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

I hope that you have all recovered from your New Year celebrations and welcome you all back to The Memorial Stadium for our first game of 2016.

When we look back over the last twelve months, I am sure we will all agree that it was an exciting time in our club's history.

It took us a while to get used to being a non league team, but Darrell Clarke had urged us all to embrace The Conference and not think that we didn't deserve to be

there and I think we did that.

Our supporters were a credit to the club and were welcomed at almost every ground we played at. Behind the scenes we met some very friendly people, all of whom were doing the best for their club and we were made to feel welcome in every boardroom we visited.

Our main aim, of course, was to return to The Football League and whilst we were disappointed not to have claimed the one automatic promotion place after a race with Barnet for

the title, we were promoted via the play offs after a memorable day at Wembley where we defeated Grimsby Town in a penalty shootout.

The first half of this season has flown by and our squad, led by Darrell and his management team, have adapted well to life back in the league. For a number of the squad, this is the first time they have played at this level, though you wouldn't guess that from their performances.

Whilst some of the results at The Memorial Stadium have

been slightly disappointing, the performances have, by and large, been excellent and wins against Wycombe and York here before Christmas, boosted everyone.

The results we have achieved away from home have been nothing short of outstanding; seven victories achieved with only half of the season gone helped propel us up to seventh place in the league before the busy festive period.

That's all in the past, of course, and now we look ahead to what could be a momentous time in the club's history as later this month we go to the Court of Appeal regarding our ongoing legal dispute with Sainsbury's. The Appeal Court has accepted our arguments about the need for an early decision and have granted us an early date for the hearing and, naturally, we are hoping for a successful outcome though I will not be able to comment further on the matter until a decision has been reached.

On the pitch, I think we can look forward to an exciting second half of the season and, with your support, which has been the one constant in the last 18 months we can continue to build on the progress we have made in the last year.

I am writing this article with 16 games already decided of the 2015/16 season in the Premier League and 20 or 21 games in the bag for the 72 clubs that make up The Football League.

The National League Clubs have already chalked up 24 or 25 games at the time of writing and so it is fair to say we are just around the halfway point in the season.

A study or even a quick look at the league tables give us almost an upside down look and not a lot like the position many of us would have predicted when the season kicked off back in August and even less like when last seasons ups

and downs were settled back in May.

Who would have thought Leicester City on top of the Premier League, having beaten a Chelsea outfit rooted in the lower half with the smallest of margins between the highly financed West London Club and those taking up the relegation places?

It has been thought in the past that those clubs promoted from the Championship are bound to struggle because of the long term established and big investment clubs already there. It was thought that the Premier League was itself made up

of three leagues within it but not so this season with Watford particularly and Bournemouth doing much better than expected.

Who would have thought The Cherries would take all three points off of Chelsea and Manchester United respectively let alone within one week? It is quite bizarre but it's what football is all about; ups and downs and what goes around comes around.

So we are now in the crazy period of the mid season transfer window with clubs taking stock of their positions and working, changing, and spending their way to a more successful outcome than

A Happy New Year to all Gasheads as we welcome Luton Town to The Memorial Stadium for the last of the fixtures that have come thick and fast as usual in this busy Christmas period.

Darrell Clarke's men are in a decent position in the league after a positive first half of the season, and with the second half getting under way, all eyes will be on those top seven places in the table, in a league which is being fiercely contested as it normally is.

With that potential challenge and a host of exciting new releases, gigs and festival bills to come, 2016 is shaping up to be as good as last year!

This afternoon's old song is taken from the number one single from this day in 1982, which was The Human League with 'Don't You Want Me.' Musical Connections

Luton



A brace of musicians in the field of progressive rock can be found with associations to Luton, making the Bedfordshire town an unlikely hotbed for the genre.

John Payne was born in Luton and became a member of Asia when he was given the invitation to become the group's frontman by founding member of Geoff Downes in 1992. During his time in the band, Asia released eight studio albums before he left in 2006.

Clive Bunker was the original drummer in Jethro Tull and with his technique based on his throbbing, gritty, engagement with the essence of blues and

rock & roll, he was given comparisons to Ginger Baker and Mitch Mitchell. Bunker's time in the band lasted until 1971, when he left just after the release of Jethro Tull's most popular album to that date, Aqualung.

Away from the world of progressive rock and into one of the most successful singers of the 1980s. Paul Young was born and raised in Luton and embarked on a solo career in the early 1980s after being part of the band Q-Tips. Young would go onto score three top 5 albums and a number one single for 'Wherever I Lay My Hat' (That's My Home).

There's a good chance that Lee Mansell will, this afternoon, get to play against the side he first joined as an 11 year old.

"Although I was at Kenilworth Road for a long time, I've never played against them since leaving back in 2005."

His Hatters career began after he was spotted playing for a Gloucestershire Primary Schools representative side; "Back in those days you could be affiliated to any club you wanted to and it was the late Stuart White, a Luton scout, who spoke to my parents and invited me up for a trial match.

"I went up, played a match against Arsenal, and from then on I was up there every other weekend playing games. I was taken on as a YT and made my first team debut at 18 before signing a three year pro deal."

That debut came in an FA Cup tie against QPR in January 2001 and although Luton lost 2-1, he had the satisfaction of scoring in the first minute of the game. Truly a debut to remember!

"I ended up winning the Young Player of the Year Award, which was staggering as I was only trying to earn myself a pro deal. The club were relegated at the end of the season following several changes of manager but then Joe Kinnear arrived and he brought in Mick Harford while my youth team manager, Brian Stein, was upgraded to first team coach.

"Following relegation Joe was given a large budget and he brought in a lot of players from higher levels and, as a young player, it was good for me to mix with them and it



proved to be a valuable learning curve.

"We were promoted back to League Two after just one season, but then I found first team opportunities hard to come by as the club continued to bring in more quality players and it was difficult for some of us younger lads to break into the side.

"Then Mike Newell took over from Joe as manager, and I managed to get back into the side and made 24 appearances in 2003/04, but chances were limited again the following season when Luton won the title and were promoted to The Championship.

"I was initially offered a new deal for the 2005/06 season, but that was withdrawn shortly after it had been made and I found myself searching for another club before ending

up at Oxford in the summer of 2005.

"It was a wrench to leave a club I had been at since I was 11 years old. I used to travel up to Luton in the school holidays and I loved it there. It was where I learnt my trade, how to deal with life as a footballer, and where I became a man. Everything I learnt at Luton helped me progress in the game and I have a lot to thank the club for, because they took a big chance on me as a youngster.

"My brother, Rich, was with the club a few years later at the same time as Stuart Sinclair and they say the same thing; it was a brilliant club to be at with so many good people behind the scenes. Kenilworth Road holds so many memories

afternoon it will be a very special day. It's always nice to play against your former club as I know from playing against both Oxford and Torquay, since joining Rovers."

His move to The Mem came after eight years at Plainmoor; "I can honestly say that I've loved every minute of my time here and I think that will continue to be the case for as long as I'm here. This is a brilliant place to come and play football and it's very special to play in front of 7,000 fans every other week."

He will always be remembered as the player whose penalty took us back into the Football League; "That was highlight of my career to date and it was such a special moment. I think what we actually achieved that afternoon only really sunk in a few weeks later. To be promoted at the first time of asking, under immense pressure, was truly magnificent."

FALLING FROM THE TOP

I'd like to warmly welcome Luton Town to the Mem this New Year.

They're a club I've always quite liked. Our two clubs have shared some similarities in recent years.

We both know the crushing pain of getting relegated out of the Football League.

We both know the joy and relief of bouncing back. And we both know what it's like to be in the lower leagues while your biggest rival (in Luton's case Watford) are in a higher division. We've also both, unfortunately, been managed by Paul Buckle.

We weren't always on the same level as Luton however. When I was a football obsessed kid in the eighties, Luton were in the old First Division, only just missing out on a place in the first ever Premier League.

It seems hard to believe now but they finished 7th in 1987. Their big fall came between 2007 and 2009 when they tumbled consecutively from the Championship into the Conference due to financial problems. I cannot imagine what that's like. After five years in the Conference, they came back up the season before we did, winning that title by an impressive 19 points!

Nowadays, we're used to sugar daddy owners buying success for clubs who were once in the lower leagues, or even non league. But it can be interesting to recall those clubs who were once big successes in the top division but who we now forget were ever there.

That 1987 FA Cup win must have felt a million years ago. Recently, I was nostalgically looking through my old Panini albums from the eighties and was surprised to find Oxford United in there as a First Division club!

They'd spent three seasons there and I'd just not remembered. Clubs like Oldham and even Swindon have been in the Premier League, but it's easy to forget that.

Before their 2001 relegation, Coventry City had been in the top flight for 34 consecutive seasons, which is rather impressive.

While we might say a football fan doesn't know true heartbreak until they've been relegated out of the league, it cannot have been easy for Coventry fans in recent years, especially when they had to play all their home games at Northampton.

Who knows what the future holds for Rovers, or indeed any club? I'd love to have a sneak peek at the football tables in 10 years' time.

What league a club is in, and their position in that league, is all often to do with how much money is being thrown into it.

I blame the Premier League for destroying a lot of what made football so accessible and exciting. Every now and then, the unexpected occurs – for example, the current reversal in expectations of Chelsea and Leicester.

But we can often tell how a season is going to pan out just by looking at how rich or poor a club is. For every club buying their way up the leagues, there's another getting into financial problems, often by trying to do the same.

In praise of Matty Taylor

Happy New Year to you all, Pirates and Hatters alike.

As I was writing this well before Christmas, owing to print deadlines, these words may seem a little dated by the time you read them, along with my predictions that Lady C will get on with just about everyone in the jungle and Jose Mourinho will be Manager Of The Year.

However, I am pretty sure that it will remain valid when I say that the form and goalscoring achievements of Matty Taylor are nothing short of a revelation. I admit that I had not heard of him when Darrell Clarke signed him from Forest Green Rovers in that apprehensive summer of 2014, when we were all still licking our wounds after being dumped out of the Football League. On his debut alongside Ryan Brunt in our Conference opener against Grimsby Town, Taylor missed a one against one chance which would have won the game.

Rovers' appalling start to the campaign was not conducive to bloodling a new striker, and it took Taylor until the tenth match, a 3-1 win over a hapless Nuneaton side, to make his mark.

With constant clamouring for a new striker, and despite the confidence shown in him by his manager, many Gasheads remained unconvinced that Taylor would have sufficient guile and weaponry to fire Rovers back into the League. Even

by the end of November, apart from two penalties his only addition to that strike against Nuneaton was a superbly taken goal against leaders Barnet, and at that stage few would have predicted how the rest of the season would unfold. One turning point may have come at Plainmoor on Boxing Day, when he delighted the huge travelling support by hammering home a long range strike to set Rovers up for a 2-1 win. Further goals followed in the next two matches, and he was now well on the way to that stunning run of success at the Mem, as including the playoff semi final against Forest Green, he scored in the last seven home games.

In addition, who is to know how differently that play off clash would have turned out had Taylor not scored that supremely clever opening goal at the New Lawn early in the first leg. He clearly enjoyed putting one over on his old employers, who had given him few opportunities in his final months at the club, and the villagers who had jeered him on his return were made to choke on their veggie burgers. Taylor was also one of the five penalty takers who fired Rovers to promotion at Wembley, and he could now look forward to his first ever match as a Football League player, long after being discarded as inadequate by his hometown club Oxford United.

How would he adjust to the step up, particularly

if it took him as long as it did to get going in the Conference? Surely, he would now be a squad player, limited mainly to substitute appearances. Again there was an inauspicious start, as Rovers were edged to defeat by Northampton in the opening game, but a goal in the next home match against old foes Barnet saw him open his account before August was out.

With Rovers struggling at the Mem, there were more demands for a new striker, but then something quite phenomenal happened. Near the end of September at Hartlepool, following a run of three home defeats in a row, Taylor - the Mem specialist in his first season - started terrorising defences on the road.

He opened the scoring in that morale boosting 3-0 win at Victoria Park and netted another the following Saturday in a 4-3 triumph at Morecambe. Further goals followed at Mansfield (a glorious headed winner in the eighth minute of stoppage time), Cambridge (another late game decider) and a consolation penalty at Crawley. It must be ages since a Rovers player scored in five consecutive away League matches,

and what was even more impressive is that when defences tire Taylor comes into his own. He possesses fantastic stamina and a never say die attitude

which ensures he keeps going to the last whistle. So even when he doesn't hit the net, and we all know that even the best strikers have fallow periods, Taylor does not hide: he is still attempting those difficult passes and clever flicks which may create space for a colleague, and he is still gunning for goals.

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
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DEEP HEAT

When I was in my teens, I was an armchair fan of Tottenham Hotspur; this was before and during my introduction to Rovers courtesy of my Dad.

Why Spurs? Well, it had seemed the natural progress after becoming huge fans of both Gary Lineker and Paul Gascoigne during the 1990 World Cup in Italy, my gateway to becoming a football fan. Before that summer, football was something I just tolerated.

When Teddy Sheringham joined Spurs in 1992, it was to the great annoyance of my brother Ed, whose team was Nottingham Forest. Neither of us had been taken to Twerton Park yet so our loyalties to 'our' teams was fierce. So posters of Sheringham wearing Forest's red were taken down in one bedroom and, along the landing in my room, posters of him in Spurs' white went up. During the years that followed, whilst my peers were obsessing over Take That, the objects of my affection were Spurs' stars, such as Sheringham, Jurgen Klinsmann, Darren Anderton and Ian Walker. By now I was a fully fledged Gashead, watching Rovers lose at Wembley in 1995 and move back to Bristol the following year and was immersed in watching my local side. But my affection for Tottenham did not wane.

Nowadays, my interest

in Tottenham is barely a passing interest, but for those years one player in particular became my all time hero, and that was Sheringham. I made scrapbooks of his career, with newspaper clippings and cuttings from Match magazine. His late involvement in international football - he was 27 when he made his England debut - was a great excitement for me, especially in the heyday of the 'SAS', his strike partnership with Alan Shearer. Pundits infuriated me at the time when they bemoaned his lack of pace, when his ability to find space and provide key passes at crucial moments were the best areas of his game. Plenty of strikers have pace but did not have his brain.

Anyway, I digress. Over the years I have watched many a former England player see out the days of their career at a lower league side. I remember Gazza's appearance for Everton against Rovers at Goodison Park in the League Cup in 2000. I got Chris Waddle's autograph leaning over the hoardings at the Mem when he played for Burnley. And some years later, when Rovers played Leicester City, I leant over the tunnel again and called over to their goalkeeper, Ian Walker, who was at the end of his career then. He kindly posed for a photo.

But a few weeks back I met my all time favourite, Sheringham - I had my eye on our fixture with

Stevenage since news of him becoming their manager broke and decided it would be a game I'd have to get to - more so since he announced he'd be registering himself as a player at the age of 49. I'd never seen him play as he was an unused sub in the England v Spain fixture I saw at Villa Park in 2001.

He wasn't going to be playing when Rovers went up against Stevenage a few weeks back but I was

thrilled to spot my teen idol walking his side out at the Mem. And although it was a sorry night for Rovers, as we lost 2-1, I stole my chance to meet Sheringham as he walked down the tunnel behind his players after their victory. I called over to him and asked for a photo. He looked up and for one brief second, I waited for his response with bated breath. Could I imagine if he'd ignored me or said no? My teenage years would have been wasted on being his biggest fan! But no, thankfully he broke from his reverie to come over and have his photo taken with me. My husband took it as I am not one for selfies. (Selfies and selfie sticks: what IS that all about? I wonder if future

generations will baulk at how crazily narcissistic our generation became, needing a STICK to take snapshots of themselves. Anyway, that's a rant for another day!)

In my teenage years, I'd written to many a player and have a treasured stash of autographed photos in my attic - one from Sheringham addressed with my name on it and 'best wishes' (which probably made my year, not just my day, back then!) amongst them. But having a photo of him, which I immediately WhatsApped to a few people, was thrilling. It was only a moment from his busy evening, but a moment that meant the world to me. He was charming as I had hoped he'd be and I am certainly going to have a soft spot for Stevenage this season.

I can honestly say it's the happiest I've ever been after a Rovers defeat!

When he looks back at 2015, defender Tom Lockyer is spoilt for choice when it comes to selecting the highlight of quite an extraordinary 12 months in his career.

In no particular order he turned 21, played at Wembley, was promoted with Rovers, passed the 100 league game mark for the club and made his Welsh U-21 debut along the way.

"It has to be playing at Wembley and winning promotion," he says when asked. I consider playing at Wembley to be a lifetime achievement. Some players never get to play there at all in their careers, so that was a personal highlight of the year.

"Winning promotion back to the Football League runs playing at the stadium a close second. It was particularly sweet, because I was in the side that went down to The Conference. Relegation hurt a lot, so it was nice to be able to play my part in putting things right."

The first half of this season has gone well, with Rovers adapting well to life back in the league.

"The aim was always to push on after last season's success and I think we have done that. We have an excellent team spirit in the squad and I believe that shows out on the pitch."

"Mind you, I do believe that the top seven or eight sides in The Conference could do well in League Two. There is a difference in standards, but the top clubs could comfortably cope with life at this level."

The first half of the campaign might well have been better

had it not been for some poor results at The Memorial Stadium; "I've no idea why we struggled at home early on. However we did win our last two home games before Christmas so I hope that was a turning point. Still, our results away from home have been pretty good and hopefully that will continue."

Support for Darrell Clarke's side this season has been outstanding; "It's been great, both home and away. The number of fans travelling to away games is unbelievable and it's good that we have been able to reward them with some good results. To hear them get behind us at every game is so encouraging when we are out on the pitch."

Like all members of the squad, he has had to get used to the manager treating each game as a different project and to the changes made in starting

lineups and the tactical switches made during matches.

"The gaffer has said he will mix and change things and to go and see him if we aren't happy with things, but as a player I don't think you can complain if, for example, you aren't in the side. There's only one thing to do and that's work hard to get in there."

"As far as different systems are concerned, we are all comfortable with either a three or a four at the back, so whatever the manager decides to do we can adapt. At Crawley, we even went with a back two!"

On to the matter of representing his country, he is clearly very proud to have

"These are good times to be Welsh and even more so to be a Welsh footballer and the whole country is buzzing with the draw for the group stages of the European Championships this year and I can't wait for us to beat England!"

At the age of 21 he had appeared in 123 first team games for Rovers, in all competitions, going into the Christmas games; "That total has just crept up on me. I don't really set myself targets and I just keep playing and try to do well and stay in the team. By doing that the appearances soon begin to mount up and it also helps if it's possible to stay free of injury."

"As for the rest of the season, hopefully we can kick on and make a charge for the upper reaches of the league. I believe we have a squad capable of doing it and see no reason why we can't do that."



READ ALL ABOUT IT!

EARLY BRISTOL FOOTBALL (PART ONE)

Association Football was a late starter in Bristol; it was not until Tuesday, 5th December 1882, that we find any reference to any local activity of the game in the pages of the Bristol Mercury, Bristol Times & Mirror, or the Western Daily Press.

On this day the latter journal reported on the encounter between St George and Warmley three days earlier, commenting that: 'These clubs met on Saturday on the ground of the former. Considerable interest was taken in the game, as the rules adopted were 'association', which, although the popular game of the Midlands North, has never found much favour in this neighbourhood, where rugby union has so firm a hold.'

The experiment was quite successful, and

the promoters of the 'dribbling game' are to be congratulated on their maiden attempt, and there is no doubt that in a few seasons Bristol may possess an 'association eleven' which will uphold their game as successfully as the rugby union teams have in the past.

Warmley won the toss and selected to play down the hill, but, owing to the strong defence of the home team's half backs and backs, were never dangerous, and only the good goalkeeping of J.A. Tayler prevented St George from scoring on several occasions. Up to half time no score was made, but on the change of ends the home team completely panned their visitors and the ball was twice forced through their goal.'

Both of these pioneers of the association game in Bristol were formed in 1882, but even so they were only following in the footsteps of various clubs not too far distant, such as Wotton under Edge, Street, and Paulton Rovers.

However, it wasn't long before other teams sprung up in Bristol, as the following season saw the birth of Bristol Rovers, who burst on the scene as the Black Arabs, and the Clifton Association club.

To many, the Clifton were the aristocrats of the local game, numbering among

their ranks Oxbridge men, such as Charles Wreford-Brown, who became Bristol's first international in 1889 on turning out for England v. Ireland when he was playing for Oxford University in term time, and his home club Clifton during vacations. Further caps were gained v. Wales in 1894 and 1895, and against Scotland in 1898.

On this latter occasion, he was a member of the FA Selection Committee, and had to be prevailed upon by his colleagues to captain the side that beat the Scots 3-1 in Glasgow on 2nd April.

He also played for the Corinthians, and the Old Carthusians, winning the FA Amateur Cup with the latter in 1894 and 1897, as well as turning out in County matches for both Gloucestershire, and London representative sides.

Unfortunately, the influence of the winners of the very first Gloucestershire Senior Cup in 1887/88, was to wane following the start of the very first local league competition in 1892, and the advent of professionalism, which was adopted by Bristol City in 1897. Not long after suffering a 9-1 FA Cup defeat by City at St John's Lane, the wearers of the 'chocolate and cardinal' disbanded in December 1897.

Whilst the early roots of the association game in Bristol were in the east of the city, it wasn't long before clubs sprouted up south of the river, much interest being kindled due to the first local Representative match taking place in front of a 600 crowd on the Bedminster Cricket ground on 7th April 1885, when Gloucestershire beat Somerset 1-0.

The following season saw further fixtures being fulfilled, including 10-1 drubbing by Aston Villa at Perry Barr, before the official formation of the Gloucestershire F.A. on 7th September 1886. However, it was the start of the Gloucestershire Senior Cup in 1887 that saw the association game

really take off in Bristol, with many more clubs being formed, including Southville, who would become Bedminster on

joining with the cricket club two years later, and Globe, who became QEH Old Boys in 1888.

The adjoining page details some of the earliest rugby and association results in the local press.

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The Ones who didn't score ten

Undeniably Bristol Rovers supporters look away with horror whenever the question arises as to which individual scored the most goals in a Football League match.

As any good student of the game can recall the answer is Joe Payne (1914-75), whose name has been given to a lounge at Kenilworth Road. It was Easter Monday 1936 and Rovers took to the field away to an injury ridden Luton Town team. The sides had drawn 2-2 at Eastville just three days earlier and Payne was playing in his first League match for eight months. With no fit forward to take the centre forward berth, he scored a first half hat trick, before a crowd of 14,296, and went on to claim ten goals in a 12-0 demolition which remains to this day Rovers' heaviest ever defeat.

In scoring his final nine goals in 46 minutes, Payne eclipsed Tranmere Rovers' Bunny Bell's feat of nine goals in a match. He opened the scoring with a low shot after 23 minutes and added two close range shots in the run up to half time. After the interval, the centre forward could do no wrong and, by the 86th minute, had increased his impressive goal tally to three headers

and seven shots. He scored an astounding 83 goals in 72 League encounters with Luton before later winning one England cap in 1937 (and characteristically scoring twice that day against Finland) in a war stunted professional career.

All this, embarrassing though it may well be for Gasheads like us, is all well and good. But who scored the other two goals that day? Has history totally forgotten them both? Shortly after Payne's 23rd minute opener, Fred Roberts scored the Hatter's second of the day; a minute from time, inside right George Martin, who had initially been falsely credited with the sixth goal, added the twelfth. Who were Roberts and Martin and how did their lives intertwine with the Bristol Rovers story?

Luton born in August 1909, Frederick Charles Roberts was a forward who had initially made his name at Birmingham; joining the Blues in 1933, he had top scored at St Andrew's in 1933/34, albeit with only eight goals for a struggling side. After 29 League matches and nine goals, he arrived at Kenilworth Road in December 1934 and was with Luton for a decade. During that time, he managed 38 goals in 180 League appearances,

Joe Payne's ten goal feat was acknowledged on this plaque on the Miners Arms, Brimington, the village in which he was born

scoring once against Rovers as Luton ran up a 6-2 home victory in January 1935.

Roberts appeared five times against Rovers in all, scoring twice, helping Luton run away with the Third Division (South) title in 1936/37; they did, however, lose 4-0 that campaign at Eastville. Division Two football saw Roberts score a brace against each of Norwich, Barnsley, Southampton and Plymouth and, after wartime football with Luton and Watford, he spent three years at Kettering Town to 1948. Fred Roberts died in Luton in January 1979, aged 69.

Scottish forward George Seatt Martin was born in Bathgate in July 1899 and, from Hamilton and Hull (204 League games and 55 goals, including a hat trick against Preston in April 1927), joined Everton in time to secure a First Division championship medal in 1927/28. In five years, he managed to play in a side relegated, re promoted

and once again crowned national champions before, after 31 goals in 85 League games for the Toffees and six matches with Middlesbrough, furthering his career from 1933 at Luton.

A noted singer with a fine tenor voice, Martin totalled 27 goals in 98 League matches at Kenilworth Road to take his career total past 100 League strikes, this tally including five games and two goals against Rovers. He scored in the 2-2 draw at Eastville on Good Friday 1936 and his last-minute goal in the 12-0 win proved the final one of his Football League career. He made just three appearances in the title winning 1936/37 season, when the inimitable Payne racked up 55 League goals, but had also played in the Everton side for which Dixie Dean scored 60 times in 1927/28. He became a coach at Luton and manager from December 1944, manager at Newcastle United who signed Jackie Milburn, Aston Villa and Luton again, before retiring in 1966.

George Martin died in Luton in the autumn of 1972, aged 73.





2015 - Been and gone

For football fans like some of us, a calendar year can perhaps be hard to review.

We view the season from August to May as more important. However, 31st December is always an opportunity to look back and for us perhaps you'd say, 'remember where we've come from'.

We were looking good as the New Year began. A win at Torquay (Boxing Day) and then a 4-0 win at home to Macclesfield had rounded off 2014 well. On New Years Day, we had the return game with Torquay, a favourite Conference trick, where you generally get matched with someone near you twice at holiday time, to play each other home and away. In the end, we scraped a 2-2 draw but kept a useful unbeaten run rolling.

One of my enduring memories of the early part of the year, will always be the scenes at Woking. As a youngster, I

remember games at Elm Park, Reading, with no all ticket restrictions. Many of us woke up on the day and decided to go, no forward planning.

That's exactly what happened in January, as we dominated two sides of the ground with our loyal band of away supporters. Sadly, some were locked out. We could have had three sides of the ground to watch the steady 0-0 draw.

The recently formed 'Chepstow, Forest Of Dean and Monmouthshire Gas', took a posse on a much more successful trip to Gateshead. They even flew up. This was another odd shaped ground for the connoisseur, but the 1-0 win, courtesy of an Ellis Harrison strike, placed another vital cog in the Conference escape plan wheel.

On a personal note, I spent the latter part of March and early April in Fukuoka, Japan. Running round Japanese hotel corridors in the early hours trying to

get WIFI for Gas games and praying for Barnet slip ups was an unexpected set of events. I was home in time for the 7-0 destruction of Alfreton but the record shows that we just missed out on the title. Still, I was confident as we marched on Forest Green in the play offs.

Marching on Forest Green was fraught with hazard. Our contingent at the August League fixture was far too noisy, so the well known home Chairman halved our ticket allocation. I still got one myself though and recall parking my car in the middle of nowhere. What a strange place to try and plant a Football League Club! Over the two legs though we made it to Wembley, 3-0 on aggregate.

The Wembley date didn't really go according to plan at first. Grimsby Town, our opposition on the day, took an early lead. Ellis Harrison clawed us back in with an equaliser before half time and we took the game to penalties. Five

heroes smashed home our penalties and one miss from Grimsby meant that we went home to the Football League at the first attempt. The footage of Lee Mansell's penalty will be watched again and again on New Year's Eve, by many fans, along with Darrell Clarke's sprint across the Wembley turf.

And what about our Football League return? Well, up until recently, most fans would only have wanted to talk about the away games. However, on Tuesday 1st December, Matty Taylor proved that you should never compile your Top five memories of the year until it's over.

Our poor home form seemed to fade away as Matty hit three second half goals in just 11 minutes. As this was a rearranged game, he got lots of unlikely national media recognition and has even been likened to Jamie Vardy.


Let's hope he stays with us and powers us up again.

John Taylor

There were a few eyebrows raised in March 1992, when crowd favourite Devon White was allowed to leave Rovers in a part exchange deal involving Cambridge United striker John Taylor.

But the newcomer soon put everyone's minds at rest, going on to score 44 goals in just over 100 appearances. "I managed to find the net early on in my time with Rovers, which is always a big help," pointed out John, when I tracked him down at his home in Felixstowe.

Originally working as a shipping clerk, John's early dreams of making it as a footballer were dashed, when his local club, Colchester United, released him in 1983, having made just one substitute appearance – a decision they've no doubt regretted ever since. He was subsequently spotted playing for Ryman League side Sudbury United by Cambridge United, who promptly splashed out £1,000 to sign him on, kick starting a career that would see him play a total of 627 games and score 172 goals from his time with seven different Football League clubs. His first spell at Cambridge – he later returned to play and manage them – saw him consistently find the back of the net, many coming in an explosive partnership with Dion Dublin.



In March 1992, John arrived at Twerton Park, swapping places with Devon White, Cambridge also paying out £100,000 as part of the deal. Practically an ever present over the following two seasons, he would show a very healthy return of 44 goals from his 107 appearances. "I was living near Keynsham, got on really well with the fans and thought the club had some excellent players, such as Brian Parkin, Gary Waddock, Andy Tillson and Marcus Stewart. Marcus was a fantastic finisher – though I think he got even better after I left!"

Sadly for Rovers fans, John did leave – in the summer of 1994. "I had a contractual dispute with Rovers, so when Bradford City offered them £300,000 I was on my way," revealed John. Ironically, the manager who signed him for the Yorkshire outfit was Lennie Lawrence. John's spell at Valley Parade began well and he netted 13 goals for the side, before





today's visitors, Luton Town, forked out £200,000 to sign him. But the move never really worked out. "I was carrying a back injury which didn't help," pointed out John, whose return of just four goals from 40 appearances was nothing like his previously prolific goalscoring record.

Loan spells at Lincoln and original club Colchester followed, before Cambridge won the race for his signature to bring him 'home.' John was to enjoy seven more years with 'the Us,' taking his place in their Hall of Fame with a grand total of 409 appearances and 103 goals.

"After taking on the reserve team manager's position, John was given the job of first team boss in January 1992, a post he held until March 2004. "Looking back, the opportunity probably came too early in my career,"



Gary Waddock: Eight goals in 203 league games for QPR preceded his time with Rovers for whom he scored once in 71 league games. The Republic of Ireland international appeared in 153 league games for The Hatters, scoring three goals.

Richard Dryden: Began his career with Rovers, for whom he made 13 league appearances. Later in his career played 37 league games for Bristol City and appeared in 22 league games for this afternoon's visitors.



The Management

John Still, the former Rovers' assistant manager who combines the distinction of having led three teams into the Football League with an enviable reputation for identifying talent in non league football, was relieved of his duties at Kenilworth Road eight days before Christmas.

As the Hatters invited applications for the job, Academy and Development Manager **Andy Awford** became caretaker boss ahead of the pre Christmas trip to Exeter.

Awford was previously manager of Portsmouth, for whom he played over 370 games over 11 years and where he had twice acted as caretaker boss.

In his second stint in charge on a temporary basis, which began in March 2014, he won his first five games in charge to save Pompey from relegation from the League and was April's Sky Bet League Two 'Manager of the Month'. His 11 month stint in permanent charge began in May 2014.

Awford was League Two's 'Manager of the Month' again in February last year after 14 points and four clean sheets in six games without defeat.

Today we welcome -

Two goals from **Paul Benson** against Northampton last month were not enough to save the Hatters from a fourth consecutive defeat or to prevent **John Still** losing his job.

Still first signed **Benson** for Dagenham & Redbridge in the summer of 2005. His 28 goals in 2006/07 made him the club's and the Conference National's top marksman. Subsequent moves took the former England 'C' cap to Charlton and Swindon with loan stints at Portsmouth and Cheltenham. He spent the 2013/14 campaign on loan at Luton before switching permanently ahead of the following season.




The Hatters' third goal against the Cobblers came from the penalty spot thanks to **Danny Green**, a summer signing from MK Dons. The former Bishop's Stortford midfielder spent three seasons with Charlton before joining MK Dons at the start of the 2014/15 campaign after five games on loan for them in 2013.

Another ex Dagger, England 'C' international **Craig Mackail-Smith**, has also represented Scotland at full international level thanks to his Edinburgh born grandmother. His




38 goals for the Daggers led to a move to Peterborough early in 2007 which resulted in 99 goals and three promotions. **Mackail-Smith** became a Hatter last August after four years at Brighton during which he played a further three games for the Posh on loan towards the end of 2014.

Summer signing **Jack Marriott** found the net for the eighth time this term in November's 4-3 home defeat by Carlisle. Now 21, he joined Ipswich at the age of 15 and made one start and two substitute appearances for the Tractor Boys. He has turned out on





February signing **Ryan Hall**, a former Crystal Palace youngster, spent two months on loan with Dagenham & Redbridge early in 2008 before spending a further month on loan at Crawley. Hall has since played for Bromley, Southend, Leeds United, initially on loan, Sheffield United, also on loan, MK Dons and Rotherham. Last season he turned out six times on loan for Notts County.

Alex Lawless has represented Wales at U-21 level and as a semi professional. Whilst with York in 2010 he spent two months on loan at Kenilworth Road before the switch became permanent. A former Fulham trainee, he spent the 2005/06 season with Torquay followed by three years at Forest Green.

Oliver Lee, on loan from Birmingham, scored in the Hatters' 4-1 win at Hartlepool in October. The 24 year old ex West Ham trainee played on loan for Dagenham & Redbridge and Gillingham before spending the 2012/13 campaign with Barnet. Initially loaned to Birmingham in March 2013, he switched to St Andrews on a permanent basis two months later. He played 15 games during a loan spell at Plymouth, netting twice.



Midfielder **Jake Howells** returned to the squad for the pre Christmas visit to Exeter looking to feature in his first game of the season for the Hatters. The England 'C' and former Wales U-21 cap, who has spent a month on loan at Yeovil, was transfer listed at his own request in the summer.

Winger **Paddy McCourt** was once described by Scotland manager Gordon Strachan as one of the most gifted footballers he had ever seen. The Northern Ireland international left Rochdale for Shamrock Rovers in 2005 and joined Celtic in 2008 after a spell at his home town club Derry City. Before signing for the Hatters in July he plied his trade at Barnsley and Brighton, ending last season with three months on loan at Notts County.




Cameron McGeehan's early years were spent with Fulham and Chelsea. The Northern Ireland U-21 cap joined Norwich in 2011 and captained the Canaries' youth side to success in the FA Youth Cup in 2012/13. Early in 2014 he joined the Hatters on loan and helped them to gain promotion to League Two. Loans spells at Cambridge United and back at Kenilworth Road led to a permanent switch to Luton in the summer. **McGeehan**'s eighth goal of the current campaign came in November's home win over Barnet.

A central midfielder who can also play in defence, **Pelly Ruddock Mpanzu** went from Boreham Wood to West Ham, who loaned him to the Hatters in November 2013 and recalled him the following month due to an injury crisis. Luton secured his services on a permanent basis in January 2014 and **Mpanzu** helped them to win promotion to League Two as Conference Premier champions.

Jonathan Smith netted for the fourth time this term in October's 4-1 win at Hartlepool. He has played for Morecambe and Forest Green and spent the 2011/12 campaign with Swindon between two spells at York.




Central defender or right back **Scott Cuthbert** signed a professional deal with Celtic but did not appear for their senior side. He went on loan to Livingston and St Mirren before spending two campaigns at Swindon. In 2011 the former Scottish U-21 cap moved to Leyton Orient, featuring over 150 times for the O's before his summer move to Kenilworth Road.

England 'C' cap **Scott Griffiths**, who helped the Hatters to return to the League as Conference Premier champions in 2013/14, also

enjoyed promotion in 2006/07 with Dagenham & Redbridge, and with Chesterfield in 2010/11 during one of his two loan stints with the Spireites. Right back Sean Long, a Republic of Ireland international, joined the Hatters on loan from Reading in mid October.

Right back **Stephen O'Donnell** scored 10 times in his four campaigns with Partick Thistle before the ex Scotland U-21 cap came south of the border in the summer. There appears to have been an element of fortune about his first goal for the Hatters, in a home JPT win over Leyton Orient in September, when the 23 year old former Celtic trainee got in the way of a shot from midfielder **Ryan Hall**.

Summer signing **Mark O'Brien** was named Derby County's 'Scholar of the Year' and Republic of Ireland's U-19 'Player of the Year' in 2009. In that year he needed heart surgery for a valve problem but fortunately made a full recovery. He spent last season on loan at Motherwell.



Magnus Okuonghae has returned from a loan spell at Hartlepool. The 29 year old Nigerian's former employers include Aldershot, Crawley Town, Dagenham & Redbridge and

Colchester, where he was club captain and for whom he played over 200 games.

Dan Potts signed for the Hatters in May after 13 games for West Ham. The 21 year old left back or central defender has been on loan at Colchester and Portsmouth.

Previously signed by **Still** for Dagenham & Redbridge in 2010, **Luke Wilkinson** left Bristol City for Portsmouth, later playing on loan for Eastleigh, Boreham Wood and Dartford, with whom he won promotion to the Conference Premier via the play offs. The defender scored his third goal of the campaign in September's 3-1 win at Morecambe.

Frankie Musonda, a 17 year old central defender who signed professional forms in November along with defensive midfielder **James Justin**, was on the bench against the Cobblers last month.


38 year old keeper **Mark Tyler**, signed from Peterborough in the summer of 2009, made over 500 appearances for the Posh. He began as a trainee at Norwich City, his hometown club. His number two **Elliot Justham** has featured four times since switching from East Thurrock in 2013.

Ron Davies


Noted for his aerial ability, Welsh international striker Ron Davies was capped 29 times after leaving Luton Town. Signing professional for Chester in July 1959, he was twice leading



marksman, moving to Luton in October 1962. He was top scorer in 1962/63, netting 21 goals in 32 League games before joining Norwich City in September 1963. Moving to Southampton in August 1966, he topped their goalscoring charts three times before joining Portsmouth in April 1973. Later with Manchester United, Arcadia Shepherds, LA Aztecs, Tulsa Roughnecks and Seattle Sounders, he coached in the United States and died in May 2013.

Mervyn Day


Luton Town's former loan goalkeeper Mervyn Day starred in West Ham's 1975 FA Cup final success. The England U-23 international was twice ever present for the Hammers and played in the 1976 ECWC final, moving to Orient in July 1979. He was ever present three times prior to joining Aston Villa in May 1983, then joined Leeds United in February 1985 and helped win the Second Division title in 1989/90. Loaned to



Luton in March 1992, he made four League appearances. Joining Carlisle United in July 1993, he became their manager, then assisted Alan Curbishley at Charlton and West Ham, returning to Leeds as chief scout.

John Hartson

Welsh international striker John Hartson helped Luton Town reach the FA Cup semi finals in 1993/94. Signing professional for Luton in December 1992, he netted 11 goals in 54 League games before sold to Arsenal for £2,500,000 in January 1995. He scored in the 1995 ECWC final, moving to West Ham for £3,200,000 in February 1997. Leading marksman in 1997/98, he joined Wimbledon for £7,000,000 in January 1999 and had a spell with Coventry City prior to joining Celtic in August 2001. He starred in their 2001/02 'treble' triumph and joined West Brom for £500,000 in July 2006, gaining a total of 51 caps.



Colin Todd

Ex England international central defender Colin Todd appeared for Luton Town in 1984/85. Initially with Sunderland, he moved to Derby County in February 1971, starring as they won the League Championship in 1971/72 and 1974/75, when PFA Player of the Year. He joined Everton in September 1978, then played for Birmingham City and Nottingham Forest. Reuniting with Jim Smith at Oxford United in February 1984, he helped clinch the Third Division title and moved to Luton in October 1984, playing two League games. He later managed Middlesbrough, Bolton Wanderers, Swindon Town, Derby County and Bradford City.

Matthew Upson

Former Luton Town central defender Matthew Upson gained 21 England caps. Signing professional for Luton Town in April 1996, he made his only League appearance for the Hatters as a substitute

in their 1-0 win over Rotherham four months later and joined Arsenal for £1,000,000 in May 1997. He featured in their 1997/98 Premier League title campaign and was a member of the 2001/02 'double' winning squad.

Loaned to several clubs, he moved to Birmingham City for £2,000,000 in January 2003, then joined West Ham for £6,000,000 in January 2007. He has since played for Stoke City, Brighton, Leicester City and MK Dons.


WE'VE MET BEFORE

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

Each year preventable diseases such as diabetes and coronary heart disease cost the Bristol area alone roughly £7.5 million per year and current interventions have struggled to engage a wide variety of participants.

To help combat this rising problem Bristol Rovers Community Trust will be offering local people a free 45 minute education programme followed by an hour of light physical activity every Tuesday evening between 7.00-9.00pm from 12th January here at the Memorial Stadium.

The education sessions will look at healthy eating including food preparation and nutrition, heart health, stress and mental health, ways of giving up smoking, sensible drinking limits as well as a 1:1 GP session.

All of these will be led by qualified NHS staff. The exercise sessions will be a fun engaging hour led by qualified Bristol Rovers staff.

Stuart Sinclair who himself is a qualified personal trainer has taken on the role of Fans4Life ambassador. He said; "I am delighted to be involved with this fantastic programme as its ambassador. There is a huge problem of obesity and heart disease in this country and I am well aware of the positive impact this programme can have on tackling these issues. Signing up to the programme really can change people's lives for the better".

SOCER: IN SIGHT & SOUND

FROM PICTURES TO HD SOUND AND VISION

As I mentioned in the last programme (Leyton Orient) there was an apparent harmony between the BBC and the Football Association just before the outbreak of WWII.

From 1938 the FA allowed the Charity Shield, FA Cup Final, England – Scotland internationals and even the Amateur Cup final to be televised, albeit to the affluent region of the London area where most television sets were owned.

Our journey through the media minefield continues in the post War era, but not with the latest technology of television, oh no. The BBC still maintained that radio was the way forward and so we return to 'sound only' for this next instalment.

During those early years of peace time the BBC were responsible for producing some of the finest programmes to have both popularity and in some cases longevity: 'Mrs Dale's Diary', 'Woman's Hour', 'Dick Barton-Special Agent' and of course 'The Archers' had the pulling power to empty public houses and entice the listeners in their millions.


Star names at the time emanating from those walnut housed, five valve radio sets such as 'Round The Horne' with Kenneth Horne, 'Big-hearted' Arthur Askey, 'Cheerful' Charlie Chester, 'It's That Man Again' Tommy Handley (aka ITMA) and 'The Man in Black' Valentine Dyall soon became personal friends of the airwaves. But amid all

these dramas and comedies, where is the sport?

Up until the end of 1947 the BBC Sports Dept was still limited to very little airtime and even when it did, it was restricted to being no earlier than 6:15pm, so as not to affect stories that would make headline news in the morning editions of local and national newspapers. But on 3rd January 1948 all that was about to change as the BBC broadcast the very first edition of Sports Report.

Because we have the availability to listen to radio sport almost anywhere these days we take it for granted that one programme is set aside for an entire Saturday afternoon to not only bring live commentaries of more than one match, but bounce around the nation and get on the spot accounts of goals and incidents as they happen. In 1948 it was a little different.

The winds of change were indeed whipping up into a storm in the autumn of 1947. It appears that the Football Association were getting cold feet on the limitations of how many viewers were benefiting from TV broadcasts. With only around 10.8m living in London, it was estimated that less than one

tune. Theme music for radio broadcasts was paramount for capturing the attention of the listening audience.

As the first strains of The Devil's Gallop wafted through the air you knew it was time for 'Dick Barton – Special Agent'. And see if you can name the BBC radio programmes from these theme tunes? 'Coronation Scot', 'By the Sleepy Lagoon', 'Barwick Green' and 'Puffin' Billy'.

* Of course, you must be of a certain age to remember any of these, but try them out on YouTube.

It took Mackay and his assistant Hugh Driver several days of raiding the BBC gramophone library in the depths of Broadcasting House, but with literally hours until the 5:30 debut broadcast a tiny 10 inch disc was brought up to the turntable where 'Out Of The Blue' was blasted out and selected as the programme's now famous signature tune, with the most popular recording being played by the Central Band of the RAF since the mid 1950's.

So as you tune in to Sports Report at 5:00pm this evening get ready to raise a glass of bubbly as this iconic programme celebrates its 68th birthday tomorrow. Happy Birthday Sports Report!

Bristol Rovers gained their first win in ten matches at home to Luton Town. Bert Tann's side took the lead on 29 minutes when former England international Ron Bayham failed to hold Norman Sykes' shot and Geoff Bradford followed up to score. Rovers doubled their advantage on 34 minutes when debutant Johnny Watkins crossed and George Petherbridge fired home. Rovers made it three after 55 minutes as Petherbridge's corner was headed on by Bradford and Peter

Hooper slammed the ball into the net. Luton pulled a goal back on 78 minutes when a Gordon Turner shot went in off Ray Mabbutt, but Bradford ran through to complete the scoring with four minutes left.

Long serving winger George Petherbridge starred in Bristol Rovers' 1952/53 Third Division title triumph. He played



for Colston Sports before moving to Eastville Stadium in October 1945 and scored four goals in Rovers' 5-0 victory over Torquay United in December 1951. Ever present in 1951/52, he featured in the epic 4-0 FA Cup third round win over Manchester United's 'Busby Babes' in January 1956. He netted 85 times in 452 League outings prior to joining Salisbury in July 1962, then Falmouth and Glastonbury. Later a publican at Sherston, he was sports master at Millfield School, then groundsman at Wells Cathedral School. He settled in Glastonbury and died in March 2013.

27/12/80 Division Two Bristol Rovers 2 Luton Town 4

A Brian Stein hat trick helped Luton Town to a comfortable win at Eastville Stadium. Struggling Rovers took the lead on eight minutes when Steve Williams knocked down Mike Barrett's cross for Stewart Barrowclough to score. Luton drew level four minutes later when Stein capitalised on Gary Emmanuel's poor back pass to score, but Terry Cooper's side regained the lead on 14 minutes when Gary Mabbutt forced home Barrett's cross. Luton equalised again on 34 minutes when Stein followed


up Godfrey Ingram's shot to score, then went ahead three minutes later through a Ricky Hill free kick. Stein netted again on 81 minutes to complete his treble and seal victory for Luton.

Jason Roberts and Jamie Cureton scored two goals apiece in Bristol Rovers' convincing win at Kenilworth Road. Luton took the lead after 13 minutes when a cross by Stuart Douglas was steered home by Phil Gray but Rovers drew level on 26 minutes through a blunder by Nathan Abbey. His kick barely reached the halfway line and Robbie Pethick nodded the ball to Roberts who calmly lobbed home. Rovers went ahead on 38 minutes after Abbey spilled the ball and Cureton scored from

a tight angle. Rovers increased their lead in the 58th minute when a Pethick pass was turned home superbly by Cureton, then Roberts completed the scoring with a 20 yard strike in stoppage time.

Grenada international striker Jason Roberts starred as Bristol Rovers reached the FA Cup fifth round in 1998/99. A cousin of Cyrille Regis, he impressed with Hayes before moving to Wolves in September 1997 and was loaned to Torquay United and Bristol City. Joining Rovers for £250,000 in August 1998, he netted 38 goals in 78 League games before sold to West Brom for £2,000,000 in July 2000. He helped win promotion in 2001/02, joining Wigan Athletic for £2,000,000



in January 2004. Starring as they won promotion in 2004/05 and were League Cup finalists in 2006, he later played for Blackburn Rovers and Reading. He received the MBE in recognition of his charity work.

19/2/02 Division Three Luton Town 3 Bristol Rovers 0

Second placed Luton Town swept aside Bristol Rovers at Kenilworth Road. Luton dominated throughout and nearly scored in the first half when a 25 yard shot by Matthew Taylor came back off the post. The Hatters broke the deadlock on 46 minutes when Taylor's cross was headed in by Steve Howard. Luton doubled their lead in the 65th minute when a David Bayliss cross was headed home by Chris Coyne. Lowly Rovers offered little in reply and were reduced to ten men after 76 minutes when Steve

Foster's professional foul brought down Howard in the penalty area. Kevin Nicholls made in three from the resulting spot kick. Luton were promoted at the end of the season.

Striker Steve Howard topped Luton Town's goalscoring charts in five successive seasons. Initially with Tow Law, he joined Hartlepool United in August 1995 and moved to Northampton Town for



£120,000 in February 1999. He starred in their 1999/2000 promotion campaign, joining Luton for £50,000 in March 2001. A key figure as the Hatters won promotion in 2001/02, then the League One title in 2004/05, he scored 95 goals in 212 League outings before being sold to Derby County for £1,000,000 in July 2006.

The Scotland 'B' international helped them to win promotion in 2006/07 and joined Leicester City for £1,500,000 in January 2008, then played for Hartlepool again.

STEPHEN BYRNE profiles past Rovers players

WILLIAM WALTER WEBBER GERRISH

Flanders field claimed the life of Billy Gerrish, who had left Rovers to win a League championship medal with Aston Villa in 1909/10, for whom he scored a hat trick against Chelsea in Division One in September 1909.

Unable to retain his place in the side the following season, his career took him to Preston and Chesterfield, where he suffered a broken leg, before enlisting as F/936 in the Footballers' Battalion, the 17th Middlesex

Regiment; he was killed on the Western Front.

The former England international Frank Buckley, who coached the Footballers' Battalion team, described Gerrish as 'a splendid soldier, most willing and brave'. In February 1915, when in military hospital, he had heard another patient was dying through blood loss and offered to have some of his blood pumped into the patient 'who was ever after grateful for the extension of his own life by about a year', as his former

Rovers team mate Peter Roney wrote from the trenches.

One of 52 soldiers in his regiment killed in one day, Gerrish has no known grave and is commemorated on the Thiepval Memorial to the Missing.

Prior to this sad end, he had broken into Rovers' side at the age of 21, establishing himself in the side and becoming a lynchpin during the 1908/09 season, when his two goals set up a 4-1 victory over a very strong Southampton side.

These were but two of eleven goals in 49 Southern League appearances for the Eastville side; he is said to have once smashed a shot into the Eastville net so hard that it broke through the back and out on to the main road.

He later represented Chesterfield in eight Midland League games without scoring, as his club finished second in the table, his first appearance being in a 6-0 victory over Grimsby Town reserves in December 1912. The extended Gerrish family lived for many years on the corner of Whitehall Road and Gordon Road, in a house demolished in 1925, and nearby Gerrish Avenue bears their name; Billy Gerrish was one of ten children born to Wesley Charles Gerrish (1848-1916) and Florence Webber (1854-1940) of 664 Stapleton Road and fathered a son called Horace (1911-39). His brother Howard Gerrish (1885-1969) was on Rovers' books during the 1904/05 Southern League championship season but, unable to break into the side, moved away and was reported to be at 6 Cardiff Road, Glanllyn, Taffs Well in 1953.

Top scorer with Bagnall's in the Stafford and District League, Sam

Duckers was a regular for over a decade at Stafford Rangers, where he was one of three professionals

on the club's books as late as the 1935/36 season.

His most profitable campaign had been that of 1926/27, when he scored 18 times in 20 games for the Birmingham League champions, before being ruled out by an injury suffered against Wellington St George's in January 1927. Rangers scored 542 goals in a five season spell at this time.

On the basis of good club form, Rovers took

a chance on the inside forward, signing him along with Charles Heinemann, but he appeared just the once in the League, in a 3-1 home defeat, in which Rovers conceded three headed goals. 'It is obvious', the Bristol Times and Mirror reported, 'that Duckers needs far more experience'. He did score for the reserves when they defeated Bath City 4-1 in December 1925, but returned to Stafford to play alongside his cousin John Duckers and also

Midfielder Billy Foreman played a total of 38 minutes' League football in a Rovers shirt, 26 against Blackburn on his début and 12 against Oldham Athletic in April 1978.

Signing for Rovers along with Brian O'Donnell in May 1976, he was later, as a student at Weymouth College, selected by the

British Colleges XI for a tour of North America in 1981. Two loan spells at Bridport earned Foreman a début as a substitute in the goalless draw at Melksham in January

1981 and a goal from the penalty spot as well as an assist, as Keynsham were defeated 3-1 the following month.

To a tally of 31 (+1) Western League games and two goals for the Bees could be added five cup ties and an appearance in the abandoned game at Saltash United in 1981. His second goal for Bridport was driven home from 20 yards after Neil Mitchell's pull back, just nine minutes into a 2-2 draw with Barnstaple Town in November 1982; this was one of 23 Western League games in which he played during 1982/83, having

Looking Back

- Season 2000/01 -

A season which opened with great optimism ended in tears on a Wednesday night in May, as Rovers slipped into the basement division for the first time ever.

Relegation ended Rovers' proud record of being the only club never to have played in either the top or the bottom division of the Football League. Requiring at least a point at home to Wycombe, Rovers conceded a 73rd minute deflected shot from the future Rovers defender Danny Senda and a spectacular volley from Bulman five minutes later.

Only six minutes into the season, Jamie Cureton stroked home a penalty against Bournemouth to give Rovers an early lead. Rovers were unbeaten in their opening 12 league and cup games and recorded comprehensive victories at Brentford and at second in the table Cambridge.


However, the warning signs were already there and Rovers, in particular, had not yet won at home. Jason Roberts had commanded a club record fee of £2m to move to West Brom, but the sales of influential defender Andy Tillson for just £10k to Walsall and, after the opening game, of Cureton to Reading were regarded by supporters with disbelief. Rovers had sold three forwards, in Roberts, Cureton, and Bobby Zamora for a profit over two million pounds.

Zamora was to be the top scorer in all four divisions, while Cureton and Roberts scored 30 and 16 times respectively. Nathan Ellington was top scorer and Vitalijs Astafjevs' five goals rendered him an unlikely second highest scorer for the season. Rovers failed to score in 19 of their 46 league fixtures.

New signing Martin Cameron was ruled out for much of the season while new club captain Andy Thomson broke his foot early on. Nick Culkin, a season long loan signing, was an inspirational goalkeeper, while Player of the Year Steve Foster also missed few games. Beyond these two, however, few players could lay claim to a regular place in the side, although Astafjevs and Ellington appeared often alongside the new generation of Rovers players in Simon Bryant and Lewis Hogg.

Young Player of the Year, Hogg made his league début as an opening day substitute and scored his first two goals at Brentford. New signings Che Wilson and Scott Jones, alongside Marcus Bignot early in the season, were also pivotal figures, but Rovers used a seasonal total of 35 players.

The long unbeaten run ended at Bury in October, which forced Culkin to leave the field injured and Foster was red carded. The substitute goalkeeper was Brian Parkin, who

astonishing 576 minutes without a goal in league or cup football. When Astafjevs scored to give Rovers a 33rd minute lead over Cambridge, his goal, coupled with Ellington's header, finally gave Rovers their long awaited first home league win of the season.

They were the last league side to do so and the winless run since Easter Saturday had finally stretched to 13 home league matches.

Ultimately, Rovers' six home league wins equalled the total of away league victories, and matched the six home wins of the 2010/11 relegation campaign. Success at Dean Court for a second consecutive season was, though, the only victory away from home after the first week in November and Rovers lost their final six away matches. Only on one occasion in the season were consecutive league fixtures won and Rovers recorded 10 draws at home and 15 in all, eight of them goalless. Three points from any one of these, for instance the local derby where a seasonal highest home crowd of 9,361 saw Bristol City earn a point when Steve Phillips saved Scott Jones' penalty deep into injury time, one of four penalties Rovers squandered all season, would with hindsight have prevented relegation.

we had to concede. Just a week later international call ups from Millwall's squad enabled them to call the game off. This was a theme that would continue throughout the whole season.



On October 31st Port Vale once again had to stay home as we had a game in the League Cup to deal with. None of these games had programmes issued for them.

Peterborough were the next victims of this epidemic of postponements. The December 30th game did



have a programme issued as did the next attempt on 14th March. Eventually the game was played on 20th March and a four page wraparound was added.

Finally, nothing was issued for our postponed games against Bristol City in January and Wycombe in February.



Rushden were relegated at the end of the season and by 2011 had gone out of business altogether.

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
