



MONEY TALK

Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for the first time in two weeks as we entertain Uxbridge in the FA Trophy.

I would like to welcome Tony Choules, his players, staff and the directors and the supporters of Uxbridge.

We know that Tony will have prepared his squad to give us a test this afternoon and will no doubt be asking his players to put on a show to make their club proud. We never take any opposition lightly and we certainly won't be doing that this afternoon.

The FA Trophy is a massive competition and that is underlined by the fact the final is played at Wembley.

We all know how much of a tradition this club has in cup competitions and we will make sure that continues this afternoon.

Today is our first home match since our 3-0 victory over Rushden & Diamonds on New Years Day.

On that day I was pleased with the performance in patches in what was our first match for almost a month. It was crucial that we scored a goal just before halftime and our second half performance was fantastic and highlighted by a further two goals.

Rushden are a good team and will no doubt still harbour hopes of a Play-Off place come the end of the season so to beat them convincingly was extremely pleasing and set us up nicely for the trip to Hayes & Yeading three days later.

That game was a totally different one from what we encountered against Rushden. Hayes set us a problem in the first half which we struggled to get to grips with.

However after we spoke to the players at half-time we reassessed and came out all guns blazing and were duly rewarded when Claude struck with 15 minutes left.

I've said it many times before, it takes all different types of performances to win the league and the three points we earned at Church Road could prove crucial come the end of the season.

You have to keep going some days and that game was one of those times, so it is a great three points.

I thought some of our approach play at times was patient on the night. We switched the play, we kept the ball and then we waited for the right moment to make the opportunities and thankfully we took one.

Unfortunately we couldn't find a goal at Bath last weekend in what I thought was an excellent performances.

We hit the woodwork twice and created half a dozen good chances to win the game.

I thought Bath were outstanding. They worked their socks off to keep us at bay. It's not unusual that we come up against teams inspired with goalkeepers enjoying man-of-the-match performances but we had enough chances to win two or three games but it wasn't to be.

Wednesday's draw at league leaders AFC Wimbledon was an incredibly frustrating 90 minutes.

On the plus side it was fourth consecutive clean sheet but as I said afterwards you've got to score goals to win games.

However to hit the woodwork twice for the second game running is exasperating for all involved but at the end of the day, to take four points off the current league leaders, is a good return in anyone's book.

But if we had came off the pitch as two or three-nil winners I think that would have been a true reflection of the game.

I know a lot of people will be frustrated we haven't won the last two games because of how close it is at the top of the table but we are still confident of delivering success this season.


Please stay with the group. The players are in good form and we believe we're playing well.

It's interesting how officials and players from other clubs nearly always mention our terrific support when they are talking about Luton Town. Don't ever underestimate your influence!

Earlier this week, I was proud to represent the club at the funeral in Rugby of our old centre-half and captain Terry Branston. I sat in the church with our club historian Roger Wash and Terry's stalwart defensive partner John Moore.

Many of you will remember Terry with huge affection. He came to us as our new captain in the summer of 1967 after the club had suffered years of decline and led us to two promotions in three years. He was an absolute inspiration - I can see him now, eyes bulging, fists pumping, urging the players on and leading us through a fabulously exciting title winning season in Division Four.

The heyday of Bruce Rioch, Alan Slough, Keith Allen, Ray Whittaker, Graham French, amongst others, and, of course, John Moore. Terrific times to be a fan - I remember travelling all over the country as a student and simply loving the rebirth of our football club.

Terry was diagnosed with cancer in October, a terrible shock to his family, and he was gone shortly before Christmas. He was a considerable figure in his hometown - he'd lived there all his life, he'd been a pillar of his local cricket team, for whom he scored 22,000 runs and still helped out with coaching, and he ran his own driving school.

The funeral service was packed out. An estimated four hundred-plus in the church, with scores of people having to stand. Farewell, Terry, and thanks for all you did for our beloved football club.

So, back to today. Here's hoping we can progress in the FA Trophy and see those goals crashing in again.

Enjoy the game, bye for now.



CAPTAIN SPEAKING

Welcome back to Kenilworth Road to you all for this FA Trophy second round tie with Uxbridge.

We know that Uxbridge, despite being three leagues below us in the football pyramid, will fancy their chances of causing an upset this afternoon and we have to guard against complacency.

This competition gives all non-league clubs the opportunity to get to Wembley. A number of us in the squad already know what it's like to appear in front of 40,000 of you at the national stadium and - believe me - as players it's something we'd all like to do again.

However this season's number one priority is success in the league and since we were last at Kenilworth Road we have continued our fine performances on the road but, frustratingly, we could not turn encouraging performances at Bath and AFC Wimbledon into three points.

Many teams will look at a point at both of those venues as good ones and, although we are grateful for the two points won in the past two games, we feel as though we should have taken maximum points from both trips.

We started the New Year in fine style with an excellent victory over Rushden and Diamonds on a day when the breakthrough before half-time rewarded us for our enterprise in an open first half. Our performance in the second half was even better.

A narrow win at Hayes and Yeading followed the Tuesday afterwards when we needed to be alert to keep out a lively first-half showing from the home side.

A few words of wisdom at the interval set up our second half performance and that enabled us to record three vital points in our quest for promotion from this division.

Last Saturday at Bath we were up against a side that have surprised a lot of teams so far this season and have done well to establish themselves in mid-table following their promotion last season.

We were all left scratching our heads come the final whistle as to how we didn't manage to break the deadlock and were frustrated to see two efforts of ours denied by the post and crossbar.

We created a number of chances but we just couldn't bag that all important goal. I'm sure the point earned will turn out to be an important one come the end of the season and I'm equally confident a number of other sides will find it difficult to succeed at Twerton Park.

There was even more head scratching on Wednesday night when our fantastic second half display at AFC Wimbledon only earned one point.

Once again we were thwarted by another inspired goalkeeping performance - we seem to be coming up against those most weeks - but what fills us with confidence is the fact we're creating chances - and lots of them. I firmly believe our luck will change soon.

Goalkeepers and defenders are usually the first to earn the plaudits but this is a team game and defending starts from the front.

Let's hope it continues this afternoon and for the foreseeable future - now that would be a record worth shouting about!

MICHAEL HOWE


The older brother of midfielder Tommy, Michael is a defender who previously played for Hayes Gate in the Middlesex County League last season.

MARK SMITH



SAM KANANI



LEGEND MOURNED

● TERRY BRANSTON. 25TH JULY 1938 - 22ND DECEMBER 2010

Everyone at Kenilworth Road was saddened to learn of the death of former captain Terry Branston after a short illness on 22nd December.

If one player was instrumental in winning the old Division Four championship for the Hatters in 1968 it was skipper Branston.

Signed on a free transfer from Northampton, for whom he had given sterling service, by manager Allan Brown, he was brought to Luton for his leadership qualities but ended up giving far more.

Terry started off playing local youth football in his home town of Rugby and was recommended to Northampton Town who he signed for in October 1958.

Joining Northampton at this time was the best thing that could have happened to Terry as the team embarked on a roll that was to take it from the Fourth Division to the First by 1965, the most successful period in the club's history.

Terry made his League debut for the Cobblers in October 1960, as a 22-year-old in a 3-3 draw at newly elected Peterborough and by the end of that season had become a regular in the side that won promotion from the old Division Four.

He missed only three games over the next three seasons during which time he played against the Hatters for the only time, a League Cup tie at Kenilworth Road, and saw the Cobblers move up to Division Two. Northampton won promotion to the top flight in 1965 with Terry retaining his place in the heart of the defence but unfortunately the stay was brief and by 1967 successive relegations saw the Cobblers back in Division Three.

Northampton decided to give him a free transfer in the summer of 1967 and their loss



was Luton's gain as Hatter's manager Allan Brown saw Terry as the ideal captain to lead his new look side out of Division Four and back to the top.

Making his debut for the Town in an ill-tempered 1-1 draw at Wrexham in August 1967 Terry was ever present in that record breaking campaign and as well as marshalling and bullying his fellow defenders he found time to weigh in with five vital goals, most of which were unstoppable headers from flag kicks.

In 1969 Chris Nicholl was bought from Halifax Town for the massive sum, by Luton standards, of £35,000 to replace Terry but by the end of the season, when promotion hopes were slipping away, the 'skipper' was recalled to steady the ship and ensure the rise in status.

Unfortunately, Terry's Division Two career with the Town was short-lived as we were thrashed 2-4 at Bolton on the opening day of the

1970/71 season and a month later he was transferred to Lincoln for £5,000 where he became a team-mate of a young Graham Taylor.


When the Imps came to choose a new manager, the Board was split and the casting vote went to Taylor in preference to Terry who did not even apply for the job. Who knows what might have been!

After leaving Lincoln, Terry turned out for Nuneaton Borough, Enderby, VS. Rugby as player/manager before finishing his playing career with A.E.I. Rugby where it had all started.

Terry still lived in Rugby where he ran a driving school for many years and was a fairly regular visitor to Kenilworth Road.

Chairman Nick Owen and Honorary Life Vice President John Buttle were both present on the Club's behalf at Terry's funeral.

This game, the first of the new decade, produced a performance by the Hatters which was typical of the cavalier style of play encouraged by David Pleat – although the bone hard pitch was only passed fit by the referee after a great deal of deliberation.

A crowd of 19,717 did turn up to see a goal feast played out between two committed sides that were out to entertain.

Chelsea opened the scoring with Mick Fillary's 20-yard drive but Mal Donagh, playing in midfield in place of the injured Tony Greasham, smacked in a goal off the underside of the bar – his first league goal for the Hatters.

Mike Saxby headed the Town ahead a minute

from the interval and 35 seconds later a Ricky Hill effort from outside the area was ruled out when the linesman flagged to indicate Bob Hatton had strayed offside.

Ian Britton equalised for the Blues soon after the restart and it was then Chelsea's turn to take the upper hand when they were awarded a penalty for handball. Furious protests then encouraged the referee to consult his linesman who had signalled for a throw-in before the penalty incident took place. The spotkick was then overturned.

A rare header from David Moss, when he got on the end of a long throw from Paul Price, put the Town in the driving seat once more only for

Clive Walker to run through the Luton defence to make it 3-3.

The breathless game ended with Donagh heading against the bar in the final minute, but a draw was not deemed a fair result by the exhilarated crowd who felt that the Town had dropped a point they could ill afford to lose.

Following the Town's relegation from the old Division One in 1992, supporters looked forward to a spell of success after four years of struggle and last minute Houdini acts.

During the summer of 1992 the Hatters were forced to part with Mark Pembridge who was snapped up by big spending Derby County for £1.25 million, but the fans were savouring the thought that fit again Phil Gray would be able to link up with new boy Steve Claridge and crowd favourite Mick Harford.

Unfortunately, before a ball had been kicked in anger, Harford was transferred to Chelsea and suddenly the Town's attack looked decidedly lightweight and lacking in height.

"It is a chance for the youngsters to show me what they can do," said manager David Pleat as he threw in young Jamie Campbell for the opening day trip to Leicester.

Although Campbell scored his first senior goal for the club, an injury time winner for the Foxes meant a disappointing start to the season and, if the supporters had only known it at the time, set a pattern that was going to take some time to change.

The Town's home record during the 1991/92 relegation season from the top flight had not been too bad and the fans thought teams like Bristol City would only be turning up at Kenilworth Road to make up the numbers.

It was therefore a rude awakening to the harsh facts of life in the new Division One in our first home game of the campaign.

Andy Cole was unstoppable that afternoon and had a hand in all the City goals in a 3-0 trouncing. It was then realised that we were about to be in for a major struggle at the wrong end of the table again, rather than make a glorious and immediate bid for promotion back to the top flight.

A first point of the season was secured in a 0-0 draw against Charlton at Upton Park, but were soon back to losing ways when we went down 2-0 at St James' Park against an emerging Newcastle side.

Tranmere were the next visitors to Kenilworth Road and they returned to Merseyside with a point following an entertaining 3-3 draw, but as the first league tables were being produced it slowly sank in that the Town were second bottom.

The next game, away at Brentford, was switched to a Sunday as it was scheduled to be televised. The TV company, however, changed its mind leaving the Luton supporters to watch the Saturday results roll in as their team moved to bottom spot.

It seemed strange to be playing on a Sunday without the television cameras, but after 29 away games since the Town's last away victory, stretching back to March 1991, a 2-1 victory was recorded and with it a move in several places up the table.

A last minute penalty, tucked away by Claridge, won a further point the following week as Birmingham came to Kenilworth Road, but that still left the Town looking for that elusive first home victory, a sequence that was extended further when Plymouth drew here 2-2 in a Rumbolds Cup tie.

Both Marvin Johnson and Trevor Peake were lost due to long-term injuries against the West Country side, with the result that Damian Matthew was signed on-loan from Chelsea in a

bid to strengthen our rearguard. He made his debut in a dour 0-0 draw at Notts County which, surprisingly, lengthened the unbeaten run to five games.

Just as the supporters thought the Town were slowly turning the corner, Portsmouth came to Kenilworth Road and won 4-1 in farcical conditions. On a waterlogged pitch and in driving rain, the strength and power of the Pompey side, and Guy Whittingham in particular, shone through and the Hatters were down with the strugglers again.

A 3-2 defeat at Plymouth to go out of the league cup was followed by a 3-0 loss at bottom placed Barnsley, with all the goals coming in the first half.

Pembridge returned to Kenilworth Road the following week and helped his Derby side to a 3-1 win, hammering another nail in the coffin to leave the supporters wondering what had gone wrong.

Given this terrible form it was very surprising that a great many Luton supporters made their way to Peterborough the next Saturday for only our third trip to London Road for league points.

After early Posh pressure the Hatters took the lead when David Preece fed Gray who lobbed Ian Bennett in the Peterborough goal from 30

yards. Posh hit back and equalised soon after with Gary Cooper hitting home a free-kick, awarded rather harshly against Darren Salton who everyone felt was the victim rather than the culprit.


Back came the Town and regained the lead with a strange goal. Paul Telfer, making his return to the side after a long absence with a broken foot, headed a Preece cross towards goal. The ball hit a defender, then the post and cannoned into the net off the back of Bennett's head.

Things got even better shortly before the interval when Gray headed home a Claridge cross, and when the halftime whistle blew, the players went off to a standing ovation from the relieved Town contingent.

Peterborough staged the expected second half onslaught, but the Luton defence stood firm until the 70th minute when Tony Adcock headed home after Hatters goalkeeper Andy Petterson pushed a Tony Phillips effort against the bar.

Petterson made another great save from future Town player Adcock just before the end, but after riding their luck the Town ended up with three points.

MATCH REPORT

The Town returned to action with a bang to secure their sixth win in seven matches in the Blue Square Bet Premier with a fine New Year's Day victory over Rushden & Diamonds.

It was a brace in a seven-minute spell either side of the break from Matthew Barnes-Homer, who took his tally to the season to 13 in doing so, that put them in the driving seat.

Drury was the architect, bringing the ball down and spraying an accurate ball forward into the path of the front man. He took a touch to beat one defender and a second to beat another before swivelling to hammer a low left-foot shot past Day.

By now the Town were well in command restricting the visitors to efforts from range and with 15 minutes left on the clock Gnaka got the goal his performance deserved to completely put the game beyond the Diamonds' reach.

Barnes-Homer poked the ball through looking for Crow but the former Cambridge man was standing in an offside position and he intelligently left it for the Frenchman. With only one thing in his mind he dropped a shoulder, worked the ball onto his left foot and rolled an accurate leftfoot shot beyond the outstretched hand of Day.
