




Good afternoon and a big welcome to you all for this important second round tie in the FA Trophy.

We wish a warm welcome and brief stay at Kenilworth Road to our visitors Wrexham, in particular manager Andy Morrell and his players and staff.

They are the holders of the FA Trophy and we congratulate them on their success in this competition last season. We'll be attempting to end their interest in retaining the trophy this afternoon.

In the last round against Staines a goalless draw in the original tie was followed by a 2-0 home victory thanks to goals from Andy Parry and Shaun Whalley. In both matches we fielded young teams – averaging approximately 21 years of age. We made the decision quite early in the season to go down this road because we want to give competitive football to everybody in the squad whilst also giving ourselves a chance of progressing in the competition.

We were all very pleased with the level of performance in the last round against Staines and it showed there is a lot more to come from our younger group of players we often refer to as the 'development squad'. Here's to us continuing that this afternoon.

Last weekend a very good away performance at Alfreton saw us register a 5-0 victory. Even taking away the scoreline it was a very, very good all-round team performance. I felt early on in the game that we had a belief about us and I don't think anybody could begrudge us the margin of victory on an afternoon when we played ever-so well. The most flattering aspect of the result was hearing the kind comments made about our display by those from Alfreton. They felt our performance was very convincing and deserved.

That result is now behind us and today we focus on a cup competition that has its fair share of negative press.

However, the benefits of a good run in the Trophy are clear, and what better incentive than a final at Wembley is there? We feel that our group of development players have what it takes to get us there and what a tremendous achievement that would be.


Personnel-wise two of our loanees, Joe Davis and Pelly Ruddock Mpanzu, have featured in the last two ties in this competition and have competed very well. They did well enough against Staines to force themselves into the reckoning for the first team last Saturday. Unfortunately Alfie Mawson is cup-tied having featured for Maidenhead but he showed his strong capabilities in last weekend's win before being forced off at half-time with a foot injury that required several stitches.

Those players who you maybe more familiar with who have been unavailable through injury are making good progress. Solomon Taiwo has had his hernia operation and we are confident we will see him back training very soon and, hopefully, in contention for a start come the new year. Alex Lacey, Jon Shaw and Andy Parry are also making progress and are not too far away from making a return.



Enjoy the game.





Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for this FA Trophy tie against fellow Skrill Premier outfit Wrexham.

We won through to this stage of this competition after a replay win over Staines in which a number of the development squad and youth team players were given their chance to impress and impress they did.

The winning mentality really has swept right through the club from the first team, development squad and youth team, and that can only be a huge benefit to everybody associated with Luton Town.

It was a very young team that played Staines and by all accounts they were very unlucky not to get the job done in the first game away from home. Only an inspired performance from their goalkeeper prevented a victory but a comfortable 2-0 win in the replay by an almost identical starting XI got the job done.

Quality

A number of players have really impressed when playing in the development games this season and that match against Staines again showed the strength and quality we have at the club. The manager isn't afraid of bleeding youngsters and testing them. Staines were no mugs and the fact they are doing well in the league below us is a testament to what an achievement it was to come through two games unbeaten and not even concede a goal.

It is likely that a similar side will take on Wrexham this afternoon. What an opportunity this will be for those players. To play against an experienced Wrexham side offers a wonderful test but I am confident whoever plays for us today will give our visitors a really good game.

All of the players in the squad know that if they are performing well they will be given the chance by the

manager. Countless times this season a fine display in a development game has led to a first team opportunity and today's game are no different.

There is a feel-good factor running through the club at the moment and last Saturday's 5-0 win at Alfreton was evidence of that. It was without doubt an exceptional performance. It was a match to really enjoy playing in, and the quality of all of the goals were way above Conference level. The third goal especially is one we played over and over again when we looked back at the DVD.

The standard of performance, especially in those first 20 minutes, was some of the best football I have seen since I have been at the club.

One of the pleasing aspects about the victory was also the fact we started so well. There have been times this season where we haven't begun games as quick as we would have liked and not scored goals early enough, so to score four times in a nine-minute spell in the opening 20 minutes is a massive improvement and a further sign that we're heading in the right direction.

There's still a very long way to go and the next few weeks are going to be a big test for us. The festive period can make or break a team's season and we face a testing Christmas and New Year series of matches against teams who are harbouring similar promotion hopes to us. However, as the manager keeps telling us, all we can focus on is ourselves. And if we win, and keep winning, then there's no reason to worry about anyone else.

With tough games coming up now is the time that we need your support more than ever. Thanks for your superb backing, especially those who got behind the younger lads in both FA Trophy matches against Staines. Please do the same this afternoon.

This afternoon we give a warm welcome to everybody associated with Wrexham Football Club to Kenilworth Road.

The Red Dragons arrive on Bedfordshire soil as holders of the FA Trophy following their penalty shootout victory over Grimsby in last season's final at Wembley.

Andy Morrell's side booked their spot in the second round thanks to a 2-1 win over Gresley Rovers at the Racecourse and will be looking to continue their fine form which has seen the club steadily rise up the Skrill Premier table after an inconsistent start to the campaign. In all competitions the Dragons have won five of their last seven games. Morrell's side were unlucky in Monday night's FA Cup second round tie at home to League 2 leaders Oxford United in which they lost 2-1, but in league action the Dragons have won five of their last eight matches, losing twice – at Macclesfield and Kidderminster.

The Dragons beat the Town at the Racecourse earlier in the season with a 2-0 victory with John Still holding his hand up afterwards claiming he picked the wrong side.

It remains to be seen what kind of side both teams field this afternoon, although the Hatters have already hinted that a young team maybe given another chance following their performances in the two matches with Staines in the previous round. Regardless what sides are put out, the Hatters face a Wrexham side who have struggled away from home this season. In the Skrill Premier the Dragons have won just twice in 11 matches, at Gateshead and, more recently, at Dartford. Compare that record to their home form in the league which reads six wins from 10.

The Dragons have a reasonable record at Kenilworth Road, and last won here in October 2011 – a season the Town went onto then beat Wrexham in the Play-Offs despite finishing 17 points behind in the table.

Wrexham fielded a team blended of youth and experience against Gresley in the previous round with player/boss Morrell, who started the game, on target. A total of eight changes were made for that tie following their previous Skrill Premier fixture.

Goals haven't been hard to find for the Dragons, with 15 different goalscorers finding the target for Morrell's men this season. Striker Andy Bishop leads the way with seven goals whilst veteran forward Brett Ormeord and midfielder Johnny Hunt have five each.

Today's visitors' road to glory in the Trophy last term began with a 5-0 first round win over Rushall Olympic before a 3-2 win over Solihull Moors in the second round.

A 5-0 win at Sutton United set-up a quarter-final meeting with Southport at Haig Avenue and the 3-1 win there booked a two-legged semi-final clash with Gainsborough Trinity.

A 3-1 first leg win at the Racecourse was the ideal platform to build on and, despite a 2-1 defeat in the second leg, the Dragons were through to a first-ever Wembley final.

In front of 35,000 fans, it was Grimsby that took the lead in the final but a Kevin Thornton penalty forced extra-time and Wrexham dominated the shootout to triumph 4-1 and become the first Welsh club to lift the Trophy.

MEET THE WREXHAM SQUAD

THE MANAGER/MANAGER

ANDY MORRELL. Experienced striker who took control of team affairs at the Racecourse in October 2011 following Dean Saunders' departure to Doncaster. Has twice led the Red Dragons to the Play-Offs and lifted the FA Trophy last season.

GOALKEEPERS

JOSLAIN MAYEBI. Cameroon-born stopper who joined Wrexham in December 2010 after a successful trial. Previously on the books at FC Metz, AEK Larnaca, Hakoah Ramat Gan and Maccabi Ahi Nazareth.

ANDY COUGHLIN. Former Tranmere apprentice who twice played for Rovers before signing for Wrexham this summer having impressed Andy Morrell on trial.

DEFENDERS

NEIL ASHTON. Left-back who had totted up over 200 senior appearances with Tranmere, Shrewsbury, Macclesfield and Chester before signing for the Red Dragons in the summer of 2010. Been a mainstay ever since and was player of the year in 2011/12.

DAVID ARTELL. Experienced centre-half who has enjoyed spells with Rotherham, Mansfield, Morecambe, Chester and Northampton before signing for Wrexham.

MARK CARRINGTON. Summer arrival following his release from Bury. Originally a product of Crewe's academy he has also been on the books of Hamilton in Scotland and at MK Dons.

MARK CREIGHTON. Towering centre-half known as the Beast, who signed permanently at the Racecourse in January 2011 following a successful loan spell. Missed the majority of last season with a serious knee injury.

STEVE TOMASSEN. Ex-youth player who starred on loan with Airbus in 2012/13, captaining the WPL side and helping them earn a place on the Europa League.

JUNIOR NTAME. French-Cameroonian central defender who signed this summer. Has played for clubs in France, Belgium, Switzerland and Slovenia.

STEPHEN WRIGHT. Right-back who came through the ranks at Liverpool, playing 14 times for the Reds in the Premier League. Joined Sunderland before spells at Coventry, Brentford and Hartlepool.

MIDFIELDERS

THEO BAILEY-JONES. Young winger who joined in the summer of 2013 after a successful trial period. Only 19, but played with semi-pro teams in the Manchester area.

JAY COLBECK. Progressed through the ranks from the youth team and burst onto the scene with a double strike against Kettering Town in January 2012.

ADRIAN CIESLEWICZ. Polish Under-19 international who began his career as a youngster at Manchester City before his release in 2009. A fans' favourite, blessed with pace, the winger is now in his fifth season at the Racecourse.

DEAN KEATES. Vastly experienced midfielder who has won promotion six times with three different clubs. Shot to fame with Walsall before spells at Hull, Kidderminster, Lincoln, Walsall again, Peterborough and Wycombe.

JAY HARRIS. Joined the Dragons in the summer of 2010. Started out as an apprentice at Everton before joining Accrington Stanley and then Chester.

JOHNNY HUNT. Youngster who rose through the ranks at the Racecourse. Captained the reserves to the Central League title and signed a new contract this summer.

KEVIN THORNTON. Irish midfielder who penned a new deal with the Dragons this summer. Began his career with Coventry before spells with Nuneaton and Northampton Town.

STRIKERS

JOE ANYINSAH. Summer arrival following a successful trial. Was released by hometown club Bristol Rovers but began his career with rivals Bristol City. Has also enjoyed spells with Preston, Carlisle and Charlton.

ANDY BISHOP. Experienced striker who scored once against the Town earlier this season. Originally joined the Dragons on loan before he signed on a permanent basis. Started his career with Walsall before loan spells at Kidderminster, Yeovil and Rochdale. Then signed for York and then Bury, where he was prolific in front of goal having played over 250 times for the Shakers.


BRETT ORMEROD. Well-travelled striker who has played and scored in all four divisions of the Football League following spells with Accrington, Southampton, Preston and, most notably, Blackpool.

ROB OGLEBY. Former Coventry youngster who moved to Scotland to play for Hearts in 2010. Left Tynecastle in January 2011 and signed for Wrexham.



TOWN 2-0 STAINES

The Town booked a second round meeting with FA Trophy holders Wrexham after a 2-0 win over Staines at Kenilworth Road.

Stubborn Staines had held out for 48 minutes before Andy Parry broke the deadlock, chesting the ball down before volleying home from six yards.

And fellow former Southport man Shaun Whalley doubled the Hatters' lead when he flicked a header into the corner of the net on 72 minutes.

It was no more than the young Hatters deserved after a dominant display against their Skrill South opponents who had kept the Town at bay for 90 minutes the previous Saturday.

Showing three changes to the side from that tie, with Parry, Alex Wall and Charlie Smith all given starts, the Town began on the front foot against a Swans side win just one victory away from home all season.

Wall was the focal point for the Town in the first half. The striker's pace and power was causing the visitors plenty of problems and he fired two shots at goal in the opening 15 minutes which fired a warning shot to the Swans.

Jack Turner, the Staines hero from the first game where he denied the Town with a string of fine saves, almost gifted the Hatters a soft opener when he allowed a shot from Wall to slip through his fingers. The ball rolled goalwards but the keeper managed to claw back the ball much to his relief.

Mark Cullen deflected a Pelly Ruddock cross into Wall's path but his shot from six yard bounced over the crossbar on 26 minutes and a minute later Cullen's drive was blocked behind for a corner.

As half-time approached the Town upped the ante. Whalley danced through the Staines defence to rifle a shot goalwards that Turner saved well.

However, three minutes after the restart the Hatters were in front. Smith's curling free-kick was flicked towards the unmarked Parry, and he coolly volleyed home from inside the six yard box having taken the ball down on his chest. It was his fourth goal of the season.

The Town were now sensing blood and Cullen flicked a header wide on 53 minutes before Ruddock was unlucky not to win a penalty when he was sent sprawling in the box having galloped up the line and into the area following Whalley's slide-rule pass five minutes later.

Matt Robinson almost served up a second on a plate for Wall and Cullen on 58 minutes but neither forward could find the all-important touch.


With the Hatters beginning to turn to screw, Turner saved a Whalley free-kick on 69 minutes but, three minutes later, Whalley did find the net, changing his body shape well to turn and head past Turner from eight yards for his second goal in Luton colours.

By now the Town were looking dangerous with every attack and Turner denied Cullen once more with a really smart stop on 72 minutes and the goalkeeper prevented the striker again with nine minutes left.

As time ticked down Staines tried in vain to find a late consolation but found Elliot Justham a hard barrier to pass and, with holes appearing in the visitors' defence, the Town came close to adding to their tally in the closing stages. Substitute Zane Banton twice went close with fine efforts and Whalley tested Turner with the final kick.



ALFRETON 0-5 TOWN



Luke Guttridge shows close control

The Hatters produced a stunning performance to equal their biggest victory away from Kenilworth Road as they put five past Alfreton and extend their unbeaten league run to 14 games.

The Town scored four times in a superb nine-minute spell in the first half with two goals from Andre Gray and one each from Paul Benson and Luke Guttridge.

After the break the Hatters remained disciplined and, after keeping Alfreton at bay, Alex Lawless scored midway through the second period to complete the rout.

Their stunning first half display started with a number of decent chances in the first five minutes with Benson heading a Ronnie Henry cross over the bar before Guttridge skied Gray's cut-back on six minutes.

The Hatters were dominating the opening stages and they deservedly took the lead on 10 minutes with a lovely goal. Guttridge was the creator, bursting forward from the left flank to thread a perfect pass through to Gray and his finish exhumed confidence, a low shot that flew past Ross Atkins.

It was a really eye-catching goal and it got better for the Hatters two minutes later when Benson doubled the lead. This time Gray and Guttridge combined to feed Benson and the former Dagenham striker clipped a wonderfully cool finish over the advancing Atkins for his seventh goal of the campaign.

Having failed to score in two previous visits to the Impact Arena, incredibly the Hatters made it 3-0 on 14 minutes as Gray got his second. It was another move of fantastic

quality with Benson and Guttridge again involved: this time Benson squaring to his strike partner to tap home inside the six yard box for his 12th goal in 11 starts.

The Town looked dangerous every time they attacked and, almost unbelievably, it was 4-0 on 18 minutes as the Hatters' purple patch in front of goal continued. Gray's high ball into the air was controlled by Guttridge and the midfielder rounded Atkins and – somehow – finished from the narrowest of angles.

But the Hatters continued to press for a fifth. Gray spurned a chance for his hat-trick on 29 minutes when he nodded straight at Atkins following Guttridge's left-wing cross and a header from Lawless flashed across the face of goal six minutes later following Henry's centre – and that was the end of a breathless first 45 minutes.

After the break Alfreton rallied but failed to test Gray. Henry blocked a goal-bound free-kick from Bradley Wood on 55 minutes and after weathering that storm the Town made it five on 67 minutes. Alfreton failed to clear their lines and Gray picked their pocket, and his flick through released Lawless and he did the rest, finding the corner of the net for his second goal of the season.

Benson and Guttridge almost got on the end of a right-wing raid from Ruddock Mpanzu moments later as the Town hunted a sixth. It was olé stuff from the Town in the closing stages. Despite efforts from Gray and Lawless the Town couldn't add to their tally but quite frankly, nobody in the Hatters ranks cared much – the job was done and the win moved the Hatters to within a point of the leaders.




Paul Benson clips home the second goal

Trophy Tales

TODAY THE TOWN TAKE PART IN THEIR 23RD TIE IN THE FA TROPHY AGAINST THE CURRENT HOLDERS, WREXHAM

The victory over Staines in the first round replay earlier this month meant the Hatters progressed to the second round of the competition for the fourth successive season.

Overall the Hatters have won 12 of their 22 ties in the competition, drawing six and losing four times, scoring 31 and conceding 15.

The Town were knocked out at the first round stage by Cambridge United in their first season in the competition but then reached the semi-finals in the following two campaigns before exiting at the quarter-final stage last term.

Wins

In 2010/11 the Hatters beat Welling after a replay in the first round before successive home wins over Uxbridge and Gloucester set-up a quarter-final trip to Guiseley.

A 1-0 win courtesy of a Matthew Barnes-Homer goal secured a two-legged semi-final meeting with Mansfield.

The Stags won the first leg but the Town led 1-0 in the second, and took the tie to extra-time despite being reduced to nine men following the dismissals of Claude Gnakpa and Alex Lawless. However the Hatters were agonisingly denied a penalty shootout when Mansfield's Louis Briscoe netted an equaliser two minutes from the end of extra-time.

The Hatters reached the semi-finals again in 2011/12. A routine win over Swindon Supermarine at Kenilworth Road was followed by a second round tie with Hinckley that was played at the second attempt after a frozen pitch.

When the tie was finally played a

goalless draw signalled a replay that the Town eventually won 3-0. A certain Andre Gray impressed for the Knitters in those two games before going onto sign for the Hatters.

A win at Kidderminster – played on a bitterly cold night at Aggborough – set-up a quarter-final meeting with Gateshead and a 2-0 victory over the Tynesiders secured another spot in the semis.

Just like the previous campaign the Town were reduced to nine men in a semi-final with Jake Howells and Keith Keane sent-off in the first leg at Bootham Crescent that the Minstermen won 1-0.

A Robbie Willmott strike in the second leg looked to have taken the tie to extra-time only for Matty Blair to score an aggregate winner in stoppage time to take City to Wembley.

The Town's trials and tribulations in the Trophy came to an end in the last eight last season with a heavy 3-0 defeat at Grimsby just three days after the historic 1-0 win over Norwich in the FA Cup.

Wins over Dorchester – following a replay, again after the first game was postponed, this time after a waterlogged pitch – Matlock – which saw a last-gasp Jon Shaw winner – and Skelmersdale set-up the tie where the Town exited at Blundell Park.



DRIVER REFLECTS ON YOUTH CUP DEFEAT

Hatters Under-18s boss Paul Driver was proud of his side's efforts despite exiting the FA Youth Cup following a 3-1 defeat at Huddersfield.

The Town youngsters led in extra-time thanks to Zane Banton's cool finish but the Terriers hit back to score three times in the closing stages to seal a place in the fourth round.

"It's frustrating to have lost given we had the lead but we acquitted ourselves well," Driver told lutontown.co.uk.

"Not one single player of ours looked out of their depth. Huddersfield are at Premier League level in youth team terms so we're pleased in what we've done.

"It's been a decent run in the competition and we've gone out with a lot of pride. What we have to do is dust ourselves down and the aim now is to win the league [the Youth Alliance South East Division]."

Outstanding

Driver admitted the most disappointing aspect was Huddersfield's equaliser, which came seconds after the Town had taken the lead.

"It was an outstanding finish from Zane but we switched off after the restart," said Driver. "It's frustrating but it's a lesson the boys will have to learn. You're always at your most vulnerable when you score and their lad has run through and been fouled and they score from the penalty."

"You go from being in front with 13 minutes left to being level with 12 to go and then before you know it you're behind and chasing the game."

The Town lie fourth in the Youth Alliance, three points behind leaders Colchester but with two games in hand.

"I'm happy with the run we've had in the Youth Cup and I'm disappointed we couldn't go further, but we've now got to go and win the league and I think we're capable of doing that," added Driver.

The disappointment was shared by the players, who took to their Twitter accounts after the defeat.

"Great team performance and so unlucky with the result. Gutted!" said captain Charlie Smith.

"Heartbroken. Knocked out by Huddersfield in the FA Youth Cup," added Tinashe Chabata.

Goalkeeper Ben Barnes tweeted: "Unfortunately lost but so proud to be a part of this team with these players, just gotta work hard and go forward from here on."

"Great effort lads, couldn't have done any more, did everyone proud," tweeted defender Harry Tamplin.

Midfielder Ian Rees said: "Lost 3-1 in extra-time. Gutted to have lost, didn't deserve it."

Goalscorer Banton had the last word: "So gutted. Thought we'd won after I got the goal in the last eight minutes in the second half of extra-time. Somehow we lost it. Well done boys. Everyone played decent. Didn't deserve that."




Alan West goes close with a flying header during the 1-1 home draw with Wrexham in September 1980.

The early rounds of the FA Trophy proper are never an easy sell; not for fans who contemplate Christmas shopping, managers who play weakened sides and nor for reporters, I have to confess.

You scan the draw for a game where a lower level team going well in their own division are at home to a higher level opponent, preferably within easy travelling distance of home.

Bury Town of the top half of the Ryman Premier at home to Skrill South title favourites Eastleigh measured up for me.

But even then I found myself competing with the festivities, as a pre-match visit to the Blues' website told me the huge car park adjacent to Ram Meadow, that I'd found so useful when I used to go and play there with Ware, would be rammed because of the Suffolk town's Christmas Fayre.

A sign of big players being rested came just before kick-off with Ian Miller, the Cambridge United captain, pushing his son Hudson's buggy around the perimeter of his old club's pitch, enjoying a weekend off while his Abbey teammates did battle, successfully, at Salisbury.

By half-time of our game, the chance of an upset had gone with Ben Strevens doing what he's done brilliantly for more than a decade at Barnet, Crawley, Dagenham & Redbridge, Brentford, Wycombe and Gillingham by netting two close-range efforts to start the Spittires' flight into round two.

So what about my headline? Step forward Craig McAllister, another veteran of the Non-League and lower Football League circuit, now back with his first club after serving the likes of Basingstoke – where I first came up against him as a player – Stevenage, Woking, Grays, Exeter, Crawley, Newport and Luton with distinction.

As he made his way off the pitch after the pre-match warm-up, I said hello and asked how he was?

"Great thanks mate – missus gave birth to our second at two o'clock this morning, didn't she?" came the reply as he made his way down the tunnel.

With that chat in mind as he came on as a half-time sub, I pondered a goal from the striker who'd been up all night holding the mother of his baby's hand, cuddled the new arrival and maybe grabbed half-an-hour's sleep on the coach before celebrating how he knows best.

Sure enough, the 33-year-old buried Bury further with a close-range header 11 minutes after joining the action and the Bebeto cradle celebration was re-enacted for the 987,546th time since USA '94!

Afterwards, it got better. Manager Richard Hill told me that he and eight of the players who'd had furthest to travel spent the Friday

night in a Stansted hotel. "I offered to drive Macca back to Southampton in the early hours, but he wanted to stay and play," said Hill.

McAllister, whose fiancée Linzi is the daughter of former Tiverton Town manager, and current Taunton assistant, Martyn Rogers, explained further. "I can't wait to get back and see the little man," he said. "It's a proud day but I had a job to do here, and having been around football all her life, Linzi understands. Hopefully she still will when I go to watch Tottenham-Man United with her old man tomorrow!"

I'm not sure my wife would have let me get away with it when our two were due. But at a time of year when we celebrate birth, I was doing a jig of joy at little Charlie McAllister's arrival.
