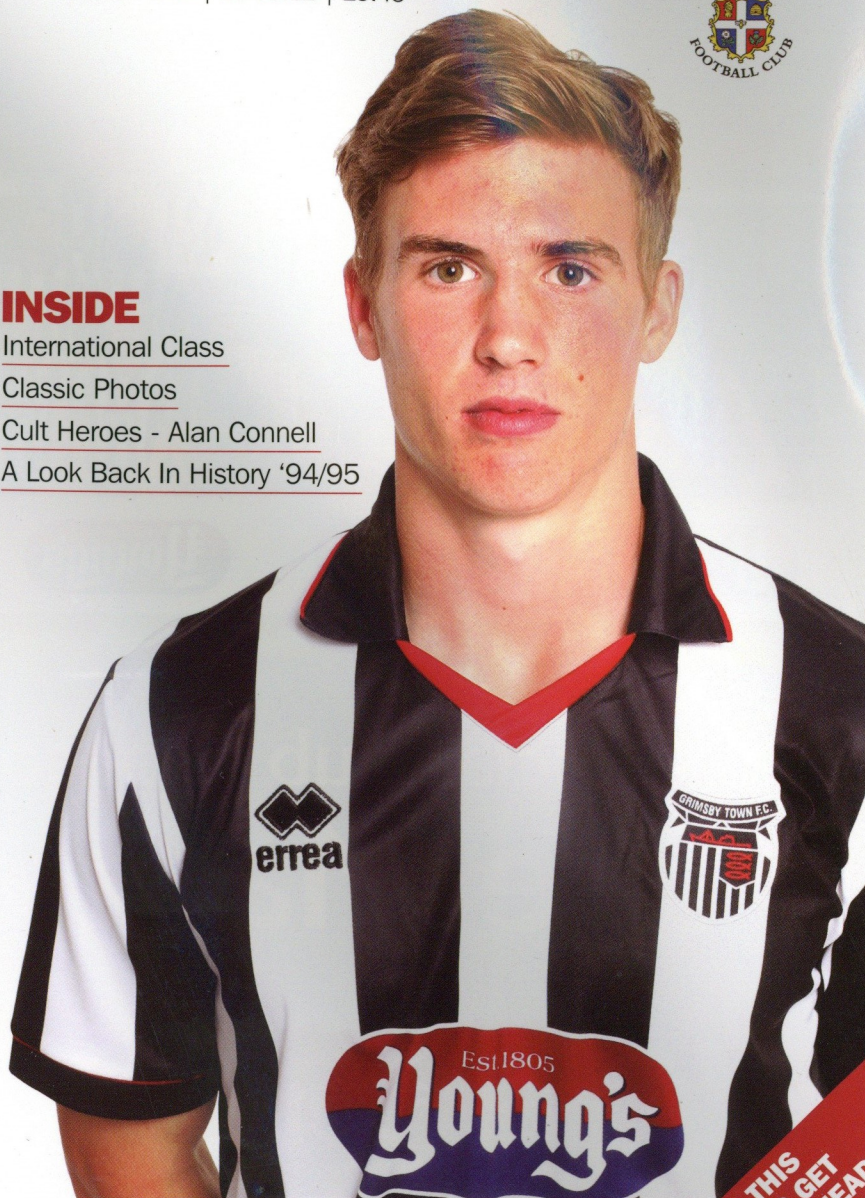

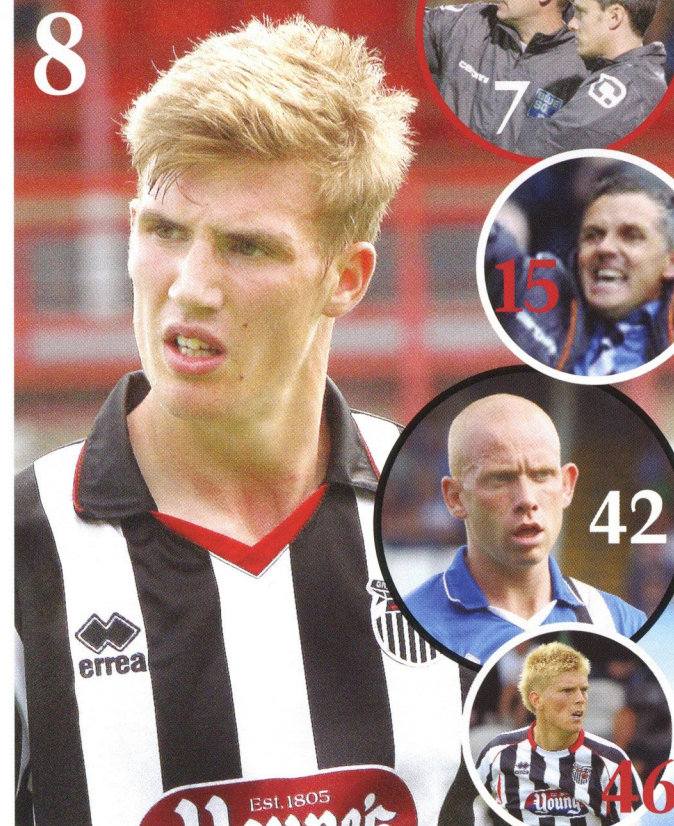

Think of a time when you were the angriest you've ever been at a football match," asked a wizened old man who used to sit next to me when I had a season ticket in the Pontoon. Talk about an open ended question to kick start a conversation! He was clearly an experienced campaigner and I knew at this point that I would have to come out with something quite spectacular to usurp whatever he was going to weigh in with.

I looked at his face in an attempt to determine his age. I didn't look for too long because it could have got weird. I narrowed my eyes and brought my right hand up to my chin to show that I was thinking about something and not admiring his ancient charm. If I knew how old he was, I could perhaps anticipate what he had in mind.

The trouble is, I've always been terrible at judging people's ages. I wasn't that good to begin with but I lost all confidence in any ability I might have had when I insulted my next-door neighbour by putting him down as a 40-year old. It turns out his more of a 28-year old and now he parks his car a little further across the entrance to my driveway.

Someone once told me you could work out the age of a Grimsby Town fan by counting the number of wrinkles they have on their forehead – a bit like counting the rings on a tree trunk. We each have our own reasons why one event made us angrier than another. Given the way the last decade has gone, it makes me wonder if North East Lincolnshire isn't just a permanent pit of anger.

The angriest I ever got at a football match (for the record) was when Michael Ryan officiated a game between Town and Bradford at Blundell Park in February 2002. He was the referee who sent off Rob Taylor for kicking thin air and allowed Benito Carbone three minutes to celebrate with the Bradford fans after he scored direct from a free-kick that Ryan had moved forwards 10 yards before John McDermott mouthed off. I know, I know!

Having given up guessing the man's age and experience, I had decided that I was going to tell him about the day Michael Ryan tried to ruin my life. But before I could even begin my tale, he added: "I guarantee that it doesn't beat the anger you feel when you bite the inside of your mouth."

I thought about Michael Ryan – I even thought about Mark Clattenberg – and I thought about the last time I bit the inside of my mouth. And I realised that the wizened old man was dead right.

Young Grimsby Town striker Dayle Southwell is thoroughly enjoying his start to the 2012/13 season and is relishing the prospect of playing an even bigger part in the Mariners' campaign going forward.

The only member of last season's youth squad to earn a professional deal at Blundell Park, Dayle has quickly gone about establishing himself as an important member of Rob Scott and Paul Hurst's squad, despite being just 18 years of age.

Of course the teenage forward is no stranger to first team action, having made his debut in a 2-0 win at Mansfield Town in April 2011.

He recalled: "It came as a real surprise to me when the managers called me and told me I would be travelling with the first team to Mansfield and it was an even bigger surprise when I got to play the last few minutes of the game.

"You have to remember that I was just a first-year YT at the time and, even though that first year had gone well and I was scoring plenty of goals, I never expected to get the call-up at that stage."

He continued: "Once you have had the taste of first team action, you want more of it and it certainly gave me a boost going into last season, especially as the managers took the time out to call me in and talk to me about their expectations of me and make sure that I knew I was in their plans."

And it didn't take long for the Mariners' youngster to make an impression last season, netting his first senior goal, a well-taken header, in the FA Cup Fourth Qualifying

Round victory over Ashington AFC at Blundell Park in October. It is a moment the 18-year-old remembers fondly.

"It was great to get back out with the first team and even better to net my first goal," he stated.

"It was a dream come true for me and one I have dreamt of for a long time.

"I would say it is the best moment of my career so far; there is nothing better than scoring on your home pitch in front of your own fans."

Whilst making fleeting appearances for the senior team, Dayle was also scoring regularly for the youth team but a number of factors combined to halt his momentum at the turn of the year.

He said: "I got injured towards the end of the year and then, when I returned, some of the youth team games were postponed.

"Then I was involved with the first team squad on a lot of Saturdays without getting a game, so it meant I went a long time without playing any football.

"When I got back into action I felt a bit rusty and I have to admit that I didn't think I had done enough to earn a deal at the end of the season."

But Dayle impressed in a 16-minute cameo on the final day of the campaign against Southport and was soon penning his first professional contract at Blundell Park. It was an opportunity he was determined to make the most of.

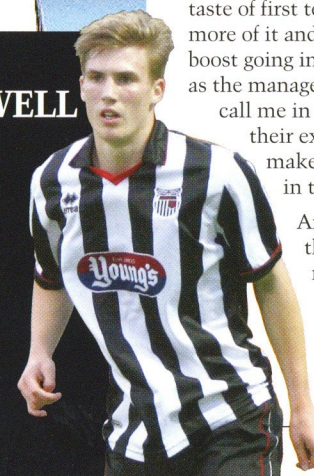

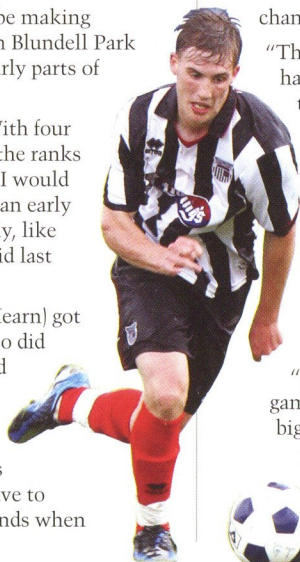
He declared: "I was delighted that the managers gave me the chance to prove myself and I went away for the summer determined to come back as fit as I have ever been."

"They (Rob Scott and Paul Hurst) have been excellent with me and spoken to me lots and give me some really good advice."

But with last season's 45-goal duo of Anthony Elding and Liam Hearn, as well as new signings Greg Pearson and Andy Cook in front of him, Dayle admits that he was expecting to be making inroads away from Blundell Park – at least in the early parts of the season.

He continued: "With four senior strikers in the ranks as well, I thought I would be going out on loan early in the season really, like Sam (Mulready) did last season."

"But first Liam (Hearn) got injured and then so did Greg (Pearson) and all of a sudden I found myself really in the picture and that is something you have to grab with both hands when it comes."



And Dayle did that in fine fashion by netting his first league goal in the 2-0 win at Hereford United earlier this month.

He said: "I came on very early and I was expecting the managers to wave Elds (Anthony Elding) on but they asked me to go out there and I had a chance straight away."

"I was a bit more prepared for the second one and I knew that if I could get a yard in front of the centre half, I could work the space and get a shot in and that if I kept it low it would have a great chance of going in."

"Thankfully that is what happened and it set us on the way for an excellent win."

In the following game at Barrow, Dayle was given his first full start for the club and he admits he found it hard on a night where substitute Elding rescued a point for Town with a brace.

"It was a tough, tough game. They were two really big centre halves who gave you nothing," he stated.

"They were hard to get around but thankfully Elds came on and we

got a point from a game where it looked like we would end up with nothing."

And Dayle reserved praise for the former Boston man, who he credits with being a big influence on his career.

He continued: "Elds is great to play alongside. He is always talking to you and advising you and even in training he takes you to one side and teaches you little things that help your game – you can't help but learn from a player like that."

The club's reserve side returned to action last week, an opportunity that Dayle missed last season.

He elaborated: "I think I was at the level last season where I needed to be playing reserve football regularly and unfortunately we didn't have that option."

"The managers mentioned it to me and it would have been ideal when the youth games were off and I was an unused sub in the matchday 16."

"My focus is fully on the first team now though and hopefully that will continue for a long time."

"We have quietly gone about our business and we know that tonight will be tough but we are not conceding a lot, we just have to take our chances at the other end."

1994/95 A look back in history

Despite finishing just outside the Play Off positions, the 1994/95 season will be remembered as the year when Town's most successful manager of all time, Alan Buckley, left the club to take over at struggling West Bromwich Albion midway through the season, paving the way for former Nottingham Forest full back Brian Laws to land his first managerial role of his career.

During pre season Alan Buckley made no new additions to his squad for the start of the campaign but allowed reserve goalkeeper Rhys Wilmot to move to Crystal Palace for £80,000. Happy with his squad, he announced that this season his team could 'gatecrash' the Premiership and win promotion. With the support of Chairman Peter

Furneaux, a ground move was also very high on the agenda for Town as the implications of the recently published Taylor Report were to soon take effect.

Bolton Wanderers were the visitors to a sun-kissed Blundell Park for the opening game of the season, a Clive Mendonca hat-trick earned Town a point in a 3-3 draw. Further draws away at Watford and Sunderland followed before the Mariners earned their first win at home to Tranmere

Rovers. Disappointment came when Town lost to Second Division Bradford City in the 1st Round of the Coca Cola Cup, although victories against Port Vale (4-1), Swindon Town (3-2) and Portsmouth (2-0) helped Buckley's side begin to assert themselves as one of the contenders for promotion.

On the 20th October news came through that Buckley, along with his backroom staff of Arthur Mann and Richard O'Kelly had accepted new jobs at West Brom; leaving the Mariners short of any coaching staff two days before the home tie with Middlesbrough. Peter Furneaux wasted no time in appointing Football in The Community Officer John Cockerill as Caretaker Manager, with senior players Paul Fitcher and Graham Rodger asked to assist him until a permanent replacement could be found. The players responded well to their make-shift managerial team, only losing once in a seven game spell, however on the 20th November, Brian Law was appointed the new boss, with former Aston Villa defender Kenny Swain as his assistant. Cockerill was given a new job as Youth Team coach, which he was happy to accept.

Laws' first game in charge was a 2-1 win against Bristol City at Blundell Park, which saw Town move up to 4th in the table – at that point it seemed that Buckley's pre-season prediction of 'gatecrashing' the Premiership might happen. However a poor spell saw the Mariners slip down to 13th with Laws' apparent lack of coaching experience clear to see after comprehensive defeats to

Oldham and Barnsley during the Christmas period.

The manager's first signings for the club were Mansfield Town goalkeeper Jason Pearcey, who was brought in to challenge number one Paul Crichton, young Sheffield United defender Ashley Fickling and the highly regarded Jamie Forrester from Leeds United's Academy. Leaving Blundell Park were Tony Rees and Paul Agnew, who both moved to the Hawthorns to team up with former manager Buckley. Also around this time Bill Carr became Town's new Chairman replacing Furneaux.

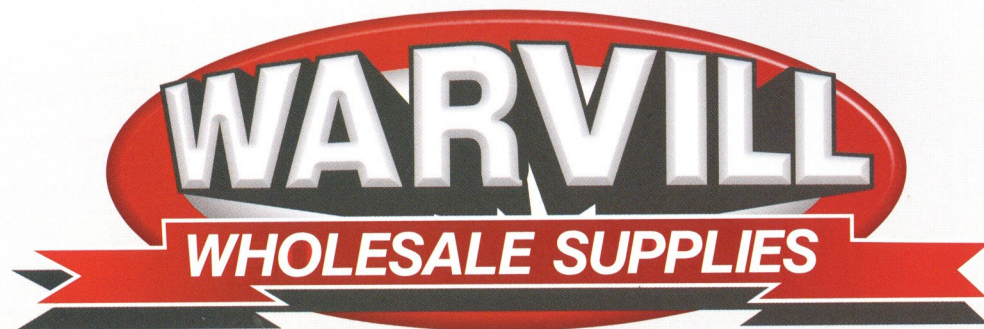
The new Town side played with a higher-tempo than under the previous manager and although the majority of players had been schooled in Buckley's own 'total football' style, they were now playing in a slightly more cavalier fashion, which many fans were said to have preferred. The 5-0 demolition of Luton and 3-1 victory against Sunderland on TV were the best examples of Laws' new approach. However, after a fairly inconsistent season the Mariners only finished 10th in the League.

The final home game of the season against Wolves was the last time that fans would be able to stand at Blundell Park. During the summer break seating was installed across the whole of the stadium, cutting the capacity to just short of 9,000.

Introducing... **Luton Town**

Goals is the order of the day for Luton Town boss Paul Buckle as he looks for his side to live up to their billing of pre-season favourites for the Blue Square Bet Premier title.

Defeat to York City in the Conference Play Off Final last season made it three times in three seasons that the Hatters have been defeated in the play-offs.

And with rivals Crawley Town and Fleetwood Town showing that the path to the Football League is best forged with plenty of attacking options, manager Buckle has followed suit and assembled a forward line that should be capable of firing the Hatters back into the league at the season's end.

Hinckley striker Andre Gray ended the 2011/12 season and his move to Kenilworth Road was made permanent for a bargain £30,000 in the summer. The club's pursuit of 35-goal hitman Jon Shaw finally came to an end when the player made the move south in the summer and the Hatters will be hoping he can continue the one-in-two goal ratio that saw him become such a success at Gateshead.

Another player who has had success at this level before is Scott Rendell and his capture was another coup for Buckle as he brings in a striker who has scored plenty of Conference goals before, most notably for Cambridge United and Crawley.

And that's not to forget last season's top scorer at Kenilworth Road, Stuart Fleetwood, who netted 16 in all competitions. The former Forest Green Rovers' man has already scored seven times in his eight outings and looks to be back to the form that earned him a move to Charlton Athletic in 2008.

Manager Buckle does not like to keep any cards up his sleeve either, preferring to start any three of his front men and overpower the opposition from the start. And the goals have flowed this season already; Cambridge, Ebbsfleet and most notably leaders Macclesfield Town,

who were hit for four at Kenilworth Road at the start of the month.

But the goals have dried up in the last two games. A heavy 3-0 reverse at a resurgent Alfreton was followed by a stalemate at home to Wrexham last Saturday but the Hatters are still firmly in the promotion mix and Buckle will be hoping that it stays that way for the remainder of the campaign as they try to avoid the exertions they have put in with late season runs to earn a play-off spot.

Elsewhere, the Hatters' squad is brimming with talent, even after Buckle, who joined the club at the start of April, opted to refresh the ranks in the summer.

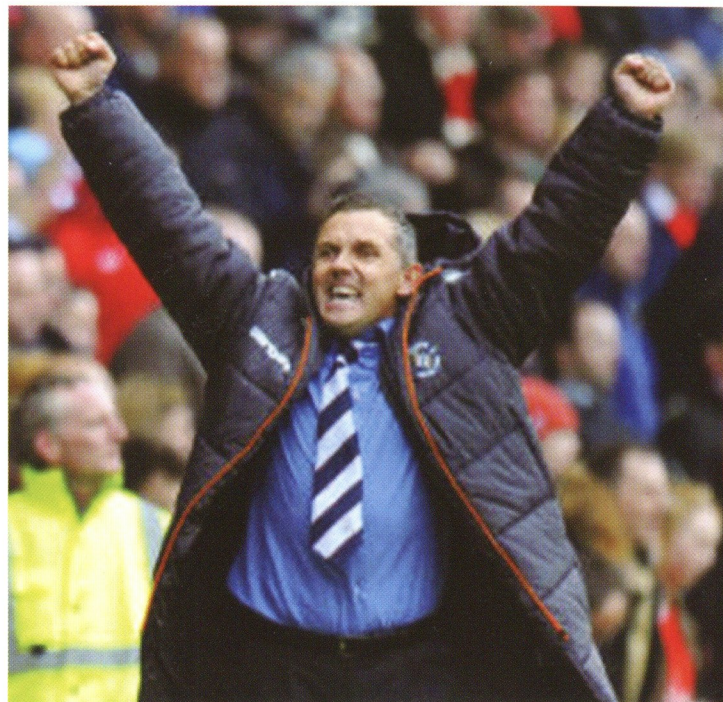
It was no surprise to see stalwart Keith Keane snapped up by a league club after 17 years as man and boy at Kenilworth Road, whilst the duo of George Pilkington and Godfrey Poku departed for well-fancied Mansfield Town.

The departures of both Robbie Willmott and Aaron O'Connor both came as a surprise but Buckle has brought in several talented players, including experienced defender Ronnie Henry, who has previously won the division with Stevenage, and Gillingham midfielder Danny Spiller.

Highly-rated youngster Matt Robinson has joined from Leicester, whilst goalkeeper Dean Brill rejoins the club where he made his name and manager Buckle returned to former stomping ground Torquay to bring in athletic full back Lathaniel Rowe-Turner.

The Hatters' boss has also dipped into the loan market with the trio of Yaser Kasim (Brighton), Jake Robinson (Northampton) and Connor Essam (Gillingham) moving to Kenilworth Road.

And Buckle will be hoping that his side can be at that best to defeat a stingy Mariners' side in front of the TV cameras. Indeed this fixture has been one of Premier Sport TV's marquee fixtures and is shown live for the third time with both sides sharing



Focus on... The Gaffer

Former Bristol Rovers and Torquay boss Paul Buckle is the latest man charged with returning Luton Town to the Football League, having come agonisingly close to accomplishing that task within six weeks of his appointment last season.

The 41-year-old took the reins at Kenilworth Road in early-April and a late season turnaround saw the Hatters force their way into the play-offs, where they were beaten by York City in the final.

Buckle, a midfielder with over 500 league appearances to his name, most notably with Brentford, Torquay, Colchester and four separate spells with Exeter, has gone about trimming the Luton squad and adding players who can bring the winning mentality back to Kenilworth Road.

And the former Grecian knows all about success in the Conference, having taken over at Torquay when they were relegated in 2007 and leading the club to two successive play-off appearances, the latter seeing the Plainmoor club beat Cambridge United 2-0 in the final to win promotion at the second attempt.

Although United struggled back in the Football League, their end of season form in 2009/10 saw them secure survival with a club record seven consecutive clean sheets, which included a thumping 3-0 win here at Blundell Park.

It was a sign of things to come and the following campaign the Gulls made it all the way to the League Two play-off final where they were edged out 1-0 by Stevenage. Buckle joined Bristol Rovers in the aftermath of that result but was given less than six months to turn the Pirates' fortunes around before his dismissal. Now at the Luton helm, Buckle is confident that with new signings such as Ronnie Henry and Jon Shaw at his disposal that he can bring league football back to Kenilworth Road.

Stuart Fleetwood

Welsh under-21 international Stuart Fleetwood is one of the Blue Square Bet Premier's most lethal strikers and has been in scintillating form already this season, topping the Conference goalscoring charts with seven goals so far this term.

Having turned out earlier in his career for Cardiff City and Hereford United, where he won his representative honours for Wales, Fleetwood made his name with Forest Green Rovers during the 2007/08 season.

He caught the eye of several Football League clubs after goalscoring displays against Rotherham and Swindon in the Gloucestershire club's FA Cup run during that campaign and looked to be heading to either Charlton or Crewe but opted to stay at the New Lawn for the whole season, scoring 28 times as the club achieved their highest-ever league finish.

A move to the Addicks did materialise that summer but he was strangely not given his chance at the Valley, appearing for just eight minutes in a League Cup tie against former club Hereford, that coming two years after moving to South London.

The player did impress in loan spells at Cheltenham, Brighton and Exeter during this time before securing a move back to former club Hereford in July 2010. He scored 18 times to finish as the club's top scorer in 2010/11 before joining Luton in August 2011 and finishing as the Hatters' top scorer last season with 16 goals.

Star Graduate... **BRUCE RIOCH**

Football historian **LEIGH EDWARDS** profiles one of Luton Town's finest-ever players

Powerful midfielder Bruce Rioch was capped 24 times by Scotland after leaving Luton Town.

Born in Aldershot, where his father was a regimental sergeant major, Bruce was raised in Luton and became an apprentice at Kenilworth Road. Rioch turned professional in September 1964 and made his League debut in Luton's 1-0 defeat at home to Southend United two months later. His first League goal came in the Hatters' 3-2 defeat at Bradford City in December 1965 and he soon attracted interest from bigger clubs with his pace, power and fierce shooting. He also had great competitiveness and a ruthless streak.

Bruce was Luton's leading marksman in 1966-67 and again in 1967-68 when he missed just two matches as the Hatters stormed to the Fourth Division title. Rioch was also an important figure as Luton narrowly failed to win promotion again in 1968-69, netting 47 goals in 149 League games before moving to Aston Villa for a then club record £100,000 in July 1969. His younger brother Neil, an England Youth international, followed him from Luton to Villa shortly afterwards.

Bruce played for Villa in the 1971 League Cup final and starred in their 1971-72 Third Division title triumph. Moving to Derby County for £200,000 in February 1974, he took over from the injured Henry Newton and helped Dave Mackay's side to finish third in the top-flight that season. Rioch was ever-present and leading marksman with 15 League goals in 1974-75 when Derby won the League Championship for the second time in four seasons.

Towards the end of that title campaign, he scored one of his most memorable goals with a surging run from near the half-way line against Newcastle United at St James' Park. The following season, he hit a thunderous free-kick in the FA Cup sixth round win at home to Newcastle, then scored four goals in Derby's remarkable 8-2 First Division victory over Spurs in October 1976.

Rioch could play for Scotland through parental qualification and made his international debut in their 1-0 victory over Portugal at Hampden Park in May 1975. He scored his first international goal to clinch Scotland's 2-2 draw with Wales four days later and went on to become the first English-born player ever to captain Scotland, leading them in the 1978 World Cup finals in Argentina.

Sold to Everton for £180,000 in December 1976, Rioch returned to Derby a mere 11 months later but fell out with Tommy Docherty and Colin Addison and had loan spells at Birmingham City and Sheffield United. After that he played for Seattle Sounders, becoming Torquay United's player-coach in October 1980 and later their player-manager. He then took charge of Middlesbrough, managing them from the Third Division to First in consecutive seasons.

After a spell as Millwall's manager, he became Bolton Wanderers' boss in May 1992 and plotted two promotion successes, also leading them to the 1995 League Cup final. He spent a year as Arsenal's manager before the appointment of Arsene Wenger, signing Dennis Bergkamp and David Platt, then managed Norwich City, Wigan Athletic and Danish side Aalborg.

If the coach driver's CD collection was questionable the Three Lions' performance was anything but.

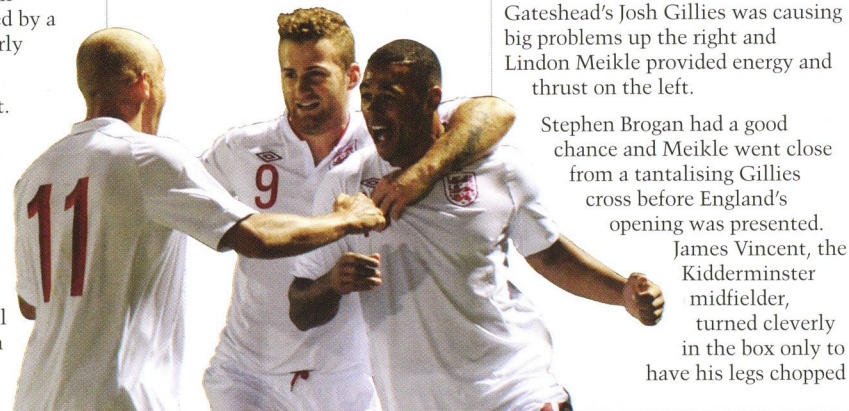
Paul Fairclough's young guns were immense and Andre Gray's winner fitting reward for their dominant display.

Now they must hold their breath. Returning from Brussels with three points was a must if England's International Challenge Trophy adventure is to continue into the semi-finals.

Before Belgium they were sat bottom of the group with just one point, gained against Italy in February. That was followed by a 4-0 defeat in Moscow in early June.

“We talked about all the emotions we wanted to feel after the game,” Fairclough said. “We wrote them down on a board.”

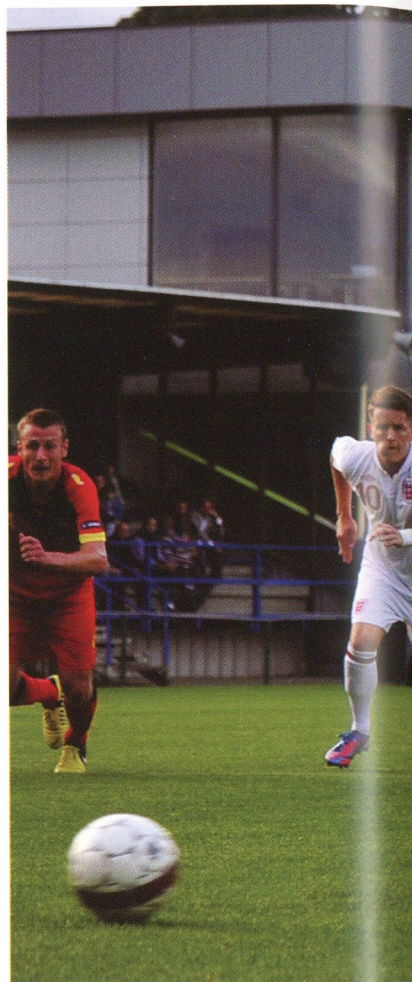

These results around Europe have become a trademark of this England team. Sometimes they don't get the credit they deserve.

Make no mistake, this was a very talented Belgium side drawn from the ever-increasing reservoir of young talent.

They are all under 21, but within that they still had a ball-playing midfielder on loan at Walsall from Premier League Stoke City, Florent Cuvelier, a Birmingham City centre-half, Brice Ntambwe, and Dorian Klonaridis, who Champions League



side Lille paid €800,000 for this summer. England's defence had him in their back pocket like loose change.

From the beginning their play was slick. They passed the ball with precision and suffocated Belgium to steal possession back quickly.

Gateshead's Josh Gillies was causing big problems up the right and Lindon Meikle provided energy and thrust on the left.

Stephen Brogan had a good chance and Meikle went close from a tantalising Gillies cross before England's opening was presented. James Vincent, the Kidderminster midfielder, turned cleverly in the box only to have his legs chopped

Scott Spencer, a tireless worker up front all evening, stepped up for the penalty, waited for Theo Defourny to commit himself early and stroked it the opposite way into the bottom right corner.

Spencer sent a curling effort past the post before Belgium drew level in fortunate circumstances.

Naudts collected the ball 25-yards out, took aim and hit a shot that was destined for Preston Edwards' arms only for a wicked deflection off Eddie Oshodi that diverted the ball into the goal.

It wasn't the only low point of the half for England. Forest Green Rovers midfielder Kieron Forbes had an unfortunate clash with teammate Jamie Turley. Play was held up for nine minutes while he was treated on the pitch and given

oxygen before being taken to hospital as a precaution.

When the game did restart, Brogan was denied by a fine save from the impressive Defourny.

Fairclough felt his side had lost some of their fluency towards the end of the first-half and taken to the long ball too often.

That was corrected after the break and the introduction of Gray's pace gave the hosts another headache to deal with.

More top saves from Defourny prevented Meikle and Spencer making the breakthrough while Vincent and Adam Watkins, on for Forbes, had chances flash wide.

For all of Belgium's neat play they could never hurt England. While his distribution was excellent, by and large Edwards was a spectator.

The back four of Turley, Oshodi, the particularly impressive Simon Ainge and Aswad Thomas always looked comfortable. Substitute Dylan De Belder got in behind once but his flicked header went wide.

Going forward England kept patient. It can be a virtue and so it proved. A quick free-kick was slipped into Spencer who sent a gorgeous flick around the corner for Gray to steam clear and slot home.

It could have been even more comfortable had Defourny not pulled off an outrageous point blank save when Vincent looked nailed on to make it three.

Over to you Russia, with all England's love.

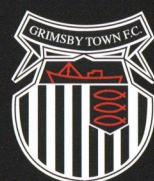

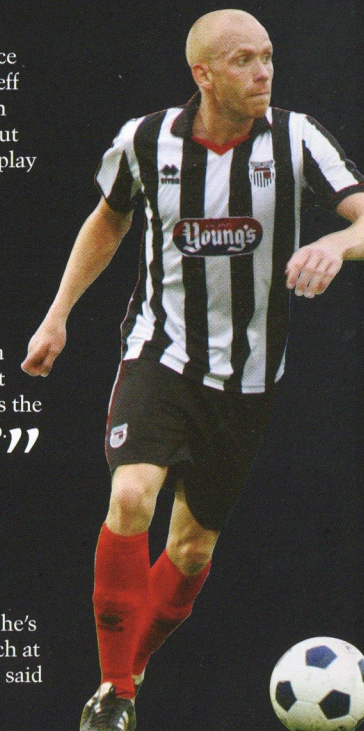

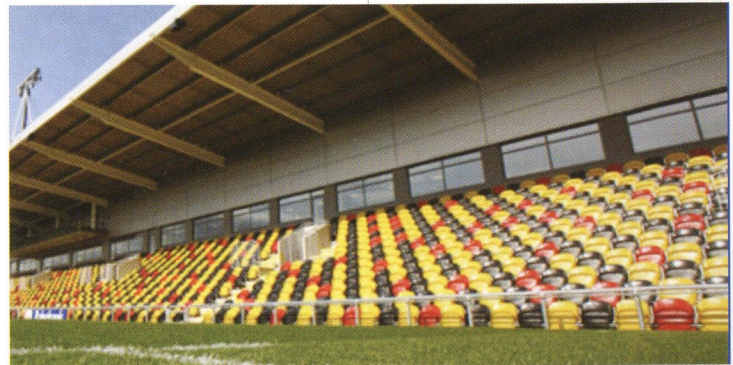

So, what's the ground like?

The Club moved to Rodney Parade, the home of Newport and Newport Gwent Dragons Rugby Clubs at the beginning of the 2012/13 season after spending eight years at Newport Stadium. Situated on the East bank of the River Usk, the stadium has seen some recent investment with the opening of two new stands. On one side is the Bisley Stand that was opened in 2011. One unusual aspect of the stand is that the seats comprise a number of different colours, making for an eye catching 'polka dot' effect. Opposite is the much older but classic looking Hazell Stand. This covered stand has seating to the rear and terracing to the front.

The North or Town End is a small open terrace which is quite set-back from the playing area. Normally this end is not open for matches but may be employed for some of the bigger games.

And what's it like for Town fans?

Away fans are housed at the South End of the Bisley Stand, where around 580 fans can be accommodated. The stand is all seated and covered and being a relatively new stand the facilities inside are good. Away fans share the stand with home supporters who are separated by a portion of green netting draped over the seats. Please note that the entrance to the away section is located at the bottom of Corporation Road (the same road as the ticket office and club shop).

How do we get there?

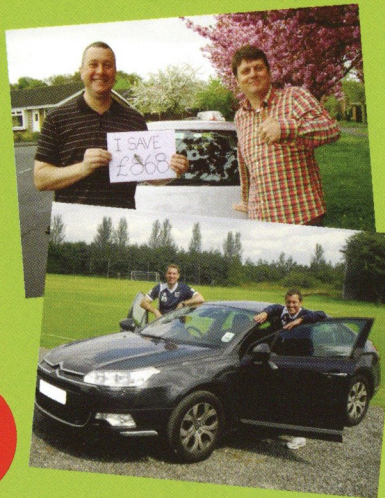
Car: Leave the M4 at Junction 26 and take the A4051 towards

Newport. After going under a flyover (which is the A4042) you will reach a large roundabout where you take the 2nd exit keeping in the filter lane towards the City Centre/Railway Station (do not go up the adjoining slip road onto the A4042). At the next roundabout take the 1st exit going across the river onto the B4591 towards Maindee. At the traffic lights bear right onto Chepstow Road and then take the first right into Corporation Road. Take the next right into Grafton Road and the entrance and ticket office are down on the left.

Train: Newport railway station is situated around a quarter of a mile away from the stadium and is a relatively short walk. As you come out of the main station entrance turn left along the main (Queensway) road. Follow this road until you reach a large roundabout. Take the pedestrian underpass down underneath the roundabout and at the centre turn left towards Clarence Place/River Usk. After you have come back up to street level you should see a bridge in front of you going across the river. Cross the bridge and then take the first right hand turn into Rodney Parade and the stadium is down this road on the left.

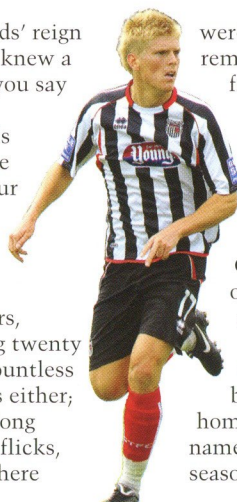

In tonight's feature Chris Mills waxes lyrical about a Striker who caught the eye during a relatively drab season.

Say what you like about Neil Woods' reign as GTFC manager, but by god he knew a striker when he saw one (Before you say anything, Serge Mafoko was technically a winger). If Woodsy is remembered for one thing, let it be this, he was the man that signed Alan Connell - our first twenty goal-a-season striker since Clive Mendonca. And for that I will forever be thankful.

AC played forty two times for the Mariners, starting on all forty two occasions, scoring twenty five goals along the way and racking up countless assists. But they weren't just any old goals either; we paid witness to all sorts of wonderful long range efforts, pin point free kicks, cheeky flicks, sublime volleys and audacious lobs. Ok, there



were a few tap-ins now and again, but many will remember Connell for his quality instincts in front of goal.

My love for AC grew astonishingly fast. I'd never seen a Grimsby player with such a good first touch. I still haven't.

In fact, for a long time I'd barely seen a Grimsby player able to consistently pass to one of his own team mates. It was if I was dreaming. He was a breath of fresh air, I felt reinvigorated. In fact it was the strongest I'd ever felt about another man without it becoming awkward or in any way homosexual. I was even moved enough to get his name and number on the back of my shirt for that season, the first and now perhaps last time I'd

allowed myself to indulge in such an act.

But what impressed me most about Connell was his knack of gliding and drifting into pockets of space outside of the opposition's box, just far enough that no self-respecting defender would dare follow but close enough to strike fear into a goalkeeper. With instant control and a stylish deft touch he was able to see and feel a through ball or an effort on goal before the rest of us had barely drawn breath. At any given moment his expert spacial awareness allowed him to know exactly where every team mate and opponent were on the pitch and where they could be a couple of seconds later. That's if the ball wasn't already in the net.

I found myself going home and waxing lyrical to my Mum. Of course she didn't care, she didn't even know who he was but I'd tell her anyway; how Connell had done this, and how Connell had done that. It was if I was a kid again learning how football should be played for the first time. Mum would

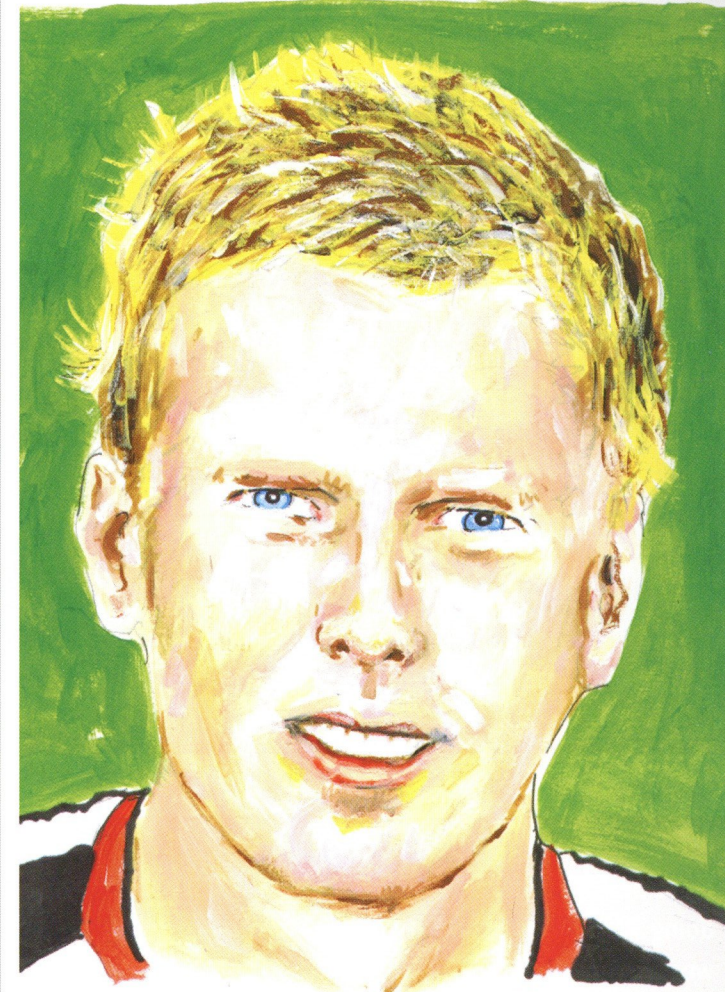


half listen and then say something like "there must be other players on the pitch bar him".

There definitely wasn't.

Alan Connell was the one brief spark in



Strange Tales of the Mariners Programme Protest - Part One

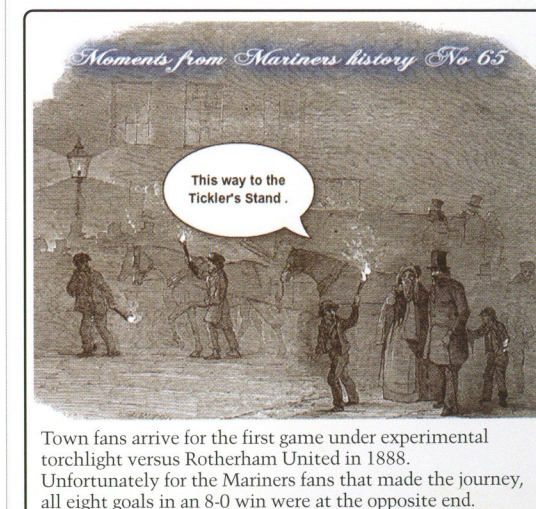
In the days before radio, TV and the internet, the printed word was king. And, when GTFC began issuing programmes on a regular basis in 1912, there was seemingly no official policy regarding content. The season was just a couple of months old when, in October 1912, the press headline 'Grimsby Football Sensation' brought the club's programme (and its failings) to a wider audience.

Director Mr Tong had joined the board in 1910 only to soon realise it was not a united one. After serving on the Finance Committee he had tendered his resignation at the 1912 AGM but his fellow directors had refused to accept it, unable (or unwilling) to repay his loan. This uneasy alliance reached new depths when, in the home programme versus Leicester, Mr Tong was indirectly attacked. 'A story is going the rounds about a certain Director' stated 'The Mariner' regarding Town's recent trip to Wolves. 'When the players and directors presented themselves at the Railway Station they found him already in possession of the saloon, smoking in the comfiest corner. 'Tis said he had the outing at the club's expense. Want to know who it was? Ah - that would be telling!'

Mr Tong wrote a letter of defence to the press before the "Saturday Telegraph" gave its opinion. 'The club was ill-advised to make the matter public in their programme,' said the Editor. 'I expect to hear the club deny responsibility for the story, but I don't see how they can.

The programme is the official organ of the club; it is promoted by the directors and the club takes all the receipts. Therefore it is reasonable to regard whatever appears as bearing the authority of the club.'

Neither GTFC nor the directors made any further comment on the matter, and a line was seemingly drawn under the episode. Mr Tong finally parted company prior to the Great War, but not before there was an even more sensational 'programme protest'...

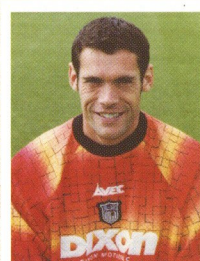

AIDAN DAVISON

Signed from Bradford City in the summer of 1997, goalkeeper Aidan Davison made his third and final appearance for Northern Ireland just weeks into his Grimsby Town career. The big stopper was named as first choice for a 3-1 home defeat to Germany in August 1997, Oliver Bierhoff bagging a hat-trick for the visitors. The former Bolton man made over 100 league appearances for Town in two spells with the club, keeping a club record 35 clean sheets in the double Wembley season of 1997/98.

DAVID MULLIGAN

A loan signing from rivals Scunthorpe in August 2007, full-back David Mulligan made his Mariners' debut in a 2-1 away defeat at Shrewsbury on 1st September 2007. The Liverpool-born defender made six appearances for Town during this spell, which was eventually cut short so the player could turn out for his country, New Zealand, in a 2010 World Cup qualifier against Fiji, which the All-Whites won 2-0.

HARRY BETMEAD

One of the stalwarts of the Grimsby Town side of the 1930s, defender Harry Betmead played nearly 300 league games for the club in a 17-year spell as a Mariner, a figure that would no doubt have increased substantially, had it not been for the outbreak of World War II. Betmead was part of the famous Town backline that included Ginger Hall and Teddy Buck, a trio that was famed throughout the land. Harry turned down moves to some of the country's top clubs to remain on the East Coast and was rewarded with a solitary England cap in 1937, playing for the Three Lions in an 8-0 win over Finland in Helsinki.

CHRIS NICHOLL

A real coup when brought to the club as player/assistant manager by Dave Booth in 1983, Nicholl brought experience to a young Mariners' side and helped the club reach a post-war height of fifth in the old Second Division. The former Aston Villa star made 70 appearances for the Mariners in two seasons and also made the last of 51 outings for Northern Ireland during his time at Blundell Park, those coming in a 3-1 win over Australia and a 1-0 defeat in Turkey.

BILLY ANDREWS

Born in America, Billy Andrews wasn't a left-back by trade but his

most famous appearance for Northern Ireland came on the left-side of defence. The Kansas native was reported to be the first North American to play in the Football League, turning out for Oldham and Stockport, having earned international honours for Northern Ireland previous to this year, thanks to five years' residency in the country and a famed spell with Glentoran. A second spell at Glentoran preceded a move to Blundell Park, where his career underwent a resurgence, playing 114 times in three seasons. And it was here that Billy starred as a late replacement for Ireland (as they were known) as they shocked England with a 2-1 victory on 15th February 1912.

JEAN-PAUL KALALA

A Russell Slade signing from Nice in the summer of 2005 and hit the headlines early in his Blundell Park career when he netted the shock winner as the Mariners dumped Premier League giants Tottenham out of the Carling Cup. Kalala had been selected for DR Congo's African Nations Cup campaign of 2004 and made one appearance for his country as a Mariner, a 2-2 draw against Tunisia in Paris in November 2005. Jean-Paul was selected for DR Congo's 2006 African Nations Cup squad but did not make an appearance and this arguably hindered his progress at Blundell Park, although the player later returned for a loan spell in 2008.

JACKIE BESTALL

Perhaps the most legendary of all the players who have ever pulled on the black and white stripes, Jackie Bestall was the pocket dynamo that kept the greatest Grimsby Town side of them all, the Division One heroes of the 30s, ticking. What Bestall, all 5'3" of him, lacked in height he made up for in sheer heart, guts, determination and skill. Such was his impact on the club that the smallest road in Grimsby and Cleethorpes was named after him. He played over 400 league games for the club in a 12-year spell and earned one England cap, when he was closing in on 35, as the Three Lions defeated Northern Ireland 2-1 at Goodison Park.

JOE WATERS

Bestall's modern day equivalent was midfielder Joe Waters, who first arrived at Blundell Park on loan from Leicester in 1976. The player had an immediate impact on the side and

struck up a real rapport with the fans but that wasn't shared by the club's Board, who felt that the £10,000 transfer fee was too much, until the Mariners' supporters contributed £2,000 of that fee. And what a bargain it proved to be as Waters became one of the key men of the great Town side of the late-70s and early-80s, playing 356 league games and scoring 65 times. He scored on his international debut for Eire, a 3-3 draw in Turkey in October 1977 but shockingly only earned one more cap, two years later against Northern Ireland.

JOHNNY SCOTT

One of the most skilled and cultured midfielders in the Mariners' history, Johnny Scott's place in the club's folklore is secured as the only serving Mariner to appear in a World Cup tournament. Those came for Northern Ireland in 1958, as the side defeated Czechoslovakia 2-1 but then lost 4-0 to France. Scott, a former Manchester United youngster, played over 250 times for the Mariners, scoring 54 times and was equally adept in the forward ranks or on the wing.

KEITH ALEXANDER

After winning promotion with the Mariners in 1990, there was no time for striker Keith Alexander to celebrate as he headed off to St Lucia to play two matches for the fledgling nation. The big frontman appeared for his country as they lost 2-0 to Barbados in a friendly on 13th May but they rebounded 14 days later to defeat Bermuda in a Caribbean Cup qualifying match by the same scoreline.

PAT GLOVER

Another great of the 1930s, Pat Glover is another Grimsby Town cap holder who is also a club record holder and also regarded as the Mariners' best-ever striker. The Welshman failed to make the grade at Swansea and moved east to Grimsby, where he settled quickly. Glover still holds the club's all-time scoring record, 180 goals in just 227 games, as well as the most goals for the club in a season when he netted 42 times in the 1933/34 season. Glover is also the Mariners' record cap holder with seven for Wales and his seven goals in those games mean he is also Town's record international goalscorer.

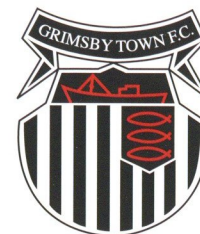

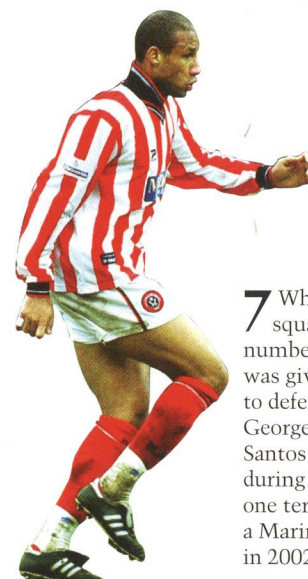
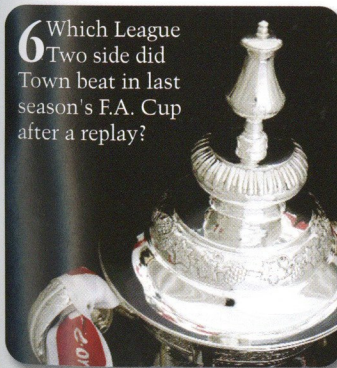

"We didn't have as much possession as we'd like and we didn't use it as well as we would have liked.

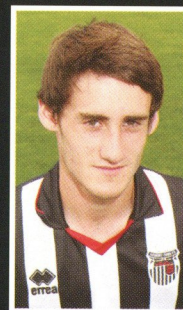
"The conditions were not great for either side, because it was really, really hot, but they dealt with that well.

Reserves

The Mariners' reserve side returned to action after a break of 16 months with a 1-0 defeat at Gateshead on Tuesday 11th September.

The only goal of the game came from the home side's Michael Sweet, who struck 18 minutes from time to seal the victory for a Heed side who dominated large portions of the game.

Indeed the Mariners were indebted to an excellent performance from goalkeeper Greg Fleming, who kept the scores level for so long with a series of excellent saves.

The former Chesterfield custodian was called into action as early as the fourth minute when he used his legs to deny Sweet, after the Gateshead youngster had been played in by a Michael Roberts' pass.

Roberts and Lewis Galpin tried their luck in the opening stages but found Fleming in inspired form with Ryan McGorrigan and Lance McGlen spurning other excellent opportunities in an opening 45 minutes that saw the hosts register eleven shots on the Town goal.

It was much the same after the interval with Fleming making flying saves from Peter Ravenhill and James Marwood before Sweet finally broke the deadlock in the 72nd-minute. The Gateshead man latched onto a lofted pass from Roberts, before firing in from the right-hand edge of the penalty area.

Interim Youth Team Manager Adam Smith was pleased with the experience his young charges received.

He said: "We didn't particularly get to grips with the first-half and had a challenge after 30 minutes when Simon Ford and Jack Griffin clashed heads and had to come off to have stitches.

"Jack was able to continue but Fordy, unfortunately had to come off, and within a couple of minutes Andi Thanoj had to come off with a kick on the ankle.

"That really disrupted our plans – we were already a young side and full of youth on the bench. But it provided opportunities for some of the lads to get on quickly.

"In the second-half we started to play much better, we had a little more composed possession in the early stages and for all of Gateshead's attractive football they didn't cause us too many problems.

"They got their goal which was probably deserved and we couldn't really argue with the outcome."

The Last Word

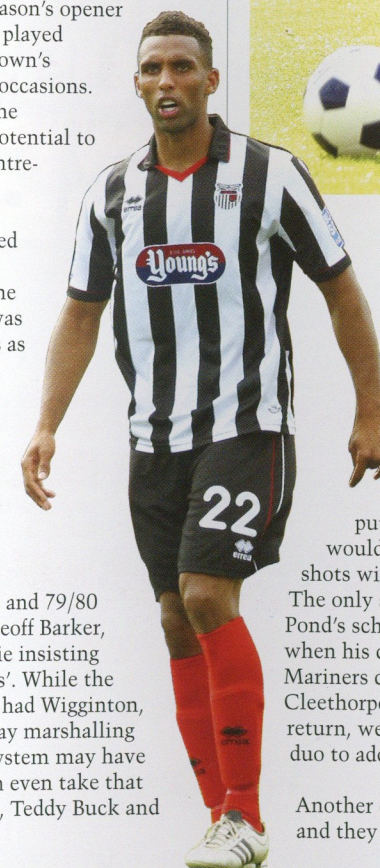

Strikers are judged on goals, wingers live off assists and keepers enjoy making any save – no matter how simple. But what gives defenders a reason to celebrate? Clean sheets of course. And as centre-half Nathan Pond admitted in the Telegraph recently, the Mariners' shut-out against Hereford gave him almost as much satisfaction as the win itself.

Well, in that case, the on-loan Fleetwood Town man and central defensive partner Shaun Pearson must be on a constant high at the moment. Saturday's 0-0 draw at Kidderminster brought the Mariners' fifth clean sheet of the season, and only Wrexham have a better defensive record in the Blue Square Bet Premier. Since Pond's arrival prior to the season's opener at Southport, he and Pearson have played every minute together, allowing Town's defence to be breached on just six occasions. Pretty impressive stuff. But does the burgeoning partnership have the potential to rival some of Town's legendary centre-back pairings?

The last time the Mariners achieved promotion, in 1997/98, Peter Handyside and Mark Lever were the solid base on which that success was built. Town conceded just 37 goals as they swept into the old Division One after victory in the play-offs. Earlier, the successive promotions of 89/90 and 90/91 were also underpinned by a miserly defence. Lever with Andy Tillson, and then Paul FUTcher, were the rocks on which Alan Buckley built his side.

It was a similar story for the 78/79 and 79/80 promotion-winning teams, with Geoff Barker, Clive Wigginton and Dean Crombie insisting opposition attackers 'shall not pass'. While the Division Four champions of 71/72 had Wigginton, Graham Rathbone and Stewart Gray marshalling their no-nonsense backline. The system may have been slightly different, but you can even take that back to the days of Harry Betmead, Teddy Buck and Alec Hall in the 30s and 40s.

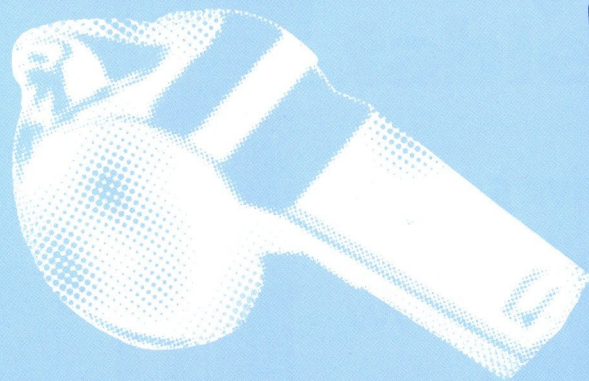


Each and every one of these centre-half partnerships had one key thing in common. They loved clean sheets and hated giving the opposition anything to cheer, even if the three points were already in the bag. That desire for shut-outs now appears to be a trait of both Pond and Pearson. They are centre-halves in the old-fashioned mould, putting their heads in where most of us would hesitate to dangle a boot and blocking shots with whatever part of the body is required. The only slight concern for this pairing could be Pond's scheduled return to Fleetwood in January when his current loan period ends. But if the Mariners can extend the defender's stay in Cleethorpes and go on to make a Football League return, we could certainly have another dynamic duo to add to the list.

Another clean sheet tonight against the Hatters and they will be well on the way.

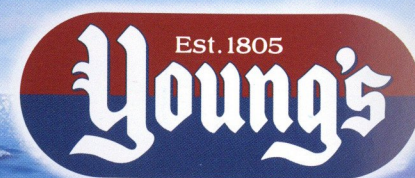

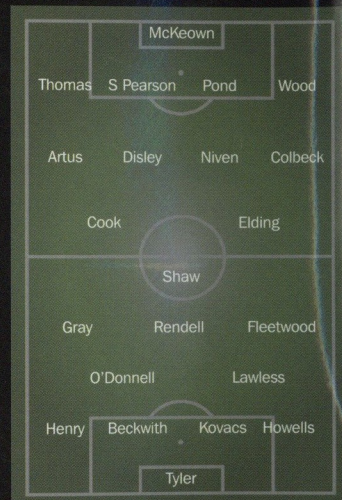
