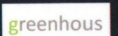

The players that have come in to cover injuries and suspensions have done well and it goes to show we have a squad of first team players rather than just a first team.

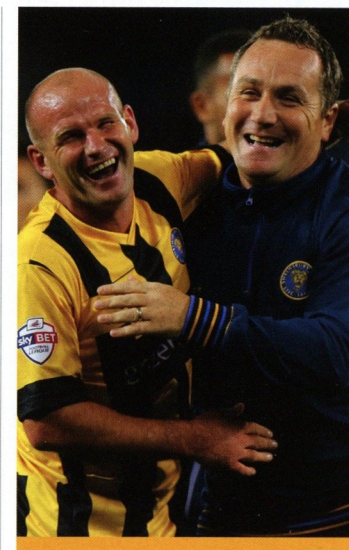

Town also donated prizes to the winners of a FIFA tournament for the juniors, arranged by Console Heaven.

Console Heaven is the ultimate gaming van, with their van being fully customised with full surround sound, air conditioning, HD TV's, Xbox's, Playstation's and Wii U's.

Stan Kay, from Console Heaven, said: "It's a new concept that has been brought over from the United States. It's the only one we know of in the Midlands and it's also the only one with outdoor facilities.

"It's good of the Club to give us this opportunity."

Town skipper Lawrence enjoyed getting involved: "The kids will remember it for a long time and it's good to see the smiles on their faces," he said.

Academy Physio Joins The Tour Of Britain

Wayne Peter, one of the Shrewsbury Town Academy physiotherapists, has become part of the Team Raleigh cycling team for their challenge of the Tour Of Britain.

Wayne will be swapping his football duties to take care and help out with the elite cyclists as they look to win one of the UK's biggest professional cycle races. He will be one of the team's physiotherapists but will also be chipping in with the water bottles, nutritional needs and catering for the cyclist before, during and after the race.

It's a great opportunity for Giggsey and one that he is really looking forward to: "I'm a big cycling fan so it's a great opportunity for me and I can't wait to get involved.

"The profile of cycling over the last few years has continued to increase especially with the likes of Wiggins, Cavendish and Froome, the sport has become massive.

"I'll be starting this weekend with them at the Newport Nocturne so I can meet everyone and get a feeling for the team.

"After that we'll travel over to Ipswich for the Elite Rider series to take part in that. It is a series which takes place all over the year and one of the riders, Yanto Barker, is currently leading that and can come out as overall winner.

"After that the Tour of Britain starts next Sunday in Liverpool and runs over seven days finally finishing in London.

"Stage 3 actually starts in Newtown which is my hometown so it will be nice to be part of the Tour there."

After seeing that the Tour of Britain was passing through Newtown, Wayne asked if he could have a look around on the day

and see how things worked. In the end his cheeky email has landed him a place on the Team Raleigh staff: "As the Tour was coming through Newtown I sent off a speculative email to a few of the teams to see if I could get into the paddock and see how things work on the physio side during an elite road race.

"I was very surprised to get an email back saying get in touch and then to be asked to be involved with Team Raleigh."

Working as a physio for the Shrewsbury Town Academy and with Welsh Premier side Newtown, Wayne is used to dealing with football injuries. The demands of cycling will be a little different with different problems and preparations needed: "Cycling focuses a bit more on the lower body and is more about the repetitive nature of the cycling technique, whereas in football you have a lot more injuries that you can pick up.

"You don't tend to see too many injuries from cycling other than the ones that people pick up when they come off and crash.

"I know I'm there if that happens but it will be more about general maintenance of the cyclists through the race, through the evenings and pre-race massage before they go out."

He has been part of the Academy staff for a while and worked with the likes of Connor Goldson, Ryan Woods and Jon Taylor. It is something he enjoys and is thankful for the Club for allowing him to join the Tour: "I'm honoured to be part of the Shrewsbury Town medical team and I've got to thank the club for giving me the chance.



"They've believed in me and given me the opportunity and if wasn't for the likes of Skitty, Pellow, Steve Reece and everyone else I wouldn't be in this position to help out Team Raleigh.

"They've also given me the opportunity to go on the tour as I will have to miss a few matches."

Morecambe.

Mark Yates' side have now won three out of their four games to stay within two points of top spot Cheltenham came back from 2-0 down at half-time to maintain their unbeaten league start with a 3-2 victory over Tranmere Rovers on Saturday.

It has been a decent start for Cheltenham with wins over Bury and Accrington Stanley, along with a goalless draw against Carlisle.

However, they endured a difficult opening 45 minutes at Prenton Park as Eliot Richards and Marc Laird gave the hosts a two-goal cushion at the break.

But Tranmere had picked up just four points from their opening three games and they looked unconvincing as they lost their advantage in the second half.

Three goals in the space of just six minutes from Matt Richards, Koby Arthur and Jordan Wynter sealed victory for the visitors.

Morecambe are the only team still with a 100 per cent record in the Football League this term.

Paul Mullin's brace at Cambridge gave Morecambe their fourth straight win and put them top of League Two.

Portsmouth are second in League Two after Craig Westcarr's goal ten minutes from time helped them see off winless Oxford United while Burton Albion's winning start ended at Newport County.

Michael Appleton will not have enjoyed losing points to his former club as his poor start continues at the Kassam.

Oxford are without a point in four league matches.

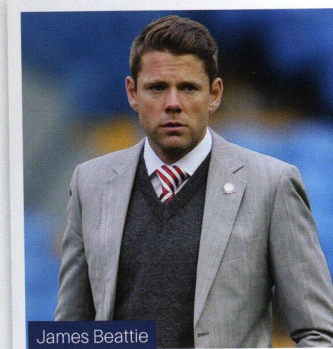
Burton remain unbeaten following a 1-1 draw at Newport.

Chris Zebroski's first-half opener looked to have condemned the visitors to defeat but John Mousinho levelled six minutes after the break to keep Burton unbeaten.

The draw ensures Newport are off the mark with their first point of the season while Accrington were able to do the same against Luton Town.

However, James Beattie will likely wonder whether his side could have taken maximum points, having led 2-0 after 16 minutes through James Gray and Luke Joyce.

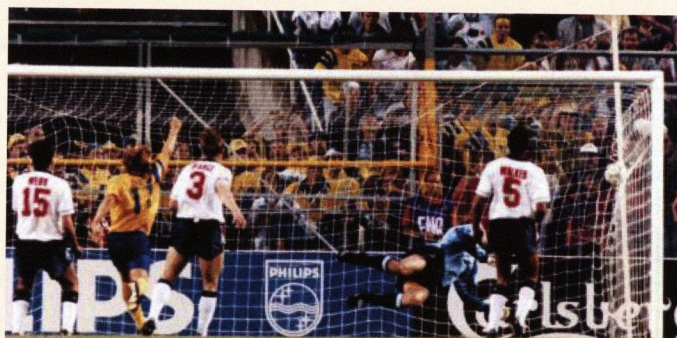

On the 18th December 1992, Shrewsbury centre back Connor Goldson was born. Having come through the ranks at Shrews, since 2010 he has made 63 league appearances for the club, with two goals to his name.

Last season, he spent some time on loan at Cheltenham Town, but returned due to an injury crisis. Following Liam Lawrence's absence against Blackpool in the Capital One Cup this year, the 21-year old took the captain's armband as Town overcame the Championship outfit 1-0. Talk of the Town looks at other notable events which happened during the year of 1992.

In football, England had a horrendous time at Euro 1992, finishing bottom of their group on goals scored following goalless draws with France

and Denmark, before losing 2-1 to Sweden. Sweden topped the group with Denmark - who would later go on to remarkably win the tournament - finishing second. Domestically, the 1991/92 First Division season ended with Leeds United winning the league by four points, with Manchester United having to settle for second place. Today's opponents Luton Town were relegated that season, along with Notts County and West Ham United.

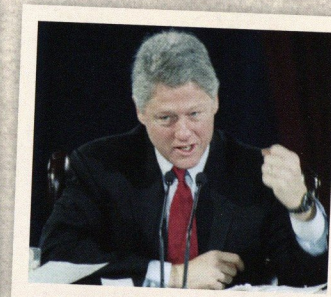
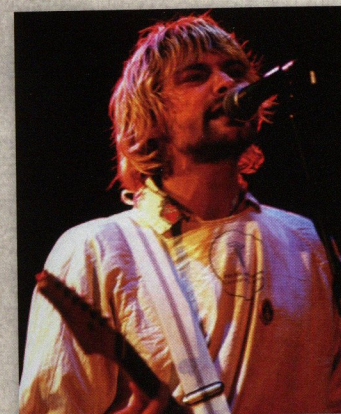
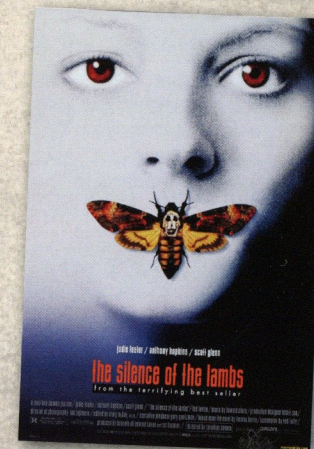
That would be the last time winning the First Division meant winning the best league in England, as the Premier League came into

force for the 1992/93 year. Teddy Sheringham scored the first ever Premier League goal on Sky Sports as Nottingham Forest beat Liverpool 1-0 at The City Ground in August, as the soon to be global brand started off. A few months earlier, Liverpool had won the FA Cup after defeating Sunderland 2-0 thanks to goals from Michael Thomas and Ian Rush. In Europe, Barcelona won their first European Cup after beating Sampdoria 1-0 at Wembley - and no less than four future Premier League managers played that day, with Michael Laudrup, Ronald Koeman, Gianluca Vialli, and Roberto Mancini featuring. Current Bayern Munich boss Pep Guardiola also played.

In music, Nirvana played their last ever gig in the UK when they headlined Reading Festival in August. Frontman Kurt Cobain came onto the stage being pushed in a wheelchair, making light of reports of his mental

health in the press. 1992 also saw the Freddie Mercury Tribute concert at Wembley Stadium, where the remaining members of Queen played alongside huge names in music such as Elton John, David Bowie and Robert Plant as they raised money for the Mercury Phoenix Trust AIDS charity organisation. 90's favourites Ebenezer Goode by The Shamen and Snap!'s Rhythm is a Dancer both hit Number One, while Whitney Houston's cover of 'I Will Always Love You' was the only single that sold over a million records in the UK.

Elsewhere, The Silence of the Lambs won five Oscars including Best Picture, Director, Actor and Actress, while South Africans voted in favour of political reforms which brought an end to apartheid, Bill Clinton was elected as US President, the first text message was sent in the UK over Vodafone's network, and children's television star Barney made his TV debut.

andy mangan

Andy Mangan, 27, has started the season well with three goals and four solid performances. The 27 year old is determined to continue the good form to thank manager Micky Mellon for bringing him here.

The Liverpoolian is starting to feel back at home playing football after a tough 12 months at Forest Green. He is very experienced in the lower leagues and is confident that Town have the ability to get promoted up to League one.

The striker who is in great form is happy with the great start and hopes to kick on this season to put as many points on the board as they can.

He has quickly settled at the Greenhous Meadow and just wants to keep up the hard work to gain a first team place.

Mangan said: "It feels like home - I have nothing but thanks and respect to the gaffer for bringing me here. He has given me another opportunity and I hope to repay him with good performances and goals."

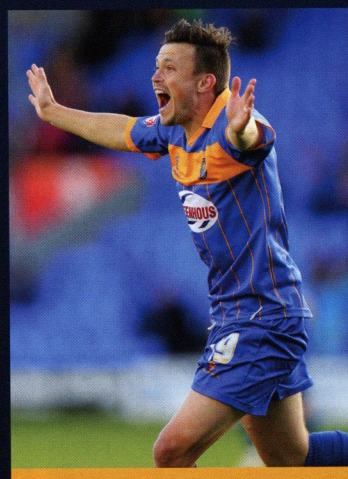
The pair knew each other already from their time at Fleetwood Town and Mangan believes this has helped him to settle into life as a Shrewsbury Town player. By scoring early goals he will soon become a favourite with the fans. This will also help him to settle into the club.

Mangan has high hopes for the season and is eager to continue to fight for promotion. After going down to 10 men away to Northampton early on it shows that the squad will fight for each other to gain points and that they are willing to work hard for one another.

Working together as a unit will be a huge influence in the success of the

club this year. As a new squad it is important to gel together to grind out results.

The former Fleetwood striker said: "The squad and the whole unit are fighting for promotion to League one.



"It feels like home - I have nothing but thanks and respect to the gaffer for bringing me here."

We have a fantastic squad with great quality and the team spirit is very high which is vital. The manager and his coaching staff are pushing us harder and harder in training. But we will still need that little bit of luck at some point in the season that every teams needs to get promotion.

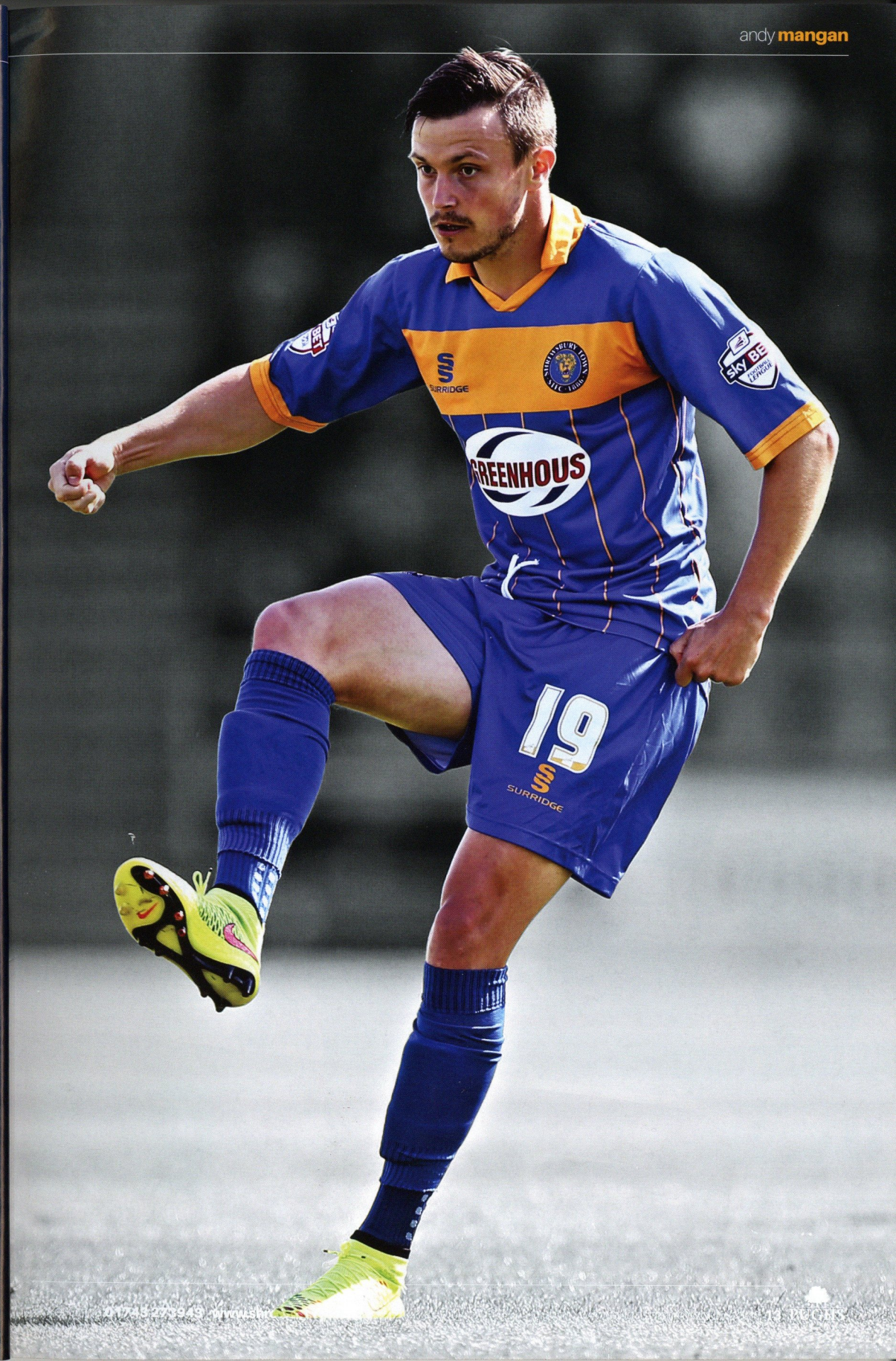
The home form will be key this season. We need to make the home ground a fortress. We want teams to be afraid to come here because they will be scared of getting a good battering. Getting 16/17 home wins a season should get enough points on the board to help with the promotion push." Mangan views come after the 4-0 victory against Accrington Stanley in which the forward bagged two goals.

"The confident within the squad is extremely high and beating Championship side Blackpool has helped massively. We are working hard as a unit and will continue to do so."

The training sessions have been demanding and with the new squad being built over the summer, Mellon has added to the squad with quality experienced players.

There are a lot of changes that the gaffer can go with for forward options and it is important we all stay focussed on getting as many points as possible."

It is important for the squad to now stay consistent and not get carried away with the flying start they have had - there is still a lot of hard work to do. ■

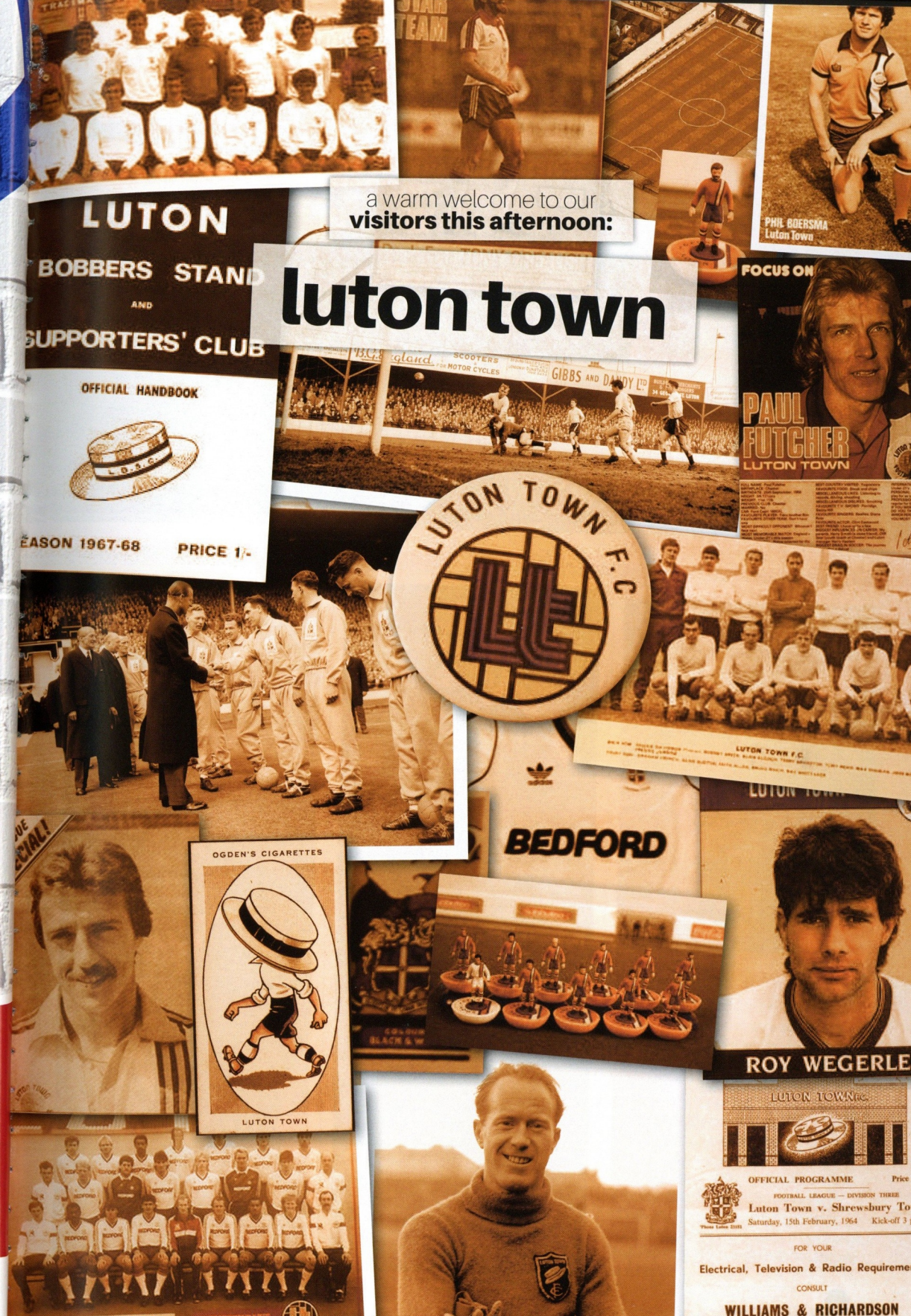

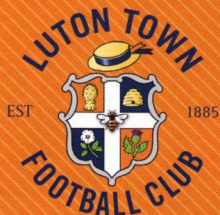

■ Luton Town have called Kenilworth Road home for over 100 years. They started their footballing life at the Excelsior Ground and then a short spell at Dunstable Road before the move to Kenilworth in 1905.

■ One of the club's most famous days was a 3-2 League Cup Final victory at Wembley against Arsenal. The Hatters were trailing 2-1 before a late equaliser and an even later winner by club legend Brian Stein.

■ Comedian Eric Morecambe is one of the club's famous fans. He is greatly appreciated at the club where he has his own suite. Nick Owen, another famous face is the chairman of the club.

■ Luton Town's largest attendance was a Sixth Round FA Cup where a crowd of 30,069 squeezed into the ground to see the Hatters play their FA Cup replay against Blackpool where the Hatters defeated their Lancashire rivals.

April 2012 - February 2013

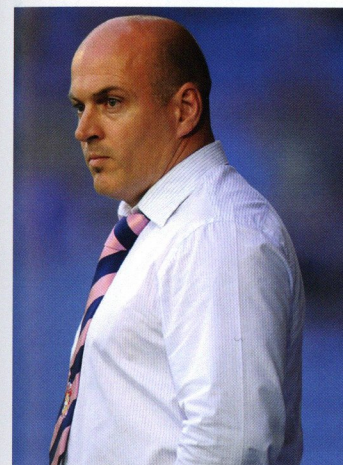
The early reign of former Shrewsbury Town manager Paul Buckle looked positive. A Play off final defeat by York was probably the low point and high point. The following season saw the Hatters drop too many points and with promotion looking unlikely, the club turned to John Still in early 2013.



john still

February 2013 - Present

The Dagenham and Redbridge legend joined the Hatters as their 2012/13 campaign began to fall apart in the Conference. Still went on a rebuilding process that summer and finally managed to gain promotion last season as they topped the Conference to re-join the Football League.



gary brabin

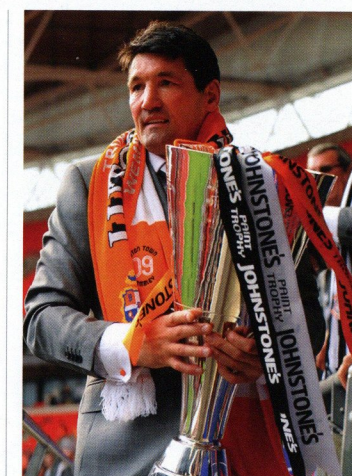
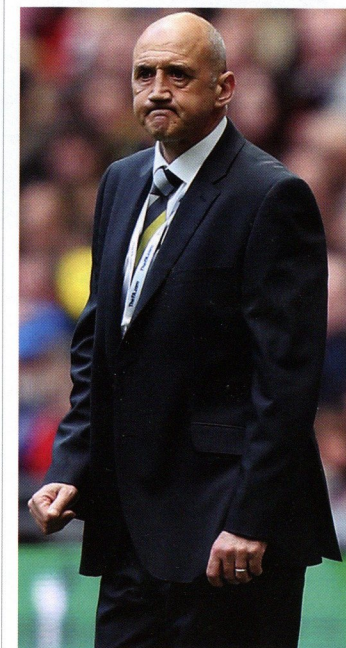
March 2011 - March 2012

Gary Brabin took over the club following Richard Money's departure but it was another reign that promised more than it delivered at a club that expects more than battling for play off places in the Conference. Brabin's highlight came in his final days as boss as he signed the highly rated Andre Gray who would later go on to have the team built around him. The low light was the penalty shootout defeat by AFC Wimbledon in the play off final at the Etihad Stadium. So close yet so far.

richard money

October 2009 - March 2011

Richard Money was placed in charge of Luton a little after a month after Mick Harford had left the beleaguered, newly relegated Hatters. Money managed to gain over a 50% win ratio at a club and lasted almost two and a half years.



mick harford

Mick Harford's affiliation with Luton Town started as a player and continued as a manager despite having to battle a 30-point deduction in League Two. Needless to say, that mountain was far too high for the Hatters to climb and just after a little under two months in charge left the club. Harford's highlight in charge of the club was the Football League Trophy victory over Scunthorpe in 2009. To get the already doomed squad to perform on such a big stage is a day the club's fans will not forget in a hurry.

Today we welcome to Greenhous Meadow, Luton Town.



John Stills men gained promotion for the Hatters last season after an impressive season finishing as champions.

This is their first time back in the football league in five years. The Hatters have had a mixed time in recent times, going into administration which meant they had to play in the lower leagues but now a stable owner and their experience manager looks like guiding the club back to the top.

Luton have brought in seven players this summer, whilst letting three players leave. Coming into Stanley are; Lee Angol, Paul Benson who was at the club last season, Paul Connolly and Andy Drury from Crawley, Ross Lafayette from Welling, Ricky Miller from Boston and Luke Rooney and Luke Wilkinson from Maidstone and Dagenham & Redbridge respectively. Departing the club; last seasons top goal scorer Andre Gray to Brentford and Ronnie Henry to Stevenage.

The Hatters faithful will be hoping for a good run this season even though

they have just been promoted into the football league. The project is strong down in Hertfordshire and nothing but Play Offs will be wanted by everything associated with the club

Luton have had a decent start to life back in the football league, winning their opening game away at Carlisle, before a defeat at home to Wimbledon. Their last two matches ended up in draws against Bury and Accrington Stanley. The Hatters lost to Swindon in the Capital One cup first round.



players to watch: luton town



Mark Tyler is a hugely experienced goalkeeper who signed a one-year contract extension in May 2013. On the verge of 700 senior appearances, Tyler was one of the Hatters' first signings in their first season in the Conference in the summer of 2009, and - before the beginning of the 2013/14 season - the stopper has since gone on to make 184 appearances between the sticks, keeping 72 clean sheets. Prior to his move to Kenilworth Road Mark had made almost 400 appearances whilst with Peterborough United. The 2013/14 season was Tyler's fifth at Kenilworth Road and he crowned it by playing every match in the 46-game title-winning campaign. He kept clean sheets in exactly half of those games and has made 230 appearances in total for the Hatters.



Paul Benson is an experienced striker who signed on a season-long loan from League 1 side Swindon Town in late August 2013. Benson started out with Essex Intermediate League side White Ensign but shot to prominence with Dagenham & Redbridge under John Still, helping the Daggers to win two promotions, scoring over 75 goals. He signed for Charlton Athletic in August 2010 but after a season-and-a-half - in which he scored 10 league goals - the striker moved to Swindon Town in January 2012 and helped the Robins win the League 2 title that season. Having fallen down the pecking order at the County Ground, he was loaned to Portsmouth and Cheltenham last season before he was reunited with Still at Kenilworth.



Luke Guttridge is an influential and experienced central midfielder with over 400 senior appearances to his name who signed for the Hatters in August 2013 on a two-year contract. He has twice won promotion whilst with Southend, and also helped Northampton reach the League 2 play-off final last season. Luke enjoyed a fine debut season with the Hatters, scoring an impressive 13 goals in 33 matches before a foot injury curtailed his season in March.



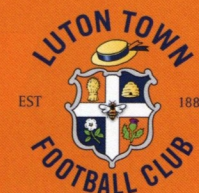
Kal Naismith, a Scottish winger or forward who first came to the Store First Stadium in pre-season with a view to a permanent move from Rangers. He weighed in with some good performances and a couple of goals but had to return north of the border. Just hours before Stanley's game with Portsmouth Naismith returned on a two-year-deal having secured his release from Ibrox and he made his debut against Pompey.

curtis
davies

Curtis Davies only played for Luton Town between 2003 and 2005 but his impression is a lasting one as he the pride of seeing him perform at the top level in the Premier League week in, week out runs thick. Davies played a starring role in Luton's promotion to the Championship and was awarded League One Player of the Year. He was sold in 2005 for a reported £3 million to West Brom.



steve
howard

Striker Steve Howard played for Luton Town between 2001 and 2006 and it is safe to say it was a very fruitful spell as he hit almost 100 league goals in a little over 200 league games to make him third in the all time top scorers list at the club. It wasn't only his goals that made him a club legend. Howard was deployed as an emergency centre back for a spell in the 2005/6 season and still managed 15 goals at Championship level.



mick
harford

Mick Harford had a ratio of almost one in three for Luton Town during his first five seasons at the Bedfordshire club between 1984 and 1989. Harford rejoined the club for a couple of temporary spells. His affiliation with the club also had him manage the club for a season in 2008/9 as he took on the impossible job of trying to keep the Hatters in the football league with a 30 point deduction.

There was one highlight of that season and that was leading the club to the Football League Trophy at Wembley as 40,000 Hatters fans followed the club to the national stadium as they won 3-2 against Scunthorpe.



brian
stein

Brian Stein was signed to Luton Town by David Pleat in 1977 and stayed up until 1988 before a further spell in 1991. The South African striker scored 130 goals over all in 427 appearances for the Hatters including two in the League Cup final win over Arsenal and immediately having legend bestowed upon him. Stein struck up a wonderful partnership with Paul Walsh before the now Sky Sports pundit moved to Liverpool in 1984.



bruce
rioch

Bruce Rioch turned a Luton Town professional in 1964 with the midfielder staying on until 1969 where he moved to Aston Villa. He scored 24 goals from midfield in the Fourth Division as the Hatters won the title in 1968. Luton gave Rioch the starting point to travel all over the world with his football. Highlights include managing Arsenal but he also had a spell playing and managing in Seattle. Other clubs that Rioch managed include Aalborg and Odens.



john
hartson

Welsh striker John Hartson only made 54 appearances for the Hatters but is seen as a product of their famous youth system. Hartson scored 11 goals between 1992 and 1995 in the league before moving to Arsenal for £2.5 million. The target man also played for West Ham, Wimbledon, Coventry, Celtic and West Brom. He also managed to make over 50 appearances for Wales.

John Still is glad to be back in the Football League as Luton Town manager - and believes his squad have enough spirit for a successful 2014/15 season.

Following their promotion from the Football Conference as champions last season, the Hatters have picked up five points from their opening four League Two matches ahead of today's game.

And Still is just pleased to see the club back where he believes they belong.

"It's good to be back," said Still.

"I've achieved it (promotion) with three different clubs, three different groups of players.

"Other than getting into the Premier League, taking a club into the Football League is, I think, the biggest thing you can do.

"It's incredible for the players and the supporters, and obviously for the club itself for different reasons.

"Luton will feel they came out of the Football League unfairly, so in a way we feel we've put right the wrong."

Luton started the 2014/15 campaign with a 1-0 win at Carlisle United, who were relegated from League One last season.

The Hatters were knocked out of the Capital One Cup at home to Swindon Town and lost their second league game against AFC Wimbledon, but draws with Bury and away to Accrington have given confidence back to the squad.

Still's side had to come back from two goals behind to pick up a point at Stanley in their last game.

"We've started okay and had a reasonably tough round of games so far - away to Carlisle and away to Accrington," said Still.



"Other than getting into the Premier League, taking a club into the Football League is, I think, the biggest thing you can do. It's incredible for the players and the supporters."

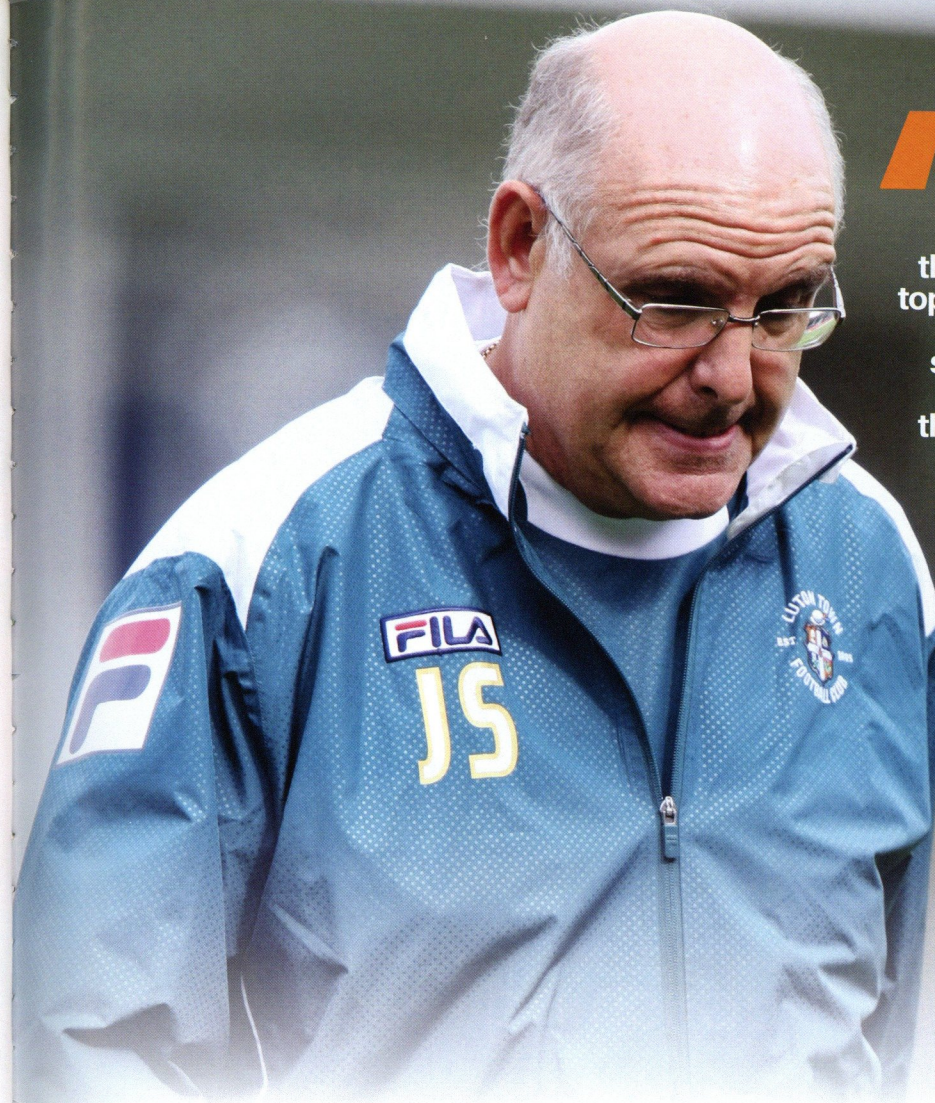
"We've played okay but not great after a tough start, but we never started on fire last season either, so I'm reasonably comfortable with how we've started.

"We know we've got spirit, we know we've got determination and we've got a collective togetherness.

"We've worked hard on those parts of our team so we know they're there.

"We know we have quality, but I think that, in the first half against Accrington, we never played to the standard that we feel we're capable of.

"It was certainly a good fight back when we did come back, though. The disappointment was that we were behind by two goals and we felt that shouldn't have been the case.

I think it's a club that will be in that top group of teams at the end of the season, because they've shown that with the start they've had.

"We feel that we are strong enough to compete wherever we go, and we always feel that we have something we can call upon if we need it, and we needed that at Accrington.

"We needed to find that little bit extra, and we did that. We've always been quite happy with that side of our game.

"Now we've got Shrewsbury away and then Bury, who will be there or thereabouts at the end of the season."

Still sees Shrewsbury as one of the sides who will be pushing for promotion this season and knows one or two of the Town players very well, particularly former Hatters forward Andy Mangan, who scored the winner in the Capital One Cup win at Leicester.

"Shrewsbury have made a strong start and brought in some good players," said Still.

"I think it's a club that will be in that top group of teams at the end of the season, because they've shown that with the start they've had.

"We know Andy Mangan well although we appreciate he pulled his hamstring at Leicester.

"He spent a bit of time with us last year and he's been around the lower levels of English football for a while.

"With (James) Collins and (Jean-Louis) Akpa Akpro up front as well, Shrewsbury have got players up front to cause teams problems."

The 64-year-old has not come across Town manager Micky Mellon before,

but Still believes Micky is capable of taking Shrewsbury forward after the work he did in charge at Fleetwood Town.

"Micky did a fantastic job at Fleetwood and he's showing what he's all about once again," said Still.

"People I know speak of him well so I know for certain that he's going to have his team ready to play.

"We hassled Shrewsbury to get into the play-offs when I was at Dagenham and they beat us at our place. That put them in the play-offs as opposed to us.

"It should be a good game. My nephew lives in Shrewsbury so he'll probably be at the game!"

Perhaps the most high profile man to have donned both shirts is none other than David Pleat.

Having signed from Nottingham Forest in 1964, Pleat spend three years at Luton, making 70 league appearances and scoring nine goals from outside left. In 1967, he joined Shrewsbury but only stayed for one season before being sold to Exeter. In 1978 he would return to Kenilworth Road as manager, a position which he held for eight years. During that time, they were promoted to the old First Division and made the 1985 FA Cup semi-finals, before Pleat left for Tottenham Hotspur in 1986.

If there was ever a case of 'one's man rubbish is another's treasure', it was with Andre Gray. Having come through the Shrewsbury academy, making four league appearances in the 2009/10 season, he was released at the end of that season and began plying his trade for non-league Hinckley Town. After 29 goals in 65 games, Luton took him on loan where he hit five in nine. They made the move permanent, and didn't regret it as Gray almost single-handedly shot Luton back to the Football League with 47 goals in 88 games. This summer, he signed for Championship side Brentford for a rumoured fee of £1m.

Another player to start off at Shrewsbury and become a hero in the eyes of Hatters fans was Graham French. After 27 appearances and one goal, French moved onto Swindon, Watford and Wellington before ending

up at Luton. There, he made 182 appearances and scored 22 goals, one of which against Mansfield Town has been classed as the best goal ever to be scored by a Luton Town player by some supporters. Not only an icon on the pitch, but off it he was revered in the local pubs for frequently starting games in an intoxicated state - however, French's ability helped Luton to two promotions and he is still seen as a club legend to this day.

Finally, to a more recent player who has worn both strips, Asa Hall is no stranger to either side. Despite being tipped for huge things at Birmingham and having a successful loan spell at Shrews in 2008, the Blues released the former England U20 and Luton snapped him up, where he became a part of the side that won the 2009 Football League Trophy. In 2010 Luton released him, where

he was signed by Oxford United, but two years later he found himself at New Meadow again. Despite issues behind the scenes, Hall fought for his place at the club, but following relegation last season, he was released. He's now at Cheltenham Town.

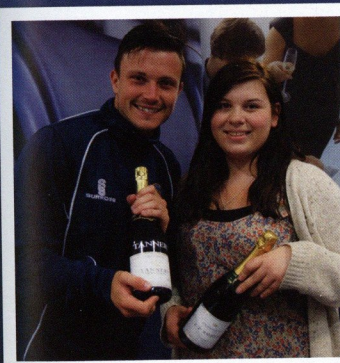

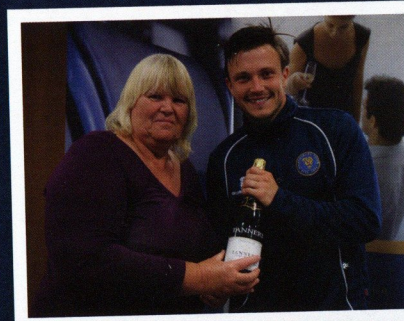

It's a good set up, a good club and we're all working in the right direction. I'm really enjoying it.

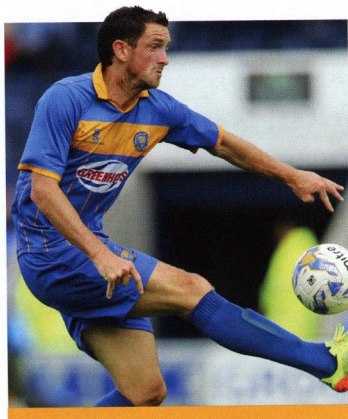
How do you look back on your four seasons with Aberdeen?

There's obviously going to be ups and downs along the way, we know that, but we feel that we're good enough to really challenge this season so hopefully we can prove that right.



And how did it feel to be a part of that special win at Leicester on Tuesday?

It was a great night. Every now and again these great nights come around. We prepared well for the game and went about it the same way as we do for every game. On the night we've put in a really good performance. We were absolutely chuffed. It wasn't just a smash and grab, we had chances and it was a well-worked performance. There were chances for myself and other players which we could have gone on and scored. It was a nice touch from the Leicester fans to clap us off the pitch after the game as well. You have to savour moments like them.

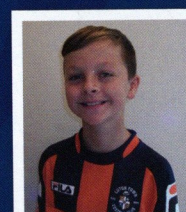

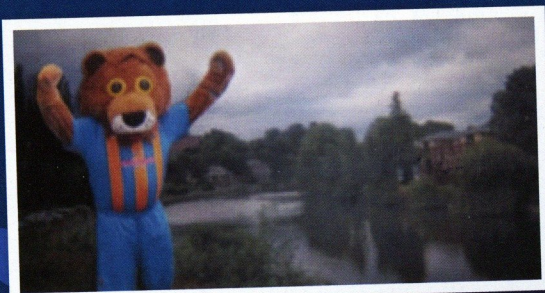

flashback

Stuart Dunn covers Town's fortunes for BBC Radio Shropshire and the Shrewsbury Chronicle

A HOME game against Luton, stood on the Riverside at the Gay Meadow, provides one of my first, albeit hazy, memories of ever watching Shrewsbury Town play.

Aged eight, Town hosted Luton in a season which would end with the Hatters gaining promotion to the top-flight of English football under former Shrewsbury winger David Pleat on a chilly winter's afternoon in December 1981.

My memories of the game are a little vague although I do recall Luton had some top players in their side that day, people like Ricky Hill and Brian Stein, who would both go on to play for England, and also Northern Ireland stalwart Mal Donaghy at the back.

Given what Luton went on to achieve that season and that Town would end the campaign requiring a draw on the final day of the season at Leicester City to stay up, which they just about managed, Town did well to pick up a point from an entertaining 2-2 draw with Pleat's talented side.

Ian Atkins and John Dungworth scored the goals against a Luton side which ended up as champions by eight points.

Luton went on to establish themselves as a strong top division side for several years, but eventually the name Shrewsbury reappeared on their fixture list.

They eventually returned to the Meadow in 1996, easing to a 3-0 win, and they also proved too strong in



the return at Kenilworth Road towards the end of the season, the first time I had visited their tight, atmospheric ground hemmed in by terraced houses.

Those were the days when our Radio Shropshire coverage usually consisted of three or four brief reports each half instead of the full commentary service the station has now provided for several years.

But with Town embroiled in a relegation fight they were destined to lose, the decision makers came to the conclusion that we should carry out second-half commentary of the game.

Town were already 1-0 down by the time our uninterrupted 45 minutes began and I had the

pleasure of the company of former Sheffield Wednesday, Arsenal and England winger Brian Marwood as summariser as Luton scored a second unanswered goal to nudge Shrewsbury closer to the relegation trapdoor.

Two home games against Luton both stand out. The first came on the final day of the 2001-02 season when Town needed to beat Luton to seal a play-off place under Kevin Ratcliffe in the fourth tier.

Luton, under Joe Kinnear, were already confirmed champions and they wrecked Town's hopes of extending their season by winning 2-0.

Gregor Rioch, the left back, scored an unfortunate own goal and Steve

Howard made sure of the result with a late second in front of a Gay Meadow full house.

Nigel Jemson, the injured Town skipper, was sat alongside me that day as summariser, as he was a week earlier when Shrewsbury won 2-0 at Southend to move to the brink of snatching a top seven spot.

But such was Jemson's sense of disappointment at Town falling just short in the final reckoning, I seem to remember he had little to say in the last 20 minutes or so. Guttled didn't even come close to Jemson's mood as Shrewsbury's season ended on a low note.

Town enjoyed themselves rather more the last time the Hatters visited for what remains, until today at least, their only previous visit to the club's new stadium on Oteley Road.

It came at a time in November 2008 when Paul Simpson's Shrewsbury team were playing well and scoring plenty of goals having rattled in seven apiece against both Gillingham and Wycombe earlier in the campaign.

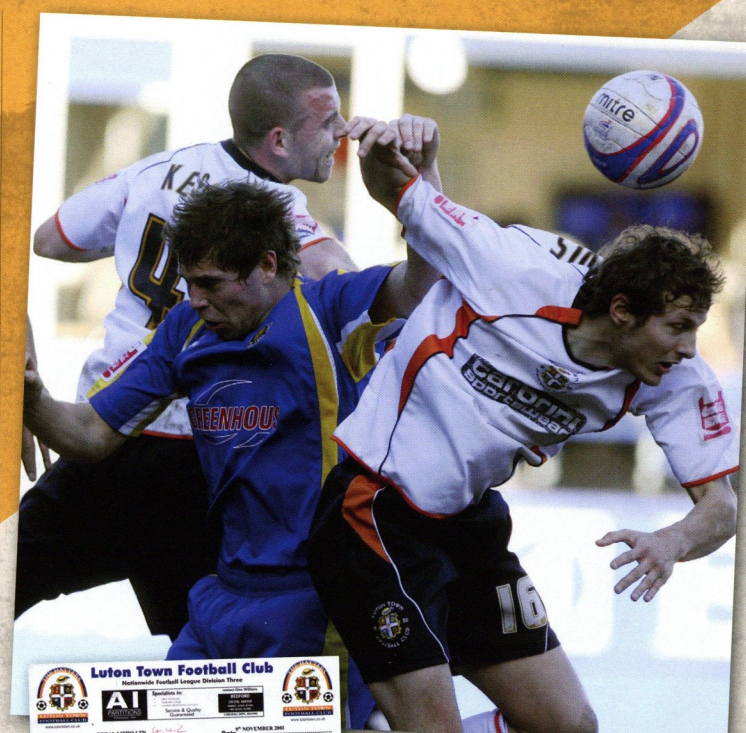
Luton, hit by a big points deduction, were struggling and Town proved too strong for them on the day, easing to a 3-0 win with goals from Paul Murray, Grant Holt and a Ben Davies thunderbolt.

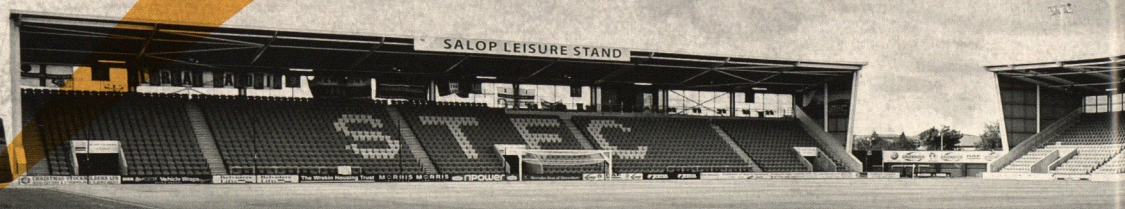


Luton, who would end the season relegated, had their revenge in the Kenilworth Road return by beating Town, despite another well taken Davies goal, 3-1, with Asa Hall, a man well known in these parts, among the home scorers.

It was a day when the normally reliable Holt, who hit 28 goals that season, fired blanks as a string of chances went unconverted.

But perhaps the result should not have been too unexpected as it came during a long run of matches without an away win for Simpson's side which astonishingly lasted from August until April, an incredible sequence considering the talent in that squad.

It's good to see Luton back in the Football League again, particularly under such a good footballing man as John Still, a real gentleman on his last visit to the Greenhouse Meadow when his Dagenham & Redbridge side were beaten 1-0 on the day Town sealed promotion from League Two in April 2012. <<

celebrity interview

Next up in our new Celebrity Interview feature, is none other than the Hatters Chairman and TV presenter, **Nick Owen**. Not only is Nick a thoroughly nice chap, but he also has quite a soft spot for Shrewsbury Town. **Martin Wild** is asking the questions.

MW: First of all Nick, from everyone at Shrewsbury Town, welcome back to the Football League. Erm, what took you so long?

NO: Ha, ha. Well everyone warned us when we went into the Conference that it was very competitive, and that it would be incredibly difficult to get out of and that proved to be the case. It's full of teams - as Shrewsbury Town fans would know - that are very strong, and many have recent Football League experience. We were up against teams down the years such as York, Mansfield, Wrexham, Cambridge United, and Stockport County of course, who went even further down - loads of clubs with a Football League background. They were all as equally determined to get up as we were and although we came close a couple of times by getting to the final of the play-offs, we didn't quite manage it until the fifth year when we won the title comfortably. I'm thrilled to be back but it has been an incredibly tough struggle.

MW: The Conference is the unofficial Fifth Division and a graveyard for former league clubs. Can I ask what your initial thoughts were, when Greg Dyke announced a controversial proposal for a new League Three to improve the National team's chances?

NO: Well I have to say that I don't like disagreeing with Greg because we're old friends. He was my boss at breakfast television, my boss and Director General at the BBC, and my boss as head of the ITV sports committee when I was their main sports presenter. So we go back a long way and he even wrote the foreword to my autobiography. But, I vehemently disagreed with his ideas as I thought the whole idea surrounding

B sides went against the concept of competitive football. I didn't see how it could possibly have worked, especially as there would have been no promotion either after a certain level. So not for me I'm afraid.

MW: That 30 point deduction back in 2008 effectively consigned Luton to five years in non-league. Rotherham and Bournemouth escaped the drop despite 17 point penalties and now both reside in the Championship. That's quite a contrast in fortunes isn't it?

NO: Yes it is. But I think the difference in points between us and them was quite considerable; another thirteen points. With hindsight with that 30 point punishment - because we weren't a bad team and would have finished halfway without it - I wonder whether we might have been a bit anxious in wanting to win every game because the gap was so huge, instead of being a little bit calmer about it and not worrying about drawing the occasional game. We lost a lot of games that we needn't have lost because we were throwing everything at it. We proved we were a decent side because that very same season we won the Johnstone's Paints Trophy at Wembley against a Scunthorpe side that went on to gain promotion to the Championship. Two weeks later we were down but still managed to take 42,000 fans with us. Rotherham and Bournemouth both did brilliantly, and at one stage we looked close to turning things around, but ultimately I just think that the hurdle was too great to overcome and it was a huge blow.

MW: There must be so many highs and lows down the years. I remember David Pleat's extremely dodgy dash across

Maine Road back in '83 I think it was, and of course there was the Littlewoods Cup win over Arsenal. What's been your highlight following The Hatters Nick, as either a fan or a Chairman?

NO: Unquestionably as a fan it would have to be that Littlewoods Cup win you mentioned over Arsenal back in 1988. It was a cracking final. We were 1-0 up then 2-1 down, and it could have been 3-1 but our goalkeeper Andy Dibble saved a penalty. We went up the other end and equalised and won with virtually the last kick of the game. Luton were a very attractive side in those days. We had players like Brian Stein, Mick Harford, Ricky Hill and Steve Foster who all played for England. Mal Donaghy was another international - a long established left back with Ireland - and David Pree's a little left sided midfielder who came from Bridgnorth in Shropshire. Danny Wilson and Kingsley Black, who had just started to make his way in the game, were other cracking players in a really exciting team and it was a decent decade for us after '83 after we avoided relegation in your reference there to David Pleat. The JPT win was also memorable as it came during a really difficult time against the backdrop of that 30 point deduction, and we knew we were going to lose our FL status after 89 years. In the midst of all that to pull off an extra-time victory was quite something so they're obvious highlights. But every time I walk into Kenilworth Road it's a highlight for me as it's been a special place in my life for 56 years now. It's an incredible source of pride to me that I was asked by the Consortium who were trying to take over the club, to ask me to represent them as their spokesman and figurehead.

MW: Why Luton Town Nick? Can you remember when the love affair started?

NO: Well it's 'cos they're my local team it's a simple as that. I come from a small town in Hertfordshire called Berkhamsted, and my father used to go to Luton as often as he could. I started to follow their results when he was going to games in the late 50's. I finally put enough pressure on him to take me to my first match on September 3rd 1958 (I) against Leeds United in a game which ended 1-1. If I wasn't hooked before I certainly was after that. It was an amazing experience walking into that ground for the first time, and seeing players I'd only read about in the papers before, as there wasn't much TV coverage back then.

MW: It must be hard to contain your emotions in the director's box? I find it hard enough to restrain myself in the press area.

NO: Ha, ha. You don't have to restrain your emotions that much really. You're sitting with your fellow directors so you're all passionate fans. The great thing about all the investors who've done so much to save Luton Town is they have no agenda. As you know some football clubs are taken over by investors who have no connection with them whatsoever. All our guys are lifelong Luton fans so when we score or go close we're all ooh, aah, yes and so forth. We go just as bonkers as everyone else!

MW: Speaking of investors, we had David Lloyd the ex-cricketer representing Accrington last week, and he was saying he gets really angry when rich foreign investors buy established Premier League clubs. He felt they should consider buying clubs like Accrington if they wanted to help local communities.

Do you think the day will ever come when they look at investing in lower league clubs like yours?

NO: I don't see why not. A club like ours, and indeed Shrewsbury Town, are clubs with huge potential. If we get a bigger stadium, and hopefully that will come one day because we've been working on that now for a number of years, I think we'd be a very attractive proposition. We're about 30 miles outside of London and we have an airport and an excellent train service, so we're very accessible to a huge amount of the population. There's a great catchment area around Luton itself and I think they could all be sucked in if we were successful - those 42,000 that went with us to Wembley in 2009 proves that point. Having said all that, I wouldn't really want anyone taking over our football club who weren't Luton fans.

MW: Do you have any affinity with Shrewsbury - you were educated here I believe?

NO: Oh, absolutely. I spent from the ages of 7 to 18 as a pupil at Shrewsbury School. Eleven years in total in what really are your formative years in many ways. I used to watch Shrewsbury quite a lot at the old Gay Meadow so I always keep an eye out for their results and it's always nice to come back here. My late father was born in Shrewsbury and used to play for Shrewsbury amateurs before moving down South and becoming a Luton fan. The rest as they say...

MW: That's fascinating. What have you made of Luton's start back in the league Nick - a win, a draw and a defeat?

NO: Well, I can't complain. We had a very slow start to last season but went

on to have a brilliant campaign. We've had what you might call a slowish start this time but whilst four points from three games is hardly setting the world on fire, it's not a disaster either as we're finding our feet. We're bedding in a few players for a start and I think we've played some of the best teams in the division - particularly Bury who I thought were very impressive, although they've spent a bit of money haven't they? I'm very hopeful that we'll settle and it will be interesting to see where we are at Christmas. I have great faith in our manager John Still.

MW: Where do you think our respective clubs will finish this season?

NO: I think Shrewsbury are looking very strong and you'd expect them to do well having just come down. I hate to predict where my club are going to finish but I would be very hopeful that we'll be competing near to the top end of the table. That's all I dare say as I don't want to tempt fate. I think Shrewsbury will be right up there as well.

MW: Finally Nick, we ask all our celebrity guests to give us a prediction for the match.

NO: (Confidently) 2-0 to Luton. (Ten minutes after the interview, I received the following text off Nick who was preparing for the Midlands Today late night bulletin on BBC One): "I've been thinking a bit more about my prediction and I'd like to change it please. I'll go for 1-1. I know it's sitting on the fence a bit but it's a bit more realistic."

We'd like to thank Nick for taking the time during a hectic schedule to do this interview, and hope he enjoys his trip to the Greenhous Meadow this afternoon.

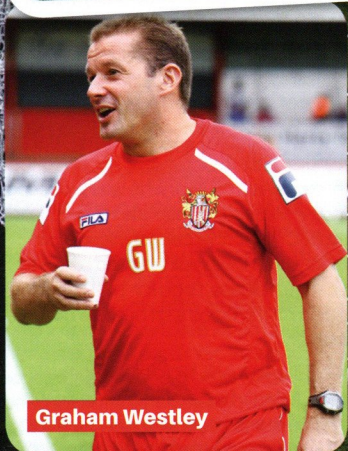
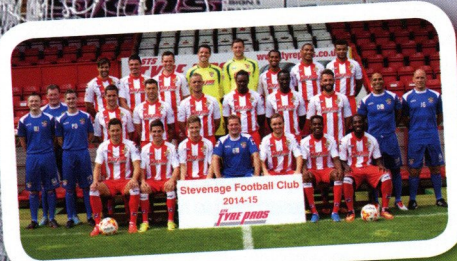

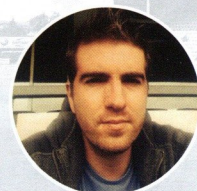

LIFE AFTER TOWN

David Pleat only spent one season with Shrewsbury Town, having been signed by manager Arthur Rowley in 1967. Now, nearly 50 years on, the former outside-right still recalls his time at Gay Meadow as though it were yesterday.

He made his debut against Oxford United in a 2-0 home win on the opening day after leaving today's opponents Luton on a free transfer.

"Arthur was a rather surly character," said Pleat. "He'd been a great player with a great left foot, a real powerhouse. When I was deciding where to go, his words to me after a good meeting with him were 'if you don't make your mind up within 24 hours I'm going to sign Bernard Lewis from Cardiff instead! That was his introduction."

"I joined a very good side. I remember the match against Oxford well. The two Atkinson brothers, Ron and Graham, were playing for them and afterwards the Shrewsbury goalkeeper Alan Boswell - who was a bright brain as well as a very good 'keeper - said to me 'I'm telling you now, although it's only the first game, that's as good a side as we'll play and they'll get promoted.' He was right, and it was Shrewsbury who missed out by a whisker on the final day of that season."

After 10 years at Town as player and manager, which included breaking all scoring records, taking the club to the edge of the second division and twice reaching the last 16 of the FA Cup, it was to be Rowley's final season. Harry Gregg took over the following summer.

"I probably didn't do myself justice at Shrewsbury," admitted Pleat, who only played 16 times for Town. "I'd come to the club after suffering a broken leg and back injury from Luton so my better seasons came later when I left to join Exeter. I never felt Arthur had that much confidence in me, but at the same time I never had enough respect for him. I did have huge respect



for his coach Gordon Lee though. It was a brief spell at Shrewsbury but an interesting one. I think I learnt a lot from my time there in terms of coaching and management. We had some outstanding players. Frank Clarke was as good a lower league centre forward as I saw. He was brilliant at holding the ball up, although he wasn't the quickest. He was lovely guy too."

That season, Clarke moved to Queens Park Rangers for £35,000, with Rowley admitting many years later, the deal cost Town promotion.

"Ted Hemsley was in the team too," said Pleat. "He was a leader - as much interested in the cricket and horse-racing as the football. We had little Trevor Meredith, the outside right who I was competing with for that position - he'd come from Burnley. He and Jimmy McLaughlin were as

good as any wingers in the league. We had a very good team that year and picked up hardly any injuries. I do remember Alf Wood putting a lad from Tranmere in hospital in Shrewsbury for about 5 weeks with a ruptured spleen - it was terrible. George Boardman was a lovely man too, a very good Scottish inside forward and Eric Brodie was another Scotsman who supported Frank Clarke. I remember Tommy Seymour. He was the physiotherapist and kit-man but after 2pm he would go to scout players in Scotland. He was a real stalwart at Shrewsbury. I met some good people. There were a lot of football thinkers in that team."

Pleat's lack of regular starts for Shrewsbury that season meant his missed out on playing in the FA Cup matches against Arsenal. After Peter

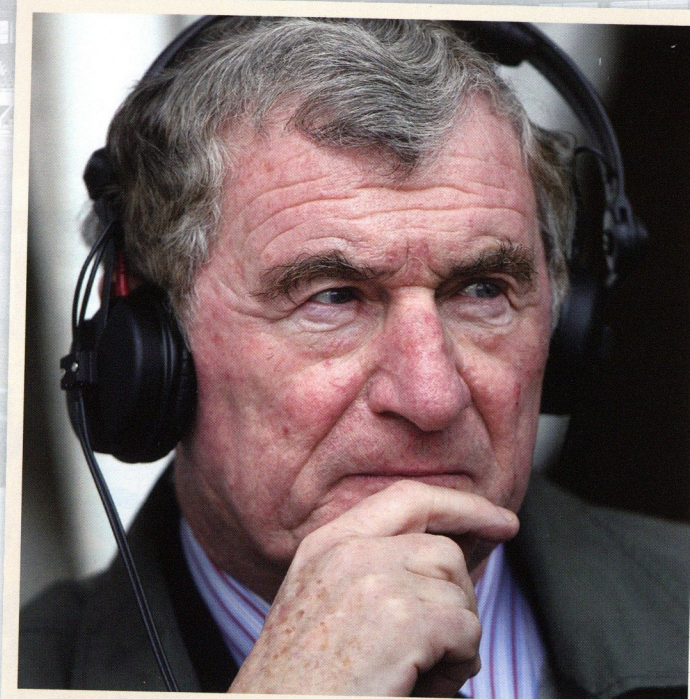
Dolby's late equaliser in front of more than 18,000 at Gay Meadow, Town lost the replay at Highbury 2-0.

"Shrewsbury is a place where people consider it to be a market town," said Pleat. "People might go to watch Wolves, Aston Villa or Stoke instead. We didn't have a big captive audience but had a reputation for being a good cup side and the club made some good money from the replay at Arsenal."

Pleat also remembers the training facilities - or lack of them - at Gay Meadow, and the flood water which used to spill onto the pitch from the River Severn behind the terracing. Pleat is pictured in one famous image looking out onto two feet of flood water in January 1968, ahead of a postponed FA Cup replay with Durham Amateurs Tow Law Town.

"We used to train behind the goal on ash felt," he recalled. "It was really bumpy, the players of today would not believe what we trained on. I remember the Wakeman school backing on to the left of the ground, and the river along the back. When the water got high, we came in our wellington boots and often wondered when the next game would be called off."

"I lived in digs at Meole Brace with one of the Shrewsbury players, Graham Clapham. He was like me in the sense he was more on the bench than in the team. When I became manager of Tottenham, his son Jamie was there. He was a frustrated left-back as he wasn't in the team so I sold him to Ipswich. It's amazing how I was in digs with his dad at Shrewsbury and ended up selling his son who went on to have a really good career. He's now coaching at Newcastle."



Pleat still sees some of his former teammates on the footballing circuit.

"I bump into George Boardman from time to time," he said. "He's a scout so I catch up with him up and down the country. Pat Wright went abroad to coach in the Middle East. I recommended him to Brian Clough and Peter Taylor at Derby. They paid £8000 for him but unfortunately he got destroyed in his first game and he never got into their good books as a player. I still see him at Villa when I've been to matches."

After an injury hit playing career at Luton, Pleat is able to reflect on his time as Hatters manager with hugely fond memories in an era of unprecedented success.

After spells at Shrewsbury, Exeter and Peterborough, he came back to Luton as a coach and was then appointed boss in 1978. He led the Hatters to the first division, and narrowly missed out on a place in the FA Cup final, beaten by Everton in extra time in the semi-final in 1985.

"We had people like Mal Donaghy, Brian Stein, Paul Walsh, Mick Harford and David Moss," he said. "The list is endless. I started out managing at Nuneaton and some of the best signings I made were from the lower leagues and non-league. We had the club's best spell in the 80's, changed the team three times and had

a super time. It's fantastic they're back in the Football League under John Still. I'm delighted."

There were just over 9000 fans inside Kenilworth Road for Luton's return against AFC Wimbledon this season, and Pleat says those numbers show the club can continue to push through the leagues.

"One of the important issues is that they need a new ground," he said. "When I came to the club in 1964 as a player from Nottingham Forest, that was one of the selling points to me yet they're still waiting. That's the sadness of Luton Town. Had they grasped the nettle and gone to Milton Keynes when they had the opportunity, it would have been a good move. We have always had to sell players, more than they average club, and it set a precedent with people Peter Anderson and Andy King leaving to prevent administration. I would like to think Luton will be up there challenging this season. They get good crowds, there's a reasonable budget and I'd love to see big teams coming to Luton and being beaten again. We so much enjoyed being David and beating Goliath. Shrewsbury have got a good manager in Micky Mellon who achieved success with Fleetwood. I know Liam Lawrence from his Stoke and Sunderland days and if they give Micky the time, I'm sure he'll do well." ■

The answer surely is the sin bin?

'Why', asked Mrs Jervis, 'Following the doom and gloom at the end of last season and the prediction that life in league two was going to be so awful and the end of the world is nigh are you so cheerful about your beloved football club once again?'

I have to admit that occasionally, quite apart from being very trying my wife of very nearly forty wonderful years (she reads the programme) comes up with the occasional bit of astuteness. Football, as a once famous ex footballer said is a funny old game because she is right; there isn't a single town supporter who so far in this very young season would say they are not enjoying life in league two. Our disappointment about playing in a lower league has been replaced with a new found optimism and fresh hope by a manager and a squad of players who in the true spirit of Shrewsbury Town teams over the years don't know when they are beat!

This squad of players with their strength in depth and their character and the resilience they have revealed so far would not have been relegated at the end of last season. Despite the higher standards and the challenge of bigger and higher spending clubs in league one, the late comeback against Tranmere and the survival for more than two thirds of the game with ten men against Northampton is sufficient evidence that the new Shrewsbury are made of sterner stuff. Not only do we have players who can pass the ball and take on defenders they are all winners.

Mrs Jervis is right (for once), we are all more cheerful about our football

club and there isn't a soul who would want to swap places with a year ago - despite our lower league status. A trip to a Premiership Club, unbeaten in the league, plenty of high quality goals created and scored by quality players and most crucially a winning mentality. Early days I know but I predict more of the same.

The rules in Rugby would seem to have been more thoughtfully evolved than those in football. The use of

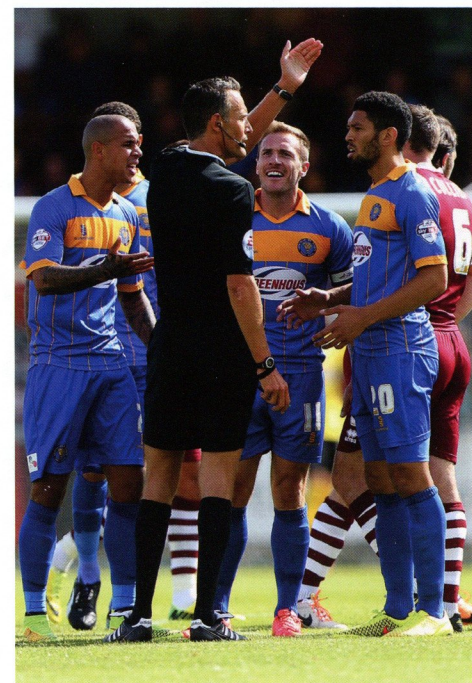
Liam Lawrence's red card as a result of a highly contentious refereeing decision made in an instant so early in the game led to the loss of our captain and a key player's services for more than two thirds of the game. The punishment in my opinion was heavy handed and as our eminent friend and fellow supporter Judge Robin Onions might say 'disproportionate' - not forgetting, subject to an appeal, we now lose Liam's services for three games.

On the basis of one man's interpretation of a tackle the team is massively weakened and the public who have paid to watch the game and who have travelled in some cases long distances are denied a fair game of football between two teams of eleven players.

The decision to send a player off so early in the game is huge - the advantage to the opposition is significant; the final outcome is not the result of fair play between two teams especially when an overreaction of an opposition player can inevitably influence the referee's decision. No footballer plays the game with any intent to seriously hurt another player. In their determination to do well for the team, sometimes players might try too hard and a foul is committed. What's more, there is no certainty that the official has got it right - too often video

evidence proves he hasn't.

The answer surely is ten minutes in the sin bin for all but the worst of premeditated and serious foul play - the opposition gain a temporary advantage, the foul is punished, the point is made and everyone can once again respect the rules of the game and the difficult role of the referee.



video technology during televised games to support the referees, the total respect for the authority of the referee and the sin bin to punish those thought to have seriously infringed the rules of the game. I have long thought our game could do worse than consider how our own game could benefit from the experiences in Rugby.

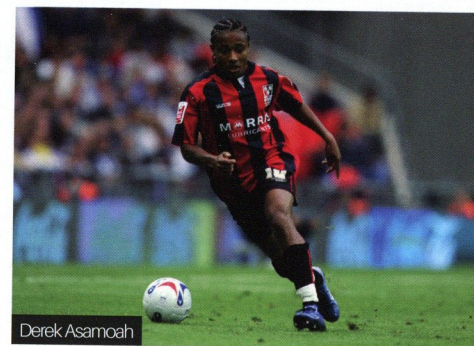

for Town, including "the goal that took us to Wembley against 'The Gas' in 1996".

'Vencremos' went for another Aussie James Meredith "we may see him again in the league one day". We'll he did, playing for Bradford City. He did of course play on loan for Telford, and came to the notice of many during his time at York City. My undying memory of him was being skinned by a part time player running up the slope at Underhill. It was also Gary Peters last game.



Derek Asamoah

My personal favourite has to be Derek Asamoah. The Ghanaian international (born in Accra), joined Town at the start of their final season at Gay Meadow. Part of the team that made the first Play Off Final at the new Wembley. Asamoah agonising missed a great chance (when it seemed easier to score) that would have put Town on level terms against Bristol Rovers. What I liked about Derek was his pace and the ability to create something out of nothing. He made 39 appearances for Town, scoring 10 times.

It all ended in acrimony when Asamoah went missing on the eve of the 2007/8 season. It later

transpired that he had joined O.C.G Nice. Eventually costing the French side £50,000. Then Town Manager Gary Peters revealed that Asamoah would have been sacked if he had remained at Town, due to not seeking permission to leave.

Personal 'claim to fame' from me is that I announced Derek's last ever goal for Town (Shropshire Senior Cup Final between Market Drayton Town and Salop at Ludlow Town). I was standing on the balcony at the then SBS Stadium when the Ludlow match day announcer asked if I wanted to

tell the 500 or so attending the next goal. Being a total 'media whore', I jumped at the chance. And 'Degsy' dully scored. "Goal scorer for Shrewsbury - DEREK ASAMOAH!!!!!"

For my next article in the Newport County programme we'll start to piece together a squad of Town's 'Foreign Legion'. But as an additional and in keeping with our visitors that day I want to ask 'who is your favourite Welsh player that

has represented Town?'. Plenty to choose from.

traveller's tales

Ian Jones recounts his football trips over the years

When the citizens of East Berlin pushed the city's dividing wall to breaking point in 1989 a transformation of European politics was unleashed.

The journey to freedom, symbolised by the ordinary East Germany people in their Trabant cars being waved through once impregnable border checkpoints, started a process that would soon become evident on football's international stage. German reunification in 1990 meant that East Germany withdrew from Euro 92 before qualifying began and for the first time since the second world war Germany competed as one nation again. There would, however, be further political disruption to the tournament before the final stages.

Along with England and the hosts Sweden, the nations qualifying for the finals were France, Germany, Netherland, Scotland, the Soviet Union and Yugoslavia. In 1991 a civil war broke out in Yugoslavia which would ultimately lead to the break-up of the country. The war made Yugoslavia's participation in the finals impossible and the country was disqualified; their place was awarded to qualifying group runners-up Denmark.

On 26 December 1991 the Union of Soviet Socialist Republics ceased to exist, with twelve of its republics becoming independent. The now defunct Soviet Union team retained its place in the tournament competing under the banner of the Commonwealth of Independent States, drawing players from most of the old Soviet republics. After the tournament the new eastern European nations would form their own football associations.

The draw for the finals placed England in a group with Denmark, France and Sweden. England's first two matches would be played at Malmö Stadion, with the third scheduled for Rasunda Stadium, then the Swedish national stadium,



in the Solna Municipality just outside Stockholm. Making our holiday arrangements we decided to base ourselves in the historic city of Helsingborg in the south of the country, a relatively short drive from Malmö. For England's third game it was decided to make a one-day visit to the capital, even though this would mean a round trip of just over 600 miles. Serious consideration was given to staying for the whole three weeks of the tournament. My friends' visit to Italia 90 had been restricted to England's first phase matches in Cagliari and they had missed following the team's progress through to the semi-finals. Such was the sense of expectation about England's chances in Sweden that they were reluctant to risk missing out again. Eventually caution prevailed and we decided to limit our expedition to a fortnight which would cover all three group matches. These would surely provide sufficient excitement to pack into a memorable holiday.

While football was the primary purpose of our journey we were also determined to have a holiday

in the traditional sense. Staying in Helsingborg, which was also a ferry port, would give us the chance to go sightseeing not only in Sweden but also in Denmark a short sea crossing away. There were also thoughts of also seeing some of the Scandinavian night life – although we had concerns about the high price of Sweden's notoriously heavily taxed beer.

A holiday flat near Helsingborg's town centre had been booked. This seemingly routine holiday detail led to an unexpected telephone call from the apartment's proprietor. He was a freelance journalist who contributed to some of Sweden's leading sports magazines. With four England supporters arriving on his doorstep he saw an opportunity for his next commission: a feature on their experiences at Sweden's Euro 92. The fact that they supported a rather obscure small English club made the journalistic angle even sharper. After some discussion we agreed to cooperate in his proposal – it seemed prudent to keep on the right side of our temporary landlord.

It was no less than Town deserved, and they might have added to that lead.

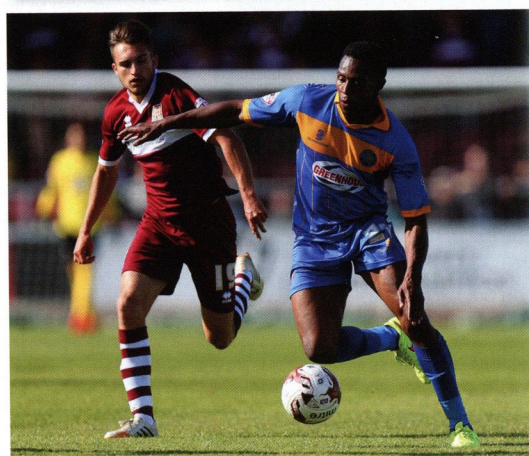
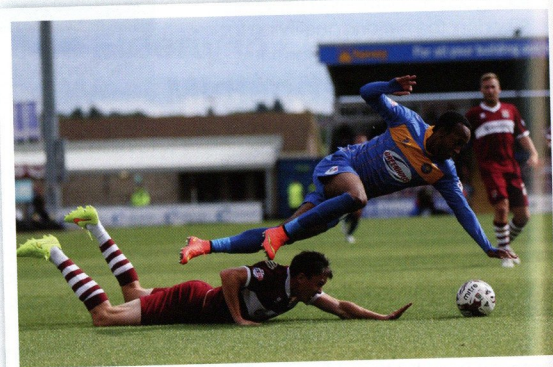
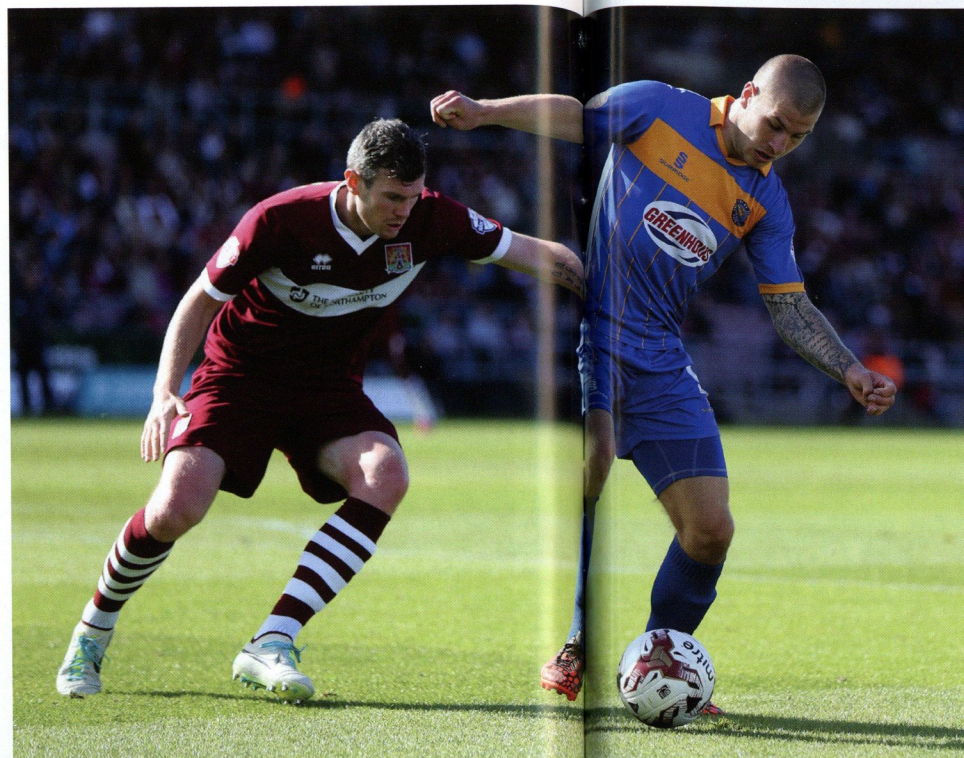

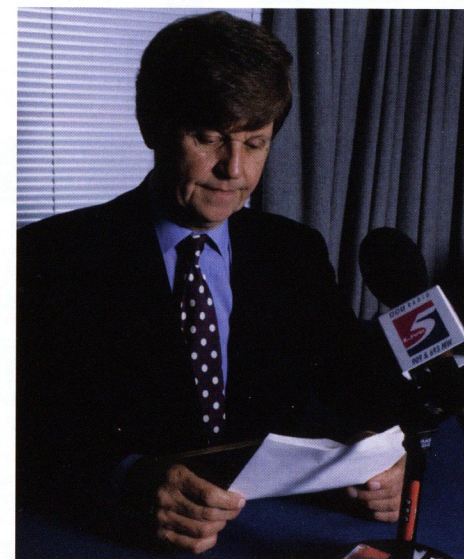

Hello Super Town fans, with this being only the fifth league game of the new football season, I am sure I can still say welcome back to the Greenhous Meadow.

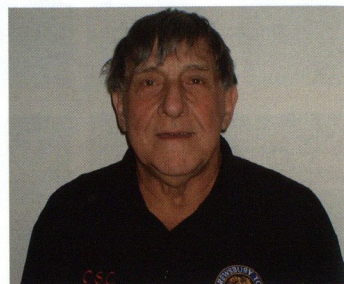

Network Rail and The Football League Trust

The new partnership between Network Rail and The Football League Trust (FLT) will see Shrewsbury Town CST, along with 9 other clubs, work with Network Rail's community safety managers to boost awareness of railway safety.

The sessions will be delivered on the club's doorstep at Lucozade Powerleague, a prime location to deliver a railway safety education programme, with a railway running adjacent to the football ground.

Tragically, 164 people lost their lives after going onto the tracks in the last five years. Of these, 70% were struck by trains with 18% suffering electrocution by coming into contact with the power supply which can be as much as 25,000 volts. The peak ages for trespass fatalities are late teens and earlier twenties with around one in five deaths in this age group.

Events on the day included a cake sale, tombola, nail painting, as well as live music and other fundraising activities.

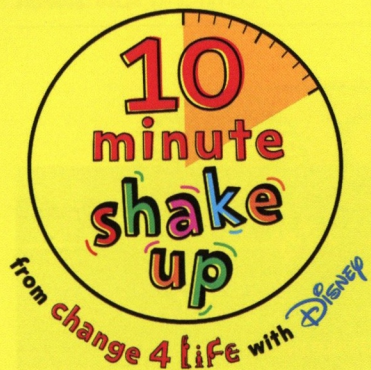

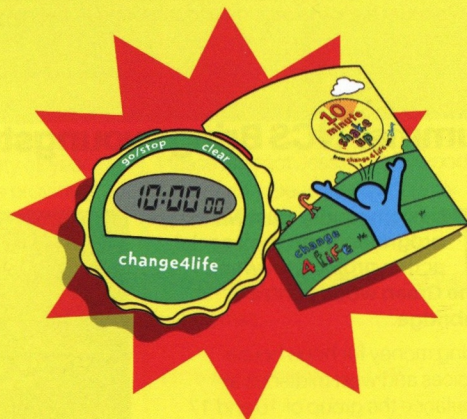

introducing: jeff watkins

Every team needs a leader - and **Jeff Watkins** is just the man to do that job for Shrewsbury Town's youth side.

The versatile defender, now a second-year scholar in the Under-18s group, wears the captain's armband for Ian Dawes' team.

It's a role Jeff takes great pride in doing and he believes it's the person he is which has led to him being the youth team skipper.

"I believe being a leader on the pitch is the best way to play your own game, and you can help others as well," said Jeff.

"It's not the fact that I've got the band, it's more the person I am that led me to being captain.

"I try to pull the team together and make sure everyone's doing everything right.

"I like to keep everyone positive and be a role model myself both on and off the pitch, which is very important."

Jeff has ambitions to follow the likes of Connor Goldson and Dominic Smith into Town's first team but acknowledges there is plenty of work to be done for that opportunity to come around.

It was a choice between rugby and football for Jeff growing up, but the Liverpool fan followed his heart and went for the sport with the circular ball.

"I used to play rugby and got quite far in that," said Jeff.

"I actually had to make a choice between rugby and football, and with the scholarship offer at this level, I went with my heart which said football.

"I begged my mum near enough every day of my toddler ages. I always had a ball at

my feet and new from that day that's what I wanted to do.

"I started as a striker for Dawley Wanderers which was fun, and I played for Telford at development level and came to Shrewsbury at the end of under-15s. It all just went from there really.

"With all the hard work from my mum, dad and everyone else who's helped me along the way, I'm pretty certain that this is where I needed to be.

"If I wasn't then it would have all come down to nothing. It was about pushing myself when I was younger to get the offer of a scholarship.

"Pete Walden from the under-16s pushed me and helped me a lot. He was one of the coaches who believed in me, so without him I wouldn't be here, like my parents."

Academy manager Steve Reece is also someone who Jeff has reserved praise for.

"Steve (Reece) is brilliant. On and off the pitch he plays his part. He keeps the lads going, has a laugh with us and he's a great person to have around the Club.

"We've got a good squad because there's good players we can bring off the bench. We all get on really well and the team has gelled nicely.

Jeff's versatility saw him pushed up front as a striker in the 1-0 defeat at Walsall, as Town looked to find an equaliser late on.

It's a role the captain is prepared to take on when required.

Youth: Shrewsbury Town 2-3 Oldham Athletic Under-18s suffer first home defeat of the season

Goals from Tom King and Kaiman Anderson were not enough for Shrewsbury Town's youth team as they fell to their first home defeat of the season against Oldham Athletic.

Town were back playing at Shrewsbury Sports Village and took the lead after just 50 seconds, when King smashed in across goal from the left.

Oldham equalised through Jordache Walters in the 15th minute but the young Shrews retook the lead when Anderson rounded off a superb passing move by rolling the ball into the far corner.

However, the Latics responded by levelling again on the stroke of half-time via a powerful strike from Devante Jacobs.

And Tony Philliskirk's side nicked all three points with five minutes left when Ryan Ellison converted a penalty, before Town had King sent off in added time to cap a disappointing day all-round.

FIRST HALF

Having played their home games at Lilleshall National Sports Centre throughout pre-season and for the opening league game against Fleetwood Town, the young Shrews returned to Shrewsbury Sports Village for Saturday's match.

And head of academy coaching Ian Dawes made four changes to the side beaten 1-0 at Walsall a week before, with goalkeeper Harry Lewis, Nathan Millis, Alex Fletcher and Jordan Wilson all coming in for Alex Ashton, Jack Butts, Joel Carta and Ethan Jones.



Rain poured down from the first whistle but it did not stop Town from making the perfect start, as Niall Flint picked out King on the left edge of the penalty area before the latter lashed a left-footed strike into the far right corner, for his third goal of the season, with only 50 seconds on the clock.

Oldham looked to hit back six minutes later when captain Jack Tuohy flicked wide a header from a corner, and they did grab an equaliser in the 15th minute.

Striker Walters collected the ball on the edge of the Town box before turning and rifling a powerful low strike - off his left foot - to leave Harry Lewis with no chance at his left corner.

The Latics continued to press from thereon but the young Shrews retook the lead in the 22nd minute with a clever team move.

One-touch passing between Josh Ginnelly, Wilson and Anderson resulted in the latter finding space on the right side of the box before he rolled the ball across goal into the far left corner for his first of the campaign.

Town could then have created a two-goal lead before half-time when Flint latched onto Lewis' long kick forward on the right and burst down on goal, but the midfielder was unable to loft over the oncoming Chris Renshaw.

Chances continued to arrive for either side before Philliskirk's side again equalised a minute before half-time with another effort into the corner.

This time Jacobs struck low from long range on the right and Lewis was unable to reach the ball at his right-hand post, meaning the two teams went in level at the break.

Town started the second period strongly and skipper Jeff Watkins got up to head a corner from Flint straight into the goalkeeper's hands.

At the other end, Lewis was called into action to save low from Walters when the striker got in behind the Shrews defence.

But it was Town who had the better chances of the half, with Anderson being denied by Renshaw at his near post while substitute George Hassall nearly squeezed one in following a corner.

And the best of the lot fell for Anderson with ten minutes to go, but the striker sliced his effort wide from close range after Ginnelly has sprayed a low ball across the box from the left.

Town were then made to pay for their missed chances with five minutes left, when the referee awarded Oldham a penalty after a foul by substitute Butts.

Ellison stepped up to fire the ball low into the bottom left corner to give the Latics a late lead.

The young Shrews struggled to get the ball back from thereon and King was sent off for a late challenge in added time.

Ian Dawes has called on Shrewsbury Town's youth team to handle the physical side of football better following their 3-2 defeat to Oldham Athletic.

The young Shrews led twice in the Youth Alliance (North West) fixture at Shrewsbury Sports Village but were pegged back before going down to a late penalty from the Latics.

Oldham's first two goals came from their muscular strikers, and Dawes, head of coaching, wants the Under-18s to cope better when up against strong opponents.

"Off the ball they had a physical player playing up front and he was more dominant than our players - we've got to learn to deal with that," said Dawes.

"If we had stopped him playing, like we spoke about, then we would have won the game.

"I thought it was a mixed game, on the ball at times we were okay.

Eight pages were on offer in the programme for 4d (about 2p). No manager's comments but the programme notes bemoaned a recent run of injuries including goalkeeper Alan Boswell and marksman Arthur Rowley which was put forward as the reason for a recent run of poor results. They also included a welcome to on loan goalkeeper John McLaughlin who played just five games before returning to his job as a colliery electrician. Whilst conceding seven goals he kept two clean sheets.

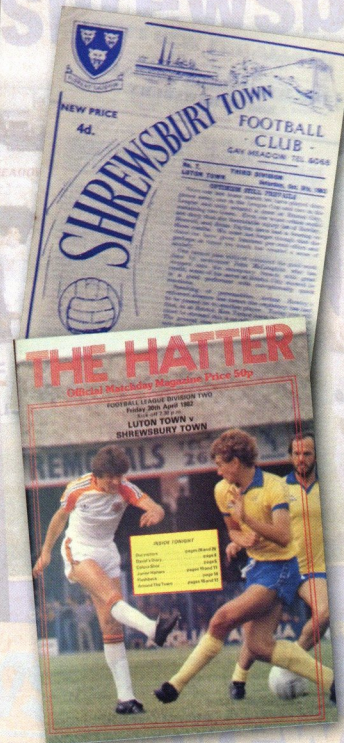
The programme included full line ups, scorers and attendances from recent games including reserve and youth games. There were 785 at the previous week's 4-0 reserve win but the Club felt there should have been more. "Visitor's Page" gave details of the Luton players including goalkeeper ex England International Ron Baynham. And a rather surprising note from the Supporters Club told us that it was now helping "old age pensioners" to attend games by contributing 1/- (5p) to their entry cost and that this was costing them £10 per match. Would we expect any Supporters Club to offer similar these days?

The following season Luton were on their way to another relegation, to Division 4. We didn't help their cause with a remarkable 7-2 win at Kenilworth Road on 10th March 1965. George Boardman bagged four, Robin Scott two and Bobby Ross one.

Luton's programme in black and white throughout had an image on the front cover of the ground entrance and of course a hat. Programme notes welcomed new manager George Martin who had previously been a player and had other roles at the Club and was described as a "great Luton enthusiast". The notes also hoped for better luck with injuries which they had

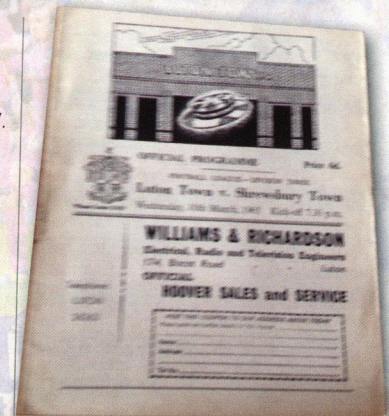
struggled against all season and the announcement of a new scheme for supporters which "involves the playing of messages and record requests and tunes over the public address speakers". Alternatively, supporters could join the "Luton Bobbers Stand and Supporters Club for 1/2 (5p) or 21/- (£1-05) for life membership.

The usual crop of adverts including G A Wild & Sons advertising camping equipment (apparently they were suppliers to the football club - clearly for long distance away trips I presume)



whilst Bunty Coaches offered summer express services to Clacton, Bognor, Brighton, Margate and many others. On the front cover a coupon to complete to get details of "the Hoover" from Williams and Richardson. No Internet then?

Happier times at Kenilworth road on 30th April 1982 as Luton's 4-1 win against us saw them promoted to the top division and they went on to be crowned Champions as the season ended. Brian Stein's goal was equalised by Ian Atkins for Shrewsbury but three goals in the last 12 minutes from Ricky

Manager David Pleat naturally concentrated in his notes on the expectation of a win and promotion. His hope was "that we have a game of football to please without any trouble and everyone ready to appreciate the visitor's good points while encouraging our side to the limit". I expect the Luton Vice Presidents, listed in the programme, would be pleased with the outcome, none more than the late Eric Morecambe OBE who never missed an opportunity to plug the club in his TV shows, usually whilst slapping Ernie Wise on the face!

Plenty to read in the programme including something I had never seen before. Part 21 of "Head for the Heights" was a full page comic strip covering the story of Leatown's Bobbin (I assume that he had a surname as well if that was his first name). In this issue he was playing for his country, Guatador, in a World Cup qualifying game. In true comic style he heard at half time when the score was 2-2 that the President of the South American country who had been held prisoner with him recently had also escaped and that inspired a 3-2 win ensuring his country's place in the finals in Spain. I wonder if Bobbin inspired Leatown to a trophy in the remaining issues of "The Hatter", a sure way to ensure supporters bought the next programme.

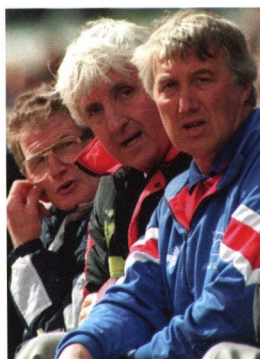
His Master's Voice

In the recent programme against Tranmere we were celebrating the milestone of Stuart Dunn covering his 1,000th Shrewsbury game for BBC Radio Shropshire.

Stuart himself referred to the hard act he had to follow – respected local journalist Russell Mulford, who was the radio voice of Town games from when Radio Shropshire went on air in 1985, through to when he retired in the mid-90s and handed the reins to Stuart.

"It was really exciting when the radio station started up," Russell recalls, "but it was also that more difficult to get on air what we expect instantaneously these days.

"Reporting on the match itself was on the phone, but we had no way of playing an interview with the manager or the players afterwards.



"So for home matches I had an arrangement to go into the dressing room after the game, tap the manager of the time on the shoulder, and record his reaction on an old tape recorder – which I could hardly see in the steamy atmosphere.

"Then I had to physically drive it up to the Radio Shropshire studios to get it played on air before six o'clock!"

Russell had a long career as a Shropshire journalist. He started life as a reporter on the Wellington Journal and then the Shrewsbury Chronicle, and later set up his own press agency in Shrewsbury, covering everything from Crown Court cases to sport.

With Radio Shropshire he travelled the length and breadth of the country following the Town – "and I was lucky when the radio service started, as Shrewsbury were in the old second division <the Championship today> and playing some big teams. Manchester City, Leeds, Chelsea and more."

Like any long-serving reporter, he saw off a list of Shrewsbury managers. "Interesting fellows, all of them," he says, "but two really stood out for me.



"John Bond was a man of charisma who'd known the big time, and when you put a microphone in front of him he didn't need any warming up. He had a colourful opinion on anything and everything.

"I also remember when Shrewsbury played at Torquay one afternoon. He'd played there briefly towards the end of his playing career (he'd been at the top with West Ham), and he got a standing ovation from the Torquay supporters. And after the game, he did a lap of honour. The opposing manager!

"Another good manager was Ian McNeill. He was honest, open and a genuine character with his Scots brogue and a twinkle in his eye."

With following your team, as any fan will testify, there are highs and lows.

"Some of the big stadiums we went to will always stick in the mind. The magnificent trophy room at the two Sheffield clubs. Teenager Carl Griffiths scoring a couple in a 3-2 win at Leeds. The excitement of the cup.

"And lower down, the hospitality at the likes of Exeter with its corrugated iron stand, and Bury with the black pudding they offered you!

"The lows?

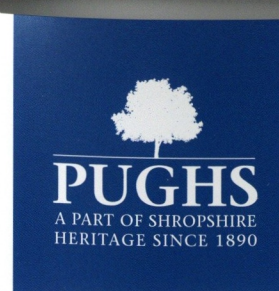
"Going to Newcastle for a midweek Zenith Data Cup game. The press box was being rebuilt, so James Bond and I found ourselves perched on a plank of wood across two buckets between the touchline and the terrace wall, on a night when it hailed, snowed, poured with rain, plus thunder and lightning – with one umbrella to protect us. We were soaked. The ink on our notes just washed away. And Town lost in the last minute.

"Afterwards we would face a long journey back – and I remember thinking, fans listening at home on the sofa would just think we were having a glamorous night out."

Russell still follows the Town's fortunes, and never misses a game on Radio Shropshire.

"Stuart Dunn's done really well. He's knowledgeable, he paints a picture of what's going on, he has good melody in his voice, and he's quite clearly passionate about the team – but, quite rightly, always tells it as it is."

Well – he had a good teacher.
