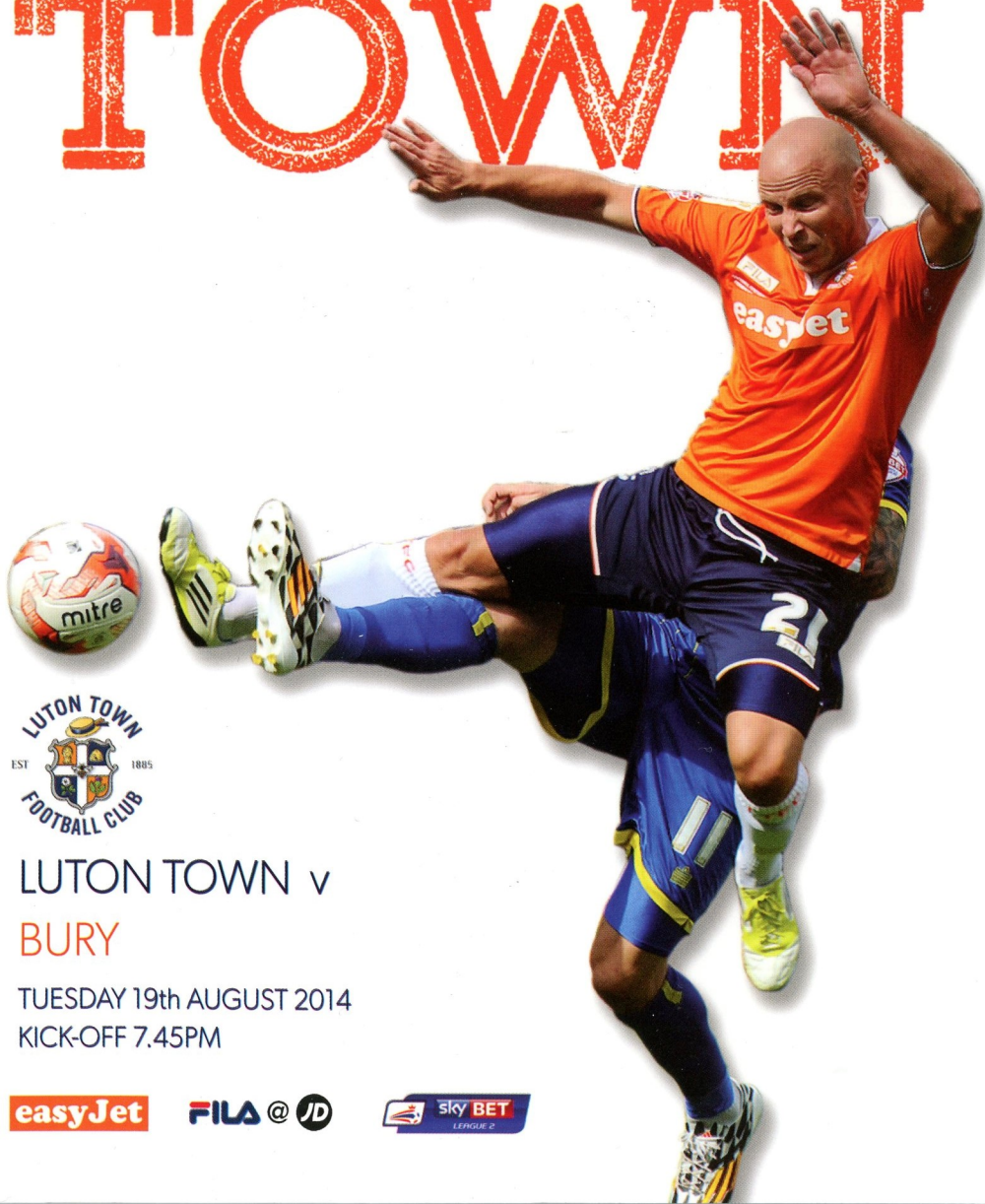

JOHN STILL

Good evening and welcome back to Kenilworth Road once again for this Sky Bet League 2 encounter against Bury.

Tonight's game follows quickly from Saturday's match where unfortunately we didn't get the three points we wanted as we came up against a very determined AFC Wimbledon side.

Whenever you lose it is disappointing but it's fair to say that I was only disappointed with the end result. I was, however, more than happy with our performance.

There was a lot of good things and the only frustrating thing for me was that we did not make the most of our play in the opponents' half.

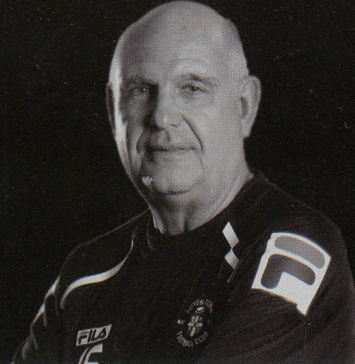
Objectively

At this stage of the season it's important to look at results objectively. We know we're not in a position where we'd like to be but this time last year we did not start particularly well. As I said last year you cannot judge the team and the performances until after six or eight games. So far we've only played two games, winning one and losing the other.

The last two home games have shown me enough that if we keep playing the way I know we can and keep the togetherness in our team we will only get stronger.

Against AFC Wimbledon we had to make a couple of changes with Luke Rooney unfortunately suspended after receiving two yellow cards against Swindon.

We were also without the services of Paul Connolly who was not quite fit enough to feature after picking up a slight hamstring problem.

It's nothing too serious and we had Curtley Williams on the bench as a precaution.

Curtley himself has been a bit behind in his fitness having picked up a little knock to his foot. He's back in the training which is also a plus.

It was good to have Luke Guttridge back on the field making his first start for us since last March. It was always our plan to give him an hour and he came through the 60 minutes with no ill effects and that is absolutely fantastic.

This week we hope to receive good news from the specialist on Jonathan Smith. He's had a few niggles over the summer – nothing serious – and his pre-season hasn't been affected by it. Smudge has trained vigorously all pre-season and all we've done is keep competitive football away from him until he's 100 per cent ready to return.

Alex Lawless is another who has been out with a niggling hamstring problem and I expect him to train fully this week. The same can be said for Ricky Miller.

Formidable

Turning attention to tonight we face a Bury side who I think will be one of the strongest sides in the division this year. I think they have brought in some very decent players. I believe once they hit their stride this season they will be formidable opponents.

Their assistant Chris Brass is a good pal of mine and I know they will be prepared to face us tonight. They have experienced a similar start to the season to us but I am under no illusions of how tough tonight's game will be tonight.

Playing against the best teams and against the best players are what we want for our team because it makes our players better for it. Therefore I see this evening as an ideal game for us in preparation for the long season ahead.

The support we received from the stands at the weekend was absolutely terrific. Incredible. Throughout the game and then at the end it was unbelievable.

It makes a massive difference and I know the players appreciated it hugely. Everyone at the club knows how much the togetherness of the support and the players helped us last season so please keep it up and who knows what we can achieve in this campaign.

Get behind us and enjoy the game.

WITH VICE CHAIRMAN DAVID WILKINSON



Good evening everyone and a warm welcome to Kenilworth Road for this afternoon's fixture against the Shakers

A special welcome goes out to our visitors this evening, the players, officials and supporters

from Bury Football Club.

I hope you all had a good summer. Sadly I was away for the game against Royal Antwerp, which I gather was quite an occasion. I know we are hoping to get a return match next year where we can renew some of the friendships made that day.

These are my first notes of the season and as such my first notes as a member of the Board of a Football League club. Unfortunately I am not able to report on our first home victory, but I am convinced it won't be long in coming.

Honour

When I first walked through the Kenilworth Road turnstiles as a 10-year-old kid I could never have imagined that one day I would have the honour to be elected as vice-chairman of this great club. I still feel as in awe of the place as when I first stood on the terraces and find it hard to believe that I can wander about at will and management, players and staff know who I am, which is more than I think I do sometimes.

None of the current directors knew each other when Gary Sweet found us and sold us on his 2020 plans, but I am now proud to be able to call them my friends and I thank them for putting their faith in me to fulfil this role.

Actually nothing much changes. Nick Owen is magnificent with the media and we are so fortunate to have such an experienced and polished performer in front of the cameras and microphones. Nick and I have also become friends and it is part of my job to keep him abreast of developments at the club and in the boardroom. I chair Board meetings and sit in, when required, at meetings to represent the

ownership, act as a sounding board, as well as being an ambassador for the club home and away. The Football League requires that those responsible are named and given the appropriate title.

Gary, Mike Herrick and I joined the squad at their training camp in Portugal again this year and, as John had already done most of his business, were able to become better acquainted with all involved. It is sometimes a little uncomfortable to watch such hard work without being physically able to participate, but I think it is really important for non-football people such as us to get an insight into what goes on and how people work. For what it's worth I believe we have a very strong, together squad quite capable of reaching higher levels. I would like to add my welcome on behalf of the Board to all our new players and hope that we can help them fulfil their dreams.

Worthwhile

As you all know we have continued supporting our youth set-up without any central funding as we believe that it is an important part of our future. I urge you to pop up to Ely Way on the Saturday morning of a game or to come to Youth Cup games when they start, it is really worthwhile. I have only seen one game so far this season, the home draw against Stevenage on Saturday, and believe me you, some excellent football was played with some talented players on show.

Now that we are in the Football League a lot of work is required by Wayne Turner and his team to ensure we comply with the standards set by the Premier League for varying levels of academy status. We are highly thought of in this area of the game, but it is vitally important for us that this continues and we can once again receive central funding to help us improve the service we provide and the facilities available.

This is important as we are long-term players. Our investment in this club is to enable it to eventually secure its long-term future. We are not there yet, but we are getting there. Our legacy will depend upon a stable management and financial structure, a new stadium, top-class training facilities, full interaction and support for and from the community and, of course, playing success.

Next year we are 130 years old. Between us we have been coming for hundreds of years and, of course we want success in our lifetimes, but what is most important is that the club is self-sustainable and goes on long after we have departed this mortal coil.

Proud

On Saturday after we had been beaten by Wimbledon, G Block and others stayed behind singing and chanting after the game until the players had finished their warm down and left the pitch. It must have been 20 minutes. Gary and I stayed out to watch, proud and much moved.

That's what it is about. The real thing – wholehearted, unflinching commitment.

How can we fail with this kind of support behind us?

We thank you and salute you all.

When I was leaving the ground this old ditty came into my head from way back, which seems somewhat appropriate.

"Here we go again – Happy as can be – All good friends – And jolly good company"

Enjoy the game.

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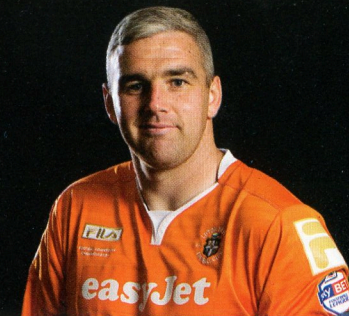

THIS IS YOUR CAPTAIN SPEAKING

FROM THE DRESSING ROOM WITH STEPHEN McNULTY



It was obviously disappointing for us all to lose our first match back at home in the Football League on Saturday but, as I alluded to in my notes for that game, it was never going to be an easy game.

We knew that this season wasn't going to be plain sailing but it hurt to lose a match that we all thought we deserved to get something from. Losing will give us things to think about and enable us to refocus our efforts ahead of tonight's match against a Bury team widely fancied to do well this term.

This evening's game also gives us the opportunity to put right what we did wrong at the weekend. Bury, though, will offer us one of the biggest tests we have faced in league competition so far. Their manager David Flitcroft has assembled a strong squad and he himself has managed at a much higher level. But these are the games as players we relish. We'll look forward to this game like we do any other but after such a deflating result on Saturday we are raring to go to get our first home win of the season.

Saturday's loss was hard to take because we have been used to having our way at home over the past 12 months. We are a group of players who are used to winning at home, certainly not losing, so it was tough to take in that respect.

Chances

A lot of people asked me afterwards if the result was a bit of wake-up call but I don't think that's the case at all because I thought we deserved a draw at the very least. Like at Carlisle and against Swindon, we restricted Wimbledon to very few chances and Tyles had very little to do. Their goal was a result of one long ball downfield. We, on the other hand, created a number of chances and played some very good football. I think it was just one of those days that happens in football. Perhaps if that was a Conference game we would have won that type of match, but we've stepped up a class this year and in the end that little bit of luck in the opposition's half evaded us on this occasion.

I think it's worth pointing out that we didn't start last season too well. We're not using that as a ready-made excuse for Saturday's defeat, I just think it takes all teams a good nine or 10 games to get into their stride.

The gaffer's brought in a number of new players over the summer and, like was the case last year, everyone is still learning how to play with one another and how the gaffer wants us to play.

Nobody will be reaching for the panic button after a narrow home defeat but you can be rest assured that we will learn from that game and, indeed, from the Swindon cup tie. I think with a little rub of the green we would have got something from Saturday's game and we'll definitely be approaching tonight's game with confidence.

As I've mentioned already, Bury will pose tough opposition for us. They have strikers in Ryan Lowe and Danny Nardiello who have done very well at a higher level.

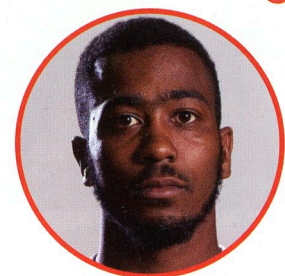
Brilliant

The boss received the manager of the year gong whilst striker Andre Gray, who has since left to join Brentford, picked up the Golden Boot after scoring 30 goals in the Hatters' title-winning campaign.

Gray and team-mates Mark Tyler, Steve McNulty and Luke Guttridge were also honoured at the event, with the quartet named in the Conference team of the season.

AFTER THREE STRAIGHT HOME FIXTURES AT KENILWORTH ROAD THE TOWN HIT THE ROAD TWICE IN THE NEXT TWO WEEKS TAKING IN TRIPS TO ACCRINGTON AND SHREWSBURY

ACCRINGTON STANLEY



WHO? Exactly. Stanley – famous or infamous, depending on your take on it – for their appearance in an advert for milk in the late 1980s, are far from a club that nobody knows about anymore. In fact this season will be the Lancashire club's ninth season back in the Football League following their Conference championship success of 2006/07.

WHERE. The 'old' or the 'original' Stanley – the club that collapsed and folded in 1966 used to play their games at Peel Park, but these days the new club play their home fixtures at the 5,000-capacity Crown Ground. The venue is named after the Crown public house adjacent to the ground and it is well worth venturing in there for a pre-match pint and some home-cooked grub.

HOW FAR? The Town have already racked up a 550-mile round-trip to begin the season with and the Hatters faithful have a 200-mile, three-and-half hour trip to Accrington to negotiate in their second away fixture in the Football League.

BOB IT. As ever, the Bobbers Travel Club will be making the journeys up and down the motorways following the Hatters this season. For the trip to Accrington the Bobbers leave from a new departure point in town – bus stop LS12 at Luton railway station – at 9am. The fares are £29 for adults and £26 for concession. Book your place by calling 01234 856542.

THE LAST TIME. The Hatters will be making only their second-ever trip to the Crown Ground. For many Town fans this trip will be the first time as it was a cold Tuesday night in February that the Hatters drew 0-0 in the -30 season in 2009. At the time the 1,088 crowd was the lowest to watch a Town League fixture.

STANLEY CONNECTIONS. There is one former Red currently in the Town squad in the shape of Shaun Whalley. The winger played 55 times for Stanley and scored five times in two seasons at the Crown Ground.

SHREWSBURY TOWN



WHO? Shrewsbury Town, aka, the Shrews. The Shropshire side are back in League 2 following their relegation from League 1 last term. Now managed by Micky Mellon – the former Fleetwood Town manager who guided the Cod Army to the Conference title in 2012.

WHERE? Shrewsbury moved to the New Meadow – aka Greenhous Meadow for sponsorship purposes – in 2007, which is an all-seated 10,000 arena that replaced their former home, Gay Meadow. The old ground was one of the most picturesque in the country (depending on what time of the year you visited), situated in the town centre. The New Meadow is an out-of-town development.

HOW TO GET THERE. Town supporters will continue to clock up the miles. From the Maple Road car park to the Greenhous Meadow changing rooms, it's 127 miles up the M1, M6 and across the M54. Coming off the M54 the stadium is well-signposted. Alternatively you can book with the Bobbers. They leave the Luton railway station at 10.30am and the fares are £23 for adults and £20 for concessions.

HAVEN'T WE BEEN HERE BEFORE? Yes. The Town's last meeting with the Shrews also took place in the -30 season of 2008/09, and in that campaign the Hatters left the New Meadow pointless and goalless following a 3-0 defeat. The Shrews led in the fourth minute after Paul Murray's goal before Ben Davies' rocket made it 2-0 in the second half. Grant Holt completed the scoring with a cheeky back-heel. Jake Howells played 90 minutes for the Town.

FORMER SHREWS. Asa Hall, Billy Cooke and David Edwards are three former Shrews that have gone onto play for the Hatters but the one most notable ex-Shrew that adorned Town colours was Andre Gray. The striker began his career at the New Meadow but was restricted to just five substitute appearances for Shrewsbury during 2009/10 before he was released. He was snapped by Hinckley in June 2011 and was then signed by the Town in March 2012.

BURY



It is with great pleasure that we welcome everybody associated with Bury Football Club to Kenilworth Road as our second visitors to Bedfordshire in the Football League this season.

It has been five years since the Shakers have visited Kenilworth Road and David Flitcroft's side arrive full of confidence after achieving their first victory of the season on Saturday.

The Shakers were comfortable 2-0 winners at Hartlepool on Saturday and three points were enough for tonight's visitors to leap-frog the Hatters in the very, very early League 2 standings.

The fact that Saturday's result was their first win of the season was a big surprise, given the expectation and hope of a season of success at Gigg Lane. Flitcroft has built a hugely experienced and talented squad with the likes of Ryan Lowe, Pablo Mills and Kelvin Etuhu added to the Shakers ranks this summer. Lowe has joined for a second spell at the club after a hugely prolific first spell in which he netted a goal every other game.

Lowe scored his second goal of the season in Saturday's 2-0 victory at Victoria Park, just four days after he had opened the scoring in their 3-2 extra-time defeat to local rivals Bolton Wanderers in the Capital One Cup. Flitcroft's side were mighty unlucky not to pull off a huge

shock at the Reebok Stadium, with the Trotters scoring a highly-contested penalty SEVEN minutes into injury time. Wanderers would eventually go on and lead 3-1 before skipper Jimmy McNulty pulled one back.

The Shakers began their League 2 campaign with a 1-0 home defeat to Cheltenham on the opening day with Flitcroft comparing his side's performance with a golfer's ability on the green. "It's like a golfer with a putt. It's no good getting on the green in two and then having four or five putts. That's where we were at today," he said after the defeat to the Robins. "We didn't hit the right areas that we'd worked on in training where we'd looked fluent."

Since their last visit to Kenilworth Road five years ago, the Shakers have spent time in League 1 before their relegation two seasons back.

And the visitors can take heart from the fact their predecessors haven't been beaten at Kenilworth Road in their last six visits to Bedfordshire.

You have to go all the way back to December 1962 for the last time the Hatters recorded a home victory over the Shakers. Bury won on their last trip to Kenilworth Road in 2009 – a game in which Mark Tyler was in goal for the Shakers whilst on-loan from Peterborough. In that game, during the Hatters' -30 season, Asa Hall had given the Town the lead but two second half goals – from Andy Bishop and Andy Morrell – gave the Shakers all three points.

► THE MANAGER



DAVID FLITCROFT. The boss who took over at Gigg Lane in December last year after leaving Barnsley, who he had kept in the Championship the season before. As a player he served the Shakers, as well as Chester and Rochdale.

► GOALKEEPERS

SHWAN JALAL. Baghdad-born stopper who signed this summer following his release from AFC Bournemouth. Arrived in the UK as a four-year-old and started his career as a youngster at Tottenham.

ROB LAINTON. Former Bolton trainee who joined the Shakers following his release from the Reebok Stadium. The young, commanding stopper spent a spell on-loan at Burton last season but has begun this season as the number one Gigg Lane.

DEFENDERS

JIMMY McNULTY. Cultured and versatile defender and captain who joined the Shakers from Barnsley. A former Everton and Liverpool trialist as a youngster, he has also been on the books at Wrexham, Macclesfield, Stockport and Brighton.

CHRIS HUSSEY. Hammersmith-born defender who joined the Shakers this summer following a successful loan spell from Burton. Started out in Woking's academy before moves to AFC Wimbledon and Coventry.

JOE WIDDOWSON. Former West Ham trainee who spent time out on loan at Rotherham and Grimsby before joining the Mariners permanently in 2009. Spells at Rochdale and Northampton followed.

NATHAN CAMERSON. Powerful and strong centre-half who signed for the Shakers after being released by Coventry, where he made 52 appearances.

PABLO MILLS. Experienced centre-half who arrived at Gigg Lane midway through last season after failing to nail down a place with Rotherham. A Conference champion with Crawley, the defender has also played for Derby and Macclesfield.

► MIDFIELDERS

ANDREW TUTTE. A product of the Manchester City academy, the ball-winning midfielder signed for the Shakers following his release from Rochdale, where he had previously enjoyed a successful loan spell.

KELVIN ETUHU. Another former Man City trainee, the midfielder joined the Shakers this summer on a two-year deal after leaving Barnsley. After loan spells at Rochdale, Leicester and Cardiff, he signed for Portsmouth on a permanent deal before joining Barnsley.

NICKY ADAMS. Classy central midfield player who returned for his second spell at Gigg Lane this summer. Started his career with the Shakers before moving to Leicester and then to Brentford, Rochdale, Rotherham and Crawley.

CHRIS SEDGEWICK. Experienced winger who has made over 600 appearances in the Football League following spells with Rotherham, Preston, Sheffield Wednesday and Scunthorpe.



DANNY MAYOR

Skilful young midfielder who signed a three-year deal this summer after impressing last term whilst on-loan from Sheffield Wednesday. Began his career as a trainee at Preston.

TOM SOARES. Former Crystal Palace and Stoke midfielder who initially joined the Shakers on non-contract terms in September 2012. Made 163 appearances for Palace before a £1.25m move to Stoke in 2008.

► STRIKERS

JOE THOMPSON. Rochdale-born frontman who joined the Shakers from Tranmere. The striker was diagnosed with a rare form of cancer whilst at Prenton Park – something which Joe revealed in June this year he had beaten.

RYAN LOWE. Prolific and experienced striker in his second spell with the Shakers after arriving this summer from Rochdale. Scored 52 goals in 100 games in his first spell at Gigg Lane.

DANNY NARDIELLO. Former Manchester United frontman whose career has included a number of loan spells, including one with the Shakers. Arrived permanently at Gigg Lane in 2013 and was the Shakers' top scorer last term.

DANNY ROSE. Striker who joined on-loan from Barnsley last week and scored in the Shakers' 2-0 win at Hartlepool on Saturday. Scored three goals in six games in a loan spell at Gigg Lane last term.

FROM THE OAK ROAD

Maurice Dickson has seen Bury's fortunes transform off the pitch – and this season, he's hoping for some success on it...

TALK OF THE TOWN:

Bury are hotly tipped to do well this season. What are Shakers fans' expectations ahead of the current campaign?

MAURICE: I think most Bury fans have higher expectations than usual. We have added a great deal of quality to the squad since David Flitcroft took over and that has fuelled those expectations. The bookies have made us one of the favourites along with the Hatters and Pompey and they aren't often wrong.

TOTT: Which of your new signings are you most impressed by?

MAURICE: Personally, I feel it's great to have Ryan Lowe back. He's a natural goalscorer but Kelvin Etuhu looks class and Danny Mayor is Championship quality.

TOTT: The two clubs share a former manager in Kevin Blackwell. Tell us about his time in charge at the club and his relationship with supporters.

MAURICE: I think most Bury fans would look on Kevin's time at Gigg Lane as a disaster. Granted he was hamstrung a bit over finances and we suffered two transfer embargoes but, shall we say, he talks a good game. One comment he made in particular really alienated him from the fans, which was: "With all due respect, people who don't work in the football industry know nothing". Sorry Kev, but I've been watching football since I was in my pram, played to a decent level and seen thousands of games – and I know nothing about the game?



TOTT: David Flitcroft was acclaimed for keeping Barnsley in the Championship in 2012/13. Have things changed at Bury since he took the reins at Gigg Lane?

MAURICE: Very much so. I think Flicker has brought a more scientific aspect to the club and also a better style of football to watch than we've had in recent years under the likes of Blackwell and Peter Shirliff. We now have more backroom staff, such as physios, strength and conditioning coaches than we have ever had. If we don't achieve anything at the end of the season it won't be for the lack of effort from those guys.

TOTT: The club has had financial difficulties in recent seasons – however, Chairman Stewart Day is reported to have heavily invested in the club. Are the financial troubles gone now?

MAURICE: That's the 64 million dollar question. We are due to have an AGM in September where, supposedly, questions will be answered. There is no doubt that money has been spent and spent well in making the facilities at Gigg Lane some of the best outside the Premier League which helps in recruiting players. The hospitality side of things has also been improved to increase revenue streams. But the bottom line is we were hours away from going out of business and so if Stewart and his directors hadn't come in we'd have been in massive trouble and possibly out of the League.

TOTT: Which sides will win promotion from League 2 come May? And what is your prediction for today's game?

MAURICE: My ideal three would be Bury, Portsmouth and Burton Albion but because my late Uncle John was a season ticket holder at Kenilworth Road, I'd like to see Luton Town go up too. As for tonight's result, I'm going for a 2–1 Bury win!

TOTT: Greg Dyke put forward proposals for the introduction of a league of 'B teams' between League 2 and the Conference in May. Would they be good for English football?

MAURICE: No, they wouldn't, they'd be a disaster for English football. The idea that B teams at that level would improve the English national team by bringing on young English players is absolutely ridiculous. I'm a Northern Ireland fan and therefore not really that interested in the fortunes of England, but Mr Dyke's idea is a joke and an insult to all lower league clubs. Who would watch these teams? Imagine you are enjoying alcohol responsibly at your local and you get talking to a fellow fan at the bar. "Who do you support mate?" "I'm a Spurs B team fan myself"...it's never going to happen!

Without wishing to come across as xenophobic, the problem lies with the number of foreigners playing in the Premier League. They take away places from young English and British talent. The youngsters will improve by playing at the top level week in week out and not by, with all due respect, playing the likes of Nuneaton or Exeter. The rules around freedom of movement for EU players would be almost impossible to get around but we could limit the number of Brazilian, Argentinian, Nigerian, South Korean or other nationalities by saying teams cannot field more than one per game. I wonder how Mr Dyke would feel if his beloved Brentford were back in the fourth tier and had to face Sunderland B away on a cold Tuesday night in January?

DID YOU KNOW?

The Shakers have an illustrious history and are two-time FA Cup winners. Bury lifted the trophy in 1900 and 1903. The club also won the Second Division Championship (what is now the Championship) in 1895, which saw the club promoted to the top flight. The Shakers' best finish in the first division was fourth, which came in 1926.

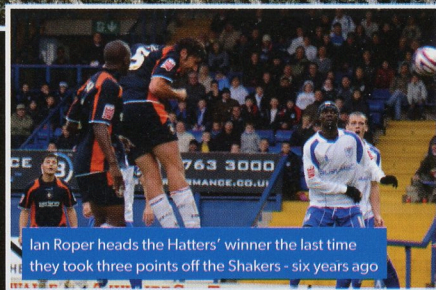
AND A SHAKER

There have been a number of players who have worn the shirts of both the Town and Bury down the years, none more notable than our very own Mark Tyler, who played 11 games on-loan with the Shakers in 2009.

Another hugely popular goalkeeper, Dean Kiely, has also played for both clubs. He made 137 Football League appearances whilst at Gigg Lane before a £1m move to Charlton in the summer of 1999. Kiely arrived on-loan at Kenilworth Road in November 2006. He made his debut in a 2-1 defeat at Southampton and played 11 times for the Town in the Championship.

Current Town striker Mark Cullen will also be familiar to Shakers fans in the Oak Road end tonight. The forward had two loan spells at Gigg Lane, scoring once in 16 appearances in 2011 and 2012.

One of the most familiar faces in football in recent history, centre-half Efe Sodje, became a cult hero at

Gigg Lane having previously been on the Town's books. He played just nine times for the Town but 212 times for the Shakers and scored 18 goals.

Those supporters who can cast their minds back to 1984 will remember striker Steve Elliott, a £95,000 signing by David Pleat from Preston North End. Elliott managed three league goals in an injury-affected spell at Kenilworth Road before joining Bury via Walsall and Bolton.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

As mentioned on page 18, Bury arrive at Kenilworth Road this evening unbeaten in their last six visits to Bedfordshire – winning the last two.

During that time – which stretches back to the Town's last home win against the Shakers in 1962 – Bury have won twice and drawn four times, including the previous two fixtures. However, the Hatters edge the overall head-to-head records between the two clubs with the Town winning 18 to Bury's 13 in the 39 previous meetings. Eight have ended all square. Interestingly enough, six of those eight draws have come in the last 10 fixtures. What chance a draw this evening?

In recent times, goals in games between the two clubs have been very thin on the ground: in the last 11 meetings, only 19 goals have been scored. Four of those 11 matches have finished goalless.

The last time the Hatters beat the Shakers came at Gigg Lane in the minus 30 season of 2008/09. The Town ran out 2-1 winners in October that season

thanks to goals from striker Tom Craddock and popular defender Ian Roper.

That victory was the Town's first over Bury in seven previous attempts stretching back to a 1973 League Cup replay at Gigg Lane.

The lack of goals and success for the Hatters in recent history is in stark contrast to the record between the two sides throughout the 1930s, 40s and 50s in what now is the Championship. Between 1938 and 1956 the Town won all four of their meetings with the Shakers, triumphing 4-3, 5-2, 2-1 and 2-0. Bury's biggest victories over the Hatters came in a 5-2 win at Gigg Lane in 1949 and a 4-1 triumph in 1950.

Town's all-time leading marksman Gordon Turner also enjoyed playing against the Shakers – he netted six goals in as many games against tonight's visitors in matches between 1953 and 1961.

Twenty-one of the 39 meetings between the two clubs took place in the Old Second Division (now Championship). Tonight's fixture will be the third occasion the clubs have met in the fourth tier.

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN **LEIGH EDWARDS** TRACES WHAT HAPPENED TO TWO OF **BURY'S** GREATEST POST-WAR TEAMS

► 1960/61 THIRD DIVISION CHAMPIONS

FRANK ADAMS: Goalkeeper who made 170 League appearances before moving to Chester in July 1963. He later joined Tranmere Rovers and resided in Liverpool until his death in March 2009.

EDDIE ROBERTSON: Scottish right-back who joined Wrexham in October 1963. Later playing for Tranmere Rovers and Ellesmere Port, he was Tranmere's coach until his death in December 1981.

BOBBY CONROY: Ever-present left-back who scored twice in 217 League games before following Dave Russell to Tranmere Rovers in July 1962. Later with Buxton, he died at 49 in July 1978.

BRIAN TURNER: Long-serving right-half who moved to Oldham Athletic in August 1970, then played for Droylsden. He ran the Rosemar Cafe in Bury and died in Southport in January 1999.

BOB STOKOE: Player-boss who became Charlton's manager in August 1965, then had spells in charge of Rochdale, Carlisle, Blackpool, Sunderland and Bury again. He died in February 2004.

GORDON ATHERTON: Ever-present left-half who followed Bert Head to Swindon in December 1964, then back to Bury. He worked in the building trade and engineering, settling in Little Lever.

BILL CALDER: Outside-right who joined Oxford United in November 1963, then Rochdale, Macclesfield, Nantwich and Horwich. He was sales director of Sealocrete building chemicals in Bury.

BILL HOLDEN: Former England B international who moved to Halifax Town in June 1962, then played for Rugby and Hereford United. He resided in Morecambe until his death in January 2011.

DON WATSON: Ever-present centre-forward who netted 65 goals in 172 League games, joining Barnsley in January 1962. Later with Rochdale, Barrow and Buxton, he settled in his native Barnsley.

ALLAN JACKSON: Leading marksman who scored 43 times in 124 League games before joining Brighton in November 1962. Later with Burton Albion, he became player-boss of hometown Newhall.

JOHNNY HUBBARD: Scottish outside-left who netted 29 goals in 109 League games, moving to Ayr United in June 1962. He became a tennis coach, then was a sports officer for Prestwick Council.

► 1996/97 SECOND DIVISION CHAMPIONS

DEAN KIELY: Ever-present goalkeeper who made 137 League appearances before joining Charlton Athletic in May 1999. The Eire international later played for Portsmouth, Luton and West Brom.

DEAN WEST: Ever-present right-back who followed Stan Ternent to Burnley in July 1999. Rejoining Lincoln City in July 2004, he then had spells with Boston United, King's Lynn and Corby Town.

GORDON ARMSTRONG: Experienced defender who scored four times in 71 League games before following Stan Ternent to Burnley in August 1998. He later had a spell with Accrington Stanley.

NICK DAWS: Long-serving midfielder who netted 16 goals in 361 League games prior to joining Rotherham United in July 2001. He was loaned to Grimsby Town before injury ended his career.

CHRIS LUCKETTI: Central defender who moved to Huddersfield in June 1999, then played for Preston, Neil Warnock's Sheffield United and Huddersfield again. Now Fleetwood's assistant-boss.

MIKE JACKSON: England Youth central defender who joined Preston in March 1997. He moved to Tranmere Rovers in July 2004, then played for Blackpool before ending his career at Shrewsbury.

PAUL BUTLER: Central defender who netted four goals in 84 League games, joining Sunderland in July 1998. The Eire international later played for Wolves, Leeds United, MK Dons and Chester.

MARK CARTER: Leading marksman who scored 62 times in 134 League outings before joining Rochdale in July 1997, then Ashton United, Runcorn, Bamber Bridge and Radcliffe Borough.

DAVID JOHNSON: Striker who scored 18 times in 97 League games, moving to Ipswich Town in November 1997. The Jamaica international later played for Nottingham Forest and Hucknall.

LENNY JOHNROSE: Midfielder who followed Stan Ternent to Burnley in February 1999. He later played for Bury again, Swansea City and Burnley again before becoming a personal fitness trainer.

ROB MATTHEWS: Ex-England Schoolboy winger who joined Stockport County in November 1998. He later played for Hull City, Northwich Victoria, Mossley, Altrincham and Mossley again.

WHAT'S THE STORY?

The Town's return to the Football League at Kenilworth Road ended in defeat as a first-half Matt Tubbs strike gave AFC Wimbledon the points.

It was a result harsh on the Hatters who saw plenty of the ball throughout the 90 minutes but couldn't find a way past the Dons' defence and goalkeeper James Shea, despite creating a number of chances.

The Town came close in the first half when Luke Guttridge saw a terrific shot saved by Shea but the visitors – who beat the Hatters in the 2011 Conference Play-Off final – took the lead when Tubbs finished superbly after racing onto Adebayo Akinfenwa's flick on four minutes before half-time.

After the break the Dons spurned great chances to double their lead with Akinfenwa and Tubbs guilty of missing in front of goal, but the Town continued to dominate but couldn't find an equaliser.

Guttridge's header hit the side-netting, Mark Cullen struck a post with a shot from 25 yards before Paul Benson, Andy Drury, Luke Wilkinson and Stephen McNulty all came close but the visitors held on to secure all three points.

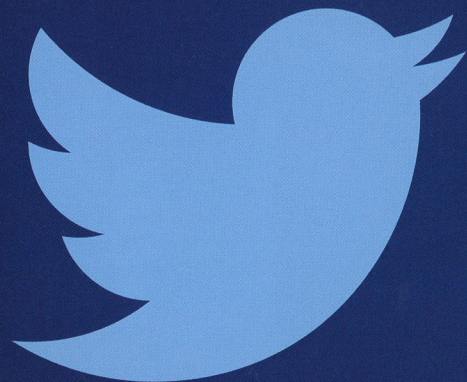

MIDFIELDER MATT ROBINSON ON FOOTBALL LEAGUE MILESTONE

Matt Robinson felt hard done by in the 1-0 loss to AFC Wimbledon, as the Hatters were on top for the majority of the clash at Kenilworth Road.

The Town tasted defeat in their opening Football League home game; however 20-year-old Robinson admitted that the Hatters deserved something from the game.

"I am very disappointed; I thought we were the stronger team throughout the game,"

Robinson told Hatters Player. "Wimbledon had a short spell at the start of the second half were they came out on top. They probably could have scored a second, but I thought our performance deserved three points."

It was Robinson's first game as a Football League player at the tender age of 20. The midfielder was delighted to have reached the milestone at such an early stage in his career.

"It's a nice milestone to hit, earning my first appearance in the Football League, I'm only 20 years old now so things like that are pretty big to me," said the youngster. "It's not the only milestone I want to reach, but it's a good starting point. Being labelled as a Football League player is a nice label."

"It's nice to see the gaffer putting his faith in me especially when it's a level up from last year. To be given this opportunity at the age of 20 is a very nice thing for me to say."

"I was pleased with my performance, but it's not about how I perform it's about the team getting three points. I could have one of my best games and we still lose, but three points mean more to me."

The Hatters midfielder paid tribute to the Luton Town supporters who turned up to cheer on their side in their first home game of the season. More than 9,000 fans showed up on the day to show their support.

"It means a lot to the fans after five years out of the Football League," said the former Leicester trainee who arrived at Kenilworth Road in the summer of 2012.

"The fans turned out in their numbers today and I thought their support was terrific. It's very rare to see the fans singing after a loss. It shows that they are behind us this year and hopefully we can go and get promoted again, that's our aim."

THE BIG INTERVIEW

During the Town's 1-0 defeat to the Dons, there was a claim for a penalty during the first half, when Fraser Franks was dragged down in the area following an eye-of-the-needle pass from Robinson to find the right-back. Robinson believes that on another day, a penalty could have been given in the home sides favour.

"I thought that was a penalty, if Luke Guttridge leaves it the ref gives the pen," admitted the midfielder. "It was a very nice move, but we all know what Luke can do in front of goal so I don't blame him for taking it on."

Deserved

"Luke reached double figures last season and there's no reason why he won't do that again. I think we deserved something out of the game."

Last season the Town started off slowly in the league before picking up the majority of their points towards Christmas. Robinson believes that slipping up at this stage of the season is not always a bad thing.

"I didn't play at the start of last season so starting off slowly isn't something I have really experienced yet," said Robinson. "Watching from the stand is a different thing from being on the pitch and doing it."

"If we have a slow start it's not the end of the world. After Christmas last season was the time when we picked up the most points compared to other teams."

"There's no reason why this won't happen again."

Robinson was used in the right-back position in the latter stages of the Wimbledon defeat, a position that the 20-year-old is not familiar with. However, the natural midfielder performed well in defence and will continue to play in whatever position John Still.

"For a time I had to play in the right-back position," said the youngster. "I don't know if this position is going to be made permanent for me, however I'll play where I am told and I'll do the very best that I can. It's not something that I'm used to so it will be a learning curve for me."

Test

The midfielder admitted that last week's Capital One Cup clash against Swindon Town was a huge test for the Hatters, and one were they coped very well in. Robinson admitted that the Hatters will have to get used to playing against much higher opposition at this level.

"Playing against a team like Swindon was a learning curve for us," Robinson said. We learnt how to hold our shape against a team who are probably the best footballing team in the league above us.

"They were all very comfortable on the ball and that's something we may have to come across a few times this season."

Travellers' TALES

Hatters supporter **DAN LUCEY** made his first ever visit to Kenilworth Road last season to witness the incredible 4-3 victory over Halifax. And, over the summer, Dan kindly sent us his story on his pilgrimage to Bedfordshire to be included in Talk of the Town.

MISSION ACCOMPLISHED

A lifetime's ambition was fulfilled in October 2013, as an opportunity to scupper another family holiday for football reasons arose, when my wife decided that we and our three kids should travel from Ireland to London for a week.

Booking the flights, I conducted research not with prices in mind, but that our trip should coincide with a Luton Town home fixture. My first choice Luton Town v Lincoln City, had to be discounted due to circumstances beyond my control, so FC Halifax Town would have to suffice.



I also acquired match tickets online – intending to surprise my loved ones after a few days away.

Staying in Mile End, our vacation got off to an inauspicious start, as we had to accompany our two-year-old to a local NHS health centre. Once he'd recovered, we embarked upon the capital's sights and I plucked up enough courage to announce the 'treat' I'd arranged for the weekend.

Come match day, the train journey from King's Cross involved a peculiar-scented sexagenarian extolling the virtues of a toy fair he'd attended, to my polite, but perplexed wife. As he waffled on about board games, my mind wandered to what Kenilworth Road would be like.

Ridicule

Being the only Irish Luton fan, who I'm aware of, my 30-year association with the Hatters appears bizarre to most people on this side of the water.

Since discovering them on Match of the Day as a young boy, I've had to endure bigger teams' fans' ridicule: the plastic pitch, membership cards, 2008's administration and the thirty-point deduction, which contributed to relegation and non-league football.

Even the highlight – 1988's Littlewoods Cup final victory over Arsenal (my dad's team), was sullied because of a mother's insistence at half-time that we collect our gran for her weekly Sunday outing.

Old enough to travel abroad without my parents, vague agreements with various friends to travel over to England when Luton were at home on a Saturday and their team playing away in London the following day, never materialised. I didn't attend any of the Hatters' recent Wembley appearances either, but did see them play both Wigan and Blackpool away, whilst visiting a pal in Manchester (the latter, for his wedding) ... Alas, Kenilworth Road remained the Holy Grail.

On arrival in Luton, three people's ignorance to the location of their home town's football ground wasn't a good omen. At last, a helpful mechanic pointed out

the right direction, but only between expressing misgivings about the area and its inhabitants' lack of charm: "This place is rotten!", "Be Careful!" and so on.

Following the crowd past Sainsbury's, Kenilworth Road revealed itself from within a maze of terraced houses. After collecting our match tickets, an anticipated call to the club shop was assuaged on spotting that it operated from a Portakabin. My mood lightened on purchasing an official club top and a copy of the aforementioned League Cup final DVD (an opportunity to regain 45 minutes from my youth).

Entering Kenilworth Road, it appeared to be full of contradictions: an old ground, but one with a fresh lick of paint, and the infamous executive boxes opposite the

Main Stand, which contained enough leg room to conceal a child's stroller without compromising on comfort.

Around us, home fans regaled each other about the previous week's thrilling comeback to beat Lincoln 3-2 after twice falling behind.

Another topic of conversation recounted Luton's captain Ronnie Henry's altercation with a home supporter after the game. Said fan had earlier berated the players, as they departed the pitch 1-0 down at half time...This near miss of contrasting excitement levels was sure to result in witnessing a scoreless bore fest.

Prior to kick-off, a season-ticket holding father and son informed me that we were occupying their seats. Embarrassed and apologetic, I offered to move, but they insisted that we stay put, on realising the stroller and other toddler-related paraphernalia would have to be hauled two seats to the left. The dad sat next to me, and after some small talk, I asked him if the Hatters might gain promotion at the fifth attempt. "They won't ... but only because I put a bet on them to win the league."

Coming into this match, Luton trailed leaders Cambridge by eight points. In a division where one team can run away with it, a great season could see a club finish second and lose out in the Play-Offs...Something Hatters fans are well aware of.

Improve

Recent results suggested a solid defence (eight clean sheets in 10 games), but a necessity to improve at the other end if a return to English football's fourth tier was to be achieved.

The visitors, FC Halifax Town, were in a rush through the non-league pyramid. In 2008-2009, they resided in the Northern Premier League Division One North, and following three promotions, earned the right to participate in the Skryll Premier courtesy of a 1-0 Play-Off win over Brackley Town the season before last.

As the teams entered the pitch, three things disturbed me, but I still can't decide in which order...First off, Luton's mascot Happy Harry has to be the most child-unfriendly creation to ever grace a football field. To finish, Luton's manager John Still bore an uncanny likeness to Pope Francis, albeit an increasingly agitated one, as the game progressed.

The match began with adversity, as Halifax raced into an early lead. Things improved after quarter-of-an-hour, when industrious and impressive midfielder Luke Guttridge scored via a wicked deflection. Minutes later, former Luton player Simon Ainge rose unchallenged in the box to head in a right-wing free-kick for the visitors. Within five minutes, Halifax went 3-1 up with a sweet low shot from Dan Gardner – cue stunned silence from the home crowd...This didn't last long, as despair turned to disgust.





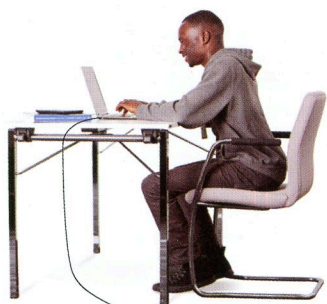
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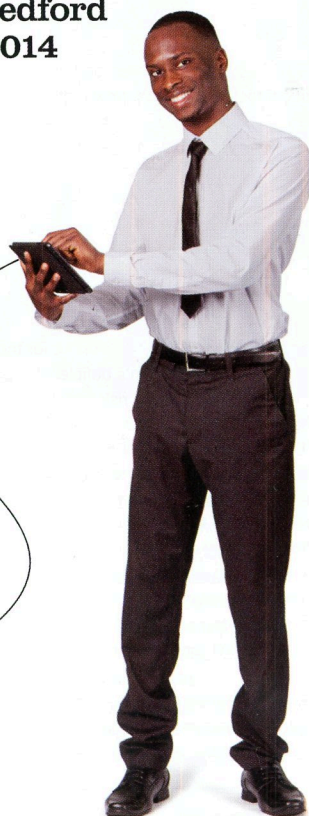
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There was a man seated behind me, whose frequent critical tactical analysis, now mutated into indecipherable overdrive. In comparison, the Shaymen's fans in the Oak Road End (all 260) were ecstatic. "You picked a bad game, mate" my neighbour remarked, but there was no sign of a torn-up betting slip at his feet.

Rewarded

On the half-hour mark, Halifax's danger man Gardner could have made it 4-1, but his turn and mistimed volley sailed over veteran keeper Mark Tyler, hitting the crossbar. It was a pivotal moment for the home fans. Do they bemoan their team's deficiencies or get behind the players? Not wanting to risk the skipper's ire, over 6,200 people chose positivity.

Luton responded – upping the tempo and producing good football. They were soon rewarded, when the permatanned Paul Benson scored after left-back Scott Griffiths' cross was returned first time by Henry.

Matters got even better six minutes before the break, as the most skilful player on the pitch, Andre Gray, raced onto a through ball from midfielder Alex Lawless and rifled the ball low into the corner of the net.

The atmosphere was electric. After hugging my new best friend, I glanced over at my family... Even my wife was euphoric. As for the kids, they were too wrapped up with savoury snacks and assorted gadgets to realise what was going on.

Half-time arrived and everyone drew breath again. An obligatory trip to fetch dodgy hot dogs and keep my children on side, allowed an opportunity to decompress.

To be predicted, the second-half was a tamer affair. Luton bossed possession, but didn't trouble the visitors' keeper, Matt Glennon. Midway through, Halifax regained a foothold and the ever-willing Gardner, after a smart turn, saw Tyler's legs block his strike. Another chance came five minutes later, but substitute Kevin Holsgrove's deflected effort struck the base of the Hatter's post and ran away to safety... Within minutes, Still introduced sturdy forward Alex Wall to proceedings, who went on to miss a number of half-chances.

Unstoppable

As a draw looked likely, seven minutes from time, the comeback was completed. Benson passed to Wall. Gray's unselfish run opened up Halifax's defence and from twenty-five yards out, Wall thundered an unstoppable shot into the top corner of the net. The home crowd rose as one and I almost dropped our two-year-old amidst the wild celebrations. For the remaining moments, the shell-shocked Shaymen's challenge petered out and Gray almost notched a fifth in added time.

On conclusion, an appreciative Luton support filed out of Kenilworth Road, as I said goodbye to the father and son. "Looks like you picked a good one after all." I had indeed ... Maybe I won't watch my DVD for a while yet.

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CAPTAIN HAILS OPENING DAY WIN



Skipper Stephen McNulty praised the Town's hard work and determination in the opening day of the season win over the Cumbrians 10 days ago.

It was the first time that McNulty had captained the Hatters having been handed the armband in the summer and Hatters ran out 1-0 winners over Carlisle in a game against a side recently relegated from League One.

And the Town defender praised the hard working Hatters in what was a tough opening game of the season.

"We always knew it would be hard to come down here as they've just been relegated from League One," McNulty said. "We came here with a game plan and it worked well. We felt comfortable in the end and it was a great three points for us."

It was a much different start to the campaign of last season, as McNulty remembers losing out to Southport on the opening day. The defender believes that the first game can often be the most difficult.

"The first game of the season is always very tough. Sometimes it can be a coin toss and we worked hard to get the three points here today," said McNulty.

McNulty stood firm in the second half when the Blues were pressing for an equaliser in front of home supporters. In the end the skipper walked away from Brunton Park with his first clean sheet in the Football League under the Hatters.

Pleased

The Town skipper started the game alongside Luke Wilkinson, who made his competitive debut for the Hatters. McNulty admitted that he was pleased with how his defensive partner performed to help keep Carlisle at bay until the final whistle.

"We've got four good centre-backs now," said the Town captain. "We have three young lads, who I think will go on to play at a much higher level and hopefully this will be with Luton Town."

"Myself and Wilko were comfortable at the back. Other than Carlisle hitting the post they didn't really trouble us all game; we both dealt with everything that came at us."

Chance

The 30-year-old believes that it was tough on Fraser Franks to have not started at the back, but the defender is sure that his partner of last season will get a chance to prove himself in the Football League.

"Fraser will be disappointed to not have played a part today," said the centre-back. "That's how it goes sometimes, it's a long old season and I'm sure he will play his part. We have a lot of players challenging for positions."

The Town defender was honoured to have lead out his side as captain in the Hatters return to the Football League, and hopes that it will be the first game of many whilst wearing the armband.

"It's been a great honour for me, whether I've got the armband on or not. It's a great privilege for me in my career."

YESTERDAY'S PAGES

Club historian **ROGER WASH** looks back on a classic encounter between the Hatters and Shakers

Luton Town 4-0 Bury 7th October 1961

Following the Town's relegation from the top flight in 1960, new manager Sam Bartram set about dismantling the ageing squad he had inherited with the result that 1960/61 was seen as season of consolidation although the fans were hoping for something rather better than a 13th place finish.

The summer of 1961 saw only one major signing with centre-half Ron Cope moving from Manchester United to take a position which had not been adequately filled since Syd Owen retired two years before.

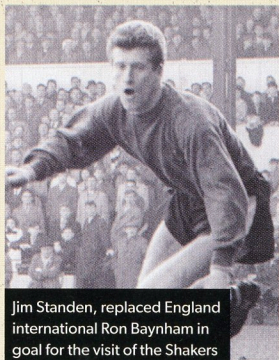
The new campaign started off with a bang when newly-relegated Preston were seen off 4-1 at Kenilworth Road. With three out of the first four games ending in victories for the Hatters it looked like the corner had been turned and the team were going to make a push for promotion. Hope soon turned to despair, though, when the next three games were lost before three wins on the spin pushed the Town back up the table. At least the team was being consistently inconsistent!

After a 4-1 defeat at Newcastle, Bartram wielded the axe and dropped England international goalkeeper Ron Baynam and inside-forward Alwyn McGuffie. Both players were missing for a midweek League Cup draw with Rotherham and youngster Mike Collins was preferred at centre-half for the injured Cope rather than the more experienced Terry Kelly.

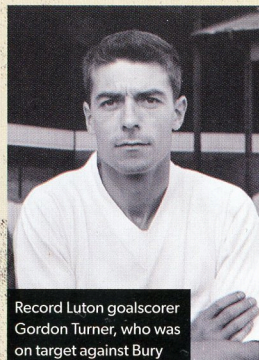
This led to immediate transfer requests being tabled by McGuffie and Kelly meaning it was not a happy ship at Kenilworth Road leading up to the visit of Bury on the following Saturday.

Threatening weather and general apathy at the inconsistent form of the team meant that the crowd dipped to 10,315, the lowest of the season, to see newly-promoted Bury, who were tucked away in mid-table.

The early chances fell to Bury which were blazed wide and on 11 minutes they had the ball in the net through Donald Watson but their joy was short-lived when a late flag for offside chalked out the effort.

Straight from the re-start the Town took the lead with a scrambled effort. Both Alec Ashworth and Gordon Turner took a swipe at the ball following a cross from Harry Walden with Turner successful on his second attempt.

Surprise

At no stage did the Town look like they were going to run away with the game and Bury had their fair share of the play so it came as a bit of a surprise when Ashworth doubled the Town's lead a minute from the interval. Latching on to a Walden pass he forced his way past Watson before thumping the ball home.

Two became three on 52 minutes when veteran goalscorer Turner followed a long goal kick from Jim Standen which bounced over the head of Bury centre-half Bob Stokoe before planting the ball in the net with his customary accuracy.

Play became aimless, there were a multitude of niggling fouls and unforced errors by both sides but with the Town three ahead the fans did not mind. Ashworth broke the boredom with a shot that hit the bar and eight minutes from time took a pass from Jim Fleming and scored with a shot that goalkeeper John Heath looked to have covered.

Sam Bartram agreed afterwards that it had not been a stellar performance by the Town but the opportunism of Ashworth and Turner was the difference between the two sides.

THE PROGRAMME

At the start of the season the Town had changed their programme for the first time since the war. Gone was the eight-page large sized issue full of adverts to be replaced by a smaller sized 12-page effort – also full of adverts. It cost 1d more as well!

The programme notes talked about the previous week's poor display at Newcastle when the home side scored from their first effort, which came from a mistake, and continued to net at regular intervals thereafter with the defence all over the place.

Bunty coaches were running trips to the Town's game at Brighton the following Saturday at a cost of 14/- (70p) with a departure time set at 7.45am.

AND IF YOU KNOW YOUR HISTORY...

WHEN FRENCH SHOOK THE SHAKERS

Club historian **ROGER WASH** looks back on the day that wing wizard **Graham French** had one of the games of his life

The Town had started the 1969/70 season as if they really meant business. Thirteen games undefeated was the proud boast at the start of the campaign as the Hatters attempted to put behind them the disappointment of narrowly failing to win promotion at the end of the previous campaign.

With new find Malcolm Macdonald banging in the goals and early season signing Chris Nicholl shoring up the defence the Town were points clear at the top until disaster struck over Christmas. A 1-0 defeat to fellow promotion hopefuls Orient on a mud heap at Brisbane Road on Boxing Day was understandable but a home reversal, the first for over 18 months, to strugglers Gillingham was not.

There then followed a terrible 5-1 hammering at Shrewsbury and when the Match of the Day cameras witnessed a 2-0 defeat to Plymouth at Kenilworth Road the knives were out. As the Town were slipping back to third spot after leading the table for so long the Kenilworth Road crowd were actually heard to boo a Luton player for the first time in several seasons.

The unlucky recipient of this treatment was Mike Keen as he prepared to come on as substitute – his crime was to think several seconds faster than some of his team-mates!

It was therefore a less than buoyant Luton squad that travelled to Bury on 24th January 1970 for the first meeting with the Shakers since the Town's days in Division Two (now the Championship) seven years before. Bury had been relegated from that division in 1969 and were finding life fairly tough in their new surroundings due mainly to their poor form on their travels. They did, however, possess the prolific George Jones and Jimmy Kerr in their forward line, were the divisions top scorers,

and had an impressive home record, winning their previous game at Gigg Lane 8-0.

In those days the players and officials travelled with the supporters on specially chartered trains and the trip to Bury was no exception.

For supporters, the chance to travel all over the country in relative comfort for 25/- (£1.25) return was too good an opportunity to turn down, and as usual the train was fully booked despite the poor form of the team.

Manager Alec Stock, in a bid to reverse the run of four straight defeats, decided to opt for safety first and drafted John Moore into the half-back line and dropped Keith Allen in favour of Keen. With Moore given the job of man-marking Shakers dangerman Kerr and Nicholl looking after Jones it was fairly obvious that the Town would happily settle for a point. The factor that Stock had not taken into account was the match-winning abilities of winger Graham French.

French had one of those afternoons when he displayed all the talents that should have brought many England caps had he not been such a loose cannon.

Time and time again he beat Bury full-back Roy Parnell to put over a stream of tantalising crosses and even had the cheek, on occasions, to wait for the defender to get up off the grass before beating him again!

Mercurial

It was from a French cross that Macdonald opened the scoring after only five minutes and with several defenders now covering the mercurial winger, Matt Tees was left in acres of space to increase the Town's lead on the half hour.

The reasons why French was unable to continue with his first half form into the second period was to be revealed: later and with the Town slackening off slightly, Bury reduced the deficit after 68 minutes through Ben Anderson.

Suitably stung, the Hatters restored their two-goal advantage four minutes later when Tees calmly lobbed Shakers goalkeeper John Forrester.

With Moore and Nicholl once again tightly shackling the Bury forwards, the Town goal did not come under any further serious pressure and at the final whistle it was realised that the promotion bandwagon was rolling again.

In his book *Never afraid to Miss*, Malcolm Macdonald recalled that particular outing to Bury:

"The one story that emphasises French's lifestyle came when we were playing away to Bury and all the players

had to report to Luton station early on Saturday morning. Alec Stock, superbly dressed as usual, carried out a roll call and we were one short. French was late.

"The British Rail authorities were keen to get the special train out of the station, but Alec would not budge until French arrived. He was very valuable member of the team.

As the manager paced up and down the platform, I saw Graham staggering towards us in the other direction. He was blind drunk and wanted to tell the world what a great all-night party he had been to.

Somehow we kept him away from Alec and convinced our left winger that sleep and not another vodka and tonic was his best pre-match build-up.

"He slept the entire journey and again in the dressing room before the match. We eventually woke him up at 2.30pm and told him to get changed.

"French was brilliant from the kick-off. He went past the Bury full-back as if he wasn't there and made two goals for Matt Tees and me before Bury knew what had hit them.

All we did was give the ball to French and wait for the cross. He obviously tired as the game went on but to this day I do not know whether Alec realised how ill French really was."

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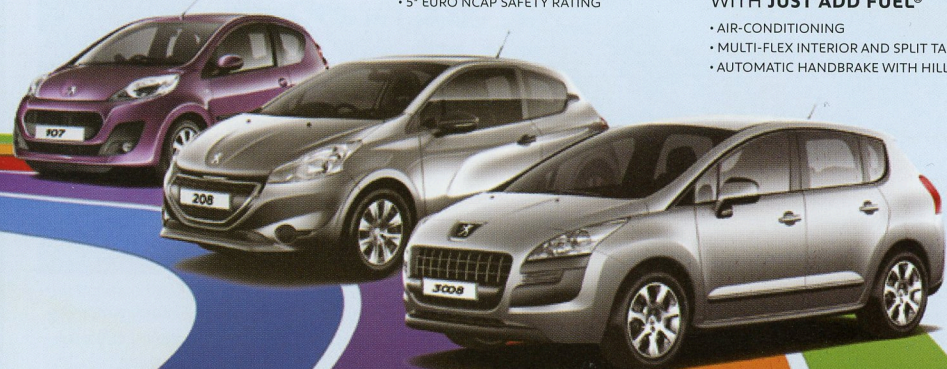
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ON THIS DAY

► THE RECORD

The Town's record on this day is a decent one, with eight victories from the 14 matches played on 19th August down the years. The Hatters have drawn three and lost just three, scoring 30 and conceding 17. It wasn't until 1950 that the Town first played on 19th August, whilst it has been eight years since they have been in action on this day – and that came in the Championship.

► THE LAST TIME

In 2006 the Town were in the second tier and eight years ago today they held Stoke City – now in the Premier League – to a 2-2 draw at Kenilworth Road. The Potters led thanks to Peter Sweeney's early goal but the Hatters fought back to lead through Leon Barnett's header and Richard Langley's penalty. However, the Potters pinched a point when Luke Chadwick nodded home from close range. Tony Pulis, who left Crystal Palace last week, was in charge of Stoke that afternoon.

► HORNETS BEATEN

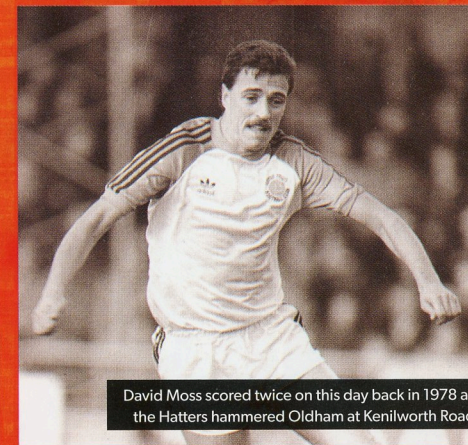
The Hatters were also in the second tier back in 1980 and 34 years ago the Town beat local rivals Watford at Kenilworth Road thanks to a sole goal from Steve White, who converted David Moss' cross before a crowd of 13,887. The Town would end the campaign in fifth, four places ahead of the Hornets.

► SIX OF THE BEST

Also in the second tier, and two years before the Town beat the Hornets, the Hatters handed Oldham Athletic a footballing lesson at Kenilworth Road in the opening game of the 1978/79 season with a 6-1 victory. Bob Hatton and David Moss both netted twice and Brian Stein and Lil Fuccillo were also on target. What was so significant about this game? Well the Town scored all six of their goals in the second half and were trailing 1-0 half-time. The impressive result proved to be a false dawn, however, as the Hatters ended the season in a disappointing 18th place, two points above the relegation zone.

► EIGHT-GOAL THRILLER

Oldham had also previously visited Kenilworth Road on this day back in 1953 – in a game that ended in an incredible 4-4 draw. Johnny Downie scored a hat-trick and Jim Pemberton scored a penalty for the Hatters that afternoon in front of 22,822. The scoreline is one of seven

occasions that the Hatters have drawn 4-4, the most recent coming in 2003 in a League Cup tie at Charlton Athletic.

► THE LAST VICTORY

While the Hatters have won eight of their 14 matches on this day, it has not been since 1995 that the Town have collected all three points on 19th August. The Town picked up all three points in a 1-0 victory at Southend in Division One (now Championship) thanks to Tony Thorpe's goal 14 minutes from time. The result was even more significant given the Town played the majority of the match with 10 men following Ceri Hughes' first-half red card.

► LEAGUE CUP WINS

The Town have won two out of two in both of their League Cup ties played on 19th August. In 1969, in a replay, the Hatters won 5-2 at Kenilworth Road over Peterborough thanks to goals from Terry Branston, Malcolm Macdonald, Keith Allen and two from Brian Lewis. A year later Macdonald netted the winner as the Hatters won 1-0 at Gillingham.

► THE BEST OF THE REST

Preston North End were beaten 4-1 at Kenilworth Road in 1961...North End were also beaten in Bedfordshire in 1972 thanks to Peter Anderson's goal...The Town played once in the top flight on this day, at Tottenham in 1989, going down 2-1 with Roy Wegerle scoring the Hatters' goal.

Luton Town Football Club's Academy Under-9s-14s age groups travelled to Nottingham Forest last Sunday, and all sides displayed some excellent football.

The Under-9s showed a very creative and positive approach to all their games, demonstrating a fantastic exuberance and enthusiasm towards their learning.

Since coming back from the Manchester United trip, the boys have closely bonded and the boys' parents have been fully supportive of the club's football philosophy. Our philosophy encourages young players to be expressive in possession, and one goal in particular highlighted this tremendously. Our young right-back, on receiving the ball from the goalkeeper, drove forward beating three players before slotting the ball into the bottom corner.

The Under-10s scored some wonderful goals too, showing a mixture of passing and dribbling football throughout the games. One goal in particular that stands out in the memory was a goal which came right from the goalkeeper. A sweeping one-touch move involving four of the Luton players saw the ball bounce from player to player cutting the Forest defence in to shreds before the striker dinked the ball with an incredible finishing over the on-rushing goalkeeper.

Our Under-11s showed a consistent high press up the pitch with players showing huge levels of energy to win the ball back early. Similarly to the younger age groups, the boys were encouraged to be creative when in possession. Socially, the boys were challenged with several players playing a year up, and these boys integrated well into the squad and put in some excellent performances.

Incredible

The Under-12s showed some of the best football of all during the day. Effortless, sweeping football was the order of the day, with some of the passing moves bringing gasps from the spectators and even the oppositions' staff. Some incredible goals were scored, the highlight of which was a patient passing move from the goalkeeper with two players selling their markers with no-touch turns, before ending with a crescendo of one-touch passing in the final third, which ended up with the ball being spun over the last defender for the forward running midfield player to smash home first time on the volley.

Meanwhile, the Under-13s played some lovely passing football building up possession patiently from the back and switching the play well until they had opportunities to attack. Coach James Townsend worked with the boys on their passing and receiving skills and the boys consistently put together moves involving a lot of the team and many passes. The game was a very competitive one with Nottingham Forest also putting together some good moves.

Last, but by no means least, our Under-14s had a tough time against a good Forest team. They showed some good football in spells of the game and it was pleasing to see some pre-Academy boys getting the opportunity to play with the Academy. This supports the club's philosophy of developing players through our tiered system and bringing them into the Academy periodically.

Overall it was a fantastic day with the Luton squads showing excellent football across the board, and that the future is bright for this football club.

Academy on tour

IT'S NOT EVERY DAY THAT LEAGUE 2 SIDES PARTICIPATE AGAINST THE LIKES OF JUVENTUS, BUT ONCE AGAIN THE HATTERS' ACADEMY TOOK ON THE BEST EUROPEAN CLUBS IN COMPETITION OVER THE SUMMER. HERE'S HOW THE TOWN UNDER-9S DID IN THE PT SPORTS CUP.

A selection of the Town's Under-9s were in great form to register a 22nd-place in a top European tournament in Germany in June.

The Hatters youngsters took on the likes of Italian giants Juventus and German Bundesliga outfit Hertha Berlin during the event which saw the Town finish in the top third of the 66 participating clubs in the PT Sports Cup.

The tournament saw teams from across mainland Europe assemble together to play in arguably the best outdoor 7v7 Under-10 tournament in Germany.



Staying in the town of Gutersloh, at the Holiday Inn Hotel, this was the ideal location and setting for the Hatters youngsters to prepare, rest and recover throughout the tour which started on Wednesday and finished on Sunday evening.

The tour enabled the young players to experience a

number of aspects throughout the journey, including the importance of preparation, game understanding, diet and nutrition, rest and sleep as well as game performance against other top clubs and squads.

In such tournaments all players are exposed and challenged whilst demonstrating their own individuality within the team. It provides a great insight for all and enables everyone to understand the qualities required to strive to the highest levels.

With a flight from Luton to Dortmund on Wednesday afternoon, the Town soon touched down and moved across the city before catching a train towards Bielefeld. This way of transport is easy and a great learning experience as the players get to see a host of attractions on route. Arriving in good time, the team were soon in the town of Gutersloh and checked in at base, where they would begin to rest for the evening. A team meeting

explaining the guidelines and understanding of what the coaching staff were looking for throughout the tour was provided before the players began to rest in their rooms.

Thursday saw the Town take part in the first planned tournament, at a local host club, TSV Essendissen, close the town of Herford, for 2003 born players. With the Hatters squad full of 2004 and several 2005 born players, this would provide a number of good opportunities for the players, as preparation continued in planning for the main event at the weekend. The tournament was a 16-team event, with four groups of four teams.

The Hatters finished third in their group on goal difference with six points, with final game's 3-0 defeat to SC Bielefeld proving quite costly. However, it was a great learning experience and the day was a tremendous learning curve for the players in many ways.

The squad received a lot of compliments from the hosts, especially the Town's performances and conduct. The day certainly provided a challenging experience in preparation for what was to come.

After a day off on Friday, Saturday was game day. It was early start, and after breakfast the Town were soon in action with their first game at 9.15am.

The group consisted of the following teams together with the outcomes:

- Game 1 v SC Verl White Won 4-0
- Game 2 v Fundacion Marcet Barcelona Won 1-0
- Game 3 v Eintracht Frankfurt Lost 0-3
- Game 4 v Dynamon Dresden Won 1-0

These good performances and results enabled the Town to finish second in the group behind Fundacion Marcet Barcelona on goal difference which was a great start and very pleasing for the coaching staff.

The top three in the group progress further to a higher level of group stage, which meant the Town found themselves in Group E of round two with the opportunity to progress to the last 16 of the competition.

This ended the Hatters' fixtures on day one and, following a massive opening ceremony, which takes place after the morning schedule and before the afternoon programme, and lunch, the Town could relax after a good first day.

Sunday morning was another early start and saw the Town play their remaining group fixtures:

All three games were excellent tests and provided great viewing for all. The Dresden match ended in a score draw after the Town conceded a late penalty. The Juventus fixture was a great game settled in the last minute after the Hatters had switched off for a brief moment, which you cannot do against such teams. Hertha Berlin was an entertaining fixture where the Town needed to win, but it was not too be.

The results put the Town in third position which meant they would end the tournament playing for 20-22 place against the following in a three-team league.

It was great for the Town to test themselves against such established clubs and certainly provided good learning aspects for the players.

The competition was great to witness and even within the squad places were competitive as players understood that it is not always equal playing time.

There comes a time within the development where tougher decisions are made and players understand that they too need to demonstrate certain requirements when it comes to playing certain teams. It's the competitive edge within the development phase. It can bring out different qualities within the competitive environment.

The final position of 22nd from 66 teams is a great achievement from a group of players who were mainly born from September 2004 onwards participating in a top tournament with players born from January 2004. Therefore, a difference of potentially nine months from our eldest player! That's not an excuse. Far from it. It just demonstrates how well the players performed.

The top eight places in the tournament included: Winners: Hamburg, Runners-up HJK Helsinki, third: Borussia Dortmund, fourth: Fortuna Dusseldorf.

The Town did progress further than some of Europe's finest clubs including Schalke 04 (26th place), Slavia Prague (29th), KV Mechelen (30th), Wolfsburg (31st), Brondby (32nd), Hansa Rostock (33rd) and Dynamo Dresden (34th) which demonstrates the level in attendance.

From the tournament, it was soon back on the German Train Network as the squad travelled back to Dortmund before catching the flight home in good time for arrival back at Luton Airport.

There was a number of presentations to the players highlighting a number of aspects on the tour, of which these players were presented with awards from the weekend. These included the trophy we received for third position on Thursday, a FC Barcelona Pennant, a Hertha Berlin Pennant and a programme from Juventus signed by their youth coach.

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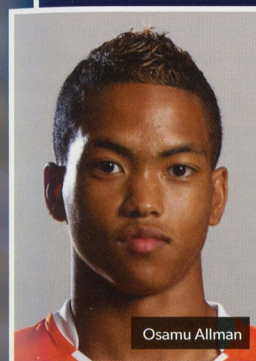
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TOWN 1-1 STEVENAGE

"On another day we could have won by three or four. Hitting the woodwork three times is unlucky and there's not a lot you can do as a coach when that happens.

"The issue with Stevenage's equaliser was frustrating because we'd highlighted their goalscorer as a target and we failed to deal with it when it mattered most.

"Overall, though, the positives certainly outweighed the negatives. Daril Ngwala had the best match of his scholarship so far, whilst Osamu Allman and Luke Trotman also gave very good accounts of themselves.

Buzzing

"Other than the silly free-kick it was an excellent performance and on another day we win 4-1 and we come off the pitch buzzing saying how good we were. A draw wasn't the end of the world but I trust the players will have learned from missing their chances at one end and defending at the other."

The Town Under-18s are next in action tomorrow at Ely Way when they take on Cambridge United in the Youth Alliance. Kick-off is at 11am. The Hatters then travel to Dagenham & Redbridge on Saturday with a 10.30am kick-off.

COMMUNITY INTEGRATION THROUGH SPORT (KITS)

The Club's Community Trust along with Active Luton have continued delivering football coaching using sport to engage, empower and improve the lives of disadvantaged young men in the Marsh Farm, Lewsey Farm and Farley Hill areas of town.

In May over 180 boys visited the stadium for the KiTS football tournament from the three areas of the town and played each other on the pitch in a fantastic tournament, which Lewsey won. The boys also attended various workshops in the Eric Morecombe suite from the Council, Police and Princes Trust as well as meeting former ex-offenders who spoke about their experiences with the boys. The integration project runs every Friday and boys aged 14-19 can simply turn up and join in.

ASIAN FOOTBALL INITIATIVE

Our Sport England/National Lottery-funded football initiative continued throughout the summer at Denbigh High School and Dallow Community Centre with a break for Ramadan. Sessions are held on Mondays at Denbigh and Dallow on Tuesday from 5pm and boys in Year 8 upwards can simply turn up and join in. The initiative has so far progressed a couple of boys into the Club's youth development academy system and also steered several boys into local grass root teams for the new season.

The Community Trust held two Get Into Football courses during the summer for young unemployed and disadvantaged young people from Luton between the ages of 14 and 18. The courses were held at both our Ely Way training ground and the main stadium and involved a number of team building activities culminating in the awarding of Level 1 coaching certificates with the help of the Bedfordshire Football Association. Over 35 young people took part in the two courses, and over half of the successful applicants have since volunteered on Trust activities - including the Hatters Cup youth football tournament and our KiTS integration project. Future courses are planned with our partners during the coming season.

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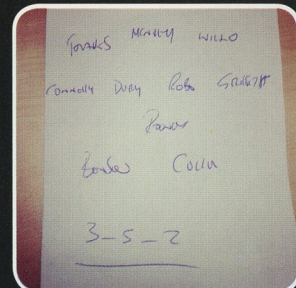

LEAGUE 2 NEWS IN BRIEF

The Hatters tasted defeat in their first home game of the Football League season, pushing the Town down the league table to 14th position.

The Town fought hard to try and continue their winning start to life in the Football League, but it was not enough and the Hatters failed to come away with any points against an AFC Wimbledon side who took their chances on the day. Matt Tubbs took the plaudits as his 41st minute strike made sure that all three points were snapped up by the Dons in the 1-0 win for the away side.

Meanwhile, a number of sides continued their winning start to the season as Morecambe, Wycombe, Southend, Burton and Cheltenham all picked up maximum points to make it two wins in two.

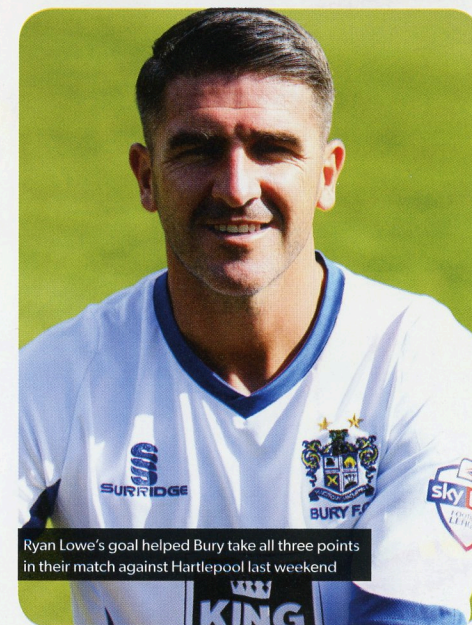
Winners

A tremendous second half comeback from Morecambe – after going two goals down – at home to Newport County meant that the Shrimps stand at the top of the league table on goal difference. Southend and Wycombe were both comfortable winners at home to Stevenage and Carlisle respectively.

Burton left it very late against John Still's former club Dagenham & Redbridge. Goals in the 84th and 88th minute meant that the Brewers went away from the Pirelli Stadium with three points to their name. Cheltenham scraped past Accrington Stanley in a 2-1 win for the home side.

Portsmouth came out winners at home to newly-promoted Cambridge United, despite having a man sent off towards the end of the first half. It finished 2-1 to Pompey and they climb to eighth in the league standings.

Shrewsbury Town remain unbeaten following the first two games of the season. The Blues saw off Tranmere Rovers following a tremendous late comeback, goals from Andy Mangan (90) and Micky Demetriou (94) pushed Shrewsbury up to sixth in the table.

Both Bury and Plymouth earned their first win of the new campaign last weekend. Bury won 2-0 away at Hartlepool, meaning that the Shakers moved to 11th

in the table and Hartlepool remain without a single point to their name.

Argyle ran out 3-0 comfortable winners at home to Exeter City in the Devon derby. Goals from Tyler Harvey, Reuben Reid and Curtis Nelson moved Plymouth into a top 10 position.

It was a weekend where the home sides prevailed, with nine of a possible 12 home teams picking up three points. Unfortunately it wasn't to be for the Town and John Still's side will be looking to change that in the home fixture tonight against Bury.

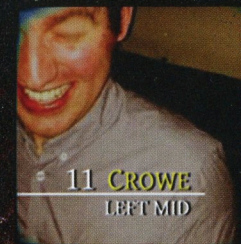

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AFC WIMBLEDON: THE COMEBACK GIG

Far away from the big venues of the Premier League, two stars of the 1980s took to the stage in the middle of our little local.

Saturday's Kenilworth Road Football League opener against AFC Wimbledon was a heavyweight clash for division four eh, fans of #thebanter? HAHAAHAHAHA. Alright, give over.

The occasion of our first home game back in the league and the match-up between the unusually proportioned Bayo Akinfenwa and our Steve McNulty is not the only reason the game had a gravitational pull of its own. Because we're a bit the same, us and them.

Both sets of fans, over a certain vintage, have Wembley memories and press cuttings of their heroes clutching silverware and inspirational perms. They have the dog-eared VHS and the programmes. Both had fallen on hard times and are heading towards a restoration of the natural order of things.

Intimidating

Equally both teams have a certain reputation in the game for footballing style that was born in the 80s: one an intimidating and direct Crazy Gang of Vinnie Jones and John Fashanus – the other a determinedly neat passing side with a magic synthetic carpet.

More than in previous meetings between us and them, Saturday's game had the whiff of a comeback gig for a cult 80s band, or at least a tribute act.

For their reformation AFC Wimbledon had taken the usual administrative step of undergoing a subtle renaming due to a corporate wrangle with the record company, which had seen slimy marketing men make off with bits of their identity and history.

The fashion in which the Dons scored what turned out to be the winner absolutely stank of Crazy Gang

nostalgia: a big hoof up-field was flicked on by the unfeasibly muscular AkinFashanu, while Tubbs had the composure to see off the attentions of an otherwise dominant McNulty to bury his strike past the helpless Mark Tyler.

Akinfenwa tried repeatedly to intimidate Luton players just as Fashanu had done in the time of tiny shorts and mullets: he stood threateningly over Tyler as his second half diving header failed to double the visitors' advantage and later swatted away the wafer thin ref who had the unenviable role of the ham in a McNulty/Bayo handbag sandwich.

Luton, for their part in the 80s nostalgia, had the better of the passing play for long periods with little glimpses of what is to come from Drury and Guttridge: who, in their own mini-comebacks, weren't quite as good as the original Drury and Guttridge yet, but it was still great to see them both performing for us again.

Flawless

Alex Wall will have cursed our return to real grass as Benson's lay-off found the only bobble on what is a carpet of such flawless green that it could have been mistaken for plastic, his subsequent shot almost taking out EasyJet flight 2161 to Amsterdam.

So we lost. As comeback gigs go, it was a bit like The Cure at Reading Festival. Competent, authentic stuff; but lacking that bit of magic.

It was nice to see John Still holding court on the Football League show when I got in after the game. His likeable but focused manner is the personification of what this club is becoming.

After hearing him hold his own talking music with the Roland Rat of Radio 6, Steve Lamacq on his programme recently, I reckon John's pretty much the coolest manager we've had in any era too.

Never too high, never too low is his favourite tune. It's the only one he knows.

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Football League clubs look to the future



At their owners' and executives' conference in Portugal over the summer - in which the Town were ratified as a member for the first time in five years - Football League clubs discussed a range of issues relating to their competition and their ongoing contribution to English football.

Clubs received a presentation from FA Chairman, Greg Dyke, about the findings of his recent commission on the future of the England team.

They also had the opportunity to question him about the Commission's proposals and debate the matter in detail during a two-hour session.

Concern

The Football League's Chief Executive, Shaun Harvey, said: "Greg Dyke provided a detailed and thought provoking presentation that helped clubs get a better understanding of the thinking behind his recent report. Whilst it's fair to say there is no appetite amongst clubs for the use of B teams or Strategic Loan Partnerships in the football pyramid, they did share his overriding concern about the development of young English footballers and supported a number of the report's other recommendations.

We will continue to work with the FA to help find solutions that will be supported across the whole game."

One area highlighted by the Commission was the lack of high quality artificial playing surfaces available in comparison to other major footballing nations.

After discussing the matter in their divisional meetings, Leagues 1 and 2 indicated their 'in principle' support for the use of artificial playing surfaces in their divisions.

They have asked The Football League to provide clubs with further analysis of the use of such pitches before formal consideration of the matter later in the year.

While not supporting the use of artificial pitches in their division, Championship clubs have indicated that they would not object to their use in Leagues 1 and 2 or in cup competitions.

At their AGM earlier this afternoon, clubs voted to extend regulations applying to club takeovers in the Championship to clubs in Leagues 1 and 2.

Going forward, any application for a change of control at clubs in Leagues 1 and 2 will require the purchasers of the club to provide 'Future Financial Information' demonstrating the club's ability to trade and evidence of the source and sufficiency of funding.

Harvey continued: "Having operated these rules in the Championship for the last four seasons it is logical to now extend their implementation throughout our competition. They will assist our efforts to ensure that anyone taking control of a Football League club has the necessary funds, from a legitimate source, to support its business plan."

Finally, the Board of The Football League discussed the recent newspaper articles regarding alleged corruption in the bidding process for the 2022 World Cup.

Football League Chairman, Greg Clarke, said: "The Board offered its support to the views expressed by the FA Chairman on the matter, namely that the process should be re-run if the allegations are ultimately proven to be true.

"In our view, it is essential that FIFA - as the ultimate guardian of the world game - complies with the very highest standards of corporate governance, otherwise it will lose the confidence of national associations, leagues and football fans across the world."

People talk to me about Luton all the time – we're one of those teams other supporters are always interested in.

Most football fans want to know how we're getting on after what happened to us and so I've loved the media interest in the Hatters since we earned promotion. It's all been positive – people seem genuinely pleased to have us back in the Football League and want us to do well.

I manage to find fellow Hatters in the woodwork of every broadcaster I work for. Even at the BBC in Salford, there's a Luton Town Supporters Club in Media City and I have friends from Sky Sports and talkSPORT who are all fans too. I've also brought plenty of colleagues from various sports broadcasters I've worked for to Kenilworth Road over the years.

Atmosphere

It's usually Tuesday night games like this one because we all work on Saturdays. They all come out commenting on the fantastic atmosphere and noise here and now all look out for the Hatters results.

Usually on a Saturday afternoon, you'll find me at a Championship ground reporting for BBC Final Score and 5 Live (yes I've covered Watford, and yes I've been asked to wash thoroughly before returning to Kenilworth Road!).

At the start of the season though, I put in a special request to my producer to go to Carlisle (I doubt he had many reporters doing that!) It was my first match officially reporting on Luton. Years ago I reported on the Town for my University radio station and did post-match and fan updates for talkSPORT, but never full match reports. I have to say, I'm not sure my nerves could take it again though!

I always get nervous before going on air, but reporting on your own team is a whole different kettle of fish. It's a doubly whammy of nerves!



A win on the road on the opening day in Luton's first match back in the Football League after a five-year absence, was special though and I felt privileged just to be there, let alone be working. I have to be neutral of course – but will admit to a sneaky fist pump when Mark Cullen scored!

Saturday's defeat to AFC Wimbledon is a healthy reminder though that this season won't be easy. But the belief around Kenilworth Road, from the board, to the backroom, the supporters and neutral fans across the country means it's a season full of expectation.
