## Trophy history

In 1969 The Football Association introduced The FA Challenge Trophy, a knock-out competition for non-League clubs with

the incentive of an appearance at Wembley for the Finalists.

With amateur clubs still being afforded that opportunity in The FA Amateur Cup (until 1974 when the competition was last played), it was felt that clubs with professional players, who could only enter The FA Cup, should have a more realistic chance of making it to the famed Twin Towers.

Entries for the first Trophy competition in 1969-70 included eight clubs who were destined to enter the Football League:

Barnet, Cambridge United, Hereford United, Kidderminster Harriers, Macclesfield Town, Scarborough, Wimbledon and Wigan Athletic.

Macclesfield beat Telford United 2-0 in the first final, watched by 28,000 at Wembley.

Three clubs have won the Trophy two years in a row: Yorkshire side

Scarborough with wins in 1976 and 1977; Woking with victories in 1994 and 1995 and finally

Kingstonian with victories in the years 1999 and 2000.

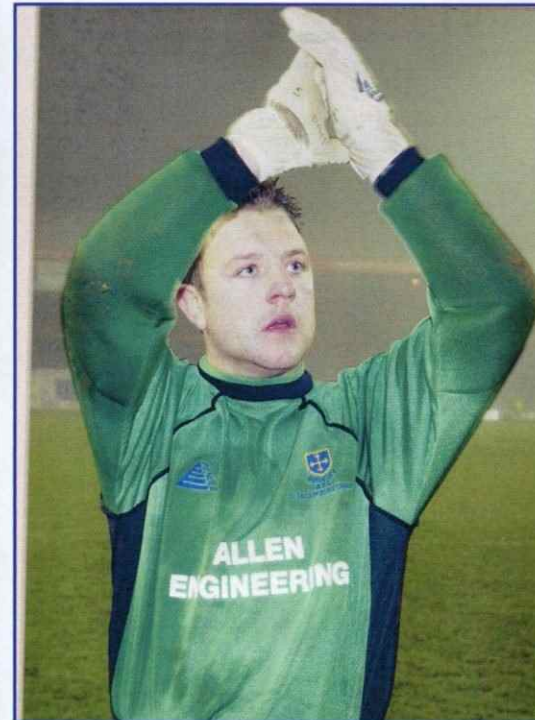

### DIRECTIONS TO KENILWORTH ROAD

**Directions by Road:** Almost everyone who drives to Luton will do so via the M1 whether from the midlands, north, south, south east or south west. The ground is quite difficult to find from Junction 10, so even if you are coming from the south, you might find it easier to go on to Junction 11. If you do leave at Junction 10, follow the signs to the City Centre, then to Dunstable and the ground will be on your left when you get into the one-way system.

**From the North:** Exit the M1 at Junction 11, and join the A505 towards Luton. Follow the A505 for approximately 1.5 miles and Kenilworth Road is on your right as you leave the one-way system along Dunstable Road.

To park, follow the one-way around, turning left, right and right again all in about 100 yards so that you do a complete U-turn and then take the second left into Ash Road.

Continue down to the bottom, turn left at the end and the club is in front of you. Continue straight past the club and the road bends immediately over a dual carriageway bridge. Beyond this is plenty of street parking (and a great fish shop) if you are early.

## Luton Town - Their history

The birth of Luton Town Football Club was never going to be easy. At the meeting called to discuss the formation based, supposedly, on a merger between local clubs, Wanderers and Excelsior an argument ensued.

Officials from the Wanderers club maintained that they had been using the name 'Luton Town' for several months and that the meeting was pointless. Nevertheless that particular point of order was rejected and 'Luton Town Football Club' was dragged screaming into the world on April 11th 1885.

Early games for the newly formed club consisted of friendlies, apart from annual excursions into the English Cup as it was then named. The club began to attract stronger opposition, better players and more spectators such as the growth in industry in Luton at the time.

The foresighted decision to pay three players was taken in 1890 with the remainder being included the following year.

Due to this expense friendly matches were not enough to keep the finances straight and an invitation to become a founder member of the Southern League in 1894 was grabbed with both hands.

Finishing as runners-up to Millwall in each of the first two seasons of the Southern League the club then made a bid for election to the Football League. Their initial proposition failed and a season had to be spent in the United League before they were accepted into Football League Division Two in 1897.

Unfortunately all that glitters is

not gold and the Town found themselves in a predominantly northern based competition with the high cost of travel becoming an escalating burden.

After three years of increasing struggle the club took the decision to rejoin a, now much stronger, Southern League and a period of consolidation followed. Such was the strength of the Southern League that the Town could not return to their former glories and after several seasons of mid-table obscurity suffered relegation to Division Two where most of the teams were based in Wales.

Thankfully promotion back to Division One was achieved two years later, in 1914, and the club emerged from the ordeal far stronger and a great deal wiser.

After hostilities ceased, the Southern League, en bloc, was asked to form a new Division Three of the Football League and the Town then enjoyed 17 seasons at this level mostly.

The board in the mid-1930s, decided to make a concerted bid to achieve a higher status. Players were brought in to help them achieve this objective and their highest ever position was achieved in 1936 when they finished runners-up to Coventry in the days when only one side was promoted. During this campaign, a wing-half, Joe Payne, was handed his debut at centre-forward against Bristol Rovers and he altered the record books at a stroke when scoring 10 goals in a 12-0 victory.

Payne continued into the next season as he left off the last

and it was his remarkable 55 goals out of a total of 103 that helped secure promotion to Division Two on the back of a tremendous home record.

Decisions were immediately taken to extend the Kenilworth Road ground, where the Town had moved in 1905, with the capacity increased to a supposed 34,000. This limit was never seriously tested as the Town held their own in the new higher sphere. In their second season in Division Two, however, a strong and settled squad, ably led from the front by local boy Hugh Billington, nearly achieved promotion to the top flight.

Over Easter 1939, a series of good results had forced the team into the promotion positions, but a draw and two defeats from the final three games meant that they missed out. Unfortunately, no-one will ever know how far this squad could have progressed as in September 1939, with the Town sitting proudly at the top of the table, war broke out. After a seven-year break, it was back to a few seasons of mid-table mediocrity until, in 1950/51, Town came perilously close to suffering relegation back to Division Three, only surviving by dint of a three game winning run as the season drew to a close.

Luckily this scare was not repeated as the Town's youth policy, nurtured by manager Dally Duncan, began to bear fruit. Future all-time leading scorer for the Hatters, Gordon Turner, learnt the ropes under the expert guidance of ex-England international Jesse Pye and, with a settled side,

the Town just missed out on promotion in both 1953 and 1954.

The final push in the fight to earn a Division One spot came in 1954/55 when the Town eventually won through in a titanic struggle with Birmingham and Rotherham. The Hatters finally clinched the runners-up spot on goal average with the Millers the unlucky side to lose out. Town swept all before them early in the following season and were the talk of the football world after beating Newcastle, Blackpool, Wolves and league leaders Sunderland in quick succession, and all by big scores. The euphoria did not last and a mid-table position at the season's end was still probably more than the supporters expected the previous August.

Town finished eighth in 1957/58, their highest ever, and early in the following campaign actually hit top spot before dropping back to mid-table. If the failure to maintain the challenge for the championship was a disappointment then the supporters were in for a treat in another way. The Hatters had never progressed beyond the quarter-finals in the FA Cup before but, in 1958/59 the Wembley band wagon took off as Town fought their way past Leeds, Leicester, Ipswich and Blackpool before seeing off Norwich in the semi-final. Cup euphoria had struck in a big way with a record Kenilworth Road crowd of 30,069 turning out for the quarter-final replay against Blackpool and as many travelling to White Hart Lane

for the semi-final which was drawn with the Town winning through in the re-match.

The final itself was a massive disappointment compared to the run up, with the Town not performing on the day, leaving ten man Nottingham Forest to win comfortably 2-1.

From that moment, the Hatters' fortunes went into a steady decline. Dally Duncan had left in the October before the Cup run started, and it was not until after the final that recently-retired captain and centre-half Syd Owen was appointed into the hot seat.

The Town had a disastrous 1959/60 season and finished bottom, to be relegated after five years at the top.

Owen was replaced by ex-Charlton goalkeeper Sam Bartram, but the rot had set in and 33 players were used in the 1960/61 season but Town could not manage to finish in the top half of the table.

There was a general feeling that Bartram was slowly turning the ship around after he finished the 1961/62 campaign in mid-table but he was relieved of his duties 'by mutual consent'. His replacement was to be ex-Town coach Jack Crompton but he changed his mind after a week in the post on medical grounds.

Bristol City coach Bill Harvey then took over and presided over another relegation campaign as the Town sank dismally to Division Three at the end of 1962/63.

Unfortunately the team plunged headlong towards Division Four at an alarming rate, only saved by an

unexpected nine game unbeaten run as the season drew to a close.

The stay of execution was only temporary as the Town, only six years from their FA Cup Final appearance, slumped to the football basement in 1965 amidst apathy and crowds of less than 3,000. Harvey had resigned mid-season to be replaced by ex-Town player and manager George Martin. The Hatters made a good effort at escaping Division Four at the first attempt and were only let down by rows over player bonuses as the season entered its final couple of games. No money, all experienced players released as a legacy of the bonuses row and crowds at an all time low left a tired George Martin with no option but to resign, to be replaced by Allan Brown, who had starred for Town in the 1959 Cup run.

Brown had some work to do! With the team in second bottom position in November 1966, they crashed 8-1 to bottom club Lincoln, arguably the club's lowest spot in their history.

Gradually things improved with Brown's enthusiasm and astute playing of the transfer market ensuring a final position of 17th which was looked on as a success.

In his first close season in charge, Brown pieced together a squad that would take Town back to where the supporters felt they belonged. The free-transfer signing of veteran centre-half Terry Branston was the catalyst that welded together a mix of youth and experience and after Town

went to the top of the table in February 1968 they never looked back and walked away with the title.

Buoyed by this success, the new season opened as the old one had finished, but the mid-season sacking of manager Brown for 'disloyalty' - he applied for the Leicester job - shocked the football world. The new man, Alec Stock, failed to make it two successive promotions but made no mistake in 1969/70 aided by the goalscoring exploits of a £17,500 signing from Fulham, Malcolm Macdonald.

At one time, the Hatters seemed capable of walking through Division Two back to a top flight they had left in 1960, but the March 1970 announcement of the collapse of Burr and Hunt's Vehicle and General and a disastrous Easter, when all three games were lost, meant that the meteoric rise came to an abrupt halt. Macdonald was sold to Newcastle for a then massive £180,000 and without a proven goalscorer, the 1971/72 season was a complete anti-climax after the excitement of the previous four years.

A weary Stock resigned at the season's end to be replaced by Harry Haslam, who had originally come to the club as promotions manager. Although Town boasted an amazing away record in his first season in charge and reached the quarter-finals of the FA Cup for the first time since 1959, the home record was poor. This was put right, however, in 1973/74 when promotion from

a very average Division Two was achieved.

Behind the scenes the directors felt that promotion had been won far too early and their fears were justified with Town rock bottom at Christmas, but a spirited fightback in the second half of the campaign ended with unfortunate relegation in a blaze of glory.

The brief stay at the top had its financial repercussions and by the middle of the following seasons only the sale of midfielder Peter Anderson prevented the club from folding. Haslam departed in early 1978 to be replaced by David Pleat. His first full season in control almost ended in relegation but his coaching skills and astute transfer dealings gradually came to the fore and after near misses of a return to Division One in 1980 and 1981 promotion came 12 months later in devastating fashion. The championship was won in great style with a brand of attacking football that was to become the Pleat hallmark.

It took a last gasp win at Manchester City to prevent a quick return to Division Two. Visions of Pleat skipping across the Maine Road turf after the 1-0 victory remain some of television's enduring images.

Unfortunately the Hatters were unable to build on this narrow escape and by late autumn 1984 were once again struggling at the wrong end of the table. Boardroom reshuffles and the loosening of the purse strings for Pleat enabled him to buy the players

necessary for long term survival. Amazingly most of these new players were cup-tied as the Town fought through to the FA Cup semi-final where they were narrowly and unluckily beaten by Everton.

The installation of an artificial pitch in the summer of 1985 was warmly greeted initially by the footballing press but gradually mutterings of discontent grew and by the time Town went back to grass in 1991 they had reached a crescendo.

A position of ninth was reached in 1985/86 at the end of which Pleat found the call of Tottenham too great and he departed amid much acrimony. His replacement, John Moore - a stalwart defender from the Fourth Division days - led Town to their highest ever placing in Division One of seventh in 1986/87 and then resigned. Moore's assistant, Ray Harford, was next in the hot seat and presided over a momentous 1987/88 season which included three trips to Wembley as well as yet another FA Cup semi-final, this time against Wimbledon.

Defeat in the Simod Cup final, the Mercantile Credit Centenary Tournament and the FA Cup semi-final appeared to signal a season of glorious failure but on 24th April 1988, an army of 35,000 Luton supporters saw the Hatters win their first ever major trophy. A last-minute strike from Brian Stein saw Town finally overcome Arsenal 3-2 at Wembley in a see-saw thriller in which Arsenal, leading 2-1, were awarded a penalty, which

was brilliantly saved by Andy Dibble, before Town came storming back, leading to skipper Steve Foster lifting the Littlewoods Cup. The Hatters reached the Littlewoods Cup final again the following year but went down 1-3 to Nottingham Forest as the era of success came to a gradual close. A last gasp home win over Norwich in 1989 saved Town from relegation but was not enough to save Harford, who was dismissed mid-way through the following campaign. Ex-Hatters star Jim Ryan took over to see Town escape the drop over the next two seasons before he was replaced by the returning Pleat. This time Town had used up their nine lives and sank back down in 1992 after 10 years at the top. They almost dropped again in 1993. Surprisingly, the Hatters fought through to the FA Cup semi-final once more in 1994 after seeing off Premiership high flyers Newcastle and West Ham along the way. Unfortunately, defeat by Chelsea in a lacklustre game at Wembley meant that all the Town had to look forward to was another fight against relegation which was mercifully achieved. Pleat departed once more at the end of 1994/95 and his replacement, Terry Westley from the coaching staff, was unable to prevent them dropping to the foot of the table. After only a few months in the job he was replaced by the experienced Lennie Lawrence.

The loss of talismanic goalscorer Dwight Marshall with a broken ankle, however, knocked the stuffing out of the side with relegation the inevitable consequence. Back in a division they last left in 1970 the Hatters took a little while to acclimatise but when sharpshooter Tony Thorpe got his eye in, the goals started to flow and by Christmas they had hit top spot. Unfortunately, a late season wobble with too many points dropped at home meant that the Hatters had to settle for third and a place in the play-offs where they were beaten by Crewe. Town then failed to hit the heights for several seasons and even suffered two periods in the hands of receivers as well as a season in the football basement. Thankfully, that period came to end in the summer of 2004 and with the new owners in place the club celebrated one of their greatest achievements in recent years when they won the League One Championship. The Luton Town Board then showed their commitment to the club by splashing out £150,000 on transfer deadline day to secure the signing of Stockport County's Northern Ireland international striker Warren Feeney - the first fee paid for a player by Luton Town since 1998 - some seven years previously! The League One Championship was sealed when the Hatters claimed a 2-1 victory at Wrexham, coming from a goal behind to seal the Championship on St. George's Day in Wales.

It was the second time in three years that the Hatters had joy in Wales after sealing promotion from Division Three at Swansea City in 2002. Over 2,000 travelling Luton Town fans were at the Racecourse Ground to see the Hatters claim the Championship - the first silverware the club had won since lifting the Littlewoods Cup at Wembley against Arsenal in 1988. The addition of a couple of fresh faces saw the squad emulate their start to the previous campaign and take the Championship by storm, maintaining a top five place during the opening months of the season. Liverpool visited Kenilworth Road for an FA Cup tie which will be remembered as a cup classi, Liverpool coming back from 3-1 down to win 5-3. Town only managed six more victories in the 18 league fixtures that followed. However the team could take heart from a fantastic season and a top 10 finish was achieved with a 1-1 draw at Burnley in the final game of the campaign. The 2006-2007 season was largely dominated by the Hatters' off-the-field problems which began with manager Mike Newell blowing the whistle on underhand transfer activity that he knew of within the game. However the season took a dramatic turn for the worse following a thumping 5-1 home victory over Leeds United. A 4-0 thrashing at Everton in the second round of the League Cup bringing everyone back down to earth with a bump.

But worse news was to follow. Prior to the trip to face Ipswich Town at Portman Road, defender Sol Davis suffered a stroke on the team coach leaving the whole club in shock and it was no surprise the following day that - with minds elsewhere - the Hatters were on the receiving end of a 5-0 defeat. The Hatters then went on to equal their all time record of eight consecutive defeats by losing the following six matches which sent them plummeting down the table. Following a fifth straight defeat Newell was dismissed. Former Barton Rovers goalkeeper and Leeds United manager Kevin Blackwell was named as Newell's permanent successor. Relegation to League One was confirmed and Blackwell signed eight players during the summer of 2007 in preparation for a tilt at promotion back to the Championship. However the club were deducted 10 points for failing to administration. From being in a comfortable mid-table position the Hatters found themselves deep in a relegation battle. With the administrator in charge the New Year saw the beginning of player sales which would go on to affect the team's performances. Blackwell then decided to call it quits by saying he would quit the club following the replay at Liverpool. Before the cup replay at Anfield it was announced that the administrator had chosen Luton Town 2020 Ltd as the preferred bidders to take over the club.

The consortium and was headed by famous Hatters fan and TV presenters Nick Owen and included former Hatters legends Steve Foster and Godfrey Ingram as well as other influential businessman all of which were Town supporters. Buoyed by this news it made for an extra-special night at Anfield. The team held on until the final minute of added on time in the first half before Ryan Babel struck the opening goal to break Hatters' hearts. A Steven Gerrard hat-trick and a goal from Sami Hyypia cumulated in a 5-0 defeat. That was to be manager Blackwell's last match in charge as the administrator moved quickly to install legend Mick Harford as his replacement. Relegation to League 2 was confirmed following the 2-1 home defeat to Brighton on 12th April. With the new owners set to take full control of the club in the summer the only problem the Hatters prepared themselves for would have been beginning their League 2 campaign with 15 points deducted for failure to agree to a CVA (Company Voluntary Agreement). However the Football League decided that because the club had been in administration for the third time in nine years, they would punish them further by deducting a further five points. But worse news followed. The club were still being investigated by the Football Association for the past

financial irregularities that had been made public during Mike Newell's time at the club two years previously. As a result the club had a further 10 points docked by the FA which meant the club had to start the season with an incredible 30 point penalty. However, the burden of the points deductions proved too much and relegation out of the Football League was confirmed. It meant the club would start life in the Blue Square Premier in 2009/10 after 89 years in the Football League. The Hatters' first season of Conference football proved to be a rollercoaster one. An indifferent start to the campaign saw Mick Harford leave Kenilworth Road and was replaced by another former Town player, Richard Money. Slowly the team's results and performances improved and a nine match winning streak through March and April propelled the Town into title contention. However, leaders Stevenage - who had themselves overhauled long-time leaders Oxford - proved to be too consistent, winning the division and meant Money's men had to settle for a play-off place. Paired with fifth-placed York City, a goal a minute from time gave York and 1-0 first leg lead and, unfortunately, a similar scoreline in the return leg at Kenilworth Road consigned the Hatters to a second season at non-league level.

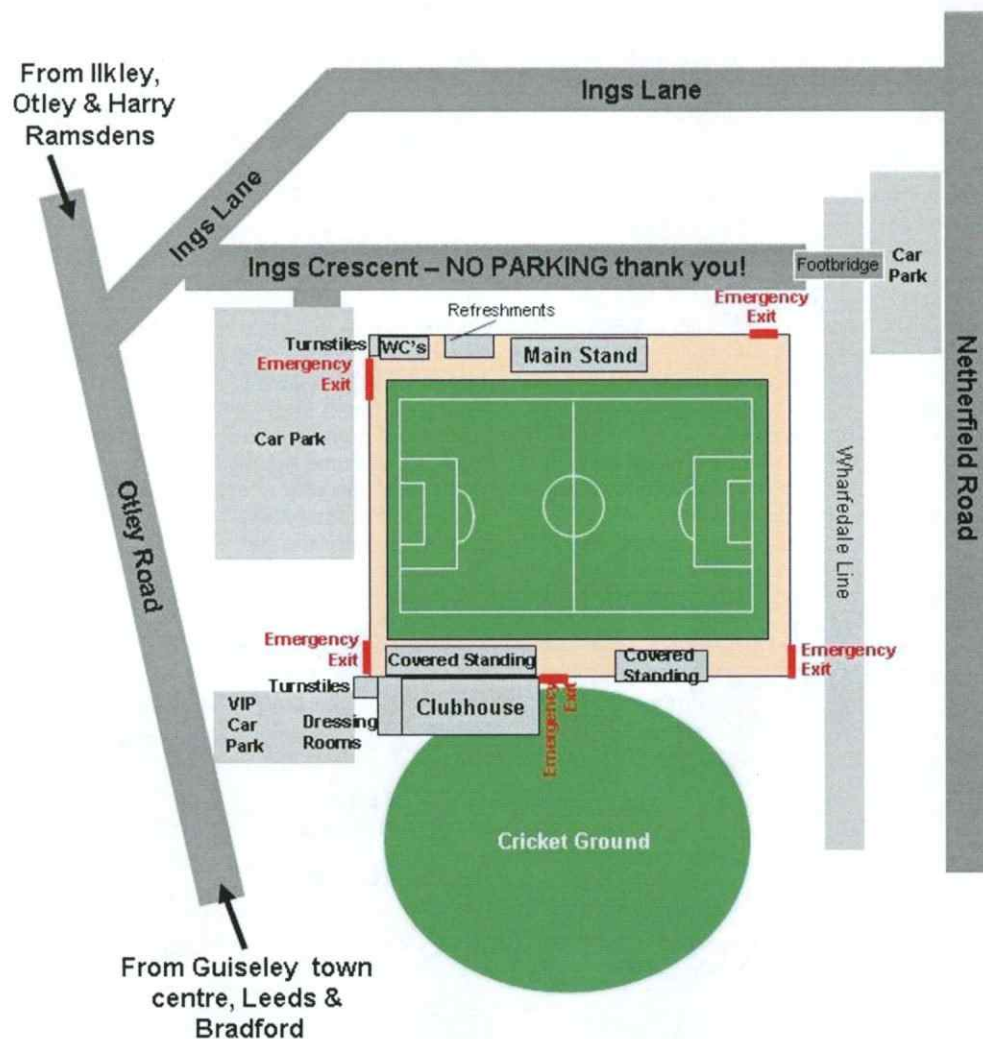

# Luton Town - Pen Pics

## MANAGER

### Richard Money

Lowestoft-born Richard Money became the Hatters' 24th post-war permanent manager to succeed Mick Harford. Dubbed "Dicky Dosh" by Walsall fans after he guided the Saddlers to the League 2 title in 2006/07, Richard played 49 times during his season-long stay at Kenilworth Road in 1982/83.

Richard cut his managerial teeth at Scunthorpe United – who he also served as a player, before going continuing his education overseas with two clubs in Sweden. After a brief stint in Australia it was to Walsall where he enjoyed his most successful spell before joining Newcastle United as Academy Director prior to returning to Bedfordshire.

## GOALKEEPERS

### Mark Tyler

Hugely experienced goalkeeper who signed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road in June 2009 to become Mick Harford's fifth signing of the summer following his release from Peterborough United.

Mark made 483 appearances in 15 years at London Road and was rewarded for his loyalty with a testimonial against Liverpool in 2007. After falling down the pecking order at Posh he found first team opportunities hard to come by and in 2008/09 he was loaned out to League 2 Bury where he made 11 appearances for the Shakers.

A former England Youth international, Tyler was handed the number one shirt by the Hatters boss.

### Kevin Pilkington

Vastly experienced goalkeeper who joined the Hatters in May 2010 after his release from Notts County. Began his career with Manchester United playing six times in the Premier League. During his six years at Old Trafford Pilkington enjoyed loan spells at Rochdale, Rotherham and Celtic before a two-year stay at Port Vale. After 23 league appearances for the Valiants, he was on the move once more, with Aberystwyth Town and Wigan Athletic his next two ports of call. He joined Mansfield in 2000 and went on to feature 167 times in league action over the next five years.

In 2005 the Hitchin-born stopper made the short hop down the M1 to sign for Notts County and a five year stay resulted in him making 141 appearances. Pilkington joined the Hatters on-loan and when the Magpies released him in the summer of 2010, Money was quick to snap up the veteran.

## DEFENDERS

### Luke Graham

Versatile defender signed on-loan from Kettering in January 2011. Started his career with Northampton before moving to Rockingham Road following a successful loan spell. Spent a short time at Mansfield before signing for York City – for

whom he helped to last season's Blue Square Bet Premier Promotion Final. Rejoined Kettering in the summer before moving to Kenilworth Road.

### Zdenek Kroca

Centre-half who impressed in assured display alongside George Pilkington in two pre-season fixtures in 2010 to earn a one-year contract. Kroca made 169 league appearances with home town club Tescoma Zlin in his native Czech Republic. Last season the imposing 6ft 5in defender was in fine form, scoring four times in 27 league appearances with the Letná Stadium outfit as they finished in second place in the Czech second division.

### George Pilkington

Highly experienced defender who joined the club on a free transfer in August 2008. Having started as an Everton trainee, Pilkington joined Port Vale in June 2003, after a loan spell at Exeter City. Having started 223 league games for the Valiants, the highly-regarded defender has been named Player of the Year twice. Pilkington hit the headlines for his goalscoring exploits in Town's first season in the Conference.

### Dan Gleeson

A tall and athletic defender, primarily a right-back, Gleeson signed for the Hatters in the summer of 2010 from his home town club Cambridge United.

A product of the U's academy, Gleeson made his debut at 18 and soon became a regular at the Abbey Stadium making 61 league appearances before Notts County snapped him up in 2006. Gleeson was back at the Abbey, firstly on-loan before resigning permanently in 2007. Recognised as one of the best right-backs outside the Football League, Gleeson's performances have seen him rewarded with seven England C caps.

## Ed Asafu-Adjaye

Capable of playing in any position across defence, Asafu-Adjaye has made significant progress through the club's youth set-up. After a loan spell with non-league side Walton & Hersham, he made the breakthrough into the first team under former boss Mike Newell. Ed went on-loan to Salisbury City and when Mick Harford arrived as manager at Kenilworth Road one of the first things he did was recall the young defender. He has gone from strength to strength and was part of the Town team that won the Johnstone's Paint Trophy at Wembley in 2009.

## Shane Blackett

Luton-born Shane became Mick Harford's sixth summer signing of 2009 after penning a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road. Equally adept at centre-back The Harlow-born winger penned an 18-month contract with the Hatters in January 2011 after hitting 10 goals for Cambridge United.

Capable of playing on either wing or behind the front two, Willmott has an eye for goal. His performances for the U's' youth team saw him break into the senior squad, making his debut as a 17-year-old in September 2007.

## Paul Carden

Experienced central midfielder signed on-loan from Cambridge United in February 2011 until the end of the season.

## Jake Howells

The young winger, who can also play at left-back, came through the ranks at Kenilworth Road and made his first team debut as a second half substitute in May 2008. He made his full debut in the Hatters colours away at Bradford City in October 2008. After making 36 appearances for the Hatters in the 2008/09 the England C international was rewarded for his efforts with a professional contract in May.

## Godfrey Poku

Tenacious defensive midfielder who signed together with JJ O'Donnell from Blue Square South outfit St Albans City in January 2010 on an 18-month contract.

## JJ O'Donnell

Tricky winger who joined the Town with St Albans team-mate Godfrey Poku in January 2010. Also capable of playing in attack. He made his first team debut as a substitute in the 4-2 FA Cup first round replay win over Corby Town.

## Claude Gnaka

A defender capable of playing centre back or full back, who joined on a free transfer in August 2008. Having plied his trade across Europe with Montpellier HSC, Racing de Santander, Deportivo Alaves and FC Vaduz of Liechtenstein, Claude moved to Swindon Town for a brief spell. He was then off again in July 2007 to Peterborough United and was a regular in the League 2 promotion winning side, starting 25 league games.

## Keith Keane

Having made his debut as a 16-year-old in November 2003, Keith Keane went on to enjoy an extended run in the side from February onwards whilst Kevin Foley was out injured. Another product of the youth system who regularly appeared for the Republic of Ireland at schoolboy level.

## Adam Newton

Ascot-born Adam became Mick Harford's second summer signing of 2009 after agreeing a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road following his release from Brentford. Predominantly used as a right winger, the pacey wide man is equally as comfortable at right-back. Adam started his career at West Ham United before signing for Peterborough in May 2002. At the end of the 2007/08 season, Adam was snapped by Andy Scott and Brentford where he helped the Bees to the League 2 title. A St Kitts and Nevis international, he has spent time on-loan at Portsmouth, Notts County and Leyton Orient.

## Adam Watkins

Young midfielder, capable of playing in attack, who signed professional forms at Kenilworth Road in June 2010. A self-confessed Hatters fan, he made his first team bow in a 1-0 defeat at Southampton in the FA Cup third round in January 2010. He spent the tail end of the 2009/10 campaign on-loan at Arlesey Town.

## Charlie Henry

Winger Henry signed from Blue Square Bet Premier rivals Newport County in November 2010, signing initially on-loan until January when the England C international will complete a permanent switch. Henry is no stranger to Kenilworth Road as he came through the youth ranks at the club but was told he was too small to continue his scholarship and left when he was 15. Now 24, Henry came back to Bedfordshire with a bang back in August when hitting a superb goal in front of the Hatters faithful when Newport were the visitors earlier in the campaign. Henry netted nine times as Dean Holdsworth's side plundered over 93 goals last season to romp to the title.

## Alex Lawless

Former Wales Under-21 midfielder who signed in November 2010 initially on-loan from York City before a permanent deal goes through in January 2011. Alex agreed a contract which keeps him at Kenilworth Road at least until the end of the 2011/12 season.

A star of the Minstermen's campaign last season.

## FORWARDS

### Matthew Barnes-Homer

Prolific striker who joined the Hatters on a month's loan from Kidderminster Harriers before agreeing a two-and-a-half year contract to move permanently when the transfer window re-opened on 1st January 2010. The powerful forward followed up his 21 goals in all competitions during 2008/09 with nine goals in 20 league appearances last term. Scored the winner on his debut for England C in their 2-1 win over Poland in November. A trainee at Wolves before going on to lead something of a nomadic life prior to finding his feet at Kidderminster.

### Danny Crow

A nippy poacher of a striker, Crow joined the Hatters from Cambridge United in May 2010 following the expiry of his contract at the Abbey Stadium. The front man started his career as a trainee with Norwich City and made his senior bow in the Premier League for the Canaries in December 2004. A loan spell at Northampton followed towards the end of the 2004/05 season before he was released by Norwich and signed for Peterborough in the summer of 2005, notching 17 goals in his debut season at London Road. Following a short loan spell at Notts County, Crow was released by Posh and was snapped up by Cambridge in September 2008.

## Dan Walker

Quick young forward capable of playing down the flanks who signed a one-year deal in July 2010 after impressing in pre-season in games for and against the Hatters. Previously with Bedford Town, Walker has also played for Stony Stratford Town and Leighton Town. He made his first team debut

## Amari Morgan-Smith

Striker or wide man who arrived at Kenilworth Road as a free agent following a two-year spell at Ilkeston Town. He put pen to paper on a two-year deal after two years with the Blue Square Bet North side in which he scored 34 goals in 77 starts. A fast and skilful frontman.

## Jason Walker

England C international striker signed in November 2010 initially on-loan from Barrow before a permanent deal goes through in January 2011. Barrow-born Walker signed a deal to keep him at Kenilworth Road until the end of the 2011/12 season after the Town beat off a number of clubs to secure his signature. The striker began his career in Scotland with Dundee, coming through the ranks at Dens Park but, after four seasons without featuring, the youngster was snapped by Greenock Morton in 2004. Three years with the Ton followed before he was on the move again, crossing the border to sign for Morecambe.

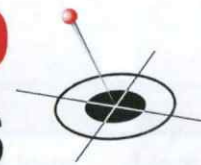
