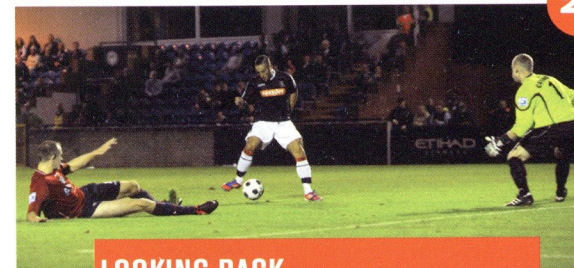

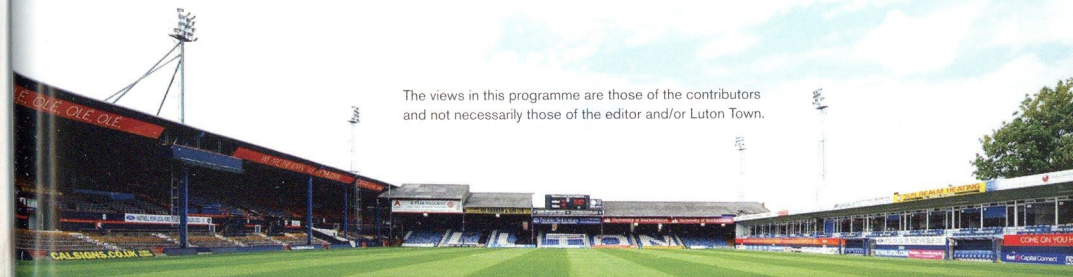

Welcome back to you all for this afternoon's Blue Square Bet Premier fixture with AFC Telford United.

We go into today's game unbeaten having taken seven points from nine, which is a great return having played three games in a six-day period.

The improvement since the first half against Gateshead has been fantastic and I cannot praise the players enough for their hard work and determination to ensure we have the points total we have early on in this campaign.

A number of the lads are new signings and, with the weight of expectation firmly on everyone's shoulders, I am delighted with their attitude.

Playing at pace

Expectation is always tougher to manage when you're a club like Luton Town. It's easy when you're the underdog. However, I believe when we play football at a high tempo those pressures can be forgotten. When playing at pace we are a hard team to contain – and that's what we'll be out to do this afternoon.

In the last three games we have shown a variety of characteristics which leads to me to suggest we have an absolutely fantastic group of players here at Kenilworth Road. Those who witnessed the Hyde game will see we made a huddle at the full-time whistle. We wanted to show everyone the togetherness we have here. We are all working towards achieving one goal.

We've shown character to come from one goal down and two goals down. We've shown our quality to go to Kidderminster and win comfortably and keep a clean sheet in the process. Individually, players have shown their physical and mental attributes. Those who have been substituted have taken it the right way, whilst those who have come on have gone on to do the business.

Hugely motivated

In the three games we have played, we have already seen that teams are hugely motivated playing Luton Town. This was illustrated at Hyde where they gave us a real run

for our money. I hope they will go on to give other clubs in and around the top of the table a good game, too.

AFC Telford will be the same. I know Andy from time spent together at Brentford and they are not going to make it easy. But, with all due respect to Telford, I'm not interested in the opposition. It's about what we do that matters.

We will not be standing off teams. The players have a license from me to go and attack teams at will and play on the front foot. That was something we didn't do in the first half against Gateshead but that has since been rectified. The players have the quality and have been given the opportunity to go and express themselves.

Today is the first of two games in the space of three days over this Bank Holiday weekend, with a trip to Ebbsfleet waiting in the wings on Monday.

The dangerous thing is to look at both games but make no mistake we will be fully focused on this afternoon's fixture. Believe me, if we were to win today we'll have lots of running in our legs on Monday.

Up and running

We'll be going full out today. We won't be giving Telford a moment's peace. The pleasing thing is we're up and running – striker's are scoring and creating goals and the team are working hard for one another.

Finally, I must pay tribute to the supporters who travelled to Kidderminster and Hyde last week. Your support doesn't go unnoticed and I'm sure the six points put a smile on your faces.

Three points could see us return to the top of the league so please get behind us again today.

WITH MANAGING DIRECTOR GARY SWEET



Good afternoon to you all for our second home match of the season, and a vital one it is too! Despite being so early in the season, any game which provides a fantastic opportunity for the Hatters to be top of the league by 5pm must be considered as an important event.

A very warm welcome to the supporters, players and officials of AFC Telford United, whose second season in the Blue Square Bet Premier is now fully underway having just seen off Braintree by three goals. I'd like to extend a personal welcome to Lee Carter, the Telford Chairman, who has just joined me on the board of the Football Conference.

As this is my first opportunity to wish you all a happy new season, I'd particularly like to thank each and every season ticket holder for renewing or joining. As an update, I'm delighted to be able to announce that you have astounded us and surpassed the expectations of everyone.

Including executive ticket sales, we have now broken the 4,000 mark and have beaten our total of last year. On behalf of the board, a massive thank you to you all for your loyalty and commitment.

Season tickets are incredibly important to us. Not only are they a crucial source of guaranteed income but season ticket sales provide an accurate barometer for the feeling of enthusiasm, hope and faith for the club for the season and, the jobs we, collectively, are doing to get our great club back on track.

We also use season ticket sales as a gauge of confidence in the squad put together which, in turn, enables us to trade more effectively and more assertively.

As you may have noticed, we have had a busy (to say the least) and successful (we all hope) summer of player trading.

In Paul Buckle we have a manager who revels in the challenge of change and strives for perfection. Without any disrespect to those players who departed over the summer, each departure provided us with an opportunity to improve that particular position, to improve the squad balance and to improve the flexibility or depth of the squad.

Additionally, by making such changes, we have had the opportunity to restructure a new culture in the squad with a tight-knit pack of strong, determined characters.

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank each and every departing player for their involvement at Luton Town over their time, and, in particular, to two loyal servants.

George Pilkington was an impeccable servant to this club having captained us for four years, led us to a Football League Trophy victory and provided some wonderful memories of his ability, including his cool head for that penalty up in North Wales last May.

Unforgettably, Keith Keane, who rose through the youth ranks at Kenilworth Road from the age of seven and made his debut almost 10 years ago at the ripe old age of 16. Keith gave us many pleasurable moments during his 285 odd appearances, most notably his injury time winner against Oxford direct from a stupendous corner kick in 2010. Whilst it is always a wrench to see such good lads leave, I think you'll agree, our current squad fills us with a greater prospect of hope and excitement than I have felt since becoming involved almost five years ago.

It is all slightly overshadowed by injuries to two recent, promising signings, Garry Richards and Danny Spiller. Whilst we understand that supporters would always like to be fully informed about the squad's fitness levels, it simply wouldn't be wise for us to expose the conditions of our players to our opposition.

Danny and Garry are both doing everything in their powers to recover from their injuries; both of which were sustained since signing. It was such bad luck that having established a new and incredibly thorough medical and fitness test protocol for this summer – which both players passed with flying colours – that two of our most exciting new recruits found themselves out of action after picking up longer term problems.

We wish both of them well in their recoveries. Meanwhile, to balance this setback, we have been delighted by the development of one or two youngsters who are making a name for themselves, particularly JJ O'Donnell who has been like a new signing to us this season. Well done JJ!

Also I must congratulate Jake Woolley on the signing of his first professional contract, thoroughly deserved.

Obtaining seven points from nine is a very good start to the campaign, particularly after two successive away wins – showing the sort of resilience that's been missing in recent seasons. Our squad isn't quite complete yet, so we are hoping and expecting good results to continue and performances to improve throughout the season.

This can't be done without your help, especially away from home. You continue to follow the team away in numbers, for which we are very grateful, and when journeys north on a Friday night are as difficult as they were to Hyde last week, we are yet again left astounded by the togetherness of the fans and team. Never lose sight of the impact you have, the very fact that you are every bit an intrinsic part of the team of Luton Town and the fact that your continued support is crucial to whatever we achieve this season.

Please keep the atmosphere electric, especially here at Kenilworth Road. The noise at our last game against Gateshead was terrific, especially in the second half as we fought back from two goals down.

I must sign off now, but in my next set of notes, I'd like - amongst other things - to discuss stadium and training ground relocation issues; on both of which subjects we've made small but steady progress over the summer.

Enjoy the game today and let's get this place rocking!

But it's important you get off to a good start and the pleasing thing for me is that we are grinding out results but playing okay.

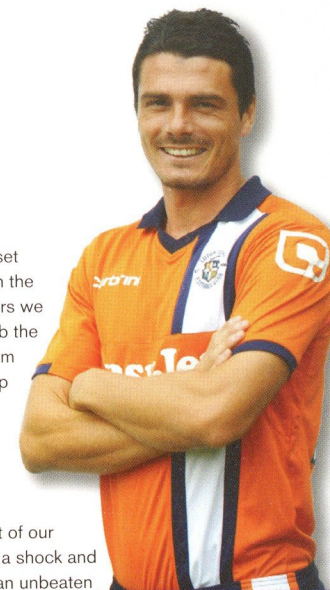

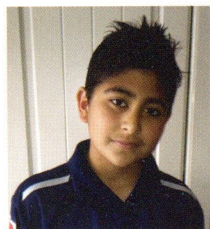

It promises to be a fantastic occasion as a squad consisting of Hatters legends spanning several decades make a welcome return 'home'.

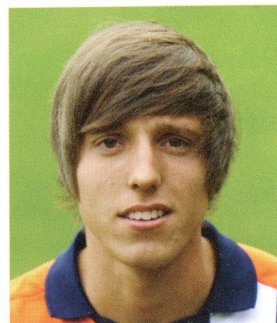

Our ever-popular Golden Gamble returned two weeks ago and a big prize was awarded to David Chellev at our game with Gateshead.

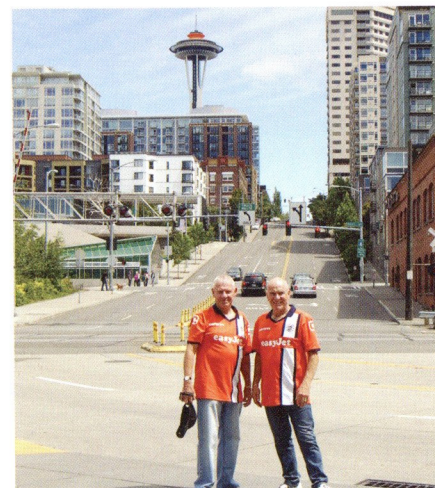
David was clutching ticket number 02400 which was pulled out of the hat at half-time against the Tynesiders, giving him a rather handy £655.

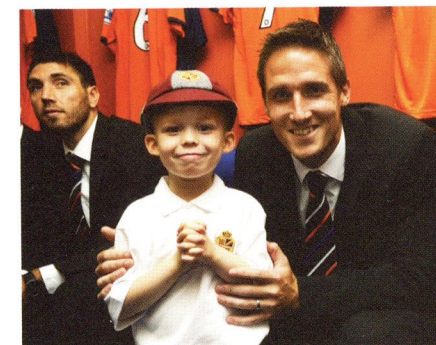
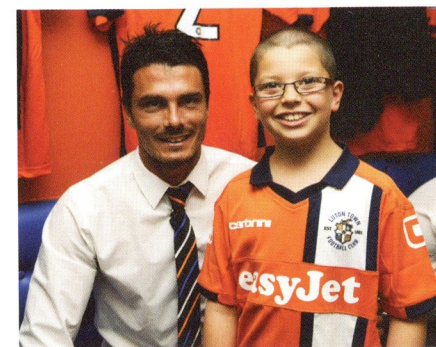
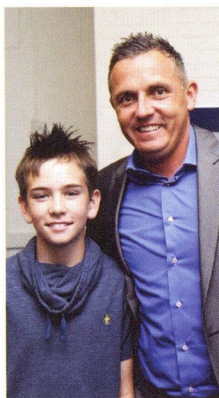


First up is 11-year-old Jacob Penny from Luton. Jacob attends Lealands High School and plays football for Sundon Athletic.

Today's visitors will be hoping a case of second season syndrome doesn't come hunting for AFC Telford heads as they look to improve on last season's survival success.

After successfully negotiating an instant dismissal from the Blue Square Bet Premier last season - avoiding the drop by the narrowest of margins, finishing 20th - the Bucks will be looking to improve under the watchful eye of former England international Andy Sinton. Sinton, who represented his country on 12 occasions, took over the reins back in 2010 and led his side to promotion in his first season in charge. Sinton strengthened his side in the close season by recruiting the likes of former QPR forward Kieron St. Amie, who netted 11 times for league rivals Tamworth, including a brace against his new side in August 2011. His addition, along with former Newport County striker Jake Reid, shapes a new-look front line for the Bucks as they embark on their most ambitious campaign since they were reformed only eight years ago.

The Bucks will arrive at Kenilworth Road this afternoon with optimism after they frustrated the home side and salvaged a well-earned point against the Town last season. On that day, current Bucks shot stopper Ryan Young was in scintillating form, preventing the Hatters from taking all three points with point blank saves from Stuart Fleetwood, James Dance and Town's goalscorer on the day Robbie Willmott.

However, the only other occasion these sides have met was last season's return fixture which took place in

September at the New Bucks Head, where the Hatters were not so forgiving. An inspired Amari Morgan-Smith bagged an early goal to soothe the nerves before doubling his tally after the restart. It was a ruthless performance by the Hatters despite ending the evening with 10 men after Ed Asafa-Adjaye was dismissed. They left Shropshire with all three points.

Sinton's side entered this season as one of the favourites to succumb to relegation. However, after impressive points against Barrow and Braintree, the Bucks sit comfortably in mid-table prior to today's game and will be looking to prove to all those who doubted, well and truly wrong.

Past results favour the home side in today's clash but, with the Bucks marching into the game off the back of an impressive 3-0 drubbing of Alan Devonshire's Braintree, spirits are high in the Telford camp that they can leave Bedfordshire with a favourable result that will have many pre-season doubters stand up and take note of this ever-growing young football club.

- Telford have failed to score in the first half in 34 of their 49 BSBP games.
- Last season, Telford conceded first in 23 games and only came back to earn points in four of those games.

AFC Telford United narrowly avoided relegation last season with just two games to go and it is a widely-held belief they owe their survival to the well-documented implosion of Darlington. However, the club is looking ahead not backwards and manager Andy Sinton has brought in no fewer than 12 new faces over the summer in a bid to make Blue Square Bet Premier survival an easier task this time around.

How have they started the season?

Confidence is currently at an all-time high at Telford after the club recorded its biggest winning margin since being in the top tier of Non-League football with a 3-0 win over Braintree last weekend. Prior to that, a 2-1 defeat to Forest Green Rovers saw the Bucks produce a spirited second-half display which was nearly enough to complete a comeback from 2-0 down against one of the favourites for this season's league title.

How did they fare last season?

Last season, Telford finished 20th in the Blue Square Bet Premier with a lowly 46 points. The side possessed one of the poorest scoring records in the league and only registered 45 goals in total. Of those 45, 20 were scored by three players who will all be unavailable today. Chris Sharp - the club's top scorer with 11 goals last season - is out with a groin injury, whilst Kyle Perry and Sean Newton have moved on to other clubs.

The Bucks had a respectable home record last year (ranked 13th in the league), but it was their abysmal away record which put them in such danger. Sinton's team only managed to win one game away from New Bucks Head all season - a 1-0 win at York City - and that came back in August last year.

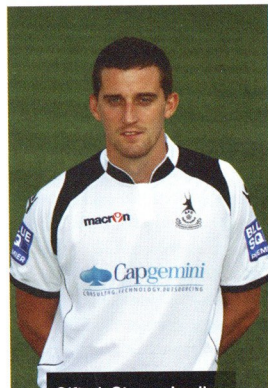
It is worth noting that after winning at York, Telford then went on to earn draws at Fleetwood, Mansfield and ourselves - so they will be hoping to replicate those performances again this year.

How will they play? Who are their key men?

Telford have added some size and strength to their squad this summer and word from the club is that Sinton's men will look to press the Hatters aggressively in order to stifle any attempts to play football through the midfield.



After impressing when switching to a 4-4-2 during the second half against Forest Green and beating Braintree convincingly, it is likely Sinton will keep faith that system. New signing Justin Rose will be partnered by the experienced Chris Blackburn at the back if he is fit. In midfield, Luke Hubbins' pace, industry and ability to beat his man down the outside will be a threat, while attacking central-midfielder Nathan Rooney, who has scored twice this season, will look to get forward often. Steven Leslie is arguably the most

technically gifted of Telford's players and he will look to provide a creative edge from the left-hand side of midfield. Wolves graduate James Spray should start up front with the physically imposing Kieran St Aime. It is likely one of the two will be instructed to prevent Yaser Kasim from composing the play in front of the Luton defence.

HOW'S YOUR SEASON GONE SO FAR?

I feel the season hasn't started too badly. A solid point at Barrow, a battling loss versus Forest Green and a 3-0 win against Braintree. There's more to come from our new signings.

WHO'S YOUR PLAYER TO WATCH?

Our new signing Steven Leslie. A former Football League player with a lot of skill and good feet. He has got the vision and creativity to unlock any defence in this league. He has only had one pre-season game and three league games but I feel there's still a lot more to come from him.

WHAT DO YOU THINK OF YOUR MANAGER?

Andy Sinton isn't really what you call a 'fans' manager' - he doesn't interact with the supporters that often. If he came out to explain some of his decisions more often, I believe he'd have a better rapport with the Telford fans.

WHO DO YOU MOST WANT TO BEAT THIS SEASON?

I would love to watch Telford get one over on Nuneaton this season. Their squad is made up of ex-Telford players - it should make for an intriguing encounter.

HAVE YOU BEEN TO KENILWORTH ROAD BEFORE, AND IF SO, HOW WAS THE EXPERIENCE?

I have been to Kenilworth Road before, last season when the teams drew 1-1 thanks to Sean Newton's fantastic free-kick. I personally liked the stadium. I believe Luton will get stronger as the season progresses, and I expect them to make the Play-Offs by the end of the season.

I'm backing Telford to cause a small upset today - 2-2.

CLASSIC CAMPAIGNS

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS SELECTS TEN POST-WAR
TELFORD UNITED/AFC TELFORD CLASSIC CAMPAIGNS

1969/70

Telford United reached the first ever FA Trophy final in 1969/70. Ron Flowers' side defeated Witton Albion, Ilkeston Town, Wigan Athletic, Romford, Worcester City and Chelmsford City before losing 2-0 to Macclesfield Town in the Wembley final. Telford finished eighth in the Southern League Premier Division, blasting Barnet 5-3 and Wimbledon 4-0 at the Bucks Head and winning 2-1 at Yeovil Town. They also reached the FA Cup first round for only the second time in 15 years.

1970/71

Graham Carr skippered Telford United to the FA Trophy and Southern League double in 1970/71. They beat Bradford Park Avenue, South Shields, Burton Albion, Tamworth and Yeovil Town en route to the FA Trophy final. Goals by Jack Bentley, Joey Owen and Micky Fudge secured a 3-2 victory over Hillingdon Borough at Wembley. The Bucks beat Weymouth 3-2 on aggregate in the Southern League Cup final and won 5-2 at Walton & Hersham to reach the FA Cup second round for the second time.

1981/82

Telford United finished third in the Conference in 1981/82, the club's highest ever position. They kicked off with a 2-0 defeat at Bath City but lost just one of their next 11 games. Dave Mather scored four times in a 7-1 demolition of Frickley Athletic and Mark Neale grabbed a hat-trick in a 4-3 win over Altrincham in consecutive home matches in February. Just one defeat in their last 10 games, including a 4-1 win over Boston United, saw them finish third behind Runcorn and Enfield. They lost 1-0 to eventual winners Enfield in the FA Trophy third round. Dave Mather was top scorer with 22 goals, while Kevin Charlton and Tony Turner were ever-present.

1982/83

United won the FA Trophy for the second time in 1982/83. Stan Storton's side beat Burton Albion, Spennymoor United, Scarborough, Dartford and Harrow

Borough en route to the FA Trophy final. Two goals by Dave Mather gave Telford a 2-1 victory over Northwich Victoria at Wembley. They also beat Wigan Athletic in the FA Cup first round - their first ever win over Football League opposition in the competition - then took Tranmere Rovers to a second round replay.

1983/84

The Bucks beat three Football League clubs en route to the FA Cup fourth round in 1983/84. Stan Storton's side defeated Stockport County 3-0, Northampton Town 3-2 and Rochdale 4-1 in the FA Cup before losing 3-2 at Derby County. Telford reached the Bob Lord Trophy semi-finals before losing to Barnet and lost their grip on the FA Trophy with a 2-0 quarter-final replay defeat at Marine. Colin Williams, Dean Edwards and Dave Mather scored 51 goals between them.

1984/85

United beat four Football League clubs en route to the FA Cup fifth round in 1984/85. They defeated Lincoln City 2-1, Preston 4-1, Bradford City 2-1 and Darlington 3-0 in the FA Cup before losing 3-0 to holders Everton in front of 47,402 at Goodison Park. Telford were only the fourth non-league club to reach the FA Cup fifth round since the war. Mark Hancock was Player of the Year, while Kevin Charlton and skipper Tony Turner were both ever-present.

1987/88

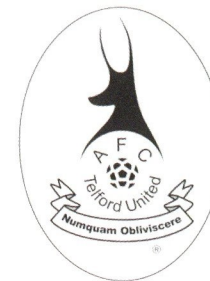
Telford were FA Trophy finalists for the fourth time in 1987/88. Stan Storton's side defeated Buxton, Wealdstone, Stafford Rangers, Cheltenham Town and Wokingham Town en route to the FA Trophy final. They were held to a 0-0 draw by Enfield at Wembley before losing 3-2 in the replay at The Hawthorns. They won 10 times in 11 matches in mid-season, including a 4-0 demolition of Enfield. Top scorer Steve Norris joined Scarborough for a record fee.

1988/89

Telford won the FA Trophy for the third time in 1988/89. They defeated Witton Albion, Yeovil Town, Kidderminster Harriers, Newcastle Blue Star and Hyde United to reach the FA Trophy final for the second consecutive season. Ian Crawley scored in extra-time to clinch a 1-0 victory over Macclesfield Town at Wembley. They also took Carlisle United to an FA Cup first round replay but finished 16th in the Conference.



1991/92

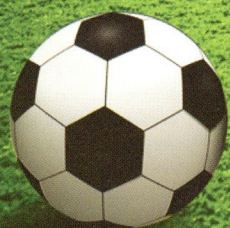
Gerry Daly plotted United's FA Cup first round replay win over Stoke City in 1991/92. They drew 0-0 at the Victoria Ground before Ian Benbow scored twice in their 2-1 replay victory at the Bucks Head. Telford lost 1-0 at home to Wrexham in the second round. They lost just two of their first 10 Conference games and went second with a 4-1 victory over Stafford in late September but finished sixth. Eventual winners Colchester defeated them 4-0 in the FA Trophy quarter-finals.

2010/11

AFC Telford won the Blue Square North Play-Off final in 2010/11. Andy Sinton's side finished runners-up to Alfreton Town, winning 5-0 at home to Corby Town and Hyde and also at Gainsborough Trinity. They lost just two matches at home, against Boston United and Solihull Moors, and two away, against Eastwood Town and Blyth Spartans. Andy Brown was top scorer with 14 goals and they kept 14 clean sheets in their 20 away games. The Bucks beat Nuneaton Town 3-2 on aggregate in the Play-Off semi-finals before goals from Sean Newton, Liam Murray and Phil Trainer clinched a dramatic 3-2 victory over Guiseley in the Play-Off final, watched by 5,436 at the New Bucks Head.

OPENING DAY HONOURS SHARED

Paul Buckle's men clawed their way back from two goals down to earn an opening day draw with Gateshead at Kenilworth Road, with goals from Stuart Fleetwood and debutant Jon Shaw sealing a comeback in a strong second-half display.

Two-nil down at half-time after a muted first-half display, the Hatters came out for the second half with real vigour and attacking intent, but fell just short of picking up the three points they wanted after giving themselves too much to do against a strong and well-organised Heed side.

The Tynesiders stunned the majority of the 6,700 crowd at Kenilworth Road when Liam Hatch nodded home a left-wing corner on 25 minutes. And worse followed 10 minutes later when Hatch's strike-partner Yemi Odubade sped through to slip a fine finish underneath Mark Tyler to double the visitors' advantage.

Buckle made two changes at half-time, introducing Alex Lawless and former Tynesider Shaw and it was the striker who got the Town back in the game when he struck just after the hour to make it 2-1.

Now confidence was flowing through the Hatters and it came as no surprise when Fleetwood fired a fine finish into the corner of the net 10 minutes later to bring the scores level.

Afterwards Buckle felt his side showed great character to come back from two goals down to earn a point. "The first half was definitely one to forget," he

told Hatters Player afterwards. "It didn't look anything like us from pre-season and it seemed to me that the players wanted too much time on the ball. There wasn't enough purpose about us.

"We've been undone for the first goal by a set-piece which is sloppy, and it's a reminder to the players that if you concede the first goal at Kenilworth Road it's very difficult. But we showed fabulous character and the fans stuck with us – and we could have won it."

Trailing at the break Buckle felt he had no option to make the two changes. "I will always go for it," Buckle said. "It was killing me to be 2-0 down at half-time. We came in and there were a lot of faces down but, it's a good saying of ours, 'there's nothing on the floor, so heads up'.

"Both changes were tactical and with Jon up there we looked a different a completely different team. In the first half we were trying to score the perfect goal but once Jon was on we could hit him and everyone could join in.

"I've said before if we're going to succeed this season we're going to have to mix it up and I'm delighted we've shown so much character to come back from two down and draw. It's a great reminder of what this league is all about and we've shown the strength of character to come through it.

"There's a lot of positives and it's only the first game of the season."

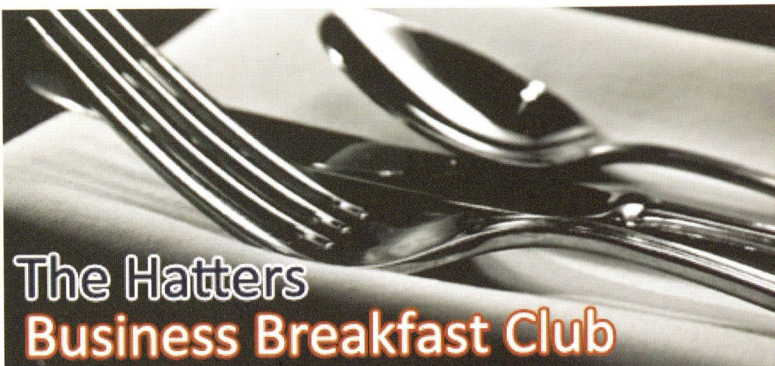

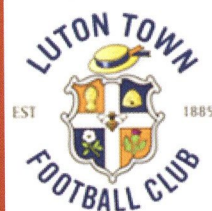

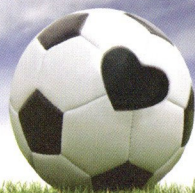

LATE COMEBACK EARNS VICTORY

The Town battled back from behind to go top of the Blue Square Bet Premier with a hard-earned win at Hyde.

After both sides had gone close to opening the scoring in the first half, it was the Tigers who took the lead on 55 minutes when former Hatters loanee Matthew Blinkhorn turned on the edge of the box and finished well past Mark Tyler who, despite getting a glove on the ball, could not keep it out. In response, Paul Buckle made two substitutes in quick succession; introducing Jake Howells and Andre Gray for Greg Taylor and Yaser Kasim.

The Town were finding it tough going and looked unlikely to find a way back into the game until JJ O'Donnell stepped in on 69 minutes.

Jon Shaw battled for the ball and worked it into the path of Scott Rendell, who showed patient play to feed O'Donnell and he arrowed a low shot goal-wards that fizzed past the motionless David Carnell in the Hyde goal. It was the young midfielder's first goal for the club.

Tyler played a crucial role – darting way outside of his box in sweeper-esque fashion to mop up the danger and pass to Henry. The skipper then threaded a fine ball down the line to Gray who raced down the wing, looked up and swept an inch-perfect pass into the path of Fleetwood whose first-time finish beat Carnell and completed the turnaround.

Afterwards, Buckle again praised his side's character as they came from a goal down to earn victory.

He said: "I'm pleased we've won – we've come through two difficult games with six points. The players deserve a massive pat on the back. Tonight showed we have some tremendous characters.

"Sloppy play on the edge of our box led to their goal but in truth, especially in the first half, we were making all the running and creating chances.

"When you don't get the first goal it's always hard, but we remained patient and the supporters helped us – I thought they were first class again tonight – coming to Hyde on a Friday night and that's why we went over to them at the end because they played a vital role.

"We showed our desire tonight. I'm trying to instil a winning mentality and a grit and determination, and you know if you baulk at places like Hyde then you'll get rolled over.

"We showed that we can mix it up and I'm proud that we're top of the league tonight.



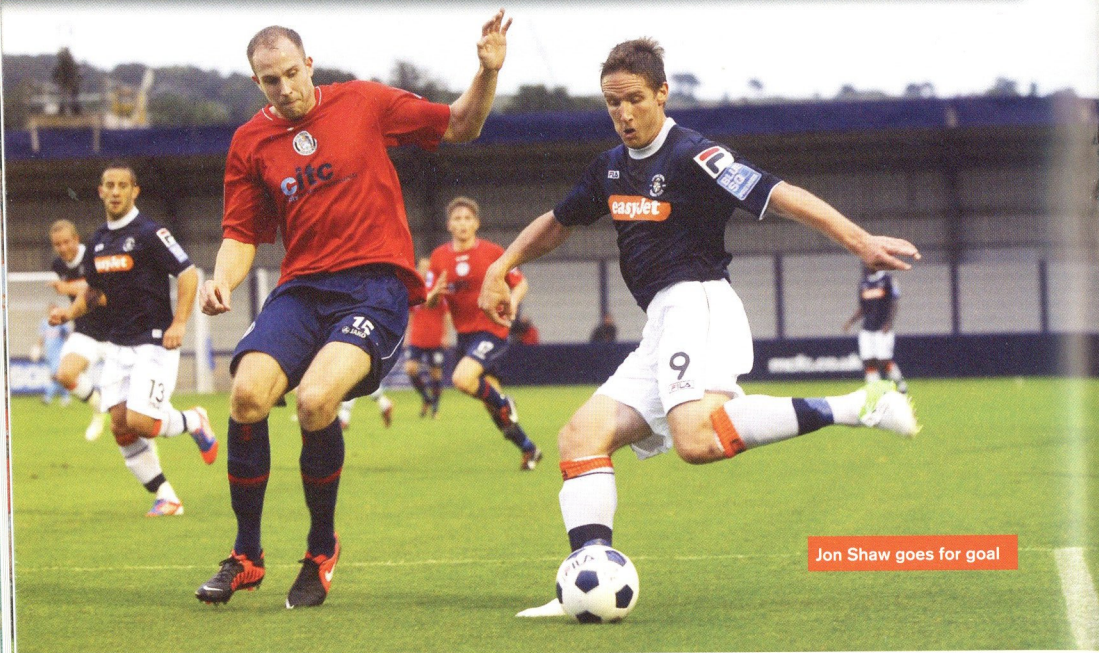

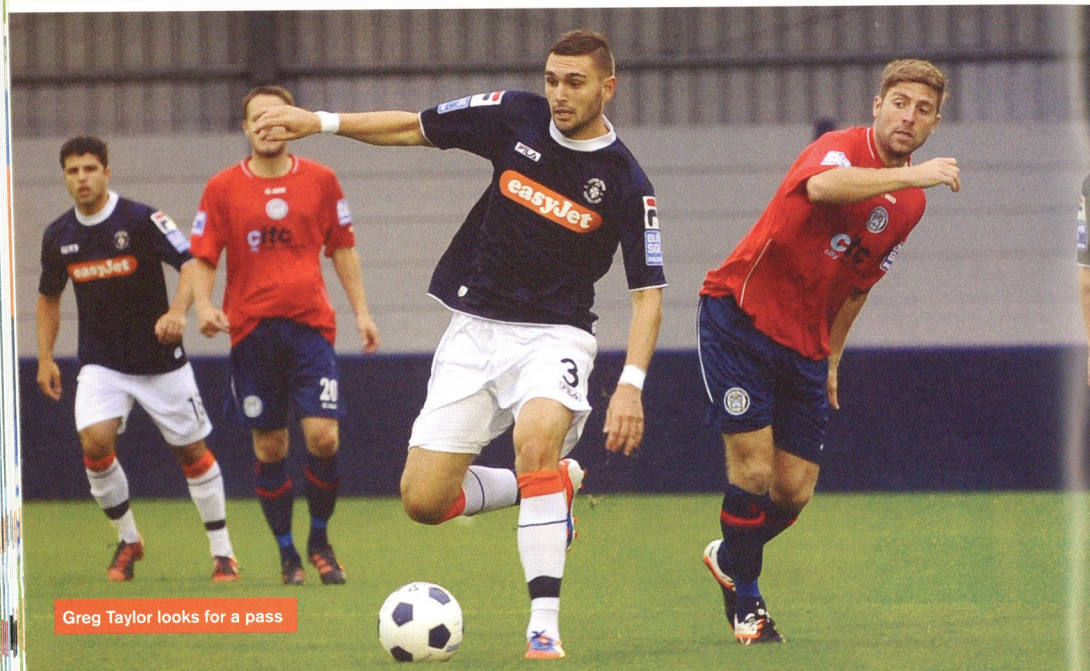

Two first-half goals from Stuart Fleetwood gave the Hatters their first victory of the season at Kidderminster.

The striker scored two fine goals in the space of seven minutes to extend the Hatters fine record at Aggborough – this was their fifth win in the last six visits to this part of Worcestershire.

It was no more than the Town deserved with Fleetwood opening the scoring on 23 minutes, finishing coolly following an intricate move involving JJ O'Donnell and Scott Rendell.

His second was even better. With nothing on, he turned to hit a stunning low, curling shot from the edge of the area beyond the home goalkeeper Danny Lewis.

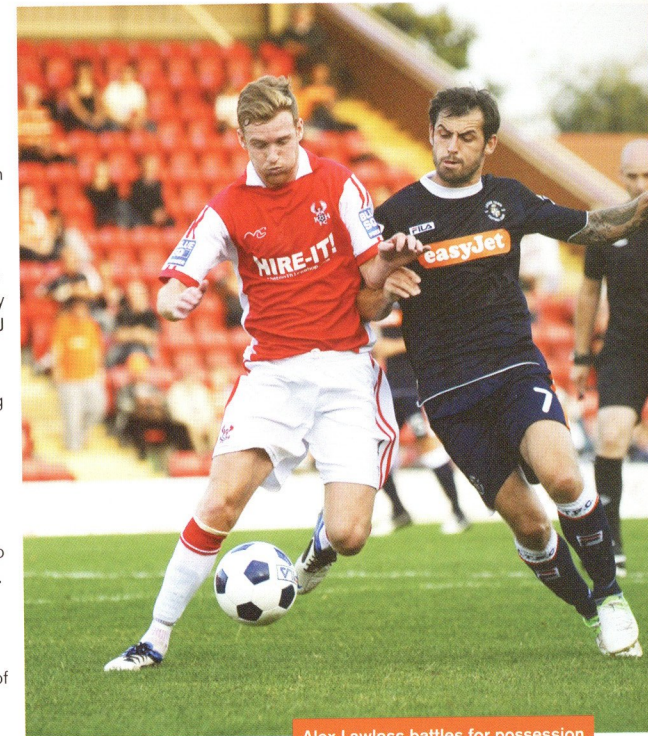
Harriers, who had rarely threatened in the first half, came out all guns blazing in the second half but failed to call Mark Tyler into a meaningful save.

O'Donnell, Jon Shaw, Alex Lawless and Fleetwood all came close to adding to the tally, including an effort from the latter that skimmed the top of the crossbar.

But it mattered not – the Town were always comfortably in control despite Harriers' efforts, and held on to secure a deserved victory – banishing the disappointment of the first half on Saturday.

Town boss Paul Buckle felt he got the response he was looking for from his side having been unimpressed with the 2-2 draw with Gateshead on Saturday – and two goals from Fleetwood at Aggborough delighted the boss.

"I got a response for the whole 90 minutes," he said afterwards. "We started well and we begun like we were in the mood not to be second best. We worked hard and got our reward and I thought we were magnificent. I told the players we need to be nasty and to grind out victories away from home and in the end we made it look easy because we were doing the right things well."

"We've set the benchmark and got a good three points against a good side, and the key is to continue that and build on it at Hyde on Friday."

Buckle revealed that it was a hard decision to give goal hero Fleetwood the nod to start over Andre Gray, who was dropped to the bench in favour of Shaw.

"It was a tough call," he said. "In the end I went with Stuart because he scored one and made one on Saturday – but he wasn't by any means on it at the weekend."

"Before the game I asked him if he still believed in himself and he said he did. After all, his record in this division speaks for itself and the two goals he scored were excellent."

TOWN TREASURES

CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH DELVES DEEP INTO
HIS VAST COLLECTION OF HATTERS MEMORABILIA

Featured today is a remarkably well preserved poster advertising a match at the old Dunstable Road ground 112 years ago.

This was to be no ordinary game though, as the Town were entering a new chapter in their history by re-joining the Southern League following their failure to establish themselves as a major force in the national, but northern-dominated, Football League.

Founder members of the Southern League in 1894, the Town had finished runners-up to Millwall in each of their first two seasons and then felt ready to make the step up, but their assumption that they would be accepted by the Football League was dealt a savage blow when they were not elected.

The Town therefore had to play a season in the United League before their eventual elevation in 1897. Sadly, the Football League Division Two was not all it seemed, as, with only Woolwich Arsenal south of Leicester, travel costs were huge and as the team was not really strong enough, crowds dwindled away leaving the club in a parlous financial state.

In 1900, after three years of declining fortune, the Town did not seek re-election and instead went cap in hand back to the Southern League who, thankfully, accepted us back into the fold.

In the four years the Town had been away, the Southern League had grown progressively stronger, as proved by visitors on the opening day of the 1900/01 season, Southampton, who reached the FA Cup final the season before.

Re-joining the Southern League was not only sound financial sense but it seemed to rejuvenate the Luton supporters and there was an expectant crowd of "upwards of 4,000" who generated gate receipts of £105 for the clash with the Saints. This attendance was in direct contrast to those of the back-end of the previous season which had dipped as low as 1,000.

With seven players making their Luton debuts that day, it was felt that the team would take time to settle so it came as a surprise when Bill Molyneux fired the Town into an early lead.

Southampton were a strong side though, and were 3-1 up at the interval but, although better footballers, they were second best when it came to passion and, when Jimmy Blessington netted the Town's equaliser in the second half, after Molyneux had earlier reduced the arrears, a point was on the cards.

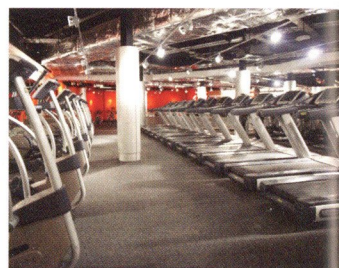
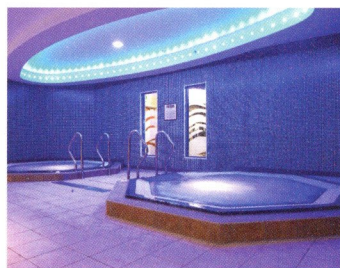
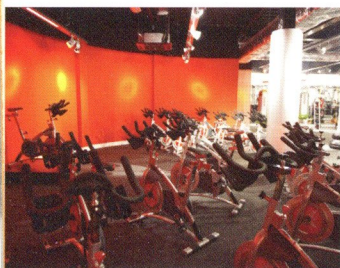
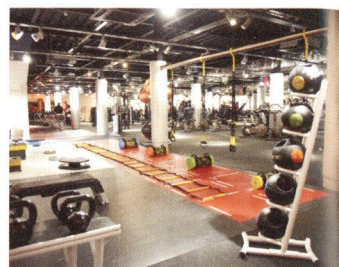
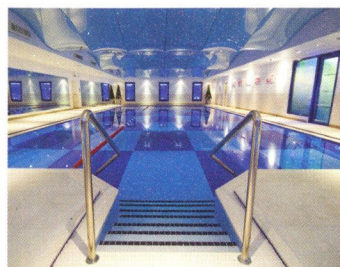

THE RECORD

The Town have a mixed record on this day in history. Of the 14 games played, the Hatters have won six, drawn three and lost five. The first was played back in 1923 when Swansea Town (as the Swans were then known) beat the Hatters 1-0 at Vetch Field. The most recent game came in 2007 when Gillingham were seen off at Kenilworth Road by three goals to one.

OPENING DAY DRAW

In 1990, the Hatters opened their First Division (now Premier League) campaign with a 1-1 draw against Crystal Palace at Kenilworth Road. Iain Dowie got the Town's goal.

PLAYING THE PIRATES

The Town have twice faced Bristol Rovers at the Memorial Ground on this day in recent years. The most recent was a 3-2 defeat in 2001. Matt Taylor and Lee Mansell were on target for the Town. In 1999, Rovers secured their place in the second round of the League Cup after a 2-2 draw.

FELLED AT FOREST

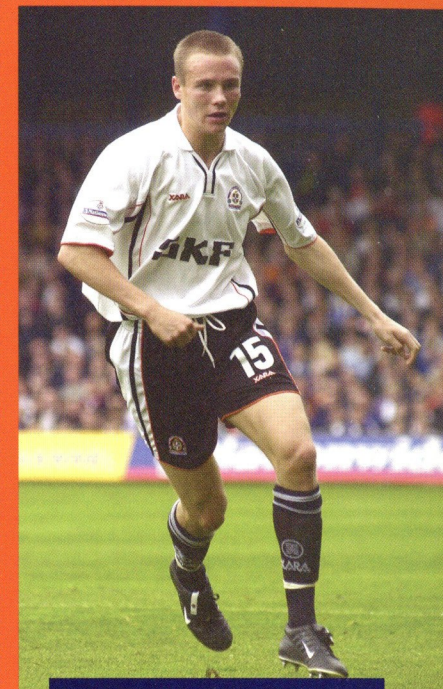
Hatters supporters who travelled back from the City Ground in 1973 would have been wondering what lie in store for the season ahead after watching a 4-0 defeat to Nottingham Forest. In a great example that it doesn't always matter how you fair on the first game of the season, the Town went on to finish runners-up and win promotion to the top flight.

AWAY THE LADS

Two of the Town's six wins have come away from Kenilworth Road on this day. A 1-0 victory at Bury came in 1951 in the Second Division (now Championship), whilst a 2-1 win at Charlton followed five years later in the old First Division.

NAUGHTY NEWELL

The Hatters began the 2002/03 season with Mike Newell in charge, the season before he guided the club to the League 1 title. But he was in the officials' bad books following a 2-0 defeat against Brighton at the Withdean when he stepped out of his technical

area to stop a ball from running out of play. "The ball had gone out. I was just trying to stop it so that I could get the ball back into play," Newell said afterwards. "The ref said I stepped outside the technical area. There was nowhere for me to sit, so I had to stand in the tunnel for the rest of the game." To compound the misery, Chris Coyne scored an own goal and Steve Howard was sent-off for foul and abusive language.

KENILWORTH COMFORTS

The Hatters have only lost one of seven home games on this date – a 3-2 defeat to Rotherham in 1962. The four victories include a 1-0 success over Brighton in 1928, a 2-1 win over Orient in 1979 (Bob Hatton and Ricky Hill on target) and a 2-0 victory over Stoke in 1984 (Steve Elliott and Frankie Bunn with the goals).

REACTION

BITTER-SWEET DEBUT FOR SHAW

For new signing Jon Shaw, the 2-2 draw against his former employers on Saturday was bitter-sweet.

The Hatters' new number nine hauled his side back into contention with a 61st-minute debut strike against Gateshead, before Stuart Fleetwood's equaliser wiped out the visitors' two-goal advantage. And after such a disastrous first-half display, the 28-year-old was content to take a point on the opening day.

"I don't think we deserved to win on the evidence of our first half display," Shaw told Hatters Player. "It's a bitter-sweet day for me though, it was good to get a goal and, in the end, we have to be slightly happy with the result."

Perfect season?

"We'll go back and work on the things we didn't do so well with and in some ways it's good that mistakes have been highlighted now, at this early stage."

"We can brush up on things and come back stronger. It's a long season and you never know we might look back

on the point come the end of the season and realise how important it was having been 2-0 down.

"Everyone wants to have a perfect season but that's almost impossible, we'll take a point after what happened in the first half."

Surprise

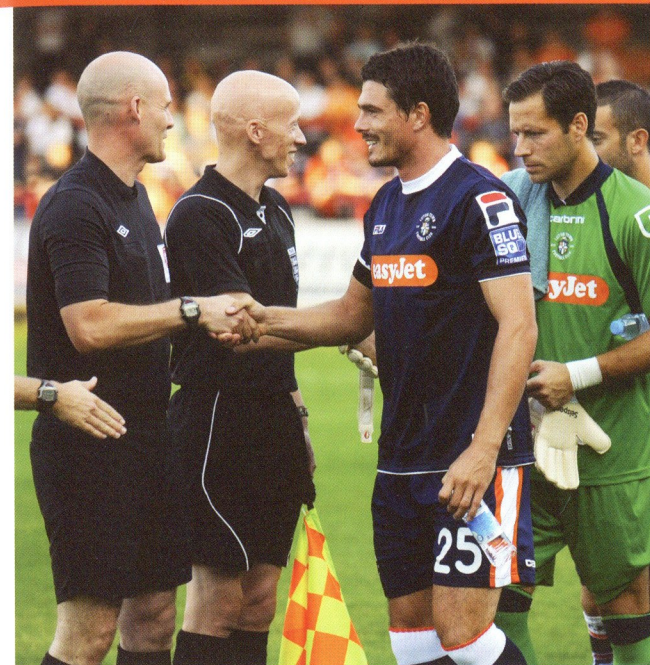
After 35 goals last season – which included one bullet header against the Town – it may have come as a surprise to some to see the striker lurking six yards out for a tap-in.

"I suppose everyone expects me to score the kind of goal I scored against Orient," Shaw continued. "It's a rare one for me to score at such close range but with the quality we have you need to be in the box and ready, and it was a great ball from Stuart Fleetwood."

"I was hoping to come on at some point in the second half, perhaps if we were 1-0 or 2-0 up, and play a role in a win but in the end we showed great character to come back and get a point."

REACTION

SKIPPER PLEASED WITH SHUTOUT



Captain Ronnie Henry was delighted the Hatters kept a clean sheet to ensure a comfortable first win of the season at Kidderminster.

The Town won 2-0 thanks to two goals from striker Stuart Fleetwood, but defender Henry felt Paul Buckle's decision to swap him, Lathaniel Rowe-Turner and Greg Taylor in defence helped the Hatters' cause at Aggborough.

Natural

He told Hatters Player: "It felt more natural, but then again in pre-season I was playing centre-half keeping clean sheets against Championship sides and it felt natural then."

"It's fine, Taylor left-back, Rowe-Turner at centre-half with Janos, and me right-back."

"It's all our natural positions apart from Lathaniel. He's a good centre-half and a good left-back."

"I don't think we really mind where we play but I'm sure a lot of people will say that's our natural positions and I'm sure a lot of people will say they're our best positions."

The skipper, who played a key role in the Stevenage side that won back-to-back promotions in recent seasons, doesn't mind where he plays – as long as the Hatters are winning.

"It doesn't bother me," he said. "Wherever we're told to play the lads are happy with that, they'll get their heads down, get on with it and get the job done, like we did."

"It's a big difference, there's a lot more leg work. I can get up and down the line. It's something that naturally comes to me and I've done it in League 1 and League 2."

"It doesn't bother me, centre-half, right-back – I enjoy right-back."

"I prefer to get my legs going for as long as I can. If we keep going like we are we will be OK."

After the disappointing first half against Gateshead in the season opener, Henry praised the Town's character to bounce back and earn four points from the first two games.

"It hit us quite hard against Gateshead that we conceded two sloppy goals, which we hadn't done in pre-season," he said.

"It was a massive shock. When you keep clean sheets regularly and one goes in, it's a big shock but you've got to get over it quickly."

"To concede two goals is unlike us, but the lads have bounced back tremendously to come away with a 2-0 result, and it could have been more."

Nixon – then playing for Curzon Ashton – wanted a bit of the Sierra Sapphire lifestyle, and went straight to Maine Road, then home of his beloved Manchester City, after finishing his shift.

Met by City legends Tony Book, Denis Law and Ken Barnes in reception, he asked for a trial. A scout watched him

play in the North West Counties League the following day, then invited him to play in a reserve game at the stadium where he had watched his heroes from a being small boy.

To cut a long story short, Nixon earned a contract and went onto play 84 times for the Sky Blues. He then enjoyed great success at Tranmere Rovers, earning cult status over a decade, and Stockport before more recently working as goalkeeper coach at Fleetwood and now Macclesfield.

Picking up my the NLP after returning home last weekend, I then read an excellent interview my colleague Matt Badcock had done with current Stockport player Joe Connor.

After eight years studying and playing soccer in America, the 26-year-old returned to his native Stockport last November with his pregnant wife and child.

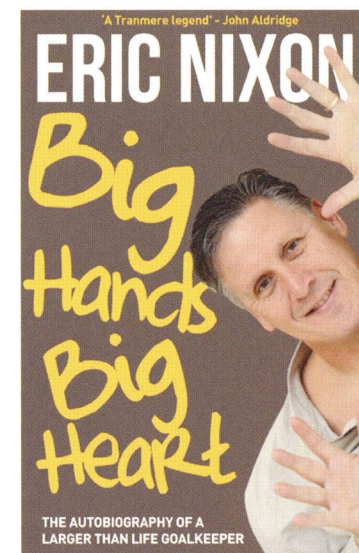
His granddad Jack and dad Jim had both played for County, so after seeing Stockport had been hammered 7-0 at Grimsby, he thought "I'm going to see if I can go and play for them".

The midfielder turned up at the training ground, asked if he could join in and was told 'No'. But he stayed to watch to "see what the standard was like", and when they needed an extra man, he was invited onto the training pitch.

Now, I did actually enjoy my holiday. And the wine wasn't half good.

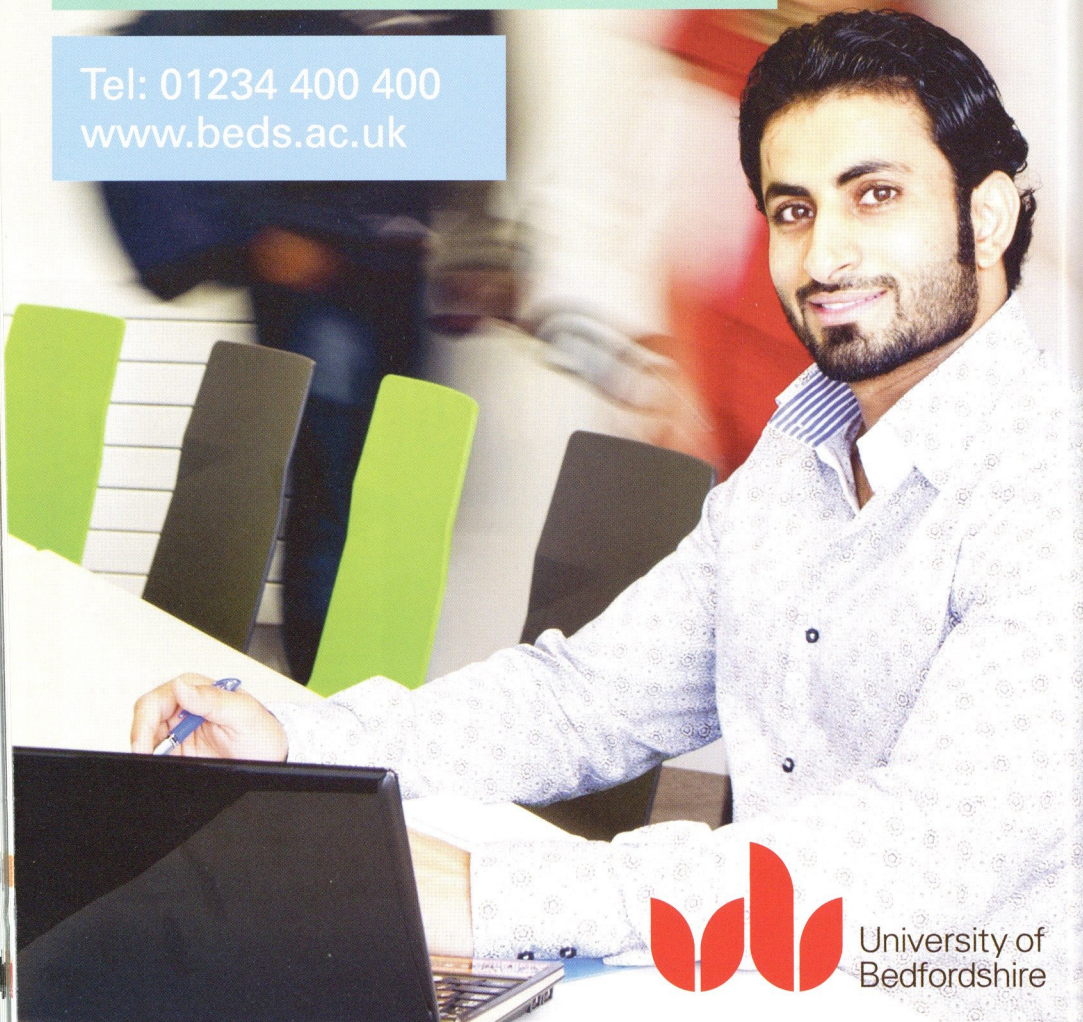
But it's equally refreshing to be back and able to report on rags-to-riches – or at least trialist-to-talisman – tales such as Eric and Joe's as another fine season matures!

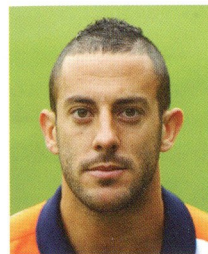

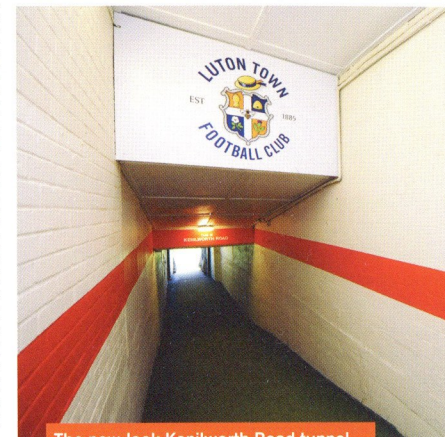

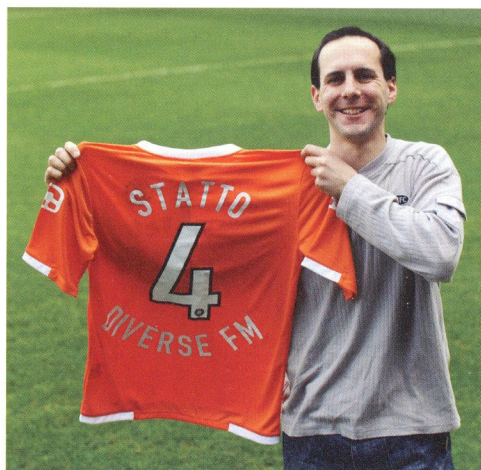
An unbeaten record at Kidderminster was continued, courtesy of two more goals from Fleetwood, and for Diverse FM it marked the beginning of a new era.

ON YOUR MARKS

It's fair to say it's been a steady start. Who wouldn't have taken two wins and one draw from the first three games? Especially after that first half against Gateshead. There's been plenty of talk about that first 45 against the Tynesiders - hopefully that's the last.

Looking back at the three previous seasons in the Blue Square Bet Premier, we have always enjoyed a decent start to each campaign.

Our first, in 2009/10 under Mick Harford, the team did not lose for eight games - winning four and drawing four - before succumbing to a 2-0 defeat at a packed Kassam Stadium against promotion rivals Oxford.

Top of the pile

Two seasons ago, the Town were top of the pile at this stage with a 100 per cent record from three games following victories over Altrincham, Kettering and Fleetwood. The fourth match in the sequence saw Newport County earn a point at Kenilworth Road (Charlie Henry scoring for the Exiles) before the unbeaten start came crashing to an end in the fifth game at Tamworth.

And then we have last season, unbeaten for the first 10 games, split between five wins and five draws, before a calamitous first half against York that saw the Minstermen record a comfortable 3-0 victory and knock the Town off top spot in the process.

Football is full of clichés - they say a good start is vital - but then it's not how you start it's how you finish. For the Town of course, the past three seasons have ended in heartache in the Play-Offs, twice at the very final hurdle, and I'm not sure we can all take a fourth successive season of that.

Top flight

Expectation is understandably high but it's worth remembering it's early days. Elsewhere in this programme, you'll read that once the Town began a season with a 4-0 defeat at Nottingham Forest in 1973/74 - but still went onto finish the season as runners-up and win promotion to the top flight.

I wasn't around then but can still remember wretched starts to seasons in more recent times. Three successive defeats at the start of 1996/97 before we finished third; even worse, five successive defeats in 2002/03 under Joe Kinnear before a mid-table finish was achieved.

I was also recently reminded of Norwich City's opening day 7-1 home defeat to Colchester a few years back in League 1, before they went on to march to the title nine months later.

It just goes to show football is a funny old game and, apologies for talking in clichés again, but it really shows titles aren't won or lost in August.

All I say is just enjoy the ride!

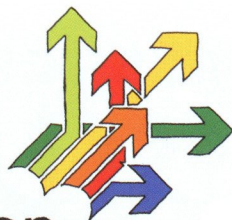

Stephens missing from the defence through injury and this is going to affect games in a big way.

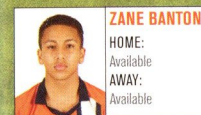

"We must be more clinical in front of goal going forward if we are to have the impact on the league that we are capable of."

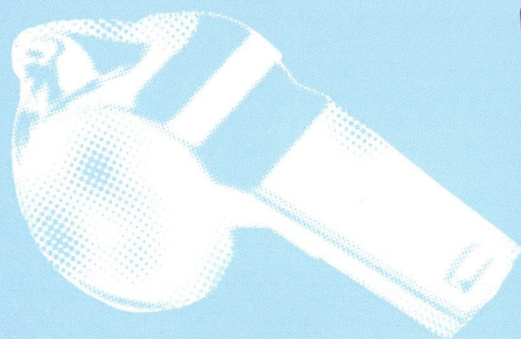

Pre-season favourites Mansfield Town have endured a nightmare start to their promotion campaign with back-to-back defeats but salvaged a win against win-



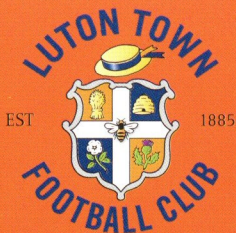

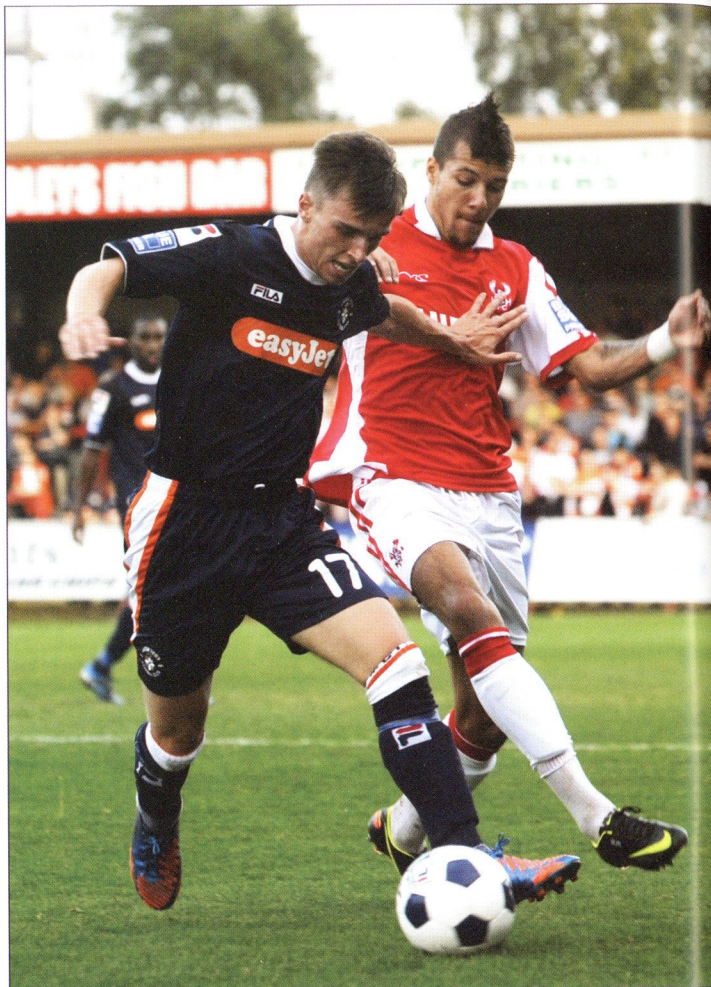

Where: Not far away, I can tell you. Ebbsfleet play in Northfleet, a small settlement on the outskirts of Gravesend which is just 60.5 miles around the M25 clockwise, over the Dartford crossing and into Kent.

Sorry, where? There is no such place as Ebbsfleet, per se. The football team play in Gravesend (and, admittedly always have done). The club used to be called Gravesend and Northfleet but the name change came about in 2007 to coincide with the opening of the new Ebbsfleet International EuroStar station.

Still don't know where I'm going: M1 south, M25 anti-clockwise. Come off M25 at junction at junction 1a and follow signs for Gravesend. It's only five miles away from the junction with the M25. Carefully punching in DA11 9GN into your sat-nav should do the trick for you drivers out there or the Bobbers coach will take you there. That's a lot to write about getting there, it's only 60 miles: We know, but we want as many Luton fans there as possible. It's a Bank Holiday Monday and, if the weather's good, we could have almost 1,500 fans there. Hint, hint.

Costa-del-Ebbs eet then? Not quite, the old ground Stonebridge Road was built in 1905 – the same year that Kenilworth Road opened. Typically the away end has no cover but it's 80 degree heat it might be nice. If not, bring a brolly.

Sounds good to me: Okay, well if you really like it, why not become a member of the Ebbsfleet board. Since February 2008 the club has been owned by MyFootballClub.com, whose members vote on player transfers, budgets and ticket prices, among other things, instead of those decisions being made exclusively by the club's management and staff, like at most other clubs. However, I'm sure signing up in the next 48 hours and suggesting to pick their centre-half in goal will get approved.

We've been here before, right? Yep, twice – and what's more we've scored eight goals in those two games. It's probably best to mention the 2-2 draw last season first (we were 2-0 up with 10 minutes left) but forget that for a second – remember the incredible 6-1 win in March 2010? Trailing 1-0 at half-time to Janos Kovacs own goal (sorry Janos), the Hatters' second half performance blew the hosts away. Claude Gnaka led the way with a hat-trick and strikers Tom Craddock, Kevin Gallen and Matthew Barnes-Homer also hit the target.

So shall we expect goals? Most definitely. The Fleet won 5-4 at Nuneaton on the opening day of the season. As we know, games between the Town and Ebbsfleet invariably serve up goals. We've mentioned the 6-1 win and 2-2 draw at Stonebridge Road but, at Kenilworth Road, the Town won 3-0 last season but lost 3-2 in January 2010. What are the odds on a 0-0 please?
