MONEY TALK

Good afternoon and welcome to Kerelworth Road for the today's important game against York City in the Blue Square Bet Premier.

I'd like to extend a warm welcome to Gary Mills, his staff and players, plus the directors and supporters of York to Bedfordshire for this early kickoff.

Gary has done an excellent job in the short time he's been in the hot seat at Bootham Crescent and their rise up the table is no surprise. They are winning games and not conceding many goals. To say today's game will be tough one is an understatement.

This afternoon we resume league action for the first time since 20th November when we beat Histon. Since then we have had two fixtures postponed and taken part in four cup ties.

It means we will need to rearrange fixtures for later in the season and that is where our squad will really come into its own - we could be in a situation like we were last year where we're playing two games a week.

Having played four successive cup ties in two different competitions it will be a welcome return to playing league football. It's a huge cliché but this is our bread and butter and our absolute main priority.

The Christmas and New Year period is one of the most crucial times for any club and of course ours are no exception. After today's game against a side who pipped us in the semi-finals of the Play Offs last season, we have two games against Bredon & Diamonds - themselves Play Off semi-finalists last season - and Tamworth, who have already beaten us earlier in the campaign.

It is absolutely vital that we maintain the current level of performance that we have seen over the past few months during this time, if we are to maintain our strong position in the league table.

Our win over Histon was achieved in some style and that put us in good stead for the trip to Charlton in which the players were magnificent to earn a replay following a superb 2-2 draw at the Valley.

In the replay here I was hugely frustrated to lose the game in the manner in which we did because on the balance of play - not just on that night but over the two games against Phil Parkinson's side - I thought we deserved to go through.

I firmly believe the best team lost and whilst it was disappointing for everyone to miss out on a third round tie at Tottenham we can hold our heads high, knowing we put a side likely to be playing Championship football next season through two lots of demanding 90 minutes of football.

Without wanting to sound like sour grapes their final two goals, both deflections, perhaps summed up our night. Sometimes you know when things like that happen it isn't going to be your night. But we move on and we wish Charlton well in the next round of the competition.

After two consecutive games against Charlton we had two successive ties against Welling United in the FA Trophy.

I said in the leadup to the first game last Sunday that the competition would be the ideal stepping stone for our young players to get some match experience and over the two

matches I could not be more delighted with the way they conducted themselves.


Alex Lacey, Cauley Woodrow, Newman Carney, JJ O'Donnell, Jordan Patrick, Godfrey Poku and Dan Walker were excellent and their performances over the two games will give us another chance to look at them again when we play Uxbridge in the next round come January.

We don't want to take any competition or opposition lightly; we feel our young players are more than match for anyone and the result in the replay at Welling on Tuesday was fantastic given we went a goal down. As I said after both games, it would have been a tough game for our full first team to get a result from.

Your support in all the games recently, given the cold weather especially, has been fantastic. Please keep it up today.

As this afternoon is our last home game before Christmas I'd like to take the opportunity to wish you all and your families a very Merry Christmas and look forward to seeing you all back here against Tamworth.

So a warm welcome today to their players, directors and supporters and let's hope the memories from today will be of a cracking football match - something we've come to expect here at Kenilworth Road, not least last week when we played Charlton Athletic in the FA Cup.

I thought our performance in the first half was sensational. The front runners from League 1 had no answer to our pace and flair, even though they'd already seen it some 11 days earlier at the Valley.

Both acknowledged how tough it had been for them and Gary told me that, if Charlton had to go out of the competition, he'd have preferred it to be against Luton Town!

Two guys there who are outstanding examples of how Luton Town brings youngsters through the ranks to play at the highest level.

We also saw a number of our younger players in the home FA Trophy match against Welling on Sunday. I know it was frustrating, I know we had enough chances to thrash them, but we dominated from start to finish and we saw genuine flashes of the talents coming through.

I couldn't get to the replay, but it was obviously tough going at Park View Road and we looked beaten until our two new(ish) boys, Jason Walker and Alex Lawless broke Welling hearts with goals in the 82nd and 93rd minutes. Well done to

them for not giving up. Next up in the FA Trophy it's Uxbridge at home in January.


Someone we're still waiting to see on the field is Charlie Henry who joined us at the end of November from Newport County.

It's good to be back playing a game in the league after four successive cup fixtures and what an exciting game it promises to be this afternoon.

York have gone through a managerial change this season with the appointment of Gary Mills who has already masterminded a victory over us whilst in charge of Tamworth this season.

Of course we have disappointing memories facing York when they edged us out of the Play-Offs last season when they won both legs to progress to Wembley.

They won't want to be reminded of the disappointment they had to contend with in the wake of the Promotion final defeat to Oxford and with that in mind, we need to be wary of the threat they will pose us.

After four meetings last season we know plenty about their personnel but luckily for us we have a little bit of inside knowledge from Alex Lawless on the way they are playing under their new manager. Their results have steadily improved of late which was highlighted by the fact Gary took manager of the month and and goalkeeper Michael Ingham took the player of the month prize recently.

After the two games against Charlton we had two cup ties against Welling United in which a very young squad did the club proud by earning a place in the next round of the FA Trophy.

I was very impressed with the way our young players performed in both ties against a side that are flying high in the league below us.

Having personally already featured in three matches against Corby and St Albans - two teams from the same level as Welling - I must commend all the players on getting

through to the next round.



INTRODUCING YORK CITY

HISTORY

After being founded in 1922 York joined the Football League seven years later, there they remained until the Minstermen finally lost their status as a League club following relegation from League 2 in 2003/04.

After a 17th place finish in their first season in the Conference they missed out on the Play-Offs by three places in 2005/06.

The following season, however, the Minstermen did make the end-of-season lottery but lost at the semi-final stage to Morecambe, who went onto win promotion themselves.

In 2007/08 City failed to replicate the form of the previous campaign and ended up marooned in mid-table, eventually finishing 14th.

The following season saw another frustrating league campaign in the Conference for the Bootham Crescent faithful when they finished in 17th place, narrowly avoiding the drop with a late resurgence in form, towards the tail end of the season, helping them survive.

A rather disappointing start was made to the 2009/10 season with just one win in the opening five games but an unbeaten run of nine matches lifted City into the top five. A club record of eight successive league wins sent Play-Off hopes soaring but a lean spell in February of two draws and four defeats caused them to slip to sixth.

The Minstermen got back on track with a vital win at Mansfield Town and in the closing weeks secured their top five position. Convincing victories in the final run in included a 50 home crushing of AFC Wimbledon and 40 at Grays Athletic.

The Hatters were beaten twice in the Play-Off semi-final by York, only for the club to fall at the final hurdle against Oxford in the Promotion Final.

The Hatters failed in their bid to regain their Football League status at the first attempt as City snatched a goal two minutes after the break to win a 2-0 aggregate victory in this Play-Off

semi-final second leg. Tom Craddock had the first sniff for the Town on 14 minutes, snatching at a shot which went wide of the post after Simon Heslop had picked him out with a lovely pass on the edge of the area.

On 22 minutes the Hatters should have levelled the aggregate score when Claude Gnakpa beat David McGurk to the ball on the edge of the penalty with the ball dropping kindly for Kevin Galen who saw a shot well saved by Michael Ingham.

A half-chance from a header from Gnakpa got the crowd off their feet on 31 minutes and 10 minutes later a fine passing move around the York penalty area saw Jake Howells drive a dangerous cross goalwards that was eventually cleared.

York responded in first half stoppage time, again through Brodie. This time the BPS's top striker did brilliantly to twist and turn past Freddie Murray and Shane Blackett to blast a shot straight at Tyler.

Goalless at the interval it may have been, but two minutes after the restart Hatters hearts sunk to new depths as York doubled their aggregate advantage.

Winning a free-kick on the edge of the 18 yard box, Rankine stepped up and arrowed a fierce free-kick that whistled through the Town's wall. The ball bounced off Tyler, running free to the quickest man to it.

Unfortunately for the Hatters that man was Carruthers. The blond haired left-footer had the simple task of poking the loose ball home to send the 1,400 supporters from Yorkshire into ecstasy.

The Hatters huffed and puffed but couldn't find an equaliser despite decent opportunity for Craddock and Asa Hall and it was City who were celebrating reaching the Promotion Final.

MEET THE MANAGER:

GARY MILLS

Appointed manager in succession to Martin Foyle in mid-October 2010, Gary had a distinguished playing career and as an 18-year-old played in the 1980 European Cup final for Nottingham Forest when they beat SV Hamburg to lift the trophy.

A midfielder he was capped for England at Under-21 level and went on to play for Derby County, Notts County and Leicester City as well as a spell in the USA with Seattle Sounders. In total he made 477 Football League appearances - 37 goals (1978-1995).

His first managerial appointment was with Grantham whom he led to the Southern League (Midland) title in 1998.

He then moved to Kings Lynn before joining Tamworth for his first spell as manager of the Lambs in 2001. A period as first-team coach at Coventry City followed before his appointment as boss of Notts County in 2004 and then after managing Alfreton Town he returned to Tamworth in January 2007.

He was unable to save the club from relegation from the Conference Premier that season but in 2009 he guided the Lambs back to the top tier of non-league football when they were Blue Square North Champions.



With seven wins from their first 10 home games of the season very few clubs have been able to leave Kenilworth Road having taken points off the Hatters this term.

Taking out the unlucky defeat at the hands of Charlton Athletic in the FA Cup and the last gasp loss inflicted by Crawley and you have to go back to York's victory in the Play-Offs for the last time Luton players will really feel they were beaten on their own patch.

The Minstermen arrive for the first time since that day with the experience still fresh in their minds and, led by new boss Gary Mills - who has already masterminded one victory over the Town this season in his previous role at Tamworth - the game is nicely set up for both teams.

Of course there are still only three points available for this afternoon's victors but both camps this week have identified that the game does have a bit of extra spice to it - but for all the right reasons.

Speaking in the build-up to the match, Mills told the Press: "They will be out for some revenge after the Play-Off defeat and we have to make sure they don't get it."


"That's what the game is about as long as the battle. I put my team out to play with the passion, commitment and desire needed to win a game of football and, with our ability, I think we can get a result there."

The Hatters have suffered just five defeats on home soil in all competitions in the whole of 2010 but Mills sees no reason why can't repeat his success from August, when Tamworth became the first team to beat Richard Money's team, when winning at the Lamb.

"They are a big club with a big fan base who should be the title favourites in this division," added the former Leicester City man.

"But I've already beaten them 3-1 with Tamworth this season and deservedly so. I want to beat them 3-1 again and I think we can do."

"It's not daunting going to Kenilworth Road. They are not going to be any better than Rotherham and we've got to go to Luton with the same attitude and level of organisation we had when we went there."




Greg Young

He joined the club in September after two seasons at Bury, where he made 49 appearances, including 42 in League 2. He started his career at Huddersfield Town and made six substitute appearances.


Neil Barrett

Charlton boss Phil Parkinson threw on striker Pavel Abbott and that change gave the visitors a new dimension and on 66 minutes they took the lead to complete the turnaround when Joe Anyinsah touched home a low drive from Matt Fry to put them ahead for the first time on the night.

Still the Town saw plenty of the ball but the sucker punch arrived with 10 minutes to go when Johnnie Jackson saw his free kick, from the edge of the area, take a huge deflection and the ball landed up unfortunately in the back of Mark Tyler's net.

The Hatters huffed and puffed in search of a reply but Elliott wasn't seriously tested and come the final whistle it was the Londoners celebrating victory and a trip to White Hart Lane.

POST-MATCH REACTION

Luton's participation in this season's FA Cup may be over but over the two games against Charlton they proved there was little to pick between them and the League 1 side.

There was plenty of disappointment at missing out on a trip to White Hart Lane but also plenty of positives to take as they look to continue their push for promotion.

Midfielder Keith Keane has played in plenty of cup games at Luton but was hoping for at least one more.

"It's always disappointing to lose when you have played so well, but you have just got to take it on the chin and get on with the next game," he told Hatters Player afterwards.

"We went 1-0 up, playing really well and we were full of confidence especially after what happened in the first game. I thought we gave a good performance we were just unlucky on the night.

"It doesn't matter who you play even if it was a team like Man United you want them to only score good goals against you.

"Personally I couldn't really see them scoring because I thought we defended really well and were playing well, but they just got two lucky deflections and you know that's just what happens sometimes."



Keane has played as high as the Championship with Luton, as recently as 2007 and he admits he enjoyed the chance to pit his wits against a team of the quality of Charlton.

"Sometimes you start thinking am I good enough to play in League 1 again and that's why you like to test yourself against better teams or supposedly better teams and I think we more than held our own.

"On another day we could have won and I think it gave everyone a lot of confidence and you know there are a lot of players in our team that could easily play at that level.

"It's easy to get up for games like that, playing at a really nice stadium, all the fans are there, it's a big game so it's really nice and easy to get up for, we have just got to make sure we get up for the games in the Conference, be professional and try and get promoted."

"We hope that we are able to carry on this kind of form into our league fixtures because unlike tonight where we weren't expected to win it's different in the Blue Square Bet Premier."

"The shoe is on the other foot when we are expected to win. If we can recreate the football we have shown in two matches against a team who could be playing Championship football next season, we shouldn't fear anybody."



He's ineligible to feature today against his present employers as part of the agreement between the two clubs but the Town's former York midfielder Alex Lawless was delighted to help a young side beat Welling United in the FA Trophy on Tuesday.

The Hatters' new recruit from Bootham Crescent broke the resistance of the Blue Square Bet South side with a stunning winner deep into injury time at Park View Road to earn a second round trip with Uxbridge in January.

While he shared his disappointment about missing out this afternoon the Town goalscorer was glad to find the target and get some minutes under his belt considering he was cupped for the two games against Charlton.

"I'd had a few earlier that were not so good, so it was nice to get one right to be honest," he said afterwards.

"It's always nice to score and I think we were good enough overall to get the result."

"It was good not to have to go to extra-time as you never know what will happen then, especially with the pitch getting a bit frosty."

So we're glad we won."

Lawless felt the Town deserved to earn their place in the next round and admitted how tough it was to come through two challenging periods of 90 minutes against the Wings.

"Welling must be gutted because they didn't half work hard," he said. "I know we've

had two games in three days but they work as well whereas it's a full time job for us."

"We would have liked to taken control a bit earlier but got the goal we needed in the end."

Lawless is now hoping his new side can progress in the competition and has his eyes firmly set on a Wembley appearance.

"York got to the final the season before I arrived there and they were buzzing about it."

"Before you know it, if you keep winning your games, you're one or two games away from the final."

"Jason Walker played there last year, won and scored. I know how ambitious this club are and it's only right that we aim to win every competition we can."


And what was it like for the 25-year-old to be considered one of the senior players on duty over the two games?



10 The number of games played previously at Kenilworth Road on this day. The Hatters have five wins, and one defeat and four matches have ended in a draw. Luton have scored 14 goals and conceded just five.

0 The first match, back in 1908, ended goalless when Plymouth Argyle were the visitors in a Southern League fixture.

1 Wallace Birch scored his first goal for Luton against rivals Watford, who were the visitors in 1930 for a Division Three (South) fixture. Jimmy Yardley also netted in a 2-0 victory for the Hatters.


2 Andy Rennie netted both goals in a 2-0 victory in 1933, when Barnsley were beaten in a FA Cup third round replay. The Town beat Tottenham Hotspur and Halifax Town in the next two rounds, before eventually being beaten in the quarter-finals by Everton.

6 The number of goals shared by the two sides when Northampton Town came to Kenilworth Road in 1936 for a Division Three (South) fixture in 1936. Willie Boyd, George Martin and Frederick Roberts were the scorers for the Hatters as they were held to a 3-3 draw.

3 The biggest margin of victory on this day came in 1958 when Aston Villa were beaten 3-0 in a First Division match. Jimmy Adam, Gordon Turner and George MacLeod were the scorers in front of the highest recorded crowd for a fixture at Kenilworth Road on this date, as 16,619 watched the action.

28 The number of years before the Hatters played again on this date, and Aston Villa were the visitors once again. This time goals from Mike Newell and Brian Stein gave Luton a 2-0 victory.

5 It was a League Cup fifth round tie in 1989 when Southampton were the



opponents, as Ricky Hill scored in 1-1 draw. The Hatters won the replay 2-1, with Mick Harford and Hill scoring. Luton went all the way to Wembley that season, after beating West Ham in the semi-finals, but were beaten by Nottingham Forest.

0 The only time that Luton have lost on this day was against West Ham in 1992, their last season in the top flight, as Mike Small scored the only goal of the game for the visitors.

1 Paul Telfer netted as the Hatters won 1-

against Southend in the third round of the FA Cup in 1994. The Hatters enjoyed a good run in the competition, after beating Premiership Newcastle and West Ham they were eventually beaten by Chelsea in a Wembley semi-final.

The fixture was against Wrexham in front of the lowest recorded Kenilworth Road crowd on this date, as 6,167 fans watched a goalless draw.



TAILORED FOR SUCCESS

LUTON GAVE ME THE IDEAL GROUNDING, SAYS MATT TAYLOR

Matt Taylor is undoubtedly one of the biggest recent successes of the Luton Town youth system having gone on to become an established Premier League player since his graduation as a young Hatter.

He left Kenilworth Road in 2002 for Portsmouth and has gone on to play well over 200 times in the topflight with Pompey and

Bolton Wanderers, his current employers.

But getting in the firstteam with Luton at the age of 17 gave him the perfect platform to go on and progress his career.

He had only been at the club for a little over a year having been scouted from his native Oxford and it proved to be just the right move.

"When I moved I had always been used to being at home but I moved into the digs, which was fantastic, and I lived there with Emmerson Boyce for a while," Matt recalled.

"It made you grow up, which was very important. The club itself was in a bit of trouble financially and my first season in the League was my second as a youth team player and we

got shoved in at the deep end.

"If you swam, the world was your oyster so to speak, and I was very fortunate to have the chance to get a game at 17.

"The club itself gave me a fantastic grounding and personally feel so fortunate to have had that at the start of my career and an insight into what football was like.

"Now I have been fortunate enough to be at a Premier League club and the players in the Academy haven't played much football so they go on loan, and it gives you experience.

"At Bolton everything you can imagine is done for you and coming to Luton was a culture shock but it was fantastic because it grounded you.

"If I hadn't had that opportunity I wouldn't appreciate everything I have now and for me it was a fantastic opportunity that fortunately I took."

Youth team manager John Moore was a big influence on Matt's early career, along with other youth management in the shape of Paul Lowe and Dean Rastrick.

All of them helped the young man adapt to his new environment and when it came to the step up to the firstteam, manager Lennie Lawrence was perfectly positioned to know how to handle Matt's development.

"It was a baptism of fire when we went in and we were very fortunate we had a manager in Lennie Lawrence who was very experienced, he looked after you, and knew when to put you in and take you out," Matt continued.

"They didn't really have anyone else to play so I played a lot and really enjoyed it.

"When you came from playing with your mates at 16 to playing in front of thousands of fans, who I must say were fantastic, it was a great experience.

"To go into that environment at 17 when your mates were at school doing their A Levels was fantastic and it made you want more.

"You have seen the tip of the iceberg and it made you want to strive to better yourself. It was a fantastic opportunity and I can't thank the club enough.

"The only disappointment is I haven't been back as a player since I left but hopefully by the end of my career I will go back and play at Luton."

Matt's Luton debut came in August 1999 away at



Shrewsbury and we took near enough 2,000 fans there.

"That was just a fantastic time in my life and it's not until you get older and finish that I'll reflect on what a good stage it was.

"It gave me a wonderful grounding and I got better as a footballer by playing football as opposed to playing in a reserve team somewhere.

"I was fortunate enough to have the opportunity to play League games and that's how you cut your teeth.

"We had some fantastic games that season after the disappointment of the season before when we had got relegated.

"We were averaging seven and a half thousand fans every week in the bottom tier of English football."

And while Matt is now settled in the north of England as he continues his career at Bolton, he retains his love for Luton and wants this season to be the one that returns the Hatters to the Football League.

He said: "I still check the results and see how they're doing as ultimately I still have a soft spot for Luton as it was my first club."

"When I was at the club there was always talk about building a new ground and it seems that because they've never been able to get planning permission, the club hasn't made that step forward."

"If you can get the ground you can generate more resources and attract better players."

"It is great that Nick Owen is there as chairman and that's fantastic as it gives the club stability."

"Hopefully they will now start to see better things coming and we all keep our fingers crossed that they can get promoted back to the League."

"They need to get back - they have got the resources, they have got the fanbase, the chairman and the fans want to see the Football League back at Kenilworth Road and I for one would love to see that."

"I hope that they do achieve League football this season as there is still a very good squad and a good team."

"They can get back into the League, that's where Luton Town belongs."

12 The number of goals scored by the two sides when Lincoln City were the visitors in 1897. Luton were comfortable 9-3 winners, as Edwin Birch netted a hattrick in the Division Two encounter.


0 The only time the Hatters have failed to score during a home game on 18th December was in 1901 when Woolwich Arsenal won 2-0 in an FA Cup replay.

3 It was three apiece when Plymouth Argyle came to Kenilworth Road in 1926 as the sides drew in a Division Three (South) match. Harry Woods scored twice and Syd Reid also netted.

1 Luton also drew their next home match on this date, when Norwich came to Kenilworth Road 11 years later in 1937. The Hatters shared the points with Jack Vinall scoring in a 1-1 draw. This game also saw the highest attendance, 14,492, for a home game on 18th December.

2 Luton had consecutive 2-0 home victories on this day in 1971 and in 1983. Alan Slough and Don Givens were the scorers against Orient in the 1971/72 season, whilst Brian Horton, from the penalty spot, and Trevor Aylott netted against West Brom 12 years later.

BAYLISS ALWAYS LEARNING

FORMER DEFENDER DAVID BAYLISS TALKS MANAGEMENT, PROMOTION AND AMBITION

David Bayliss' time as a player gave him plenty of opportunities to learn from the men in charge before embarking on his own managerial career.

Now it's a career path that the former Luton Town man had particularly wanted to take at a relatively young age - he was 31 when handed the reigns at Barrow three years ago.

jointly with Darren Sheridan.

His days as a full-time player had come to an end due to injury at the age of 29 and he moved into the non-league ranks before ending up at Barrow in 2006 and being put in the hotseat a year later.

"I loved playing that much and didn't want to

pack it in but it was put upon me," David recalled when looking back on how it all got started.

"Having packed it in a lot earlier than I ideally would have liked I did my coaching badges, played part-time and took my insurance payout.

"The Barrow role just got landed on me to be honest. We were playing one week, and the next week the manager had gone, so they asked us if we wanted to take over.

"At the time we were struggling in Conference North but we lost two out of 29 games, which was unbelievable, and won promotion.

"But we didn't learn anything that season as you don't when you win every week - you learn more when you are getting beat, and as soon as we started losing it became a test.

"If you want a peaceful or stress-free life don't go into management or coaching!

"The buzz when you win games is unbelievable, and to achieve things like winning the FA Trophy at Wembley last season and two appearances in the third round of the FA Cup is fantastic.

"I'm sure anyone who has been there will be honest and say that the good times outweigh the bad.

"As a manager I'd like to say my approach is a bit of everything as I have played with managers who are bawlers and shouters, and I've played with good talkers and good coaches.

"I learnt a lot from Mick Harford and Joe Kinnear when I was at Luton, and Mick was probably the best coach I've worked for as a talker and as a manager.

"Management has got its good points and bad points, and you do get frustrated when you'd love to put your boots on again but unfortunately those days are gone now.

"I am still only 34 though and I have learnt more in three years of coaching and management than I did in 14 years as a player.

"Hopefully in four or five years from now I'll be a better coach and still be in a job."

"It's been a difficult start to the season for Barrow, a former Football League club themselves, and they have struggled to build on last season's FA Trophy success and runs to the third round of the FA Cup in 2010 and 2009.

"Injuries haven't helped them as their squad has been seriously disrupted, but David believes that when they have all their players available the



increase dramatically, we are looking at stability for the next few years and cup runs to generate more money and crowds."

David played 41 times in an injury-hit four-year spell at Luton after signing from Rochdale in 2001.

But despite his injuries he looks at it as the favourite time of his playing career given the promotions in 2002 and 2005 and some of the players he was at Kenilworth Road with.

After returning to the top level of non-league football with Barrow however, his former employers have held the upper-hand with 10 victories home and away last season.

And it was the same story in October as Matthew Barnes-Homer netted the only goal of the game at Holker Street in what David describes as a 'strange game'.

He added: "The pitch wasn't brilliant and the wind was a factor in the game, and Luton probably shaded the first half but in all honesty we were unlucky not to get something out of the game."

Cumbrians will rise up the Blue Square Bet Premier table. A tilt at promotion isn't on the agenda though, certainly not in the short-term, and David believes it is a case of keeping on trying to take steps forward.

"When we took over we were third from bottom of Conference North and we have come a long way in two and a half years," he said.

"We have generated money with cup runs but it is a long-term project here and we know we won't get promotion in the next two or three years because we are up against some very big teams.

"We are in that group of teams where if we get a mid-table finish and a cup run it has been a great season for us.

"It is always the target long-term to get into the Football League but we have got to be realistic and unless someone comes in, and our gates

"It is a tough league and they are in a clutch of teams that can win it."

"For the likes of Barrow there is no real pressure as a good season for us means a mid-table finish and a good cup run."

"Luton fans shouldn't accept anything less than promotion because of the sheer size of the club and the fan-base."

"They should be in the top four all through this season and I am sure they will be."

"Luton shouldn't be at this level but a lot has gone on in the past so they have to get on with it and find a solution to get out of this league."

"I am sure, with Richard Money, Gary Brabin and Alan Neilson, they will go on and do that, because they have three of the best people at this level."


Nothing pulls on the heartstrings like an old Hatter's playing strip...

AWAY 2001-2003

The Town started life in the basement division of the Football League in 2001/02 with Joe Kinnear at the helm and the away strip for a two season stint was a popular orange and royal blue number, manufactured by Xara.

As debuts go it looked fantastic under the Madejski Stadium floodlights but the team were thumped 4-0 by Reading in the first round of the League Cup.

The look was completed by blue shorts and is modelled here by Carl Griffiths against today's visitors York City in September 2001.

KENNETH (KEN) KILBY HAWKES

Spotted by Luton's North-East scout Dick Trembath while playing for Shotton Colliery Welfare, Ken joined the Hatters in 1951 but his career at Kenilworth Road was put on hold when he was called up for National Service.

Ken finally broke into the Luton first team in 1957 and was then almost ever present until the relegation season of 1959/60 and played for the Hatters in the 1959 FA Cup final.

A rugged left-back, Ken was part of new manager Sam Bartram's cull in 1961 and he

moved to Peterborough followed by Bedford and St. Neots.

After hanging up his boots, Ken then worked for Walker Clarke and Co. for 28 years and received a whole bottle of sherry on retirement. Ken is still a welcome regular at Kenilworth Road.

ERIC MORECAMBE SUITE

Previously the Hatters Club, a restaurant led to the room being dedicated to the former Town director and was officially opened by Eric's wife, Jean Bartholomew.

Many iconic photographs of the great man adorn the orange walls of the suite which not only holds functions throughout the season and is packed on matchdays, but it is also home to the Hatters' trophy cabinet with a range of trophies, medals, pennants, memorabilia locked inside.

Although Joe Payne was spotted playing as a centre-forward for Bolsover Colliery, it was soon decided by those at Kenilworth Road that wing-half was his best position and he began to learn his trade in the professional game in the Town's reserves and at the club's nursery side, Biggleswade Town.

It is now a matter of footballing folklore that due to injuries, Payne was handed the centre-forward shirt on Easter Monday 1936 in a home game against Bristol Rovers and he went out and scored 10 times in a 12-0 victory.

Life was never likely to be the same for him again!

The 10goal haul is still a Football League

record to this day and he broke another record the following season when bagging 55 goals as the Hatters won the Division Three (South) championship, and with it promotion.

A call up for the England squad on a tour to Scandinavia in the summer of 1937 ended with him winning a full cap against Finland and, as the Town set about playing Division Two football for the first time since 1900, he found the net regularly.

Invariably, the big clubs came sniffing around and it was no real surprise when he was transferred to Chelsea in March 1938 for a big fee.

Unfortunately, the war took a large chunk out

of his career and after a spell at West Ham when peace resumed, he retired at the age of 34 dogged by ill health.

Payne returned to Luton to work and at one stage he lived in one of the club houses at the top of Kenilworth Road.

A low handicap golfer as well as being good enough to play cricket for Bedfordshire, poor health meant he eventually had to give those up as well. Joe died of a heart attack at the young age of 61 in 1975.

When the Town were promoted back to the top flight in 1974 for the first time in 14 years, the fans were looking forward to rubbing shoulders with the big boys once more, none more so than Leeds United who had been at the pinnacle of English football for a decade.

As Christmas approached, the Town were all but relegated with a sorry total of only nine points to their name, in the days of two points for a win, at that stage in the campaign. It looked likely that they were going down with a mere four points total and in desperation manager Harry Haslam decided to throw in

the youngsters and to hell with the consequences.

Teenagers Paul Futcher and his twin brother Ron, who had been signed from Chester pre-season, together with ex-Burton Albion full-back Steve Buckley were blooded and with three straight wins over the holiday period the panic measures seemed to work and perhaps there was a glimmer of hope at the end of the tunnel.

Playing open, attacking and sometimes naive but ultimately exciting football, the Hatters were now winning as many games as they lost

and had managed to haul themselves up by the bootstraps and move off bottom place by the time of the visit of mighty Leeds on 22nd March 1975.

Leeds, the reigning League champions, had lost their manager Don Revie to England duties in the summer of 1974 and had suffered a traumatic 44 days under the management of Brian Clough as the season opened.

Ominously, they had bounced back and were now within striking distance of the top of the table following a run of 18 games without

defeat and were also about to win through to the final of the European Cup.

A crowd of 23,048, the second highest of the season, gathered at Kenilworth Road and were treated to an amazing opening with the Town going two up inside the first 12 minutes.

In the third minute Jimmy Husband broke on the right but the danger appeared to have passed when his cross went over the head of Ron Futcher.

The Leeds defenders inexplicably stood rooted to the spot, ball watching, but the wily John Aston sized up the situation in a trice and fired a right foot shot past David Stewart in the Leeds goal.

Less than 10 minutes later Kenilworth Road

truly erupted when Aston, this time on the right, dragged defenders all over the place leaving Peter Anderson to slam the ball into the roof of the net.

The Luton players, quite understandably, retreated behind their sandbags for a period waiting for an onslaught that never actually came, with a stunned Leeds unable to recover any form of fluency.

When Leeds did pull a goal back with three minutes to go, with Joe Jordan taking advantage of some comic defending, it came as a complete shock but before the alarm bells could ring the referee blew his whistle to signal a remarkable Luton victory.

Watching Barcelona scouts, spying on Leeds

before their forthcoming European Cup clash, must have gone back to Spain to report to Johann Cruyff and co. that Leeds were ripe for picking off.

Harry Haslam said afterwards: "They must have gone away more worried about us. We've been playing this way all season, but things haven't gone for us - now our luck could be changing."


On Tuesday 2nd November the Baldock Arena was officially relaunched as the home of Luton Town youth development. Thanks to a generous donation from Loyal Luton Supporters Club and SoLYD, the Arena has been redecorated over the past six months to contain the following:

- Signed shirts from graduates of the programme now playing in the Premier League
- An honours board listing every player to obtain a scholarship from the Centre of Excellence
- Motivational messages from coaches throughout the world of sport
- A welcome board listing every graduate of the programme.

The evening saw visits from Aston Villa and England player Curtis Davies, currently on loan at Leicester City, and West Ham United captain Matthew Upson who now has 21 England caps.

They were joined by members of the current Luton Town firstteam including Keith Keane, Jake Howells and Claude Gnapka, and ex-players, including Kingsley Black and Wayne Farnell, were also present.

"To see so many players from past and present was fantastic for all of our young players, coaches and parents and shows the sentiment that Luton Town holds to anyone who has ever represented the club," Youth Development Officer Gregg Broughton said.



Baldock has hosted the clubs Centre of Excellence since 2007, and now, in addition, hosts the Luton Town Under-18 shadow squad, meaning that the club use the facility for over 40 hours a week.

With covered stands, dug-outs, changing rooms, a parents bar and interactive classroom complementing the third generation AstroTurf pitch, the Football League have graded Baldock facility as one of the best for youth development outside of the Premier League.

"To see so many players from past and present was fantastic for all of our young players, coaches and parents and shows the sentiment that Luton Town holds to anyone who has ever represented the club," Youth Development Officer Gregg Broughton said.

"The highlight for me was something that happened away from the glamour of the TV cameras when Luton legend John Moore spoke to our current Under-16 squad.

For those who are not aware of John's credentials, in addition to playing over 280 games for the club and coaching so many of the youth players who went on to the Premier League, John also managed the Luton Town team that finished seventh in the old First Division (now the Premier League) in 1987."





Despite the weather wiping out so much of football in the past month the Hatters' Ladies managed to progress into the second round proper of the FA Cup by defeating both Rothwell Town and Woodbridge Town.

The writing was on the wall for Rothwell in the very first minute when Jessica McKay powerfully headed into the net, from a Katie Davis cross, before Davis was on target herself from a Michelle Byrne cross after just 10 minutes.

The Town's domination continued throughout the half and as the interval approached Nicola Hemmings forced her way past two players, before driving the ball low into the net before Candice Davies performed a similar trick to make it 4-0 at half time.

The visitors were restricted to a couple of half chances as Luton went close on several occasions to extending their lead but there were no further goals by the break. Another powerful start to the second period and a fine run and cross by Davies was again brought down by McKay and with her back to goal she spun and drove a low shot under the keeper for her second.

McKay then completed her first senior hat-trick racing clear from the pursuing Woodbridge defenders and although the goalkeeper did get a hand to the ball the shot was too powerful and the ball looped up and rolled into the empty net.

An injury time penalty for the visitors reduced the arrears but Town were not finished as Maddix again broke at speed and crossed for Claire Howe at the far post to make the score 4-1. Manager John Wyett was delighted with the win:

"This was another fine win making it five in a row and where all the players once again performed very well as a unit."

Some of the football played at times was excellent creating plenty of goalscoring opportunities which can only be a good thing when the front six players have all progressed from our youth teams in the past 18 months".

One of those players, 16-year-old McKay, played last season as a left back but having now been converted to a striker she is regularly on the scoresheet. She will hopefully go on to emulate another SuperMac from an earlier era at Luton who underwent a similar conversion and went on to do rather well for himself!

TRIBUTES FOR RUSHDEN GOALKEEPER

The Blue Square Bet Premier was rocked with the tragic news of the death of Rushden and Diamonds' young goalkeeper, Dale Roberts, on Tuesday.



The 24-year-old made 91 appearances for the Diamonds, and was named England 'C' player of the year last season.

An international team-mate of Luton's Matthew Barnes-Homer, Jake Howells and Amari Morgan-Smith, Roberts' untimely death was met with sadness throughout the football family.

Rushden chairman Gary Calder released a statement on the club's website saying: "Our thoughts and prayers at this time go to his parents, family and friends."

Paul Fairclough, Roberts' manager at England 'C' level, added: "On behalf of The Football Association Representative Matches Committee, England C team staff and players, I wish to say how saddened I am at the tragic loss of life of Dale Roberts."

Dale, as well as being an outstanding goalkeeper, was an outstanding young man in every sense of the word."

MANSFIELD MISERY OVER STADIUM CONTINUES

Mansfield Town continue to search for a new home after being locked out of Field Mill by landlord Keith Haslam earlier this month.

Their plans to host matches at either Ilkeston or Alfreton have been thwarted as those grounds

are deemed not to meet the minimum quality standard required for the Blue Square Bet Premier.

Duncan Russell has been in temporary charge of first team duties since David Holdsworth was sacked as manager in November, and the former Blackburn coach's position is expected to be made permanent imminently.

FINANCIAL TROUBLES AT HISTON AND KIDDY

The Football Conference has charged Histon with allegedly submitting "misleading financial information."

An independent commission will assess their case over the coming fortnight. Meanwhile, the club has delayed paying the players' December wages amid reports of cash-flow problems following the repayment of debts.

Kidderminster are also being investigated by the Conference in relation to the new Financial Reporting Initiative regulations, and directors have admitted that the club could face liquidation if £150,000 isn't raised by the end of the month.

The Kidderminster Harriers Independent Supporters Trust is appealing for fans to make donations.

TRANSFER ROUND-UP

Bad weather and the FA Trophy mean that there hasn't been much Blue Square Bet Premier action of late, but there has been plenty of action off the pitch as clubs add to their squads in order to cope with the busy festive period.



• WITH FORMER LUTON NEWS SPORTS EDITOR DAVE FLETT

Dave Flett covered the Hatters for the Luton News between 1997 and 2003, reporting on one relegation and a promotion, as well as a run to the Carling Cup quarter-finals, the plunge into receivership under David Kohler and Joe Kinnear's colourful reign.

He is now The Press' York City writer but, here, selects the best 11 players he witnessed at Kenilworth Road:

Goalkeeper: Kelvin Davis – Made so few mistakes which is always the best gauge of a good keeper. Unlucky not to have received international recognition at some stage considering the paucity of good English number ones during his career.

Right back: Emmerson Boyce – The perfect modern-day full back. Was always capable of getting up and down the flank and just as comfortable operating in the middle of defence. Has worked hard to become a Premier League regular.

Centre back: Steve Davis – Playing in what is now League 1 always looked too easy for him and, if he had an extra yard of pace, he would have been one of the best defenders in the country. Sadly, when he signed for York in 2004, injury problems led to his eventual retirement.

Centre back: Gary Doherty – Offered great versatility with his ability to play in defence or attack. Always honest and hardworking.

Left back: Matthew Taylor – A pleasure to see him plying his trade in the Premier League and was a privilege to see his explosive and exciting first steps into the professional game.

Right wing: Graham Alexander – There was an absence of quality right-sided players during my time reporting on Luton. Graham was an extremely reliable right



back, who was just as comfortable in midfield though and would have combined well with Boyce.

Centre of midfield: Paul McLaren – Played in a struggling side for most of his Hatters career but was a cultured footballer and would probably have blossomed more if he had chosen to work with Joe Kinnear.

Centre of midfield: Matthew Spring – Had the full array of midfield talents and should have gone on to achieve more than he has done in the game.

Left wing: Jean Louis-Valois – Boasted phenomenal skill and gave Kinnear's 2001/02 promotion-winning team flair at just the right stage of the season.

Striker: Steve Howard – Endured a difficult start to his Town career but became a rarity in the game – a target man who also knew where the net is.

Striker: Tony Thorpe – This might be an unpopular choice as he somewhat blotted his copy book with the manner in which he left the club but an extremely cool finisher of chances.
