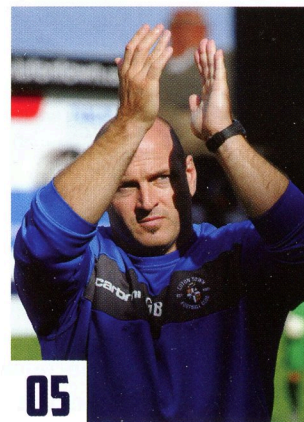

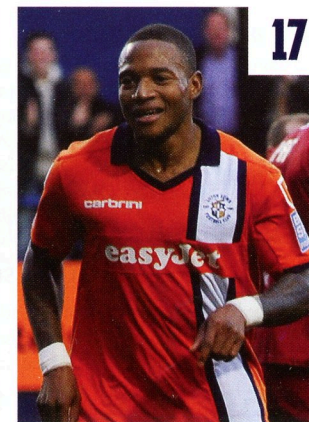

Welcome back to Kenilworth Road for this afternoon's FA Trophy tie with Swindon Supermarine.

I'd like to extend a huge welcome to everyone connected to Swindon Supermarine, in particular to their management team of Matt Robinson and Gary Horgan.

We had a scout go and watch them on Tuesday and they proceeded to beat Chippenham Town 8-1. Regardless of the opposition, scoring eight goals is a fantastic achievement and no doubt a result like that will be a massive confidence booster.

Last season we had a fine run in this competition getting all the way through to the semi-final stage. We were dreadfully unlucky not to achieve a final place after the dramatic second leg semi-final game against Mansfield Town here at Kenilworth Road. That afternoon saw us reduced to nine men, playing the whole of extra time two men light. The spirit and determination of both the players and yourself in the stand that day was absolutely incredible.

Last season we were drawn at home to sides in leagues below us and, on each occasion, the professionalism of the players was excellent. Some games were tougher than others but the players picked really shone and, in some cases, it proved to be of vital experience for a number of young players. Cauley Woodrow, for example, played against Welling and Gloucester and only last week he signed his first professional contract with Fulham.

Today we must do the same, be patient and professional. We know that Swindon will make it tough for us and will not want to concede an early goal and frustrate us.

Frustration has been a word I have used a lot recently and our last two games has led to much more of it.

Against Cheltenham I thought we stood a really good chance of getting a result against one of the most in-form sides in the country. Our first 10 minute display wasn't good enough and they took advantage. However, after we found our feet I thought we were the better side and deservedly equalised.

It was a real sucker punch to concede just before half-time and although we recovered to equalise a second time in the second half, we could not find a third and in pushing forward we conceded two more goals. Cheltenham's reward was a third round trip to Tottenham. We wish them well.

On Tuesday night we were left hugely disappointed by a 1-1 draw at Lincoln. David Holdsworth has gone in at Sincil Bank and slowly he has started to turn their fortunes around after a really bad start to the season. To be in a winning position and to only leave with a point is a massive frustration and I can understand your frustrations. I believe we will turn these around and earn promotion this season. I do genuinely believe that. I want everyone to believe that too. We need to be positive.

I have talked a lot about consistency too - if anything we are becoming consistently inconsistent. I know, my staff know, and of course the players know that we need to do better. We're at the half-way stage of the season and there are a lot of points to play for still.

Your support has been fantastic and all I can say is thank you for it. The players and myself really do appreciate it. To take over 300 to Lincoln on a bitterly cold Tuesday night in December is a magnificent effort.

Keep the faith.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH GARY SWEET



Good afternoon all and welcome to Kenilworth Road for the first round of the FA Trophy versus Swindon Supermarine.

I'd like to welcome all those associated with our visitors to today's game with a place in the second round of this highly-regarded competition at stake.

Swindon arrive here in a rich vein of form having won seven of their last nine matches in all competitions, including an 8-1 win in their last match, so we know that we will be in for a tough afternoon.

Frustratingly, Tuesday night at Lincoln felt like another Groundhog Day, didn't it? Yet again we dominate periods of play with some good quality football but undo the hard work by leaking a second half goal culminating in a two point loss.

We simply must do better. And we shall.

You all know by now that every member of 2020, plus I hasten to add, almost every member of the staff at Luton Town, are all passionate Hatters. We have said it before but it is a statement that should be reaffirmed; we share the frustrations of every Town supporter; we feel the hurt after every game; we all want the same thing and all want it as quickly as possible.

Furthermore, as a united board and a united Club, you can have every faith that we deliberate every aspect of the business and football management and make our decisions, whatever they may be, to ensure that we give you the success we strive for and so richly deserve.

After every game, win, lose or draw, we study each and every match (almost each and every minute of every match) including our management approach to the game, in some detail. No stone remains unturned in our assessment of our performance which is discussed openly resulting in actions being taken to improve and progress.

I'm happy to share with you, from a personal perspective; It's within my mentality that I am never content with a Luton Town performance or the management thereof, regardless of the result (even though I may be somewhat more defensive of the team and manager in public).

In order to establish an ambitious culture of the company I set myself very high targets in everything I do and do everything I possibly can to achieve them with the faith that the company progresses more quickly. I mention this because you should understand that the standards we all now set ourselves at the Club are very high indeed, both in the office and on the pitch.

Setting high standards and having big expectations is a very healthy pursuit. There is no difference with supporters having such high expectations of the team as there is with me setting high standards in the business.

I have commented before on the enormity of the challenge that our players have to face in coming to terms with the incredibly high expectations that our supporters have at Luton Town. Even though we appreciate why our expectations are so high, we'd be foolish if we ignored the burden we place on the team because, without doubt, it has had an impact on our performances.

What I am expressly not doing here is apportioning blame. You now understand that our standards at the Club are very high indeed therefore our expectations are shared. However, it is imperative that these expectations are mutually shared and not perceived to divide.

From one perspective, whilst our squad's physical conditioning is excellent, our players must learn to cope with pressure that comes with our situation - a task we are enthusiastically managing head-on. I have offered my thoughts previously, that I feel our players

need to be bolder and express themselves and I'm fully confident our players will embrace this responsibility.

Equally though, Luton Town supporters, including me and everyone at the Club, must learn to understand how we cope when the team's performances or results do not meet our demands.

Please trust me when I tell you that our situation right now will not be solved by one single action or decision. It will be accomplished by a multitude of less obvious aspects which we have identified that we need to address to meet those footballing standards.

I believe we all have a duty to create an environment within which our players feel they can play more instinctively and revive their winning mentality.

Whether our high standards are attained or not we all need to revive that stubborn Lutonian mentality by having the faith that the Club's decisions are correct and made for the right reasons. We fully believe in our current set up to correct the deficit in the right way.

Gary Brabin and his staff know exactly what is expected of them. Our players know exactly what is expected of them. Anything but a win and a good performance is considered as unacceptable by us all but, with the belief that everything we are currently doing is professional and thorough, should we not achieve that we must keep a level head, examine and fine tune.

Here's to this process starting today!

Tuesday's draw at Lincoln City was another frustrating away game for us after we had to settle for a share of the spoils after taking a thoroughly deserved first half lead.

As a team we cannot put our finger on why we are unable to finish teams off when in a winning position. We are well aware of the number of times it has happened this season and understand that it isn't good enough, especially when – with respect to the opposition – we know we should be beating teams in the bottom half of the table given the talent we have in the dressing room.

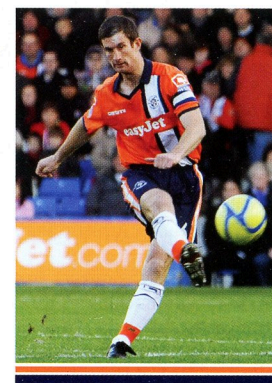
Good players do not turn in to bad players overnight. Our performances this season have, on the whole, been good. We have only been beaten comprehensively once this season, against York, and even in that game we had chances to take the lead before they opened the scoring.

In our last two games we have shown in glimpses what a good side we are. We played some excellent football against Cheltenham and in the first half at Lincoln I thought we were exceptional and unlucky not to be two or three goals ahead. The manager has told us repeatedly that we must learn to take our chances. We need to be more ruthless – and not just in the opposition's penalty area.

Against Cheltenham we started poorly and were punished, came back into it, dominating the game, equalising before they scored a hugely fortuitous goal moments before half-time. We went in at the break wondering how we were behind and the Cheltenham players knew the same. They were telling each other how lucky there were to be in front.

We rallied, equalised a second time before they hit back a third time and when we were pushing up at the end they scored another. Cheltenham are a good side doing well in League 2. However, we more than matched them and, with a bit of luck, we could have won. It goes to show that there isn't much difference between the Blue Square Bet Premier and League 2.

At Lincoln I was frustrated having had to be withdrawn at half-time after suffering concussion following a challenge at the end of the first half. Like all footballers I hate watching in the stands, especially when you know you can't come on and influence the game anymore.



As I said, our first half performance was impressive. Lincoln changed things around in the second half and they scored a scrappy goal. There was huge disappointment in the dressing room afterwards.

We discussed things afterwards at length in the dressing room. We realised that we had let you down again and I can only apologise to the supporters that travelled because we know that we should have gone to Lincoln and won. The games against Bath, Ebbsfleet, Cambridge and Stockport also spring to mind where we were ahead and only left with a one point on each occasion.

Today, our attention turns to the FA Trophy, a competition we did well in last season to get all the way to the semis. The final is at Wembley and a few of the lads know what it's like to play – and win – there and I'm sure I can speak on behalf of everyone when I say we'd love to get there again.

Swindon Supermarine are going to come here and want to cause an upset and we have to guard against complacency. We don't want to be sitting in another disappointed dressing room come five o'clock tonight thinking what might have been.

WELCOME SWINDON SUPERMARINE

HISTORY

Swindon Supermarine was founded in 1992 from the amalgamation of two established Hellenic League clubs - Swindon Athletic and Supermarine.

At the time of the merger, fortunes were not running well for both clubs. Supermarine were to finish in bottom place in Division One in the 1991/92 season and Swindon Athletic were having problems improving their facilities at their Swindon Borough Council owned Southbrook Recreation ground. To comply with the new league rules both clubs recognised they could best achieve their ambitions by a merger and the new club, Swindon Supermarine Football Club took the place of Swindon Athletic in the Premier Division.

In 1997/98 the new club won the Hellenic League championship but were not promoted due to ground requirements. However, the championship was won for the second time in 2000/01 and this time they were accepted into the Southern League.

After four years of struggle at the foot of the table, not helped by a rapid succession of managerial changes, Marine qualified for the Play-Offs in 2005/06 but lost to Hemel Hempstead Town in the semi-finals.

In 2006/07 they again reached the promotion Play-Offs, where this time they were successful after beating Burnham in the semi-final and Taunton Town in the final. This earned Marine a place in the Southern League Premier Division.

At the end of the 2009/10 season, the club announced that it was facing a financial shortfall of £50,000 which would affect its immediate position in the Southern League. Step forward a supporter's consortium to save the club. Through various commitments and a sponsorship drive they continued in the Southern League Premier Division in the 2010/11 season.

Part of the drive included the ground sponsorship which was taken up by local company H J Webb & Son and the ground became known as the Webbs Wood Stadium from August 2010.

In February 2011, manager Mark Collier and assistant Tom Jones both resigned and were replaced by duo Gary Horgan and Matt Robinson. Horgan and Robinson guided the club to a 10th-place finish in the Southern League Premier Division last term - the club's highest ever league position.

Matt Robinson

Former Southampton, Portsmouth, Reading and Oxford defender who signed for Marine in 2009. Became caretaker boss in 2011 before taking up joint control with Gary Horgan in May this year.

Joined from Chippenham Town this summer. Started his career as a youngster at Bristol Rovers before trialling with a host of clubs including Liverpool.

James Rae

Made his debut as a 17-year-old for Marine following his arrival from AFC Bournemouth in April 2007.

Danny Allen

Re-signing in 2006 having played in the academy. Spent five years with Forest Green and also played for Didcot and Paulton Rovers.

Tom Cole

Centre-half signed in July 2011 from neighbours Highworth Town for whom he was captain.

Dave Brampton

Signing in 2010 from Worcester City. Former Swindon Town trainee, Dave joined Tamworth in 2005 and represented England C whilst with the Lambs.

Jon Beeden

Young centre-back in his second spell with Marine having spent a season in the Hellenic League with Wootton Bassett Town.

Kyle Lapham

Swindon-born defender joining second time round from Australian side Dandenong Thunder. Former Swindon Town scholar Kyle also played for Cirencester.

MIDFIELDERS

Ben Wells

Pre-season signing from Weston-super-Mare. Began his career on YTS forms at Swindon and has also represented Basingstoke Town.

Sam Morris

Another former Swindon Town youth product, Sam originally signed on-loan for Marine before signing permanently in 2009.

Harry Etheridge

Midfielder who joined Marine in March 2011 from Shortwood United. Also played for Highworth Town and Cirencester.

Sean Woon

Former New College Academy central midfielder in his second spell with the club having also played for Cirencester.

Rob Dean

Tenacious, goal scoring midfield player who signed from Highworth this summer. Another with previous links with Cirencester.

Nick Stanley

Originally signed for Marine in March 2008 from Cirencester before leaving for Leamington. Goal scoring midfielder or forward, Nick then joined Oxford City before returning to Marine this year.

STRIKERS

Bradley Gray

Lightning quick front man who started his career as a trainee with Leyton Orient. Had several loans spells in and around the capital before joining Salisbury in July 2009. Bradley then joined Forest Green before arriving at Marine this summer.

Ashley Edenborough

Former Cirencester and Chippenham striker in his second spell at the club. Possesses a good engine and searing pace.

Jamie Pricor

Forward capable of playing out wide who signed from Hartbury College in March 2011. Also an FA Level 2 coach, Jamie started a BH (Hons) in sports coaching in 2010.

Swindon-born striker in his third spell with the club. Another who signed from Dandenong Thunder in Australia, Steve has also had spells with Hungerford, Clevedon, Taunton, Cirencester and Team Bath.

Newman Carney has agreed to sign a professional contract in the summer.

The defender, who has already made his first team debut after appearing for the Town in the FA Trophy tie last season, signed the agreement on the pitch at half-time during last Saturday's game with Cheltenham.

As a 12-year-old Newman attended the Town's very first Talent Identification Programme in Luton and his talent immediately shone. He was soon promoted to the Club's Performance Centre and captained the Under-13 team to win the Kokkola Cup in Finland later that season.

Playing for Dunstable Icknield, Newman was signed by Luton Town's Centre of Excellence at the end of the 2006/07 season, and after shining as an Under-14, made his debut for the Youth Team as an Under 15.

Joining the club full-time after completing his GCSEs in 2010, Newman made his debut for the first team last season in the 2-1 FA Trophy replay win over Welling in December 2010.

Newman is a left-footed defender who is equally comfortable playing at left-back or at centre-back. He has a great range of passing and is a natural leader and has featured regularly for the reserves but is currently recovering from a broken leg sustained in an FA Youth cup tie earlier this season.

The number of years between home games on this date. Chesterfield were once again the opponents, this time in the Fourth Division. A brace from Bruce Rioch and a goal from Ray Whittaker secured a 3-2 victory.

7

The number of matches previously played on this date at Kenilworth Road. Luton have won five and lost two, scoring 21 goals and conceding just eight.

5

The number of different competitions that have featured in these seven games. The first match came in the United League in 1906 when Hastings were beaten 2-0 courtesy of goals from Alexander Brown and John Pickering. The other matches were played in the FA Cup, Football League, Auto Windscreen Shield and LDV Vans Trophy.

1

It was just a year later when an Auto Windscreens first round match saw Luton beat Leyton Orient 2-1 in 1996 with Steve Davis and Kim Grant on target.

4

The most number of goals scored by a Luton player on this day came in 1938 when Chesterfield were the visitors for a Second Division match. Hugh Billington netted four goals in a 5-0 win, with George Stephenson also getting his name on the scoresheet. This game also saw the highest recorded attendance for a home fixture on this date as 12,744 witnessed a convincing Luton win.

0

The first of two defeats came in 1995 when Wolverhampton Wanderers won 3-2 with Scott Oakes and Dwight Marshall scoring for the Hatters.

10

The number of matches previously played on this date, with Luton winning five, drawing two and losing three times. The Hatters have scored 24 goals and conceded 16, an amazing average of four goals per game have therefore been scored on this day.

6

The number of goals scored by Luton in an FA Cup second round tie against Norwich City in 1927. Syd Reid scored a hat-trick and Harry Woods, Jimmy Yardley and George Dennis all scored as well.

9

The number of years since the last home game on this date and it was a 2-1 defeat to Cambridge United in the third round of the LDV Vans Trophy. Tony Thorpe scored for Luton.

3

This is only Luton's third season playing in the FA Trophy. Having lost to Cambridge United in 2009, 3-1 at the Abbey Stadium, the Hatters progressed to the semi-finals last season. After a 0-0 draw with Welling United at Kenilworth Road, Luton progressed courtesy of late goals from Jason Walker and Alex Lawless to win the replay 2-1. After victories over Uxbridge and Gloucester City at home, 4-0 and 1-0 respectively, the Hatters won 1-0 at Guiseley to earn a semi-final place against Mansfield. Despite playing with two men less, the Hatters hung on until two minutes from the end of extra time when Louis Briscoe netted the rebound after his penalty had been saved by Kevin Pilkington.

TOWN 2-4 CHELTENHAM TOWN CUP DREAM OVER



Boss Gary Brabin felt his side deserved better after seeing Cheltenham earn a place in the third round of the FA Cup at the Town's expense with a 3-2 victory at Kenilworth Road.

The Hatters twice equalised through Aaron O'Connor but were left contemplating what might have been after a fine performance against one of the most in-form sides in the country.

"I'm disappointed with the result as I genuinely thought we had a chance of winning but I can't ask any more from the players today," the Manager told Hatters Player afterwards. "It was a good game, a great one for the neutral and one in which I thought we played really well.

"We didn't start well though, I thought we were edgy in the first 10 minutes and I didn't think we ever got going. But after the first 10 minutes we took a real grip of the game and deserved to equalise. At that point I thought we'd go on and win it but in the last five minutes of the first half we've backed off and been punished.

"It meant we were 2-1 down at half-time after a pleasing first half but I said to the lads at the break we had to keep believing and we had to do more without the ball because when play broke down Cheltenham were quicker to it.

"We started the second half well and got it back to 2-2 and at that point I thought there was only one team in it. But we've fallen for the sucker punch and gone 3-2 down and in the end when, we're chasing the game, we've lost our shape and they've got a fourth."

The Hatters lined-up with a 4-3-3 formation with Adam Watkins given a start at the heart of the midfield and two-goal O'Connor being used on the right-hand side of a three-pronged attack.

And Brabin was keen to lay praise on the duo's performance.

"I know what Aaron's capable of and I know he was disappointed that he was dropped for the game in midweek," said Brabin. "The one thing I've told him he's missing from his game at the moment is goals and he's responded today.

"As for Adam, he's always in my thoughts. I know people want me to play him week-in, week-out, but it's my job to get the best out of him. He's been a revelation for us but I don't want people to get carried away. We played 4-3-3 because today because we have the players who are suited to it and Adam is one of them. He's certainly not done himself any harm."

With league points at stake next when the Town travel to face Lincoln on Tuesday night the manager believes there are a number of positives to take from their cup exit.

"I thought the fans were terrific and they've clapped the lads off at the end even though we've lost," said Brabin. "That will do our players the world of good, and give them a real lift.

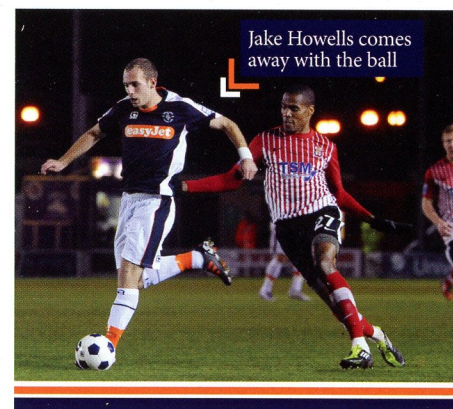


LINCOLN CITY 1-1 TOWN POINT FOR EACH



The Town had two men sent-off in the last five minutes as they had to settle for a point at Sincil Bank.

The Hatters began on top, looking menacing going forward: Adam Watkins flashing a shot wide on five minutes. On nine minutes the Town had the ball in the Lincoln net but Aaron O'Connor's header from a Robbie Willmott corner was chalked off after his flag-kick was adjudged to have bent out of play before it reached the box. Willmott and Watkins came close to breaking the deadlock, both forcing Paul Farman into two fine saves with efforts on 13 minutes. Watkins forced Farman into a top stop on 26 minutes when Willmott's left wing cross was superbly kept out by the goalkeeper as the Town continued to push forward.



Lawless warmed the gloves of Farman again minutes later before the Hatters finally had a goal to reward their superiority on 36 minutes when O'Connor teed-up Danny Crow to poke home his fifth goal of the season.

Gary Brabin was forced into a change at half-time when George Pilkington - who took a knock in the

first half - was replaced by former Imp Jamie Hand. The boss later revealed the skipper was suffering from concussion. Lincoln upped the ante in the second half but the Town almost doubled their lead seven minutes into the second half when Jake Howells volleyed over and O'Connor drilled a shot inches wide.

Imp sub Jamie Taylor was beginning to cause the Hatters real problems and he should have equalised on 59 minutes when he curled a shot around the post after Keith Keane had gifted him the ball in the box. Taylor's arrival had certainly given new impetus into the Imps' attacking play as a flurry of half-chances came the hosts' way as the clock ticked past the hour mark with first Gowling and then Taylor heading high and wide.

Still the Imps pushed forward and Taylor should have done better on 72 minutes when haring down the left wing and nutmegging Dan Gleeson but his shot drifted wide with two teammates better placed for a tap-in. Lawless was inches away from finding the corner of the net with a header from Watkins' clever pass on 73 minutes and that missed chance proved costly as on 77 minutes the Imps levelled it up. Conal Platt was able to hook a high ball into the box down the left and Richard Hinds was able to head home from a yard out.

The Town tried in vain to restore their lead in the remaining 10 minutes but their job became an uphill battle with five minutes left when Lawless was sent-off for a second bookable offence. That spurred on the hosts and they almost snatched the lead a minute later when Jake Sheridan's cross was almost turned into his own net by former Imp Janos Kovacs.

Both sides went all out for all three points in the final minutes with Watkins going closest for the Town, flashing a shot wide of the post from the edge of the box in stoppage time. Time was almost up when the Hatters were reduced to nine men in the fourth minute of stoppage time when Hand was shown his second yellow card with virtually the last action of the game.



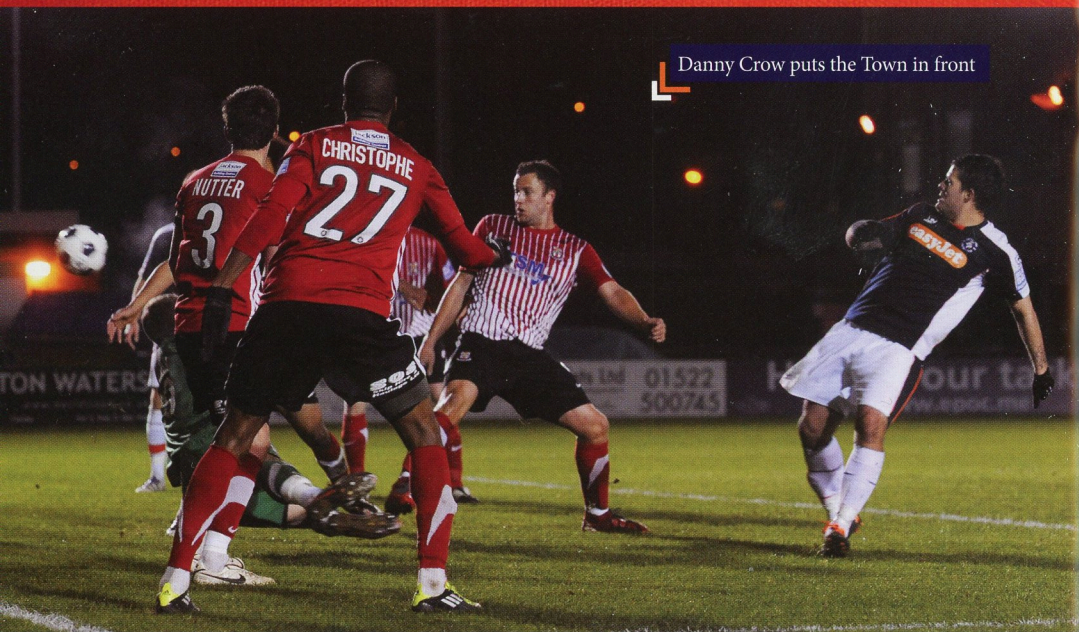

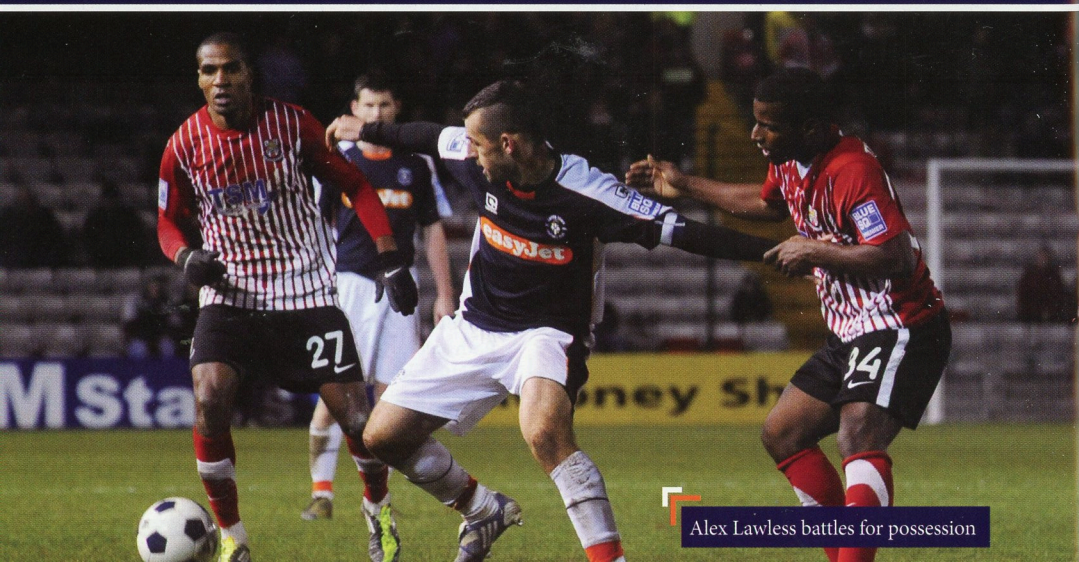

Back in the top flight after a 14 year gap, the Town were proud to kick off the 1974/75 campaign with an invitation to take part in the Texaco Cup competition for the first time.

Inaugurated in 1970, the competition had built up quite a following by the time the Hatters were asked to participate and the initial mini-league stage was seen as a good competitive start to the new season.

The Town were joined by newly relegated Southampton, top flight West Ham and Orient from

Division Two (now the Championship) in their group and kicked off with a home game against the Saints. Proving the popularity of the competition, a crowd of 8,445, including a large contingent from the south coast, gathered on a hot day to see the Town control the game from the start.

Barry Butlin put the Town ahead on 40 minutes with a header after Saints goalkeeper Ian Turner flapped at a Gordon Hindson corner and were denied a second a couple of minutes later, when the referee blew very late for an earlier foul after Peter Anderson had slammed the ball home.

Southampton's Lew Chatterley smacked home a 25-yard leveller early in the second half, completely against the run of play and, try as they might, the Town could not put the game to bed despite having the majority of the play.

We were, though, treated to a cameo substitute appearance from precocious teenager Paul Fletcher, newly signed from Chester.

The Town then won at West Ham mid-week before blotting their copy book when allowing Orient's Gerry Queen to net a late equaliser in a 2-2 draw at Brisbane Road the following Saturday. We therefore departed the competition without losing a game, leaving Southampton, who had beaten both Orient and West Ham, to go through. The Saints eventually went through to the final where they lost to Newcastle over two legs.

Crawley Town players – horrible lot aren't they? Bet they wouldn't help old ladies across the road and no doubt drive straight through amber traffic lights. How dare they do well?

That was how some felt last season when a large injection of funds helped deliver Blue Square Bet Premier promotion and an incredible FA Cup run.

The feeling from some Non-League followers was Crawley didn't deserve any credit, even though they beat Swindon, Derby County and Torquay on their way to Manchester United.

Of course this wasn't just down to the fact the Sussex club's expensively assembled a squad, but also because of the feeling towards manager Steve Evans and his past with Boston. But his past was his past. He'd admitted his mistakes – he was found guilty by the FA of impeding an FA inquiry into contract irregularities at Boston – and ten years on it was surely time to move on.

Not for some, who kindly told us reporters via our NLP twitter accounts exactly what they thought of our coverage of the Red Devils' remarkable Cup exploits.

Without wishing to make a sweeping generalisation, Non-League fans are, in the main, happy to see other Non-League clubs do well in the FA Cup. Whether it be because fans have good memories of a certain club or because a former player or manager is doing well.

Last season there wasn't that same sentiment. Normally getting to Old Trafford in the fifth round of the FA Cup would be a celebration of the Non-League flag flying high. But because it was Crawley and Evans, the same support wasn't shown – in my view unfairly.

The large majority of the players in that impressive squad had scrapped around the cabbage patch fields of Non-League all their career. They deserved more praise than they got from some for the way they went to Old Trafford and gave Sir Alex Ferguson's men one hell of a game.

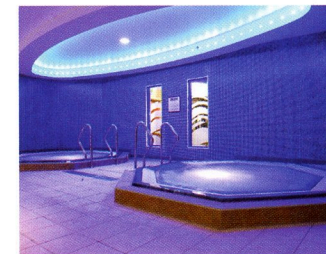
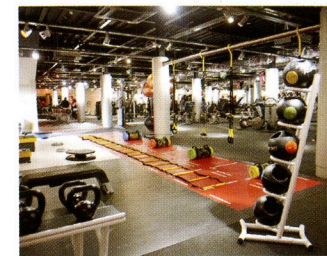
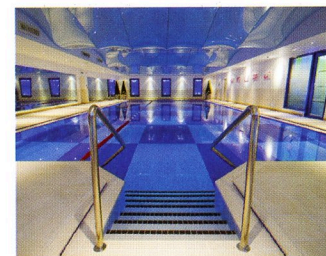

Ninety-nine per cent of Non-League will be pleased to see their representatives do well this time. But, they'll always be haters.
