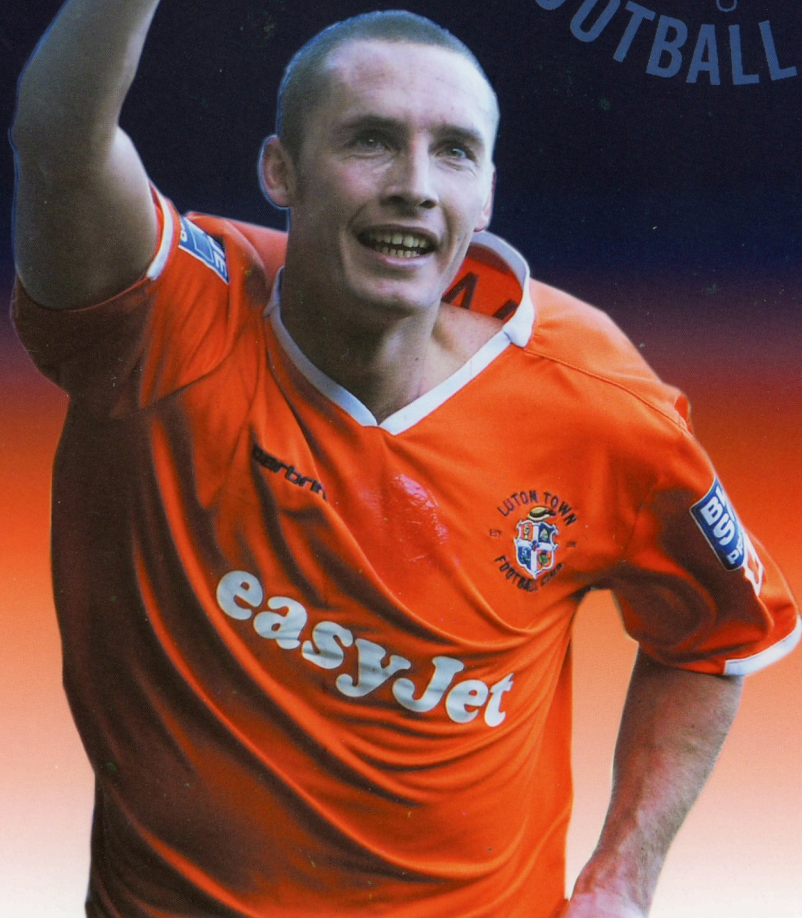

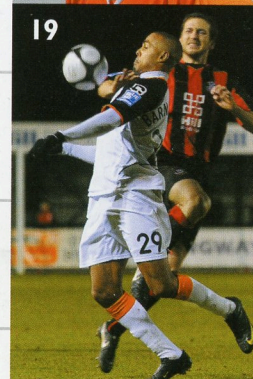

MONEY TALKS

Welcome back to Kenilworth Road for tonight's Blue Square Premier encounter with Oxford United.

I would like to extend a warm welcome to Chris Wilder, his staff, players, the directors and supporters of Oxford this evening.

The past week and the two matches that we have played during it have been very mixed for us.

A hugely disappointing home defeat by Ebbsfleet United was followed by a fine away victory at Barrow on Saturday.

I spoke at length after the loss to Ebbsfleet and still reflect on the game as one of the lowest points in my footballing career.

We were simply not good enough on the day. On the reflection of the 90 minutes Ebbsfleet were the better side and deserved to earn the three points.

The players were made fully aware what a victory would have done for a majority of reasons.

However, on the back of three straight league wins, and two in the space of a week away from home, we were too complacent.

A win would have made it four victories on the spin; given us the chance to break into the top five and send out a clear message to the rest of the division.

In some ways it was frustrating not to have a match on the Tuesday after the Ebbsfleet game as it would have given us the chance to bounce back as quickly as possible.

But after a week of soul searching and hard work on the training pitch we

went to Barrow and returned with a 1-0 win and with it a thoroughly professional away display.

We started the game well and chalked up another success away from home thanks to Liam Hatch's goal seven minutes from the end.

It was fair reward for the players. They have responded in the best possible way following the disappointment of the previous week.

The win at Barrow sets us up nicely for this evening's game which is the first in a busy streak of Tuesday night fixtures and gives us another opportunity to break back into the top five.

Make no mistake: we are treating tonight's game like any other. We will have prepared the same way we would have done regardless of the opposition.

There's no doubting there will be a great atmosphere tonight and I am sure the players will respond in the way we know they can.

The league table can change very quickly and results dictate that and we know we are in good form and confident.

Your support has been terrific – even in the face of adversity. I'd like to thank all those fans who made the long trip to Barrow on Saturday.

It was great to see so many of your there. It was an important match for us and to have your vocal backing throughout the 90 minutes really helped and was much appreciated.

Enjoy the game.





2020 MISSION

DIRECTOR ANTONY BROWN LOOKS AHEAD TO TONIGHT'S BIG GAME



Good evening and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for this evening's Blue Square encounter with table-topping Oxford United.

We welcome the fans, players, staff and directors from Oxford to Luton for tonight's eagerly awaited encounter, in what we hope will be an exciting game as both teams strive for promotion this season.

Certainly the match at Oxford earlier in the campaign wasn't befitting a Conference game. The crowd, atmosphere and quality of players on show was more than the level you would expect at League 1, or above. I'm sure tonight has all the ingredients to match the game at the Kassam Stadium in September.

We go into this evening's game on the back of a hard fought win on Saturday away at Barrow.

The staff and players deserve huge credit for the way we responded to the bitter disappointment of losing at home to Ebbsfleet the week before. I thought the players' attitude on Saturday was spot on, in a game where we had to win individual battles before we could impose our game on the opposition.

We showed that little bit of extra quality in the final third to eventually win the game, with an exceptional delivery from Kevin Nicholls' corner leading to Liam Hatch's fine header.

The same combination nearly put the game beyond doubt a few minutes later, in what was again a quality cross into the box, with a goal-bound Hatch header forcing a good save out of the Barrow goalkeeper.

We need to show the same

commitment and determination for the remainder of the season if we are to return to the Football League at the first time of asking.

The 2020 group reached a personal milestone recently, as on 15th January marked the second anniversary since we were announced as preferred bidders in our quest to buy the club.

We have maintained from the outset our primary objective is to achieve financial stability.

This may be perceived as breaking even, but when you consider a recent study has shown only four clubs in the entire Football League break even, you have some idea of the task ahead; especially considering we inherited a business that, at the time of administration, was losing very close to £500,000 per month.

These losses were reduced, by the time we completed the takeover, to £350,000 per month.

Financial stability will be considered achieved once the losses are under complete control and are at a level the club can manage. This does not mean we are about to break even – far from it – but we have managed to stem the losses of the business to a level that are far more manageable.

The net result of this is our group of investors have to continue to fund the losses throughout this season, and beyond, and are continuing to do so. This is a remarkable commitment that we should all be rightly proud of.

What I think makes this level of commitment even more admirable, is the fact this has been made during the current severe economic downturn. Given our group of investors have a diverse range of

businesses spread throughout the globe, they, like a majority of private investors, have suffered significantly. So to make this continued ongoing level of financial commitment to the football club deserves high praise indeed.

Another challenge we constantly face at the club is the continued rumours about the business.

Our manager aptly coined the phrase: "At Luton we have rumours about rumours". This has been recently highlighted again when TalkSport radio station and the BBC website reported Luton Town were about to enter administration. This only fuelled the rumour mill as fans from across the globe called the club's offices to hear firsthand the truth.

In a world where information spreads quicker than ever we have, at times, a fruitless task of quelling these rumours.

For the record, the old company, owned by the Jayten group, who were previously in ownership of the Football Club, is in the process of being liquidated. This is standard procedure when a company enters administration, and should not be confused with the new company who are now in ownership of the Football Club, namely Luton Town Football Club 2020 Ltd.

We, as a board, sit shoulder to shoulder together in the Main Stand at every game. We kick every ball, feel the hurt when we concede, and share in the joy when we score and win.

Tonight will be no different when the vocal cords will be tested to the limit!

So join me, and 2020 group, in raising the roof of our famous old ground for tonight's game.

SATURDAY 30TH JANUARY

The Hatters suffered their fourth home defeat of the season as two goals from Magno Vieira and one from Moses Ashikodi earn Ebbsfleet United a 3-2 victory at Kenilworth Road.

Striker Liam Hatch gave the Town the lead in the 28th minute before Vieira struck twice in the lead-up to half-time to give Liam Daish's side the lead.



A Tom Craddock goal hauled the Hatters level just before the hour mark but 60 seconds later Ebbsfleet restored their lead when Ashikodi took advantage of some poor defending to rifle home.

Martin Prickett's Under-18s earned 6-1 win over a Tottenham Hotspur academy side.

SATURDAY 6TH FEBRUARY

The Town put the disappointment of losing to Ebbsfleet behind them by recording a fine 1-0 victory at Barrow thanks to Liam Hatch's header seven minutes from time.

The striker got on the end of Kevin Nicholls' corner to give the Hatters their sixth win in seven league away games and extend a run of six straight matches on their travels without conceding a goal.

Meanwhile it was a day to forget for the Town's Under-18s as they suffered a bad day at the office following a 6-0 home defeat to Peterborough United in the Youth Alliance.

We hope you had a great day with us Fred – even though we lost!

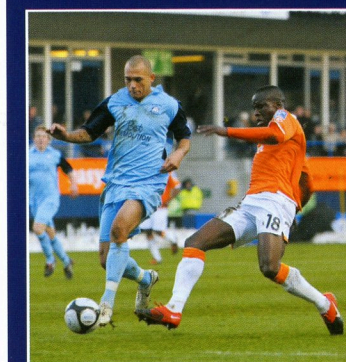

WE TAKE A LOOK AT TONIGHT'S VISITORS

PREVIOUS MEETINGS:

Luton wins: 13 Oxford wins: 12 Draws: 7

In the head-to-head record between the two sides the Hatters hold a narrow advantage with 13 wins to 12.

We have met 26 times in the Football League, winning 11, drawing six and losing nine. The Town's last meeting was at the Kassam Stadium on Boxing Day 2001 winning 2-1 with goals from Dean Crowe and Matthew Spring.

We have also met the U's in the Littlewoods Cup semi-final of 1987/88, the Worthington Cup in 1998/99 and the Auto Windscreens Shield in 1999/2000.

During the 1987/88 campaign the two sides met in the old First Division with the Town coming out on top in both games in which 18 goals were scored in the 7-4 and 5-2 victories.

RECENT HISTORY:

Oxford, like the Hatters, will be one of just two sides in the Blue Square Premier this season who have played at the top level of English football and to have won a major trophy (not including AFC Wimbledon).

The U's climb to the then First Division started when the club won back-to-back league titles in the early 1980s.

Firstly when lifting the Division Three title in 1983/84 before adding the Division Two title the following season.

A season passed in the First Division before the U's were winning silverware again – this time adding the League Cup to their trophy cabinet in 1986 following a Wembley victory over Queens Park Rangers.

After battling relegation from the top flight for several seasons the club finally succumbed to the drop to the Second Division in 1987/88.

Relegation followed in 1993/94 from what was then called Division One (today's Championship) but bounced back to second tier with promotion in 1994/95 under the stewardship of Denis Smith.

However, the U's found themselves back in the third tier with a relegation in 1998/99.

Oxford lasted just two seasons in Division Two before their relegation along with the Hatters during a disastrous 2000/01 campaign in which they conceded 100 goals which meant demotion to the league's basement division.

A bad first season in Division Three – that marked the club's first at their new Kassam Stadium home – was followed

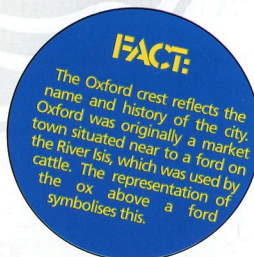
by two campaigns where the U's missed out on the promotion play-offs.

However, the 2005/06 season saw them relegated on the final day of the season following a 3-2 defeat to Leyton Orient at the Kassam Stadium.

It meant the 2006/07 the U's had to start life outside of the Football League. An unbeaten run at the beginning of the campaign looked as though it had secured them an immediate return to the Football League but a loss of form saw them pipped to the title by Dagenham & Redbridge and they lost in the play-off semi-finals to Exeter City.

A mid-table finish in 2007/08 was followed by last season's seventh place finish in the Blue Square Premier where they landed up finishing four points off the play-offs.

It meant the U's were made to rue the fielding of an unregistered player during the campaign as they were deducted five points by the Conference as punishment.



play-off final (losing to Hereford) before crippling financial problems meant that Chris was fighting a tough battle every day.

In the summer of 2008 he joined Bury as assistant manager and had helped them to second in League Two when he joined the U's as successor to Darren Patterson. A magnificent end to the season has raised expectations for this time around.

THE MANAGER

CHRIS WILDER

Chris began his career as an apprentice at Southampton and played 400 games for 11 clubs including Sheffield United, Rotherham and Nott County.

He ended his playing career at Halifax and then became manager at the Shay in troubled times: there were only five registered players when he took over.

However, over the next six years he built a good footballing side who reached the

Oxford United arrive at Kenilworth Road this evening as league leaders by virtue of their 0-0 draw with Kidderminster Harriers on Saturday. The goalless draw saw them climb above Stevenage Borough on goal difference and return to the summit of the Blue Square Premier.

There is little to choose between the two teams at the top although with two games in hand, the U's will fancy their chances of putting a bit of daylight between the coveted automatic promotion spot and the rest of the division.

On another day they may have had a bit more breathing space going into tonight's game after going close to breaking the deadlock on several occasions on Saturday against Steve Burr's side.

CHRIS WILDER

OXFORD BOSS LOOKING FORWARD TO FACING THE HATTERS

Speaking after the match U's boss Wilder told Oxford's official website: "The result was a bittersweet one for us. It was a tight game against decent opposition who play a system that frustrates, and to be fair to them they looked good on the counter.

"We won't know until the end of the season whether it's a point gained or two points dropped, but we gave a lot in terms of effort. There are 19 games to go and we're top of the league as it stands, and if we're still there come the end of the season I'll be delighted."

Oxford have won six out of their last 10 matches, stretching back to the beginning of December but Wilder is aware his side will face a tough test against an improving Hatters team that can boast five wins in all competitions from the same run of games, and one that will be looking to



avenge their 2-0 defeat back at the Kassam Stadium at the start of September.

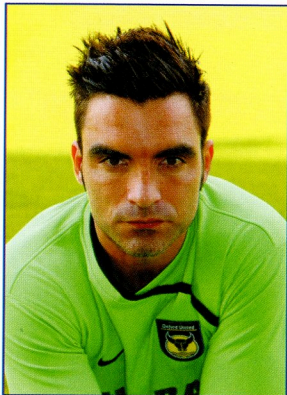
"The players have put themselves in the position to make this sort of night happen," he said. We had a fantastic game against them here, a game that had everything; some good, some not so good. It was a proper football match and I'm sure that Tuesday night will be the same.

BILL TURLEY

GOALKEEPERS

Billy Turley

Experienced goalkeeper who started his league career as understudy to Andy Woodman at Northampton before becoming the Cobblers' regular keeper. Having spent a spell on loan at Leyton Orient, the 6ft 4in stopper then made his name as number one at Rushden, who he joined for £120,000 in February 1998. A major factor in the Diamonds' Conference winning side and then their Championship winning side in the old Third Division, Turley is a fine shot stopper who commands his penalty box. He proved his consistency in his first season with the U's and signed a new deal in the summer of 2006. A big favourite with the United fans.

Ryan Clarke

Former England Under-21 international whose last game of 2008/09 was against the U's for Northwich Victoria in the final game of the season. The tall, commanding Bristolian began his career with Bristol Rovers and had loan spells at Kidderminster, Southend and Forest Green before a permanent move to Salisbury in 2006. He was a huge success as Salisbury reached the Blue Square Premier, making 106 starts in two seasons before losing his place due to injury. He then ended the season with the Vics before joining United in June 2009.

DEFENDERS

Damian Batt

Batt began his career with Norwich City, and after a short spell at Dagenham and Redbridge he joined Barnet, where he played an important part in their promotion into the Football League. He played one year in League 2 for Barnet, before joining St Albans in August 2006. After a short spell at Stevenage Borough he joined Grays Athletic on non-contract terms before signing for United in January 2009. Able to play at right back or on the right wing.

Kevin Sandwith

Defender who began his career in his native Cumbria with Carlisle before spells at Barrow and Telford. In 2001 he signed for Doncaster Rovers before linking up with Chris Wilder at Halifax in 2002. His defensive abilities and dead ball delivery caught the eye of Lincoln City who paid £10,000 for his services in March 2004, where he spent a season and a half before joining Macclesfield Town. Former United boss Mark Wright then took him to Chester where he made over 50 appearances before moving to Weymouth in 2008. Kevin joined United in February 2009.

Mark Creighton

Towering centre half who dominates in the air and was a big favourite with the fans at Aggborough throughout his 158 starts for Kidderminster Harriers. Captain for the last two seasons, Creighton was the Harriers' player of the year in 2006/07 and 2007/08 before joining the U's for an undisclosed fee in May 2009.

Rhys Day

A strong centre half who has plenty of experience at this level after captaining Aldershot to the title two years ago. A Manchester City trainee he enjoyed success at Mansfield where he played over 100 games. A defender with good positional awareness, Rhys joined the U's just before the season started.

Jake Wright

Jake is a left-sided centre half currently on loan from Brighton until the end of

the season. Jake started his career with Bradford City before a loan at Halifax under Chris Wilder. This became permanent in 2006 before Jake joined Crawley in 2008 prior to his move to the Seagulls.

Anthony Tonkin

The experienced left back began his career at Yeovil where he made 95 starts before joining Stockport. A £150,000 fee took him to Crewe Alexandra for three years before a return to Yeovil. The last three years have seen him starring at Grays Athletic, Forest Green Rovers and Cambridge before he signed for the U's this season from BSP rivals Cambridge.

MIDFIELDERS

Adam Murray

Adam began his career as a trainee with Derby County, turning professional in August 1998. He made his league debut on April 17, 1999, for Derby away at West Ham United. He gradually established himself in Derby's first team, and played regularly in their Championship side, but by the start of the 2003/04 season was out of favour and joined Kidderminster Harriers on loan. He left Derby in November 2003, joining Notts County and then rejoined Kidderminster Harriers and was a regular in their side until the end of the season. In June 2004, he joined Mansfield Town where he was until his move to Carlisle United in March 2005, where he played in Paul Simpson's side's Play-Off team that won promotion back to the Football League. At the start of the 2006/07 he moved on to Torquay United for £10,000. In January 2007, Murray joined Macclesfield for a fee of £17,500 and he joined United half way through the 2007/08 season. His form and consistency have marked Adam out as a star man at this level.

Adam Chapman

Talented midfielder or full back from who is comfortable just about anywhere on the pitch. Adam helped the Sheffield United youth team through to the FA Youth cup quarter finals in 2006/7 and ended that season as youth team top scorer despite playing in defence. A Northern Irish Under-21 international

Adam joined United on loan in January and was an instant success, then joined permanently in the summer of 2009.

Dannie Bulman

Midfielder who adds experience in the centre of the park, Dannie made his name at Wycombe Wanderers, making over 200 appearances for the Chairboys and playing his part in their run to the FA Cup semi-final against Liverpool in 2001. In 2004 Dannie joined Stevenage, making just over 80 starts in three seasons before joining Crawley, initially on loan and then permanently, making over 100 starts for them. Widely regarded as among the best central midfielders at this level, he joined United in May 2009.

Alfie Potter

Winger who first came to fame with a goal for Havant and Waterlooville against Liverpool at Anfield as the Conference South side took a shock 2-1 lead before losing 5-2. That appearance came on loan from Peterborough, and was followed by a brief loan at AFC Wimbledon and then a season long loan at Kettering last season where he made 29 league starts including both games against The U's. A tricky winger with bags of pace, Alfie joined on a season-long loan in July 2009.

Sam Deering

Promising young winger who has come through the youth team ranks at the Kassam Stadium. Able to play on either flank Sam has pace, flair and an eye for goal. Sadly a broken leg suffered at Salisbury on Boxing Day ended his season early last season, just as he was making a name for himself. He worked hard to get back to full fitness and is an exciting player whose all action style makes him a favourite with the fans.

Simon Clist

Simon started out at Bristol City and made 87 appearances for the Ashton Gate side before a short loan spell at Torquay United. A permanent move

to Barnet followed, where he made 67 starts, before a move to Forest Green where he made over 100 appearances. The central midfielder agreed a two and a half year deal with the U's early in 2009 and soon showed his worth with some accomplished performances and well-taken goals.

Lee Fowler

Lee started his career with Coventry City as a trainee and played 14 times for them. Capped 12 times at Under-21 level by Wales, he joined Huddersfield Town in 2003 and scored the winning penalty in the Play-Off final of 2004 at the Millennium Stadium in his home town. He then moved on to Scarborough for a season before joining Burton Albion then Newport County. He then moved back to Blue Square Premier level with Forest Green Rovers before joining Kettering in the summer of 2009. He joined the U's in December

STRIKERS

James Constable

Prolific striker who started playing for Walsall, where he scored three times in nine starts. Five goals in nine games on loan at Kidderminster led to a permanent move to the Harriers where 18 goals in 42 starts, plus two goals at Wembley in front of 53,000 at the FA Trophy final, meant interest from a host of league clubs. He joined Shrewsbury for an undisclosed fee where he scored four times in seven starts. James joined United on a season long loan in July 2008 and was a massive success. Twenty plus goals, the chance to lead the line for England C, United's Players' and Supporters' Player of the Year, and the accolade of Blue Square Player of the Year highlighted his importance. Joined permanently in May 2009.

Jack Midson

Proven goalscorer in the Blue Square Premier after netting over 20 goals for Histon last season. The 6ft 2in forward began his career at

Stevenage and had brief spells at Dagenham and Bishops' Stortford before a very profitable move to Histon, for whom he scored 25 goals in 63 starts. He joined United in June 2009.

Matt Green

Matt began his career at Newport before joining Cardiff City as a youngster. Fast and direct, Matt was a regular scorer at youth and reserve level at Cardiff and came to Oxford on loan in November 2007. After a debut goal away at Kidderminster Matt continued to score regularly and ended the season with two goals away at Ebbsfleet to reach double figures. After being released by Cardiff that summer he opted to join Torquay for 2008/09 and bagged five goals in 17 starts (plus 15 sub appearances) as the Gulls won promotion back in to the Football League. He then rejoined United on a season long loan in June 2009.

Jamie Cook

Striker who rejoined United in August after nine seasons away from his hometown club. Having come through the ranks at the Manor Ground Jamie made 77 senior appearances for the U's in the Championship and League 1 before joining Boston United. After spells at Stevenage and Rushden he joined Crawley and was consistently among the top scorers in this division.

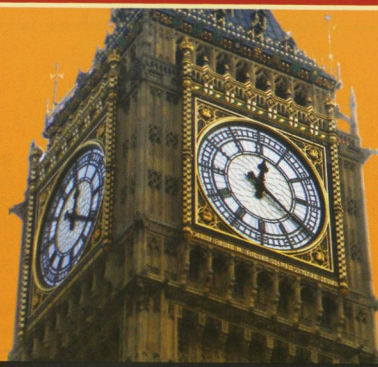
Francis Green

A year later and Oxford took an early two-goal lead, but late goals from Mike Newell and Mark Stein looked to have given Luton an unlikely draw. However Oxford scored a dramatic late winner a minute from time.

NUMBERS GAME

ON THIS DAY IN THE HATTERS' HISTORY

Luton won an incredible 11-goal thriller in February 1988. Mark Stein netted his first, and only, hat-trick for Luton in an amazing 7-4 victory. Mick Harford and Brian Stein scored before Oxford pulled a goal back from the penalty spot. Darron McDonough immediately restored the two-goal advantage, although Oxford reduced the deficit once again before the break. Mark Stein added two goals early in the second half before the visitors made it 5-3. Stein completed an 11-minute hat-trick, and within a minute the visitors made it 6-4 with just 65 minutes on the clock! Harford netted his second of the game to make it 7-4, and remarkably the final 19 minutes failed to see any further goals.

6

That match in 1988 started a six-match unbeaten run for the Hatters in this fixture, and the following three games all ended in victories too. David Preece, Phil Gray and Scott Oakes all scored in a 3-1 win in March 1993, and 11 months

later Oakes was on the scoresheet again, as Mitchell Thomas and Tony Thorpe also netted in a 3-0 win. In September 1999 Liam George scored twice, and Stuart Fraser netted his only goal for Luton, as the Hatters led 3-0 at half time. Oxford hit back after the break and reduced the deficit with two goals, before Adam Locke scored a long range effort with time running out to seal a 4-2 victory.

1

The last two matches at Kenilworth have seen both teams earn a point in 1-1 draws. Julian Watts scored in April 2001, but the visitors equalised in the second half. Oxford had already been relegated, and a few weeks later a similar fate was confirmed for Luton. The Hatters bounced back at the first attempt though, finishing runners-up, with the match in September being decided in the opening 10 minutes! Andy Scott scored for the visitors on five minutes, but Luton didn't take long to equalise through Kevin Nicholls.

ASA HALL DRIVES HOME THE TOWN'S SECOND GOAL AT THE GLASSWORLD STADIUM

Second half goals from debutant Janos Kovacs and Asa Hall put the Hatters on their way to their third straight victory in the Blue Square Premier.

After a goalless first half the Town took the lead seven minutes after the interval when the big Hungarian centre-half nodded home Kevin Nicholls' left-wing corner.

The Hatters played some terrific football in the second 45 minutes and their seventh victory on the road this season was made safe on 73 minutes when Hall exchanged passes with Matthew Barnes-Homer to beat Stutes goalkeeper Danny Naisbitt from six yards for his fifth goal of the campaign.

In truth the Town could have won by a greater margin and goalkeeper Kevin Pilkington was rarely threatened in the second half although the hosts had the better of the first half and could have taken the lead inside the first 25 seconds when Bradley Hudson-Odoi hit the crossbar.

confident mood as the Town struggled to make any much of an impact. An injury to, and subsequent substitution of Claude Gnaka for Barnes-Homer on 28 minutes finally saw the Hatters up the tempo with the striker linking up well with Gallen several times before the break.

Gallen, Barnes-Homer and Adam Newton all went close as the Town finished the first half strongly.

The Hatters started the second half like they ended the first with their two goals fair rewards for their endeavour and quality with the statistics of shots on target (11-3) and shots off target (7-4) in Luton's favour a clear indication of their dominance.

At one point the visitors looked like they were going to run riot as they bossed the second half with substitutes Barnes-Homer, Hatch and Tom Craddock linking up and causing Histon havoc.

Three wins on the bounce was made even sweeter with the bonus of Liam Hatch returning for the first time since the beginning of October to complete 45 minutes. The striker had a goal ruled out and was a constant menace to the home defence.

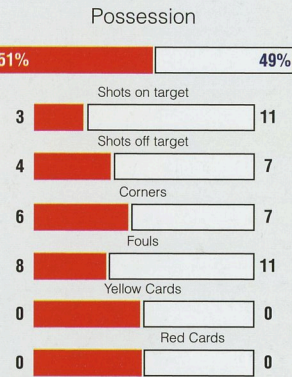

The Hatters lost for the fourth time at Kenilworth Road this season as Ebbsfleet ended Richard Money's side's run of three straight league victories in their first home game in 33 days.

After an opening half-an-hour that visitors dominated, the Town took the lead when Liam Hatch struck against his old club with a fine left-footed shot after he had got the better of three Fleet defenders.

With everything looking rosy with the Hatters a goal-up, the game turned on its head completely before the break with Magno Vieira striking twice in the space of three minutes.

Firstly on 42 minutes he drove a shot past substitute goalkeeper Shane Gore from 15 yards after taking a neat pass from Alex Stavrinou to level things up.

Then, a minute into stoppage time, Vieira was on hand to tap into an empty net to give the Fleet the lead when seizing on the loose ball after Gore had come out to challenge Ricky Shakes for the ball.

In truth it was no more than the Kent side deserved after a bright first half that belied their lowly position in the Blue Square Premier.

The Hatters began the second period much brighter and eventually, after long spells of possession, levelled things up on 65 minutes.

A long throw from substitute Ed Asafu-Adjaye was headed on at the front post by Asa Hall and Tom Craddock was on hand to hook the ball past Lance Cronin in the Ebbsfleet goal after his initial header was blocked.

Everyone assumed at that point that the Town would go on an record their fourth straight victory but the visitors had other ideas.

Just two minutes later Moses Ashikodi fired Liam Daish's men back in front after the Hatters had failed to clear their lines following a corner.

Still, the Hatters continued to press and they thought they had found their second equaliser of the afternoon twice in the space of 30 seconds on 74 minutes.

Firstly Craddock saw a fine shot saved by Cronin before he swung in a delightful cross that was headed home by an unmarked Hatch inside the penalty area but to the frustration of everyone inside Kenilworth Road a late flag of the lineman, indicating offside, meant the score remained at 3-2.

With time ticking down the Town piled on the pressure but the nearest they came to finding an equaliser came with seven minutes left when Cronin saved firstly from Hatch's swerving long-range effort and then from George Pilkington's super shot on the turn from the resulting corner.

"Honestly I can stand here and say I apologise for our performance this afternoon.

"I've been in football since I was 16 but I cannot remember feeling so low, or angry, frustrated and disappointment as I feel right now."

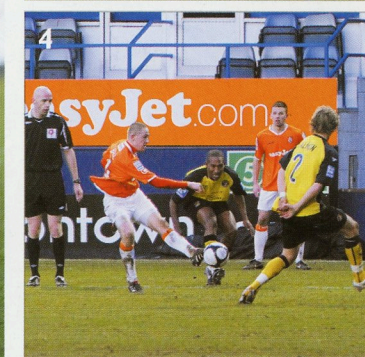
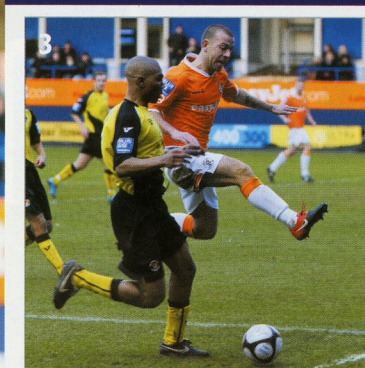

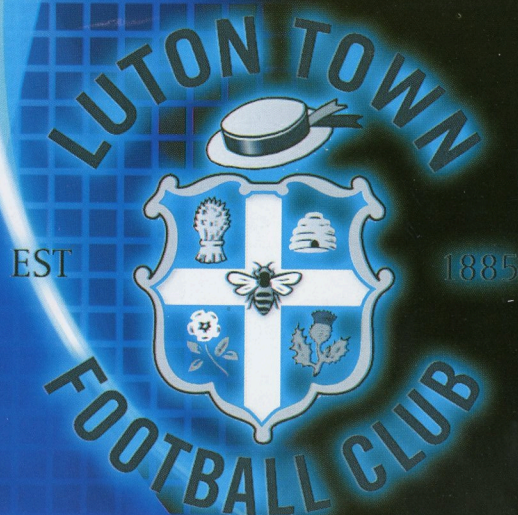

Not convinced they could shift 4,000 tickets, the Town opted for the smaller number which brought on the predictable moans.

The Luton supporters lucky enough to make the trip were shocked when 19-year-old Tony Thorpe, on his full debut, smacked in a 20 yard drive into the top corner after 35 minutes.

It was difficult to see which was the Premiership side as the Hatters played clever possession football, defended deep and then threatened the Magpies on the counter attack.

Newcastle's equaliser came just as the Town were beginning to think they were up for a famous victory.

Peter Beardsley, on the edge of the area, tried to get past Alan Harper and fell over while doing so. Despite the protests the referee pointed to the spot leaving Beardsley to level.

The Town comfortably held on for a replay leaving a relieved Newcastle manager Kevin Keegan to say that he was happy to be in the hat for the fifth round draw.

A capacity crowd of 12,503 plus the Sky TV cameras were present for the replay. How would the paupers of Luton Town with a squad costing £500,000 manage to compete against a star-studded side that cost £7.5 million to assemble?

Due to an injury to striker Kerry Dixon, the Hatters brought in another teenager, 18-year-old John Hartson, to the side. Hartson's reputation had been confined to Bedfordshire up until that point but it was now magnified many times over when he gave the Hatters the lead on 16 minutes.

Hartson clipped a Trevor Peake pass around the advancing Magpies

goalkeeper Mike Hooper before calmly stroking the ball into the net to send the crowd wild.

Newcastle fought back with Beardsley hitting a post with a firm shot while at the other end a Hartson header seemed to be heading in but Barry Venison executed an acrobatic clearance on the line to prevent the Town from going two up.

The Magpies upped the pressure in the second half, as to be expected, but the Luton central defensive partnership of John Dreyer and Peake stood firm.

The tie was finally settled with 10 minutes to go when a shot from

Scott Oakes was blocked by Hooper with the loose ball running to Des Linton who drove it back into the box for Oakes to side-foot home.

Keegan was gracious in defeat, praising the Town and adding: "Luton deserved to win, fair and square, and good luck to them. I hope they go all the way to the final at Wembley."

Luton manager David Pleat, while praising Hartson and Oakes said: "It was a team performance. I don't think we had an inferior performance by any player."

The Hatters beat Cardiff at Ninian Park in the next round before being paired with West Ham in the

quarter finals. A draw at Upton Park led to another famous Kenilworth Road night when a hat-trick from Oakes set up a marvellous 3-2 victory.

Sadly, that is where the fairy tale ended as Chelsea were easy 2-0 winners in the semi-final which at least was played under the Twin Towers of Wembley Stadium.

Two goals from new signing Brian Wake was enough to earn the Tynesiders all three points in front of a bumper and eventually, disappointed crowd of over 7,000.

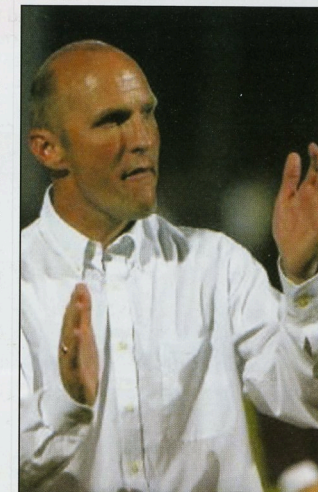
Wimbledon kept up their promotion push with a routine home victory over lowly Forest Green Rovers while Rushden and

The lead was further extended after Taylor Nathaniel shot from a corner was carried over the line by the Spurs goalkeeper before Adam Watkins notched the Hatters' sixth of the match when tapping home after excellent work from Toomey.

At Biggleswade, on a pitch more suitable for fishing than football, Luton's youngsters were given a harsh reality check following the triumph over Tottenham.

Finally, I must report that the Football League recently withdrew funding that had been promised to Luton Town for their technical development programme.

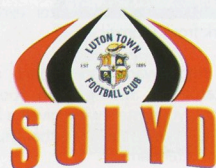
Despite relegation, the Football League had guaranteed that the £20,000 promised for this programme would remain in place for two years.

A goal seven minutes from time from Liam Hatch got the Hatters got back to winning ways with a hard-fought victory at Barrow.

The striker got on the end of Kevin Nicholls' right-wing corner on 83 minutes to nod home the winner just five minutes before it looked like he was going to be substituted.

Hatch's header, his second goal in as many games since returning fully-fit from injury, capped a workmanlike and professional away display from Richard Money's side.

Goalkeeper Mark Tyler had rarely been troubled on his first outing in Town colours since the end of October but he was called into action on 72 minutes when reacting smartly to stick out a strong arm to prevent Walker from giving Barrow the lead when left unmarked at the back-post following Simon Spender's deep cross.

As the Hatters upped the ante with time ticking away they thought they had the lead on 82 minutes when substitute Craig Nelthorpe saw his left-wing cross headed off the line by Mark Jones.

Not to be outdone, from the resulting corner swung in from Nicholls, Hatch strained every neck muscle to meet the skipper's flag-kick to plant a firm header into the back of the Barrow net to the delight of the 302 travelling Town fans.

The goal seemed to knock the stuffing out of the hosts and Hatch almost got his second a minute later when from a similar position he saw his header tipped over the crossbar by Deasy following another Nicholls corner.

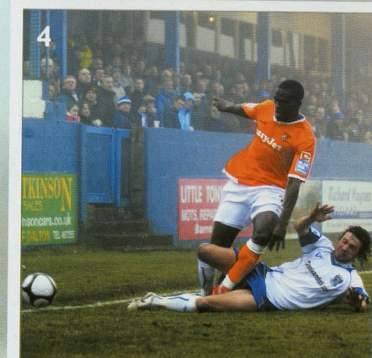
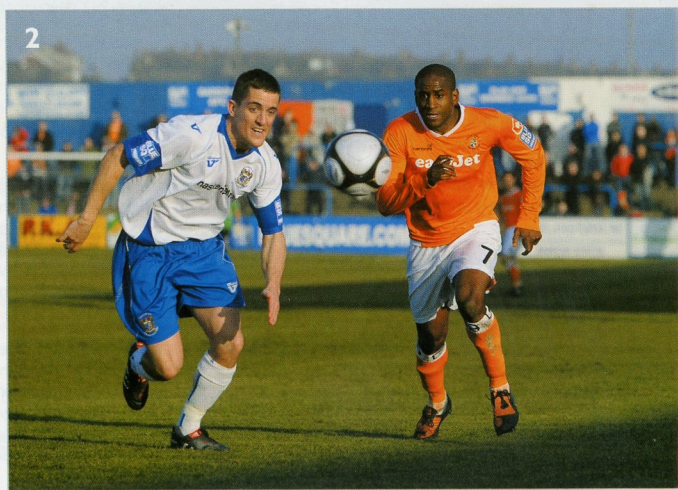
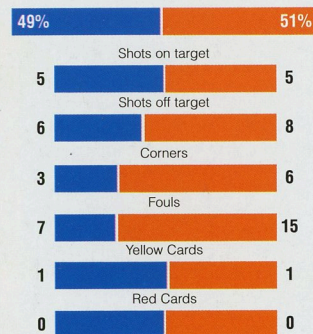

TOWN DEFENDER REFLECTS ON BARROW WIN



The Hatters produced another solid performance on the road as they returned back from Cumbria with all three points after a 1-0 win over Barrow in their latest Blue Square Premier fixture.

A late headed goal from Liam Hatch was enough to give Town a narrow victory at Holker Street and for defender Fred Murray the nature of the win represented a big improvement for the Hatters.

"It was a decent performance," reflected the former Northampton defender. "We know we can play better than that but it was a positive response to the result against Ebbsfleet a week earlier.

"Looking at the amount of chances we created in the first-half which

weren't converted, you're always wondering when the opposition will probably get there little spell in the game to score.

"The style of football suits us on the road because the opposition has to come out at us so the game becomes more open.

"It seems that teams are giving an extra 10 percent when they travel to our ground so we need to highlight that and start games a lot better and go at them from the off."

What happens when you start sending out negative messages? Invariably, the person or group who the negativity is directed at begin to doubt themselves. They become less

WHAT'S THE GROUND LIKE?

Although a tidy and well kept ground, it is one of the smaller in the Blue Square Premier.

On one side is the smart looking Main Stand. This covered, all-seated stand, has a capacity of 542 seats. There are no supporting pillars,

Opposite is a small covered terrace, called the Peter Fountain Stand that extends again for around half the length of the pitch.

The stewarding is fairly relaxed and normally a hassle free day out. The Club provide their own catering which includes the usual football fare including, amongst other things cheeseburgers, burgers, hot dogs and chip butties.

HOW TO GET THERE AND WHERE TO PARK?

Take the M1 south, M25, leaving at junction six taking the A22 to Eastbourne. Take the first exit at the large roundabout shortly before Polegate, signposted A27 Eastbourne, Hastings & Bexhill. At the next roundabout, take the second exit towards Stone Cross and Westham (A22); at another roundabout shortly afterwards, take

the first exit signposted Stone Cross and Westham. Continue towards Stone Cross village, past Dittons Nursery on your left. Shortly afterwards you will come to a crossroads, with a church on your left, the Red Lion pub on the right, and Stone Cross windmill immediately ahead.

Turn right, down the B2104 Friday Street. At the end of Friday Street, turn left at the double mini-roundabout into Hide Hollow (B2191), passing Eastbourne Crematorium on your right. Turn right at the roundabout into Priory Road, and Priory Lane is about 200 yards down the road on the left.

There is a good sized car park at the ground which holds 400 cars, part of which is allocated to away supporters and is free of charge. As there is only one entrance/exit to the car park, then this can lead to a bit of a bottleneck at the end of the game. 1960'S DREAM TEAM

HATTERS FAN PHIL BASSILL PICKS HIS BEST XI FROM THE 1960S

The first league match I attended was at Kenilworth Road on 14th April 1962. I was seven years old. The match was Sunderland and we lost 2-1. In spite of the result I was smitten and from then on attended regularly. Initially standing in the Bobbers Stand in line with the penalty box at the Kenilworth End but as the Town descended through the divisions, my Dad and I stood behind the Oak Road goal. When my brother started attending we switched to the uncovered Kenilworth Road.

GOALKEEPER

Sandy Davie: Sandy was a neat tidy keeper. Nothing flash, quick reactions, very agile and always willing to come off his line. Sandy joined the Hatters in Autumn 1968. My first goalkeeping hero. The best Town goalkeeper since Ron Baynham and Bernard Streten according to my Dad. Having been a goalkeeper in the forces, he reckoned himself an expert in this field.

BACK FOUR

Brendan McNally: McNally had played in the FA Cup Final in 1959 and he played in the first game I attended. He was a hard tackler and a good passer of the ball. He seemed unbeatable to me. According to my Dad he had class. He put the fear of god into opposing wingers: they never went past him twice.

Terry Branston: Branston joined the Town when they were in the old fourth division and made an immediate impact. He organised the defence, dominated in the air and skipped the side to promotion in 1968 and 1970.

Always a danger at set pieces, Terry led by example.

Chris Nicholl: Nicholl impressed when he played for Halifax against the Town in August 1969. By the end of the week the Hatters had signed him up. For the next two-and-a-half years he proved to be a great signing. Tall, lanky, great in the air and with good ability on the ground, his telescopic legs often scooped the ball away from opposing forwards. Like Bruce Rioch he was sold to Aston Villa

Fred Jardine: Originally a winger, Fred was converted into a full back in late 1964. From that point onwards Jardine became a regular in the first team. He always gave 100% effort and his surging runs down the wing raised the spirits and always gave Ray Whittaker another option. Most heart warming, however, were his sliding tackles which seemed always to leave the attacker in the stands and Jardine with the ball.

MIDFIELD

Graham French: I was at the Mansfield game in 1968 when French scored a brilliant goal, rated by many as the best Town goal ever. French was an enigma. Undoubtedly talented but very unpredictable. He could do things that had you in awe one minute and then did something which made you want to weep the next. When he was good he was great; our own version of George Best, Charlie Cooke or Eddie Gray. A shame that we only had him to treasure for too short a time.

Alan Slough: A local boy who worked and worked for the cause. Slough was Luton's utility player who made the life of his colleagues, and particularly Bruce Rioch, much easier. His tackling was firm, his distribution was excellent, and quite often he would turn up to score a valuable goal.

Bruce Rioch: We were standing outside the technical drawing room at Barnfield High when the news came through that Rioch had been sold to Aston Villa. Our hero had been sold and many of us were devastated by the news. Luckily we were able to enjoy his clever touches, his great passing, pace and fierce shooting for four years. He would make it into any Luton team that I have seen since 1962.

Ray Whittaker: Short and stocky but fast, left-footed and accurate when crossing a ball he contributed so much to the promotion team of 1967/68. In addition Ray would often chip in with a goal. A number of strikers, and in particular John O'Rourke, benefited from his accurate and reliable service.

FORWARDS

Ron Davies: Sadly Ron Davies only played 35 times for Luton. He scored over 20 goals in a very poor team. Ron appeared to hang in the air was a great header of the ball. Ron was a shining light at a time when following the Town was not a happy experience. Even to a nine year old he was sheer class. No surprise that he went on to play for some of the best clubs in the country.

John O'Rourke: John played for the Town from 1963 until 1965. In his first season Luton finished 18th in the third division and John scored 22 goals in 23 games. The next season the Town were relegated but he still managed to score 10 times in 21 games. In his final season he scored 32 goals in 40 games in the fourth division. No wonder he was a hero to so many local teenage schoolboys.

The Hatters will be next at home a week on Saturday as Terry Brown brings his AFC Wimbledon side to Kenilworth Road for what is expected to be an intriguing encounter.

Both sides met on the opening day of the 2009/10 Blue Square Premier season back in August at Kingsmeadow with the game finishing 1-1 after Tom Craddock's 14th-minute penalty had been cancelled out by Dons striker Jon Main's spot-kick 10 minutes from time.

AFC Wimbledon started life in 2002 after the club and its fans wanted a continuation of Wimbledon Football Club to emerge from the break away club after Milton Keynes Dons formed and moved away from London to Milton Keynes.

Led by Kris Stewart, the club was formed by supporters and in the a hectic few weeks during the summer of 2002 the club held three trial days on Wimbledon Common to attract players for the forthcoming season in the Combined Counties League.

In July of that year, with new players in place for their first friendly game, they lost 4-0 against Sutton United but attracted almost 5,000 supporters.

Since then the Dons have experienced

success in such a short period of time winning the Combined Counties League at the second attempt in the 2003/04 season which gained them promotion to the Isthmian League First Division.

During this period of success the team produced an unbeaten run of 78 league matches over two seasons which is still an all-time English record by any senior football club.

Promotion to the Isthmian League Premier Division followed during this incredible run of games without loss and after flirting with promotion they eventually went up into the Conference South under the guidance of Brown.

They quickly adapted to life in the Conference South and were yet again on a charge as they came out on top on the final day of last season thus giving them promotion to the Blue Square Premier.

Brown's men have had a successful début season so far and are currently in the hunt for another promotion via the Play-Off positions.

Before arriving at Kenilworth Road, AFC Wimbledon face a tough trip to Abbey Stadium to take on Cambridge United in the league.

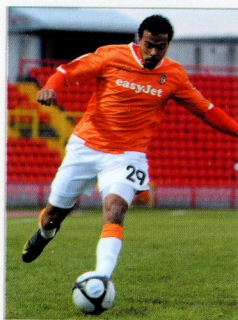
