MONEY TALK

Welcome back to Kenilworth Road for this afternoon's hugely important game against Mansfield Town in the semi-final second leg of the FA Trophy.

I'd like to give a special welcome to Duncan Russell and his team plus the directors, staff and supporters of the Stags.

I have been told they will be filling the away end this afternoon which will make for a fantastic atmosphere.

And so there should be with what's at stake. The winners will be off to Wembley on 7th May - a huge incentive for both teams to play under the arch in front of a big crowd.

Mansfield hold a slender advantage going into this afternoon's game and there's no doubt they will do all they can to ensure they stave off our threat.

The first leg at Field Mill was hugely disappointing. I thought our overall play was poor but that said we created a number of opportunities which would have seen us earn a victory on another day.

Their goalkeeper pulled off four or five terrific saves and George Pilkington hit the crossbar. However, football is all about scoring goals and the fact remains we did not stick the ball in the back of the net and it leaves us in the position of chasing the tie today.

The players were all disappointed we didn't come away with a victory so losing is even more frustrating because Kevin Pilkington barely had a save to make at the other end.

We know it will be tough because this afternoon because we're a goal down but if there's a full

house at Kenilworth Road today who knows what can happen.

It's still all to play for and we're still very much in the tie. It's only half-time and we've got 90 minutes ahead of us.

With our league programme continuing every week it's a difficult balancing act, especially with players ineligible or cup-tied.

I said before the first leg that we're going to have to be very good over the two games to achieve what we want to achieve.

I also said that the first leg is about staying in contention for second leg by putting yourself in the driving seat which would make things a heck of a lot easier.

We might not have done that but we are confident of overturning the deficit. Our form at Kenilworth Road has been fantastic all season and we have scored 45 goals in 18 league games at home in the league.

Mansfield will be in a position of 'stick or twist'. Do they stick with what they've got - knowing it's tough to defend and play for a draw, or twist - going for the jugular but face the possibility of being caught out.

Whatever happens this afternoon we can look back on our run in the competition with pride having given a number of our up-and-coming youngsters their debuts in the earlier rounds.

Welling, Uxbridge, Gloucester and Guiseley have all given us stern tests and further highlights the quality of play in the leagues below ourselves.

I must once again pay tribute and congratulate to work our wonderful youth development

department have done in finding and then nurturing the talent through so we are in a position to blood youngsters in this way and give them valuable first team experience.

The young players that have been involved have all shown the desire, passion and ability to get results and it was fantastic to see so many young players involved in the wins against Welling and Uxbridge, especially.

Should we progress today to a Wembley final their contribution will be recognised and not forgotten.

Our league programme continues unabated and we were unfortunate not pick up all three points at Cambridge on Tuesday night.

It was a valiant effort 48 hours after the first leg against Mansfield where once more we were denied goals by the woodwork and opposition goalkeeper.

While many people will look at the league table and see Crawley 11 points ahead of us there is no reason to panic just yet. With 12 games to go and 36 points to play for anything can happen.

Your support has been fantastic all season and a trip to Wembley would be a fantastic way to reward your backing throughout the competition and throughout the league campaign.

Get behind us today and keep believing.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for what promises to be an exciting few hours at our celebrated home.

I would like to extend a warm welcome to our visitors Mansfield Town, their manager, players, directors, staff and supporters, who have travelled in large numbers down the M1 in support of their team.

The prize for either side this afternoon is a grand one: a trip to Wembley. We all know all too well the experience of a visit to the national stadium and buzz it not just gives the club but the whole town.

It only seems like yesterday we were celebrating our fantastic Johnstone's Paint Trophy victory in front of 55,000 fans three years ago. I don't think I know any Luton Town supporter who wouldn't want to experience that again.

While the FA Trophy might not be the Littlewoods Cup or the JPT, I'm sure you'll join me in wishing that Richard and the players guide us through to another final. We would be the only team in history to reach Wembley in six different competitions, how's that for a record?

Mansfield stand in our way today and hold a slender advantage following last Sunday's first leg at Field Mill. It was frustrating for us all not to see our chances and dominance count for anything when on another day we'd be starting the game this afternoon with a healthy lead. We're just praying that their goalkeeper doesn't play like that again!

It's our belief that we enter any competition with the intention, desire and absolute commitment to win it. You could argue that Wembley is our second home, in which we all should be privileged, given that many Premier League clubs have failed to visit the nation's ancestral home as much as we have.

The FA Trophy has always been a wonderful

competition and our performances so far have been a delight to watch, especially those where players as young as 16 have represented us.

Cauley Woodrow, Alasan Ann, Adam Watkins, Jordan Patrick, Christian Tavemier, Newman Carney and Alex Lacey will remember this competition for their introduction to the first team squad and all made significant contributions along the way to get us to this stage.

While we know that today's game offers us the opportunity to get to a Wembley final we also know that our absolute priority, without compromise, is to win promotion back to the Football League.

Seeing us drop points, as we did on Tuesday evening, presents all of us in the boardroom with as much disappointment and frustration as any other supporter. I, personally, have felt incredibly dejected after a few recent games that have seen us drift away from challenging for the top spot.

However, I have no option but to rationalise the situation for the good of the team, the club and supporters in order to run the business without (too much) emotional distraction and support the management team to get focused on the next game and the next three points.

The team is underperforming. We should be performing more cohesively. But, we have always acknowledged that this league will not always be pretty and above all, we all have the faith and firm belief that we can and will get much more out of the squad. This is our absolute commitment.

Despite not performing at our peak, we are in a good position to get promoted in the most challenging league at any level but Chris Wilder was under similar pressure from the Oxford supporters this time last season and look where they are now!

I have been questioned by some, since Tuesday, about our performances and the abilities of the manager and his squad.

Anyone wishing for a managerial change will be disappointed; any such decision will not be taken at this stage of the season while we are in strong contention. On the contrary, if we are to succeed, we must all have faith in our management team.

We all know that football a very subjective game with over 6,000 managers casting opinions at every home game. Supporters have always and will always disagree with certain choices their manager makes. We must understand that whilst this is what makes the game engaging for a lot of supporters there are often good, logical and justifiable reasons for some decisions that doesn't always come to light.

Primarily however, stability is key for our success, as is your support and commitment so it is vital that we retain a sense of perspective during our run in.

In any other league second place is an automatic promotion spot and while we know one place was up for grabs at the start it is galling to find ourselves in this position for a second season in succession.

Although it may not feel like it, statistically, we are actually living one of the most successful seasons in our history. Some may say its lower league but our budget is set according to our position.

Despite being 11 points off the league leaders, we lie in third place in the table, second on points per game, averaging around two points per game.

With such results, this would ordinarily be considered as excellent form that would usually see us top of any league. In fact, in any division of the Football League, on average, we would currently be in a clear automatic promotion place, a whopping nine points clear of play-offs.

We are all too aware that this is no ordinary league especially when Luton Town is the biggest scalp, but I can assure you that we are resilient enough to succeed.

Let's celebrate the fact that we are in with an excellent chance of the first climb back to where we belong, with a possible Wembley final to boot.

Mansfield's position and a goal up there would be no doubt that we would still go out on the offensive, play football the way we like to and try and win the football match. That's just what we do.

This competition has given a number of players the opportunity and I'd like to thank each and everyone one of them in helping us get this far.

It certainly seems a long time ago that I was watching a young side draw at home to Welling on a cold Sunday afternoon in December.

The manager has used the competition to rest some of the senior players and introduce our up-and-coming youngsters. The performances of everyone have been magnificent and they are a credit to this club.

It means we are in the position to be challenging on two fronts which is fantastic for this club. As players we are well aware of the history and tradition it has for being successful.

Tuesday's draw at Cambridge was another frustrating 90 minutes for us in which we dominated and had chances to win it.

We dropped points and lost ground on Crawley which is disappointing but in fairness to them they are having an unbelievable season. We need to make sure we are there should they slip up and we still have to play them at their place.

We're not giving up on the title just yet and with so many points left to play for there's no doubt it is still within reach. It will be tough but we are determined. As a group we have always

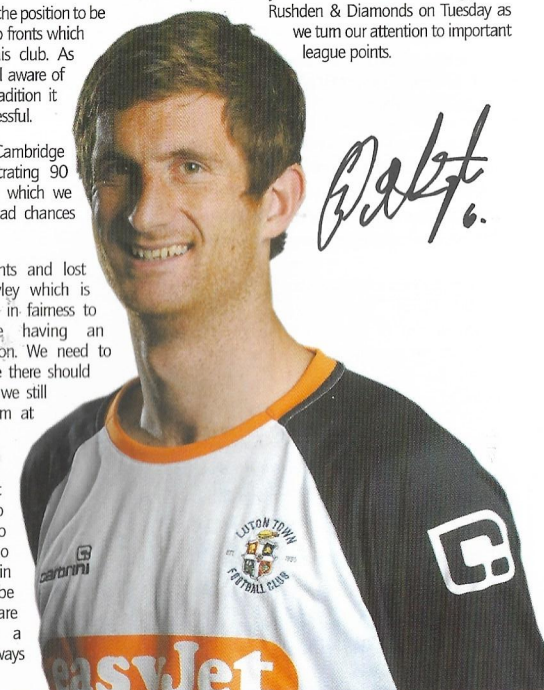
responded well to criticism and disappointment, always bouncing back to prove people wrong.

HATTERS CHATTER

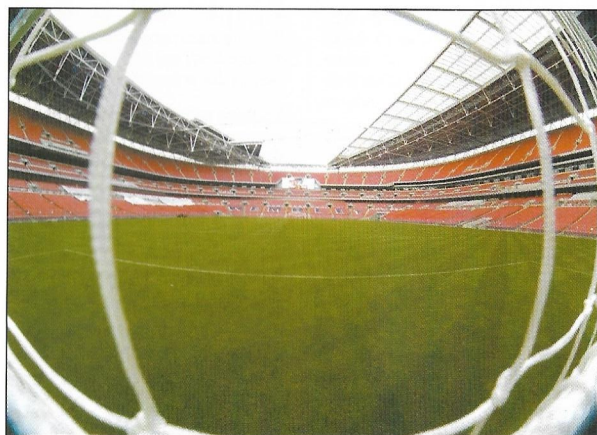
ALL TO PLAY FOR

Town midfielders Adam Watkins and JJ O'Donnell have joined Harrow Borough and St Albans City respectively, on loan, for a month.

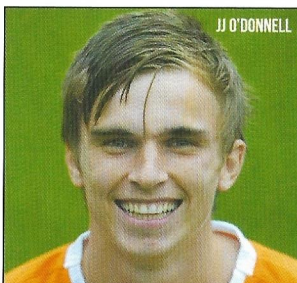

Hatters manager Richard Money said: "As we have a number of players back from injury we thought it was best to give both players regular, competitive football."

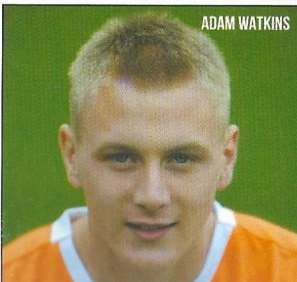
O'Donnell was delighted to help his new side to victory over Staines Town on Saturday.

INTRODUCING MANSFIELD TOWN

HISTORY

This is the Stags' third season in the Conference this summer, following their relegation from the Football League in 2007/08 which ended their 77-year stay among the 92 clubs.

David Holdsworth - who took over in December 2008 - led the Stags to a ninth place finish in the league, enjoying a fine home record but finding it difficult to earn results on their travels. The club were deducted four points by the Conference the season before last for fielding an ineligible player in their opening two games of the campaign in which they won and drew.

The Field Mill faithful last tasted success when winning promotion along with the Town in 2001/02 finishing in third place earning promotion to the then Division 2.

They only lasted one season in Division 2 before relegation back to the League's basement division - only for them to lose in the Play-Off final at the Millennium Stadium against Huddersfield in 2003/04, their first season back in Division 3.

LAST TIME AT KENILWORTH ROAD

LUTON TOWN 2-0 MANSFIELD TOWN
28th September 2010

On a night of high drama the Hatters missed three penalties but two goals in three minutes kept up their unbeaten home record with a 2-0 victory over 10-man Mansfield.

The night's tension, however, began in a two-minute period when the referee booked two players for either side.

However on 14 minutes, the Town should have had the lead when Claude Gnaka saw a shot saved by Alan Marriott before hitting the followup just past the post.

Danny Crow bundled a shot wide of the upright on 25 minutes before Adam Smith

missed a fine chance for the Stags three minutes later.

The drama started two minutes before the break when Gnaka missed a penalty after Gary Mills had handled in the box. However the referee had spotted an infringement and the spot-kick was ordered to be retaken.

Crow saw his effort saved which sparked a 19-man brawl which eventually led to Mansfield skipper Steve Foster sent-off for a second bookable offence and Stags boss David Holdsworth sent from the dugout.

Then, 13 seconds into the second period, Gnaka was sent tumbling in the box by Kevin Sandwith to give the Hatters their third chance to net from the spot but Matthew Barnes-Homer sent his kick over the bar.

But on 51 minutes the relief around the ground was lifted when, finally, the Town had the lead when Crow smashed home from close range following Jake Howells' low cross.

There was no let-up in the action and Hatters fans were on their feet three minutes later to celebrate Amari Morgan-Smith's debut goal when he sent an accurate shot past Marriott from the edge of the area.

Morgan-Smith missed an opportunity to put the game beyond doubt when he sent a low shot into the arms of Marriott, after Crow had raced clear before Dan Gleeson, Morgan-Smith, Crow and Zdenek Kroca all came close to extending the Town's lead but in the end 2-0 was enough.

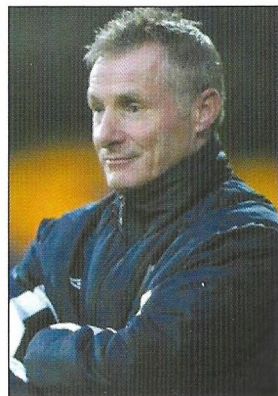
MEET THE MANAGER:

DUNCAN RUSSELL

Duncan was appointed manager in December after an impressive three match unbeaten spell as Caretaker Manager. Following former boss David Holdsworth's departure by mutual consent in November, he came out top in an exhaustive interview process which saw over 40 applicants reduced to a four-man shortlist.

Duncan had been Holdsworth's assistant since the beginning of the current season and was handed the job for a number of reasons including his record of working with high quality players at Championship level, his many contacts in the game, the respect he has earned from the playing squad in addition to his unbeaten record in temporary charge.

The former Army officer, 52, a UEFA A Licence holder, has held coaching roles at six different clubs over the last 12 years including Derby County, Walsall, Wolves and MK Dons.



Holding a slender 1-0 advantage from the first leg thanks to Danny Mitchley's goal, Mansfield arrive at Kenilworth Road on the back of a 2-1 defeat at the hands of York City in midweek.

The Stags took the lead in the game through Tom Naylor but went down to two second half goals from Jamie Read.

Mansfield boss Duncan Russell said he felt that his side had done enough to earn at least a point.

"I thought we gifted them two goals. They were sloppy goals to concede," he said. "I was disappointed not to get a point out of that because I thought it was the least we deserved.

"I am a little bit annoyed that we did not make them work for their goals.

"It has to frustrate you as a player. You have to sit down and ask whether you lost the game or whether you gave it away.

"I thought we gave it away, I really did. I do not mind losing a game against a team that deserves it. I will hold my hands up then.

"But they did not deserve to win that, we deserved a point. They had a lucky night."

With the Stags hopes of a Play-Off place fading, he admitted it does put more emphasis on getting a result at Kenilworth Road to ensure that his side secure a trip to Wembley.

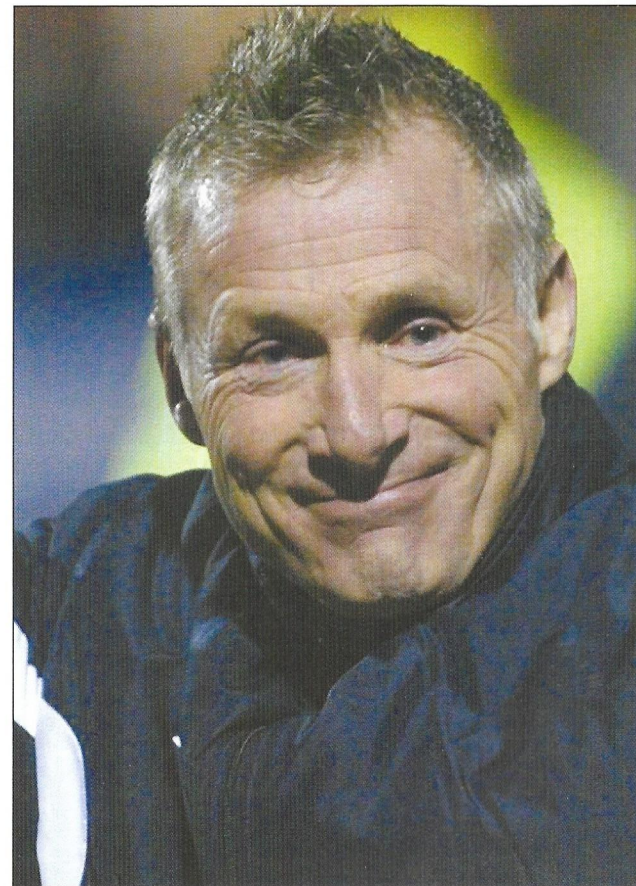
"It is a big ask for us now. If we had kicked on and got three points, we would have been much better off," he said.

"We have lost four games in 20, which is not a bad stat. But I am just disappointed to have lost the game in the manner we did. We did not deserve to lose.

"I can tell you that we will keep fighting for every point. We want to finish as high as we possibly can in the table and see where that takes us.

"But now we can prepare for 90 minutes of football that could take us to a Wembley final."

Speaking after last Sunday's first leg Duncan stressed the importance of taking an advantage it today's game.

"It was really important we took a lead, especially with the home tie coming first," he said.

"The job is only halfdone and we now have to

go to Luton and recreate that performance.

"We must go there and make sure we don't lose the game. Even if we draw it we would go through."

GOALKEEPERS

DAVID GROF

Notts County goalkeeper David Grof became the third new arrival in January after joining on loan until the end of the current campaign. His arrival at Field Mill came on a busy transfer deadline day with his paperwork being completed shortly before the 11pm cut off.

The 21-year-old comes highly rated at Meadow Lane and is currently the Magpies' third choice shotstopper. Hungarian-born, the promising youngster joined County on a one year deal in July having previously played for Hibernian in the Scottish Premier League. He was sent out on loan to Tamworth earlier this season to pick up some valuable experience before being recalled by Paul Ince following an injury to Rob Burch.

ALAN MARIOTT

Alan Marriott is highly regarded as one of the best goalkeepers outside of the Football League. The Bedford-born shotstopper joined the Stags in January 2009 following a 12 game spell at Rushden & Diamonds.

Marriott began his career at Tottenham Hotspur as a trainee but was released in 1999 without making a first team appearance prior to joining Lincoln City.

He went on to make just over 350 appearances for the Imps and featured in all of their five consecutive Play-Off finishes in League 2 between 2003 and 2007.

Marriott broke a number of the club's records including becoming the first goalkeeper to keep 100 clean sheets and play in 140 consecutive games.

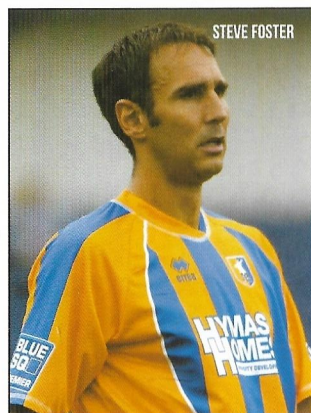
DEFENDERS

STEVE FOSTER

Steve Foster, the son of former Mansfield Town defender Colin Foster, began his career at Mansfield Town in 1992, where he made five appearances before being released by the club.

He then furthered his career by playing for such clubs as Scunthorpe United, Bristol Rovers, Doncaster United and Darlington.

Having chalked up 620 appearances in a

career which has seen three promotions, Foster was seen as the ideal choice to be Stags' new captain when he signed in the summer. Foster is considered a hero amongst Mansfield fans and is a lifelong fan of the club.

TOM NAYLOR

Young defender Tom Naylor signed his first professional contract when putting pen to paper in a two year deal with the club in March 2009.

Born in Sutton-in-Ashfield, the teenager who stands at 6ft 2in tall graduated through the Stags' youth system where he was converted from a central midfielder to centre half.

KEVIN SANDWITH

Experienced full-back Kevin Sandwith began his career as a trainee at Carlisle United and made his league debut in October 1997. He then joined non-league Barrow in May the following year, where he made 14 appearances, scoring three goals. Doncaster Rovers was his next stop, in 2001.

In November 2002, Sandwith moved to Halifax Town. Impressing a watching Lincoln City scout during his time at The Shay, he secured a £10,000 transfer to Sincil Bank in 2004.

Moves to Macclesfield Town and Chester City followed, where then City manager Mark Wright commented: "He [Sandwith] is undoubtedly one of the best players in this league at delivering a ball with his left foot, from freekicks and corners".

Kevin signed for Weymouth in July 2008, before moving to Oxford United in the February of the following year. He signed for the Stags in the

summer and has become one of the club's most appeared players this campaign.

GARY SILK

Gary Silk's impressive displays in 2008/09 earned him several accolades at the Club's awards ceremony including Player of the Season and the Players' Player of the Season awards.

Silk played for Notts County between 2006 and 2008 and is credited with several tremendous performances from a right back position.

Although he began his career at Portsmouth, Silk made his professional debut whilst on a loan spell at Barnet. After that he spent the majority of the 2004/05 season on loan at Wycombe where he featured 22 times.

When his Portsmouth contract expired he joined Notts County where he played 63 times and scored two goals before joining Mansfield Town in 2008. He is held in high regard by supporters and is considered one of Stags' best ever right-backs.

DAN SPENCE

Manager Duncan Russell added defender Spence to the squad until the end of the season. The 21-year-old former Reading right back came as a free agent and has Conference experience after featuring for Salisbury throughout 2009 prior to a move to Glenn Hoddle's soccer academy in Spain. Russell was impressed by what he saw in a trial organised by Glenn Hoddle and the player's agent George Foster.

MIDFIELDERS

LOUIS BRISCOE

Comfortable on either wing or as a central striker, Briscoe began his career as a trainee at Port Vale where he made four appearances for the first team.

After his release from Vale in 2007 he spent the next couple of years playing parttime football, and can list Gresley Rovers, Leek Town, Stafford Rangers and Ilkeston Town amongst his former clubs.

Briscoe was handed a second bite at the professional cherry when David Holdsworth signed him in January 2009.

ASHLEY CAIN

Fleetfooted winger Cain put pen to paper on a one year deal with the club in July 2010 following a successful preseason trial.

The 19-year-old came through the youth setup at Coventry before enjoying loan spells with Luton and Oxford last season.

STEVEN ISTEAD

Midfielder Istead began his career at Newcastle but left to join Hartlepool in 2002 without making a single first team appearance. He played 64 times for Hartlepool and even became the youngest player ever to play for the club before his release in 2006.

Istead then went onto play for non-league clubs Gateshead and Consett before rejoining his old Hartlepool boss Neale Cooper at Peterhead. After 22 appearances in Scotland he returned south of the border to join Ilkeston Town where David Holdsworth was then the manager.

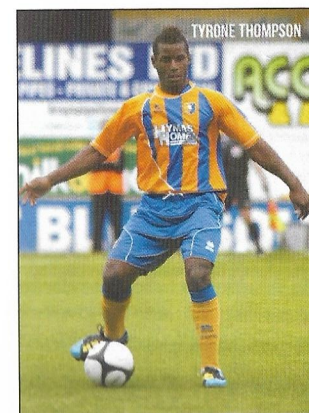
Holdsworth swooped to resign the youngster for the Stags for the 2009 season using him 15 times at Field Mill.

KYLE NIX

Australian-born Nix began his career as a young professional at both Manchester United and Aston Villa before joining Sheffield United in 2005.

After his stint at Bramall Lane he moved to non-league Buxton where he played six times and in 2007 the left winger was offered a short term contract at Bradford City by manager Stuart McCall - who knew Nix from his time at Sheffield United.

Nix netted on his debut for the Bantams in a Carling Cup tie against Wolverhampton

Wanderers and made his league debut three days later at Shrewsbury Town.

After an impressive run of performances for Bradford City he was offered a longer deal which kept him at the club until the end of the 2008/09 season.

Now in his second season at Field Mill, Nix also brings international experience to the club having represented England from U16s through to U20s. Whilst playing for the Under-17s he scored twice in a 4-0 victory over the Faroe Islands whilst playing in the Nordic International tournament in 2002.

ADAM SMITH

Flying winger Smith emerged through Chesterfield's youth ranks and made his first team debut as substitute away to Port Vale in November 2002. Adam left the club after seven seasons at Saltergate, in which time he enjoyed a short loan spell at Lincoln. Soon after leaving Saltergate, he had a brief stint at Gainsborough Trinity. York City were soon to poach the 25-year-old for an undisclosed fee, but after almost two years with the Minstermen, Adam felt the time was right to make another move, this time to Field Mill in the summer.

TYRONE THOMPSON

Thompson joined the club alongside fellow new signing Keigan Parker in July.

The 29-year-old midfielder came through Sheffield United's Centre of Excellence and made one appearance for the Blades before his 2003 move to Huddersfield. Stints at Scarborough, Halifax and Crawley followed and most recently Torquay where he amassed 47 appearances over the last two seasons.

STRIKERS

PAUL CONNOR

Prolific frontman Paul Connor was signed by Middlesbrough straight after he left school. He has spent all of career in the Football League, scoring 29 goals for Rochdale between 2001-2004. Rochdale paid a sizeable £150,000 for his services, before he joined Swansea City in 2004.

After scoring 16 goals for Swansea City in his two year term, he progressed onto Leyton Orient, Cheltenham, and Lincoln City netting a total of 14 goals.

He was delighted to sign for the Stags this season, putting pen to paper on a one year contract, before extending his deal last month.

DANNY MITCHELEY

Danny joined the club on non-contract terms in November 2010 after sufficiently impressing manager David Holdsworth during preseason training and then a trial period here at Field Mill. The 21-year-old frontman was a free agent following his release by Premiership side Blackpool over the summer, a club he originally signed for in 2008.

He starred at both youth and reserve level for the Tangerines but with Blackpool riding high in the Championship, and then pushing towards promotion last season, he was loaned out to Southport, Burscough and finally Wrexham in March 2010 to gain first team experience.

He opened his account in only his second appearances for Stags against Forest Green Rovers less than a week after his arrival.

MATCH REPORT

The Town scored twice past Tamworth stand-in goalkeeper Tom Marshall to record a comfortable victory.

The game turned in the 10th minute when the Lambs' number one stopper Liam Mitchell was forced off with a hand injury.

With no substitute goalkeeper on the bench the visitors had to rely on centre-half Marshall to keep the Hatters at bay.

It took the Town until the 18th minute to test the rookie goalkeeper when Claude Gnaka rode a cynical challenge to continue running into the penalty area and blast a low shot at the near post that Marshall kicked away.

The Frenchman looked like a man on a mission and five minutes later his back post header was tipped away by Marshall as the Town hunted the opening goal.

Tamworth's need to protect their goalkeeper in search of a point meant the Hatters dominated possession but the home crowd began to get restless when Marshall again came to the Lambs' rescue on 35 minutes when he did well to stop Zdenek Kroca's near post header from finding the back of the net.

However the tension inside Kenilworth Road was lifted seven minutes before half-time when Matthew Barnes-Homer won a freekick 20yards from goal.

The freekick, floated in superbly by Jake Howells was met by Lloyd Owusu who directed a header beyond Marshall.

The Town, and Freddie Murray in particular, thought they should have had a penalty a minute before the break when the left-back was upended but the hosts almost made it 2-0 four minutes into the second half when a Howells header was caught by Marshall.

Gnaka poked a ball over the bar following fine football in the 56th minute before the Hatters made the points safe on the hour when Gnaka laid off the ball in a crowded penalty box to Barnes-Homer who hammered home his second goal in as many games.

Shots continued to rain down on the visitors' goal with Howells dragging a shot wide and Barnes-Homer rifling a shot inches wide of the post on 74 minutes.

The Town continued to press looking for a third but Tamworth were able to keep them to just two to move them two points clearer to Crawley at the top following their draw with Kidderminster.

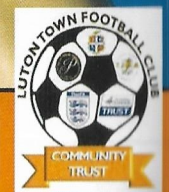
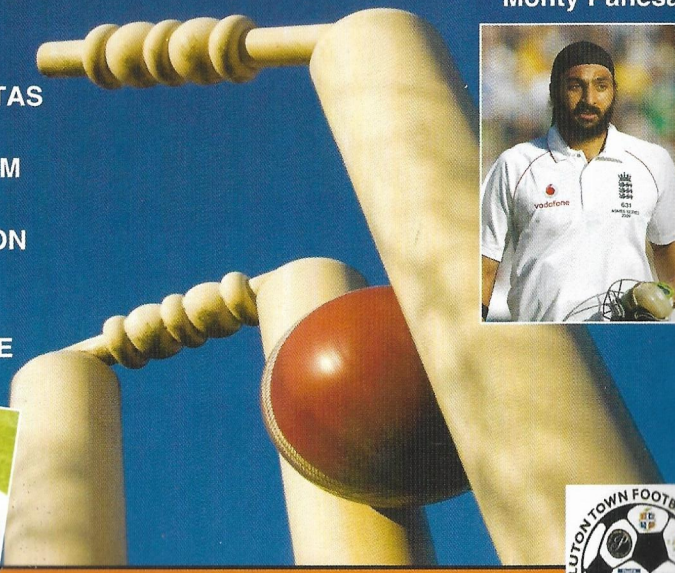
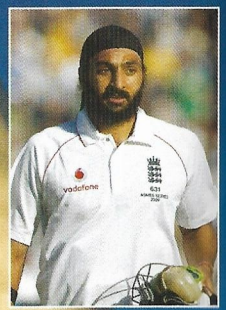

POST-MATCH REACTION

Last time out at Kenilworth Road the Hatters ran out as comfortable 2-0 winners over Tamworth thanks to a goal in each half from Lloyd Owusu and Matthew Barnes-Homer.

The game presented the chance for Alex Lawless to get 90 minutes under his belt as the midfielder topped up his match fitness following his recent absence.

Boosted by the run out the former Wales Under-21 man told Talk of the Town: "I haven't played for the last couple of weeks, the last full game I played was Fleetwood, and it was frustrating coming off so early in the Guiseley game. It was quite tiring today but I think the adrenaline got me through in the end.

"As the days were going by it was proving challenging for me because it was getting better but I still couldn't do what I needed to and then I had a good session with the physio and since then I have felt fine.

"I was pleased to get the nod to start, it was a bit of a surprise so I was delighted.

Having come off against Guiseley and then not been able to play for a couple of weeks it was quite frustrating so I was really up for it."

Lawless was forced off after just 12 minutes of the 1-0 win at Guiseley at the end of February. Reflecting on the

disappointment of the incident that forced him off, the former York man said: "I was running down the line to chase one of their players and one of them tried to be clever and block me, but I think he's done it a little bit unfairly to be honest with you which was even more annoying really because it could have been avoided.

"I didn't anticipate it so I couldn't protect myself and he just caught me in the hip with his knee; I thought I could carry on but I wasn't able to."

The victory over the Lambs, avenged the Hatters away defeat earlier in the season and Lawless was pleased that Luton were able to extend their unbeaten run to five games with the win.

"We have got such a strong team and a good mentality that we are always confident that we are going to win, sometimes it takes a bit longer but we got there in the end.

"I think in most of our home games, like Gateshead, we have created chances - we slipped up there a little bit - but we have improved in the last couple of months since that match.

"We were patient and kept plugging away. Ideally we always want to score more than we do, our expectations are really high but you know sometimes it doesn't work like that and, having got in front, it is just good to make sure we don't concede."

MATCH REPORT

An inspired display from Mansfield goalkeeper David Grof meant the Town go into this afternoon's second leg a goal down in their FA Trophy semi-final.

The home stopper made six superb saves to thwart the Hatters and they were made to pay for those misses on 62 minutes when Danny Mitchley's turn and shot beat Kevin Pilkington and went in off the post to give the Stags the lead.

The Town came close to taking the lead in the 12th minute when a super move down the left saw Freddie Murray cut the ball back for Lloyd Owusu whose lay-off to Matthew Barnes-Homer saw the striker fire over the crossbar.

Murray tried his luck with a firsttime shot from the edge of the area that flashed wide on 19 minutes before Grof pulled off his first save of the afternoon to keep out Jake Howells' deflected shot.

George Pilkington had to be at his best to deny Kyle Nix a shot on goal on 31 minutes after Mitchley had gone down in the box looking for a penalty while Connor also had the ball in the net only to be denied by an offside flag.

However, back came the Hatters and it was Grof's agility that kept out a goalbound header from Owusu on 43 minutes following Keith Keane's deep cross.

The Town almost took the lead on 54 minutes when Barnes-Homer brushed off his marker to put the ball on a plate for the onrushing Alex Lawless but from 12-yards his side foot effort was parried away spectacularly by Grof.

Still the Town pressed but still found the Mansfield goal impossible to breach: Grof denied Lawless again on 61 minutes and seconds later Pilkington's back post header hit the crossbar.

Breathing a sigh of relief, Mansfield broke forward immediately and after finding time to hold the ball up Mitchley turned Pilkington to find the smallest of gaps to stroke home the opening goal against the run of play.

The Town's response was good and it should have been 1-1 on 73 minutes but substitute Danny Crow saw his close range header from a Howells cross saved again by that man Grof.

POST-MATCH REACTION

Despite not having as much to do as his opposite number David Grof, goalkeeper Kevin Pilkington ended up on the losing side as the Town went down 1-0 to Mansfield in the first leg of their FA Trophy semi-final.

"We haven't been able to get the ball down and pass it as well as we could have so it is disappointing in that aspect but it's only halftime in the tie. We have got next week to come and hopefully we will turn it around then," Pilkington said afterwards.

"The Gaffer has said we can't play any worse than that so we can come out next week and put on a performance and hopefully we can get back into the match and go on and get to Wembley.

"We've created chances without even playing well and we have to look at the positives after a loss like this. Their goalkeeper has made three or four really good saves and you can see why he got man of the match.

"It is very frustrating when I'm not that busy yet we end up coming away having lost 1-0."

The goal that beat him arrived just after the hour mark, courtesy of Danny Mitchley and it was one that Pilkington was disappointed to concede.

He said: "It has gone through Pilks' legs and then he got a nice little turn on it and got a good

connection to it. I got a little touch onto the post with it but unfortunately it has gone the wrong side of the post for my liking and it ended up dribbling in."

Pilkington, who spent five years at Field Mill between 2000 and 2005, making over 160 appearances, had a three-month loan spell earlier this season with the Stags.

His last appearances for Mansfield was in early January and he was surprised to receive a mixed reaction on his return.

He explained: "I was a bit surprised and disappointed with that, I came here for three months and I felt I had done well for them, the reception I got wasn't one I was expecting.

"Some fans have got short memories. I got promoted here, got to the Play-Off final here and had five good years with them so it was disappointing to get booed by a minority of their supporters but that's football fans for you.

"I'm a Luton Town player now and my focus is in doing well for the club."

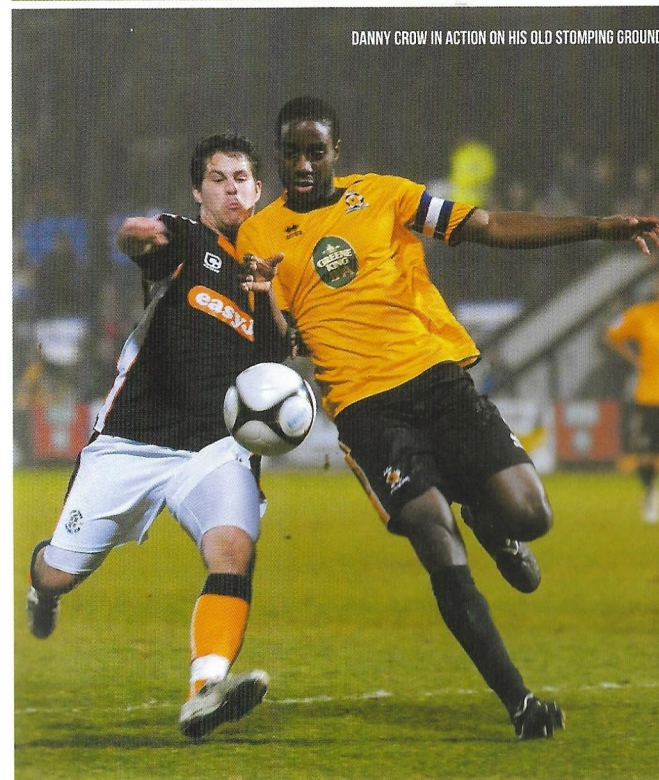

MATCH REPORT

The Hatters hit the woodwork in the first half and forced Cambridge goalkeeper Simon Brown into three vital saves in the second but could not break down their struggling hosts.

It took until the 28th minute for either side to create a worthwhile chance and it almost saw the visitors take the lead.

Robbie Willmott, whipped in a dangerous free-kick from the left that Zdenek Kroca met with a bullet header but the centre-half's effort cannoned off the underside of the crossbar.

Cambridge slowly but surely worked their way back into the game and after Danny Crow headed wide on 33 minutes, Liam Hughes' daisy-cutter from the edge of the box two minutes later was saved by Mark Tyler.

Willmott's pace down both flanks was causing the hosts problems and he almost broke the deadlock on 38 minutes when good work from Adam Newton, Crow and Lloyd Owusu set the winger up to flash a shot just wide of the post.

On 41 minutes Danny Wright's header at the backpost rebounded off the crossbar and from five yards David Partridge slammed the ball over the crossbar with the goal gaping.

Two minutes later the U's should have been ahead when Wright strode clear of the Hatters defence but the home striker fluffed his lines when one-on-one with Tyler, with a shot that bounced well wide.

Cambridge had the ball in the net in first half injury time but Luke Berry's stunning acrobatic overhead kick was disallowed for handball.

Three minutes after the restart the Hatters were denied the lead by a fingertip save by Brown. He stopped Owusu's towering header from finding the net before Cambridge had the ball in the net for a second time on 55 minutes but Wright's tap-in was ruled out for a foul on Claude Gnackpa.

Wright hit the side-netting on 74 minutes after a nice flowing move for the U's but the Town hit back with 15 minutes left on the clock when Brown saved Gnackpa's fierce shot.

Both sides went for the jugular in an end-to-end final 10 minutes but it was the Hatters who came the closest to finding a late winner when Keith Kean's drive from 12-yards, with two minutes left was well saved.

"I am a Luton town player now so they can say whatever they want. I have moved on from Cambridge, made a career choice, and I know I have made the right one.

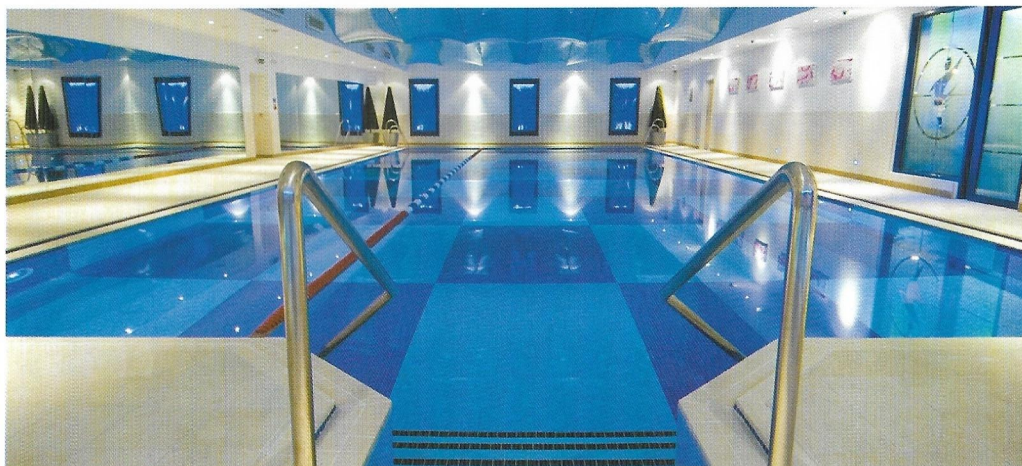
"I am at a team that is pushing for the league rather than one fighting relegation. Career wise it was right for me and Luton is a great club to be at right now."

"I am right behind the lads 100%. I have played at Wembley and it is a great experience, and a great day out for the fans so I am right behind them and would love to have another day out there again."

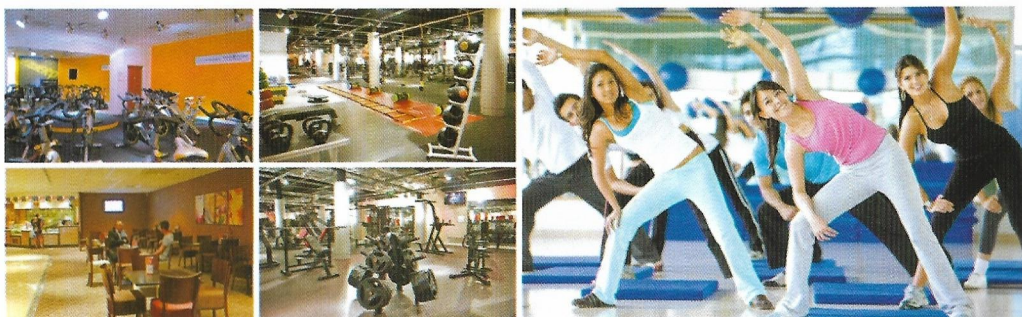

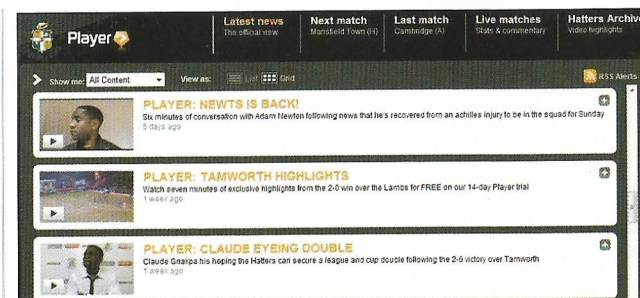
The Town boss was pleased with the way his side ground out a 2-0 victory against a Tamworth side who played almost 80 minutes with an outfield player in goal.

The winger also explained to the Player cameras that he knows he's made the right career move by joining the Town and hailed the 900 Hatters fans that made the midweek trip.

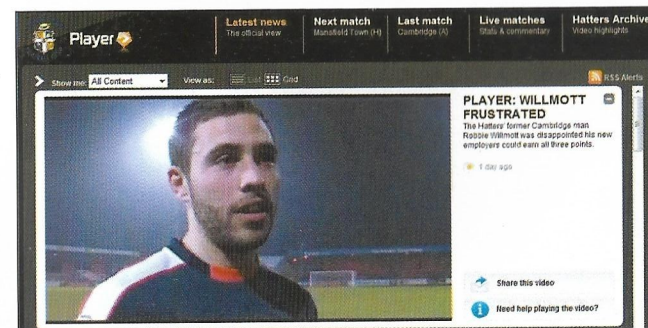

THE LUTON TOWN PHILOSOPHY

DAVID PLEAT LOOKS BACK ON WONDERFUL TIMES AT KENILWORTH ROAD

David Pleat's two spells as manager of Luton Town along with his period as a player at Kenilworth Road mean he retains a massive affinity for the Hatters.

He pulled on a Luton shirt from 1964 to 1967, making 70 League appearances, and had a hugely successful time in charge from 1978 to 1986 before returning again from 1991 to 1995.

David's love for Luton is as strong as Luton's love for David and was evident when he returned for the club's 125th anniversary celebrations and spoke alongside Raddy Antic and Brian Horton.

One of his big pleasures is that many of the players he managed, particularly during his first spell, have gone on to enjoy good careers as coaches or bosses in their own right.

And that image of him running on to the pitch at Maine Road in 1983 after the dramatic escape from relegation at the expense of Manchester City is forever etched on the minds of all Luton fans.

David recalls the day with great emotion, particularly as it came at a time of family difficulty.



He said: "I look back on that day and in my brain was that we [the coaching staff] had done our work, it is in the players' hands, which it always is.

"Sometimes someone up there smiles down on you, sometimes it goes the other way.

"I came to Luton in 1963. I met my wife here, and the day before the City game my wife's father sadly passed away.

"We had all sorts of phone calls from back home and I think I just lost it [when running on to the pitch], it meant so much.

"Her father was a Lutonian born and bred, he had a greengrocer's shop on Princess Street, and I just thought when I ran on that my wife's father would have been so pleased at Luton staying up.

"A lot of people see me and say 'I remember you, you ran on at City', but I think that you don't know the half of it!"

Keeping Luton in the old First Division was a remarkable achievement for David, coming in the first season after he had led the club to the Second Division championship.

David is rightly proud of what he achieved during that era, when the club also reached successive FA Cup semi-finals, before he moved on to Tottenham Hotspur.

His second spell wasn't quite so successful but David, who has enjoyed a long career in football as a player, coach, manager and media pundit, will always recall his days at Luton fondly.

"We just had some wonderful times," he said.

"Eric Morecambe was a really funny man. When I used to take the reserves at Luton he used to come to the games - I don't think he knew where the first-team were playing when they were away, and the reserves were convenient to Harpenden if he was going to a show in the West End!

"He said to me once 'why don't you stand on the touchline and put a board up with a figure or number on it?'

"He wanted me to put a number up and when that number went up the players were so tuned in they'd know exactly what to do next - but I don't think many of our players could even count!

"That was the kind of pleasant humour he had that meant you could speak like that with a director.

"There were so many good years and there's a very positive perception of Luton across the board in football.

"Everyone in football was sad at the punishment that led to the club being demoted, it was unfair.

"People up and down the country thought 'it can't be' because Luton is a proper club that has a reputation for playing football the way it should be played.

"I always remember wanting players to pass the ball around, not to just kick it forward.

"It might sound very simplistic but I wanted defenders to work the ball out from the back, not to hit the front man too quickly.

"Luton Town represents a philosophy - and that philosophy of Luton Town is to play good football."

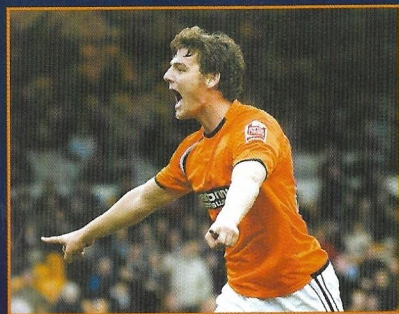

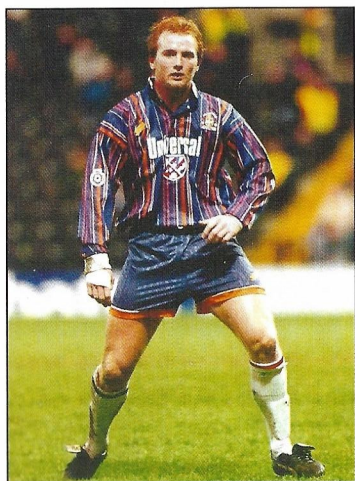
When the Town travelled to Darlington in January they needed to find a shirt that did not clash with the Quakers' black and white hooped shirts.

The big clubs came sniffing around and Arsenal paid a then record fee for a teenage

of £2.5m for the powerful striker in 1995 and since then he has become a regular for Wales and enjoyed several big money moves in both England and Scotland.

John announced his retirement from the game in February 2008 and after overcoming cancer is now a television pundit and part-time coach at Newport County.

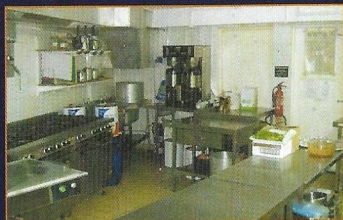

COVER STORY

George Best looks on helplessly as John Faulkner heads the only goal of the game against Fulham at Kenilworth Road in October 1977.



George Best of Manchester United and Northern Ireland was arguably one of the greatest ever footballers to grace these shores and his fallout with the hierarchy at Old Trafford and his subsequent signing for unfashionable Fulham in September 1976 sent the football press into overdrive.

Crowds at Craven Cottage tripled overnight due the signing of Best and another footballing legend Rodney Marsh and Fulham became the team everyone wanted to see.

The first away game for this travelling circus was at Luton and 19,929, which was not to be

beaten again in the League for nearly four years, watched as the Cottagers won rather too easily 2-0.

The novelty had worn off by the time of the return and with Best injured the Town, in the middle of a run of nine straight victories, won 2-1 at Craven Cottage in front of only 11,071 which was less than half the crowd that had turned up at the height of the boom.

Best returned to Kenilworth Road the following season but the furore had completely died down by then and, although Hatters centre-half John Faulkner netted to

secure the two points, it barely attracted anything more than a normal report in the national press.

Best lasted only four more games for Fulham after the Luton defeat before he jumped ship and departed to the United States leaving behind a light that had shone briefly in West London and, of course, at Kenilworth Road.

This victory was ample revenge for the 2-0 defeat at Kenilworth Road a year before just as the Best bandwagon first hit town.

LARS ELSTRUP TURNS AWAY AFTER NETTING THE VITAL SECOND GOAL AGAINST THE RAMS

The Town's ninth consecutive season in the top flight seemed destined, for two thirds of the campaign, to be their last, but on 9th March 1991 they won away at Aston Villa to record their third win in four games in an amazing upsurge in fortunes and, with 10 games to play, were suddenly pitched into a comfortable 13th spot in the table.

Supporters coming away from Villa Park were now thinking of a possible top 10 position with relegation fears furthest from their thoughts. Unfortunately, the remainder of the season turned into a nightmare.

From the next seven games only two points were won as the Town slipped nearer and nearer the relegation zone again with a young side lacking any real striking power.

Record signing Lars Elstrup, after a bright start to the season, had gone off the boil and was probably dreaming of a return to Denmark while Iain Dowie was sold to West Ham for £480,000, the second reluctant player to become a Hammer in a matter of months.

The Town were ahead at both Coventry and Sheffield United but lost both games, went

down at home to Norwich and Wimbledon after having all the play, drew 0-0 at Kenilworth Road against Tottenham - John Dreyer missing a penalty - and were three up at Chelsea only for the Blues to level the score.

Only two teams were to go down that season, due to restructuring of the top flight, and immediately below the Town were Derby and Sunderland, who had both suffered equally poor runs, and as the fixture list had panned out the Hatters' last two home games were against these two sides.

With three games to go, Sunderland were visitors to Kenilworth Road and a Luton victory would have gone a long way to easing fears of a return to Division Two.

Sunderland had won only one away game that campaign, but they seemed to have more of a will to win that day and took the lead through Gordon Armstrong after 22 minutes, only for the Town's best attacker, centre-half Graham Rodger, to level the score 10 minutes later.

In the second half there was only going to be one winner, and Colin Pascoe duly obliged for the visitors on the hour, catching the Luton defence on the break.

Manager Jim Ryan kept the players in the changing room for an hour after the game and emerged a bitterly disappointed man due to the fact that the Town had blown their chances of avoiding a last match of the season showdown once again.

The penultimate game of the campaign was away at Everton and the Town put on an ultra defensive performance but still lost out to a second-half strike from Tony Cottee. Injury problems and suspensions had meant that no recognised central attacker was

included in the line-up, while Ryan was forced to call up and use the previously untried Paul Telfer as substitute.

Since winning at Kenilworth Road, Sunderland had drawn two home games and were now level on points with the Town, with the same goal difference although the Hatters had scored more goals.

The situation was now reasonably simple. The Town had to beat already relegated Derby at Kenilworth Road and hope that Sunderland did not run up a cricket score in their final game at Manchester City.

All very well, but the Hatters had got out of the habit of winning and it was over two months since three points had last been picked up. Also, although Derby were already relegated they could not be expected to allow the Town to win especially with Peter Shilton, Mark Wright, Dean Saunders and Mick Harford still in the side.

A best of the season crowd of 12,889 turned up to see if another great escape could be engineered and they were delighted to see that nerves were not a part of the Town's makeup that afternoon as good football flowed.

A great roar went up when it was learned that Sunderland had gone behind at Maine Road, then the euphoria died down when news came through that the Wearsiders were now 2-1 ahead.

A win was now vital and the breakthrough came just before half-time when a perfectly flighted free-kick from Jason Rees skimmed off the top of Mick Harford's head straight into the net.

What turned out to be the deciding goal came almost immediately after the start of the second half when a clever passing movement ended with a corner which was taken by David Preece.

His accurate placekick found John Dreyer who headed the ball across the box to Kingsley Black who headed it back the opposite way to Lars Elstrup who scored with Shilton wrong-footed.

Derby had a couple of chances after that, but the clearer opportunities came the way of the Town and a 2-0 win was sufficient to ensure Division One football for another season. Sunderland, incidentally, ended up losing 3-2.

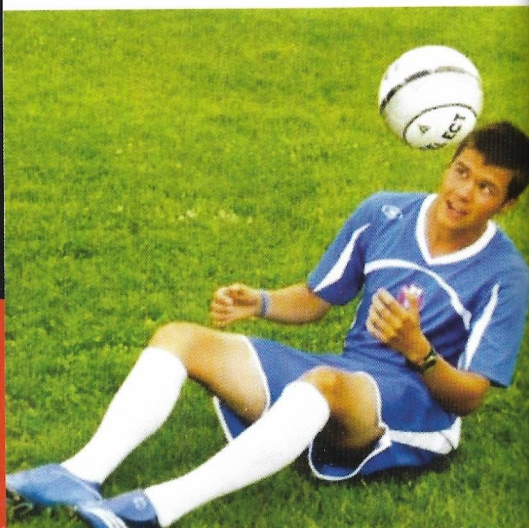

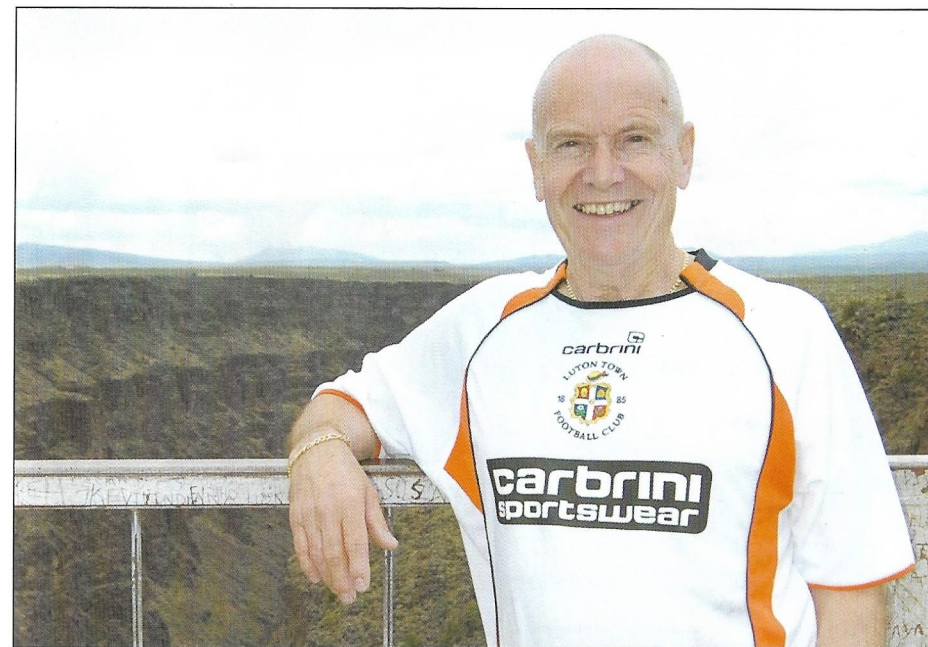

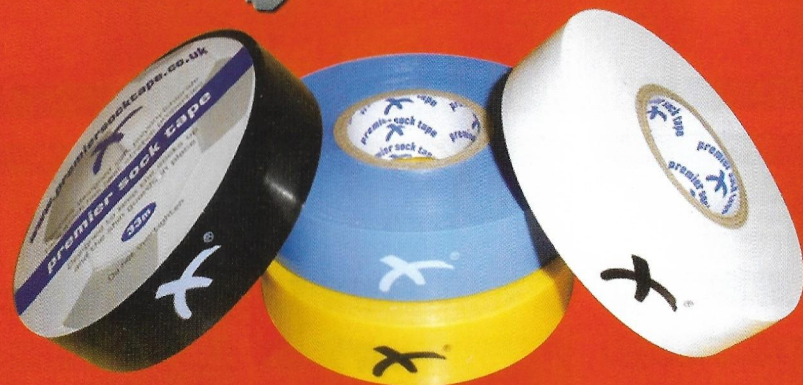

Coach's comments:

Gregg Broughton: "Jerome Jibidu is a right footed full-back from Cranfield who has been with the club since the age of eight.

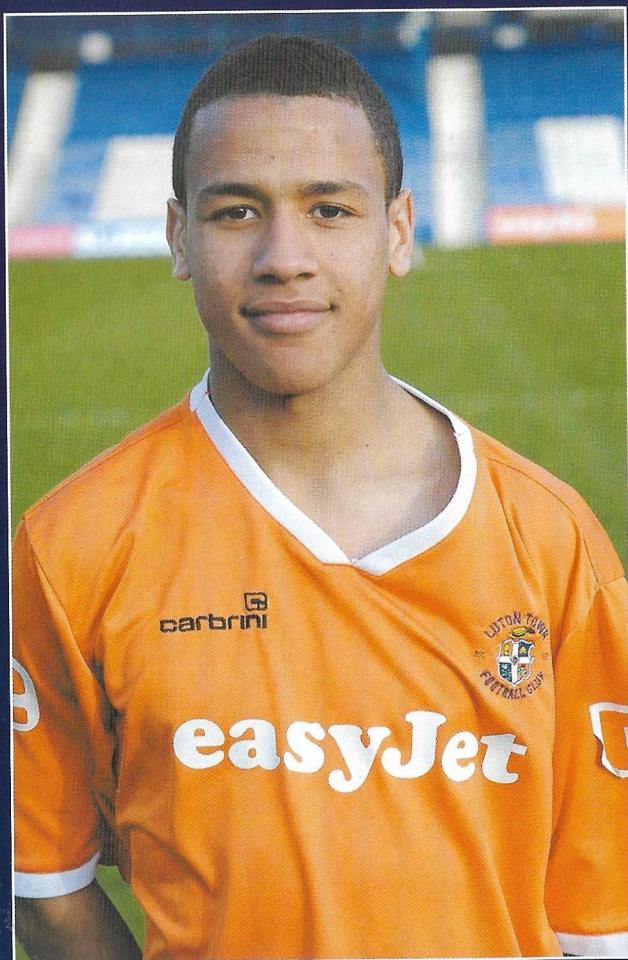
"Currently in his final year of school, Jerome will be joining Luton Town on a fulltime basis once he completes his GCSEs this summer.

Luton Town Football Club are once again opening their doors for a coaches In-Service training session hosted by Under-18 coach Jon De Souza.

Coaches from local clubs are invited in to Luton Town's Centre of Excellence training facility, Baldock Arena on Tuesday 22nd March 2011 to observe the coaching session based on Passing with a Purpose.

Jon told Talk of the Town: "Passing is often worked on by coaches at varying levels, but

the point of having possession of the ball can become lost.

"It is easy to put a session on based on just keeping the ball, but this is not the difficult part of passing.

"The difficult bit is being able to pass with pace, tempo and with the view to hurt the opposition.

"Possession is at best only a potential advantage as so many goals are scored by regaining the ball from the opposition.

Therefore when your team has the ball, it is important that their passing has an attacking

purpose."

Clubs who are currently involved with the club partnership scheme have been afforded the opportunity of bringing as many of their staff along as they like.

All other local clubs can send two members of staff to the session and we can look to pursue a closer link for the future.

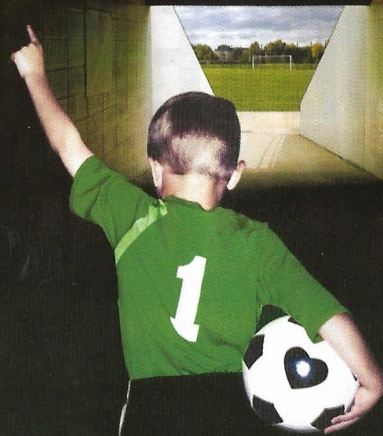

Lacey was superb at the back but the Hatters couldn't find a goal and had to settle for a replay.

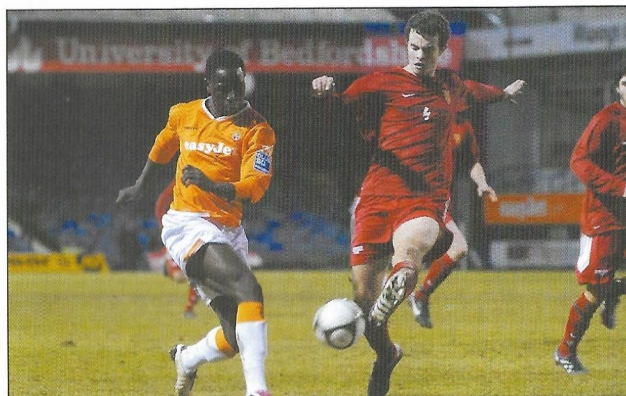
A similar Hatters side lined up at Park View Road a few days later, and it looked like Town were heading for an unexpected defeat when Luis Cumbers put the home side in front.

SECOND ROUND

Chasetown 2-2 Mansfield Mansfield 3-1 Chasetown (replay)

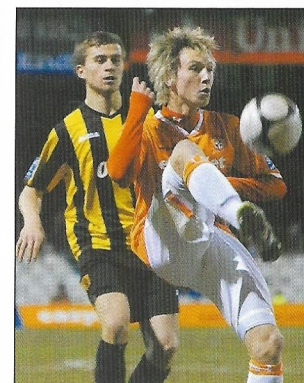
A capacity 2,000 crowd squeezed into the Scholars' Ground as Northern Premier Division Chasetown hosted higher league opposition in a salivating cup tie.

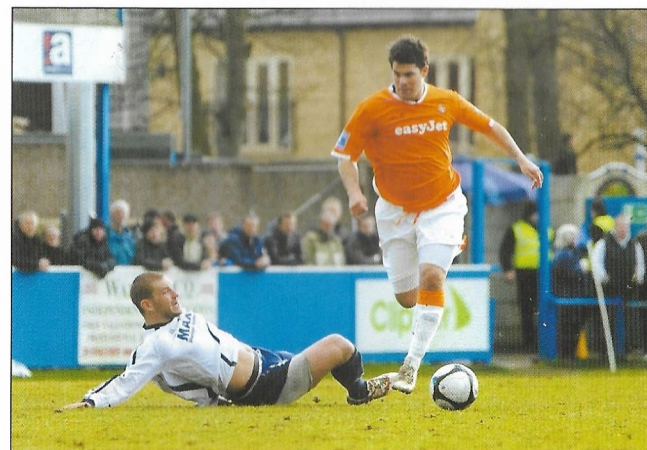

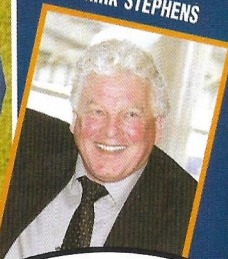

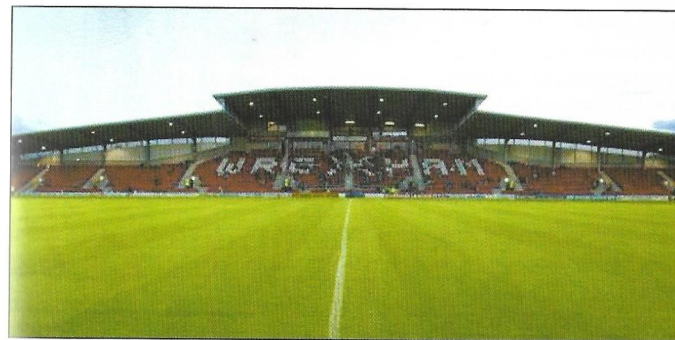

WREXHAM STILL RUDDERLESS

The takeover saga at Wrexham took yet more twists this week as millionaire hotelier Stephanie Booth at one stage appeared to be out of the running to gain control of the club, but has since joined forces with Wrexham Supporters Trust to launch a joint bid.

Former Dragons striker Ashley Ward has now withdrawn his takeover attempt, just days after a statement on the club's website implied that the ex-Blackburn and Barnsley man's consortium had made the most financially-viable proposal.

Meanwhile, controversial businessman and UKIP candidate Stephen Cleeve has also announced his intention to bid for the Welsh club.

FOYLE PERFECT FOR GRIMSBY?

As Grimsby's search for a new manager continues, Martin Foyle has re-emerged as a possible target.

The 47-year-old former York City boss had previously turned down the chance to speak to the Mariners out of loyalty to Bristol Rovers, where he was working as a coach, but he has since become a free agent after departing along with manager Dave Penney, who was sacked last week.

Ian Sampson and Mark Stimson, formerly of Northampton and Barnet respectively, are also being touted as potential successors to Grimsby's

previous manager Neil Woods, but Martin Ling appears to be unavailable while he resolves contractual issues with his former employers Cambridge.

U'S REINFORCE MIDFIELD

Cambridge caretaker-manager Jez George has moved to bolster his team's midfield options with the loan signing of Mark Bentley on a month's loan from League 2 Gillingham.

The 33-year-old has turned out 22 times for the Kent side this season, but has recently suffered from injury and Gills boss Andy Hessenthaler has allowed him to move temporarily to regain form and fitness.

Meanwhile 23-year-old Ricky Wellard, also a midfielder, has extended his loan from AFC Wimbledon, keeping him at the Abbey stadium for another month.

CRAWLEY SIGN ANOTHER

Blue Square Bet Premier leaders Crawley Town have made yet another signing, bringing in Hayes and Yeading defender Charlie Wassmer on loan for the rest of the season, when the deal will be made permanent.

The 19-year-old has been a regular for United this season and has agreed a two-year deal with the Sussex outfit. The fee has not been disclosed.

Funding for our project is shared between the Department for Children, Schools and Families and Luton Borough Council.

Our other key partner is, of course, Luton Town Football Club. Without the help of our three key partners we would not be able to deliver the after school support programmes we deliver each week.

However, after 31st March the funding given from the Department for Education will cease and we are currently looking to fund the centre through other means, so that we can continue to give the children of Luton these exciting opportunities, to improve their futures.

We have delivered afterschool study programmes, curriculum time support programmes, as well as weekend holiday courses to more than 500 local youngsters.

We have also supported local schools in the delivery of reading programmes in which more than a thousand local youngsters have benefitted.

We are now working closely with Luton Town Community Trust to deliver an exciting new programme called Double Club, which I have mentioned before in previous articles.

This term we are delivering after school study support to just two schools, Wigmore Primary School and Beech Hill Primary School. They attend after school on Wednesday and Thursday's for two hours.

In last week's programme I mentioned why the children enjoy the sessions so much.

Having a low pupil-to-adult ratio helps enormously. Another key factor has been the varied nature of the activities the children get to participate in.

The pupils have:
Written their own player profile



Measured the Kenilworth Road pitch

Estimated the seating capacity in the Kenilworth Road Stand

Designed Luton Town's playing kit for next season

Produced a visual report of their tour of Kenilworth Road

Created a power point with many of the activities they have completed saved on the slide show

This is by no means a comprehensive list of all the activities they have taken part in.

Developing confidence in the use of ICT skills is one of the key objectives of the programme.

Through the use of the apple Mac books, the pupils from Downside have learnt a wide variety of new skills from adding transitions in their slide show right through to creating a cartoon.

The photographs I have included this week show the pupils enjoying their tour of Kenilworth Road, participating in team building activities at Ely Way as well as using the digital cameras for the visual report activity.

It must be something in the warm spring air.

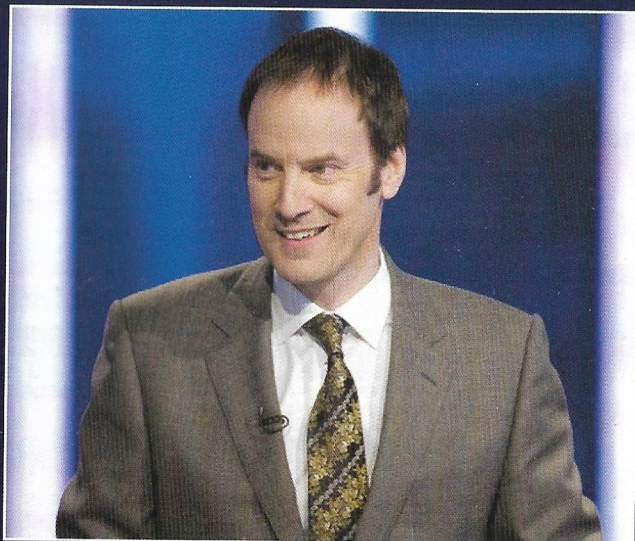
I bet our manager, Mr Money, was thrilled with that! Don't think of the pressure, Richard.

"Well, in that case, I'll have a quid on that please", I replied.

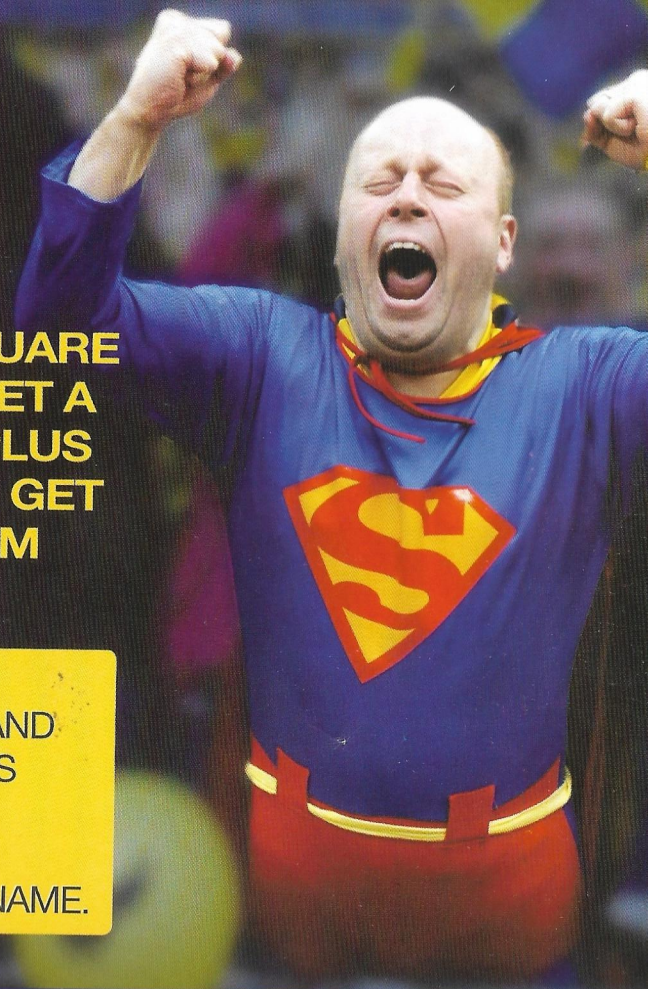
