



NEILSON

Good afternoon and welcome to Kenilworth Road for today's game against Mansfield Town.

I would like to extend a warm welcome to our visitors, including their manager Paul Cox, plus his management team and players.

The past few days have been very difficult following the news that Paul Buckle left the club. I was told by Gary Sweet at the team hotel prior to the Macclesfield game and it goes without saying that it came to a massive shock.

That meant myself, Carl Emberson, Stuart Cash and Dmitri Kharine were placed in charge of the game, as we are again this afternoon.

Decisions

In the lead up to the Macclesfield game we had already worked on and spoken about tactics and team selection for the match with Paul, but we never envisaged that we would be in the position of making the decisions directly without him.

The performance itself was mixed. We started very well, hitting the post early on before Andre Gray put us ahead. Macclesfield had their goalkeeper sent off but we failed to build on our numerical advantage.

Our second half display was less encouraging but we were in for training on Wednesday to assess what happened and went over how we could have improved our performance.

It was hugely disappointing to only earn a point but, if we're looking for positives, we stopped the rot away from home and scored – something we haven't done a lot in recent fixtures away from Kenilworth Road.

Tuesday's second half display highlighted our need for improvement and I am hoping that will be evident this afternoon. Mansfield are doing well themselves, overcoming an indifferent spell of form earlier in the season to now be one of the contenders for promotion.

We should not forget that whilst the last few months have been disappointing, we still have a very good squad of talented players at this club. For me, confidence is the biggest thing in football.

Without it, players can struggle, but with it they can thrive and show their true potential. Myself, Carl, Stuart and Dimi's job is to ensure that the players' belief is there.

But we need to start somewhere. Macclesfield was a point gained. We cannot afford to look back on past results in a negative way as that doesn't help anyone. Positivity and confidence breeds and we need to kick-start that and build momentum today.

Confidence

There is a lot of football still left to be played between now and the end of the season. 17 games, including today's, remain, and we'll be playing twice a week right now until the end. The schedule itself gives us an opportunity to build momentum and lift confidence, and a win this afternoon would work wonders.

With confidence players are quicker, stronger and better on the ball. When the pressure is off – like we showed against Norwich and Wolves – players can enjoy their football. That's what we need to go back to.

I want players playing with confidence because we have some exceptional players at this football club. They are good enough – they just need it coaxing out of them at the minute.

Situations like the one we find ourselves in now are never easy, but now is not the time to just throw in the towel.

We need your support today like we've never needed before. Forget Norwich and Wolves – today is a huge game, so please get behind the players who are selected this afternoon. We all want the same thing, remember – for Luton Town to be a success.

The players' efforts in the FA Cup have installed a lot of pride back into the club and into the town – but now is the time we all join forces to ensure that this pride is not lost.

Thank you for your support and get behind us this afternoon.

FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH DIRECTOR DAVID WILKINSON



Good afternoon to everyone and a warm welcome to Kenilworth Road to all the officials, players and supporters from Mansfield Town.

Having had a disappointing start to the season Mansfield have recently hit form and are now right in the mix for Play-Offs and promotion so we hope for an exciting and competitive game this afternoon.

As part of my current research I can tell you that we have played each other 28 times since I first came to Kenilworth Road in 1958, which includes the game in 1968 in which Graham French scored what has been voted as Luton's best ever goal – and you can read about that elsewhere in today's programme.

Hopes

They say a week is a long time in politics well what is it in football? A week ago we were about to play in the FA Cup fifth round with hopes of being the first non-league club in almost a century to make the quarter-finals, and now after a disappointing 1-1 draw on Tuesday night, we are once again looking for a new manager.

As on previous occasions, the Board has appointed a committee to put together a list of applicants and potential targets and to refine a shortlist.

The committee for this stage of the process will consist of Gary Sweet, Barry Gold and Billy Jennings. Barry and Billy have been working with us for a little while now, and have vast knowledge of and extensive contacts in the business.

Interviews

They will inquire and research more deeply and the top candidates be invited to interviews. The Board has set out the necessary criteria and the strengths expected from the chosen one.

I believe that the attributes are what most fans would expect, but it has to be said that even Sir Alex might not

tick all the boxes. In other words we are being demanding, but we have a short time scale and we are a Conference football club so some compromises may have to be made.

I also need to say that it is our hope that we can find a man to become part of the "Luton family" and give us some long-term stability.

Fantastic supporter base

We appreciate that the job is not easy and the pressures are much greater than at smaller clubs that lack our history and fantastic supporter base, but we are determined to get it right for the long-term and not have to make this the annual event, which it seems to have become.

Paul Buckle's departure was not expected, and we spent a lot of time making sure that he was comfortable with the decision. It became increasingly clear that he had no option but to depart.

We have promised Paul that, although we now know the full facts behind the decision we will not disclose them until they become public information, at which time it will become clear that his reasons were genuine and not football related.

We have enjoyed working with him, believe that he has made a difference and wish him well in his future endeavours. We are parting on good terms and I hope that we can include him amongst our supporters in the future.

Media storm

On a lighter note in the Boardroom before the Millwall game we were discussing the media storm surrounding it and the revival of memories of 1985, and both sides commented that we had played each other a lot since then with limited problems so I thought I would look up the facts.

We have played Millwall 27 times in all competitions without any significant trouble. In fact since I first came to Kenilworth Road, we have played them over 50 times, and they are second in our most-played-against chart equalling Watford and QPR.




Shock

It was a massive blow ahead of another important game, but we knew we had to focus on winning three points.

We started the match off very well and should have been a couple of goals up before we eventually took the lead through Andre Gray's goal. Macclesfield had their goalkeeper sent off but, despite having a number of chances, we couldn't find a second goal.

That proved to be costly as our second half performance was below par, and that allowed Macclesfield back into the game and they equalised with about 15 minutes left.

It was fair to say it wasn't a good evening. Paul's departure was totally unexpected; especially considering he only came to Kenilworth Road at the back end of last season.



He was beginning to build a team here, and the squad here is still extremely talented and full of winners. It was completely out of the blue, but on behalf of the rest of the lads, I would like to thank him and wish him the best of luck.

Good form

This afternoon we welcome Mansfield to Kenilworth Road, a team who are currently high on confidence and in good form. They are on the kind of run we need to get on if we are to succeed this season.

There is absolutely no reason why we cannot end this season with something to celebrate. It's important we win today – we need to start somewhere, and we have been in excellent form at home for several months now.

THE LATEST NEWS AT KENILWORTH ROAD

BUCKLE LEAVES TOWN

Hours before our match at Macclesfield on Tuesday night it was with much regret that we announced, by mutual consent, and as a result of genuine personal circumstances unrelated to his tenure as manager of Luton Town Football Club, that Paul Buckle had parted company with the Club. The reasons for Paul's departure are fully understood by the Board, who sincerely regret that he is leaving. We are fully aware that achieving managerial stability will create the conditions necessary for success on the football pitch.

We are grateful to Paul for what he has brought to the Club and believe that he has built the foundations necessary for Luton Town to achieve the Board's desire of returning to the Football League as soon as possible.

RECRUITMENT PROCESS UNDER WAY

On Wednesday morning members of the Hatters board met to discuss the process of appointing Paul Buckle's successor and a recruitment panel has been put in place to lead the football club into a new era. This panel includes the extremely experienced duo of Bill Jennings and Barry Gold.

They will undertake the role of football consultants by assisting the board of directors with their football expertise, to complete the process. Jennings and Gold have been working on recruitment and scouting for Luton Town Football Club for some time, are well known to the Club and will ensure the best outcome as their main priority. Once the panel was appointed it drew up the specific characteristics and key skills required to lead Luton Town and to establish the consistency of the interviewing process.

The board were united in the desired qualities needed for the next suitable candidate, however the appeal

of applicants deemed as 'wildcards' would again be assessed if they were confirmed as being suitably fit for the role to ensure the process is explored exhaustively.

A high number of applications have already been received by the panel and a short-list is being created.

The interviewing process will begin on Thursday with Gary Sweet, Bill Jennings and Barry Gold conducting the initial stages. If an applicant is successful in the initial stage they will be recommended to other nominated board members to conclude the second and final stage of the interviewing process.

There is unlikely to be any further comment on this situation from the Club until terms have been agreed and a first team manager has been installed into his new position.

THREE UP THREE DOWN MESSAGE

Supporters in the Kenilworth Road were asked to help display an important message prior to our FA Cup tie with Millwall last Saturday.

Coloured cards were held aloft by fans to reveal 'Three Up, Three Down', a message Town chairman Nick Owen hopes can instigate an increase in the number of promotion and relegation places between the Football League and the Blue Square Bet Premier.

"It has become quite apparent over the past decade that the Conference has become a real bottleneck for football clubs wishing and needing to progress," said Owen.

"We are proud to be members of a League which is professionally run and which regularly produces high quality and exciting football being played by a host of professional clubs who boast attendance figures that would put several League sides to shame.

"We feel the current set-up of one automatic promotion spot could have potentially damaging repercussions on a

number of clubs who drop down to this division – there have already been two cases of clubs dropping out of the Football League who have since dissolved.

"The quality of football, allied with the fact promoted clubs from the Conference continue their success once in League 2, is a clear indication that, year-on-year, the Conference is improving and we – Luton Town – believe that should be rewarded by the football family."

NOW WE SEE YOU NOW WE DON'T

Town duo Jake Woolley and Alex Lacey were both given special dispensation to be named as substitutes in last Saturday's game with Millwall.

Both players were out on loan spells but, since the Hatters' exit from the competition, they have returned to Hitchin and Eastleigh respectively to continue their time out on loan.

In other developments involving Town players out on loan, winger James Dance scored in two successive games for Nuneaton – both in injury time – to ensure the Boro won their last two fixtures.

THOMAS GRANTED CLEARANCE

The Town's frustrating wait for Wayne Thomas' international clearance was finally put to bed following the granting of a provisional clearance by the Football Association on Wednesday.

Wayne put pen to paper on Monday 4th February and international clearance was immediately applied for from the Greek Football Federation (HFF) as he was last registered with Veria FC in Greece.

Usually international clearance is received within a day or two, but on this occasion the HFF did not respond at all forcing Wayne to sit out four matches including the FA Cup tie with Millwall when the Hatters were without the services of three central defenders through suspension and being cup-tied. Under FIFA regulations, if international clearance is not received within 15 clear days then the Football Association can issue a provisional clearance and this duly arrived today.

Wayne is now available for selection and will no doubt be keen to make his long awaited Hatters' debut.




We have the pleasure of welcoming brothers Louis and Ben Twelvetree as our mascots for this afternoon's match.

WELCOME MANSFIELD TOWN



Today the Hatters welcome Mansfield Town to Kenilworth Road for a gripping promotion chasing clash.

Much like the Hatters, Mansfield lie poised and ready to pounce into the top five after results in the week left the Play-Off picture wide open.

Mansfield currently occupy sixth place in the Blue Square Bet Premier and three points off the Play-Off pace but with a run of three away games in the next four outings for the Stags, points this afternoon is of the highest order.

Once again the comparison between the sides comes in to play as Mansfield have had their struggles away from the One Call Stadium. Six defeats away from home could be seen as the reason for Mansfield's position outside the top five, but since the turn of the year Paul Cox's men have looked to resurrect their form away from Nottinghamshire.

Three wins from their last five away matches has seen their form dramatically improve and, after a midweek win away at Hyde, the Stags will want to continue their form in Bedfordshire this afternoon.

In recent years Kenilworth Road has not been a happy hunting ground for the Stags, however, and in a total of 13 meetings on the Hatters home turf Mansfield have retreated with maximum points just twice.

A closely contested fixture is always on the cards between these two non-league giants which has seen the

last five meetings end all square. Earlier in the season the sides met on a Sunday afternoon in Nottinghamshire and as the night drew in Andre Gray stepped up to twice put the Hatters ahead prior to Matt Green's late equaliser to earn a share of the spoils.

A number of former Hatters litter the Stags dressing room. George Pilkington departed Kenilworth Road in the summer and joined up with the Stags to take charge of the defensive line. Despite his highly anticipated move though, he has struggled to nail down a starting spot, unlike fellow former Hatter Adam Murray. He made just seven appearances whilst at Kenilworth Road in 2010 but has found solace at the One Call Stadium and has become an ever present source of experience in the middle of midfield.

A good attentive display is expected from both sides who have not struggled to find the net since the outset of the season.

Both sides have been prolific in front of goal at home this campaign which Barrow duly found out against both clubs in the past few weeks. Firstly their visit to Kenilworth Road ended with Jon Shaw bagging the match ball in a 6-1 drubbing. And just over a month later Mansfield smashed eight past the sorry Bluebirds with five goals netted in the first half. That was enough to win the manager an Aston Martin DB9 from the chairman giving an all new meaning to quick fire goals.

Mansfield started the season as one of the favourites for the Blue Square Bet Premier title, but begun the campaign poorly with only five wins from their opening 13 games.

However, Paul Cox's team turned things around and are now the division's most in-form team scoring goals at will. In fact, the Stags' run has been so impressive that they now have their eyes firmly fixed on the title again as they are only eight points behind Wrexham with two games in hand and a total of 48 points still to play for.

A CLOSER LOOK AT MANSFIELD'S SEASON SO FAR

Mansfield sit poised in sixth with 53 points having played 30, won 16, drawn five, lost nine, scoring 59 and conceding 41. The Stags are in the hottest form of any team in league currently having won six of their last seven games whilst scoring an incredible 24 goals in that period. Recent 5-0 and 8-1 victories have elevated Cox's team to being among the division's top scoring sides. Mansfield may not look like the imperious outfit they are after a glance at their away record, but that, as you are about to find out, is rather deceiving. The fact that the Stags have lost six of their 14 games away from home may be encouraging to Hatters fans on the face of it, but when you consider they have won six of their last seven games on their travels and have only conceded four goals, there is reason to be concerned.

HOW WILL THEY PLAY? WHO ARE THEIR DANGER MEN?

Expect Cox's side to come out of the blocks quickly at Kenilworth Road today. The Stags boast one of the finest first-half records in the Blue Square Bet Premier having only been behind five times in 30 games going into the break. Mansfield have been leading 13 times going into half-time and, worryingly for the Hatters, they have won 12 when doing so. In terms of playing style, the Nottinghamshire outfit are all about intensity and work-rate. Cox's men are full of industry and will look to swarm Luton with an aggressive pressing game. They will attempt to suffocate the Town denying players the time to settle on the ball and pick a pass. Expect attacks to be



quick and direct with Mansfield's wide men trying to get at the Hatters full-backs in one-on-ones in order to swing crosses in for the aerially-imposing Matt Green.

It will be a big day for Bedford-born goalkeeper Adam Marriot starting for the visitors in the county of his birth. Lee Beevers will start at right-back alongside John Dempster and the vastly-experienced Conference centre-half Luke Jones.

James Jennings, a set-piece specialist who signed in February from Cambridge United, will take the left-back berth.

Louie Briscoe, who dashed Hatters hopes of going to Wembley for the FA Trophy final in 2011 with an extra-time penalty, will be a constant threat from the right with his natural ability to go past players.

On the other flank, the industrious Colin Daniel will look to stifle any adventures forward from Ronnie Henry and Alex Lawless. Ex-Luton midfielder Adam Murray will marshall the Mansfield midfield alongside the militant Anthony Howell whose job will be to destroy any Luton play. Lee Stevenson, who has a reputation as a prolific goalscoring attacking midfielder after tallying 67 goals in two seasons for Eastwood Town, will operate behind the powerhouse that is striker Green. Green will relish a battle with Steve McNulty and their aerial duels should be a constant feature.

THOUGHTS FROM THE OAK ROAD

TALK OF THE TOWN GETS THE INSIDE WORD FROM THE VISITORS' CAMP

WHAT'S YOUR NAME? Paul Taylor (Honorary President of the Stags Supporters Association)

AGE? 56

HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN SUPPORTING YOUR CLUB? 45 years

YOU WERE BIG PROMOTION FAVOURITES BEFORE A BALL WAS KICKED AND IN RECENT WEEKS APPEAR TO BE LIVING UP TO THAT EXPECTATION. HOW WOULD YOU RATE YOUR SEASON SO FAR? Mixed. We did not start too well but since the end of November we have started to show the kind of form which last year took us to the Play-Offs. A couple of weeks ago we stumped Barrow 8-1 and were brilliant, but then the following game that midweek we were not so good and lost at Newport - which in some way typifies our season.

GEORGE PILKINGTON WAS A HATTERS' HERO, YET HAS BARELY MADE A HANDFUL OF APPEARANCES FOR YOU SINCE SIGNING IN THE SUMMER. WHAT'S HAPPENED? I am not really sure. Many Stags fans admired George when he played against us but he has only played four times for us and has never been on the winning side (not that he was to blame for that) so it has been difficult to judge him this season.

WHO'S YOUR PLAYER TO WATCH? Lee Stevenson, who is finally having a decent run in the side and showing the kind form we were promised he was capable of when Paul Cox brought him to the One Call Stadium from his previous club Eastwood Town.

WHAT DO YOU MAKE OF THE JOB MANAGER

PAUL COX IS DOING? Paul Cox has been our most successful Conference manager as we made the Play-Offs in his first season with 89 points. He is known for having fabulous second halves of seasons so if we make promotion back to the big league he would go down in Stags folklore. That said, it is widely believed he has the best budget ever given to a Stags manager. No doubt he enhanced his reputation globally with the way he conducted himself with the media who were attracted to the club during the Liverpool FA Cup tie.

WHAT ARE YOUR MEMORIES FROM FACING LUTON? Luton have yet to win at our place, so from the first time I saw Luton play there (a 1-0 win for us on Easter Monday 1969, when you were reigning Fourth Division Champions) they've been quite good.

At Kenilworth Road it has been a different story, with the trip home after the FA Trophy semi-final second leg

that took us to Wembley a couple of years ago the pick of the lot. I did enjoy one Luton win, I was in the Luton end at Wembley in 1988 when you beat Arsenal to win the Littlewoods Cup.

THIS IS MANSFIELD'S FIFTH SEASON IN THE CONFERENCE. ARE YOU SURPRISED NOT TO HAVE GAINED PROMOTION BY NOW? WHY DO YOU FEEL PROMOTION IS SO DIFFICULT TO ACHIEVE? When we were relegated in 2008

the club was in a very poor state. A month before our first season in the Conference, the club (thankfully) changed ownership, but we had about five players and no manager so I did not have any preconception of an immediate return. With another change in ownership I thought we would do it last year, particularly when we made the Play-Offs. As you yourselves have found out, this is the hardest league to get out of and each year it seems to get more difficult. The Conference should be three up, three down with the Football League.

WHO'S THE BEST PLAYER YOU'VE SEEN PULL ON A MANSFIELD SHIRT? Dudley Roberts, the greatest header of a ball I have ever seen.

IF THERE WAS ONE ASPECT OF MODERN FOOTBALL YOU COULD GET RID OF, WHAT WOULD IT BE? Players who feign injury, dive, handball and basically cheat.

WHAT'S YOUR FAVOURITE MANSFIELD SONG/CHANT? "My old man said be a Spireite fan" - it's too offensive to continue but I hate Chesterfield with a passion!

WILL YOU GO UP THIS SEASON? WHAT ABOUT LUTON? The jury is still out on that one. It's a tall order for both to do so as one of us would need to win the league. The Play-Offs are a distinct possibility for both clubs so one of us could do it, I hope it's us!

WHAT'S THE SCORE GOING TO BE? 2-1 to Mansfield Town. It's about time we won one here again!



CLASSIC CAMPAIGNS

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS SELECTS 10 POST-WAR MANSFIELD TOWN CLASSIC CAMPAIGNS

1950/51

Mansfield Town finished Third Division (North) runners-up in 1950/51. The Stags were unbeaten in their opening six games and maintained their promotion challenge, with the 1-1 draw at home to title rivals Rotherham United in mid-January watched by 18,343. Mansfield failed to catch them despite ending the campaign with 11 wins in a 15-match unbeaten run, but it was their highest placing at that time and they were unbeaten at Field Mill that season. Freddie Steele's side also reached the FA Cup fifth round and Sammy Chessel, John Grogan and Jack Lewis were ever-present, while Billy Coole was leading scorer.

1962/63

Ken Wagstaff and Roy Chapman scored 64 league goals between them as Mansfield Town won promotion in 1962/63. New signing Colin Askey also impressed as the Stags won their opening six Fourth Division games but that winter's 'big freeze' caused widespread postponements and Mansfield resumed their league fixtures in early March with a 4-2 win over rivals Oldham Athletic. Tommy Cummings became player-boss in place of Raich Carter, who resigned to manage Middlesbrough, and the Stags overcame fixture congestion to pip Gillingham to promotion on goal average, with a 1-1 draw at Stockport County in their final game.

1964/65

Mansfield Town were unlucky not to win promotion to the Second Division in 1964/65. Despite the mid-season sale of Ken Wagstaff and Roy Chapman to Hull City and Lincoln respectively, the Stags remained in the promotion race. Newcomers included Shrewsbury pair John Gregson and Harry Middleton, while Bill Curry arrived from Derby County and grabbed a hat-trick in the 8-1 annihilation of QPR. With five games remaining Mansfield were well placed to win promotion but then costly defeats at Reading and title rivals Carlisle United enabled Bristol City to pip Tommy Cummings' side to promotion on goal average.

1968/69


Tommy Eggleston managed Mansfield Town to the FA Cup sixth round in 1968/69. Summer signings included Johnny Quigley from Bristol City and Mick Hopkinson from Derby County, with the Stags winning their first two Third Division games to emerge as early leaders. A disappointing sequence of results saw Mansfield slide down the table after this but they made headlines with their FA Cup exploits. The Stags defeated Tow Law 4-1, Rotherham United 1-0, Sheffield United 2-1 and Southend United 2-1 before an epic 3-0 fifth round win at home to West Ham. They lost 1-0 to Leicester in the sixth round.

1974/75

New manager Dave Smith guided Mansfield Town to the Fourth Division title in 1974/75. Early signings included Gordon Hodgson from Newcastle and Ray Clarke from Swindon, with the Stags winning their opening four Fourth Division games. Kevin Bird returned from injury and a 3-1 win at home to title rivals Shrewsbury enabled Mansfield to open up a four point lead in early December. The Stags reached the FA Cup fifth round and went on to clinch the title with a thrilling 7-0 win over Scunthorpe. Goalkeeper Rod Arnold, Sandy Pate and top scorer Ray Clarke were ever-present as the Stags amassed a record 68 points.

1976/77

Mansfield Town won the Third Division title in 1976/77. Peter Morris returned as player-manager and Johnny Miller followed him from Norwich City. Despite the summer sale of Ray Clarke, the Stags began with a 3-1 win over Preston and their unbeaten run of league matches stretched back to the previous February. Ernie Moss was signed from Peterborough and rekindled his striking partnership with Kevin Randall, while Billy McEwan arrived from Chesterfield. The Stags clinched promotion to the Second Division for the first time with a 2-0 win over Portsmouth, then triumphed 1-0 at Wrexham to win the title.



1977/78

Mansfield Town prepared for their first ever Second Division campaign by signing Ian Phillips and Northern Ireland international Pat Sharkey from Ipswich and Dave Syrett from Swindon. The latter two scored as the Stags kicked off with a 2-1 victory at home to newly-relegated Stoke City but the record run of 38 home league matches undefeated ended when Brighton won 2-1 at Field Mill. Mansfield drew both games against high-flying Spurs but despite experienced newcomers like John Aston and Dennis Martin, they failed to consolidate higher status under Billy Bingham who replaced Peter Morris as manager.

1985/86

Ian Greaves guided Mansfield Town to promotion to the Third Division in 1985/86. New signing Keith Cassells scored a hat-trick on his debut as the Stags began with a 4-0 win at home to Hereford United, with fellow newcomer Neville Chamberlain netting the other goal. There were thrilling Milk Cup ties against Middlesbrough and Chelsea, with Mansfield remaining in third place for most of the season. Promotion was clinched with a 4-0 win at home to Hartlepool and the Stags finished third with 81 points. Kevin Hitchcock and George Foster were ever-present, while Neville Chamberlain was top scorer with 16 goals.

1986/87

Mansfield Town played in their first Wembley final in 1986/87. The newly-promoted Stags challenged at the top of the Third Division early in the season, then slipped back into mid-table and finished in 10th position. Ian Greaves' side beat York City 1-0, Bury 2-1, Middlesbrough 1-0 and Chester 2-1 en route to the Freight Rover Trophy final. Mansfield defeated holders Bristol City 5-4 on penalties after a 1-1 draw at Wembley: Kevin Hitchcock, Mick Graham, Paul Garner, Tony Lowery, George Foster, Tony Kenworthy, Kevin Kent, Jason Danskin (Gary Pollard), Neil Whatmore (Ian Stringfellow), Keith Cassells, Mark Kearney.

2001/02

Stuart Watkiss achieved instant success as manager by guiding Mansfield Town to promotion in 2001/02. The Stags were early pace-setters under Billy Dearden, remaining unbeaten in their first seven matches, and climbed to second place with a 3-0 victory over Swansea City at the start of December. Assistant-boss Stuart Watkiss succeeded Notts County-bound Billy Dearden in charge early in the New Year and signed Eire international striker David Kelly. The Stags overcame a run of five games without a win to clinch the third promotion slot with a 2-0 victory over Carlisle United. Chris Greenacre was top scorer with 21 goals.





CUP DREAM OVER

Once again it was individual errors that Paul Buckle felt cost his team a place in the quarter-final of the FA Cup after defeat at home to Millwall.

In what has been an achilles heel for the Town all season, the manager was frustrated that his side were unable to get their noses ahead after conceding James Henry's 12th-minute strike.

Millwall striker Rob Hulse made it 2-0 10 minutes before half-time and the Lions were able to stifle the Town in the second half and secured a passage through to the last-eight when substitute Dany N'Guessan tapped home with four minutes left.

In truth the Town dominated and 3-0 flattered Millwall but the visitors' ruthlessness in front of goal was the difference on ultimately a day of disappointment.

"I'm disappointed because a big part of today was always that we didn't concede early – and that's what we did," said the manager.

"It was a poor first goal to concede but we recovered well, Arnaud Mendy and Andre Gray went close and their keeper had a good game.

"However, whatever level you're at you can't defend like that against Championship opposition. The first goal meant we were always chasing the game and it meant some desperation crept in. Had we held out or

got it back to 1-1 it would have been a different game. But mistakes have been the story of our season. We need to be honest now starting Monday. We've got to cut them out and move on."

And move on they will – it's back to the bread and butter of the Blue Square Bet Premier for the next two months. "It's Saturday-Tuesday from now on, and we have to deal with it," said Buckle. "We've got to do everything to get promoted.

"The first thing we have to address is keeping clean sheets. I've got to put together a back four that compliments each other. That's what it's all about. The one thing Millwall didn't allow us today was anything sloppy – they were no-nonsense and that is how we need to be."

However disappointing the result, Buckle was in agreement that it had been one heck of a journey in the competition. "It's been unbelievable," said the boss. "It's something I will always remember. There's no better place in football than a full house at Kenilworth Road. I'd like to thank the fans who supported us against Millwall and Wolves here and, of course, that game at Norwich.

"There have been some brilliant times during this cup run which will remain in the memory for a long time to come."









A POINT A PIECE

The Town had to settle for a point on the day Paul Buckle left Kenilworth Road as a Wade Fairhurst goal 15 minutes from time cancelled out Andre Gray's early goal.

It was a frustrating performance from the Hatters which saw a highly contested midfield dominate proceedings despite the hosts having keeper Rhys Taylor dismissed and playing a large spell with 10-men.

The Hatters started instantly with Jon Shaw and Gray again wreaking havoc. Gray retained possession in the middle of the park before slamming an audacious effort goalwards. The outside of his right boot flew the ball goalbound before it slammed off the upright and Shaw couldn't net the follow up from the edge of the area.

Gray then netted to give the Hatters a 15th-minute lead after a comfortable tap in from close range. A looping pass from Smith found Shaw who chested the ball instantly and while the Macclesfield fans roared for an offside flag Shaw's effort was rebuffed by Rhys Taylor. The ball ricocheted to Gray who slotted the ball home to give the Hatters an early advantage.


Macclesfield retaliated instantly with a threat of their own. A searching pass toward the far post found Wade Fairhurst unmarked who controlled the bouncing pass and drilled goalwards. With Tyler beaten Henry recovers to clear off the line.

It got worse for the hosts as Taylor saw red on 21 minutes. Gray raced through on goal before being hauled down by the keeper and was instantly dismissed by Mr Kavanagh. Kasim replaced by makeshift keeper, midfield man Peter Winn.

A crunching tackle from Smith retained possession in the middle of the park before shifting the ball to Shaw out on right. His early pass gave Gray a chance to scamper away. The Town goalscorer took a quick look up before ripping his shot early towards the far post. Winn allowed it to bobble past the upright as the Hatters ended the first half 1-0 up.

The Hatters replaced Rendell at the break with JJ O'Donnell to replace the front man. O'Donnell shifts out to the wide left of midfield for the Hatters.

Both sides took a while to continue the tempo of the first half and 10-man Macclesfield tested Tyler from range 10 minutes into the second period. Kissack tricked his way inside before passing possession to Murtagh who shot from range into the grateful grasps

of Tyler between the sticks. Gray continued to run the Macclesfield back line ragged as Smith gave him another searching ball to chase. Gray leapt away from the defenders and prodded the ball towards goal as Winn narrowed the angle. The initial effort looked to have slipped through Winn's legs but clipped up off of his thigh allowing him to cling on to the bouncing ball behind him.

It was end-to-end football at Moss Rose as the hour mark passed as Murtagh again came close. Skipping away from two Hatters challenges the Macclesfield midfield man flicked the ball into the far corner with the outside of his boot. His effort was seen wide by Tyler who soared across his goal to ensure nothing would creep inside the bottom corner.

But heavy Macclesfield pressure finally paid off when Fairhurst struck with 15 minutes remaining. Patient build-up saw Murtagh play in Fairhurst who shot across Tyler and saw his effort nestle in the corner via the inside of the post.

Stuart Fleetwood was introduced as time closed in on the Hatters and his impact was immediate. A brilliant, quick link-up between the substitute and Gray worked the latter an angle to shoot. His effort could not find the target however, and Winn watched it soar over the crossbar.

As the fourth official held the board aloft Shaw volleyed Fleetwood into an advanced position. Fleetwood dropped the shoulder on Mills and raced past the defender before arrowing his effort towards the top corner. Winn seemed to get the faintest of touches on the ball to deflect it against the crossbar for the final Hatters attack of the evening.

SKIPPER ON CUP EXIT

Captain Ronnie Henry has lead his team through the FA Cup run from Cambridge to Norwich and putting aside his disappointment of the cup exit, Henry maintains a sense of pride for his side's achievements.


"We will be punished by sides of higher opposition if we make mistakes and we have done," he said.

"If we can get out of this league it will be a fantastic season getting so far in the FA Cup and getting into League Two."




JJ O'Donnell dashes past Millwall right-back Alan Dunne during last Saturday's fifth round FA Cup tie

FRENCH IN FOOTBALL PARADISE WITH WONDER GOAL AGAINST THE STAGS.

LUTON TOWN 4-2 MANSFIELD TOWN
FOOTBALL LEAGUE DIVISION THREE.
18TH SEPTEMBER 1968.

Newly promoted Luton Town started the 1968/69 season just as they had finished the previous campaign – in winning form.

The huge sum of £90,000 had been spent that summer on Mike Harrison, Laurie Sheffield and Brian Lewis and the new boys made their debut in a 4-0 hammering of Oldham on the opening day. The sun shone down on the 14,747 crowd who watched Harrison, Lewis, Keith Allen and Fred Jardine score the goals that brought about a good humoured pitch invasion at the end.


A hard fought 0-0 draw at Barrow followed, which set up a home game against relegated Rotherham. Another sun drenched crowd saw Bruce Rioch score twice in the first 15 minutes to set up a sparkling 3-1 win as the Hatters became early season League leaders.

Fever pitch

With the Town support at fever pitch the lead at the top was consolidated the following Wednesday night when Barnsley were seen off 5-1 before a crowd of 15,899. The game included a goal from Rioch, who beat four men in a run from his own half, which will be fondly remembered by those fortunate enough to be there.

The good form continued with a 3-1 win at Gillingham, a 0-0 draw at Orient and another home victory, this time against Tranmere, leading up to the long awaited home clash with second place Mansfield.

Enthusiasm had reached a high point and a crowd of 19,315 was present to see the game open in amazing fashion when 'golden boy' Rioch was dismissed for allegedly striking an opponent following a goalmouth melee.

The local evening newspaper carried a series of photographs in its next edition in an attempt to vindicate Rioch, but a simple reference to the 5,000 behind the Oak Road goal would have saved all the bother!

The sense of injustice felt by the team and the crowd, who were to be deprived of a player for 87 minutes, meant that the rest of the match was played in an unreal atmosphere which bordered on the belligerent.

As so often happens in these cases the ten men fought like twelve and their sheer persistence was rewarded by a doubtful penalty duly tucked away by Mike Harrison midway through the first half.

The second period opened with Mansfield determined to make the extra man tell and with the Town tiring, Doug Jones netted an equaliser. With the Town down to nine men for periods when both John Moore and Terry



Branston had to leave the field for running repairs they were beginning to look a sorry sight, but were then thrown a lifeline by the inconsistent referee.

Mansfield's Phil Waller was sent off for an innocuous tackle on Brian Lewis and it appeared at the time that the official was attempting to level the sides up once more.

Fresh reserves

The Hatters now found fresh reserves of energy and four minutes later Laurie Sheffield headed home a Harrison cross before Lewis scored a solo goal to put the game beyond doubt.

The drama was not yet over, though, with French collecting the ball in his own penalty area and then proceeding to lop the length of the pitch, beating three players and the goalkeeper in the process before firing home. A fantastic goal on a fantastic evening.

Finest

Many say that the goal was the finest seen on the Kenilworth Road pitch and that if the cameras were there they would still be replaying it today. Certainly I have never seen a better goal but credit should be given to Brian Lewis who took defenders with him on a mazy decoy run.

"My legs have taken a bit of a beating to be honest," the 26-year-old said. "It was a bit more physical than the Norwich or Wolves matches but was what we expected. I'm just disappointed because I think it's a real chance gone missing because you don't get these chances that often."

Honesty is something we have come to expect from Smith who wears his heart on his sleeve and with recent results having not been the best, it is something Smith will ensure won't continue without a fight.

"We've just got to keep working hard," he said. "We're disappointed results haven't gone our way but you have times like that you've just got to get on with it and keep working to come out of it which I'm sure we will. They hurt me a lot these defeats. With the quality we've got we should be doing better and we know that. We're working hard, all together to sort it out and that's what we need to do."

Since his first début for the Hatters in November his rapport with the fans has been incredulous. His never-say-die attitude from whistle to whistle ensures cult hero status was soon on the cards.



RENDELL REFLECTS ON CUP DEFEAT

It was contrasting rounds in the FA Cup for Scott Rendell who wrote his name in the history books in the fourth round when Hatters won against Norwich only for the Town to be put to the sword against a clinical Millwall side last weekend.

Despite the disappointment, Rendell looked back on a hard fought game with pride and a different look on what could have been.

"It was a tough shift for everyone and to come out losing 3-0 is even harder," he said after the hoards of journalists had evacuated Bedfordshire.

"We've given it a good go and we've had a good run. We had our chances. If it wasn't for their goalkeeper I think we would have scored at least one or two.

"I think we held our own across the 90 minutes but individual errors have cost us. That's where we are at the minute as a group and we need to cut them out quickly if we want to get anywhere in the league."

Hatters hearts fluttered at the possibility of an FA Cup quarter final and dared to dream it was on the cards when Millwall were drawn against them to Kenilworth Road. But with no fairytale ending for the Hatters, Rendell said that realistically the challenge was always going to be a tough one to combat.

"If everyone was realistic it was probably going to end pretty soon," said the 26-year-old Hatters forward who has found the net four times in the competition this season.

"Saying that, we were on a good run in the FA Cup and we've enjoyed every step of the way. It's been a good ride but now we need to focus on the league which is the most important thing."

The Hatters team sheet has been ever changing with suspension, injury and cup ineligibility limiting defensive options. Now the cup campaign is put to bed, Rendell says the team will benefit from consistency in the squad.

"It's been hard having five, six, seven players coming in that couldn't play with them being cup tied so it now gives us one squad for every game we play," he said. "That might make it easier for us to stop chopping and changing and see how we get on."

Rendell was one of the four changes to the side that lost to Dartford the previous Tuesday and the striker was happy to be given a leading role in proceedings.


"I've had to be patient because I haven't started a league game since New Year's Day," he said. "I've been champing at the bit trying to get back in, working hard in training and the gaffer gave me the shout for the game.

"Me and Andre struck up a good partnership earlier in the season when we had a good run playing together and we know how each other plays; we're on the same wavelength. Sometimes it didn't show but it's a one off game.

"We all know the quality we have here as strikers at the club and as soon as you've got the shirt you've got to keep hold of it."

Now everything is focused back on the league the Hatters look to make a later surge for promotion. With cup antics taking centre stage the Town forward reassured fans the league was, and always has been the main priority.


"It was the only aim. Now we can take the FA Cup and trophy out of it we can knuckle down and focus on every league game and give it our all."

"It was a shock to us in the hotel before the game because we didn't really have any clue what was going on," said the Town skipper.

"When we heard Paul had resigned, it wasn't nice to hear because we had a lot of respect for him and we felt we had something going here."

"We weren't brave enough, and didn't express ourselves enough and in the end they got the goal. It wasn't to be and we have got to regroup now and see what the future holds for us.

"We will go on the training pitch and we will work again there's nothing else we can really do. We have to wait for the new manager to come in, maybe he won't be here by the weekend but we will work with the management staff we have got and try to get the three points against Mansfield."


Rumours and speculation swarms across the club about who will be installed as Buckle's successor but Henry is focusing on the next game and believes having Alan Neilson, Carl Emberson and Stuart Cash in charge can help proceedings.

"They know us and we know how they work," continued Henry. "I just hope the board make the right decision on who to appoint next, I hope the fans and the club gets behind them and we can push on in the league."

With the uncertainty that looms and a recent run of results that does darken the mood more, club captain Henry is ensuring a positive attitude can maintain they stay on track for their season's target.

"There is no point us going out there and not thinking we can make the play-offs and we can't get promoted, stranger things have happened," Henry said.

"We will go out there positive and hopefully we can get the managerial situation resolved sooner rather than later and hopefully make a late run on the Play-Offs."

ESSENTIAL READING FOR FOLLOWERS OF THE NATIONAL GAME

It's that time of the year again when Non-League clubs start looking at league tables and calendars with dread while trying to work out when exactly they'll fit in their remaining fixtures.

January, by anybody's standards, was a treacherous month that provided little in the way of football. Freezing temperatures and snow caused havoc across the country and meant that fixture backlogs got a little bit more crammed. It's not until you start looking at some league tables across Non-League that the problem really hits you – and a problem it definitely is.

If you start in the Blue Square Bet North, FC Halifax Town – who had a great run in the FA Trophy – had played 21 league games before today's fixtures. That means they've still got another 21 to play before April 27. Even if the Shaymen play Saturday, Tuesday until that date, they'll still have two fixtures remaining. That could well mean that Neil Aspin's men will have to play three games in a week to allay the congestion. And considering they are firmly in the BSB North play-off race, it's far from ideal.

The Southern League's Step 4 divisions have also been hit hard. South & West side Bridgwater Town have played only half of their games while Sholing still have 20 matches to cram in. Central division side Slough Town also have 20 of their 42 games left to play.

But that's nothing compared to the Ryman League. Premier division strugglers Thurrock have played just

21 times in the league, with Lowestoft Town having played just one more.

And in the Ryman North, Brentwood Town have over half of their fixtures left having played just 20.

The weather is not the only culprit though, with Step 5 sides enjoying a run in the FA Vase falling behind with their league games.

Combined Counties Premier outfit Guernsey are through to the quarter-finals but have a staggering 25 league matches left to play.

With away sides on the mainland not fancying a trip in midweek – and who can really blame them – it'll take something special for the Green Lions to complete their league programme.

Another side still in the Vase and not on the mainland is Wessex League Premier Newport IoW. With 22 of their 40 league games still to go, it will be an uphill battle for the Port too.

So, how do we try to combat the backlog? Obviously you can't legislate for the weather. What you can do is start Non-League seasons earlier, giving teams more time to get their games in.

By starting seasons on the first Saturday in August, and making sure teams play Saturday, Tuesday while the weather is still reasonable, teams could have seven or eight games ticked off before they enter September.

There's no foolproof way to stop fixture backlogs but with the option there to give everybody a better chance, it would be silly not to take it.

FROM THE PRESS BOX

WITH FORMER LUTON NEWS SPORTS EDITOR BRIAN SWAIN

On a visit back down memory lane earlier this season, I reminisced on this page about one of the many players who have given me great pleasure over six decades of following Luton Town.

Brian Horton was a great leader and motivator, and while he was playing for the Town in the 1980s he struck up a friendship with another player, which became one of football's most enduring partnerships.

The pair also played major roles in taking the Town into the old First Division (now the Premier League) in 1982, although when we heard four years earlier that David Pleat had signed a 26-year-old winger from Third Division Swindon we wondered if it was a bit of a gamble.

The Town's board had taken a gamble when they promoted Pleat from the coaching staff to replace Harry Haslam, who resigned in January 1978.

Pleat's first game in charge was a 4-0 FA Cup thrashing at Millwall, but we finished in Second Division mid-table, with Bolton, Southampton and Spurs taking the three automatic promotion places.

In the summer of 1978, we saw the early examples of Pleat's incredible ability to identify and recruit talent. He started his first full season in charge with seven men making their debuts in the opening match, at home to Oldham: Kirk Stephens, Steve Sherlock, Mark Aizlewood, Mal Donaghy, Bob Hatton, Chris Turner and David Moss.

Hero

Personally, I have always loved to see players getting down the flanks and knocking over quality crosses, and I have seen a few of those in my time: think Brian Stein's decisive cross for Raddy Antic to score at Maine Road in 1983, or Ashley Grimes setting up Stein's Wembley winner, five years later.

As a boy, my hero was left-winger Bert Mitchell, and in the 1970s wingers I loved were headed by John Aston and Jim Ryan.

But Moss was the best winger I ever saw in Town colours. He turned out to be a lot better than Third Division, able to operate on either wing but particularly effective on the left. He was the best I ever saw at crossing the ball while running at full speed, and he had pace in abundance. He packed a powerful shot and was a dead-ball expert, especially with his left foot.



And the Pleat 'gamble' of seven debuts in 1978? At half-time we were one down to Oldham, and moaning over our beer. But then the new team clicked to devastating effect, whacking in six goals without reply. Moss and Hatton got two apiece, with Stein and Lil Fuccillo (penalty) also on target.

Top flight

It was the start of the best period in Luton Town's history, with Pleat insisting on entertaining and winning football, which took us into the First Division in 1982. Moss was a crucial part of that happy band, reaching the top flight at 30, before returning to Swindon in the summer of 1985.

He had netted 88 goals for the Town in 221 appearances as a winger.

He became a regular manager's assistant to Horton after that and is now scouting for Liverpool's academy. If he finds a winger as good as he was, he will have done an amazing job.


Oh, and one thing is not a *nearly* at all. This I know for sure. The Hatters may be *nearly* many things, but we were never being boring.







ELITE PLAYER PERFORMANCE PLAN AND ITS IMPLICATIONS

In the summer of 2011 a new set of rules were developed to revamp youth development in this country.

In essence, the majority of the changes I agree with. It will make the game more professional and accountable for the development of all players within the programme. It will raise standards with regards facilities and coaching staff and it will, in the long term, be better for player development in this country.

The major change that is having an effect on clubs already this season is the ability of scouts and clubs to recruit players from other clubs for reduced compensation.

Whilst it is our ultimate aim to push players all the way through our development programme, we would never stand in the way of a player who wishes to move on. Obviously, deals have to be right for all parties and we as a Club would always ensure the welfare and future development of the child before entering into discussions with any club.

With the implementation of these new rules, players moving from club to club will take place more frequently as the rules have shifted the power to the buying club.

In the new rules, clubs will receive payment of £3,500 per year at the club, for players aged Under-9-11. This then rises to £12,500 for players at Under-12-16. These figures are some way off the players' actual value and could potentially leave lower league clubs worse off in the long term.


Gone are the days now when youth departments can be self sufficient. Recent big money sales of Cauley Woodrow to Fulham, Larum Dawkins to Arsenal, the three Da Silva brothers to Chelsea, Michael Richens to Peterborough, Michael Caine to Leicester and Lewis Baker to Chelsea, where the club were in control of the transfer fee, will soon no longer be possible.

As a result of this, there is more pressure on the club to create an environment where players are developed to a level where they are good enough to leave but looked after so well, they don't want to.

Having said this, we are confident that our development philosophy and the way we treat our players is enough to keep churning out players. Our history and the opportunities we provide are second to none for a club at this level, in fact better than many clubs in the Football League.

On that note, as I'm writing this we are currently on our way to PSV Eindhoven with the Under-11-15 age groups. Now on the third day of our tour we are due to view the stadium and travel home. The boys have been fantastic throughout and have made the trip easy. They have been a real credit to the Football Club and their parents.

I will update you fully in my next set of notes.




Cauley Woodrow in action for the Town in the FA Trophy before he signed for Premier League side Fulham

Minutes later it was 3-0 when Day seized on a superbly threaded through ball from Teighlor Pengelley to score her second.



The Mariners had been on an 18-game unbeaten run but Luke Daley's double put an end to that record and left the door wide open to the chasing pack.






