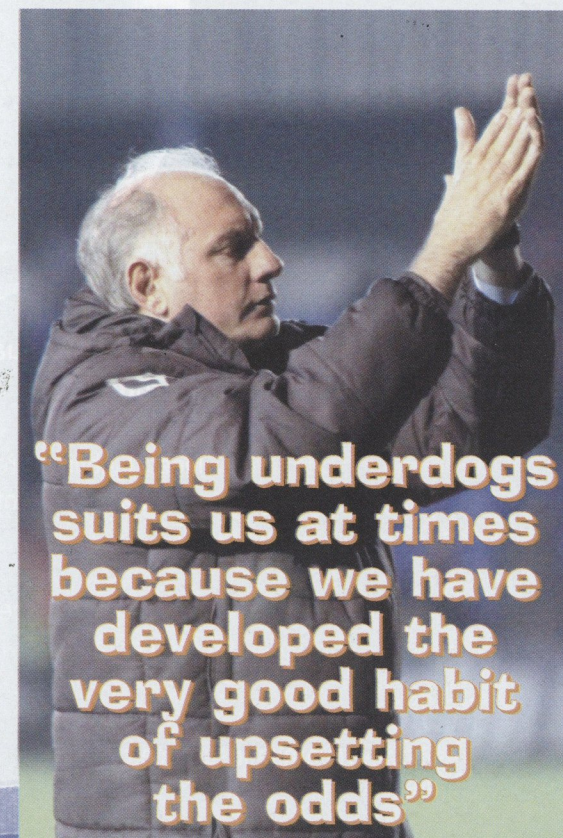

our guests enjoy their visit to
North Essex.

Despite the stop-start nature of
our season, the lads continue to

than last Tuesday's fine two-goal
victory over the then leaders
Grimsby Town.

Yes, the pitch was heavy on the
night, but it was the same for
both sides and our boys were
certainly 'at it'.

A great bit of finishing saw Luke
put us ahead before that wicked
near post corner left the visitors
embarrassed. Although we didn't
add to those two goals, it really
could and should have been more.
Well done lads!

It was an important result for us
as many of the sides immediately
beneath us also picked up points
last Tuesday evening.

Saturday saw us without a
game, as Wrexham played in the
Trophy, but the results elsewhere
couldn't have been much better
for us.

We now have two or three
games in hand over the sides
around us and we'll need to pick
up points from these games to
ease ourselves away from the foot
of the table.

Next Saturday we are due to
visit Gateshead for another
League match. Tonight's
Gateshead match was postponed
yesterday and (I understand) was
scheduled to be played on three
different grounds - Hartlepool,
Darlington, then York City - before
going back to Gateshead - all
within the last few days!

Like you, I've heard stories of
Gateshead moving to Hartlepool
but, as I write these notes
(yesterday lunchtime), Club
Secretary Tom Woodley is still to

receive any confirmation of the
game and we do not know where
we are playing the match!

I can only apologise to our
supporters for this situation and
we will do our best to confirm the
venue as soon as we know.

We here at Braintree have had
our fair share of pitch problems
and have a lot of sympathy with
Gateshead's situation.

That said, there are five pages
of rules about membership
requirements and I have contacted
League General Manager Dennis
Strudwick to ask for the Football
Conference Board's advice and
guidance as to whether a switch
of venue from the International
Stadium at such short notice is
within League rules.

I understand that, last season,
Newport County had similar
issues with the playing surface at
Newport Stadium and requested
permission to play fixtures at
Rodney Parade, but this request
was turned down.

In the interest of consistency
and fairness, I wonder if that
precedent should also apply to
Gateshead?

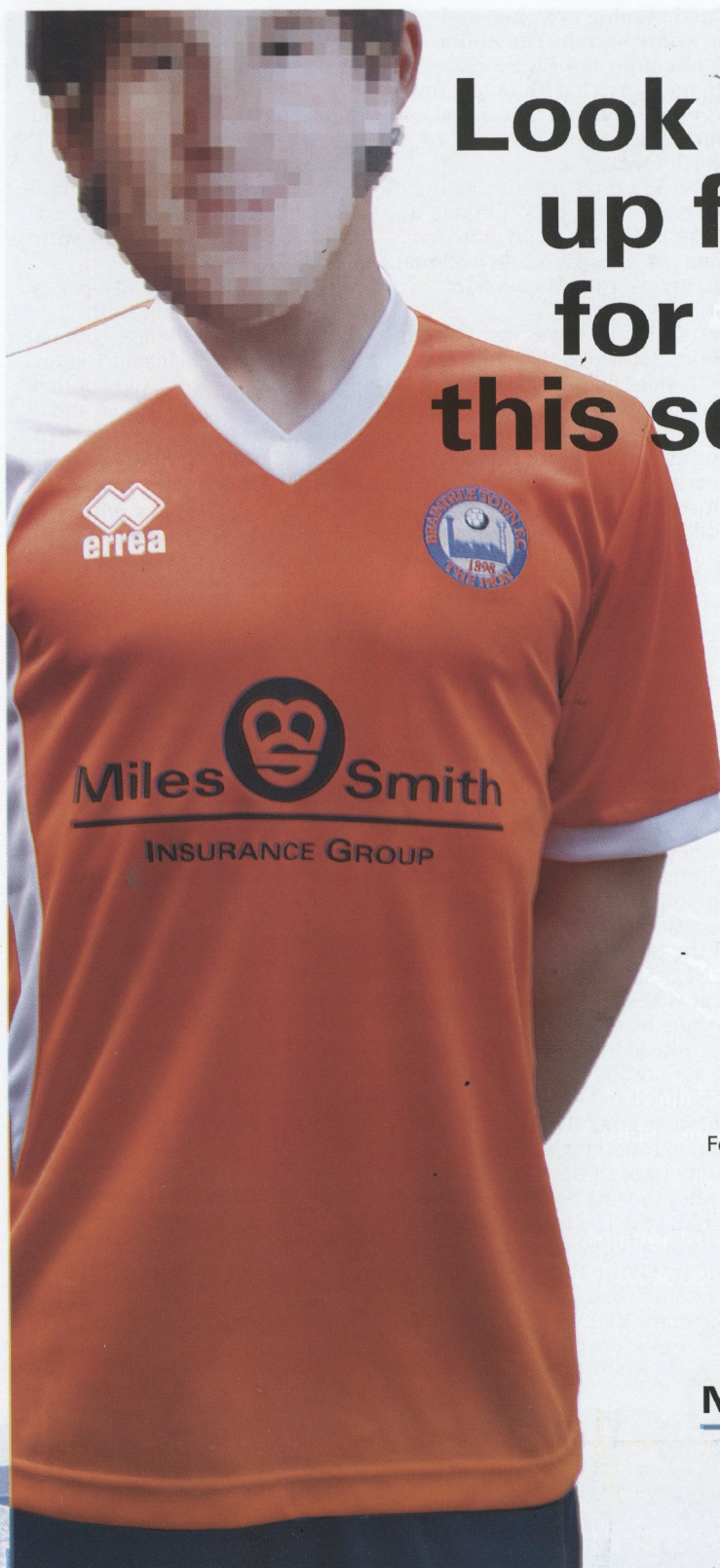

THIS past Sunday (February 24) will for most younger football fans passed by as just another Sunday, probably reflecting on the outcome of their clubs' respective matches the previous day.

But for us older football fans with longer memories of England winning the World Cup back in 1966 this past Sunday was a reminder of the death of the country's greatest ever captain.

Twenty years ago on Sunday the great Bobby Moore sadly died of bowel cancer at the age of 51, a great loss to football and leaving a void in the lives of those who knew him that has never been filled.

He was without doubt the greatest captain England has ever had and even in his latter years before his untimely death he remained the modest, generous, meticulous but extremely

checking incidents and players' names during game like we all do to ensure our reports were accurate.

He was simply the same man as he had been as a player - quiet, unassuming, dedicated to the job at hand and still thoroughly enjoying his football.

Occasionally a watching spectator would creep up to the press box and ask for his autograph, even during the action of the game, but he never refused the intruder or his interruption, smiling and signing before returning to his reporting duties.

Some people denigrated his radio work because he should have been given a loftier role by football's authorities and yes of course he should and it was and still is a national disgrace that he was never handed an ambassadorial position.

Franz Beckenbauer and Pele have named him the best defender ever and clearly right up until his death Beckenbauer still held him such high esteem.

It was a few months before Moore's death in February 1993 that as a motoring journalist I was as usual attending the annual Geneva Motor Show where at a Mercedes-Benz press dinner I was fortunate to be put on Beckenbauer's table - he was doing corporate work for the German car maker at the time.

We chatted about football the whole evening - a fascinating experience in itself which will live long in my own memory - and cars were not even mentioned!

By that time he was aware of stories surrounding Moore's health and asked about him and all we knew then was that he was not well but still trying to carry on his football commentating. None of us knew the extent of his illness with cancer but even then Beckenbauer's perception of the situation was clear in his own mind, although he never actually said.

He did speak opening how highly he regarded Moore as a footballer and as a person, certainly in the same breath of the likes of Pele.

The year after Moore's death and at the same motor show it was Beckenbauer who caught me in the media room to talk about "his great England friend" and his untimely death and he repeated what he had said a year ago about him and said he had been really upset when he heard the sad news.

In the press box Moore was certainly generous with time and money, modest and very, funny at times, coming out with some great one liners.

Nobody was in awe of him because he didn't let it happen - respect yes - and he always put unknown people around at ease and as throughout his career on and off the field treated princes and paupers in the same endearing way.

He was such a humble man and in my experience he never spoke of his own glorious successes in his commentating days - he could give a few lessons on etiquette and behaviour though to many of today's highly paid footballers.

So last Sunday was for a few of us time for a moment of reflection on such a wonderful football person.

funny man that he was and a side which most of the public really saw.

Having watched him play in the flesh as it were for West Ham (he made 544 appearances for the Hammers) and England, plus his last playing days at Fulham was a privilege.

In his late years he became a football radio commentator for Capital Radio and it was in this capacity that I sat alongside him a few times when he came down to Roots Hall to cover Southend Utd matches.

He would just simply slip along the cramped press benches with the rest of us without any publicity, joining in the banter with us younger sports reporters,

But he was really thrilled by his commentary work and did an exceptionally good job and he was not afraid either to criticise a player or manager for their actions in a game, as I often heard first hand sitting alongside him.

Football fans of course everywhere loved him while managers of all ages and experience and also players would turn their heads when he entered a press conference, again quietly and in an unassuming manner. He sought no special treatment, he said he regarded being allowed into the press pack an honour which was quite a statement from such an outstanding footballer.

Luton Town Football Club was formed on 11 April 1885, the product of a merger of the two leading local teams, Luton Town Wanderers and Excelsior. Initially based at Excelsior's Dallow Lane ground, the club began making payments to certain individual players in 1890.

The following year, Luton became the first club in southern England to be fully professional. The club was a founder member of the Southern Football League in the 1894-95 season and finished as runners-up in its first two seasons.

The Luton side first played in the white and black colours which the club has retained for much of its history during the 1920-21 season, when they rejoined the Football League; until then, the players had worn sky blue shirts with white shorts and navy socks.

Luton stayed in the Third Division South until 1936-37, when the team finished top and won promotion to the Second Division, at that time the second tier of English football. During the promotion season, striker Joe Payne scored 55 goals in 39 games; during the previous season he had scored 10 in one match against Bristol Rovers, which remains a Football League record today.

During the early 1950s, one of Luton's greatest sides emerged under manager Dally Duncan. The team included Gordon Turner, who went on to become Luton's all-time top goalscorer, Bob Morton, who holds the record for the most

club appearances, and Syd Owen, an England international.

During this period, Luton sides also featured two England international goalkeepers, Ron Baynham and Bernard Streten, as well as Irish internationals Seamus Dunne, Tom Aherne and George Cummins. This team reached the top flight for the first time in 1955-56, after finishing the season in second place behind Birmingham City on goal average.

The club achieved its highest ever league position, seventh, in 1986-87, and won the

1988-89, but lost 3-1 to Nottingham Forest.

The club was relegated from the top division at the end of the 1991-92 season, and sank to the third tier four years later. Luton stayed in the third-tier Second Division until relegation at the end of the 2000-01 season.

The club then had a total of 30 points docked from its 2008-09 record by The Football Association and The Football League for various financial irregularities. These deductions proved to be too large an obstacle to overcome, but



Football League Cup a year later with a 3-2 win over Arsenal. With ten minutes left on the clock and Arsenal 2-1 ahead, a penalty save from stand-in goalkeeper Andy Dibble sparked a late Luton rally: Danny Wilson equalised, before Brian Stein scored the winner with the last kick of the match. The club reached the League Cup Final once more in

Luton came from behind in the final of the Football League Trophy to win the competition for the first time.

Relegation meant that 2009-10 saw Luton playing in the Conference National, a competition which the club had never before contested, and in which, as of the 2012-13 season, they remain after three play-off defeats in three years.

Arsenal To Alfreton

The highs and lows of Luton Town

MARK TYLER - Hugely experienced goalkeeper who signed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road in June 2009 to become Mick Harford's fifth signing of the summer following his release from Peterborough United. Mark made 483 appearances in 15 years at London Road and was rewarded for his loyalty with a testimonial against Liverpool in 2007. After falling down the pecking order at Posh he found first team opportunities hard to come by and in 2008/09 he was loaned out to League 2 Bury where he made 11 appearances for the Shakers. A former England Youth international, Tyler was handed the number one shirt by the Hatters boss who admitted he'd failed in an attempt to sign the stopper the previous summer. After a hugely successful two years between the sticks at Kenilworth Road, Mark signed a new contract in the summer of 2011.

DEAN BRILL - No stranger to Kenilworth Road having made 97 appearances for the Hatters after rising through the ranks as a youngster. Left the club in 2009 for Oldham where he spent two seasons before signing for Barnet last season, who he helped keep in the Football League. Lewis Kidd - Young goalkeeper who has yet to make a first team appearance. Signed professional forms in the summer of 2011 and has often appeared on the Town bench. Recently signed a new one-year contract.

LATHANIEL ROWE-TURNER - Defender Lathaniel Rowe-Turner became Town boss Paul Buckle's sixth signing of a busy summer in July 2012. The 22-year-old is a left-back by trade but is equally comfortable at centre-half and is reunited with the manager having previously worked together at Torquay United. Born in

Leicester, 6ft 11in Lathaniel began his career with his hometown club. He was part of the Foxes' youth team that won the Premier League academy league in 2006/07. In the following season he was named City's academy player of the year. However, having failed to make a first team appearance in 2010 he was released by the Foxes and in February of that year he joined Buckle at Plainmoor. In his first season on the Devon coast the youngster appeared 10 times and scored once - in the Gulls' 3-0 win against Barnet. Last season Lathaniel made 24 appearances in all competitions prior to his release by manager Martin Ling.

RONNIE HENRY - The Hatters unveiled influential defender Ronnie Henry as their first signing of the summer in June 2012. The former Stevenage captain signed a two-year contract at Kenilworth Road to also become Paul Buckle's first recruit as Town boss. Hemel-born Henry joined the Hatters having spent seven successful years at Broadhall Way in which he helped the Hertfordshire side twice win promotion and twice lift the FA Trophy. Primarily an attacking and assured right-back, Henry began his career as a youngster at Tottenham Hotspur, but after a loan spell with Southend United in 2003, he joined Dublin City in Ireland in 2004 for four months before returning to England to sign for Stevenage. He went onto make 329 appearances for Boro to become their fourth highest appearance holder, playing key roles in their title winning side in the Blue Square Bet Premier in 2009/10 and their subsequent Play-Off final victory over Buckle's Torquay side in the following campaign that earned a second successive promotion. In the season

just passed, Henry made 40 appearances in League 1, helping Stevenage to another Play-Off appearance. But, having received an offer of a new contract with Boro and from a string of Football League sides, he opted to sign on the dotted line for the Town - and was named captain for the 2012/13 season by Paul Buckle.

SIMON AINGE - Classy - centre-half signed on a month's loan from Blue Square Bet North side Guiseley in late September. Has spent three seasons at Nethermoor as the Lions' captain with his fine form rewarded by a call-up to the England C squad last season. Known for his calm defending and threat in the opposition penalty area. Last season he scored nine goals from defence.

ARNAUD MENDY - Combative and creative central midfielder signed from Macclesfield Town in October 2012. Born in France, he began his career with Rouen before moving to England to pursue a professional career. He signed for Derby, making one appearance for the Rams before signing for the Silkmen in the summer of 2011. He enjoyed a fruitful spell at the Moss Rose and hit the headlines last season with a stunning goal against Bolton Wanderers in the FA Cup. Impressed against the Hatters in Macc colours and having continued to monitor his performances boss Paul Buckle snapped the Guinea-Bissau international up on a two-year deal.

JAKE HOWELLS - The young winger, who can also play at left-back or in central midfield, came through the ranks at Kenilworth Road and made his first team debut as a second half substitute in May 2008. He made his full debut in the Hatters colours away at Bradford City in October 2008. After making 36 appearances for the Hatters in the 2008/09 the England C international was rewarded for his efforts with a professional contract in May. In his first season as a pro, Howells made huge strides with impressive performances on the left-side of midfield, ending the 2009/10 campaign with six goals, including his first senior goal in the incredible 4-3 win over Cambridge in September 2009. Capped at Under-21 level by Wales, Howells signed a three-year contract extension in the summer of 2012.

ALEX LAWLESS - Former Wales Under-21 midfielder who signed in November 2010 initially on-loan from York City before a permanent deal went through in January 2011. A star of the Minstermen's campaign last season which saw them lose in the Promotion Final to Oxford United, Lawless featured prominently in all four of the meetings with the Hatters last term at the heart of midfield. He only joined York at the start of last season, impressing then boss Martin Foyle enough to prise the 25-year-old away from Forest Green Rovers where performances in a variety of positions - in defence and across midfield -

had also caught the eye of Football League scouts. It's not just the 150 games experience in the Conference that Lawless has with Forest Green and York that he has on his CV. A former Cardiff City scholar he took-up non-league football in Wales before he was snapped up to earn his first professional contract with Premier League Fulham in 2003. Without featuring for the Cottagers it was off to South West to Torquay United for the young Lawless but after just a year and 16 appearances at Plainmoor he was on the move again, to Forest Green in 2006 and in his three seasons he helped the Gloucestershire consolidate in the Conference. Arriving at Bootham Crescent in the summer of 2009, local media announced him merely as a 'utility player' but that was far from the case, and alongside Neil Barrett he forged a formidable partnership in the centre of City's midfield, changing the Yorkshire club's relegation worries from one season to making them just one game away from promotion the next.

DAVE MARTIN - Old-fashioned touchline-hugging left-winger who joined the Hatters on an 18-month deal in January 2012 following his release from Millwall. Began his career in non-league circles, impressing at Dartford which led to a move to Crystal Palace. Broke onto the scene with spells in the Championship with Millwall and Derby before settling again at Southend. Helped the Shrimpers to the Play-Offs in 2011/12 prior to signing for the Hatters.

JONATHAN SMITH - Combative central midfielder signed from York in January 2013 for £50,000 following a successful loan spell. Originally with York he moved to Swindon where he helped the Robins win the League 2 title in 2011/12 before switched back to Bootham Crescent.

SCOTT NEILSON - Winger signed until the end of the season following his release from Crawley Town. Began his career in non-league circles with Ware and Hertford before moving to Cambridge and then Crawley. A successful loan spell with Grimsby this season caught the Hatters' eye and when his deal at Blundell Park came to an end he was snapped up on a free transfer in January 2013.

DAN WALKER - Quick young forward capable of playing down the flanks who signed a one-year deal in July 2010 after impressing in pre-season in games for and against the Hatters. Previously with Bedford Town, Walker has also played for Stony Stratford Town and Leighton Town. He made his first team debut for the Hatters as substitute in a 3-0 win over AFC Wimbledon in September 2010 before scoring his first senior goal against Forest Green a month later. Has enjoyed loan spells at Eastbourne, Cambridge and Southport in recent seasons and in the summer of 2012 he signed a new

one-year contract.

STUART FLEETWOOD - Prolific striker who signed for an undisclosed fee from Hereford United on deadline day in August 2011. The Gloucester-born frontman, who scored 28 goals the last time he played at Conference level whilst with Forest Green Rovers, signed a two-year deal at Kenilworth Road. He began his career as a trainee at Cardiff City, making the grade to feature eight times for the Bluebirds between 2003 and 2006. In January 2006, Fleetwood signed for Hereford for the first time scoring eight times before he signed for Forest Green in June 2007. And it was his spell with Rovers that saw people sit up and take notice after plundering 32 league and cup goals in a season that saw the Gloucestershire side earn their highest league placing. The Wales Under-21 international turned down a new contract at FGR to sign for then Championship Charlton in June 2008 but was loaned out Cheltenham, Exeter and Brighton. Fleetwood returned to Edgar Street last summer and scored 18 goals as he helped the Bulls avoid the drop in League 2. After hitting the post on his debut against Stockport, Fleetwood scored on his full debut in the win over Darlington.

ANDRE GRAY - Lightning-quick forward signed from Blue Square Bet North Hinckley United on loan transfer deadline day in March 2012. The prolific striker had scored 39 goals in two seasons for the Knitters after being released from Shrewsbury Town in 2010. The Wolverhampton-born man made a goalscoring debut for the Town when scoring in the 1-1 draw with Grimsby Town. He has also spent time on-loan with AFC Telford United. Scored seven goals in 12 games at the end of last season to earn his first call up to the England C squad this summer.

SCOTT RENDELL - Striker who became the Town's third signing of the summer after completing a move from Wycombe Wanderers for an undisclosed fee. He hit 85 goals in his past six seasons and has been the creator of many more during successful stints with Wycombe, Torquay, Cambridge (twice) and Crawley in both the Conference and in League 2. He helped fire Wycombe to promotion in 2011/12 by hitting 16 goals in 26 starts, but found first team opportunities limited in League 1 in 2011/12 and was loaned out to Bristol Rovers and Oxford United - scoring three times for the U's. Scott began his career at Aldershot Town before making the short move to Championship club Reading. It was a loan move to Crawley that jump-started his career in 2006 when he hit eight goals in 21 games which led to a permanent move in 2007. Soon the 6ft 2in striker was snapped up by Cambridge, and scored 17 league goals in 23 starts in 2007/08 at the Abbey Stadium. That goalscoring form in the Conference persuaded Peterborough United to shell out

£115,000 for his services in 2008 but, after struggling to break into the Posh starting line-up, a loan move back to Cambridge followed in 2008/09 where he notched a further 15 goals. The following campaign Rendell was again out on loan, with Buckle securing the striker for a season long-loan that saw him hit 13 goals in all competition for the Gulls. A permanent move away from Peterborough saw Rendell sign for Wycombe in 2010 and was the Chairboys' top goal-getter as they secured promotion to League 1.

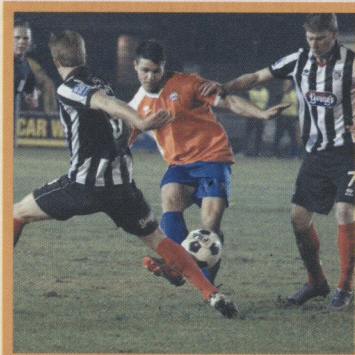
Brace from Luke Daley - sets up comfortable win

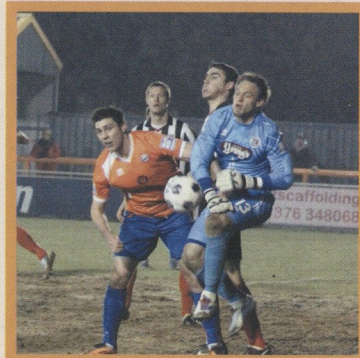

fine pass from Ryan Peters set up Daley to run at the Grimsby defence. With Thomas backing off, Daley raced to the edge of the

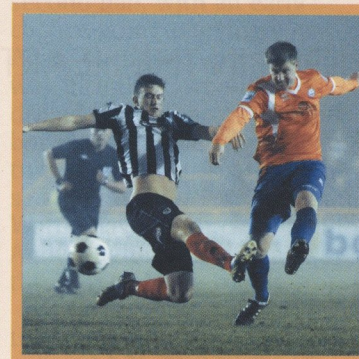

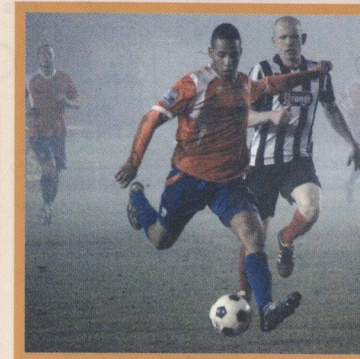

imposed ourselves on them tonight and were good value for our win. I was also pleased with the chances we created and also how Nathan



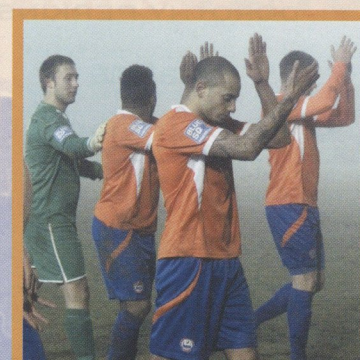

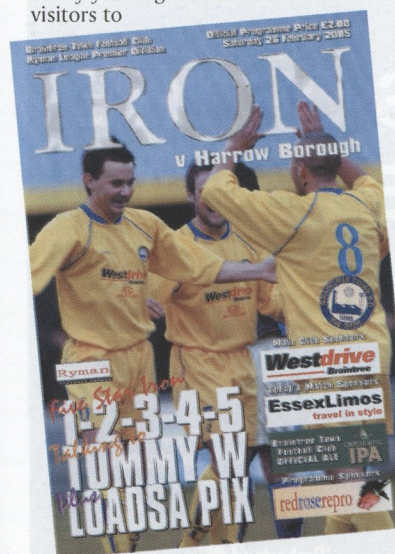
26th February 1910

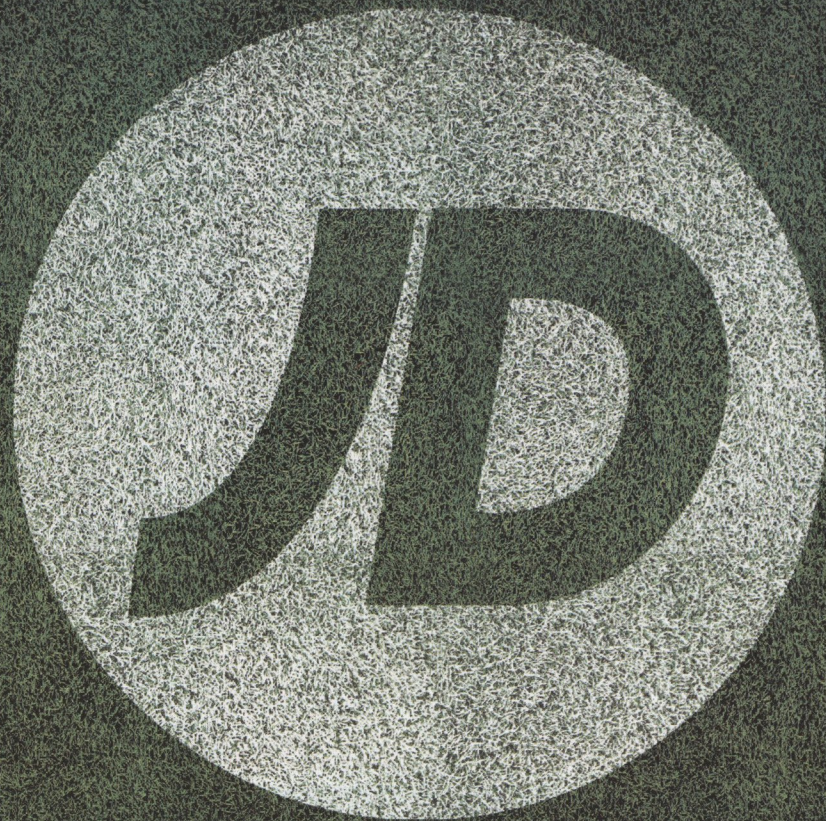

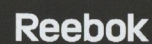

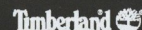

IT'S THAT time of the year again when Non-League clubs start looking at league tables and calendars with dread while trying to work out when exactly they'll fit in their remaining fixtures.

January, by anybody's standards, was a treacherous month that provided little in the way of football. Freezing temperatures and snow caused havoc across the country and meant that fixture backlogs got a little bit more crammed.

It's not until you start looking at some league tables across Non-League that the problem really hits you – and a problem it definitely is.

If you start in the Blue Square Bet North, FC Halifax Town – who had a great run in the FA Trophy – had played 21 league games before today's fixtures. That means they've still got another 21 to play before April 27.

Even if the Shaymen play Saturday, Tuesday until that date, they'll still have two fixtures remaining. That could well mean that Neil Aspin's men will have to play three games in a week to allay the congestion. And considering they are firmly in the BSB North play-off race, it's far from ideal.

The Southern League's Step 4 divisions have also been hit hard. South & West side Bridgwater Town have played only half of their games while Sholing still have 20 matches to cram in. Central division side Slough Town also have 20

of their 42 games left to play.

But that's nothing compared to the Ryman League. Premier division strugglers Thurrock have played just 21 times in the league, with Lowestoft Town having played just one more.

And in the Ryman North, Brentwood Town have over half of their fixtures left having played just 20.

The weather is not the only culprit though, with Step 5 sides enjoying a run in the FA Vase falling behind with their league games.

Another side still in the Vase and not on the mainland is Wessex League Premier Newport IOW. With 22 of their 40 league games still to go, it will be an uphill battle for the Port too.

So, how do we try to combat the backlog? Obviously you can't legislate for the weather. What you can do is start Non-League seasons earlier, giving teams more time to get their games in.

By starting seasons on the first Saturday in August, and

With away sides on the mainland not fancying a trip in midweek – and who can really blame them – it'll take something special for the Green Lions to complete their league programme.

making sure teams play Saturday, Tuesday while the weather is still reasonable, teams could have seven or eight games ticked off before they enter September.

There's no foolproof way to stop fixture backlogs but with the option there to give everybody a better chance, it would be silly not to take it.

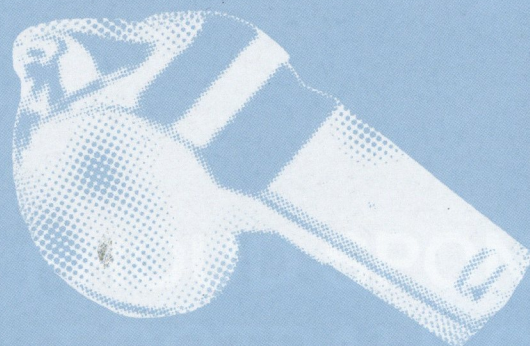

Our match at home to Southport has now been re-arranged for Wednesday, 3rd April, with kick-off at 7.45pm.

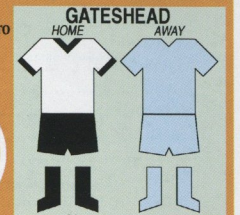

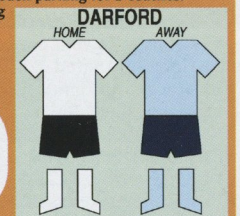
