The view from the Manager Let's show battling qualities



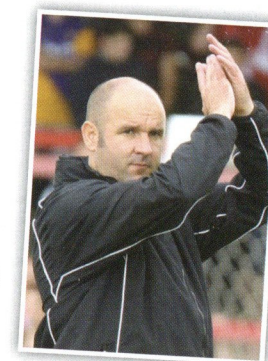
Good afternoon as we welcome Luton Town to the Swansway Chester Stadium.

Luton Town was always going to be one of the stand-out fixtures this season and it presents a great chance for us to show the league that we mean business, against a side with pedigree. Since the last time we spoke, a lot has happened both on and off the pitch. We've had three games and remained unbeaten, so I have to be pleased with that, although we could have taken 9 points out of 9, as we were in positions to win in two of those drawn games. I'll start with the Aldershot match, which ultimately left me feeling deflated despite an improved performance from the previous weekend in the cup. We've brought some fresh faces in recently and it's fair to say they made an impact, not just Conor's goal, which I thought showed excellent technique. Having competition within the squad can only be healthy and drive existing squad members to push that little bit harder. Take Jason Jarrett for example. He's been out of the team recently but came in and did a good job against Aldershot. All the players will get chances throughout the season, it's up to them to grasp their chance when it comes along.

I thought we deserved to win this one. It was a bit disappointing to concede so late, especially as the goal led from our corner, which we gave away too cheaply when we might have kept it in the corner. On to Hyde and I was pleased with the character the lads showed, especially given the lax start we made to the game. It's not the first time we've started games slowly away from home and we were punished once again. The golden rule of playing away from home is to keep their fans quiet for the first quarter of an hour. We know home sides will attack us, so we need to be extra vigilant to keep our shape and close down space in front of our back line. The early goal for them got their crowd going and you could see their players responded. That said, to come from behind to win any game is a good achievement, so I have to praise the lads for their commitment, especially in tough conditions. That win put us in a good frame of mind for the midweek visit to Hereford.

We knew beforehand that they were a physical side - the sort of side which has caused us problems this season. Again, we let them score early but then pushed on. It pleased me to see the lads work tooth and nail to keep our run going. However, now we're on a run it's not a case of us all playing *Ring a Ring o' Roses* outside the Blues Bar. There is plenty of work to get the side where I want them to be. As a coach you always look for signs of progress - and I think you can see that we are heading in the right direction - but there are things we need to tighten up defensively in order to climb that table. Away from the field of play it's been a great fortnight for the Club. I'd like to congratulate George Horan and Barrie Hipkiss on receiving prizes at the North West Football Association awards. To be recognised at such a prestigious ceremony rewards all of their hard work both on and off the pitch. We are playing our first match at the Swansway Chester Stadium this afternoon. On behalf of the club I'd like to thank them, along with our many other sponsors, for continuing to support the club - It is very much appreciated by us all.

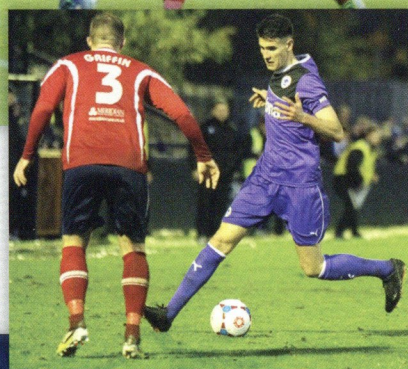

The Deva Archives

The first ever meeting between Chester and Luton Town in the city took place on May 11th 1966 and was a vital match for the Hatters who were chasing promotion from Division Four.

With five games to play the visitors were in a strong position. In those days there were only two points for a win and although Luton stood sixth in the table, three points behind fourth placed Colchester United, they had two games in hand and promotion was in their own hands. Chester themselves were a point behind Luton but, having played two more games, any realistic chance of a place in Division Three had disappeared after a disappointing second half to the campaign. On a wet Sealand Road evening, Luton took control and raced into a two goal lead thanks to John O'Rourke and John Reid. It looked like the visitors were set to claim a vital two points in their promotion push but the match was never completed. Conditions had become increasingly farcical throughout the first half and torrential rain plus a massive thunderstorm forced the abandonment of the game in the 47th minute. It was the sight of three players from both sides trying to extract the ball from a massive puddle in front of the main stand that convinced the referee that the game couldn't continue.

For Luton the premature end proved to have massive consequences. The match was re-scheduled for May 28th and Luton travelled to the Stadium knowing that a win would secure a return to Division Three at the first attempt. All was going to plan when Billy Stark gave them the lead in the 6th minute but in a thrilling second half Chester grabbed an equaliser when a long punt from John Butler was collected by Jimmy Humes who crashed the ball into the net from inside the penalty area.

The single point was not enough for Luton and they missed out on promotion to Colchester on goal average and had to wait another two seasons before a place back in Division Three was secured.

NOTES by The Manager.

WELCOME to supporters of Chester and Luton.

There is a touch of irony about to-day's game as far as we at Chester are concerned. Not many weeks ago I thought our clash with Luton may be vital to ourselves, but that is not now so, and instead to-day's game is vital to Luton. At the time of compiling these notes the result of Luton's game at Newport is not known, but if they have won their game at Newport they will need both points from to-day's game if Colchester win at Newport to-day. A Swansway Chester welcome to Luton Town

Today's visitors were formed in 1885 as the result of a merger between local teams - Luton Town Wanderers and Excelsior - and over the years have seen almost everything there is to see in the game.

The Hatters were the first club in southern England to turn professional when they started making payments to players as early as 1890 before turning fully professional the following year. Their early years were spent as founder members of the Southern League where they finished as runners up in consecutive seasons before leaving to help form the United League. After finishing in second place in that new league they then became one of the few southern based teams in the Football League in readiness for the 1897/8 campaign. Such a step up crippled the club's finances, however, and in 1900 they returned to the Southern League. 1920 saw a return to the Football League, albeit this time to the third tier, until the goalscoring exploits of Joe Payne - 55 goals in 39 games - helped the side to promotion via the Championship of Division 3 (South). The 1950s marked one of the best eras in the history of the Hatters with a team boasting many international players being assembled and promotion to the top flight achieved in 1955/6. 1958/9 brought an FA Cup final appearance and all looked bright at Kenilworth Road. As good as the 50s had been, however, the 60s was to be bad and by 1965 the Hatters were in Division 4. The yoyo situation that has played a significant part in the club's history continued with promotions taking them back to the top flight in 1974 followed by instant relegation and a return under David Pleat at the end of the 1981/2 campaign. Relegation was almost instantaneous until a late winner scored by super sub Raddy Antic secured their status. In 1986/7 the Hatters achieved their highest position, finishing seventh and a year later they beat Arsenal to win the Football League Cup. A return to Wembley was secured in 1988/9 but on that occasion Nottingham Forest got the better of them. Luton's stay in the top flight ended with relegation in 1991/2 and just nine years later they were back in the fourth tier. Two further promotions were experienced as were two relegations, financial problems and a 30 points deduction which led to relegation in 2009/10 but not before one final act of defiance as the side won the Football League Trophy. Last season brought FA Cup progress to round five but despite three appearances in the play offs a return to Football League status is still only a dream.

The Hatters lost their opening game of the season 1-0 at Southport, but their only other league defeat so far also came on their travels, in mid September, 2-0, at Wrexham. Three away games have been won, 2-0 at Kidderminster, 4-0 at Woking and 4-3 at Tamworth with games at Forest Green (0-0), Hereford (0-0), Aldershot (3-3) and Gateshead (0-0) ending all square. Last Saturday they lost 2-1 at Welling in the FA Cup, this after winning 1-0 at Woking in the previous round.

The Management...

The man currently charged with masterminding promotion for the hatters is **John Still**, a man who has been there, done it and probably got the T-shirt. John was appointed manager in January of this year having previously spent some nine years in charge at Dagenham and Redbridge where he took the Daggers up to the League as Conference Champions in 2007 and then to League 1 via the play offs in 2010. Prior to his time at Dagenham, John had led Dartford to the Southern League title in 1984 and won the Conference with Maidstone five years later. In 1991 he guided Redbridge Forest to the Isthmian League title before that club eventually became Dagenham and Redbridge. John's assistant is **Terry Harris** who had been on the coaching staff at Dagenham since 1999 and before that at St Albans, Dartford and Enfield.

Goalkeepers...

Mark Tyler is a vastly experienced keeper who was with Norwich as a youngster before playing 416 league games with Peterborough between 1994 and 2009 when he joined the Hatters. During his time with Posh he also had loan spells with Billericay, Yeovil, Hull, Watford and Bury and he's also played for England at under 18 and 20 levels. Mark had kept 72 clean sheets in 184 games for Luton before this season. **Elliott Justham** was signed in May from East Thurrock having kept 14 clean sheets in 31 games for them last term. Elliott has previously had trials for West Ham and Reading.

Defenders...

Central defenders **Steve McNulty** and **Anthony Charles** are both experienced campaigners. Steve was with Liverpool as a youngster before being released in 2003 and moving into non league football. He captained Barrow into the Conference and had spells with Vauxhall Motors and Burscough before linking up with Fleetwood who he again captained as they took the Conference title in 2012. He joined Luton in January. Anthony was signed from Plymouth pre season but he has twice been a Conference title winner, with Barnet and Aldershot as well as having spells with Grewe, Hyde, Hayes, Farnborough and Northampton. He has also been capped by England at C level. Fellow centre backs **Andy Parry** and **Alex Lacey** are both in their early 20s. Andy was signed from Southport for whom he'd made 62 appearances following his release from Blackburn. Alex made his Luton debut as a 17 year old in 2009 and was voted Man of the Match. He had a spell on loan at Eastleigh last season but has been a regular in the Luton side this term. Attacking right back **Ronnie Henry** was signed from Stevenage last season. A youngster with Spurs he made 3 appearances on loan at Southend and then had a spell in Ireland before returning to make 329 appearances for Stevenage, the fourth highest for the club and a spell that saw him enjoy

two promotions and an FA Trophy win. Left back **Scott Griffiths** had a spell with Southend as a youngster but made his mark with over 200 games for Dagenham and Redbridge where he was a Conference title winner. He then had spells with Peterborough and Chesterfield before joining Luton on a short term deal last season which has now been extended this. **Danny Fitzsimons** was with both Millwall and QPR as a youngster but he's joined Luton this season after scooping all the Player of the Year awards at Histon last term. Danny can play on the left or in the centre. **Brett Longden** is a teenage right back and first year professional with the club.

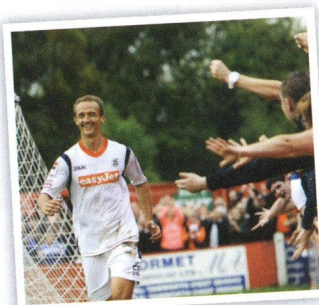
Midfielders...

Alex Lawless was voted Player of the Year and Players' Player of the Year last term and is well past the 100 game mark since his arrival from York in November 2010. Alex was with Cardiff as a youngster and then played for Ton Pentre before joining Fulham in 2003. He didn't make the first team in his 2 years at Craven Cottage but then moved on to play 14 games for Torquay, 102 for Forest Green and 51 for York. **Jonathan Smith** is another ex Minsterman having joined Luton from York in January after a loan spell. Jonathan started his senior career with York but then helped Swindon to the League 2 title in 2011/12 before returning to York. Jonathan played 51 times for York and 38 for Swindon along with 107 games for Forest Green and brief spells with Morecambe, Bamber Bridge and Fleetwood as a youngster. Left winger **Dave Martin** joined the club in January 2010 having played in 150 League games for Crystal Palace, Millwall, Derby, Southend, Notts County and Walsall. Dave started his career in non league circles with Slade Green and then Dartford. **Luke Guttridge** is another ex League man having made close on 400 appearances with Torquay, Cambridge Utd, Southend, Leyton Orient, Colchester, Northampton and Aldershot prior to arriving at Kenilworth Road in the summer. A scorer of 45 goals in his former life he has netted 6 so far this term. **Solomon Taiwo** was signed from Bromley in March but he has had a varied career. He started his career at Bromley and arrived at Dagenham in 2007 via several other non league sides. After 54 appearances in two years for the Daggers he joined Cardiff for a fee in the region of £250,000 but the move produced just 9 appearances and after a further single appearance for Mansfield he arrived back at Bromley last season. **Jake Howells** was with Hemel Hempstead and Watford as a youngster before joining Luton in 2007. A player who can play on the wing, at left back or in centre midfield, Jake made his debut in May 2008 and last season passed the 200 game mark whilst still only 21. He has also been capped by England C and Wales at under 21 level. **Shaun Whalley** is a name that may be familiar to Chester fans as he made 3 appearances for Chester City back in 2004. Shaun's career has taken him to Norwich (Academy), Southport Reserves, Runcorn, Witton, Accrington Stanley, Wrexham, Droylsden, Hyde and most notably, Southport where he played over 100 games scoring 27 goals before linking up with Luton in the summer. **Jim Stevenson** is a 21 year old who was

signed from Histon in May after topping their scoring charts last term with 11. Ironically Jim made his Histon debut as a 17 year old against Luton before becoming a mainstay in the Histon line up. **JJ O'Donnell** is a left sided or central player who was signed as a youngster from St Albans in 2010 and has also had loan spells with Thurrock, Hampton and Richmond and Cambridge City. **David Viana** is a well travelled youngster who joined the club in September after playing in America. Previously on the books of Atletico Madrid and Racing Strasbourg, David has been capped by Portugal at under 17, 18 and 19 levels. **Matt Robinson** is a home grown youngster who made 14 appearances last term including the final 7 games and he netted his first goal for the club in the final game of the season.

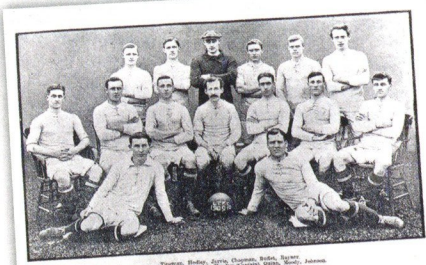
Fowards...

Several experienced goalscorers are competing for forward places in the side. Ex Hinckley man **Andre Gray** has 6 to his name this season having finished as top scorer last term with 20. A pacey player, Andre made 4 appearances for his first club Shrewsbury but then joined Hinckley in 2010 and scored 39 goals in just two seasons. He had a loan spell at Luton at the end of 2011/12 when he netted 5 goals in 9 games and also scored after just 17 seconds of the play off final defeat against York. He has also been capped by England C. **Paul Benson** has 5 goals under his belt since arriving on a season long loan from Swindon in August. Paul came to notice as a youngster when he scored 107 goals in 65 games for Essex Olympian side White Ensign and he moved to Dagenham where he netted 69 in 165 games. Since leaving the Daggers in 2010 he has added a further 28 goals in 85 games with Charlton, Swindon, Portsmouth and Cheltenham. **Mark Cullen** scored on his Premier League debut for Hull but that proved to be his only goal in 24 outings. He had loan spells with Stockport, Bradford City and Bury adding a further 4 goals in 24 games but has netted 5 times for the Hatters so far this season. **Alex Wall** joined the club on loan from Maidenhead in March and then made the move a more permanent one in the summer. Alex netted 13 times for Maidenhead last term and had previously played for Thatcham Town. He has one goal to his name this season. **Jon Shaw** is in his second season at the club and netted 21 times in all competitions last term. Jon started his career with 2 goals in 18 games for Sheffield Wednesday and has since gone on to play for York, Burton, Halifax, Rochdale, Crawley, Barrow, Mansfield and Gateshead. He has scored goals at all his clubs including 45 in 80 games at his previous employers, Gateshead. **Zane Banton** is a home grown talent who made his debut earlier this season.

Luton Town Classic campaigns

We take a closer look at ten post war 'Classic Campaigns'.

1954/55 - Gordon Turner scored 32 goals as Luton Town won promotion to the top-flight for the first time in 1954/55. The Hatters began with a 3-0 victory at home to Nottingham Forest

and soared up the Second Division table with six straight wins. Gordon Turner grabbed a hat-trick as Luton trounced Blackburn 7-3 and they triumphed 5-1 at Nottingham Forest. Dally Duncan's side maintained their challenge, slamming four goals past Hull City, Rotherham, Liverpool and Port Vale. Tom Aherne and Shay Dunne were ever-present as Luton pipped Rotherham to the runners-up slot on goal average with a 3-0 win at Doncaster.

1958/59 - Luton Town were FA Cup finalists for the first and only time in 1958/59. The Hatters were unbeaten in their opening ten First Division games, trouncing Manchester City 5-1 and scoring four goals past West Ham and Preston. They recovered from a lean spell to beat Arsenal 6-3 and Burnley 6-2, then top scorer Allan Brown netted four goals in a 5-1 demolition of Nottingham Forest but poor results over the closing weeks saw them finish below mid-table. Luton defeated Leeds 5-1, Leicester 4-1, Ipswich 5-2, Blackpool 1-0 and Norwich 1-0 in the FA Cup before Syd Owen's side lost 2-1 to Nottingham Forest in the final.

1967/68 - Bruce Rioch netted 24 goals as Luton Town won the Fourth Division title in 1967/68. New captain Terry Branston made his debut as

the Hatters kicked off with a 1-1 draw at Wrexham and Ian Buxton arrived from Derby in September. Luton lost just two of their first 18 matches and beat Charlton in the League Cup first round, scoring 27 goals in a run of eight successive wins. Allan Brown's side went top of the table with a 2-0 win at Brentford in February and Keith Allen, Max Dougan, Fred Jardine, John Moore and Ray Whittaker also starred as they remained in pole position, clinching the title with a 4-0 victory over Crewe.

1969/70 - Malcolm Macdonald scored 25 times as Luton Town won promotion in 1969/70. The Hatters had narrowly missed promotion the previous season and Bruce Rioch was sold to Aston Villa for a record fee, with Alec Stock signing Malcolm Macdonald, John Ryan and John Collins. Luton were early leaders after remaining unbeaten in their opening 13 matches, recruiting Chris Nicholl from Halifax and Matt Tees from Charlton. Malcolm Macdonald grabbed hat-tricks in 5-0 wins over Bradford City and Reading, with Luton unbeaten in their last six matches and clinching promotion as Third Division runners-up with a 0-0 draw at Mansfield

1973/74 - Luton Town regained top-flight status after an absence of 14 years in 1973/74. The Hatters recovered from a 4-0 defeat at Nottingham Forest on the opening day to hammer Carlisle 6-1, embarking on an eight-match unbeaten run. Harry Haslam signed Alan West from Burnley and Jimmy Husband from Everton as Luton maintained their promotion challenge. Husband netted a hat-trick in a 3-1 victory over rivals Orient, then leading marksman Barry Butlin scored three in a 4-2 win over Preston. Alan Garner and Bobby Thomson were ever-present and other stars included Peter Anderson and John Ryan as Luton finished runners-up.

1981/82 - David Pleat guided Luton Town to the Second Division title in 1981/82. The Hatters had narrowly missed promotion in the previous two years and Tony Grealish was swapped for Brighton's Brian Horton. They raced to the top by winning their first three games and hammered rivals Watford 4-1, then Steve White scored four times in a 6-0 demolition of Grimsby. Richard Money arrived from Liverpool and was an influential figure as Luton were unbeaten in their last 14 matches. Leading marksman Brian Stein, Mal Donaghy, Kirk Stephens and Steve White were all ever-present as Luton won the title with 88 points.

1987/88 - Ray Harford plotted Luton Town's 1988 Littlewoods Cup final triumph. Danny Wilson replaced Peter Nicholas in midfield, while Micky Weir arrived from Hibernian and Mike Newell moved to Leicester.

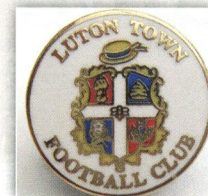
The Hatters won 5-2 at Oxford and Ian Allinson was signed from Stoke in October, with Luton losing just twice in 12 matches including a 7-4 win in the return match against Oxford, finishing ninth in the top-flight. They defeated Wigan 5-2, Coventry 3-1, Ipswich 1-0, Bradford City 2-0 and Oxford 3-1 in the Littlewoods Cup before beating Arsenal 3-2 in the final. Luton were also FA Cup semi-finalists and Simod Cup finalists.

1988/89 - Luton Town were Littlewoods Cup finalists for the second consecutive season in 1988/89. Departures were Brian Stein, Mark Stein and Andy Dibble, while newcomers included Roy Wegerle, John Dreyer and Steve Williams. Luton's first home win was 1-0 against Liverpool and they beat Southampton 6-1 in January but First Division form was generally disappointing, with the Hatters narrowly avoiding relegation by winning three of their last four games. Luton defeated Burnley 2-1, Leeds 2-0, Manchester City 3-1, Southampton 2-1 and West Ham 5-0 in the Littlewoods Cup before losing 3-1 to Nottingham Forest in the final.

2001/02 - Steve Howard scored 24 times as Luton Town won promotion in 2001/02. Joe Kinnear's side were early leaders after winning their opening two matches and newcomer Carl Griffiths netted a hat-trick in a 5-1 win over Torquay. The Hatters briefly regained pole position after beating Darlington 5-2 in October, signing Chris Coyne from Dundee, Jean-Louis Valois from Lille, Dean Crowe from Stoke, Ahmet Brkovic from Orient and Dave Bayliss from Rochdale. A run of 12 successive wins, slamming five goals past Halifax and Mansfield, took Luton back to the top with two games remaining but they finished runners-up to Plymouth.

2004/05 - Mike Newell managed Luton Town to the League One title in 2004/05. The Hatters stormed to the top of the table, winning 10 of their first 12 games before three successive defeats. They beat Bradford City 4-0 and Wrexham 5-1, then Steve Howard netted a hat-trick in a 4-1 win at MK Dons. The 1-0 victory over Port Vale in December heralded a 14 match unbeaten run and Luton bounced back from a 3-1 defeat in the return fixture to hammer Bristol City 5-0. Briefly displaced as leaders by Hull, they triumphed 4-1 at Torquay and secured promotion with four games remaining. Luton won the title with a record 98 points.

Star graduate Bruce Rioch



Powerful midfielder Bruce Rioch was capped 24 times by Scotland after leaving Luton Town.

Born in Aldershot, where his father was a regimental sergeant major, Bruce was raised in Luton and became an apprentice at Kenilworth Road. Rioch turned professional in September 1964 and made his League debut in Luton's 1-0 defeat at home to Southend United two months later. His first League goal came in the Hatters' 3-2 defeat at Bradford City in December 1965 and he soon attracted interest from bigger clubs with his pace, power and fierce shooting. He also had great competitiveness and a ruthless streak. Bruce was Luton's leading marksman in 1966-67 and again in 1967-68 when he missed just two matches as the Hatters stormed to the Fourth Division title. Rioch was also an important figure as Luton narrowly failed to win promotion again in 1968-69, netting 47 goals in 149 League games before moving to Aston Villa for a then club record £100,000 in July 1969. His younger brother Neil, an England Youth international, followed him from Luton to Villa shortly afterwards.

Bruce played for Villa in the 1971 League Cup final and starred in their 1971-72 Third Division title triumph. Moving to Derby County for £200,000 in February 1974, he took over from the injured Henry Newton and helped Dave Mackay's side to finish third in the top-flight that season. Rioch was ever-present and leading marksman with 15 League goals in 1974-75 when Derby won the League Championship for the second time in four seasons.

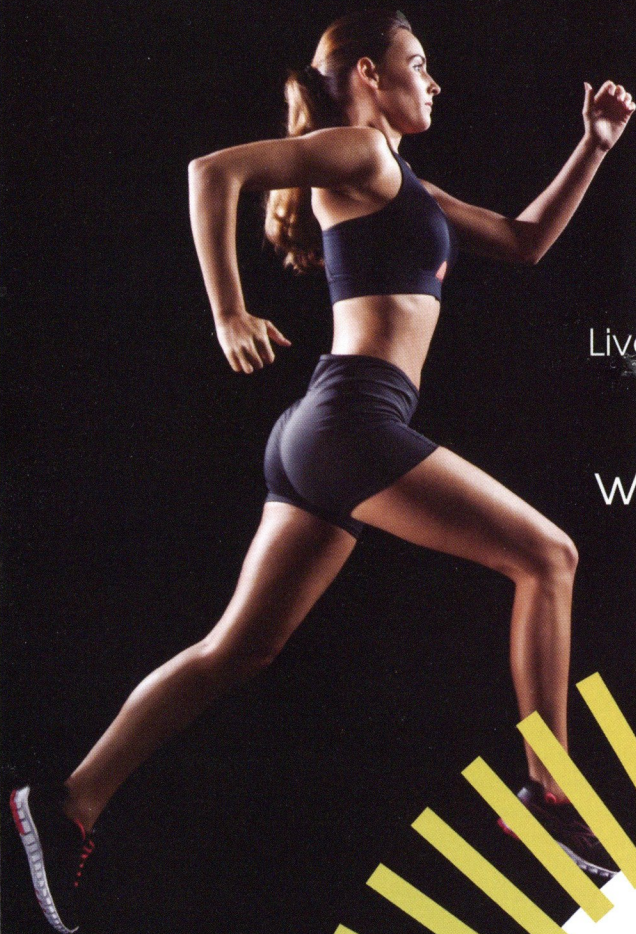
Towards the end of that title campaign, he scored one of his most memorable goals with a surging run from near the half-way line against Newcastle United at St James' Park. The following season, he hit a thunderous free-kick in the FA Cup sixth round win at home to Newcastle, then scored four goals in Derby's remarkable 8-2 First Division victory over Spurs in October 1976.

Rioch could play for Scotland through parental qualification and made his international debut in their 1-0 victory over Portugal at Hampden Park in May 1975. He scored his first international goal to clinch Scotland's 2-2 draw with Wales four days later and went on to become the first English-born player ever to captain Scotland, leading them in the 1978 World Cup finals in Argentina. Sold to Everton for £180,000 in December 1976, Rioch returned to Derby a mere 11 months later but fell out with Tommy Docherty and Colin Addison. He then had loan spells at Birmingham City and Sheffield United. After that he played for Seattle Sounders, becoming Torquay United's player-coach in October 1980 and later their player-manager. He then took charge of Middlesbrough, managing them from the Third Division to First in consecutive seasons.

After a spell as Millwall's manager, he became Bolton Wanderers' boss in May 1992 and plotted two promotion successes, also leading them to the 1995 League Cup final. He spent a year as Arsenal's manager before the appointment of Arsene Wenger, signing Dennis Bergkamp and David Platt, then managed Norwich City, Wigan Athletic and Danish side Aalborg.

Around the league



Another three rounds of fixtures to catch up on this week and a mix of league and cup games too.

Two weeks ago we had the disappointment of **Aldershot** grabbing a last gasp equaliser to cancel out Conor Wilkinson's fine debut goal but a pleasing performance to build on nonetheless. The result of the day, however, came at **Southport** where **Cambridge** finally tasted defeat at the 17th time of asking. The all important goal was another debut goal, for central defender Matty Brown, and came after just 82 seconds of the game. The new man, on loan from Chesterfield, then did his bit at the back as the Sandgrounders withstood incessant second half pressure from the leaders to record their first league win in six. Second placed **Kidderminster** and third placed **Luton** failed to take full advantage of United's slip, however with Kiddy losing out 1-0 at **Barnet** and the Hatters being held to a goalless draw at **Gateshead**. **Grimsby** and **Salisbury** on the other hand both moved to within one point of Luton thanks to fine wins. The Mariners netted in the first minute of their game at **Woking** through Ross Hannah and then again in the 92nd through Craig Disley after the home side had pulled level on the half hour mark. **Salisbury's** fine 4-1 home win against **Hereford** had been achieved a couple of nights earlier in front of the television cameras. The win was set up with two first half goals and though Sam Smith pulled one back on the hour, two goals in the final two minutes made the scoreline emphatic. The day's other victories all went in favour of the home sides. James Norwood scored after just five minutes to give his side **Forest Green** their first win in five, this at home to **Dartford** whilst Jake Gallagher's first goal of the campaign was enough to secure the three points for **Welling** against **Lincoln**. **Alfreton** and **Macclesfield** both gave their supporters three goals to cheer. Two first half efforts from the on loan Jake Speight and a third goal soon after the restart scored by Job Akinde were enough for Alfreton to beat FC Halifax but Macc had to work a bit harder for their three points against **Wrexham**. Connor Jennings got the game off to a flying start converting a penalty in the first minute then netted again five minutes before the break to restore Macc's lead this after Joe Anyinsah had pulled the visitors level in the 13th minute. Wrexham then levelled again ten minutes from time but Jennings had the last laugh and claimed the match ball with a late late winner. The remaining two games both ended level. **Hyde** thought they had gained their elusive first win of the campaign when Scott Spencer gave them a 2-1 lead in added time only for **Nuneaton's** Dave Hibbert to level

seconds later. **Braintree** gained a useful point at **Tamworth** to keep themselves just outside the play offs though they will probably consider it two points lost as Tamworth had to play for 65 minutes with only ten men following the dismissal of debut man Charlie Allen. Last Saturday of course was good for us as we ran out deserved 2-1 winners at **Hyde** in the only league game to take place. Craig Mahon's late recall from Fylde must have caught Jimmy Soul by surprise as Craig had to turn out in a shirt with no number, but that didn't stop him turning in a star performance, though several others weren't far behind in a game played in atrocious conditions. It was the FA Cup that occupied the thoughts of our other teams in action and what a mixed bag of results it produced. Pride of place has to go to **Macclesfield** who beat Swindon 4-0 with Connor Jennings on target twice to take his goals tally to eight in the last four games and 14 in the last ten. Coincidentally Macc had beaten the same opponents in last year's competition. A goal from ex Chester man Nick Chadwick also gave **Tamworth** a taste of the headlines as they saw off the challenge of Cheltenham 1-0. **Kidderminster** were 4-1 winners against Sutton United, this after the visitors had taken a tenth minute lead whilst our other winners came from clashes against fellow Skril Premier sides. Three first half goals gave **Salisbury** the upper hand against **Dartford** who never really got in touch despite scoring twice in the 4-2 defeat. Two first half efforts secured **Welling's** passage against **Luton** who pulled one back just before the hour mark but couldn't break through again whilst **Wrexham** ran out 3-1 winners against **Alfreton**. Four of our sides earned a second bite at the cherry with **Gateshead** probably being the unluckiest conceding a late equaliser after they had led 2-0 at Oxford. **Braintree** took the lead against Newport but had to settle for 1-1 whilst **Grimsby** outplayed Scunthorpe for much of their game but couldn't score and **Lincoln** also had to settle for 0-0 against Plymouth. **Hereford** were beaten 2-0 at Burton on the Sunday but Saturday's losers all did so in style! **Barnet** had Keanu Marsh-Brown sent off after thirteen minutes at Preston and were thumped 6-0 whilst **Southport** were 2-0 down inside ten minutes before eventually losing 5-2 at Leyton Orient. **FC Halifax** only trailed MK Dons 1-0 at half time but were beaten 4-1. **Cambridge's** game at Bury fell foul of the monsoon conditions. And so to Tuesday where our lads gained a good point at **Hereford**. At times in the second half it was a bit like the Alamo and JD needed to show

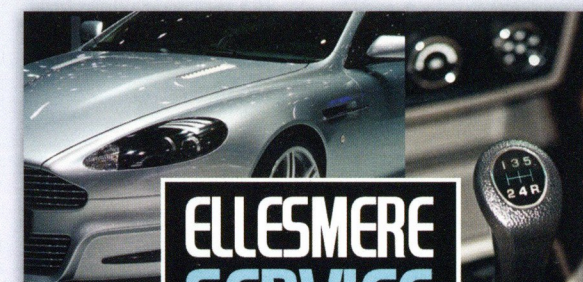

how good a keeper he is. It was encouraging to see everyone stand up to the pressure despite some horrible challenges going completely unpunished and right at the death we almost pinched all three points. In the other games **Cambridge** and **FC Halifax** were the night's biggest winners recording 4-0 victories against **Aldershot** and **Hyde** respectively. **Woking** recorded their first win in seven games beating **Dartford** 3-0 thanks to three goals in the final 27 minutes. **Wrexham** were 3-2 winners at home against **Gateshead** with Andy Bishop scoring all three including an injury time winner to take his goals tally to five in two games. The home side went 1-0 up in the 23rd minute only for the visitors to score twice inside a minute to lead at the break. Wrexham levelled 13 minutes from time and then grabbed that late winner. Ex Chester man Nick Chadwick was on target again as **Tamworth** beat **Alfreton** 1-0 whilst Marcus Kelly was on target as **Forest Green** beat **Nuneaton** by the same score. **Luton** and **Lincoln** were the night's away winners, 2-1 at **Braintree** and 1-0 at **Southport** respectively. **Barnet** and **Welling** remained goalless whilst a last gasp effort from **Macclesfield** brought them a share of the spoils against **Kidderminster** who had led from the 27th minute.

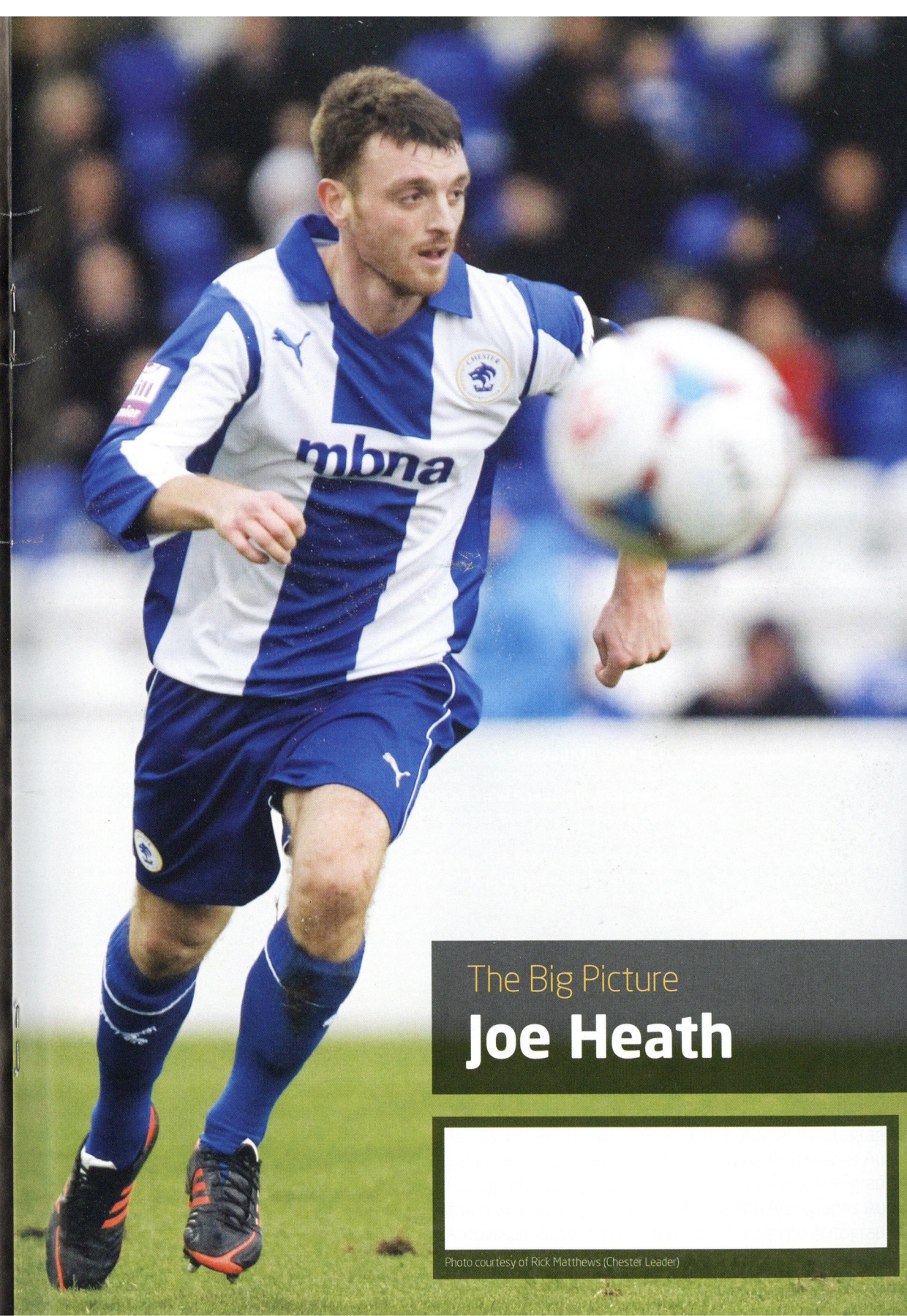

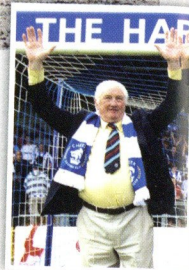

Elfed Morris, one of the members of Chester's 'Famous Five', sadly passed away recently. In the 1964/65 season, playing outside left, Elfed contributed 26 goals of the team's 141 goals in the season, one of five players to score over 20 goals along with Jimmy Humes, Mike Metcalf, Hugh Ryden and Gary Talbot - an incredible achievement and one not likely to be emulated for quite some time. Elfed took a keen interest in the exploits of Chester FC and made one of his last visits a couple of years ago when the 'Famous Five' were reunited for the game against Bamber Bridge, where the legends took to the pitch to recreate the iconic photo of them all shooting the ball into the net at the same time. Elsewhere, the club are also saddened to hear of John Colin Parry, a life long Chester fan, who sadly passed away following a short illness, aged 77. He started attending matches in 1948 and lived and breathed the club, right up to his death. He went to matches whenever he could and passed on the bug to his son Paul - quite an achievement given Paul was born just 100 yards from Stamford Bridge! 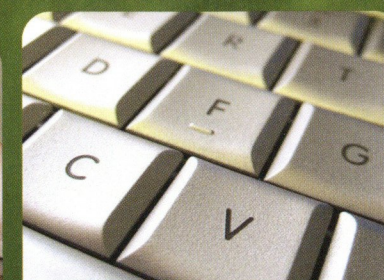

What's the ground like: In 2007 Nuneaton Borough moved to the Liberty Way stadium, after spending 90 years at their former Manor Park home. The Club went into liquidation in 2008 and were subsequently reformed as Nuneaton Town. The stadium itself, although new, is largely open and is rather bland in appearance. Three sides of the stadium are comprised of terracing, whilst the remaining side houses a small UK Flooring Direct Main Stand. This Main Stand was opened for the 2010/11 season. It is covered and all seated and houses 514 supporters. It runs for around a quarter of the length of the pitch and has a floodlight pylon to either side. This side also houses the team dugouts and towards the Britannia Tyres Stand has a couple of small structures that house a directors/corporate hospitality area. Opposite is an open terrace, which has the Rugby Clubhouse situated at the back of it. This terrace is split into separate compartments and has four floodlight pylons situated in front of it. At one end is the Britannia Tyres Stand a covered terrace, which is the home end of the ground. This stand can hold up to 1,800 fans and unusually the terracing is comprised not of concrete steps, but metal ones instead. The end, the Stuarts Plumbing Stand is a similar looking covered terrace, but is smaller in size. In one corner of the stadium in-between the Stuart Plumbing Stand and South Terrace is a Security Control Box which has a clock mounted next to it. The ground is shared with Nuneaton Rugby Club.

What's to eat and drink: Although there is a supporter's bar, this is only available to away fans when games are not segregated as the bar is located inside the stadium. However the Rugby Club has its own Clubhouse which can be accessed from the Liberty Way car park and welcomes away fans. The nearest pubs are the Crows Nest and the Acorn which are both about a ten minute walk away. The Crows Nest, which if coming from the M6 you will pass on your right, has Sky Sports television and also serves food. The Acorn



also offers food. To find these pubs: At the entrance to the industrial estate (with it and the stadium behind you) turn right at the roundabout and the Crows Nest is down on the left, whilst for the Acorn turn left at the roundabout and it is down on the left. If you are arriving at Nuneaton Railway Station then more or less opposite the station entrance is the Crown pub. This pub is listed in the CAMRA Good Beer Guide and normally has 10 ales on tap.

How to get there by car: Leave the M1 at Junction 21 and take the M69 towards Coventry. Leave the M69 at Junction 1 and take the A5 towards Nuneaton/Tamworth. Cross over two roundabouts and after passing an Aldi supermarket on the right and the Longshoot pub on the left, take the next left at the traffic lights onto A47 towards Nuneaton. At the next roundabout take the 1st exit onto the A4254 (signposted Coventry/Bedworth). Turn right at next roundabout into Townsend Drive and then right again into Liberty Way for the stadium.

Nearest train station: Nuneaton Railway Station is situated just under 1.5 miles away from the stadium and should take around 30 minutes to walk.

Admission: Like a number of Clubs Nuneaton operate a match category system (A & B) whereby the most popular games cost more to watch. Category A terrace prices are shown below with Category B prices shown in brackets: Adults £14 (£12), Over 60's/Full Time Students £10 (£8), Under 16's £5 (£5), Under 12's £2 (£2). Seating prices are £2 more which is paid inside the stadium to transfer to the Main Stand seated area.

Football in its many guises



The thing which makes football so universally popular is that it is so easy to have a game...

All you need are some willing participants and a ball - or something to replicate a ball if you're not in receipt of a Mitre Delta.

I seriously question whether there has ever been a football fan who hasn't used rolled-up socks to have an impromptu game. As young children, me and my brother would have many a game, often after our bedtime, leaping into our beds to pretend to be asleep when my dad shouted upstairs! One goal would be the gap between a bed and a wardrobe and the other would be made up of a conveniently shaped shelving unit. It's fair to say that the former was a larger target, so we'd swap ends after every few goals! I remember one time dribbling the ball next to a cupboard and then trying to unleash the most powerful shot imaginable only for my little toe to crash against the aforementioned cupboard with such agonising force I thought I would never walk again. I couldn't even go and get sympathy from my parents as I was meant to be in bed! Christmas would festoon my grandparent's house with balloons, so we ingeniously untied one of them and used this in kind of a slow-motion game of football. If you've ever tried dribbling a balloon you

will know what I mean! An alternative was keepie uppies. As a 10 year old the thought that I could do over 100 keepie uppies was the stuff of legend! Who cares if I could only do about 5 with a proper football! At Primary School we had a ban on footballs in the school playground, presumably so that players and bystanders alike wouldn't get injured. This early H&S directive didn't really work as we crunched up a Coke can and furiously booted around the serrated tin as hopscotchers and British bulldoggers dived for cover!

Tennis balls have always been an easy alternative for its larger cousin. It's fair to say that I've spent a good proportion of my life, belly down, trying to reach a stray ball from underneath a car or hedgerow. Growing up we had quite a large driveway, with a rockery forming a natural goal at one end. The other goal was the end of the drive, and as we didn't have a gate it meant that whenever we scored a goal the ball would fire across Hermitage Road, peppering any traffic unlucky to be making its trip through Saughall at the time. My horrified Mum caught wind of this one time and I don't think I've ever seen her so angry. Of course the problem with this game is that our pitch would only be available until Dad came home from work. I can only apologise to my Dad if we ever looked disappointed as he pulled into the drive! Cushions make a handy indoor alternative and of course you can use the settee as a goal, allowing for some spectacular dives which Grenville would no doubt be impressed with! Probably the oddest thing I've ever used as a ball was a cork. Our kitchen formed the pitch with the cabinet beneath the sink forming one goal and the doorway to the dining room the other. It was insanely fun as corks, by their very nature, would bounce off at peculiar angles, often meaning that a wayward shot would take an advantageous bounce to leave the keeper red faced. On one such occasion I was prepared for this, and as the cork reared up and to my right, I swung my body round with all the agility of a 12 year old, crunching my head against the crockery cupboard. The huge split down the otherwise pristine panel almost a metaphor for the goal I had just conceded.

Of course, over the years I have also enjoyed many a game with proper footballs, but for a footy-mad lad like me, these improvised games were every bit as enjoyable!

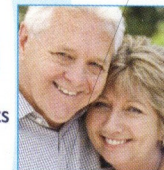

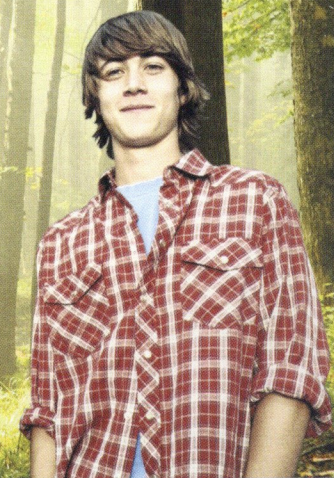

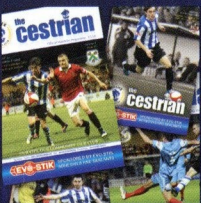
