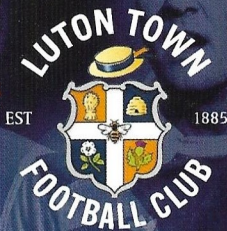

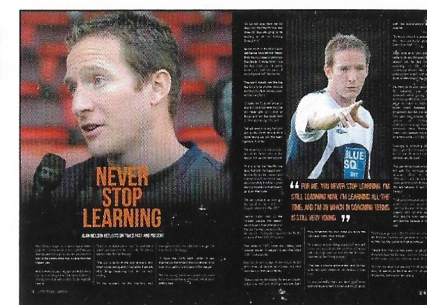

GARY BRABIN

Welcome back to Kenilworth Road for this evening's Blue Square Bet Premier match with Barrow.

I would like to extend a warm welcome to our visitors from Cumbria tonight who have made the long journey south, Darren Sheridan and Dave Bayliss and their team including captain Phil Bolland as well as the directors, staff and supporters of the Bluebirds.

The last 72 hours have been a whirlwind for myself and everyone connected to the club but it's important we focus on these final 10 games starting tonight.

Although we are not giving up the ghost about chasing Crawley it's important we concentrate on ourselves and not rely on others, which means getting the best out of this group of players who I believe are good enough to get promoted from this league.

Not only are the next 10 matches about winning, it will be about improving performances and, more importantly, building the confidence of these players and maximising the potential that they all have.

I was glad to have worked with Richard and hope we can stay friends, however I think this is where I belong and I'm very much my own man.

The most important thing is not about me at this point but the players performing at their maximum for the next 10 games and making sure we're spot on for potentially the 11th, 12th, and 13th games of the season - the play-off semi-finals and a potential final at Eastlands.

The players are a great bunch of lads off and pitch and I know what they can do on it. It's

important they come to fore now and show me who wants the shirts for this final big push for promotion.

We know it's not going to be easy but with the full support of our fantastic fan base, the people behind scenes at club, and ability we have in the dressing room, I am confident we can achieve this.

Since we have been playing this in the Conference all three meetings with tonight's visitors have all ended in 1-0 victories - an indication of how tough a side Darren and Dave have pieced together at Holker Street.

Last season they won the FA Trophy at Wembley beating Stevenage with Jason Walker scoring the winning goal. I was there that day and was impressed with what I saw.

Up until the start of this month our visitors had not won away from home but have since racked up three vital wins in their quest to beat the drop. They were chasing a fifth straight win on Saturday against Bath City but went down 1-0 and they will be keen to get back to winning ways tonight.

Obviously a lot has happened since we were last at Kenilworth Road. Our exit from the FA Trophy was a bitter pill to swallow given the circumstances and I think we can all count ourselves unlucky not to be anticipating a trip to Wembley in May.

That honour of course will go to Mansfield and we wish them well against Darlington but at least it means we can fully focus on concentrating on our push for promotion.

Three days after such a gruelling and cruel end

to the match with Mansfield we recorded a vital victory at a Rushden and Diamonds side still harbouring hopes of achieving a Play-Off place.

I don't think the players' contribution on the night could have been any better following the Mansfield tie and to come away with three points and yet another clean sheet was absolutely fantastic.

However our joy at Rushden was short lived following Saturday's defeat and display at Southport.

After the spirited performances against Mansfield and Rushden we thought we'd turned the corner but then the disappointment of the Southport game was very, very disappointing and it was certainly the worst we've ever performed since I've been at the club.

That result has gone, it's in the past now and we start afresh tonight where we hope to cement our play-off place and ensure we start getting the players firing on all cylinders.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

We welcome back supporters to our first home game since Mansfield, and we also welcome the directors, staff, management and players of Barrow after their long trip down to Bedfordshire.

Games against Barrow are always hard fought with often only a slim margin in the score so we are sure today will be another hotly contested game.

Emotions were all over the place during and after the Mansfield game. A big atmosphere was asked for, an absolutely fantastic response from all fans was given, and the players reacted with one of the best performances this season.

We have no doubt that had the officiating been fair we would have finished the job, but in the end it was nine versus 12. When even the opposition players claim for a corner and the ref gives a penalty you know something is up, or in the case, not up to standard.

All I can say is that it was laughable and quite frankly embarrassing. However, we wish Mansfield well in the final and we are sure it will be great for their fans.

It's not a huge moneyspinner (after all the FA has to make its money back on the Wembley debacle somehow, and a massive stadium rental charge is one way!), but it is a great day out.

The game at Mansfield was excellent and two non-Hatter guests of mine were simply amazed at the noise.

They had never been in a ground like it. From start to extra-time finish everyone was simply brilliant. Whilst the result was not what we wanted, I think we each deserve to slap each other on the back in hearty congratulation that, even through some of the worst officiating I have ever witnessed, we were the 10th, 11th, and 12th man that day.

Support like that will be needed again this season as we now are left to focus on the top objective of promotion. We have 10 games to go, and with no disrespect to Barrow or any other team we face, we are looking to build on the performances against Mansfield and Rushden & Diamonds.

However, it is a shame that I have to report that a number of Club Exclusion Orders have been issued to people who attended the game in the home end.

It is beyond my comprehension to understand why someone who purports to support Luton Town would see fit to vandalise Kenilworth Road when leaving a game. We are all highly charged after such a dismal officiating display, but why on earth would that result in harming the club you claim to support?

Additionally, how can someone who claims to support Luton Town - knowing the previous sanctions the Club has had and knowing the likely sanctions it would face - throw items on to the field of play?

Do these supporters really want to cost the Club serious money whether it be through fines, additional stewarding, or increased police category games?

Let me make it simple for those so called fans who feel they need to throw items if things do not go their way: STAY AWAY.

Simply, you cost the Club too much. In money, staff resource in defending the Club, and reputation, you harm the Club.

You harm every other supporter who experiences ridiculous policing at away venues because of the incidents we have recorded against the Club's name.

The best way you can support us is to stay away. If you come to Kenilworth Road to vandalise, fight, throw things, or break the rules, don't come, keep your money, you are not welcome.

Come back when you have grown up and can act like adults. If not, then like those people caught against Mansfield, you will be banned. If I had my way I would name and shame because nothing else seems to get through to these people.

And it does not matter where you are in the ground. In exactly the same way the actions of some Mansfield Town directors were inexcusable, outrageous, and childish and this has been taken to task too - apologies after the game do not suffice.

Considering they were in the ascendancy I have never witnessed anything like it either home or away - there is a certain decorum expected when you sit on the halfway line amongst home fans, and we always respect that when we are on our travels. Certain Mansfield Town directors and their guests crossed that line and they are not immune to action.

Finally, some extremely good news! May we pass on our congratulations to the staff and management at Vauxhall for the excellent news regarding the future of the Luton facilities.

They have experienced a torrid time in the recent past when General Motors hit financial trouble, and for a long period their future was uncertain. The announcement this week appears to secure the future of the staff for many years to come and that is a testament to all their hard work in the past.

I was fortunate enough to be shown around the factory last year, and as I left, I complimented the staff and management on what an excellent attitude and culture the team had.

As in many walks of life attitude can make a huge difference, and so all of us at Luton Town are delighted that their efforts have resulted in such a good and deserved result.

Meanwhile, sing up for the boys - WE KNOW WE MAKE A DIFFERENCE!

CAPTAIN SPEAKING

Welcome back to Kenilworth Road tonight for an important fixture against Barrow and the start of a new era following the appointment of Gary Brabin as manager after Richard Money's departure.

Richard did a great job and we were all disappointed to hear the news but as a team we will stick together and move on and support Gary in our quest for promotion which is what we're all desperate for.

The last time we were at Kenilworth Road, against Mansfield, it was hugely frustrating to come off the pitch after the disappointment of conceding so late to deny us a crack at penalties which I thought we deserved at the very least.

Please get behind the lads again this evening like I know you can.

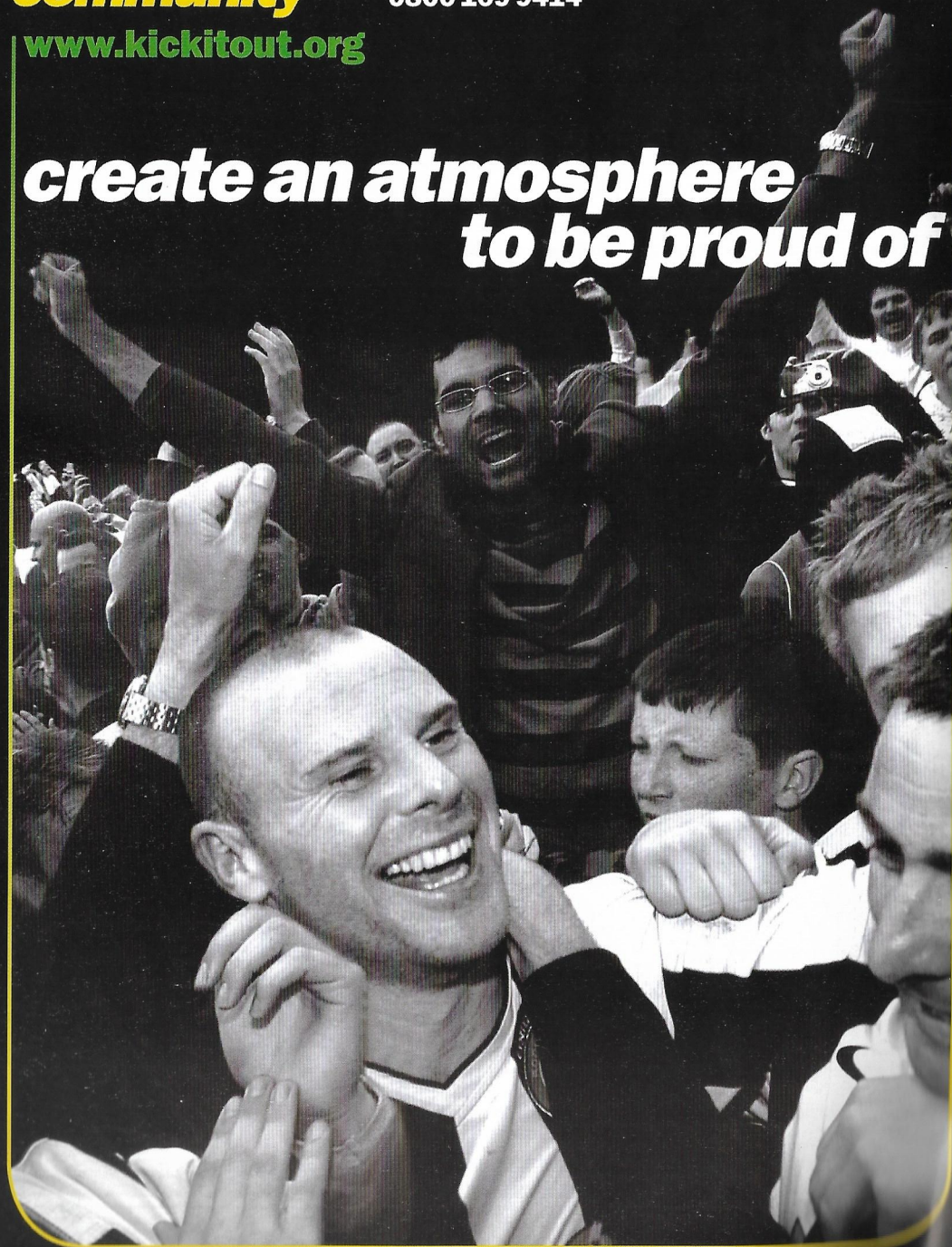

CLUB STATEMENT

Yesterday Luton Town Football Club announced that, by genuine mutual consent, Richard Money has been replaced in his role as manager by Gary Brabin with immediate effect.

Commenting on parting company with the Hatters Richard said: "I loved playing for the Club and it has a special place for me. I was very honoured to be selected as manager in November 2009 and since then, together with my staff and team, we feel we have moved a long way forward to the position we are in today.

"I am very proud to have the best record of any Luton Town manager but we all know that these are highly unusual circumstances with only one league position being considered as success.

"I leave the manager's post with the Club in a solid position to enter the play-offs and this season we have achieved this by producing some quality football.

"However, from now to the end of the season is crucial. There must be no distractions and I have said before everyone must be together and united. I urge everyone to get behind the new manager and give 110 per cent on and off the pitch to take this Club back to where it belongs, in the Football League.

"After Saturday's defeat at Southport, Gary Sweet and I met to discuss, what we both felt was an unsatisfactory display. We both came to the conclusion that promotion must be the only target for the club in its current position and both decided that we needed to do whatever we felt necessary to make it happen.

"Therefore, it is with a very heavy heart that I pass on the baton so close to the end of the season but I have every faith that such an

enthusiastic and capable person is in place to give the team and supporters a fresh impetus.

"It is because the Club is so important to me that I have agreed to this decision and I thank Gary and the board of investors for the fantastic opportunity I have been given. I wish everyone the very best for the future and I look forward to sharing a glass of champagne in Manchester with you all in May."



Town managing director Gary Sweet said: "Richard and I have been in discussions since the game at the weekend.

"He has always been honest and honourable in his appraisal of any situation which has always been hugely valued by the board and the investors.

"We all have immense respect for Richard and we recognise the huge differences he has made in his time here. These are exceptional circumstances that carry the highest expectation - a situation no other manager has ever found himself in.

"On a personal level, the board know what

Richard has achieved and we all have expressed our most sincere and heartfelt appreciation to him.

"Unfortunately, many will not see the true work that Richard has undertaken and full impact he has made within the constraints we face as a Club.

"We are parting with a successful manager and I am absolutely confident that history will show the large strides forward Richard has made here. The board have really enjoyed working with Richard, and we wish him the very best for the future. He is always welcome at Kenilworth Road and can hold his head high knowing that he made a very real difference."

With immediate effect, the new manager will be Gary Brabin. Gary joined the Club at the same time as Richard in November 2009 and was previously Conference Manager of the Year during his spell at Cambridge United.

"Gary's credentials are there for all to see", Sweet explained. "He knows the pain of losing in a play-off final, and a play-off semi-final. He has worked with the players for over a year, knows the Club, and knows the task in hand. He has huge experience and only one focus - promotion.

"We will give him all the support we have available to achieve this goal. We need everyone to step up to the plate - players, staff and supporters - because we all know what is at stake.

"We have a run-in that will be used to firstly secure the minimum of a play-off place, and then prepare for these head-to-head games. We know that we are all doing everything we can to make this close season a joyous one, with the prospect of league football come August."

INTRODUCING BARROW

HISTORY

Founded in September 1901, the club began playing competitive football in the Lancashire League at its first home ground The Strawberry.

Their Football League career began with six straight defeats which were representative of many of the struggles to come. Over the seasons up to the Second World War, the club's best finish in the Division Three North was eighth in the 1933/34 season.

Little changed immediately after the Second World War but when the League was reorganised in 1958, the club found itself placed in Division Four.

The club continued to struggle in Division Four. At the end of the 1971/72 season, the club finished third bottom of Division Four and required to make its 11th re-election application.

In June 1972, they were faced in the ballot by Southern League Hereford United. The first ballot saw the votes tied at 26 each. The second ballot saw United collect 29 votes to Barrow's 20 and, after 51 years the club had lost its much-prized Football League status.

The club joined the Northern Premier League in August 1972. In 1979, despite a lack of playing success, the club joined the APL (now the Conference) and the opening home game saw a crowd of 2,027 as the team defeated Yeovil Town 2-0 but in 1983 the club were relegated to the Northern League.

In five years starting in March 1986 the club enjoy unparalleled success. The 1987/88 season saw the club reach the FA Trophy semi-finals where the club lost to Enfield.

However, the following two seasons saw the NPL title captured and with it promotion to the Conference. Then, in May 1990, the club captured the FA Trophy with a 3-0 win over Leek Town at Wembley thanks to two goals from Kenny Gordon and one from club appearance and goalscoring record holder

Colin Cowperthwaite.

The Bluebirds' were promoted back to the Conference however in 2008/09 when Darren Sheridan and Dave Bayliss masterminded a fantastic 20-match unbeaten run which culminated in a 1-0 Blue Square North Play-Off final victory over Stalybridge Celtic.

Last season, the club's performance surpassed expectations - after further consolidating their place in the Conference and the team reached the FA Cup third round again.

However the season was topped off with a trip to Wembley and 20 years after first lifting the FA Trophy the team repeated the feat by defeating Conference champions Stevenage 2-1 after extra time.

LAST MEETING

**2ND OCTOBER 2010
BARROW 0-1 LUTON**

For the second successive season a solitary goal was enough to give the Town a vital victory at Holker Street.

After being overrun by Richard Money's men in the opening half-an-hour, Barrow finally got a grip of proceedings and all of a sudden the game was swinging from end-to-end.

But, a minute after Andy Drury had seen an ambitious curling effort graze the outside of the post on 36 minutes, the Hatters had the lead when Drury fed Matthew Barnes-Homer who arched a perfect low shot home.

The Bluebirds almost snatched an equaliser against the run of play five minutes before the break when a fantastic save by Mark Tyler kept out Neil Wainwright's sliding backpost effort and Tyler came to the Town's aid in the second half to deny Jason Walker and Andy Cook.

In the third minute of stoppage time, Barrow thought they'd earned a point but from Paul Rutherford's cross Paul Jones headed over much to the relief of the away contingent.



MEET THE MANAGERS:

DAVID BAYLISS AND DARREN SHERIDAN

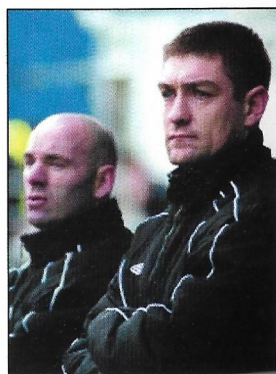
The duo were appointed joint-caretaker managers with club skipper Paul Jones in November 2007 before they were appointed on a permanent basis the following month.

Joint-winner of the Blue Square North Manager of the Month award in March 2008, their run of just two defeats in 29 league games took them into the Blue Square North Play-Offs where they won the Final and with it promotion to Blue Square Premier.

In the 2008/09 season, they helped the Bluebirds maintain Blue Square Premier status and reach the FA Cup third round.

Last season they shared the glory of consolidating a place in Blue Square Bet Premier as well as another trip to the third round of the FA Cup against Premier League opposition and topped it off by winning the FA Trophy at Wembley against Stevenage Borough.

Midfielder Sheridan continues to feature occasionally as a player whilst defender Bayliss is no stranger to Kenilworth Road having spent four seasons with the Hatters making 37 league appearances.



Having started the month in the relegation places, Barrow arrive at Kenilworth Road three points above the dreaded drop zone after Saturday's 1-0 defeat at the hands of Bath City.

Lee Phillips' seventh minute goal brought an end to the Bluebirds' run of five-match unbeaten run.

Having put some daylight between themselves and the bottom three in recent weeks Barrow were looking to record a club record fifth consecutive win in the top flight of non-league football against the Romans but it wasn't to be.

The narrow defeat was compounded when recent recruit Richie Barker - who had scored in his last three games - was dismissed just after an hour.

Barker was released by Oxford United in January and has formed a formidable partnership in central midfield with Andy Ferrell and joint-manager Darren Sheridan since his arrival.

Sheridan is in dual control of the Holker Street outfit with former Hatters defender Dave Bayliss and the 43-year-old has found himself thrust into first-team action on a regular basis again in recent weeks with both Robin Hulbert and James Owen sidelined.

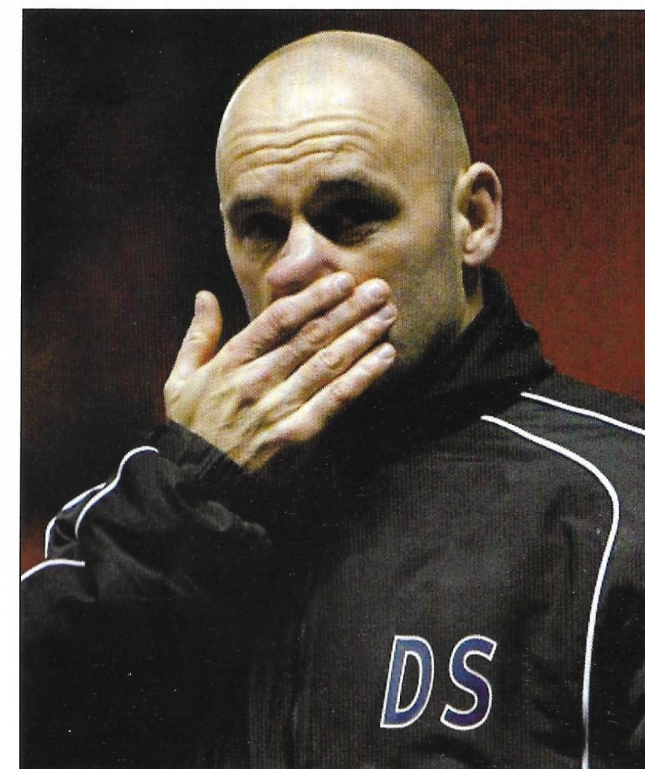
"The central three is working well, we have a good understanding," Sheridan told the North-West Evening Mail. "Richie has come in and you can see what type of player he is. He gets in the box and gets goals. Fez [Andy Ferrell] is doing the same.

"They know they have the license to push on and get in the box because I'll provide that security behind them. I'll sit in there because I can't get up and down the pitch like them.

"I'm loving it. I want to carry on playing as long as I can, and as long as my legs will let me. It works well for me, because the other two lads do lots of good running.

"As long as it keeps working for us, then I'll keep playing. Obviously it won't work every time, but at the minute, touch wood, it's working brilliantly for us."

With over 400 appearances under his belt from a 14-year professional career that took in spells with Barnsley, Wigan Athletic, Oldham Athletic,

JOINT BOSS THRILLED TO PLAY AGAIN

Clyde and St. Johnstone, Sheridan's experience has proved vital in recent weeks as Barrow have responded well since they lost 3-2 to leaders Crawley at the end of February.

The Manchester-born midfielder explained that being nearer than the touchline to bark his orders is proving beneficial: "We were nodding off at times, but when I'm out there I try and keep on at them.

"It helps when players are getting on to each other, getting a grip of each other.

"I'm always saying to them: 'Fall out with each other'.

"After the game you have a chat about it and a laugh, but on the pitch you want to win the game and you have to have a go at each other."

GOALKEEPERS

CLARK MASTERS

Clark had spells as a junior with both Brighton and Gillingham before signing his first professional contract in 2004 with Brentford. He remained at Griffin Park until January 2008 and spent time on loan with Redbridge, Slough Town, AFC Wimbledon and Welling United.

In January 2008, he joined Southend United but he was immediately loaned out to Stevenage Borough and didn't make a first-team appearance for the Shrimpers. In the summer of 2009 he joined Aldershot Town before being released in February 2010. He spent the rest of the season with Hayes and Yeading United. He began the current season with Hastings United in the Ryman League and joined Barrow at the start of November.

SHAUN PEARSON

Shaun has played in the Cymru Alliance for Llangefni Town and joined Barrow in the summer of 2010, having featured in pre-season games in both 2009 and 2010. He is the brother of defender Mike. He made his first-team debut in the game at Bath City in early September.

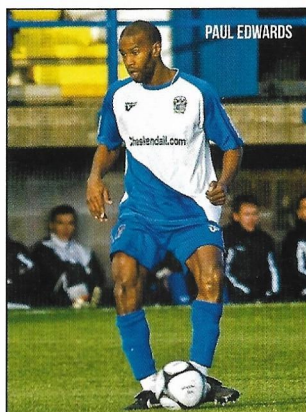
DEFENDERS

PHIL BOLLAND

Began his senior career with Altrincham and had spells with Salford City, Trafford and Knowlsey United before joining Southport in 1997. He quickly became a first-team regular and over four years made 97 appearances for the Sandgrounders, scoring nine times. In 2001 he joined Oxford United but made just 20 appearances for them, scoring once, before returning north and signing for Chester City.

He remained at the Deva Stadium until 2006 making 139 appearances and scoring seven times. In early 2006, he followed former City boss Mark Wright to Peterborough United but after just 17 appearances for Posh he turned to Chester.

He made a further 28 appearances for City, scoring once before being released in early 2008 and joining Wrexham for whom he



made 18 appearances. In the summer of 2008, he joined Cambridge United before being released in 2009 and signed for Barrow.

PAUL EDWARDS

Defender who began his career with Crewe Alexandra but was released without making a first-team appearance. He had brief spells with Ashton United and Curzon Ashton before joining Doncaster Rovers for whom he made his League debut at 16. He then had spells with Knutsford and Altrincham before joining Swindon in 2001.

He made 14 league appearances for the Robins before in the summer of 2002 returning north to join Wrexham. He spent two seasons at the Racecourse, scoring four times in 79 League games. In the summer 2004 he moved to Blackpool and in one season with the Tangerines he netted three times in 28 league appearances.

The summer of 2005 saw him join Oldham and he again spent two seasons with the Latics, making 60 league appearances without scoring. In the summer of 2007 he joined Port Vale and he played 56 league games for them, scoring twice. He joined Barrow in March 2010 and although initially left the club in the summer of 2010 he returned to the club early in the season.

MIKE PEARSON

Mike began his career as a scholar with Oldham and made his way into the first-team for the first time during the 2006/07 season. He was released by Oldham in the summer of 2008 and joined Barrow in July 2008, making his debut in

the opening home win over Oxford United in Blue Square Premier. Mike has also played with the Welsh Semi-Professional international squad making his debut in the 2009/10 season.

SIMON SPENDER

Simon joined Wrexham as a youngster and made his way through the ranks making his first-team debut in the Football League in March 2004. He soon established himself in the Dragons first-team and collected six caps for the Welsh under-21 side. He joined Barrow on loan in March 2009 and made his debut in the home win over Histon. He was released by Wrexham at the end of last season and joined Barrow on a permanent deal in the summer.

He joined Barrow in February 2011 and made his debut in the home draw with Mansfield.

Andy began his career with Newcastle United but was released in the summer of 2004 when he joined Watford. He spent a season with the Hornets before being released and joined Hereford. He spent two seasons at Edgar Street during which time he helped the Bulls regain their Football League status. He made a total of 65 first-team appearances for them, scoring three times. In the summer of 2007 he joined Kidderminster Harriers, having had a brief spell on loan at Aggborough earlier in the year.

He played for Harriers for two seasons, making 78 appearances for them, scoring twice. In the summer of 2009 he joined York City, where he played 29 times, netting twice before, in February 2010, he moved to Gateshead for an undisclosed fee. He made 33 appearances for the Tynesiders, scoring once before he joined Barrow on loan in March 2011.

MARC GOODFELLOW

Former Stoke City midfielder who joined Barrow



on loan at the end of November 2009 and made his debut in the FA Cup tie at Oxford. He returned to parent club Burton after the FA Cup tie at Sunderland in January 2010 and at the end of that month joined Kidderminster Harriers on loan for the rest of the season. He was released by Burton Albion at the end of last season and joined Barrow in August 2010.

PAUL RUTHERFORD

Paul was with the Liverpool academy as a youngster before he joined the youth set-up, at Chester City. He turned professional in the summer of 2005 and made 38 appearances league and cup appearances for City, scoring once before being released in the summer of 2009. He joined Barrow in July 2009 and made his debut on the opening day of the season in the win at Cambridge United.

STRIKERS

GREGG BLUNDELL

Started his career as a trainee with Tranmere before being released in the summer of 1997. Joined Northwich Victoria in 2001 and in two years at the club netted 39 goals in 90 appearances. In the summer of 2003 he joined Doncaster Rovers and in his two years with the Yorkshire club he scored 28 goals in 86 games.

He moved again in the summer of 2005 to

join Chester City, where he again spent two seasons and scored 13 times in 57 games, before moving in the summer of 2007 to Darlington. Began his career with Everton as a youngster and made his first-team debut for the Toffees during the 2001/02 season. He left Everton during the 2004/05 season having played 14 first-team games and joined Plymouth Argyle and went on to make 77 appearances for the Home Park club, scoring 10 times before leaving the club during the 2008/09 season.

However he broke his foot against AFC Wimbledon almost immediately after re-joining the club and had to return to Brunton Park. After another loan spell at Holker Street he was released by Carlisle in January 2011 and signed for Barrow on a permanent basis.

WAYNE CURTIS

Born in Barrow, Wayne began his senior career with Holker O.B. in the North West Counties League. He secured a transfer to Conference outfit Morecambe in the summer of 1998. Over the following five seasons he established himself in the Shrimps first-team but was transfer listed in November 2003 and joined Barrow in a loan deal.

Wayne rejoined Barrow on loan in January 2008 for one month and returned to Morecambe thereafter. At the end of the 2009/10 season he was released by Morecambe and joined Fleetwood Town before joining Barrow on loan for a third spell at the end of January 2011.

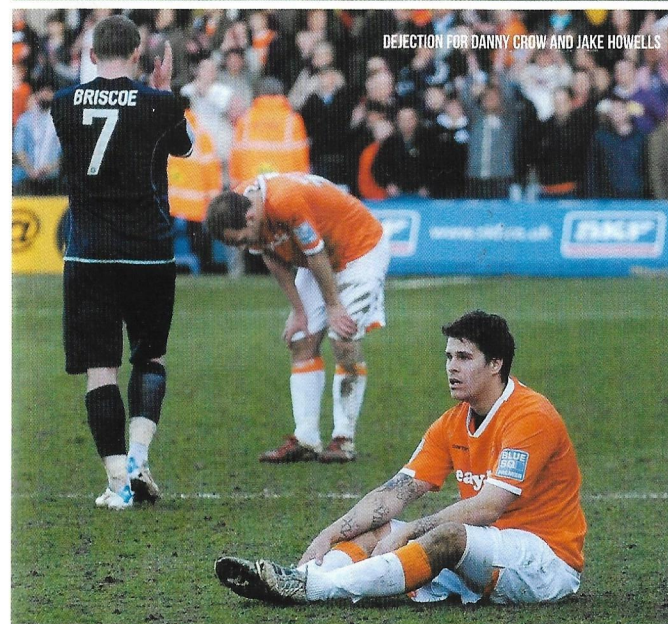

MATCH REPORT

Gallant nine-man Town were cruelly denied a crack at a penalty shootout as Mansfield's Louis Briscoe struck with two minutes left to give the visitors a place in the FA Trophy final at Wembley.

On an afternoon of high drama at Kenilworth Road the sides began with the visitors holding a one-goal lead following the first leg.

The Town began much the brighter and should have taken the lead in the 12th minute when Luke Graham saw his header from close range from an Alex Lawless free-kick saved by Mansfield goalkeeper David Grof.

As the Hatters continued to pour forward, Lloyd Owusu missed a great shooting opportunity after good work from Matthew Barnes-Homer on 19 minutes.

The strikers again combined eight minutes later when a super turn and shot from Owusu came back off the post before Claude Gnackpa saw a fierce follow-up beaten away by Grof.

That woke Mansfield up but they failed to test Kevin Pilkington despite forging a number of decent chances in the lead up to the break.

But it was the Town that broke the deadlock in emphatic style 50 seconds after the interval when Owusu was first to pounce on a poor Mansfield clearance to thump a shot beyond the dive of Grof from 20 yards.

Owusu should have made it 2-0 soon afterwards after rounding Grof and shooting over before the drama really began to unfold.

As both sides looked to settle for extra-time the Town were reduced to 10 men six minutes before the end of the 90 when Claude Gnackpa was sent-off for a second bookable offence.

Worse followed a minute before full-time when Alex Lawless joined his team-mate for an early bath with a straight red card after a challenge on Kyle Nix.

The Hatters hung on throughout extra-time magnificently in the face of wave after wave of Mansfield attacks.

Mansfield were reduced to efforts from range but with the Town minutes away from securing a deserved chance at a penalty shootout, the referee awarded the visitors a penalty for a handball against Luke Graham.

Briscoe smashed the penalty down the middle but Kevin Pilkington produced a wonderful save to keep it out but the ball span back into Briscoe's path who poked home to silence Kenilworth Road and leave the home faithful gutted.

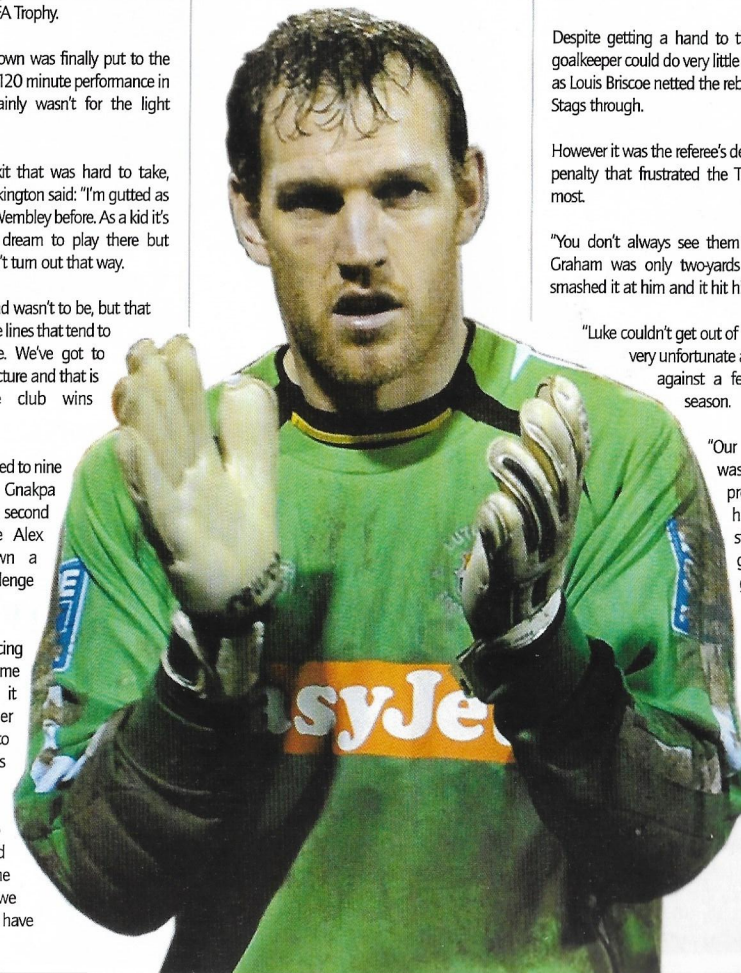

"They only had one shot in the whole of extratime but unfortunately the penalty went against us."

Despite getting a hand to the spot kick, the goalkeeper could do very little with the rebound as Louis Briscoe netted the rebound to send the Stags through.

However it was the referee's decision to give the penalty that frustrated the Town stopper the most.

"You don't always see them given and Luke Graham was only two yards away when he smashed it at him and it hit his hand," he said.

"Luke couldn't get out of the way so it was very unfortunate as we've come up against a few of them this season.

"Our goal this season was to win promotion and hopefully we can still do that. We've got some big games coming up so we need to get sorted.

"We're not giving up on winning league yet as there's still 12 games to go with lots of points to play for."

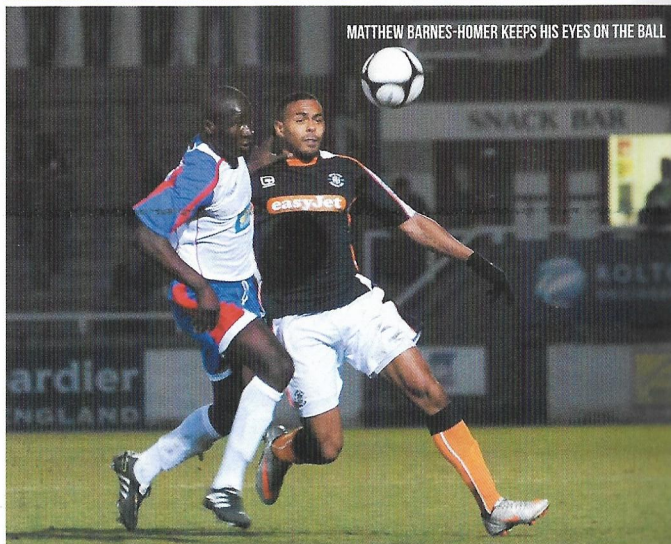

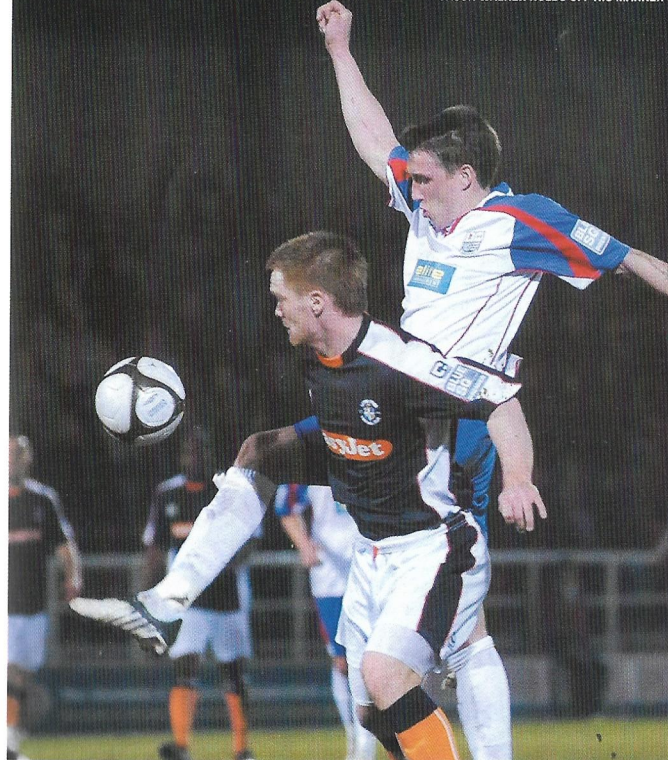

MATCH REPORT

Robbie Willmott's second goal in Town colours earned a vital victory against PlayOff chasing Rushden & Diamonds at Nene Park.

There was an early warning inside three minutes when Max Porter's shot from the edge of the area was saved by Mark Tyler.

The Town came to life on nine minutes when Adam Newton worked well down the right hand side and put in a low cross which was only half dealt with by the Rushden back line, allowing Danny Crow to warn Joe Day's gloves in the Diamonds goal from 18 yards.

However the Hatters took the lead in the 11th minute when George Pilkington's long diagonal ball from the back, sent Willmott chasing. Rushden's Shane Huke scuttled back to intervene but his back pass was woefully under-hit, allowing the Town winger to rush through and beat the onrushing goalkeeper.

The Diamonds rallied, and good work from former Hatter Ryan Charles created space for Alan Power to cross for Gash who headed into Tyler's arms. Then, after 34 minutes a left wing corner was well cleared by Pilkington before the lurking Mills thrashed the loose ball high and wide of the goal from range.

Half chances for the Town continued before Diamonds almost levelled on the stroke of half-time when Charles sprinted into the box down the left but Gash could not turn home the ball from six yards.

Diamonds midfielder Mills again tried to find his range on 66 minutes, picking up a clever training ground corner delivered outside the box, but he skewed his right-foot shot well wide of the post.

The Town should have sealed victory moments later when substitute Jason Walker can clear on goal but after his stumble, Crow's shot was saved, Willmott saw an effort blocked and a follow-up header somehow cleared off the line.

With their tails up, Luton started to play some really neat stuff, and Howells, Willmott and Crow combined to work the ball into the box, only for Day to smother the ball in the sixyard box.

The hosts responded when Gash unleashed a half-volley on the turn which looked a certain goal, with only a superb save from Tyler maintaining the Town's slender lead.

POST-MATCH REACTION

A solid away performance at Rushden and Diamonds saw the Hatters pick up an impressive 1-0 victory and an important three points as the promotion push begins to heat up.

New signing Robbie Willmott capitalised on a woefully under hit backpass to grab his second Luton goal of the season and the match winner.

"The defender made a mistake and I managed to capitalise by tucking it under the keeper," the winger said afterwards. "We're delighted with the three points away from home as Rushden is a tough place to come.

"I'm very happy with the goal. I always knew I could score goals even though I missed a few chances in the game at Newport. I forgot all about that tonight and managed to put one away. We got the three points which is all that matters."

The 20-year-old was signed from Cambridge United for £50,000 during the January transfer window and has experienced a stop-start career so far after being cup tied for the Hatters' FA Trophy run.

"It feels like I am playing every other week so hopefully I can get a run of games and start scoring more regularly," he said. "I have only played 20 minutes at Kenilworth Road so far and I really want to grab a goal at home."

More than 1,300 Luton fans made the trip to Nene Park making up almost half the crowd and created a fantastic atmosphere which boosted a solid team display and special performance by Hatters goalkeeper Mark Tyler.

"He made some unbelievable saves," Willmott continued. "We know he can do that as he does it every day in training and when you watch him he is outstanding."

"He is the one of the best goalkeepers I have ever played with in my career."

It was the best possible response by the Town side still feeling the disappointment of the semi-final cup exit to Mansfield.

Willmott, like all of his team-mates, is keen to brush that frustration aside and concentrate on the forthcoming fixtures to secure their bid for promotion.

"We've got to stick together now and until the end of the season," he added. "We're putting everything in on the pitch. But we have got to keep scoring goals and getting the clean sheets."

"We're constantly trying to get the ball back as soon as we lose it. If anyone makes a mistake then everyone is working hard to win it back again and doing their job."

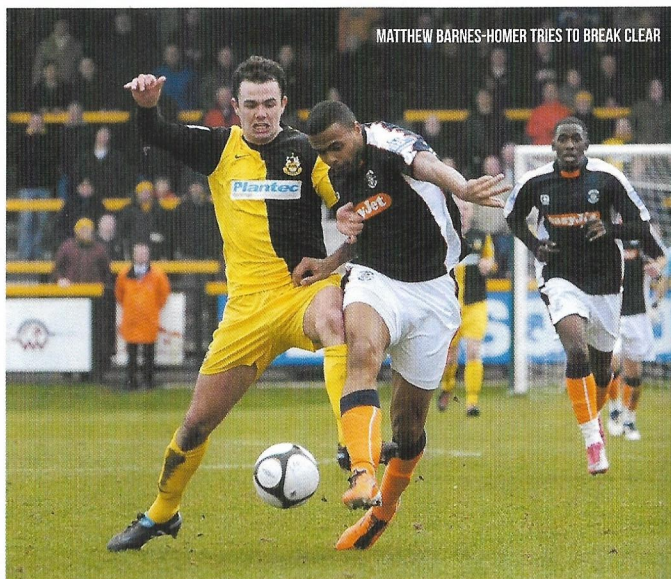

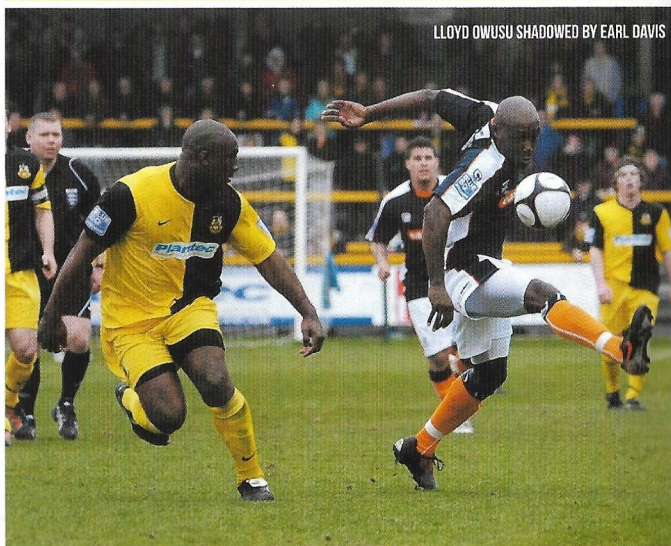

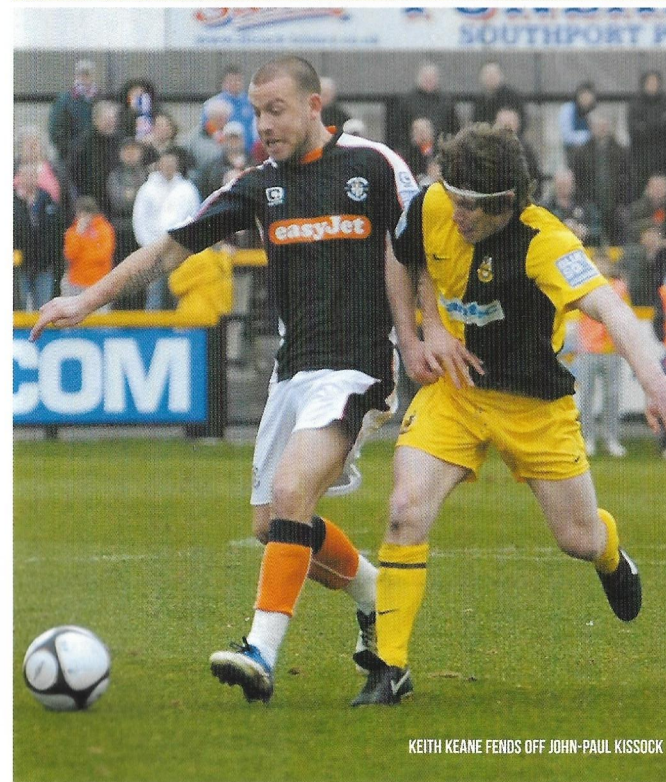

MATCH REPORT

Southport staged a remarkable late comeback to stun the Town and end their six-match unbeaten run.

The relegation threatened hosts enjoyed the lions' share of the first period as the Hatters struggled to get to grips with the Sandgrounders' diamond formation.

John-Paul Kissock, a constant menace throughout the game, was at the heart of most of the hosts' attacking play and fine play from the former Everton trainee in the sixth minute saw Karl Ledsham strike the post inside the sixyard box.

The Sandgrounders continued to boss possession but without troubling Mark Tyler whilst the Town were restricted to half chances at best in an forgettable first half that saw Richard Money haul off Luke Graham and Claude Gnakpa in favour of Danny Crow and Amari Morgan-Smith.

Southport continued from where they left off as they started the second 45 minutes but despite dominating could not force Tyler into a meaningful save.

Money made his third change of the afternoon on 66 minutes when Lloyd Owusu made way for Dan Walker and within nine minutes the substitute helped put the Town in front.

The striker, playing out on the right wing, sped down the flank and crossed low for Morgan-Smith whose instant lay-off found Matthew Barnes-Homer who rifled a fine low finish past Tony McMillan in the home goal.

The Hatters thought they should have had a penalty on 79 minutes when Earl Davis sent both Morgan-Smith and Barnes-Homer tumbling in the box but three minutes after their appeals had been waved away Southport equalised.

Shaun Whalley whipped in a rightwing cross and captain Alan Moogan was on hand, unmarked in the Hatters penalty area, to head past Tyler.

As the game finally sprung into life the Town should have retaken the lead two minutes later when a Morgan-Smith shot from an acute angle was spilled by McMillan but Crow, with the goal gaping, failed to convert.

That miss ultimately proved costly four minutes later and two minutes from time when more slack defending from the Hatters from a setpiece saw rightback Kevin Lee to steal in unmarked at the backpost to send a header past Tyler to complete the turnaround and leave the visitors pointless.

POST-MATCH REACTION

A disappointing away defeat to Southport saw the Hatters fail to capitalise on Crawley's draw at Gateshead with the hosts staging a remarkable late comeback to stun the Town and end their six-match unbeaten run.

Returning from a loan spell at Cambridge, striker Dan Walker made an appearances as a second half substitute to play a role in the Town's goal but the former Bedford man was ultimately left disappointed.

"It was a dead game and it looked like nothing was going to happen. But they scored two rubbish goals and we're all gutted," he said afterwards.

"It's horrible as we were that close to winning and I don't think we deserved it. Especially scoring late on you'd expect to get something - at least a draw. You don't expect to concede two goals late on."

The Hatters took the lead thanks to Matthew Barnes-Homer's 17th goal of the season on 75 minutes after some fine play by Walker, who had an immediate impact after coming on as a substitute midway through the second half.

"When I get the ball I like to see a bit of grass in front of me, so I can knock it past and get it in the box or get a shot off.

"It's all about getting the ball in the right areas and trying to keep it and wait for the right chance."



Unfortunately for the Town, Southport scored twice in the last eight minutes to seal a smash and grab victory leaving the players to a reflect quietly post-match in the dressing room.

"Nobody said much as everyone was so down. It was sickening to lose like that but we have to move on to the next game now."

It was the 20-year-old's first appearance since returning from a one-month loan spell at the Abbey Stadium and the former Bedford man is keen to make his mark at Kenilworth Road.

"I enjoyed it as it was good to be playing 90 minutes, week in week out, for a month," he said. "I got on well with the players there and if I had to go back there I wouldn't mind, but I'd rather earn my place here and show what I can do.

"I've got to show what I can offer and that's more than just being an impact player.

"Hopefully I can get a few starts and show my strengths and what I can give to the team. I feel that I've learnt a lot and worked on my game defensively but it's up to the gaffer to decide."

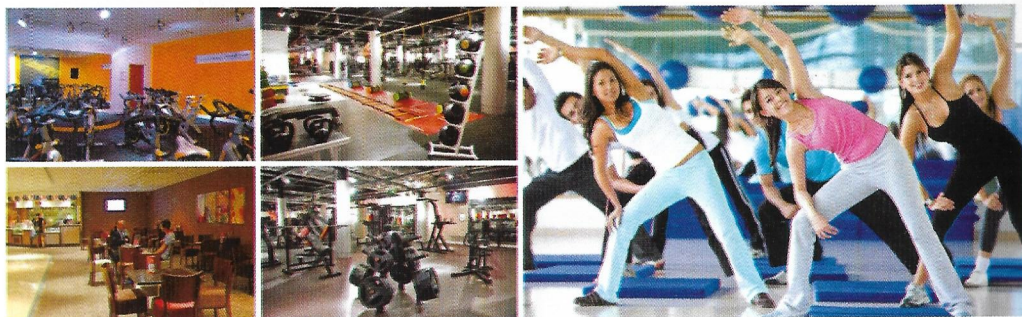

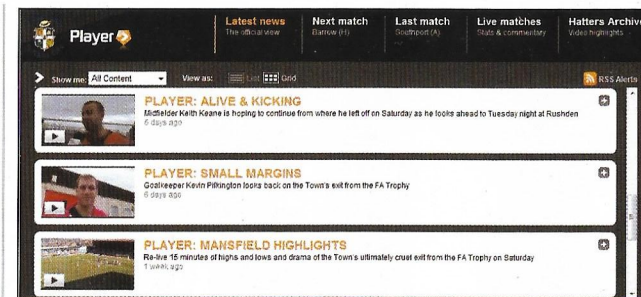
He had mixed reactions following the 1-1 draw with Mansfield Town which meant his side were denied a place at Wembley in the cruellest of fashions.

And the young fleet-footed attacker was pleased to have played a part in his side's goal but was left frustrated by the last-gasp defeat.

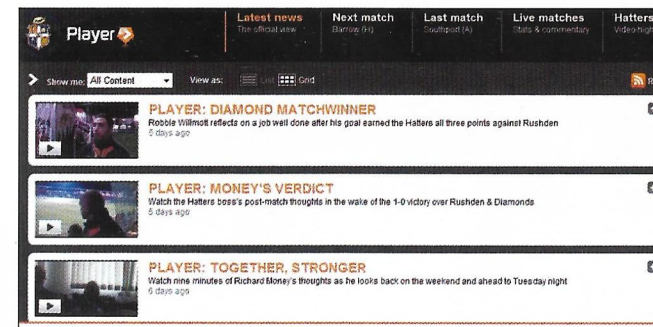

NUMBERS GAME

10 The number of home matches previously played on this date. The Town have won seven, drawn two and lost one. The Hatters have netted 22 times and have conceded just six times.

1 The only goalless draw on this day was also the only home match not played at Kenilworth Road. Tottenham Hotspur were the visitors for a Southern League match.

0 The only time the Hatters have failed to secure any points was back in 1924 when Charlton Athletic won 1-0 in a Division Three (South) match.

1 A solitary goal, scored by Jimmy Yardley was enough to secure the victory when Brighton & Hove Albion were the opponents in 1930.

7 The most number of goals scored by Luton on this date came in 1932 when Norwich City were the visitors for a Division Three (South) fixture. Harry Loasby netted a hat-trick for Luton, with Jackie Slicer scoring a brace. Tommy Tait and Andy Rennie were also on the scoresheet. This fixture also recorded the lowest attendance for a match at Kenilworth Road on this date, as just 2,619 were there for this convincing victory.

5 The number of years since the lowest attendance and the highest on this day is recorded when 18,279 witnessed a 2-0 victory over Clapton Orient in 1937. Joe Payne and Frederick Roberts were on the scoresheet.

3 The margin of victory for the Hatters in 1947 as Swansea Town were beaten 3-0 in a Division Two fixture. Ted Duggan netted a brace and Hugh Billington also scored.

22 The number of years before another game was played at Kenilworth Road on this date and Orient were the visitors for a

Division Three match. Terry Branston and Laurie Sheffield scored the goals in a 2-1 win for Luton.

2 There have only been two draws on this day, the first back in 1902 has already been covered, whilst the second was in 1980 when Burnley held the Town to a 1-1 draw. The visitors took the lead on the hour but Bob Hatton equalised soon after.

4 The Hatters scored four goals against Portsmouth in 1988 in the only top flight game to have been played at Kenilworth Road on this date. Danny Wilson opened the scoring inside 10 minutes before Portsmouth levelled after the break but Luton restored the

lead immediately through Mark Stein. Paul Mariner headed an own goal to make it 3-1 before Brian Stein wrapped up the victory late in the game.

3 The number of years since the last match here on the 29th March. Crewe Alexandra were the visitors for a League 1 fixture. Matthew Spring opened the scoring for the Hatters inside five minutes but Nicky Maynard equalised just before the hour mark. Spring scored his second of the game from the penalty spot after Ryan Charles was fouled inside the area. Keith Keane and Ed Asafu-Adjaye are the only two players from the squad that day that are still at the club now.

NEVER STOP LEARNING

ALAN NEILSON REFLECTS ON TIMES PAST AND PRESENT

Alan Neilson might be a former Luton Town player but his current role as the club's first-team development manager means he's very much a man in the present rather than a name from the Hatters' past.

And he wants to play a big part in what he feels can be an exciting future at Kenilworth Road – starting first of all with a return to the Football League.

"There is no doubt about that," he said when asked just how keen he is to play his role in helping take the club forward.

"The club is going in the right direction and when you're talking about the future, there are other things happening here that are very exciting.

"At the moment, on the coaching and

management side, our objective is to get this team back in the League.

"It helps the youth setup, which is very important to the whole of the club, and all of our focus is on getting Luton back in the League.

"For the management, fans, players, the youth setup, the overall future of the club, it is all about getting back.

"As we talk now there are 60 days until the Play-Off final and those 60 days are going to be exciting so we are looking forward to it."

Recent results in the Blue Square Bet Premier have left the Hatters third, having played a game less than leaders Crawley Town – but the Red Devils are 15 points further on, and ten clear of second-placed AFC Wimbledon.

They aren't already over the line but if it is to be another crack at the Play-Offs, Alan believes Luton will be ready for it.

"Crawley are 15 points above us now but Luton will never stop, we will never give up – look at Burton and how they nearly blew it a few seasons ago," he said.

"We will keep on going, trying to pick up the points, though it's a cliché saying we will take every game as it comes.

"We know that on our day we are one of the better sides in the league and we can beat anyone.

"If it is to be the Play-Offs, we have had two two-legged semi-finals in the last two seasons and both times we have lost the away leg so hopefully it will be a good learning experience if we have to go down that route.

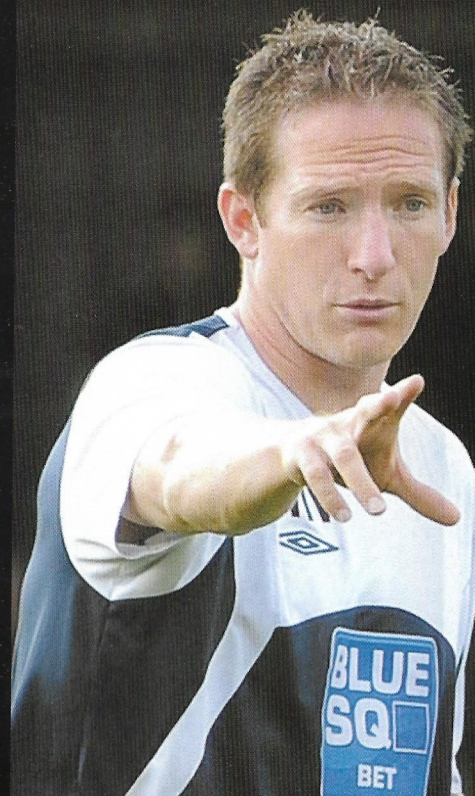
"We are confident we have got the squad to do it and if it happens, roll-on the Play-Offs."

Helping Luton back to the Football League this season would mean a third promotion at the club for Alan, six years after his last one – having also signed in time for the backend of the 2001/02 success.

That came in 2005 when the Hatters were runaway winners of League 1 to earn their place in the Championship.

Back then he was a player for the club, in the last of his three full seasons as a Hatter, and Alan looks back on that period fondly.

"It was a massive rollercoaster for fans and players at that time with some real highs and lows, but I

think sometimes the lows make you enjoy the highs even more," Alan reflected.

"As a player at Luton things started off very well for me, we had a bit of a lull, and then it finished with a big high when we won the title and were promoted to the Championship.

"That was a massive achievement, and we had some very good players in the nucleus of that team.

"At any successful team you need good team spirit and it was superb, it pulled us through, along

with the management and coaches.

"In recent times it is probably the most successful period Luton have had."

Alan's time as a Luton player came to an end following that season but he had been coaching in the club's community scheme since the previous season and continued to do so after leaving the club.

He went on to play part-time for Salisbury City and Tamworth while gaining his coaching qualifications, and his return to Luton in 2008 as youth coach heralded a progression that has now seen him take the position this season of first-team development manager, having previously been first-team coach – and caretaker manager for a short while – in 2009/10.

Coaching is something Alan gets a great deal of enjoyment out of and his current role is certainly very involved.

"We plan things together and I will take the warm-ups and sessions, then in the afternoons I will take out the development squad of players, the lads between 18 and 22," he said.

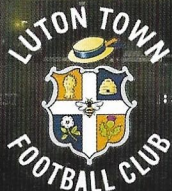
"I will sometimes work with the youth team and overall the aim is to improve the younger players, who probably need that little bit more coaching and training because of their age.

"For the younger ones, if they're not in and around the first-team, I will try and get them out on loan so they can play games and get experience.

"People think that you loan players to get rid of them but that's not the case – if it's not beneficial for themselves and Luton Town we won't do it.

"For me, you never stop learning. I'm still learning now, I'm learning all the time, and I'm 38 which in coaching terms is still very young."

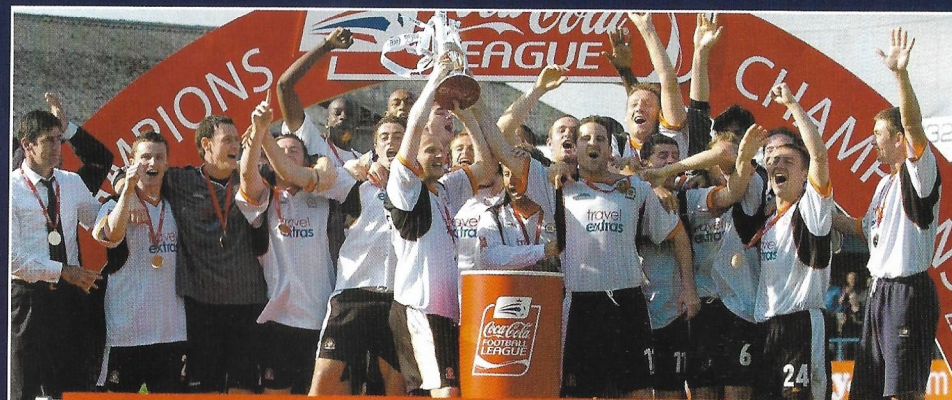

CHAMPIONS 2005 LUTON TOWN

The Town had started the 2004/05
campaign with six straight wins and soon built
up a healthy lead at the top.

With inspirational skipper Kevin Nicholls and
strong left-back Sol Davis shaking off their
'bad-boy' images and the queue for the
treatment table down to a minimum the Town
managed to keep a remarkably settled side.

The emphasis was on teamwork and a never-
say-die spirit with the supporters not quite able
to believe their eyes considering the troubles
the club had been in only a few months
before.

When the team needed to win – as they did at
Bristol City for the first time since 1973, at
Chesterfield where the home side had
remained unbeaten all season, against fellow
challengers Hull at Kenilworth Road and then
at Bournemouth with ten men as the season
entered the final straight – they always
managed to pull the rabbit out of the hat.

Promotion was confirmed during the midweek
following the Bournemouth victory when
Brentford beat third placed Tranmere and a
carnival atmosphere was evident when MK
Dons were beaten 1-0 at Kenilworth Road the
next Saturday.

The Town then won at the home of bogey
team Wrexham to clinch the championship
before Brentford were seen off with late goals
at Kenilworth Road to avenge an earlier FA
Cup defeat at the hands of the Bees.

The crowd stayed behind in the sunshine to
celebrate a brilliant season which had seen
records not just broken but smashed out of
sight.

Sadly, the Town could not break the magical
100 points barrier as in the final game of a
dazzling campaign they could 'only' draw 3-3
at Doncaster!

GORDON TURNER MISSED A PENALTY FOR THE FIRST TIME IN HIS LUTON CAREER AGAINST PRESTON IN SEPTEMBER 1958

The big news over the summer of 1958 had been the signing of Northern Ireland international winger Billy Bingham from Sunderland for £15,000.

Bingham was still a major player at the peak of his powers and was regarded as a major coup as far as little Luton were concerned.

Ironically, the Town had tried to sign Bingham from Glentoran in 1951 but he had decided to join top flight Sunderland rather than second division Luton.

Now that Sunderland had been relegated, the now top flight Hatters had finally got their man.

A Kenilworth Road crowd of 24,425 turned out to see new-boy Bingham make his debut against West Bromwich Albion on the opening day of the season, and he did not disappoint, putting in a masterful performance in a 1-1 draw.

Another 1-1 draw followed, at Leeds, before the Town secured their first ever win at

Birmingham, courtesy of a John Groves strike three minutes from the end.

Leeds came to Kenilworth Road for the return fixture and went back to Yorkshire with a point following a 1-1 draw, before early season leaders West Ham paid a visit to Luton.

The Hammers, who had been promoted to Division One at the end of the previous season were, like the Town, unbeaten at that stage in the campaign and such was the interest in the game 25,715 forced their way in to see the away team take an interval lead through Vic Keeble.

Spurred on by the crowd, the Hatters tore into West Ham in the second period and goals from Allan Brown, Dave Pacey and Gordon Turner with two, earned a resounding 4-1 victory. The

football world was beginning to sit up and take notice. Another 1-1 draw followed, this time at Manchester City, when an early City goal was pegged back by Groves, with another point dropped when Bolton secured a 0-0 draw in a sterile game at Kenilworth Road with both defences dominating.

Shaking off the disappointment of two successive draws the Town came back with a bang in seeing off Manchester City 5-1 at Kenilworth Road to preserve the unbeaten record and put the team briefly top of the Division One table.

The Hatters then returned from Burnley with a point from a 2-2 draw on one of the club's bogey grounds at the time, Turf Moor.

Despite stretching the run, both points should

have been won but for a Burnley equaliser a couple of minutes from the end when defender Bobby Seith scored with a 30-yard 'hit and hope' shot that dipped at the last second.

The next game saw new leaders Preston visit Kenilworth Road and the supporters knew that a victory would put the Town in pole position again, but this time on a Saturday when league tables were produced in all the national newspapers (for some reason tables were not often produced after mid-week games, so Luton supporters had not been able to see their side at the top of the table in print).

Preston had finished as runners-up to Wolves at the end of the previous season and in doing so had scored 100 goals with Tom Finney and Tommy Thompson contributing 60 between them.

Again interest was high and 23,056 packed Kenilworth Road together with the BBC television cameras who were recording their 'Sports Special' programme.

It was the Town that opened the scoring, through George Cummins, but Dennis Hatsell equalised before the break for the visitors after Gordon Turner suffered his first ever penalty miss, seeing his spot kick well saved by Fred Else.

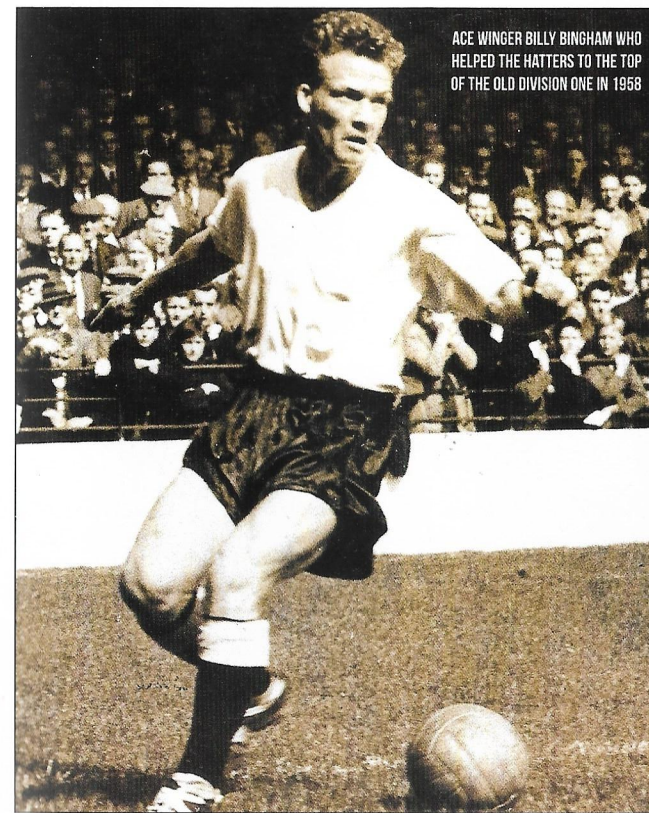
During the second period the Town finally came to life, and this after Turner had suffered an ankle injury which reduced his mobility and had him hobbling up and down the centre.

It was left to the wingers to show the way to goal, and Bingham, repaying a large chunk of his transfer fee, scored a brilliant goal soon after the restart with his first for the club, with left winger Jim Adam hitting home two in the last quarter.

Finney and his colleagues were pushed aside as the Town swept to victory, maintained their 10-match unbeaten start and were seen sitting proudly at the top of the table.

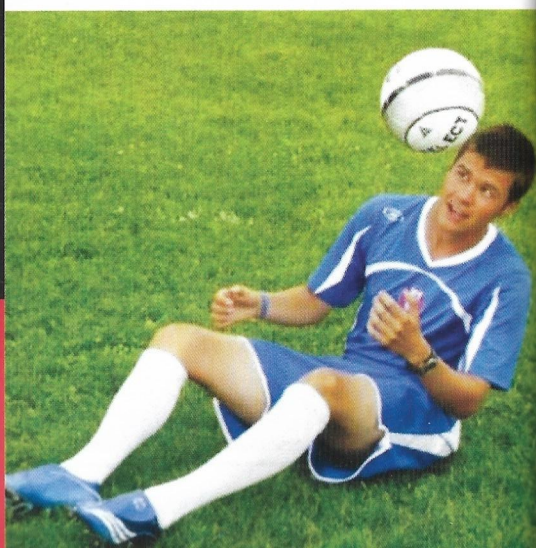

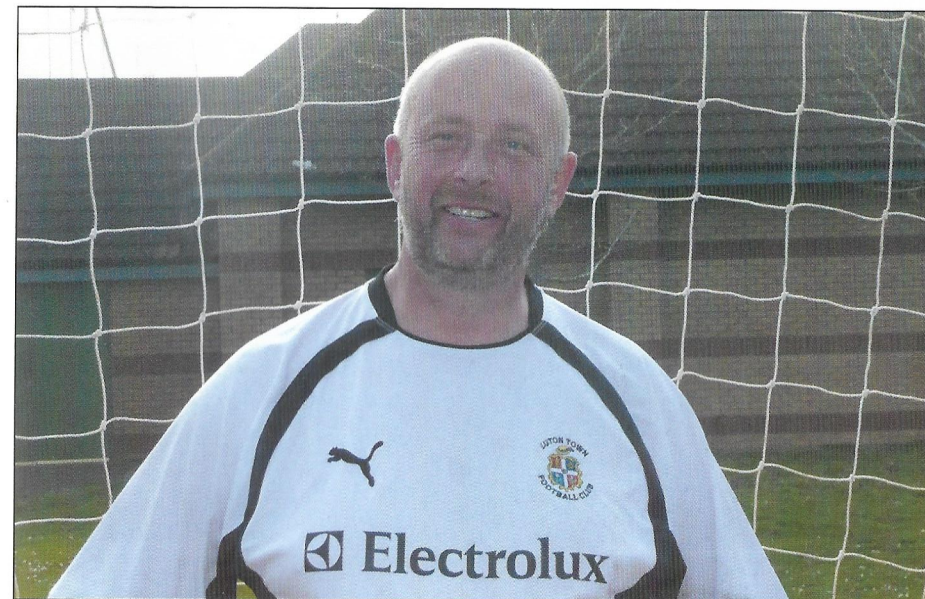

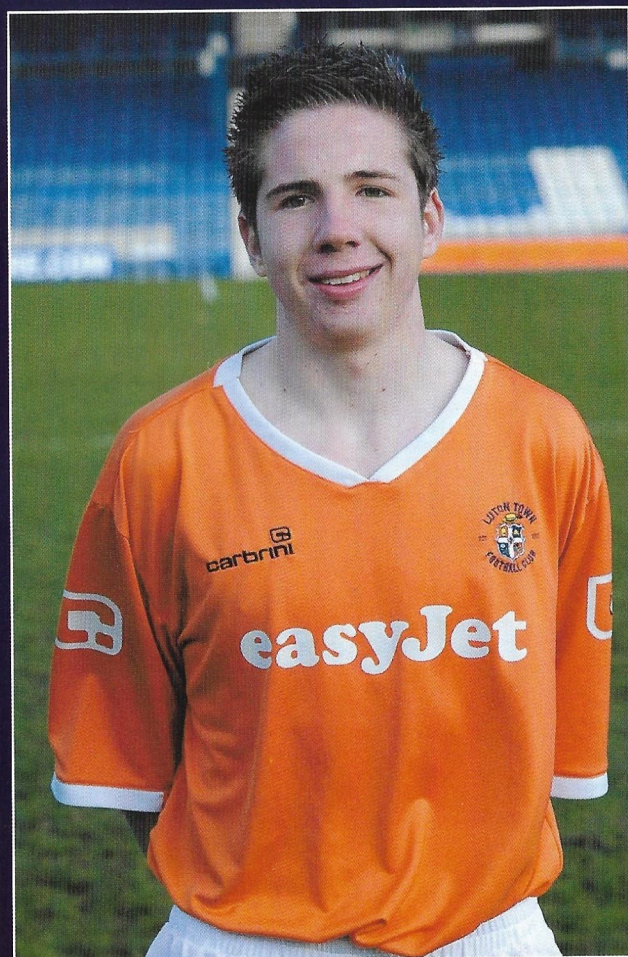

CENTRE OF EXCELLENCE

Three years with the Hatters' celebrated Centre of Excellence has seen Cauley Woodrow develop into one of football's hottest prospects.

And now, after being the first player from a non-league team since 1974 to represent a full England side when he played - and scored - for the Under-17s, the Hatters can announce that the 16-year-old has signed for Premier League Fulham.

The six figure transfer fee agreed with the Cottagers is the highest received by the club since 2020 took over at Kenilworth Road and could go onto exceed and smash the current transfer record received for a club in non-league football.

Having shot to prominence after scoring six goals in an FA Youth Cup game for the Under-18s, when only 15 back in September, Woodrow made his debut for the Hatters in December's 2-1 victory at Welling United in the FA Trophy and went onto feature in a further two games in the same competition.

Youth development officer Gregg Broughton told lutontown.co.uk: "Although we are disappointed to lose a player of Cauley's calibre, this move is one that will benefit Cauley, the club and all the young players in the centre of excellence.

"Money generated from this move will not only allow us to reinvest the funds for a category 2

academy status under the new Premier League ruling but, also, should the club be unable to achieve promotion this season, allow us to safeguard the future of all our other young talents.

"It means we now have three players from this age group who are now plying their trade with Premier League clubs. Cauley joins David Moli at Liverpool and Lewis Baker at Chelsea.

"This is a record that our coaching and recruitment staff should be proud of and, although it is a shame none of these will feature in the youth team next season, it will give the rest of the year group a truly fantastic chance of fulfilling their potential."

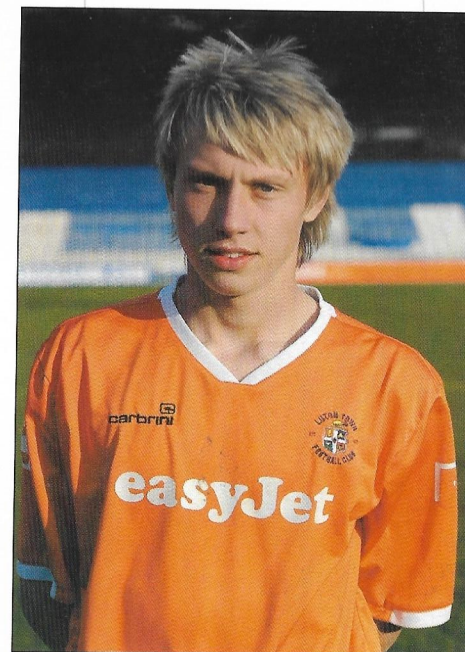
Town managing director Gary Sweet added: "It was inevitable, during this period, that we would find it difficult to keep hold of a player who is an England international.

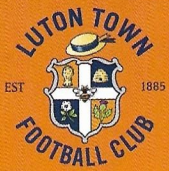

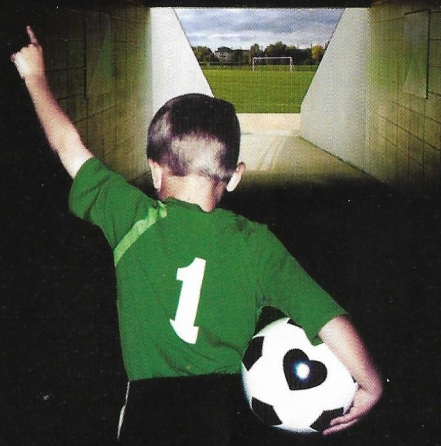

Things quickly began to go wrong when a very harsh penalty was awarded against the Town when Leyah Maddix lost her footing and fell into a Lewes player well outside of the penalty area but the referee pointed to the spot, enabling the host to take the lead.

Things quickly went from bad to worse as the Sussex sided netted twice more before 20 minutes had passed. Most teams 3-0 down and carrying injuries would have collapsed but not the Town Ladies who continued to try and play football on a pitch that was reminiscent of nearby Brighton beach.

Their efforts were rewarded when Henman turned the ball in to reduce the arrears. Just before the break Candice Davies lifted the ball over the Lewes goalkeeper only to see it strike the crossbar and go agonisingly over.

The fightback continued during the second half as the Town defence held firm and several good chances went begging to reduce the deficit but with five minutes left a superb cross by Davies was converted at the near post by Kane.

Pushing for an unlikely equaliser the Town however conceded a late fourth goal on the break to go down 4-2.

Captain Michelle Byrne said afterwards: "This was always going to be a difficult trip but with five changes to the starting lineup and after conceding three times in the first 20 minutes we left ourselves a mountain to climb.

"Great credit to the players involved for almost climbing that mountain against the odds."

WOMBLES SEAL MOHAMED DEAL

AFC Wimbledon have bolstered their striking options with the signing of Bath City front man Kaid Mohamed.

The 26-year-old forward has scored 13 goals in the Blue Square Bet Premier this term, but fell foul of the Romans' management when he announced last week that he was looking for a transfer away from the club.

DRAGONS HIT WITH TRANSFER EMBARGO

Booth had joined forces with Wrexham FC Supporters Trust in an effort to gain control of the Dragons, but after taking objection to her comments that the club was 'days away from administration' the board has suspended negotiations with her consortium.

Striker Courtney Herbert has joined Cambridge United on loan from Northampton Town until the end of the season.

The young forward has made 42 appearances for the Cobblers - mostly from the substitutes' bench - since joining from Long Buckby in 2009.

Meanwhile, play-off chasing York City have taken Huddersfield's teenage winger Aiden Chippendale on loan for the season run-in.

THREE NEW FACES AT HISTON

Rockbottom Histon this week strengthened their squad with three loan signings as they attempt to make a late bid to beat the drop.

20-year-old Crystal Palace goalkeeper Wes Foderingham has joined the Stutes along with QPR's 19-year-old rightsided player Elliott Cox and Town defender Ed Asafu-Adjaye.

The Cambridgeshire side, who were dealt a five point deduction earlier in the season, are twelve points from safety - but with two games in hand on 20th-placed Hayes & Yeading and with an improved squad, Stutes fans will be praying for a dramatic 'great escape'.

MARINERS FINALLY MAKE APPOINTMENT

Grimby Town have finally replaced Neil Woods with the appointment of joint-managers Rob Scott and Paul Hurst.

The duo, aged 37 and 36 respectively, played together at Rotherham and have made a successful start to their management career, already gaining promotions together at Ilkeston and Boston.

They will now be hopeful of mounting a late promotion charge, with the Mariners currently ten points off the play-offs. However, their former club Boston United are claiming that Scott and Hurst are in breach of contract, with chairman David Newton announcing at the weekend that he will be pursuing legal action against the pair and against Grimsby Town.

We have some of the children from the four schools we have been working with attending the game tonight. So a big hello if that's you and well done for all your hard work.

At the Study Centre we are currently working with Downside Juniors and Infants to deliver our Literacy Leaders program and it is working incredibly well.

The Kick into Reading package has a variety of programmes you can choose from, including the Hatters' Reading Challenge, the Response to Reading programme as well as the Literacy Leaders reading support training programme.

The Hatters' Reading Challenge is a simple but effective incentive-based reading programme.

Last year more than 1,000 pupils from five different schools participated in the initiative.

Pupils are provided with professionally produced pocket reading passports which they can use to keep a record of books they have read, as well as occasions in which they have visited the library.

The programme can be delivered to a specially selected group of children, an individual class or year group, or across the school.

The Response to Reading programme consists of eight specially designed reading cards which can be used in the classroom as part of guided or independent reading programme.

They can also be used in the library as a motivational tool for gifted and talented readers or as a specialised after school programme in partnership with the Hatters Study Centre staff.

Each card is designed to provide pupils with an exciting opportunity to respond to a book they have just read.

The cards are user friendly with a simple set of



instructions explaining how to complete the activity.

In most cases an example is also provided on the card. The cards are a quality resource that give pupils with an exciting opportunity to combine their writing and artistic skills to complete each activity.

The Literacy Leaders programme is designed to benefit reluctant and struggling readers in Key Stage 2 as well as emerging readers working at Key Stage 1.

The basic philosophy behind the programme is to provide pupils, who have been identified as struggling with their reading with an opportunity in which they are regarded as a

'reading expert' and as a result, gain a greater sense of confidence in the subject.

Key Stage 2 pupils are trained as reading buddies to work with children in reception and Year 1 classes. Their training is designed to give them a basic understanding of three simple reading strategies - pause, prompt and praise (PPP).

The Key Stage 2 pupil can then put into action the PPP strategies while listening to a junior reader.

Once trained, the older pupils are then able to work with their younger counter parts once or twice a week, listening to them read as well as reading to them.

HOME 1913/14

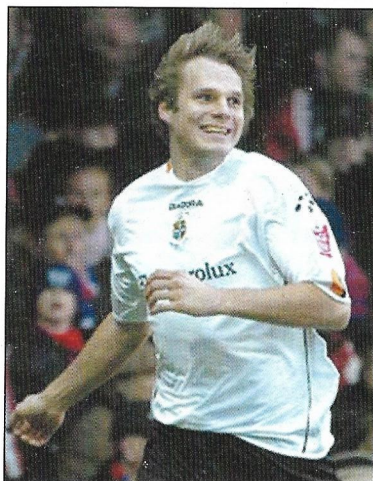
The Town took to the field for their 1913/14 campaign in Southern League Division 2 in a smart two-tone blue strip.

Predominately sky blue its main design feature was a navy chevron coming down over the collar.

While in those days supporters were probably less inclined to discuss the merits of the strip the Town were wearing, it ultimately proved to be a landmark in the club's history, as promotion was achieved, finishing second ensuring a place in the Southern League Division 1 would follow.

Markus HEIKKINEN

Although born in Sweden, due to his Finnish parents working there at the time, Markus regarded himself as a Finn, becoming a regular for the national team.

After playing for MyPa and HJK Helsinki he wanted to try his luck in England and joined Portsmouth where he was not given a fair crack of the whip and so headed north of the border to Aberdeen, where he became a favourite.

Determined to play in England, Markus

came to Mike Newell's Luton in 2005 and did look back despite playing in an unfamiliar central defensive position as opposed to midfield where he appeared for his country.

Markus was rightly voted Luton's Player of the Season in 2005/06 but sadly left for Rapid Vienna a year later following the Town's relegation.

IRRIGATION CONTROL ROOM

One of the ground's most hidden rooms, situated underneath executive box 28 in the corner of the ground and linked to the water tower, lies the irrigation control room.

It allows water to be pumped into the pitch's irrigation system which enables the sprinklers to water the pitch when necessary.
