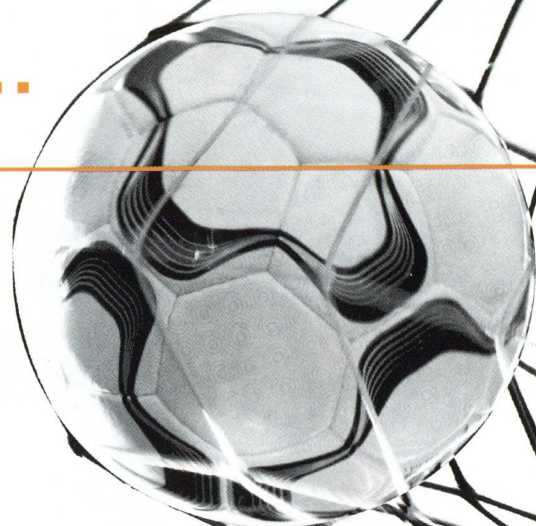

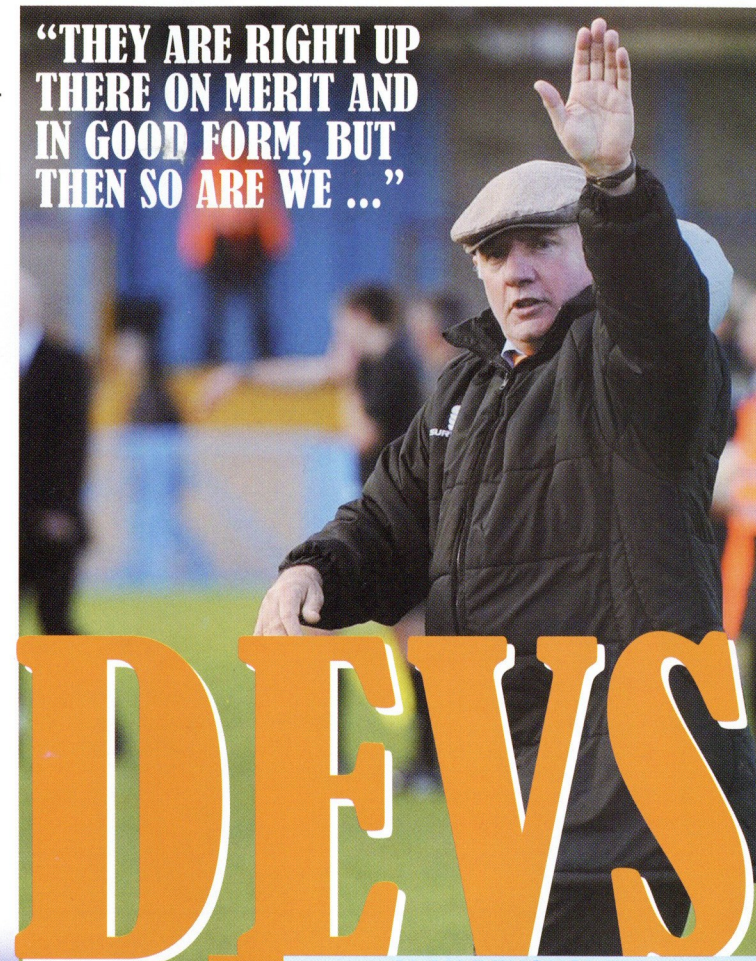
Luton will bring hundreds of fans and they will make a lot of noise but I thought your support on Saturday was first class.

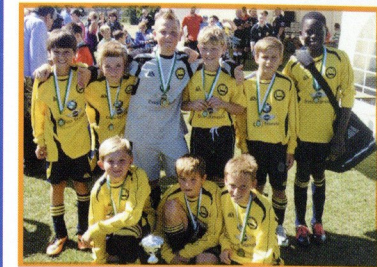

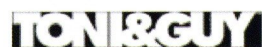

at a stroke, all happened at Kenilworth Road at around this time.

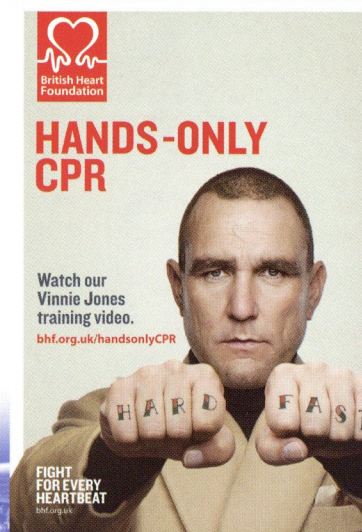
Trailblazers and although not everything worked it was a time when Luton were a true force to be reckoned with.

BLUFFERS GUIDE - LUTON

Why are Luton known as the Hatters?

Plaiting and straw hat making were very popular in Luton in the 19th Century. Plaits used to be imported from Italy but the Napoleonic wars stopped that and a Luton businessman, Thomas Waller, started buying them from prisoners of war and the people in and around the town who plaited. You don't find that sort of information in many football programmes by the way.

When were the club formed?

11th April 1885, and they made quick progress. In 1891 Luton became the first club in southern England to be fully professional. The club was a founder member of the Southern Football before joining The Football League for 1897-98, although they returned to the Southern League for the 1900-01 season for financial reasons.

How long have then been at Kenilworth Road?

Since 1905. They were there when they got back into the Football League in 1920-21 and for their best pre-match season of 1936-37, when the team finished top and won promotion to the Second Division. Joe Payne was the star in those days: he scored ten goals in one match against Bristol Rovers, which remains a Football League record.

Other than their golden era in the 1980s what other memorable moments did they have?

The 50s were a great period - they reached the FA Cup Final against Nottingham Forest in 1958-59 but by 1964-65, were playing in the fourth tier. The 70's saw stars such as Bruce Rioch and Malcolm Macdonald while comedy legend Eric Morecambe's spell on the board kept them in the public eye.

keep them up, and a dramatic Wembley League Cup final win over Arsenal remain iconic moments in their history.

What happened after that?

The club was relegated from the top division at the end of the 1991-92 season and were back in the third tier four years later Luton stayed in the old Second Division until relegation at the end of the 2000-01 season. Joe Kinnear helped them win promotion to



But the 80s were the best years...

Yes. David Pleat had played for the Hatters and was made manager in 1978. By 1982-83 the team was back in the top flight. Stars such as Ricky Hill, Brian Stein, Steve Foster, Mal Donaghy and Les Sealey shone as Luton relished life at the top. Pleat dancing across the pitch at Man City after Raddy Antic scored to record.

rise again but administration and point deductions followed and despite winning the Football League Trophy they were relegated to the Conference.

They have been in the promotion play-offs three times and remain one of the best supported club playing at this level.

MEET THE MEN FROM



Promotion is the name of the game for Luton Town as they strive to make it a case of fifth time lucky.

The Hatters have become something of a 'nearly club' since their relegation to the Conference in 2009; three times they have reached the play offs, twice the final itself, without making that ultimate leap back into the Football League.

Their fall from grace has been well documented. The 1988 League Cup winners competed in English Football's second tier as recently as 2007 but serious financial problems, points deductions and three successive demotions saw them drop into non league, where they have remained ever since.

Mick Hartford, Richard Money, Gary Brabin and Paul Buckell have all tried but failed to guide Luton to promotion, meaning the responsibility now befalls former Dagenham and Redbridge boss John Still – their fifth manager in just four years.

Under Still, Luton have made solid progress. Only six of his 34 games in charge have ended in defeat and after a rocky start to this campaign, Luton are now nine matches unbeaten and up to third.

At present, they are seven points behind leaders Cambridge United and are one of only three clubs to still be unbeaten at home this season.

On paper, Luton have one of the strongest squads in the division. They have a wealth of Football League experience which is complemented by youthful exuberance.

For a team aiming for promotion, it bodes well that they have several players in their ranks who have been there, done it and got the medals to show for it.

Imposing centre back Steve McNulty captained Fleetwood Town to the Conference title in 2012. Luke Guttridge won two promotions with Southend United. Ronnie Henry, the Hatters' skipper, was an integral part of the Stevenage team that rose from the Conference to League One. And perhaps most impressively, veteran striker Paul Benson has achieved the honour with Dagenham, Charlton Athletic and Swindon Town.

Furthermore, goalkeeper Mark Tyler has made almost 700 senior appearances.

But Luton aren't all about old heads. Striker Andy Gray, 22, was their leading marksman last season with an impressive 20 goals and has hit six already this term.

Although the Hatters have been consistent of late in terms of results, the entertainment value of their matches has been entirely unpredictable.

Their games appear to be either mesmerizing or uninspiring, Hatters supporters being thrilled or frustrated in equal measure.

This is highlighted by the exciting 4-3 victories over Halifax Town and Tamworth,

compared to five dismal 0-0 draws.

Luton have registered a healthy return of 30 league goals but indeed finding the back of the net has proved troublesome on occasions; they have failed to score in seven of their matches.

This was especially apparent at the start of the season as they recorded blanks in five of their first eight games.

Haig Avenue was the destination on the opening day but Luton slipped to a disappointing 1-0 reverse at Southport.

Salisbury City were next up and comfortably beaten 2-0 at Kenilworth Road but the Hatters had Luke Guttridge to thank in their following game as his 97th minute equaliser rescued a point at home to Macclesfield Town.

Their matches against Forest Green Rovers and Cambridge finished goalless before an impressive 2-0 victory at Kidderminster Harriers, courtesy of two second half penalties from Jake Howells.

Meet The Hatters

MARK TYLER - Hugely experienced goalkeeper who signed a one-year contract extension in May. On the verge of 700 senior appearances, 36-year-old Tyler was one of the Hatters' first signings in their first season in the Conference in 2009, and the stopper has since gone on to make 184 appearances between the sticks, keeping 72 clean sheets.

DANNY FITZSIMONS - Former Millwall and QPR defender who followed team-mate Jim Stevenson to Kenilworth Road from Histon on a two-year contract this summer. He swept the board at the Stutes' end-of-season awards and has over 100 games' experience despite only being 21 years old. Capable of playing at left-back or in central defence.

JONATHAN SMITH - Central midfielder who joined the Hatters from Swindon last season having helped the Robins lift the League 2 title in 2011/12 under Paolo Di Canio. Also capable of playing at right-back.



drew 0-0, this time against Grimsby Town, before going down 2-0 at Wrexham.

However, defeat to the Welsh club proved to be a turning point in their season as Luton won their next three matches; Dartford and Lincoln City were defeated 3-0 and 3-2 respectively at home, and Woking thrashed 4-0 away.

Hereford United at Edgar Street ended in another goalless stalemate before their game of the season to date; Luton fighting back from 3-1 down to record a memorable 4-3 triumph over Halifax.

Six goals were shared in their away match at Aldershot before Hyde were brushed aside 4-1 at Kenilworth Road in mid-October.

Luton again prevailed in a seven goal thriller at Tamworth and in their most recent league match they were held 0-0 at Gateshead to leave them firmly in the play off picture.

STEVE McNULTY - The experienced centre-half signed a new deal with the Hatters this summer after a string of accomplished performances for the club during 2012/13. The Liverpool-born defender led Fleetwood to Conference title in 2011/12, lifting the title as the Cod Army captain.

ANTHONY CHARLES - Experienced central defender who helped Barnet and Aldershot to the Conference title in 2005 and 2008 respectively. A calm, composed, left-footed defender, Charles left Aldershot for Northampton in January 2012 and went onto appear 18 times in League 2 before ending last season with Plymouth.

ALEX LAWLESS - The influential and creative midfielder penned a new two-year contract in May, turning down contracts at two clubs in League 1. The 27-year-old has made 124 appearances for the Hatters since signing from York City in November 2010 and has scored 12 goals.

KENILWORTH ROAD

SOLOMON TAIWO - Central midfielder who agreed a new one-year contract at the end of the season having appeared nine times for the Hatters having been signed by John Still in March. Starred for a host of non-league clubs before being snapped by Still at Dagenham in 2007 where he became a driving force in midfield. His impressive performances led to him signing for then-Championship Cardiff in 2009 for £250,000.

JOHN SHAW - Centre-forward in his second season at Kenilworth Road having signed last summer from Gateshead. Scored 45 league goals in 80 appearances for the Tynesiders and hit double figures for the Town last term, including a hat-trick in the 6-1 win over Barrow in January.

ALEX WALL - Raw, powerful centre-forward with pace to boot, who became John Still's first signing at Kenilworth Road having joined from Maidenhead last season. He scored his first goals for the Hatters when both hitting both goals in a 2-0 win over Ebbsfleet in April.

JAKE HOWELLS - Still hard to believe he's 22, Howells is the Hatters' longest serving player having made his debut as a 17-year-old on the final day of the 2007/08 season. Since then, the left-footer has been capped by Wales at under-21 level and has made over 200 appearances for the club.

SCOTT GRIFFITHS - Left-back who penned a one-year contract at the end of last season. Another former Dagenham man, the experienced 27-year-old joined the Hatters in March following his release from former club Peterborough. He won the Conference under Still in 2007 and lifted the League 2 title with Chesterfield in 2011.

MARK CULLEN - Young striker signed on a two-year deal following his release from Premier League-bound Hull City. A clever, poacher of a forward, Cullen impressed the manager with two fine performances against the Hatters whilst on loan at Stockport. Given his debut for Hull in the Premier League, he scored on his full debut for the Tigers whilst in the top flight.

ANDY PARRY - The central defender signed from Southport on a two-year contract this summer. Also able to play in central midfield, Parry has two seasons of Conference football under his belt but began his career as a youngster at Blackburn.

JJ O'DONNELL - Left-sided midfielder who joined the Town in 2010 from St Albans and made his debut as a substitute in an FA Cup tie against Corby later that year. After successful loan spells at Thurrock and Hampton & Richmond, he penned a three-year contract last summer.

ELLIOT JUSTHAM - Promising young goalkeeper signed from East Thurrock on a two-year deal in May. The commanding 6ft

3in stopper kept 14 clean sheets in 31 matches for the Rocks last season, and the 22-year-old has previously enjoyed trials at West Ham and Reading.

DAVE MARTIN - Left-winger who signed for the Hatters in January this year and went onto score three times in 16 league appearances for the club. He was rewarded for his fine performances with a new two-year deal this summer.

DAVID VIANA - Highly-rated Portuguese youth international who signed a one-year contract at Kenilworth Road in late September 2013. The France-born midfielder is capable of playing across the midfield and in an advanced position behind the striker. Has played in the MLS with Salt Lake and been on the books of Spanish giants Atletico Madrid.

LUKE GUTTRIDGE - Experienced central midfielder with over 400 senior appearances who signed for the Hatters in August on a two-year contract. He has twice won promotion whilst with Southend, and helped Northampton reach the League 2 play-off final last season.

MATT ROBINSON - Teenage midfielder in his second season at Kenilworth Road having signed last summer from Leicester. He impressed towards the end of the previous campaign and was rewarded with a new two-year contract this summer.

RONNIE HENRY - Club captain and right-back in his second season with the club. The defender joined the Hatters last summer from Stevenage, who he helped win promotion from to League 1.

ALEX LACEY - centre-half who has enjoyed a fine pre-season in which he was handed the captain's armband by John Still. Made his Town debut as a 17-year-old in the FA Trophy and spent last season on loan with Eastleigh.

ANDRE GRAY - Lightning quick forward who finished last season as the Hatters' leading goalscorer with 20 goals. The young striker made an instant impact when signing from Hinckley in March 2012 and has been capped by England C.

PAUL BENSON - Experienced centre-forward signed on a season-long loan from Swindon in August. Helped Dagenham & Redbridge to two promotions with John

Still, scoring over 75 times in the process. Continued to score once he left the Daggers when with Charlton and Swindon. Won League 2 title with Swindon in 2012.

JIM STEVENSON - Box-to-box midfielder signed in May on a two-year deal from Histon. The youngster scored 11 goals for the Stutes in 2012/13 and ended the campaign as the top goalscorer. The 21-year-old made his full debut as a 17-year-old at Kenilworth Road for Histon.

JAKE WOOLLEY - Teenage forward who signed professional forms last summer having impressed the coaching staff with his performances and attitude. Also made his debut as a 17-year-old in the Trophy, but has also tasted action in the Conference.

BRETT LONGDEN - First year professional and a right-back by trade who made his mark in pre-season with a fine 30-yard goal against Thurrock. Tasted first team experience in the FA Trophy.

ZANE BANTON - Youth team striker who was rewarded for his performances in the Hatters' development and youth squads to earn a professional contract in September 2013. Made his debut as a second half substitute in the 4-0 win over Woking.

JEROME JIBODU - Like Longden, Jerome signed his first professional contract this summer. A composed left-back, he made his Hatters debut in the FA Trophy against Skelmersdale last season.

JOHN STILL - The manager. The 63-year-old joined the Hatters last March having enjoyed a hugely successful 10-year spell at Dagenham & Redbridge where he guided the Daggers to the Conference title as well as promotion to League 1.

TERRY HARRIS - John Still's right-hand man who had been with Dagenham & Redbridge since 1999. As a player he starred for the old Dagenham FC – scoring a winning goal at Wembley – and has also coached at Dartford, Enfield and St Albans.

BACK TO SKRILL!

The Iron face Luton Town tonight with both sides eager to get back to winning ways after being held to goalless away draws at Tamworth and Gateshead respectively in their previous league outings.

Alan Devonshire's men have emerged victorious in three of their last four matches at base but will be wary of a Luton team unbeaten in nine. The Iron boast an impressive recent record against John Still's much fancied promotion hopefuls, having won the last three meetings including the corresponding fixture last season. Sean Marks and Kenny Davis were on target for the Iron back in February as they prevailed 2-0.

Elsewhere in the Skrill Premier tonight, league leaders Cambridge United are looking for an immediate response after suffering their first league defeat of the season against Southport last time out. Aldershot are the visitors to The R Costings Abbey Stadium and face a daunting task. Cambridge possess an extremely impressive 100% home record having won all eight of their matches while the Shots are languishing in 23rd having won just one in seven. A small crumb of comfort for the visitors is that they have only conceded five away goals - the joint best away defensive record - but they will, no doubt, have their work cut out to get a positive result.

Another high flying team who lost their previous Skrill Premier match are Kidderminster Harriers, who travel to Moss Rose to face cup heroes Macclesfield Town. The Harriers received a huge boost last week with the news that popular manager Steve Burr had rejected the advances of Forest Green Rovers and committed his future to the club. The Worcestershire outfit have been inconsistent on the road and will need to keep an eye on Connor Jennings, the league's leading marksman, who bagged a hat-trick in the Silkmen's win over Wrexham and scored two in their FA Cup thumping of Swindon Town.

Barnet are striving to make it seven league games unbeaten as they host Welling. The sides are

locked on 28 points apiece in 7th and 8th position respectively, only two points shy of the play offs. Welling enter the match in good form having shown a remarkable resurgence of late, taking 19 points from the last 27 available.

At the wrong end of the table, out of form Hereford United welcome fellow strugglers Chester to Edgar Street with both sides in dire need of points. Four of the Bulls' last five matches have been lost while Chester recorded an important victory over Hyde at the weekend to move level on points with their opponents.

Bottom of the table Hyde make the trip to Halifax more in hope than expectation as they seek to record that elusive first three point haul of the season at the 19th time of asking. They came agonisingly close against Nuneaton but lost at home to Chester on Saturday. The odds are stacked heavily against Hyde; the Shaymen are formidable on home territory with only Cambridge picking up more points at base.

Meanwhile, last season's beaten play off finalists Wrexham are down in 17th, badly struggling for form, as they take on a much improving



Woking are in serious need of some home comforts having tasted success only once in their nine matches at the Kingfield Stadium. The Cards find themselves in the relegation zone and play a Dartford side only one point the right side of the dotted line.

Another team in relegation bother are Tamworth. Only goal difference is keeping them out of the drop zone but the Lambs can take heart from a surprise FA Cup win over Cheltenham Town. Tonight they face inconsistent play off chasers Alfreton Town, who have been very much hot and cold this season; good one week, poor the next.

Gateshead side who have six wins in their last eight.

Southport recorded a great win over Cambridge a week ago and welcome Lincoln City to Haig Avenue. Just a solitary point separates the teams so a closely fought encounter is predicted.

The final match this evening sees Nuneaton attempt to halt their alarming eight match winless run as they go away to Forest Green. Boro started the season brilliantly but are falling down the league like a stone. Big spending Rovers have underachieved massively and will be desperate to make it back-to-back league wins to climb the table.

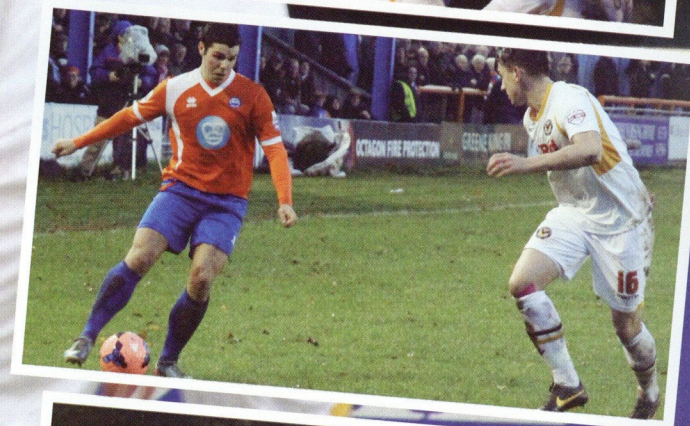
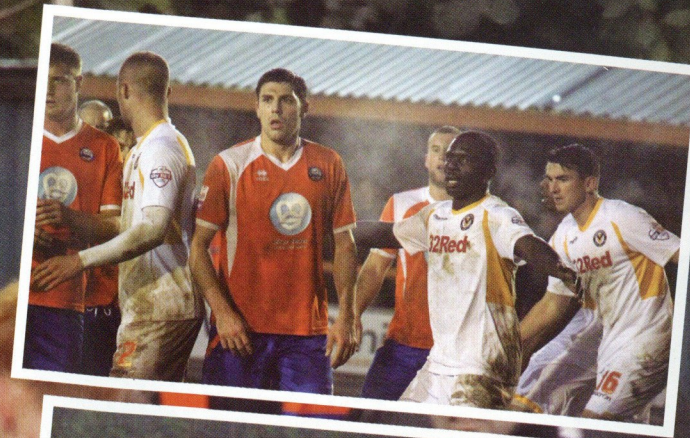

The Silkmen's reward is another home tie against the winners of the Brackley Town v Gillingham replay and who wouldn't bet on the Buckinghamshire non-leaguers pulling off a home win - they have one of the best home records in their league.

Tamworth were lucky too in the draw with Bristol City having to visit the Lamb Ground after they

have one of the best draws in the Second Round - a home tie against Sheffield Utd but only if they beat Bury away in their delayed First Round match.

All the clubs making into the Second Round know there's a fantastic incentive in reaching that all potentially lucrative Third Round and who knows a trip to Old Trafford, Anfield, the Emirates of White Hart Lane.

And that's what makes the FA Cup such a wonderful competition and still the greatest in football despite all the so-called glory of the Champions League and the like.

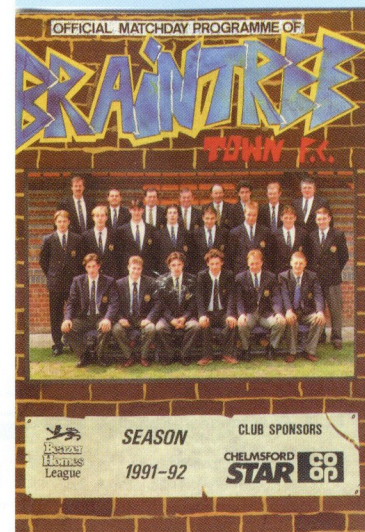
12th November 1955

Counties League match with Iron winning 3-0 with goals from Ivan Gooday (2) and Chris Guy. The team lined up with Tony Kelly in goal, Lenny Rayner, Steve James, John Bibby, Frank Warner, Gus Jennings, Nicky Lee, Russell Cotton, Chris Guy, Dave Jarvis and Ivan Gooday with Kevin Ketley coming on as sub.

**12th November 1991**

We entertained Aveley in the Essex Senior Cup Second Round, winning a close game 1-0, Gary Hollocks scored our winning goal. The Iron line up was Paul Catley in goal, Lee Fish, Russell Tanner, Mark Cranfield, Jimmy Thomas, Nick Maynard, John Bishop, Kevin Newbury, Paul England, Gary Hollocks and Duncan Coghlan. We went on to meet Purfleet (now known as Thurrock) in the next round, winning 5-1 in a replay after a 3-3 draw at Ship Lane.

12th November 2005

It was F.A. Trophy action this day eight years ago and we made the trip to play Chelmsford City in the second qualifying round, coming home with a 2-0 win thanks to James Baker's two goals. We lined up with Nicky Morgan in goal, Chris Wild, Mark Jones, Ollie Adediji, Paul Lorraine, Brad Quinton, Matti Joseph, Andy Porter, Eugene Ofori, James Baker and James Hawes with Louis Riddle coming on as sub, also on the bench were Steve Good, Prince Toku, Papa Agyemang and Robbie Martin.

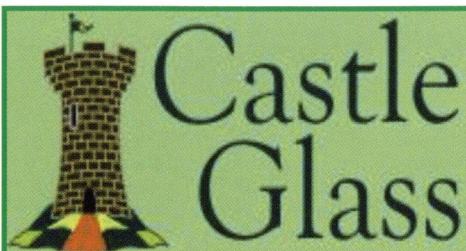

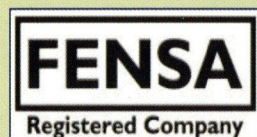

THE HATTER'S CULT HERO

Continuing our series looking at the Fans Favourites in the Conference, we trace the career of one of the all time great for the Hatters...

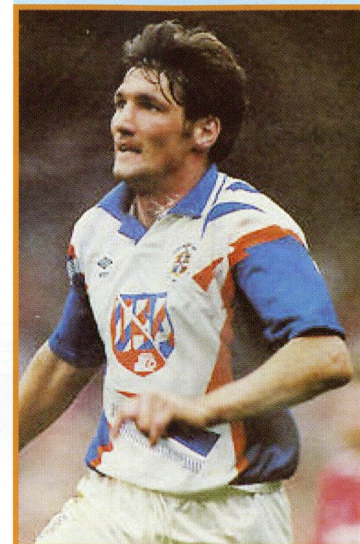
Our visitors today have several iconic players who were, and still are, loved by the fans. From Ricky Hill and Brian Stein to Steve Foster's headband and Malcolm MacDonald's sideburns, Luton fans have so many heroes from yesteryear. And yet, for many it is the no nonsense, hard as nails, total commitment of Mick Harford that stands out from the crowd.

Think of old fashioned centre forwards of the 80s and Harford is right up there with the best. Dominant in the air and far better on the deck than many gave him credit for, the Sunderland born forward hit it off straight away at Kenilworth Road in arguably Luton's best ever side.

Originally with Lincoln City Mick's talents were swiftly noticed and he moved to Newcastle United in a £180,000 transfer. You would have thought he would have been an instant hero on Tyneside, following in the traditions of so many great Number 9's: Think Andy Carroll without the pony tail. And with ability. But after just 19 appearances and eight months Mick was off to Bristol

City for £160,000 in August 1981 and then Birmingham City for a cut price £100,000 in March 1982.

Luton boss David Pleat, ever a shrewd judge of players, needed a striker who would slot in alongside the emerging Brian Stein (and later brother Mark), someone who could act as a foil, a minder, and a focus for his



exciting young team and in December 1984, Luton paid £250,000 for Harford's services. It proved to be money very well spent.

In his time at Luton, Harford earned himself two England caps, helped the Hatters win

the League Cup in 1988 against Arsenal and scored in the final the following year as Luton went down to Nottingham Forest.

57 goals in 129 appearances doesn't truly do him justice. He was a key player at Luton until his transfer to Derby County in January 1990 for £450,000. Even after his transfer, Harford managed to help the Hatters. In the last game of the season his beloved Luton needed the win to stay up.

Harford, playing for Derby remember, managed to head the ball from outside his own box, past England goalkeeper Peter Shilton, into his own net as Luton won the game and avoided the drop. Several years later he admitted that the own goal was deliberate, thus assuring himself of Cult Hero status

He went back to Luton in September 1991 for £325,000, despite competition from Manchester United before spells at Chelsea, Sunderland, Coventry City and Wimbledon.

After moving into coaching with Wimbledon, Harford returned to Luton to help in their successful promotion season of 2001-02, and has since enjoyed spells at his old stomping ground as Director of Football, and first-team coach.

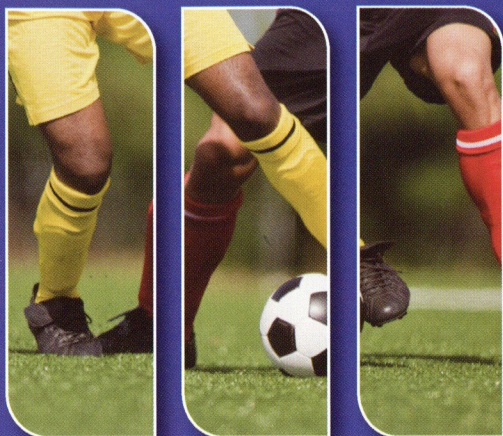

CUP REVIEW



The Iron will face Kidderminster Harriers in the FA Cup Second Round if they can see off Newport County in their First Round replay.

Steve Burr's Harriers cruised into the next round with a 4-1 victory against Sutton United at Aggborough thanks to goals from Amari Morgan-Smith, Callum Gittings, Joe Lolley and Anthony Malbon.

The headline makers in the First Round were Skril Premier sides Macclesfield Town and Tamworth, who each recorded shock victories over Football League opposition.

The Silkmen demolished Mark Cooper's Swindon Town, of League One, 4-0 at the Moss Rose. John Askey's side reached the Fourth Round in last year's competition, defeating Swindon at the same stage and Premier League bound Cardiff City in Round Three, before bowing out to eventual winners Wigan Athletic. There was no surprise to see Connor Jennings once again on the scoresheet; the prolific striker is in a rich vein of goalscoring form and is the Skril Premier's top scorer.

Cash strapped Macclesfield would really benefit from a cup run and have been rewarded with a home tie against the winners of Gillingham and Brackley Town, who drew 1-1 at the Priestfield Stadium. It could have been so much better though for the Skril North side as Bradley Dack denied them a famous scalp in the dying seconds. Joe Martin's own goal looked to have settled the tie before Dack's 96th minute strike spared the Gills' blushes, meaning they must do it all again in a replay.

Tamworth put their league struggles to one side as they overcame League Two Cheltenham Town courtesy of Nick Chadwick's 20th minute goal. Dale Belford heroes have been handed an intriguing home tie with Bristol City, who beat Dagenham & Redbridge 3-0.

Gateshead suffered injury time heart break at the hands of Oxford

United. The Heed led 2-0 at the Kassam Stadium before their League Two opponents fought back to force a replay. Wrexham await the winners after they earned a 3-1 home victory over Alfreton Town.

Boreham Wood's meeting with Carlisle United finished goalless, as did Lincoln City's tie with Plymouth Argyle. The victors of the replays will play Brentford, who smashed Staines Town 5-0, and Luton Town's conquerors, Welling, respectively.

Skril Premier promotion hopefuls Grimsby Town were left kicking themselves after they spurned a host of chances to defeat Scunthorpe United in a hotly contested Lincolnshire derby. Northampton Town will play the eventual winners after they ensured their place in the next round as they squeezed past Bishop's Stortford 2-1.

Darren Locke's powerful header had St Albans City dreaming of a cup upset against Mansfield Town. But the Stags came roaring back and ran riot as they scored eight goals against their Calor League Premier opponents, including six in a crazy final 20 minutes as their superior fitness and quality told.
