## ADDICKS GO DUTCH AFTER DAILLY GRIND

In light of a notable Scottish absence on the pitch, one defender recently made a pilgrimage to The Valley. **MATT WRIGHT** introduces Charlton's new rearguard recruit

**H**e may be unable to play this afternoon, but new Charlton recruit Marcel Seip intends to play a full role in the club's push for promotion.

The versatile defender was recruited on loan from Plymouth Argyle on Monday after the club decided not to appeal against the controversial red card issued to Addicks captain Christian Dailly against Yeovil Town last Saturday.

Dailly will today serve the second match of his four-game suspension, and Phil Parkinson reacted quickly to his scheduled absence by bringing in Seip.

"I know Charlton have been doing well, but I've come here to play," said former Netherlands U21 international Marcel.

"I don't know if the gaffer will pick me or not, but I hope I come into his mind for a start. I'll have to wait and see because Charlton are doing well at the moment. But I want to play. I'll do my best in training and hopefully he'll pick me."

Seip, who represented the Pilgrims against Charlton in the 2-2 draw at Home Park in October, is unable to feature this afternoon because he represented Argyle in the competition in the last round. He is also unavailable for Charlton's Johnstone's Paint Trophy campaign.

But he already feels as if he is among friends in SE7, having worked with Tim Breacker during the assistant manager's time under Ian Holloway at Home Park, and having previously played alongside loanee Lee Martin.

"I was happy the minute I heard Tim was looking for someone," said 28-year-old Seip, who has signed until January 8th. "Christian got suspended, so they were short of options."

With Chris Solly out until the new year with an ankle injury, Dailly was the main cover for Simon Francis on the right of the rearguard, and Seip will add competition at right-back and in central defence.

"With Christian suspended and the loan window closing on Thursday, it was important we moved quickly," explained manager

Parkinson. "We just felt we needed another player like him in the squad."

Charlton will be without skipper Dailly until the regional semi-final of the Johnstone's Paint Trophy against Brentford on December 14th after the club opted not to appeal against his harsh dismissal last weekend.

Although Dailly and opponent Sam Williams, plus Yeovil boss Terry Skiverton, admitted afterwards that the incident was a clash of heads, the video evidence wasn't clear enough to sustain hopes that the referee's decision – that Dailly elbowed Williams – could be overturned.

"We had a good long look at it and it was a clash of heads, but we were concerned that if we did appeal, it could ultimately see him miss more games," said Parkinson. "We just couldn't take the risk of it being extended due to a frivolous claim."

"It's a real shame because Christian has spent 14 years in England and, prior to this season, had only been sent off once. Now he's been the victim of two harsh decisions in a matter of months."

Charlton's player of the season last term, Dailly was sent off when he received a second yellow card for an innocuous challenge against Leyton Orient in August. ◀

years and was a big-money sale.

We came from behind to draw

with Bristol Rovers last Tuesday

night, but I was generally pleased

with the all-round performance.

Bristol had drawn at Brighton

& Hove Albion three days earlier

and were hard to break down, but

I thought that, over the 90 minutes,

we had enough clear-cut chances

to win the game, and I can't fault

the lads' efforts.

When we equalised, I think fans

could sense that we weren't going

to be content with a draw and really

wanted to win the game.

We went all out to win the match,

and when you do that, you can

sometimes leave the back door

open, and we nearly got punished.

But our attacking threat in the last

20 minutes was excellent, and on

another day, we could have scored a

couple of goals in that period alone.

I went to Park View Road the

following night to watch the U18s in

the youth cup, and I was very

pleased with their performance

against Bury Town.

The win has set up an attractive

game at Carrow Road next month,

and I expect a couple of the players


on show will be involved in our

**Frustrated by an injury-plagued spell in Yorkshire, one defender emerged determined to battle his way back – just like the club he returned to during the summer. GARY HAINES finds out how a long-serving Addick has played his part in Charlton's current good Fortune**

It's around this time of year that the Christmas decorations come down from the loft and gift lists are circulated among friends and family.

Such traditions remain rife, and the absence of Jonathan Fortune from last year's festive menu in SE7 was pretty much like Christmas Day without the Queen's Speech.

The big defender is reborn in the Addicks stable this season, though, and is keen to make up for lost

time following a stop-start second spell at the club.

Just to fill fans in on the absence of Fortune last season; the 30-year-old ended his long association with the club in summer 2009, joining Championship side Sheffield United.

However, following an injury-plagued spell at Bramall Lane, the centre-back found himself once more seeking fresh pastures a year later – and his career went full circle when he arrived back at Sparrows Lane.

A member of the Addicks squad in the Premiership, Fortune's transition back into Charlton red was seamless, and he was eventually handed a short-term contract until the end of this year.

He's had to wait patiently for his chance to shine, but the suspension of skipper Christian Dailly has opened the door for a solid run in the team going into December.

And having entered the fray for the closing 15 minutes of the incident-

packed clash with Yeovil Town last Saturday, Fortune started alongside Gary Doherty in the midweek Valley draw with Bristol Rovers.

Indeed, he ended the evening wearing the captain's armband after stand-in skipper Jose Semedo left the action early in the second half.

"I was surprised to come on last weekend, because as a defender, you don't usually come off the bench," said Jonathan, whose midweek outing took him to an

aggregate 204 games for the club.

"I was chatting to Christian about it after the game, and we were saying that defence is probably the hardest role to fulfil after coming on.

"A centre-forward or winger can take his time and get involved, and if you mis-control the ball or you are not ready, then it's not going to affect things too much.

"But one mistake as a defender and it's a goal or a chance on goal for their team. So you have to be so

concentrated and so prepared."

Fortune and co held firm when shorthanded against the Grovers, and after the visitors were also reduced to 10 men near the end, Johnnie Jackson's penalty proved decisive in a 3-2 win.

On Tuesday, Fortune was in from the start as Dailly began his ban, and the defender helped stretch the Addicks' unbeaten run in all competitions to nine matches.

"It was a tough evening," said

Fortune, who watched Will Hoskins spurn a glorious chance to win the game for Bristol in the closing stages.

"We've been on a great run of late, and I thought the boys showed great character to get back in the game and then press on for the win.

"The boys have put in a great bit of effort recently, and taken us from mid-table to being in contention. There is more of a team feeling about the place now. I think everyone is starting to blend a bit more and understand each other. Hopefully, we can keep going like this."

Fortune is now hoping to continue his rearguard progress in this afternoon's FA Cup clash against Luton Town. And while 'Forch' may be a cool customer off the field, don't

let that disguise the fact that he craves match action – so much so that he played through stomach cramps during the FA Cup first-round replay

against Barnet at The Valley 11 days ago.

"It was best that I didn't carry on, but it was really frustrating," he said, having finally been forced off after 63 minutes. "I'm waiting for these games and when the opportunities come, I can't pass them up."

"I know I've been here a long while, but apart from, obviously, the gaffer and Kins [Mark Kinsella], it's a whole new set-up."

"There are new players and three very good centre-halves – Christian, Doc [Gary Doherty] and Miguel [Llera]. I've got to be patient and I understood that when I first came here, but, fingers crossed, I can now hopefully get a run in the side and put some performances back to back."

"If anyone in any position at any club is getting a continued run, it should work out that you start getting better with each game. I want to be able to put a run of a few games together to try to get back to match fitness and match sharpness."

Fortune made his first-team return against Milton Keynes Dons on September 28th, fully 20 months and a day after his last outing for the club, on January 27th, 2009.

And while the date will long be remembered by the Valley fans who celebrated a victory over fierce rivals Crystal Palace after an 18-match winless league run, it was

memorable for all the wrong reasons for Fortune.

A jarring Achilles injury suffered in the 1-0 win saw him leave the action on the hour mark,

and it proved to be the final match of his initial spell at the club at which he had climbed through the ranks.

But far from a fresh start in the Steel City, his career stood still as he made just six appearances for the Blades during a frustrating time at Bramall Lane.

Discussing his move north, he explained: "I had to go up there, really, as there was nothing [on offer] at Charlton at the time. So I played 45 minutes in a friendly and did well and they said we would get something sorted."

"Then, in the last kick of the training session the next Monday, I did my hamstring, which put me out for a month."

After missing pre-season, Fortune eventually signed for the Blades, but opportunity didn't knock until November.

"I played against Barnsley and played well and was back involved again," he said. "Then I came off the bench for two minutes and did my hamstring again."

"I just couldn't get a regular run of games. Every time I came back, I kept breaking down, and I did my hamstring again just before January."

Only four more games followed in 2010 before the two parties agreed to part ways.

"It's been awful in terms of how frustrating it has been," he said. "I wasn't playing and I just wanted to go somewhere where I would start getting some football games again. So I moved on."

After heading south in the summer, the defender therefore continued his unbroken sequence of starting pre-season training at Sparrows Lane in July.

"Even last season, when I was at Sheffield United, I was always in contact with Charlton and watching what was going on," he said.

"When pre-season arrived, I knew that I had to be somewhere training. I'm not someone who can just go to the gym by myself; I have to be around other people, and it just felt right at Charlton."

"I was enjoying myself with the boys over the summer, and thought it created an opportunity where maybe we could both do something and I could stay."

Luton's arrival in SE7 recalls a thrilling League Cup contest between the two sides in September 2003, and Fortune was in the centre of the Addicks' defence as Charlton trailed 2-0 just after the half-hour mark.

A last-minute goal by Paolo Di Canio, his first as a Charlton player, made it 3-3 after 90 minutes, and after the teams traded goals in extra-time, the match ended in a 4-4 draw and penalties ensued.

Fortune converted Charlton's third spot-kick, and a save by Dean Kiely finally earned the Addicks an 8-7 shootout success.

"I had a friend called Courtney Pitt who was playing for Luton at the time, and he came on," recalled Jonathan. "I remember it going to extra-time and then penalties, but all our cup games at that time seemed to go to penalties."

"I put one past Woody [Charlton goalkeeping coach Andy Woodman] against Oxford United a year earlier as well."

Fortune, who was a striker coming through the youth ranks at the club, is one of just two playing survivors – along with Thierry Racon – from the last time the two sides met, a 3-1 League Cup loss at Kenilworth Road in 2007.

Since then, the Hatters have dropped out of The Football League, and he noted: "Football is getting stranger and stranger now."

"It's no surprise when you see what's happened to us and other teams, but it's hit them a bit worse."


"These games are strictly about being professional, being up for it and doing the right job. Hopefully, that will be the case today." ▶

## FACING THE 12 DAYS OF PRINT MASS

Producing four matchday programmes in 12 days has required hard work behind the scenes, and MATT WRIGHT takes a closer look at how the club's hectic schedule compares to previous years

Today's FA Cup tie against Luton Town is Charlton's fourth home match in the space of 12 days – and has certainly tested the club's communications department to its limit, even though we've produced smaller editions of the Valley Review for the two cup games in that period.

It started us thinking about previous busy times in the club's history, and that meant just one thing – a call to Colin Cameron.

As you'd expect of the ever-prepared club historian, his reply was immediate as he recalled the 'Ice Age' 1962/63 season, when the Addicks played nine matches in 28 days in April following a series of postponements earlier in the campaign due to the weather.

Indeed, in contrast to the current hectic schedule, there was a 75-day period (from December 22nd, 1962 to March 6th, 1963) when Charlton were only able to play six league and cup matches, all at The Valley. Even one of those games, against Southampton, was abandoned.

A third-round FA Cup match against Cardiff City, originally scheduled for January 5th, was ultimately postponed 10 times due to the extreme winter weather before it eventually took place on February 18th.

But it's previous occasions featuring a sustained run of home games that we're specifically interested in, and further research shows that three home matches in eight days has proved a relatively common occurrence over the years, as well as runs of four Valley

matches in the space of 15-18 days.

But four home fixtures in just 12 days remains a rarity – until you

go all the way back to 1924/25 and uncover a sequence of nine matches, seven of which were at home, from November 22nd to December 27th.

During this period, four home games and one away were played in the space of 10 days.

And although this is a worse schedule than the Addicks have experienced this month, the matchday programme editor in me is compelled to point out that the 'programme' of the time was a one-page printed sheet...

The vagaries of the FA Cup draw

and the necessity of a first-round replay against Barnet were responsible for the current concentration of home games, but it could have been worse.

Had Charlton been drawn at home in the regional semi-finals of the Johnstone's Paint Trophy, and the match not selected by Sky, we could all have been back here again on Tuesday night – five home games in 15 days.

That would have meant nine games in November, but times have certainly changed.

In 1971/72, Charlton played their final nine fixtures of the campaign in 30 days, culminating in the 5-0 defeat to Blackpool which confirmed the club's relegation to the Third Division.

However, just three days before heading to Bloomfield Road, the same team took part in a testimonial match for former player Dietmar Bruck against Coventry City at Highfield Road – making it a final run-in of 10 matches in 30 days.

Given the financial ramifications of relegation in modern-day football, it's hard to imagine that any club would field a full-strength line-up for a friendly with such an important match on the horizon nowadays. ▶




"We are taking this incident extremely seriously because we cannot allow the mindless actions of one person to cause so much pain and distress," said managing director Stephen Kavanagh. "We will be examining CCTV footage to try to identify who was responsible, and we

Her husband, Keith, said: "You don't expect that sort of thing from your own fans. It hit her on the crown of her head, so it could only have been thrown from the upper north."

The duo are refusing to let the unsavoury incident spoil their support of the Addicks, however, and were intending to return to SE7 today.

"We've been in the same seats for the past 10 years and we're not going to move now," Keith said. "But supporters can help to make sure it never happens again by finding whoever is responsible."



# MONEY MEN HAVE INTEREST IN CUP SHOCK

Cashflow may have been a problem for Luton Town in recent years, but one source of Money is starting to turn things around. GARY HAINES assesses the in-form Bedfordshire men

Having gone from the Championship to the Conference in the space of three years, there's not been too much to smile about for Luton Town supporters in recent times.

Indeed, the wonderland of top-flight football must seem a million miles away from the Hatters following a mad descent down the league ladder.

A far more stable club these days, however, and with Money at their disposal (manager Richard, that is), Luton experienced play-off semi-final misery last term, just like Charlton.

For Swindon Town on penalties, read York City in the Blue Square Premier post-season lottery as the second-placed finish by Luton, attempting to bounce straight back into The Football League at the first attempt, was rendered academic by the Minstermen.

Town have everything to gain and nothing to lose today, though, following their first-round replay win against the minnows of Corby Town.

They needed a late equaliser to force a 1-1 draw in the initial tie, but proved too strong when the match

was replayed and earned their trip to The Valley with a 4-2 triumph.

The Money men are certainly flush at the moment, having lost just once in their last nine games in all competitions, and Histon were hammered 5-1 last weekend.

They currently sit third in the league, two points behind leaders AFC Wimbledon, although second-placed Crawley Town have a game in hand on both clubs. And after today's cup crunch, the Hatters are due at Kingsmeadow for a tasty-looking summit meeting with the Dons on Tuesday.

The prestige and pounds offered by a third-round tie against one of the country's big clubs are a sizable carrot for both teams this afternoon, but Money remains fiercely focused on leading his side back into The Football League this term.

And so to the decline that has seen the club – FA Cup finalists in 1959, when they lost 2-1 to Nottingham Forest – plunge into obscurity.

Dogged by financial problems, Luton dropped out of the Championship in 2007, and, after

an encouraging start to the following campaign, were hit by a 10-point deduction for falling into administration.

Another relegation followed in May 2008, and the off-field predicament worsened the following summer with another deduction, this time a cumulative 30-point punishment threatening their 89-year stay in The Football League.

Despite almost wiping out the deficit before the turn of the year, the challenge proved too much, and the Hatters suffered the drop for a third season in a row in 2009 – but not before

the club defiantly won the Johnstone's Paint Trophy at Wembley. ▶





# DRESSING ROOM DIARIES

One former Hatter's prowess in front of goal had unfortunate – but not drastic – consequences last Saturday. TOM HARVEY talks to Gary Doherty

I've got great memories of my time at Luton Town – we had a decent team. A lot of the old guard had moved on and players who'd done well in the FA Youth Cup got a chance in the first XI.

It was going well but, as Luton have had to do a lot down the years, they sold players to stay afloat. Until they get their new stadium, they'll always be in the same boat.

They seem to be doing well right now. I haven't been to see them this season, but I read reports when I go back to my mum and dad's, and the manager seems to be doing a great job with a really young team.

I played as a striker and as a defender in my time there, as I have throughout my career – it's only in the past few years that I've settled as a centre-half. When I was at Tottenham Hotspur, there was a stage when I was playing centre-half for them but then going away with the Republic of Ireland and playing centre-forward, which was pretty weird.

Christian Dally's red card against Yeovil Town – which I didn't think was a sending-off – means the gaffer has been forced to change what has been a fairly settled back four.

If you want to get out of this league, you need a steady back four who all know each other's

games. I think that's what we were lacking at the start of the season.

Chris is a massive loss. He's our captain and our leader, but I have full faith in the other centre-backs at the club because they've come in and done well this season.

Unfortunately, I scored an own goal against Yeovil. The ball shot across the goal and I stretched for it to try to put it out for a corner, but instead hit it full on with my laces and it flew into the top corner. It felt like it was happening in slow motion, and it's always gutting to score an own goal, but thankfully we dug in and got the three points.

Jacko [Johnnie Jackson] showed great guts to step up and take a massive pressure penalty to win the game. He's got great ability. Now he's got licence to get forward and get in the box, he's shown how good he is further up the pitch.

He moans about his body because he doesn't look great with his shirt off, so I told him to do some press-ups because a few of us do them after training. He then started scoring, so in his head he thinks it's down to the press-ups!

His goals have really propelled us up the league, though, and that's what you need – goals from all areas, not just your strikers. ▶
