





Racism won't be tolerated

The Barrow club will not tolerate any form of racism. We are still involved in an investigation that a Macclesfield player was abused when they visited the Furness Building Society Stadium in December. It was reported to match referee David Webb that Macclesfield player Nat Brown alleged he had been subjected to racial abuse.

The matter was brought to the attention of the Barrow Safety Officer and head steward Mike Forsythe. And as is usual for all referee-reported "extra-ordinary match Incidents", the incident is being investigated by Barrow AFC in conjunction, and in full co-operation, with Cumbria Police.

The match DVD has been made available for scrutinisation and any fans witnessing any racial abuse are urged to come forward with information, either to the club or Cumbria Police.

Barrow chairman Brian Keen stated: "This is a decent family community club and there is no place for racism here. If we can identify any culprits they will be facing as stern a punishment as we can dish out.

"We have an excellent relationship with Cumbria Police and together we will do everything we can to bring this matter to a satisfactory conclusion".

Barrow secretary/director Russell Dodd said: "We take these allegations very seriously. We were asked by the FA for our version of events and we are investigating, involving Cumbria Police throughout.

"We deplore any kind of racism. There is no place for it anywhere in society. We have worked very hard over the last few years with our links with the 'Kick it out' campaign. Our fans have generally been superb in this regard and have if anything displayed positive racial discrimination.

"Our Community team has been delivering anti-racism talks in Barrow schools for the last few years and already six schools have been covered this season, with six more planned by the summer. We are also told by Kick-it-Out that our annual day is one of their best.

"However if some new fans have suddenly started displaying this behaviour, we urge all our true fans to identify them."

Furness Building Society Stadium Review

A warm welcome to the Furness Building Society Stadium for what is our first Saturday home Blue Square Bet Premier game of the year. Indeed our first home Conference Saturday game since September 17 when Forest Green Rovers were the visitors.

Our visitors today are Luton Town who are one of the title favourites this season and who have captured the imagination of the footballing public with their FA Cup exploits this season. Their win over Wolves of the Championship in the third round proper was the result of the round and last Saturday they headed to Carrow Road to play Premier League side Norwich City in round IV where they recorded a famous victory thanks to Scott Rendell's goal. We wish them well in round V against Championship side Millwall.

However, on Tuesday night their FA Trophy campaign ended with a 3-0 defeat at Grimsby Town.

Of course it is just under four short weeks since we lost 6-1 at Kenilworth Road with former loan striker Jon Shaw, who joined the Hatters from Gateshead over the summer, netting a hat-trick.

Clearly we hope he will not do that again this afternoon and its worth remembering that after losing 5-1 at Kenilworth Road last season, we won the return game here 1-0 thanks to Alex-Ray Harvey's goal. Let's hope we can repeat that again.

Would you believe it?

At long last our long lasting FA Trophy third round saga came to a happy end with a 3-2 win over Gateshead here on Tuesday at the Furness Building Society Stadium in what was an "away" game. Things looked promising when Richie Baker tucked away our first penalty of 2013 to give us the lead but by the hour mark we had slipped behind.

At that point in stepped Matt Flynn who netted his fourth goal of the season with the equaliser and his second goal in successive games. With a replay beckoning – which I suspect neither side would have wanted – in stepped Gateshead defender Carl Magnay. With Danny Rowe closing in a Baker cross, he turned the ball past his own keeper and the majority of the vast majority of the crowd went home happy. Not just with the result but, I guess, the battling performance too.

The crowd of 728 was also highly encouraging in the circumstances as we recorded our first win on this ground since the Trophy replay against Hyde back in November.

Macc – Part I

First things first. To get a crowd of just short of 1,600 for the Macclesfield FA Cup second tie just one week before Christmas, given the small away following, was truly remarkable and a big thank you to all of you who came along with family, friends and

work mates. It made a real difference.

The game itself was good if frustrating as we should have defeated the Silkmen and would have done but for a bit of bad luck and some finishing that might have been better. Richie Baker's well struck free kick - his tenth goal of the season - to level the game in the first half was what we deserved and we were unlucky not to go on and find the winner.

Boxing Day blues

When the fixture list came out last summer, I am sure that along with many fans I looked at the Christmas and New Year games and was a little disappointed to find that our "derby" games were against Gateshead. The Tynesiders are a tough side to beat as we know over the years but they have never brought many fans with them.

From that point of view the gate of 1,135 was disappointing but not a huge surprise given that a number of our own "floating" fans might have been saving money for the trip to the Macclesfield replay.

However that gate is rather less than the 2,000 plus gates we have had on two recent Boxing Days for the visit of two former Football League clubs in Wrexham and Stockport County.

On the field our frustrations continued as there was nothing in the game at all – indeed we might have just about had the better of it – before the Tynesiders scored just before the interval and then wrapped up the points in the closing stages.

Macc – Part II

We again took a fantastic travelling support who deserved to see better than the final disappointing 4-1 defeat. Clearly 4-1 does not suggest a close game but it might have been very different had we managed to follow up Adam Boyes first half goal with an equaliser but it wasn't to be.

One of the challenges here was the crowd of just 1,554. Our share of the gate will not compensate for the loss of the home league game against the Silkmen which was scheduled for the same day. It was interesting to note that on New Year's Day, the visit of Southport to Moss Rose attracted less than 1,500 fans when amongst other things tickets for their Cardiff FA Cup tie were on sale.

A very happy New Year

I have been to the International Stadium to watch us a number of times down the years and only once have I seen us win – in May 1979 when goals from the late Allan Suddick and Colin Cowperthwaite give us a 2-1 win on the final day of the season. Since then I have seen some disappointing results at the ground and with the game being on New Year's Day I didn't travel this time. I suspect, therefore, that I was among many who having put the computer on was delighted by the news after 52 seconds that Adam

Boyes had netted our first goal of 2013 and that was enough to bring three points home.

Despite both Newcastle United and Sunderland not being in action, only 610 fans turned up to watch, including a fantastic small number of Barrow fans. Getting to the North-east on a public holiday is a nightmare so well done to all of those who made the journey.

That attendance was by a very long way the smallest attendance in the division – the next smallest gate was the Macclesfield v Southport gate with Hyde getting over 2,000 for the visit of Stockport County and over 7,000 watching the Lincolnshire derby between Grimsby Town and Lincoln City.

The truth is that now that York City are in the Football League the Tynesiders do not have a natural derby game.

Remarkable

Our trip to Newport two weeks ago saw us return with two points which for a number of reasons was quite remarkable. Full credit to the Welsh side and their supporters for their efforts to get the game played. I am sure many thought there was little chance of the game going ahead but it did and on a reasonable surface.

Then there was the result. In September we capitulated 3-0 to what looked like a very good side. Whilst we drew at Spytty Park last season, the previous season we took a pasting there and so the win at Rodney Parade was a very welcome surprise earned by a great team performance. Matt Flynn popped up with his first goal of the season and Danny L Rowe netted on his debut – hopefully the first of many goals for the club.

Our last success at Newport came at their old Somerton Park ground during our promotion winning 1966-67 season in Division Four when Roy McCarthy netted the winner.

On the road, again

Let's start on Tuesday night when we head across country to the Northolme to play Gainsborough Trinity in the FA Trophy quarter-finals. That will bring a reunion with two of our better players of the early part of this century – Steve Housham and Lee Warren.

"Housh" took charge of Trinity in September 2011 and led them to the play-off finals in Blue Square Bet North last season where they lost to Nuneaton Town. This season they are again well placed for the play-offs and on Tuesday night they won 1-0 at Workington.

Lee Warren is, I believe, Steve's assistant and we will all remember what a consistent performer he was for us.

There may also be a familiar player in defence for Trinity where

Danny Hone, who was on loan here last season, is now playing. Another former loanee Craig Nelthorpe is back playing for Trinity as well.

Our last trip to the Northolme was back in December 2007 just after Dave Bayliss and Darren Sheridan had been appointed as managers on a permanent basis. On that occasion a late Steve McNulty penalty rescued a point.

Next Saturday we head to Nottinghamshire to play Mansfield Town – the only side we have yet to play in the league this season. They seem to have taken confidence from their FA Cup performance against Liverpool and their recent wins at both Stockport County and Southport put them right back in the play-off hunt.

Our trip to Field Mill last season is probably best forgotten as we went down 7-0 which included the home side missing a penalty, Shaun Pearson being carried off with a knee injury and youngster Stuart Dixon coming on for a baptism of fire in goal. Stuart started this season as back-up keeper at Workington and I think he is now in Australia.

Two seasons ago a long range special from Danny Forrest – now at Harrogate Town – earned a point for us and the same again would do us nicely.

On Tuesday week we make the shorter trip to Haig Avenue to play Southport looking to complete our first double of the season. Last season we led 1-0 at the interval at Haig Avenue courtesy of a Paul Rutherford strike but conceded two sloppy goals to lose 2-1; the previous season we won 4-2 in the run of three successive away wins that pulled us away from the drop zone.

Back in October, we looked to be heading for defeat here with 20 minutes remaining as we trailed 2-0 but two goals from Adam Boyes and a Richie Baker special, which won the website "Goal of the Month", earned us three points. The same again please.

Next at home

Our next home game depends on what happens in the Trophy. If we beat Gainsborough, then our next home game will be on Tuesday, February 19 when Woking will visit; if we lose in Lincolnshire then we will be at home two weeks today with Nuneaton Town as visitors.

Our Opponents: Luton Town


Luton Town are grabbing all the headlines at the moment after their great FA Cup fourth round win before a gate of over 26,000 at Premiership Norwich City last Saturday.

The victory, through a Scott Rendell strike, meant they were the first non-League side to knock a Premier league club out of the Cup and now entertain Championship side Millwall in a fortnight as they bid to reach the quarter-finals. We wish them good luck as they carry the non-League flag.

They made the headlines in 2006-2007 for totally different off-the-field problems which with manager Mike Newell blowing the whistle on underhand transfer activity he knew of within the game.

The following season they were deducted 10 points for falling into administration, plunging them into the relegation battle. With the administrator in charge, the New Year saw the beginning of player sales and it led to relegation to League 2.

They were to start their League 2 campaign with 15 points deducted for failure to agree to a CVA (Company Voluntary Agreement). And the Football League decided that because the club had been in



administration for the third time in nine years, they would punish them further by deducting a further five points.

Worse followed with a further 10 points docked by the FA who were still investigating past financial irregularities. So they started the season with an incredible 30 point penalty.

The burden proved too much and relegation out of the Football League was confirmed on Easter Monday, meaning the club starting life in the Blue Square Premier in 2009/10 after 89 years in the Football League.

In their first season in non-League they finished second behind champions Stevenage but lost in the play-offs semi-final to York City. They finished in a play-off place the following season but lost on penalties to AFC Wimbledon in the final.

Last season they finished fifth and with it a crack at the play-offs for a third season running but there was more despair as they lost to York City in the final.

MARK TYLER (Goalkeeper)

Arrived at Kenilworth Road in June 2009 from Peterborough United where he made 483 appearances in 15 years and was rewarded with a testimonial against Liverpool in 2007. Former England Youth international was handed No.1 jersey by Hatters boss who admitted he'd failed in an attempt to sign the stopper the previous summer as first team opportunities at Posh became harder to come by.

LEWIS KIDD (Goalkeeper)

Signed professional contract at end of 2010/11 after impressing in Youth and Reserves teams and signed one-year deal in the summer.

DEAN BRILL (Goalkeeper)

Has made 97 appearance for Hatters after rising through the ranks as youngster. Left club in 2009 for Oldham where he spent two seasons before signing for Barnet last season. Made second "debut" for the Town in a 2-1 victory at Forest Green in October.

LATHANIEL ROWE-TURNER (Defender)


Was sixth signing of a busy 2012 summer, reuniting with manager Paul Buckle having previously worked together at Torquay United. Born in Leicester, began his career with his hometown club and was part of Foxes' youth team that won Premier League Academy League in 2006/07. Following season was named City's academy player of year but having failed to make first team appearance in 2010 was released by and joined Buckle at Plainmoor.

GREG TAYLOR (Defender)

Signed from Darlington in November 2011. Started career as a junior with Northampton before signed for Kettering Town and then joining Darlo.

GARRY RICHARDS (Centre half)

Signed two-year contract at Kenilworth Road last June following release from League 2 Gillingham where made 122 appearances over four years. Started career with Colchester United, who he helped earn promotion from League 1 as runners-up in 2006. In August 2007, for undisclosed fee, joined Southend but, after just six months and 14 appearances made move to Priestfield.



JANOS KOVACS (Centre half)

Arrived for his second spell at Kenilworth Road in September 2011, initially on emergency loan from Hereford United. First joined Hatters from Lincoln City in January 2010 and made 17 appearances before he joined Hereford in the summer of 2010. Previously with MTK in his native

Hungary, came to England in 2005 when signing for Chesterfield before switch to Lincoln.

JAKE HOWELLS (Defender)

Has come through ranks at Kenilworth Road and made first team debut in May 2008. After making 36 appearances for Hatters in 2008/09 he was rewarded with professional contract in May 2009.

SIMON AINGE (Defender)


Started as youngster at Bradford City, making his full debut in 2008. When deal at Valley Parade expired joined city neighbours Bradford Park Avenue prior to move to Guiseley. Was signed on a month's loan from Blue Square Bet North side Guiseley in late September before full deal, completed. Spent three seasons at Guiseley with his fine form rewarded by call-up to England C squad.

ALEX LACEY (Centre half)

String of fine display at heart of U-18s' and Reserves' defence led to professional contract in November 2010. Last season featured for Hatters in both FA Cup and FA Trophy and was sent on loan to Cambridge City, Thurrock and Eastbourne to gain experience.

CONNOR ESSAM (Defender)

Town secured highly-rated Gillingham defender on loan on transfer deadline day in August. 20-year-old is product of Gills' youth system and last season played 18 times for the Priestfield outfit.



RONNIE HENRY (Defender)

First signing of last summer. Former Stevenage captain spent seven successful years at Broadhall Way, helping side twice win promotion and twice lift FA Trophy. At Tottenham Hotspur as youngster but after loan spell with Southend United in 2003, joined Dublin City in Ireland in 2004 for four months before returning to England to sign for Stevenage. Went onto make 329 appearances for Boro. Offered new contract with Boro and from string of Football League sides but opted for Luton.



ALEX LAWLESS (Midfielder)

Former Wales Under-21 midfielder signed in November 2010 initially on-loan from York City before deal going through permanently in January 2011. Star of Minstermen's campaign in 2009/10 which saw them lose promotion final to Oxford United. Joined York at start of 2009/10, impressing then boss Martin Foyle enough to prise him away

from Forest Green Rovers. Former Cardiff City scholar took-up non-League football in Wales before earned first

professional contract with Premier League Fulham in 2003. Without featuring for Cottagers moved to Torquay United but after just year and 16 appearances joined Forest Green in 2006. Arrived at Bootham Crescent in summer of 2009

DANNY SPILLER (Midfielder)

Signed two-year deal in June 2012. With Gillingham as youngster, progressing through ranks to clock up over 100 League appearances. Signed for Millwall in 2007 but failed to settle at New Den and then enjoyed short spells with Wycombe, Welling and Dagenham & Redbridge before resigning for Gillingham in 2010.

ARNAUD MENDY (Midfielder)

Signed from Macclesfield Town in October 2012 on two year deal. Born in France, began with Rouen before moving to England to pursue professional career. Signed for Derby, making one appearance, before signing for Silkmen in summer of 2011. Hit headlines last season with stunning goal against Bolton Wanderers in FA Cup.

ADAM WATKINS (Midfielder)

Signed professional forms at Kenilworth Road in June 2010. Self-confessed Hatters fan, made first team bow in 1-0 defeat at Southampton in FA Cup third round in January 2010. Impressive performances in pre-season saw him force way into Gary Brabin's first team squad at beginning of 2011/12. Form led to being capped by England C and scored for Three Lions in 1-1 draw against Italy – and then won Wales U-21 call-up!

JJ O'DONNELL (Midfielder)

Joined Town from St Albans in January 2010. Having had spells out on loan at Hampton & Richmond Borough and Thurrock in 2011/12, signed three-year contract last May.

JAMES DANCE (Midfielder)

Signed from Crawley Town in July 2011. Was trainee at Birmingham City and on released made name in non-League circles in West Midlands before catching eye of Kettering Town in 2009. Fine performances led to signing for Crawley in January 2011. However, after picking up Blue Square Bet Premier winners' medal last term, found himself out of Red Devils' starting XI and Hatters' bid accepted.

SCOTT NEILSON (Midfielder)

Signed until end of season following release from Crawley Town. Began in non-League circles with Ware and Hertford before moving to Cambridge and then Crawley. Had loan spell with Grimsby this season before Hatters snapped him up on free transfer in January 2013.



JON SHAW (Striker)

Town had to beat off stiff competition to sign prolific scorer on two-year contract in June 2012. Hit 35 goals in all competitions for Gateshead in 2011/12 and netted 56 goals in 97 appearances for the Heed. Has scored almost 130 career goals since starting as trainee at home-town club Sheffield Wednesday. Goals began to flow when joined Conference outfit Burton Albion before move to Halifax in 2007. His form took back to Football League with

Rochdale but, failing to break into Dale first XI on consistent basis had loan spells with Crawley, Barrow and Gateshead. Had six months with Mansfield before move to Gateshead in May 2010.

SCOTT RENDELL (Striker)


Town's third signing of summer after completing move from Wycombe Wanderers for undisclosed fee. Has hit 85 goals in past six seasons and been creator of many more during successful stints with Wycombe, Torquay, Cambridge (twice) and Crawley in both Conference and League 2. Began career at Aldershot Town before move to Championship Reading. Loan move to Crawley jump-started his career and snapped up by Cambridge 2007/08. Goalscoring form in Conference persuaded Peterborough United to shell out £115,000 for his services in 2008 but struggling to break into Posh starting line-up saw loan move back to Cambridge. Permanent move away from Peterborough saw sign for Wycombe in 2010 and was on goal-getter as they secured promotion to League 1.

STUART FLEETWOOD (Striker)

Signed for undisclosed fee from Hereford United on deadline day in August 2011. Began career as trainee at Cardiff City, making grade to feature eight times for Bluebirds between 2003 and 2006. In January 2006 signed for Hereford for the first time before joining Forest Green Rovers where plundered 32 goals in a season. Wales U-21 international turned down new contract at FGR to sign for then Championship Charlton in June 2008 but was loaned out Cheltenham, Exeter and Brighton. Returned to Edgar Street last summer and scored 18 goals as he helped the Bulls avoid the drop in League 2.

MATT ROBINSON (Forward)

The directors can fully appreciate how fans feel about the present financial position the club finds itself in but you can rest assured that they are doing everything to rectify the situation. The best way to do this is to increase our attendances between now and the end of the season. 



Lee's cheers and tears with the Bluebirds

The Evening Mail's Barrow AFC reporter LEE PROCTER is moving on after covering the club's activities for nine years. He looks back at the highlights of his time at Holker Street

IT started with a wasted jaunt to Marine for a game that was called off at the last minute and the near write-off of a work's car.

It ended with a 500-mile Tuesday night round trip to Luton to witness a 6-1 drubbing and a bedtime of 2.30am.

In between, my nine years reporting on Barrow AFC, both as understudy and then the main man, have been just as eventful.

There have been highs and lows, cheers and tears, jubilation and frustration, all of which amount to memories I will hold with me for a long time now I have left the Evening Mail today.

Let's stick with the good – Wembley Stadium, Saturday May 8, 2010 and skipper Paul Jones, the man who bled blue and white blood for the club, proudly thrusting aloft the FA Trophy in front of 8,000 delirious supporters.

Wow, I still get goosebumps now, even a tear in the eye.

Having travelled with the squad and spent the entire experience in their company, I felt part of the team. Going to Wembley the day before the final and even getting to kick a ball around on the hallowed turf remains a pub story very few of my mates can trump.

Then there were the FA Cup away days at Middlesbrough and Sunderland and, from a professional

point-of-view, the golden opportunity to interview Premier League managers and players. Perhaps, because it came first, the trip to The Riverside was, for me, the standout of the two. Who will ever forget Jason Walker's goal and then fellow Barrovian Wayne Curtis almost forcing a replay? What a truly special day out that was.

Even better was the Blue Square North play-off final victory over Stalybridge at Burton in 2008. I was stood among the hordes of "shoes off" Barrow supporters seeking colour for my feature article when suddenly Matt Henney tapped-in and the party erupted.

I must have been hugged by more than 100 strangers during the post-match pitch invasion that night.

Probably the best performance I've seen by the Bluebirds was the brutal 4-0 dismantling of an unbeaten Fleetwood side expected to swagger to victory at Holker Street in August 2011.

Indeed, it has often been when tagged as underdogs that Barrow have excelled – the FA Cup wins over Brentford and Oxford United, both at a rocking Holker Street, spring to mind.

Then there are those memories off the pitch that will forever make me smile:

* The thousands upon thousands of miles spent travelling the country with BBC Radio Cumbria's Andy Wood and his questionable selection of chav music.

* The day I jumped on board the supporters' bus and made a 23-hour round trip to Torquay to watch a 4-1 defeat.

* Giving former joint-manager Darren Sheridan a lift back from Crawley and being treated to his full repertoire of one-liners.

* Manager Dave Bayliss's interviews – the guy is non-League's equivalent of Ian Holloway.

* The time ex-midfielder Robin Hulbert dressed up as The Bay radio station's mascot bear and jumped the Mayor of Barrow mid-speech.

* Playing at a rain-lashed Holker Street in a charity match and, despite telling the manager I was a striker, being asked to play left-back and man-mark Chesney from Coronation Street. Random, I know!

There are more, so many more, but, as always, I have already exceeded my word count! (Mail Sports Editor's note: Lee's match reports should be 700 words, they are often more than 1,200. His back page pieces should be 500 words, usually they reach 800).

Away from Barrow AFC, my stand-out highlight was, without a doubt, reporting from last year's Paralympic Games – special thanks to local athletics ace Dean Miller for making that happen.

Oh, and there was the time darts legend Phil 'The Power' Taylor stole my dictaphone – but that, as they say, is another story.

Thanks to everyone – there are way too many to list.





I know we are now into February but as this is our first home game in 2013 may I take this belated opportunity to wish you all a Happy and Prosperous New Year. The past year or so has been a struggle for the club both on and off the field. The recent AGM brought it home to all fans just how difficult it has been for the Directors to keep the club trading whilst trying to provide you the fans with best team possible on the field. Unfortunately the Conference is getting stronger and stronger with more ex league clubs with much greater financial backing through greater income from gate receipts; others are being bankrolled by big financial backers while some have the benefit of both. Unfortunately we at Barrow have neither. Last season our average gate was about 1300 just below mid-table while this year it is below 1000 the third worst in the Conference.

During this time the club have been attempting to bridge the gap with trying to increase off the field income through sponsorship, corporate hospitality and the hiring of the conference rooms out to a variety of local companies during the week and also evenings. Also the club took steps to save money as was explained at the recent AGM. Football at this level is not cheap if we want to stay at this level which we as directors wish to do and I'm sure the vast majority of fans also want to achieve then we will all need to pull together in the same direction.

When the chips are down it is time for everyone to do what they can to help the club get through these difficult times. The easiest thing in the world to do is to blame somebody else for our position. We are all collectively as a members club responsible so let us all try to play our part in whatever way we can to help overcome these difficulties. There are a number of ways that we can all play our part as highlighted below.

Firstly the club needs to put on offers (repeat existing or come up with new practical ideas) to encourage more fans to attend games.

Secondly you as club ambassadors try your utmost to encourage family, friends work colleagues to come along to as many games between now and the end of the season and sell the positives of the club rather than look for the negatives to always put the club down.

Thirdly get involved with the recent initiatives that will bring in some extra income for the club. These include purchasing your holiday currency through Covent Garden FX who not only give you a better deal than the high street but also pay the Bluebird Development Fund a percentage of each transaction. A second and more lucrative initiative is one that was pushed last year but failed to reach its target. The Bluebird Development Fund Account will be more than happy to accommodate any such donations which would certainly help the club get through the difficult financial situation it is in at present. Any such money would be ring fenced for the mortgage and a monthly statement made via the programme, official website and the Forum to keep members and fans fully informed of monies donated.

There are still a number of home and away shirts for sale. If you have not purchased one please can I ask you to consider doing so as this will bring in extra income as shirts have already been purchased by the club. There are also hats, scarfs and caps all available at low prices. Could you do with one of these items to keep out the inclement weather?

The Bluebird Development Fund has been a fantastic help to this club raising over £100,000 during the past 4/5 years to assist with projects and paying bills. This has taken a great deal of effort on their behalf and they can only be congratulated for their magnificent work. Please continue to help them by purchasing their raffle tickets and attending their fund raising functions, the next being a Quiz Night being held in the Cross Bar on the 15th February.

Don't forget there are numerous other ways to help the club either directly or through the BDF. There are still a number of opportunities available within the programme for kit and page sponsorship. Tribute for two of the club's followers

A minute's applause will be held as a tribute to two Barrow fans before today's game with Luton Town.

Kingsman David Robert Shaw, 23, of Barrow, served with the 1st Battalion The Duke of Lancaster's Regiment and was shot when his checkpoint came under attack from insurgents in the Lashkar Gah district of Helmand Province in Afghanistan.

He was flown to the UK but died at the Queen Elizabeth Hospital in Birmingham. His family said he would be "missed and never forgotten".

They said in a statement: "David was a much-loved son and brother who was proud to have served his country in the 1st Battalion The Duke of Lancaster's Regiment. He loved his family and friends and would always make time for a hug for everybody. He enjoyed playing football, running, was an Arsenal fan and also followed his local team, Barrow AFC."

He was first deployed to Afghanistan in March 2010. He returned last October as an assault pioneer as well as a qualified sharpshooter. The MoD said in one incident he administered first aid to four Afghan children who had fallen into a canal after a vehicle accident, showing actions "of the highest calibre".

Lieutenant Colonel Nick Wood, commanding officer of 1st Battalion The Duke of Lancaster's Regiment, said his death was a "devastating tragedy".

"David was a true Cumbrian and Kingsman - physically and mentally tough, a warrior through and through, utterly loyal to those he worked with and possessing a sense of humour that touched us all. Known throughout the Battalion as 'Doctor S', he was the most popular of individuals. His joking and light-heartedness would lift the gloomiest of situations and have us all laughing. He was someone we all wanted to be with and have around."

• Bob Burns, who died at the age of 63, was a keen Barrow supporter – and actually kept goal against Manchester United. That was in a game at Holker Street when the Reds sent a team, containing several of their star names, to Barrow to play Greengate United in a charity match to raise money for an urgent operation for a young Barrow girl. The match was arranged by the soccer team based at the Greengate Workingmen's Club and Bob was their 'keeper.'

Bob spent part of his working life in the licensed trade being the steward of the British Workman's Club when it was in Hindpool Road and later the licensee of the Swan pub in Barrow. In that respect he was following his father John who combined being the landlord of the Market Tavern in Barrow with duties as a funeral director.

Bob is the father of Mike Burns who played county cricket for Warwickshire and Somerset. Bob also leaves daughter Natalie and son Stephen.

The club's condolences go out to both families.

EX BLUEBIRDS IN THE NEWS

There is lots of news involving activities of former Bluebirds since our last home programme.

Firstly, former joint boss Darren Sheridan has quit his post as manager of Salford City in the Evo-stik Northern Premier League First Division North.

City have actually enjoyed a decent enough campaign and almost defeated FC United of Manchester in the F.A. Cup but Shez's departure comes at a time when City have decided to make budget cuts.

Also on the management front David Rush, the former Sunderland and Oxford United striker who played for us during Kenny Lowe's first season in charge in 1999-2000, is the new assistant manager of Gateshead. He has been appointed as No.2 to his former Sunderland team-mate Anth Smith.

In the Championship a former Barrow striker appeared as part of the caretaker management team at Blackburn Rovers. Coach Terry McPhillips made his name as a player with Crewe Alexandra but had a spell on loan here in early 1992 when John King was manager.

While Graham Heathcote is best known, of course, as manager of rivals Altrincham for many years, in 1991-92 he was assistant manager here to John King and then manager in his own right. Graham has recently undergone a hip replacement operation and according to the Altrincham website all has gone well. As an aside our former goalkeeper Ian Senior is still goalkeeping coach to the Robins.

Former skipper Phil Bolland is on the move again. After we released him at the end of last season he had a brief spell in Blue Square Bet North with Droylsden before being released. He then joined FC Halifax Town in the same Division and signed a dual registration with Ashton United in the Evo-stik NPL Premier Division to get some game time – only to be sent off on his debut.

He had of late held down a place in the Halifax defence but he has now moved back west of the Pennines and into Wales and signed for Airbus UK Broughton who look to have a good chance of

possibly finishing as runners up this season to the New Saints – that would mean European football at the Airfield next term!

Bolly's former defensive partner here, Paul Jones, had a brief spell with Airbus earlier in the season which ended without him making a first team appearance, I think.

In the NPL Premier Division our former goalkeeper Ashley Timms is on the move again. Having been released by Ilkeston he has made the short trip to into Derbyshire and signed for league rivals Worksop Town.

Another player from the Phil Wilson era, midfielder Ryan Zico-Black, will be looking for more luck in 2013. He is now resident in Guernsey and has been one of the main reasons behind their rise up the pyramid – so far to the Premier Division of the Combined Counties League.

Before Christmas he broke his leg but if he can recover quickly he is likely to feature as the Islanders have a huge fixture backlog.

It was a far happier Christmas for our former loan goalkeeper Alan Martin. Alan joined Crewe Alexandra in the summer of 2011 but failed to break into the first team as the Railwaymen won promotion through the play-offs.

In the past summer he was handed a six month contract but an injury to first choice keeper and goalkeeping coach Steve Phillips gave the Scot a first team chance which he has grasped with both hands. His excellent form - some of you may have caught some of his efforts on the Football League Show - have earned him an 18 month contract extension which will take him through until the summer of 2014.

If you go back to the 2004-05 season, some of you might remember the uncompromising centre back Karl Colley who did a job for us that season. He has had many clubs since and is now looking for a new club again having been released in unusual circumstances by his last club, Belper Town of the Evo-stik First Division South.

The release has come about as a result of disciplinary issues rather than form and in an unusual move Town's boss Peter Duffield released a statement explaining the decision which seems to have revolved round a training ground incident and the player then taking to an Internet Forum to voice his views.

Meanwhile, Rochdale defender Neill Byrne, who was on loan here during December, has been on trial with Tamworth with a view to an initial loan move.

Young Dean Overson, who had a spell here on loan earlier this season although he did not make a first team appearance, returned to parent club Bradford City in League Two and he has been loaned out to Evo-stik NPL Premier Division side Kendal Town.

Their squad has been decimated following a budget cut and change of manager and Overson joins three Carlisle United teenagers in trying to keep Town out of the relegation places – it seems like a tall order.

He has been joined at Kendal by two other former Bluebirds. Defender Kevin Brown was signed by Phil Wilson in the summer of 2006 but never played a competitive game for us – he has since served Lancaster City, Clitheroe and more recently Bamber Bridge. Also returning to Kendal is our former striker Mike Rushton who featured once for us last season and has been with Ambleside of late – that is where new Town boss Steve Edmondson was managing before he took over at Town.


Striker Obi Anoruo, who failed to make an impact here following his summer signing, has joined Vauxhall Motors in Blue Square Bet North – the club where he enjoyed success a couple of seasons ago whilst on loan from Wrexham.

Another former player on the move is former loan midfielder Luke Sharry. The ex-Bradford City man has been playing for Garforth Town, popping up the Evo-stik NPL First Division North. Just before Christmas he made the short move to join fellow First Division North side Ossett Town.

One ex-Bluebird who seems unlikely to play again this season is former loan striker Mat Bailey who is

now making a name for himself as a central defender with Nantwich Town in the Evo-stik NPL Premier Division.

Bailey has injured knee ligaments and a bit like former keeper Stuart Tomlinson, who suffered a similar injury playing for Burton Albion in League Two, seems set to sit out the rest of this season. Tomlinson, incidentally, has been offered a short term deal by Burton Albion as he looks to recover his fitness.



Alan Martin has signed 18 month contract extension with Crewe.

Up at Workington keeper Aaran Taylor – who signed for us but never made a competitive first team appearance – may be out for the rest of the season due to a wrist injury. That looked set to give a chance at this level to young Stuart Dixon who provided cover for Shaun Pearson in the second half of last season but he has moved to Australia.

Former loan striker Richard Brodie is on the move again. He spent the first half of the season on loan to League Two Morecambe from Crawley Town of League One and reports suggested the Shrimps wanted to make the deal permanent. However Brodie has returned to Blue Square Bet Premier and joined Grimsby Town on loan for the rest of the season – he will be hoping to complete a hat-trick of title medals at this level having collected medals at Crawley Town and Fleetwood Town in the last two seasons.

That move meant that another former Bluebirds striker, Michael Rankine, who had been on loan to the Mariners, has returned to Aldershot Town in League Two.

Also on the move is former midfielder Paul Brown who has left Marine in the Evo-stik NPL Premier Division again and joined their league rivals Nantwich Town.



There is plenty of news to catch up on around the league since our last home programme with the transfer window having re-opened – amongst other things.

AFC TELFORD

In a surprise move before Christmas, boss Andy Sinton decided to allow reserve keeper Danzelle Louis-Hamilton to go out on loan to get game time. He has joined stuttering Evo-stik Northern Premier League Premier Division side AFC Fylde where he links up with a number of his former Fleetwood Town team mates.

He also lost the services of former New Saints striker Chris Sharp – son of former Everton and Scotland star and Sky pundit Graeme - who has joined Hereford United as he wishes to play full time football.

At the start of the New Year before more transfer activity, assistant manager Mike Davies resigned as a result of increasing business commitments. He has been replaced by former Birmingham City and Sheffield Wednesday midfielder Graham Hyde who was assistant at Boston United until Jason Lee was sacked and then had a brief spell in caretaker charge.

That sparked more transfer activity with veteran striker Darren Byfield released, summer signing Jon Brown leaving for Thailand and midfielder Tom Roberts joining struggling Blue Square Bet North side Colwyn Bay. Defender Liam Chivers will not be returning to the club having extended his deal with Port Vale in League Two.

Two new faces arrived – former Hull City defender Joe Lamplough who has been featuring for Kettering Town in the Evo-stik Southern League Premier Division and former Everton junior Ged Kinsella, who plays in midfield, joined on a one month loan from Fleetwood Town of League Two. Another new face is winger Jason Stokes recently released by Boston United of Blue Square Bet North.

MACCLESFIELD TOWN

The first move of the window saw confirmation that midfielder John Paul Kissock had joined the club permanently from Luton Town after a successful loan spell. The club then signed French defender Thierry Audel who has been playing in Italy with Pisa Calcio.

The first player moving out was defender James Bolton who joined Stafford Rangers of the Evo-stik NPL Premier Division on a one month loan.

MANSFIELD TOWN

There was a boost for the Stags prior to their great FA Cup victory over Liverpool after work on the ground saw the

local authority agree to raise the capacity by just over 1,000 to 7,880.

County boss Justin Edinburgh initially lost the services of loan striker Christian Jolley just before Christmas after he was recalled by his parent club AFC Wimbledon of League Two. There were reports that County wanted to extend his loan but it then seemed possible he might be on the move to either Luton Town or Forest Green Rovers. However he eventually agreed a permanent move to Rodney Parade. He was then joined by winger Robbie Willmott from Cambridge United.

First departure of the window from Rodney Parade saw midfielder Jake Thomson agree a one month loan deal with Lincoln City.

Off the field the club have appointed former Worcester City director and chairman and current Conference assistant general manager Dave Boddy as their new chief executive.

NUNEATON TOWN

Before the festive break manager Kevin Wilkin allowed young midfielder Ben Ford to join struggling Evo-stik Southern League Premier Division outfit Kettering Town – he has played for them before. Also leaving Liberty Way for now is Australian goalkeeper Brad McNamara. He joined in the summer and has now been loaned out to Evo-stik Southern League Premier Division neighbours Barwell.

One player who is not joining Town is Coventry City

defender Jordan Willis – the loan deal had been agreed but Willis decided not to move and so City are seeking a loan move for him to a League Two club.

SOUTHPORT

Manager Liam Watson has allowed one of his summer signings, striker Darren Stephenson, to leave the club. He arrived when released by Bradford City of League Two and had previously had a loan spell at Haig Avenue. He has now joined Chorley in the Evo-stik NPL Premier Division having previously been on loan at Victory Park earlier in the campaign.

First signing of the window was confirmation that former defender Andy Owens, who has been on loan back to the club from Mansfield Town, will now stay at Haig Avenue for the rest of the season.

ALFRETON TOWN

Manager Nicky Law has now allowed midfielder Anthony Wilson to leave the club permanently. Wilson was a long serving member of the Reds squad and he will now try to help Evo-stik NPL Premier Division side North Ferriby United win promotion.

Also leaving the Impact Arena is summer signing Tom Denton. The striker who joined the club from Mossley has joined Evo-stik NPL Premier Division Worksop Town for whom he netted 11 goals in 11 games whilst on loan – whilst the fee is undisclosed, rumours suggest it could be a five figure fee and a record for the Tigers.

At the same time in a more surprising move, summer signing Josh Dawkins, previously with Norwich City, has been loaned out to Ryman Premier Division side Lowestoft Town for a month.

Devonshire then moved to reinforce the midfield area by signing Bradley Dack from Gillingham of League Two on an initial one month loan.

CAMBRIDGE UNITED

United have not had a great season to date and before

Christmas they lost the services of experienced midfielder Luke Berry. He originally injured his knee in late November but it has turned out that he now needs surgery and will be side lined until March at least.

The club also agreed that summer signing Scott Garner could remain on loan with Lincoln City until the end of the season.

The first deal to bring a player into the club saw defender Curtis Haynes-Brown signing for the rest of the season having been originally on loan from Yeovil Town of League One who released him as the window opened.

A number of players have left the club. Defender Michael Wylde, previously of Kidderminster Harriers and Tamworth, has been released having been on loan to AFC Telford. Adriano Moke has also been released whilst Newport County have paid a fee to secure the services of winger Robbie Willmott. Youngster Luke Allen has extended his loan to Evo-stik Southern League Premier Division neighbours Cambridge City for the rest of the campaign.

DARTFORD

Boss Tony Burman has again decided to loan out his first choice goalkeeper from last season, Louis Wells. He has joined Leatherhead in the Ryman League First Division South and it will be interesting to see if he is back in the first team frame at the end of the loan.

The first arrival was experienced midfielder Dominic Green, initially for a month from Dagenham & Redbridge of League Two.

EBBSFLEET UNITED

Boss Liam Daish began the window talking of strengthening his defence and his first acquisition was 21 year old defender Jack Saville from Barnet of League Two initially for a month.

FOREST GREEN ROVERS

Rovers manager Dave Hockaday was busy before Christmas tying up a number of his current squad on longer deals. Former Watford midfielder Al Bangura agreed a two year contract extension whilst defenders Chris Stokes and Arran Racine have signed until the summer of 2015.

Goalkeeper Matt Bulman and defender Ed Asafu-Adjaye also agreed to stay until the summer of 2014. In addition defender Eddie Oshodi has signed a new deal which will see him at the club until the summer of 2015.

Experienced defender Chris Todd, on loan at Hereford United earlier in the season, has left the club and signed for Eastleigh of Blue Square Bet South.

OVER THE YEARS

2nd February

1907 Lancs Combination Div 1 Barrow 0 Manchester City Reserves 31

Barrow entertained the Manchester City second string looking to bounce back from the previous week when they had gone down 5-0 to a Bury Reserves side who were to finish in the top four at the end of the season. On paper City Reserves did not appear to be as formidable and as the previous home encounter had seen a 5-1 home success against Nelson, another win might have been in prospect.

Sadly it didn't work out that way as City ran out 3-0 winners, having led by a single goal at the interval. This turned out to be the second game of a run of six all of which were lost and no goals were scored.

1935 Division Three North Barrow 1 Chesterfield 1

Chesterfield were the visitors to Holker Street as manager Tom Lowe sought to pick up the pieces following a 5-0 thrashing the previous week at Fellows Park against Walsall. That game had been the first in 11 League encounters where the team had failed to score and they went into the game looking to preserve the record of having scored in every home League game that season – the only blank had come in an FA Cup tie with Aldershot.

There were three changes. Defender Billy Host dropped out to be replaced by Harold Hopley; Len Wassell also returned to defence to replace Gordon Wilson; and forward Harry Rowbotham replaced Jackie Foster.

Earlier in the season, the team had lost to the visitors 3-0 at Saltergate. A tough game was expected and that was how it turned out. The

The irony was that the run without a goal ended in the return fixture in Manchester when Daisy Bell netted the Barrow goal in a creditable 1-1 draw. That result sparked improved form and a run of five home games without defeat until Southport Central ended the run on the final day of the season.

Barrow finished the season fifth from bottom, the same as 12 months earlier; City were four places above them.

game finished level at 1-1 and the man responsible for earning a point and keeping the home scoring run going was Les Clenshaw. He was a Londoner who had joined the club the previous summer from Southend United. He netted eight League goals that season and this was the start of him scoring four goals in a three game run. In September 1935 he moved on to Mansfield Town.

The scoring run at home continued until mid April when York City recorded a clean sheet in a 2-0 win.

1957 Division Three North Gateshead 2 Barrow 2

Joe Harvey's side travelled to the North-east to take on Gateshead at Redheughs Park. Seven days earlier the team had gone down 2-1 at Holker Street to Hull City but now they were looking to defend an unbeaten League run on the road dating back to a 4-1 defeat at Bradford Park Avenue at the end of September.

Since then the team had played seven times – winning three and drawing on four occasions. In addition the team was looking to avenge a 2-1 defeat by the Tynesiders at Holker Street in September. Manager Harvey stuck with an unchanged team and was rewarded with a point in a hard fought draw.

The Barrow scorers were familiar – Billy Gordon grabbed the first goal in what was a prolific season

for him as he netted 27 times in 40 League appearances. The second goal came from Scotsman Bob Callaghan who had joined the club in September 1956 from Division Three North rivals Scunthorpe United. He netted seven times in 23 League games that season. He remained with the club the following season but was released and joined Southern League side Gloucester City in the summer of 1958.

The unbeaten away run ended in the following away game with a 1-0 defeat at York.

1985 GL Barrow 3 Dagenham 1

Former Manchester United striker and currently Manchester City assistant manager Brian Kidd had a comparatively short and difficult time as Barrow AFC manager. This was his eighth league game in charge and he went into it still looking for a first league win. His first win had come seven days earlier in an ATS Trophy tie at Holker Street when Wren Rovers had been beaten 1-0 with an own goal.

Kidd had completely re-shaped the playing squad and for the visit of Dagenham, there were three new faces in the side. At right back there was a debut for Benny Phillips who had League experience at Bury and Chester whilst in midfield former Burnley youngster Andy Wharton started alongside former Everton winger Ronnie Goodlass.

Things did not look bright at the interval as on the stroke of half-time Peter McDonnell was controversially judged to have brought down visiting forward Scott and Robert Codner drilled the penalty home.

However it was very different after the break as a Barrow side inspired by Nigel Keen, who was reported to be being watched by a scout from Burnley, took command. The equaliser came on 56 minutes when Kevin Keelan, who had made his debut the previous week, took a quick free kick and found Keen who drilled a shot across the keeper and

into the net – it was Barrow's first league goal since December 1.

Three minutes later Barrow took the lead when another of Kidd's signings, Kevin Gorman, fired home from 15 yards – Gorman had first played for Barrow in 1973 and had been deemed not to be good enough. Now he was back helping the cause after a highly successful spell with Mossley.

The icing on the cake came three minutes from time when Colin Cowperthwaite netted from close range after a Phillips shot rebounded from the post.

The result eased the tension and started a six match unbeaten run.

Now is the time to rally round and back the club

Since our last home Blue Square Premier game against Gateshead on Boxing Day, an awful lot has happened.

Fourteen years ago last month the club went into liquidation and was saved from extinction by those who stepped forward to take over the running of the club with the first task of ensuring survival. Some of those individuals are still involved today.

At that point the club was reconstituted as a members club and over 1,200 members joined from the town and beyond. There is a time and a place, I guess to discuss the constitution and whether it works today in the current economic and business climate – and that might be a topic for discussion at the next AGM.

However what saved the club was the interest and membership scheme. At the moment I believe we might have around 400 members – one third of the original number. Those 400 people are the life blood of the club in many ways but there are many others who attend regularly who are not members. What are the reasons?

Of course for all of us you can forget to pay - I did it one year until very late - or lost interest. However there are two more interesting reasons I have seen.

The first is to the effect that "I don't get anything for my membership". Well for £20 you get very little these days – in fact that would not buy you entrance to a game above Blue Square Bet Premier level in most instances.

The board, in recent times, managed to link some offers to the membership but in reality it is a donation. I think it is not a large donation but every little helps and I have been cheered by a number of contributors to the Forum setting out to get family and friends to become members – every little helps.

The reality is that as a member you do get the right to attend the AGM and if you want to you can put yourself forward to become a director.

The second interesting reason is that people have not rejoined because they don't like the way the club is being and has been run. That is their prerogative but there seem to be a lot of unrealistic expectations.

Some of you might just remember the trust type scheme that runs Ebbsfleet United which if reports are to be believed are struggling for members. That was designed to give supporters a say in just about

everything including signings and team selections.

Football is a business and there has to be trust between, in our case, the members and the board. I am sure there would be an acceptance that at times things might have been done better or there might have been better communication but one of the pleasing things again to come out through a number of comments on the Forum is the fact that there is recognition that trying to run a members football club is a difficult and thankless business.

Some of you who read this will agree with these sentiments, others will disagree but that is fine. However, to quote the song "We are all in this together" and we are in a battle so, how can we win it?

On the field, we have to take it as read that Dave and Ash will have whoever puts on the jersey fired up and ready to die for the cause. We have got to back them from minute one to minute 90 – particularly at home. We have a lot of games to play at home against teams in our half of the table and we simply have to win those.

I and many of you have been at Holker Street when a crowd of 1,000 has sounded a lot more and been the team's 12th man. We need that in every game from now until the end of the season.

Off the field we also have to all pull together. Put aside history and let's all pull together. There have been some fantastic schemes appearing on the Forum which people are contributing to such as the betting syndicate – not everyone's cup of tea I accept – the canvas sale, the enthusiasm for Bluebirds Account. These will help but long term we have to find ways of bringing the floaters or non-attenders back.

The bottom line is that we are now competing in a world where you can go to a pub on a Saturday afternoon and watch a Premiership match instead of coming to your local game. There have been some interesting suggestions about attendance prices and the club has run a kids ticket scheme but one of the challenges is that any scheme has to bring in more money than if you didn't do anything. And that's the rub.

Let's look at two recent schemes. A couple of years ago Mansfield ran a scheme for the visit of Gateshead where fans could pay what they wanted to get in. I recall they got a capacity crowd but reports later suggested the gate receipts had been no better than an average home gate – the catering had gone well but for

the next home game the attendance was back to the previous level.

Very recently Morecambe let everyone in for free for the visit of Dagenham & Redbridge on a Tuesday night. A game that might have attracted 1,700 attracted 4,000. But none of those 4,000 paid. Sure they might have brought a programme and food but the gamble Morecambe took is that some of those who came and don't usually come would return. Let's see what their next home gate is.

Some of you might also have read the article about York City's return to the Football League and the fact that despite going to two Wembley appearances during the season they lost over £750k. That tells you that even success doesn't bring profit and if the report was right and suggested that 97per cent of income was spent on player wages, then in my view you can see what is wrong with football.

One of the great myths about us is that we made a lot of money out of two FA Cup third round appearances and winning the Trophy. We did make money but not as

much as people think. The real money that you make, particularly in the FA Cup, is the prize money.

I always remember the trip to Sunderland. Remember they reduced their prices for the game but we still seemed set for a bumper pay day. Then on the day you look and see more stewards than I have ever seen at a Barrow game. All of those had to be paid out of the gate before we got any share.

So, what am I saying (and I think many others are too)? Let's put concerns and criticisms to one side, let's not have a post mortem about recent events now but let's acknowledge that we all have one common goal – to see the team finish 20th in Blue Square Bet Premier or higher when the final whistle blows on April 20.

That means getting behind the team and the club, trying to encourage as many people as possible to join the cause and get behind the team. We didn't have the best team in the world in 1999 but the people of Furness came out in the droves to support them. I know the world is different but let's try for that spirit again.

Down Memory Lane

February began with a series of firsts as Redditch United visited Holker Street - we recorded our first ever Conference North win over them at 2-0. Mark Boyd scored his first goal for the club and Paul Jones netted his first of the season and that set up the visit of league leaders Kettering Town the following Tuesday - that game had been the subject of a late call off in December.

This time the game got underway and Matt Henney even gave us the lead but the heavy persistent rain continued and the abandonment in the second half was inevitable. The signs that team were starting on a run again came in the next two games - at Alfreton and Hinckley.

In the first a back to the wall effort earned a point in a 0-0 draw as Town missed a penalty and then at Hinckley, Chris Thompson equalised with a second half penalty before in injury time Mark Boyd stepped up to curl home a free kick.

There had been transfer movement by this time with young Rhys Hardie released and replaced in the squad by Rio Nelson. Kevin Rapley had returned from Vauxhall Motors but he seemed to be out of the management's plans.

A visit from Blyth Spartans ended in a 1-1 draw with Henney equalising in the second half after the team had laid siege to the visitors' goal - Paul Jones almost grabbed an injury time winner. The crowd of just over 1,000 suggested that the fans might be starting to believe again.

The first week in March was pivotal to what followed. It began with an effective performance at Hilton Park to defeat struggling Leigh RMI 2-1 with goals from Henney and Jason Walker. A midweek win over old rivals Boston United at Holker Street followed thanks to McNulty's early goal.

On March 8, the team produced one of their best performances of the season as they handed out a 5-1 thrashing to Solihull Moors thanks to a Nick Rogan double plus efforts from Walker, Henney and McNulty - the only down side was the late injury to substitute James Scales.

By the time the team visited play-off chasing Nuneaton Borough seven days later there was a new face in the squad - striker Paul Tait, a man of many clubs who joined from Northwich Victoria and he played a part late on as we secured a point in a 0-0 draw - perhaps we had a little luck in the game as Tim Deasy was only cautioned for handling outside his box when he might have seen red.

The play-off places were in reach and two wins over Easter helped us move closer to them. On Good Friday there was a first goal of the year from Andy Bond in injury time to defeat Hyde United and 72 hours later at Hucknall, McNulty popped up to head a first half winner. That set up a trip to AFC Telford who were also chasing a play-off place. The home side were stunned in the opening half hour as Rogan and Walker netted to give us a two goal lead that we never looked like losing.

The result gave us six wins and a draw in March - it was good enough to win Dave Bayliss and Darren Sheridan the "Manager of the Month" award and to make us real play-off contenders.

We had to keep winning to put the pressure on Harrogate Town and Nuneaton Borough and we began the month by squeezing home against Alfreton Town thanks to a Thompson penalty and a late Rogan goal.

The crowd was growing and there was a fair travelling support the following Tuesday night for the trip to Workington. It was a tight local derby and it looked like finishing goalless until with only five

minutes remaining we won a free kick on our right and substitute Darren Sheridan drifted the ball over the wall, beyond Adam Collin and into the net. We were in the play-off zone. The question was whether we could stay there.

The answer was emphatically "yes" as we played our final away game of the season against Redditch United at the Valley Stadium and won 5-0 - Rogan netted twice whilst Walker, Bond and McNulty scored as Deasy saved a penalty, again.

The visit of the champions elect Kettering Town was another milestone as 2,067 fans came through the turnstiles - more than double the number that might have attended the game when originally scheduled back in December. They saw Thompson convert a second half penalty to earn us a point.

That left us with two home games which we simply had to win and the first was against Tamworth. The game was over by half-time as Henney netted twice to give us a 2-0 win. Henney was then withdrawn as he was carrying an injury and he was clearly vital for the final game of the regular season.

The midweek attention turned to play-off rivals Harrogate Town who were playing at Tamworth. They could only manage a draw and that left a simple equation for our final home game against Worcester City - as long as we equalled or bettered the Harrogate Town result we were in the play-offs.

City were stuffy opponents but a crowd of 2,468 - the best for a league game in over ten years - erupted on 17 minutes as the ever reliable Henney netted the only goal of the game to secure a play off place. A quite remarkable achievement.

Our play-off semi-final opponents were AFC Telford, a side we had done the double over in the league but clearly they were going to be difficult to beat. The first leg was at Holker Street. A magnificent crowd of 2,701 came through the gate, despite the Champions League semi-final between Chelsea and Liverpool, and they had to wait 70 minutes for the breakthrough.

When it came the scorer was a surprise - it was Paul Tait's first goal for the club, scored minutes after replacing Walker. And when Rogan added a second goal in the dying minutes, we were well set for the second leg.

That second leg was played on a Sunday before a partisan home crowd but the majority of the 4,123 fans were stunned in the first half as home defender Roberts turned a Mark Boyd corner past his own keeper and then in the second half substitute Tait struck again to win the game 2-0 and the tie on aggregate 4-0. Just one step more for glory.

Friday, May 8; venue the Pirelli Stadium, Burton. The Blue Square North Play-off Final - Barrow v Stalybridge Celtic. Not the most romantic of venues but one well suited for the game and the live TV coverage.

The crucial news for Barrow was that Henney was fit to start but he had little chance to shine in a first half that saw few chances. Celtic began the second half brighter with Deasy saving from Hall before on 57 minutes the goal arrived. Garner fouled Brown on the right. Boyd floated the ball into the area, McNulty headed down and Matt Henney fired the ball home from close range to the delight of the Barrow fans behind the goal.

There was still half an hour left. Celtic had their chances - there was a shout for a penalty for hand ball against Henney that on another day might have been given; McNulty hacked the ball clear after Deasy had made a fingertip stop to deny Barlow; and Tait, on for Walker, had spent the last ten minutes playing as an extra central defender.

When the final whistle sounded there was a mixture of elation and disbelief. How could this be the side that at the start of November had been staring relegation in the face? Well it was and somehow Dave Bayliss and Darren Sheridan had lifted the team to glory beyond the fans wildest dreams. "Shoes off if you love Barrow?" You bet.
