Young striker James Alabi says manager James Beattie was the lure for him to come to Accrington Stanley.

Alabi, 19, signed from Stoke City on an initial one month loan spell and is keen to make an impact at the Store First Stadium.

Alabi has been given a starting berth in League Two and hopes both Stanley and himself benefit from his four-week spell.

"It's a good little club and the players and the management all welcomed me and have helped me settle in," said the forward.

"James Beattie was one of the main reasons why I came here because he can work with me and help me with my striking ability.

"I didn't know much about the club before I came but I know they are well known and have a lot of history and it's a good chance for me to see what I can do in League Two."

Alabi is a powerful forward who is willing to have a go. "My strengths are holding the ball up but my main strength is running in behind and beating defenders for pace and power.

"At the moment, it's about making sure I can do some good things for the team. " Alabi has had experience of League One and League Two in previous stints on loan.

"I was on loan at Scunthorpe when they got promoted from League Two last season and I was on loan there when they were in League One two seasons ago," said Alabi.

"It is hard for a player to come to a club and establish yourself, you have just got to make sure you are confident and have the right attitude."



Jordan Mustoe has plenty of League Two experience – and he wants to use his know-how to propel the Reds up the table.

The 23-year-old missed the opening day clash with Southend, signing a one-month deal with the Reds the week after.

The left back has played the last three games and is keen to establish himself at a club after having a number of loans spells around the lower leagues despite his young age.

"I have been at quite a few clubs in League Two and I know the league well and

know what to expect," said Mustoe, who lists Barnet, Morecambe, Carlisle, Bury and Wycombe on his CV as loan deals from his then parent club Wigan Athletic.

"I feel confident at this level and want to do well. It was really hard for the first game of the new season not having a club and being out of contract – it hurt.

"I don't think some players realise how hard it is when you haven't got a club so I am thrilled to be here. There is competition for the left back role but no one wants an easy ride and competition is good."

Mustoe had a friendly face in the Stanley dressing room as he already knew Adam Buxton from his Wigan days.

"It's always nice when you know someone, especially a character like Bucko, but I am the type of character that settles in easily anyway and I have had to deal with it quite a lot already in my career, walking into a new dressing room.

"They are a good group here at Accrington and I am sure we will do well this season. Results haven't gone our way so far but there is a long way to go and we just need that one result to kick on."



Introducing... Luton Town

John Still has forged quite a reputation within football particularly in non-league and the lower divisions of the Football League.

What he achieved in 10 years with Dagenham and Redbridge was nothing short of remarkable as he took them as high as League One on a shoe-string budget.

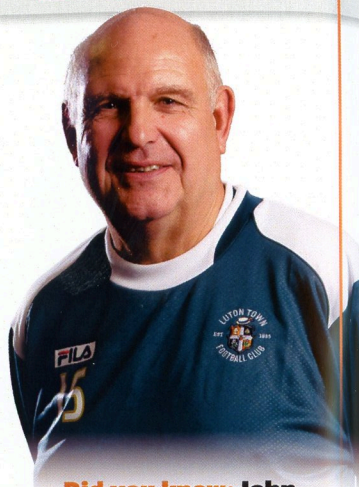
After his playing career was cut short by an unfortunate injury, Still started to manage non-league clubs.

His first jobs in the Football League were at Peterborough and Barnet, who he led them to play-offs on two occasions.

In 2004 he joined Dagenham and Redbridge

for a second time (he initially managed them in the early 1990s) and, in a seven year spell at Daggers, he would achieve the unthinkable by gaining promotion up to League Two and then League One. The Daggers struggled with a limited budget in the third tier but took relegation to the last day when a 5-0 defeat to Peterborough ensured a quick return to League Two.

On 26th February 2013 Still decided to bring an end to his time with Dagenham and take up a new challenge of masterminded Luton Town's return to the Football League. He achieved this with little fuss as the Hatters romped to last season's Conference Championship.



Did you know: John Still has the impressive record of winning the Football Conference on three occasions - Maidstone United, Dagenham and Redbridge and his Luton Town side won the league last season with 102 points and also scored over 100 goals in the process.

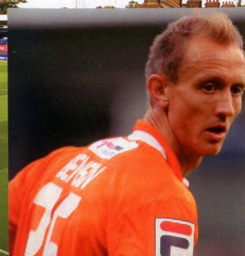
ONE TO WATCH Paul Benson Midfielder

Benson, 34, made his move to Luton permanent in the summer, joining after a successful loan spell during the second half of last season.

The striker started his career with Dagenham and Redbridge where he had the impressive record of 69 goals in 165 appearances.

He 2010 he would move onto Charlton Athletic, before moving to fellow League One side Swindon Town.

John Still then jumped in and reunited himself with the striker and during the back end of last season Benson netted a resounding 17 goals in 36 games to ensure promotion for the Hatters.



The Spine of the Team



Mark Tyler Goalkeeper

Former Peterborough United custodian Mark Tyler has worked tirelessly to become number one shot-stopper at Kenilworth Road.

Was an integral part of last season's Skril Premier championship-winning side and produced a string of impressive displays.

Tyler, 37, has more than 600 professional appearances to his name and will be integral to any success the Hatters may have this season.



Steve McNulty Defender

Man-mountain McNulty cuts an imposing figure on the football pitch and offers the Hatters resilience at the heart of the defence.

The captain started his career in the lower leagues making over 50 appearances for Burscough, Vauxhall Motors and Barrow before signing for Fleetwood Town in 2009.

Whilst at Highbury he made 110 appearances and scored nine goals as he helped the club to the title and promotion to League Two.



Jake Howells Midfielder

Despite still only being 23-years-old, Howells can very much be considered as Mr Luton Town.

Having started as a schoolboy with Watford he later went onto join the Hatters and hasn't looked back since.

The midfielder has gone onto make over 220 appearances for the Kenilworth Road club and has played for the club in League One, League Two and the Conference.

He also has international caps on his CV having appeared for England C and Wales Under 21's

Fans View

Hatters fan Steve Moore, 26, is Diverse FM's Luton Town Show presenter.

Lee Clarke caught up with him to discuss the departure of Andre Gray, his dream Luton player and what he expects from the Hatters this season.

It was quite a season for you last season. Did you fully expect to go up in such style?

Not at all. In fact, the appointment of John Still was all about moving away from trying to find a magic formula to win the league each season. Still was hired with a remit of rebuilding the playing side of the club in his way, over a period of time, so we would be better for it in the long term. As a result, there was certainly less pressure and expectation last year, so to play some of the football we did and to win the league, was almost ironic in a way.

How would you assess League Two so far, has it been exactly what you expected?

It is certainly a stronger league than the one we left five years ago. A lot of the teams that we were doing little more than just avoiding the drop have finally fallen through the trapdoor, replaced by ambitious sides from below. I still believe that any side capable of finishing in the Conference play-off spots would quite comfortably finish in the top half of League Two..

Do you think last season's emphatic title win will give you much needed momentum ahead of this season?

Well, there will certainly be some momentum carried over from that and we are certainly better off for having it. Keeping the main

nucleus of the squad is probably just as important though and given that, despite promotion, John Still was never going to waiver from building from the base up, that was something that we were always going to achieve.

How big of a loss was Andre Gray?

Sure, losing a player of his quality is always going to be a major blow and weaken the squad. However, if Mark Cullen never gets injured in the early part of last season, Andre Gray never gets back into the starting eleven and that question could well be 'How big of a loss is Mark Cullen?' As well as that, Gray's contract was up at the end of this season, so to get the money we did was excellent business by the club. There is also a prevailing feeling that even if Cullen is unable to step up, it will only be a matter of time before Still finds the next young hot-shot non-league striker to follow in the footsteps of the likes of Paul Benson, Craig Mackail-Smith and Dwight Gayle.

What would you say is the main strength of Luton Town Football Club?

I think it's most certainly the support. It has always been large in number, but the events of the last decade have, apart from some notable exceptions like the 2009 Johnston Paint Trophy Final, led to a negative



and pretty antagonistic atmosphere. What John Still has managed to do is help turn the crowd into a unified, positive force, creating the best elements of the 'We have been wronged' siege mentality this makes it much tougher for opposing players to face Luton. This is in stark contrast to the majority of the non-League years, where it was a more intimidating atmosphere for Luton players than it was the opposition.

Do you fully expect to be up there challenging for promotion again this season?

I'd like to think so. Certainly if we are out of the play-off shake up as early as February-March time I would be disappointed. However, talk of us being favourites for the division is hugely overblown and I would certainly be shocked if we achieved a second successive title.

Who are your key players?

Obviously I have already mentioned Mark Cullen who will be key in the sense that how successful he is may well directly translate to how successful we are. Captain Steve McNulty is an incredible reader of the game and he is also one of the best ball-playing defenders in the lower leagues.

If money were no object which player from the Football League would you like to see play for Luton?

Callum McManaman. The one thing lacking in this Luton squad is a really pacey wide player who can go past people on the ball and for me, he is one of the best at that outside the Premier League. As well as that, he is the kind of young player with potential that John Still loves to work with.

And finally... Where will you finish this season?

**SEIZE YOUR
CHANCE**



Defender Tom Aldred knows it's important for Stanley players to seize their opportunity at the Store First Stadium – as it's a club that will give them a chance.

There is a long production line of talent who have fallen down the leagues and then gone on to kick start their careers at Stanley.

Brett Ormerod, Gary Roberts, Ian Craney and Jimmy Ryan are names which spring to mind of players who have shone with the Reds and made their moves back into higher leagues, making money for Stanley in the process.

Aldred, 23, was Player of the Season last year and it is rumoured there are Championship and League One clubs who are keeping tabs on him.

And he admits that he is grateful to Stanley for giving him the chance – and others should make use of their opportunity as it can be a small step into falling out of football altogether.

"When you come to a place like Accrington you have got to get your head down and work your way into the team and then stay there," said Aldred, who began his career at Carlisle before a move to Watford.

"I started at Carlisle and I had good potential to kick on and do well but, when I look back, I should have stayed there and played games.

"Instead, I took my move to Watford and, looking back, I took it too early and it happened too fast for me.

"I found myself floating about

teams and as a centre half that's no good, you need to be playing regularly and I will always be grateful to Accrington as they gave me that opportunity to rebuild my career.

"What you have got to do when you get here is keep your place and impress and do well for yourself and the team.

"To be fair to the staff here they give people opportunities who haven't played many league games so it's up to the players to impress, get themselves into the team, keep their place and then who knows where it might take them?"

Since Aldred came into the team in March 2013, replacing the injured Mark Hughes at Rochdale, he hasn't missed a game and he wants to see more of the current crop of players make the most of their opportunities. Who knows what would have happened if Hughes hadn't got injured?

"I guess you never know but it was about me taking my chance and I want other players to do the same and do well," continued the centre half.

"Hopefully this season we will get a few players stepping out and maybe someone who you didn't expect to do well may surprise people and take their chance.

"That's what you need here

as there isn't the five or six marquee players that a lot of clubs have got, players have got to step out from nowhere and produce the goods."

This means the likes of Josh Windass, Michael Liddle, Piero Mingoia, Adam Buxton, James Gray, Will Hatfield, Kal Naismith, George Bowerman and Shay McCartan all have to step up to the plate.

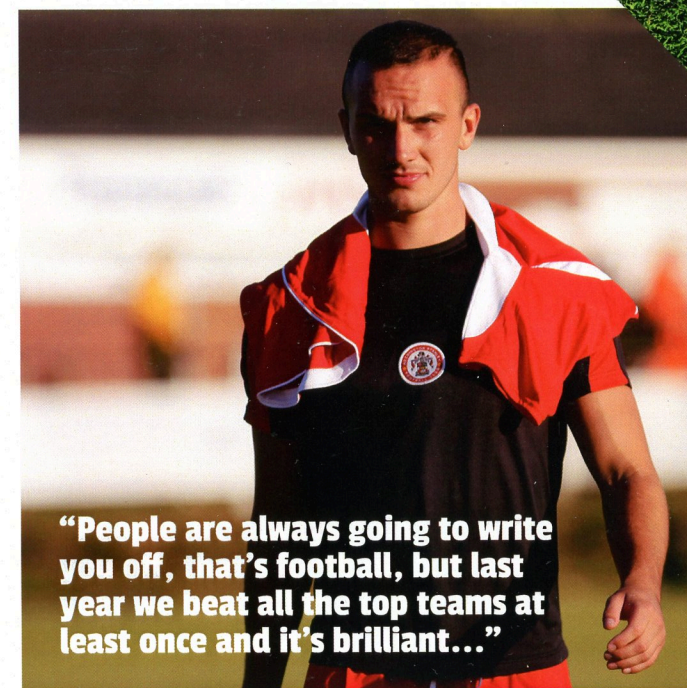
"I think we have lost a few key players from last season in Marcus Bettinelli, Kayode Odejayi and Peter Murphy. They were three big players but there are players who didn't feature last year as much as they will this year who can step into their shoes like Josh and George.

"Josh Windass had a good pre-season and it's up to him to put it into practise now as pre-season is one thing but the league is another.

"I do think Josh will be a very good player, it's just identifying his qualities he can use in League Two which will take him forward

"There is also George Bowerman and it's a big season for Michael Liddle as well because he didn't feature a lot last season because of injury but there are a lot of players who have got to get their heads down and impress."

Aldred admits there is a great togetherness between the players at Stanley as they battle against the odds every season.



"People are always going to write you off, that's football, but last year we beat all the top teams at least once and it's brilliant..."

"One of the good things about being here is team spirit is the best," said the Bolton-born player. "They are a great set of lads and that helps, especially at this club as you can either laugh or cry at some of the things that go on and the lads do tend to laugh about it! It helps us on and off the pitch to achieve better things.

"People are always going to write you off, that's football, but last year we beat all the top teams at least once and it's brilliant when we are the underdogs and we get the better of the teams with the bigger squads and wages.

"We definitely have got the squad here who are more

than capable of finishing well this year. It's a case of executing this on the pitch but I am sure we will do that and keep going forward."

Whether Aldred is still part of the Stanley furniture in the near future remains to be seen as he admits he dreams of playing at the highest possible level.

"I don't put any pressure on myself but I am ambitious and I want to kick on, keep playing well and I want to play higher as I believe I can.

"Hopefully in three or four years I will look back and say Accrington are the club that made me and I will always be extremely grateful to them for that."

'Accrington Stanley Columnist Lee Clarke shares with us his thoughts ahead of the 2014/15 season'

Clarkey's column

Accrington Stanley columnist Lee Clarke bemoans interfering chairman.

As I sit and write this, the dust is just settling on the shocking and I feel disgraceful news that with just two days before the beast that is the Premier League reared its head again, Tony Pulis had departed from his role as manager of Crystal Palace. Now managers come and go all the time you say, so why is this big news?

Well for starters the timing. Imagine preparing for two solid months and working your socks off to get everything right ahead of a clean slate of a campaign, and then just 48 hours before you are due to kick-off, leaving your role to someone else to take over. It just isn't right.

A chef wouldn't work for the furs preparing the meat and all the trimmings for a gourmet meal to then let someone else take the credit (or criticism). Crazy!

What also makes it big news is the fact that this is yet another case of a football chairman meddling with the first-team squad. How often do we hear that today?

When a chairman buys a football club someone should tell them the role of a manager's job. They manage

the team, select the players they want in their team and organise the coaches to train the players in the style they want them to play. It's hardly rocket science is it?

The chairman's role is to balance the books, strike negotiations with agents to sign the players which the manager wants and to really look neat and tidy in the stands on match days. I do appreciate that there is probably a lot more behind-the-scenes stuff that a chairman does, but you get my gist.

Now, I don't for one minute want anyone to suggest that I am saying chairman need to be robots, far from it. Some of the best chairman around show passion and desire and give a general damn about what their club is doing. Nothing wrong with that at all, but there is a line in the sand when it comes to the role of a chairman and the role of a manager and when crossed it can be lethal.

I can't for one minute imagine Darragh MacAnthony at Peterborough walking into a meeting with Darren Ferguson and saying 'We are signing this guy from x club and this guy from y club and if you don't like it you can go.' It simply wouldn't happen but at the same time he is a

chairman who wants the best for his club and from time to time probably does make positive suggestions for the manager to take on board, and also negative ones!

According to reports Palace chairman Steve Parish had refused to sign four major players that Pulis had recommended would take the club to the next level, but had told him that he was planning on bringing Wilfried Zaha back to the club. You won't be shocked to learn that Zaha wasn't on the manager's list of targets.

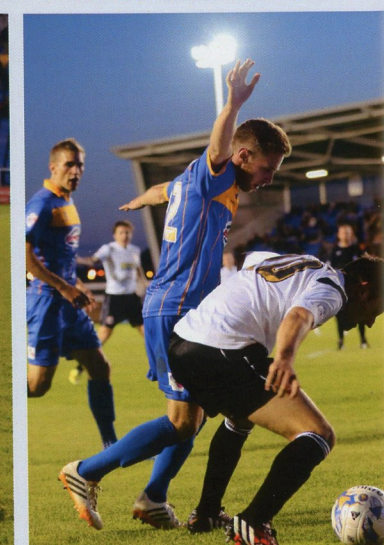
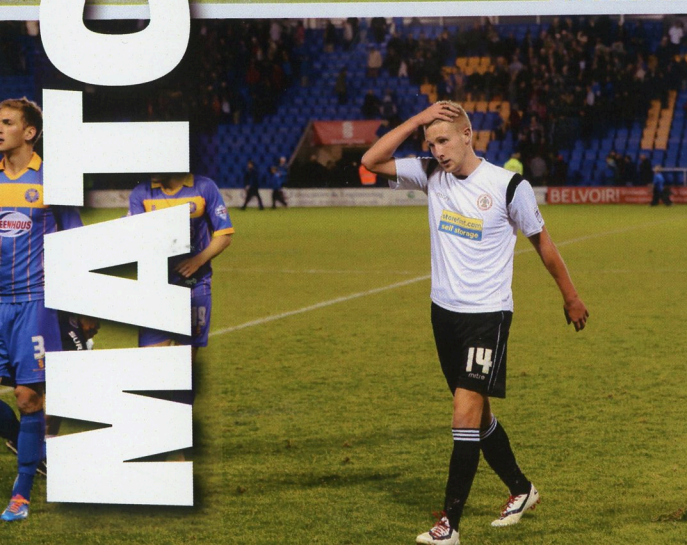
I mean think about the robust, dogged style that Pulis plays. Would the Manchester United youngster really have fit into that style? Pulis obviously didn't think so and that should have been all that mattered to close the door. Not an arrogant attitude that screams 'well this is my club!'

You have to feel that the Eagles who went from rock-bottom last year to a very credible 11th would have improved again this year under the former Stoke manager's guidance. I now fear that in one swift board meeting they have been plunged straight into a relegation dog-fight even before a ball as been kicked.

Pulis is a man with great integrity and I admire him for what he has done in this instance. It is nice to see a manager stand up to an owner and have the strength to walk out on a club so close to a season. He certainly will not be out of work for long and hopefully next time he can work for a boss who realises what a great manager they actually have.

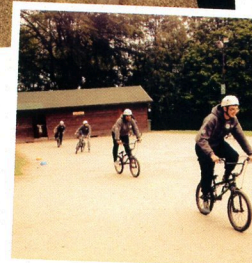

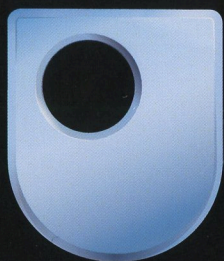

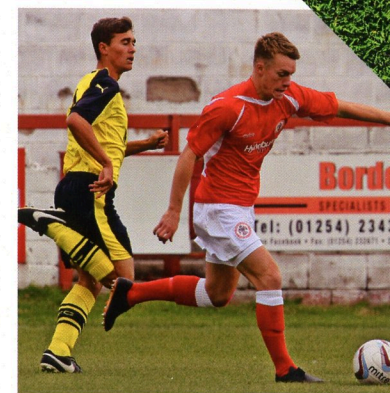
