THE GAME

This time last season Luton were enjoying their seemingly unassailable position at the top of the Conference Premier table.

They ended up romping to the title by a massive 19-point margin to reclaim the Football League place they had lost five years earlier.

And now John Still's side are targeting back-to-back promotions, having taken to life in League Two like a duck to water.

The Hatters were leading the way in mid-November, although have since fallen away and currently sit fifth ahead of this afternoon's clash at Fratton Park.

They are now six points adrift of third-placed Wycombe and only three clear of Stevenage, who currently lead the chasing pack just outside of the play-off berths.

Luton have won five times on their travels this term, seeing off Carlisle (1-0), Cambridge (1-0), Stevenage (2-1), Hartlepool (2-1) and Plymouth (1-0).

But four of those victories occurred before October was out and they have not tasted away success since the middle of January.

Pompey, meanwhile, have claimed 10 points from the last 12 available at Fratton Park and will be aiming to put a dent in the Hatters' promotion hopes today.

THE CLUB

Luton Town were formed in 1885 and joined the Football League 12 years later. They reached the 1959 FA Cup final, but were beaten 2-1 by Nottingham Forest at Wembley. The Hatters won their first piece of major silverware in 1988 when they defeated Arsenal 3-2 to lift the League Cup.

Johnny Moore asks Mike Simmonds of the Luton News Herald & Post to run the rule over the Hatters

JM IT'S BEEN A GREAT FIRST SEASON BACK IN THE FOOTBALL LEAGUE FOR LUTON. HAS IT EXCEEDED THEIR EXPECTATIONS?

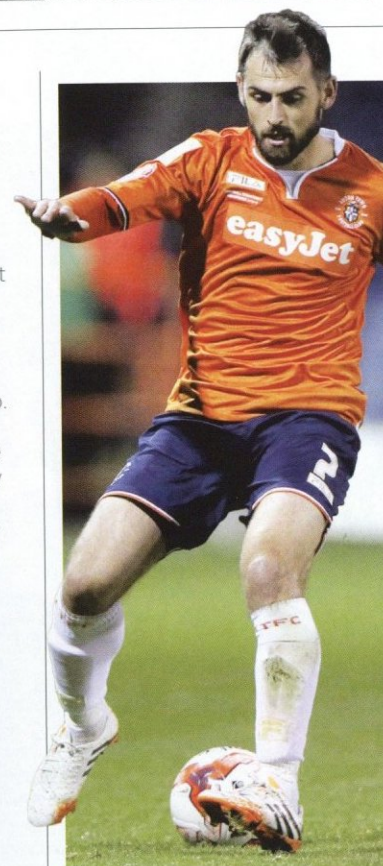
MS Not really. Luton's supporters were optimistic about their team's chances going into the campaign after romping to the title last term and seeing plenty of recent Conference winners challenge in League Two. Most would have backed their team to achieve a play-off place at the start, which is where they currently sit, so I wouldn't say they have been too surprised by the team's progress to date.

JM GIVEN THE WAY THINGS HAVE GONE SO FAR, WOULD FANS BE DISAPPOINTED IF LUTON HAD TO SETTLE FOR THE PLAY-OFFS RATHER THAN AUTOMATIC PROMOTION?

MS Supporters would probably be split 50/50 by this, as many would have accepted being in the play-offs back in August. However, after Town climbed to the top of the table and had such a long run in the top three positions, some thought a second successive promotion was definitely on the cards. The dip in form recently has led some to re-evaluate their expectations, though, with many starting to remember just where the team has come from in such a short space of time.

JM ARE THE CLUB STRONGER FOR THEIR STINT IN THE NON-LEAGUE GAME, GIVEN THEIR STATE PRIOR TO RELEGATION?

MS Although they would have quite happily spent just the one season in the Conference, the club appear in a better state off the field since their relegation. The Hatters are in safe hands with owners Luton Town 2020 Ltd, while in John

Still, they have a manager who is really building his squad for the future, with the emphasis on what he likes to describe as 'young, hungry' players, such as Cameron McGeehan and Michael Harriman. Supporters have really taken to Still since his arrival

from Dagenham & Redbridge, too, as he has finally bridged the gap that might have existed between previous Luton bosses and fans.

JM WHO ARE THE IN-FORM HATTERS PLAYERS LIKELY TO POSE POMPEY PROBLEMS THIS AFTERNOON?

MS Returning midfielder Alex Lawless has looked very sharp since recovering fully from a broken foot. In his last two matches, he has come off the bench and helped change the game in Luton's favour, particularly last Saturday as he scored one and almost grabbed another. Another huge player that Luton now have back and fit again is Luke Guttridge. The midfielder netted 13 goals last term as the Hatters romped to the title, before suffering another metatarsal injury. He now appears over that, playing the last three games, scoring once too and if he can remain fit, he could be a massive influence between now and the end of the season.

JM HOW HAVE LUTON LOOKED ON THE ROAD THIS SEASON AND WILL THEY BE GOING ALL OUT FOR VICTORY TODAY?

MS After making a hugely impressive start to life on their travels, with four wins from seven, Luton's away form has become something of an issue in recent weeks. They have looked far from comfortable, with three straight defeats and won only once since October, a run spanning 12 games. Naturally, though, they will still be looking to win today at Fratton Park, where they will be in the rare role of underdogs – and Luton could really do with a victory to reignite their promotion hopes.



DEFINING MOMENTS

LUTON TOWN

Football historian Leigh Edwards selects some of the key moments that have shaped Luton's post-war era



2005

1955 – TOP-FLIGHT HATTERS

Gordon Turner scored 32 goals as Luton won promotion to the top-flight for the first time. The Hatters began with a 3-0 victory at home to Nottingham Forest and soared up the second division table with six straight wins. Turner grabbed a hat-trick as they trounced Blackburn 7-3 and they also triumphed 5-1 at Forest. Dally Duncan's side maintained their challenge, slamming four goals past Hull, Rotherham, Liverpool and Port Vale. Tom Aherne and Shay Dunne were ever-present as Luton pipped Rotherham to the runners-up slot on goal average with a 3-0 win at Doncaster.

1959 – FA CUP FINALISTS

The Hatters reached the FA Cup final for the first and only time. They were unbeaten in their opening 10 Division One games, thrashing Manchester City 5-1 and hitting four goals past West Ham and Preston. Luton recovered from a lean spell to beat Arsenal 6-3 and Burnley 6-2, then top scorer Allan Brown netted four times in a 5-1 demolition of Nottingham Forest, but poor results over the closing weeks saw them finish below mid-table. The Hatters defeated Leeds 5-1, Leicester 4-1, Ipswich 5-2, Blackpool 1-0 and Norwich 1-0 in the FA Cup before Syd Owen's side lost 2-1 to Forest in the final.

1968 – FOURTH DIVISION TITLE

Bruce Rioch netted 24 goals as Luton won the fourth division title. New captain Terry Branston made his

debut as they kicked off with a 1-1 draw at Wrexham and Ian Buxton arrived from Derby in September. The Hatters lost just two of their first 18 matches and beat Charlton in the opening round of the League Cup, scoring 27 times in a run of eight successive victories. Allan Brown's side went top of the table with a 2-0 win at Brentford in February and Keith Allen, Max Dougan, Fred Jardine, John Moore and Ray Whittaker starred as they remained in pole position, clinching the title with a 4-0 triumph over Crewe.

1970 – PROMOTION WINNERS

Malcolm Macdonald scored 25 times as the Hatters won promotion from Division Three. They had narrowly failed to go up the previous season and Bruce Rioch was sold to Aston Villa for a record fee, with Alec Stock signing Macdonald, John Ryan and John Collins. Luton were early leaders after remaining unbeaten in their opening 13 matches, recruiting Chris Nicholl from Halifax and Matt Tees from Charlton. Macdonald grabbed hat-tricks in 5-0 wins over Bradford and Reading, with Town unbeaten in their last six matches and clinching promotion as runners-up with a 0-0 draw at Mansfield.

1974 – FIRST CLASS RETURN

Luton regained top-flight status after an absence of 14 years. They recovered from a 4-0 defeat at Nottingham Forest on the opening day to hammer Carlisle 6-1, embarking on an eight-match unbeaten run. Harry Haslam signed Alan West from Burnley and

Jimmy Husband from Everton as the Hatters maintained their promotion challenge. Husband netted a hat-trick in a 3-1 victory over rivals Orient, then leading marksman Barry Butlin also scored three in a 4-2 defeat of Preston. Alan Garner and Bobby Thomson were ever-present and other stars included Peter Anderson and John Ryan as Luton finished runners-up.

1982 – SECOND DIVISION CHAMPIONS

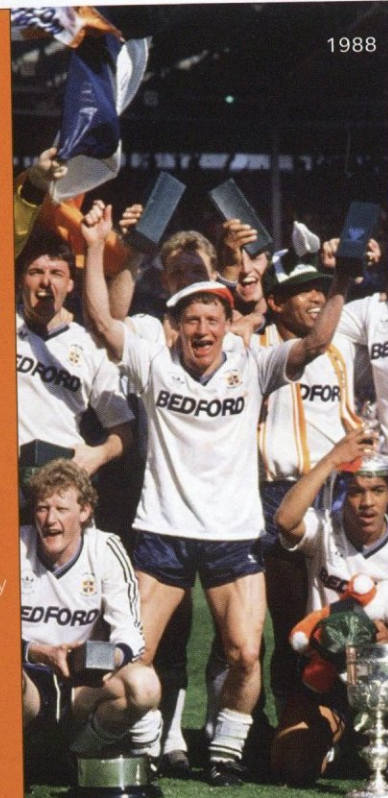
David Pleat guided the Hatters to the Division Two title. They had narrowly missed out on promotion in the previous two years and Tony Grealish was swapped for Brighton's Brian Horton. Town raced to the top by winning their first three games and hammered rivals Watford 4-1, then Steve White scored four times in a 6-0 demolition of Grimsby. Richard Money arrived from Liverpool and was an influential figure as Luton were unbeaten in their last 14 matches. Leading marksman Brian Stein, Mal Donaghy, Kirk Stephens and Steve White were all ever-present as Luton won the title with 88 points.

1988 – LEAGUE CUP WINNERS

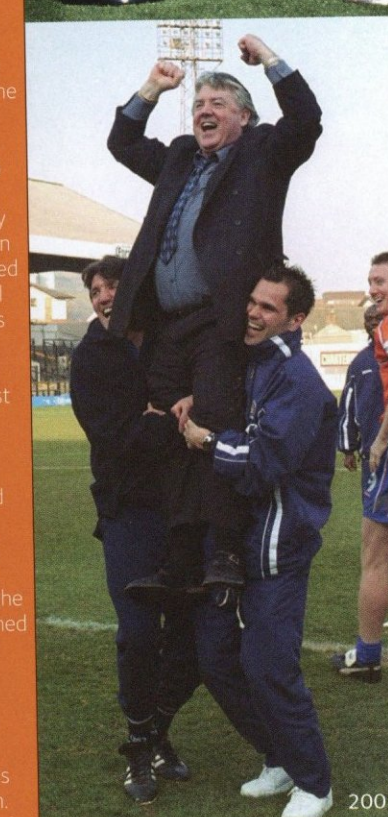
Ray Harford plotted Luton's League Cup final triumph. Danny Wilson replaced Peter Nicholas in midfield, while Micky Weir arrived from Hibernian and Mike Newell moved to Leicester. The Hatters won 5-2 at Oxford and Ian Allinson was signed from Stoke in October, with Town losing just twice in 12 matches, including a 7-4 win in the return match against Oxford, finishing ninth in the top-flight. They defeated Wigan 5-2, Coventry 3-1, Ipswich 1-0, Bradford 2-0 and Oxford 3-1 in the League Cup before beating Arsenal 3-2 in the Wembley final. Luton also reached the final of the Simod Cup and last four of the FA Cup.

1989 – WEMBLEY FINALISTS AGAIN

Luton were League Cup finalists for a second successive season.

Brian Stein, Mark Stein and Andy Dibble all departed, while newcomers included Roy Wegerle, John Dreyer and Steve Williams. Their first home victory was a 1-0 triumph over Liverpool and they beat Southampton 6-1 in January, but first division form was generally disappointing, with the Hatters narrowly avoiding relegation by winning three of their last four games. Town defeated Burnley 2-1, Leeds 2-0, Manchester City 3-1, Southampton 2-1 and West Ham 5-0 in the League Cup before losing 3-1 to Nottingham Forest at Wembley.

2002 – THIRD DIVISION RUNNERS-UP

Steve Howard scored 24 times as the Hatters won promotion from Division Three. Joe Kinnear's men were early leaders after winning their opening two matches and newcomer Carl Griffiths netted a hat-trick in a 5-1 victory over Torquay. Luton briefly regained pole position after beating Darlington 5-2 in October, signing Chris Coyne from Dundee, Jean-Louis Valois from Lille, Dean Crowe from Stoke, Ahmet Brkovic from Orient and Dave Bayliss from Rochdale. A run of 12 successive wins, which saw them slam five goals past Halifax and Mansfield, took Town back to the top with two games remaining, but they finished runners-up to Plymouth.

2005 – RECORD POINTS TOTAL
Mike Newell led Luton to the League One title. They stormed to the top of the table, winning 10 of their first 12 games before suffering three successive defeats. The Hatters beat Bradford 4-0 and Wrexham 5-1, then Steve Howard bagged a hat-trick in a 4-1 victory at MK Dons. The 1-0 triumph over Port Vale in December heralded a 14-match unbeaten run and Town bounced back from a 2-1 defeat against Bristol City to hammer them 5-0 in the return fixture. Briefly displaced as leaders by Hull, they triumphed 4-1 at Torquay and secured promotion with four fixtures remaining, claiming the title with a record 98 points.



TAYLOR MADE

RYAN ENJOYING HIS NEW STRIKE PARTNERSHIP

Alan Shearer and Chris Sutton famously formed a prolific 'SAS' partnership that led Blackburn to the Premier League title.

Now Pompey are hoping to use 'TNT' to blow a hole in League Two defences.

The potential of the Taylor 'n' Tubbs relationship was there for all to see at Cambridge last month, with Ryan and Matt netting four goals between them in a 6-2 rout.

And the former is enjoying having someone alongside him, after largely being utilised as a lone striker last season.

"I was up there on my own and had Wes Fogden behind me doing all my running," Taylor recalls. "This season I've had Matt or Craig Westcarr with me, so there's someone to run onto the ball when I knock it down.

"Matt's been brilliant since he came in and got a deserved hat-trick at Cambridge the other week.

Hopefully that will continue and we can form a dangerous partnership.

"It's similar to the little-and-large relationship I had with Adam Le Fondre at Rotherham. It worked then and it seems to be working now."

Taylor scored three goals in total last month – including a vital brace to help snatch victory from the jaws of defeat against Tranmere – to double his tally for the season before netting again at Accrington seven days ago.

"I wasn't good enough earlier on – I've said that to myself and I've said it to the manager," he declares. "In the last few weeks I've got some goals and my all-round play has also been a lot better, so I'm looking to build on that and keep improving

until the end of the season.

"It's always a confidence booster to score, although first and foremost you have to make sure you do the job you're asked to do for the team."

Taylor has also paid tribute to Andy Awford, who has been one of his most vocal supporters throughout the campaign.

"As soon as he got the job last season, he pulled me to one side and said I was playing on Saturday," reveals the 26-year-old. "He then started me in all but one of the games for the rest of the campaign. I knew then that he was a fan of mine and now it's about me repaying that faith."

Pompey enjoyed a run of seven



matches without defeat before they were finally beaten at Northampton 11 days ago.

They recovered from that to draw away to Accrington and Taylor is targeting another impressive haul of points before the end of the season.

"It was a good run of games,"

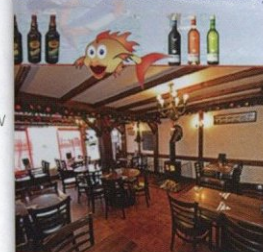

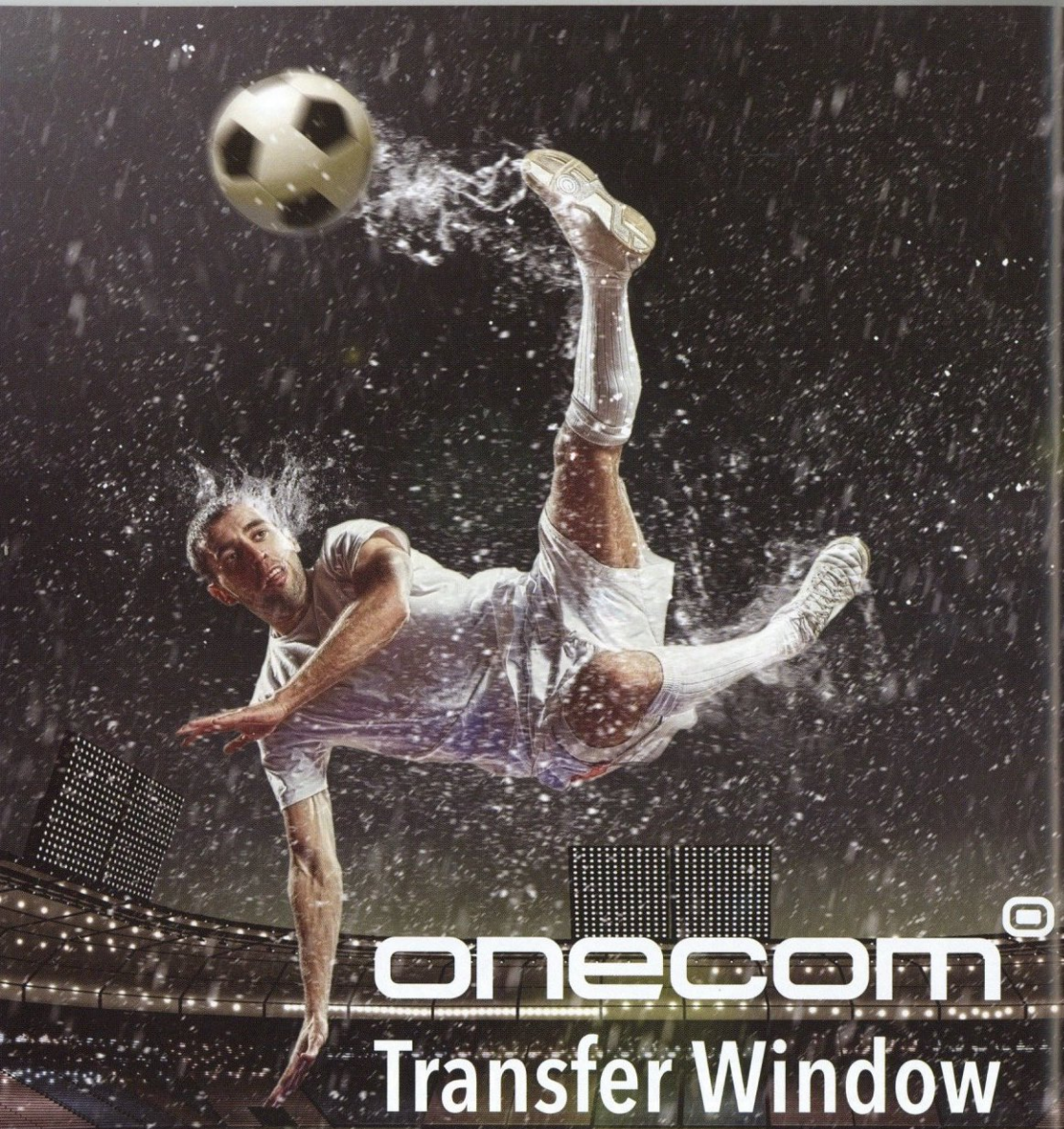

he states. "It saw the gaffer win Manager of the Month and helped us move away from the bottom of the table. There were some decent performances in there and it's just a shame that it had to end the other night, but then we picked ourselves up and got ready to go again.

"We've had a few disappointing spells during the season, but you're going to have dips in form and the important thing is how you deal with that.

"Hopefully we can now get another run going to climb up that league table and then see where we end up. We just need to make sure we

work hard in training and that we're prepared for every game."

Pompey are currently rooted firmly in mid-table – sitting 10 points off the final play-off spot and 11 clear of the League Two trapdoor.

Taylor believes that a top-seven finish is still within the Blues' grasp, but knows that they need to perform on a regular basis in order to achieve that.

"One reason why a lot of players are at this level is because of inconsistency," he explains. "On their day they can be as good as Championship quality, but you need to be able to do it week in, week out.

"We've seen this season that any team is capable of beating any other – that's not just a cliché. It means that every game is going to be tough and you have to be ready for different sides playing different kinds of football.

"Our results have been a lot stronger recently and we have to believe that Northampton match was just a blip.

"The gap to the play-offs is 10 points, but we just need to take each game as it comes and not look too far ahead."

Taylor believes that Pompey have a secret weapon in their quest to move up the table – average Fratton gates of more than 15,000.

"It's a bit of an odd scenario," he says. "You look down the attendances in League Two and there's nobody getting anywhere near us."

"To have that many fans at this level is crazy and is a brilliant incentive for us. The support home and away is top drawer and can only help us."

Pompey today come up against a

Luton outfit that romped to the Conference Premier title last term, bringing to an end their five-year exile from the Football League. And they have not struggled in a higher division, currently occupying fifth spot despite Saturday's home defeat to Morecambe.

Taylor netted in the 1-1 draw with the Hatters at Kenilworth Road just after Christmas and is hoping he can repeat the feat this afternoon.

"It wasn't exactly a belter," he laughs. "But they all count – it doesn't really matter how they go in. It would be

nice if I could find the target again

"Luton have kicked on from their promotion last season and they've got a manager who's experienced this level. They've adapted brilliantly to playing in League Two and have a solid team, so it will be a tough test for us, but one we're confident we can pass if we play to our potential."

"They're also a big team down in the division and the atmosphere will be great. I'm sure that both sets of fans will be going at it hammer and tongs but hopefully we'll be the ones who come out on top."

Even though I didn't get to work with them at Pompey, it was great to welcome Hermann Hreidarsson and David James back to Fratton Park for the last home match against Oxford. Both the Icelandic defender and England international were extremely popular players and Hermann even booked the Jimmy Dickinson lounge for 20 of his countrymen, which certainly livened the place up.

Many of you will have witnessed the rousing reception they received upon taking to the pitch at half-time. Only a select band of players will have been afforded such a response and it shows how much the fans took have taken them to their hearts.

A host of other former Blues stars were also present. I know Jimmy Carter well, as he was here during

the twilight of my career when I was fighting for the goalkeeper's spot with Mart Poom and – God rest his soul – Aaron Flahavan. He made 77 appearances for the club between 1995 and 1998 and spent time on loan at Oxford before that. My old mate Chris Burns, who turned out to be a surprise package in the early 1990s, was here and was joined by George Ley and Norman Piper.

It is always great to have former players here, especially when they span different periods, and they enjoyed the chance to tour the various hospitality lounges before the game and meet some of our fans. To finish the complement, Keith Viney was also at the game, along with those regulars who live locally and visit the Players' Lounge on a matchday.

There are a number of events on the horizon before the end of the season and one of these is the London Supporters' Club dinner, which takes place following the Bury game on April 18. This year it is being held in memory of the much missed Eddy Wilson, who was a member of the group and a Pompey stalwart for more than half a century. For those of us who knew him, it still seems strange seeing Eddy around the place on matchday or operating the public address system at reserve and youth cup games. He was a popular figure at Fratton Park and I'm sure the dinner will be well attended.

To say that my time at Luton wasn't the most prolific spell of my career is somewhat of an understatement – I played six times for them and never scored. Consequently, the thing most Hatters fans remember me for is my boots. I had just acquired a boot sponsorship at the time and my bright Puma King footwear outshone everyone. It's just a pity that my football didn't do the same.

David Pleat was a manager who spoke a thousand words when one would do and rather conned me into moving from Crystal Palace by saying I would suit their style of play. It soon became clear that I didn't. A few weeks later he was telling me that if he knew I was this bad he never would have attempted to sign me – which, of course, did my ever diminishing confidence the world of good.

Just before Pompey came in to rescue me from this nightmare, I was sat in David's office to discuss where we felt it had all gone wrong. I thought that the side lacked a couple of hard-men who would put their foot in and fight for lost causes. His response was that he never took advice from players and how dare I suggest that he didn't know what was best for his team.

So I was intrigued when, not long after I left, Luton signed Mick Harford and Peter Nicholas – possibly two of the hardest players in the game at that time. It made me think that I had in some way influenced the direction they took because, let's face it, I hadn't done that on the pitch.

When Pompey made their interest known, David sat me down again,

said that Alan Ball had made an offer and as I was doing nothing at Luton, I might as well just go there. I was only too happy to accept and join up with my old Palace team-mate Billy Gilbert. When I arrived at Fratton Park, I heard those immortal words from Bally that would greet me further down the line at both Stoke and Exeter: "Welcome, son. You are going to absolutely love it down here."

Finally, I'd like to give David Pleat some credit for never holding a grudge. A few months after leaving Luton he sent me a Christmas card with an unusual yuletide greeting. It simply said: "Have you learned to use your left foot yet?"

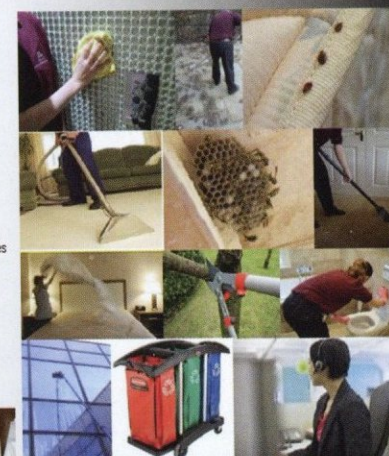

for money launderers, property dealers, tax dodgers and more.

But things are changing in the football landscape.

For instance, Trust In Luton owns 50,000 shares in the club. They have the legal right to veto any changes to the club name, kit colours, club crest and even the mascot. Fans literally protect the club's identity. It beats voting on one of three boring kit colour options offered by the kit manufacturer too.

Also, more and more football grounds up and down the country – thanks mainly to fans – have now been declared an 'Asset of Community Value', making it a lot harder for the stadium to be sold off for development.

Supporters are becoming more aware of the power they have. Harnessing that power for the benefit of their clubs' future is the key. It is a steep learning curve for all fan-owned clubs, Pompey included.

As long as fan-owned club boards aim to be transparent through clear and accurate dissemination of information, then fans will be happy. However, go down the common football business trail of vague sound-bites, creative accounting wheezes and exploitative marketing and it won't be long before more 'unveiling' articles are published across the country.

Which is where we come in.

The three of us have set up The Vegias Institute – a not-for-profit organisation – to aid fans by disclosing and analysing information regarding the financing, ownership and governance of their clubs.

We're here to help.

TRANSPARENCY AND FAN OWNERSHIP.

Many stalwart Pompey fans played their part in saving Portsmouth Football Club from extinction.

Our small band, the Pompey Bloggers, came together to do our bit. Our job was to unveil the characters and their business 'practices' that had brought the club to its knees, in reputational and practical terms.

April 10 2013, the culmination of everyone's efforts saw triumph with pumped fists and parties. We had all done it, Pompey were saved, we fans were in charge.

Being fan-owned means that important stakeholders, the fans, have a say in how their beloved club is run. Sadly this is a relatively rare occurrence, especially in professional football.

Without fans, football is nothing. Without fans, the value of the game as a spectacle (now worth £5.14 billion) would be greatly reduced.

The importance of fan devotion in football is both ignored and exploited by owners as it suits; who see a football club as their own private empire and ATM; who know full well that loyal supporters will pay over the odds for tickets, replica shirts, calendars and such-like ephemera. Club shops with scant supply of replica shirt stocks are rare; though in some cases, as we know, it does happen.

Changing the kit colour, stadium name, whacking high-interest loans (aka 'investments') onto the club's assets – football has seen it all. Yet nothing much has been done to change this. Little of it is illegal, but all of it is bad news for the club's true stakeholders, the fans.

Decades of weak football authority regulation have left clubs wide open to becoming ready-made vehicles

Academy manager Mark Kelly said: "We controlled the first half, but were just missing that spark in the final third.

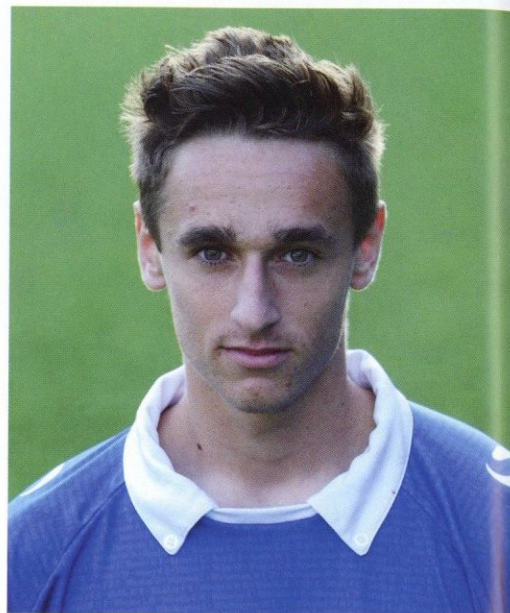
"Bournemouth obviously got a ticking off at the break because they came roaring out of the traps from the restart and scored twice.

I LEARNED AN IMPORTANT PIECE OF FAMILY HISTORY ON MY MOST RECENT TRIP BACK HOME TO NORTHERN IRELAND LAST WEEK.

It turns out I'm not the first member of my clan to have a connection with Pompey – and it's taken me nearly eight years with The News to discover this nugget of information!

A fact that's made even more surprising given that every time I set foot back in the auld homeland, I get asked about the goings on at Fratton Park first rather than my own wellbeing.

Such interest in the fortunes of Pompey from family members has often made me consider setting up our own supporters' club or putting them all in contact with Irish Blues: Portsmouth Supporters' Club, who, I believe, are the only one in Ireland for fans of the star and crescent.

However, I may have to disappoint the one or two less-switched-on members of the McMahon/Mullan dynasty who think that it's actually Plymouth and not Pompey who I cover for the paper.

That's a common mistake for quite a few of them – and one I often have to correct even before our usual football chats get under way.

I can't level such inaccuracies at my dad John, though.

Last summer he was eager to attend a charity game in Trevor Carson's home town of Killyleagh for The News in order to get an exclusive with the then-Pompey goalkeeper on where his future lay. I refused the offer, however, as I wasn't quite sure what

his shorthand was like!

Nevertheless, it was at a family funeral this month when I was informed that I was following in some noteworthy footsteps when it came to my support of Pompey and not, erm, Plymouth!

According to my uncle Kevin – I'll give him his moment of glory – it's in fact my late uncle Brian who first discovered the lure of the Blues when he was a boy in the 1950s, and not myself.

And the reason why?

Well, apparently the then-young, independently-minded Brian refused to conform to the norm and support the easy option of the then title winners and instead wanted a team with a Northern Ireland connection.

And with Norman Uprichard in goal for Pompey at the time, it was seemingly a natural fit. Unfortunately,

in those days, money was too tight for Brian to see his idol in action in the flesh at Fratton Park.

But he was still a proud Blues supporter, looking out for their results as best he could – that was until Uprichard, who played more than 160 games for Pompey, left the club in 1959!

There was also the fact that fellow Northern Ireland international Derek Dougan departed Fratton Park the same year for Blackburn.

And it came as no surprise that Rovers then became his club of choice, with Pompey now having to take a back seat.

The biggest showing of football disloyalty, you will think.

But I'm still proud that I have discovered ancestors with a Pompey past, no matter how fleeting and tenuous.

The reason we're taking a bow is due to the fact that I imposed a ban on myself using the indoor shopping complex in Havant as a thoroughfare – and not for the first time.

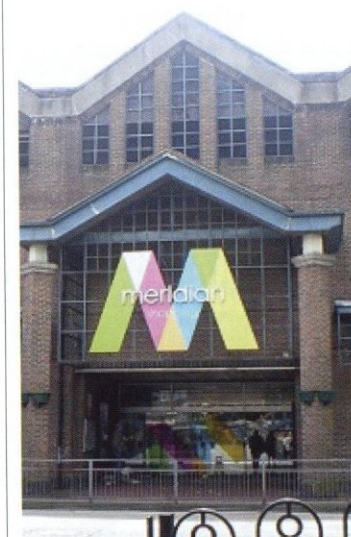
Let me explain. I habitually used the Meridian Centre as a short-cut to the cash machine and pub, via popping into WH Smith to enjoy a free read of the football magazines and autobiographies, sometimes to avoid a downpour.

But as indoor shopping complexes go, it has always been somewhat of a white elephant, which replaced a quaint outdoor arcade in what has always essentially been a market town.

It was last March that, in the midst of six winless games which saw just one goal scored and struggling to find any divine inspiration, I contemplated clutching at straws.

Among all my daily rituals and movements that I racked my brain about, this was the one that I finally hit on.

I kid you not. The conscious decision to boycott the Meridian Centre for the good of Pompey came on Thursday, March 27 – two days

before the trip to Newport.

Every credible Blues fan knows what happened next as Andy Awford's side negotiated the final seven games of the season unbeaten, accruing 17 points in the process. Suddenly a side who couldn't win became one that wouldn't lose.

For the next few months I avoided that place like the plague. However,

when the penultimate day of August came along I was brave enough – following five matches without defeat – to believe our work hard had been done. I, therefore, resumed using my thoroughfare of convenience before a home match against Newport.

I felt a sense of foreboding as soon I put my foot through the door, exacerbated later that day by a first loss in 13 games, quickly followed by a couple more on the road at Burton and Southend.

But still I lumbered on through the centre during the winter, hoping that a natural – rather than divine – intervention would come to the fore, thereby maintaining easier links to my money and a pint or two.

Nevertheless, following a run of eight winless games from November through to January, I decided it was once again time to take one for the team.

As I was about to enter two days before the Wycombe match, I stopped abruptly and imposed another sentence of self-exile in the hope of inspiring another turnaround.

Again the impact was almost immediate, with undoubtedly the most vibrant performance of the season occurring at high-flying Wycombe.

By the time a trip to Cambridge came around in deepest February, Pompey were flourishing in full bloom and purring like a Rolls-Royce engine.

My route to both the hole in the wall and the subsequent watering hole continue to be more inconvenient.

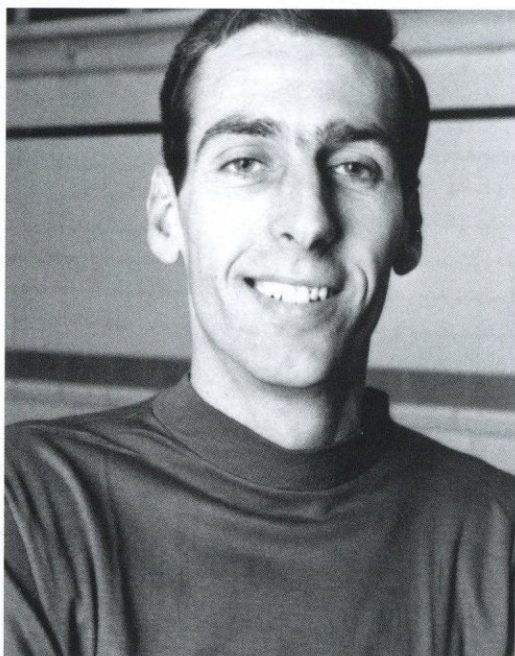
But the sacrifice made by me and my white elephant has twice managed to reverse the fortunes of Awford's boys for the better.

BYGONE BLUES

Johnny Moore looks at Chris Kamara's contribution to Pompey

MANY OUTSIDE THE CITY ARE UNAWARE THAT CHRIS KAMARA BEGAN HIS NOMADIC FOOTBALL CAREER AT POMPEY.

Now 'Kammy' is an instantly recognisable face on Sky Sports, but nobody would have believed that television fame was lying in wait when he arrived at Fratton Park straight out of the Navy as a teenager.

It seemed like his footballing dream has passed by when hometown club Middlesbrough failed to take him on as an apprentice.

The disillusioned youngster went off to sea, but while stationed in Portsmouth he was spotted playing by club scouts.

Bought out of the Navy to realise his ambitions, Kamara went on to feature in a youth team rich in promise, alongside the likes of Steve Foster, Peter Denyer and Billy Eames.

Such was his progress, he made his first team Blues debut at the age of just 17 in a 2-0 defeat at home to Luton in 1975.

Manager Ian St John used him 21 times in the old Division Two that season, with Pompey eventually finishing rock bottom.

Kamara's first senior goal had arrived earlier in the campaign during a 4-1 loss at Bolton in November, after intercepting a back-pass from the experienced Tony Dunne.

Of his four efforts from midfield that season, the only one that came at home was in a 2-0 victory over Blackpool. He showed maturity beyond his years by stepping up – with the game still deadlocked – to convert a 50th-minute penalty.

But this was March and the Blues were already hopelessly cut adrift – eventually getting relegated and ending 12 points shy of safety.

Despite such abject failure, Kamara was one of the few success stories, with his enthusiasm shining through.

These were certainly bleak times at Fratton and they avoided a second successive drop into the basement by a single point the following season.

Chris had become a pivotal figure by this point, with the emphasis firmly placed on youth as Pompey tried to

look towards the future.

He would start 40 league and cup games that term, again netting four times. While his goal tally was slightly disappointing, the chances he created for others was a particular strength.

Later in the season, St John was replaced in the dug-out by the legendary Jimmy Dickinson and a decision he made in the summer of 1977 proved controversial.

He accepted a 15,000 offer from Swindon for Kamara and it was not a popular decision, with the player soon haunting his old side by opening the scoring in a rollercoaster League Cup clash at the County Ground that the Blues lost 4-3.

This followed a stormy encounter on the south coast which ended in a 1-1 draw, but saw the midfielder receive sinister death threats in the build-up.

Yet four years after his departure, Kamara would shrug off all the acrimony by returning to Pompey for a fee of £50,000.

But it seemed like a strange decision by boss Frank Burrows – who had steered the club to promotion from Division Four – because after just 14 games he was on his way again, this time in swap deal with Brentford's David Crown.

Later Kamara would turn out for Swindon (again), Stoke, Leeds, Luton, Middlesbrough – long after that first rejection – Sheffield United and Bradford.

Then, after spells in charge of Bradford and Stoke, TV work came calling and he would regularly return to Fratton Park in order to cover matches.

One of his more notable broadcasting moments came in match against Blackburn when he completely missed Anthony Vanden Borre's red card, provoking much hilarity back in the studio, as well as homes up and down the country.

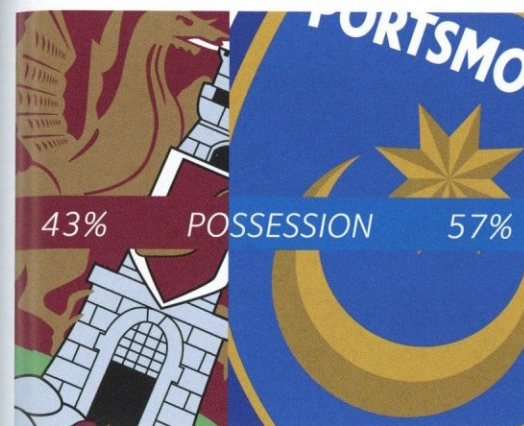

"Losing is hard to take when you're so close to the final and everyone was extremely disappointed in the dressing room afterwards.

"Sheffield are doing well in the Premier League Northern Division and we hope to play them again at the end of the season in the play-off to decide who gets promoted into the Super League.

"We want to be testing ourselves against sides of their calibre on a regular basis because it can be difficult to measure progress when you're winning league games comfortably most weeks."
