FROM THE CHAIRMAN

It looks as though we are certainly on our way to a third successive attendance of over 2,000 here at Aggborough for the start of the new season.

I've mentioned how fantastic the atmosphere was in and around the ground for the games against Stockport County and Wrexham and, before we started the season, how much I wanted that to carry over. Certainly it appears to have done that so far but it couldn't be any more important to the club that this continues.

It took us a long time to reach a stage where we more or less started with at least 2,000 home supporters in the ground and while we dipped just below that against Chester, I'm confident we'll see a few more here for the Luton game. They are obviously a very well-supported club and I'm sure they will travel in their numbers, too.

The difference of having, for instance, an extra 300 supporters in the ground for all of our home matches compared to last season cannot be understated and, as well as the financial rewards, it's also a massive boost for them to be playing in front of such an atmosphere at Aggborough.

As you may have read, we have a special offer coming up for the Aldershot Town game here [Friday, 27 September] whereby any paying attendee for the match against FC Halifax Town here a few nights earlier will get £5.00 off for the Aldershot Town fixture.

The full details are on page 51 of the programme today and I really hope we'll see some new faces here on the night as our supporters look to take advantage of the offer.

FROM THE DUGOUT

It goes without saying we were disappointed with the penalty decision that saw us lose in injury time at Nuneaton Town on Bank Holiday Monday.

I have never been one to moan and bleat about referees and officials because I've always said that once a decision has been made there is nothing you can do or say to change it. That said, the one I saw at Nuneaton was one of the most frustrating I've encountered. I still find it quite amazing that it was given.

The most disappointing aspect for me was the conversation I had with the match referee after the game. Having said he thought it was a deliberate handball by Kyle Storer, I asked quite calmly and reasonably to confirm that, in his opinion, Kyle had intentionally blocked the ball going towards goal with his hands – that he had done it on purpose – and he said that was correct, despite the fact the ball was smashed at Kyle from, at most, three or four yards. I still find it quite incredible but we now have to move on and put it behind us.

Looking back at the Bank Holiday weekend, the Chester game was a tough one against a side who were battling for their first points of the season. I have to say I thought they came here and made it very difficult for us and put in a good performance, but we rose to that and without really hitting maximum stride we managed to score three good goals and see the game out.

Against Nuneaton we didn't really perform as we would have liked in the second half and lost our way a bit as well as the momentum from the first half

and a good start. At 1-1, although disappointed, I did think a draw wouldn't have represented a bad result given Nuneaton's start so to lose the game in such a manner was difficult to take.

We made a few changes to the side for the game which isn't something I do often with a side that had been winning matches but it is one of the busiest times of the season and with a strong squad at our disposal it is so important to keep things fresh. After the event that might have looked like the wrong thing to do but that's only with hindsight and nobody has the benefit of that at the time.

We're back at Aggborough today and welcome Luton Town as our guests. The lads love playing here in front of the Harriers fans and the atmosphere – that the ground can produce – it will be great again today as you know Luton will bring a large number of supporters, too. We have two wins from two so far this season here and we want to keep that going.

John Still is a very experienced manager and has already won promotion from this division with Dagenham & Rebridge and so knows the type of player you need in your squad to achieve that and he has been able to bring in a number of them. It's our biggest and most important game because it's our next one and we're looking forward to it – make no mistake, they will again be up at the right end of the table come the end of the season.

JUST FANTASTIC

HARRIERS FANS HAVE CERTAINLY RUN THROUGH GAMUT OF EMOTIONS OVER THE LAST FEW YEARS AND DEFENDER LEE VAUGHAN HAS COMMENDED THEM FOR ALWAYS "BEING THERE".

It's certainly not been a dull period in the club's history. A brush with administration and near-financial melt-down, two heart-wrenching close-calls with the play-offs; not to mention the rollercoaster of an adventure that culminated in last season's second place finish.

And the popular full-back knows that while the most recent passage of time has been good fun for the Kiddy faithful, there have been a number of dark days, too.

Speaking exclusively to *The Harrier* ahead of today's Skrill Premier meeting with Luton Town at Aggborough, Vaughan says the club's supporters have proven themselves to be exceptional and a true "twelfth man" when it comes to doing their bit and getting behind Steve Burr's charges.

Increased attendances at this very early stage of the season can only be a good thing, too – the reds set for their third successive 2,000+ gate at the beginning of this term as the community still rides the wave of momentum created by two sell-out crowds back in April.

"It does make a difference and having more people at the ground is only ever going to help us," says Vaughan.

"But the core of the fans are always here and always have been – you hear them, they get behind the lads and they're good people; decent, honest fans."

"Football fans can be fickle, they moan when you're not doing well and they sometimes moan when you are doing well as well!"

"But, on the whole, the Kiddy fans get behind us and have been there for us – they say it's like a twelfth man and that's true."

Harriers have made no secret of their desire to go one better and top the pile this season and achieve promotion back to the Football League.

The former AFC Telford man is adamant there is a fine line between confidence and arrogance and explains it's perfectly natural to aim for the sky when you begin a season – after all, why start a competition if your aim isn't to win it?

The trick is to produce the goods and Vaughan admits: "Everything is ready to push on until the next level and now the emphasis is on us, on the pitch to the deliver."

"Everything is here and we're set up to be a Football League club and I don't want to tempt fate by talking about it but it's down to us now."

"It's not being cocky and nobody can deny that this is exactly what our goal is and that's what we're here for – we just have to make sure we back up what we say and do our jobs on the pitch."

"It's important to go out there and get the results, ugly or otherwise."

Harriers have the chance to make it three wins from three at the start of the new term with the visit of John Still's Hatters this afternoon.

3-1 successes over Gateshead and Chester have helped contribute to a reasonable start to 2013/14 but it goes without saying the tough tests will only keep coming.

Town have solidified even more in recent weeks thanks to goalless draws against Forest Green and Cambridge United and come to Aggborough with plenty to be confident.

Keen to bounce back from a defeat of their own at the hands of Nuneaton

Town on Bank Holiday Monday, though, Vaughan says Harriers approach the game with an equally bright mindset.

"It'll be a good atmosphere at Aggborough and it's definitely one of the games you look for and one you want to be involved in," he went on to say.

"Luton will bring a lot of people here and without a doubt they will be up there again at the end of the season."

03.04.1922 TO 18.07.2013

Gordon was the second eldest of four Bulmer boys, educated at King Charles Grammar School.

Gordon had several interests, not least of which was supporting Kidderminster Harriers, which he had done since 1932. He had a wealth of knowledge and endless stories about the club and the players that he had known over the years. In 2012 he celebrated his 90th birthday in the Aggborough suite.

His lifelong interest in football grew from when he was a boy, he was a keen and talented footballer who having been spotted was offered the opportunity to become an apprentice and play professionally for Wolverhampton Wanderers at which point his father told him that he could forget about that and must look for a proper job but clearly his interest in football never waned.

Gordon was a season ticket holder and had renewed his season ticket for the current 2013/14 season. Gordon passed away on the 18th July 2013, at the age of 91, and to the many that knew him Gordon was a gentleman who was always there for his wife, children, grandchildren and great grandchildren and will always be remembered as a proud family man who was loved by all that were close to him.

RADIO WAVES

I haven't yet had a chance to take a look at the penalty decision that led to Nuneaton Town's winner in the final minutes of the game at Liberty Way, but listening to Steve Miller's commentary, it was pretty obvious that it was 'contentious' to say the least.

In fact, I think 'contentious' as understating things a bit as Steve said he had never seen quite as bad a decision as the one the referee gave against Kyle Storer.

Even then, Nuneaton needed a stroke of luck to score as Danny Lewis' save cannoned into the net off Mickey Demetriou – at that point, everyone in the ground of a Harriers persuasion must have thought this was simply not going to be their day. I have seldom ever heard Steve Burr lost for words in a post-match interview, but even he was struggling to comprehend those final few minutes at Nuneaton.

It was a shame the game ended this way – listening to the commentary, it sounded as though a point would have been about right as Nuneaton kept up the momentum in the second half and so could have argued they would have been good value for the draw. Coming off the back of the win here against Chester FC that would surely have represented a satisfying weekend's work.

I have to admit I am surprised Chester have struggled the way they have done so far this season – given they breezed through the Conference North last season, many people were expecting great things from them this time around. But the defeat at Aggborough was followed by another home reversal on Monday so they are still looking for their first point of the season.

Gateshead were beaten here on the opening day and are still looking for their first point of the campaign but I still think they could be in the running for the 'Kidderminster Harriers Lazarus Award' for this season. In other words, after a decidedly dodgy start, the Heed could yet come good, but much will depend on how quickly any new management team beds in.

A couple of weeks back I was at Aggborough for an interview with Steve Burr when the subject of Ryan Rowe came up and the fact the striker was about to head out on loan to Stourbridge in the hope he might regain a bit of confidence. Well, let's say the early signs are highly encouraging, not least when The Glassboys made the short trip to Redditch United on Bank Holiday

Monday. Ryan Rowe scored four times as Stourbridge thumped their hosts six-one at Valley Stadium. The Amblecote side is up to third in the table and is within a point of the leading clubs, so here's hoping Ryan continues that kind of form between now and January.


On to today's game and, if much is expected from Harriers this season, then much is expected from Luton Town every season. Ever since the Hatters dropped out of the Football League, they have been widely tipped for the title in every campaign since, but are so far yet to deliver the top prize. A number of managers have fallen on their sword after what has been perceived as failure and the task of returning Luton to the Football League has now fallen to John Still. With his vast experience and solid record at this level, this looks to be a very sensible appointment by the Kenilworth Road club.

The fact John Still arrived at Luton in February will also be a bonus as he had the chance last season to look at those players at the club last season and so would have had a far better idea who to keep and who should move on. Also he has been there and done it before with Dagenham and Redbridge so knows what is needed to be successful at this level. Under John Still, The Daggers won the Conference title with five games to spare in April 2007 and Luton will have more financial 'clout' than there every would have been in that corner of Essex. If Harriers are not to win the league this season, then you can't help think that Luton Town would be the next best bet.

But, as players, these are surely the games you want to play in – both clubs will fancy their chances this season and there should be a good crowd here to see it. Let's hope we get the game the fixture deserves.

TROLL HUNTERS

An interesting story came through on my radio as I was driving in to work last week, concerning the focus of police with regards social media and abuse of players and opposition fans through the various online platforms.

This is another ugly aspect of our beautiful game that is being addressed, following on from successes in outlawing a number of other types of abuse that have blighted football.

Statistics have recently been released looking into the number of football related arrests and banning orders, both of which have decreased in recent years. This is great news for football, and shows that efforts made by the FA, police and clubs have been having a positive effect on reducing those ugly scenes that hounded football for far too many years. It will always happen as, unfortunately, football seems to be used as an excuse for people who have nothing better to do than go out and create hostility.


It is also refreshing to see that the authorities are not sitting on their laurels and patting themselves on the back for a job well done. They are continuously trying to iron out the less-tasteful behaviours that have long plagued football grounds. The highly-publicised campaign to stamp out racism in football is one that springs to mind, although the campaign has not been aided by the much-talked-about incidents surrounding influential Premier League players. The number of arrests for racially aggravated incidents and chanting remains low, although the fact that there are still arrests shows there is still work to be done.

Another campaign that has been launched recently looks to stamp out homophobic abuse at football grounds. A frightening statistic showed that Brighton fans were on the receiving end of homophobic related chanting at a staggering 70% of their matches. Liverpool stewards were recently issued with a handbook outlining language that the club deemed unacceptable. Phrases such as 'that's gay' and 'fairy' are to be punished if heard by stewards. These guidelines were met with some trepidation, as phrases such as 'man up' are also on the list, with some fans feeling that these are too restrictive and too politically correct. It may be that more guidelines such as these appear at more clubs around the country as the FA continue to strive to eradicate all forms of discrimination.

The stamping out of such inexcusable behaviours in the stands seems to lead to

some people feeling the need to continue their abuse from behind the relative anonymity of a computer screen. Recent news has shown how horrific the effect of online abuse can be, and anyone who 'likes' or 'follows' footballers, or even read some fans forums, will see the abuse that some individuals feel the need to direct at footballers and opposition fans using these platforms.

Unfortunately, it even happens with some of our own players. Whoever feels the need to abuse anyone online, let alone their own team's players? Some comments are particularly offensive, and there have been high profile examples, such as the jailing of an individual for the sending of racist tweets towards Fabrice Muamba.

This type of abuse would not be tolerated being hurled from the stands and, rightly so, shouldn't be allowed in a social network environment. There have been stories in recent weeks of football fans posting civil observations on performances of opposition

players, to then receive torrents of personal, hurtful abuse from a section of the opposition's fans. This is a form of abuse and bullying whichever way you look at it. Young fans are growing up watching the game with a far superior understanding of technology than many of us, and stamping out this abuse will surely be beneficial in ensuring it does not continue within the generations of our younger fans.

It does seem particularly positive that the footballing authorities are keeping up with the times and not just tackling the offensive behaviour of those inside football grounds, but also those who hide behind computer screens. These groups are always in the minority, but as the old saying goes, it is always the minority that will ruin the reputation of the majority. Hopefully there will be a day where discrimination of all types is eradicated and players and fans using social networks are able to do so without the worry of being targeted by trolls. **COYR!**

GOALS GALORE!

A busy bank holiday weekend of Skrill Premier football didn't disappoint with a total of 57 goals scored across the 24 fixtures.

Some teams fared better than others, however, as Barnet replaced Cambridge at the top of the table thanks to a 3-0 win over nine-man Braintree Town at Cressing Road on Monday. The Iron were up against it after Dean Wells was dismissed for hacking down Mark Byrne with just two minutes on the clock, while Alan Massey was sent off on the half hour for fouling Harry Crawford in the box.

Nathan McDonald saved the resulting penalty from Massey's tackle, but second half goals from Keanu Marsh-Brown, Byrne and Jake Hyde secured the points for Edgar David's side. Cambridge, meanwhile, relinquished top spot after being held by Luton to a goalless draw at Kenilworth Road.

Nuneaton, Grimsby and Lincoln all continued their fine starts to the new season with victories, plus Alfreton picked up their third home win of the campaign over previously unbeaten Hereford at the Impact Arena.

Striker John Akinde headed his fourth goal for the Reds in the 2-1 win, putting him joint second in the scorers chart with Halifax's Lee Gregory and Nuneaton's Louis Moult. Only Hyde from Barnet currently has more, with five.

Chester are still looking for their first point after losing 2-1 against Forest Green, with goals from Danny Wright and Matthew Barnes-Homer doing the damage for the away side.

Gateshead, on the other hand, did get off the mark points-wise as Liam Hatch's goal with 20 minutes to go earned them a draw against Macclesfield. The Heed went into the game on a run of four straight defeats but showed character to stage a comeback after going two-nil down before the interval.

At the foot of the table, Aldershot moved to minus-three points as goals from Matt Paterson and Brett Williams saw them overcome Woking. The Shots have made a decent start to the campaign as they chip away at their -10 points penalty. If they had started on level playing field, Andy Scott's men would currently occupy 13th position. Elsewhere, Dartford beat Tamworth while Halifax saw off Southport courtesy of a strike from Kevin Holsgrove.

Welling and Salisbury shared a goalless draw at Park View Road, although the latter will be the happier of the two teams after playing for 45 minutes with 10 men following the dismissal of Theo Lewis. Joe Healy had a great chance to win it for the Wings deep into stoppage time but he fluffed his lines from the penalty spot.

Off the field, Hereford have signed Michael West on a one-month loan deal from Sky Bet League One side Crewe Alexandra. The midfielder is hoping for some regular game time after only making two substitute appearances for the Railwaymen so far this season.

Luton have also been busy, bringing in Paul Benson on loan from Swindon until the end of the season. The veteran striker, who had spells at Portsmouth and Cheltenham last year, will be looking to make an immediate impact at Kenilworth Road.

In managerial news, Gateshead have apparently received a host of applications and enquiries for the vacant manager's job following Anthony Smith's departure last week. Gary Mills, John Coleman and Terry Brown, who have all taken clubs into the Football League from the Conference in the past, are rumoured to be in the running, along with a number of high profile ex-players. David Rush, who has taken over temporarily, is yet to declare whether or not he is interested in the job on a permanent basis.

Despite the speculation, chairman Graham Wood remains tight-lipped on who the next man in the hot seat will be. Reports suggest we won't have to wait too long to find out, and, with just a single point to their name so far, Gateshead fans will be hoping it is sooner rather than later.

This weekend sees the top four go head-to-head, with Cambridge taking on Lincoln and Barnet facing Nuneaton. Meanwhile, Hereford and Tamworth, the other two undefeated teams, will do battle at Edgar Street. Surely something has to give?

MEMORABLE TORMENTORS...

Whether it was a constant threat year after year or just the occasional flashes of brilliance, Harriers have gone up against some unmistakeable talent over the years – here we profile just a few.

MARCUS GAYLE

Nine minutes and thirty seconds – it's not a huge amount of time. But seven years ago it was enough to turn Harriers dreams into nightmares in beautiful Hampshire.

Saturday, 14 October 2006 and Harriers, managed by Mark Yates, were down at the Recreation Ground, home of Aldershot Town.

It's wasn't a particularly good start to the afternoon, either, when with eight minutes on the clock John Grant somehow worked his way past the challenges of some four different Harriers players inside the area before beating goalkeeper Scott Bevan at his near post.

It was a day of questionable defending from the visitors from Worcestershire so the hopes inside the first half, after Grant's opener, would not likely have been too high but the tide turned swiftly and, against the run of play, Yates' charges were in front before the interval.

The enigmatic lyseden Christie did the honours with two goals in two minutes – a tormenting feat of his own! The first saw him latch on to a cross from loan man Craig Nelthorpe to nod the ball home and, a few moments further on, he cut inside and curled a beauty of an effort into the top corner to give his team an unlikely lead.

A curious team talk in the dressing room, then – but you'd bet the one name furthest from the lips of the management team would be one Marcus Gayle. The veteran front-man had made over 250 appearances for the old Wimbledon in the top flight, scoring against the likes of Manchester United, was enjoying something of a final fling in the game

with the Shots with his age approaching 36.

But if his career was on the wane, it certainly wasn't evident with 62 minutes on the clock when Gayle stepped off the bench and on to the pitch. In around six minutes he'd scored, levelling the scores at 2-2 as he nodded home unmarked from close range.

Then the Shots were back in front in mere moments, Gayle's second came as he swept the ball beyond a helpless and deserted Bevan having been given far too much time and space inside the area.

Worse was still to come – in a time totalling less than ten minutes, Gayle had wrapped up his hat-trick and turned a 2-1 deficit into an emphatic 4-2 winning score line with the final goal of the game; what was arguably Bevan's only real mistake of the game coming as he came to clear a cross and got absolutely nothing, Gayle on hand to head the ball back over the top of him and into the back of an empty net.

It was a remarkable turnaround in remarkable time and astonishingly, despite a career at the top of the game for so many years domestically and internationally with Jamaica, this was Gayle's one and only hat-trick. Of the achievement he would later reflect: ""I still cannot believe it happened."

"I was fortunate enough to make the Jamaica squad in 98. I played in the final group game against Japan, which we won.

"That was one of the highlights of my career – along with [that] freakish hat-trick."

The striker would incidentally go out on a high – the three goals notched against Harriers were the last he would score in a storied professional career.

Gayle, now 42, currently manages in the Skrill South with Staines Town.



PROGRAMME MONTHLY

The varying fortunes of international teams, and international players, are reflected in the big match programmes produced for their fixtures, and the half dozen or so games played by each of the Home Counties each season form an easily collectable set. Every current season programmes of this type is immediately available on eBay, and programme dealers also obtain quantities for sale. Ironically, despite the importance and prominence of the fixtures, copies of previous season big match issues may be picked up from dealers, or on eBay, at a reasonable discount, or as part of bargain bundles. This is because the high match-day cover price (reflecting the sizeable nature of the productions) does not equate with the limited demand for these programmes a couple of years later. Older International match programmes are priced much less than, say, Cup Finals, and early 60's programmes can be obtained for between £1 and £2, late 50's £3, and early 1950's from between £3 and £7. Pre-war and immediate post-war programmes are more expensive, and harder to collect items may only surface via offers lists and auctions, but for many of these programmes, prices can often be less than League match issues of a similar vintage.

Of particular interest from the England team's point of view are programmes for home games played at stadia other than Wembley. Examples include 1966 v Poland at Liverpool, 1962 v France at Hillsborough, and 1961 v Luxembourg at Highbury; indeed all but the Scotland pre-war internationals were staged at London club or provincial grounds.

Programmes for all the Home Countries' matches abroad vary in scarcity. Some are extremely difficult to obtain and very obscure, particularly

those for South American or Iron Curtain countries before 1970. Others, particularly in the last 30 years when dealers

imported in quantity, are rather more plentiful and are priced accordingly.

Inter-League programmes (up to the early 1970's) are an interesting feature for those with a sense of football history, covering a four-way tournament each season between the Scottish

League, English League, Irish League and League of Ireland (Eire), while Under 21 and their Under 23 predecessors and Youth international programmes are interesting items to collect and reflect upon in later years, particularly in view of the subsequent careers of the players involved.

Euro 96 illustrated, and subsequent European Championship and World Cup Finals have underlined, the enormous interest that the English international team can generate amongst football fans, no matter their preferences at club level. That is reflected in the popularity of international match programmes. The keenest of collectors accumulate issues from a number of countries (e.g. all four home countries matches, plus perhaps those of the Republic of Ireland) although the majority restrict their interest to the


country of their nationality.

Programme sales at international matches have at times in the past exceeded attendances, illustrating that many programmes were "brought back from the match" by friends and relatives. The price, weight and bulk of modern issues has greatly reduced the quantities sold at the match. Not all collectors can rely on this personalised service, however, and the majority fall back on programme dealers and eBay. These traders are diligent in obtaining supplies of home and away international matches, either dealing directly

with the football authorities, or relying on travelling fans returning with pre-ordered supplies. The cost of carriage is significant, however, leading to the cost to the collector being upwards of £5, irrespective of the cover price in the local currency. Mind you, that does compare well with the current cost of Wembley international programmes, albeit that home matches see a superb colourful, glossy programme produced

In the next two editions of the programme, we will take a closer look at some of the rarer, and more expensive, England international programmes.



Harriers kept up their encouraging start to the season with a professional and hard-fought 3-1 home win over Chester at Aggborough.

The game was slow to get going in terms of chances but from the off there was plenty of energy from both sides and Harriers had the best of the early pressure with Chey Dunkley producing the hosts' first chance with a header over.

Experienced striker Gareth Seddon saw a shot blocked for Chester and with 26 minutes on the clock Alex Titchiner produced a fine save from Danny Lewis, shooting at the near post and forcing the Harriers custodian to act quickly with his left boot.

Just after the half-hour mark Harriers were ahead as a Kyle Storer corner was hammered home by the unmistakable noggin of Josh Gowling from six yards out; and the lead would be doubled in the dying moments of the half as Callum Gittings bravely stole in to pick up the ball and drop it into the path of winger Marvin Johnson who kept his cool in front of goal to roll it into the bottom corner.

After three and a half games,

however, Chester would net their first goal of the season in added time of the first half as a hopeful, lofted cross was nodded in by Danny Harrison, beating Lewis and clipping the upright before settling beyond the line.

Harriers opened the second period with sights of goal from Johnson and Malbon and come the hour mark both industrious players were withdrawn as Harriers made a double change, James Dance and Joe Lolley heading on.


Young striker Lolley has never been shy about trying his luck in front of goal and as the game edged into its last 20 minutes he did that with an effort that was deflected away, ten minutes later fizzing one over the bar after cutting inside.

Chester finished the stronger of the two teams as they had their first real spell of pressure in the game in search of an equaliser but Harriers stood firm and indeed added extra gloss to the score line in injury time - livewire Lolley latching on to an up-field ball to drill the ball past Danby into the bottom corner of the net.



At the start of every new season, there is boundless optimism about Chelmsford City gaining promotion to the Conference and every season that optimism proves ill-founded.

IN OPPOSITION

Today at Aggborough we welcome Luton Town, who are embarking on their fifth season out of the Football League, writes Rob Fletcher.

Having been a major force in the division for three seasons in a row, many were surprised when the club failed to make the play-offs last season

Having dropped out of League 2 back in 2009, many had expected the Hatters to make an immediate return. However, despite these hopes, the club has so far failed to make the step back to the Football League and has instead become well acquainted with life in non-league football – under the watchful eye of chairman and BBC Midlands Today presenter, Nick Owen.

Despite this, Luton have been a major contender in the promotion race in each of the past four seasons. After reaching the play-off semi-finals in 2009/10, the Hatters went a step further a year later when they fell to AFC Wimbledon on penalties at Manchester City's Etihad Stadium. The club then suffered the same fate at the hands of York City in 2011/12, with the Minsters running out 2-1 winners in front of over 39,000 fans at Wembley.

Having been a major force in the division for three seasons in a row, many were surprised when the club failed to make the play-offs last season – instead having to settle for seventh place, 13 points off the play-off pace. However, many had expected Luton to push on this season and reclaim their place amongst the league's big players – but the Hatters have failed to find top gear so far this campaign.

The new season started with a defeat when Luton fell 1-0 to early season high-flyers Southport on the opening day. However, the Hatters put the defeat behind them almost immediately, comfortably seeing off Salisbury 2-0 three days later – thanks to goals from Solomon Taiwo and Luke Guttridge. But three consecutive draws with Macclesfield, Forest Green and Cambridge meant Luton fell off the early season pace, though encouragement will be taken from clean sheets against the latter two.

But as fans of all clubs will know, the table means little this early on in the year as new players are still gelling together, while managers are still getting to grips with new formations and tactics. With this in mind, it is important to remember that what the Hatters do have is a manager at the helm with a portfolio many of his counterparts at this level would cherish.

John Still (pictured) was appointed in February of this year, following the departure of Paul Buckle. With plenty of non-league

accomplishments under his belt, the one that will stand out to Luton fans is the Conference National title he won with Dagenham and Redbridge back in 2006/07. Still has experienced what it is like to win the league and is more than capable of repeating the feat with the club the size of Luton.

He wasted no time in making his mark on the club, bringing in a new backroom team in the summer, in addition to a number of new players. The above-mentioned Guttridge was signed in July to add depth to the midfield department, while winger Shaun Whalley was also added to the books. Incidentally, Whalley had an unhappy debut after missing a penalty during the opening day defeat to Southport.


Elsewhere, fellow new signing striker Mark Cullen has something on his CV that all players at this level will envy – scoring in the Premier League, which he did during his time with Hull City.

Defender Anthony Charles has been brought in from League Two Plymouth Argyle while Andrew Parry will also strengthen the defence following his move from Southport. Goalkeeper Elliot Justham joins from East Thurrock, while Histon pair Jim Stevenson and Danny Fitzsimons will boost the midfield and defensive departments respectively.

Glancing over the rest of the squad, Luton have a host of players with plenty of experience. Goalkeeper Mark Tyler has played over 150 times for the Hatters, while midfielder Alex Lawless is approaching the 100-game mark. Lawless also scored the goal that saw off Wolves 1-0 in last season's FA Cup.

Midfielder Jake Howells has been a regular at the club since 2008, while skipper Ronnie Henry was the first player to lift a competitive trophy at the new Wembley when he captained Stevenage in the 2006/07 FA Trophy Final against Harriers. Striker Andre Gray has drawn interest from Football League sides with his goalscoring pedigree, while fellow frontman Jon Shaw is also dangerous in front of goal at this level.

With expectation comes a lot of pressure, and this is something Luton players have had to put up with during their time in the division. The club is arguably the biggest name in the Skrill Premier and is still remembered for its glory days from years gone by in the Football League. Although things have not gone exactly to plan so far this campaign, there is still plenty of time for the Hatters to turn things round and become one of the key players in the 2013/14 Skrill Premier promotion race.

In Goal

MARK TYLER

Hugely experienced goalkeeper who signed a one-year contract extension in May. On the verge of 700 senior appearances, 36-year-old Tyler was one of the Hatters' first signings in their first season in the Conference in 2009, and the stopper has since gone on to make 184 appearances between the sticks, keeping 72 clean sheets.

ELLIOTT JUSTHAM

Promising young goalkeeper signed from East Thurrock on a two-year deal in May. The commanding 6ft 3in stopper kept 14 clean sheets in 31 matches for the Rocks last season, and the 22-year-old has previously enjoyed trials at West Ham and Reading.

In Defence

DANNY FITZSIMONS

Former Millwall and QPR defender who followed team-mate Jim Stevenson to Kenilworth Road from Histon on a two-year contract this summer. He swept the board at the Stutes' end-of-season awards and has over 100 games' experience despite only being 21 years old. Capable of playing at left-back or in central defence.

STEVE McNULTY

The experienced centre-half signed a new deal with the Hatters this summer after a string of accomplished performances for the club during 2012/13. The Liverpool-born defender led Fleetwood Town to Conference title in 2011/12, lifting the title as the Cod Army captain.

ANTHONY CHARLES

Experienced central defender who helped Barnet and Aldershot to the Conference title in 2005 and 2008 respectively. A calm, composed, left-footed defender, Charles left Aldershot for Northampton in January 2012 and went onto appear 18 times in League 2 for the Cobblers. He ended last season with Plymouth.

SCOTT GRIFFITHS

Left-back who penned a one-year contract at the end of last season. Another former Dagenham man, the experienced 27-year-old joined the Hatters in March following his release from former club Peterborough. He won the Conference under Still in 2007 and lifted the League 2 title with Chesterfield in 2011.

ANDY PARRY

The central defender signed from Southport on a two-year contract this summer. Also able to play in central midfield, Parry has two season's worth of Conference football under his belt but began his career as a youngster at Blackburn.

RONNIE HENRY

Club captain and right-back in his second season with the club. The defender joined the Hatters last summer from Stevenage, who he helped win promotion from the Conference to League One.

ALEX LACEY

Highly-rated centre-half who has enjoyed a fine pre-season in which he was handed the captain's armband by John Still. Made his Town debut as a 17-year-old in the FA Trophy and spent last season on loan with Eastleigh.

BRETT LONGDEN

First year professional Brett is a right-back by trade and made his mark in pre-season with a fine 30-yard goal against Thurrock. He's another player who has tasted first team experience in the FA Trophy.

JEROME JIBODU

Like Longden, Jerome signed his first professional contract this summer. A composed left-back, he made his Hatters debut in the FA Trophy against Skelmersdale last season.

In Midfield

JONATHAN SMITH

Central midfielder who joined the Hatters from Swindon last season having helped the Robins lift the League 2 title in 2011/12 under Paolo Di Canio. Also capable of playing at right-back.

ALEX LAWLESS

The influential and creative midfielder penned a new two-year contract in May, turning down contracts at two clubs in League 1. The 27-year-old has made 124 appearances for the Hatters since signing from York City in November 2010 and has scored 12 goals.

SOLOMAN TAIWO

Central midfielder who agreed a new one-year contract at the end of the season having appeared nine times for the Hatters having been signed

by John Still in March. Starred for a host of non-league clubs before being snapped by Still at Dagenham in 2007 where he became a driving force in the Daggers midfield. His impressive performances led to him signing for then-Championship Cardiff in 2009 for £250,000.

JAKE HOWELLS

Still hard to believe he's 22, Howells is the Hatters' longest serving player having made his debut as a 17-year-old on the final day of the 2007/08 season. Since then, the left-footer has been capped by Wales at under-21 level and has made over 200 appearances for the club.

JJ O'DONNELL

Left-sided midfielder who joined the Town in 2010 from St Albans and made his debut as a substitute in an FA Cup tie against Corby later that year. After successful loan spells at Thurrock and Hampton & Richmond, he penned a three-year contract last summer.

DAVE MARTIN

Left-winger who signed for the Hatters in January this year and went onto score three times in 16 league appearances for the club. He was rewarded for his fine performances with a new two-year deal this summer.

LUKE GUTTRIDGE

Influential and experienced central midfielder with over 400 senior appearances to his name who signed for the Hatters in August on a two-year contract. He has twice won promotion whilst with Southend, and also helped Northampton reach the League 2 play-off final last season.

SHAUN WHALLEY

Attack-minded midfielder or winger who followed Andy Parry to Kenilworth Road on a two-year deal from Southport. The 25-year-old was in inspired form for the Sandgrounders throughout 2012/13, scoring 10 goals and creating many more, and ended the campaign with a string of end-of-season awards.

MATT ROBINSON

Teenage midfielder in his second season at Kenilworth Road having signed last summer from Leicester City. He impressed John Still towards the end

of the previous campaign and was rewarded with a new two-year contract this summer.

JIM STEVENSON

Box-to-box midfielder signed in May on a two-year deal from Histon. The youngster scored 11 goals for the Stutes in 2012/13 and ended the campaign as the top goalscorer. The 21-year-old made his full debut as a 17-year-old at Kenilworth Road for Histon in a game the Hatters won 5-1.

In Attack

JON SHAW

Centre-forward in his second season at Kenilworth Road having signed last summer from Gateshead. Scored 45 league goals in 80 appearances for the Town last term, including a hat-trick in the 6-1 win over Barrow in January.

ALEX WALL

Raw, powerful centre-forward with pace to boot, who became John Still's first signing at Kenilworth Road having joined from Maidenhead last season. He scored his first goals for the Hatters when both hitting both goals in a 2-0 win over Ebbsfleet in April.

MARK CULLEN

Young striker signed on a two-year deal following his release from Premier League-bound Hull City. A clever, poacher of a forward, Cullen impressed the manager with two fine performances against the Hatters whilst on loan at Stockport. Given his debut for Hull in the Premier League, he scored on his full debut for the Tigers whilst in the top flight.

ANDRE GREY


Lightening quick forward who finished last season as the Hatters' leading goalscorer with 20 goals. The young striker made an instant impact when signing from Hinckley in March 2012 and has been capped by England C.

JAKE WOOLLEY

Teenage forward who signed professional forms last summer having impressed the coaching staff with his performances and attitude. Also made his debut as a 17-year-old in the FA Trophy, but has also tasted action in the Conference.

1959 FA CUP FINALISTS

RON BAYNHAM: England international goalkeeper who made 388 League appearances until injury ended his playing career in May 1965. He later worked as an interior decorator and now lives in Silsoe.

BRENDAN McNALLY: Eire international right-back who joined Cambridge City in July 1963, then Dunstable. He managed Chesham and Dunstable, then worked for Zenith Windows, settling in Dunstable.

KEN HAWKS: Left-back who moved to Peterborough United in June 1961, then played for Bedford and St Neots. He spent 28 years as a sales rep for a wholesale food company and still lives in Luton.

JOHN GROVES: Long-serving right-half who netted 16 goals in 218 League games, moving to Bournemouth in September 1963. Settling in his native Derby, he spent 30 years working for Courtaulds.

SYD OWEN: England international who became manager. Later Leeds United's coach until October 1975, he then coached at Birmingham, Hull City and Manchester United. He died in August 1998.

DAVE PACEY: England U-23 left-half who netted 16 goals in 246 League games for the Hatters, moving to Kettering Town in July 1965. He then worked for Electrolux, settling in Newport Pagnell.

BILLY BINGHAM: Northern Ireland international winger who joined Everton in October 1960, then played for Port Vale. He managed Southport, Plymouth, Everton, Mansfield and Northern Ireland.

ALLAN BROWN: Scotland international who moved to Portsmouth in March 1961, then managed Wigan, Luton, Torquay, Bury, Nottingham Forest, Southport and Blackpool. He died in April 2011.

BOB MORTON: England B international who netted 48 goals in 495 League games, becoming Bletchley Town's player-boss in July 1964. He worked for Luton Sports Press and died in April 2002.

GEORGE CUMMINS: Eire international who scored 21 times in 186 League outings, moving to Cambridge City in July 1961, then Hull City. He was later an electrician, settling in Newton-le-Willows.

TONY GREGORY: Ex-England Youth winger who joined Watford in March 1960, then Bexley, Bedford, Hastings, Dover and Stevenage. He was managing director of an aerosol manufacturing firm.

1973-74 PROMOTION WINNERS

GRAHAM HORN: Goalkeeper who moved to Charlton Athletic in December 1976, then Southend, Aldershot and Torquay. Later a residential social worker for Devon County Council, he died in July 2012.

JOHN RYAN: Right-back who joined Norwich City in August 1976, then Sheffield United, Manchester City, Stockport County, Chester and Cambridge United's player-boss. He has held coaching posts.

JIMMY HUSBAND: Former England U-23 international who joined Memphis Rogues in May 1978. Later with Eynesbury and St Neots, he then worked as a barman at a local pub and has settled in Clephill.

STEVE WHITE: Striker who moved to Charlton Athletic in July 1982, then Bristol Rovers again, Swindon Town, Hereford United and Cardiff City. He has assisted Bath City and managed Chippenham.

HARRIERS 1-2 LUTON TOWN. SATURDAY, 10 OCTOBER, 2009

Harriers were defeated by two Luton goals in the last fifteen minutes, including a last-minute winner that left them ruing missed chances in a dramatic and controversial first half.

The first half was initially good for Harriers, the visitors allowing them plenty of time and space to knock the ball around. It was the visitors, however, who had the first good chance to open the scoring; Chris McPhee, still in the heart of the defence in an unchanged Harriers side, made a poor clearance that was played back in to Ben Wright who hit his shot on the turn over the bar.

Within a minute Harriers were ahead; Duane Courtney's cross from the right found Matt Barnes-Homer at the near post on the edge of the penalty area, he chested the ball down and spun and hit a low shot across Mark Tyler in The Hatters' goal to record his seventh goal of the season.


Harriers should have built upon their lead, and could have had the game wrapped up long before the drama kicked-off; Lee Baker's cross from the left was flicked on by Barnes-Homer just out of the reach of Robbie Matthews shortly after the goal. On the half-hour Barnes-Homer's cross from the right picked out Brian Smikle whose goal bound header was well saved by Tyler and when Barnes-Homer fired the loose ball back across goal there was nobody there to apply the finishing touch. Five minutes before the interval Baker's corner from the right was not cleared and McPhee saw his shot cleared off the line.

Moments later the game was turned upon its head. Luton midfielder Rossi Jarvis made a needless, reckless, challenge on McPhee on the touchline near midfield and was shown the red card. McPhee hobbled on for a short

while but had to be substituted for Gavin Caines. In stoppage time at the end of the half Harriers themselves were reduced to ten men when Matthews was adjudged to have stamped on Tyler as he leapt over him as the keeper saved at his feet, the referee possibly influenced by the reaction of Tyler and the baying Luton fans just a few yards away behind the goal.

After the interval Luton began to take control of the game and kept Harriers penned back inside their own half for extended periods of the game. Ten minutes in Adam Newton's cross from the right was headed wide of the far post by Asa Hall. At the other end Smikle had a great chance to double the lead on the hour, set up by Dean Bennett he lashed at his shot and blasted it over the bar from a narrow angle.

Freddie Murray set up another chance for Luton as the visitors continued to press but his cross from the left was headed weakly at Dean Coleman by substitute Ryan Charles. It was no surprise, then, when Town drew level with fifteen minutes still to play; a cross from the left was not cleared



properly and fell to Newton who hit a blistering volley that gave Coleman no chance before going in off the bar.

Despite being pegged back for most of the half it seemed that Harriers would at least hold on to take a point but in the last minute they were sunk when Charles met Newton's cross from the right and lifted it past Coleman to send the visiting support into raptures.


