

# MONEY TALK

Welcome back to Kenilworth Road for tonight's important FA Cup replay against Charlton Athletic.

I'd like to welcome Phil Parkinson and his players plus the directors, staff and supporters from the Valley for this evening's tie.

We were given a tough test in an exciting spectacle in South East London and we are fully expecting another difficult match here at Kenilworth Road.

The meeting between the two sides 12 days ago was a thoroughly entertaining and typical cup tie that we are privileged to have in this country. It was one of those games that could you show to people around the world as a prime example of an FA Cup tie.

As a manager obviously it was hugely disappointing to concede the opening goal in the manner in which we did having been encamped in their third of the pitch for almost the whole of the first five minutes.

That goal highlighted the level at which Charlton operate. There is no doubt of the quality they possess among their massed squad; the speed and movement of their forward players was illustrated in a ruthless manner to give them the lead.

Undeterred we bounced back and showed terrific character. To remain focused and to keep playing the way we did despite that early set back is always vitally important and I was incredibly happy with the way the players stuck to their task.

Getting level before half-time was very important but again it was galling to concede once more so soon after that hard work.

Yet we kept going and after weathering the pressure from Charlton early in the second half we deservedly earned a replay when Andy Drury scored a truly superb goal.

I said after the game that being in the draw for the third round was the most important thing come Sunday and having done that it was obviously very interesting to see ourselves or Charlton paired with Tottenham in round three.

That's the incentive for both teams tonight and I'm sure Charlton won't want to pass up an opportunity to visit White Hart Lane - a stadium they were gracing in Premier League competition not too long ago.

It sets tonight's replay up perfectly and I find it no surprise that ESPN have decided to broadcast live.

Obviously they are here to record a cup shock. It's up to us to make sure that can be a reality. But what stands in our way is a Charlton side that are second in League 1 for a reason.

We showed in the first game that we can bridge a gap of 49 places and we need to be on top of our game a second time to earn ourselves a fantastic prize of visiting a team who are competing at the highest level of the game.

It's easy to get carried away with the possibility of travelling to Tottenham but all that excitement will be lost if we don't win this evening.

The players are focused fully on the job in hand. We briefed them fully before the first game and we will have done the same before tonight.

These are nights players, managers and supporters love to be involved in. It's up to all of us once more to come together as one.

We're in good form at the minute and we fear nobody. Our performances over the past few months have shown a tremendous consistency and we're scoring plenty of goals, especially at Kenilworth Road.

There have been some classic cup encounters under the Kenilworth Road floodlights in recent years - let's hope tonight is one to remember.

Your support at the Valley was absolutely phenomenal. Almost 3,000 makes myself, the management team, directors, staff and most importantly the players, incredibly proud.


Please make the same kind of atmosphere under the floodlights this evening and hopefully that can help us reward you for your unwavering loyalty and support.

Elsewhere, news has been more controversial. I do not mean the Aussies when I say that some

men were truly poleaxed in recent days. Last week the country heard that the bid prepared by our governing body was unsuccessful in its application to host the 2018 World Cup. Worse than that, angry faces were left trying to understand how our 'world class' bid in fact gained only one solitary vote (excluding the vote we gave ourselves of course).

Accusations, cancellations and recriminations abound. At the end of the day, the FA invested £15m into a bid and they failed - not marginally, but completely. When things go so spectacularly wrong, one would think that the people responsible would look firstly at their own ranks rather than blame all and sundry, whilst cancelling friendlies in a flounce.

Even the acting Chairman has resigned because "he feels he cannot trust those in power" - those in charge of the integrity of the game. Well, we all know how he feels. He also said that the voting members did not even read all the submissions before making their terrible and incomprehensible decision. Again we understand, because we too have fallen foul of that.

Surely, after the failed 2006 bid, lessons would be learnt in the dark corridors of the Football Association? £15m is a huge amount of money that could do so much good, so the people responsible for it have to come up with far more than the lame excuses of "it's an unfair process" (why spend £15m on it then?), or "They lied to us" (yes, but nothing new there eh?!). Are the people who spent this vast sum really ignorant of the reason(s) for failure?

FIFA know that whatever decision they made for host country in eight and 12 years time, that the decision would be historic - a decision that will be seen by most of the world's population; a decision that determines the location of the greatest show on Earth!

To me, it's not just about delivering the best logistical bid, or the best money making bid, or

the best marketing bid, or even the bid with the most indecipherable logo - surely they are a given - but what about the passion? It's about people, community, and togetherness. Tribe and family, not spin and brands. Those that rip the soul out of our game in the relentless pursuit of money will eventually suck the beast dry. Maybe this is a warning shot and the beast is stumbling - after all some Clubs were relying on a successful bid to shore up their coffers and that's hardly the legacy FIFA had in mind.

Perhaps, in the other bids FIFA saw something that justified making such an historic decision. Time will tell and no doubt our media will find any hidden skeletons or locate the smoking guns. Maybe it is indeed true that the process was unfair, controlled by too few people, that evidence was not read, and there was some slight of hand.

In which case, the changes which are needed stretch even further than everyone thought and to the very top of the pyramid.

So, who needs global branding or superslick TV? This is the FA Cup - THE best competition in the World! The place where dreams are made!

Be the 12th man and help the lads to progress in both competitions!

Come on you Hatters!







The last time we played at Kenilworth Road we dispatched Histon 5-1 and, again, it says a lot when we come off the field not entirely happy with our performance.

It was obviously an important result that boosted our goal difference and it's also pleasing to see us within touching distance of top spot given our position in the table this time last season when we gave ourselves a task of playing catch-up.

We put our focus on the league to one side again this evening and with the incentive of a trip to Spurs, we know what is at stake.


Since I have been at the Club your support has been a ~~absolute~~ tremendous and I can't think of a better way to reward your loyalty by

## DRURY NOMINATED



Henry, 24, has signed on-loan from Newport and will sign permanently in January whilst Hinton, 32, arrives on loan from League 2 Northampton until January.


## REST IN PEACE WALLY

**Wally Shanks. 1st May 1923 - 28th November 2010**

Everyone at Kenilworth Road was saddened to learn of the death of Wally Shanks on Sunday at the grand age of 87.

Although born in Malta, Wally was brought up in Scotland and was on the brink of joining Aberdeen when war broke out.

After the war, during which time he formed a great friendship with Tommy Walker the ex Hearts player, Wally toyed with offers from both Blackpool and Spurs but decided to follow his old friend, now at Chelsea, to Stamford Bridge.



The breakthrough eventually came in 1949/50 when thirty appearances were made together with the first league goal – the winner in a 1-0 victory at Preston. Wally then remained virtually ever present until 1957 when he joined the Towns coaching staff.

Following relegation in 1960, Wally left the club in the general shake-up and concentrated on his thriving sports business with Gordon Turner.

Wally then went on to run the Brown Owl for many years but still kept in touch with Bob Morton, Syd Owen and John Groves from that era when the talk was about the pure enjoyment of being paid for something they loved doing.

Wally's wages at Luton when he joined were £6.00 a week close season and £8 during the season and they pale into insignificance when compared to the money earned by today's players.

There will be a minute's silence at tonight's game.

# INTRODUCING CHARLTON ATHLETIC

## CLUB HISTORY

Charlton Athletic were formed in June 1905 and joined the Kent League for one campaign before becoming professional. They were accepted by the Southern League and played just a single season before being voted into the Football League.

Charlton finished second bottom in the Football League in 1926 and were forced to apply for re-election, which consequently proved to be a successful application.

Three years later the Addicks won the Division Three championship in 1929 and they remained at the Division Two level for four years. After relegation, Jimmy Seed was appointed as manager; three years into Seed's reign, the Addicks had gained successive promotions from the Third Division to the First Division in 1936.

In 1937, Charlton finished runners-up in the First Division in 1938 and were finalists in the 1946 FA Cup, but lost to 4-1 to Derby after extra time.

The Addicks made amends when they reached the FA Cup final again in 1947. This time they beat Burnley 1-0, Chris Duffy scoring the only goal but 10 years later they found themselves back in the Second Division.

From the late 1950s until the early 1970s, Charlton remained a mainstay of the Second Division before relegation to the Third Division in 1972 caused the team's support to drop, and even a promotion in 1975 back to the Second Division did little to reinvigorate the team's support and finances. In 1979/80 Charlton were relegated again to the Third Division, but won immediate promotion back to the Second Division in 1980-81.

They were forced to leave the Valley just after the start of the 1985/86 season after its safety was criticised by Football League officials. The club began to groundshare with Crystal Palace at Selhurst Park.

Despite the move away from the Valley, Charlton were promoted to the First Division as

Second Division runners-up at the end of 1985/86 and remained at this level for four years (achieving a highest league finish of 14th).

Eventually, however, the Addicks fell to relegation in 1990 but in 1995, new chairman Richard Murray appointed Alan Curbishley as manager. Under his sole leadership, the Addicks made an appearance in the Play-Offs in 1996 but were eliminated by Crystal Palace in the semi-finals.

They reached the Division One Play-Off final and battled against Sunderland in a thrilling game which ended with a 4-4 draw after extra time. Charlton won 7-6 on penalties and were promoted to the Premier League.

The Addicks only lasted one season in the top flight but bounced back the following season when winning the Division One title in 2000.

The 2003/04 season saw them finish in 7th place which is still the club's highest finish since the 1950s.

However, Curbishley left and Iain Dowie was appointed in 2006. Former Hatter Dowie's reign was brief and he was sacked after 12 matches in November 2006 before Lee Reed took over, only to suffer the same fate and was dismissed on Christmas Eve.

Reed was replaced by former player Alan Pardew and although results did improve, Pardew was unable to keep Charlton up and relegation was confirmed in the penultimate match of the season.

In their first season back in the second tier the Addicks finished 11th and after Pardew left in November of 2008, Phil Parkinson took over. However another relegation followed as Parkinson could not save them slipping into League 1 for the first time in 29 years.

Last season, after spending almost the entire season in the top six of League 1, Charlton were defeated on penalties to Swindon Town in the Play-Off semifinal, second leg.



## MEET THE MANAGER:

### PHIL PARKINSON

Phil Parkinson was initially installed as caretaker boss following the departure of Alan Pardew in November 2008.

After eight games in temporary charge, he was named Charlton's 19th permanent manager on the final day of 2008, and although he was unable to stave off relegation, the Addicks lost just one of their final eight games that term.

Back in May 2006, Parkinson's former club, Colchester United, denied him permission to talk to Charlton as a potential replacement for Alan Curbishley, and the Chorley-born 42-year-old instead moved to Hull City.

After a short spell at the KC Stadium, he was appointed in January 2007 as assistant to Pardew, whom he played under during a glittering career at Reading. He made 424 appearances and was voted the best central midfielder in the club's history by fans.

He gained UEFA's highest coaching qualification, the Pro Licence, two years after taking charge of Colchester in February 2003, leading the U's to the Championship three seasons later.

A former Southampton trainee, Parkinson's professional breakthrough came at Bury, where he made 169 league and cup appearances.



After seeing his side held to a 2-2 Charlton boss Phil Parkinson was full of praise for the Hatters.

He watched on as his side were pegged back twice, by a team two divisions below them but it didn't come as a surprise.

"We knew it would be a difficult game. The top teams in the Conference are better than a lot of teams in League 2," Parkinson said afterwards.

"I thought in the first half, it was a 'you attack, we attack' type of game. The shape of our team was too loose, but in the second half, we were tighter and the two banks of four were a lot more solid."

"We gave Luton too many chances in the first half. In the second half, we did better. All the good results and good performances have been built on a good shape but we were a bit loose in the first half."

Andy Drury understandably stole all the headlines as he set up the replay with a brace and he was also the talk of the Addicks dressing room.

"We got in some good positions to score the third goal but they've scored a fantastic goal to earn a replay. Credit to him [Drury], it was a terrific goal."

"He was a player we highlighted as their key player," revealed Parkinson.

"He normally plays out wide and his goal was top drawer. Not something you'd expect from someone playing in the Conference."


He's certainly got ability, but the difference between the leagues isn't as big as people think.

"It was a great strike and worthy of getting a replay," added Johnnie Jackson, who was on the scoresheet himself.

"They had a lot of possession but we generally limited them to long shots; unfortunately, he stuck one in the top corner."

You have to give credit to their lad, he scored a blinder from about 30 yards and sometimes you can't do anything about those.

"They came out in the first half and had a real go at us, and perhaps we were fortunate to be 2-1 up at half-time, but we thought we would see it through."

### PARKINSON PRAISES HATTERS' DISPLAY

"Charlton, like Luton, haven't played since the first meeting, with the weather putting pay to their trip to Rochdale but Parkinson is hoping the rest can help his battle weary squad."

"We had a lot of key players missing, but we'll

go to Luton with a stronger starting XI and a stronger bench and we look forward to it."

"Neither team needed another game, but we've got one and we have to go to Luton and get ourselves into the next round."

## Jonathan Fortune

The central defender, who made 195 Charlton appearances from 2001-09, rejoined the club in the summer, after leaving Sheffield United in the summer.

He made his first debut in August 2001, when he featured against Everton in the Premiership, after coming through the ranks at the Valley. His second debut came against the MK Dons in September and he has made nine further appearances.

## Matt Fry

Versatile defender Fry signed on for a second loan spell at The Valley just 48 hours before the start of the season. The West Ham United defender's spell, last season, was curtailed by injury and he failed to make a first team appearance. He missed the first match with the Hatters due to suspension.

Highly-rated youth product Elliott signed a new contract last September to keep him at his boyhood club until 2012.

Elliott watched from the Covered End as a six-year-old when Colin Walsh crowned the return to The Valley in 1992, and was one of the few success stories of 2008/09, when he was chosen by fans as the runner-up to Nicky Bailey in that season's player of the year award.

Since making his debut in April 2008, Elliott has amassed 62 first-team appearances for the Addicks.

## DEFENDERS

### Simon Francis

The left-back, who signed a two-year deal in the summer, cost an initial £35,000 from Southend United, where he was named the Shrimpers' player of the year last term.

The fee could rise to £75,000 and the deal was completed not long after he had turned down a reported £150,000 move to Brentford. He became the club's second summer acquisition from Roots Hall, following in the footsteps of Alan McCormack.

### Miguel Llera

Spanish centre-back Llera arrived on a free transfer from Milton Keynes Dons in June 2009. Strong in the air with a fine left foot, Llera's raking cross field passes were a big

## Johnnie Jackson

The versatile left-footer returned to the club in early July, after enjoying a spell on loan at the Valley last season.


The 28-year-old, who can operate at left-back, left midfield or in the middle of the park played four games for the Addicks before tearing his hamstring against Stockport County in early March and returning to parent club Notts County. He previously played for Phil Parkinson at Colchester United.

## Alan McCormack

The midfielder arrived at the Valley in the summer after leaving cash-strapped Southend United. The Irishman, who came through the ranks at Preston North End has an eye for a pass, and can also net from the middle of the park

## Joe Anyinsah

Attacking midfielder Anyinsah, joined the club on the same day as Paul Benson back in August. He was a free agent after leaving Carlisle United in the summer, to move closer to his


## Kyle Reid

The pacey winger also joined from Sheffield United in the summer, after enjoying a loan spell at the Valley last season. Loan star Reid became Charlton's fourth signing of the summer in July.

He bagged four goals in 18 appearances for the Addicks last term, and Charlton never suffered defeat when he found the net. One dramatic late winner against Southend United in late February was particularly memorable, and of his eight career goals, three have come against the Shrimpers.

## Terry Racon

Engine-roomer Racon signed for the Addicks in August 2007 from Guingamp. He began his career with Marseille, but played just one match for the French giants, departing for Lorient on loan and then Guingamp.

Racon has also attended a Guadeloupe training camp, but has yet to feature in an international match for the Caribbean French colony.

## Scott Wagstaff

2009/10 proved a real breakthrough campaign for hard-working wideman Wagstaff, who was named the club's young player of the year for a second time.

The Kent-based 20-year-old, who signed a new one-year contract at the club in July, featured in every squad in all competitions last term and is closing in on 50 appearances.

## STRIKERS

### Paul Benson

Charlton completed the signing of Dagenham & Redbridge striker Paul Benson for an undisclosed fee back in August and his debut came a day later against his former club.

Benson joined the Daggers in July 2005 after

being spotted playing for Essex non-league outfit White Erinsign, for whom he scored 96 goals in two seasons. In total, including FA Trophy matches, Benson notched 84 goals in 201 games for John Still's side.

## Akpo Sodje

Having spent two spells on loan with the Addicks last season, Sodje signed a permanent deal with the club on the eve of the League 1 play-off semi-final second leg against Swindon Town in May.

The 29-year-old frontman arrived on loan from Sheffield Wednesday in mid-November and his late arrival as a substitute against Milton Keynes Dons saw him join older sibling Sam in the Addicks ranks, the pair becoming the third set of brothers to play for the club in the same match.

## Pawel Abbott

The Polish Under 21 international joined from Oldham in the summer, signing for a nominal fee. He top scored for the Latics last term, netting 13 times, and his last game for the club came against Charlton in Oldham's final match of 2009/10.

Abbott, who lived in Poland from the age of 11 to 18, has represented Poland U21's six times, and netted on his debut.



## MATCH REPORT

Andy Drury's fantastic late equaliser put the Town's name in the hat for the third round draw after holding League 1 Charlton Athletic to a pulsating 2-2 draw at the Valley.

The midfielder curled a fabulous rightfoot strike from 25 yards, over Charlton goalkeeper Rob Elliott's hand to send the travelling hordes into ecstasy.

A second crack at the Addicks was no more than the Hatters deserved after taking the game to a side 49 places above them in the pyramid.

Charlton took the lead against the run of play as early as the sixth minute when Joe Anyinsah was free to head home unmarked past Mark Tyler.

Undeterred by that set back, the Hatters stormed back. Drury saw a super free-kick tipped over by Elliott before Matthew Barnes-Homer hit the post with a 25-yard drive.

On the half hour the Town were level when Amari Morgan-Smith was fouled in the box. Drury saw his spot kick saved but he was on hand to nod the rebound home.

Buoyed by that the Hatters sensed blood - Claude Gnakpa saw a goal ruled out for offside - but no sooner were they level, four minutes later they were behind again.

This time a cross from the left saw Anyinsah force a save from Tyler. The ball fell kindly to Johnnie Jackson who nodded past the goalkeeper via a deflection.

Charlton pressed after the break looking to put the tie to bed but gradually the Hatters worked their way back into the game playing some eye-catching football.

Elliott had not been overly extended but, with seven minutes left on the clock, he was beaten all ends up as the Town drew level.

Substitute Dan Walker surged through the middle of the park and found Gnakpa. He tried to beat his man but was dispossessed but the ball fell kindly to Drury who looked up and sent a first-time right-foot shot arcing over the outstretched arms of Elliott to send the away fans berserk.

After that the Hatters looked for a winner but after half-chances from George Pilkington, Barnes-Homer and Taiwo Atieno, Gnakpa thought he should have had a last gasp penalty when sent tumbling by Jackson in stoppage time.

Referee Oliver Langford waved away the visitors' claims and that proved to be the last action of a thrilling spectacle.

Morgan-Smith had gone off by the time the second equaliser came but he had an excellent view of the superb strike by Andy Drury.


"We just looked at the gaffer, and he said Drury's a good player, we all know he's a good and we were all delighted to see a goal go in.


"Towards the end it looked like we might have nicked it, so hopefully we can take it back to Kenilworth Road and turn them over.

Before the trip to Charlton another new signing spoke exclusively to Player when Charlie Henry popped into the interview room to discuss his


move from Newport County.



GARY MCSHEFFREY IS SUBMERGED BY HIS TEAMMATES AFTER NETTING AGAINST THE ADDICKS IN 2003.



With all the problems surrounding the club over the summer of 2003, Luton Town supporters were glad to merely have a football team to support.

A trip to a Premiership club in the Carling Cup was therefore seen as more of a bonus than normal and several Hatters supporters made their way to the Valley hoping for the best but fearing the worst.

In a pre-match boost it was learned that Gary McSheffrey, the Town's on-loan signing from Coventry, had been given permission to play and, after the opening exchanges which saw both sides go close, the forward weaved his way past Charlton defender Mark Fish before slotting a ball through to the overlapping Kevin Foley who netted with ease.

Two minutes later David Bayliss was on hand at the far post to head in a Matthew Spring

corner and suddenly the ecstatic Luton supporters could see a major upset on the cards.

On 40 minutes, however, a momentary lapse of concentration in the Luton defence gave Paulo Di Canio and Kevin Lisbie the chance to set up Scott Parker to bring Charlton back into the game.

The leveller then came soon after the interval when Lisbie headed home a Claus Jensen cross but the Hatters refused to lie down and when McSheffrey curled home a wonder goal with 12 minutes remaining it looked like it was going to be the Town's night after all.

With the game deep in stoppage time and the referee looking at his watch, Di Canio headed in a cruel equaliser that was timed at 93 minutes.

The breathless game now went into extra time and when Jensen fired home to put Charlton ahead for the first time, it seemed that the brave fight was over but, after finding extra stores of resolve, skipper Chris Coyne levelled the tie once more five minutes later.

Finally the referee blew the final whistle leaving the score at an incredible 4-4 with the lottery of a penalty shootout now a reality.

In common with everything that had gone on before neither side would budge an inch and the first 15 penalties all found the back of the net after Charlton had won the toss to take the first kick.

It was left to Coyne to take number 16 and he held his head in his hands as he saw Charlton goalkeeper Dean Kiely save his effort.

Following relegation after only one season in the top flight, the Town set about the 1975/76 campaign hoping to bounce straight back.

On the pitch, the future looked bright due to a promising crop of youngsters coming through some of whom had already been blooded, but off it the spectre of financial disaster loomed large.

For one thing, most of the players were still on lucrative Division One contracts and for another attendances were bound to drop in

Division Two.

The Hatters started the season brightly but from the heady heights of sixth spot after four games only one win was recorded in the next ten League outings which naturally set the alarm bells ringing.

Injuries to the influential John Aston and Alan West did not help the Town's cause, but rumours of severe financial problems behind the scenes evidently began to prey on the players' minds. There is no smoke without fire, it is said, and certainly there was plenty of

smoke billowing about, as tongues wagged about the cash crisis at Kenilworth Road.

Evidence was not hard to find. Manager Harry Haslam was refused permission to sign the ex-Celtic and Scotland winger Jimmy Johnstone on a free transfer due to the size of the players signing on fee.

Four directors, including Eric Morecombe, resigned and talk of the electricity being cut off at Kenilworth Road spread like wildfire.

It therefore came as a bit of a relief when

everything came out into the open, although the news that the club would go into liquidation unless a large amount of capital was raised within 28 days was extremely worrying.

Behind the scenes a deal had been arranged to sell prize asset, midfielder Peter Anderson, to Antwerp but the press bombshell scuppered the deal.

A fee of £105,000 had been agreed but that figure halved at a stroke and there was still no certainty that the transfer would go through as a delegation of Antwerp officials watched the Town's next game - an away fixture at Charlton.

Charlton had gone four games without a win and with few Luton supporters in attendance it was hardly surprising that the crowd of 8,703 spread around the vast bowl of the Valley was the second lowest of the season at that point.

The Addicks started off the stronger side and it came as little surprise when Mike Flanagan headed home Keith Peacock's cleverly flighted free-kick after only eight minutes.

That was as good as it got for Charlton with the Town gradually forcing their way back into the game leading to Anderson equalising on 38 minutes.

No one in the ground could have predicted the Town's dramatic second half assault on the Charlton goal which began in the 57th minute when Alan West crossed to the far post, Andy King headed against the bar and Jimmy Husband dived full length to nod in the rebound.

Two minutes later, winger John Aston broke on the left and crossed for Husband to head past Graham Tutt in the Charlton goal.

The Addicks goalkeeper was beaten again 60 seconds later when Brian Chambers crashed the ball into the net from full-back Steve Buckley's cross.

Charlton's defence was now embarrassingly exposed and 12 minutes later West cruised through the middle and switched the ball left to Anderson who coolly scored in the corner of the net.

Happily, the Antwerp officials were satisfied with Anderson's display and paid £55,000 for the midfielder which was enough to save the club at the 11th hour.

The thought that Anderson could have had a stinker at Charlton did not bear thinking about!
