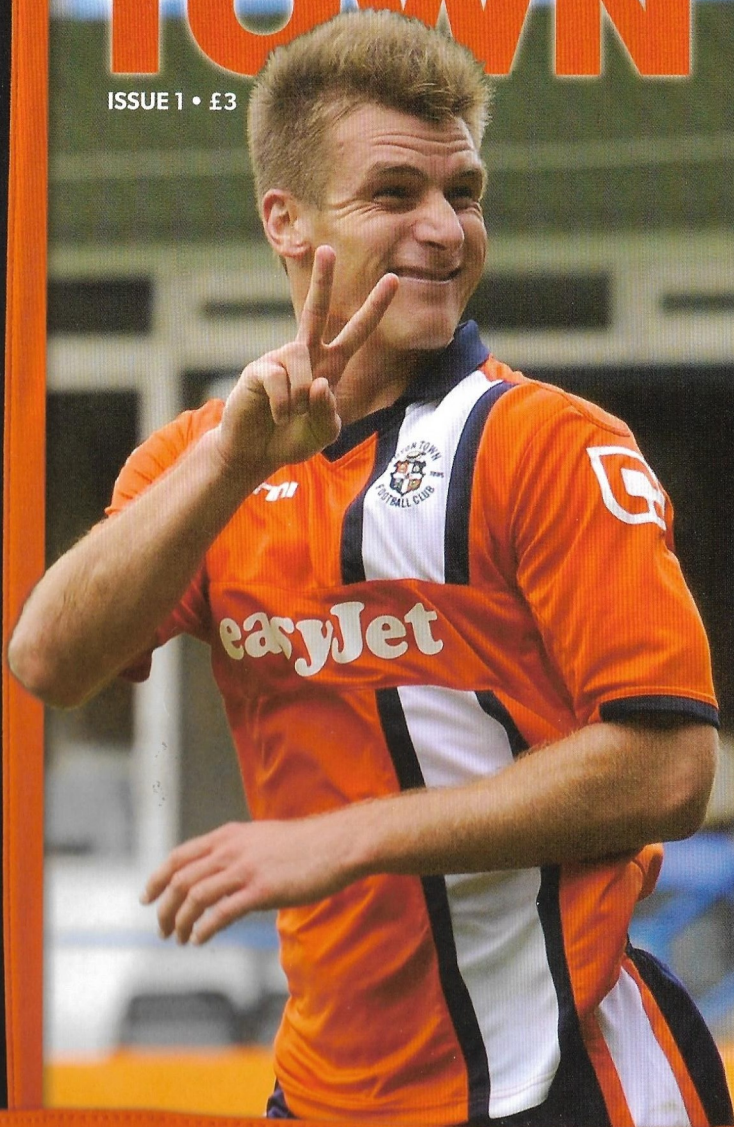

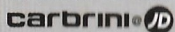

A big welcome back to you all to Kenilworth Road for the first game of the new season against Gateshead.

Today represents our first opportunity to get points on the board as we begin what promises to be an exciting, if not tough, campaign in the Blue Square Bet Premier.

Some things in football change but my philosophy and ethos certainly hasn't. This afternoon we will try to do what we will do in every game; attack teams and work hard for one another.

In our path today are Gateshead who will no doubt be a tough opposition, but I am confident we can continue our fine pre-season of scoring goals and keeping clean sheets.

Our preparation over the past few months has been rigorous and I am pleased with the way the team has developed during the course of pre-season.

One of the main points I have told the players is that we have standards – high standards – and in this unforgiving league we cannot afford to dip below these. Hard work will get us there and from what I've seen from the players so far I am happy that they are taking this important message seriously.

For me, the performance levels of the players are hugely important and it's vital that we perform to a high standard on a consistent basis if we are to succeed this season.

We all know that today and the subsequent 45 matches are massive for Luton Town Football Club and everyone is in it together.

The board, you - the supporters, the management and the players are all

pulling in the same direction and a happy club is a great place to be and that in itself breeds confidence. It's something that we need to keep in mind throughout the next nine months.

I have been told that we have sold well over 4,000 season tickets and this afternoon almost 7,000 of you will be backing us. That is absolutely fantastic. In the fifth tier of English football your passion knows no bounds.

There will be times when our passing might not be at its best, when our finishing or defending is called into question. All I ask is that you stick by us and the team. I've said it before and I'll say it again; together we can conquer.

It has been a very productive pre-season but we have still had our fair share of problems with injuries to new recruits Danny Spiller, Garry Richards and Jon Shaw. It's not been as smooth as I would have liked but the one thing which has delighted myself and the coaching staff has been the attitude and application of the younger players.

With their contribution we have been able to maintain an unbeaten record in pre-season and from the players'

point of view the games have enabled them to pick up valuable experience of playing at Kenilworth Road against strong Football League opposition.

However, it doesn't matter whether you're young or old – all players understand what it is like to play for Luton Town and the pressures that come with it.

They'll be times when the opposition will raise their game against us just because we are Luton Town.

To combat that we need a strong group who will work hard to ensure that you are proud of your football club and I believe we have a group here that will do that.

You play a major part in our season so please get behind and welcome this new group and fresh start. As I've said, there will be times when it won't be pretty but if we all support each other we can achieve great things.

Enjoy the game.

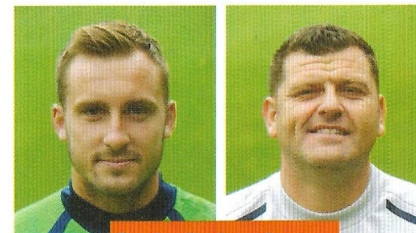

Ninety other clubs are finding similar problems with their new sites - some much worse than ours. Ipswich had a Norwich City man on their player profiles, while Stockport County carried Southport's fixture list. Our Press Officer Andrew Barringer has been working tirelessly to try to get it going properly and we will get there, but please be patient.

So here we go. Personally, I am delighted with the way things have turned around on the field since Paul Buckle arrived. The new energy and direction was plain for all to see in the closing stages last season, despite disappointment at Wembley, and now he's had another three months or so to bring in the sort of players he feels are crucial to our success.

Unbeaten

I am already hugely impressed with the work ethic of the squad, the commitment and running, constantly pressing the opposition as well as showing no little skill when we're on the ball. We're unbeaten in pre-season and that includes convincing performances against Ipswich Town and Leyton Orient. We beat them both and they couldn't score against us.

Today's visitors are Gateshead, who had a good season last time around by finishing eighth and challenging for a Play-Off place until late on, and I would like to welcome their players, directors and supporters to Kenilworth Road. It's ironic that Jon Shaw's first Blue Square Bet Premier match for Luton Town should be against the team-mates he's just left behind in the north east.

Many thanks again for your continuing and dedicated support - it's constantly talked about by the players, especially by the new ones coming in. It's massively appreciated and it's the envy of many clubs, even two divisions above us.

We are equally passionate in the boardroom, as you know. We are long-standing (suffering) supporters and, like you, we cannot wait to get the new season started - now the time has come!

We know if we work hard enough and take the confidence from our pre-season results into today then we can get a positive result.

Whether it's at Kenilworth Road, or at Barrow in February on a Tuesday night, I can assure you the lads will be giving 100 per cent - that's the least you deserve for your support.

Here's to a great season that begins with three points this afternoon.

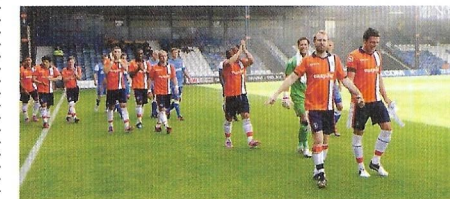

It certainly has been a busy summer with this game in particular catching the attention of guests and sponsors keen to take advantage of our hospitality packages.

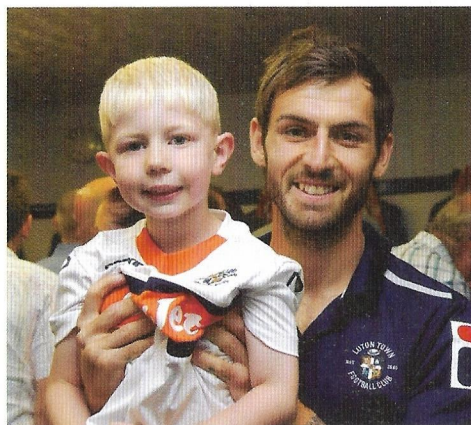

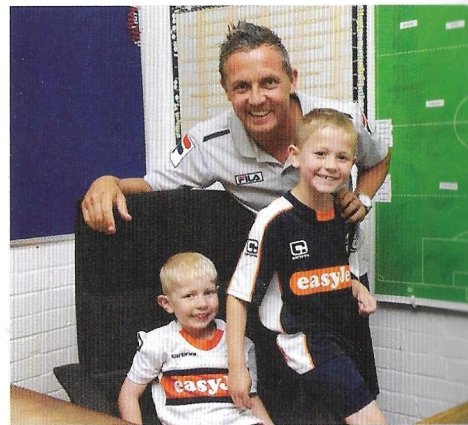

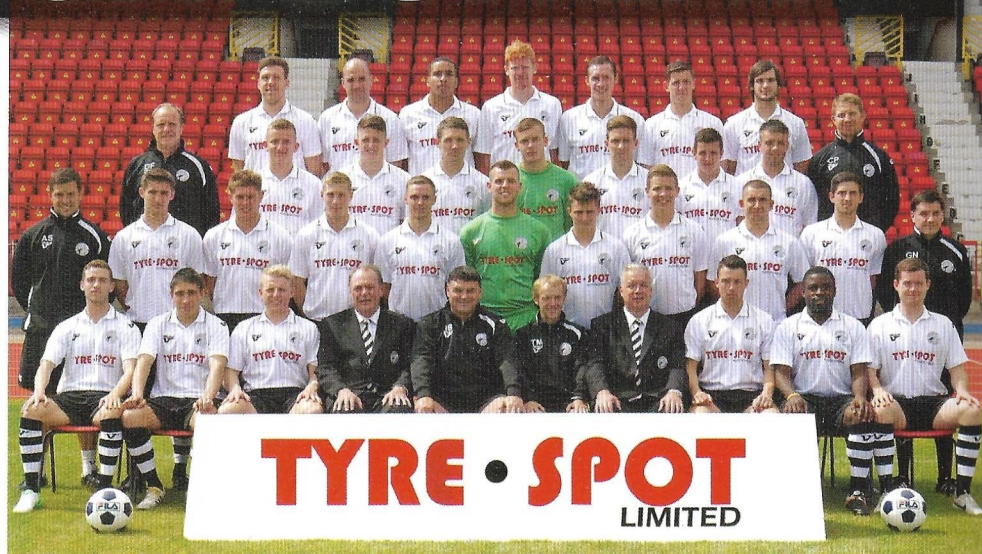

GATESHEAD



It was another season of success on Tyneside last season – and we're not talking about Newcastle United.

Ian Bogie's Tynesiders finished their third season in the Blue Square Bet Premier in eighth place having been among the chasing pack for promotion right the way through the campaign. The Heed's rise from the backwaters of the Northern League since Bogie's arrival in 2007 has seen the club improve season on season, so there is an air of expectation at the International Stadium that another promotion push could be on the cards.

Much will be made of last season's top goalscorer Jon Shaw's move to Kenilworth Road and all eyes will be on the striker this afternoon, but Bogie's skill is not just about getting his sides to play good football but also replacing departing stars with new talent.

The Hatters know all too well the threat posed by the Tynesiders. In previous seasons the Town have often come unstuck at the hands of Bogie's sides.

In the first season at this level, in 2009/10, the Town laboured to a 2-1 home victory before completing a double later in the campaign with a 1-0 win on Tyneside.

The season before last, Bogie's men took four points off the Hatters with a 1-0 win at the International Stadium thanks to a header from Shaw, before a thrilling 2-2 draw at Kenilworth Road that saw the Town fight back from two goals down in the first half to earn a point.

Last season, the Heed twice made the long journey home from Bedfordshire with nothing to show for their efforts as the Town ran out comfortable 5-1 winners in the league meeting (with Shaw heading the consolation) and 2-0 victors in an FA Trophy tie.

Goals are few and far between at the International Stadium in meetings between the two and last April the Town were fortunate to earn a point in a goalless draw on Tyneside to keep them in the running for a Play-Off place. The hosts hit the post and Mark Tyler was forced into a fantastic reaction save late on. But, previous history means nothing and, as Paul Buckle will tell you, it's what counts on the pitch in the game you're playing that matters most.

The Town come into the game on the back of an unbeaten pre-season with a new-look squad and, while the Tynesiders cannot share a similar record this summer, they will be confident of causing an upset on the opening day of the campaign.

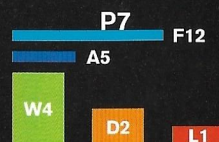

Gateshead is a club moving in the right direction both on and off the field. Having improved upon their final league standing every single season for the past six years (a feat which includes back-to-back promotions), the Tynesiders are now aiming to better themselves once again by achieving a play-off spot this term. What's more, the club is awaiting a move to a brand new 7,000+ capacity stadium and the plan is to be a Football League club by the time the move is ready.

How did they fare last season?

Last season, the Heed finished eighth in the Blue Square Bet Premier with 74 points. They amassed 33 points away from home, winning 10 games on their travels (three more than the Hatters managed), including impressive victories at Mansfield, York, Kidderminster and Southport. Incredibly, they only failed to score in three away games, but it was their defensive record which let them down. Even after discounting the 5-1 drubbing they received here last October, the men from Tyneside still conceded an average of 1.41 goals per game.

The major difference between the Gateshead of last year and this year, as most Hatters will know, is the absence of centre-forward Jon Shaw. The Sheffield-born striker signed for Luton this summer after scoring an incredible 35 goals in 50 games for Gateshead last season. Shaw won his team 27 points as the only scorer in eight wins and three draws, and contributed goals to another six wins and one draw (19 points). Of Shaw's 28 league goals, 14 came away from home - meaning he scored 47% of all the Tynesiders' away goals.

How will they play?

Perhaps the most impressive thing about Gateshead is the footballing philosophy manager Ian Bogie has instilled in the club since his arrival in May 2007. Bogie, a keen admirer of the Spanish style of play, likes his men to employ an attractive short passing game and has stuck firmly to his beliefs despite criticism that his team 'overplay' the ball.



How will they line up? Who are their key men?

Bogie has tinkered with his team no end during pre-season, but it is likely his men will set up in a 4-3-3. Towering centre-back James Curtis, who has been at the club for nine years and made over 400 appearances, should be partnered by 20-year-old Chris Bush at the heart of the defence. In midfield, playmaker Phil Turnbull and ex-Darlington dynamo Jamie Chandler are likely to be anchored by club captain Ben Clark, who has recently been moved forward into a defensive midfield role. 34-year-old Micky Cummins scored 12 goals from midfield last year, but is likely to start on the bench. Up front, Ex-Luton loanee Liam Hatch will lead the line with Yemi Odubade and former Hartlepool forward James Brown flanking him. Odubade scored seven goals last year and made the club's most assists despite missing 20 games through injury.

Reason for caution

Despite having the edge over Gateshead in recent meetings, there is reason to be cautious going into today's curtain-raiser. Gateshead hit the ground running last season. They won six of their first seven encounters and were in the top three for the first 15 games, so they will be hoping for a similar start to this campaign with an upset here at Kenilworth Road.

THOUGHTS FROM THE OAK ROAD

TALK OF THE TOWN GETS THE INSIDE WORD FROM THE VISITORS' CAMP

What's your name? Simon Lowery

Age? 44

How long have you been supporting your club?

Since 1990. It was a 9-0 defeat to Sutton United and I was hooked.

What are your expectations for your club this season?

We're in a transitional period. We've cut the squad down and got some of the YTS lads in there now. We finished eighth last season, so I think about mid-table this time. Obviously losing Jon Shaw is going to be a big miss.

What do you think of your manager an Bogie?

He came in when we in the doldrums of the Northern Premier League and has been backed by a multi-million pound chairman to get where we are now. He's always been able to replace our star players - we lost Lee Novak to Huddersfield and bought in Daryl Clare - and when he left we got in Jon Shaw. We'll get to see how much of a good manager he is this season. You'd be amazed how many Gateshead fans don't rate Bogie, though. For me, this is the greatest time to be a Gateshead fan. Prior to Bogie, we were playing the likes of Spennymoor and Blyth Spartans, now we're playing Luton, Wrexham and Stockport County.

Who's your player to watch?

Yemi Odubade. He broke his foot last season so we haven't seen the best of him yet. Also look out for James Brown, who we signed from Hartlepool, and Jamie Chandler, who we got from Darlington.

Who do you most want to beat this season?

We've got no real grudges against any team. We beat Darlington last year with the last kick of the game, and got that monkey off our back because we'd never beaten them before. We also did the double over York who are a fairly local side. Beating Luton would be a nice feather in the cap - Luton are the big club in the league.

Have you been to Kenilworth Road before and if so, how was the experience?

The Luton fans are always friendly. Cambridge United have the most miserable supporters ever. I first went to Kenilworth Road watching Newcastle, but it was probably most satisfying seeing Gateshead getting a draw there in our second season in the Conference.

What do you think of Luton's chances of promotion this year?

I think Luton will win the league: 1. Because of Jon Shaw and 2. Because of Paul Buckle - he's done it before with Torquay. Certainly whoever finishes above Luton will win it - there's no Crawley or Fleetwood type this year.

What can Luton fans expect from Jon Shaw?

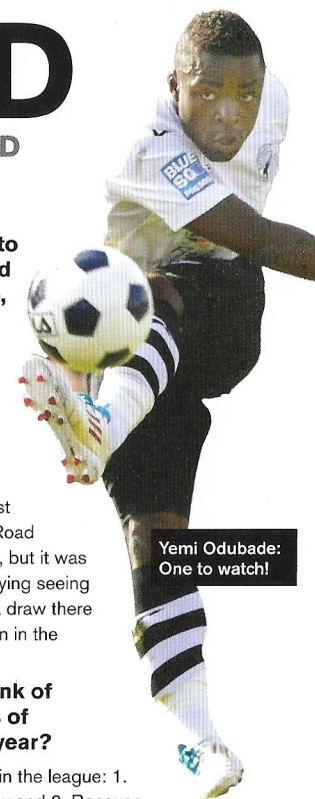
His goalscoring and heading ability are second to none, and he's such a nice lad - someone you'd like your daughter to bring home. He has a good touch, can take penalties, free-kicks - and he cost you nothing. He's the best Gateshead player I've seen in 22 years.

What's your club's favourite chant/song?

The Trail of the Lonesome Pine by Laurel and Hardy. I'm not sure how it originated, some guy was drunk at a game, we asked him for a song, he came out with this and it stuck.

What's the score going to be today?

I'll go 2-1 Gateshead, I won't live it down otherwise. Jon Shaw to score for you.

CLASSIC CAMPAIGNS

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS SELECTS 10 OF GATESHEAD FINEST SEASONS

1947/48

Gateshead finished fourth in the Third Division (North) in 1947/48, their highest position for 16 years. Results were inconsistent during the first half of the season but a thrilling 7-0 win at home to Hartlepoons on Christmas Day was quickly followed by a 5-0 demolition of Rochdale, with Harry Hawkins grabbing a hat-trick. Five successive wins lifted Gateshead up to third place by early February but promotion hopes faded after Oldham Athletic won 5-3 at Redheugh Park and top scorer Harry Hawkins moved to Hartlepoons, despite Bill Tulip's side beating eventual champions Lincoln City 3-2. Tom Callander was ever-present in the heart of defence.

1948/49

Gateshead reached the FA Cup fourth round for the first time in 1948/49. Bill Tulip's side defeated Netherfield, Scarborough and Aldershot before facing West Brom in front of 17,000 at Redheugh Park. Tom Callander gave Gateshead a first-half lead but the Baggies triumphed 3-1 after extra-time. Leading marksman George Wilbert and Johnny Ingham scored 26 goals between them as Gateshead finished fifth in the Third Division (North). They trounced Bradford City 6-2 in mid-March and their two Easter matches against eventual champions Hull City were watched by a total 61,333 fans. Defensive pair Tom Callander and Harold Wyles were ever-present.

1949/50

Gateshead finished Third Division (North) runners-up in 1949/50. They kicked off with a 3-1 win at Rochdale, then Ernie Passmore netted four goals in a 7-1 demolition of Halifax, a hat-trick against Chester and five in a 5-3 victory at Hartlepoons. But Gateshead slipped from top to mid-table before a 3-2 win at Darlington on Boxing Day sparked an improvement. They gained two consecutive 5-1 wins over York City and Tranmere Rovers, then a 5-0 victory over Accrington Stanley in mid-March heralded seven successive wins. George Wilbert was the leading marksman and Johnny Ingham was ever-present as Gateshead finished just two points behind champions Doncaster Rovers.

1952/53

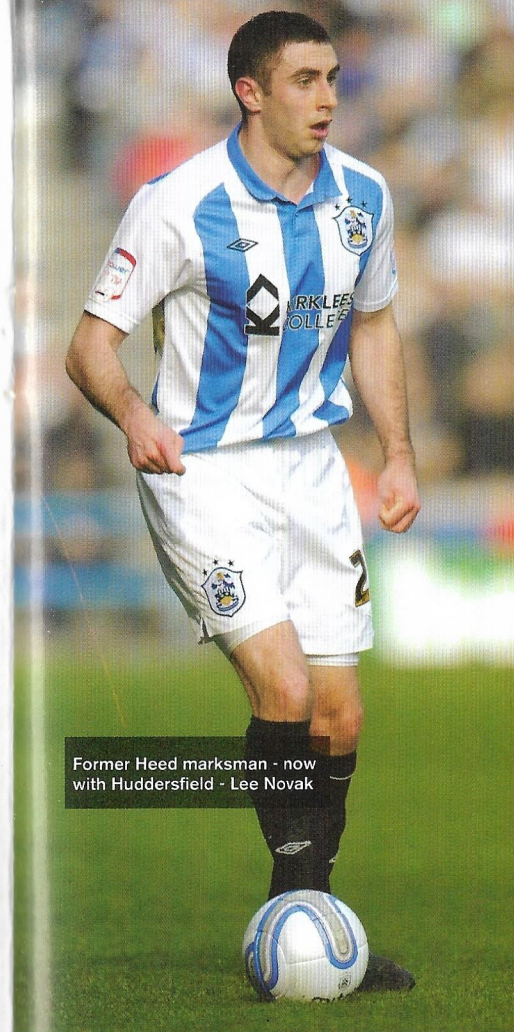
Gateshead reached the FA Cup sixth round for the only time in 1952/53. Bill Tulip's side beat Crewe Alexandra and Bradford PA before Ian Winters' goal clinched an epic 1-0 third round win at home to Liverpool. They then won at Hull City and Plymouth Argyle, before losing 1-0 to eventual finalists Bolton Wanderers in front of 17,692 at Redheugh Park. Gateshead were the North-East's last survivors in the FA Cup that season. George Wilbert was top scorer and the two Callander brothers, Jack and Tom, were both ever-present as Gateshead finished a disappointing ninth in the Third Division (North), despite hammering Crewe 6-1 and slamming five goals past Darlington and Accrington.

1953/54

Gateshead finished fourth in the Third Division (North) in 1953/54. They hit four goals past Southport, Workington, Stockport, Tranmere, Halifax and Accrington - remaining unbeaten at home until a 2-1 loss against Darlington in February. Bouncing back to hammer Grimsby 7-1 a week later, Billy Watkin scored four goals and was immediately sold to Middlesbrough. Gateshead were one of only three teams to beat champions Port Vale that season. Bill Tulip's side were second in the table in mid-March, but a 5-1 defeat at Wrexham heralded a poor run and they won just three of their last 11 matches. Bob Gray and Tom Callander were ever-present.

1982/83

Gateshead won the Northern Premier League title with a club record 100 points in 1982/83. Ray Wilkie's side included skipper Terry Hibbitt, goalkeeper and 'Player of the Year' Kenny Dodds, Steve Higgins, Gordon Hindson, Kevin Pugh and strikers Jim Pearson and Bob Topping, who scored 47 of Gateshead's 114 Northern Premier League goals between them. Gateshead trounced Netherfield 8-0, both Goole and Worksop 6-0 and Matlock, Oswestry and Tamworth 5-0. They emerged from the pack around Christmas, when they started catching up with the games in hand, and eventually finished 16 points clear of runners-up Mossley, losing just once at home all season - 2-1 to Chorley.

1985/86

Gateshead were Northern Premier League champions in 1985/86. They began with a 2-0 win at Witton and lost just one of their first 10 games. Injury and loss of form caused a mid-season slump during which they suffered their only two home defeats, against Macclesfield and Workington. They were rocked when chairman/manager Ray Wilkie quit in March to take charge of Barrow but, inspired by Ian Donaldson, Gateshead lost just three of their last 17 games, including a 4-2 win at home to Morecambe. They pipped Marine to the title with a 3-2 victory at Rhyl in their final match. Keith McNall was top scorer with 23 goals, while Simon Smith was ever-present.



1989/90

Gateshead went close to the Northern Premier League double in 1989/90. Despite an early 3-2 victory over eventual champions Colne Dynamos, Dave Parnaby's side were just above mid-table at Christmas, but won 11 of their last 15 games, losing just once. They finished runners-up after a 3-1 win at South Liverpool on the final day and regained Conference status after Colne were denied promotion due to ground grading issues. Gateshead were also League Cup finalists for the first time but lost 1-0 to Hyde United at Maine Road. Simon Smith and Gary Hays were ever-present, while other key players included Derek Bell, Paul Doolan, Bobby Hulse and Keith McNall.

2007/08

Gateshead won the Northern Premier League play-off final in 2007/08. Ian Bogie's side began with six straight wins and remained in the leading pack throughout the season, despite three successive defeats, completing the double over eventual champions Fleetwood Town. They finished third behind Fleetwood and Witton Albion after winning nine of their last 10 unbeaten matches, scoring 29 goals and conceding just two in the process. Gateshead beat Eastwood Town 4-1 in the play-off semi-final, then clinched promotion with a 2-0 play-off final victory over Buxton. Leading marksman Graeme Armstrong and David Southern netted 39 goals between them.

2008/09

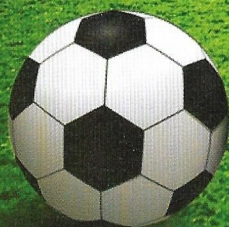
Gateshead won the Blue Square North play-off final in 2008/09. The Tynesiders were mid-table before Lee Novak's four-minute hat-trick in a 5-2 victory at Hyde United in early November sparked a marvellous run of 14 wins in 17 games. They trounced Hyde 6-3, Tamworth 5-1 and Hinkley United 5-1, and were top at the start of March but finished runners-up, five points behind Tamworth, after losing three of their last nine matches. Ian Bogie's side defeated Southport 2-1 on aggregate in the play-off semi-final, then secured promotion with a 1-0 play-off final win over Telford United. Top scorer Lee Novak and Graeme Armstrong netted 48 goals overall.

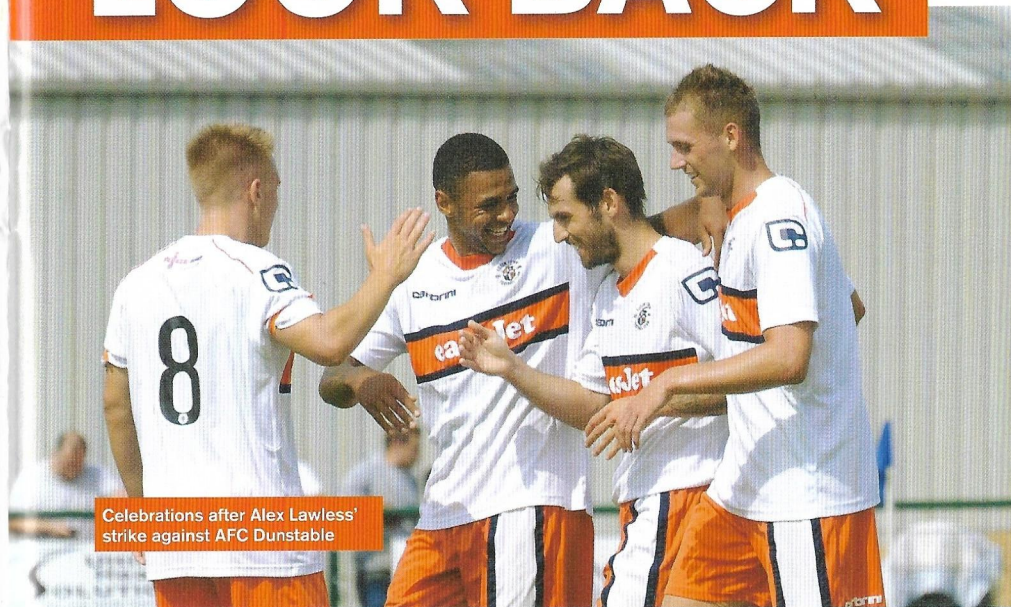

UNBEATEN PRE-SEASON

The Town come into the new season brimming with confidence after enjoying a seven-match unbeaten run over the course of pre-season.

The record – not including a Bedfordshire Senior Cup final defeat – reads five wins and six clean sheets in seven matches.

Even more impressive was the Hatters' home record against three Football League sides – one from each division – with two victories and three clean sheets.

The Town began their pre-season preparation with a narrow 1-0 win at Hitchin – Adam Watkins' fine strike shortly before the break was enough for a victory at Top Field.

In the inaugural David Preece Memorial Trophy, the Hatters picked up silverware with a 7-1 thumping of AFC Dunstable at Creasey Park. Andre Gray scored twice whilst Alex Lawless, Dan Walker, Watkins, Greg Taylor and Stuart Fleetwood were also on target.

New signing Scott Rendell put the Town ahead in the third friendly, at St Albans City, and another goal from Fleetwood ensured a 2-0 victory and a third straight win.

League 2 side Wycombe Wanderers, managed by former Hatter Gary Waddock, were the first visitors

to Kenilworth Road but despite creating numerous chances the Town had to settle for a goalless draw.

Three days later, Championship club Ipswich Town left Bedfordshire with their tails between their legs after the Hatters inflicted a 2-0 defeat on the Tractor Boys.

It was two headed goals from centre-half Janos Kovacs – one in each half – that did the damage against a strong Ipswich side that included former Hatters favourites Carlos Edwards and Andy Drury. Goalkeeper Mark Tyler also produced a stunning double save late in the first half to keep the visitors at bay.

Next up for the Hatters was a short trip to Blue Square Bet North newcomers Brackley Town but, despite the first appearance of new signing Jon Shaw, Paul Buckle's charges could not find a way through and the game ended goalless.

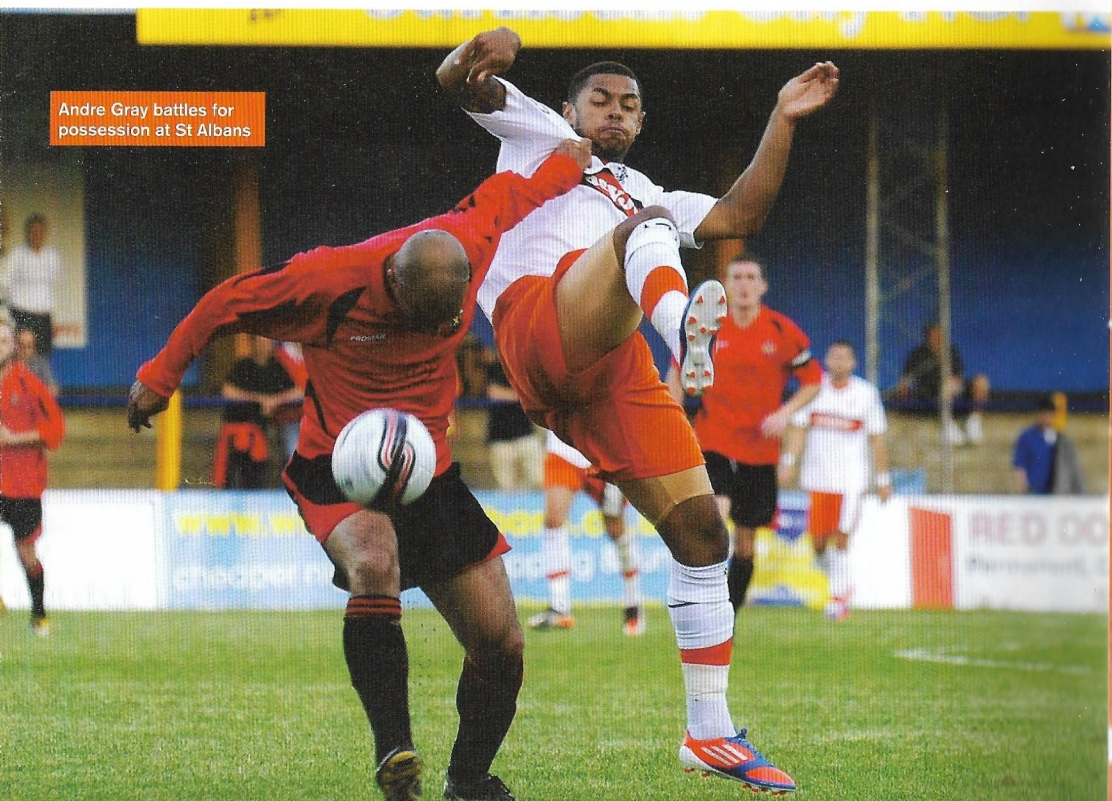
The Town got back to winning ways three days later, though, when League 1 side Leyton Orient were beaten by a solitary goal from Shaw.

The centre-forward rose to plant a towering header past the Orient goalkeeper just two minutes after his introduction as a half-time substitute.

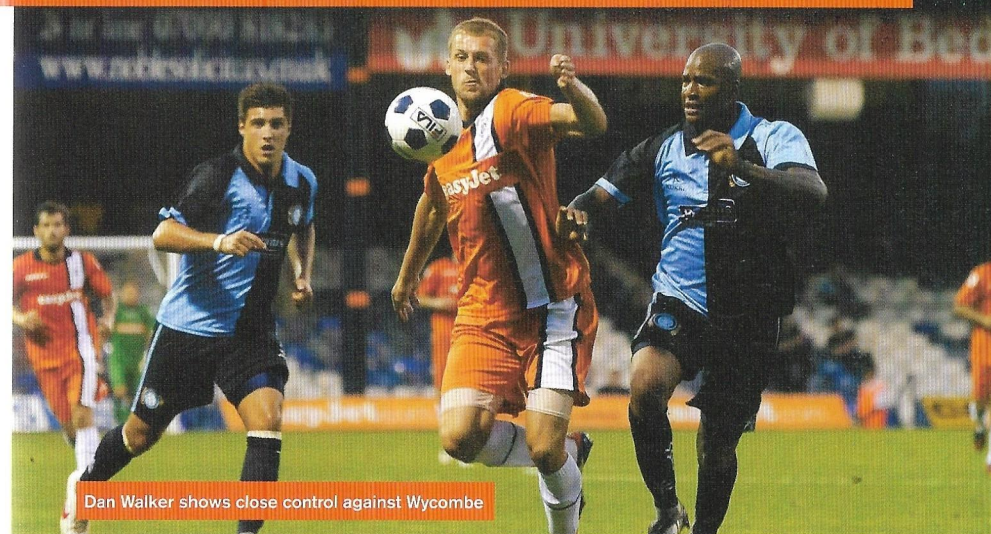

PROMOTION TOPS AGENDA

Manager Paul Buckle described himself as "hell-bent" on ensuring promotion this season following an efficient 1-0 victory over Leyton Orient which confirmed the Town ended pre-season unbeaten.

The Hatters restricted their League 1 opponents to a handful of chances during the 90 minutes, as they kept another clean sheet following similar shut-outs against Wycombe and Ipswich. Buckle revealed the high quality of the players' pre-season performances have given him a selection dilemma ahead of what he feels will be difficult game against Ian Bogie's Tynesiders this afternoon.

"It's not going to be easy picking the team, I can tell you that much," he said. "We've watched Gateshead so we know all about them and we had a tough game there last year when we drew 0-0, so it's not an easy game for Luton Town. We don't get given an easy game, it's not like that, everybody comes here to try and beat us. Everyone punches above their weight against us. It's something we're used to now and I'm just trying to close ranks with the players and say it's not about any other team or what they do or try and do, it's about what we do."

With the practice of pre-season over, the manager is keen to outline that the determination shown against

the O's was exactly what he expects from the players ahead of the forthcoming campaign.

"The players have given everything, I've said to them afterwards that the Luton fans expect that, and deserve that work-rate and if we do that they'll stick with us and they'll back us. You know it's going to be a tough ride, the Conference is an unforgiving league, and we're going to have to be at it in all aspects of our game.

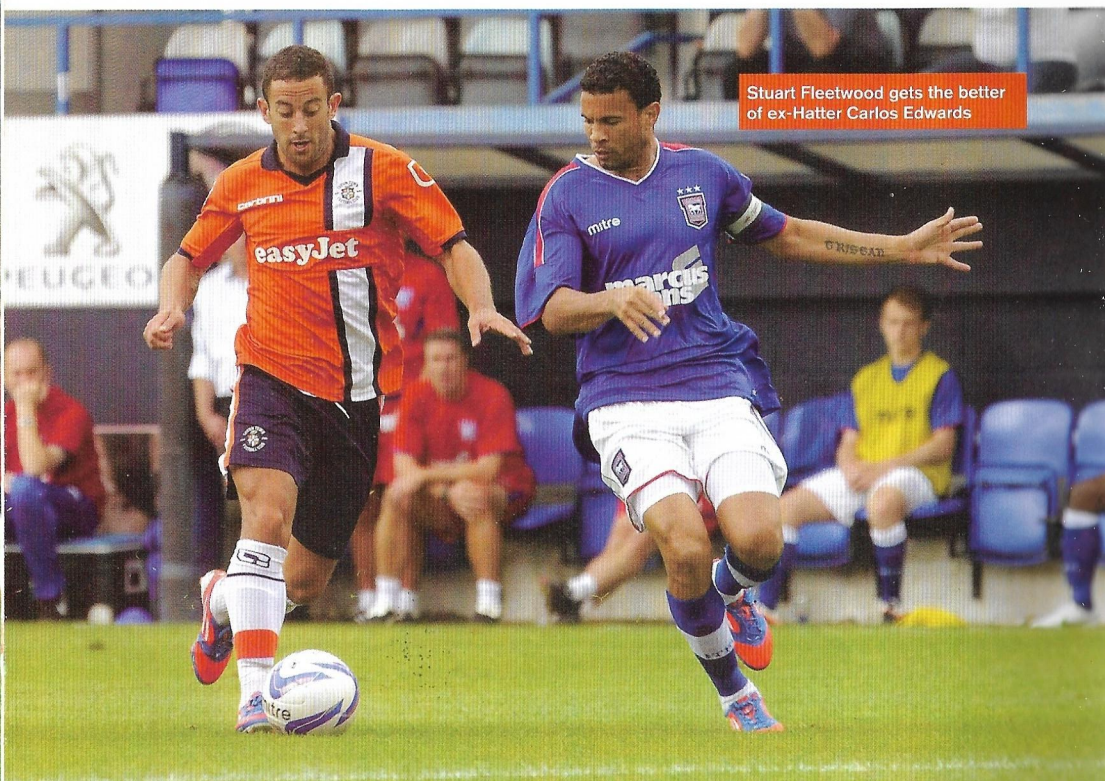
"The fitness levels are very good. We won't know until the season starts to see where we're at and we have to get up to speed quickly. What I would say is that in comparison to last year, we are fitter. I think the team moves better and we are lasting the games. We saw a lot of late goals last year and fitness is a major part of the game. I think Ronnie Henry brings something to the football club, you see the way Ronnie is in training and the way he is these games, he's bringing Janos alongside him and all the other defenders. You need that mentality, that horrible mentality to say no every time teams come knocking.

"I've got out this division once and I want to do it again. I'm hell-bent on doing it. I said I'd bring in players that would die for the football club and that's what we've got to do. We have to fight and scrap for every ball this season, and if we do that we'll give ourselves a chance."

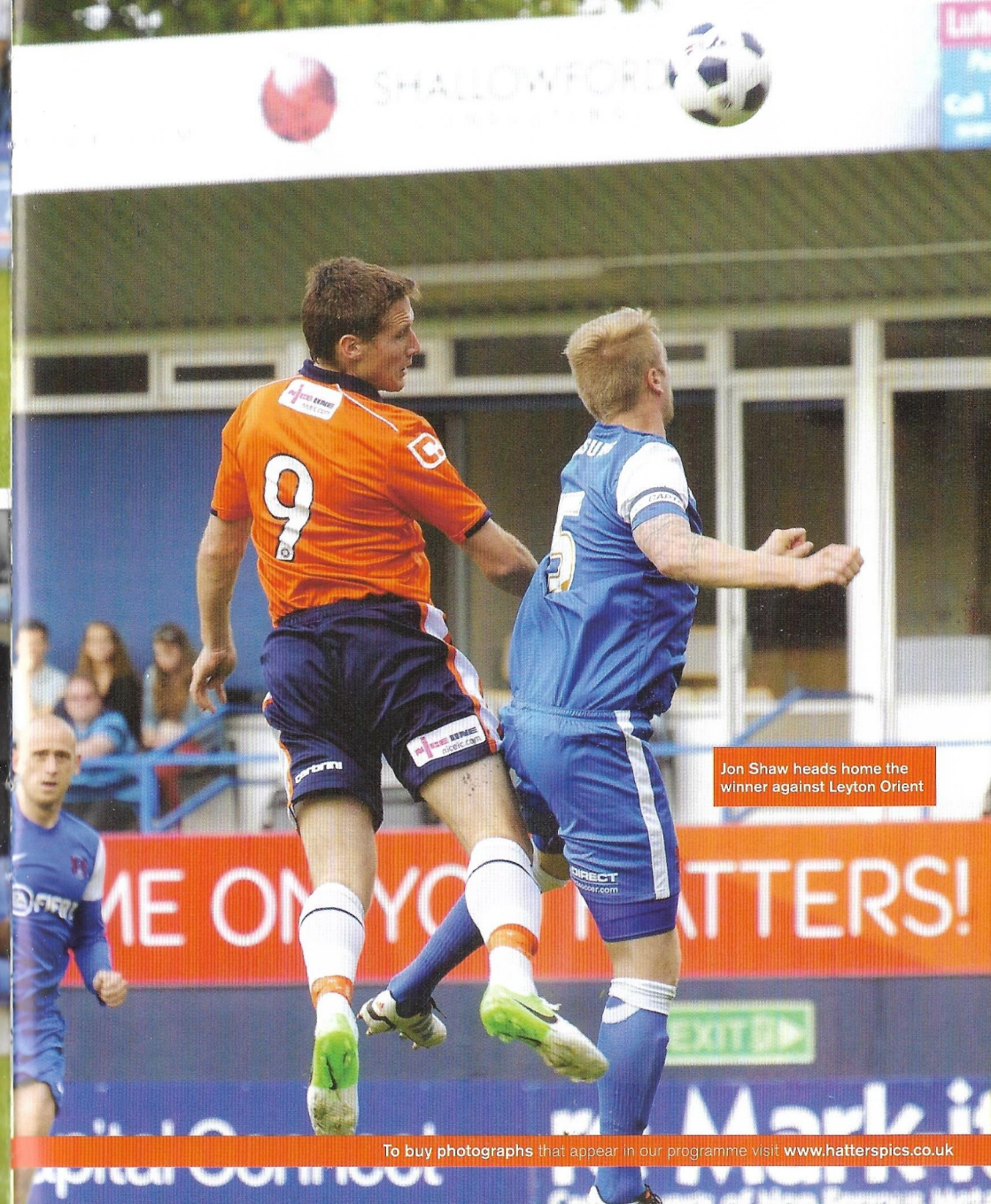




Jon Shaw heads home the

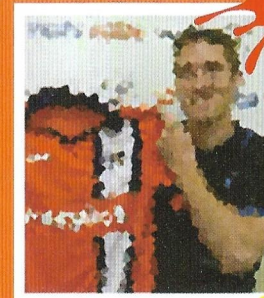
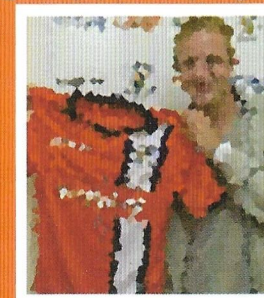
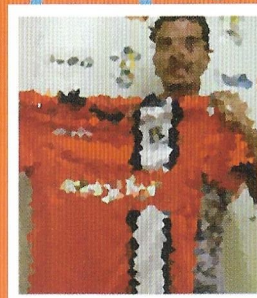

Jesse Pye had been signed from Wolves that summer and, at 32, was seen to be long past his best but he soon silenced his doubters by top scoring for the Hatters in 1952/53, as well as nurturing the blossoming talents of future record-scorer Gordon Turner.

With his brilliant football brain and superb ball control, he remains the favourite Hatter for supporters of a certain age.

TOWN TREASURES

CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH DELVES DEEP INTO HIS VAST COLLECTION OF HATTERS MEMORABILIA

In topical mode, featured is a photo of the Great Britain Olympic Football side that struck gold at London 1908.

Playing in that victorious side was the Town's first superstar, half-back Bob Hawkes, who went on to win 19 amateur caps for his country as well as five full caps. Not included in the above cap tally, Bob starred as Great Britain thrashed Sweden 12-1, with Bob scoring

twice, before beating the Netherlands 4-0. In the final at White City, a crowd of 8,000 saw Great Britain beat a Denmark side, who had trounced France 17-1 in an earlier round, 2-0.

The winning team was awarded only one gold medal but the individual players each received a decorative scroll commemorating the achievement.

ON THIS DAY

AUGUST 11

THE RECORD

The Town have only ever played six times on 11th August in their history. The first came at Gillingham in a League Cup tie in 1979. Of the six games, the Town have won four and lost two.

The most recent was the Hatters' first home game in the Conference in 2009 against Mansfield.

STAGS SUNK

On that night, the Town beat the Stags 4-1 in front of 7,295 at Kenilworth Road. Mansfield took the lead through a Scott Garner header on 18 minutes, but George Pilkington's first ever goal for the club six minutes before the break levelled things up.

Pilkington – now of course a Mansfield player – scored again to put the Town in front on 66 minutes before a Kyle Perry own goal moved the Hatters 3-1 ahead nine minutes from time.

In stoppage time, Tom Craddock converted a penalty to make it four, with the crowd baying for Pilkington to net a hat-trick. "Tommy's our penalty taker," boss Mick Harford said afterwards.

HOME COMFORTS

The Town began their 2007/08 season in League 1 with a home fixture against Hartlepool United. Manager Kevin Blackwell gave debuts to seven new signings and two of those – Darren Currie and Alan Goodall – struck to secure a 2-1 victory in front of 8,013.

CHAMPIONS ELECT

At the beginning of the Town's League 1 title-winning season in 2004/05, Mike Newell's side rattled off six successive victories to rise to the top of the table.

Having beaten Oldham on the opening day of the season, the Hatters travelled to Swindon Town the following Tuesday.

A Kevin Nicholls penalty put the Town ahead in the 24th minute before an own goal from the Robins' Rory Fallon doubled the Hatters' lead.

Sam Parkin, who would later go on to play for the Hatters, pulled a goal back on the stroke of half-time but Steve Howard restored the Town's two-goal cushion six minutes after the restart. Alan Reeves' header for Swindon made it 3-2 but the Hatters held on.

AWAY THE LADS

The Town began life in Division 3 (now League 2) in 2001/02 with the long trip to Carlisle United. Over 1,000 Hatters fans travelled up the M1 and M6 to watch the team secure a 2-0 victory thanks to two goals in 11 second-half minutes from debutants Paul Hughes and Carl Griffiths.

(NOT) UP FOR THE CUP

The 1979 meeting with Gillingham, the first on this date, saw the Town go down 3-0 at Priestfield in a League Cup first round first leg tie. A 1-1 draw at Kenilworth Road in the second leg saw the Hatters eliminated.

It was a different story 19 years later, though. The Town lost 3-2 at home to Oxford United in a League Cup first round first leg tie on this date in 1998, but a 3-1 second leg win at the Manor Ground saw them through on aggregate. The Hatters went on to reach the quarter-finals, where they were beaten by Sunderland.

A SHAW THING!

New signing Jon Shaw tells Talk of the Town his hopes and dreams of a season of success

New Hatters striker Jon Shaw is looking forward to life at Kenilworth Road, starting with his former team-mates who are today's visitors.

The Town's new number nine had a successful two-year spell at the Gateshead International Stadium, scoring more than 50 goals for the Tyneside outfit - clinical form which brought him to the forefront of scouts up and down the country.

Sheffield-born Shaw put pen to paper on a two-year contract with the Hatters in June and looks forward to emulating his prolific goal scoring record which concluded with his acquisition into Paul Buckle's squad.

Joe Flemons caught up with the Hatters' newest cult hero after his goalscoring start to life at Kenilworth Road against Leyton Orient.

First appearance

45 minutes and a goal on your first appearance in front of the home crowd - was that the dream start you were looking for?

Definitely. Up until now it's been a bit frustrating having not played many games, but I got 45 minutes against Brackley and I was looking to get a run out against Orient at home in front of the fans, so to come on and score straight away, you can't really ask for much more.

As you mentioned, it must have been frustrating having your pre-season disrupted as much as it has been?

I've been here nearly five weeks and I've only spent one week injured, but it seemed like an eternity because we played so many games in that week. So, yes, it's been a lot of hard work and then to miss out on those friendlies was a bit frustrating but the season starts next week so hopefully I'll be back.

So, Gateshead at home to kick-off the season - how do you feel about the upcoming fixture against your former side?

You've just got to treat it like any other game - we will play them twice this season anyway so to get them early when everyone is fresh and ready to start should make it a good game. Ian Bogie's side will try and play good football - he always does - and I'm looking forward to a good game. I had two great years there so I'm not going to sit here and say 'we're going to beat them or they're going to beat us', but I predict a good game of football with two teams who want to play the right way.

Will you celebrate if you score?

No. I said that early when I first signed that if I score I won't be celebrating. I'm not really a big celebrator anyway. So no, I think it would be slightly disrespectful to them and I don't see it as disrespecting our fans, I think they'll understand. I had a good couple of years with Gateshead and I'll leave it at that.

You had an incredible start to last season netting six goals in six games. Is that something you're looking to emulate in a Hatters strip this season?

Well, obviously you want to score as many goals as you can. You set your target for the season at around 20, and anything else is a bonus. If you can get off to a good start and score as many as possible it makes the task a little bit easier to get to your target - that would be ideal, but if it doesn't you don't expect too much.

There has been a number of summer signings, yourself included, how have you all settled in?

Brilliantly. You couldn't ask for a better bunch and there's been a lot of surprise from people outside the club at how you attract the likes of Ronnie Henry, Scott Rendell, Danny Spiller, Gary Richards and Nathaniel Rowe-Turner to the club. They are big names from higher

leagues that have proved they can play in leagues above, and a few have been in teams that have got out of this league. There's a lot with experience of success and they're all winners - it's great to have such influence on the rest of the squad.

With the additions to an already strong attacking side, who would you see as an ideal strike partner for yourself?

To be honest with you, we can all play together and I think that goes for even the young lads that are coming into the side. Whether its Andre Gray, Stuart Fleetwood, Dan Walker or Scott Rendell, we can all play with each other. We've all got different elements which add something to the team, so whether its one, two, three or four of us at once, I'm sure other teams will be looking at that and are a bit worried.

Have you got confidence that this is the squad to take the club up?

Yes. I know how hard this league is, I've been here for a long time. I've seen teams that have come down and struggled, teams that have gone up playing the right way, teams that have gone up playing horribly. However, I believe in this squad, I believe in the club - that's why I came and if I didn't think we could win it or be in the shake up at the end I wouldn't of signed. It's a genuine belief that this is the season for us.

play only in the FA Cup, sponsored, of course, by the American brewing giant.

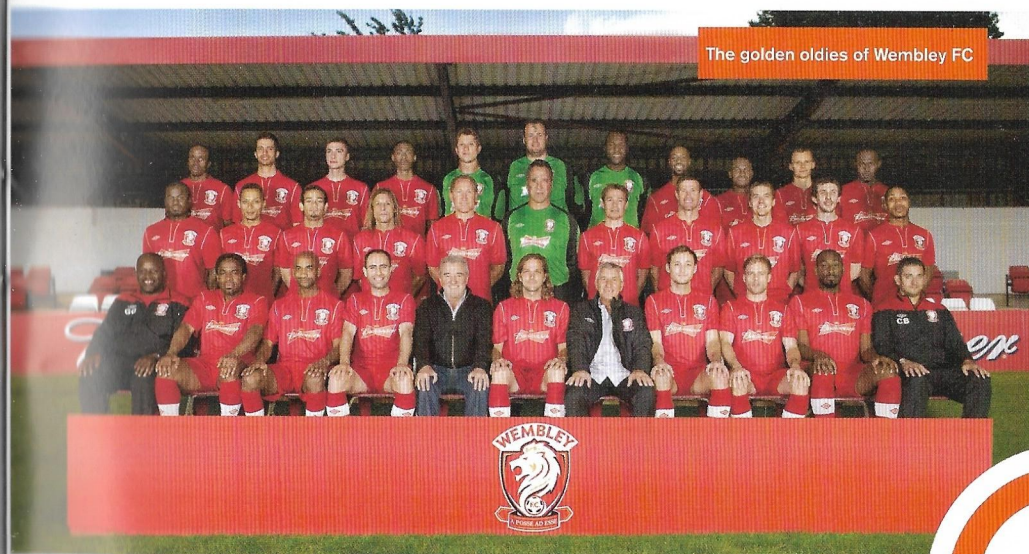
It led the NLP to ask the question – welcome extra publicity and some good harmless fun, or has the Non-League game become the Bud of the joke?

Venables himself won it as player and as manager of Tottenham. Getting the retired legends back in the groove and winning over the sceptics is his biggest challenge to date.



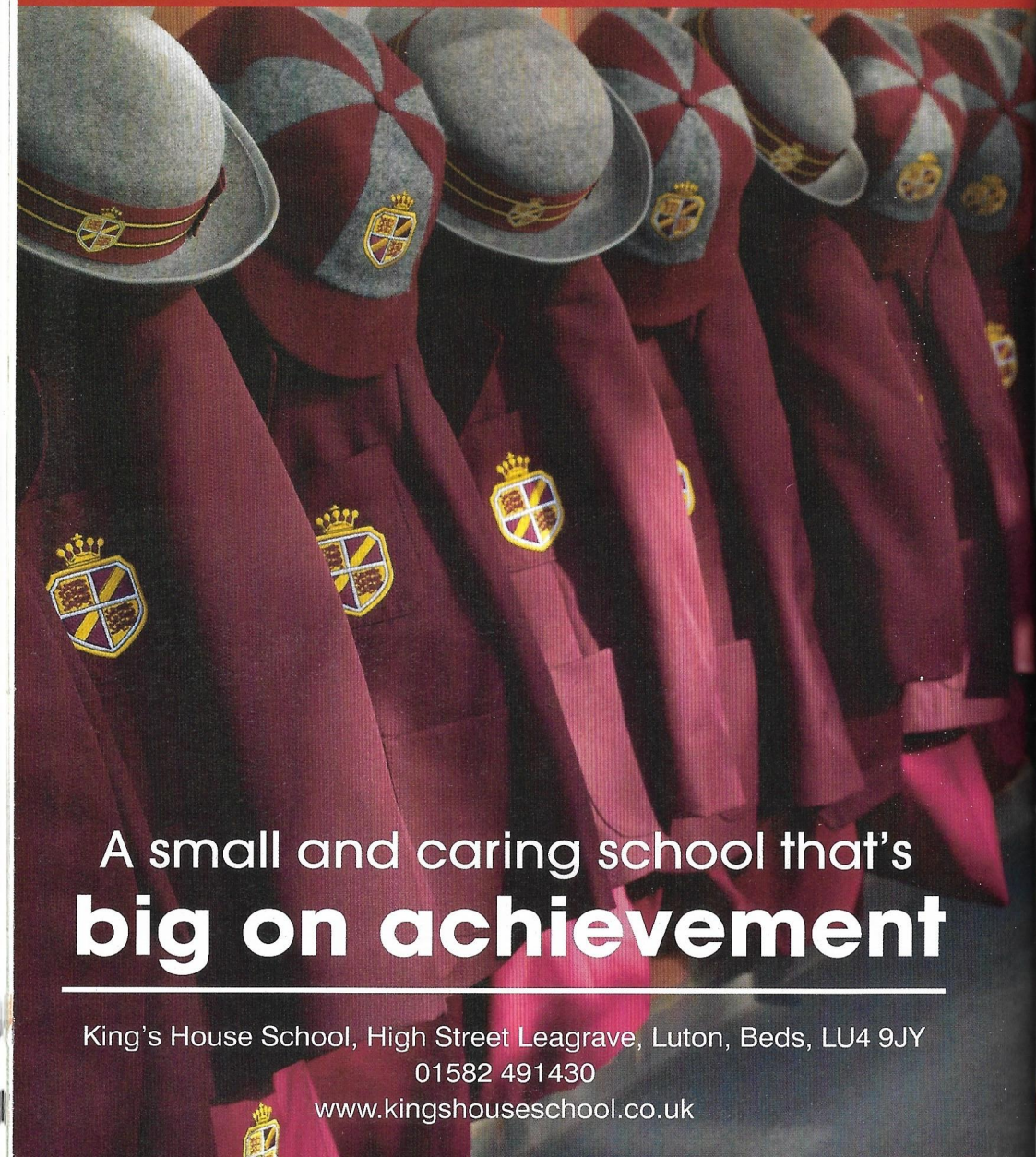

Promotion push

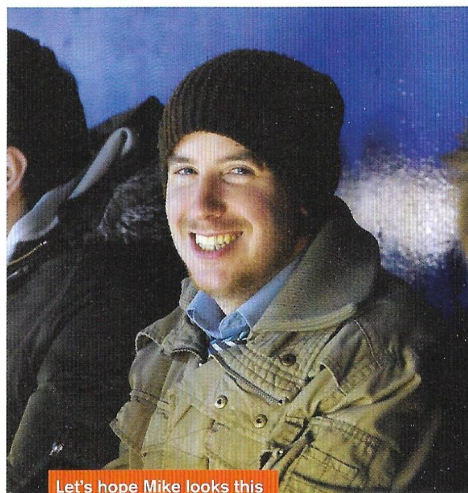

It's been a summer of change on the pitch with new manager Paul Buckle adding nine new faces to the Kenilworth Road dressing room, but there has also been plenty of changes off the pitch too, following the launch of our new-look website.

Together with almost 90 other clubs, the new-look site went live over the course of the summer with lutontown.co.uk completing its makeover in early July.

The decision to change sites came following Football League Interactive's (FLI) decision to switch service providers from Perform Group to a new provider in the shape of Sapient Nitro.

The project was well over 12 months in the making, which began with FLI tendering the contract and ended when sites began going live in late June.

Clubs were given the option of choosing one of three new designs with our feeling that the current 'Action' lens was right for us given the expertise and imagery of our photographer Gareth Owen.

A few teething problems still persist but we have been advised by the FLI that the experience of visiting the new site will continue to improve.

We have successfully pushed for the multi-pagination of stories to be removed and add to gallery sections to news articles – something which was bizarrely omitted by Sapient when the sites first went live.

and we certainly hope the user experience will improve as time goes on.

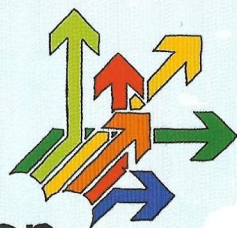

ACADEMY UPDATE

ALL CHANGE IN YOUTH DEPARTMENT

The Hatters were happy to announce an exciting new restructuring in the youth development department over the summer.

The set-up reshuffle comes as the club enters the EPPP (Elite Player Performance Plan) for the first time, as well as news that Head of Youth Gregg Broughton is to further his career away from Kenilworth Road with Premier League Norwich City.

With Gregg's departure comes the opportunity for others, and the Town are delighted to welcome three new faces into the youth department.

One face is a familiar one; that of Wayne Turner, who takes on the mantle as of Head of Youth Football. Wayne has had a long association with the Hatters having appeared 82 times at Kenilworth Road as a player, as well as coaching at various youth levels.

Wayne will be assisted by Matt Stannard, who has joined from Wycombe Wanderers as Youth Operations Manager, and Lee Cowley, who has become Youth Coaching Manager. Matt has valuable experience of football administration and will be responsible for the day-to-day running of the Academy. Whilst Lee, himself a former manager at local level and youth coach at Kenilworth Road for 15 years, will oversee the club's coaches across all age groups from Under-9s to Under-18s. With a dedicated administrative point of contact, Matt's role will enable coaches to focus on football and coaching.

Managing director Gary Sweet told lutontown.co.uk: "As a board, 2020 put youth development as one of the cornerstones of our vision for the football club and this hasn't wavered, despite the enormous challenges we have faced behind the scenes.

"Despite the Football League cutting our funding from £180,000 to £90,000 after relegation, and then cutting it to zero after losing two successive Play-Off finals, our investors have continued to back this key area. Their investment has almost reached £750,000 in this area alone since taking over four years ago.

"The importance that youth football plays at our football club is hugely significant, and we owe massive gratitude to our shareholders for enabling our restructuring plans at youth level to go ahead.

"More importantly, the role our youth section plays on the pitch will be more significant in the coming years and beyond. Youth development is never a quick fix, but it is the only way to progress.

Hugely exciting

"We have recently signed Alasan Ann and Newman Carney on professional deals whilst also agreeing terms with nine new scholars who will feature for the Under-18s next season under the guidance of Paul Driver.

all our new faces good luck at Luton Town.

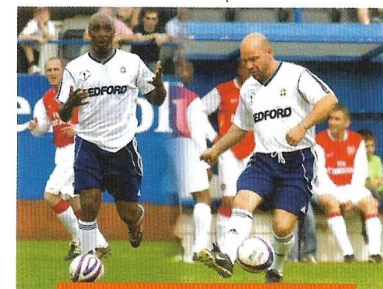
"We would also like to pay tribute to Gregg who has done a marvellous job over the past six years at this club and wish him well for future away from Kenilworth Road."

That result meant the Town needed to beat Swedish side

Brommapojkarna to qualify for the quarter-finals but, despite Osamu Allman's goal, the game ended 1-1.

The result didn't mean an early exit though, as the Hatters played-off for the right to finish 13th in the competition. However, more Danish opposition – this time in the shape of FC Midtjylland – dashed their chances of finishing 13th with as they won 3-1.

It meant one more game for the Town in a bid to finish 15th, and that place was assured thanks to a fine 3-1 victory over Polish side Lechia Gdnask.

It was back to Britain for the boys and having taken part in friendlies against youth teams of Tottenham and Fulham, the Town were pitted against two adult sides.

A 3-2 to defeat to AFC Kempston – with Zak Stephens and Ian Rees on target – was followed by a 3-1 victory over AFC Rushden & Diamonds.

Driver, a former coach with the Diamonds, said: "While the Rushden game was obviously a way better game all round for us – the Kempston game was equally useful in the development of the boys.

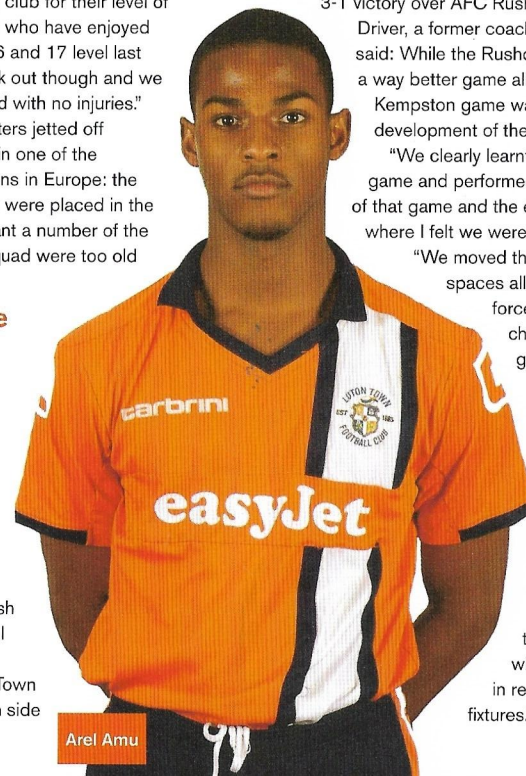
"We clearly learnt from the first half of that game and performed much better for the rest of that game and the entire match at Rushden where I felt we were superb.

"We moved the ball well and found spaces all over the park which

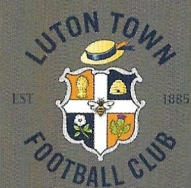
forced them into a formation change and we showed great energy throughout the 90 minutes in closing them down.

"These games are great for the players. After playing against Academy sides, this teaches them

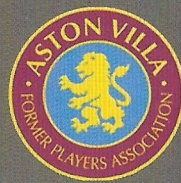
how to play against older and bigger players which is exactly what they will come up against when they move to play in reserve and first team fixtures."

FINE PRE-SEASON FOR LADIES

Like Paul Buckle's boys, the ladies are unbeaten in pre-season, which included two good wins against higher ranked teams.

Tougher task

The second pre-season game was going to be a much tougher task on paper as the Town travelled to National Premier Division South side, Gillingham. Both teams were at full strength on what was a very hot afternoon. Gillingham came close to opening the scoring in the first two minutes, but Lauren Impey cleared the ball off the line. But as the Town upped the tempo, Gillingham were struggling with the pace. The Town then went 1-0 up after 10 minutes when Nicola Henman seized onto a weak back-pass and slotted the ball past the Gills goalkeeper.

As the Town piled on the pressure another goal soon arrived. A through ball sent Jess McKay bursting into the penalty area, and she was brought down by a Gills defender. The referee had no hesitation in pointing to the penalty spot. Henman then tucked away the resulting penalty.

As the tempo dropped in the searing heat, Gillingham came back into the game. Although they had a lot of possession, another solid performance by the back four held them at bay and the Town held

Queens Park Rangers - another National Premier Division South side - were the visitors to Stockwood last Sunday, and this game turned into a goal fest. Rangers took an early lead, and they looked the better side until on the half hour when a cross came shot by Carroll completely deceived the QPR goalkeeper and finished up in the net.

Radley soon added a second when she somehow squeezed a shot in from a narrow angle despite being surrounded by three defenders. Just before half-time it was 3-1, when Michelle Byrne rifled in a shot from the edge of the penalty area.

Two goals in the first eight minutes of the second half from Rangers wiped out the lead. But, within a minute, the Town were back in front when Bex Kane pressurised a Rangers defender to put the ball into her own net. From that point on the Town totally dominated the game. Two well struck free-kicks by Carroll found the net to complete her hat-trick, before Bex Scott scored with a fine solo effort to round off a 7-3 victory.

It has been another busy summer in the Blue Square Bet Premier with the most active team in the transfer market being Macclesfield Town, perhaps unsurprising considering their relegation from League 2 last season.

The majority of last season's squad have left Moss Rose, including top scorer George Donnelly, who has joined Rochdale. Fourteen players have signed for the Silkmen, most notably from a Luton perspective are former players Matthew Barnes-Homer and Charlie Henry, whilst John-Paul Kissock has joined on loan from the Hatters. Other signings include Harry Agombar, who had trials with West Ham United and Partizan Belgrade before signing for Macclesfield, and Peter Winn from Stevenage.

Financial issues after relegation have meant that Hereford's transfer activities have been limited, although strikers Ryan Bowman and Marlon Jackson are among the key signings for new manager Martin Foyle.

Out of last season's Play-Off contenders, Mansfield have been the most active, signing many players with high credentials at this level. These include John Dempster from Crawley, George Pilkington and Godfrey Poku from Luton, and Jamie Tolley and Jake Speight from Wrexham.

Suffered

The Welsh side, who were runners-up last season, have suffered in the transfer market over the summer, with not only Tolley and Speight departing, but also Mathias Pogba, Nat Knight-Percival and Chris Maxwell leaving to join Football League sides. Manager Andy Morrell has added former Premier League striker Brett Ormerod to his squad, but generally he will look towards the same players from last season that saw the Dragons finish second.

Other top-half teams from last season have seen varying levels of activity in the transfer market. Southport have made few changes from the squad that finished seventh last season, the most notable departure being Andy Owens to Mansfield.

Today's opponents Gateshead will look towards James Brown to replace Jon Shaw, who netted 28

league goals last season, whilst Kidderminster have added 6ft 5in centre-back Exodus Geohaghon and winger Ricky Shakes from Ebbsfleet, as well as re-signing midfielder Keith Briggs from Fleetwood to boost their promotion push.

Other teams involved in disappointing campaigns last season include Cambridge United and Lincoln City, and both clubs have added 10 players to their respective squads. Cambridge's signings include Scott Garner from Grimsby, Ricky Wellard from AFC Wimbledon and the return of winger Robbie Willmott.

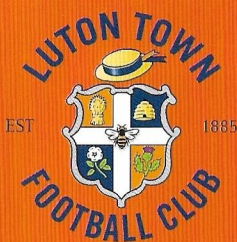
Forest Green Rovers, meanwhile, have added four strikers to their squad, including Magno Vieira from Fleetwood and Phil Marsh from Stalybridge, who scored 22 goals in the Blue Square Bet North last term.

The four newly-promoted teams to the division have generally been quiet during the summer, with the notable exception of Nuneaton Town.

Boro have signed 11 players during the close season, including former Aston Villa defender and Ireland international Stephen O'Halloran and target man Kyle Perry.

Hyde have been the quietest of any teams during the transfer market, signing just three players and seeing only two leave.

Elsewhere, the most notable and, perhaps shrewd, signing of the summer could be Tamworth's capture of former England international Lee Hendrie, who is now aged 35.

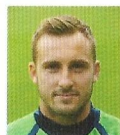

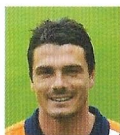

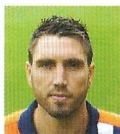

Age: 30

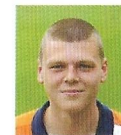

The Town face two successive away fixtures after this afternoon's season-opener against Gateshead.

Paul Buckle's men travel to Kidderminster Harriers on Tuesday night before heading further north on Friday night for a televised trip to newly-promoted Hyde.



KIDDERMINSTER

Where: Worcestershire, England. To be more precise, Aggborough Stadium, Hoo Road in Kidderminster. Typing in DY10 1NB into your sat-nav will get you there.

Not got sat-nav, mate: Okay, well the Bobbers Travel are, as ever, running a coach to Aggborough. They're leaving our Maple Road car park at 3.30pm and the prices are £19 for adults and £16 for concessions.

We've been here before haven't we? Absolutely, and what's more, we haven't lost in five previous visits; winning four and drawing one. That's bound to jinx it then.

Eat and drink: Like any supporter (or journalist) will tell you, a trip to Aggborough is the highlight of the culinary season. Both sets of supporters can mingle in the friendly ambience of the supporters' club directly behind the main stand before tasting the home-made delights once inside. The cottage pies (with gravy, trust me) are hailed nationwide, while the famous pea-green Aggborough soup is available by the gallon and is a firm favourite with locals and visitors.

Vantage point: Town fans will be stretching their vocal chords predominately on a covered terrace behind the goal. A right old racket can be created by only a handful of supporters chanting, so imagine the noise a thousand voices can muster. Seating in a relatively new stand by the side of the pitch is also available.

Non-footballing fact: Kidderminster is most famous for carpets. The area began as the hub for the industry back in the late 18th century. And no, Harriers aren't nicknamed the Carpet Fitters.



HYDE

Where: This isn't the small civil parish of Hyde that's south-east of here (the land mostly occupied by the Luton Hoo), but, and I quote "a town in the Metropolitan Borough of Tameside, Great Manchester, England". Basically, seven miles east of Manchester. The football club plays at Ewan Fields.

Ok, thanks for the geography lesson, how do I get there? Well, if you're driving, the postcode for the ground is SK14 2SB. If you'd prefer a coach driver to take the strain, the Bobbers are running a coach that leaves the Maple Road car park at 1.30pm and costs £23 for adults and £20 for concessions.

So, Hyde then? Yep, previously known as Hyde United. Why drop the United, I can hear you asking in your thousands. Well, the club struck a deal with Manchester City to use Ewan Fields as a venue for their reserve games. City didn't want the U-word anywhere. Hyde do play in red shirts, though, and more importantly, won the Blue Square Bet North championship last term so they won't be pushovers.

Step into the unknown: The Town have never played against Hyde or paid a visit Ewan Fields before.

Telly addicts: Premier Sports TV are screening the game live on television and you could save yourself a 350-mile round trip by either making the somewhat shorter journey to Kenilworth Road to watch the game with fellow fans in the Eric Morecambe lounge, or by subscribing to the channel itself - just call 0871 663 9000 to do so.

Luton link: Town favourite and current club chaplain Alan West was born in Hyde. Midfielder Alan begun his career with Burnley before going onto make 317 appearances at Kenilworth Road between 1973 and 1981.

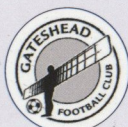
