



MONEY TALK

Good afternoon and welcome once again to Kenilworth Road for today's game against Gateshead in the Blue Square Bet Premier.

I'd like to extend a warm welcome to Ian Bogie, his staff and players, plus the directors and supporters of Gateshead who have made the long journey south from Tyneside for this fixture.

Ian has done a terrific job since taking over at the International Stadium. Two successive promotions led to promotion to this level the season before last and I know keeping them up was a magnificent achievement by everyone associated with the club.

I think we all know how much of a tough place the International Stadium is. Since I have been in charge we have won and lost narrowly in two very similar games in very windy conditions.

It's not an easy venue to play at and we found that out to our cost back in September when Jon Shaw's goal gave Ian's side all three points.

Although we had Taiwo Atieno harshly sent off it was a day to forget in which we put in probably our worst performance of the season.

We've challenged the players to right the wrongs of that 1-0 defeat this afternoon but we are under no illusions that it will be easy.

Our visitors have hit a good run of form – winning their last three and scoring 10 goals in the process, including a 3-0 win over Barrow on Tuesday night.

A word we often use in the dressing room is patience and we will be telling the players before kickoff to remain patient if things aren't going our way.

That is something I urge you the supporters to consider too. While I am not saying Gateshead will be intent on frustrating us, we know they will want to frustrate and quieten our support – at times when things aren't going to plan we need you to get behind the team.

Your backing of the team has been phenomenal and in a division where crowds only average 1,000, our 7,000 really can act as 12th man.

We owe you after that poor performance at Gateshead and if we continue to play the way we have been in recent weeks then we are confident of picking up another three points in our quest for success.

At this point in time, the way the results are going, every point dropped is scrutinised and that's why it was vital we earned victory on Tuesday against an in-form York side.

A lot will probably be made of the fact York had their goalkeeper sent off and that they didn't have a substitute goalkeeper, but even before that happened I thought we could have gone ahead.

It was wonderful football to create the opportunity that led to the red card in the first place and from that moment on we knew given York's lack of a second goalkeeper that we would be in a strong position to go on and win the game.

However, it is never easy playing against 10 men as we found out in the second half. Understandably Gary Mills, their manager, told his players to keep the scoreline respectable and having tightened up defensively we found it tough to penetrate two banks of four.

As I said after the game, though, we are one team that clubs probably fear when they go down to 10 men because of the quality of our passing and movement. That showed in the first half, enabling us to go in at half-time in a very comfortable position.

Striker Lloyd Owusu was one of the players on target and I'd like to welcome Lloyd and congratulate him on a fine debut.

Considering he had only met his team-mates 90 minutes before kickoff and not played since last year was a testament to his own personal fitness regime.

He showed a magnificent strength and appetite on Tuesday and we hope he will go on to play a big part for us in the second half of the season.


It's another big game today so please get behind the players and enjoy the game.

CAPTAIN SPEAKING

Welcome back to Kenilworth Road for today's game with Gateshead - opponents who we know will make us work extremely hard this afternoon.

In the three games that I have been involved in against the Tynesiders each game has been decided by just the one goal.

That obviously includes last September's disappointingly 1-0 defeat in the North East. That is a result has been used as a constant reminder in the build-up to this game because we know we didn't perform well on the day.

I was asked after Tuesday's 5-0 win over York if there was any secret to our current form, especially with regard to keeping six successive clean sheets since the turn of the year.

My reply was that now it's been mentioned it will probably have jinxed it today! But in all seriousness there is no secret: we've been working hard as a team, simple but important stuff.

Defending isn't just done by defenders, it starts from the very top of the field and the work the strikers especially put in closing people down and harassing opponents is often gone unnoticed.

Success doesn't come easy and the harder you work the better you will become and the way we're all pulling together as a team is having the desired effect.

On Tuesday we comprehensively beat a team who have been in really good form recently - even if their goalkeeper was sent off.

There's no question he had to be sent off and the fact we scored straight from the freekick gave us a good foundation to go and build on.

In truth we were in the ascendency before the sending off and it was pleasing to go on and score more goals, improving our goal difference further in the process.

In our previous two league games at Bath and Wimbledon we were happy to keep the clean sheets and sometimes you take a point. They were tough away games, remember. Being back at home in the next few weeks is great for us considering our record here.

Hopefully we can continue and add to our tally this afternoon and we know Gateshead aren't here to just make up the numbers.

You can't afford to take a look at the positions of clubs in this league and think any game is going to be easy - I think we found that to our detriment last year and on occasions this season.

It's up to us to get the job done and by working hard we can eliminate the mistakes and continue our improvement in all aspects of our game.

As I said, we're a unit and as individuals we've all got our own jobs to do, pulling in the right direction for the mutual gain.

It's going to be hectic and exciting finale to the season - just as it was last year - and with the squad we have we believe we have a fantastic chance of success.

The advantages of the strength in-depth of our squad will now come to the fore as we play Saturday, Tuesday pretty much from now until the end of the season following the rescheduling of all the matches.

Our run in the FA Trophy has enabled a number of players to stake a claim for a

place in the first team squad with the manager showing faith in the likes of Godfrey Poku and Adam Watkins.

After today we have another big game on Tuesday when Grimsby are the visitors but it's that old cliché of taking each game as it comes as far as we're concerned.

Your support has been terrific this season and with so many home fixtures coming up I urge you all to keep up the volume levels and back the boys to what hopefully will be three important points this afternoon.

HATTERS CHATTER

NEW MAN MAKES HIS MARK

Town boss Richard Money bolstered his attacking options on Tuesday by swooping to secure the signing of experienced striker Lloyd Owusu ahead of a pack of Football League clubs.

The 34-year-old Ghanaian international arrives at Kenilworth Road until the end of the season and got off to a perfect start by bagging a debut goal in the 5-0 victory over York City.

Owusu enjoyed a prolific career in England prior to his move to Australia, having netted 144 times in 350 starts for a number of Football League clubs.

It was his goalscoring exploits with then Conference side Slough Town that alerted League clubs of his talents with Brentford stumping up £25,000 for his services in 1998.

It proved to be money well spent as the striker went onto hit 64 goals in 148 starts for the Bees, firing 25 goals in his debut season as the Griffin Park outfit lifted the Third Division title in 1998/99.


The goals continued to flow for the forward and a move to the Championship followed when Sheffield Wednesday snapped him up after his contract expired with Brentford in the summer of 2004.

After scoring nine times for the Owls, despite being restricted to appearances from the substitutes' bench, he fell out of favour at Hillsborough and a loan move to Reading followed, a switch that was soon made permanent.

However, after scoring six goals in the Championship at the Madjeski Stadium during 2004/05, he was back at Griffin Park in the summer of 2005.

The goals kept coming in West London for the striker but after missing most of the 2006/07 season through injury he left Brentford once more and signed for Yeovil Town in July 2007.

After nine goals for the Gloves in his first season at Huish Park, the Slough-born hitman was again on the move, going onto strike 15 goals for three clubs during 2008/09: one for Yeovil and seven at both



INTRODUCING GATESHEAD



The original Gateshead AFC was formed in 1930 when neighbours South Shields, members of the Football League's old Third Division North, moved to Gateshead's Redheugh Park because of financial difficulties.

The club had applied for reelection only once before in a relatively successful 30-year period, but were nevertheless unceremoniously cast aside in favour of the more geographically acceptable Peterborough United in 1960.

In 1968 Gateshead became founder members of the Northern Premier League but their stay in the new competition lasted only two years.

Finishing as runners-up the Tynesiders then spent a season in the Midland League until in 1973, seven leagues and 43 years after its inception, Gateshead AFC ceased to exist.

A new club called Gateshead Town played the following season in the local Northern Combination League but, astonishingly, history was soon to repeat itself.

Renamed Gateshead United the club soon became a force in the Northern Premier League while claiming the scalps of Football League clubs Grimsby Town and Crewe Alexandra in the FA Cup.

However, in 1977, after only three years of operation, came the shock announcement that United were to disband - the third body blow to hit Gateshead supporters in less than 20 years.

Replacing Gateshead United in the Northern

Premier League for the 1977/78 season and after two years in the Conference, the Tynesiders returned to the Northern Premier League and lifted the title for the second time in 1986.

Their second spell in the Conference lasted just one season, though they were quick to bounce back, and reclaimed their place at the top table of non-league football in 1990.

It was Gateshead's most successful period as a non-league club but a productive period ended in 1998 when the club was relegated back to the Northern Premier League after eight consecutive seasons of Conference football.

Relegation to the Northern Premier League first division followed but, after one season, Gateshead were back in the NPL top tier following the introduction of a geographically split first division.

Gateshead finished third in the UniBond Premier division in 2007/08, hitting 93 league goals before beating Buxton 2-0 in the Play-Off final.

In the 2008/09 season the rejuvenated Tynesiders claimed runners-up spot in the Blue Square North and a second promotion was clinched after beating Southport in the two-legged semifinal and then AFC Telford United 1-0 in the Play-Off final.

The first campaign back in the Conference Premier, however, proved to be a difficult one with top flight status only retained on the final day of last season on goal difference.

MEET THE MANAGER:

IAN BOGIE

Ian had a tremendous start to his managerial career when he guided Gateshead to back-to-back promotions from the UniBond Premier Division to the Blue Square Premier.

He joined Gateshead in the summer of 2006 as assistant manager and took over as caretaker boss before he was given the manager's job on a permanent basis at the start of the 2007/08 season.

Promotion through the Play-Offs was achieved in his first season and this was followed by a second promotion via the Play-Offs to the Blue Square Premier.

Now in his fourth season at the helm he became Gateshead's first full-time manager for half a century when he penned a two-year deal in the summer.

As a player Bogie, 43, was a talented midfielder who made over 450 appearances in the professional game taking in spells at Newcastle United, Preston North End, Millwall, Leyton Orient, Port Vale and Kidderminster Harriers.



Back-to-back wins in the FA Trophy against Southport and Hampton & Richmond Borough seemed to be the perfect tonic for Gateshead as they secured their first League win in nine matches on Tuesday.

Goals from Jon Shaw, Martin Brittain and Nathan Fisher secured the 3-0 win over Barrow, to leave Manager Ian Bogie understandably delighted.

"The turnaround since the heavy defeat at Southport and the response of the players has been excellent," said the Tynesiders' chief.

"For 25 minutes we were superb against Barrow and bossed the game. We got the goal but then didn't push on for awhile and let them back in.

"Barrow may feel the penalty for the second goal was harsh but we'll take it and it was good to Fisher continue to find the net.

"It was a great finish from the lad after he had just missed a much easier chance and the win sets up for the trip to Luton this weekend.

"Mulligan came back in and did well. His work ethic was great and he earned the penalty that gave us a two goal cushion.


"Tumblin had a fine game in midfield and Deasy has made a couple of fantastic saves late on to make sure we kept another clean sheet.

"Gateshead now sit 16th in the table as look to improve on their 21st place finish in their first season back in the Conference.

They only retained their place in the league on the final day of last season on goal difference from Forest Green Rovers and no doubt Bogie will be hoping things will be a little bit more clear cut this time around.

Luton completed the double over Bogie's side last season, winning by only a single goal on each occasion, but when the sides met in September at the International Stadium it was the home side who came out on top.

Shaw scored the only goal of the game and the Gateshead boss is hoping their recent

good form can stand them in good stead.

"Luton on their own patch will be a formidable challenge but we will go into the lions den that is Kenilworth Road in good heart."

TIM DEASY

A 25-year-old shotstopper, who joined Gateshead from Barrow during the close season. He starred in Barrow's FA Cup third round tie against Sunderland at the Stadium of Light in January but was on the bench for the FA Trophy final win over Stevenage at Wembley. He has also played in the Football League with Macclesfield Town and Stockport County.

DEFENDERS

CRAIG BAXTER

An attacking defender, who is now in his fifth season at Gateshead following his release by Newcastle United, in the summer of 2006. The right-back was Gateshead's only ever-present during the 2008/09 Blue Square North promotion campaign and has made over 200 appearances for the Tyneside club.

BEN CLARK

Former England Youth international Clark was a major signing for Gateshead during the summer from League 1 Hartlepool United, signing a two-year contract. He made 181 appearances in six years at Victoria Park after initially coming through the ranks at Sunderland and playing 14 games. The former England Under 19 captain can also play in midfield.

JAMES CURTIS

Curtis is the longest serving player at the



club having joined Gateshead in the summer of 2003 from Northern League side Washington. The towering central defender is a firm fans favourite and his impressive performances have brought several accolades including Player of the Year on three occasions, including last season. The 28-year-old made his 300th appearance against Crawley Town in November 2009 and has played in four different leagues with the club.

MICHAEL LIDDLE

Liddle joined Gateshead on loan earlier this month, from Premier League outfit Sunderland in January and scored a stunning goal on his debut against Kidderminster Harriers. The 21-year-old made his senior debut for the Black Cats against Barrow in the FA Cup last season and played 22 games on loan at Carlisle United during the 2008/09 campaign.

JAMES TAVERNIER

The 19-year-old made the short trip across the



Tyne in January to join Gateshead on loan from Newcastle United. The Yorkshireman has made two senior appearances for the Magpies, in the League Cup at Peterborough United and Accrington Stanley.

MIDFIELDERS

MARTIN BRITAIN

Brittain is another former Newcastle United player in the Gateshead ranks. He signed from Kidderminster Harriers but missed most of the first season after suffering a double leg break against Hayes & Yeading United in September 2009. The 26-year-old made seven appearances for the Magpies, including one start before enjoying spells at Ipswich, Yeovil, Carlisle and Walsall.

JOAN SIMUN EDMUNDSSON

A Faroe Islands international, who has played for his country against Italy, Russia, Scotland and France, scoring once, against Estonia. Joan



KRIS GATE

signed on loan from Newcastle earlier this month and made his debut in the 2-2 draw with Kidderminster Harriers. The attacking left-sided player started his career at local club B68 Toftir.

MATCH REPORT

For the second successive game the Town were twice frustrated by the woodwork as they had to settle for a point at league leaders AFC Wimbledon.

Both chances came in a two-minute spell in a second-half dominated by the Hatters. Firstly Jason Walker poked a shot against the bar on 73 minutes before Andy Drury thundered a shot from the edge of the area against the frame of Seb Brown's goal.

The Town started on the front foot but were almost caught cold on 13 minutes when James Mulley tested Mark Tyler from the edge of the box.

That scare over, the Hatters began to reestablish their hold on the game and Drury came close to breaking the deadlock on 35 minutes when Brown dived away to his left to keep out the midfielder's piledriver after taking a pass from Matthew Barnes-Homer.

As halftime approached Brown in the home goal was again called into action when beating away a close range effort from Danny Crow after the Town striker had done well to find space in the penalty area.

Then, a minute before the break, Alex Lawless – sent on as a replacement for the injured Amari Morgan-Smith – saw a header from a leftwing Drury corner bounce agonisingly past the post.

The Hatters started the second half in the same vein and after Walker was introduced for Crow the Dons found themselves well and truly under the cosh.

On 58 minutes the Town should have led when Walker's shot from Claude Gnakpa's cross hit a defender and Barnes-Homer directed the follow-up straight at Brown.

The Hatters were turning the screw and the lively Walker spurned two chances in the space of two minutes – firstly poking a shot at Brown before hitting the crossbar after being put through by Keith Keane's quick freekick.

Two minutes later the Wimbledon woodwork was struck again, this time brilliance from Drury down the left saw the 27-year-old hit a fantastic effort that cannoned back off the crossbar.

That let-off woke up Wimbledon as the Hatters dwelt on missed opportunities but neither side could break the deadlock as the game swung from end-to-end in the final 10 minutes and the points were shared.

Town boss Richard Money felt his side deserved all three points on a night in which Andy Drury was one of those cursing the crossbar after he saw a long range effort beat the goalkeeper.


The Hatters midfielder, who hit the post at Bath in the previous game, was left as frustrated as anyone come the final whistle.

"We don't really know what more we could have done to win the game to be honest but you know we've got to move on," he told Hatters Player afterwards.

"It's gutting not to win but we've got the game Saturday and we've got York on the Tuesday to get over it.

"We couldn't really do much more, we're disappointed but then we've also got to take the positives out of it, look at the chances we've created, five, six or seven clear cut chances and on another day they will go in and we'll win easily.

"We played really well second half so if we keep playing like that, I'm sure our luck will change and our chances will go in the back of the net.



"Despite two successive draws leaving them three points behind the leaders Drury still believes the Town are the ones to beat, when it comes to promotion.

"When you do start looking at the table you think 'what if we do this', 'what if we do that', it's quite natural to think that, but we've said we have just got to keep performing, that's the main thing at the end of the day and we'll see where it takes us.

"I signed here because Luton is a massive club and it should be in the Football League or even the Championship so my aim is to get the club back up to that sort of football.

"I believe we are the best team in this league, we've got the best players, we've got the best team and squad but it's not about how we are on paper.

"We know we've got to go out there every single game and give 100% if we play like we did in the second half for the rest of the season I'm sure we will have no problems whatsoever."

MATCH REPORT

Two goals apiece from Taiwo Atieno and Adam Watkins helped a young Town side through to the last 16 of the FA Trophy with a comfortable victory over Southern League Uxbridge.

In truth the scoreline could have been greater against a side plying their trade three levels below the Hatters in the pyramid.

Jason Walker came close to giving the Town the lead with audacious effort from his own half on 12 minutes after seeing visiting goalkeeper Michael Plwonski off his line.

However it was Atieno who broke the deadlock in the 18th minute when finishing well on the counter-attack, taking a pass from Godfrey Poku and firing past Plwonski.

Five minutes later debutant Christian Tavernier curled an effort onto the visitors crossbar – the fifth time the Hatters had hit the woodwork in three games.

Uxbridge striker Chris Moore missed two decent chances for the Southern League Division One Central outfit including a header, when unmarked from six yards out a minute before the break, that Mark Tyer was on hand to catch.

The second half began slowly but as the visitors tired the Hatters turned the screw.

Atieno was pulled back in the box by Gavin Brown which led to Watkins grabbing his first of the afternoon from the penalty spot on 68 minutes.

Then, 10 minutes later, Atieno got his second when turning well in the area to send a left-foot shot beyond Plwonski for his sixth goal of the season.

With Uxbridge unable to cope with the pace, movement and fitness of the Town, Watkins, substitute Cauley Woodrow and Alex Lawless all went close to extending the lead further before Watkins grabbed his second.

Lawless fed Woodrow down the left and the 16-year-old's cutback was perfect for Watkins who sent a firsttime volley flying past Plwonski.

More chances came and went for the Hatters as they chased a fifth but they had to settle for four in a game in which they kept their fifth successive clean sheet in the process.

POST-MATCH REACTION

After bagging two goals in the 4-0 win over Uxbridge, young striker Adam Watkins was understandably delighted at the final whistle.

Making only his first start for the club the 19-year-old netted kept his cool to net from the penalty spot before adding a fourth with just 10 minutes to go, to see the Hatters through and make it a full debut to remember.

"It's just good to obviously get the win first, that's the main thing and then to get the two goals is a bonus," he told Hatters Player afterwards.

Another youngster Godfrey Poku might not have been on the scoresheet but he did enough to catch the eye of the Kenilworth Road crowd, winning the Man of the Match award and he was quick to heap the praise on his team mates.

"Even though I got the Man of the Match I think the rest of the team did brilliantly," he said.


"From the goalkeeper to the defenders and midfielders to the forwards I think we played really well."





A century and a quarter later the occasion was reenacted as the Town played a friendly at the Buckinghamshire outfit, now known simply as Marlow, in a replica of that stylish strip.

A comfortable win contributed to a successful pre-season for the team. Woking, Kilmarnock, Bedford, and Newcastle were also beaten in the warm up fixtures, as were a Liverpool XI who were overrun by our first team in an impressive 3-0 victory.

The anniversary kit wasn't the only factor in Hatters' new look in the summer, as Richard Money bolstered the squad with no fewer than eight signings.

Coup' was the key word for many of the deals, as the Hatters punched above their weight in signing Pavel Besta and Zdenek Kroca – a Czech pair with fantastic pedigree – as well as grabbing Andy Drury and Adam Murray from newly-promoted League 2 sides Stevenage and Oxford.

But the best news for many Hatters fans was that George Pilkington and Keith Keane agreed extensions to their contracts.

AUGUST

New boy Kroca marked his debut with a goal as Luton ran out 2-1 winners on the opening day at home to Altrincham. Matthew Barnes-Homer was the other scorer that day, and he started the season in red-hot form with five goals in the opening three games, including a hattrick at Kettering.

After a bright start with nine points from the opening three games, the Town ensured an unbeaten opening month of season with draws at home to Newport County and Hayes & Yeading.

Last season's top scorer Tom Craddock left before the transfer deadline signing for Oxford, following the likes of Asa Hall, Janos Kovacs, Rossi Jarvis, and Kevin Nicholls out of the exit door of Kenilworth Road.

SEPTEMBER

Kenyan international Taiwo Ateino resigned

as a free agent and he made his 'second debut' as a substitute in a televised 2-0 defeat away at Grimsby.

Ateino started his first home game as the Hatters notched up a 2-0 win against Cambridge United, which included a first goal for the club for new signing Drury.

High-flying AFC Wimbledon were the next visitors at Kenilworth Road, but the division's leading side couldn't handle Luton's firepower as Kroca, Pilkington and Barnes-Homer fired the Town to a fantastic 3-0 win.

Any hope that the Hatters' season had properly ignited was dampened when they took just one point from a pair of tricky long journeys up north to Darlington and Gateshead.

The month ended positively though, as debutant Amari Morgan-Smith – signed from Ilkeston Town – and Danny Crow registered their first goals for the club in a 2-0 home win over Mansfield, a match in which the Hatters


somehow contrived to miss three penalties and yet still bag the three points.

OCTOBER

Barnes-Homer continued his impressive scoring form with the winner in a 1-0 win away at Barrow, before Crawley came to Kenilworth Road for a tense midweek fixture under floodlights.

The interest surrounding the clash, between the two pre-season favourites was high and the Kenilworth Road faithful were given hope when Drury netted from the spot after Kroca was fouled in the area – a great relief given Luton's recent inability to score from twelve-yards.

But Crawley spoiled the party when Richard Brodie levelled with 10 minutes to go before Craig McAllister's injury-time winner completed

the cruellest of smash-and-grab jobs. The defeat seemed to jolt the Town, and from that game on they proceeded to show something like the goalscoring form of the previous spring.

Eastbourne were despatched 4-2 in a trip to the south coast, before Forest Green were thrashed 6-1 and Bath City beaten 3-1 on the eve of the 125th anniversary. Either side of these important league victories was a 4-0 rout against St Albans in an FA Cup qualifier which saw Morgan-Smith score a hat-trick.

NOVEMBER

A somewhat insipid draw away at lower-league Corby Town in the first round proper of the FA Cup was followed by a miserable 1-0 defeat at Wrexham, a side who seem to be becoming something of a bogey-side for the Hatters.

New signing Alex Lawless notched the winner

in a tough away match at Altrincham, before Money's men continued their rich scoring form at home with a 4-2 win in the replay with Corby and a fine 5-1 hammering of Histon in the league. Jason Walker, another new signing, scoring on his debut against the Stutes.

The Town were drawn against League 1 Charlton in the FA Cup second round, but the team was clearly undaunted against the higher-division opposition despite going a goal behind in the first few minutes at the Valley.

Drury equalised with a rebound from his own penalty, before the Hatters went behind again before half time. The second half saw the visitors play some superb football, which was encapsulated by a fantastic 25-yard curling equaliser late on from the excellent Drury to earn a replay.

DECEMBER

Some Hatters fans were left reaching for the record books as they struggled to remember another month in history during which Luton played no action in the league.

That was the case in December, when chronic bad weather enforced an unscheduled mid-season break to Conference fixtures.

The snow came down halfway through the York game, putting paid to that match as well as all the others scheduled until the end of the month.

The Town did manage to squeeze in a few cup fixtures before the freeze set in, gallantly going down 3-1 in the home replay against Charlton in a scoreline that flattened the visitors, before an extremely young Luton side, including the impressive 17 year-old Alex Lacey, eventually overcame Welling United in the FA Trophy after a replay.

The end of the year saw the Hatters sitting in third place in the table, two points behind the leaders Wimbledon.

5 The number of matches previously played at Kenilworth Road on this date. The Hatters have won all of these matches, scoring 12 goals and conceding four.


3 The Hatters scored three goals in the first meeting on this date when Northampton Town were the visitors for a Division Three fixture back in 1921. Louis Bookman, James Bradley, with his only goal for the Town, and Ernie Simms were the goalscorers.

1 Only one of these fixtures wasn't a League game and that was an FA Cup fourth round tie against Swindon in 1938. The Hatters won 2-1 courtesy of goals from Charlie Ferguson and George Stephenson. This match also saw the highest attendance for a game on this date at Kenilworth Road, as 25,746 fans saw the Town progress to the next round.

0 The only time that the Hatters have kept a clean sheet on this date was in 1955 when goals from Gordon Turner and Roy Davies secured a 2-0 victory over Middlesbrough in a Second Division fixture.

10 The Town beat Derby with only 10 men in 1994. Scott Oakes scored a wonder goal that will still be remembered today by those fans that were there on the day. Paul Telfer had opened the scoring just before half-time, but Derby equalised soon after the break. Ceri Hughes was sent-off before Oakes went on a run from inside his own half, beating seven Derby players, before firing in a shot past Martin Taylor.

11 The number of years since the last game at Kenilworth Road, when Reading were the visitors in 2000. Julian Watts opened the scoring, but Darren Caskey equalised on the hour for the visitors. Liam George netted twice in the last 20 minutes to secure a 3-1 win for the Town in front of 6,044, the lowest



attendance on this date at Kenilworth Road.

9 The number of away games played on this date with the Town winning three, drawing twice and losing on four occasions, scoring 16 goals and conceding 17.

3 The biggest margin of victory on this date was actually from an away game, at Sheffield United in 1977. Jimmy Husband

netted twice and Ron Futter also scored as the Town triumphed 3-0.

4 The most goals scored by the Hatters on this day also came in an away fixture, a First Division match at Brighton & Hove Albion in 1983. Ricky Hill netted twice for the Town, with both Jimmy Case and Gary Stevens scoring own goals in a 4-2 win.



DETERMINATION REWARDED

HARD WORK WITH THE HATTERS PAID OFF, SAYS CURTIS DAVIES

Have a look through the list of players who appeared for Luton Town in the middle part of the last decade and you'll see several who went on to play in the Premier League.

Curtis Davies is just one of those who progressed through the youth ranks at

Kenilworth Road before going on and lining up in the top-flight.

He made his breakthrough at Luton in the 2003/04 season alongside the likes of Emmerson Boyce, Kevin Foley and Leon Barnett - all players who were at different

stages of a similar career path.

Curtis looks back on that period with great pride and says it reflects well on Luton's ability to develop and produce young players.

"It is satisfying, and Leon actually ended up

being my replacement at West Brom as well, which is quite funny!" Curtis recalls.

"It is good that from the group I was in, a lot of us went on to play Premier League football and we had a good, strong group.

"From the year group below us Dean Brill has also gone on and done well at Oldham Athletic.

"It is good and satisfying to see that we made it to the level we did with the facilities we had as it shows that facilities can take you so far, but actually having that ability to go to the next level is important too."

Curtis pinpoints his time at Luton as a good grounding for any young player and says it stood him in good stead for his future career.

"That's the big thing, even the young players these days haven't played at a stadium like a Kenilworth Road," he continued.

"You can play at these nice stadiums with nice facilities but when coming up at Luton, with all due respect, you couldn't get a much worse stadium facilities-wise but the atmosphere at the ground was unbelievable."

"With being at Villa and we go to places like Gillingham I've played at these grounds, I know them, and I'm not intimidated by a ground like that."

"It gives me a one-up coming through the lower leagues."

Curtis was only 18 when he made his Luton debut in a Football League Trophy encounter away to Rushden & Diamonds in 2003, and by his own admission was a "raw teenager" at the time.

But he quickly grew up as he developed his game in a senior environment after graduating from the youth team.

He said: "Luton was a great club to be at because when I think back to the interaction with the first team, at some clubs as a youth team player you would walk into the first team room and they would tell you to get out!

"In our club I think the transition between the



He ranks that moment as his favourite at the club and at the beginning of the following season he was adapting well to life in the Championship - as was the club overall - but at the end of the August 2005 transfer window a move to the Premier League came his way as West Bromwich Albion snapped him up.

Curtis was even involved in the England set-up in Fabio Capello's first squad and he then moved on to Aston Villa in 2007, initially on loan before completing a permanent switch at the end of 2007/08.

It's easy to forget that he is still only 25 and he has been included in England squads again, during which time he was also an unused substitute for the national side's 2-1 win in Germany in 2008.

Curtis' Villa career has slowed in the last couple of seasons after a few injury troubles but now he is back playing first-team football again with a loan spell at Championship side Leicester City.

And with time still on his side, Curtis still wants to achieve plenty in the game.

"The immediate aim is to secure my future," he said.

youth team and the first team wasn't as big because you already knew the lads; it wasn't a daunting a prospect, which helped.

"I had a coach in John Moore behind me and in my opinion he has been one of the biggest influences on my career.

"He was really hard on me which was strange sometimes because I have a good attitude as a player, I want to work hard, but John was hard on players he thought had something about them.

"It made you a better character and from that I've gone on to play at a higher level."

Curtis made 62 appearances in a Luton shirt and was a fixture in the side that claimed the League 1 title in 2005, scoring the first goal at Wrexham that actually clinched top spot in April.

"I would like to stay at Leicester and play as many games as possible until January then hopefully I can have a decision on whether I'm staying at Villa or moving on.

"I want to sort my future and once I've sorted that, be it wherever it is, I'd like to be playing football."

"The biggest ambition, if you look at it that way, is to get back into the England set-up."

"Having been in it at a young age and on the bench for the game against Germany I want more of it."

"Seeing the likes of Gary Cahill coming through, hopefully I can be in there if I'm playing regular Premier League football."



We stick a random pin into club historian Roger Wash's excellent book *Hatters Heroes* and focus on a player who has featured for the Hatters in the past 125 years

David John MOSS

At the age of 16, Witney-born David had the choice of either Oxford or Swindon and opted for the latter who were his boyhood favourites.

He became a regular for the Robins in 1973/74 and over the next four seasons built a growing reputation as a goalscoring winger which led to Luton manager David Pleat nipping in ahead of Stoke to secure his services in 1978.

During his first season at Kenilworth Road David suffered a recurring pelvic injury but once fully fit he showed his full range of skills with the ability to play on either wing, cross the

ball at speed and fierce shooting. He also became the resident dead ball expert in his seven years with the club.

After retiring, he followed his old skipper, Brian Horton, around at various clubs as assistant manager before taking the hot seat at Macclesfield.

David is now involved in the youth development set-up at Liverpool.

● LUTON PLAYER-MANAGER DALLY DUNCAN PREPARES TO TAKE A CORNER AT KENILWORTH ROAD



Douglas 'Dally' Duncan built up a big reputation as a tricky left winger playing for Hull and Derby pre-war and was also awarded 14 caps for Scotland along the way.

After winning an FA Cup winners medal for the Rams in 1945/46 – his side had put out the Hatters in round three – he came to Luton in October 1946 as playercoach when he showed that, even as a veteran, he still had plenty of tricks up his sleeve.

When Hatters manager George Martin was enticed to Newcastle in 1947, Duncan was appointed player-manager at Kenilworth Road

although it was not long before he hung up his boots, finishing in a home game against Tottenham in October 1947 just after his 38th birthday.

Dally Duncan then oversaw one of the most successful periods in the club's history as he gradually built up a young, hungry side which eventually won promotion to the top flight in 1955.

Whether he felt that he had taken the Town as far as he could go after they finished eighth in the old Division One in 1957/58 is not certain, but he accepted the post of manager of newly

promoted Blackburn in October 1958 who he helped to the FA Cup final in 1960 which they lost 3-0 to Wolves.

Dally was sacked by Blackburn soon after the cup final due to the club's lowly League placing and, disillusioned, he moved to Brighton where he ran a small hotel, although he did subsequently carry out some scouting tasks for the Hatters.

Dally died in Brighton in 1990 at the age of 80.

RADDY ANTIC IS SENT TUMBLING ON HIS LUTON DEBUT

The Town's first match of the 1980/81 campaign was away to West Ham at Upton Park - not the ideal start to a season for a variety of reasons.

West Ham were parading both the FA Cup, which they had won at the end of the previous season, and new signing Paul Goddard purchased from QPR for close to a £1m.

Luton, by contrast, were without their previous seasons leading scorer Bob Hatton and had only one cut price signing to boast in Raddy Antic.

Ten minutes before kickoff the crowd of 27,933 was whipped up into a frenzy as the West Ham players carried out a lap of honour with the cup and, as the game commenced, the Town were immediately pushed back by wave after wave of attacking play.

By halftime West Ham were well ahead on

points for, despite Paul Price keeping very close

control over Goddard, only a couple of superb

saves by Jake Findlay and the woodwork had

prevented the Hammers from taking the lead.

West Ham's increasing frustration looked over in the 57th minute when Tony Grealish

upended Pat Holland in the box with Ray Stewart netting from the resulting penalty.

A double substitution then turned the game. Firstly, Goddard limped off to be replaced by defender Frank Lampard and then Alan West came on for the Town for Steve White with Antic being pushed up front in his place.

Gradually the Town began to take the upper hand with West playing some perfect through balls to David Moss and Brian Stein who, in turn, were pulling the West Ham defence all over the place.

The breakthrough came in the 75th minute when Moss, clean through, was tripped by big Hammers defender Alvin Martin.

The winger despatched the spotkick with ease as he did again when, with only two minutes to go, Stein was tripped by Billy Bonds. The carnival atmosphere was now turning positively funereal.

West Ham managed to pick themselves up from this disappointment and, by the time of the return game three months later, they had gone a club record 15 games without defeat and were sitting proudly at the head of the Division Two table.

The Town's form, on the other hand, had been patchy after their fine start to the season. After winning the first two games they then picked up only one more victory in the next 11 games before winning three out of the next four.

This time it was the Town's turn to attack from

the start and their persistence was rewarded in the 13th minute when a through ball from Ricky Hill was touched off by White to the onrushing Stein who hit a scorcher from 20 yards past a helpless Phil Parkes in the West Ham goal.

More excitement was to follow five minutes later when the Town increased their lead with White feeding Stein again, who this time took the ball around Parkes to net from an acute angle.

After looking dead and buried, West Ham continued to fight hard in an open game played in difficult, wet conditions and their perseverance paid off when they reduced the arrears shortly before halftime through a close range header from Trevor Brooking.

The Hammers came out with a vengeance in the second half and threw everything at the Hatters defence and it was not long before the equaliser came, albeit fortunately, from the boot

of Brooking after he fought through several tackles, saw his first shot hit Findlay, his second hit a post and the third creep over the line.

To their credit the Town bounced back and roared on by a best of the season crowd of 17,031 turned up the pressure on the West Ham rearguard once again.

The pressure eventually paid off when, with five minutes left on the clock, Kirk Stephens centred, Hill met it with a flying header and Moss was in position to thump home the winner.

So ended a memorable game, full of everything good in football and without a hint of malice throughout.

West Ham would only lose two more games over the course of that season, both away, as they strode to the championship. The Town finished fifth in the days before the Play-Offs.


Gregg Broughton: "Moses was scouted playing for his club in a cup final at the end of his Under-15 season.

● HATTERS MAKE EUROPEAN HISTORY ONCE AGAIN

A year ago Luton Town became the first non-continental club to lift the Under-15 Hassia Bingen Indoor five-a-side trophy defeating Bundesliga giants Mainz in the final.


In the group stage Town were drawn against German League 1 club Darmstadt and Danish giants Brondby.

This was once again a hard fought game against a big physical opposition. The Town dominated in possession, stuck to the game plan with perfection and won the final 2-1.

History had been made, the Hassia Bingen Under-15 indoor five-a-side trophy had been retained for the very first time.

A delighted manager Martin Prickett told Talk of the Town: "The whole weekend the boys have been very professional and focused in our collective goal, to retain this coveted trophy.

"We learned so much from the first day and to win the warm up tournament was a massive boost, especially beating Brondby.

"On the Sunday the squad was magnificent. Everyone who was called upon delivered and even in the defeat we learned our lessons quickly and made us such a difficult side to play against.

"I'm very pleased for Cauley Woodrow for getting the tournaments' top goalscorer award and equally pleased for Jerome Jibodu who had an outstanding and mature tournament.

"It is very hard to single out players as this really was a squad performance, I'm so proud of the way the team played, how they listened and took on board advice as well as the way they played, at no point throughout the weekend did we look like an English team and that is a measure of how good this squad have performed.

"My thanks must also go to Pam our physio and Ron (Theo) my assistant for all the support and advice they gave the players over the weekend. Combined with the players it really was a dream team with which to work."





Luton Town are a massive club in the Blue Square Bet Premier - the biggest - and for many clubs, taking on the Hatters is the highlight of the season.

That can make life difficult for Richard Money's men, particularly on their travels, while playing in front of a big crowd at Kenilworth Road can either inspire or intimidate visiting sides.

Gateshead came to Luton on the second weekend of last season and played really well in front of a near 7,000 strong crowd.

They rose to the occasion and were afforded plaudits from then Luton boss Mick Harford - but still came away with nothing after losing 2-1.

It was the first time the two clubs had met and while it illustrated how far Gateshead have come in a short space of time, it also showed how quickly Luton have slipped down the ladder.

I remember watching Tyneside's other black-and-white's, Newcastle United, play at Kenilworth Road around 1980 when at College in Leicester.

If someone had told me then that I would one day come back to report on hometown club Gateshead playing Luton in a league game they would have laughed out of sight.

At that time Gateshead were playing in the Northern Premier League and the two clubs were miles apart in stature, the Tynesiders then a part-time outfit.

Gateshead's switch to full-time status during the summer has had a huge impact on an ambitious club that is now run professionally from top to bottom.



It is half a century since Gateshead were last a full-time outfit, when they were unjustly voted out of the Football League in 1960.

Both clubs are just one promotion away from regaining League status, though I suspect Hatters fans will be impatient to get back into the League at the second attempt.

Like Gateshead, Luton are bidding to right a perceived wrong and at this stage of the season it is shaping up to be a three horse race for the title and one automatic promotion slot.

Luton will certainly be keen to avoid the pitfalls of the Play-Offs after defeat in the semi-finals last year.

Luton's record at Kenilworth Road this season is impressive, though it will no doubt stick in the throat that the only league defeat on home soil was against title rivals Crawley Town.

Hatters supporters will also not need to be reminded that one of their five league defeats came at Gateshead in September.

Luton played the second half of that game on Tyneside with ten men, the 1-0 scoreline one of Gateshead's biggest results since they lost Football League status.

With both clubs enjoying a productive week today's game should be a cracker.
