

NOTES FROM THE MANAGER



GOOD AFTERNOON AND WELCOME BACK TO KENILWORTH ROAD FOR THIS SKY BET LEAGUE 2 ENCOUNTER AGAINST NORTHAMPTON TOWN.

I'd like to give a warm welcome to the Cobblers' manager Chris Wilder and his staff and players plus the directors and supporters of our visitors today.

I have known Chris for a long time and he's always done a very good job wherever he has been in his career.

Chris and the team have had to put up with some off-the-field problems but they have come through them with flying colours and find themselves in a really strong position near the top of the table. They have had a good first half of the season and come to us in good form so we know we will have to be up for the challenge today.

Our last few games have been a bit disappointing. From a winning position against Carlisle things turned around and ended up with a hugely frustrating defeat. That result was followed by the defeat at Newport which was also very difficult to take. While it's difficult to predict injuries I would like to think the squad will be strong as we enter this busy Christmas period.

It's always a hectic time of year and I think it's fair to say it's a period in which we really need to be in gear. At the turn of the year in previous seasons we have always been in and around the top group and that is where we need to aim for now.

These crucial few weeks will be vital for us.

This coming Tuesday our youth team have their important FA Youth Cup tie away to Notts County. The lads have done terrific and I think everyone at the Club is very appreciative of the hard work and endeavour put in by Paul Driver, the team and all concerned. They will be well supported at Meadow Lane and by all the staff. Good luck to you all.

Turning attention back to this afternoon, what do we need? We need a committed, intelligent and hard-working performance. We've found ourselves in a strong position in our last home match against Carlisle but unfortunately couldn't hold on. We need to ensure we put in the same kind of performance but make sure we don't let any advantage we have slip like we did on that night.

Enjoy the game, get behind us like you always do and help us push on towards this festive period.





THE TOWN HIT THE ROAD IN THEIR FINAL GAME BEFORE CHRISTMAS WHEN THEY MAKE THE LONG TRIP DOWN TO DEVON TO FACE EXETER.

WHO? The Town take on Exeter City, aka the Grecians next Saturday. The club were formed in 1904 and are currently in their fourth season in League 2 following relegation in 2011/12. Like the Hatters, the Grecians spent five years in the Conference and ended their spell in the fifth tier by beating Cambridge in the Play-Offs final at Wembley in 2008.

WHERE? The ground that is often confused with Newcastle's St James' Park – Exeter's hasn't got an apostrophe at the end of their James – was built in 1904 and opened in September that year. Its current capacity is 8,541 and its record attendance was 20,984 when Sunderland visited for an FA Cup quarter-final replay in 1931.

HOW TO GET THERE. From Luton, take the M1 south, M25 anti-clockwise. Take the M4 and then M5 south, leaving the M5 at Junction 30, following signs for Exeter city centre along Sidmouth Road (A379) and then onto Rydon Lane (A3015). Take the Sidmouth Road turn off (B3183) towards the city centre. Keep going towards the town centre as the road becomes Heavitree Road. On nearing the city centre, take the fourth exit at the

large roundabout onto Western Way. At the next roundabout take the second exit onto Old Tiverton Road, then turn left into St James Road for the ground. There is street parking, but quite a way from the ground as there is a local residents' scheme in operation. If you have a satnav, safely type in EX4 6PX in to it to get you there.

ON THE BOBBERS. It's a three-and-a-half-hour, 213-mile drive to Exeter but if you'd rather somebody else take you there why not travel with fellow Town fans on the Bobbers? They depart Luton train station bright and early at 8.30am and the fare is £33 for adults and £30 for concessions. Call 01234 856542 to book your place.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE? The Town hold a decent record against the Grecians overall, winning 31 of the 60 previous meetings, which includes 12 matches (W6, L6) in the Southern League. The Hatters have drawn 13 and lost 16. The Hatters don't have a bad record at St James Park, winning 12, losing 11 and drawing eight of their 31 previous trips to Exeter. The Town have won two and drawn two of their last four

games away at Exeter, winning 5-0 in 1967 and 1-0 in 2008. Last season the Town drew 1-1 with Scott Griffiths on target.

THIS TIME ROUND. The Grecians currently sit three places and four points above the Town in League 2 going into today's games. Paul Tisdale's side have only lost one of their 10 games on home soil this season – to Wycombe back in September. Exeter are unbeaten in their last six matches which includes a 2-0 win over Port Vale in the FA Cup last weekend. Their reward for that victory is a home third round draw against Liverpool. However, City are also decent on the road, with wins at Plymouth, Mansfield and Portsmouth.

Welcome to Kenilworth Road NORTHAMPTON TOWN



It gives us great pleasure to welcome everyone associated with Northampton Town to Kenilworth Road this afternoon.

It's been a difficult season off the field for the Cobblers so far, with a sizable debt threatening the future existence of the club during the early parts of the year.

But a takeover from former Oxford United chairman Kelvin Thomas has helped the club reach a level of stability, putting any uncertainty firmly in the past at Sixfields.

And despite the troubles, Northampton have been performing excellently in League 2, currently sitting third in the table, denied the top spot by goal difference from Oxford and Plymouth.

Having finished solidly in mid-table last year, Northampton are already two thirds of the way towards eclipsing the 61 points they accumulated in the 2014/15 campaign.

Manager Chris Wilder, who enjoyed a playing career lasting 15 years, has been at the helm since January 2014 after signing a three-and-a-half year contract, guiding the club away from an imminent

relegation danger in his first season.

This season, however, started a lot brighter for Wilder and co., winning the first three games of the season, including a 3-0 hammering of League 1 outfit Blackpool in the Capital One Cup. The Cobblers suffered a slight blip from there, falling 4-1 to Newcastle in the same competition as part of a run of just two wins in ten games.

A 2-1 defeat away at Cambridge left Northampton ninth in the league, but a run of six league victories in seven games has seen them rocket up the table, taking 19 points from a possible 21 since the middle of October.

After a narrow 3-2 victory over Carlisle, the Cobblers then edged out Stevenage 2-1 before being held to a 2-2 draw by a vastly improved Newport County. Wilder's side then secured one-goal victories over Mansfield, Notts County and Crawley as well as a 2-0 victory over Yeovil a fortnight ago.

Northampton may also have a cup run to look forward to when they host MK Dons in the third round of the FA Cup. Victory over League 1 high-flyers Coventry saw Northampton cause a shock in the first round, but they were then

THE SEASON AHEAD...

After coming close to the Play-Offs last season what were expectations at Sixfields at the start of the season?



a third successive game. A crowd of 6,087 turned up, the best of the season at that stage, to see Northampton take the initiative with left back John Frain continually lifting the ball on to the head of ex-Hatter Paul Wilkinson at every opportunity.

Thankfully, Sean Evers cut down the Frain supply line early on forcing Northampton to change their tactics and with it a game of football rather than a war of attrition broke out.

The Cobblers had the ball in the net in the 16th minute but Carlo Corazzin's free-kick was disallowed by the referee as he had not signalled that the kick should be taken.

Three minutes later the Town had their own free-kick on the edge of the area and with Steve Davis, Ray McKinnon and Michael McIndoe hovering over the ball the latter played it sideways to full-back Graham Alexander whose 25-yard effort was deflected past Andy Woodman in the Cobblers goal for his fourth strike of the season.

The goal angered Northampton with both Ian Sampson and his central defensive partner Doug Hodgson going through the back of Northern Ireland international Phil Gray with only Sampson receiving a yellow card. Although Gray and Stuart Douglas spurned decent

opportunities it was the Cobblers who finished the half the stronger side with Corazzin forcing a point blank save from Luton keeper Kelvin Davis and Dave Savage seeing his 20-yard volley cannon off the crossbar.

In the second period, though, the Town took control and only heroics from Woodman who saved well from McIndoe, Douglas and Andrew Fotiadis, prevented the scoreline from becoming more realistic.

With the Hatters now up to third, one point off the top, it was left to Lennie Lawrence to say: "I am not getting carried away as we've had our moments of good fortune."




The Town produced a colourful 48-page programme for the visit of Northampton.

There was a report on the forgotten man of Kenilworth Road, Julian James, who had broken his leg following a very late challenge by Barry Hayles at Bristol Rovers the previous season. It was confirmed that James would need another operation on his leg which would mean that he would be out for the foreseeable future. Sadly, James never played League football again.

Skipper Steve Davis, in his column, mentioned the foul on Andre Scarlett which left the Oldham miscreant receiving his marching orders. Davis said, "This resulted in John Moore, Clive Goodyear and others from the Luton bench asking the Oldham lads if they fancied a pint after the game!"

The Town topped both the Football Combination and South East Counties League tables showing that the youth system was working full throttle.



DEFINING MOMENTS

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN **LEIGH EDWARDS** SELECTS EIGHT KEY MATCHES AND MOMENTS THAT HAVE SHAPED NORTHAMPTON TOWN'S POST-WAR ERA

1961 FIRST PROMOTION SUCCESS

Dave Bowen guided Northampton Town to promotion in 1960/61. The Cobblers started well, with only three defeats before Christmas, and the first-ever League visit to Peterborough United ended 3-3 in front of 22,959. Newcomers during the season included Laurie Brown, Norman Coe, Barry Lines, Mike Everitt and Norwich trio Ron Spelman, Jimmy Moran and Bob Edwards. Long-serving Roly Mills missed just one match as the Cobblers finished third in the Fourth Division with 60 points.

England Amateur international Laurie Brown was leading marksman with 22 goals and moved to Arsenal at the end of the season.

1963 THIRD DIVISION CHAMPIONS

Northampton clinched the Third Division title as two goals by Frank Large secured a 2-0 victory over Carlisle United in front of 15,094 at the County Ground on 9th May 1963. Newcomers Alec Ashworth and John Kurila starred as the Cobblers made a fine start, losing just once in their first ten games, beating Wrexham 8-0 and Halifax 7-1. Billy Hails arrived from Peterborough and Dave Bowen signed Frank Large from QPR to replace Cliff Holton who joined Crystal Palace. Chic Brodie and Barry Lines were ever-present, while Alec Ashworth was top scorer as the Cobblers won all except one of their last 11 matches.

1965 TOP-FLIGHT COBBLERS

The Cobblers completed their meteoric rise under Dave Bowen by reaching the top-flight in 1964/65. New signings Charlie Livesey

and Harry Walden starred as a 17 match unbeaten run lifted the Cobblers into second place by the start of December. Northampton bounced back from a 5-0 defeat at title rivals Newcastle United and clinched promotion to the First Division as two goals by Don Martin plus others from Bobby Brown and Joe Kiernan secured a 4-1 victory at Bury on 17th April 1965. Theo Foley, Bryan Harvey and Derek Leck were ever-present as the Cobblers also reached the League Cup quarter-finals.

1976 PROMOTION WINNERS

Leading marksman Jim Hall scored twice as Northampton Town clinched promotion with a 2-1 Fourth Division win at Bradford City on 10th April 1976. The Cobblers had lost just one of their opening nine Fourth Division games and went top of the table after a 1-0 win at Cambridge United in early November. Don Martin returned from Blackburn Rovers and grabbed a hat-trick

Northampton knocked out Liverpool of the League Cup at Anfield back in 2010

in a 5-2 win over Hartlepool. Jim Hall scored three times in a 6-0 win over Bournemouth and Paul Stratford did likewise as Bill Dodgin's side ended the season with a 4-0 demolition of Stockport County, finishing runners-up behind Lincoln City.

1987 RECORD-BREAKING CHAMPIONS

Northampton stormed to the Fourth Division title with a record 99 points in 1986/87. A five match unbeaten start ended with a 2-1 defeat at Swansea but the Cobblers then went another 21 League games undefeated until losing 1-0 in the return match at home to Swansea. Russ Wilcox was signed from Frickley and Dave Logan from Mansfield. Graham Carr's side clinched promotion as goals by Dave Gilbert and Richard Hill secured a 2-1 win at home to Crewe on 29th April 1987. Richard Hill, Trevor Morley and Trevor Benjamin scored 63 goals overall, while Peter Gleasure and Keith McPherson were ever-present.

1994 MOVE TO SIXFIELDS STADIUM

The club moved from the County Ground to Sixfields Stadium in 1994. The Cobblers had played at the County Ground, also home to Northamptonshire CCC, since the club's formation in 1897. The last match played at the County Ground was the 1-0 Third Division defeat by Mansfield Town watched by 4,993 on 11th October 1994. Northampton's first match at the newly-built Sixfields was the 1-1 Third Division draw against Barnet four days later, with Martin Aldridge scoring the first goal

there in front of a 7,461 crowd. The record attendance at Sixfields is 7,557 for Manchester City's visit in September 1998.

1997 WEMBLEY WINNERS

John Frain's late strike gave the Cobblers a dramatic 1-0 victory over Swansea City in the Third Division Play-Off final watched by 46,804 at Wembley Stadium on 24th May 1997. The Cobblers had won just two of their opening 11 League games but the 1-0 victory at Exeter was a turning point and January saw high-scoring wins over Cardiff, Chester and Hartlepool. Newcomers included John Frain and John Gayle as Ian Atkins' side ended the season with an unbeaten seven-match run and qualified for the Play-Offs in fourth place. The Cobblers beat Cardiff 4-2 on aggregate to reach Wembley in their centenary year.

2006 PROMOTION PARTY

Northampton clinched promotion as Scott McGleish's goal secured a 1-0 League 2 win at home to Chester City on 29th April 2006. Colin Calderwood's side failed to win any of their opening four games but then triumphed 1-0 at eventual champions Carlisle United. They lost just three times before Christmas and remained in the promotion race throughout the season, winning 5-0 at home to Macclesfield Town in January. The Cobblers overcame two consecutive defeats in March to win seven of their last nine matches. Goalkeeper Lee Harper was ever-present, while Scott McGleish was top scorer as they finished runners-up.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Town lost only one of their first 15 meetings with the Cobblers. The Hatters were unbeaten in the first eight meetings before Northampton first beat us 2-1 in the Southern League on 24th April 1905.

The Hatters hold an impressive home record against the Cobblers, winning a massive 75 per cent of the 40 matches on home turf. 30 of the 40 games have won, five have been drawn and five have gone Northampton's way.

Northampton have only won five matches on Bedfordshire soil, the most recent came in 2000 when a Steve Howard-inspired Cobblers side won 2-0. That was Northampton's first win here since 1920!

The Town have only ever won once at Sixfields – a 1-0 win in Joe Kinnear's first match in charge in 2001. Stuart Douglas scored the Hatters' only goal. Northampton have won six of the seven games at Sixfields.



5 - 6 On Boxing Day 1927 the Town led 5-1 at half-time against Northampton but the Cobblers stormed back in the second half to triumph 6-5! The Town have only scored five or more against the Cobblers once and it came in this match.

HOME COMFORTS

The Hatters have won 10 of their last 12 matches at Kenilworth Road and have won their last five. The aggregate score in the Town's favour in the last five home meetings is 11-3. Last season the Town beat Northampton here 1-0 thanks to Luke Guttridge's last minute goal. But the Cobblers gained revenge later in the season, coming back to win 2-1 after Alex Lawless had put the Town ahead.

The largest attendance to watch a Luton versus Northampton game came at Kenilworth Road in an FA Cup third round tie in 1961. The Hatters ran out 4-0 winners with all-time leading marksman Gordon Turner scoring twice.



WHAT'S THE STORY?

The Town threw away a 3-1 lead to lose 4-3 at Kenilworth Road as Carlisle completed an incredible second-half comeback.

An early Jack Marriott goal had the Hatters 1-0 up after four minutes but United levelled a minute before the break through Charlie Wyke's strike. But the Town seemed to be on their way to three points when Josh McQuoid and Danny Green struck to make it 3-1 before the hour mark.

However, the Cumbrians – the league's leading goalscorers who also possessed the leakiest defence – turned the game on its head with three goals in an unbelievable 14 minutes to leave Kenilworth Road stunned.





Hatters fan Brian Webb on finding a Luton Town team photo from 1889/90

Since I retired in 2010
I have been working
as a volunteer at
Wardown Park
Museum helping with
some of the more
mundane tasks.

As I got to know my way around
behind the scenes, I found
some fascinating Luton Town
memorabilia, such as the fixture
card from the 1885/86 season. I
also located an old photograph of
a football team, which was labelled
as 'Luton Town in 1891/92'. The
staff at the museum looked to me
to identify the players but I didn't
have a clue who they were. Roger
Wash's books helped identify some
of the players but many were a
mystery.

Retirement has many benefits
but your brain can wither away
if you do not use it. I needed a
project to occupy my time. I had
always been puzzled about the
formation of the club - a merger
between Excelsior and Wanderers
yet the latter continued to exist! I
decided to find out more from the
local newspapers held at Luton
Central Library.

When I read the reports about
the 11th April 1885 meeting at
the Town Hall I was struck by a
number of things: The absence
of a merger between Excelsior
and Wanderers was the major
discovery. However, I was also
impressed by the men involved.
Who were J.C. Lomax, E.H. Lomax,
G.H. Small and Herbert Spratley?

J.C. Lomax, appears in the records
as scoring some goals but there did
not appear to be a photo of him nor
any information about his life.

I started to investigate and found
that John Charles Lomax and his
brother, Ernest Herbert Lomax,
went to Peterhouse, Cambridge
University in 1884. I contacted
Peterhouse and the person I was
put in touch with was a Lutonian!
He could not have been more
helpful and sent me a photo of the
Peterhouse football team from
1886 which included the Lomax
brothers. I went back to the old
photograph in the Museum and
there were the Lomax brothers in
their cardinal red Luton Town shirts.
I subsequently identified other
players from photographs but we
have one mystery man, back row,
extreme right.

Prince's Trust and Hatters Community Trust

The Hatters Community Trust partner many different organizations both locally and nationally and last week teamed up the Prince's Trust once again to run a Get Started into Football programme for eighteen local 16 to 25-year-olds who were currently out of work and not in training or education.

The course was specifically designed to help young people move forward with their lives, remove barriers and have a go at fun activities and with the help of the Hatters Community staff and the Beds FA the participants all passed their Level 1 Coaching Certificate as part of the programme.

The Level 1 coaching course provides an introduction to the planning and delivery of safe and enjoyable coaching sessions for young players and included an introduction to practical games to develop players' technical skills such as shooting, turning with the ball and running with the ball. The course is aimed at the Prince's Trust youngsters who want to work with groups of young players and who were new to football coaching and working with young players.

As well as gaining some new coaching skills and understanding more about the role of a coach, the course also includes an FA Emergency Aid course and Safeguarding Children in Football workshop allowing our new coaches to put their new skills to good use straight away and during the week lots of activities were offered which gave everyone the chance to develop new skills, confidence and motivation as well as the opportunity to make new friends within the group. They also made lots of new friends at the stadium and enjoyed meeting the first team at their pre-match training session on the pitch ahead of last week's FA Cup tie at Peterborough.

The Prince's Trust also continues to give one to one support to help the participants think about what





Hatters youngsters excel to reach tournament semis

Despite our best efforts the boys lost out narrowly 3-2 in the semi-final to Armenia Bielefeld despite hitting the post and the bar in the last minute things just didn't fall our way.

Once the tears had subsided the boys can look back on the tournament and be extremely proud of what they achieved against some of the biggest clubs in Europe, finishing ahead of the likes of Borussia Dortmund, Juventus and PSV Eindhoven. PRESSURE DROP

Rumour, intrigue and speculative boos from the spectacularly boozed. When you're the manager of a fourth division football club called Luton Town, eventually the pressure's gonna drop on you.

The Sunday after defeat to Newport an unknown journalist on Twitter, with just enough followers to seem credible and a name you couldn't make up, told us that John Still would leave Luton the following day. At least that's what he understood.

Rumours on the internet are usually easy to ignore: At the time of writing for example, neither Keenan nor Kel have actually died, there's rarely really ever a riot at Dartford away and reports of Nathan Tyson's signing for The Town remain greatly exaggerated.

RUMOUR

But sometimes rumours have a flicker of foreboding truth about them. Just enough corroborating circumstance to provoke that involuntary twinge of acceptance. Maybe a little, tepid part of me had wanted it to be true... Could it really be the end of the road for Still?

And so, for I and others who read the rumour, like a bruised and bloody Dr Jones senior staring over the cliff edge at the fireball he believes has taken his son Indiana, we experienced a little preview of that moment of clarity that might come when Our John does eventually leave.

I was absolutely gutted.

I didn't think I would be, to be honest. It's been a bit of a slog following Luton this past year and there hasn't been a whole lot to cheer or to inspire our enduring travelling armies. But reading the words on Twitter and seeing the rumour take hold of the good people of Lutopia last week, there was none of the excitement or throat throbbing relief that my frustrated face at full-time the previous day might have hoped for. Instead, looking back over John's post-match interview from south Wales, it felt as if a bit of the club (and me by extension) might have fallen, prematurely, off.

MISS

Whenever Still does eventually leave, for me at least, there'll be plenty to miss. Because football today is littered, like my Tube journey to work, with enough

throwaway spivs in blazers and hair product and teeth they haven't finished paying for. Clubs are built like Corporations from the dugout down on financial models and scouting networks and big data. Marketing collateral. The brand. Disposable people with barely opposable thumbs.

Customer satisfaction or your Moneyball back.

It hit me that the John Still era at Luton might be the last chance we ever get at giving a betracksuited football manager a bit of time to build something around him – something we were all up for a year ago. It's a nice philosophy for a club to have, but I suppose it's only easy to walk the talk while you're winning.

HOUNDING

In a world moving more and more quickly every day, expectation will only grow the further up the league we go, and sooner or later we'll be just another Championship machine screaming and crying on our own YouTube channel until managers are leaving every three months just in time to start hounding out the next badge-wielding careerist, talking his way up a ladder so shallow it won't remember it was ever climbed.

Sooner or later there'll be no such thing as Managerial Eras anymore. Just a perpetual merry-go-round. And every club will be just like that soul-for-sale Udinese tribute band down in Watford.

Sooner or later that's what we're gonna get, mate.

So what's your hurry? Drop the pressure...

Minnows Whitehawk - who have five former Luton players in their squad - have been dangled the ultimate carrot ahead of their FA Cup second round replay with Dagenham & Redbridge.

Victory for the National League South side would earn a trip to play Everton at Goodison Park and a day in front of the TV cameras.

The prize should make for a tense evening at Victoria Road but that doesn't mean it won't be dramatic. After all, the FA Cup has thrown up some spectacular replays over the years...

Tranmere 4 Southampton 3 Round 5, 2001

Over the course of 18 euphoric months, John Aldridge's giant killers dumped no fewer than nine Premier League sides out of the cups. Yet even by their standards, this was an remarkable night.

Having ground out a dour 0-0 at the Dell, Rovers - then rock bottom of the First Division - went 3-0 down inside 40 minutes.

But cometh the hour, cometh 37-year-old Paul Rideout.

The veteran striker, scorer of Everton's FA Cup final winner in 1995, notched a 22-minute hat-trick then teed up sub Stuart Barlow

to scramble home a late winner as Saints inexplicably collapsed. Tranmere would bow out in the quarters to Liverpool; Southampton boss Glenn Hoddle - who would jump ship for Spurs just a month later - branded his players "a disgrace to the club".

Leyton Orient 8 Droylsden 2 Round 2, 2010

With 15 minutes left at Brisbane Road, Conference North side Droylsden were two goals and a man to the good. Forty-five minutes later, they were two men light and six goals down.

Orient pulled one back in the 77th minute, then equalised with a minute to go. Over the course of the next half hour, hat-tricks for Scott McGleish and Jonathan Tehoue gave the League One side a victory they'd scarcely deserved.

In fact, of 220 minutes over two matches, Droylsden - known as the Bloods - were behind for just 27 of them.

Swansea 2 Havant & Waterlooville 4 Round 2, 2008

Seemingly dead and buried, Conference South side Havant stunned the League 1 leaders with a last-gasp leveller at the Liberty,

taking the tie back to Hampshire. And by the time the replay kicked off, both sides had been dangled the ultimate carrot - a trip to Anfield in round three.

Were the minnows fazed? Not a bit. They battered Roberto Martinez's side, running out comfortable 4-2 winners. The Spaniard - now in charge of Everton - won't fancy Whitehawk much.

Hereford 2 Newcastle 1 Round 3, 1972

You know the goal but did you know it came in a replay? And it wasn't even the winner? The Southern League Bulls had drawn 2-2 at St James Park, taking the lead after just 17 seconds before levelling at the death.

Then came that famous replay, part-time carpenter Ronnie Radford equalising after 85 minutes before setting up Ricky George to net an extra-time winner that history rarely remembers. It was the first time a Non-League side had beaten top-flight opposition for 23 years.

LEAGUE LOOK

It may have been a disappointing weekend for the Hatters, but there was certainly plenty of entertainment around the rest of League 2 a fortnight ago.

With teams in FA Cup action last week, we have to go back 11 days for the last dose of league football, where Matt Taylor's 12-minute hat-trick secured a 3-0 victory for Bristol Rovers over Wycombe, while Paul Mullin's goal ensured Dagenham and Redbridge, playing their second game in four days, made the long trip home from Morecambe empty-handed.

BUMPER

Those two games succeeded a bumper week in the division, with table-toppers Plymouth held to 1-1 draw at Dagenham, allowing Oxford United to leapfrog Argyle to the top of the table. The U's profited from Danny Hylton's winner to go top by goal difference, and the pair have been joined on 40 points by Northampton, the Hatters' opponents this afternoon, who won 2-0 at home to Yeovil.

Fellow-promotion candidates Accrington kept in touch with the early pace-setters courtesy of a 5-1 thrashing of York – who have now conceded 11 goals in

two games – and are five points adrift in fourth but with a game in hand. Portsmouth slipped up with a 2-2 draw at Wycombe, while Carlisle and Mansfield make up the remaining play-off places with 3-1 successes over Crawley and Barnet respectively.

ADRIFT

The bottom three sides have been cut adrift somewhat, as York and Yeovil's defeats kept them in the relegation zone, while Dagenham are just a point clear. Newport are now six points clear of the base thanks to their victory over the Hatters last week moving them up to 21st.

There's a full programme of League 2 fixtures this weekend, with all 24 teams kicking off at 3pm this afternoon.

Oxford host Carlisle while Portsmouth entertain Hartlepool at Fratton Park. York go to Bristol Rovers while Yeovil take on Barnet at Huish Park.
