
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
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From the Boardroom

The club is in the process of putting together a centenary committee that will arrange and coordinate events



From the Manager

Good afternoon and welcome to everyone connected with Luton Town FC. This will always be a massive game because of the close proximity of our visitors, especially as we are now starved of "derbies", and the fact that without doubt they are amongst the favourites for promotion. When you then have the added ingredient of all the ex-players and staff from our visitors returning to the R Costings Stadium, it is no wonder why this fixture will attract our biggest crowd of the season.

I know there will be some pantomime villains today but I have nothing but respect for Gary Brabin, Paul Carden, Dan Gleeson, Danny Crow and Robbie Willmott. From my perspective, I remember Dan Gleeson as a 15 year old youngster that joined United and progressed through the ranks much as Josh Coulson has done since, with his hometown club. I signed Robbie

Willmott as a 15 year old from Buntingford and his sale last January became a financial imperative for the club. Those days of overspending are now over so that we can hold onto our best assets and help them develop until its right for all parties for them to progress higher. That means not entering into contracts with daft release clauses and waiting for our best young players to develop to such a level that enables us to sell them to clubs further up the pyramid and for money that can make a difference in helping the club grow.

Gary was at this club at a time that would have tested the sanity of any manager and Paul was also put in the almost untenable position as the incumbent assistant for any future managers. In Paul's case, I feel as though we handled a very difficult situation with respect and honesty back in February and resolved matters in the

summer so that both Paul and the club could move on. It should not be forgotten what a massive contribution he made on the pitch throughout his time as a Cambridge United player and I would ask you to show that appreciation to him today. He deserves a proper reception.

It is fact that we are punching significantly above our weight at the moment and no-one knows how long we can sustain our current run of results. Don't be fooled by the result of our first encounter or our current respective league positions. I believe that if anyone finishes above Luton they will be champions and clubs like York City, Fleetwood, Wrexham and Mansfield Town are far better resourced to challenge them than ourselves. Back in September, I said that even though we had defended superbly to claim an unlikely victory, Luton are the better team. They have a stronger squad and when you look at their strength in depth and options in every position, it is frightening. The fact that our young team is competing at this end of the table after 19 games is fantastic credit to the players. Whereas Luton have experienced players in every position not even in the team, we have the likes of JT, Blaine, Hughesy, Jack Eades, Maz and JP; all under 21 years old. The one thing this team will do though, is continue to develop and grow. Results and performances may dip from time to time, but the improvement from the end of last season has been dramatic and even if it evens out as the season progresses, we should still end with more points and a better league position than term. That should give everyone some hope for the future. Especially as it will be achieved at a reduced budget that is financially sustainable for the club going into our centenary year. It means that success can be achieved without risking the long term future of the club.

As well as scouting thoroughly and recruiting wisely, this can only be achieved through our youth policy and

continuing our commitment to developing our own young players. With this in mind, it was pleasing that on Tuesday evening Blaine, Jack Eades and James Brighton all impressed for their loan clubs, Rory made his debut for England C and our Under 18's beat Crawley Town in the FA Youth Cup. A good night for youth development! Mark Bonner is doing a fantastic job with the scholars, as I knew he would, and we have now been the better team twice against Football League opposition. They have a third round tie to look forward to, possibly against Charlton Athletic, but Wroxham away this afternoon will be an even bigger test. The FA Youth Cup is a great competition but handling the demands of the Ridgeons League every week is what really sorts the men from the boys.

Finally, I would like to thank you all again for the support that you have given the team so far this season. We know that we didn't perform anywhere near the levels that we have set ourselves on Friday but we have come a long way in a very short period of time and sometimes we need to step back and see the big picture. The noise in the stadium after Josh's second equaliser and the atmosphere at the end was something that we must aim to create more often. If this club is to be successful in the future, we all have a part to play. We know that it will have to be achieved against the odds but this club has a history of doing just that. From the directors to the staff to the players to the fans we all want the same thing and it feels like EVERYONE is pulling in the same direction to make it

happen. There will be disappointments, frustrations and set-backs but as long as we stay "United in Endeavour" then we will continue to move forward.

Let's see if you can match the noise our away fans generated at Kenilworth Road. Your fantastic support helps the players more than you can imagine. The character the players have shown in coming from behind comes from the never say die attitude on the terraces. You never give up on us and that is so important. Someone once said about their fans "don't support us when we are winning if you can't support us when we are losing". We are grateful that you understand the true meaning of "support" and that is why we are so proud to play for you.

Having played five of their last six games at home, a return to league action sees Luton travel to the R Costings Abbey Stadium following last weekend's FA Cup exploits. Whilst the U's were holding Wrexham, Gary Brabin's men claimed the League Two scalp of Northampton thanks to a 1-0 victory at Kenilworth Road. Therefore, the seventh-placed Hatters will arrive full of confidence today as they aim to climb back into the Blue Square Bet Premier play-off places.

Now enduring their third season at non-league level following relegation in 2009, albeit after suffering a 30-point deduction due to financial irregularities, they will be targeting no less than promotion this year. The Bedfordshire club lost out to York in the 2009/10 play-offs and, worse was to follow last season when, after reaching the showpiece final, they were defeated by AFC Wimbledon courtesy of a dramatic penalty shoot-out.

Previous incumbent Richard Money left by mutual consent in March, with Town attempting to catch league leaders Crawley. Ex-U's boss Brabin guided his men to just one loss in ten games and, although Steve Evans's expensively assembled squad duly cantered to the title, Luton secured their play-off spot with some momentum. However, that loss to AFC Wimbledon has left scars and, although the hierarchy have been financially supportive this season, Brabin will be under no illusion as to his

brief.

Town's home form has undulated to date, with six wins and a draw counterbalanced by three defeats to Wrexham, Fleetwood and the Mighty U's, tellingly the division's top three sides. They are a difficult proposition away from home, though, as just one defeat will testify. That loss came at York in September thanks to a 3-0 reverse but, disappointment is outweighed by five draws and a trio of victories at Telford, Grimsby and Kidderminster.

The Manager Gary Brabin



Ex-U's boss Gary Brabin was appointed Luton's Chief Scout in October 2009 following his departure from the Abbey. Promoted to Assistant Manager last season, although, with just two months of the campaign remaining and Town struggling to maintain a play-off push, Richard Money was relieved of his duties and Gary stepped up. A tortuous play-off final defeat to AFC Wimbledon dampened spirits, but the 40-year old remains determined to lead Town back into the Football League.

That loss brought back memories of his time at United, who he lead to Wembley in the same showpiece final two years previous, only for black & amber hearts to be broken. Collecting the BSP Manager of the Season award, he guided the U's to a runners-up spot in his only season at the Abbey after arriving from Southport in June 2008.

A non-nonsense midfielder in his playing days, Gary boasted a 300-plus game career that started at Stockport and also saw him emblazoned in the colours of, amongst others, Runcorn, Doncaster, Blackpool, Hull, Chester, Burscough and Welsh outfit The New Saints.

Gary is assisted at Town by former Newcastle and Southampton defender Alan Neilson, whilst ex-U's Captain Paul Carden provides coaching support.

Presenting The Players


■ Kevin Pilkington Goalkeeper

An experienced stopper, Kevin was recalled for last Saturday's FA Cup win over Northampton; just his second appearance of the season. Joining the club from Notts County in May 2010, the 37-year old kick-started his career with Manchester United, played six times in the Premier League before moving to Port Vale via loan spells with Rochdale, Rotherham and Celtic. His 423-game journey has been complimented by stints at Aberystwyth, Wigan and Mansfield.

■ Mark Tyler Goalkeeper

Another Town keeper with plenty of know-how, 34-year old Mark was first-choice between the sticks until being dropped to the bench for last weekend's FA Cup clash with Northampton. Snapped up from Peterborough in 2009, where he played 483 times, Mark was also loaned to League Two side Bury before arriving at Kenilworth Road.

■ George Pilkington Defender



A former Everton trainee, George is now enjoying his fourth season with the Hatters. An imposing centre-half, he left the Premiership club for Port Vale in June 2003, has also seen service at Exeter and, since signing for Town has collected several Player of the Year awards. Missed the first two months of this season, but he has returned to stabilise the rearguard.

■ Dan Gleeson - Defender

One of several ex-United men returning to the Abbey, right-back Dan was named in the Hatters squad for last Saturday's

FA Cup fixture following three months on the sidelines with a back injury. An accomplished defender, he graduated from the U's Youth Academy, debuted in 2003 before being released in 2006, but rejoined the club from Notts County seven months later. Nevertheless, following 198 appearances and two Wembley Play-off finals Dan opted to leave his hometown club in June for a new challenge.

■ Ed Asafu-Adjaye Defender

Versatile in defence, Ed progressed through the Hatters youth set-up and, following loan spells with Walton & Hersham and Salisbury during 2007/08, stepped up to first-team duties. Unfortunately appearances have been fleeting this season and, despite warming the bench, Ed has not pulled on a Town shirt since mid-September. May miss today's trip to the Abbey after picking up a foot injury.


One to Watch



■ Curtis Osano Defender

One of several former Rushden players in the squad, this quick-footed defender is capable of playing at left-back or centre-half. Kenyan-born, Curtis was a youth with Reading but, despite career-building loan spells with Aldershot, Woking and Rushden did not make a first-team appearance for the Royals so opted to join the latter in 2008. Nevertheless, Diamonds' collapse prompted his July switch to Luton following 150-plus games at Nene Park.

One to Watch



■ Jamie Hand Midfielder

Currently on loan from Hayes & Yeading, Jamie is a popular figure at Kenilworth Road thanks to his battling central midfield performances. Gary Brabin is keen to sign the 27-year old permanently in January and has boldly predicted that he "will be part of the side that gets us promoted". Jamie played Premiership football with Watford in 2000/01 and has also served Oxford, Peterborough, Northampton, Chester, Huddersfield, Lincoln, Ebbsfleet and Woking.

■ Shane Blackett - Defender

Arriving at Kenilworth Road during the summer of 2009, left-sided defender Shane began his career with Dunstable then Arlesey Town prior to being snapped up by Dagenham & Redbridge in 2004. He helped the Daggers win Football League promotion in 2007 before Peterborough swooped in early 2007. Shane, who made 38 appearances at London Road, will probably be amongst the substitutes today.

■ Dean Beckwith Defender

A regular in the starting line-up during August and September following his summer move from Northampton, Dean has recently returned to the squad after a spell away from action. A former Gillingham scholar, this commanding centre-half won Football League promotion with Hereford in 2006 and boasts a 250-plus game career.

is another product of the Hatters academy. An established member of the squad since 2003, he has passed the 250 appearance mark for Town and is a good bet to partner Jamie Hand in central midfield today, although, capable of playing anywhere across the park if required.

■ Adam Watkins Midfielder

An attacking midfielder who can also operate in attack, Adam climbed off the bench to score the winner in last Saturday's 1-0 FA Cup victory over Northampton. A product of the Hatters youth system, he signed a professional deal in June 2010 and, despite starting just five games this term, has popped up with three goals and made his England C debut against Gibraltar on Tuesday.

■ Charlie Henry Midfielder

Signed from Newport in November 2010, winger Charlie actually started out as a youth with Luton but, after being released by the Hatters, moved south to Havant & Waterlooville before pitching up at County, where he won a BSBS Championship medal. Charlie is yet to appear for Town this season.

■ Alex Lawless Midfielder



Central midfielder Alex was signed from York last November. A former Welsh U21 international, he suffered Play-off Final heartache with City in 2010 and again with Town last season. A Cardiff scholar, he moved to Fulham in 2003 via the Welsh lower leagues, but failed to make the grade at Craven Cottage so joined Torquay then Forest Green. Made



121 appearances for FGR before joining York in June 2009. Alex returned to the Hatters squad for the recent home defeat to Fleetwood following a six-week absence.

■ James Dance **Midfielder**

Competition on the flanks is provided by this 24-year old who joined the Hatters from Crawley in July. James began his career with Birmingham then toured the Midlands non-league circuit before being snapped up by Kettering during 2009. Steve Evans' money-bags Town then swooped but, after pocketing a BSBP winners medal last season, he opted to stay in the Conference with Luton. Will miss today's game after undergoing a cheekbone operation.

■ John-Paul Kissock **Midfielder**



A third member of the squad on midweek England C duty, John-Paul made a summer move from Southport. Also appearing for his country at U16 and U18 level, this 21-year old attacking midfielder started out with Everton, was an unused substitute in nine Premiership games, but departed for Hamilton Academicals via a loan spell with Gretna. Dropped a level with Newton then Formby prior to joining Southport last December and is now a regular in the Hatters matchday squad.

■ Tommy Wright **Forward**

A recent signing, this experienced centre-forward saw service at Leicester, Brentford, Blackpool, Barnsley and Darlington before Aberdeen paid £75,000 for him in 2008. Tommy then moved south to Grimsby prior to a second spell with Grimsby, for whom he bagged four goals in 22 games as well as

collecting a FA Trophy winners medal. The 27-year old scored the winner in Town's 1-0 victory at Grimsby last month, but is doubtful for today's game thanks to an ankle knock.

■ Amari Morgan-Smith **Forward**

Captured from Ilkeston Town last year, Amari amassed an eye-catching 34 goals in 77 starts for the Derbyshire club. Boasting bags of pace, he was called into the England C squad in May following some impressive performances. The 22-year old, a trainee with Wolves, has also sported the colours of Stockport and is Luton's top scorer this season with nine goals from 15 starts.

■ Danny Crow **Forward**

After a fine 23-goal campaign in black and amber Danny left the Abbey in May

■ Stuart Fleetwood **Forward**

This 25-year old made his name after netting 34 goals for Forest Green during the 2007/08 season. Stuart also enjoyed three spells with Hereford and, despite scoring 18

League Two goals last term, they allowed him to join the Hatters in August. Starting out at Cardiff, this former Welsh U21 international also donned the shirt for Charlton, Cheltenham, Exeter and Brighton, whilst his record for Town reads two goals from 13 games.



2010. The 24-year old started out with Norwich and also appeared for Northampton, Notts County and Peterborough before arriving in CB5 during September 2008. Danny's debut season ended with an appearance in our unsuccessful BSBP Play-off Final; a trick he repeated with Town last season. Has popped up with three goals this term, but has not found the net since early September.

■ Aaron O'Connor **Forward**

A possible strike partner for Amari Morgan-Smith today, Aaron can also operate on the flanks due to his enviable pace. Formerly a Player of the Year with Rushden, he bagged 27 goals across two seasons at Nene Park before Luton swooped in July. Beginning his career with Derby, Aaron relocated to Ilkeston before packing his bags again for stints with Scunthorpe, Gresley Rovers, where he notched 80 goals in 127 matches, Grays Athletic and Mansfield prior to moving to Rushden. The 28-year old will be disappointed with his tally of just one goal this term.

■ Ryan Brunt **Forward**

Captured on a short-term deal from Stoke on Wednesday, Ryan could be in the frame to face United today. The 18-year old, a lightning-quick striker, has been playing reserve team football regularly at the Britannia Stadium, but will benefit from a taste of first-team action with the Hatters.

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Football historian Leigh Edwards looks at Luton Town's leading lights

Classic Campaign – 1987-88

Ray Harford plotted Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph. Danny Wilson replaced Peter Nicholas in midfield, while Micky Weir arrived from Hibernian and Mike Newell moved to Leicester. The Hatters won 5-2 at Oxford and Ian Allinson was signed from Stoke in October, with Luton losing just twice in 12 matches including a 7-4 win the return match against Oxford, finishing ninth in the top-flight. They defeated Wigan 5-2, Coventry 3-1, Ipswich 1-0, Bradford City 2-0 and Oxford 3-1 in the Littlewoods Cup before beating Arsenal 3-2 in the final. Luton were also FA Cup semi-finalists and Simod Cup finalists.

Managing To Succeed – David Pleat

Articulate manager David Pleat (pictured) guided Luton Town to the Second Division title in 1981-82. A former winger, he played for Nottingham Forest, Luton, Shrewsbury, Exeter and Peterborough before becoming Nuneaton's player-boss. He rejoined

Luton as coach in July 1972 and became manager in January 1978, guiding the Hatters to the FA Cup semi-finals in 1984-85. Taking charge of Spurs in May 1986, he led them to the 1987 FA Cup final, then managed Leicester City before rejoining Luton in June 1991. He took the Hatters to the FA Cup semi-finals again in 1993-94, leaving in June 1995. Now working in the media.

Fab Four

Bruce Rioch

Influential midfielder Bruce Rioch was capped 24 times by Scotland after leaving Luton Town. Signing professional for Luton in September 1964, he starred in the 1967-68 Fourth Division title triumph and netted 46 goals in 149 League games prior to joining Aston Villa for £100,000 in July 1969. He was a key figure in their 1971-72 Third Division title success and moved to Derby County in February 1974, helping to win the League Championship in 1974-75. He played for Everton, Derby again and Torquay,

since managing Middlesbrough, Millwall, Bolton Wanderers, Arsenal, Norwich City and Wigan Athletic.

Ricky Hill

England international midfielder Ricky Hill was 'Player of the Year' when Luton Town won the Second Division title in 1981-82. Signing professional at Kenilworth Road in May 1976, he was 'Player of the Year' again in 1982-83 and starred as Luton were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85. He featured in two consecutive Littlewoods Cup finals including the 1988 Wembley triumph and netted 54 goals in 436 League games before moving to Le Havre in July 1989. Reuniting with David Pleat at Leicester City in August 1990 and later as a coach at Sheffield Wednesday and Spurs, he briefly rejoined Luton as manager.

Brian Stein

England international striker Brian Stein scored twice in Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph. Moving to Kenilworth Road from Edgware Town in October 1977, he was leading marksman in Luton's 1981-82 Second Division success and also starred as they were FA Cup semi-finalists in 1984-85 and 1987-88. He joined French side Caen in July 1988 and moved via Annecy back to Luton in July 1991. Voted 'Player of the Year' for the second time in 1991-92, he netted 130 goals in 427 League games overall for the Hatters before joining Barnet in August 1992. His younger brother Mark also played for Luton.

Malcolm Macdonald

Ace marksman Malcolm Macdonald was capped 14 times by England after leaving Luton Town. Initially with Tonbridge, he joined Fulham in August 1968 and moved to Kenilworth Road in July 1969. He was Luton's top scorer in two consecutive seasons including the 1969-70 promotion success and netted 49 goals in 88 League games before being sold to Newcastle United for £180,000 in May 1971. An FA Cup finalist in 1974, he joined Arsenal for £333,000 in August 1976 and was an FA Cup finalist again in 1978 before injury ended his career. He managed Fulham and Huddersfield Town and has since worked in the media.

1983

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United enjoyed five successful seasons in Division Two (now "The Championship") from 1978-1983, but a change in rules to allow home clubs to keep all of their gate money instead of sharing it with their visitors worked badly against smaller clubs such as the U's in competition with the likes of Chelsea, Leeds, Newcastle and Manchester City. On this day in 1983 United were on a run of seven consecutive defeats when this message from the Boardroom appeared in the matchday programme:

The Club at present, as far as playing results are concerned, is going through a difficult period. This has been mainly due to the drastic playing staff cuts that unfortunately had to be made during the close season in an attempt to live within our means as far as income and expenditure are concerned. These essential cuts have, to say the least, left us depleted in playing members, particularly with the cruel injury list and sickness that has hit the club.

It is hoped therefore that we have now reached the bottom of the trough with regard to injuries and playing results and that both these aspects will improve dramatically in the weeks to come.

On our recent visit to Cardiff, we noticed their programme contained an article by the Club manager, of which a great deal could so easily be redirected to ourselves, and for the record we give below extracts of the views that were expressed.

"In recent weeks the Club, the Management and the Directors have taken 'stick' in both the Press and in the letters we have all received. That's part of football and it has to be accepted

because everyone is entitled to their opinion – that goes for the supporters who are our life-blood, the newspapers and the media in general. A lot of folks have had their say recently and got complaints off their chest – I trust they feel better for having made their points.

"What we, most closely connected with the club, have to be careful about is that we do not rip each apart in the process. We must not destroy each other's enthusiasm and ambitions, because those are exactly the qualities needed to put both the team and the club itself in a respectable position during the coming months. This is the time to pull together, to look at each other and be counted."

These views could apply to Cambridge United and although further difficult and unpopular decisions may have to be made in the future, we trust that in the long term they will be for the benefit of the club.

The U's stopped the rot with a goalless draw, but after a long, record-breaking run, had to wait until 28th April 1984 for their next League win on the way to ignominious relegation. On a lighter note, the programme carried more comments from

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
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
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
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Today's Mascots

Kieran, who comes from South Wootton, plays for Wootton U7's and trains with the Cambridge United RDC in King's Lynn. A Chelsea fan, Kieran also enjoys playing XBox. He is celebrating his seventh birthday - happy birthday Kieran.

Ellisha was born with spinal dysraphism with distematomyelia L1-L3 (a form of spinal bifida), Left thoraco lumber scoliosis (curvature of the spine), Neuropathic bowel and bladder (she has little control over bladder and bowel).

Ellisha, who is six years old, has had two major surgeries on her spine since she was born the first one was in March 2006 and that was diastem surgery for aspiration of syrinx, and her second lot of surgery was in March 2009 and that was spinal bone grafting T7-L2, to try and slow the spine from curving as much as it was.

She is booked in to have the life

changing operation on 29th November and her family hopes to have her home in time for Christmas.

Hopefully once the surgery has taken place it will give her a much more comfortable life without having to wear a cast all the time, and will be able to do things she like to do, and will stop all the chest infections she gets due to her lungs being crushed by the spine and she won't be so out of breath either.

"We have no infrastructure here. Our pitches are in a very bad state, and children find it difficult to master the right techniques. We need proper pitches, basic kit and equipment. We need good coaches. We live in the 21st century, but unfortunately, we don't have these things."

These are the words of Oraz Nazarov, coach of the Tajikistan Under-19 football team. He was speaking in Doha last month, during qualifying for the 2012 Asian Under-19 Championship, where his players were paired with their counterparts from Kuwait, Jordan, Bahrain, Bhutan and the host country, Qatar.

Tajikistan is an unfamiliar country to most westerners. It has had a difficult beginning as an independent state, even by the standards of other post-Soviet republics. After independence, Tajikistan suffered a devastating five-year civil war that lasted until 1997, since when a degree of political stability and foreign aid have allowed the country's economy to start to grow.

The Tajik football federation was admitted to FIFA in 1994, with the first official game the same year, a 1-0 defeat to Kazakhstan in a Central Asian tournament held in Uzbekistan. Successive attempts at World Cup

qualification, beginning with the 1998 tournament, have been brief, with the highlight a record 16-0 win over Guam in the qualifiers for the 2006 championship.

Asian qualifying for the 2014 World Cup in Brazil is already under way. A two-legged tie with Syria saw the Tajiks lose 2-1 away and 4-0 at home, only to see their 6-1 aggregate defeat turned into a 6-0 aggregate win as FIFA disqualified the Syrians for fielding an ineligible player. With defeats against Japan (8-0 below, right), North Korea (1-0) and Uzbekistan (1-0), Tajikistan's continued interest seems limited.

Tajik President Emomali Rahmon recently appointed his eldest son, 23-year-old Rustam Emomali, as deputy head of the country's football federation. Rustam also owns and regularly turns out for one of Tajikistan's leading club sides, Istiqlol (pictured above). Just to show there isn't really any favouritism as far as the family is concerned, Rustam's eldest sister, Ozoda Rahmonova, is deputy foreign minister.

FIFA President Sepp Blatter opened the federation's new headquarters in 2004, but with seemingly limited funds available to develop Tajikistan's football infrastructure, and with costs for travel

and accommodation for international matches prohibitively high, it is difficult for the national team at all levels to gain experience, apart from in official competitions.

This is why the Under-19s' experience in tournaments like the one in Qatar is so important. Despite two wins, 6-0 against Bhutan and 3-2 over the hosts, however, Tajikistan failed to advance beyond the qualifiers, and Oraz Nazarov remains depressingly downbeat.

"I don't think there is any future, either for our youth team or our Under-19s," he says. "Yes, they have played five games and yes, they have gained some experience, but all this needs to be built on and developed. The more games they can play at that level, the more the players will advance and grow, but otherwise we will remain in the same place."

It sounds like a cry for help and it is. "I would like to attract the attention of the President of FIFA, so that more attention can be given to the development of football in our country," he says. "Our country is not in a position to think about football, but we must attract investment for building stadiums, to supply equipment and to encourage children, because it matters."



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

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First Thoughts

Much as we've all wanted to do so at one point or another, assaulting a referee is never a good idea.

Striker Josh McKenzie discovered this to his cost last week when he was slapped (not literally) with a three-year ban from all football for striking referee Chris Wicks.

McKenzie was playing for Evo-Stick (Southern) Premier at the time, and reacted angrily after he was dismissed in a match against Chesham United on October 15. The 28-year-old has accepted his punishment, which included a £250 fine, and has since been sacked by Redditch chairman Chris Swan.

An FA spokesman said: "Any abuse of a referee should be considered seriously and any physical contact against a referee, if proved, should carry a considerable sporting sanction."

No one would argue that the punishment doesn't fit the crime in this

instance, but problems have arisen with the news that the Southern League want the match replayed.

Chesham were leading 1-0 at the time of the assault, and following the incident Mr Wicks decided to abandon play.

Understandably, the Hertfordshire side are a bit rankled at having to start again at 0-0.

In a statement they said: "We are awaiting clarification as to the league rules or precedents that led to the decision to replay the match."

"The board will be discussing match arrangements over the next couple of days, including decisions about admission fees for the game, understanding that supporters have already paid to watch this match."

"We must overcome this feeling of frustration and disappointment, put this whole situation behind and focus on our quest for promotion."

Redditch might argue that they

shouldn't be punished as a club for the actions of one idiotic player, but in my view it doesn't seem very just that Chesham and their supporters should be penalised for an incident that was nothing to do with them.

Thankfully assaults on match officials are few and far between, but referees are routinely subjected to verbal abuse and physical intimidation which usually goes unpunished.

Perhaps it would be a good idea for the FA to put a rule in place whereby if something like this happens again that the perpetrator and his club are automatically sanctioned.

Not only would it mean innocent teams like Chesham don't get unfairly targeted, but maybe managers would drum the much talked about - but rarely implemented - respect message into their teams.



In Focus

Ryan Charles

If Ryan Charles' goal tally was as high as his words-per-minute ratio, Cambridge United would probably be out of sight at the top of the league by now already.

The talkative striker, who joined from now-defunct Rushden & Diamonds in the summer, is the U's self-proclaimed "socialite" and seems to have taken on the mantle vacated by Conal Platt, when he was loaned out to Telford and then Lincoln this season, as the joker of the pack.

"I think I get on with everyone," he smiles. "I just hope they get on with me."

The problem for Charles this season is that he's not had much of a chance to let his feet do the talking. The 22-year-old has only started five times, scoring once, and he says this lack of pitch time is the biggest regret of his short career at the Abbey Stadium so far.

"It's not gone as I'd planned," he admits. "I wanted to be starting a few more games and getting a few more goals but I got injured at the wrong time and because the team have been doing so well recently it's been hard for anyone to get back in once they're out."

"I've come here to play games, score goals, and be the number one striker at the club and obviously at the moment I'm not, which isn't ideal, but football is always about competing for your position so I've got no problem with doing that. At the moment I'm just trying to play my part."

The form to which Charles alludes has been impressive to say the least. Under Jez George in 2011/12, Cambridge have ➤

been beaten only once in the last 17 matches in all competitions – a run which included arguably their most impressive result so far this season, a 1-0 win at today's visitors Luton.

Despite admitting he's looking to complete a double over his former club, Charles says he still holds the Hatters in high regard – having spent his formative years as a schoolboy and trainee at Kenilworth Road.

"I got the chance to play in League 1 and League 2 and Luton will always be in my heart because they gave me my start in football and the fans were great for my whole time there," he enthuses.

"Despite my history with Luton though, I'm a Cambridge United player now so all I want is to do well for us, go out there on Saturday and beat them."

Although he speaks highly of his former club, Charles admits he does look back on the end of his 12-year association with the Bedfordshire outfit with some regret – especially when it comes to former manager Richard Money, who Charles effectively blames for his ultimate exit.

"I enjoyed myself until he came in, but he wanted his own team," Charles says. "I was confident and flying and he told me I would still be involved, but then he'd change the team around and do completely the opposite of what he'd said to me."

"In the end I asked to leave because I didn't think I was getting a fair crack of the whip. I didn't want to leave but I felt I had to in order to progress my career."

"The thing was, when I did say I wanted to go, he was fine at first but at the end of the season he called me into

his office and said I was silly for requesting a transfer, that he thought I was a good player and why did I want to go?"

"You could say myself and the manager parted on bad terms but I don't hold it against him, he was just trying to do his job but it was confusing though. In the end I just wanted to get away, but I never had a problem with the club, the board and the fans and I'll always have time for them."

Charles says he couldn't have a more different mentor these days though, and is quick to extol the virtues of playing for Jez George: "From the minute I met him, he's been honest with me and I really respect that about him."

"He's definitely a people person, knows how to look after you and give you the right confidence when you need it."

Richard Money was perhaps a bit more old school and wasn't so keen on working with the younger players but Jez is completely the opposite. His background is in youth football and it really shows – in a good way."

Speaking to Charles, his infectious enthusiasm shines through – and, despite being something of a bit-part player so far he waxes lyrical about the football the team are playing, and the results they are producing. So are the players as surprised as the pundits and, to a certain extent, United's own fans as to the success enjoyed so far?

"With the players we've got, who I see in training every day, we're not surprised at all. We believe in ourselves," he says.

"Other teams might be surprised by the form we've showed but we believe the sky's the limit if we keep working hard."

"We're all similar ages, it's one of the youngest teams I've been in but it does mean everyone has got more in common with each other. It's like a big family – and we all want the same thing. We're all trying to get better, improve and get up the leagues and do the best we can for the club."

"We're lacking that bit of experience but a lot of the lads have lots of league games under their belt, so it's not all about how old you are."

Michael Wylde, James Jennings, and Kevin Roberts have all played a lot of games and they are all good talkers on the pitch, which helps you out. Danny Naisbitt is another old head who talks a lot from the back and he gives us good advice. It's all positive at the moment, we're third in the league and everyone's buzzing around."

Moving onto more sombre matters, Charles suffered tragedy in his private life recently when school friend Billy Dove, 21, was killed in Hemel Hempstead in a stabbing incident that made headlines across the country.

Charles says this has had a profound effect on his life already, calling the entire episode "heart-breaking", but he praises the reaction of those around him, from family and friends to team-mates and fans of Cambridge and Luton.

"I got a phonecall at about 3am from my friend telling me he'd been stabbed and his sister called me after that too," he recalls.

"I'd known him since I was in year seven at school and a bunch of us always used to hang around together and play football in the park. I was in shock at first because to look at him he wouldn't

cause trouble – we'd always call him 'Little Billy' because he was so small and scrawny."

"Jez and the lads have been so supportive. The manager said to me I could do whatever felt right but, looking back even now, I'm glad I kept going, kept busy and got on with my job."

"When Josh scored [against Wrexham] he lifted up his shirt to show his T-shirt underneath and pay his respects to him and that meant a lot. The lads have been brilliant."

"I've also got a tattoo for Billy – I've got an angel on my right arm for my nan, and now I've got one on my left hand for him. I only get tattoos that mean something."

He adds: "The good thing to come out of this is that all our friends have become a lot closer, it's just a shame this has had to happen for us to do that."

So, moving back to football, how does he see himself getting a regular start in the first-team, or is his old Rushden team-mate Michael Gash going to keep him out all season?

"If I was picking the team I'd play up front with Gashy, I think we could be quite effective together. He's a target man and I'm more of a ball at the feet striker," he said.

"We've played together before and it worked well, I'd play off his flick ons and run in behind."

"But that's obviously just me – we're winning games and doing really well. The gaffer's obviously picking the right team and the right formation so I can't complain. I'm still just proud to be involved."

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

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

We followed that up with a home draw with Ebbsfleet United, after a goalless first half we soon found ourselves two down within 15 minutes of the restart but goals from Nat Richardson and Hannah Goodchild saw us drab an unlikely point.

Our latest game was an away trip to Luton Town, we were hoping to extend our seven game unbeaten run but by half time our hopes looked slim. 2-0 down and not playing very well, we were soon 3-0 down after the break but managed to pick ourselves up and put up a better fight for the remainder of the game but eventually losing 4-2 with our goals coming from Natalie Richardson and Sophie Thompson.

Next up for us was the start of our FA Cup adventure with an away tie against Hampstead WFC in the Third Qualifying Round. Last year saw us get

to the Third Round proper where we lost to Leeds City Vixens from the Premier League. We managed to edge past Hampstead surroundings that weren't used to and with a well organised Hampstead team determined to pull off a giant killing Sunday was a tough day at the office.

We scored early after Nat Richardson controlled a poor goal kick and shot from long range into an empty net to give us the lead. The game was scrappy and didn't flow at all which suited our hosts and continued to frustrate us. Hampstead equalised shortly before half time after a huge bobble beat our keeper Verity Crook.

The second half was much the same as the first, very scrappy and one of few chances but the game turned when Hampstead were reduced to 10 players after an untidy tackle on Kalyleigh Burt resulted in a second booking. We finally managed to get the ball moving and found some space on a tiny pitch and 15 minutes from the end Hampstead failed to clear a Nat Richardson cross properly which fell to Captain Gemma Clare (pictured) who lashed it in from the edge of the area for her first goal for the club and the winner which sent us through to the 1st round.

Next up are Oxford United at home and they look to be a good side so our cup adventure doesn't look like getting any easier!!

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
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Last year's sell-out publication 'Cambridge 'til I Die' produced by U's fans Doug Shulman and Kevin Robson, provoked a wave of wonderful tales from the United fan base. The publishers were inundated with stories and the book overflowed so, throughout the season, we publish the ones that got away...

As the third of three brothers, football and the U's were ingrained within me before my conscious mind could even challenge its relevance.

The beginning...

The end of what proved to be a successful 1990/91 season was drawing to its conclusion and the U's were hosting Preston North End at the Abbey. In the 18 months prior to that game, I had become increasingly interested in football on a Saturday afternoon, when my father and brothers would disappear for a few hours and return later dressed in amber, excited, and full of discussion. What followed was a six-year old's incessant struggle to convince his Dad to

save him from the retreat of roller-skating on a Saturday afternoon.

My chance finally arrived on a sunny afternoon in March 1991, with my rear firmly attached to a Block A seat at the front of the family enclosure. My memory of the game is pretty blank, other than both goals in a 1-1 draw, (both of which I enthusiastically celebrated, not realising that the teams swap ends at half time).

From the start of the 1991/92 my attendance at the Abbey was unwavering, along with my father (who's worked at the Abbey on match days since 1982), two brothers, and mother. Bless her. She didn't have much of a choice in the end. Attending every home game I soon became gripped – a positive start to the season helped to fuel the fire and desire.

Fratton Park - 21st September 1991 - Portsmouth 3-0 Cambridge United

After a promising start of five wins in the first seven games my first away trip brought a temporary and abrupt halt to

the U's continued charge. A trip on the old Junior U's coach took us to the game, the road trip, the mascot raffle on the coach, the morning football and of course the match, which opened my eyes to another level – another level of support – of experience and excitement. The 'away day' for me was born.

The excitement rolled on in what proved to be a compelling campaign; the excitement of which eventually crashed and burned, and in some style.

The destination, Filbert Street, date 13th May 1992 – Leicester City 5-0 Cambridge

In my first full season as a Cambridge fan I'd been riding on the crest of a wave. One which I only really experienced the pinnacle of and one, sadly, at the age I could not fully appreciate. On this night our hopes of gracing the first year of the Premiership crashed. By the time Tommy Wright had chipped John Vaughan the tears had long been flowing. For the first time I would experience real disappointment, real deflation, and real heartache. This was an experience that, unfortunately, I have been destined to relive more times than the successes as a United fan.

During the 1991/92 season I could, on reflection, barely comprehend or fully understand what I'd witnessed. As a seven-year old kid, I was swept along by the emotion, ceremony and sense of theatre, which was seamlessly bound together by roots of tribal collectiveness first sown by my brothers and watered, initially, by General John Beck's charges and the amber nation.

But, in the 19 year slump that has followed, I have never lost fascination with the narrative. Unlike watching other, non-United football, my analytical mind switches off, losing myself in a story over which I have no control and an absorption in something beyond my own preoccupations. Not to mention all that goes with it ... the away days, the Boro' derbies, the last minute winners, the sound of 'Coconuts' ...






Match Of The Day

Cambridge United's First Appearance
On 'Match Of The Day'

Hereford United 0 Cambridge United 0, Division Three, 13 October 1973

MOTD picked on the Football League's two newest clubs who were both in the Third Division for the first time. Hereford had made the brighter start to the season, but both sides cancelled each other out in front of 8,522 at Edgar Street and it wasn't great viewing for the neutrals. We were wearing a lurid fluorescent orange away strip, which was probably the most entertaining part of the game for those with colour TV sets. Both sides featured MOTD heroes though. Ronnie Radford had scored the thunderbolt equaliser in Hereford's famous FA Cup giantkilling over Newcastle in 1972 and Cambridge's Dave Simmons (pictured) had scored Colchester's third goal when they beat

the almighty Leeds in 1970. It took until March 1990 for the MOTD cameras to visit the Abbey Stadium though, in the 1-0 defeat to Crystal Palace in the FA Cup Quarter-Final.

Luton Town's First Appearance On 'Match Of The Day'

Swindon Town 0 Luton Town 0, Division Three, 18 January 1969


It was a great match to choose, on paper at least, because both sides were sitting just outside the promotion zone at the end of this match with Swindon fifth and Luton eighth. Again, it was a match in which both teams successfully nullified the danger from each other in front of 19,105 at the County Ground. Bruce Rioch was Luton's star player - he was later to play in Derby County's

1974-75 League Championship-winning side. Don Rogers was Swindon's hero. Less than two months after this game he would score twice in their amazing 3-1 League Cup Final victory over Arsenal. Swindon also achieved promotion this season, finishing three points clear of Luton who were denied the honour, because they finished third and only two teams were promoted in those days. The following season they did achieve their goal as they finished runners-up to Orient.


The First-Ever 'Match Of The Day'
Liverpool 3 Arsenal 2, Division One, 22 August 1964

The FA Cup Final had been broadcast live on TV since 1938 and there had been a Saturday night highlights programme called Sports Special before Match Of The Day made its debut. As part of the new BBC2 television station they scheduled this fresh show at 6.30 in the evening, hosted by commentator Kenneth Wolstenholme. They only showed this one game, but it was a cracker. The home side (who were defending League Champions) went into a two goal lead through Roger Hunt and Gordon Wallace, only for Arsenal to level through Geoff Strong and Joe Baker. Wallace popped up with the winner right at the end. Probably the most memorable image was the sight of a black cat running across the pitch though. The TV audience was estimated to be about 20,000 as BBC2 was only broadcast in the London area at the time, compared to 47,620 who were actually at the game.

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"Sometimes they shout that I am lazy, but that doesn't upset me. I am lazy."

And who could forget this marvellous quote from John Beck when he brought the 18-year-old across the channel from Nantes back in 2001:

"It's the coup of the century," said JB. "We brought him over, had a look at him and said 'Yes!' He's such an incredible young man, a nice lad, and he reminds me of Hightower in the Police Academy films, he's that tall."

The giant Frenchman showed flashes of skill during his time at the club, but was eventually released by the U's due his

constant lack of fitness.

Since then, One has been all over the place (France, Finland, er, Wales) in a bid to make a name for himself, and finally seems to have carved out a niche in the Scottish lower divisions.

Having served the likes of Partick

Thistle, Raith Rovers and Livingston, One spent last term at Stranraer and enjoyed the most prolific season of his career to date, smashing in 25 goals as the Blues finished fifth in the Scottish Third Division.

He was on the move again this summer, joining Alloa, and netted his first goal for the Wasps on Saturday in a 1-1 draw with Peterhead.

"One used his imposing physique to out-jump Bavidge at the near post,

turning home Ryan McCord's corner at the near post with less than 15 minutes remaining," noted one report, and a quick glance at the Alloa website confirms just how imposing Armand is these days, ahem.

Another ex-U's striker who for whom the phrase "more clubs than Tiger Woods" seems wholly appropriate is Lee McEvilly.

Press Gang reported earlier this season that Big Evil was at Blue Square North side Droylsden, but since then he has moved on to Colwyn Bay and could be set to up sticks again this week after being approached by former Bay boss Dave Challinor, now in charge at AFC Fylde.

McEvilly could also be in hot water after allegedly aiming racist abuse at Blyth Spartans striker Richard Offiong in a recent Blue Square Bet North clash.

"I pulled the guy aside at the end at the end of the game and told him if he just apologised then I wouldn't it any further, but he denied knowing what I was talking about.

"The referee did not hear the remarks but one of team-mates did."

With Bay being based in Wales, the matter is under investigation by the Football Association of Wales. A spokesman for the club told the North Wales Weekly News that they didn't respond to "rumours and gossip", while McEvilly himself declined to comment when contacted by The Non-League Paper.

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
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



Safety Announcements

All safety announcements will be preceded by a 'bing-bong' sound from the tannoy. Please listen carefully to any subsequent information.

Supporters who enter the stadium on a match day should be aware that, prior to each fixture, the teams warm up on the playing surface whilst the stadium is filling with supporters. Footballs are used during this period and there is a low to moderate risk of injury to supporters from footballs at this time. The tannoy will announce the arrival of the players on the pitch for the warm up period.

United in Endeavour

Cambridge United Football Club has a proud history and tradition with its roots in the City and County. We are always striving to make the community feel part of the Football Club and we would, as a result, like

to think that the R Costings Abbey Stadium is a safe and welcoming place for all football fans, whatever their race and colour.

For this reason everyone at this Football Club is committed to helping the campaign to Kick Racism out of Football. Racism of any sort will not be tolerated and we urge anyone hearing racist abuse to report it to a steward or write to Secretary Claire Osbourn at the Club. Anyone using racist abuse or threatening behaviour faces ejection from the R Costings Abbey Stadium and a ban from Cambridge United Football Club.

Ground Regulations

Copies of the ground regulations and conditions of entry to the R Costings Abbey Stadium are posted around the ground. However, we respectfully draw the attention of all supporters to Section 7 of the regulations, which says:

The use of threatening behaviour, foul, abusive or racist language is strictly forbidden and will result in either arrest or ejection from the ground. The following are arrestable offences under the Football (Offences) Act 1991, as amended by the Football (Offences and Disorder) Act 1999:

- the throwing of any object with the ground without lawful authority or excuse
- the chanting of anything indecent or racialist in nature
- the entry onto the playing area or any adjacent area to which spectators are not generally admitted without lawful authority or excuse.

Conviction could result in a Football Banning Order being made for all grounds in the country together with travelling abroad when England play.

Supporters are also reminded that Section 9 of the regulations say that nobody may stand in any seated area whilst play is in progress. Persistent standing in seated areas

is strictly forbidden and may result in ejection from the ground.

Supporters are reminded that in accordance with the Ground Regulations they should remain seated if in a seated section of the stadium. Guardians are asked to take responsibility for under 14s.

Traffic Management Plan

Please could all supporters be aware of the pedestrian section of the Cambridge United Traffic Management Plan:

Pedestrians will be permitted to access the Stadium site via any of the access points subject to their being open and stewarded. Pedestrians must have the appropriate tickets for the area of the stadium entered.

Cambridge United Football Club has management boards displayed at all exits advising spectators to use the pedestrian crossing on Newmarket Road and Coldhams Lane when leaving the Stadium.

Signage is also displayed on the North Terrace exit roadway directing supporters to the pedestrian crossings.

Main Stand Exit Gates

Please could all supporters note that for Health and Safety reasons the Main Stand exit gates at the front of the stand, for exit along the perimeter track, will not be opened until all players and officials have left the field of play.

Matchday Parking

The Club and police have received a number of complaints from residents near the ground regarding the parking of vehicles in the local streets on match days. We ask all of our supporters who park in the local streets close to the ground to be considerate of our neighbours and park without obstructing driveways or access routes for emergency vehicles. The areas will be monitored going forwards.
