working as hard as I can with a small budget. The pressure I'm under is mainly brought on by myself and its good experience for me. Yes, I'm under financial restraints and I may have to release money in other parts of the team in order to bring new players in."

Daish has been linked with a number of Conference jobs in recent times, including

the post at Cambridge United, but he remains committed to getting The Fleet up the BSP table after agreeing a new two-year deal.

Another manager who finds it hard to keep out of the news is Crawley's Steve Evans and, financially at least, he is very much worse off this week thanks to another fine and touchline ban.

The self-styled 'bad boy' of the Conference was fined £750 and could be banned from "attending three games" after being found guilty of "improper conduct" during a game against Salisbury last February.

Evans could yet trigger a further ten game ban, previously suspended pending his good behaviour, but Crawley chairman Vic Marley is backing his man all the way as he fights to clear his name.

"Steve has been found guilty, but having looked at the evidence, I feel that it has more to do with his reputation from the past rather than anything in this particular case. The punishment handed out is, I feel, severe."

Severe it may be but The FA are currently looking at all aspects of the game, especially in light of their high-profile 'Respect' campaign. Therefore it's a safe bet to say that Evans won't be fronting that in the foreseeable future.



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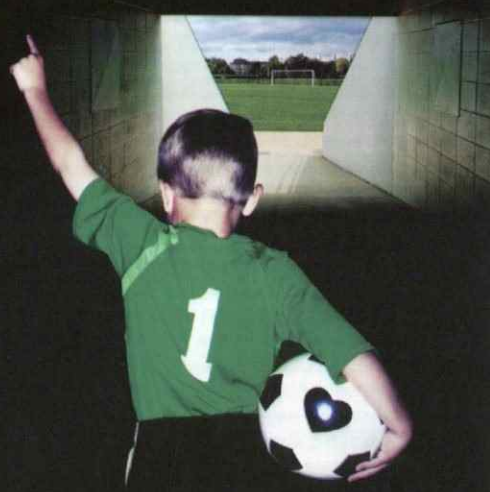
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Further encouragement but no end product

A cracking end-to-end final home game in our qualifying group was worthy of a far bigger turnout than just over the 11,500 who witnessed the Russia clash, the visitors still having a chance of piping Germany to the automatic qualifying spot. Despite the 3-1 reverse, Wales still have a shout of third place which would ensure a higher seeding for the forthcoming European Championships and represent progress in itself. However, this will need John Toshack's side to beat both Finland and Lichtenstein in their own back yards next month.

It's a task which is not beyond Wales but the European minnows confirmed their continuing improvement with a draw against the Finns on the same night as that Russia encounter, so even that game cannot be considered a forgone conclusion.

The Welsh performance against Guus Hiddink's side was at least worthy of a draw at the sparsely populated Millennium Stadium, James Collins' deft flick drawing Wales level midway through the second-half.

Wolves midfielder David Edwards had a chance to put his side in front but his shot was smothered by the Russian keeper and Wales' flickering hopes of victory were quickly extinguished by two late goals. And it was this lack of potency in front of goal which eventually proved the difference between two countries whose respective populations are 3 million and 140 million!

Still Toshack can feel well pleased that his young players managed to match their more illustrious opponents who currently stand in sixth place in the FIFA rankings. The Russians superior finishing was evident in their superb opening goal, but the Welsh defence will have been disappointed at the individual errors which contributed to the visitors other two strikes.

That lack of punch in attack for Wales is worrying, what with Craig Bellamy having to 'fetch and carry' on his own when he himself should be in a striking position, especially if the Manchester City forward is being deployed as a lone attacker. His work rate can never be questioned – as witnessed in Sunday's thrilling Manchester derby – but in your scribe's humble opinion he does

need greater support, particularly in home matches.

The biggest plus of the night was the debut of Brian Stock, the Doncaster Rovers midfielder. As early as the fifth minute, he flashed a tremendous 20-yard shot narrowly wide and although – at 27 – a relatively late entrant to the senior international scene, he did enough to suggest that he will figure in many more of Toshack's squads in the years to come.

As is the norm in the Welsh camp these days, the manager had to contend with yet another distraction in the build-up to the game. This time it was the announcement that the enigmatic Jason Koumas had decided to retire from international football and so concentrate on his club career. The Wigan player never realised his full potential at this level and his persistent withdrawals from overseas matches will not be missed by the majority of Welsh fans.

By contrast, Jack Collison and Simon Church both lost their fathers in the week prior to the Russia match and were understandably not available. All in Welsh football extend their sincere condolences to Jack, Simon and their respective families at a time when football is rightly secondary in their thoughts.

There could yet be another change of heart from Danny Collins who has said that

he now wants to be involved again in the Welsh set up. His new manager at Stoke City, following the defender's transfer from Sunderland, is none other than Tony Pulis and he proved a breath of fresh air on BBC2's 'Sport Wales' programme recently with his support for Toshack and the latter's youth policy.

Pulis has confirmed that he will do his most to encourage his fellow countryman to return to the fold. There is no doubt that Collins would be a big plus to the Welsh senior side, with Pulis wisely advocating that it is the player who should make the first move by picking up the phone and speaking to Toshack!

Phone calls only of the congratulatory nature however for Brian Flynn and his Under-21 players for a superb 2-1 success over the talented Italy side at the Liberty Stadium, where a superb goal from Aaron Ramsey sent the 5,000 plus crowd into raptures.

Wales have only one more home game in Group 3 against Bosnia-Herzegovina to come but then face three tough away ties in the next year, and while top at present, one feels that the final game in Italy next September will ultimately prove decisive.

Keep the faith always.

The Aggborough Stadium, Kidderminster

WHEN?

Our most recent visit to Kidderminster came last November and was a bitter-sweet affair. Those who travelled to Aggborough in vast numbers witnessed a terrific game that swung both ways; Wrexham picked up the tempo after the break and dominated our hosts in the second half, playing some of our best football of the season. The 0-1 reversal meant that our fine unbeaten run under Dean Saunders had come to an end, but fans were re-assured when we at least went down fighting. Had there been any justice, we'd have taken at least a point.

WHERE?

On what was possibly our shortest Saturday afternoon trips of the season, over 800 Wrexham fans made the effort; in fact, for those fans based in Shropshire, the fixture constituted a local derby. Our crew left Wrexham in mid-morning and were at the stadium well in advance of kick-off; it's a straight-forward run down, really, down the A5 and then off towards Bridgnorth. For those travelling by rail, Aggborough is within reasonable walking distance of the railway station at Kidderminster and within spitting distance of the town centre. There's a decent boozer at the station and a quality chippy immediately opposite.

WHAT?

We'd previously been to Aggborough in March, 2003, when a brace of Lee Trundle goals [one of them claimed by Brian Carey] kept our promotion push on track. Since then, the impressive East Stand – which was under construction at the time – is now fully operational and, as a four-sided ground, Aggborough is now one of the best in the division. This time, as then, the away fans were housed in a covered terrace behind one of the goals, where the atmosphere was excellent and the views unrestricted. It was just a shame that we couldn't score, although we did everything but. The range of grub available inside the ground was excellent, and those who arrived at the ground early were able to enjoy a decent pint in The Harriers Arms, located behind The Reynolds Stand. The bar filled up closer to kick-off and both it and the club's Social Club – on the other side of the ground – were both hopping once the away coaches started to off-load.

HOW?

Exactly. Having hit the woodwork three times after half-time – and having forced Adam Bartlett, the impressive Kidderminster goalkeeper, into a series of fine saves – quite how Wrexham left empty-handed was the main talking point on the away end. As Dean Saunders concluded afterwards, we'd already won games where we'd played far worse, and would do so again. Not that the result unduly affected us; immediately afterwards we resumed winning ways and stayed unbeaten in the league until the turn of the year.

WHY?

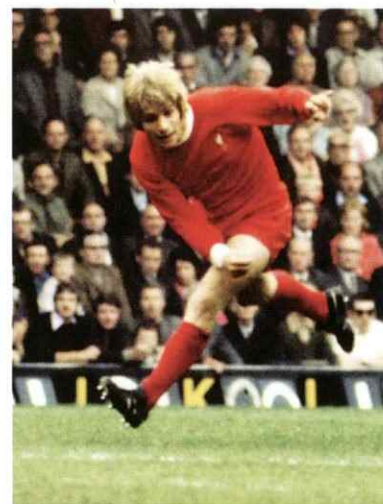
Even in defeat, those Wrexham fans who travelled to Aggborough in their numbers left the ground in good form; they'd seen a decent game between two strong sides on the up. The atmosphere all afternoon was excellent, with plenty of good-humoured banter flying backwards and forwards. That said, the home side's goalkeeper, Adam Bartlett, certainly didn't distinguish himself with his juvenile behaviour in front of the away end towards the end of the game. But not even that – nor the reversal – could detract from what was a decent day out to a vibey, well-appointed ground.

Next up on the old Sat Nav is Kidderminster. So as a prelude to our trip to Aggborough, we thought we'd give you an insight to some of the area's most famous sons and daughters, sporting and otherwise...

ALUN EVANS

Not to be confused with the long-standing Secretary of the Football Association Of Wales [and current Chairman of the League Of Wales] or indeed the Rhondda-born professional darts player of the same name, Alun Evans was a prodigious teenage striker who briefly the limelight at Liverpool during the late 1960s and early 70s.

Kidderminster-born, he started his career with Wolverhampton Wanderers before becoming Britain's first ever £100,000 teenage signing when Bill Shankly took him to Anfield in 1968.



As Keith Perkins writes as part of his excellent Impressive Forgotten Heroes series on the Liverpool website, www.thisisanfield.com: "Bill Shankly's attention was first drawn to this precocious young player when Liverpool hosted Wolves in 1967. In this particular match, Evans had the gall to make Ron Yeats look average by using his quick turns, sudden changes of direction and flicks and tricks."

Evans went on to enjoy a dream Liverpool debut, scoring within ten minutes of his debut against Leicester. And he went better again on the following week, returning to Molineux within days of his departure and scoring twice – this time in a red shirt – in a 6-0 rout.

He's also started to make waves off of the pitch; with his blond, Beatles-inspired mop-top, he certainly cut a dash and was quickly adopted as an Anfield poster-boy.

Sadly, he struggled to capitalise on his rapid-fire impact and a string of injuries and a glassing incident in a night-club in Wolverhampton stunted his progress and compromised his swagger.

KIDDERMINSTER

And although he featured briefly towards the end of the following season, bagging a hat-trick against Bayern Munich in a European Fairs Cup game and also scoring in an FA Cup semi-final against Everton, he was never again to regain his form at Anfield.

Leaving Liverpool for Aston Villa, he subsequently played at Walsall before calling time on his professional career before his thirtieth birthday and emigrating to Australia.

ROBERT PLANT

Critically derided at regular junctions and seemingly forever on the cusp of self-parody, Led Zeppelin are arguably the most successful and influential heavy-metal outfit in the often-bizarre history of the genre.

Best known to this day for the eight-minute 'Stairway To Heaven', it was singer Robert Plant – alongside guitarist Jimmy Page – who defined the Led Zeppelin sound from the off and, by nodding to classic blues and folk music, helped to distinguish their group from the rest of the hard rock litter.

As recorded in the Rolling Stone Encyclopaedia Of Rock And Roll: "Page and Plant were grounded in British folk music and fascinated by mythology, Middle Earth fantasy, and the occult, as became increasingly evident from the band's later albums."

The original Led Zeppelin line-up – which also included John Bonham and John Paul Jones – quickly gained enormous world-wide success but the group's life-span was short, if prolific; they recorded together for the last time in 1978.

As the group enjoyed more and more success – Led Zeppelin have sold far in excess of 100 million albums – the group dynamic began to come apart at the seams.

As Stephen Davis captures superbly in his excellent biography, 'Hammer Of The Gods', copious amounts of drink, drugs and jealousy, as well as a career-long interest in magic and the writing of Aleister Crowley, eventually did for them.

While rehearsing to tour their 'In Through The Out Door' album in late 1980, drummer Bonham died at Page's home; he had inhaled his own vomit having consumed vast quantities of vodka and then falling asleep.

All three surviving original members have enjoyed successful solo careers as performers, arrangers and producers and have infrequently re-united for one-offs, but its Plant who's reached the furthest beyond his natural habitat.

He had already worked with the American folk musician and singer Alison Krauss – best known as a member of the acclaimed country group, Union Station – on a 2004 tribute to the legendary blues artist, Leadbelly and more formally on the sound-track to the film 'O Brother, Where Art Thou?'

But it was on the multi-selling 2007 album, 'Raising Sand', that Plant – alongside Krauss – found unanimous critical acclaim and, literally, a new voice.

Indeed, so successful was the venture – a blue-grass and folk inspired work-out of covers and some original songs – that an anticipated Led Zeppelin re-union was parked while Plant and Krauss worked their magic on tour.

Born in West Bromwich, Plant grew up around Halesowen and Kidderminster, and to this day retains strong ties to the town.

Still resident there, Plant, a self-confessed Wolves fanatic, is also the patron of a label called MAS Records, which is based in Kidderminster, and is currently working with Krauss on a follow-up album to 'Raising Sand'.

PETER COLLINS

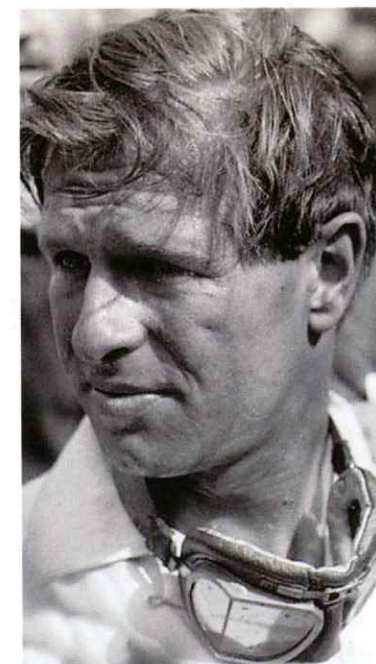
Kidderminster's most famous sporting son is unquestionably the Formula One driver Peter Collins who, during six glorious years in the 1950s, participated in 35 World Championship Grand Prix races, winning three of them and achieving podium finishes in nine.

The son of a haulage contractor from Kidderminster, Collins began his career as a teenager, initially racing 500cc Formula 3 cars; after spells attached to the Vanwell and Maserati teams, he signed up with Ferrari in advance of the 1956 season.

Following a second place finish in Monaco – behind Sterling Moss – and subsequent wins in Belgium and France, Collins had clearly announced himself on the biggest stages of all.

He scored his third win on the circuit the following season when he landed the British Grand Prix at Silverstone but, sadly, it was the last race he'd finish.

Later that season, in hard pursuit of the race leader, Tony Brooks, at the German leg of the championship at the Nurburgring, he lost control of his car, spun off of the track and disappeared over a perimeter bank.



Thrown clear of his car, he hit a tree, suffered critical injuries to his head and died later that afternoon. He was 26-years-old.

Known as 'The Gentleman Driver', his remains are buried in the churchyard at Saint Mary's in Mustow Green, Kidderminster.

John Day – on www.ferrariownersclub.co.uk – remarks that "there is no reference to his career or achievements on the gravestone; it simply bears the inscription 'With a cheerful smile and a wave of the hand he journeyed into an unknown land'."

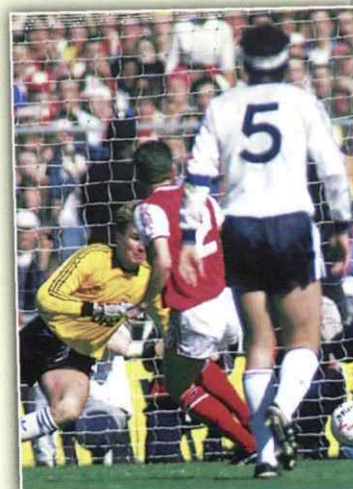

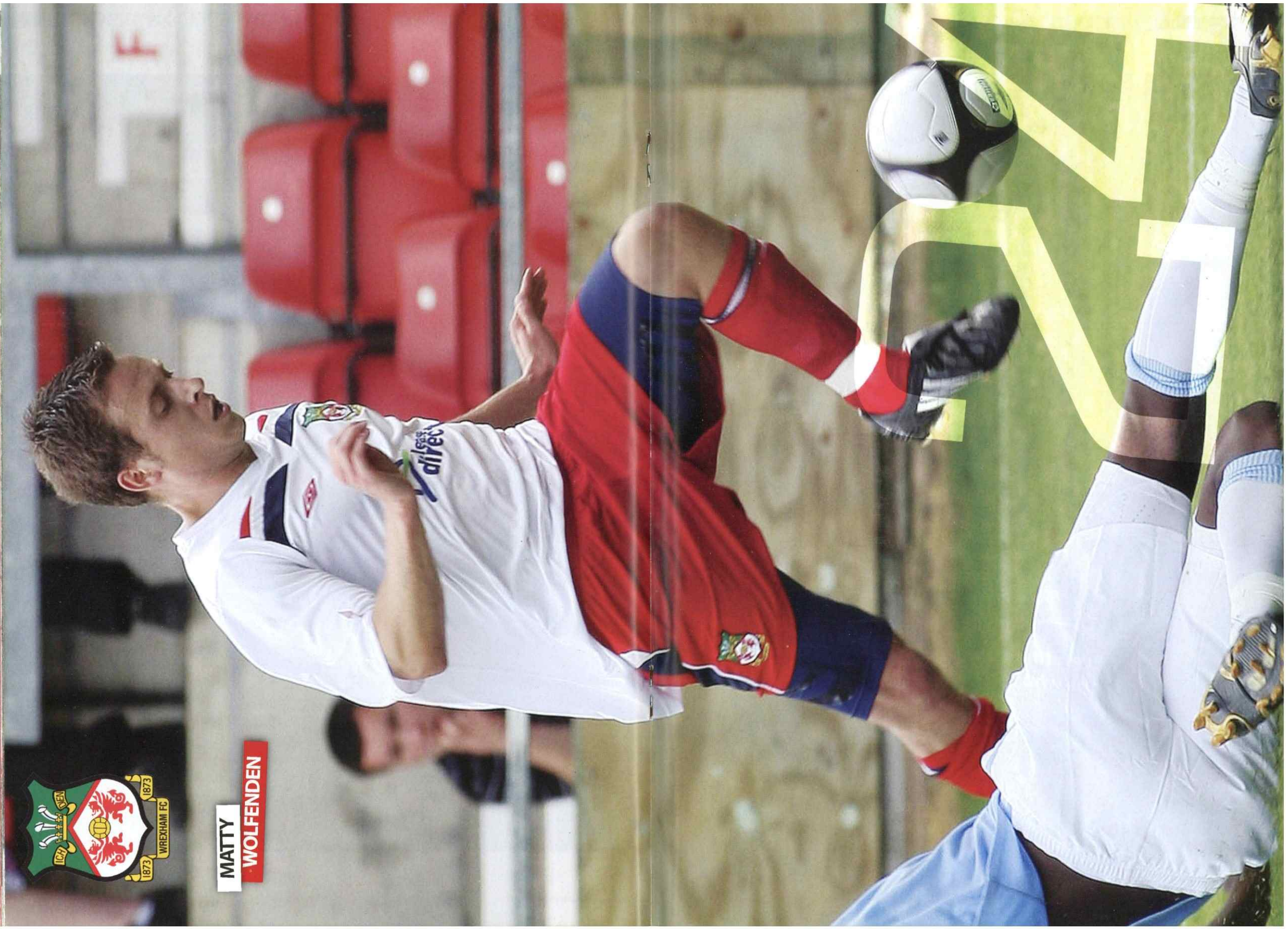

A 6-1 hammering of Carlisle

And that's how it panned out with
Wrexham three goals to the good
inside the opening 23 minutes. Paul
Barrett opened the flood gates on
16 minutes when he fired home
Carlos Edwards' cross before Brian
Carey added a second barely three
minutes later when he headed in
Darren Ferguson's centre.

Fellow central defender Stephen
Roberts then had his moment of
glory when he made it 3-0 slotting
the ball past Shaun Marshall at the
far post, as today's picture shows.

Paul Edwards added goal number
four with a delicate lob before Lee
Jones raced clear to complete the
scoring with fully 28 minutes left.
But by then the score was irrelevant,
all the fans wanted to do was start
the celebrations as the players made
a hasty retreat to the dressing rooms
at the final whistle!



ON THIS DAY >>> RETRO 22nd September

1928

A six-game unbeaten start to the 1928-29 season saw Wrexham in confident mood ahead to the visit of Gateshead, who had to make the long and arduous journey down from the North East for a Third Division (North) fixture. A crowd of 10,148, the best of the season at The Racecourse up to that point, filtered through the turnstiles and they were rewarded as Albert Mays scored the only goal of a tight game. Having drawn at Ashington the previous weekend, this win was the first of four consecutive victories for The Robins before Stockport ended the run with a 6-2 thumping the following month.

1956

The month of September 1956 saw Wrexham pack no less than nine Division Three (North) games into a four week spell and it was certainly a productive period as we won no less than seven of those games, losing the other two, both against title favourites Derby County. Boothferry Park in Hull was the destination for The Robins on 22 September and they returned with both points courtesy of a 2-1 win over The Tigers. Two goals from former Cardiff City inside-forward Elfed Evans stunned the crowd of 16,667 and contributed to a run of five successive wins.

1965

Having disposed of near neighbours Chester by the comprehensive margin of 5-2 in the first round of the League Cup, Wrexham were drawn to face Fulham in the second round. A crowd of 12,001 assembled at The Racecourse

Ground to witness the illustrious First Division visitors in action, but the vast majority went home disappointed as it The Cottagers eased into the third round draw. Martin King got his name on the scoresheet for The Robins but the Londoners managed to score twice through Brian O'Connell and Terry Dyson to secure their progress.

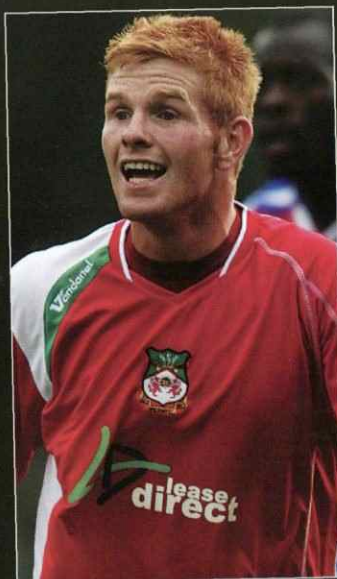
1976

It was League Cup time again for The Robins, but this time it was third round action as we had already accounted for both Port Vale and

Leicester City. White Hart Lane was the destination and it was to be a memorable night for the club as Wrexham defeated the First Division stars from Tottenham 3-2, having led 3-0 with 55 minutes gone thanks to goals from Mickey Thomas (2) and Billy Ashcroft. The home side hit back through Glenn Hoddle and Ian Moores but The Reds rearguard held firm for the remaining 27 minutes to earn a standing ovation from the travelling fans but, more importantly, a place in round four.

2007

A large following of Wrexham supporters made their way to Edgeley Park to witness the Coca-Cola League 2 game against Stockport County, but they returned disappointed as the home side ran out 2-1 winners. Boss Brian Carey made changes from the side beaten at home by Rotherham United the Saturday before and that seemed to have paid dividends when Marc Williams' (above) long range header put us in front. However, The Hatters turned the match around with goals from Anthony Elding and Dominic Blizard to leave The Dragons pointless for the fifth time in six matches.



The Dragons have had some great players down the years, all breathing with fire as they gave their all for the Wrexham colours. Intrepid reporter Mark Griffiths spent his summer months catching up with some familiar faces...

NEIL SALATHIEL

As Wrexham struggled through the 1980s, it took a strong personality to stick with the team, both for players and supporters! Neil Salathiel certainly fitted the bill on the pitch: a robust, whole-hearted right-back, he put in nearly a decade of service for the club and was witness to a difficult but fascinating period in the club's history.

"My first game was at QPR [in October 1980] but I wasn't even expecting to play," explained the sprightly looking now 46-year-old. "We went down on the train, which was a bit of a novelty in itself, and when we got to the ground Arfon Griffiths pulled me to one side about an hour before kick-off and told me I was starting."

"I just didn't know which way to turn then! QPR were a very strong side, at the top of what is now the Championship, and they'd just bought a new left-winger from Nottingham Forest as well; they'd paid a couple of hundred thousand pounds for him, which was a lot of money in those days!"

"I thought 'Well, here we go!', but it went really well! We won 1-0, Mick Vinter scored the goal, and everybody else thought I'd played quite well and so I was made up! It was absolutely wonderful!"

"Coming back on the train there were characters like Joey Jones, Dai Davies, Arfon Griffiths and Dixie McNeil – it was marvellous. A great day out! All those players who'd made such names for themselves, and then there was me, a little seventeen-year-old!"

Salathiel was hardly famed for his goalscoring mind you, hitting the net just three times in his Wrexham career which encompassed some 325 senior games. Yet, the circumstances of two of those goals were somewhat bizarre as the redoubtable defender vividly recalls.

"We were down at Southend in March 1987 and it was an amazing game! Dixie was in charge and we played with a new system, with a sweeper. We won 3-0, and it was one of the best games I ever played in for Wrexham."

"I scored two goals – both from outside the box – so you can imagine the stick I got after from the rest of the lads! Sadly, it was down in Essex on a Friday night, so hardly any Wrexham fans were there to see it."

By then the former Welsh Youth international was already in his second spell at The Racecourse, despite having only turned 24 a few months earlier. "As a young lad I was originally going to sign for Sheffield Wednesday, but a couple of things didn't work out, so I came home to Wrexham. When I turned 18, I went to see the manager. He said I'd be kept on until the end of the season and we'd go from there. Then the financial problems cut in and so I had to leave."



"I went to Crewe, and they appointed a new manager a couple of months later; it was Arfon, the man who'd just released me! But he treated me very well and I had a good time there, and played about sixty games for them."

"When I left them I went to play in South Africa for a bit, and I only came back for Christmas, but Wrexham phoned me up to ask if I'd like to train with them to keep fit while I was over. I agreed and the next thing I knew they asked if I'd fancy signing for them."

"They'd got rid of a lot of the experienced players – the high earners – because of their financial situation. I said I'd give it a whirl for a couple of years, but I ended up staying for seven or eight years in the end and had a great time!"

"Bobby Roberts was the manager by then; he was a nice man but again had a hard time because of the lack of money. I thought he did a very good job considering the financial problems we had."

The highlight of the Scot's managerial reign came in the opening months of the 1984-85 season as Wrexham produced one of the great European shocks of all-time, as Salathiel recalls with obvious relish.

"We got Porto in the first round and they'd reached the final just a few months earlier; mind you it was probably a good job we drew a big side like that because I think if we'd had to have gone to Russia or the like, it would have bankrupted the club!"

"Anyway, before the first game, we just wanted to do our best to be honest; we were down in the lower reaches of the Fourth Division after all! The crowd really got behind us that night and Jim Steel scored the only goal of the game. We thought, well 1-0 up, away leg to come, you never know!"

"The Portuguese all thought that they were going to beat us quite easily as it was only a one-goal lead. When we got there we tried some new tactics and it didn't work; we were 2-0 down after twenty minutes. We swapped it all round, but they got it to 3-0."

"Then Jake King scored two quick goals and it all got very confusing! I can remember asking Steve Wright: 'What happens if we score now; do we go through or what?' There was so much going on that it was hard to keep track of things! It was a horrible night too with the rain lashing down."

"Then they scored and made it 4-2, and I was soon asking Steve some more questions! Barry Horne then pops up with about ninety seconds left and scores the 'away' goal that put us through. All hell broke loose, on and off the pitch!"

"I heard Barry's dad had some trouble after the goal went in; he was jumping up and down, but he was the only one doing that in the entire stand!"

"We played Roma next. It was the same thing as the last round; you looked at all the international players they'd got and we just decided to go out give it your best shot."

"The first leg was in the Olympic Stadium in Rome and we got beaten 2-0,

but Jackie Keay and I both swear that the first goal was handball. Their player went up at the near post for a corner and pushed it on with his hand."

"The second goal was from about twenty-five yards, out and a player was standing offside in Stuart Parker's line of vision. So it could easily have ended 0-0 and then the return would have been a different matter altogether."

"We lost that second leg 1-0, which was the first European game the club had ever lost at home."

"We certainly didn't let ourselves down though," added Salathiel with no hint of understatement.

Roberts left in March 1985 and Wrexham's directors turned to former striking legend Dixie McNeil to try and arrest the club's ailing fortunes. "Dixie McNeil was appointed manager after Bobby and we just missed out on the play-offs in his second season in charge. Then that summer he brought in a young lad from Portsmouth called Kevin Russell and he was electric."

"The two seasons that he was with us saw us get ourselves organised and then, in the second season, finally got into the play-offs. Kevin was the outlet and he was flying. His hair wasn't though. He had more then, but not a lot!"

Wrexham reached the play-off final against Orient, but sadly for Salathiel the goalless first-leg is mostly remembered for a chance he missed.

"If only somebody had scored with a header! Some of the lads I work with now were at the match, and as soon as they mention football, someone mentions headers!"

"We drew 0-0, and lost 2-1 down there. They went 1-0 up, we equalised, they scored again and then Kevin Russell hit a shot at the end which went straight through the keeper's hands but hit him in the face and dropped safe! If that had gone in we'd have gone up! It was so disappointing. We should have done it really."

After McNeil, Brian Flynn was made manager which didn't turn out well for Salathiel.

"He made me club captain and then he let me go! Finances played their part again, but who knows what would have happened if I'd stayed? When Dixie was in charge I could have gone to a number of clubs, but I decided to stay."

"Who knows what will happen? You decide to stay, then don't see eye-to-eye with another manager and things are suddenly very different. I suppose with hindsight he did me a favour, but I didn't think so at the time!"

Ally MacLeod

It might have been tongue-in-cheek, but ten days ago the subject of today's column was announced as Scotland's greatest ever sporting hero!

Admittedly, the sobriquet came was conferred by BBC Five Live's Fighting Talk, who were recognising what they considered a remarkable slight of hand: in 1978 he succeeded in convincing a horrified English nation that Scotland were capable of winning the World Cup!

MacLeod has been seen as a figure of fun since that World Cup campaign in Argentina fell apart, which is a shame as he achieved a great deal in his career. Still, it's for the unfortunate conclusion to his stint in charge of his national side that he'll always be remembered.

MacLeod's managerial career began with Ayr United and Aberdeen, his success with each earning him a chance to take charge of Scotland. Admittedly his capacity for blowing his own trumpet would come back to haunt him, but at first his confidence was matched by his achievements. He announced on his appointment that "my name is Ally MacLeod and I am a winner," and initially he certainly was.

Scotland qualified for the World Cup from a group containing European champions Czechoslovakia and Wales, who were famously denied by a highly controversial penalty for handball at Anfield, despite the fact that it was Scottish striker Joe Jordan who committed the deed!

To make MacLeod even more popular, his side defeated England in the Home Internationals, and the fact that England failed to qualify for Argentina just made things even sweeter. While the neighbours seethed, Scotland worked itself up into a frenzy of anticipation, MacLeod promising he'd come back with "at least a medal."

The team appeared on 'Top of the Pops' as their World Cup song got to number six in the charts and 25,000 fans were at Hampden Park to see the side circle the pitch in an open top bus before they headed to a Prestwick airport to be seen off by thousands more, before many of them made their own epic journey to South America. Asked on the tarmac "What do you plan to do after Scotland



win the World Cup," MacLeod replied: "Retain it."

Such hubris would come back to haunt MacLeod. A humiliating 3-1 defeat against Peru was followed by a draw against Iran which virtually ended their campaign. To progress Scotland had to beat Holland by two clear goals, and they nearly managed it as they showed why pundits rated their chances before the tournament began. However, a 3-2 victory wasn't enough and one game later MacLeod resigned.

He went on to manage Motherwell, Airdrie and Queen of the South, playing a reserve game for the last side, and scoring from the spot, at the age of 61! However, his legacy was already established, although he claimed in his autobiography: "I am a very good manager who just happened to have a few disastrous days, once upon a time, in Argentina."

Perhaps appropriately MacLeod's playing career began bizarrely. His debut for Third Lanark ended dramatically as the stand caught fire and the players had to grab their clothes and run from the changing room!

After six years at Third Lanark - followed by six weeks at St. Mirren - he moved to

the Football League. MacLeod's career at Blackburn, indeed his entire sojourn south of the border, lasted just five years, but he made a genuine and lasting impact. He was man of the match in the 1960 FA Cup Final, although he no doubt drew little comfort from that as Rovers lost 3-0 to Wolves.

Also, he was a leading figure in the PFA's campaign to abolish the maximum wage, working tirelessly alongside Jimmy Hill, although it would seem that his stance might have brought his time at Rovers to an end as following his crusade other players in the squad were offered a pay rise, but not him!

He therefore entered negotiations with Hibernians, who offered him the pay rise his Blackburn colleagues had received. When Rovers realised that he was likely to leave they matched the offer, but too late: MacLeod felt honour-bound to accept Hibs' deal and move north.

MacLeod played over 200 games for Rovers on the left-wing, scoring one goal in every four, but no doubt the low point of his time in England came at The Racecourse. Rovers, who were in the top ten of the First Division at the time, drew us at Ewood Park in the fourth round of the inaugural League Cup but failed to make the most of home advantage.

A 1-1 draw meant the sides reconvened a week later in North Wales, and Blackburn were victims of a famous giant-killing. The first-half contained no goals, although Blackburn were fortunate to survive, but early in the second-half their luck ran out as Mickey Metcalf opened the scoring. However, Rovers hit back, Northern Ireland legend Derek Dougan equalising to send the game into extra-time.

He had only earned a stay of execution though: two more goals from Metcalf ensured Wrexham progressed at Rovers expense.

Whilst Wrexham and Luton had suffered similarly poor starts to the Division Two campaign, the vast difference in the club's respective financial positions was highlighted in the build-up to the game as The Hatters splashed out £400,000 to recruit Northern Ireland international Phil Gray; the former Fortuna Sittard striker being handed his debut against the Reds.

With Brian Flynn's side having failed to capitalise on an opening day win over Oldham - picking up just one point from their next four outings - at least the previous Saturday's home success over Bristol City had lifted spirits ahead of the tough trip to Kenilworth Road.

It came as no surprise then that Flynn should stick largely to the side that had defeated The Robins, the only change to the starting XI seeing Barry Jones come into the defence for the injured Tony Humes.

As for Luton, their squad had been decimated by injury; hence the arrival of the aforementioned Gray.

And so the match itself. After Stuart Douglas had wasted a couple of good positions for the home side, it was Wrexham who took the lead with their first serious attack with just 10 minutes played.

Crowd pleaser Karl Connolly took the ball out on the right-wing and his pass into the area resulted in a race between Dave Brammer and Luton's veteran keeper Andy Dibble; thankfully from a Wrexham viewpoint, the midfielder got there first and he calmly steered his shot around the advancing custodian to give the Reds a 1-0 advantage.

The game could, and probably should, have been put to bed early on as Mark McGregor and Connolly both wasted good opportunities before Wrexham's lead was finally doubled on 22 minutes. Gary Waddock sliced his clearance horribly and Connolly fired home a tremendous strike from the edge of the penalty-area which Dibble got nowhere near.

A good header by Steve Davis from a Richard Harvey corner-kick reduced the arrears to a single goal just before the interval and this meant that the home side came out with all guns blazing after the break.

A mix-up in the Wrexham defence allowed Gray the time and space to fire home into an unguarded net for 2-2 and thus make a good first impression on the Luton faithful in the crowd of 5,241.

The game was now on a knife-edge but it was Wrexham who stepped up a gear

and they finally gained their reward just after the hour mark. Winger Craig Skinner out-paced Bryan Small, but was than hauled back for his trouble by the on loan Birmingham City defender.

With referee Mark Rejer having little option but to point to the penalty spot, 'Skins' picked himself up and took great delight in duly converting the penalty. The home side were struggling to cope with Wrexham's greater pace and passing style of play and it was now merely a matter of what Wrexham's final margin of victory would be.

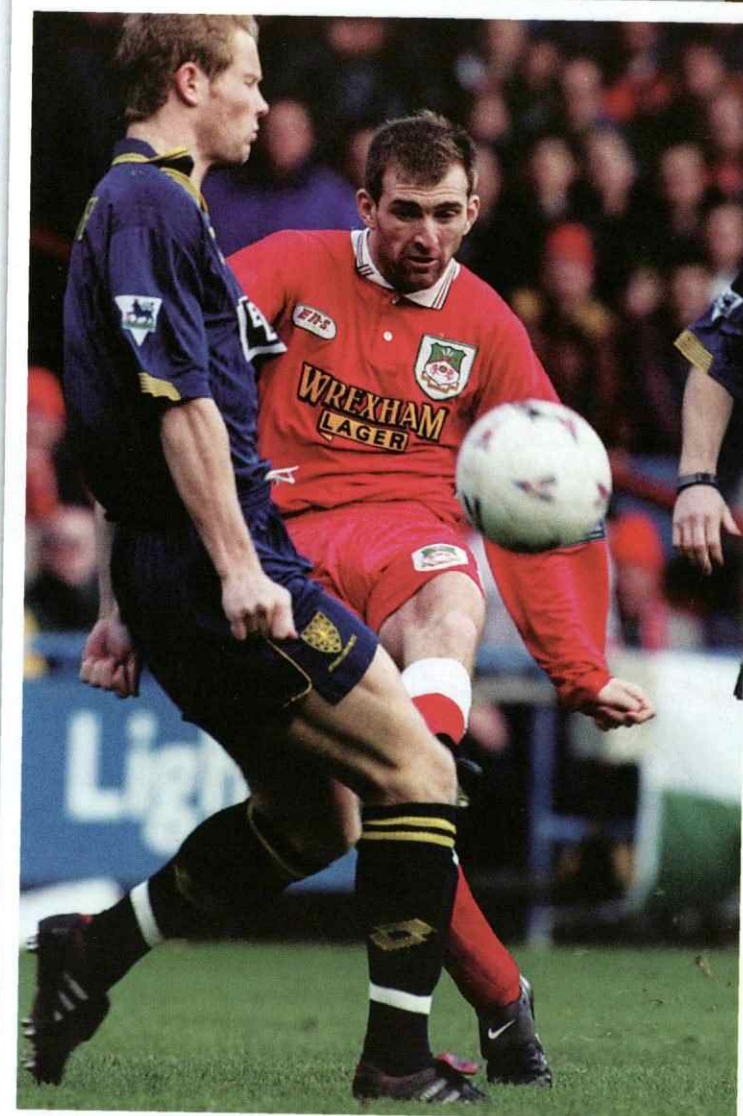
Within a minute of Skinner's penalty, the North Walsians had regained their two-goal cushion and this effectively ended the game as a contest; McGregor

pumped a long ball forward for Connolly who looped his header over Dibble and into the back of the net.

'Lugger', who had tormented The Hatters defence all afternoon with his searing pace and direct running, finally secured a well deserved hat-trick in the 73rd minute; Skinner once again was the provider and the likeable Scouser calmly beat the advancing keeper to make the scoreline 5-2.

This hat-trick was the 100th scored by a Wrexham player since joining the Football League in 1921, and the win was also the club's biggest away from The Racecourse since routing Chesterfield 6-0 in September 1976.

A memorable day all round.



SEPTEMBER 1981

Football supporters are often overly hasty and emotive in arriving at conclusions and assessments and Mel Sutton – who spent eight seasons at the coal-face here and who made over 350 appearances for us – probably knows this better than most.

So given how majestically he performed for us in the heart of our midfield, is it unfair that his place in Wrexham's lore is so sullied by the one season he spent as manager?

After John Neal spend £15,000 to bring him from Cardiff City in the summer of 1972, the Birmingham-born stylist hit the ground running; he scored winning goals in both his away and home debuts on consecutive weekends.

Comfortable on the ball and always perfectly poised, few new signings have won over the Wrexham crowd so quickly and so convincingly.

And when Arfon Griffiths departed The Racecourse in May 1981 after refusing to trim his backroom staff, Sutton eventually found himself in an invidious position; manager by default.

As one of the senior professionals at the club, as well as Griffiths' de facto assistant, he eventually became a target for the then chairman, Fred Tomlinson, but only after the board had made overtures to several well-known figures including former Everton boss Gordon Lee.

Although clearly in the wrong place at the wrong time, Sutton was damned if he did and damned if he didn't take the job when Tomlinson finally offered it to him a month later.

History now tells us that Wrexham AFC at the start of the 1980s was the ultimate poisoned chalice, haemorrhaging money, its best players and supporters in equal measure.

With a mounting debt and caught square in the eye of an appalling recession, it was clear that the club was existing way beyond its comfort zone, clinging onto its Division Two status almost in spite of itself.

Compounding the impact of Griffiths' departure further was the bubbling inertia of the natives; uninspired by a lack of investment at board level and by a lack of ambition on the field, attendances at home games had started to dwindle.

Mel Sutton's initial impact as a Wrexham player nine years previously contrasts greatly with his start in the dug-out; four defeats in his opening five league games set the alarm bells off early.

Under his management, Wrexham's starting eleven, when fit, bore a familiar look, and this was clearly part of the problem; the side was carrying huge mileage and the wafer-thin squad was rarely injury-free.

Only the emerging Eddie Niedzwiecki and Simon Hunt offered fresh options, otherwise, the nucleus was still built around Joey Jones, Gareth Davies, Dixie McNeil, Alan Hill and Ian Arkwright, who was unavailable from the off because of injury.

To this end Sutton had attempted to snare at least one additional signing during pre-season, but Ian Atkins had decided to stay put over at Shrewsbury Town while Bristol Rovers' Tony Pulis arrived on trial but never showed enough to warrant terms.

Upstairs, the cupboard was just as bare and the chairman and directors made

frequent public appeals to the absent support base.

Before a ball was kicked in anger, chairman Tomlinson declared that: "We face many problems and threats, the biggest one being finance. Only by maintaining high standards and high efficiency can we beat these problems."

For all of the chairman's laudable candour, this kind of talk did nothing to entice the sceptics.

The club, then, was caught in an invidious and all-too-familiar cycle; the lack of funding impacted on the team's ability to compete and, as the side started to leak, so too did its support start to melt.

When Charlton Athletic arrived at The Racecourse towards the end of September, 1981, we still hadn't won a single league game and, although three of our defeats were by one-goal margins, we looked leggy and bereft of ideas up-front.

The Addicks, clearly on the rise, had come up the previous May and were themselves working to a new manager.

Dixie McNeil — converted from the penalty spot



Mike Bailey had overseen the previous season's promotion winning campaign but, after having quickly departed for Brighton, had since been replaced at the front of the team bus by Alan Mullery.

And it was a plucky and hard-working side he'd inherited. From the erstwhile Nicky Johns between the sticks to the appropriately named Steve Gritt and the reliable full-back, Terry Naylor, Charlton were certainly one of the soundest outfits in the league.

But it was up front where they looked most potent. Derek Hales, still the club's all-time record goalscorer, was back for a second spell at The Valley and, alongside him, the emerging, cavalier Paul Walsh and Martin Robinson presented a formidable punch.

But faced with the Steve Dowman-Wayne Cegielski axis, they struggled to catch fire all afternoon and, against all of the pre-match odds, it was the home side that dominated the game from the off; Johns was by far the busier goalkeeper throughout, making a series of fine stops.

Continuing a recent trend, the match was decided by one goal; Dixie McNeil converted a penalty twenty minutes from time after the Charlton goalkeeper was deemed to have fouled him inside his area.

But while the decision looked harsh, neither the Wrexham fans in an official attendance returned at 3,076 nor Mel Sutton were complaining; the home side had recorded its first league win of the season, with a clean sheet thrown in for good measure.

Sadly, Wrexham failed to capitalise on the momentum and went on to spend the most part of the season in the doldrums, only rarely spotting dry dock and infrequently hitting any sort of highs.

Two poor runs of league form that bookended the year had effective done for us; any outbreaks of real form were intermittent and irregular and the fact that the club's 'Player of the Year' was its goalkeeper, Niedzwiecki, told the story of the season's traffic flow.

By the following May, and on the back of further boardroom upheaval and continued financial losses, Sutton was deemed surplus to requirements; barely four years after the single greatest season in the club's history and we'd blown the boom.

And although Sutton goes down in history as the season's sacrificial lamb, revisionism asks if the Wrexham manager – clearly a victim of circumstance – was really more sinned against than sinning

John Lennon – the former Beatle and one of popular music's most influential and prolific talents – was shot dead by Mark Chapman in New York City on 8 December, 1980.

Earlier that evening the greatest songwriter of his generation – who had been stalked for months – had autographed a copy of his most recent album, 'Double Fantasy', for his would-be assassin.

For the next twelve months, Lennon's back catalogue dominated the album charts while select cuts from 'Double Fantasy' went straight to the top of the singles charts worldwide, staying there over Christmas and well into the New Year.

'Imagine' and 'Woman' held the top berth one after the other in January 1981, shamefully replaced – however briefly – by Joe Dolce's novelty song, 'Shaddup Ya Face', which in turn was toppled by a Roxy Music version of a Lennon classic, 'Jealous Guy'.

Not to be out-done, Cardiff's Shakin' Stevens – known to his mother and father as Michael Barrett – also enjoyed a pair of Number One singles that year, with the mildly irritating but terrifyingly infectious 'This Ole House' and 'Green Door' doing the honours.

But it was the war-painted, post-punk dandies, Adam And The Ants, who were

occupying pole position by the time that Alan Mullery was addressing his troops in the away dressing room at The Racecourse Ground that September.

Fronted by actor Stuart Goddard, 'Prince Charming' was the group's second Number One single of the year; Adam And The Ants had reached the summit with 'Stand And Deliver' earlier in the year.

Elsewhere, The Specials' politically charged 'Ghost Town' was unquestionably the year's darkest and most intriguing Number One

single while, on the other extreme, Soft Cell announced themselves as an electronic pop act of import when they hit the top with 'Tainted Love'.

But if Mel Sutton, in the midst of a horrific season as Wrexham manager, needed comfort

around Christmas time from the popular music chart, he hardly felt any positive messages from Queen and David Bowie's November chart-topper, 'Under Pressure'.

And during his quieter, more reflective moments alone he may have cited the title of The Human League's Christmas-time Number One, 'Don't You Want Me, Baby?' in any imaginary conversations with the Wrexham FC fan-base.



Ayr United

Down the years the Dragons have faced various sides from Europe and beyond, whether it be in European competition of merely friendlies. In this series we look back at some of those games and chart just what's happened to those sides in the intervening years...

To my mind, not enough Conference programme articles open with quotes from Eighteenth Century Scottish poetry, so let's start the trend with a little something from the bard himself, Robbie Burns.

"This truth fand honest Tam O'Shanter,

As he frae Ayr ae night did canter;
(Auld Ayr, wham ne'er a town surpasses,

For honest men and bonie lasses)."

Don't worry, you haven't inadvertently fallen foul of a renegade band of 'Poetry Weekly' salesmen roaming outside the ground in hope of a lucky sale: Burns' words have a salient connection to a side which Wrexham faced in a friendly ten years ago.

Surely Ayr United are unique in boasting a nickname drawn from literature: as you can see above, in his great work, 'Tam O'Shanter', the eponymous hero ventures into Ayr, a town Burns lauds as having particularly upright inhabitants. Hence their nickname: 'The Honest Men'.

Not that Kilmarnock fans would necessarily agree! Their rivalry might not capture many headlines, but it's one of the most heart-felt in British football. But don't take my word for it, ask a man whose career was bookended with a spell with the two Ayrshire rivals, and also played in derbies in Glasgow, Munich and Birmingham!

Sky Sports pundit Alan McInally might have experienced white-hot atmospheres all round Europe playing for his clubs and Scotland, but he told Sky Sports that the Ayrshire derby was just as big: "I played Celtic v Rangers, Aston Villa v Birmingham, Bayern Munich v Nuremberg and this compares. If you support Ayr or Kilmarnock, this is as big.

"I remember playing in one game at Somerset Park. It would have been about



1981 and we had a guy called Ian McAllister who could have played at a higher level. Big Derek McDicken played for Killie and even saying his name frightens me! He used to work for Curries lemonade and could have carried the truck.

"Derek had a shot in the 93rd minute that went past the post, bounced back and hit the back of the netting. The ref gave the goal and all hell broke loose. It went mental. Ian was kicking everything and going crazy. I was at the other end so never really saw it but we restarted and then it was full-time.

"It kicked off after the game and Cally wanted to go into the other dressing room and kill everybody. Then we reminded him it was big Derek who scored and it might not be a good idea! But that sort of intense feeling was my first real experience of an Ayrshire derby and it was great."

The savour of the Ayrshire derbies is added to by the fact that they are rare these days. Ayr have slipped down the divisions in comparison to Kilmarnock recently, and the sides were last at the same level back in 1993, the longest period of separation the

duo have suffered since Ayr were formed in 1910.

"Quite simply, they don't get the chance to meet any more," McInally explains. "They talk about Spurs struggling just now but if they beat Arsenal twice a season their folk are happy. Can you imagine Rangers and Celtic not in the same league? Hibs and Hearts?"

McInally's father Jackie, was a legend at Kilmarnock but his loyalties lie with his first club.

"I went to Kilmarnock when I came back from Bayern Munich and it was because of one person - Tommy Burns. I would have done anything for Tommy but I never thought I'd play for the club my father did as I always saw myself as an Ayr player.

"I was there from 13 until about 20 before I went to Celtic. I didn't want to play for a club my dad was such a hero with. He won a league there. I got stick but it wasn't too bad. I had one advantage, though. My dad was Jackie McInally, so I was always going to be alright."

Despite their diminished circumstances, Ayr have been offered opportunities to take on their great rivals in the cups though, and they've taken the chances with both hands!

The season after their separation they drew each other in the Scottish Cup and Kilmarnock triumphed 2-1, but as the sides continued to draw each other with uncanny frequency, the underdogs embarked on a remarkable run of success. Four times in five years they came together and each time Ayr were victorious, once with the help of a penalty shoot-out.

After a hiatus of seven years the sides met once more last season in the Scottish Cup, and the sides fought out a dramatic game at Ayr, with the home side snatching a late equaliser through Alex Williams, to the delight of McInally, not only because of his preference for United, but because it gave him an opportunity to present the replay live on Sky Sports and sample the atmosphere of an Ayrshire derby once more!

"I was in the Sky studio doing Soccer Saturday when Ayr scored late and Jeff Stelling looked at me. He couldn't say anything at the time but then the scoreline came through. I thought, 'ya beauty' as it would give me the chance to come up for the replay. At first, I was told Alex was booked for kissing the ref. Then I heard he'd taken his top off but even that was a joke.

"The ref has never been in that position but a billion people would have swapped with Alex at that moment. I know; I've been there. Jockey Mick Fitzgerald said winning the Grand National is better than sex. Maybe he's not quite right but it's not far off.

"It's great to get a replay and now Ayrshire football is going to be at the forefront. It's terrific for both clubs and there will be some money in it."

United raised their game for the cameras as they looked to continue their terrific run against their rivals, and after just ten minutes Bryan Prunty gave them a lead which they held onto until half-time.

Soon after the restart Killie equalised, but when they had a player sent-off with twenty minutes left it looked like the giant-killers had their opportunity. Oddly, the dismissal seemed to spur the home team on though: seven minutes later they took the lead and soon afterwards snatched a third to foil United.

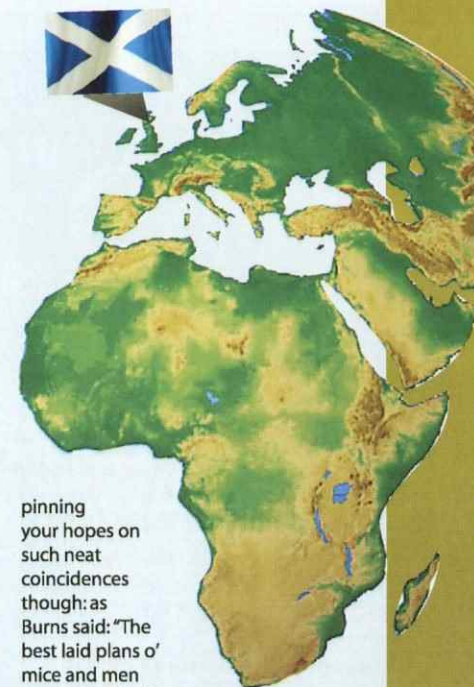
Perhaps the highpoint of Ayr's rivalry with Kilmarnock came in the 1930s, when a remarkable turnaround between the two clubs took place. In April 1936 Kilmarnock emphatically secured the local bragging rights with an 8-0 victory over The Honest Men in the final of the Ayrshire Cup. However, their position of primacy wouldn't last long; just a fortnight later the sides met in the Ayr Charity Cup final and Ayr turned things around by triumphing 7-0!

The Ayrshire Cup is a spectacular trophy, looking rather like a squat Welsh Cup, decorated with all manner of little figures, jutting precariously off its edges. Its exotic nature was augmented by the presence of sides like Afton Lads, Maybole, Vale of Ayr, Coylton Coila, Kilmaurs Floors, Ayr Rovers and Ayr Athole. Sadly, the pot is no more; it was last contested in 1997, when Ayr won it for the twenty-sixth time and got to keep it in perpetuity.

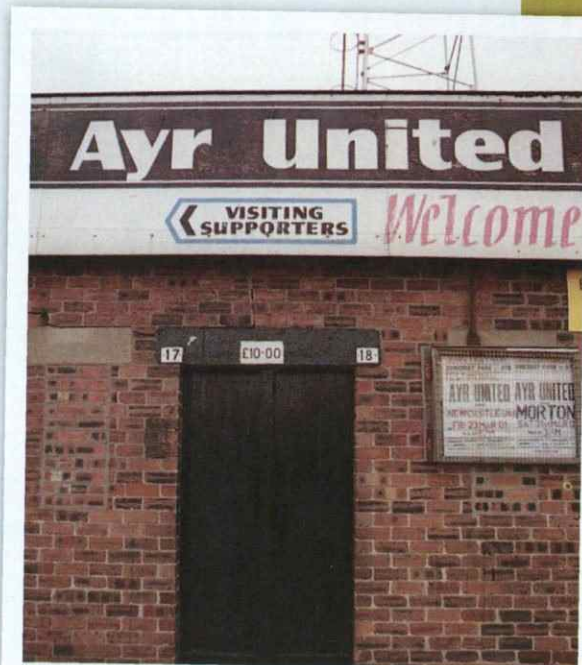
A competition of more recent vintage is an impressive event to commemorate the club's centenary season. The club was founded after the amalgamation of Ayr Parkhouse and Ayr FC, making United the only side to come about after a merger by two clubs which were already in the Scottish League. To mark the event there is an opportunity to win 'The Honest Men Centenary Pie Competition': who could pass up the chance to select the centenary pie?

Perhaps a more substantial achievement would be to mark the club's centenary with promotion and another crack in the league at Kilmarnock. At the moment United are in the Scottish First Division, and having never won a major trophy, a centennial promotion to the top division would be quite an achievement.

The man who gave the club their nickname would warn against the



pinning your hopes on such neat coincidences though: as Burns said: "The best laid plans o' mice and men gang aft agley." You can't argue with that!

"Think Wrexham and you think of a Third Division side." This was a well worn mantra back in the early 1960's with many fans, both in North Wales and beyond, questioning the club's desire to break into the upper echelons of the Football League.

Whilst that was finally achieved back in 1978, Wrexham ultimately spent more seasons in the third tier of the world's oldest league competition than any other division. In this feature, we take a look at our opponents in what became 'Wrexham's division'.

Bolton, Man City, Wigan & Luton

17. BOLTON WANDERERS

A founder member of the Football League back in 1888, Bolton flourished in the rarefied air of the First and Second Divisions until 1971, when they finished bottom of Division Two, dropping down alongside neighbours Blackburn.

They were still smarting from relegation when Wrexham visited Burnden Park in November 1971 and the Reds returned to North Wales with both points, Ian Moir and Graham Whittle netting in our 2-0 win. This was Wrexham's sixth win in a row but the season went pear shaped after that as we recorded only one win in the next 17 games, a

run that included a 1-2 reversal at home to Bolton.

Under the astute management of Jimmy Armfield, Bolton consolidated in their first season in Division Three, and then won the title a year later, finishing four points ahead of Notts County. In so doing, the Trotters beat Wrexham twice, becoming the first visiting team to win at The Racecourse Ground that season [3-1 with goals from Lee Phillips, Gary Jones and Stuart Lee] and edging home 1-0 at Burnden Park thanks to Paul Jones' goal.

Although we have faced Wanderers since then at Second and Fourth Division level, seasons 1971-72 and 1972-73 occasioned our only meetings in the third tier.

18. MANCHESTER CITY

Although a chasm now appears to separate Manchester City from Wrexham, only 11 years ago we faced the Mancunian giants as equals in Nationwide Division Two.

Joe Royle had replaced Frank Clark as City's manager in February 1998 with the club deep in relegation trouble but couldn't arrest the slide into the uncharted territory of the third tier of the game. Nevertheless, City were hot favourites to bounce back at the first time of asking.

In August 1998 Ian Rush found himself replaced by Neil Roberts in the Wrexham side that travelled to Maine Road but Roberts saw little of the ball as our hosts, unsurprisingly, dominated possession.

Shots and crosses peppered the Wrexham goalmouth where Mark Cartwright produced the best performance of his career to keep the score at 0-0. Royle admitted: "He [Cartwright] stopped everything. We had enough chances to win it yet he kept everything out."

In the return at Wrexham on Boxing Day, it was Manchester City keeper Nicky Weaver's turn to produce a man-of-the match performance. Wrexham dominated possession but City, with Gareth Taylor in their ranks, stole

a 1-0 win when Dutch defender Gerard Wiekens headed in Kevin Horlock's corner.

Wrexham ended the campaign in 17th place and, although finishing behind Fulham and Walsall, Manchester City went up via the play-offs. Famously, City miraculously recovered a two-goal deficit with just sixty seconds of normal time remaining to send their Wembley clash with Gillingham into extra-time.

Having netted the last gasp leveller, Paul Dickov then missed in the penalty shoot-out but the striker's blushes were spared when Blues' keeper Nicky Weaver saved all bar-one of the Gills spot-kicks to clinch promotion in the process.

19. WIGAN ATHLETIC

Even more recently than the games against Manchester City, Wrexham were competing in the third tier against Wigan. Although we parted company when Wrexham were relegated in 2001-02, we still beat the Latics three times that season!

Our first win was by a thumping 5-1 margin in the LDV Vans Trophy in front of 1,550 at The Racecourse Ground; an own goal from Keith Hill put the visitors into a 25th minute lead but two goals from Lee Trundle, another brace from Andy Morrell, and a fifth from Steve Thomas secured our safe passage.

At the JJB Stadium four days later, Wrexham again went behind, to a Tony Dinning penalty. Keith Hill equalised but we went behind again when Kristian Rogers saved a second penalty only for Simon Haworth to net the rebound.

The former Cardiff man celebrated with 'The Ayatollah' in front of the Wrexham fans but we had the last laugh when a Hector Sam special and a predatory strike from Craig Faulconbridge gave us a 3-2 win.

The Faulcon scored again as we beat the Latics 2-0 at home in February 2002 [Dennis Lawrence getting the other goal] but we won only three out of our remaining 13 games and dropped into Nationwide Division Three.

Admitted to the League in 1978 in place of Southport, Wigan first met Wrexham in December 1982 in a Third Division match that finished 1-1, Eamon O'Keefe nodding in a late leveller for Latics after Ian Arkwright had given us the lead.

The following Easter, John Muldoon put us ahead at Springfield Park but Wigan hit back to win 3-1. In three visits to their old ground, we never won, but in our 3 visits so far to the JJB Stadium we have never lost. Karl Connolly hit the only goal as we won there in April 2000 and we held out for a 0-0 draw there on New Year's Day 2001.

20. LUTON TOWN

Having played Second Division football for three seasons, Luton failed to be re-elected in 1900, bowing out of the League alongside Loughborough Town. The East Midlands never recovered but the Hatters re-grouped and found themselves back in the League in 1920 when the Southern League was re-branded as Division Three.

Tonight's visitors first made the trip to The Racecourse Ground in November 1963 when goals from Arfon Griffiths and Mickey Metcalfe secured Wrexham's first win in 13 games. Luton got their own back at Kenilworth Road, Clive Colbridge hitting Wrexham's consolation goal in a 1-3 defeat.

In a difficult season for both clubs, Luton narrowly avoided the drop – finishing 18th – but Ken Barnes' side slipped down to Division Four along with Millwall, Crewe and Notts County.

Our third tier clashes resumed in Nationwide Division Two in 1996-97. A dour scoreless draw at Kenilworth Road was followed by a 2-1 home win here, the irrepressible Gary Bennett notching both our goals after Steve Davis had headed the Hatters into the lead.

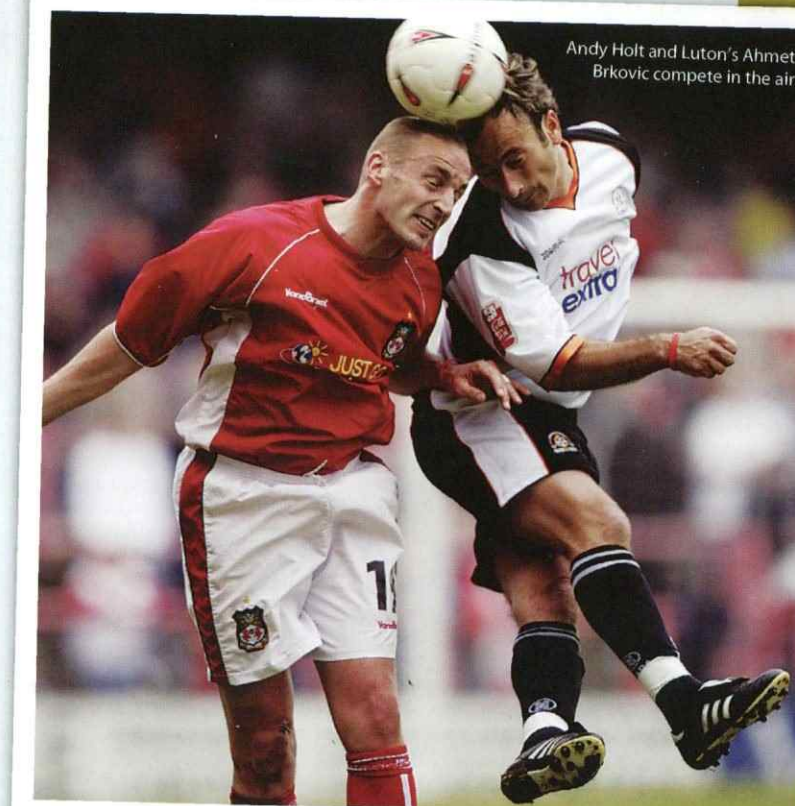
The following year, Wrexham ran riot at

Luton, our 5-2 win being the club's biggest away win in the League since a 6-0 romp at Chesterfield in September 1976.

An even more remarkable result was our most recent win at Kenilworth Road, 4-3 in October 2000. With half an hour left to play, Brian Flynn's team were 3-0 down. Faulconbridge swooped to head in a goal back and further strikes followed from Chris Killen, Martyn Chalk and Darren Ferguson, Fergie sliding in the winner with three minutes left in front of the raucous travelling supporters.

On our most recent visit to Bedfordshire, we ended up outclassed, five goals down with half-an-hour to play, there was to be no fairy-tale ending this time, though Hector Sam salvaged some pride to make the final score 5-1.

Some 2,500 Hatters made their way to The Racecourse Ground for the rematch in April 2005. Andy Holt headed Wrexham into the lead but our visitors hit back with second-half goals from Curtis Davies and Chris Coyne to clinch the League One title. Our ten point deduction for entering administration proved too much to make up as Wrexham were relegated, eight points from safety.

FERRIS WHEELS ACROSS THE COUNTRY

Ken Ferris, 1995

Like many a long-suffering and faceless football widow, Ken Ferris's partner, Nicky, is clearly a most understanding woman who has gone far beyond the boundary in the best interests – one hopes – of her domestic set-up.

Because without her support – both as one half of a relationship and as a mother to the couple's son, Lyle – its questionable whether or not the long-standing Tottenham Hotspur supporter's 1995 travelogue, 'Football Fanatic', would have ever seen the light of day.

In equal part a football diary, social essay and real-time tussle with the vagaries of the British Rail schedules, Ferris sets himself the ultimate anorak's challenge; to visit all 92 league grounds in the quickest time possible and to maybe even land himself into the Guinness Book of Records.

And this while holding down a full-time job and a family life.

There have, of course, been many far more important books on British Football but, to anyone who has ever found themselves stranded in Mansfield after a Tuesday night Johnstone's Paint Trophy defeat, 'Football Fanatic' has a wonder and a strange beauty of its own.

Applying an unscientific maths formula, Ferris – then working in financial broadcasting – hits the parade, barely stopping for breath and touching the country's most extreme [and depressing] out-posts.

"A quick back-of-the-envelope calculation told me that I would have to see three games a week for 25 weeks of the season and two games a week for the other nine weeks," he reveals in the introduction.

It's a schedule that takes him to Wrexham for a regular Saturday afternoon encounter with Leyton Orient on 14 January, 1995.

Then revelling under Brian Flynn and powered by the goals of Gary Bennett, the club – and the town – was in buoyant humour; on the previous weekend, Ipswich Town had been slain in an FA Cup Fourth Round tie.

Having encountered the bi-lingual signposts and the usual slew of flag-draped cars bearing travelling supporters going both directions on the motorway, he fetches up at the ground in good time and, in the best traditions of the day-tripper, heads immediately for the club shop.

Tooling up with a couple of fanzines [he name-checks 'The Sheeping Giant'] and a match programme, he encounters a developing orderly queue in search of coach tickets for an up-coming trip to Old Trafford and over-hears a pointed comment from a random regular.

"Who are all these people?" moaned one fan. "Why aren't they here every week?" said another who was scrambling around to get vouchers for his mates.

Leafing through the programme, and surprised to discover "only one Hughes [Bryan] – a very skilful young player (pictured) – and one Jones [Barry]," he notes that the issue is: "Full of coverage of that famous victory over Ipswich, including a centrefold picture of the players in the bath."

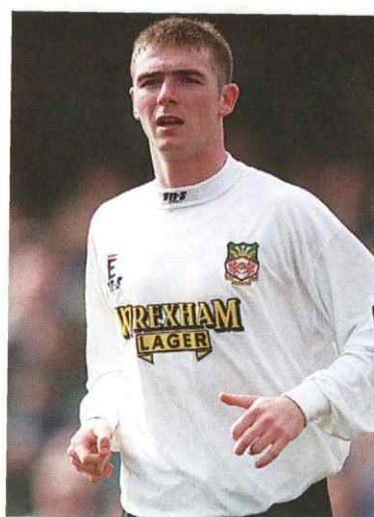
"The caption read: 'This is the least revealing. However, we still have the negatives and are prepared to listen to cash offers from certain players'."

But its Gary Bennett, inevitably, who captures the visitor's attention, and Ferris refers repeatedly to the player and the acclaim afforded him by the home [and away] supporters.

Impeccably briefed and, like all anoraks, precise with his facts and correct with his detail, Ferris mentions Bennett's nick-name and refers to the back-ground to the player's infamous 1987 tackle on Sheffield Wednesday's Ian Knight that ended with a High Court settlement.

True to form, 'Psycho' scores an excellent hat-trick on the day; one of his three goals starts with a forty-yard run down the touch-line and ends with a twenty-yard strike dispatched into the roof of Paul Heald's net.

After side-footing home a third goal – Wrexham's fourth – Ferris writes how: "The



Wrexham number seven ran towards the Kop, ripped off his shirt, as he'd done after scoring the winner against Ipswich in the Cup the week before, and pretended to throw it to his adoring fans. They lapped it up."

At the final whistle, and after the home side crafts an impressive victory [the game finished 4-1], the visitor follows another well-worn and much lamented tradition and heads to The Turf Hotel.

"It belongs to Border Breweries, who also own the ground itself, and serves a fine pint of Marston's bitter," he writes.

There, in time honoured fashion, he strikes up loose talk with a barman who offers Ferris a quick – and subjective – club history and recalls those heady days, pre-1985, when beer was still served from The Turf to those attending on the Mold Road side of the ground.

In retrospect, Ken Ferris proved to be an excellent charm for us that season.

He had previously encountered us when he visited AFC Bournemouth one month earlier, on a bitterly cold Friday night during the pre-Christmas run-up. On that occasion we won 3-1, with Bennett also on the score-sheet.

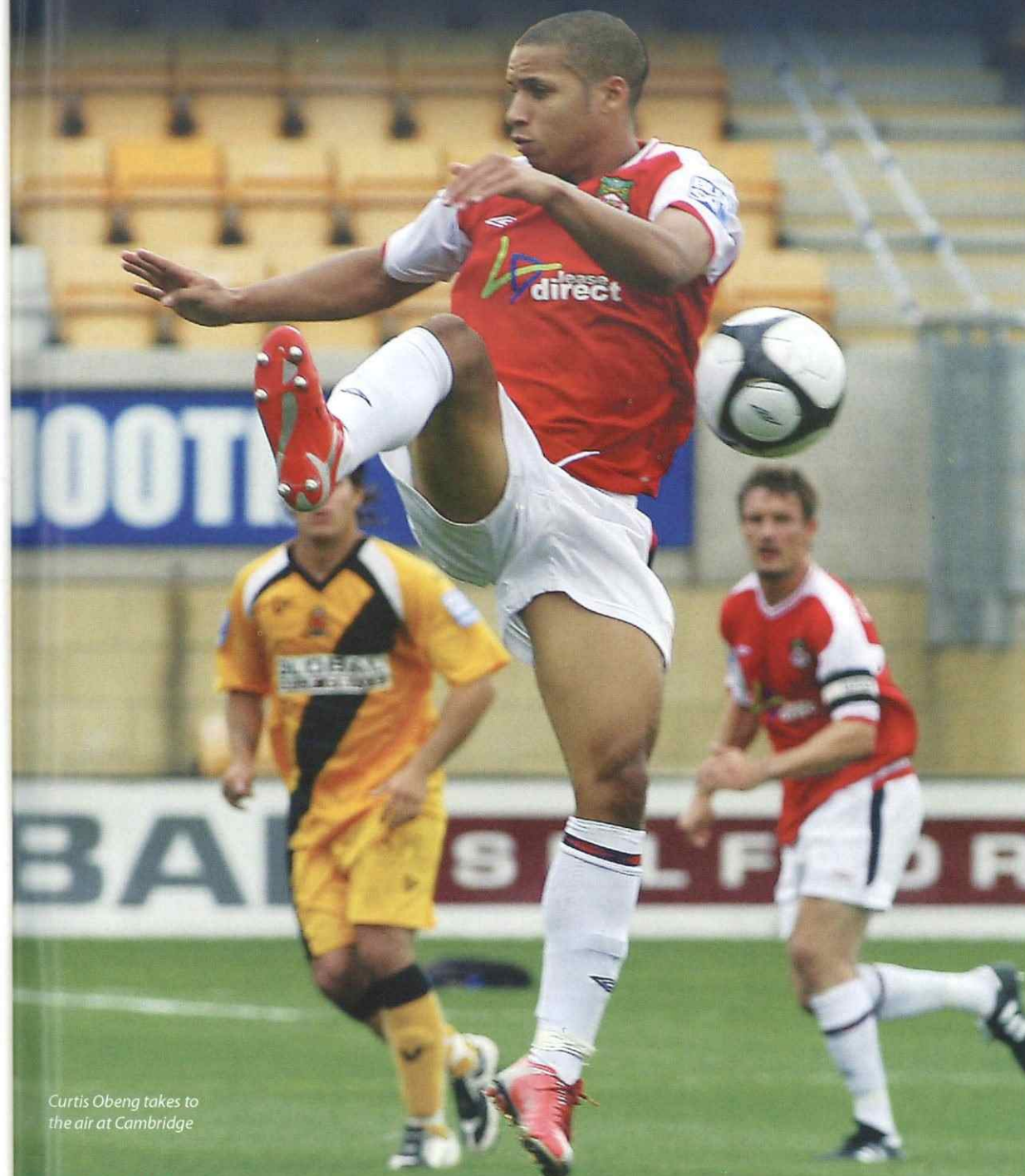

Baynes double clinches welcome away victory at the New Lawn

After six months in the waiting, Wrexham finally getting back to winning ways on their travels as struggling Forest Green are put to the sword

SATURDAY 22ND AUGUST

The Dragons one-hundred percent home record is ended as Kettering Town deservedly grab a 2-1 victory at The Racecourse. However, the result is somewhat overshadowed by injuries to two summer signings in goalkeeper Sam Russell, which is likely to keep him out of action for a couple of months, and striker Matty Wolfenden, which is expected to sideline him for around 2-3 weeks.

The Poppies took the lead in the 25th minute as a free-kick from Lee Fowler was headed back across goal by Exodus Geohaghan at the far post and striker Damian Spencer had the simple task of netting from just a couple of yards out.

The men from Northamptonshire doubled their advantage a few minutes after half-time when Patrick Noubissie fired home from the around the penalty spot and this left The Dragons with an uphill task to secure even a point.

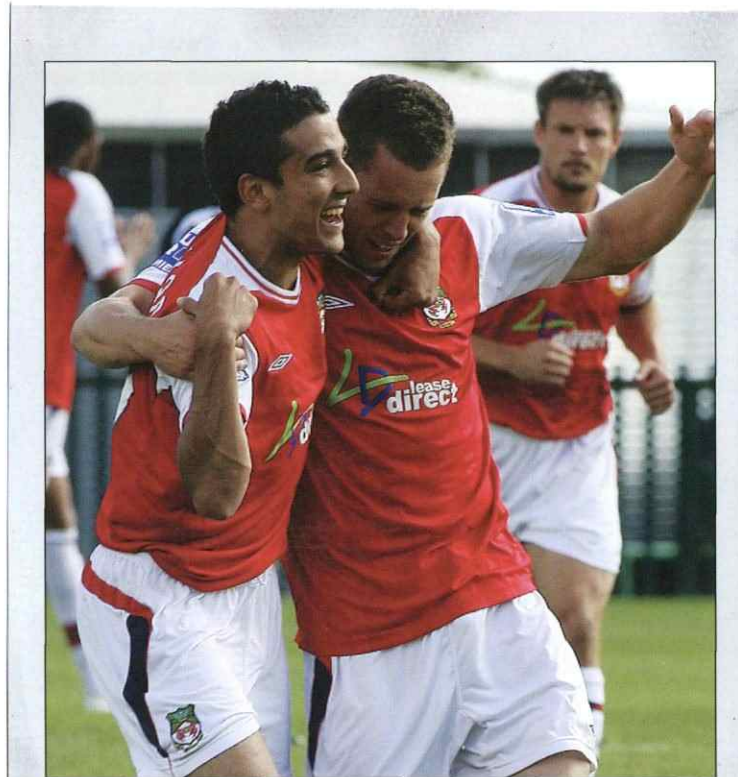
A switch of formation at half-time had seen Silvio Spann pushed into a more advanced position, swapping with Curtis Obeng, and it was from the Trinidadian's cross that defender Mani Assoumani headed Wrexham back into the game with almost half-an-hour still to play.

Russell's injury meant the home side had to play the last eleven minutes with just ten men, midfielder Hedi Taboubi going between the sticks as Dean Saunders had already used his permitted three subs.

The Williams brothers nearly combined for a late leveller; surprisingly it was Marc who set up Mike, but the defender was flagged offside by the eagle-eyed linesman before the ball had even nestled in the net.

For Taboubi taking his place between the sticks was a new experience: "It was the first time that I have played in goal. The gaffer told me to go in so I had to try and do my best. I don't know why he chose me, you'll have to ask him, but we had to score so we couldn't put a striker in goal.

"The most important thing was that we lost the game, we can't keep conceding goals from set-pieces. We will have to work on that in training. Perhaps we need to be more

aggressive, I don't know.

"We're all disappointed because we try to play good football, but you can't play good football without being aggressive and winning your battles, man for man. You had to be better than your opponent and if everyone is better then you win the game."

MONDAY 24TH AUGUST

Having played against Wrexham for Bury in a reserve friendly match the previous week, former Chelsea and Leicester defender Frank

Sinclair joins the club on a one-year contract.

The 27-year-old former Jamaican international was pleased to get the chance to move to The Racecourse as he told BBC Sport: "I've joined as I believe that this squad had the ability to win automatic promotion. I've trained a few times with Wrexham and I have seen there is good quality and good competition in the squad.

"I have no problem dropping down to non-league. I have always been suited to playing at this level because I love heading it,

defending and making tackles. One of the main attributes of this league is battling your way out of it and putting your body on the line. I've done that all through my career."

TUESDAY 25TH AUGUST

Despite Gareth Taylor netting with a crisp shot at the end of a fine, flowing move in the 26th minute, Wrexham fall to a shock 2-1 defeat against Tamworth at The Lamb.

The goal from the former Welsh international striker was the Dragons first away from home since Nathan Fairhurst netted the winner at Northwich Victoria back in March, and ended a barren run of 492 minutes without a goal.

The home side equalised on 37 minutes when captain Chris Smith headed home a corner, Jake Sheridan capitalising on an error from Ashley Westwood to net the winning goal with just 19 minutes left.

The Dragons had a blatant appeal for a penalty rejected by referee Mr Martin at 1-0 as Adrian Cieslewicz's fantastic length of the field run was ended by a tackle from behind, but the official indicated that he thought that the ball had been played before the man.

Other than that, Wrexham created very little and the home side ran out deserved victors at the end of a disappointing evening for the near 600 Reds fans present.

"We committed suicide again, we came out and conceded two shocking goals," fumed Dean Saunders afterwards. "The second goal is just a ridiculous mistake and it kills you.

"It is extremely frustrating for the supporters, I know that they are desperate to get back into the league and I am desperate to get the team back into the league. Maybe the desperation from everybody is making the players twitch a little bit."

Meanwhile midfielder Matty Hurdman has been allowed to join Colwyn Bay on loan, initially for a month.

WEDNESDAY 26TH AUGUST

The reserves start their Totesport.com League campaign with an entertaining 2-2 draw against Rochdale at Globe Way in Buckley, despite Wes Baynes giving Wrexham a two goal advantage with just 13 minutes remaining.

Baynes nets his first with a rasping 25-yard free-kick on 47 minutes, while the second was even more spectacular and from a distance which was even further out. Scott Spencer netted twice for Dale, the second coming a minute into time added on, as the spoils were shared.

Former loan star Angelos Tsiaklis features on trial for the Dragons while both Frank Sinclair and Lamine Sakho get their first competitive action in a Wrexham shirt.

Meanwhile a Wales Under-23 fixture against Poland is now likely to mean the postponement of the scheduled trip to AFC

Wimbledon early next month. This is because no less than five Wrexham players – Chris Maxwell, Neil Taylor, Mike Williams, Marc Williams and Kai Edwards – have been called up to the squad for the game at Carmarthen Town's Richmond Park. Silvio Spann will also be missing as he is away on international duty with Trinidad.

FRIDAY 28TH AUGUST

In an interview with the Daily Post, goalkeeper Chris Maxwell, who has impressed whenever called on, reveals that he is out to make the goalkeepers spot his own: "I was devastated for Sam (Russell) when he got injured. I've trained with him for two months and he is a really nice lad, but it gives me a chance to show what I can do and I've got to give the manager no choice but to pick me."

Maxwell is also making a name for himself on the international scene with Brian Flynn's Wales Under-21 side, and is also involved with the Welsh Under-23 set up.

SATURDAY 29TH AUGUST

The recalled Wes Baynes, one of six changes to the side that had lost against Tamworth, proves to be the difference between Wrexham and Forest Green Rovers as his two goals are enough to secure a 2-0 victory for The Dragons in a game where the visitors could easily have netted five or six.

Partnering Marc Williams in attack, he hammers home the first goal on 29 minutes with a long-range free-kick that flew past Terry Burton in the home side's goal. The Chester-born player grabbed his second just three minutes later, as Mark Jones is involved in the build-up which allows Baynes to fire low past the advancing keeper.

The Reds had the ball in the back of the Rovers net a number of other times but each time the officials ruled out the 'goal', while Baynes had other chances in the second-half to grab his first hat-trick for the club.

However, the win signals the first maximum three point haul on the road since defeating Northwich Victoria back in March, and ends a run of six consecutive losses away from The Racecourse since that game at The Marston's Arena.

Understandably, Reds boss Dean Saunders was a relieved man afterwards: "That was exactly what we needed. We've not been getting the rub of the green of late with both decisions and injuries so today was great. We changed our tactics a little bit and it worked.

"Everyone was anxious to get three points today so it was a big result for us. We have to punish teams, as we had three or four breakaways which should have resulted in simple tap-ins.

"I have a squad of players available to me which must be a big advantage over clubs like Forest Green but, having said that, I would like to have a settled team which picks itself every week."

Another delighted man was debutant former Chelsea defender Frank Sinclair: "I couldn't ask for more on my debut than winning comfortably 2-0 away from home. It was a new system for the lads and they have stuck to their task well. If we stick to this system for home games as well then I can only see the players getting better and better with it."

Earlier in the day, the youth side run out 3-0 winners at Oldham; Nick Rushton, Louis Moss and Leon Clowes are all on the scoresheet, although the big defender was later red-carded.

DEAN SAUNDERS' VIEW

"We started the game well and I thought that we played really well at times. It was a good game to watch and I thought that we could have scored three times in the first three minutes. For the lad to head it in from two yards for the goal, then it must have been a foul on the 'keeper otherwise he's in the back of the net."

"That changed the game and we're then chasing around trying to get a goal back; we had some good chances but ended up leaving some gaps at the back which happens when you are trying to get a goal back."

"You pick a team that you think is going to win. Wes Baynes scored twice at Forest Green – he could have had four the other week – and so he deserved to play. Obviously Gareth Taylor has scored four times in the games that he's started, so you make these decisions. "Marc [Williams] went into midfield with the hope that he would get forward a bit more than Nathan Fairhurst would. We've got the best defensive record in the League after seven games and we are trying to find the right formula to get them in at the other end."

PRE-MATCH

Dean Saunders continued with the 3-5-2 formation and made just one change from the side that drew with Barrow; Marc Williams started in midfield at the expense of Nathan Fairhurst who was left out of the squad. Wes Baynes continued up front with Gareth Taylor. Oxford, fresh from victory in their top of the table clash with Luton, kept the same starting XI.

1-15 MINUTES

The Red Dragons started brightly and had early chances to get in front as Gareth Taylor, Marc Williams and Curtis Obeng all went close for the home side. With Wrexham playing at a high tempo, it took the league leaders a while to settle into their game although they started to impose themselves with a couple of corners.

16-30 MINUTES

With both sides looking to get forward, it was an entertaining game for the crowd to watch. Mark Jones had an effort saved by Clarke before the old Achilles heel of conceding from corners came back to haunt Wrexham again. U's top scorer James Constable was unmarked as he headed a Jamie Cook corner home from close range.

31-45 MINUTES

Oxford, buoyed by the goal, forced the game and Chris Maxwell did well to save from Bulman. An error by Taboubi led to Frank Sinclair bringing down Constable earning a yellow card. Gareth Taylor's shot was saved before Mark Creighton made a superb block to deny Marc Williams. Cook should have increased the U's lead heading wide from a good position.

46-60 MINUTES

With no changes in personnel, the Dragons started brightly and pressed Oxford back. Mark Jones had an effort saved by Clarke before Gareth Taylor went close with a couple of headers. Hedi Taboubi fired in a shot on goal before he found himself booked for simulation. A competitive game was threatening to boil over and U's skipper Murray was booked.

61-75 MINUTES

Both managers made substitutions and tactical changes to try and influence the game. Adam Murray whipped in a dangerous free-kick before Chris Maxwell made a fine double save from James Constable. The referee was in danger of losing control of the proceedings as the foul count mounted whilst Mark Jones shot just wide for Wrexham.

76-90 MINUTES

A niggly game erupted on 78 minutes when, with Constable and Williams wrestling on the ground, the assistant alerted the referee to an offence by Sinclair which saw him receive his second yellow card; Saunders following after leaving his technical area to remonstrate. With the game now stretched, Oxford's Kinniburgh also saw red but the visitors held out.

POST MATCH

U's boss Chris Wilder was relieved at the end of the game: "On the back of Tuesday, this was by far the most difficult game we've played all season. We rode our luck at times. The key to winning the game was the first ten minutes of each half, and we managed to come through that unscathed and it gave us the platform to go on and win."

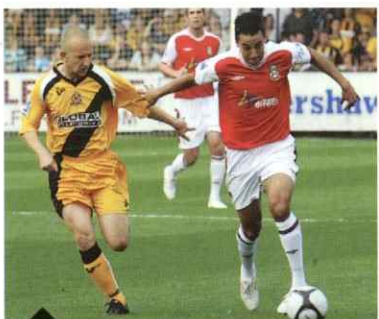

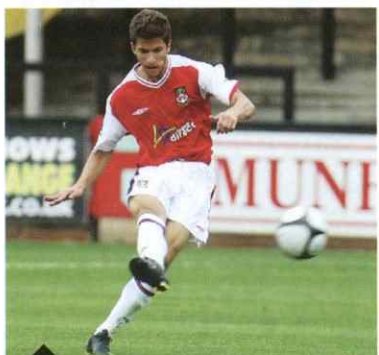

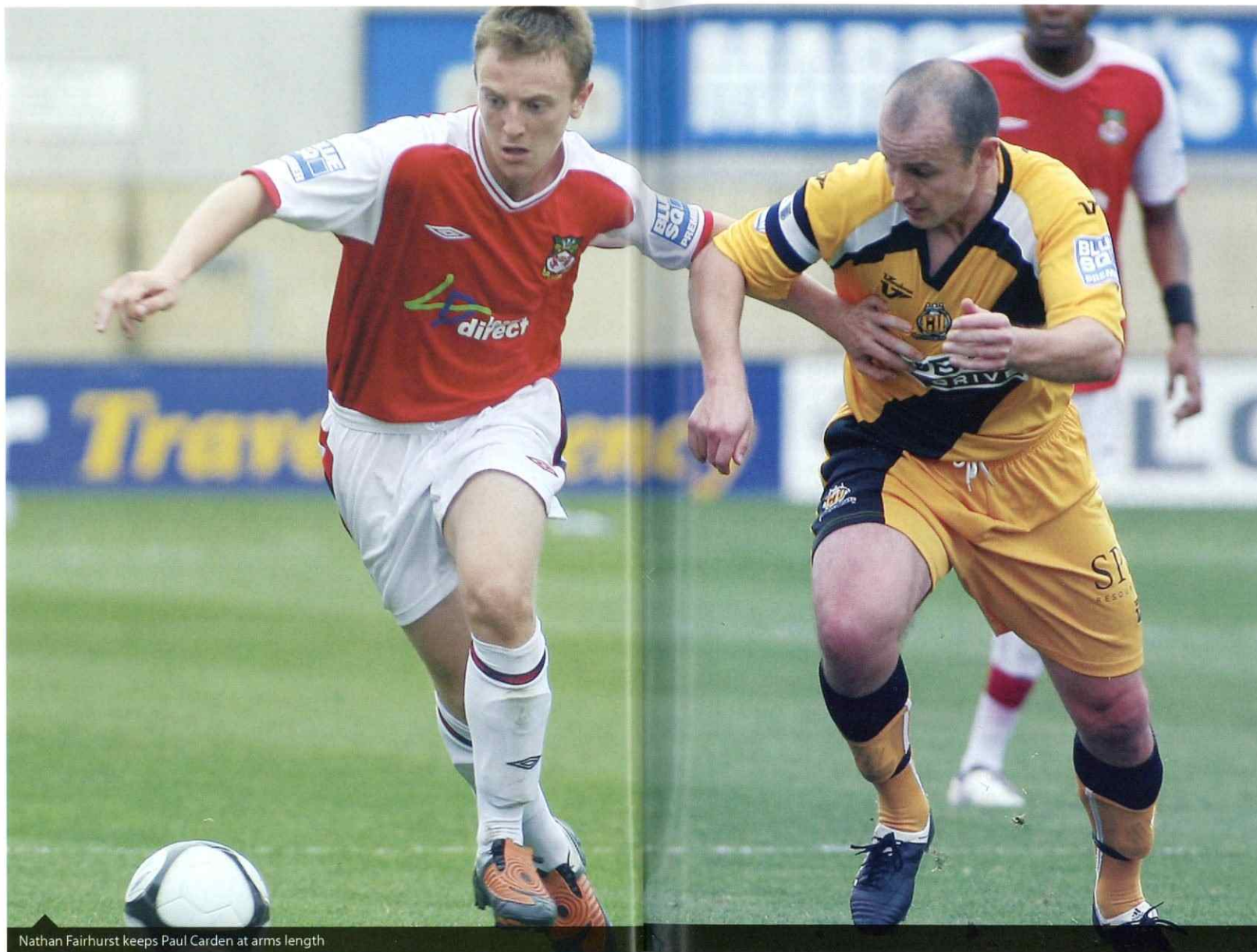
"The players weren't communicating with each other as well as they should have been; then once you lose a goal you have come out. The second-half we played a great deal better."

PRE-MATCH

Without a goal in over 200 minutes, Dean Saunders partnered Adrian Cieslewicz in attack with Gareth Taylor as he stuck with his 3-5-2 formation. New signing Angelos Tsiaklis was handed his 'second' debut in midfield whilst Mike Williams came in for the suspended Frank Sinclair. Cambridge named the same side for the seventh successive game.

1-15 MINUTES

Wrexham began brightly. A good move down the left saw Neil Taylor's whipped cross headed over by the on-rushing Fairhurst before the home side responded by taking the lead on nine minutes. Assoumani's challenge on Chris Holroyd brought Cambridge a dangerous free-kick which Wayne Hatswell dispatched low into the corner of the net.

16-30 MINUTES

Cieslewicz used his pace to escape the clutches of the home defence only to see his goalbound shot palmed over the bar by Danny Potter on 16 minutes. But Wrexham's attacks were spasmodic as Martin Ling's men dominated possession with their best effort coming from a Chris Holroyd free-kick which Chris Maxwell did well to save.

31-45 MINUTES

Dan Gleeson then forced another good save from Maxwell as Wrexham's frailty at set-piece situations continued unabated. Cambridge should have doubled their lead on 35 minutes when centre-back Brian Saah beat Robbie Willmott's corner but his powerful header from six yards flew wide of the target.

46-60 MINUTES

Clear frustrated at his side's opening 45 minute display, Saunders opted to revert to a 4-4-2 formation at the start of the second stanza. The changes worked and Wrexham began to get a foothold in the game, Gareth Taylor seeing a snap shot fly narrowly wide of Potter's left-hand post whilst the industrious Tsiaklis shot over from distance.

61-75 MINUTES

The introduction of Lamine Sakho and Marc Williams gave Wrexham renewed vigour and it was the Senegalese international who came closest to levelling. With Potter having failed to clear Obeng's cross, Sakho collected the ball on the edge of the area and sent a low shot heading goalwards only to see Hatswell make a timely block on the line.

76-90 MINUTES

With Wrexham committing more and more men to attack, the game became stretched. Sakho had another shot charged down whilst Holroyd fired tamely at Maxwell. Then, with less than ten minutes left on the clock, Cambridge made sure of the points when Willmott cut inside Obeng and saw his shot deflect off Westwood's knee and past Maxwell.

POST MATCH

Cambridge boss Martin Ling was understandably pleased at the final whistle: "It's always a worry at 1-0. It's a scoreline that makes a manager sit there on tenterhooks. We were the better side in the first-half and at the start of the second-half they came out at us a little bit. People get nervy – fans and managers alike – but the second goal relieved that tension."

Local rivalries recommence this Sunday as Wrexham and Chester face each other outside the confines of the Football League for the first time since 1905. It's a derby match to warm the hearts of any fan and Blues boss Mick Wadsworth has been busily trying to add to his squad in advance of the game.

Speaking in the wake of Saturday's 1-0 home defeat by Stevenage Borough, the 58-year-old former Newcastle United assistant-manager explained that he is looking to former City player Roberto Martinez - now in charge of Premier League Wigan - to help bolster his playing resources.

"We may get some help from Wigan," he told the Leader. "I've spoken to them in the last couple of weeks and they may be willing to help us out with a couple of players. I'm going to Wigan on Wednesday and I'm taking in lots of games but it's difficult because if I bring in players from a distance we have to arrange, financing, housing, hotels, etc."

"The first thing we have to make sure we can do is do what we are doing and that's tough for us all. The crowds at Chester aren't very big, so the commitments that we've got to staff and players and all the other things to keep a football club running is a really

tough job for the board and for the managing director.

"What we need is help from clubs like Burnley who have helped us with two lads, and now hopefully Wigan will also help us. We have to learn in the world of the possible, and we're doing as much as we can and we'll keep doing that."

With City already having to contend with a 25-point penalty, merely avoiding relegation would be an achievement in itself for the Deva Stadium side with Wadsworth (above) determined not to throw the towel in despite Chester's on-going financial woes.

"I've got very few options, but all we can do is keep going. We're trying to bring players in but it's not easy. In the situation that we're in when we lose it's a real kick in the backside because we're so far behind the rest of the clubs."

"When we win a game it doesn't seem to make a lot of difference, and when we lose a game it feels like we've fallen further behind. But we all know we can still do it, we can still get out of trouble, but we do need some help and we do need some players."

"I believe we need three or four key players to really give ourselves a chance, but while it is as it is we'll just continue to keep fighting hard. That's all we can do. We will always try and win games until our fate is sealed."

"There's no lack of commitment, spirit, or lack of bravery from anybody, but we've just got to keep going."

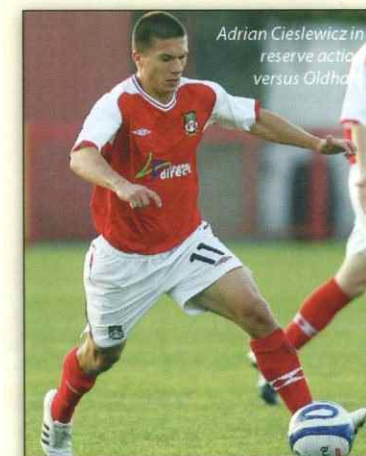

GROUND REGULATIONS

REMEMBER

The Club has the right to refuse entry or eject any person who refuses to be searched by a steward or police officer. It is a criminal offence, for which you may be arrested, to throw anything onto the pitch or at players, officials and other supporters; to take part in any indecent or racist chanting; to go on to the playing surface at any time; to try to enter the ground with intoxicating liquor; to try to enter the ground whilst drunk; to possess any article, such as knives, bottles, fireworks, smoke canisters, cans and flagpoles which might be used as offensive weapons; to use behaviour which is threatening, abusive or insulting towards another. Persons convicted of criminal offences will become subject of Exclusion Orders banning them from all Football League and Conference grounds.
