Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road to you all for today's massive match with a Gateshead side who have had a fantastic start to the season.

I would like to offer a warm welcome to our visitors, manager Ian Bogle and his staff and players plus the directors and supporters who have made the long trip south today.

Today's game is the first of two massive home games for us – it's fantastic for us to be able to play the current top two sides in the division at Kenilworth Road.

Your support has been absolutely superb so far this season and I urge you all to raise the volume this afternoon and on Tuesday. I know teams come here intent on frustrating us which in turns frustrates you but please stick with us and act as our 12th man.

Since we were last at Kenilworth Road we have picked up seven points from the last three matches and it's a measure of our expectations that we are disappointed it wasn't nine points following Tuesday night's 2-2 draw at Ebbsfleet.

Any team two goals up inside the last 15 minutes who harbour hopes of promotion should be expected to see out victory but it wasn't to be and it was a hugely frustrating coach journey home after seeing Ebbsfleet equalise in stoppage time.

That's the second time this season we've dropped points in the final minute when in a winning position away from home and as manager I can only apologise to those supporters who backed us so magnificently at Stonebridge Road for the capitulation in the final 15 minutes.

That's been and gone now – we can't change the result or mope around thinking what might have been, we need to forget about it and focus on today's game.

Football is a funny old game, so they say.

Obviously we targeted six points from the last two away games because as Luton Town that's the minimum requirement each week: to win. Had we drawn at Kidderminster and beat Ebbsfleet then no doubt we would have gone into this afternoon's match in a more positive frame of mind.

At Aggborough last Saturday we played some of our best football of the season and were worthy winners against a side that will be there or thereabout come the end of the season. It's not an easy place to go and to dominate the game in the manner in which we did was massively encouraging.

Another huge positive of last week was the return to first team action of George Pilkington and Shane Blackett. It was like they hadn't been away such were their performances.

Slowly but surely we are getting bodies back but it still seems every time we get two or three players back we lose two or three. Keith Keane, Jake Howells and Alex Lawless all missed Tuesday's game at Ebbsfleet with the first two available for selection again this afternoon.

I have gone on record many times saying that I have every confidence in this squad's chances of success this season and I continue to standby that.

Yes, Tuesday was a set-back – as a group we felt the defeat just as much as you did and we owe you a performance today to make up for two lost points.

Get behind us and keep the faith.



FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH GARY SWEET

"You're going nowhere with that lot dragging you down. I've never seen that before. How can you play every week in front of that aggression?"

Good afternoon one and all to what promises to be an enthralling encounter between two sides lying in championship chasing positions. A particular warm welcome to the 'Heed Army' who have made the lengthy trip down to Kenilworth Road and who may be modest in number but, without doubt, as loyal and as passionate as football supporters ever come.

I would like to extend a Hatters welcome to Ian Bogie and his squad of players, and to the Club's officials from the north-east too. And a particular personal welcome to Graham Wood, Gateshead's Chairman, whom I have come to know well in recent times.

Other than enjoying conversations of our own Club's aspirations – and perhaps one or two very amicable exchanges over players – Graham now chairs the Football Conference Financial Compliance Board which I have sat on and advised as a member for the last two-plus years.

The financial compliance initiative was set up in the close season of 2009 to establish new rules, regulations and guidance for Conference Clubs to follow which, principally, attempts to ensure that they are operating within their means. One of the first rules we established was to ensure that Clubs cleared their arrears and paid their tax on time; a rule which has resulted in a greater than 80% reduction in debt to HMRC in just 12 months.

The rules regarding player salary capping, loans and benevolent funding are harder to crack but these are being tackled nonetheless in a sound and objective fashion. Of course, at Luton, we are in a shipshape condition financially but support such initiatives in football in order to avoid situations that have recently occurred at Chester, Rushden and, so nearly, Wrexham.

A healthy league leads to a healthy member Club and, as you all know, our primary challenge since becoming custodians has been to establish a financial stability that can springboard us forward to realise our ambitions. On this subject and, as these are my first programme notes since his joining Luton Town, I would like to welcome Roger Bannister, our new Finance Director.

Roger has immense experience in similar roles at Birmingham City and West Ham United and will provide us with an extremely valuable service as we enter a new, more optimistic, chapter in our story.



Along with a few other deeply passionate Luton Town supporters (all directors), Roger sat with me at Tuesday night's disappointing draw at Ebbsfleet.

Results like that hit me hard. It was a game that was never going to be a handsome affair and one of those where we needed to go in, do a job and get on the coach back home, hopefully, having bagged three points. The manner of the performance may not have typified the style of play we have always expected of our team but for this season only, I would rather win ugly than draw pretty.

That's been the brief to Gary Brabin: play Luton football when you're able too but, more importantly, win! Whilst Gary would prefer to have his XI passing to feet at a high tempo, never playing a back pass and moving the ball out wide quickly and accurately every time, he also recognises the vivid reality that opponents know how to break that system down by disruption. Sometimes, not too often I hope, the technical manner in which we play will need to be sacrificed in favour of tactical pragmatism; there will be games this season when ugly will work and let's leave pretty for the games it will. Then, hopefully, we can restore the beauty parade next season in League Two.

There is no doubt that Tuesday night may not have been easy on the eye but for 77 minutes it was intentionally effective. But for a freakishly fluke goal Gary would have achieved exactly what was expected of him and we all recognise that we have to get better at closing games off in the right manner if we are serious about launching an attack on the League title.

But for me, the way in which we dropped two points was not the most disappointing thing about Tuesday night.

I'm sure you have not failed to notice the introduction in my missive today; a serious topic which I'd like to bring to your attention and one which, I know, will be highly controversial, but a debate, nonetheless, that simply must be freely aired.

The quotes at the top of this column refer to the behaviour of elements of our support on Tuesday evening at Ebbsfleet. They are quoted verbatim, as spoken to me during the second half of a game while Luton were still two goals to the good and at the end of the game, by a very respectful Football League manager who happened to be sitting nearby.

His comments referred to the obvious animosity of the Luton supporters towards one Luton Town player in particular and the entire squad at the end of the

game. It was widely acknowledged by many non-Luton supporters as, in their words, discreditable and shameful while, according to some Luton supporters I met afterwards, embarrassing. Most importantly, it was noticed by the Ebbsfleet players, who revelled in the opportunity to use it to their advantage.

For those of you who were not present Paul Carden, a Luton Town player, was astonishingly singled out and was booed by a significant element of Luton Town supporters almost every time he touched the ball. Furthermore, at the end of the match, we witnessed many supporters from behind the goal, gesticulating to our players in a vehemently negative demonstration that I, and others, find simply incomprehensible.

We are all passionate Town fans, all with many years of experiencing the obligatory ups and downs that seem to go with the territory of being a Hatter and I fully understand the frustrations of investing time and money into the devotion of our Club only to be left with a feeling of gut-wrenching disenchantment.

And just to establish a very clear perspective here, I am most certainly not referring to the vast majority of our support, with whom I am in sheer awe at their loyalty, passion and faith and whose support has been colossal this season. Neither am I referring to those who choose to have a good old whinge and moan at the selection and performance which, I confess, I also have a habit of doing at times. I am exclusively referring to those who feel they have a right to abuse players while wearing a Luton Town shirt or who gesticulate to our players after giving 100% commitment to our mutual objective.

Nobody at the Club right now should be held to blame for the lowly position we find ourselves in, none less so than our manager, coaching staff and squad.

There are two particular areas I'd like the opportunity to chiefly address; the abuse of players while wearing Luton colours and the team selection process, both of which I understand to be the sources of frustration the lead to an over-reaction.

Representing a board of equally passionate supporters who have all invested time and money into the Club, I find such behaviour unquestionably unacceptable regardless of whom the player is and any circumstance behind his appointment or selection. Once any player puts on the orange, navy or white and steps over that line, in my opinion, he should be universally and unequivocally supported.

In this particular case, Paul never has been and will never be our enemy. He was not responsible for our last administration or the deduction of our 40 points; was certainly not responsible for the reason why we haven't got promoted in the last two seasons and even wasn't accountable for the loss of two points on Tuesday. Essentially, no Luton Town player should ever be on the receiving end of such targeted bullying, despite how impervious he may be.

I am fully aware that some question Paul's contribution to Luton Town, in particular, the basis behind his appointment as coach/player. Unfortunately, this column doesn't give me sufficient space to fully explain

the value Paul brings – we already receive complaints about the size of the font – needless to say that we are lucky to have someone so dedicated and enthusiastic in helping us achieve our goals and his efforts are making a positive difference.

It would truly delight me, and the Board, if greater respect and compassion was extended to everyone representing this football club. In doing so, I would be happy to bear the brunt of any frustration anyone feels the need to discharge.

Onto my second point – that of team selection.

I am sure that every reader of this article would agree that tactical formation and team selection must always be the absolute exclusive responsibility of the manager, aided of course by his coaching staff. For example, it would be very wrong of me to get involved with footballing matters – perish the thought! And just to ease your minds, I, and the rest of the Board, make it our purpose to ensure that we are kept as far away from team selection as possible.

Therefore, it is equally as inappropriate for supporters to expect to influence team selection also. We all have our favourite players but it would simply be wrong for us to expect we know more than the manager given his experience in the game and especially given that we have made our well thought-out selection of the man to lead us, therefore, we must allow him to carry out his duty.

Gary Brabin thinks deeply and carefully about everything decision he makes and I can assure you that his dedication to Luton and his determination to make us a success simply cannot be questioned. He is also the only person who, without favour or motive, is in a position to calculate and compose the many, many intricacies that create the cohesion of a good team spirit.

It isn't always obvious, for a limitless set of reasons, why certain selections may have been made. For very good tactical reasons, any manager will not wish to reveal a pre-existing medical condition which would inform the opposition of details we wouldn't want to be known. It stands to reason that the psychological and physical make-up of individual players has a major impact as to the appropriateness of a particular tactical plan.

What's unmistakeable in this instance is that there are justifiable reasons as to why certain players are selected or not and, whilst we all retain the absolute right to question, debate and complain about the vagaries of decisions made which we would all love to make ourselves we must have the faith and belief that our manager knows better and will represent our demands and wishes with the utmost respect and the desire and commitment we would show ourselves.

Please, get behind each and every one of the lads today and for the rest of the season and spur each and every player on to victory!



Your support at the last two away fixtures has been unbelievable and we'll need your vocal encouragement again this afternoon so please get behind the lads.



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
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WELCOME GATESHEAD



Gateshead visit Kenilworth Road this afternoon looking to widen the gap between themselves and the Hatters in the Blue Square Bet Premier table.

Ian Bogie's side have been the season's surprise package having been a mainstay at the head of the league table, swapping places with current leaders Wrexham on several occasions.

The Tynesiders switched to full-time football last season and the transformation was evident in their 14th place finish – a vast improvement on their first campaign back at this level in 2009/10 when they survived relegation on the final day of the season.

With astute summer signings, a squad that has had two seasons used to playing with each other and a striker in Jon Shaw banging in the goals, the Heed have been the team to watch in the first quarter of the campaign.

Currently trailing Wrexham in the table by two points, Bogie and co. will want to build on their impressive form away from the International Stadium this afternoon which has seen them win five of their seven fixtures on the road.

While the Hatters were being held against Ebbsfleet, the Tynesiders had a Tuesday night

off – their last action as also against Ebbsfleet at Stonebridge Road when Newcastle loanee Jeff Henderson scored the only goal of the game.

That laid to rest the poor performance in their previous game when they were beaten 4-1 on their own patch by Wrexham.

This afternoon's game will be the fifth meeting in the Blue Square Bet Premier between the Town and the Tynesiders.

While the Hatters have won two of those meetings, things haven't always been so straight forward. Gateshead took four points off the Town last term: winning 1-0 on Tyneside thanks to a solitary goal from Shaw in a game that saw Taiwo Atieno sent-off in the first half. In the return at Kenilworth Road the Hatters found themselves two goals down but recovered before the break to earn a point with goals from Danny Crow and Claude Gnakpa.

There's no doubt Gateshead are a stronger, more confident outfit than they were last season and the Hatters will need to guard against complacency against a team whose expectations are focused on promotion rather than relegation these days.



THE VISITORS

HISTORY

The original Gateshead AFC was formed in 1930 when neighbours South Shields, members of the Football League's old Third Division North, moved to Gateshead's Redheugh Park because of financial difficulties.

The club had applied for re-election only once before in a relatively successful 30-year period, but were nevertheless unceremoniously cast aside in favour of the more geographically acceptable Peterborough United in 1960.

In 1968 Gateshead became founder members of the Northern Premier League but their stay in the new competition lasted only two years.

Finishing as runners-up the Tynesiders then spent a season in the Midland League until in 1973, seven leagues and 43 years after its inception, Gateshead AFC ceased to exist.

A new club called Gateshead Town played the following season in the local Northern Combination League but, astonishingly, history was soon to repeat itself.

Renamed Gateshead United the club soon became a force in the Northern Premier League while accounting for Football League clubs Grimsby Town and Crewe Alexandra in the FA Cup.

However, in 1977, after only three years of operation, came the shock announcement that United were to disband - the third body blow to hit Gateshead supporters in less than 20 years.

Replacing Gateshead United in the Northern Premier League for the 1977/78 season and after two years in the Conference, the Tynesiders returned to the Northern Premier League and lifted the title for the second time in 1986.

Their second spell in the Conference lasted just one season, though they were quick to bounce back, and reclaimed their place at the top table of non-league football in 1990.

It was Gateshead's most successful period as a non-league club but a productive period ended in 1998 when the club was relegated back to the Northern Premier League after eight consecutive seasons of Conference football.

Relegation to the Northern Premier League first division followed but, after one season, Gateshead were back in the NPL top tier following the introduction of a geographically split first division.

Gateshead finished third in the UniBond Premier division, NPL, in 2007/08, hitting 93 league goals before beating Buxton 2-0 in the Play-Off final.

In the 2008/09 season the rejuvenated Tynesiders claimed runners-up spot in the Blue Square North and a second promotion was clinched after beating Southport in the two-legged semi-final and then AFC Telford United 1-0 in the Play-Off final.

The first campaign back in the Conference Premier, however, proved to be a difficult one with top flight status only retained on the final day of last season on goal difference.

Last season the Tynesiders improved, finished a more than respectable 14th place, taking four points off the Town in the process.

MEET THE MANAGER

IAN BOGIE

Now in his fifth season at the International Stadium, Ian had a tremendous start to his managerial career when he guided Gateshead to back-to-back promotions from the UniBond Premier Division to the Blue Square Premier.

He joined Gateshead in the summer of 2006 as assistant manager and took over as caretaker boss before he was given the manager's job on a permanent basis for the start of the 2007/08 season.

Promotion through the Play-Offs was achieved in his first season and this was followed by a second promotion via the Play-Offs to the Blue Square Premier.

Now in his fourth season at the helm he became Gateshead's first full-time manager for half a century when he penned a two-year deal in the summer.

As a player Bogie was a talented midfielder who made over 450 appearances in the professional game taking in spells at Newcastle United, Preston North End, Millwall, Leyton Orient, Port Vale and Kidderminster Harriers.

IN OPPOSITION

It's been an up and down week for Gateshead boss Ian Bogie.

A heavy home defeat to title rivals Wrexham was followed by a crucial 1-0 win at Ebbsfleet United last Saturday.

Football is all about character and the ability to bounce back from disappointment and that delighted the Tynesider's chief.

"We showed a lot of character and determination to put that setback behind us," said Bogie "and we dug in with a gritty display to pick up another away win.

"Responding to adversity is the sign of a good side. We have done just that and to keep a clean sheet is a bonus as we haven't had one for a while.

"Kris Gate gave a really workmanlike display, Craig Baxter grasped his chance on his return to the side and Josh Gillies had a very good game.

"But it was a good all round performance with Jeff Henderson slotting in very well at the back and, of course, scoring the all important goal.

"Ebbsfleet played three central defenders and had five at the back until they switched to 4-4-2.

"They had a big lad up top and we had to be patient at times, even though we played much the better football.

"Their approach was very direct and we had to cope with that, which we did, even though we had to play a total of 15 minutes with 10 men due to James Curtis' injuries.

"He has sustained another cut, this time above his right eye, which required stitches and we had to patch him up.

"It was a courageous display from the big man, but nothing that surprised me.

"We'll now have to assess the damage and, fortunately, we've got a free week ahead of the big game against Luton Town at Kenilworth Road.

"It was long haul to Gravesend but we did a professional job and came back with the three points, which was the objective."

Bogie had had his fair share of injury concerns in defence but today's visitors have been boosted by the return of Curtis.

"Curtis is a big player for Gateshead and having him in the side gives everyone a boost.

"With Ben Clark injured it is even more important Curtis is fit. He is a commanding presence and a great servant to Gateshead where he is approaching 400 games.

"Henderson also did a great job at the back. He has only trained with us a couple of times but he played as if he had been part of the defence for weeks. He was composed on the ball, his distribution was good, and the script couldn't have been written better than for him to score the only goal in his first game."

■ GOALKEEPERS

PAUL FARMAN

Made the number one shirt his own during the 2009/10 campaign playing 41 games. Farman had joined Gateshead during the summer of 2009 from local rivals Blyth Spartans where he had made 17 appearances for the Blue Square North club the previous season. The talented glove man previously played three games for Newcastle United Under-18s in 2007.

JAK ALNWICK

Newcastle United goalkeeper and England Under-18 international, Alnwick is on a six-week loan at the International Stadium. Teenager Alnwick, the younger brother of Tottenham Hotspur goalkeeper Ben, was originally with Newcastle's arch rivals Sunderland. The Hexham-born shot-stopper was called into the England Under-20 squad for the FIFA Under-20 World Cup in Colombia in July having previously been capped at Under-16 and Under-17 level.

■ DEFENDERS

EDDIE ODHIAMBO

A summer signing from Newport County, Odhiambo's career started as a trainee at Southampton. He then moved to Oxford United in 2006 and played 79 games during two seasons at the Kassam Stadium. Odhiambo then joined Stevenage where he made 40 appearances in a two-year stay, including the 2009/10 Conference Premier championship campaign. A versatile player Odhiambo played at Wembley in the FA Trophy final while at Broadhall Way before joining Newport and then Gateshead.

SAM RENTS

Signed for Gateshead in May 2011 from Conference Premier champions Crawley Town where he had spent the last three years. He was the Red Devils' regular left-back until he suffered a fractured cheekbone and he made 87 appearances for the West Sussex club. A defender who can also play in midfield Rents was originally with home town club Brighton & Hove Albion where he made 35 appearances.

CHRIS CARRUTHERS

Experienced left-sided player Carruthers joined Gateshead in July 2011 after a two-year spell at York City. Capped by England at Under-20 level



the 28-year-old played 201 games for Bristol Rovers and local club Northampton where he made his debut at the age of 17. He won the 2007 League 2 Play-Off final with Bristol Rovers in front of a 60,000 Wembley crowd. Carruthers joined Oxford a year later and had loan spells at Crawley Town and York before he joined the Minstermen on a permanent basis.

BEN CLARK

Former England Youth international Clark was a major signing for Gateshead in 2010 from Hartlepool United where he made 181 appearances in six years. Originally with Sunderland, the central defender played 14 games for the Black Cats before he joined Hartlepool in 2004. The 28-year-old, who captained England at five youth levels, can also play in midfield. Club captain at Gateshead, Clark picked up the Player of the Year accolade after his first season on Tyneside.

JAMES CURTIS

The longest serving player at the club, Curtis joined Gateshead in the summer of 2003 from Northern League side Washington. The towering central defender is a firm fans' favourite and his impressive performances have brought several awards including Player of the Year on three occasions. The 29-year-old Wearsider has remained loyal to Gateshead and has racked up over 380 appearances during his eight years at the club. Curtis has played in four different leagues for Gateshead and penned a two-year professional deal during the summer of 2010.

JEFF HENDERSON

Highly-rated central defender Henderson joined Gateshead on loan from Premier League neighbours Newcastle United in October. The teenager marked his Heed debut with the

matchwinning goal at Ebbsfleet United. Played for Newcastle in a pre-season friendly at Darlington and was on the bench for the Magpies' Carling Cup win at Nottingham Forest in September.

■ MIDFIELDERS

KRIS GATE

Joined Gateshead in September 2007 after he was released from home town club Newcastle United and played a major role in Gateshead's two promotion campaigns and subsequent two Conference campaigns. The 26-year-old is a former captain of Newcastle reserves and went on to make the substitutes' bench in the Premier League having made senior appearances for the Magpies in friendlies against Rangers and Malaga. A box-to-box player, Gate has captained Gateshead for three years and is now vice-captain at the club.

PHIL TURNBULL

Turnbull joined Gateshead for a second spell in February 2008 when he signed on-loan from York City and the deal was made permanent in March that year. He had previously made five appearances on loan for Gateshead during the 2005/06 season from Hartlepool United. After leaving Victoria Park the playmaker moved on to York where injury hampered his progress. A skilful central midfield player and a good passer of the ball, he has been a regular in the Gateshead engine room for the past three seasons.

MICKY CUMMINS

Former Republic of Ireland Under-21 midfielder, Cummins signed for Gateshead from Grimsby Town during the close season. The 33-year-old racked up 287 games for Port Vale during a six-year stay in the Potteries having began his career at Middlesbrough. After leaving Port Vale, where he played in the 2001 LDV Vans final win over Brentford at the Millennium Stadium, Cummins had two year spells at both Darlington and Rotherham United before he linked up with Grimsby and then Gateshead.

MARTIN BRITTAINE

Ruled out for the majority of his first season at Gateshead after suffering a double leg break in September 2009, wide man Brittain scored nine goals in 47 games last season. Signed from Kidderminster Harriers the right-sided midfielder made one full appearance for Newcastle United and six off the bench before he spent a short period at Ipswich Town. A loan spell at Yeovil Town saw Brittain make 15 appearances for the Grovers, followed by brief stays at Carlisle United and Walsall, before the 26-year-old moved into non-league football with Kidderminster, and subsequently Gateshead.




■ STRIKERS

JON SHAW

An experienced striker who linked up with Gateshead in the summer of 2010 and was top scorer last season with 21 goals. Previously with Mansfield Town the 27-year-old's career began at hometown club Sheffield Wednesday where he made 21 appearances. Moving into non-league football, Shaw played over a century of games for Burton Albion scoring 26 goals. The England C international then scored 20 goals in 37 games for Halifax Town in the 2007/08 which secured a £50,000 move to Rochdale where opportunities were limited. Shaw had loan spells at Barrow and Gateshead before joining Mansfield and then Gateshead permanently.

YEMI ODUBADE


A summer signing from Stevenage, pacy front runner Odubade ended last season on loan at Newport County. He started out at local club Eastbourne Town as a teenager where he scored an impressive 64 goals in 85 games. A short spell at Yeovil Town was followed by a productive two seasons at Eastbourne Borough. A £25,000 move to Oxford United saw him score 31 goals in 143 games for the U's and Odubade was then top scorer at Stevenage when the club won promotion to the Football League in 2010. He featured in the FA Trophy final at Wembley that year and last season played 20 league and cup games for Stevenage before joining Newport on loan and then Gateshead.

NATHAN FISHER

Former Middlesbrough academy striker who signed for Gateshead for a £3,000 fee in the 2010 close season after a prolific season at County Durham club Chester-le-Street Town. In a relegation campaign for the Cestrians, Fisher hit a phenomenal 44 goals in 49 games to win the Northern League Golden Boot and Player of the Year awards.



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□ CLASSIC CAMPAIGN

1952/53

Gateshead made national headlines by reaching the FA Cup sixth round in 1952/53 and were the North-East's last representatives in the competition that season. Bill Tulip's side beat Crewe Alexandra 2-0, Bradford Park Avenue 2-1, Liverpool 1-0, Hull City 2-1 and Plymouth Argyle 1-0 in the FA Cup, before losing 1-0 to Bolton Wanderers in front of 17,692 at Redheugh Park. Notable players included the Callender brothers, Tom and Jack, also Bobby Cairns, Johnny Ingham, Ken Smith, Ian Winters and goalkeeper Bobby Gray. Gateshead hammered Crewe 6-1, Darlington 5-1 and Accrington 5-0 as they finished in ninth position in the Third Division (North).

□ MANAGING TO SUCCEED

BILL TULIP

Bill Tulip was honorary secretary-manager of Gateshead for 23 years. A wealthy businessman, he became a director when South Shields moved to Gateshead in 1930 and became secretary-manager in May 1933. He left his trainer Bob Keen in charge of the team but carried out many of the administrative duties at the club. Just before the war he signed Hughie Gallacher and Gateshead were Third Division (North) runners-up in 1949/50, also twice reaching the FA Cup fourth round and the sixth round in 1952/53. He was 77 when he stepped down as Gateshead's manager in June 1956, remaining as chairman and president until his death in September 1961.

□ FAB FOUR

BILLY ASKEW

One-time Gateshead midfielder Billy Askew featured in two promotion campaigns with Hull City. He turned professional with Middlesbrough in October 1977 and appeared in the top-flight before joining Hull City in August 1982. Starring in their rise under Brian Horton, he moved to Newcastle United for £150,000 in March 1990 and joined Gateshead in July 1992 after a loan spell. He netted three goals in 44 Conference games prior to joining Whitley Bay in October 1994, then played for Spennymoor United and Workington.

Following a spell in the licensed trade, he has scouted for several clubs including Darlington and lives in Pittington, Co Durham.

SHAUN ELLIOTT

Former England B international central defender Shaun Elliott played for Gateshead during the 1992/93 campaign. Signing professional for Sunderland in January 1975, he featured prominently as they won promotion in 1979/80 and were Milk Cup finalists in 1985. He joined Norwich City for £140,000 in August 1986 and moved to Blackpool in August 1988. Featuring in their 1989/90 FA Cup run, he was reunited with Ian Atkins at Colchester United in December 1990. He joined Gateshead in August 1992 and made 32 Conference appearances, then played for Bishop Auckland and Whitley Bay. Now living and working back in Norwich.

GERRY FORREST

Right-back Gerry Forrest gained considerable top-flight experience before playing for Gateshead. Initially with Billingham Town and South Bank, he joined Rotherham United in February 1977 and starred in their 1980/81 Third Division title triumph. He moved to Southampton for £100,000 in December 1985, replacing Mick Mills in their defence and featuring prominently as they were League Cup semi-finalists in 1986/87. Returning to Rotherham in August 1990, he moved to Gateshead in July 1991 and scored once in 33 Conference games. He later played for Billingham again, Norton & Stockton Ancients, Peterlee, Newtown and Brandon United.

TERRY HIBBITT

Experienced midfielder Terry Hibbit starred in Gateshead's 1982/83 Northern Premier League title triumph. Signing professional for Leeds United in December 1964, he helped them win the Fairs Cup in 1968 and League Championship in 1968/69, moving to Newcastle United in August 1971. He was an FA Cup finalist in 1974 and joined Birmingham City for £100,000 in September 1975. Returning to Newcastle in exchange for Stewart Barrowclough in April 1978, he joined Gateshead in July 1981 and had a spell as player-coach before becoming their manager in April 1986. He later ran a pub in Ponteland but tragically died in August 1994.

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

TOWN 5-1 BARROW BACK WITH A BANG



After a week that saw back-to-back defeats Gary Brabin was delighted it ended with a 5-1 hammering of Barrow.

The manager admitted it was "one of those weeks" in his press conference on Friday before the game and his players responded magnificently to their recent poor form by bouncing back with a bang in a five star show.

After falling behind inside the first two minutes the Town blitzed the Bluebirds with two from Robbie Willmott and one a piece from Adam Watkins, Amari Morgan-Smith and James Dance.

"It's a relief, I'm happy," the boss said afterwards. "I can't explain in words how tough this week's been.

"Everyone around the club will tell you I've been a bit of a grouch of late - I don't like losing and getting beaten.

"But I keep saying - we've got a good squad with good players. I'm not concentrating on us being top of the league right now. If we keep picking up points and performances like we did today and stay in and around the pack, I'm more than confident of what we can achieve when we get even more bodies back.

"No leagues are won or lost at this stage, we just need to keep going. We feel as though we're

getting strong and better and when some of our big players are back there will be even more competition for places but I'm delighted with the progress we've made.

"It was disappointing to lose the last two games - it was hard to stomach - and I can't express how bad that week was.

"But we've bounced back well and I'm thrilled for everyone involved because it has been tough."

It may have finished 5-1 but things didn't exactly go to plan for his side at Kenilworth Road after falling a goal behind inside two minutes.

But Brabin believed the Barrow goal was a blessing in disguise.

He said: "We went into the game confident but I thought when we went a goal down 'what will our reaction be?' because when Barrow have gone a goal up against teams this season they've made it very tough - especially for some of the top teams.

"But we had a game plan and I think it suited us and I'm glad to say we finished the job."

While the goalscorers will take the plaudits for their work in front of goal, the manager paid tribute to the efforts of Aaron O'Connor who started his first game since the 1-1 draw at Mansfield back in August.

"I want to pay special tribute to Aaron," he said. "He was outstanding in pre-season and by his own standards it's not gone as well during the season. That could be a confidence thing and I know not everyone's taken to him, but you couldn't get a more honest lad than Aaron.

"I thought he was outstanding today. He was a real threat in the first half and worked his socks off from minute one and won the penalty."

"That's what we want from all our players but as the game progressed a lot of them grew and got stronger, and it was Aaron set the tempo for the rest of the players."





"We've had our problems defensively this season so to have them back is fantastic and I thought they were both excellent," said the manager.


"We were bold and brave to throw them in, especially Shane as he hasn't played for so long but I'm delighted for them both."

■ **FAVOURITE ALL TIME MANAGER:** Mike Newell.



"It's been terrible. Hopefully I'm past it now. Fingers crossed I just want to enjoy my football again."


"With so long on the sidelines the Lutonian was quick to praise the efforts of the Town's medical staff in helping him in his recuperation.

WHO IS YOUR FOOTBALL IDOL? Ian Wright. He came from non-league football at a late age.



Six games into the 1994/95 campaign it looked as though the Town were about to reward their long suffering supporters with yet another frustrating season, with a mediocre mid-table position at best and relegation at worst.

Only one win had been recorded in this opening period leaving manager David Pleat scratching his head. Supporters knew where the problem lay though - a lack of goals.

The normally free-scoring Kerry Dixon had yet to score, the promising but raw teenager John Hartson was not yet the finished product and close season signing from Plymouth, Dwight Marshall, was still finding his feet.

Next up was a trip to Watford but losing two home games in four days was not the ideal preparation despite having all the play in both matches. A 3-0 defeat at Kenilworth Road at the hands of Bolton had been pretty hard to stomach but Pleat had seen something on the pitch and was prepared to persevere with a new three at the back system with loanee Gary Waddock sitting in front of them.

Watford were unbeaten at home and had 17-year-old Gary Fitzgerald making his League debut in central defence. Fitzgerald had little to do early on as his forwards peppered Juergen Sommer in the Luton goal leading to Tommy Mooney slipping the ball through to Jamie Moralee to open the scoring after 20 minutes.

The Hornets were then stung by two goals in three minutes by the Town with Andy Hessenthaler, the man all Luton supporters loved to hate, laying them on a plate with poor clearances.

Firstly, he presented the ball to Scott Oakes who needed little encouragement to send a 25-yard shot past Perry Digweed in the Watford goal, and then shortly after Dixon took advantage of another slip to net his first goal of the season.


Joy knew no bounds amongst the Luton faithful when, three minutes from the interval, tiny David Preece set up Paul Telfer who cut in from the right, beat two opponents and buried a shot between Digweed and the near post.

THE CAMERA NEVER LIES

Dowie had the last laugh though as the Hatters ran out 2-1 winners in this September 1990 top flight clash at the Dell. He did not score that day but had bagged seven before his controversial sale to West Ham the following March.

Born in Hatfield, Iain had coincidentally been rejected by Southampton as a 16-year-old. He therefore continued with his studies, gaining a M.Eng degree, before becoming a Development Engineer at British Aerospace while turning out for Cheshunt, St Albans and finally Hendon.

It was while at Claremont Road that his goalscoring exploits were spotted by the Town who signed the raw recruit for £30,000 in December 1988.

He made only one start for the Hatters over the remainder of that season but in the following campaign he made the strikers position his own,

scoring eight goals including the last gasp winner at home to Crystal Palace in April 1990 which gave the Town a fighting chance of avoiding the drop - which they took with a never to be forgotten 3-2 victory at Derby the following week.

The sale of Iain to Second Division (now Championship) West Ham in March 1991 for £480,000 was controversial in as much that he did not particularly want to go even though he was joining another reluctant ex-Hatter in Tim Breacker who had moved to Upton Park a few months before.

He did not stay long with the Hammers before moving to Southampton (them again), then to Crystal Palace, West Ham, for a second time, before finishing his playing career at QPR having amassed 59 caps for Northern Ireland along the way.

A keen student of the game, Iain then became an accomplished coach as well as managing several high profile clubs.

Iain is now a pundit with Sky TV.

WEMBLEY DREAMS SHATTERED

It is a pity that very little film footage remains of the Town's first big run in the FA Cup which took them through to the quarter-finals in 1933 and quite rightly earned them the tag of 'giant killers'.

The Hatters were, at the time, a middle of the road team in Division Three (South) which had never progressed beyond the third round of the competition and it would be fair to say that the first round pairing with Kingstonian of the Isthmian League hardly caused a ripple of excitement in the environs of Kenilworth Road.

Kingstonian were, however, just about the strongest non-league outfit around, as proved by their lifting of the Amateur Cup at the season's end and the championship the following year. A crowd of 7,701 gathered at Kenilworth Road to see the Town lucky to escape with a 2-2 draw and the replay was no easier, watched by a then record crowd at Richmond Road, but this time they scraped through 3-2.

It was off to uncharted territory in the next round with the club's first ever meeting with Stockport County of Division Three (North). Although the

final scoreline of 3-2 in the Town's favour looked close, a 3-1 lead had been built up only for the other Hatters to net a consolation in the final minute. Stockport goalkeeper, Thomas Gale, was blamed for two of the goals including one from the Town's Fred Kean which he thought was drifting wide and therefore made no attempt at saving.

A hard fought 0-0 draw at Barnsley, again of Division Three (North), brought the Tykes back to Luton and following a 2-0 win in the replay, with prolific marksman Andy Rennie bagging both goals, FA Cup euphoria at last swept through the streets of the town.

The reason for the euphoria was plain to see as the mighty Tottenham were to be the visitors to Kenilworth Road for the fourth round tie. Although 'only' a Division Two side, Spurs were on their way to promotion at the season's end and boasted a proud FA Cup pedigree having won the trophy in both 1901 and 1921.

Tottenham supporters, confident after their team's 6-0 win at Oldham in the previous round, started

arriving at Luton very early on the day of the game having caught the first available trains out of London and by 7.30 were staging an impromptu kickabout on the Moor. By mid-day queues stretched all the way down Hazelbury Crescent and two hours later the gates were closed with 17,213 in the ground.

Some 21 coaches from London were parked along Dunstable Road and the site of the old Town ground was used as an overspill car park.

The pitch was hard and icy and would doubtless be regarded as unplayable today but the Town's groundstaff had used a steam roller on the morning of the game to iron out the ruts and at least make the playing area flat.

The Luton players were definitely up for the game and adapted far better to the conditions for within 20 minutes they were two goals to the good courtesy of strikes from Tom Alderson and Tommy Tait with both efforts being set up by Arthur Mills, deputising for the injured Rennie. Spurs huffed and puffed in an effort to get back into the match but the Luton defence held firm and at the final whistle thousands of supporters surged on to the pitch to cheer off their heroes.

For those of you with the good fortune to have recorded the TV series 'Kicking and Screaming' look out for footage of this game. It may have escaped your attention due to the fact that the Town were playing in a change strip of striped shirts and the ground bears little resemblance to what you see today.

Enthusiasm waned slightly when it was learned that the Town's 'reward' was a trip to Halifax but by the time of the game over 2,000 supporters had travelled to the Shay to swell the crowd to a record 29,235. Halifax, another team the Hatters had never met before, had seen off Darwen, Workington, Doncaster and Chester in the earlier rounds and were supremely confident of progressing to the quarter-finals for the first time in their history.

When they reached Halifax, the Town supporters were greeted by a snowstorm and a snow covered pitch. After the touchlines were cleared, the game finally kicked off with the Town again the quicker to adapt to the treacherous conditions. With the snow beginning to fall once more, Tait fired the Town into the lead after 20 minutes but, soon after, the referee called the players off as the blizzard obscured the touchlines.

The players were off the field for 30 minutes while the storm passed and as floodlights were not around in those days there was a danger that the game would not finish. As such, the referee made

the players change round at half-time without leaving the field and as the snow started to fall once more Alan Nelson made the game safe by tapping in after a shot from Rennie was parried by the goalkeeper.

By now all Luton supporters felt that the Town could go all the way and even when it was announced that Everton at Goodison Park were to be their opponents in the quarter-final it was seen as merely a stepping stone on the inevitable march to Wembley.

Three special trains, one of which had a huge boater mounted on the front of the engine, and countless coaches carried several thousand Luton supporters to Liverpool on the big day and when the turnstiles stopped clicking 55,431 spectators were present generating receipts of £4,143-6-4 which was a huge amount of money at the time.

With Alderson failing to recover from an injured shoulder, Mills returned to the side but commentators did not feel that this would affect the shape of the team over much. The choice of Rennie to play at inside-forward rather than central striker did, however, cause a few eyebrows to be raised but everyone assumed that manager Harold Wightman knew what he was doing.


As it turned out Rennie was clattered early on and spent the majority of the game as a limping passenger on the wing in those far off days before substitutes. By the time Rennie was injured Everton were already one goal to the good as the Town found difficulty in adapting to the wide open spaces of Goodison Park. If the game had been staged at Kenilworth Road, doubtless Everton would have struggled within its cramped confines as did Tottenham earlier.

Although Kean, who wished to add to the Cup winners medal he earned with Bolton in 1929, was everywhere trying to bolster up his overworked defence the clever Everton forwards seemed to find the back of the net with increasing regularity. When the score reached 3-0 the game became a virtual walkover and finished in a disappointing 0-6 defeat.

It was scant consolation to the Town that they received a large share of the massive gate, that they restricted the great Dixie Dean to only one goal and that their cup exploits would mean exemption to the third round in the following season's competition. They truly felt that they would win it.

Everton, of course, did go on to lift the trophy, overcoming Manchester City 3-0 in the final!



Town youth development officer Gregg Broughton was delighted to welcome Driver to the club.


He said: "Paul came to us in a turbulent time in the summer where there was a great deal of uncertainty concerning Luton's ability to retain players' registrations.


Tooting rarely threatened the Town goal and Laura Day, Randi Reynolds and Whitford-Stark all came close to extending the lead.

SIMON PITTS LOOKS BACK ON GAMES PLAYED AT HOME ON THIS DAY

The number of home games previously played on this date. Luton have won five, drawn three and lost two. The Hatters have scored 26 goals and conceded 17.

1

The first of these fixtures, and the only one in the FA Cup, came back in 1892 when Luton beat Old St. Marks 4-0 in a first qualifying round tie. The Hatters goals came courtesy of four different scorers, John Julian, William "Roland" Brown, Frank and Harry Whitby.

0

Luton have never failed to score in a home game on this day, but, although they scored against Bristol Rovers in 1904, the visitors took the points as Luton lost 2-1. Davie Ross scored for the Hatters.

3

The third home game on this date was also the first of these fixtures to be played at Kenilworth Road, and in 1910 West Ham United were the visitors for a Southern League match. John Smith scored for Luton, but the visitors took a share of the spoils in a 1-1 draw.

7

The most number of goals scored on this day, and the first time this happened was in 1913 when Luton beat Portsmouth 4-3 in a Southern Alliance fixture. Robert Brewis, Arthur "Jimmy" Durrant, Bob Hawkes and Frank Rollinson were all on target for the Hatters.

2

The next two fixtures on this date both ended in 2-2 draws. In 1932 Newport County were the

opponents for a Division Three (South) fixture, with Fred Kean and Arthur Nelson scoring for Luton. Six years later Bradford Park Avenue were the visitors for a Second Division match, and in front of the highest attendance for a home match this date, of 14,955, Eddie Connelly scored a brace.

5

The most goals conceded came against Notts County in 1966. This was the second game that saw seven goals in total as Luton scored twice, through David Pleat and Tony Thear, in front of the highest Kenilworth Road crowd for a game on this date, 14,955.

1

A solitary goal from John Faulkner was enough for Luton in 1977 as they beat Fulham in a Second Division fixture.

5

The most goals scored by Luton came in 1994 as Middlesbrough were beaten 5-1. An own goal from Paul Wilkinson put the Hatters into the lead, before Dwight Marshall and David Preece made it 3-0 before half-time. Marshall scored his second after the break, before John Hartson made it 5-0. Middlesbrough, who were crowned Champions at the end of the season, scored a late consolation.

4

It's four years since the last game here at Kenilworth Road on this date, and Luton scored four times to beat Northampton 4-1. Darren Currie opened the scoring early in the game before Bradley Johnson equalised. Matthew Spring restored Luton's lead from the penalty spot after the break, and Paul Furlong made it 3-1 soon after the hour. An injury time spot kick, again from Spring, secured a comfortable victory.

They are the bad luck stories that fascinate the fans and media, but have the managers of the players involved shaking their heads in despair.

I'm talking the type the filtered through to the press box at half-time of the recent Blue Square Bet Premier game between York City and Luton Town.

The Minstermen's doctor had been called to the away dressing room to look at midfielder Alex Lawless' broken hand.

Frustrated by his side being 3-0 down to his old club, and having been shown the yellow card for a late challenge moments earlier, Lawless punched a brick wall and, not surprisingly, lost.

He joined a long list of players who, in my time working on *The Non-League Paper*, have been left red-faced by the bizarre ways in which they've picked up injuries.

Take my old Ware team-mate Luke Woods, for example. As a Malta Under-21 goalkeeper you'd think he'd do all he could to protect the tools of his trade.

"No 'arm in helping out my pal," thought Luke as he went on a plumbing job in early 2008 with our winger Scott Neilson, now in League 2 with Crawley.

He certainly wasn't saying that a few hours later when, after helping push Scott's broken-down van, the engine clicked into gear and Luke hopped onto the ladder at the rear of the vehicle. As it gathered pace to 30mph, he jumped off – and broke his arm as he fell!

When I was at Hitchin, midfielder Aaran Cavill missed a game because the tattoo he'd had inked on his shoulder in midweek was still too sore!

Full-back Asa Charlton missed the start of AFC Telford's 2008/09 campaign with a broken toe, sustained by dropping a beer barrel on his foot.

Worst thing was, Charlton – now with Leamington – wasn't even drunk. He was doing his day job delivering ale to pubs around the West Midlands!

Former Newport County goalkeeper Tony Pennock was always quick to get down low to keep out shots, but he had no answer when he tripped over a tree walking backwards while mowing his lawn. He could only watch as the blade sliced through his shoe and four toes!

Then there was Swindon Supermarine's former Tamworth midfielder Dave Bampton, who had to pull out of an England C squad after a set of weights rolled off his bed and landed on his foot.

Mind you, at least he didn't injure himself working out playing a boxing game on the Nintendo Wii with his kid cousin, like then-Guiseley striker James Hanson, now with Bradford City.

And what about Truro City manager Lee Hodges, who was playing for Barnet when he wrenched his groin slipping on a bar of soap in the shower?

Or former Stalybridge Celtic keeper Mark Statham, who missed a game in 1999 after trapping his head in his car door!



LAST WORD WITH GRAHAM MILLER

It was a grey April afternoon. And the Hawthorns was a dingy stadium in 1974. But for a young reporter it staged a Luton game that day which lives alongside any of the Wembley highlights.

The score may appear insignificant. It finished West Bromwich Albion 1, the Town 1. But Barry Butlin's second half equaliser secured promotion back to Division 1. And as fans of the time will tell you it ended 15 years of hurt that started with FA Cup Final defeat to Forest.


So just six seasons after storming Division 4 the Hatters were back in the top flight. And it was my role to interview Luton manager Harry Haslam. None of my BBC bosses at the time knew I was a Luton fan. It meant my delight had to remain a secret.

I blagged my way into the away dressing room with my tape recorder. It was always the 'Holy of Holies' but I got in and spied the original happy Harry sitting on a bench in a cloud of smoke. He always seemed to have a smile on his face and a cigarette in his hand.

"How does it feel to be a first division team next season?" I asked him thrusting my microphone as close as I could to get good sound. Harry roared with laughter and beamed the widest smile possible. "How does it feel?" he thought for a second or two. "It feels great son," he replied. "It means we're unbeaten at the moment!" And with that he stood up, chuckled some more, and jogged away towards his players.

The interview was over. Professionally I was happy. I had my soundbite. Inwardly I was on cloud nine.

It took me years to come out as a Luton fan! As a reporter who covered football my approach was always to keep my loyalties to myself. I knew it was working when my sports reports on ITV for example would generate mail in equal numbers from both sets of fans accusing me of bias. Nowadays the fashion is for reporters to declare their allegiance to one team or another. But as we all know it's never easy being a Luton supporter.



My dad took me to my first match here in the early 1960's. We lost to Southampton. But despite the upset, or maybe because of it, I was hooked.

I was at school with club historian Roger Wash. And rightly or wrongly we always claim that our school year started the Oak Road 'choir' that sang the team back up the leagues leading to that marvellous Championship run of 1967/8.


We shared the Oak Road with away supporters in those days. I remember the concrete steps moving underfoot as we bounced up and down in celebration of a vital victory over Southend whose supporters were stood at the back. I hope no-one from health and safety reads this!

We even adopted one song from Corby Town fans after a dismal FA Cup draw there. That was back in 1965 but I still pick up the altered version of Jim Reeve's hit "I hear the sound of distant drums" rolling down from the stands to this day.

Our choir even sang out "Rioch for England" as Bruce blasted in yet another thunderbolt of a goal in that Championship winning season. No-one listened to us and of course Bruce went on to captain Scotland in the World Cup!

I've been privileged throughout my career to have interviewed many of the biggest names in sport. And reported on World Cup finals and Champions League finals from some of the most famous football grounds in the game. But as we all know there's really no place like home. And for all its quirks and foibles for me that will always be here at the top of Kenilworth Road.
