We have organised a friendly against Hemel Hempstead on Wednesday which will benefit a number of these players.



Healthier

Tonight's match against Dagenham and Redbridge has obvious resonance for John Still. As most of us will know, John managed the Daggers from 1989 to 1994 and from 2004 until joining us in 2013.

Again, and as most of us will know, his record, with very limited finances at his disposal, was a remarkable one. He achieved two promotions, enabling Dagenham and Redbridge to achieve their highest ever league position – having secured promotion to League 1.

Unfortunately, the team only survived for one year in that division but that does not detract from the manner in which the club's fortunes were transformed under his jurisdiction.

Happily for us, John is now our manager and recent performances have given us all hope that last season's successes could potentially be repeated this season. I write these notes having just got back from the fantastic result at Hartlepool – where we played some terrific stuff and cemented our fourth-place position – which I hope we can improve upon tonight.

Standard

To achieve the aim of a second successive promotion will depend, however, upon the standard of recent performances being maintained. Tonight's match is, of course, a difficult one. Although Dagenham have not been as consistent as, no doubt, their supporters would have liked, they have still produced some good results – including a very useful away win at Accrington, last Saturday week. We have, in the recent past, conducted, in conjunction with local charity Unleashing Potential, a series of interactive events with schools.



For instance, in the summer we undertook our World Cup Week of Learning – when 700 local school children attended the ground over a period of three days. They were treated to an interactive assembly from an educational rapper, a ground tour and the opportunity to lift a replica World Cup.

The kids loved it – and so did we! We really hope that some of those children will become committed Luton Town fans in the future.

One of the things that really excites me about my job is the opportunity to interface and liaise with various

organisations and bodies to help the club use its very powerful brand to assist those organisations.

We undertake a large number of charitable events, in addition to the school-based activities described above. If you are involved with a charity, or know someone who is, please do contact me if you have ideas as to how we could help your charity in fundraising or other charitable aims.

Whilst we are helping these deserving bodies to obtain a helping hand, in doing so we also get the opportunity to talk about the football club.

Every time we do that, there is the chance of converting somebody into becoming a Luton Town fan. We need as many fans as we can get.

Personally, it really irritates me when I see young children walking around the town, wearing Chelsea, Manchester United, Manchester City or Arsenal shirts. It is even more annoying when they are wearing the shirts of foreign teams such as Barcelona or Brazil. Anything we can do to convert those youngsters into becoming Luton fans is good by me.

Please do not hesitate to contact me if you do have any ideas as to how the Club can help the community of Luton and, in doing so, help us to become a bigger club.

Congratulations

I would also like to congratulate John Buttelle, who won the Lifetime Achievement Award at the Luton Community Awards on 10th October. John has been associated with this club for over 50 years. He won the award, not just because of his devotion to this Club – though his work here involves him assisting a multitude of worthy causes – but because, in his personal capacity he has been responsible for raising huge sums of money for charity. I am sure that our many supporters who have had the privilege of knowing, being helped by or working with John, will want to offer their congratulations too.

Let's cheer as loudly as we can for three points this evening under the Kenilworth Road floodlights.



FROM THE DRESSING ROOM WITH STEPHEN McNULTY



After a slow start to the season it was great to pick up a fifth straight win on Saturday against Hartlepool.

What is most encouraging is that we have gradually have found our feet at this level without having reached our full potential yet and with a number of players unavailable through injury.

This upturn in fortune is testament to the hard work and ability of the lads and the management of the gaffer and his staff. Soon we'll have a number of players watching in the stands who will count themselves unlucky not to be in the starting XI. That will be a good problem from the gaffer...I won't envy him when that time comes.

At Hartlepool I thought they put us under pressure in spells at the start of each half but I don't really think they really got in behind us to test Tyles at all during the 90 minutes. It was disappointing to concede a goal from the penalty spot late in the game; from where I was stood at the time I don't think it was a foul by Scotty. However, it mattered little in the grand scheme of things and the victory was another important win.

Solidity

We've conceded just twice in the last seven matches and it is great to see that our defensive solidity, that served us so well last year, is coming to the fore again this season. The long hours on the training field really do pay off in games. We will spent a big chunk of our week defending and that has served us in good stead when teams really put us under the cosh.

At the other end, we scored twice on Saturday with Cully on hand to score once more and it was good to see Jim score his first goal for the club, following up after Ricky saw his free-kick saved. After his decent loan spell at Dover it's good to see Ricky back.

Given the run we're on it will be easy to get carried away. After six wins and a draw from seven games that is no surprise. However, we have a strong and experienced manager, coaching staff and dressing room that will ensure we will not get complacent. As I've said, it's a long old season and a lot can change.

Who would have thought we would be fourth in the table after six games this season when we had five points? All we need to do is to keep working hard as a group. We've got ourselves into a good position – now it's up to us to push on.

This evening we take on Dagenham & Redbridge, a club of course that the gaffer, Terry and a number of the lads have great affection for. The manager spent 10 years there so it is understandable that the game takes on a different significance, but he's been in the game long enough to know that he's the manager of Luton Town and over the course of the 90 minutes he'll be doing everything in his powers to ensure we walk away with the three points come 9.30 tonight.

Our recent form might mean we go into the match as favourites but that's nothing new to us. This season we haven't had big expectation on us, as we have in previous seasons, but with Dagenham at the other end of the table I guess a lot of people might be expecting us to win tonight. In my experience these are the games that are the toughest. We've already seen how competitive this league is, and that teams at the bottom can easily beat those at the top. Let's hope that tonight isn't one of those occasions.

Wilko wins award

Town defender Luke Wilkinson was named the Sky Bet League 2 Player of the Month for September last week.

The Hatters did not concede a goal with Wilkinson in the side in September and the centre-half notched his first goal for the club in the 2-0 win over Oxford three weeks ago.

John Still told lutontown.co.uk: "Luke has done tremendously since joining us and his form is testament to a fantastic attitude."

"Bearing in mind he had a little injury during pre-season he has worked incredibly hard to get fully fit and play an important role in the team.

"The defence as a whole has been magnificent but I still think you're yet to see the best of Luke Wilkinson."

Sky Sports' Football League pundit Don Goodman said: "He has thankfully recovered from a back injury and his presence makes the Luton defence difficult to breach.

"They did not concede a goal in September, need I say more."



Sky Bet Football Trading Manager Paul Lowery said: "It would have been 100/1 for Luton to have kept clean sheets in each of the four games in which Luke Wilkinson played, but that's exactly what they did."

"Luke also grabbed himself a goal during Luton's 2-0 victory over Oxford. He was 25/1 to grab the first of the game, and 12/1 to score at any point during that game."

Green light for Mansfield match

The Hatters' Sky Bet League 2 fixture with Mansfield Town, scheduled for Saturday 29th November, at Kenilworth Road will go ahead on the day as planned.

As was reported two weeks ago, Bedfordshire Police advised the Club of a potential English Defence League march through Luton on the same day.

However, the EDL march is now due to take place on another day, allowing the Town's match with the Stags to take place.

Inevitably, given the need to advise supporters of the potential re-arrangement, the Club has seen cancellations for commercial bookings for this particular game. How's that for goal value?

Hatters fans got the fourth-best value per goal among English clubs for their season ticket last season, according to the BBC's annual The Price of Football survey.

The Town's price-per-goal figure of £4.69 in the report is just 31p behind Fleetwood, whose supporters got the best value per goal last season for their season ticket, but above every club in both the Premier League and Championship and all bar two in League 1.

The price-per-goal figure is based on the cheapest season ticket cost last season and the number of home goals scored last term. The Town celebrated promotion back to the Football League and won 18 of their 23 home fixtures last season.

However, deconstructing the basis of the survey, which were posted on the BBC website at last week, it reveals that the value supporters get supporting the Hatters should be better than reported.

The survey is intended to benchmark the value for money (or otherwise) supporters get from their football clubs across the top five leagues in England but, in reality, the cost of being a Luton Town supporters isn't truly reflected as discounts taken up by the majority haven't been accounted for within the survey. Furthermore, there is no adjustment made for the fact that Kenilworth Road is an all-seater stadium comparing it's pricing against competitors who had, in some cases, large areas of open, standing terracing.

Statistically, around 40 per cent of all adult season ticket members purchased their tickets at £300, less than the £330 minimum price quoted in the article and only 1.5 per cent of all adult season ticket members purchased at the £400 - the maximum price quoted.

Reacting to the results of the report, Town Chief Executive, Gary Sweet, said: "The survey is a welcome piece of work and could, if researched more acutely, become a valuable entry into the football calendar.

"While we're delighted that we have been identified as one of the least expensive clubs to see a goal – even if the report is 10-20 per cent adrift – I would have preferred to see more accuracy in the report and a fairer analysis, such as terracing prices to be separated or extracted, and for discounts to be included.

"This is the first season we have increased general prices – to most – since we became custodians in 2008 and we were keen to reward loyalty with an amnesty for those wonderful people who have continued to support us during the Conference era; which we'll endeavour to reward for future seasons.

"At Luton Town, we pride ourselves on offering our supporters good value for a professional service and an exciting day out. We know we're not perfect but we're getting there. Our supporters should expect to receive better value from the Club in future as we recognise that football, at the top level, could be in danger of forgetting its true fans, as the real cost of supporting a Club is eating too much into the average or lower man's wage."

Southend Golden Gamble

Town fan Nick Horsler had extra reason for cheer at our last home match with Sound after winning the half-time Golden Gamble draw.

Nick scooped £920 after his ticket, 12793, was plucked out of the barrel during the break at the weekend.

Remember tickets are only £1 and half of the proceeds go back to the football club, while the other half goes into the kitty.

NORTHAMPTON TOWN



WHO? Northampton Town, aka the Cobblers, from Northampton, Northamptonshire. The club were formed 117 years ago and are currently managed by former Halifax and Oxford boss Chris Wilder, who took over at Sixfields last season. Their traditional club colours have been claret and white.

A LOAD OF COBBLERS. Northampton are nicknamed the Cobblers, a reference to the town's historical shoe-making industry. If you like your shoe stories...Over 4,000 pairs of leather shoes and 600 pairs of cavalry jack-boots for the Parliamentary armies were manufactured in Northampton during the Civil War, and a further 2,000 for Oliver Cromwell's New Model Army in 1648. Until well into the 19th century, the shoe industry boomed in and around the town with small manufacturing workshops set up in the surrounding areas.

SINCE WE'VE BEEN GONE... The two clubs will meet for the first time in Football League competition since April 2008. The year the Town dropped out of the League in 2009 the Cobblers were relegated from League 1. After 11th and 16th placed finishes in League 2, Northampton almost suffered relegation to the Conference but a late rally in form kept them up. In 2012/13, the Cobblers reached the League 2 Play-Off final, only to lose to Bradford. Last season saw them struggle again, however, Wilder kept them up. Their 21st-place position was their lowest since they finished bottom of the old Division 3 in 1993/94 – a season they avoided relegation with Kidderminster, Conference winners, unable to meet League ground capacity criteria.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE? The Hatters won the last meeting between the two sides in a November

2011 FA Cup first round tie at Kenilworth Road – Adam Watkins scoring a late winner which would eventually lead to Cobblers boss Gary Johnson being sacked. Both clubs have met a total of 80 times with the Hatters winning 38 to Northampton's 27. At Kenilworth Road the Town have won 29 of the 41 meetings. The Cobblers have won five games on Bedfordshire soil, the last coming in September 2000. That 2-0 victory was their first at Kenilworth Road since 1920. Overall 223 goals have been scored in Luton-Northampton clashes, working out at an average of 2.78 goals per game.

THIS TIME ROUND. After last season's campaign of struggle, Northampton have started the season well and have been in and around the top seven for several weeks so far. The Cobblers lost to Cheltenham on Saturday and tonight host Wilder's former club Oxford at Sixfields. Top scorer is striker Marc Richards has eight goals so far.

CLUB CONNECTIONS. The Town have one former Cobbler in their ranks in the shape of Luke Guttridge, who scored 14 goals and played 112 matches for Northampton in two spells. Other players to have played for both include centre-forward Steve Howard – who joined the Town from the Cobblers and went onto to score 103 goals in 228 games – Terry Branston, Anthony Charles and Greg Taylor. Craig Hinton, who spent a short loan spell at Kenilworth Road in 2010, is the Cobblers' Under-18 coach.

DID YOU KNOW? That the Cobblers hold the record for the shortest time taken to be promoted from the bottom tier to the top tier and relegated back down to the bottom again, in the space of nine years. Three promotions, in 1961, 1963 and 1965, saw Northampton reach the top flight. Then relegations in 1966, 1967 and 1969 completed the ultimate yoyo.

This match is not all-ticket for Luton Town supporters but tickets are available in advance from the ticket office at a reduced rate. We have received a full allocation of 260 seats and an initial allocation of 300 terrace tickets for this game. The total allocation of terrace tickets is 1,053.

Tickets are now on sale to season ticket holders until close of business on Wednesday 22nd October (at two per season ticket). Any remaining tickets will go general sale online at 5pm on Wednesday 22nd October and over the phone or in person from Thursday 23rd October.

Tickets are £1 cheaper to buy in advance, the prices are as follows:

Stagecoach Stand seating: adults £21, seniors over 61 £16, under-18s/students with valid NUS card £7, under-12s £4. St James Road away terrace: adults £16, seniors over 61 £13, under-18s/students with valid NUS card £7, under-12s £3.

Ambulant disabled fans are charged the appropriate age related price with a helper free of charge.

Three wheelchair spaces are available at £20 and can also be purchased through the Luton Town ticket office.

Tickets will be available on the day subject to availability priced £1 more than the buy if bought in advance.






Welcome

DAGENHAM & REDBRIDGE



It gives us great pleasure to welcome everyone associated with Dagenham & Redbridge to Bedfordshire tonight for what is only their second League visit to Kenilworth Road.

The Daggers arrive here this evening aiming to bounce back from their last-gasp 1-0 home defeat against Newport County on Saturday.

Boss Wayne Burnett, who took over from John Still when the Hatters manager left Victoria Road in February 2013, brings his side to Kenilworth Road in 19th place in the League 2 standing having taken 14 points from 13 games so far, winning four and losing seven of those.

However, if you're thinking the Town are in for an easy three points then think again. The Daggers' form on the road is better than their record at home. Burnett's side have won two and lost five at home, whereas on their travels they have lost just twice in six matches, scoring nine goals in the process.

So far this term tonight's visitors have won most recently at Accrington Stanley 10 days ago, whilst the Daggers have also won, like the Town, at Hartlepool. Draws have also been gained at Oxford and Cheltenham.

Saturday's defeat to Newport was their fifth defeat in seven home league games, so no doubt tonight's visitors will be happy to be away from home once more again.

Last season, Burnett's first full campaign in charge, was hailed a success as the Daggers defied the bookmakers' predictions of a season of struggle by finishing in ninth

place in League 2, which was 1.1 points away from a Play-Off place and 10 above the final relegation place.

Although much is sure to be made of the first game between the two clubs since Still's switch to Kenilworth Road, the Daggers squad is one which is significantly made-up of players signed under Burnett's tenure.

The likes of Scott Doe and captain Abu Ogogo joined under Still but Burnett has excelled in bringing in a mix of young and hungry (sound familiar?) and experienced players since taking charge.

Experience doesn't come much more significant than striker Jamie Cureton, the Daggers' top goalscorer this season with five goals to his name. The 39-year-old frontman is chasing 300 career goals and is fast becoming a vital part of Burnett's side.

While the Town have many former Dagenham players in their ranks, there is one familiar face in the Daggers squad. Hatters fans never got to see the best of midfielder Andre Boucaud after the midfielder joined from York, but after he left Kenilworth Road to join York, the Trinidad & Tobago international (he played against Lionel Messi in a friendly against Argentina before the World Cup) signed for Dagenham this summer and has gone on to be an influential figure in the middle of the park for the Daggers.

Dagenham last visited Kenilworth Road last summer in a friendly that the Town won 3-0 (Mark Cullen, Alex Lacey and Shaun Whalley on target) but the Hatters were also triumphant in the Daggers' sole competitive visit back in 2008 when winning 2-1 in League 2 thanks to goals from Paul McVeigh and Sol Davis.

► THE MANAGER

WAYNE BURNETT. The boss who took over from John Still in 2013. Joined the Daggers' coaching staff in 2009, originally as academy manager. As a player served Blackburn, Plymouth, Bolton, Huddersfield and Grimsby.

► GOALKEEPERS

LIAM O'BRIEN. England Under-19 international stopper who joined the Daggers in May this year following his release from Brentford. Made his Football League debut with Barnet.

MARK COUSINS. Former Fulham and Colchester goalkeeper who arrived at Dagenham this summer following the end of his contract with the U's.

► DEFENDERS

DAMIEN BATT. Experienced defender who signed this summer after leaving part-time football with Eastleigh. Began at Norwich as a youngster before spells in non-league, helping Oxford win promotion in 2010.

JACK CONNORS. Daggers academy graduate who penned professional terms last season. Made his debut in September 2013 and has been capped at under-21 level for the Republic of Ireland.

SCOTT DOE. Long-serving centre-half who joined the Daggers in March 2009 from Weymouth. Been a regular ever since and has now made over 200 Football League appearances.

BRIAN SAAH. Former Leyton Orient and Cambridge central defender who signed for the Daggers in July 2013 after rejecting a new deal at Torquay. Missed just three games in League 2 last season.

ABU OGOGO. Club captain and right-back who arrived at Victoria Road in July 2009 after his release from Arsenal. Was part of the Daggers side that won the League 2 Play-Offs in 2010, and was last season's Player of the Year.

NATHAN GREEN. Left-back or winger who was spotted playing for Tonbridge Angels in Conference South last season. Previous on the books at Lewes and Billericay.

► MIDFIELDERS

ASHLEY CHAMBERS. Speedy winger or striker with a good record against the Hatters following spells at York and Cambridge. Began his career at Leicester before joining York, scoring in the 2012 Play-Off final against the Town.

GEORGE PORTER. Midfielder who penned a short-term deal with the Daggers this summer. Began at Cray Wanderers, then joined Leyton Orient and then Burnley. Was on Rochdale's books last season.

JOSS LABADIE. Close season arrival who signed after leaving Torquay. Came through the West Brom academy before signing for Tranmere, who he played 70 times for, and then Notts County.

LUKE HOWELL. All-action midfielder who has been with the Daggers since August 2011. Began his career at Gillingham before moving to MK Dons and then Lincoln. Top scorer in 2012/13 and closing in on 100 appearances for the club.

ASHLEY HEMMINGS. Former England youth international who arrived this summer from Walsall. Began his career at Wolves but has enjoyed numerous loan spells, including one with Burton last term.

ANDRE BOUCAUD. Experienced central midfielder who is no stranger to Kenilworth Road after a short spell with the club in 2012. Joined the Daggers from Notts County and is a Trinidad & Tobago international.

► STRIKERS

JAMIE CURETON. Evergreen striker who began his career with Norwich, making his debut in the Premier League in 1994. Targeting 300 career goals after time with 15 clubs, including prolific spells at Bristol Rovers, Reading, Colchester, Norwich and Exeter.

RHYS MURPHY. Summer 2013 arrival from Dutch club Telstar. Began his career at Arsenal but scored on his Daggers debut. Missed the end of last season with a thigh injury.

ZAVON HINES. Former West Ham, Burnley and Bradford forward who signed for the Daggers at the end of August last year. Penned a new two-year deal this summer.

ADE YUSUFF. Young striker who signed last month from Chatham and scored twice in the Daggers' win at Accrington recently. Started last season at Hornchurch and has also played for Biggleswade.




FROM THE OAK ROAD

Nick Murphy has fond memories of John Still's tenure: Play-Off glory at Wembley and snatching a late point at the home of East London rivals Charlton – just two 'magic moments' that spring to mind. Life goes on though, and in Jamie Cureton, the Daggers possess a cutting edge which has wounded the Hatters on more than one occasion in the past...


TALK OF THE TOWN: There's only one person with which to start – John Still. What's your favourite John Still memory from his time in charge of the Daggers? Is he still regarded as a legend amongst the club's fans? What is John's legacy to Dagenham?

NICK: There are so many brilliant memories to choose from Still's time at the Daggers, but for me personally the 2010 Play-Off campaign is hard to beat. Specifically the 6-0 win against Morecambe, but more obviously the final against Rotherham are two memories that I'll never forget. I'm fairly certain he's regarded as a legend here, alongside Terry Harris, of course, who also has connections with the club stretching further back. John's legacy is essentially that he laid the foundations for us to try to establish ourselves as a Football League club, his scouting network of players has enabled us to thrive and provide some recognition in the footballing world. Regardless of how he may have departed, there's no doubting the influence and the legacy John had on the club.

TOTT: Wayne Burnett had big shoes to fill when he succeeded John Still – but has defied

the doom-mongers and kept the Daggers' ship sailing. What do you make of the job he is doing at Victoria Road?

NICK: I'm a big fan of Wayne, and although he has split opinion of late, I still maintain he's the right person to lead us forward. The main issue is with our home form, where we have a rotten record over the past year or so, whereas away from home we're fairly consistently getting good results – most recently at Accrington.

If we can start implementing Wayne's philosophy and ideas for the full 90 minutes at home, rather than 45 at a time, we'd almost certainly be picking up a bigger haul of points than we have been. The big question though is whether the performances will pick up at home, and if they do, can we start getting the right results.

TOTT: Which of your players should Luton keep a close eye on today? Who makes things tick?

NICK: There are a number of players who have been pivotal so far this season, none more so than Jamie Cureton. Despite his age, Cureton has been a star for us, making us tick going forward and providing the highest number of assists in the team. Elsewhere Abu Ogogo has been a rock in the midfield, while Ashley Chambers and Andre Boucaud have impressed after signing permanently in the summer, both adding much needed ingredients into the midfield area.

TOTT: Luke Wilkinson has made an impressive start to life at Kenilworth Road – were you sorry to lose him in the summer?





NICK: I was absolutely gutted to lose him. Although his last season with us wasn't particularly good, he was blighted by injury in pre-season, which ultimately left him at a disadvantage for the remainder of the season. There's a reason why he won the player of the year the season prior to that, and if I'm being honest, I think it was a mistake letting him go or at least not fighting harder to persuade him to stay.

TOTT: What is the most memorable Dagenham game you have ever seen?

NICK: For me personally, the 2-2 draw at Charlton in League 1 is a game that will live long in the memory. The unexpectedness of the result given the stature of the two clubs, at the Valley as well, contributed to an unforgettable occasion. Moreover the manner of our equaliser, having gone 2-1 down in injury time, only to come back to 2-2 in the dying seconds with a diving Jon Nurse header was simply brilliant. The Wembley game as a stand-alone fixture is obviously also up there.

TOTT: What makes being a Dagenham fan special? What is unique about the club which keeps calling you back for more?

NICK: I think it's just the community association that the club has with the supporters that makes clubs at this level, like Dagenham and Luton, special and unique. You feel valued as a supporter rather than as a customer like in the Premier League. Also the fact that you get to see young players develop and flourish, and while it is incredibly frustrating, there's not many greater thrills than seeing a player you saw on the terraces play in the Premier League, like Dwight Gayle, for example. You just wouldn't have it any other way.

TOTT: What are Dagenham's ambitions for the season? Do fans envisage a return to League 1 in the coming seasons? Or is it more about avoiding the Conference trap door? And what is your prediction for today's game?

NICK: As with every season, the first and primary ambition is to avoid relegation. This season however, I feel as though we are definitely capable of more. If we can sort the defence out, at home in particular, then we can certainly make a push towards the Play-Offs. As for the game tonight, I think I'd take a draw, although obviously I'd love a win. I'll go for a 2-2.

A HATTER...

AND A DAGGER

The two clubs of course are intricately linked by John Still, who spent two spells in charge of the Daggers and won the club promotion to the Football League by winning the Conference title and then to League 1 via the Play-Offs.

During his time here at Kenilworth Road the manager has brought a number of former Daggers to the club. Paul Benson, Scott Griffiths, Solomon Taiwo and Luke Wilkinson have all played significant parts whilst at Dagenham & Redbridge under Still.

However, scratch further below the surface and many more players have been on the books of both clubs down the years.

One player to have served both clubs with distinction is striker Mark Stein, who scored 27 goals in 107 games for the Hatters, and played in the Littlewoods Cup final win over Arsenal. After spells with QPR, Oxford, Stoke, Chelsea and a return back to Kenilworth Road, the South

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

Tonight is the fifth meeting between the two clubs in competitive competition and the third in the Football League. The head-to-head record reads two wins to both teams from the four previous meetings.

The Daggers were in the Conference on the first occasion the two sides met, back in October 2001 in an LDV Vans Trophy second round tie at Victoria Road. Then-Town boss Joe Kinnear made 11 changes for the tie, including midfielder Dean Brennan and striker Peter Thomson. Steve McGavin fired the hosts in front only for Brennan and Thomson to then put the Hatters ahead. Goalkeeper Mark Ovendale scored an own goal 15 minutes from time before Ashley Vickers' scored a golden goal winner three minutes into extra-time.

It wouldn't be until six years later, following Dagenham's promotion to the Football League, that the two clubs would meet again. The Town were the

African joined Dagenham in 2001 and notched 49 times in 76 games at Victoria Road.

Other players to have played for the Town and the Daggers include defenders Dean Beckwith, Will Antwi, Michael Spillane and Shane Blackett. Goalkeeper David Button, now at Brentford, spent loan spells with both the Hatters and the Daggers in 2009. Although he did not make a first team appearance for the Town, he was an unused substitute in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy final victory over Scunthorpe.

Finally, but by no means least, striker Mark Nwoko joined the Hatters on-loan from Dagenham during the 2009/10 campaign, and scored one goal – away to Rotherham in an FA Cup second round tie – in nine appearances.

Daggers' first-ever opponents in the League Cup in 2007 but goals from Matthew Spring and Drew Talbot secured the Hatters a 2-1 win.

A year later, after the Hatters' relegation the previous season, the two sides met in the League for the first time.

Goals from Sol Davis and Paul McVeigh earned the Hatters another 2-1 victory. A strike from left-back Davis put the Town ahead after just seven minutes but the Daggers fought back to level through Magnus Okuonghae just after the half-hour. However the Hatters secured all three points when McVeigh restored the lead four minutes before the break.

Later that season, the Town had a Valentine's Day to forget, this time on the receiving end of a 2-1 scoreline at Victoria Road to leave Mick Harford's side further in trouble at the bottom of the League 2 table.

Defender Danny Foster, now with Wycombe, struck both the Daggers' goals – accounting for 40 per cent of his overall career tally in over 300 senior matches. Ian Henderson scored the Town's goal, whilst Scott Griffiths and Solomon Taiwo played for the home side.

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS TRACES WHAT HAPPENED TO TWO OF THE DAGGERS' GREATEST POST-WAR TEAMS

► 2006/07 CONFERENCE CHAMPIONS

TONY ROBERTS: Former Welsh international goalkeeper who made a club record 175 League appearances before leaving Victoria Road in May 2011 to become Arsenal's full-time goalkeeping coach.

SCOTT GRIFFITHS: England Semi-Pro international right-back who scored once in 98 League games before moving to Peterborough United in October 2009. Now of course here at Kenilworth Road with the Hatters.

DANNY FOSTER: Defender who scored three times in 70 League outings prior to joining Brentford in July 2009. Later with Wycombe Wanderers, his career was ended by injury in November 2013.

DAVE RAINFORD: Influential midfielder who netted eight goals in 29 League games while at Victoria Road prior to joining Chelmsford City in May 2008 after being promoted in his school teaching job.

ANWAR UDDIN: The first Asian player to captain a League team, this central defender scored once in 64 League games, moving to Barnet in July 2010, then Sutton United and Eastbourne Borough.

JAKE LEBERL: Central defender who netted six goals in 84 League games before joining AFC Wimbledon in June 2007. He then had a spell back at Dover Athletic and since played for Faversham Town.

SAM SAUNDERS: Exciting winger who scored in five successive games in 2008-09. He netted 14 goals in 62 League outings prior to joining Brentford in July 2009. He appeared in the JPT final in 2011.

GLEN SOUTHAM: England Semi-Pro international midfielder who netted three goals in 75 League outings before joining Hereford United in July 2009, since playing for Barnet, Dover and Eastleigh.

PAUL BENSON: England Semi-Pro international striker who scored a club record 28 goals in 2006/07. He moved to Charlton in August 2010, then Swindon, Portsmouth, Cheltenham and now here at Kenilworth Road.

CRAIG MACKAIL-SMITH: Scotland international striker who moved to Peterborough United in January 2007. He starred in three promotion campaigns before joining Brighton in May 2011.

SAM SLOMA: Winger who joined Grays Athletic in June 2008, then played for Chelmsford, Woking, AFC Hornchurch and Wingate & Finchley. He now works for London & Capital financial services.

► 2009/10 PLAY-OFF WINNERS

TONY ROBERTS: Veteran stopper played almost 500 times in all competitions for the Daggers and was previous with QPR.

ABU OGOGO: Young right-back who forced his way back into the first-team after suspension. He was ever-present in 2012/13 and had scored 13 goals in 193 League games by the end of last season.

DAMIEN McCRRY: Republic of Ireland Youth left-back who was a mid-season signing from Plymouth Argyle. He scored once in 76 League outings before moving to Burton Albion in June 2012.

MARK ARBER: Experienced central defender who was Player of the Year in 2009/10. He netted 12 goals in 176 League outings before moving to Dartford in June 2012, since playing for Corby Town.

SCOTT DOE: Central defender who was runner-up in Daggers' 2009/10 Player of the Year awards. He was ever-present in 2012/13, scoring ten goals in 204 League games by the end of last season.

ROMAIN VINCENOT: French midfielder who was ever-present and top scorer in 2010-11, netting 13 goals in 55 League outings before moving to Brighton in June 2011. He is now with Leyton Orient.

DANNY GREEN: Ever-present winger who netted the second goal in the Play-Off final triumph, scoring 24 times in 87 League games. He joined Charlton Athletic in June 2011 and is now at MK Dons.

JON NURSE: Barbados international who scored the Daggers' first and last goals of the season, including their Wembley winner. He netted 27 times in 179 League games before joining Barnet in June 2012.



The Town made it five wins in six league matches to jump into fourth place in the table as two first half goals were enough to see off Southend United at Kenilworth Road.




The Shrimpers began the second half strongly but failed to turn their dominance into goals which enabled the Hatters to see out the game comfortably.



WHAT'S THE STORY?

The Hatters became the first club in League 2 to record five successive victories as goals from Mark Cullen and Jim Stevenson kept up their fine run of form at Hartlepool.

Showing just one change to the side that beat Southend the week before, John Still started striker Ricky Miller, recalled 48 hours previously from a loan spell at Dover after scoring five goals in 10 games.

Hosts Hartlepool had only scored two goals in six previous home games but started on the front foot. Striker Charlie Wyke tested Mark Tyler with a fourth-minute shot that the keeper did well to beat away.

Tyler kept out several half-chances as the Town worked their way into the game and five minutes before half-time the patient Hatters took the lead. Cullen, on his 50th appearance for the Town, took Pelly Ruddock Mpanzu's clever pass to slot home his fifth goal of the season.

Hartlepool upped the ante after half-time but failed to test Tyler and as the home side ran out of ideas the Town strengthened their grip on the game.

Luke Wilkinson had a bullet header cleared off the line, Cullen and Miller then both went close before Miller's free-kick nine minutes from the end was parried by home goalkeeper Scott Flinders and Stevenson was alive to the loose ball to tap home his first Luton goal to make it 2-0.

And despite the home side pulling a goal back with a stoppage time penalty, the Town held on record yet another victory – their fourth on the road this season – to close the gap on the top three.

SCOTT GRIFFITHS HAS FOND MEMORIES OF HIS TIME WITH TONIGHT'S VISITORS BUT HOW DOES BEING PART OF THE TOWN REVOLUTION UNDER JOHN STILL COMPARE TO WHEN THE PAIR WERE TOGETHER AT VICTORIA ROAD?

THE LEFT-BACK TELLS TALK OF THE TOWN

As unsung heroes go there aren't many better than Scott Griffiths. While the Town garnered 102 goals and 101 points on their way to winning the Conference title last year, there was one man at left-back that saw it all.

Griffiths played every single game for the Hatters last season and was part of the defence that kept a club record 23 clean sheets.

The championship success of last season was the third of Griffiths' career and his second in the Conference having been a part of the Dagenham & Redbridge side that won promotion to the Football League under John Still in 2006/07.

And that triumphant campaign with the Daggers remains close to the defender's heart.

Belief

"We never really had massive expectation at Dagenham because of the size of the club," Griffiths told Talk of the Town. "The Conference still had some big clubs in it that year but as we started to win games the manager kept saying 'don't think anything different – you've got an amazing chance of going up – we will go up'."

"The manager gave us belief and confidence. At the start of that season some players probably didn't believe in themselves that they could go on and be a success. I don't think they knew what they were capable of but the manager got it out of them and we won the league."

There was a similarity in the Daggers' title triumph of that year and of the Town's success last term, too, as Dagenham overhauled long-time leaders to then runaway with the championship and win it by 14 points.

"When we found ourselves in the top three we really thought to ourselves 'we can do this,'" continues the 28-year-old. "It was the same last year as well. At Dagenham we overtook Oxford, pretty much at the same

time as we went past Cambridge last year and we pretty much stayed there. It was a great time there."

With the Daggers holding off the likes of Oxford, Morecambe, York, Burton, Cambridge and Kidderminster – to name half-a-dozen teams – it was an achievement to be proud of.


However, as a fresh-faced 20-year-old it was that particular title success with tonight's visitors that means the most to Griffiths.

"The first title in your career is always special," says the left-back. "It is why Dagenham holds a very big place in my heart."

"Despite the fact they don't get the humungous crowds like we do here, the celebrations the day we won the title was fantastic. You felt like you were surrounded by very happy, cheerful people and that's why my whole time there was so enjoyable."

There are few 20-somethings that have a championship winners' medal on their mantelpiece at such a young age and Griffiths believes that achievement is a major reason why he's been able to add two more to his collection.

"The manager has always said about a winning mentality," he says, grinning before attempting to reel out more of Still's famous quotes.

"I think I have had that mentality instilled in me at a young age.

"I've been there and done that. It's like when you've not done something before you don't know how to do it. Once you have you then know how to; you know how you can make it happen again.

"For example, to win a title. I now know what it requires to win a league; I saw it last year – you do get an eye for it."

Griffiths' performances for the Daggers were not going unnoticed and in 2009 he signed, originally on loan, for then-Championship Peterborough United.


The move started well enough before not least four managers held the hotseat at London Road during Griffiths' time there.

But amid the ups and downs with Posh, there was more success, this time in League 2 – and guess what? Scott sees similarities with the Town squad of this year that was at Chesterfield in 2011.

"In my first season at Peterborough I played 20-25 games but a new manager came in, Gary Johnson.

"I fell out of favour because he thought I was too young...only for him to go and buy a player in my position roughly six months younger than me.

"Matters came to a head when I said I couldn't play because I was carrying an injury and he wanted to play me.

"I said I'd rather see someone play who was fit, rather than me hobbling around the pitch. I thought it was a decision for the good of the team."

"In any case it was Johnson that got me the loan move to Chesterfield. We won League 2 there that season so I know what it takes to win this division and I can see we've got the same ingredients here at Luton."

"It's the team bonding, the ability; things you see in training. I don't know, I think you can have that certain 'something' and I can tell its similar here now, I know it's going to be a good year. It's very exciting."

With Dagenham arriving at Kenilworth Road this evening, the former Southend youngster looked back on the time he was plucked from Aveye by Still as a teenager back in 2004.

"After leaving Southend's academy I went to Grays Athletic and played a few games for their reserves," explains Griffiths. "I was playing left midfield and scored a couple of goals and then, as a 17-year-old I joined Aveye."

"Although it was a lower level I will never forget playing there because I scored nine goals that season and I don't think I'm ever going to score that many in a season again!"

"I never knew anything about Dagenham's interest, though. It wasn't until Rob Garvey, one of

John's scouts, approached me after a game. After talking to him and the gaffer I had a trial and did well and earned myself a contract. I got in the first team soon after and the rest is history."

So what's changed in the last 10 years?

"Well the manager often asks his defenders 'can you head it? can you kick it?' and I could do both and I think I still can!" says Griffiths.

"That's all that matters. I think I've matured now and I'm a bit more confident on the ball now than I was when I first started."

And what about tonight?

"Well if myself, Paul Benson and Luke Wilkinson are involved it should be a good game for us," he says. "And with John and Terry's links to the club it should make for an interesting evening."

DID YOU KNOW?

Scott's goal in the Hatters' 6-0 win over Kidderminster in December last year was his first goal since scoring for Dagenham in their 5-0 win over Shrewsbury in League 2 in August 2009. Paul Benson struck the other four goals for the Daggers that afternoon.



NIGHTMARE OVER FOR GOALSCORER LAWLESS



Mark Tyler and Mark Cullen's tongues were firmly in their cheeks when they told Hatters Player that Alex Lawless' goal against Southend was a cross.

"Not. A. Chance," was the Welshman's response. He couldn't help but bite to a little bit of banter from his team-mates. After all, when you've scored your first goal in the Football League after years of trying, nobody is going to take the gloss of such an important point in your career.

Lawless' fine curling effort against the Shrimpers put the Town on their way to a fifth win in six League 2 matches but the midfielder's relief, on his first start of the season, was evident in his celebration. It was a goal, a moment, which meant a lot after months of frustration on the sidelines.

"It's hard to explain how I feel. I was desperate to play in the Carlisle game, absolutely desperate," said the 29-year-old, who had been on the sidelines with a hamstring injury this season.

"The frustration just made me want to do even more leading up to the weekend and now I'm just going to try and use the goal, the 90 minutes and the win to build my confidence.

"Of course it's a massive boost to my confidence, that's what those type of things are, and although I put pressure on myself to get more goals and help the team, hopefully I can build on that."

With the injury problems now behind him, the former York man is now hoping that is just the case: behind him, forgotten.

"It was a nightmare, highly frustrating but you've just got to dig in and people have moments like that," continued Lawless. "But hopefully I'm past that. I'm not really looking back on what the season has been like for me.

"The team has got the points when I haven't been playing and now I'm back I want to help them continue to do that, that's the main thing. Personally it's been frustrating but that's it, it's over, I'm only looking ahead now."

On the goal itself, the midfielder's 19th in Luton colours, Lawless admitted that he had an incline that he would notch against Southend after being told he would line-up on the left-hand side of midfield.

"Leading up to the game I had an idea I might be playing on the left," explained Lawless. "I had visions about scoring. I think you need to do that early on so that the full back, who might not know you're naturally right-footed, and are going to come inside.

"Fortunately the execution went with it, so it worked out great, it reminded me a little of the goal at Barnet on Boxing Day last season, cutting inside from the left onto my right foot.

"It was nice to be back starting, though and the next thing on the check list was that we go on and win the game, which we did.

"For a goal to have helped is just a bonus and now hopefully I can take that, the 90 minutes and the goal, and build on that."



STEVENSON AND MILLER ON HARTLEPOOL WIN

There were firsts for two of the Town side that earned the 2-1 win at Hartlepool on Saturday – with both involved in what turned out to be the winning goal at Victoria Park.

Striker Ricky Miller was recalled from a loan spell at Dover, where he had hit five goals in 10 games, to make his debut at Hartlepool and his 81st-minute free-kick set-up midfielder Jim Stevenson to net his first goal for the Town since arriving from Histon last year.

“It was brilliant to be involved, and a bonus to start,” 25-year-old Miller, who scored 28 goals for Boston last season, said. “The three points made it even better – it was a thoroughly fantastic result.

“I hoped that I would be involved somehow because I could have played 90 minutes at Dover. I think I slotted in okay and did my part. I think on another day I could have scored but all that matters is that we won and I hope I impressed the manager.

“I think I showed what I’m capable of. For the free-kick, Steve McNulty came over to me and said ‘make sure you hit the target’. I did that and fortunately for us Jimbo was on hand to put it in.

“Obviously my ambition was to come in and hit the ground running when I signed but patience isn’t my best attribute! But I’ve been working hard and now I’ve played a part I need to keep working hard to keep my place.

“The team have been winning and you can’t change a winning team so to get a chance was great. The team spirit and confidence is flying, all we need to do is to keep it going.”

For Stevenson, his first goal in Town colours was one to cherish having been given the opportunity this season by John Still.

The midfielder signed from Histon last summer was deprived of his first goal for the Town by a very late offside flag in the 2-0 win over Oxford last month but he was not be denied at Victoria Park.

“I don’t think I’ve had a shot since that effort!” he joked afterwards. “It’s nice to get a goal, it was an important one and that’s all that matters.

“I was in the right place, I picked a spot where I thought there seemed to be plenty of space and we’re always encouraged to ‘follow-in’ on those kinds of opportunities in training. If you get in there enough times a chance will eventually fall to you and this time that was the case.”

After spending last season on loan at Dartford Stevenson has already featured in the Town squad more times so far this campaign. And Stevenson believes that his hard work and dedication is paying dividends.

“I’m a big believer in working hard to get your rewards,” said Stevenson. “I look at the bigger picture. If you’re not in the team one week you’ve got to keep working to get back in it. This year the manager has rewarded my hard work in pre-season with a few opportunities and it’s been a case of kicking on and being patient.

“Scoring isn’t going to do my chances any harm, is it? We’re all on the same page as players. We want to push us further up the league.

“But we’re aware that we can play better, even though we’re on a great run. We still have players coming back who aren’t even 100 per cent fit yet. We know we can be more ruthless and if we can keep working hard I’m sure we can carry on this run.”



Andy Drury was given licence to roam around Kenilworth Road in a more advanced position in our last home game against Southend United and the midfielder's influence on the game was evident throughout.

The 30-year-old touched the ball more than any other Luton player with 89 'actions' according to statistical boffins InStat. 65 per cent of those actions were deemed successful but, as his touch graphic shows the former Crawley and Ipswich man popped up all over the field against the Shrimpers to deliver a fine performance.

His most successful action was his assist for Mark Cullen's goal which put the Town 2-0 in front on 34 minutes, having been inexplicably gifted the ball on the edge of the Southend penalty area by visiting, and possibly concussed, defender Cian Bolger.

Drury was also involved in Alex Lawless' opener, playing two passes in the sequence that led to the goal, swapping passes with Lawless in the middle of the pitch before setting up Scott Griffiths to play the final ball of the move.

The midfielder's pass accuracy rate reached 70 per cent, but what was most impressive was his ability to keep things ticking over in so-called 'non-attacking' moves. Drury was accurate with 19 of his 20 passes in non-attacking passages of play.

Overall Drury received 44 passes from team-mates, only second to striker Cullen who was given 57. The duo received more passes than any other player on the pitch, including the Southend players, an interesting statistic given the pair's involvement in the final third of the pitch in the formation John Still began with.





NEW BOY HARRIMAN OUT TO IMPRESS



Queens Park Rangers loanee Michael Harriman is aiming to put his experience to good use after signing on a 28-day emergency loan from the Premier League club.

The 21-year-old right-back made an impressive debut in the Town's 2-0 win over Southend United in the last home match here, just 48 hours after agreeing the temporary switch to Kenilworth Road. Having already enjoyed loan spells at Wycombe Wanderers and Gillingham in the last two seasons, the Republic of Ireland Under-21 international arrives in Bedfordshire with one goal: to play more games.

"Unfortunately I didn't make QPR's 25-man squad for the Premier League so I couldn't play there until January," said Harriman. "For me, I didn't want to sit around doing nothing, that's why I'm here as I love playing football."

"I didn't want to be sitting on Saturday on my sofa watching the results, I want to be out playing. I'm excited to be out there now and get first team action back under my belt."

"I've been lucky enough so far to get out in the league and get some games. I just want to use my experience, while learning from the players here as well. Everyone's got different experience levels here so I'm going to take everything on board wisely and hopefully progress as a player."

Harriman's performance against Southend was hailed by manager John Still, who substituted him in the final minute of the game so the defender could "experience the love of the Kenilworth Road crowd".

He certainly felt that, and the youngster admitted he would happily extend the loan beyond its 28 days should he be wanted.

"Hopefully I can do my part while I'm here now and see what happens at the end of the loan spell," continued Harriman. "If the first month goes well, I'll be happy to stay, so we'll see how it goes game by game."

"It's all about a learning curve for me and getting as many games under my belt as possible, while getting better as a player which I think I'm doing slowly."

"It's short-term so I've got to come in and show that I'm good enough to play with these lads. They've had a great start and if you come in and you're out of place it will get noticed so I want to be positive."

With League 2 experience already in his locker after 20 matches in the division with Wycombe the season before last, Harriman is hoping his introduction to an in-form Town team will be as comfortable as possible.

"We've already got a good back four, so hopefully I can just slot in with ease," he continued. "The boys are doing well and that's why they're there up near the top."

"My fitness levels are quite good. I love to win tackles and I like to go forward too. Defensively I think I'm solid, so hopefully I can bring a lot of attributes to the team."

And while he's already been subjected to the hurly-burly of League 2 before, Harriman has no qualms about the challenges that lie ahead.

He added: "I came in here with an open mind, that's the best way to be. Then you don't have any expectations so you come in ready and it's a new start."

Club historian **ROGER WASH** looks back on the time the Town put seven past Charlton at Kenilworth road

Luton Town 7-1 Charlton Athletic - 3rd September 1977

It was certainly a hectic close season for the Town players in the summer of 1977, with the squad embarking on a 33,000-mile round trip to tour the USA, New Caledonia, New Zealand and Fiji.

The party travelled from Heathrow to Los Angeles and then to St Louis, where the local side was beaten 3-2. From the sunny States it was on to New Zealand, where it was the middle of winter, and three wins were recorded out of four games.

On then to humid New Caledonia and Fiji where three further games were played and won.

It was a tired party that eventually arrived back on these shores after what must have been one of the longest tours in football history, and after very little respite it was back to pre-season training ready for another determined tilt at the Division Two (now Championship) title.

Pre-season training was hindered by the absence of three first-team players; Paul Price, Alan West and Ron Futcher, who were all enjoying a summer playing in the USA and who were not due back until the English season had started.

Only Phil Boersma, a £35,000 signing from Middlesbrough, was added to the squad and it was a severely depleted team that entertained Arsenal in a prestigious pre-season friendly at Kenilworth Road.

The game attracted a reasonable crowd of 6,300 many of whom had turned up to see the debut of Pat Jennings in the Arsenal goal, and they were pleasantly surprised by a fighting Town performance that earned the players a well deserved draw.

Orient were the visitors to Kenilworth Road for the first League game of the season, and with Futcher, Price and West still absent, Graham Jones, Tim Smith and David Carr were drafted into the side.

A crowd of 8,061 turned up to see the makeshift line-up, and although the record books show that the Town won 1-0 courtesy of a second half goal from full-back Steve Buckley, the scoreline was rather unfair on the 'O's who had their chances to take both points.



WOMEN & GIRLS FOOTBALL

It was great to see the Luton Ladies secure a 2-1 victory over Bedford Ladies last Wednesday at Kenilworth Road.

Holding the game at the stadium certainly raises the profile of the women's and girls' game and this ties in really nicely with the new Female Football Development programme (FFD) that the Trust are now about to become involved in through the Football League Trust. The FFD programme was launched last year in England with a goal to 'Inspire the Future Female Game' and aims to play an integral role in the progression of the women's and girls' game and drive participation growth and retention

through the delivery of sessions built around fun, friends and fitness.

We have now joined nearly every other Football League club in beginning to deliver FFD sessions aimed at 14-25-year-olds, and in the next few months, in partnership with the Beds FA and our County Sports Partnership team Bedfordshire and Luton, we will be setting up centres in local schools and colleges to engage with fresh participants, as part of the new FA Women's and Girls' programme. It is a big national programme and overall £2.4m will be invested over the next two years from Sport England funding, in an attempt to make Women's Football the second-most played team sport in England with a target of 40,000 new players.

We hope to play an important part along with all other Football League clubs in helping to account for over a third of the national target, firstly by breaking down elite barriers so our FFD will offer the opportunity for players of all abilities to join the female football revolution. We hope many participants will be enjoying their first real kicks, whilst for others, the sessions will aim to reignite a sporting passion, by easing back into playing - but pressure-free. Through our proposed different approaches, such as incorporating music and allowing participants ownership of sessions, we aim to bring the beautiful game to life for women and girls, taking players from disengagement, to playing for a team maybe within the space of few weeks.

Of course, new participants falling in love with the game for the first time, or all over again, have numerous pathways to graduate beyond grassroots at the club through our partnership with Luton Ladies and whether participants wish to excel in playing, become a coach that inspires the future generation, or maybe combine education with playing in the future, then we now have the opportunity to offer the same through this partnership.

Half-term soccer camps on the way!

ASIAN FOOTBALL INITIATIVE

Last month we played to host to one of the regional forums set up by the Football Association to consult on issues addressing Asian inclusion across grassroots football in the UK.

It was a really good turnout in the Eric Morecombe suite and lots of views and feedback was gathered by the FA from everyone involved in local football to take back to Wembley to help with the FA's overall future development plan to devise suggested activities to get more Asians involved playing the game and eventually to progress through into the professional game.

One consistent request from the local community was for local community coaching centres for young players to attend to improve skills.

It seems we anticipated this almost a year ago as we partnered with the Beds FA and Sport England to provide pathways to local competitive football for Asian youths living in the Dallow area with our popular centres at Dallow Community Learning Centre.

At Denbigh High School on a Tuesday night and Luton Sixth Form on a Thursday as we began looking to identify untapped talent on our doorstep, as well as aiming to boost social inclusion and community cohesion by bringing the football club closer to the local community.

The centres have proved hugely successful with over 100 boys each week attending.

Let's hope that the FA come up with plans to increase funding for these centres – the more boys we can get playing, the greater the chance we have of progressing them through our youth development system and into senior football.

That's a view shared by Hatters Talent Identification manager, Ross O'Kane. "There is no doubt a significant pool of untapped ability exists on our doorstep and its

growing - we need to tap into it and show local youngsters there is no barrier to football success at our youth academy," he said. "Our tie up with the Beds FA and local partner clubs in Dallow such as Luton Allstars, Luton United and Luton Sporting Club will help us identify talent and to encourage the boys to play regular organised weekend football in the local leagues where we do a lot of our recruitment."

The three current centres are open to all boys living in Dallow and anyone wishing to take part, or who needs more information on these and other centres that the community department will be running, can contact the community office on 01582 737568.

The long-term aim of the project is to provide more opportunities for boys in Dallow to take part in affiliated football, either with existing local clubs or through the establishment of additional teams from the area. A much-changed and very young line up from the previous week's excellent win away to Leyton Orient was on display for the Hatters youth on Saturday at Ely Way as they welcomed their Gillingham counterparts to Ely Way.

Injuries from that game to Leeroy Maguraushe, Daryl Ngwala, Isaac Galliford and Lee Hawkes meant that they were ruled out along with also unavailable Luke Trotman, Harry Tamplin, Kyran McGhan-George and Liam Gooch, but Craig King was fit against to take over in goal with Under-16 players Joe Hankins, Tyreeq Bakinson and Cameron McJannet getting an early chance to show Paul Driver and Head of Youth Wayne Turner how far their game has progressed this season.

Although Gillingham are towards the lower end of the league, they had registered an excellent 5-0 the previous week and started well having the best of the chances in the early stages as the Hatters settled into their game slowly.

Midway through the half, and with Osamu Allman causing the Gillingham defence all sorts of problems, it was the Hatters that struck twice in quick succession to seize the initiative in the match. Firstly, Ekene Amadi timed his run into the six-yard box to perfection to slam home Joe Hankins' cross and then a neat spin and shot from Tuki Tayali doubled the lead for the Hatters.

This advantage was then built upon just before half-time when Allman added a third as his goal-bound shot from 10 yards deflected away from the goalkeeper off of a Gillingham defender to make it 3-0 to the Hatters at the break.

As expected, the visitors came out much more intent after the break and the Hatters stood firm to maintain their lead and nullify the threat from the opposition.

A fourth goal was then added midway through the second half when a James Justin corner was nodded back across goal by Bakinson and volleyed home from 15 yards by Alex Atkinson.

This extra cushion allowed Driver to make changes, with, first, Geo Craig replacing Amadi in attack, and then two more Under-16 players, Akin Famowa and Josh Brown, were introduced for McJannet and Bakinson respectively for their second game for the Youth Team after substitute appearances against Orient last week.

Although there was no addition to the scoring, Craig showed glimpses of the quality that he can bring to the attack and the defence – marshalled well by Frankie Musonda and Craig King – and showed how effective he can be.

A second successive clean sheet was kept despite using three Under-16s, six different players and two different goalkeepers in those two games.

A happy Driver told Talk of the Town: "We have been really pleased with the lads over the past few weeks. Injuries have disrupted a lot of the work we have been doing but this hasn't affected the performances – as individuals or as a team – which is to their credit.

"The big plus for us as a coaching staff is that we have had an early chance to expose a good number of the Under-16s to this next level up and this will definitely help us make better decisions regarding who should come into us on a scholarship next season.

"From the boys' perspective too, their development can only be helped by playing with the older group and they have all put in good performances on the pitch as well as showing us that they are not fazed by the extra pressure of playing up."

HE'S ONE OF A SELECT GROUP OF TOWN PLAYERS TO GRADUATE FROM THE ACADEMY AND GO ON TO STAR IN THE PREMIER LEAGUE. **KEVIN FOLEY** REFLECTS ON THE UPS AND DOWNS DURING HIS TIME AT KENILWORTH ROAD



"Don't worry I could talk about Luton all day," says Kevin Foley as we usher our apologies for interrupting his daily schedule of the school-run last Wednesday afternoon.

As the phone call ticked around to the two-and-a-half mark Foley soon became aware, as the conversation wandered from his time in the Town's youth system to watching himself on Match of Day in the Premier League with Wolves, that he's nearly 30. "That's outrageous!" he shrieked.

Admittedly we hadn't helped: reminding him that it is almost nine years since the Hatters had beaten Leeds United 5-1 in the Championship – before the wheels fell off and the Town's downward spiral began. The season of 2006/07, that saw the Town relegated from the Championship, was the toughest of Kevin Patrick Foley's career. But more of that later – let's start at the beginning.

Everyone likes a hometown boy done good. Except that's not entirely true. Contrary to anything ever-written about Foley he is not a Lutonian.

However, Luton was the place where the football bug was caught, and soon after kicking the ball around the park as a young boy in a Manchester United shirt, it wouldn't be long before Foley was outlining a career in the game.

"People think I was born in Luton, but I was born in London and moved to Luton when I was five," explains Foley. "I grew up in Luton, in Farley Hill, and I didn't really play football properly until I was eight or nine.

"I was playing for Barnfield Colts and was scouted to go on a six-week trial with Luton Town centre of excellence. Fortunately for me I was taken on at the age of nine by Paul Lowe.

"Lee Cowley was coaching and he really did teach me a lot. Sometimes it wasn't easy, especially as a young boy because all you want to do was to play football all the time, and the sessions would be stop-start. But that was the important thing – he was coaching us and preparing us to be footballers, we were taught the basics; how to play on the back foot, how to pass the ball effectively. This was a really key thing for me in my younger years and I'm glad he's still at Luton coaching now.

"At that time I never took anything for granted but halfway through my last year as an under-16 I was told I was going to be offered a two-year YTS deal and I was over the moon. I knew that the hard work was about to begin."

Within months of signing his scholarship, Foley was given a rare chance in a reserve game that would go on to shape his career.

"The opportunity to play right-back came about when I was 16 and I was called in by Brian Stein to play in a reserve game.

"Growing up I would play up front, I know it's hard to believe but I would bang the goals in for fun! In the centre of excellence I was playing as a midfielder, and I had never played right-back before, I'd always played either central midfield or right midfield.

"Playing for the reserves was a huge thing because you'd be playing against bigger, better players. I slotted in okay and I really thrived on it. I came away from the game thinking I could go on and do for myself in that

position. My aim from then on was to nail down a place at right-back."

With a spring in his step and with a whiff of first team football around the corner, Foley remained focused, keeping his head down and developing as a player. And he had youth team boss John Moore to thank for keeping him on the straight and narrow.

"I can't speak highly enough of John," says Foley. "He was a great coach and is a great man. He instilled discipline, and taught a lot of us young players the principles in life. He was always somebody you were desperate to impress. He didn't always congratulate you on doing things, so when he did it was a massive deal.

"It was a tough environment in youth team but it stood me in good stead. These days I see a lot of young players have everything delivered to them on a plate. I think all young players need to learn discipline and the respect. Cleaning boots isn't a bad thing."

Sooner or later, though, the first team chance did come along. After two appearances in the LDV Vans Trophy as a 17-year-old in 2002, he got his first taste of League action under then-boss Joe Kinnear with two substitute appearances late in the 2002/03 season in League 1.

Kinnear, though, departed in a dramatic summer off the field for the Town, leaving Foley and the club in limbo. One phone vote later, the Hatters had a new man at the helm in Mike Newell.

Foley began the 2003/04 campaign still unsigned and went onto play 37 times in all competitions, scoring twice. Not bad for an 18-year-old fresh out of the youth team who was beginning to make the right-back position his own.

"The end of the Joe era was a bit weird," recalls Foley. "Joe left, and Mike Newell came in. Mike was told he was working with limited resources and, with the club under a transfer embargo, it meant we couldn't sign anyone, me included."

"I was thrown in at right-back and for 75 per cent of that season I was basically playing as a third-year YTS earning less than £100 per week. Enoch Showunmi was in the same boat, but playing for expenses. After he scored a hat-trick against Brentford we were both signed


on professional forms and we were both understandably delighted, it was a magical feeling."

His performances in the Town side were drawing glowing reports and soon he was adding goals to his game – his first senior strike against Yeovil was followed by another in the League Cup at Charlton.

The Hatters finished that season in 10th place and nobody expected the following campaign to be anything other than another tilt at reaching the Play-Offs at best.

"At the start of the season after there was no real belief that we could win the league or even challenge for promotion," admits Foley. "As players you always want to better your previous season and in 2003/04 we finished just outside the Play-Offs so having a crack at the top six was our aim. We beat Oldham in the first game and won the next five.

"We were flying, but then lost three games on the bounce. I remember after losing to Hull the manager sat us down. We rarely ever had meetings and never used to watch the DVD back but we did this time. Mike Newell just said 'look, people are doubting us'. He showed us clips in which we did well and clips in which we didn't.

He said: 'the wheels aren't coming off, don't worry, we just need to cut out these little mistakes'. There were no drastic measures after that and in the end we romped home.

"That team was great. Kevin Nicholls was running the show, Steve Robinson kept things ticking over, Paul Underwood was a great athlete, Ahmet Brkovic scored goals for fun; we had Rowan Vine and Steve Howard up front, and a back four of Sol Davis, Curtis Davies, and Chris Coyne and myself, and Marlon Beresford in goal. It was a good team and we didn't pick up many injuries that season – that was the key. I was 19 going on 20 that season and I'd won a league title. It gave me so much confidence and I learnt so much.

"I think growing up as a player at Luton made me realise what I wanted to achieve. John Moore always used to tell us to set ourselves targets so I set myself the goal of playing in the Premier League and playing in a World Cup."

Foley was still four years from ticking one of those ambitions of his list as he embarked on life in the Championship with the newly-promoted Hatters.

The Town weren't given much of a chance in 2005/06, especially as the fixture computer handed the Hatters an opening three-game schedule against teams relegated from the Premier League the season before: Crystal Palace, Southampton and Leeds.

"I remember the Palace game because a lot was made of Andy Johnson deciding to stay after they were relegated," says Foley. "I was told before the game how Johnson would play, that he would stand off the post at set pieces, looking for the second ball. He was my man, I didn't listen to anything I was told, and after we couldn't clear a corner, Johnson pounced to score. It was my fault. It turned out to be a big lesson for me and I'll never forget that. Thankfully we won the game."

One abiding memory for Foley from that season in the Championship was the Town's epic FA Cup encounter with Liverpool in front of the live BBC cameras.

"Without a doubt the game of that season was the Liverpool cup tie," says Foley. "It was an incredible night. In the tunnel beforehand I was genuinely in awe standing next to Gerrard, Alonso and Carragher...they were the European Champions after all. I couldn't believe it."

"To go 3-1 up was unbelievable, it was out of this world. In the end we ran out of steam, I think we'd put so much effort into the game at that stage that the final 20 minutes took it out of us."

"I remember Alonso's goal from the halfway line. Marlon had come up for a corner and was out of his goal, stranded. I wanted to run back and try and clear it but thought to myself 'I'm not going to make it', I had no energy left. Afterwards it was so, so disappointing. We had them at 3-1, we should have seen it out, and perhaps we got caught up in the emotion of it all."

After a more-than-respectable 10th place finish in the Championship, having flirted with the Play-Offs throughout the year, the summer – and season – that followed was tough for Foley to take as the Town lost several key players and saw the manager leave which contributed to the first of three successive relegations.

"We lost Vine, Nico, Howard, Curtis. The spine of the team was gone and it really affected us. It was a strange season, Mike Newell was sacked and in came Kevin Blackwell. It was a new experience for me, I had never really seen that side of football before. A lot of questions went through my mind. Who will the new boss be? Will he like me? What formation will he play? Will he bring in his own players?"

But while Foley would still keep his place in the side under Blackwell, the Town drifted down to League 1, and the two-time young player of the year would soon be saying goodbye to Kenilworth Road.

"After relegation that season I still had a year left on my contract," continues Foley. "Before the first game of the

season I was still at the club but Kevin Blackwell pulled me and told me that Wolves had put in an offer.

"I was nervous, I'd spent 12 years at Luton and it had been a big part of my life. It all happened so quickly. I met Mick McCarthy on Sunday, signed on Monday and made my debut against Bradford in the League Cup on Tuesday. I remember playing well the previous season at Wolves. I must have made a good impression."

"Moving away for the first time was a new experience. I learned a lot. We won promotion in 2009 to the Premier League. At that point I said to my agent that I felt I'd 'made it' after all, I was watching myself on Match of the Day!"

Foley's affections for the Hatters never diminished as he starred in the Premier League at Molineux, but it wasn't until 2013 that he got the return to Kenilworth Road he never thought was possible when the Town drew Wolves in the third round of the FA Cup.

"I was thinking that I might never make a return to Luton, especially with them out of the league at the time," he says. "I couldn't believe it when the draw was made."

"But the less said about the game the better...I played a nice little part in the Luton goal, shanking my clearance which led to the winner."

"It was strange walking through the main reception as an opposition player, but good to see familiar faces; Lita on reception, Dickie the groundsman; and Nick Owen came and had a chat with me before the game."

"It reminded me what a great place it was; the memories came flooding back, from watching the West Ham FA Cup quarter-final replay in the stands, to making my debut and being part of the League 1 championship side."

"For so many reasons I'll never forget my time at Luton. It will always have a place in my heart."





► THE RECORD

The Hatters go into this evening's game protecting a very good record on this day in the history books. The Town have won 12 of the 23 matches they have played on 21st October, drawing five and losing six. In recent times the Hatters' record has been excellent. The last nine games have seen the Town win six, draw two and lose just once - a record that goes back to 1978.

► THE LAST TIME

Bizarrely the Hatters' last two matches on 21st October have both been against Grimsby at Blundell Park. While the Town's record on the banks of the Humber estuary aren't the greatest, the matches in 2008 (in League 2) and 2011 (in the Conference) saw the Hatters pick up four points. On their last visit on this day the Town triumphed 1-0 on a Friday night in front of the live television cameras thanks to a goal from Tommy Wright. Three years before two Tom Craddock goals helped the Hatters draw 2-2 on a Tuesday night trip in the -30 season.

The Hatters have equalled their biggest away win in recent years, most notably the 5-0 triumphs at Alfreton and Nuneaton last season and the 6-1 win at Ebbsfleet in 2010. The Town also beat Colchester 5-0 at Layer Road in 2003. However the earliest 5-0 win on the road for the Town came in the Division Four (now League 2) championship season in 1967/68 in a victory at Exeter. On that day in Devon Keith Allen scored twice and was joined on target by Ian Buxton, Alan Slough and Ray Whittaker.

► LONG WAY HOME

The Town's 1997/98 campaign was a tough one. The previous season had seen the Hatters reach the Division 2 (now League 1) Play-Offs but an injury list had robbed the

► SIX OF THE BEST

Goals were the name of the game under manager David Pleat at the start of the 1978/79 season. An opening day 6-1 win over Oldham was followed by a 3-0 win over Charlton and a 7-1 hammering of Cardiff. On this day in 1978 the Town made it 25 goals in just six matches at Kenilworth Road after Notts County were beaten




