NOTES FROM THE CARETAKER MANAGER

GOOD AFTERNOON, HAPPY CHRISTMAS AND WELCOME TO KENILWORTH ROAD FOR THIS AFTERNOON'S SKY BET LEAGUE 2 FIXTURE AGAINST WYCOMBE WANDERERS.

A big welcome to our visitors from Adams Park; manager Gareth Ainsworth and his staff and players and the directors and supporters of the Chairboys.

Last week was a difficult one for everyone associated with the Club following John's departure but I was absolutely delighted with the response of those involved in last weekend's dramatic 3-2 victory at Exeter.

POWER COURT

OUR VISION OF A NEW STADIUM FOR LUTON TOWN

On Monday we were delighted to announce that our preferred location for a new stadium, and home for Luton Town Football Club is Power Court.

This announcement follows on from the publication of our Representations to Luton Borough offering our suggested proposals to the emerging Local Plan.

The site, which has been redundant for well over a decade is ideally situated just a stones-throw from Luton's excellent rail, bus and road links – including the Luton/ Dunstable Guided Busway.

The local plan sets out local planning policies and identifies how land is used, determining what will be built where and adopted local plans provide the framework for development across England.

The process of consultation, which took place between the

26th October and 7th December 2015, gave the public and other stakeholders an opportunity to comment on the plan with

regards to the soundness and legal compliance of the proposals and policies in the local plan.

Within that framework, the Club has put forward what it feels to be a convincing case for the local plan to be amended, and that the location of a new football stadium should be at Power Court, rather than at the land south of Stockwood Park adjacent to Junction 10 of the M1 as outlined in the existing draft local plan.

- TOWN HOPE TO BE IN THE NEW STADIUM BY 2020/21

The need for a new home for The Hatters is well documented, and has been a priority for the 2020 group since taking over the Club in 2008. Kenilworth Road has been the Club's for 110 years, after moving to the location from Dunstable Road in 1905.

VISION

Luton Town chief executive Gary Sweet said: "When we became custodians of the Club, we had a clear long term vision of where we wanted to the Club to be by the year 2020. As in so many cases, our business was named after the year of its birth.

"Our strategy was all about stability and steady growth. Initially, we needed to stabilise the Club's financial position, then begin to rebuild the team, supporters' and the public's confidence and faith in us – working towards a stable but ambitious Club that was fully integrated into and that proudly represented its community.

"Everyone at the Club has a great deal of affection for Kenilworth Road. However our need to move to a more suitable location with better facilities and a larger capacity is no secret.

"The provision of a new stadium remains a fundamental part of this vision – and our representations to the Council demonstrate our fervent belief that the site at Power Court offers the best possible solution – not just for Luton Town Football Club, but for the continued regeneration of the Town and the benefit of the wider community.

COMMUNITY

"It's fair to say that we are a club at the heart of the community, with the community at its heart. Currently, around 9,000 Hatters fans visit Kenilworth road on home match days – 95% of the stadium's home capacity. Despite our current position in the fourth tier, our supporters continually demonstrate their passion for the Club. In return, we are able to offer a safe

environment for all supporters from any walk of life to meet their friends and share in the ups and downs of the game as well as the pride we have in our town.

POSITIVE

"Through our Community Trust we deliver many thousands of teaching hours every week to young people throughout Luton, as well as helping to raise tens of thousands of pounds for good causes each year. We work closely with schools and other community groups, and do what we can to help shine a positive light on the Town.

"We strongly believe that by developing a stadium in the centre of Luton, we will be best placed to continue this work and increase the value that we are able to bring to local people.

"As we speak, we have positive discussions with British Land with regards to the site at Power Court as well as with Luton Borough Council in order to adopt proportion owned by the authority. We are grateful for the help we've received so far from the Council, and we're looking forward to working with them, as well as other local organisations such as The University of Bedfordshire, St Mary's Church and The Mall as the project progresses.

"Our intention is to submit a formal planning application for a new stadium prior to the beginning of the 2016/17 season along with plans for other enabling developments at Power Court and facilitating developments on the land owned by the Club at Junction 10 of the M1."

POWER COURT

STADIUM SITE 'WORST-KEPT SECRET' SAYS CHIEF EXECUTIVE

On Monday Town chief executive Gary Sweet explained to members of the media the Club's vision for the future, which included the news that Power Court is the preferred site for a new 17,500-seater stadium.

Sweet said a planning application for the Hatters' new home would be submitted by the start of next season and it is hoped the Town can be in a new stadium at the start of the 2020/21 campaign.

Talking to the media at Kenilworth Road, Sweet said: "Some people have said that this is the worst kept secret in town.

"I would go the other way and say that with the length of time we have been planning this it is incredible more hasn't come out.

"This is our preferred site and the reason for that is that in order for a stadium to be built there it has to be paid for.

PREFERRED

"It is a very difficult piece of land – that means it is expensive. There are a lot of pieces that need to be put in place and that is not done yet.

"But we are now in a position where we can call this our preferred site."

As things stand Luton Borough Council's Local Plan has Power Court chalked up as a site for

a retail development but our proposed changes would see it listed as the site for a new stadium.

Sweet also revealed that plans to develop a stretch of land by M1 junction 10a, recently acquired for £10m, will help fund the move to Power Court without the need for loans.

ENRICH

"This isn't just going to be a football stadium, this will be a new hub in the town centre that will enrich and revitalise the town," said Sweet. "It is badly needed.

"We need things like this to come alive and since we have taken a bold step with this other developers are thinking the same.

"Between two or three developers in town Luton could become a little bit of a special place again and we want to be a part of that."

HOUSING

On the future of Kenilworth Road, Sweet added: "Luton is desperate for housing, that's one of the reasons why we are taking it upon ourselves to put as many apartments as possible on the Power Court site.

"Without me wanting to second guess anything it is likely to have a large chunk of housing.

"We have made a polite request that the site is recognised as to what it used to be."

It gives us a great Christmas pleasure to welcome everyone associated with Wycombe Wanderers to Kenilworth Road this afternoon for some festive football.

The Chairboys arrive in Bedfordshire in touching distance of the Sky 2 League Two Play-Off places, and a strong Christmas period could see the Wanderers scrapping towards the top of this already congested division.

Wycombe marks the first permanent managerial role for Gareth Ainsworth, having previously tasted an illustrious playing career and two separate spells as caretaker manager at Queens Park Rangers.

Ainsworth took over early on in the 2012/13 season after a bad start left the Chairboys with just four points from their opening seven games. The Adams Park outfit have seen an improvement over the subsequent seasons, with Ainsworth leading the side to last season's Play-Off final, earning the League Manager's Association Manager of the Year award in the process.

Wycombe starting this season in scintillating fashion, winning their

first three league matches without even conceding a goal, while also running Championship side Fulham close in the first round of the League Cup. Wins over York, Barnet and Morecambe were followed up by draws with Dagenham and Crawley, but Ainsworth and co returned to winning ways with victory over Hartlepool.

The Chairboys were successful against Plymouth in last season's Play-Off semi-finals, but the same side found revenge in the sides' meeting at Adams Park. A difficult October followed, losing the first four games in all competitions, yet successes over Halifax and a shock against Millwall have led Wycombe to Round Three of the FA Cup, and a tie against Premier League Aston Villa to look forward to.

Despite the cup progression, league form has been patchy over recent weeks, but a win last time out against high-flying Oxford has left the Buckinghamshire side on the cusp of the top seven heading into a hectic spell of games.

Fixtures against the Chairboys have been few and far between over the years, and you have to go back 11 years for the last Hatters victory, when Steve Howard's brace and a goal from Kevin Nicholls put the Town into the next round of the

FA Cup. Since then the two have played each other on four occasions, with two draws at Adams Park while Wycombe have got the better of contests at Kenilworth Road.

Jonathan Smith got an eighth-minute equaliser, coincidentally on Boxing Day last year when the Town made the 40-mile trip, but Elliot Lee's two goals were not enough to stop the Chairboys taking all three points at Kenilworth Road back in March of this year, a game which saw the return of Paul Benson to the Hatters side.

They may be flying high, yet goals have come at a premium for Ainsworth's side, whose 28 goals is the lowest out of anyone in the top 19, but the Blues do possess the fifth meanest defence in League 2. The goals they have notched have been shared around, with nobody boasting more than the six from Garry Thompson and ex-Hatter Michael Harriman.

Central midfielder Marcus began his career as a youngster at QPR before moves to Blackpool and Brentford. He played over 150 times for the Bees and then signed for Colchester and then Wycombe in January.

Welsh youth international Aaron joined Wanderers in 2014 after leaving Newport. Began his career in Cardiff's youth ranks before moving to Bristol City. Capped at Under-19 and 17 level for Wales.

GOZIE UGWU

Former Reading youngster Gozie joined the Chairboys in the summer having impressed on trial. Played at Yeovil last term, finishing the Glovers' top goalscorer. Has also played in Scotland.

From the OAK ROAD

AFTER COMING SO CLOSE TO WINNING PROMOTION LAST SEASON, WHAT IS THE EXPECTATION AT ADAMS PARK THIS SEASON? IS ANOTHER CRACK AT THE TOP THREE POSSIBLE? CHAIRBOYS COMMENTATOR **PHIL CATCHPOLE** ANSWERS OUR QUESTIONS.

THE SEASON AHEAD...

Having been so close to promotion last season what were expectations at Adams Park at the start of the season?

● I think the fans expected more of the same initially, but that was soon tempered by Gareth Ainsworth announcing that 61 points was his target for the season. With the budget at his disposal, it's an understandable target as the club continue to sort out the problems off the pitch. The chairman has a five year plan and this is only year two.

Gareth Ainsworth has enjoyed success at Wycombe so far. What were your initial thoughts about him and how do you rate the job he has done so far?

● Gareth was a hugely popular player at Adams Park and nearly everyone agreed with his appointment. Although the club very nearly got relegated in his first full season in charge, I think he has done a very good job so far. He had to deal with a tremendous amount of problems off the pitch during that awful season, along with learning his trade. Gareth was incredibly

dignified in how he dealt with everything and also was strong enough to admit to his own failings. He changed everything he could after that and despite a tiny budget, gathered the clubs highest ever points total in the league last season.

Having missed out in the Play-Offs last season you are in the mix again this time round with games in hand. Has anything changed from last season?

● The loan market was vital for Wycombe last season, with young loanee Alfie Mawson winning the player of the season award. As the season wears on, the loan market will be vital again. Wycombe had a bit of luck last season with no postponements, coupled with early exits in the cups. This meant the small squad did not have to deal with any fixture congestion. At the time of writing, the Chairboys have already had three games called off and have made it to round three of the FA Cup. The fixture schedule may well have a big say in where Wycombe end up in the league.

Who's the one player to watch this season in the Wycombe ranks?



● A player that will need no introduction to Luton Town fans. Michael Harriman. He has been outstanding so far and is the club's top scorer and is also chipping in with regular assists.

SEASONS PAST...

Tell us about you. Why do you support Wycombe? When did it all start? What was your first game? What do you remember about it?

● I moved to High Wycombe when I was five years old and went to my first game in January 1987. It was a 3-0 victory over Bromley in the Isthmian League at Loakes Park and I remember the famous slope very well.

We're sorry to mention it once more...but last season. Did you ever envisage doing so well?

What were your overriding emotions of the campaign overall once the dust had settled on the Southend game?

● I never dreamt that Wycombe would do so well last season. The campaign before was incredibly depressing (but with a euphoric finale) and to see the club respond and so very nearly achieve promotion was fantastic. A day out at Wembley through the Play-Offs also provided some much needed funds for Wycombe too. It was impossible not to feel proud of the club after the final.

Which is your favourite season following the Chairboys and why?

● 1992/93. Wycombe Wanderers won the non-league double and were simply magnificent. Under Martin O'Neill the Chairboys played some great stuff too and Adams Park was a great place to be.

Wycombe are a now established Football League club. But what do you remember about your non-league days? What was so special about those times?

● I was a bit too young to get to many away games at the time but Wycombe had some great rivalries during those days. Colchester and Slough Town being the two I remember the most. Two successful trips to the old Wembley in the FA Trophy are cherished memories too.

LUTON AND WYCOMBE

What are your best and worst memories of Wycombe v Luton clashes? Do any games in particular stick out?

● Last season at Kenilworth Road was a great game. Under the floodlights and in front of the cameras, it was a great advert for League 2. I also remember a 1-0 defeat at Adams Park during the awful reign of Alan 'Bald Eagle' Smith. Ray Wilkins played for Wycombe that day in what appeared to be a mini dress in the club's colours.

What do you expect from today's game? What's your prediction? Are you looking forward to the lack of leg room in the away end?

● It will be tight but Wycombe are very strong on the road and will nick it by the odd goal in a niggly affair. I'm normally in the press box, commentating for BBC Three Counties Radio, but will be away on holiday following it online.

COVER STORY

Club historian ROGER WASH tells the story of the match behind today's programme cover

LUTON TOWN 3 WYCOMBE WANDERERS 1 11th October 2003

The summer of 2003 goes down as the most bizarre in the long history of Luton Town Football Club and probably deserves several articles all of its own.

New 'owner' John Gurney with his proposed re-brand to London-Luton, a 70,000 seater stadium, a 20,000-space underground car park, a Grand Prix racing track and a telephone vote to pick the new manager made the club a laughing stock as every day went by with something even more ridiculous hitting the headlines.

Gurney was now gone and it was down to those left at the club, which was now in administration, to pick up the pieces. With manager Mike Newell barred from signing players and faced with suspicion from the fans he had a massive task to win everyone around.

A healthy crowd of 6,878 turned up at Kenilworth Road on the opening day not knowing what to expect from the threadbare squad available to Newell. They were though pleasantly surprised when Rushden were overturned 3-1 to be followed up with a 2-1 win at Stockport.

As to be expected with the lack of depth, the team blew hot and cold but by early October were in a top 10 position although the Play-Off positions were always tantalisingly out of reach. Given the predicament at the start of the season this was a far better position to be in than was secretly hoped but football supporters always want more!



For the visit of Tranmere on 6th October the Town were down to 16 fit players, and of those, two were loan signings, three YTS players and one a non-contract employee. To win 3-1 was remarkable given that big target man Steve Howard was likely to be out for two months following a hernia operation, skipper Kevin Nicholls was recovering from a knee operation, defender David Bayliss now out for the season with a ruptured Achilles, Alan Neilson out with a calf injury and Ahmet Brkovic absent on compassionate leave.

Next up at Kenilworth Road were struggling Wycombe, who were one place off the bottom after only one win

all season, which was probably a good job as the Town had two more absentees to report. Defender Kevin Foley was away in international duty while goalkeeper Rob Beckwith was suspended after being dismissed during the 3-0 defeat at Oldham in the Hatter's last away game.

Making his full League debut in goal against the Chairboys was 17-year-old Dean Brill and his big chance almost got off to the worst possible start when, after only 80 seconds, his scuffed clearance fell to Wycombe skipper Michael Simpson who returned to ball first time from 40 yards but fortunately for the Town it rebounded off the bar. Chairboys striker Gavin Holligan then went close after outpacing

Hatters defender Russell Perrett before Adrian Forbes saw a header brilliantly saved by Wycombe goalkeeper Frank Talia.

Loanee Courtney Pitt also brought a smart save from Talia before the half-time whistle sounded with honours even.

Wycombe took the lead against the run of play four minutes after the interval after Pitt and Chairboys Daniel Senda collided in the area with Steve Brown scoring emphatically from the spot.

A double substitution from Newell on 74 minutes inspired a Luton fightback when Enoch Showunmi and Lee Mansell replaced Forbes and Steve Robinson. Sixty seconds after the change a cross from the overlapping Hatters full-back

Sol Davis looked to have been dealt with by Wycombe's Andy Thompson but another loanee, Gary McSheffrey, showed great awareness to block the attempted clearance into the bottom corner of the goal.

There was only likely to be one winner now as the Hatters ran riot with Perrett nodding home Matthew Spring's corner before McSheffrey brought the house down with a 25-yard unstoppable rocket into the top corner in the final minute.

A vindicated Newell said afterwards: "Sometimes you have to change things with substitutions for the sake of it to liven the game up. Fortunately things went for us today and we were helped by getting the break for the first goal."

THE PROGRAMME



The Town produced a colourful 60-page programme for the visit of Wycombe priced at £2.50.

Mike Newell, in his notes, is none too complimentary about the referee at the recent Swindon away game which the Town drew 2-2. The clash saw a dismissal for each side and Newell sent to the stands. "I can't accept complete incompetence and definitely can't accept arrogance," said Newell warning to the task. "It is basically a hobby for officials, and a good opportunity to make a name for themselves."

It was reported that the Town had needed to attend a FA disciplinary hearing due to the club's record over the previous two seasons. Newell's comments presumably were not likely to assist the Hatters' cause!

DEFINING MOMENTS

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN **LEIGH EDWARDS** SELECTS FIVE KEY MATCHES
AND MOMENTS THAT HAVE SHAPED WYCOMBE WANDERERS' POST-WAR ERA

1991 FA TROPHY WINNERS

Martin O'Neill's side beat Kidderminster Harriers 2-1 in the FA Trophy final watched by 34,842 at Wembley Stadium on 11th May 1991. Wycombe went ahead after 18 minutes when Paul Jones fumbled Mark West's low cross and Keith Scott forced the ball home. Kidderminster took a grip of the game in the second half and drew level on 61 minutes as Stewart Hadley's shot squirmed under John Granville. The Chairboys regained the lead four minutes later when Scott's centre was met by a brilliant diving header from West. Harriers pushed forward in the closing stages and Granville foiled Steve Lilwall as Wycombe held out for their first FA Trophy success.

1993 WYCOMBE AT THE DOUBLE

Wycombe Wanderers completed a Conference title and FA Trophy 'double' on 9th May 1993. The Chairboys had secured the Conference title and Football League status with Steve Thompson's goal in a 1-0 victory at Gateshead on 18th April 1993. Martin O'Neill's side faced Runcorn in the FA Trophy final watched by 32,968 at Wembley Stadium. Wycombe took the lead with Jason Cousins' free-kick after just three minutes and doubled their advantage on 21 minutes when Andy Kerr headed in Dave Carroll's cross. Steve Shaughnessy reduced the deficit on 42 minutes but second-half goals by Thompson and Carroll gave Wycombe a 4-1 win.

1994 WEMBLEY WINNERS

Wycombe Wanderers defeated Preston North End 4-2 in the Third Division play-off final watched by 40,109 at Wembley Stadium on 28th May 1994. Martin O'Neill's side missed several early chances and Preston broke the deadlock on the half hour when Ian Bryson scored with an overhead kick. Steve Thompson quickly

equalised but Preston regained the lead through Paul Raynor on 34 minutes. Simon Garner levelled in the 47th minute and Dave Carroll slotted home Garner's pass to give Wycombe the lead on 56 minutes. Glyn Creaser headed against the bar before Carroll sealed their 4-2 win and promotion at the first attempt with a fine goal in the 70th minute.

2009 TAYLOR MADE FOR SUCCESS

Peter Taylor managed Wycombe Wanderers to promotion in 2008/09. He succeeded Paul Lambert in charge during the summer and Wycombe were early pace-setters in League two, unbeaten in their first 18 matches, culminating in a 4-0 demolition of Macclesfield. They lost 3-2 at Aldershot and were displaced at the top after a mid-season run of just two wins in nine games. The Chairboys briefly slipped out of the automatic promotion places but four wins in five matches enabled them to finish in third position, finishing one goal ahead of Bury. Matt Harrold was leading marksman, while left-back Craig Woodman was ever-present 'Player of the Year'.

2011 PROMOTION WINNERS

Wanderers clinched promotion as Scott Donnelly, Ben Strevens and Scott Rendell scored in their 3-1 League Two victory at home to Southend United on 7th May 2011. Gary Waddock's newly-relegated side lost just two of their opening 16 games, including seven draws, then moved up to second place with seven wins in eight matches. The Chairboys briefly slipped out of the automatic promotion places with three successive defeats during February but a ten-match unbeaten end to the season enabled them to finish third and regain League One status at the first attempt. Scott Rendell was leading marksman, while Nikki Bull was ever-present.

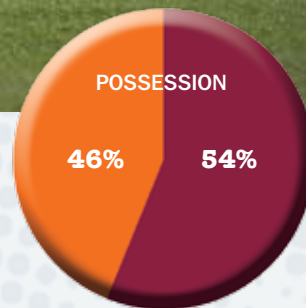
WHAT'S THE STORY?

HAKAN SAID:

“When you go 1-0 up at home you expect to win, when you score three goals at home you expect to win. “I think our second half performance was decent, but we can’t concede the goals we conceded the way we have been and expect to get back in the game. “Our defending wasn’t good enough, we know that, we’ve got to get back to work and try and rectify that. “But the goals we’re conceding are so sloppy. You cannot defend like that and expect to go and win the game. “We’ve given it a go second half but it just wasn’t to be. The players don’t want to go out and make fundamental mistakes.”

WHAT'S THE STORY?

Paul Benson's 100th-minute winner handed the Hatters a dramatic late victory in a thrilling, topsy-turvy encounter in their first game since John Still's departure.

The experienced striker was in the right place at the time in the 10th minute of added time to seal a remarkable win on the road and end a run of four straight defeats.

Goals from Cameron McGeehan – from the penalty spot – and Danny Green had the Hatters 2-0 in front at the break. But hosts Exeter, who had only lost once at home this season before kick-off, pulled a goal back with 20 minutes left through Tom Nichols' free-kick. And Paul Tisdale's side completed the comeback when Alex Nicholls headed home with seven minutes left to play.

The Grecians had dominated the second period in their bid to get back on level terms and looked as though they would go on and condemn the Town to another defeat – but Benson struck at the death to swing the three points into the Hatters' hands.

DEFENDER DELIGHT AT LAST-GASP EXETER TRIUMPH

Scott Cuthbert was full of praise for the Hatters after Paul Benson's 100th-minute winner stole the show and all three points at Exeter last weekend.

A difficult week on and off the pitch has seen the Town slump to three consecutive league defeats, and they were also having to adjust to life without manager John Still.

But a dogged performance proved the clincher as the Hatters sealed the 3-2 victory in the dying moments of the match.

"To win it like that is just unbelievable," said the centre-half. "Scoring in the 100th minute is just a huge credit to the lads – if that doesn't show that we're all together and showing that team spirit we've got, then nothing will.

WORK

"We're a bunch of lads who will work our socks off for everyone. We dug in, we could easily have folded at 2-2, but then we found something that little bit extra."

Despite taking the three points, it wasn't all plain sailing for the Hatters, and the skipper admitted that the side, under caretaker Andy Awford, did ride their luck for periods of the afternoon.

Cuthbert added: "You could tell we were a bit nervous in that first 25 minutes.

"We were defending quite well but we were giving the ball straight back to them.

"Within about five minutes of us actually getting the ball and passing it around, we got the penalty, we got the goal, and then it wasn't long before we got the other one."

The Town had gone two goals to the good thanks to a Cameron

McGeehan penalty, while Danny Green added the second before the interval.

But Tom Nichols' stunning free-kick made it 2-1 before Alex Nicholls levelled with a header to send the following faithful jittery as the game headed into the closing stages.

"We said at half-time that a third goal would kill the game off, but Exeter are a really good side, they'd only been beaten here once before so far this season, so it just shows you how strong they are at home," said Cuthbert.

"We knew they would come out and put us under pressure, but I thought it was bit of a soft free-kick. He's put it in the top corner though, but we didn't let that affect us.

DELIGHTED

"It was a tough game because Exeter are a good passing side and we had to defend really well for large parts of the game, so I'm delighted that we got that winner."

The departure of John Still just two days before the trip to the south west clearly impacted on those in a Hatters shirt, but the 28-year-old Scot felt that the performance on the pitch was deserving of the quality in the Kenilworth Road dressing room.

"It's been such a tough week," he said. "We've said goodbye to the manager that brought us back into the Football League, a fantastic man that brought us all to the



club, and I feel as a team and an individual that we let him down.

"Today we've gone out and given a real performance for Andy, the quality may not have been there for the whole 100 minutes, but the commitment was there, the strikers and midfielders running and chasing everything.

"We showed fantastic character and that's what you need when you don't have all the quality."

The food

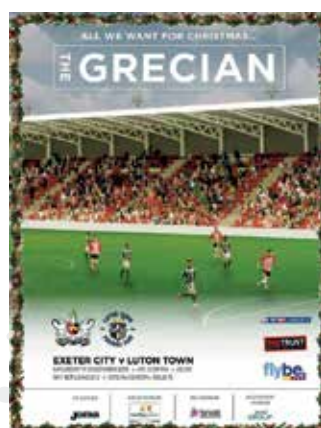
A burger bar just inside the terrace was the food option. Hot dogs, pasties, pies and sausage rolls were the hot food options and then there was the usual confectionary.

The match

To coin a popular cliché this was very much a game of two halves. Andy Awford made three changes for his first game in charge. In came Jake Howells, Scott Cuthbert and Cameron McGeehan and they replaced Scott Griffiths and the injured Luke Wilkinson and Jonathan Smith.

So the new era began in torrential rain and a fairly strong breeze – perfect conditions for football! In stormy conditions we had to

We'd been here before though. 2-0 up against Exeter at half-time. Added to this were that we'd had the conditions and had to go against them in the second half. With players coming back from

injury and the wilderness this wasn't going to be easy.

After McGeehan had a shot blocked and Paul Benson glanced wide, the Alamo got launched at us. Initially we coped with it well but a top draw free-kick into the top corner from the edge of the box got Exeter back in it with 20 to go and the equaliser came with just under 10 to play when a corner was powerfully headed in.

The Town were hanging on. Tyler made a reaction save and nine minutes of injury time was signalled. Half-way through that Josh McQuoid broke through. He slid in Jack Marriott to win it but the keeper saved – and we thought that was it.

But, as time ran out, a Benson flick-on sent Marriott to the by-line. He pulled the ball back and Benson beat the keeper to a back pass to bundle it home and win it for us in the 100th minute! Cue pandemonium on the pitch and in the stands. What a way to win!

HOWELLS' DELIGHT AT 'SECOND DEBUT'

Jake Howells admitted that his return to first-team action felt like a second debut after a long period out of the fold.

The 24-year-old made his first appearance of the season in Town colours, having also played on loan at Yeovil, in the 3-2 victory over Exeter last Saturday.

And despite his time away from the Kenilworth Road starting line-up, Howells feels he can learn from the experiences of recent months as he looks to add to his 318 Hatters appearances to date.

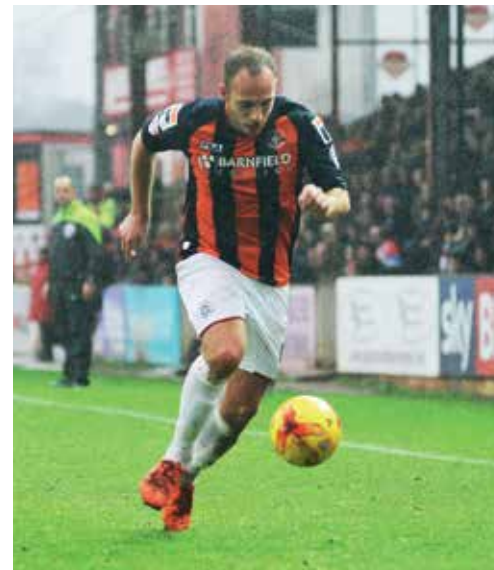
BUZZ

He told Hatters Player: "Even today was a learning curve, it was like another debut for me. It had that feeling, that buzz, and it was nice to be back out there.

"I think everyone knows I've been a Luton boy from day one, so it's a lovely thing to be put back in and be giving 100 per cent. It's hard for me to sit in the stands, not that I can do massive changes, but everyone knows I'll give everything."

Howells is currently the longest-serving player on the Town's books, but was put on the transfer list at his own request over the summer, and has not played for his side since the final game of the 2014/15 campaign.

But Howells, who played at left-back in the Hatters' trip to the south west, is adamant that the change in manager has not been the reason for his return to the starting XI.



"John had been trying to get me back in for a while so it wasn't entirely out of the wilderness," he explained. "Perhaps it was just coincidence that it's come after he's gone because he was doing everything he could to try and get me in.

POTENTIAL

"At the time I thought it was best for me personally to perhaps look elsewhere, and maybe it was the wrong step but it's a learning curve. In football, you've got to learn and I think for me it's a good to see the potential of this club and see what Luton is all about.

"It's nice to be considered in that position, some people have

doubted me there so it's up to me to prove people wrong. When you get put on a pitch for a team like Luton, you've got to give 100 per cent and I always will do that, wherever the manager decides to put me.

"Today I've hopefully changed a few people's opinions, and hopefully I can keep that going."

Having spent large parts of the season on the fringes on the squad, Howells has worked alongside Andy Awford closely, and the player is backing the caretaker boss to make the most of the notoriously difficult Christmas period, following the departure of John Still.

CREDIT

Howells said: "The run we've been on hasn't been great but to get that three points after a tough week was excellent for everyone. It's a credit to John, he deserves the credit more than anyone.

"I've been with Andy a lot already this season, so I know how he works. He's a brilliant coach and hopefully he does well in the time he gets, and we'll go from there.

"It's always tricky over the Christmas period, but everybody really enjoys it – there's never an easy game in this league. We have four tough games, but we've started well."

JANUARY

2015 didn't start in the best way for the Hatters, slipping out of the FA Cup at the hands of Cambridge. Michael Harriman's goal wasn't enough to prevent a 2-1 defeat, with the Abbey Stadium club then playing Manchester United in Round Four.

League form proved more profitable, as the Town took two wins and two draws, including revenge over the U's in a 3-2 victory on the 31st.

The Hatters also beat Plymouth 1-0, while securing honourable draws against Cheltenham and high-flyers Shrewsbury to end January four points off top spot.

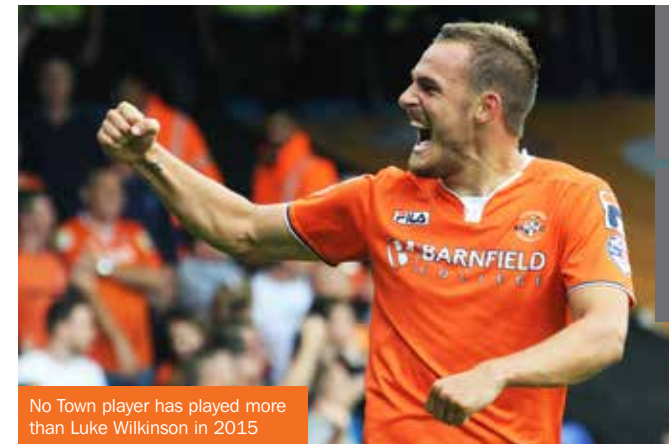

LET'S GO

MAKE THE MOST OF YOUR KENILWORTH ROAD FIX TODAY AS THE HATTERS DON'T PLAY ON HOME SOIL FOR ANOTHER THREE WEEKS WITH TRIPS TO PORTSMOUTH AND BRISTOL ROVERS NEXT UP IN LEAGUE 2

PORTSMOUTH

WHO? Portsmouth, aka Pompey, are the Town's next port of call. Paul Cook, who took over in the summer, has helped Pompey enjoy one of the best seasons in recent years. The side have been flirting with the automatic promotions places since the campaign began in August and remain well-positioned to mount a serious challenge for the top three.

WHERE? With a capacity of 20,700, Fratton Park is the largest stadium in League 2. It's all-seater these days and Town supporters will be, like last season, situated in the Milton End behind the goal. It's a covered stand with a reasonable view of the playing action, but it used to be a terrace so the legroom's a tad stingy.

HOW TO GET THERE?

It's approximately 100 miles from Kenilworth Road to Fratton Park. Take the M1 south, M25 anti-clockwise and A3 south before turning onto the M27 (ignoring the M275 turn off for Portsmouth town centre). Continue on to the A27 and at the junction with the A2030 turn right towards Southsea/Fratton. Continue straight along the A2030

and eventually you will see the ground in front of you, just slightly to your left.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

The Hatters lost the meeting at Kenilworth Road in August and the Town have won just five of their previous 38 visits to Fratton Park, losing the last six including last season's 2-0 defeat. The Hatters' last victory at Portsmouth came courtesy of a 2-0 win in September 1975 with Andy King and Adrian Alston on target before a crowd of 9,835.

BRISTOL ROVERS

WHO? Bristol Rovers, aka the Pirates, will be the Town's first opponents of 2016. Rovers won promotion via the Conference Play-Offs last season to bounce back immediately to the Football League. So far this season, Darrell Clarke's side have picked up form of late and are in striking distance of the top seven.

WHERE? The Pirates still play their home fixtures at the Memorial Stadium, a 12,000-capacity former home of the Bristol rugby club. Opened in 1921, it wasn't until 1996 that Rovers moved

in as tenants. Hatters fans have the option of uncovered terracing beside the pitch or a covered seat behind the goal in a temporary stand.

HOW TO GET THERE?

Luton to Bristol is about 150 miles and a two-and-a-half-hour drive all being well. Take the M1 south, M25 anti-clockwise and M4 westbound and then M5. Exit the M5 at junction 16 (Signposted Filton) and join the A38 (South) towards Bristol City Centre. Continue on the A38, passing the Wellington pub on your right, before turning left into Filton Avenue.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

Like at Portsmouth, the Town teams of the past have rarely returned from Bristol Rovers with much to smile about. The Hatters have never won at the Memorial Stadium, drawing four and losing six. The Town did, however, earn a point that felt like a victory on their last visit in League 1 on Boxing Day 2007. Despite playing with eight men the Hatters drew 1-1. Not since 1980 have the Town won against Bristol Rovers in Bristol (an FA Cup win in 1995 was played at Bath).

Members of the Hatters squad paid their annual visit to the children's ward at the Luton & Dunstable Hospital last week.

Born in Luton on 7th October 1915, Albert recently celebrated his 100th birthday.

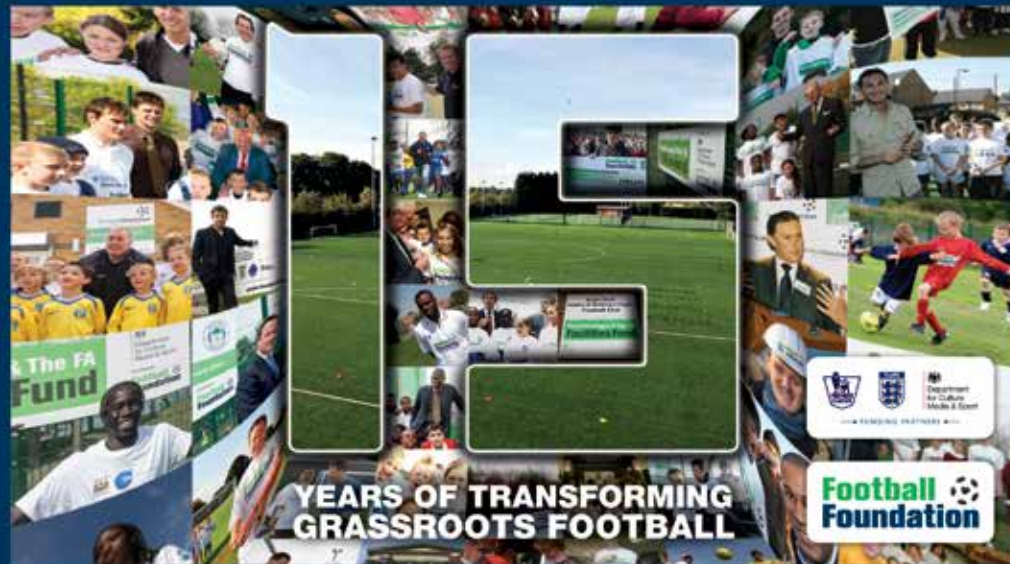
Following nearly 40 years working at the Luton Vauxhall plant, he then began his retirement alongside his loving wife of 67 years, Doris.

ON THIS BOXING DAY

DECEMBER 26

THE RECORD

One, if not the, most regular fixture on the calendar, Boxing Day has been kind to the Town over the years with 33 victories from 71 matches played in Football League and Conference football since 1898.

The Hatters have only lost 19 of the 71 games, scoring 118 goals and conceding 98. That combined is 217 goals which works out at a smidgen over three goals per game.

Of the first 12 matches, the Town only won twice, losing seven. Home victories over QPR, in 1922, and Gillingham, in 1925, were the only successes on Boxing Day for the Hatters between 1898 and 1931.

Between 1936 and 1960, the Hatters hit a purple patch on this day, winning a remarkable 11 of the 13 fixtures - drawing twice and remaining unbeaten. Six defeats out of seven then followed!

Again, between 1972 and 1985 the Town won eight of 11 successive fixtures, again going unbeaten in that sequence. The Hatters recorded six successive Boxing Day wins between 1978 and 1985 - a run ended by a 2-0 home defeat to local rivals Watford in 1986. Bah! Humbug!

It may not be as prolific as earlier sequences, the Hatters go into today's game showing a record of just one defeat in the last 18 encounters on Boxing Day. The sole defeat in that time came in 2006 when the Town were thumped 4-1 at Colchester. The other 17 fixtures

in the run since 1991 have yielded nine wins and eight draws.

MILESTONES

The Hatters have won three of their last four matches on Boxing Day. Last season's 1-1 draw at Wycombe ended a run of three straight wins, which included a 2-1 win at Barnet, a 3-1 home victory over Woking in 2012 and a 5-0 win over Kettering in 2011.

The last time the Hatters lost at home on Boxing Day was a 1-0 reverse at the hands of Sheffield United.

The first Football League fixture involving the Town on this day was a 1-1 draw at Burton Swifts in 1898, with the first victory coming against QPR in 1922, as mentioned above. It wasn't until a 2-0 win at Bournemouth in 1932 that the Hatters registered a first Football League away win.

SIX OF THE BEST... AND WORST

The Town have twice scored six goals on Boxing Day. A 6-1 win over West Ham United at Kenilworth Road was recorded in 1951, in

which Gordon Turner grabbed a hat-trick. Then, in 1958 the Town - now in the top flight - stuck six past Arsenal in a 6-3 victory in front of 21,870 at Kenilworth Road.

In 1927, the Town the Town were 5-1 up at Northampton in Division Three (South) but contrived to blow the lead in a fierce blizzard and lost 6-5. Two years later on the same day the Cobblers beat the Town again, this time only winning 4-1.

DO MENTION

The Town have won all three encounters with both Arsenal and West Ham on Boxing Day. Wins against the Hammers came in 1946, 1951 and 1953, while victories over the Gunners came in 1991, 1959 - at Highbury - and 1958.

DON'T MENTION

Watford. The Town may have a good record on this day as a whole but the Hornets have won three of the four past meetings on Boxing Day between the two clubs. The Town's sole win came in 1979 at Vicarage Road but the Hertfordshire club triumphed in 1924, 1964 and 1986 - all at Kenilworth Road.

It's been another great year for the Trust which has seen further growth in both personnel and a big growth in the number of varied football and non-football projects we deliver to our local community.

As a registered charity we look to represent the Club in the wider community using the power of football to be at the heart of communities. We rely on raising our own funds through both our coaching activities as well as grant funding from the Premier League, Football League, FA and PFA and support from the main Club and our main sponsor easyJet.

Additional partnerships with Active Luton, Luton Adult Learning, The Princes Trust, Luton Airport's Luton Youth Community Fund and StreetGames has enabled us to both expand our existing activities and begin lots of new and exciting projects.

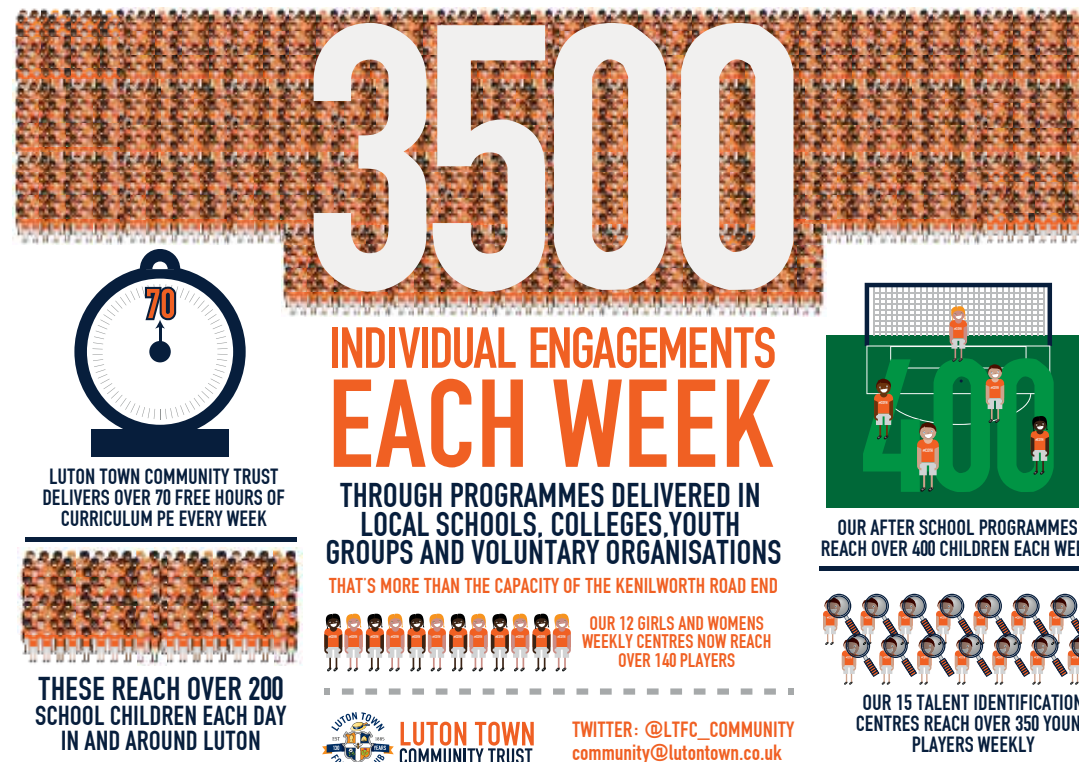
As you can see from our infographic, we now provide over 70 free PE lessons every week to over 2,000 local school children as part of the Premier League School Sport project. Our girls only coaching has really taken off with support from the FA as part of the Female Football Development programme to increase the number of women and girls enjoying football and the link with Luton Town Ladies is working well in providing player pathways.

Our growing involvement in Disability Football has also been hugely rewarding for both staff and participants and as well as our two Men's teams the Hatters and



Boaters we also now coach weekly sessions at both Weatherfield and Woodlands SEN Schools.

We've also increased our football tournaments this year with the Hatters Cup involving 1,200 youngsters playing at Kenilworth Road we also involve hundreds of additional youngsters in the national Kinder+Sport Girls and Kids cup as well as our FFD female tournament. We also have our Integration Cup with Active Luton for boys from Marsh Farm, Farley Hill and Lewsey Farm at the



stadium which forms an important part of our social projects on these estates.

Our airport-funded project has also been hugely successful in establishing youth football teams in Marsh Farm for the first time in years and we are now concentrating on doing the same in Farley Hill – with lots of other parts of Town on our radar. Luton Adult Learning are also helping us to find and train 36 new community coaches to deliver our projects with two courses for both men and women.

2016 will see lots of other exciting projects being delivered by our community staff around school literacy, attendance and behavioural issues and for our more mature community members we are also launching walking football as well as opening up the stadium for a weekly 'social club' where local members of our community can meet and chat.

We look forward to keeping everyone updated and engaged through these pages during 2016 on all of our existing and new projects as we look to both promote Luton Town Football Club to new supporters and also use the power of football to effect and improve the lives of as many members of our community as we can.

YOUTH UPDATE

The Town Under-18s stretched their extraordinary unbeaten run to 22 games when they booked a fourth-round place in the FA Youth Cup despite playing an hour with 10 men.

The young Hatters started much the brighter of the two sides and were almost in front on nine minutes. Kavan Cotter's low cross from the right found Freddie Hinds but the striker's instinctive shot at the near post was well-saved by home goalkeeper Joe Searson-Smithard.

DOMINATING

With the Town dominating it came as no surprise on the quarter-hour mark when the Hatters went in front. Alex Atkinson's defence-splitting pass found the run of Hinds and the forward guided the ball past the on-rushing keeper to roll home his 13th goal of the season.

Hurt by going behind, the hosts tested Hatters keeper Liam Gooch from a set-piece on 19 minutes but less than 60 seconds later it was 2-0 when a superbly-worked goal doubled the Town's lead. Jack Snelus played a one-two with George Murray to surge into the penalty area to unleash an unerring finish into the bottom corner.

However the game turned on 29 minutes when Magpies striker Montel Gibson raced through on goal and was brought down by Frankie Musonda just inside the penalty area. After much deliberation the referee sent-off the



Town skipper and Gibson converted the resultant spot-kick.

Despite their numerical disadvantage that Hatters, to their credit, settled well and Hinds was inches away from making it 3-1 on 36 minutes when just unable to force the ball home.

As half-time approached Snelus sent a firm shot straight at Searson-Smithard and Hinds lofted a shot over the crossbar before Murray's shot flew wide.

ADVANTAGE

However, any fears of an early County fight-back in the second half were snuffed out when the Town restored their two-goal advantage five minutes after the restart. Murray's shot from 15 yards was deflected behind for a corner but from the resultant flag-kick Murray rose at the back-post to nod home with a little help from the crossbar.

With breathing space once more, the Town looked full of confidence going forward – at times looking as though it was them and not Notts who were a man light. A mazy run from Cotter on 55 minutes

accumulated in the midfielder forcing Searson-Smithard into a comfortable save. As the hour-mark passed, County upped the ante and the Town defence needed to be brave to clear from a corner on 63 minutes that fell at Gibson's feet.

The Hatters then spurned a decent chance to make it 4-1 on 67 minutes when Cameron McJannet's left-wing cross meant for Hinds was missed by Murray with the goal at his mercy inside the six-yard box.

As time ticked down the home side ran out of ideas as the Hatters asserted their control even without their captain and Snelus almost capped the evening with a superb strike only to see his rasping 25-yard drive tipped over the crossbar.

But that was the final chance and the final whistle signalled celebrations from the Town knowing they were one game away from a place in the fifth round of the Youth Cup.

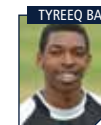

The Town Ladies returned to league action and climbed back into second place in the table following a 3-2 win over Norwich City last weekend.

Illness and injury left the Ladies with a less than fully-fit squad, but a bright opening saw plenty of crisp passing football which was rewarded when Michelle Byrne found Tasha Fensome and she outpaced her marker to neatly roll the ball past the keeper to make it 1-0.

However, the lead was short-lived when some indecisive defending gave the Canaries an opportunity down the flank and when the ball was pulled back across the penalty area it was rifled home in spite of the best efforts of Rachel Evans to keep the shot out.

Luton gambled on the stronger finish and fitness in search of all three points with Fensome's shot

being tipped round the post and Tamera Bayne only being denied by a fine smothering save. The winner appeared to have arrived when Fensome won a race to the ball with the keeper and dinked the ball over her but a covering defender was just able to nip in behind and clear off the line.

At the other end Evans did well to push the ball away from under her crossbar as the game remained in the balance. In the 75th minute the third Hatters goal arrived when a Zara Carroll corner swung in under the crossbar and the keeper under pressure from Samiara Khan could only fumble the ball into the net. Luton never looked in serious trouble after that and managed the game well to pick up all the points and complete the league double over the Canaries.

Manager Nikki Baker said: "We are delighted with the win and the character shown by the players to grind out a win in the circumstances.

"There's usually plenty of goals in our meetings and this was no exception with both sides on the



attack throughout. An especially well fought three points taking into account the changes forced upon us by availability and will hopefully set us up for the second part of the season."

Meanwhile the Development team were also involved in a five-goal thriller but came out the wrong side in a 3-2 defeat against league leaders West Wickham. Tamera Bayne and Phoebe Brown were on target in a thrilling first half but the visitors grabbed a second half winner.

The Under-16s go into the second half of the season unbeaten but it was a close shave when Jodie Bellinger fired a last minute equaliser to add to her earlier strike in a 2-2 draw with title challengers Harvesters.

A WORD FROM The Football League Paper

Unbeatable (well at the time of writing!) Brighton's 2-2 draw at Derby means the Seagulls have not tasted defeat in their first 20 games - a new Championship record.

The Seagulls overtook Neil Warnock's QPR, who didn't lose a game until December 10th in their title-winning campaign of 2010/11.

Of course, football did exist before the division was rebranded in 2004. And while Chris Hughton's men are clearly a doughty lot, they've got a way to go before they can be called the second tier's most invincible side.

Liverpool
28 games - 1893/94

Just two years old when they kicked off against Middlesbrough Ironopolis, Liverpool destroyed all and sundry as they finished the season unbeaten in 28 matches.

In an era when the default formation was six up front and it was practically impossible to stay outside, their Scottish-themed side (two McQueens, McQue, McOwen, McLean, McCartney, McVean and McBride) won all but six of them.

Oddly, though, it still wasn't enough for promotion. In those days, the bottom three sides in the First Division played the top three in the second in a set of promotion 'Test matches'.

Liverpool were drawn away at Man United, where a 2-0 victory took their tally to 29, clinching a place in the top flight and sparking a rivalry that endures to this day.

Reading
33 games - 2006/07

Arguably the greatest side the second tier has ever seen, Steve Coppell's Royals actually began the season with a dismal defeat at home to Plymouth.

It would be six months before they lost again, by which time they had overtaken Liverpool's benchmark and all but sewn up the easiest of titles.

Inspired by the goals of Dave Kitson and unknown £78,000-signing Kevin Doyle, the Royals were actually promoted on March 25 and, six games later, had notched a still-unbeaten Football League record of 106 points.

And who ended the run? Luton Town...

Chelsea
27 games - 1988/89

On September 20th, 1988, Chelsea lay bottom of the Second Division. Six games had yielded no wins and just three points. Manager Bobby Campbell - who'd hung his hat on summer signings Graham Roberts and Peter Nicholas - was feeling the heat.

Then, out of the blue, everything clicked. For the next seven months, the Blues were unstoppable, their only other defeat - a 2-0 reverse at Filbert Street in April - punctuating a title-winning run of 13 straight victories.

Chelsea finished 17 points clear, Kerry Dixon won the golden boot

with 28 goals and, but for that sole defeat, the Blues would have set that mark of 33 games two decades earlier.

West Ham
21 games - 1990/91

Next up for Chris Hughton's boys is the record of Billy Bonds' Hammers - and it's one the Brighton boss should remember well.

Hughton played 32 times as West Ham finished runners-up to Oldham and, alongside fellow veterans Alvin Martin and Tony Gale, formed part of the division's meanest back four.

They conceded just 34 goals as Bonds guided the Hammers back into the first division, though it would prove a short-lived stay as they plummeted straight back down again.

AND WHO CAN FORGET?

Our own 27-match unbeaten run, which ran from September to March in 2013/14 that set the Hatters on their way to the Conference title.

LEAGUE LOOK

Amidst the highs, lows and more highs from last Saturday's trip to Exeter, there was a full programme of League 2 football as the Christmas period got underway with a bang.

Northampton, top before the weekend's fixtures after their win against the Hatters, were dethroned from top spot as Portsmouth prevailed 2-1 at Sixfields, Conor Chaplin netting the winner five minutes from time to put the south coast club within a point of the automatic promotion places.

Plymouth were the benefactors of Northampton's slip up, returning back to the summit after their first win in five saw Hartlepool consigned to their sixth defeat in seven matches thanks to Kelvin Mellor's last-gasp winner.

Oxford make up the last of the automatic promotion places, although they suffered a loss for the first time since 24th October, with the Hatters' opponents today doing the damage, also by two goals to one. That win put Wycombe up to ninth, and with a game in hand, an opportunity to threaten the League 2 Play-Off places is well within their grasp if they have a good start to the New Year.

Carlisle and Bristol Rovers currently occupy two of those final two Play-Offs spots, and they enjoyed comfortable 3-0 victories over Notts County and Dagenham respectively, but the two are separated by Accrington Stanley,

held to a 1-1 draw from their trip to Stevenage. For Carlisle, it was an extra special victory, with the flooding at Brunton Park meaning their home game had to be moved to Preston North End's Deepdale – 85 miles away.

Outside of the top seven, Leyton Orient registered their fourth consecutive 1-1 draw, and had Jobi McAnuff to thank as his stunning strike rescued the point against Yeovil with just 15 minutes left on the clock.

It's all change at the bottom of the league, with York getting just their third win of the campaign, boasting a 2-1 victory over Morecambe having previously gone seven games in a row in defeat.

That win took the Minstermen out of the bottom two at the expense of Dagenham, who slipped to the foot of the table, while Yeovil stretched their winless run to 14 after that 1-1 draw at Orient.

Mid-table Cambridge and Mansfield played out a 1-1 draw as the latter slipped out of the Play-Off places, while AFC Wimbledon were overtaken by the Hatters as they were forced to come from two goals down to secure a draw, courtesy of Lyle Taylor's brace.

The unfortunate side of football hit home earlier this month with John Still losing his job as manager.

It had always been on the cards ever since Hatters' expensively assembled squad failed to get anywhere near top gear this season.

The odd unbeaten run was put together, but never on a consistent enough basis to break into the top seven, which is the very least expected by the Luton Board this season.

With the Hatters' defensive frailties hitting home, the 4-3 home defeat against Northampton proved to be the final straw for a majority of supporters and also the main men behind the scenes too.

UNITING

No-one can ever take away the job that Still did here though, uniting a club that had lost its way in the doldrums of the Conference, leading them to a wonderful title victory.

It might well be that Hatters' fans get to give the popular ex-boss the send off he thoroughly deserves in the new year as who's to say he won't be back in football sooner than expected, with the Dagenham job now available too.

Following from Still's exit, Andy Awford was swiftly appointed as caretaker boss, while that was

followed by the news that Jake Howells returned to the squad after a lengthy hiatus.

The club's longest serving player was not only back in the fray, but back in the starting line-up as well for the trip to Exeter, which summer up Town's season perfectly.

Leading 2-0 with 20 minutes to go, Luton conceded twice in quick succession yet again, before that now customary last-minute goal. Although this time, thankfully, it wasn't Mark Tyler fishing the ball out of the net as Town enjoyed a much-needed victory.

IMPRESSIVE

Then came possibly the biggest news of the as last Monday, when, in an impressive presentation from chief executive Gary Sweet, it was confirmed the club have chosen Power Court as their preferred site for a new ground.

Early sketches are certainly eye-catching, with the 17,500-capacity for now to be commended too



as Sweet admitted he wants the facility to come alive and be full on a regular basis, not just look impressive when empty as other stadia can do.

PLAN
