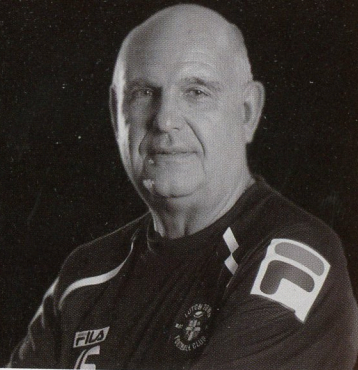

JOHN STILL



Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for this afternoon's encounter against Accrington Stanley in Sky Bet League 2.

I would like to welcome John Coleman and Jimmy Bell, our visitors' management team, to Bedfordshire today. They are good friends of mine, very talented and extremely hard-working and it is great to see them doing such a good job at the Crown Ground.

Accrington visit us on the back of a good 1-0 win over league leaders Burton on Tuesday, which shows the quality within their team. I know I say it every week, but we are expecting nothing less than another tough game. We know that we will have to produce good form this afternoon if we're to find a favourable result.

Frustrating

It was hugely frustrating to have lost the last two games away from home, both narrowly, in the manner that we did. It's disappointing, but football being football we all know these are things that can happen. The matches with Mansfield and AFC Wimbledon were both games I felt we should have got something from but it wasn't to be and we move on looking for a positive performance and outcome today.

We have been forced into making a number of changes in recent weeks, and in fairness, that has been the story of our season with suspension and, in particular, injury which has meant there has been a disruption in terms of consistent selection.

With so many changes recently, especially in defence, it has been difficult for us and it has made us not as good as we know we can be. If there's a positive to all of this it is the fact that once we have a number of players returning we will have a strong and experienced squad.

A number of senior players recovering from injury and needing game-time came through Tuesday's development squad game which saw us beat Leyton Orient 3-2. It was good to see that the people coming back are not too far away from a return to first team football.

TO HAVE WON THE LEAGUE IN OUR FIRST FULL SEASON IN CHARGE AND NOW FIND OURSELVES FOURTH IN LEAGUE 2 IS TESTIMONY TO THOSE INVOLVED. THAT'S PLAYERS AND STAFF, BOTH PAST AND PRESENT, DIRECTORS WHO HAVE SUPPORTED ME AND, OF COURSE, YOU THE SUPPORTERS.

After today's game with Accrington we face a trip to Bury on Tuesday before returning to Kenilworth Road next Saturday for a game with Morecambe.

It's a busy schedule but something I am confident the squad can cope with at what is going to be an important last two months of the season.

STILL POSITIVE

Thursday marked two years since myself and Terry Harris came to Luton Town. And what a two years it has been. It's been absolutely unbelievable.

I remember the first game away to Braintree and watching the defeat and thinking to myself 'what have I let myself in for?'

Progress

Looking back, though, it just goes to show the progress we have made in that time. To have won the league in our first full season in charge and now find ourselves fourth in League 2 is testimony to those involved. That's players and staff, both past and present, directors who have supported me and, of course, you the supporters.

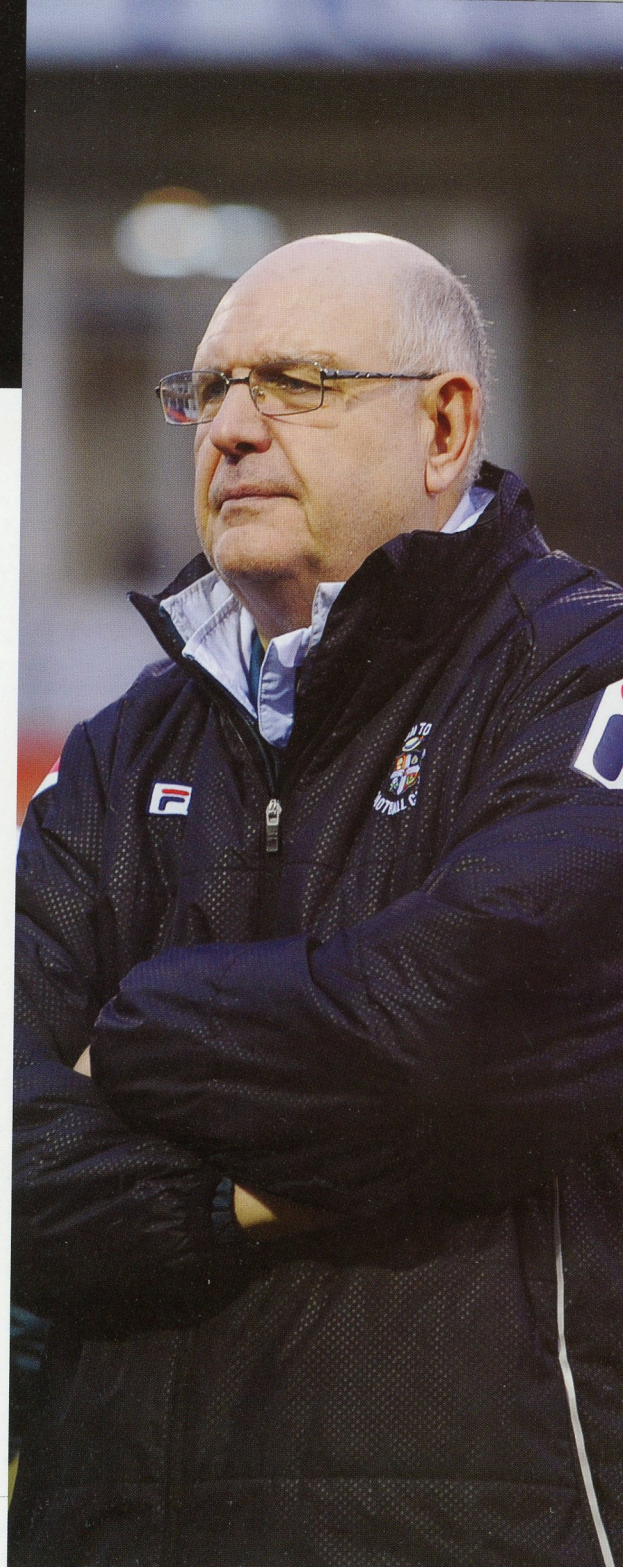

BOARDROOM

WITH CHIEF EXECUTIVE GARY SWEET



After two successive, and ultimately disappointing, cold fixtures on the road, I would like to wish all supporters a warm welcome back to our Kenilworth Road home this afternoon.

My greetings are extended to our visitors Accrington Stanley; their directors, management, players and supporters, who have made the 400-mile round-trip from Lancashire today. Stanley arrive here in good spirits having toppled league leaders Burton Albion on Tuesday evening, further enhancing League 2's reputation of being one of, if not the, most competitive divisions of the Football League.

However, with five years of Conference football under our belts, this is hardly something that is new to us and the pressure of a tough competition is what we've thrived on in recent times – and now is no different.

Even though the last kick of the game loss at Wimbledon may have been hard to take, there were plenty of positives, none more so than the goal-scoring debut of striker Elliot Lee and a 'second debut' for a certain Cameron McGeehan – welcome both! Add to that the performance of Luke Guttridge, pulling the strings in midfield, plus the accomplished debut of Elliot Justham on his Football League debut, and there was much to be encouraged about despite the result.

With Cameron and Elliot's arrivals, the return to fitness of a host of previously unavailable senior players, Alex Lawless and Paul Benson in particular – and the impending returns from suspension of our two defensive rocks in Stephen McNulty and Luke Wilkinson – we should have every reason to be upbeat.

So we enter this final straight with a squad complete and ready and, to a man, we're thoroughly looking forward to the run-in and feeling confident about our destination for next season.

Two promotions in two seasons would truly be a wondrous feat. But if it doesn't happen this season we'll stand an even better chance next as we, as a club, develop and progress on and off the pitch.

Earlier in February we announced that Earlybird season tickets would be going on sale on the 2nd March – this coming Monday – at a fixed League 2 price, regardless of the outcome of this season.

Hopefully by now you will have read the Q & A we distributed via our website, but I wanted to touch on a few key points in these notes today. As you can imagine, a lot of thought goes in to our pricing strategy for tickets and this season it was our aim to fine-tune the ticketing structure to bring even more fairness to it. Inevitably, in doing so, this has meant that prices for some groups of supporters have increased very slightly whilst, in some cases, a couple of prices have decreased.

We're excited to announce that next season we will be offering a limited number of adult season tickets in the Oak Road for just £250 which reflects the lack of some facilities and comfort at that end of the stadium – our cheapest season ticket by far and for a considerable number of years.

We have also made some changes to further discourage misuse of some ticket types, or 'tactical purchasing', which should make things fairer on the vast majority of fans who gladly pay the appropriate amount.

Other highlights include the introduction of a buy-back scheme offering any season ticket holder the opportunity to release their reserved seat for resale if they're unable to attend certain games in return for a discount against their 2016/17 season ticket.

We have also introduced new benefits for the popular Diamond upgrade which I'm sure you'll find an improvement too. Earlybird tickets will be on sale until 23rd March, so I would encourage you all to make the most of the discount while it's there. For the majority of you, prices are frozen at the same price as last year during this period, so please don't miss out.

Whilst not a direct season ticket issue, I'd just like to write a brief word on the introduction of match categorisation for next season. Put simply, having the ability to categorise matches enables us to maximise income for busy games and maximise our attendance for less busy games and is being introduced softly at this time so we can fully understand first-hand the tactical flexibility it provides us prior to our relocation. Indirectly, for season ticket holders, it makes little difference and could, potentially, make buying a season ticket even more beneficial.

It has been incredibly heartening to see that your levels of support have attracted interest and respect from the football community at large. As I write, the ticket office has only a few remaining of the 2,600 tickets available for our match away to Portsmouth in a fortnight's time, while tickets for our remaining home fixtures continue to sell well with many close to selling out.

Likewise, our corporate and hospitality areas become ever more popular. Many games have already completely sold out – such as our final home game against Stevenage.

I'd like to take this opportunity to thank you for your unwavering support.

Please don't miss out on what could be an exhilarating couple of months of football – book your tickets early!

I would also like to thank you for an unprecedentedly impressive response to our recent travel survey sent out via email asking you how you travel to Kenilworth Road. A whopping 41 per cent of recipients responded providing an excellent (and interesting) set of results with the raw data now being analysed by our specialist consultants.

Over the next game or two you may also notice some representatives carrying out personal, more detailed data collection from some of you as we continue to gain a much better understanding of the intricacies of our supporters' travel patterns. Forecasting future travel patterns is a specialist art and forms one of the most important components of any possible planning application.

Location

A major consideration for both the planning officers and us at the Club, for the selection of a site for our new home, will be your method of travel to and from the ground. It won't come as any surprise to read that, whichever location we move to, the more supporters travelling by public transport the bigger the capacity of the stadium could be, and rightly so.

As a Board, we are committed to sustainable travel. Not only for the good of the environment but also having shared with you the ghastly and lengthy experience of trying to leave an away ground from one of the many ill-conceived car parks in and around the various newly built stadia upon our away travels. This isn't an experience we wish to bestow upon visitors to our new facility – whether Luton supporters or our visitors.

It is intended that our transportation consultants, together with the expert advice of the Council, will design a set of convenient and appropriate recommendations for all visitors on matchdays for efficient travel once we have eventually settled on a site. However, for now, the detailed and comprehensive traffic assessment for a short-list of sites is well underway, the results of which will ultimately define which of our nominated sites would be the most efficient and suitable.

Meanwhile, we continue to assess the design, phasing and viability of all key sites whilst our specialist surveyors carry out considerable technical due diligence on all sites still in consideration. It may be a lengthy process and one which we shall treat seriously as we leave no stone unturned (no pun intended) but our progress moves swiftly on.

With many supporters having lived through previous attempts at relocation and witnessing protracted planning issues at other clubs, a lot of you will recognise the complex and lengthy nature of these processes; however, we genuinely appreciate your patience, understanding and the trust you have held in us in allowing us to get on with the job. Thank you.

Enjoy the match today! Let's get back to winning ways with your positive encouragement helping us do so!

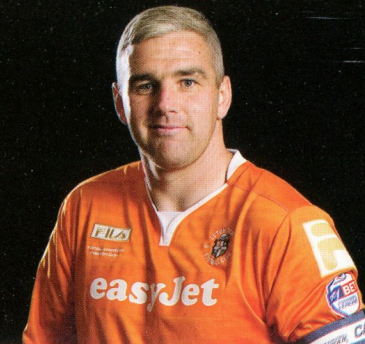

FROM THE DRESSING ROOM WITH STEPHEN McNULTY



In my last notes I told you I was hopeful of getting my four-match suspension over-turned by the authorities, but to my frustration, it was rejected.

Myself, the gaffer and a number of the lads thought the red card was harsh and that's why we decided to appeal against it. In my mind it certainly shouldn't have been a sending-off but it is a decision you have to live with. There's not a lot you can do but take it on the chin. I could say a lot more but I think I should bite my tongue – I don't want to miss any more matches.

All in all I think we're at very promising and exciting point in the season. Our aim is to win promotion and we will be doing all we can to ensure this goal is achieved. We have the right management, a fantastic squad and an unbelievable set of supporters. As the manager has said before, together we all play an important role in the success of this football club, so please get behind us once more this afternoon.

Last season the young midfielder became an important part of the Conference-winning side, scoring three times in 18 appearances.

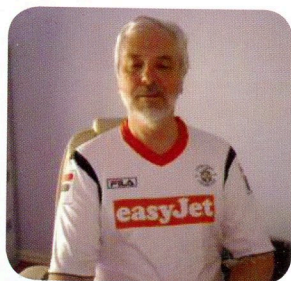
SIGNING NEXT SATURDAY

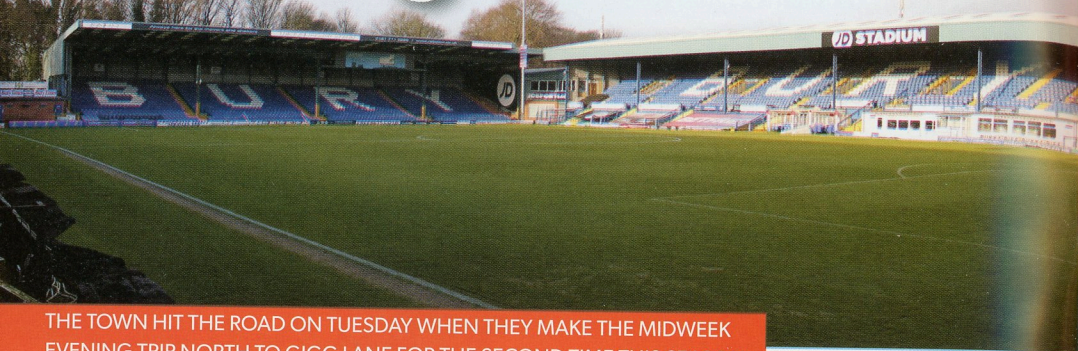

THE TOWN HIT THE ROAD ON TUESDAY WHEN THEY MAKE THE MIDWEEK EVENING TRIP NORTH TO GIGG LANE FOR THE SECOND TIME THIS SEASON

BURY



WHO? Bury, aka the Shakers, from Gigg Lane, are the Town's opponents on Tuesday. Dave Flitcroft's side drew 1-1 at Kenilworth Road this season and currently lie in seventh place in League 2. The two sides met as recently as December, however, with the Hatters progressing after a replay in the second round of the FA Cup.

HOW THEY DOING? Flitcroft's side were the bookies' favourites to win the League 2 title but the Shakers' promotion push has been an inconsistent one. Bury were in among the top three in the first three months of the season but a poor run of form leading up to Christmas derailed their prospects and the Shakers fell out of the top seven. In recent weeks, however, their form has improved and this afternoon they travel to Plymouth aiming to protect a four-match unbeaten run and extend a winning run to three matches. Last week they won 1-0 against Hartlepool, seven days after recording a 2-1 win at struggling Cheltenham.

WHERE? The Town make their first Football League trip to Gigg Lane in six years. The Hatters faithful have a 360-mile round-trip to get there and back. It is pay on the night for Hatters fans and details can be found on the page opposite. It's seating only behind the goal in the Ratio Law Stand, which holds 2,000. The Shakers have a decent home record, too, winning 10 of their 16 matches. Only Shrewsbury and Northampton have scored more goals at home than Bury's 26.

HOW TO GET THERE. Take the M1, M6 and M66, and leave the M66 at Junction 3. Take the left hand exit at the junction and follow this road until you come to the junction with the A56 Manchester Road. At this T-junction which has traffic lights, turn right towards Bury. At the end of the playing fields just before the traffic lights and a couple of pubs, turn right into Gigg Lane for the ground. Please note that Gigg Lane itself is normally closed on matchdays. The postcode for Gigg Lane is BL9 8HR. If you want to go on the Bobbers, they depart from Luton train station at 2pm. Their fare is £29 for adults and £26 for concessions. To book a place call 01234 856542.

HAVE WE BEEN BEFORE? The Hatters won on their last Football League visit to Gigg Lane in the minus-30 season, winning 2-1 courtesy of goals from Ian Roper and Tom Craddock. Overall the Town have won seven of their 21 visits to the Lancashire venue. 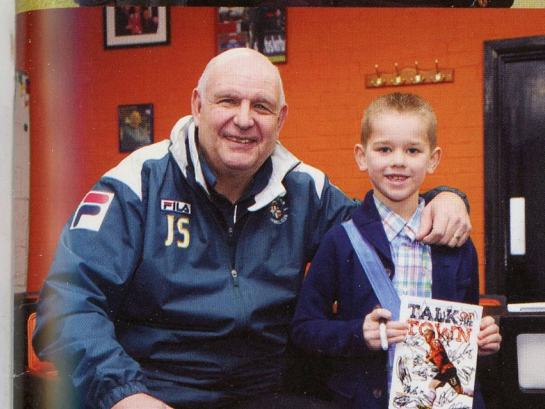

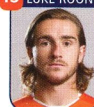

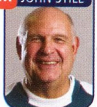

ACCRINGTON STANLEY



It gives us great pleasure to welcome everybody associated with Accrington Stanley to Kenilworth Road this afternoon.

Stanley arrive here on Bedfordshire soil buoyed by an excellent 1-0 win over current league leaders Burton Albion on Tuesday which maintained their good form of late. The Reds have won three and drawn one of their last four games to leave them sitting in 15th in the table and nine points off the Play-Offs.

Today's visitors' resurgence up the table is a far cry from their early season form which saw them languishing towards the foot of the table – indeed it wasn't until the seventh attempt that they recorded a win in League 2 when beating Tranmere 3-2 at the Crown Ground.

Stanley's upturn in fortunes has been down to the arrival of former boss John Coleman, who replaced James Beattie who parted company with the club in mid-September. His first game in charge this term was a 5-4 victory away to Northampton. Stanley have won 11, lost 10 and drawn three in League 2 this season under Coleman. That form has hoisted the Reds well away from relegation trouble and one of the bookies' favourites for the drop are now 12 points clear of the dropzone.

In recent weeks the Reds' form has seen them pick up some excellent results. As well as Tuesday's win over Burton, Coleman's side won impressively at a previously 10-game unbeaten Southend. Their current four-match unbeaten streak has come after a run of five straight defeats which included a 5-1 home defeat to Northampton.

Coleman has already etched his name into the Stanley history books by guiding the club back to the Football League after winning the Conference title back in 2005/06. It was the third promotion he brought to the Crown Ground having won the Northern Premier and Northern Division One titles in 2003 and 2000 respectively. He took charge of the Reds in 1999 and oversaw almost 600 games in charge before he left to take up the reins at Rochdale in 2012.

Since their elevation to the Football League, Stanley have more than held their own among the so-called bigger boys in League 2. This campaign is the Reds' ninth back in the Football League, with their highest finish of fifth coming in 2010/11 when they reached the League 2 Play-Offs. Of course this incarnation of Stanley is the second in history, with the original Accrington side folding in 1966 before reforming in 1968. Their highest position in the league ladder came in 1955 and 1958 when they finished runners-up in Division Three (North). Only the top side were promoted so Stanley stayed down on both occasions.

After the club reformed it rose steadily through the divisions having started off life in the Lancashire Combination. After climbing through the Cheshire County League and North West Counties Leagues, through the 70s and 80s it wasn't until Coleman's arrival that Stanley made headway towards a place back into the Football League. The Reds finished 11 points clear of Hereford in 2005 to win promotion. The following season a certain John Still won promotion with Dagenham & Redbridge so the two bosses are sure to be well acquainted with one another this afternoon.

JOHN COLEMAN. Now in his second spell as Stanley boss having returned in September 2014. His first spell saw him become the club's most successful and longest serving manager, during which time he guided Stanley to Football League.

MATT MACEY. Young goalkeeper on-loan from Arsenal. Began his career at Bristol Rovers before being snapped up by the Gunners. Was an unused substitute in the Premier League last season.

NICKY HUNT. Hugely experienced and versatile defender who played in the Premier League for Bolton, who he made over 150 appearances for. Also enjoyed spells at Birmingham and Derby.

ROB ATKINSON. Popular centre-half who penned a two-year deal at the start of last season having previously been on the books at Fleetwood, Barnsley, Rochdale and Grimsby.

SEAMUS CONNEELY. Former Republic of Ireland under-21 international who joined the Reds last month after leaving Sligo Rovers. Comfortable in defence or in central midfield.

► MIDFIELDERS

LUKE JOYCE. Long-serving club captain who has made over 200 appearances for Stanley. The central midfielder joined on a free transfer in 2009 following spells at Wigan, Carlisle, Barrow and Northwich.

JOSH WINDASS. Former Huddersfield youngster who signed for Stanley in the summer of 2013 after impressing on trial. Previously on the books at Harrogate Railway.

KAL NAISMITH. Scottish winger or forward who came to Accrington in the 2013 pre-season. Impressed enough to earn himself a two-year deal following his release from Glasgow Rangers.

PIERO MINGOIA. Diminutive former Watford midfielder who joined Stanley permanently following a successful loan spell. Penned a new one-year contract this summer.

ANTHONY BARRY. Experienced midfielder currently on loan from Forest Green and now in his second spell at Stanley. Originally joined the Reds as a youngster before going on to play for Yeovil and Fleetwood.

ANDY PROCTER. Another midfielder in his second stint with the Reds. Signed first time in 2002 before moving to Preston in 2012. Re-signed in September following his release from Bury.

► STRIKERS



SHAY McCARTAN. Young Northern Irish forward who joined the Reds in summer 2013 on a two-year deal from Burnley. A prolific scorer at youth level at Turf Moor he has previously been on-loan at Hyde.

JAMES GRAY. Talented striker who signed for Stanley in 2012 following spells with Darlington and Kettering. He is the son of former Town striker Phil.

TERRY GORNELL. Frontman now in his second spell with the Reds having joined last month from Cheltenham. Helped Stanley to the 2011 Play-Offs before spells with Shrewsbury and Rochdale.

MARCUS CARVER. A product of the Stanley youth set-up, the striker shot to prominence with his goalscoring form for the youth team. Signed a new one-year deal in the summer.

SEAN MAGUIRE. Irish forward currently on loan from West Ham. Scored on his Stanley debut in the win at Northampton. Began his career in Ireland with Waterford before moving to Upton Park.

GEORGE BOWERMAN. Former Walsall striker who signed for the Reds this summer following his exit from the Bescot. Joined Stanley on trial and impressed enough to be handed a one-year deal.

A HATTER...

AND A RED

Harvey McCreadie and current Town man Shaun Whalley are two examples of players who have played for both the Town and Accrington over the years.

After becoming Accrington's youngest ever League player at the age of 15 in 1959, young Scottish centre-forward Harvey began to attract the scouts with the eventual winners being the Hatters who paid £5,500 for his services in January 1960.

Harvey was given only one chance with the Hatters, however, in a 3-2 defeat at Wolves and the Town were relegated from the top flight amid off-the-field problems in which he failed to report for training one such issue.

The final straw came with his arrest following an altercation at the California Ballroom in Dunstable and

manager Sam Bartram quickly offloaded him to Wrexham. He fared little better at the Racecourse and moved swiftly onto Northwich and Mossley before returning to Scotland with Hibs.

Winger Whalley, joined the current guise of Accrington in September 2006 having impressed on the books at Witton Albion. He made his Stanley debut in a 2-1 defeat to Hartlepool and scored his first goal in the Reds' 8-2 defeat at Peterborough in the following season. In total, Shaun made 51

appearances for Stanley and scored five goals before his release at the end of the 2007/08 campaign. He then spent time at Wrexham, Droylsden and Hyde before moving to Southport prior to arriving here at Kenilworth Road at the start of last season.

Gornell – who is now back on their books this term – fired home from six yards.

Later that season the Town made a Tuesday night trip to the Crown Ground for their first visit to the Lancashire venue and 250 loyal Hatters fans witnessed a dour goalless draw in front of a meagre 1,033 – the lowest attendance to watch a Luton Town league fixture (not including the Conference).

This season the Hatters looked certain to lose for a second time against Stanley, when goals from James Gray and captain Luke Joyce had the home side 2-0 in front after just 16 minutes.

But the Town rallied and Luke Rooney's fine solo effort reduced the deficit on 32 minutes and three minutes before half-time Jake Howells' free-kick levelled the score.

Both sides came close to stealing a win late on, with Mark Tyler coming to the Hatters' aid in injury time to deny Gray a second goal with a fantastic save at his near post.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

This afternoon will be only the fourth meeting between the two clubs and the second at Kenilworth Road.

And the Hatters will be aiming to pick up three points for the first time against Accrington with Stanley winning one of the three previous meetings. The other two have ended all square.

Accrington walked away with all three points on their only previous visit to Kenilworth Road back in October 2008 with both sides in League 2.

The Town were still on minus points having been docked 30 points before a ball had been kicked and Stanley inflicted a painful 2-1 defeat on the Hatters in front of just 5,492 at Kenilworth Road.

Paul Mullin put the visitors in front on 16 minutes but Asa Hall levelled for the Hatters 11 minutes before half-time. However, Stanley won the points when Terry

PHIL EDWARDS: Central defender who missed just two matches in 2010/11, scoring 23 goals in 200 League games, moving to Stevenage in July 2011, since playing for Rochdale and now Burton Albion.

ANDY PROCTER: Long-serving midfielder who was captain and netted 29 goals in 235 League games before joining Preston in January 2012. Later with Bury, he returned to Accrington in September 2014.

JIMMY RYAN: Republic of Ireland Under-21 midfielder who was ever-present in 2010/11. He scored 22 times in 129 League games, moving to Scunthorpe United in July 2011, and he's at Paul Cook's Chesterfield.

Carlisle had showed little ambition going forward and Mark Tyler was barely tested and the Town continued to press in the second half.

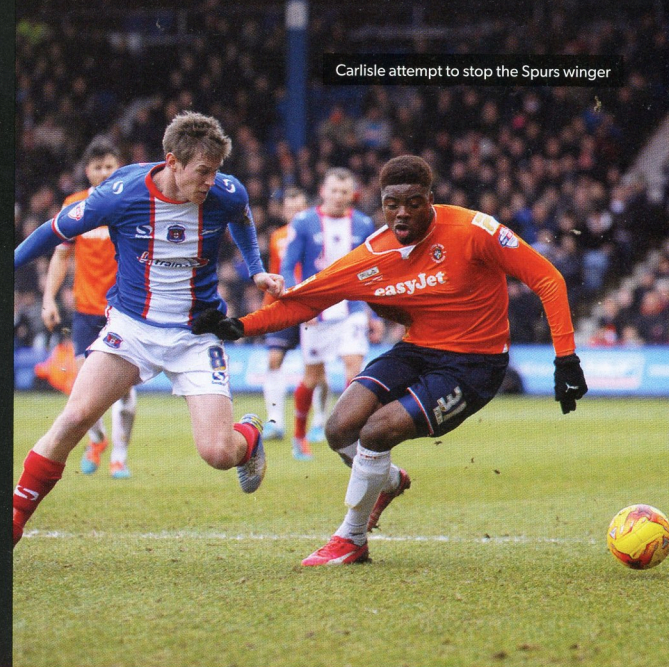
A number of times the Hatters came close to extending their lead with Cullen drawing a sprawling save from Gillespie on the hour.

Jake Howells missed the chance to level for the Hatters on the stroke of half-time only to see his header drop wide at the back post.

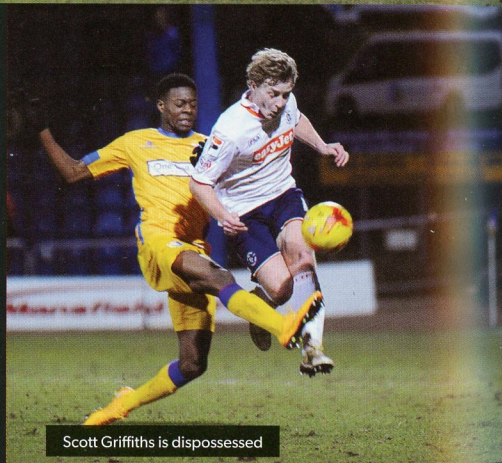
John Still introduced Nathan Oduwa and Shaun Whalley for the start of the second half and the Town huffed and puffed in search of an equaliser.

Despite dominating for long spells as the Stags tired, the Town could not find a way through the resolute home defence.

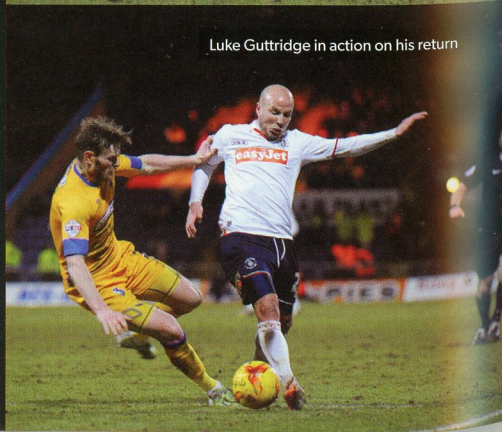
However, Mark Cullen came close to bringing the Hatters level with a wonderful piece of skill but with the goal at his mercy the striker sent his shot wide of the target.

WHAT'S THE STORY?

The Hatters fell to an injury time defeat at AFC Wimbledon having earlier fought back from two goals down in a dramatic five-goal thriller at Kingsmeadow.

The Dons deservedly led thanks to goals from Alfie Potter and Dannie Bulman, and could have been further ahead after Elliot Justham and the post denied the home side.

Potter struck after Justham had parried Craig Tanner's shot shortly before the half-hour and three minutes before half-time the Wombles were in control when Bulman fired home a fine shot from the edge of the box.

But Jayden Stockley pulled one back for the Hatters shortly before half-time to reduce the deficit, tapping home after Luke Guttridge's deflected shot came back off the post.

After the break the Town lay siege on the Dons goal and after Stockley and Guttridge went close, Stockley was denied what looked a good penalty shout when sent tumbling in the box under a challenge from Dave Winfield.

However, parity was restored when debutant Elliot Lee, on-loan from West Ham, scored within four minutes of his introduction as a substitute with his first touch to bring the Town level.

But despite looking the more likely side to snatch the points, the hosts had other ideas and Hatters hearts were broken in the final minute of stoppage time when substitute David Connolly stole in following a long kick downfield and round Justham to give Wimbledon all the points at the death.

HATTERS FAN **KEVIN HARPER** TELLS HIS STORY
OF THE TOWN'S GAME AT MANSFIELD

THE JOURNEY

THE MATCH

In fairness this wasn't the greatest game of the season. At times it was a bit drab and dank, a little like the



evening it was played on. On a pitch which cut up quite badly, goals always looked like being few and far between and in the end Mansfield broke from our corner, forced by a good save from a Jonathan Smith shot at the edge of the area, to score the only goal of the game midway through the first half.

In truth the Town had more of a go in the second half with Shaun Whalley and Nathan Oduwa coming off the bench but apart from a wonderful self-created chance by Mark Cullen our efforts went unrewarded in terms of creativity and the game in hand which would have moved us up to third became a fairly damp squib of a defeat.

MAN-OF-THE-MATCH

Considering he was coming in for the suspended Luke Wilkinson for this match, Alex Lacey was as good as anyone on the park in a Town shirt. One positive from the game was how well we defended and Lacey was at the heart of that so he did his long term prospects no harm in this match.

SUMMARY

Not the night we wanted but every setback creates the opportunity of a comeback and I'm sure we'll bounce back. We were back in Luton just after midnight which wasn't too bad, all things considered.

THE JOURNEY

A short trip to London followed the midweek disappointment with everybody hoping we could bounce back straight away. Two Bobbers coaches left Luton station at 11.30 and after avoiding a potential crash on the M25 when someone was in the wrong lane and just stopped without warning, we eventually arrived in Kingston just before 1pm on a fresh but thankfully sunny afternoon.

It is so good to have the influential midfielder back, and if he stays fit for the remainder of the season he will be the big player we know he is again. He certainly showed us what we've missed here with a couple of assists in a great performance.

MIXED DEBUT FOR LATEST LOANEE LEE



New loan signing Elliot Lee had mixed emotions on his debut for the Hatters in last weekend's 3-2 defeat at AFC Wimbledon.

The 20-year-old joined the Town from West Ham just two days before the game at Kingsmeadow and scored with his first touch to bring the Hatters level after they had trailed 2-0 against the Dons.

But David Connolly's injury-time winner broke Hatters hearts to give the home side all three points, much to Lee's frustration.

"It's obviously mixed emotions for me and all the lads," Lee said afterwards. "Coming on and scoring with my first touch for the club is a fantastic feeling for me personally. I'm over the moon with it and I thought I'd nicked us at least a point which I thought we at least deserved."

"That's the way football goes sometimes and to concede in the last second is heartbreaking, all the lads are devastated. The lads know that we weren't up to scratch in the first half and we could count ourselves lucky to go in at half-time at 2-1 with the goal from Jayden. But I thought we thoroughly deserved at least a point from our second half performance. All the lads are gutted and we just want to put it right next week."

Lee relished playing alongside the scorer of the Town's first goal, Jayden Stocley, and midfielder Luke Guttridge – who had a role in both of the Hatters' goals against the Wombles.

"When the gaffer changed it he put me and Jayden up top and Gutts in behind us and I think it really worked well," said Lee.

"I linked up well with Gutts, he threaded me through and luckily, with my first touch, I've put it around the keeper, which I'm really happy about."

"I came on the pitch a few minutes before and it was literally my first touch. As a striker, that's what you're paid to do, that's your job and I'm happy to do it."

Lee has already made his debut for the Hammers and has been on their substitutes' bench in the Premier League this season.

But after picking up an injury in his first training session while on loan at Southend earlier this season, and instead of development squad football, Lee is aiming to hit the ground running and help the Town to promotion.

"That was my first injury of my career – it was a really bad time for me," said Lee, who is the son of former England international midfielder Rob and brother of Birmingham midfielder Olly.

"I'm now making up for lost time with Luton and hopefully score some goals to help this club be successful between now and the end of this season. Playing under-21s football is not the same. It's nice being on the bench every now and then for the first team but those chances are few and far between – that's why I've come here and hopefully I can score some goals for us."

Lee will be aiming to make his first start for the Hatters on what could be his home debut this afternoon.

And the striker said he cannot wait to play in front of the Kenilworth Road crowd.

"That is something I am really looking forward to," said Lee. "When I was talking to Cameron McGeehan he said the fans here are brilliant. That is what enticed me to come here. Cam said he could not speak highly enough of the supporters and I can't wait to experiencing the buzz of playing at home."

While the loan is an initial one month deal, Lee would not be opposed to staying at Kenilworth Road for the rest of the season.

"The plan's a month but I'd be more than happy to stay longer," admitted the striker. "I think the gaffer's the same. I'm happy to be here and looking forward to the final third of the season and the push for promotion."

DID YOU KNOW?

Elliot has appeared twice for West Ham, both times as a substitute. He made his debut for the Hammers as 78th-minute sub in their 1-0 FA Cup defeat at Old Trafford against Manchester United. He then made his Upton Park bow as an 88th-minute substitute in another 1-0 defeat – this time at home to Stoke in the Premier League in August last season.

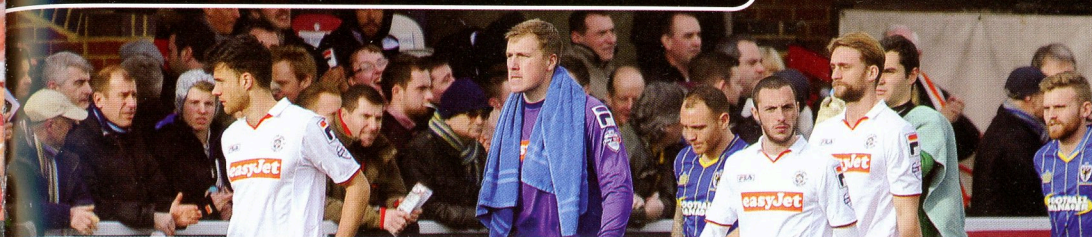

KEEPER GUTTED TO LOSE ON LEAGUE DEBUT



They say good things come to those who wait – but try telling that to Hatters goalkeeper Elliot Justham after his Football League debut at AFC Wimbledon last weekend ended with a last-gasp defeat.

The 24-year-old stopper was handed his first league appearance by John Still at Kingsmeadow last Saturday with a knee injury ruling out first choice Mark Tyler.

And while Justham impressed on what was his ninth appearance in Luton colours, he was left with mixed feelings after David Connolly's injury-time winner gave the Dons the points in a game that saw the Town come from 2-0 down to level.

"I've been waiting 18 months for my league start so it was very nice to play. I'm just absolutely gutted about the result," Justham told Hatters Player afterwards.

"I was delighted to play, but no-one likes losing. We'll go again and hopefully get a result on Saturday."

Justham made an important save after just 24 seconds from Alfie Potter but could not prevent the same player from giving the hosts the lead shortly before the half-hour or stopping Dannie Bulman's strike from the edge of the box three minutes before the break.

"I had a good warm-up and a nice early touch, which gave me confidence, but I was absolutely gutted because it was a good chance missed," said Justham, who before signing for the Town from East Thurrock was working night shifts on the London Underground.

And with the Town behind 2-1 at the interval, the goalkeeper revealed that John Still's half-time pep talk had the desired effect as Elliot Lee added to Jayden Stockley's goal to haul the Hatters level.

"The gaffer got into us at half-time," Justham said. "He said we weren't good enough at the back, which was true. They [Wimbledon] still had other chances; hitting the post and one over."

"We were too open but once we got that first goal I just thought we were a different team, especially in the second half."

"The crowd were with us, we got the goal from Elliot Lee with a great finish on his debut. We couldn't hang on for the draw or even push for the win. It was us pushing and I just thought we were going to get the third. We just couldn't deal with the long ball at the end."

Having played eight times for the Town in the FA Cup, FA Trophy and Johnstone's Paint Trophy previously, Justham explained what it was like to be Mark Tyler's understudy for so long in League fixtures, travelling the length and breadth of the country to sit on the bench every week.

"You just love being a professional footballer so you can't say it's tough," said Justham. "But of course when you know you're not playing you've just got to do your best for Tyles in the warm-up."

"You have to prepare him as best you can and, of course, when he's not available, be ready to step in."

"I knew of Tyles' problem before the game. In any case I prepare every Friday and of course I knew I had more of a chance this week so I was looking forward to it."

"Hopefully I did OK in the gaffer's mind. I know we lost the game but hopefully he can rely on me if it happens again with Tyles."

DID YOU KNOW?

Elliot Justham had been an unused substitute for 77 league (Conference and League 2) matches prior to making his first start at AFC Wimbledon last Saturday. In total, Justham has been an unused substitute 81 times for the Hatters as understudy for Mark Tyler and has been an almost ever-present for the development squad since last season.

YESTERDAY'S PAGES

Club historian **ROGER WASH** looks back to a clash with Leeds United which confirmed Division Two (now the Championship) safety with six games to go after two seasons of struggle..

Luton Town 2-1 Leeds United. 5th April 1952.

After two successive seasons in which relegation had stared the Town in the face, the 1951/52 campaign came as a breath of fresh air with promotion to the top flight a distinct possibility at one time and a trip to the FA Cup quarter-finals, for only the second time in the club's history, an added bonus.

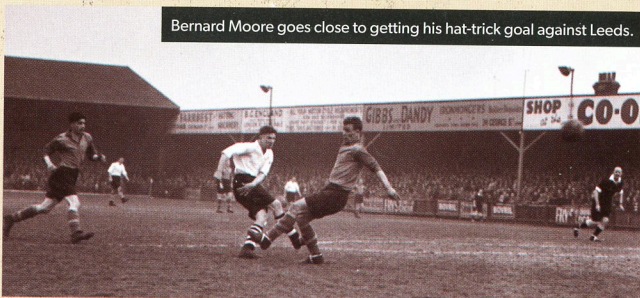
The Town team had a much more settled look about it and the defence, in particular, looking far stronger with full backs Billy Cooke and Bud Aherne complementing the virtually ever present half back line of Bob Morton, Syd Owen and Charlie Watkins.

Up front, new signing Bert Mitchell was a revelation, hammering in goals for fun from the wing as well as providing an excellent service for the dangerous Jack Taylor and a young Gordon Turner.

Six goals were scored against Notts County and West Ham and five against future champions Sheffield Wednesday, but it was in the FA Cup that the name of Luton Town came to the fore for the first time since the heyday of Joe Payne before the war.

In the third round, top flight Charlton were seen off 1-0, then it was Brentford's turn, after three games, in round four followed by Swindon Town in round five. Arsenal were the opponents in the quarter-finals and a then record crowd of 28,433 crammed into Kenilworth Road to see the Hatters go down unluckily 2-3 with only nine fit men after Owen and Roy Davies were injured in the days before substitutes.

The clamour of the cup having died down, it was now back to the League and, whereas at Christmas when the Town were in a strong challenging position, four successive defeats meant that the long awaited home clash with Leeds was now regarded as little more than

an afterthought especially after a 4-0 thumping at Sheffield Wednesday the previous week.

The fixture was still important for Leeds, however, as a defeat at Kenilworth Road would virtually end all their hopes of promotion for the season.

Late-comers to the match missed the most thrilling start to any game that season as the Town took a two goal lead in four minutes and suggested there could be another runaway victory. Bernard Moore scored the first with the game only one minute old after he intercepted a poor back pass and followed it up soon after with a close range shot from an accurate Wally Shanks centre.

Desperate

From then on it was one-way traffic with Moore leading the famous John Charles a merry dance and it was a mixture of bad luck with finishing and desperate defending by Leeds that prevented a rout.

Dave Sexton, newly installed in the team, formed a good partnership with Mitchell and with the defence, ably led by Owen, in total control it came as a surprise when Leeds pulled a goal back through Ray Iggleden with three minutes to go to bring about a completely unrealistic scoreline.

The final whistle sounded leaving both the Town and Leeds to play out the remainder of the season, but in Luton's case the corner had been turned and what was the most successful campaign since the war would be progressively bettered before eventual promotion three years later.

THE BIG INTERVIEW

A FAMILIAR FACE IS BACK AND HELL-BENT ON WINNING ANOTHER PROMOTION. **CAMERON McGEEHAN** EXPLAINS TO TALK OF THE TOWN HIS LOVE AFFAIR WITH LUTON TOWN AND WHAT IT MEANS TO BE BACK AT KENILWORTH ROAD.

We want you to stay, we want you to stay – Cameron McGeehan we want you to stay.

The thousands of Hatters fans that sung the above line last season, as the Town romped to the Conference title, have done their work. They can sleep well knowing they have played a significant part in the future of a young footballer out to make a name for himself in the game.

Four weeks ago Cameron was back at Kenilworth Road – but playing for somebody else. Cambridge United to be precise. Two weeks ago, however, he was back again. This time he was unveiled to the Hatters-supporting public at half-time during the victory over Carlisle. He was back as a Luton Town player again – something McGeehan admits he longed for ever since the curtain came down on the Town's sensational campaign last term.

"I've wanted to come back since the day I left," McGeehan exclusively told Hatters Player, five minutes into the second half of the game against Carlisle on Valentine's Day.

Re-introduced to the crowd on 14th February, it was meant to be. A true love story. "The fans were amazing from day one, I love them," continues McGeehan. "They have been a major factor for wanting to return. That and John Still, Terry, Hakan and the lads.

"I always knew I'd come back. I'm so happy it's finally happened. Last season was special. So many memories. Now's the time to create some more."

Last season McGeehan came to Kenilworth Road a highly-rated teenage midfielder but untried and untested at senior level, despite the experience gathered at youth and development level for Chelsea and Norwich City, the latter his current parent club.

His performances for the Hatters belied his tender years. As we chat, we recall a crunching tackle on his debut in the wind and rain last season against Nuneaton – a moment which set the tone for that

and the 17 impressive performances which followed. A similar challenge contested with Jonathan Smith early on in McGeehan's visit to Kenilworth Road whilst in Cambridge colours last month exhibited the same passion and enthusiasm witnessed on our very own patch last season.

Having already scored twice on his debut for the U's and helping Richard Money's side earn a goalless draw

against Premier League Manchester United in the FA Cup, McGeehan admits he arrived back at the place he'd like to call 'home' with plenty of apprehension.

"It was weird, very strange," says McGeehan, who grabbed that game by the scruff of the neck – almost quite literally at times – to almost haul United level in a game that the Town

led 3-0 but eventually held onto win 3-2. "You know what? It felt like I was a Luton player out there. It was a surreal experience.

"I wasn't sure how the Luton fans would react to me with it being Cambridge, but they were brilliant, I really appreciated it.

"It is probably one of the best games I've ever played in so far. The supporters were brilliant to me afterwards. I don't think I've ever seen a standing ovation for an opposing player before, so despite the defeat I was really chuffed."

If McGeehan first set foot on the Hatters' Ely Way training ground as a wet-behind-the-ears unknown with no senior experience to his name, that is certainly not the case 12 months later.

"Last season gave me my first taste of senior football and I absolutely loved it," says McGeehan, who scored three times in Hatters colours, including one crucial late, brave, strike against Aldershot in a nervy so-close-to-clinching-the-title fixture in early April. "Playing Under-21s football is absolutely no comparison.

"It's pretty poor, and in terms of competition, it's rubbish for young professional players trying to force themselves into the first teams.

"I've wanted to come back since the day I left."

The difference to first team level, even at Conference level, is miles apart.

"That's why I went to Cambridge – you can play as many development games as you like but nothing beats playing week in week out in front of big crowds. Going to Cambridge got me back playing again – I was happy to call myself an official first team player.

"I learned a lot, though, not just last season but at Cambridge as well. Playing twice against Manchester United, including once at Old Trafford, was an unforgettable experience.

"But it's that experience I'm now hoping to use back at Luton. I've got some know-how of League 2 to back up what I got under my belt last season."

The underlying factor in all of this, however, is McGeehan's wish to return to Kenilworth Road and pull on the Hatters' colours once more.

Town boss John Still had already expressed his interest in signing the youngster in the close season but was put off by Norwich's demands of "silly money".

It wasn't to be and instead – up until his temporary spell with Cambridge – McGeehan was a regular for the Canaries' development squad and seemingly well out of contention for a place in the Carrow Road first XI.

"In the summer I was hoping a deal to Luton could be done to bring me back, but for whatever the reason it didn't materialise," says McGeehan, his voice tinged with melancholy. "I switched my attention to trying to get into Norwich's first team, but with the opportunity almost non-existent I knew I had to find some football and that's when Cambridge came to help."

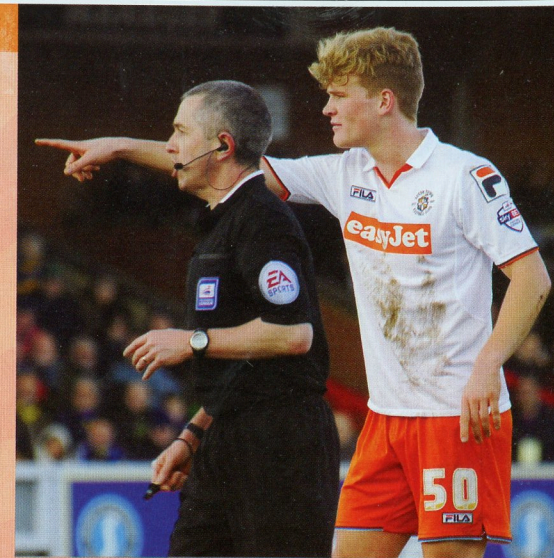
His performances in the amber of United, coupled with the Abbey Stadium coffers swelling with funds generated from a twice-televised tie and a replay at Old Trafford, meant most assumed Cambridge would be McGeehan's port of call on a more permanent basis.

Wrong...

"I had a great time at Cambridge but they are simply not a bigger club than Luton," he says. "My goal was always to come back to Luton at some point and now, thankfully, here I am and I couldn't be happier. The aim, like it was when I came here a year ago, is promotion and that's what I believe we can do."

Having experienced Conference and League 2 football over the past 12 months, McGeehan sees no reason why the Town can't go on secure what could be the first back-to-back promotions in the club's history.

"From what I've seen there's not a massive difference in the standard," he says.



"There are better teams and better players, but I think the Luton team we had last season would be good enough to win League 2 and hopefully this year we can achieve promotion as well.

"Luton showed they were way too big for the Conference last season and I think we're still way too big for League 2 as well.

"For me personally I think it is special to be a part of a team and club on the rise.

"The lads have done great to get us to the position we are in the table and I just hope I can give a bit of a boost to that as well."

Now that he's back at Kenilworth Road in Luton colours again, the Hatters faithful will have to concoct a new chant for the recognisable blond-haired number 50 who trots out onto the turf in orange and white this afternoon.

"I can't wait for it," smiles McGeehan. "It was special last year and I really enjoyed that feeling... coming out of the tunnel and the fans and their noise just hits you. I'm looking forward to putting on the orange shirt and doing it how it should be done."

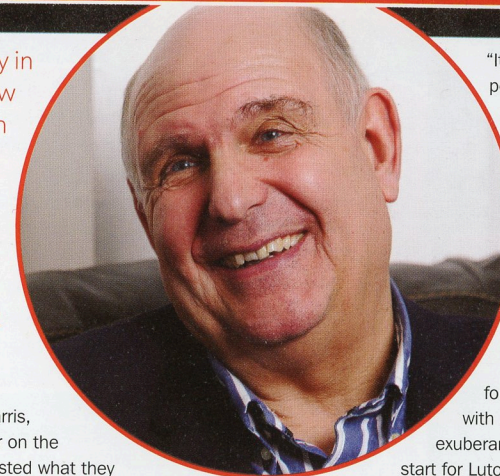
Satisfaction

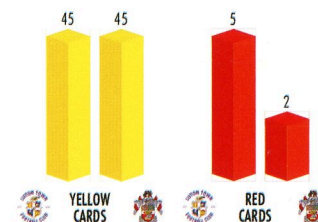

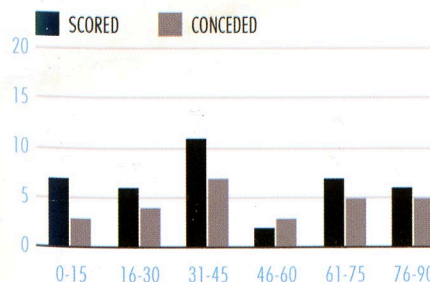

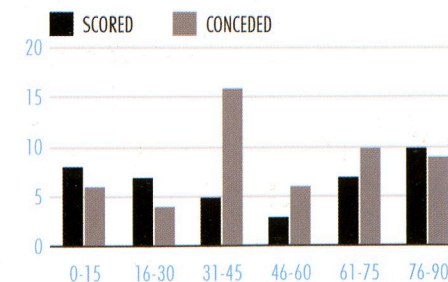

ON THIS DAY

► THE RECORD

The Hatters have enjoyed an excellent record on this day in the history books, winning 10 of the 15 matches played on 28th February down the years. The Town have lost one of 10 home games on this day, against Huddersfield in 1953. Overall the record reads 10 wins, three draws and two defeats. The Town have scored 33 times and conceded just 13.

► 62 YEARS UNBEATEN

The Hatters have not tasted a defeat on 28th February since losing 2-0 at home to Huddersfield in a Second Division (now Championship) fixture here at Kenilworth Road in 1953. 25,841 crammed inside Kenilworth Road to witness the defeat to the Terriers.

► WHAT'S HAPPENED SINCE?

In the eight games since that reverse against Huddersfield the Hatters have won six and drawn twice – winning those six matches in succession.

The first of the two draws was particularly significant as the Hatters drew 1-1 at Bloomfield Road against Blackpool in the quarter-final of the FA Cup in 1959. Billy Bingham scored the Town's goal that day and the Hatters would go on and win the replay in front of a Kenilworth Road record crowd of 30,069. Of course the Town would go on to reach the final but lose to Nottingham Forest in front of over 100,000 at Wembley.

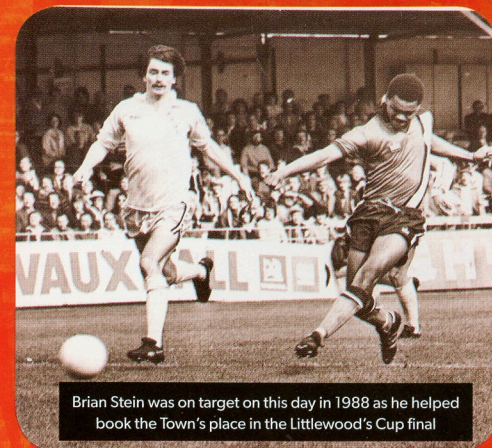
► ON OUR WAY TO WEMBLEY

Talking of Wembley, that's exactly what thousands of Hatters fans were chanting on this day in 1988 after Oxford United were seen off 2-0 in the semi-final second leg of the Littlewoods Cup at Kenilworth Road. Goals from Brian Stein and Ashley Grimes secured an aggregate 3-1 victory. And we all know what happened in the final against Arsenal at Wembley, don't we? Grimes sent a cross in for Stein to stoop the winner in the final minute and moments later Steve Foster lifted the League Cup.

► TRIPLE P

The Town's last three matches on this day have all been away from home and have all been won away to teams beginning with P.

On this day in 1998 goals from academy graduates Andrew Fotiadis and Sean Evers gave the Hatters a 2-0 win at Home Park against Plymouth Argyle.

Six years later in 2004, the Town gained a 2-1 victory in front of over 2,000 Luton supporters at London Road against Peterborough. Steve Howard and Ahmet Brkovic found the net against current Town keeper Mark Tyler.

The Town's most recent game on this day came six years ago in 2009 in the League 2 minus-30 relegation season. The Town triumphed 3-1 at Port Vale thanks to goals from Asa Hall, Kevin Gallen and Chris Martin.

► TOP FLIGHT TOWN

The Town have played once on this day down the years and that ended with a 2-1 home victory against West Ham United at Kenilworth Road in 1987.

The Hatters trailed to an eighth-minute goal from Tony Cottee but Peter Nicholas' 25-yard effort got the Town back on level terms. And Grimes, who we've already mentioned on this page, grabbed the winner 20 minutes from time before a crowd of 11,101. The Town ended the season in seventh place, the highest in the club's history.

► BEST OF THE REST

The Town saw off Sunderland 2-0 at Kenilworth Road in 1976...The Hatters' only other defeat on this day was a 4-3 reverse at Aldershot in 1934...The Hatters won their first four games on 28th February. Llanelli were beaten 5-1 in the Southern League Division 2 in 1914...Newport were beaten 4-0 in 1920...the Hatters then beat Charlton 1-0 in 1925 and then gained a comfortable 4-0 win over Swindon in 1931.

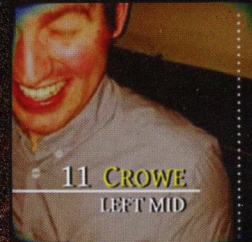

WIMBLEDON AWAY: THOSE 90, ODD, MINUTES

Chunky raindrops fell light as a feather. One at a time they twinkled past floodlights untimely lit, through searing sunshine and marbling cloud, and evaporated onto the heads and hats of late-coming Lutonians wincing at those 90, odd, minutes.

I say 90 odd minutes: Odd because, due to that horrible festering infection in Milton Keynes, AFC Wimbledon games come with a little spec of solidarity mixed in amongst the fleeting match day hate flung across the stands at the tiny blokes you may never know. Any good feeling is difficult to keep in mind though, once they start repeatedly hitting the post instead of capitulating like a club with a five step away terrace should.

Their ground is odd. Odd, not only because to see one end from the other you need a step ladder and the neck muscles of Mick Harford, such is the gentle gradient of the terrace in this gentle outpost of south London.

It's odd because it says Kingstonian on the top; odd because there's no roof on the bit at the end where those who'd venture a song into the bitter sky would see it escape towards the sun before the choir could join in; odd because the pitch looks like moss.

The game itself didn't help. Our ever-healthy list of sidelined talent meant that in many cases the players and partnerships treading that heavy turf were new. They were new and the 820-odd of us who stood in the cold with those Diamond tickets were decidedly not. We were old. Old enough to know that we probably weren't getting any daytime fireworks to go with daytime floodlights that afternoon.

The 90 odd minutes were split into two by the juddering engine of a Luke warm Guttridge slowly beginning to fire. The first saw us pegged-back and nervy, while the second saw us grow and flicker occasionally into life via knock-downs from a Jayden Stockley relishing the battle and beginning to repay the faith John Still has shown in him.

If the unexpected Stockley show wasn't odd enough, at one point Rob Lee's son scored. If the slightly flat Luton congregation weren't feeling old already, they were now.

The oddest of the 90-odd however, happened to Stockley during the second half. On a scale of "Yeah he dived" to "I'm staying up to watch the Football League show to see Claridge tear this ref a new... oh they've ignored it", this was the definition of heavy-eyelid late night fury.

From where I was swearing, the moment improbably named Jayden tumbled into the top corner of the box came with a certainty that felt out of place on this most uncertain of days. Sure as Barron Knight follows Mervyn Day this was a penalty. The yellow card that followed sapped what sanity remained from my day out to the extent that I later paid £8 for a single Jack Daniels and Coke without batting an eyelid.

But back into it we eventually got. And there was good among the bad and familiarity among the weird as Lawless, McGeehan and Guttridge pulled midfield strings that had been bypassed time and again in the first half, beneath looping hope from defence to attack.

As the clock ticked over into the 90th odd minute however, and as the Town net rustled for a final thudding time I knew, looking into the tiny jubilant Wimbledon faces who long to make their home elsewhere soon, that neither of us ever wanted to come here again.

But if they thought gaffer Keith Curle was overly-harsh, they should try working for this lot:

JOHN BECK

Beck was the king of the crazy fine, hammering his players for all manner of 'offences' that today look like good practice.

Too many short, sideways or backwards passes? That'll be a fine. Defenders taking more than two touches? Fine. Failure to go out with the lads and get absolutely leathered. Fine. Keeper throwing the ball out instead of wellying it upfield? You guessed it.

First, he collared the pair and marched them to apologise to referee Anthony Taylor like naughty schoolboys caught stealing crayons. Then he hit them in the pocket.

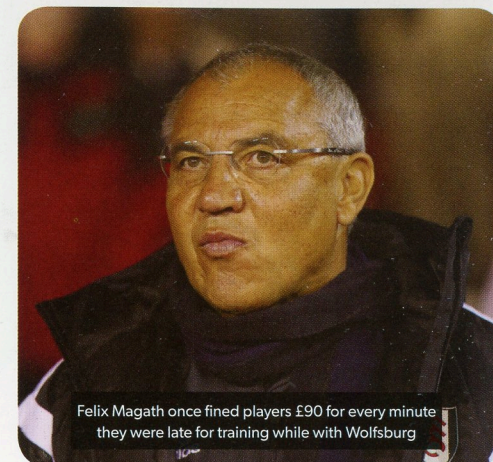
"They'll pay money for that," he said. "They will both be fined. Diving is a disease. It's one we're almost rid of but if people do it, they've got to be reminded it's not right."

Then there was a £220 fine for wearing headphones on the team coach and £87 for every minute late for training. It would have been cheaper to stay at home.

This afternoon's visitors Accrington Stanley ended league leaders Burton Albion's 13-match unbeaten run with a 1-0 win at the Crown Ground on Tuesday night.

Jimmy Floyd Hasselbaink's Burton were undone by Josh Windass's first half goal but despite the defeat the Brewers remain top of the table and nine points ahead of the Hatters in the League 2 standings. The win for Accrington, however, kept them in 15th place in the table and nine points off a Play-Off place.

The game was one three matches played on Tuesday night, with the pick of the action coming at Fratton Park as Portsmouth recovered from 2-0 down against Tranmere to win 3-2 thanks to two late goals from Ryan Taylor. Pompey, who won 6-2 at Cambridge at the weekend, are up into 13th in the table and are, like Accrington, nine points from a top seven berth.

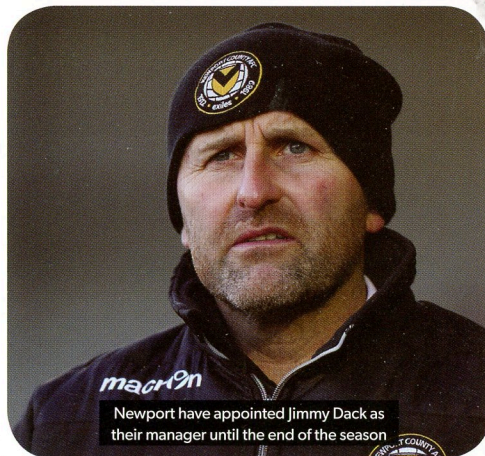
AFC Wimbledon, victors over the Hatters last Saturday, could not build on that win as they were held to a goalless draw with Cambridge at the Abbey Stadium with Adebayo Akinfenwa missing a second half penalty.

On Saturday the Hatters held their spot in fourth place despite the last-gasp defeat against the Dons at Kingsmeadow, but fell behind the leading three clubs in the automatic promotion places. Wycombe Wanderers won for the ninth time on their travels this term with a 3-2 win away at Carlisle to go four points ahead of the Hatters.

The Chairboys' win put pressure on Shrewsbury who lost 2-1 at Tranmere, while Burton came from behind to win 3-1 at Dagenham & Redbridge.

A place in the top seven, however, is becoming fiercely competitive, in no small part to Stevenage's 4-2 win over Southend at Broadhall Way. Southend were leading 2-1 with 15 minutes left but surrendered the lead and two goals in the final four minutes ensured Graham Westley's side won the points to move them to within four points of the Play-Offs.

Bury, who the Town travel to on Tuesday, earned a 1-0 win over bottom-of-the-table Hartlepool to maintain their grasp on the final Play-Off place, while Newport – who have appointed Jimmy Dack as manager for the rest of the season – lost 1-0 at home to Morecambe, who visit Kenilworth Road next weekend. County have lost five of their last seven matches, and are now two points adrift of the top seven.

Plymouth have rekindled their form of late and John Sheridan's Pilgrims made it four wins on the spin with a 3-1 win in the Devon derby at Exeter with striker Reuben Reid scoring a hat-trick. Exeter remain on the fringes of the Play-Offs, but have drifted down to 14th in the table.

Since our last home match, Cheltenham have axed ex-Town boss Paul Buckle and last time out they held Accrington to a 1-1 draw last Friday. The Robins remain in the bottom two along with Hartlepool but are just one point behind York, who lost 3-0 at Northampton last week. The Cobblers have won six of their last eight matches and are up to 11th in League 2 – eight points off the final Play-Off spot.

This afternoon leaders Burton aim to bounce back from Tuesday's disappointment at home to Newport, while second place Shrewsbury will be looking to maintain their unbeaten home record with victory over in-form Northampton at the New Meadow.

One of the games of the day is Wycombe versus Stevenage at Adams Park, with Boro knowing a win on the road could put them within a point of the top seven should other results also go their way.

Play-Off contenders Plymouth and Bury go head-to-head at Home Park, while fifth place Southend host struggling Carlisle at Roots Hall.

At the other end of the table, Hartlepool host AFC Wimbledon and Cheltenham face Tranmere in a six-pointer at Whaddon Road.

Luton Town boss John Still passed a personal milestone on Thursday of this week, completing two years in charge at Kenilworth Road.

It's been some 24 months for the manager too, as he took over with the club at quite possibly its lowest ebb, some way short of the Play-Offs and resigned to another year in the Conference.



He's only the third manager to pass two years in the hot seat since 2000, with Mike Newell the last to do so, succeeding where the likes of Paul Buckle, Gary Brabin, Richard Money, Mick Harford and Kevin Blackwell, all failed.

What Still has done wonderfully well at Kenilworth Road too is get things right both on the pitch and off it, never an easy combination.

The toxic atmosphere that had suffocated previous

managers quickly evaporated, as Still, with no little help from skipper Ronnie Henry, got the supporters on side after a home match against Lincoln.

Simple things like involving fans in the post-match huddle has gone down a storm and in Still, most supporters feel they now have someone they can relate to at the helm and are confident their beloved club is in safe hands.

Achievements

While on the field, no-one can argue with his achievements as Luton stormed to the Conference title, sweeping aside all before them to break a number of records along the way.

Now they are finally back League 2, the Hatters haven't stood still either, as despite injuries in key areas all season, they sit in fourth place, with a second successive promotion a real possibility.

Still has always been an advocate, of "young, hungry" players too, and you can see that has he has assembled the likes of Michael Harriman, Luke Wilkinson and Cameron McGeehan, who could be the cornerstones that future sides are built on.

Joked

He has joked previously that while watching on from the sidelines at Braintree, as Luton lost once more, he had considered ringing former club Dagenham to see if they would take him back.

While the last games of that season had some of the worst results in Town's history, a 2-1 defeat at home to Hyde and 5-1 loss at Gateshead, all the time, Still was working out just what was needed to restore Luton to their rightful place in the Football League.

Believed

He didn't offer a quick fix either as the start of the following campaign proved, with some fans starting to have doubts after a 2-0 defeat at Wrexham.

However, Still was never once moved from the path he believed Town were on and from there, Hatters' rise has been nothing short of remarkable.

Some might think that two years doesn't represent that long a time, but Still's longevity is rare amongst previous Town managers.
