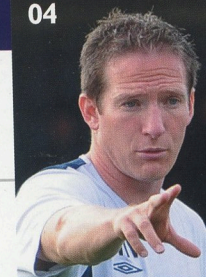

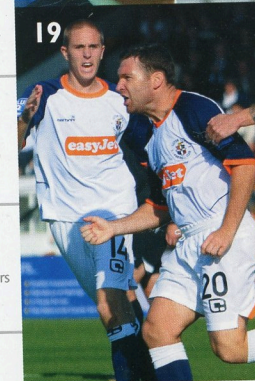

THE HATTERS' CARETAKER MANAGER REFLECTS ON A SAD WEEK AT THE CLUB

They know that their next manager could be watching from the stands today so rest assured: they will be fired-up and ready for the difficult challenge knowing that their place in the team is being scrutinised.

A win would also enhance our chances of breaking back into the top five of the division.

With 33 games to go and 99 points to play for, the coaching staff and I are confident that this group of players can go on and enjoy success this season.

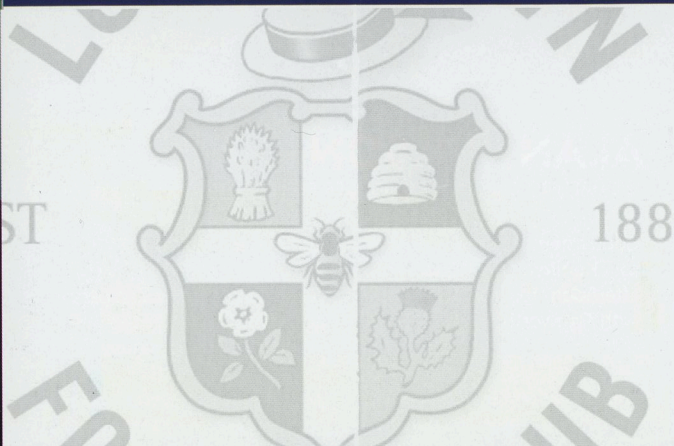
You will play a massive part today's game. We need you to be our 12th man this afternoon so please get behind the lads.

## 2020 MISSION

MANAGING DIRECTOR GARY SWEET ON A VERY HARD DECISION



Good afternoon and welcome to the start of a new era at Kenilworth Road, with the visit of Tamworth.

Luton Town 2020 has faced some incredibly tough weeks since we took control of the club nearly two years ago and this was definitely the toughest decision that we have had to have made as a group in that time.

We had to balance the need to maintain stability, which is often the foundation that success in any field is built upon, with need to act in a timely manner to ensure that we did not fall behind our set targets to such an extent that they became unachievable.

Ultimately, the reasoning behind our decision to part company with Mick Harford, was that we had begun to fall behind our agreed targets.

These targets were not just based on league position or points gained, but fell under four broad categories; position, performance, prospects and protocol and these became the

measurements against which we made our decision.

We agreed specific targets at the beginning of the season and we also decided as a board that we would do nothing for the first two months, as we believe that stability is a key to success both in the boardroom and on the training ground.

That is not to say that by making this decision we will have effected in the stability at the Club, because stability does not mean keeping people in jobs. Stability can be maintained by change.

One thing I want to make clear is that pressure did not make this decision, we, the board, made this decision.

One of our many considerations was those of supporters and their views because we view you as shareholders in the Club, however, this was not the only nor even the primary consideration.

Aggression had no impact on the decision whatsoever nor will it do in the

future. Many people who were watching the game from the directors' box on Tuesday: directors, board members and guests were saddened and, to a certain extent, embarrassed by the scenes at the end of the game.

We have already put in place a clearly-defined professional process of recruitment for the new manager, a process that we have already used to great effect when appointing other positions within the business.

The appointment will be fully considered, but, at the same time, action needs to be swift.

We anticipate that an announcement regarding the new manager will be made some time before the game against York City on Tuesday 20th October.

With this in mind we have set up an e-mail address and invite applicants with the relevant professional football experience to apply in writing with a CV to [hr@2020mission.com](mailto:hr@2020mission.com).



We have already had over 25 sensible and realistic applications which will be reduced to a good quantity shortlist, and we are very optimistic that we can appoint someone with the necessary skills, experience and character who will help us achieve our targets.

The new manager, who ever he may be, will be the luckiest man in the game as he will have inherited a squad of very talented footballers which mixes youth and experience and also a backroom team of coaches who we at the Club rate very highly.

As with Mick, the new manager will receive every ounce of support from the business which will rival any Club in the division.

Whilst on the subject of luck, we all hope that the new manager will bring with him a change in luck which has so cruelly plagued both Mick and the Club over the past couple of years.

When that success comes, we will do everything possible to ensure that Mick is stood shoulder to shoulder with us to receive the just credit he deserves.

Anyone with a love for Luton Town Football Club will have been saddened at the departure on Thursday of Mick Harford.

A more popular figure from the whole history of the club would be hard to find - in fact, he was once voted the fans' favourite player of all time.

Personally, I regard him as a very good friend of long standing and, as with all my colleagues in 2020, I have found it very difficult this week to come to terms with his going.

We all know the reasons and not everyone will agree with what's happened, but that is not why I am writing this.

I just wanted to say a few things about Mick the footballer and the man.

I first became aware of him when he played in a game I was covering for BBC local radio way back in the 70s. It was Walsall against Lincoln City, his first club.

Later, I remember when he was with Birmingham City and David Pleat was chasing him for us. David said to me he really rated him because he was "mean and nasty in the penalty box", which, of course, he was.

No-one fancied lining up against him. There are loads of stories about the way other players respected him - that's if they weren't terrified!

Paul Gascoigne, amongst many others, said he was the hardest player he ever faced!

But off the field, he was the friendliest guy you could hope to meet (and still is, of course!).

My four children have grown up watching him play. Eldest son Andy's first match, when he was five, was the FA Cup semi final against Everton at Villa Park.



Mick was playing and what a magnificent match for Andy to embark on his passionate support for the club.

Son Tim saw his first match on New Year's Day 1986 at about the same age and Mick scored a first half hat-trick against Leicester.

My daughter Jenny was a baby in 1989 when our family and another splashed out on a box for the first game of the new year, so Jenny could go with us.

We beat Southampton 6-1 and who scored twice for us? Mick Harford, of course.

The first goal ever scored in Jenny's presence (she was four months old) came from the big man.

Chris's first game (he was a toddler) was against Newcastle United in November 1987 when we thrashed them 4-0 and was Mick playing? Well, no, actually - he missed the game with flu, but Chris has since worked at the club alongside Mick when he helped out in the early days of the 2020 era.

So all four of my children have known Mick for most of their lives and he has always taken notice of them and had a chat.

Not all high flying public figures would necessarily do that. They all think very highly of him.

My happiest memories of Mick have to be of winning the League Cup back in 1988 as a player and lifting the Football League Trophy in April this year as a manager, but there are so many personal highlights too, a drink here, a meal there, meeting up at distant grounds on scouting missions...I am so grateful for his continuing friendship and all that he has done for our football club.

He came back to Kenilworth Road when we were in one hell of a mess. He stuck with it and tried to keep it going with a viciously depleted squad. Then, after the 10-point deduction, came another 30.

It must have seemed hopeless, but he was loyal and resilient.

From all my family, from all the Luton Town Football Club family, from all our fellow supporters, thank you, Mick, good luck for the future and see you back here very, very soon.

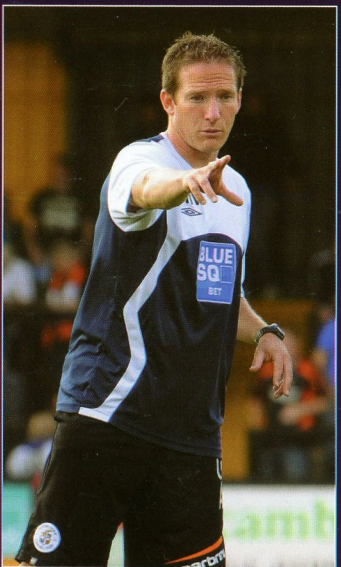

Solid performances from James, especially against a very strong QPR team, have given the group great confidence.

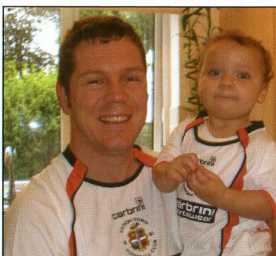
Well done James and keep up the good work.

After the Hatters' 1-0 defeat to Stevenage – that was watched by Lambs boss Gary Mills – Tamworth jumped above the Town on goal difference despite not kicking a ball that night.

It means Mills' side, promoted last season as Champions of Conference North, sit in seventh place in the Blue Square Premier having taken 22 points from their 13 fixtures this season.

The Staffordshire outfit are unbeaten in their last seven since a 1-0 defeat at Barrow at the end of August but have

only won three of those seven with four ending in draws.

On the road they've won one, drawn five and lost one with the sole victory a 2-1 success at Chester City.

### RECENT HISTORY:

The Lambs' title success last season in the Conference North was the club's second league title in five seasons as Gary Mills' side return to the non-league big time after a two season absence.

Prior to their Southern League Championship win in 2002/03, Tamworth had spent a large number of seasons playing in the West Midlands League.

The Lamb Ground faithful have had their fair share of cup success though, none more so in 1989 when they won the FA Vase following a replay win over Sudbury Town.

They also reached the final of the FA Trophy the season they won the Southern League but were denied a league and cup double when defeated by Burscough at Villa Park in 2003.

With a seven game unbeaten run heading into today's game Tamworth have had a solid start to the season and the boss Gary Mills thinks he knows why:

"We've gone through September unbeaten picking up results along the way because we are working hard and enjoying our football.

"I have some good players here with great spirit and they enjoy playing football. It's good to see the lads with a smile on their faces because it is helping us pick up points in this difficult division."

The 47-year-old is expecting a very tough game against the Hatters' but is looking forward to the challenge he faces at Kenilworth Road:

"It will be just like all the other games we've played in so far this season – it will be very tough. We are looking forward to the trip. We will work hard like we have done in previous games and hopefully we will get a result."

Mills is cautious about Town's capabilities in front of goal especially after seeing the thrilling 4-3 win against Cambridge United last Saturday:

"Luton are capable of scoring goals, they have picked up three points away from home which they will be delighted with. If you win or draw away from home in any league you are going to be happy."

Looking beyond the Luton game the Lambs' boss has highlighted his aims for the season and expects his

young Tamworth squad to develop into a better side:

"Our aim is to enjoy the season and play with a smile and finish where we deserve to finish, if that's top of the league then fantastic. The lads are just going to enjoy themselves

and work as hard they can on and off the pitch.

"We generally have a young team that is still learning about the game and if we keep enjoying it then we will win a few more games this season."

## THE MANAGER

GARY MILLS

With an impressive playing career behind him Gary, initially joined the Lambs in January 2001 and steered the club away from relegation but left to for a top coaching job at Coventry City.

He then managed Notts County and Alfreton Town before returning for his second spell in the hot season in January 2007.

Although he couldn't save the Lambs from relegation, promotion was achieved a couple of seasons later when the club lifted the Blue Square North title last season enabling the Staffordshire outfit to start the 2009/10 season back in the top flight of non-league football.

### Danny Alcock

After financial upheaval at Stafford Rangers, Danny left Marsden Road to join the Lambs and made his debut in December 2008. Previously with Accrington and Barnsley, Danny started his career with Stoke City as a youngster. He is currently combining his time at the Lamb with university studies.

### Dale Belford

Dale, son of Tamworth kit-man Buster, has returned to the Lamb to become goalkeeping coach. He was originally with the Lambs in 1988-89 and featured in the club's FA Vase success before signing for Notts County. He returned to the non-league game with a number of local clubs and is a much respected goalkeeper. He is also a regular in the Masters tournaments.

## DEFENDERS

### Richard Tait

A promising right-back, Richard initially signed on-loan for the Lambs from Nottingham Forest at the end of March 2009. He had joined the league side from non-league Curzon Ashton in January 2008 and impressed in the Academy and Reserve sides at Forest. Chris Smith

Chris made 124 appearances for Worcester City in three years before signing for the Lambs in the summer of 2008. Based in Derby, he also includes Leeds United, York City, Reading and Stafford Rangers as former clubs.

### Michael Wyld

Signed up for the Lambs in the 2008 close season, impressing in defence in the pre-season friendlies. Michael came to Tamworth from Cheltenham Town.

### Gavin Hurren

Gavin is a former Nottingham Forest trainee and joined Kidderminster Harriers after leaving the City Ground. He spent a couple of seasons at Aggborough and signed for Tamworth from Mansfield in the summer of 2009.

### Des Lyttle

Veteran defender Des started his career as a trainee at Leicester City before moving to Swansea. He then featured for Nottingham Forest, winning the old First Division twice, and West Brom amongst other clubs, before moving back into non-league with Worcester City. Des signed for the Lambs at the start of the 2007/08 season.

### Michael Briscoe

Defender Michael made over 20 appearances for Macclesfield Town and featured for Burton Albion before joining Hucknall Town in 2006. He initially signed on-loan from Hucknall in February 2007 and left to join Redditch United in 2008/09 before re-signing this summer.

### Dominic Langdon

Defender who has gone from strength to strength since signing in the 2007 close season after being released from Rushden and Diamonds. He had been at Nene Park since the age of 13. Only injury kept him out of the Lambs side last season.

### Danny Andrew

Danny won a professional contract with Peterborough United in the summer of 2009 and joined Tamworth on a short term loan in September.

### Nathan Korenteng

Another signing from Peterborough after joining the Lambs squad on work experience, last month. He has worked his way through the ranks at London Road featuring for both the youth and reserve sides.

### Neil Mackenzie

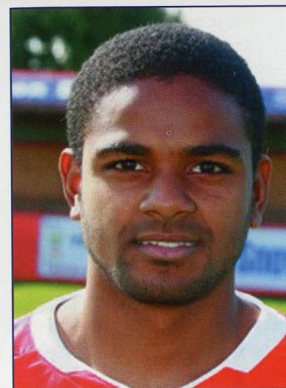

Alex signed from local rivals Nuneaton Borough in the summer of 2008 having joined Boro from Gainsborough Trinity. He also previously featured for Leamington.

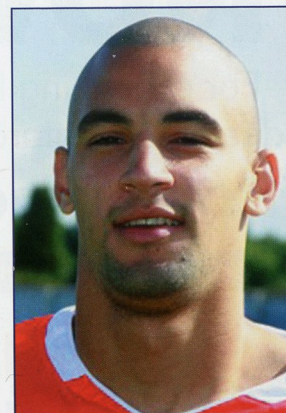
### Trevor Benjamin

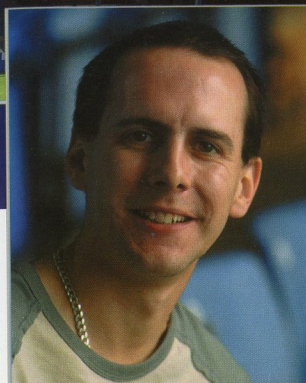

Mike Dixon scored, in his only appearance of the season for the Hatters, in the 5-1 defeat. The attendance that day was 22,908.



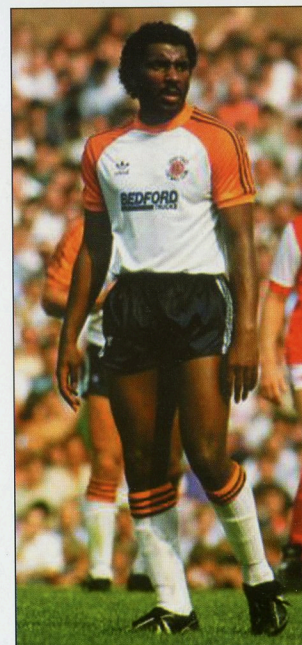

#### MICK HARTFORD:

"At half-time I was slightly disappointed with the way we had conceded two goals.



"But we sat the players down in the dressing room and said, 'we need a mammoth task from you'.

An incredible and heroic display from 10-man Hatters saw them come from two goals down to earn all three points in a seven goal thriller at the Abbey Stadium.

After Cambridge had led 2-0, against the run of play, at the interval following goals from Courtney Pitt and a penalty from Chris Holroyd the Town looked down and out.

It was even more remarkable given that the Hatters had striker Liam Hatch sent-off two minutes before half-time for a second bookable offence.

The Town's first half performance didn't warrant them to be behind but at the start of the second half they came out all guns blazing and Kevin Gallen reduced arrears when tapping from close range following Rossi Jarvis' corner, three minutes into the second half.

Twelve minutes later it was all square when a Gallen and Jarvis combined beautifully to see the latter plant a curling shot beyond Cambridge goalkeeper Danny Potter.

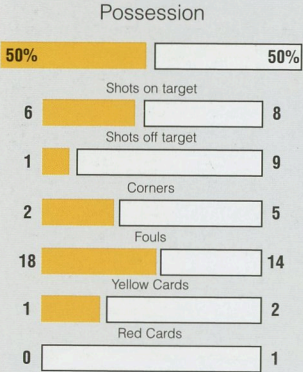

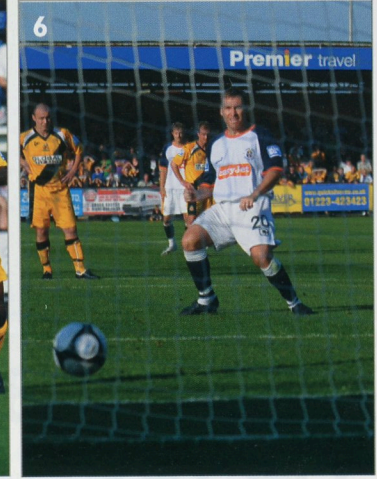

Last weekend's thriller against Cambridge was not only fantastic for the Hatters fans, as they were eventually celebrating a 4-3 win but it was also an amazing experience for the players.

"I had two and half years here so I always get a good reception from them whenever I'm back."

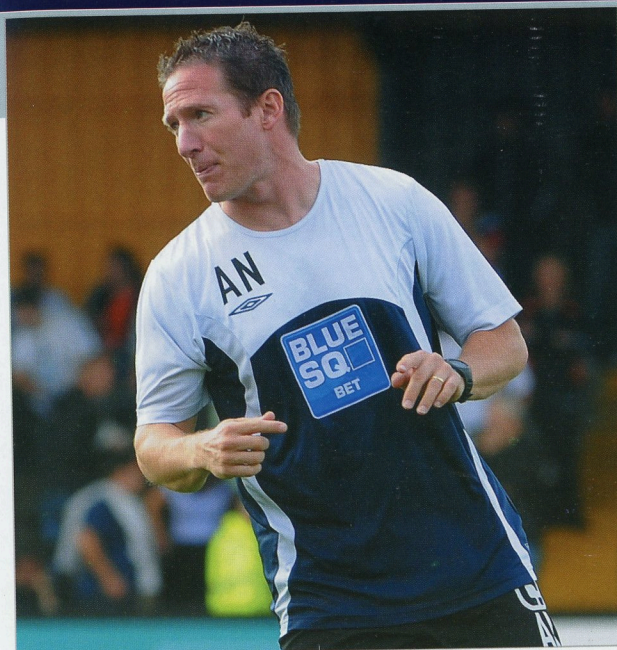


The lucky winner of the Golden Gamble at our last match against Stevenage on Tuesday was Martin Johnson.

## PIETER GUNTRIP

Hatters fan Pieter Guntrip explains his team of the 1970s. He explains that while the 1980's was our best decade he has chosen the 70's to include striker Malcolm Macdonald in his side.

### ABOUT PIETER:

I live in Swindon and have done since 1985 when I moved for work. I run my own business so I am very busy but manage to go to about 15 home games and 10 away games a season. I sit in main stand block A or B.

I am 50-years-old and go to Luton with my two sons and my sister. I first went to Kenilworth Road when I was eight (1967/8 season) with my Dad (who was an Arsenal fan then but soon became a Hatters fan). I immediately fell in love with the team, such players as Keith Allen, Graham French, Alan Slough and Bruce Rioch.

He took me all round the country (roads then weren't like they are now) and I lived for Saturday. We went up that season and then up again two years later. Macdonald and Don Givens were a magnificent strike-force and worth travelling where ever to see them play. A fond memory is a 5-1 thrashing of Wednesday at Hillsborough – those were the days.

I hope you like my team – full of memories. I am not saying these were the best players of the 70's but my favourites.

### MILIA ALECSIC

or 'elastic' as we called him. A really good keeper, great shot-stopper and very agile. He was a great favourite at Tottenham too. His career was affected by injury but in that decade he was certainly our best keeper.

### JOHN RYAN

A steely, strong player. He could play in midfield but was probably best at right back. I remember his runs down the flank towards the Oak Road end – OUR END, with excitement still

### PAUL FUTCHIER

Sheer class, a wonderful footballer in the Bobby Moore mould, never rushed, good in the air, great on the ground and always full of poise. Should have gone on and played many times for his country but probably made the wrong move to Man City.

### JOHN FAULKNER

A real character, not the best centre half but I just have to have him in my side for laughs alone. He came on the pitch one day wearing a wig (if my memory serves me right).

### BOBBY THOMPSON

Ex-England left back who brought a touch of real class into the side, great distribution and as steady as a rock. Never aimlessly gave the ball away.

### JOHN ASTON

I simply must have him in my side despite the 442 formation. He was a winger of immense talent but I reckon could play left midfield in a four. The best crosser of a ball I have ever seen for Luton Town (Mossy fans of which I am one would probably disagree). In my view one of the greatest players Luton have ever had and we were so lucky to have him.

### LIL FUCCHILLO

A silky left footed, left sided midfielder who thrilled me as a boy with his probing runs and passes. He was a Bedford lad and injuries again stopped him having a long career.

### RICKY HILL

I saw his debut – he scored – he was magnificent – what more can I say about this man.

### GRAHAM FRENCH

A real jack the lad outside the game but a talent on it. People still talk about 'that goal' from one six yard box to the other. I didn't see it but I feel I have. My Dad loved him and I can still hear him talking about him now (my Dad died twenty years ago)

### MALCOLM MACDONALD

My second favourite of all time behind Mick. The man was a beast of a player, scored hat-tricks for fun and averaged well over a goal every two games for us and in his whole career. I will never forget a hat trick against Forest when we lost 4-3 at home in the FA Cup. This was after drawing 1-1 at the City ground (Supernac scored) and he broke the goal post too.

### DON GIVENS

Classy, strong running, unselfish which is why his goals per game was not great. A real foil for Macdonald. Played many times for the Republic of Ireland and one of our all time greats.



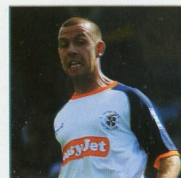
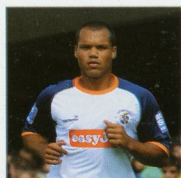

Julian, a Town fan for 32 years, was delighted when the orphans visited Singapore on a charity-funded week's holiday turning up decked out all in orange.

He said: "I have to say it was an extremely touching but very surreal moment when turning up one night at the house were 11 small Cambodian children running around in Luton colours.

"When the children received their shirts they went down a storm. I don't know if it was the bright orange but now Luton Town are the equivalent of Manchester United.

"Football is a popular sport in this part of the world and considering people know very little about football outside of the Premier League it soon became a conversation starter when everyone was asking me about Luton Town and I was quite overwhelmed by it all.

"I can't stress enough how little things they have - they have lost their parents to aids, land mines. Some of them don't even know who their parents were.

"This has helped no end and the smiles on the faces of the children tell their own story.

"I'd like to thank Stephen Browne and Phil Doherty of Trust in Luton for arranging it and the speed of the response.

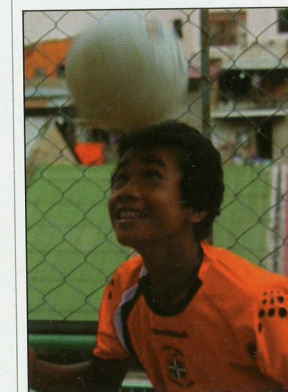
"It truly is remarkable and not only are my wife and I delighted so are a lot of football-mad Cambodian children."

## DAYS PAST

3RD OCTOBER 1970. LUTON TOWN 3 - 0 BRISTOL CITY



MALCOLM MACDONALD REACTS QUICKLY TO PUT THE TOWN ONE UP.

Tempers did not improve on the terraces when Norwich returned to Norfolk with a point from a dull 0-0 draw the following week and supporters were starting to feel that the great period of success was finally over and a season of struggle was a foregone conclusion.

A glimmer of light shone through in the next game, away to a powerful Birmingham side, with ace marksman Malcolm Macdonald earning a point with a late penalty in front of a baying, partisan crowd of 30,141.

Those Luton supporters present at St Andrews had finally witnessed some Second Division class and know-how from the players and it was hoped that the Hatters would now start climbing the table.

If anyone was thinking that the point earned at Birmingham was a flash in the pan their fears disappeared quickly when unbeaten Oxford were thrashed 4-0 at Kenilworth Road the following Tuesday evening. The season was now up and running!

Middlesbrough were flattered by managing to leave Kenilworth Road with only a 1-0 defeat in the next game before the Town were unfortunate to go down 1-0 to eventual champions Leicester at Filbert Street.

Next up were Orient, who were swept aside by the power of Macdonald and they went back to East London on the wrong end of a 4-0 defeat and, although only a point could be picked up at Swindon, both points were

secured at QPR when skipper Mike Keen returned to his old club and scored the only goal of the game with a scorching free-kick.

The Town had now eased up to fifth spot in the table and things were looking rosy at Kenilworth Road with almost 16,000 turning up for the visit of Bristol City.

The Hatters had yet to concede a goal at home and were so full of confidence that they were expected to sweep the Robins aside with ease.

Despite injuries to goalkeeper Tony Read and big centre-half Chris Nicholl, both were pronounced fit before kick-off meaning that the side was unchanged from the one that beat QPR in mid-week.

City included their new signing, £5,000 full-back Steve Stacey, who had joined the Ashton Gate club after being on a month's loan from Ipswich. The Town opened the scoring on 18 minutes when Macdonald, showing acute

awareness, was on the spot to ram the ball home after City goalkeeper Mike Gibson had saved full length, but failed to hold a rasping shot from Keen.

The score was doubled after 33 minutes when Macdonald netted again, this time with a flashing header from a pin-point Jim Ryan centre. The game was made safe just before the hour mark when full-back Alan Slough, on the overlap, took a shrewd Don Givens pass in his stride and bore down on goal before giving Gibson no chance from close range.

From then on it became a personal duel between Macdonald and Gibson with the Luton striker being thwarted on three occasions by the brilliant anticipation of the shell-shocked Robins goalkeeper.

City were never in it with the Luton defence, in which John Moore was a rock alongside Nicholl, making short work of anything thrown at them, which was not very much.

Luton coach Jimmy Andrews said afterwards: "With the gusty wind and the light ball, conditions were very difficult.

"To score three times and create half a dozen other chances in these conditions satisfies me.

"There's a terrific pride in the side about this clean sheet. It's got to the stage that if an opponent even manages to get in a shot, there's an immediate post-mortem among our defenders."

Manager Alec Stock, celebrating 21 years as a manager, merely reflected on his side's climb to third position in the table.

It's been an up and down month for Hatters midfielder Rossi Jarvis.

After being part of the Town side that suffered the disappointing results against Wrexham and Stevenage Borough, Jarvis opened his account for the campaign in the thrilling win at Cambridge and represented his country in Hungary with England C.

As the 21-year-old explains, he'd be more than happy to shelve international honours for his country in return for playing League football with the Hatters.

"It's always nice to get recognised by your country," he says.

"It was, and it always is, a real honour to play for England no matter what level you play at, and it was a good experience to go away with players in the same league.

"But if I was offered the chance to stay in the Conference and play for England C or get promoted and play in the Football League, I would take promotion every day.

"Every player wants to play at the highest possible level and I still think – with the players we've got at this football club – that we can get

promoted this season and get back into the League."

With the Hatters earning a remarkable victory at Cambridge, coming back from two goals down with 10 men to win 4-3, the former Norwich man was naturally disappointed with the two defeats that sandwiched the win at the Abbey Stadium.

He said: "We let ourselves down, we let Mick Harford down and we let the fans down big time at Wrexham.

"We bounced back at Cambridge with hard-work, grit and determination to put what went wrong at Wrexham out of our minds.

"We've beaten one of the best footballing teams in the division having gone two goals down with 10 men – and played them off the park.

"We all thought at half-time we were playing okay but we got one back a few minutes into the second half and it was a difficult to keep your emotions in check.

"Firstly we equalised and a minute later we went 3-2 up and at that point the adrenalin was really pumping through all the players.

"Five minutes later though we conceded and we then thought all the hard work had gone down the pan but we got the winner in the end and we hung on in the last 15 minutes.

"It was a strange but equally amazing day all round."

Jarvis' goal – the equaliser that got it back to two goals each – has already been described as one of the goals of the season.

It wasn't just the delicate curling finish past Cambridge goalkeeper Danny Potter but the patient build-up play prior to the goal that earned the strike its admirers.

However, Jarvis was just happy to notch his first of the season.

"It was great personally to get off the mark for the season – goals like those hit the back of the net in training all the time," he laughs.

"It was a really good team goal. I think we'd kept the ball for 10 passes before I played a quick one-two with Kevin Gallen who set me up perfectly to put it away.

"To hold on for the win was a great relief for everyone as we knew we

were under pressure after the Wrexham result but we proved that day what a good side we can be."

Three days later, however, heartache returned for the Hatters following the 1-0 defeat to Stevenage at Kenilworth Road which was followed on Thursday with the departure of Harford.

The defeat and Mick's exit hurt all the players none more so than Jarvis who was brought to the club by the former manager last summer.

He said: "After the Stevenage game the mood in the dressing room was horrible – it was the worst feeling ever walking back in there off the back of a defeat like that.

"We all felt low and we all knew we hadn't played the best football and that one lack of concentration ultimately cost us.

"We've got to cut out the silly mistakes and put our chances away – it's been a problem for us this season.

"I'd like to thank Mick – he's a great guy and a great manager who gave me my first proper chance in football by bringing me to this football club.

"As a group of players and a team it's up to us to now bounce back from this disappointment by getting a good result on Saturday."

### WHAT'S THE GROUND LIKE?

On one side of the ground is the Carole Nash Insurance Main Stand. This is a small single tiered all seater stand that sits astride the half way line. An old classic looking stand, it has glass windshields on either side, plus a number of supporting pillars,

Popular Side. At the Golf Road End is a small covered terrace, whilst opposite the, Hale End is a small open terrace.

### WHAT'S IT LIKE FOR LUTON FANS?

Town fans will mostly be housed on the open Hale End Terrace at one



one of which is centrally located at the front of the stand.

Views of the pitch may be further impaired by two small floodlight pylons that are located at the two front edges of the stand. On one side of this stand is a smaller separate structure, the Goodwin Family Stand. This is a very small covered all seater stand.

On the other side of the Main Stand is a small open terrace that is only a couple of large steps high. Opposite the Main Stand is the

end of the ground. Travelling Hatters fans can also sit in the Carole Nash Main Stand, however the leg room there is a little on the tight side. Inside the ground there is a club shop (on the Main Stand side towards the Golf Road End) and catering is provided by a couple of burger vans.

### HOW TO GET THERE AND WHERE TO PARK?

Take the M1, M6 and leave the M6 at Junction 19, and take the A556 towards Manchester Airport. At the

large roundabout junction with the M56, turn right onto the M56, still heading towards Manchester Airport. Leave the M56 at Junction 6 and take the A538 towards Hale Barns/Altrincham. After two miles (in which you will have passed through Hale Barns) you will go through the traffic lights that is the junction with the A5144 (Delahays Road).

After these traffic lights take the third right into Westminster Road. Carry straight on down Westminster Road, which becomes Bancroft Road and then Moss Lane. The ground is down on the right.

There is very little parking at the ground itself. In nearby Urban Road there is the Blessed Thomas Holford School which allows cars to park. Otherwise it's street parking.

### TRAVEL INFORMATION

Both Town on Tour and the Bobbers Travel Club are running coaches to Moss Lane.

The Bobbers leave the Maple Road car park at 9.30am and prices are £20 for adults and £17 for concessions.

Town on Tour depart from the Maple Road car park at 10am with a pick-up at Newport Pagnell service station half-an-hour later.

Prices are £18 for adults and £16 for concessions.

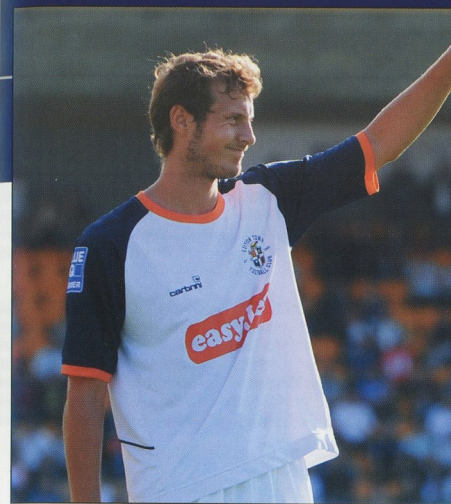

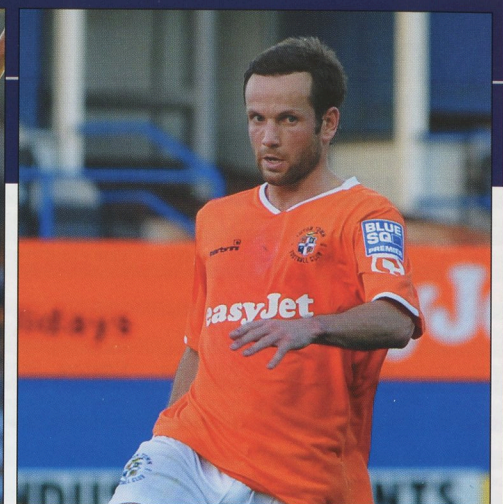

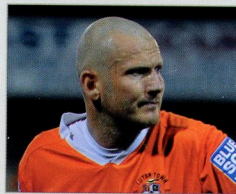
