NATHAN JONES

THE FIRST NOTES FROM THE NEW MANAGER

GOOD AFTERNOON AND WELCOME TO KENILWORTH ROAD FOR THIS SKY BET LEAGUE 2 FIXTURE AGAINST CAMBRIDGE UNITED.

I'd like to welcome Shaun Derry and everybody associated with our visitors for what promises to be a keenly-contested game in front of a passionate crowd.

Shaun has made a really positive impact since he took over at the Abbey Stadium in November and, knowing him from his playing days, I am sure he will bring a lot his qualities that he had as a footballer to Cambridge United.

PROUD

Today, however, is my first game as manager of Luton Town, and I can tell you that I am very proud to have been entrusted with the job of taking this club – your club – forward.

This is a big club with a great reputation, and one know I know a lot about. I was privileged to have spent a brief but hugely useful year on the books here as a young player, and I am now looking forward to making a positive difference here as a manager.

First and foremost I want to produce a team that the people of Luton can get behind, be proud of and relate to. I learned a lot about the ethos of this club during my time as a player here and I want

I can assure you that I will put a Luton Town team out there on the pitch to represent this club that will give absolutely everything, especially for you, our supporters.

LOYALTY

Your importance in getting behind the team will play a major part in what we will be trying to do. Having watched games at Kenilworth Road, and been a part of this club before, I know how your passion, loyalty and noise can translate onto the pitch.

If we want success we are going to have to move forward together. This will be done in small but quick

steps to firstly enable us to get a good footing in the League 2 table.

I can tell you that since I was appointed and took my first training session last week, the players have been superb. They have responded brilliantly to what I have put across to them.

The ability in the squad is something we'll be looking to harness and put into our style of play to hopefully take Luton Town forward. The hard work will speak for itself.

This is a start of a new era and a new challenge for me too. I realise where this club wants to go, and we get there by doing so sensibly and constructively, so get behind us and enjoy the game.



From the BOARDROOM

WITH VICE-CHAIRMAN **DAVID WILKINSON**

GOOD AFTERNOON EVERYONE, A VERY WARM WELCOME TO KENILWORTH ROAD, AND A BELATED HAPPY NEW YEAR FROM YOUR BOARD.

Today we greet Dave Doggett, Shaun Derry and all the officials, players and supporters from Cambridge United.

The U's, like us, are around mid-table at the moment and like us have not come up to early expectations, but there is always a little extra spice when we play each other so let's all hope for a thrilling afternoon of football.

What a difference a year makes! This time last year we were flirting with the top of the table and John Still was firmly ensconced in the hot seat. Richard Money had just taken Cambridge to Old Trafford and seemed secure in his position. Now they have both gone and the challenge begins again for the new men.

A New Year, a new manager and a new challenge.

135 applications were received for the position, some serious and some not, from a wide variety of people with a wide range of experience. A large number were rejected quite easily and the list was whittled down, eventually, to a long

short list of some 10 candidates. Some potential candidates were also considered who hadn't applied and all were eventually reduced to a shorter short list.

After Gary had undertaken the initial interviews the whole Board, or at least as many as were available, had the opportunity of presentations from the top candidates and their views were sought before making the final proposal.

Nathan came highly recommended from a broad spectrum of the football community and, having received permission from Brighton, it was arranged that he meet the entire Board and present to them.

IMPRESSED

He made a lengthy presentation outlining his football philosophy, which matched our own in every respect. He showed us how games and the opposition are analysed. He also talked about his contacts and experience in football and was questioned by us all. All those present were highly impressed by the man and his ideas and felt that he was a natural motivational speaker.

He told us that it was the way David Pleat treated him when he bought him from Merthyr Tydfil and the enjoyment he then had at Luton



that started him thinking about coaching and his football philosophy.

He is young, qualified, technically strong, ambitious, focused, driven and dedicated.

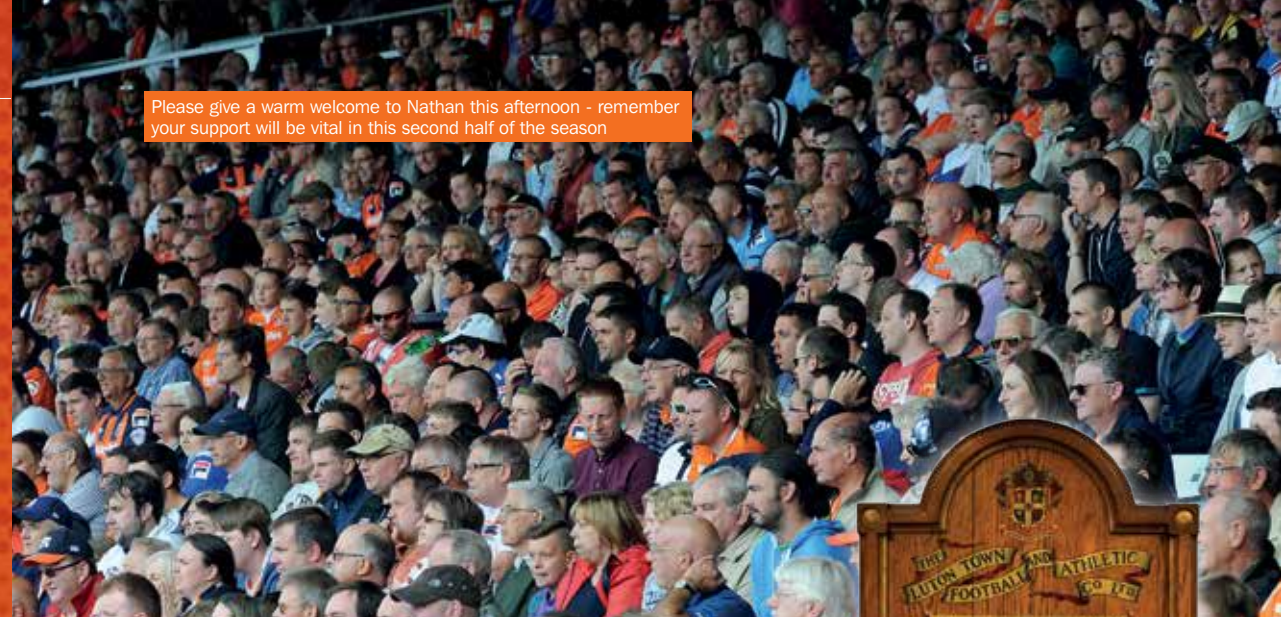
He has the reputation of being an excellent coach and we believe he has the potential to be a great manager. Some will say this is a bold move because he hasn't been part of the managerial merry-go-round, but "it's only by being bold you get anywhere".

The Board, as in all previous cases, were unanimous in their approval and support.

We wait with interest to see who joins the coaching staff and to see the structure and content of the management team.

Changing managers is not something we like doing. We, and you, get to know them well and it is a wrench when they have to go, not only emotionally but also financially. Every time a manager leaves he and his staff receive compensation and when a new one joins he has

to recruit new staff and probably make changes to the playing squad, which of course tends to negatively affect the playing budget.

There have been comments about the number of managers we have had since we took control of the Club. We have released five and appointed five in the last eight years, which sounds a lot. However, the average tenure of a manager in the professional game in England is 1.23 years whereas our average is 1.6 years, and this despite the abnormal pressure to get out of the Conference.

AMBITIONS

When we employ a manager we believe and expect that his and our ambitions match and that we can succeed together in the longer term. Let's hope that Nathan can reverse the trend and help us climb the divisions.

Our thanks to Andy Awford for standing in after John's departure and congratulations to him, Paul Driver and our Under-18s for winning the Youth Alliance League last Tuesday. What a fantastic achievement with only one defeat in all competitions this season.

As mentioned in my last notes a considerable number of the Board and vice presidents went to Meadow Lane to see them play Notts County in the FA Youth Cup third round. We were full of optimism after their unbeaten record to that date and they did not disappoint. They played a style of football we hadn't seen for some time and even though they were reduced to 10 men early in the game came out comfortable winners. Their next opponents are Oldham away and I'm sure that a number of us will make the trip wherever it ends up being.

I had a Christmas gift of a book entitled "Winners and how they succeed" and thought I would share one of the quotes with you: "the interesting thing about coaching is that you have to trouble the comfortable and comfort the troubled." - R Charlesworth Australian coach and athlete.

“As a Club we realise a change of thinking will not happen overnight, but we are already excited at the prospect of Nathan’s ideas and vision for Luton Town.”



NATHAN JONES

Last week we were delighted to announce Nathan Jones as the Club’s new first team manager.

The 42-year-old has signed a two-and-a-half year contract and joins the Hatters from Championship Brighton & Hove Albion where he had held the position of first team coach.

REPUTATION

Although this will be Jones’ first full managerial position, the Welshman has forged himself a fine reputation as a coach and assistant manager.

Jones holds a UEFA Pro Licence and last summer helped England Under-21 boss Gareth Southgate prepare the Young Lions for their UEFA Under-21 championship campaign in the Czech Republic.

A defender as a player, Jones began his professional career at Kenilworth Road 20 years ago, when David Pleat signed him for £10,000 from Merthyr Tydfil in 1995.

After a year at Kenilworth Road Jones left for a 12-month spell in Spain, playing for Numancia and Badajoz, but on his return to the UK Jones went on to enjoy success at Southend, Brighton and Yeovil, making over 500 appearances and winning promotion three times.

SUCCESS

Success continued to follow after he hung up his boots. It was with his final club as a player, Yeovil, that Jones began his coaching badges, and in 2009 he became the Glovers’ assistant manager.

After a brief spell as Under-21s manager at Charlton, Jones was appointed assistant head coach to Oscar Garcia at Brighton in 2013. In his first season at the Amex the Seagulls reached the Championship Play-Off final.

Following Garcia’s departure, Jones was then named as new boss Sami Hyypia’s first team coach but after the Finn’s exit in December last season, Jones took over as interim manager and helped the then-struggling Seagulls to four points from two games in the Championship.

Despite another change in manager at the Amex, Jones was kept on by the newest man in the hotseat and became Chris Hughton’s first team coach – a position he has held until his arrival at Kenilworth Road.

10 THINGS ABOUT NATHAN JONES

- Nathan Jones is the Hatters’ 31st different manager.
- He is the 13th different manager to have previously been on the Town’s books as a player.
- Nathan was born in Rhondda, South Wales on 28th May 1973.
- His early football career started as an apprentice at Cardiff City. He turned professional in 1993.
- Nathan was signed by David Pleat from Merthyr but left the Hatters without making a single appearance. Before the 1995/96 campaign had even begun, Pleat left to take over at Sheffield Wednesday.
- Jones is bi-lingual and is able to speak English and Spanish. He has an A-level in Spanish.
- As assistant manager at Yeovil he helped introduce future English internationals Andros Townsend, Steven Caulker and Ryan Mason in their first steps in professional football. The trio all joined the Glovers on loan from Tottenham during Jones’ time at Huish Park.
- Jones began coaching at a young age, and was a coach coordinator in American soccer camps in the States when only 19.
- He has worked under three separate managers at Brighton – Oscar Garcia, Sami Hyypia and Chris Hughton. When Hyypia left the Seagulls last season, Jones took caretaker charge, overseeing two matches: a 2-2 draw with Reading and a 2-0 win at Fulham in the Championship.
- Last summer Nathan was asked to assist and shadow England Under-21 coaches Gareth Southgate and Steve Holland ahead of their Euro 2015 preparations.

JONES ON... LUTON TOWN

"I feel it's a good match. Our ethos and what we believe in run parallel. It's an ambitious club that has plans to get back to where it once was. I believe I have a way doing things that coincides with the club's philosophy and ethos and I think we're very much alike.

"The Club were looking for something a bit different from the norm, from the experienced managers, if you like.

"When I first came to Luton I took confidence from being spotted and brought here by David Pleat and then working with Wayne Turner and John Moore, good coaches held in very high regard. It was a good education and a lot of the things I've picked up at Luton have since contributed to shaping my career. I loved it here and I'm privileged now to be back to lead this club forward."

JONES ON... MUTUAL POTENTIAL

"I've followed this club for a long time and I enjoyed my small time here and know it has the potential to do very well.



"I wasn't looking for a quick fix in my career. I was at a good club in Brighton who invested a lot of time in and saw progression in me so it is a bit of a gamble, but a calculated one, a good one. I can feel the potential at the club and I believe our achievements together can run parallel. Hopefully we can find a way to bring the good times to Kenilworth Road."

JONES ON... EXPERIENCE

"People have to gain experience...and I am experienced. I've been in football for 27-and-a-half years. I was never a player that just switched off. I gleaned a lot off of managers I've worked with. I knew I wasn't going to be a top, top player but I worked hard every day to try and achieve something so I started preparing myself for this moment from quite an early stage.

"Since I've embarked on my coaching career I've worked with a lot of people, and had lots of different roles. I haven't had masses experience of managing a football club but I've got masses of experience of seeing how a club is managed. And I believe I'm ready for that."

JONES ON...FOOTBALL PHILOSOPHY

"The kind of football I hope for is winning football. I'd like us to work hard, play at a tempo, pass the ball quickly and be good to watch. Teams who are good to watch win football matches and that's what we'll endeavour to do. We'll work hard, defend well, pass the ball when we can, create chances and, if we've got the quality to take those chances, we will be in a position to win football matches.

"It's not going to be all about tiki-taka football or Barcelona. The Nathan Jones philosophy will be attempted to be implemented by doing what I think will take the club forward. It's what I believe in and what I've worked so hard for."

JONES ON... PATIENCE

"We're going to take it game-by-game. Let's see where we go. I'm not going to say 'we're going to do this, we're going to do that'. I'm hopeful of a day-by-day improvement from the people we have here. Then we'll be in a better position to win matches. It's clichéd, it's boring, but you've got to take it game by game, it's all you can do. We'll try and win and if we do we'll go back and see how we did it, work on it again and see if we can improve on it to try and win another match. If you don't succeed, we'll go back, analyse what went wrong and try and improve and move onto the next. It's simple."

JONES ON... THE FANS

"The fans are going to play a massive part. There's been a lot of positivity around my appointment which I really appreciate.

"The fans can lift this team and play their part in taking us forward and getting behind the team and drive them forward. We want Kenilworth Road to be a tough place for people to come but a place where our players enjoy playing. That will help us win football matches, it really, really does. I know we're not in a good position at the moment but as a collective – as a town, club and a community – we can move forward together. The fans are going to be a vital part. It's excellent to see this club averaging 8-9,000 every week and I want to put a team out on the pitch which will make the fans happy."

JONES ON... MANAGEMENT

"I think it was when I was about 27 that I kind of thought to myself that I wasn't going to be a Premier League player. It wasn't through a lack of trying – I played until I was 39. I was offered the player/assistant

role at Yeovil at 36. But in my 20s I knew I wasn't going to be a top, top player but thought to myself 'what am I going to do in my career after I've finished playing?' That's when I started writing out [training] sessions, some ideas in what I liked in managers and what I didn't like in managers. I wrote down things, stored a lot of knowledge and I have the passion. I started coaching the women's team at Yeovil and loved doing that and since I've learnt a lot.

"Over the course of my career I've found out and been interested in how people conduct themselves and deal with certain situations, how they talk to players, what kind of body language they use.

"Chris Hughton is a good example of man-management – how he controls a club. Everything's contributed and I hope to be able to transfer what I've learned here: getting people wanting to play for you is important. I've seen a lot good coaches and a lot of not-so-good coaches throughout my career and now the challenge for me is to use that experience and put it into practise."

JONES ON... THE CHALLENGE

"I am ready, it is a wonderful challenge and a challenge I am ready for. I dedicate my life to doing what I do. I wouldn't go home at night if I didn't have an understanding girlfriend to go back to: I'd immerse myself in the job too much otherwise. She allows me to switch off a bit.

"It's fantastic...it's not quite like an exam but when you prepare and feel you're ready and that you want the opportunity and then you're given that chance... it gives you a buzz. Fail or succeed here I know that I have belief that I am ready and I'm excited. I know I'll bring something to Luton Town and that's the challenge – making it all work."

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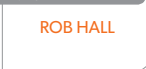

CAMBRIDGE UNITED

It gives us great pleasure to welcome everyone associated with Cambridge United to Kenilworth Road this afternoon.

The U's arrive in Bedfordshire on the back of two league defeats, but sit comfortably in 12th place in Sky Bet League 2 table, having won 10 and lost 10 of their 26 fixtures to date.

The Hatters are no strangers to the Abbey Stadium club, with today's meeting the 12th in just three-and-a-half years as the two sides shared promotion back to the Football League a couple of years ago.

The Town have the better of the recent history, losing just three out of the last 13 meetings in all competitions, including victories in the last three League 2 clashes.

Mark Cullen's late winner sealed an away victory last term, while Andy Drury, Luke Wilkinson and Jonathan Smith were all on target to seal the double, just weeks after FA Cup disappointment against the same opposition, who went on to play Manchester United in the following round.

Wilkinson was also on target in the reverse fixture this season, a game remembered for Luke Guttridge's

wonder strike as the Town ran out 3-1 winners at the Abbey back in September.

Cambridge started the campaign on fire, with seven goals in their opening two league games as a 3-0 hammering of Newport County was followed by one of the games of the season – a 4-4 draw from their trip to Carlisle.

But September proved far more subdued, netting just twice in five games, featuring that defeat against the Hatters as their topsy-turvy results continued through the autumn months.

Form steadied, but not in a good way – with four league defeats in five matches, including a 2-1 home defeat to Bristol Rovers that marked the end of Richard Money's tenure at the club, three years after he had arrived at the Abbey Stadium.

After two defeats to mark the start of his appointment, results for new manager Shaun Derry began to pick up, courtesy of a 4-2 victory at Morecambe and a 3-1 success over Notts County before a 2-1 win at high-flying Plymouth, arguably the result of Cambridge's season to date.

That victory formulated a run of six unbeaten in League 2 for United, but two defeats to begin 2016 – a 4-1 home thrashing by

AFC Wimbledon and a narrow defeat at Crawley – has seen Derry's team slip three points off the Play-Off places having played more than the majority of sides in the division.

Cambridge's most potent goal threat has been Barry Corr, with the striker occupying fourth spot on the league top scorers chart on 12 strikes, and he is sure to be a troublesome thorn in the Hatters' side this afternoon.

The U's also boast two former Hatters in their ranks, but it's unlikely we'll get to see fans' favourite Keith Keane, who remains on the treatment table following an injury he picked up as long ago as August, with his side understandably looking to manage his workload back to fitness.

Also in the Cambridge squad is Greg Taylor, who started over 30 games for the Town in two spells while the side were in the Conference.

United manager Shaun took charge in November last year following the sacking of former Town boss Richard Money. As a player Derry enjoyed a long and successful career as a midfielder with Notts County, Sheffield United, Portsmouth, Palace, Leeds and QPR.

BETWEEN THE STICKS

SAM BEASANT

Son of former Wimbledon keeper Dave, Sam was snapped up in the close season from Stevenage. Played youth football in Cyprus before spells with Maidenhead, Billericay and Woking before joining Boro.

IN DEFENCE

GREG TAYLOR

Former Town full-back Greg joined Cambridge in 2013 and has now played over 100 times in black and amber. Joined the Hatters from Darlington in 2010 and has also played for Mansfield and Kettering.

ELLIOTT OMOZUJI

Summer arrival and England youth international Elliott penned a two-year contract after leaving Orient. Came through the ranks at Fulham and experienced loan spells with Charlton and Norwich.

LEON LEGGE

Commanding centre-half Leon was United's first signing of last

summer following his departure from Gillingham. The experienced defender began his Football League career with Brentford.

MARK ROBERTS

Another experienced centre-half, Mark joined Cambridge three weeks after last season ended. Was a success at Stevenage, helping Boro win the Conference before he joined Fleetwood.

DARNELL FURLONG

Luton-born defender Darnell joined United on-loan from QPR earlier this month. Made his Rangers debut as a teenager and spent a spell on-loan at Northampton earlier season. Son of striker Paul.

ACROSS THE MIDDLE

HARRISON DUNK

Left-winger Harrison netted on his home debut in August 2011 after signing from Bromley. Played an integral part in United's promotion season and is nearing 150 appearances in black and amber.

RYAN DONALDSON

Highly-rated attacking midfielder Ryan joined the U's from Gateshead in 2013. The former England youth international started at Newcastle and was another who starred in the U's promotion season.

LIAM HUGHES

A product of the Abbey Stadium academy, versatile midfielder Liam was converted from a centre-half. Has now played over 170 times for the United first team.

LUKE BERRY

Box-to-box midfielder Luke returned for a second spell at the Abbey this summer having left for Barnsley at the start of last season. A product of the U's academy, he was United's top scorer in 2013/14.

CONOR NEWTON

Summer arrival Conor signed for the U's from Rotherham. Another former Newcastle youngster, he enjoyed two loan spells with St Mirren in Scotland before joining the Millers.

RYAN LEDSON

England youth international Ryan joined United on-loan from Everton in November. Turned pro at Goodison Park on his 17th birthday and made his Toffees debut in the Europa League last year.

UP FRONT

ROBBIE SIMPSON

Forward Robbie rejoined United for a second spell in June 2014. The striker has spent time with Coventry, Oldham, Brentford and Orient and was the U's' top goalscorer last season.

BARRY CORR

United's top goalscorer to date with 12 goals already this season, Corr joined the U's in the summer from Southend. Made almost 200 appearances for the Shrimpers and fired them to promotion last term.

From the OAK ROAD

Much was expected from Cambridge at the start of this season but former Town manager Richard Money paid the price for an inconsistent start. However new boss Shaun Derry's arrival has now got the United fans dreaming of a shot of the top seven. Now that they lie just three points off the Play-Offs, is promotion a possibility?

We ask United fan and commentator **MARK JOHNSON** for his verdict

THE SEASON AHEAD...

After a solid season last term on your return to the Football League, what was the expectation at the Abbey Stadium at the start of this season?

The message coming from the club was very clear during the summer; they were expecting to challenge for the Play-Offs and were actively encouraging the supporters to buy into that expectation.

Richard Money has managed both the Town and United. What was he like and was it the right decision for the Board to part with him?

What you saw was what you got with Richard Money; he was single-minded and passionate about what he was trying to achieve and as the manager that finally ended Cambridge's seemingly interminable Conference exile, he will be remembered as one of the most successful in the club's history. Having said that, results and performances had tapered off and the time did seem right for a change of direction.

Shaun Derry's arrival has seen an upturn in fortunes.

What has he brought to the side and what's changed?

Shaun Derry is certainly a very different character from Richard Money, but no less passionate about what he's trying to achieve. The most noticeable change since his arrival has been that the players seem to be enjoying their football again.

Many of your summer signings came to the Abbey with excellent reputations. Who's been the pick of the new boys? Have the new signings under-achieved given what was expected of them?

Given his goal scoring record so far this season, it's tough to look much further than Barry Corr in terms of the pick of the summer signings; but you'd have to say that the team as a whole has yet to meet the level of expectation set for this season.

Who's the one player to watch this season in the Cambridge side today?

Barry Corr - it's one thing knowing what he's trying to do and another preventing him from doing it.



SEASONS PAST...

Tell us about you. Why do you follow Cambridge? When did it all start? What was your first game? What do you remember about it?

My Dad took to me see Cambridge in the late 1960s but I can't remember which match. I started watching them regularly in the mid-70s, reporting on them in the mid-90s and commenting on their matches for BBC Radio Cambridgeshire in 2002.

The Conference promotion winning season saw the Hatters overhaul United. At the start of that

campaign what was the expectation then? Was it a surprise that you were challenging for the title?

I remember the squad being assembled early in the summer leading up to the promotion season and how the side seemed to 'click' immediately during pre-season. It wasn't, therefore, a huge surprise to see them start that campaign so well; and of course when you start a season without losing any of your first 17 games, you do get an idea that the season might turn out to be a decent one.

Which is your favourite season following United and why?

I'm torn between two seasons: 2013/14 - two Wembley wins and promotion and 2014/15 - which might not have had the silverware, but was the first back in the Football League and also included a couple of FA Cup ties against Manchester United.

Cambridge spent their fair share of time in the Conference, and narrowly missed out on promotion a number of times. What do you remember about your non-league days? What was so special about those times?

Other than sometimes having the feeling that we were destined to be trapped in the Conference for ever, I look back on those years with more than a

modicum of fondness... not that I'd want to go back of course! When you work in the press box you come across some good people; people who make up for some of the facilities being on the prehistoric side of basic. This was particularly the case with the FA Trophy, a competition that took us to some bizarre places where we had to be really inventive with finding kit which would allow us to broadcast a full match commentary - there were a couple of times I nearly had to resort to semaphore and pigeons to keep us on air.

LUTON AND CAMBRIDGE

What are your best and worst memories of Cambridge v Luton clashes? Do any games in particular stick out?

A couple come to mind: one is a Football League Trophy tie in October 2002 when Luke Guttridge scored a golden goal winner for the U's on the coldest night since the last ice age. The other memory is of an FA Trophy replay in January 2014 when Ashley Chambers scored the only goal of the game ... or so I understand; I actually didn't see the goal as the entire penalty area at that end of the ground was blocked from my view in the press box by the widest pillar in Christendom.

What do you expect from today's game? What's your prediction? Are you looking

forward to the lack of leg room in the away end?

As always with a trip to Luton, I'm expecting a tight game and an electric atmosphere ... and hoping not to have to commentate from behind a pillar!

COVER STORY

Club historian ROGER WASH tells the story of the match behind today's programme cover

LUTON TOWN 2 CAMBRIDGE UNITED 0 27th March 1993

Relegation in 1992, after 10 years at the top, and missing out on the new Premier League meant that the Town needed to get used to Barclays League Division One (or Division Two as we still called it).

Financial pressures on the club following demotion meant the sale of Mark Pembroke to Derby for £1.25 million to be replaced by Steve Claridge from Cambridge United for a tribunal fixed £160,000. At least we had Mick Harford to lead the line though but we were all devastated when he went to Chelsea just as the season started.

From a low starting point things got steadily worse as we endured a very rude awakening as the campaign unfolded. The home record was appalling as teams caught us on the break and it was not until the end of November that a win was recorded at Kenilworth Road with Watford being seen off 2-0.

It was only a smattering of away victories that kept the Hatters out of the relegation places, but when the record on the road started to slip the team found itself rock bottom in January and we were staring a second relegation in the face.

Fortunately, the dire situation slowly turned and a settled defence, keeping seven clean sheets in a row, saw the Town creep up the table. At the other end, the loan signing of Kerry Dixon was taking some weight off the shoulders of Phil Gray.

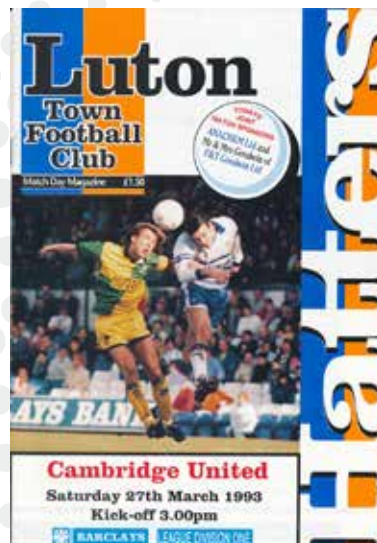
Local boy Dixon had been on the Town's books as a

youngster but had been allowed to leave by David Pleat. He persevered and after starring for Dunstable Town and Reading earned a dream move for Chelsea where he scored 147 goals in 335 starts as well as playing eight times for England.

A big money move to Southampton in 1992 turned sour and Pleat nipped in to sign the big striker on loan some 15 years after discarding him!

By the time of the visit of Cambridge in late March the Hatters were outside the bottom three but only just with United only one place above on the same number of points. The clash was therefore a true six-pointer as the campaign drew to a close.

A crowd of 8,077 turned up to see a Town side hit by flu and suspensions with Gray out on a one-match ban and influential midfielder David Preece bed-ridden. This gave an opportunity to 19-year-old Martin Williams and a return to the fold for Chris Kamara, who had been

out on loan since the previous November following stinging criticism of his performances from Pleat. Kamara had in turn said some less than complimentary things about the Hatters but was forced to return to Kenilworth Road with his tail between his legs after finding that no-one wished to keep him. The Luton crowd were remarkably forgiving I seem to remember. Returning to Kenilworth Road for the opposition was Steve Claridge who had been sold back to United after a pressing VAT bill needed settling.

In a tense atmosphere the Town got off to a cracking start and any nerves were settled on 20 minutes when Dixon scored a stunning goal. Receiving a pass from Marvin Johnson with his back to goal he flicked the ball up, swivelled, and

hit a right foot volley into the top corner.

On Pleat's insistence the pitch had been heavily watered to reduce the bounce of the ball and encourage passing football. On a rare foray upfield Cambridge defender Phil Chapple headed goalwards from a corner but his effort bounced over the bar having hit the only dry spot on the pitch.

Williams was fouled in the box by Cambridge defender Mick Heathcote but the referee waved play on and then the youngster hit a 30 yard volley to try to emulate Dixon but his effort was tipped onto the bar by goalkeeper John Vaughan.

Cambridge changed formation and tactics at the interval reverting to three up front and hoisting the ball forward. This proved dangerous

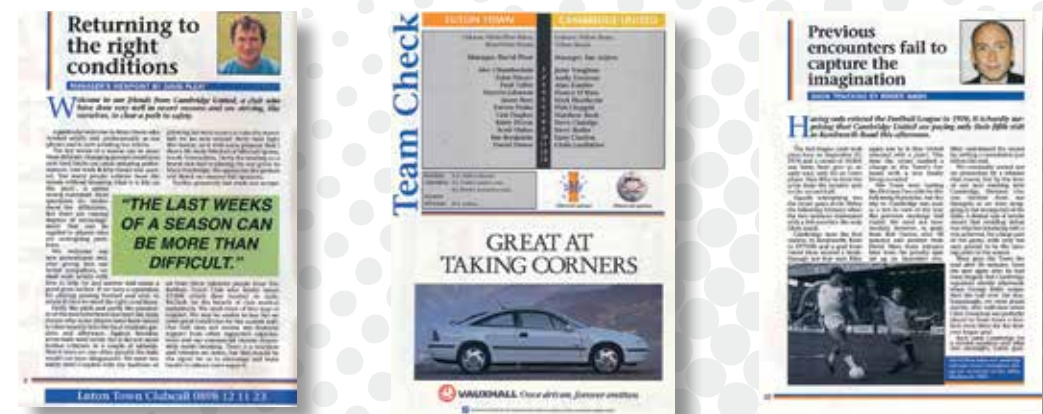
for a time until the revival was snuffed out with another Luton goal on 50 minutes.

Williams motored down the wing and for once his far post cross was perfect being met by a diving Scott Oakes header which flew into the net.

The Town defence then needed to withstand an aerial bombardment which they did with relative ease and even found time to set up counter attacks which almost led to further goals from Williams and Jason Rees.

Cambridge manager Ian Atkins accused his side of "bottling it", while Pleat was merely "pleased with the effort". Dixon was asked if he was likely to sign for the Town permanently and replied "Get [MD] David Kohler to sell his car and buy me!"

THE PROGRAMME



The Town produced a 32-page programme for the visit of Cambridge priced at £1.50.

Manager David Pleat, in his column, made mention of a brief appearance to be made by Darren Salton on the pitch at half-time. Salton and fellow team member Paul Telfer had been involved in a fatal road accident the previous November.

Pleat also stated that seven balls had been lumped out of the ground during the 0-0 draw with Swindon 10 days before, never to be seen again, which meant that we were around 30 balls light for season (he didn't mention John Dreyer by name). Multiple ball sponsors were therefore required.

It was mentioned that the Town had appointed a new head groundsman. Richard 'Dickie' Bird is still here 23 years later!

DEFINING MOMENTS

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN **LEIGH EDWARDS** SELECTS FIVE KEY MATCHES
AND MOMENTS THAT HAVE SHAPED CAMBRIDGE UNITED'S POST-WAR ERA

1969 SOUTHERN LEAGUE 'DOUBLE'

Bill Cassidy and Tony Butcher scored 43 goals between them as Cambridge achieved the Southern League 'double' in 1968/69. Bill Leivers' side lost four of their first seven Southern League games before the arrival of Cassidy and Butcher from Chelmsford heralded a considerable improvement. Tony Butcher grabbed a hat-trick in a 5-0 victory at Margate and Cambridge went top for the first time with a 2-0 win over rivals Hillingdon in January. United were unbeaten in their final ten matches, clinching the title with a 3-0 victory over Kettering on the last day and beating Cheltenham 1-0 in the Southern League Cup final.

1973 UNITED'S STAG PARTY

Cambridge clinched promotion as two goals by Ronnie Walton plus Bobby Ross' penalty secured a 3-2 Fourth Division win at home to rivals Mansfield Town on 28th April 1973. Leivers' side lost four of their opening five matches but the arrival of Graham Watson from Doncaster in September coincided with a 15-match unbeaten run that lifted Cambridge to third place in November. United maintained their promotion challenge, signing Bobby Ross from Brentford, but promotion hopes were dented with defeats against Exeter and Hereford. Another run of seven games without defeat set Cambridge up for promotion.

1977 FOURTH DIVISION CHAMPIONS

Ron Atkinson managed United to the Fourth Division title in 1976/77. The U's suffered just two defeats in their opening 18 matches, strengthening the team with Tom Finney from Sunderland and Dave Stringer from Norwich. Cambridge regained pole position as

newcomer Jim Hall scored in a 2-1 win over rivals Bradford City on New Year's Day, then extended their lead at the top with seven straight wins. Tom Finney netted hat-tricks against Southport and Brentford during the closing weeks. Alan Biley was top scorer with 19 goals as United clinched the title with a 0-0 draw at Stockport County on 6th May 1977.

1978 PROMOTION WINNERS

Alan Biley was leading marksman with 21 goals as Cambridge United won promotion in 1977/78. Sammy Morgan was signed from Brighton and Cambridge overcame a poor start, with the arrival of Lindsay Smith and John Cozens strengthening the team. United beat Peterborough 1-0 in front of 10,998 shortly before Atkinson became West Brom's manager in January. John Docherty stepped up to replace him and United went top with a 3-0 win over Plymouth in February. Cambridge lost just one of their final nine matches, clinching promotion as runners-up with a 2-1 victory at home to Exeter City on 29th April 1977.

1992 SECOND DIVISION PLAY- OFFS

Cambridge United so nearly became founder members of the FA Premier League in 1991/92. Beck's side kicked off in the Second Division with three straight wins, then trounced Leicester 5-1 and went top of the table with a 12-match unbeaten run. They faltered after Christmas but revived automatic promotion hopes with four wins in five matches, including a 6-1 demolition of Bristol Rovers. Top scorer Dublin and Claridge netted 27 goals between them as Cambridge qualified for the Second Division Play-Offs in fifth position. They drew 1-1 with Leicester in the semi-final first-leg but lost 5-0 in the second-leg.

DID YOU KNOW?

The Town have only lost one of the past 14 league (including Conference) meetings between the clubs.

That one Cambridge win came in the Conference at Kenilworth Road in September 2011. It remains United's sole league win on Bedfordshire soil, although the U's have won four times overall including in cup ties.

You have to go back to October 2000 for Cambridge's last home win against the Hatters in the League – a 2-1 win at the Abbey in Division 2 (now League 1). However, United beat the Town 2-1 in the FA Cup third round last season and went on to draw with Manchester United in fourth round, earning a replay at Old Trafford.

United's last visit here a year ago saw the Town come out on top in a five-goal thriller. The Hatters led 3-0 at the break thanks to goals from Jonathan Smith, Andy Drury and Luke Wilkinson. Cambridge dominated the second half and pulled two goals back but despite an inspired performance from Cameron McGeehan the visitors couldn't force an equaliser.

The Hatters beat Cambridge 9-1 in an FA Cup fourth qualifying tie at Kenilworth Road 106 years ago. It wasn't until 1978 that the two sides met in League competition.

The Hatters are unbeaten at home in the Football League against United, winning four and drawing four of these games down the years. The first three Football League meetings at Kenilworth Road against the U's ended in draws between 1978 and 1981. The Hatters' first home League win over United came thanks to a Brian Horton winner in a 1-0 victory in 1982.

Since September 2009 the Hatters have met United no less than 18 times in the past six years. The Town have lost just four times in these meetings, winning seven while drawing seven too. The two clubs have met three times in the FA Trophy (Cambridge winning two of these) and twice in the FA Cup (one win each, both at the Abbey).

Of Cambridge's nine wins over the Town, seven have been by the odd goal. United have twice won by a two-goal margin and both came courtesy of 3-1 victories. The first came at the Abbey Stadium in November 1999, the other in an FA Trophy tie in December 2009.

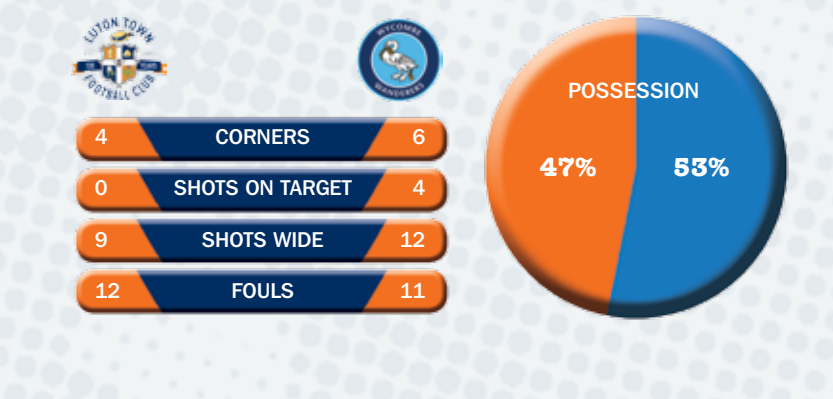

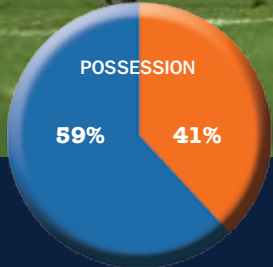

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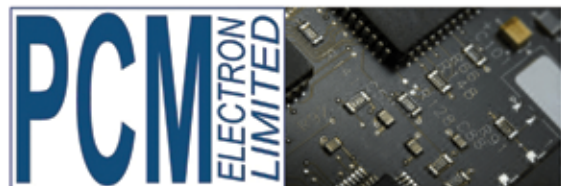

The ground

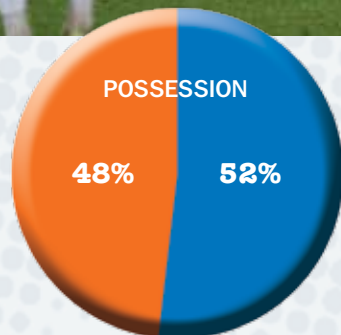

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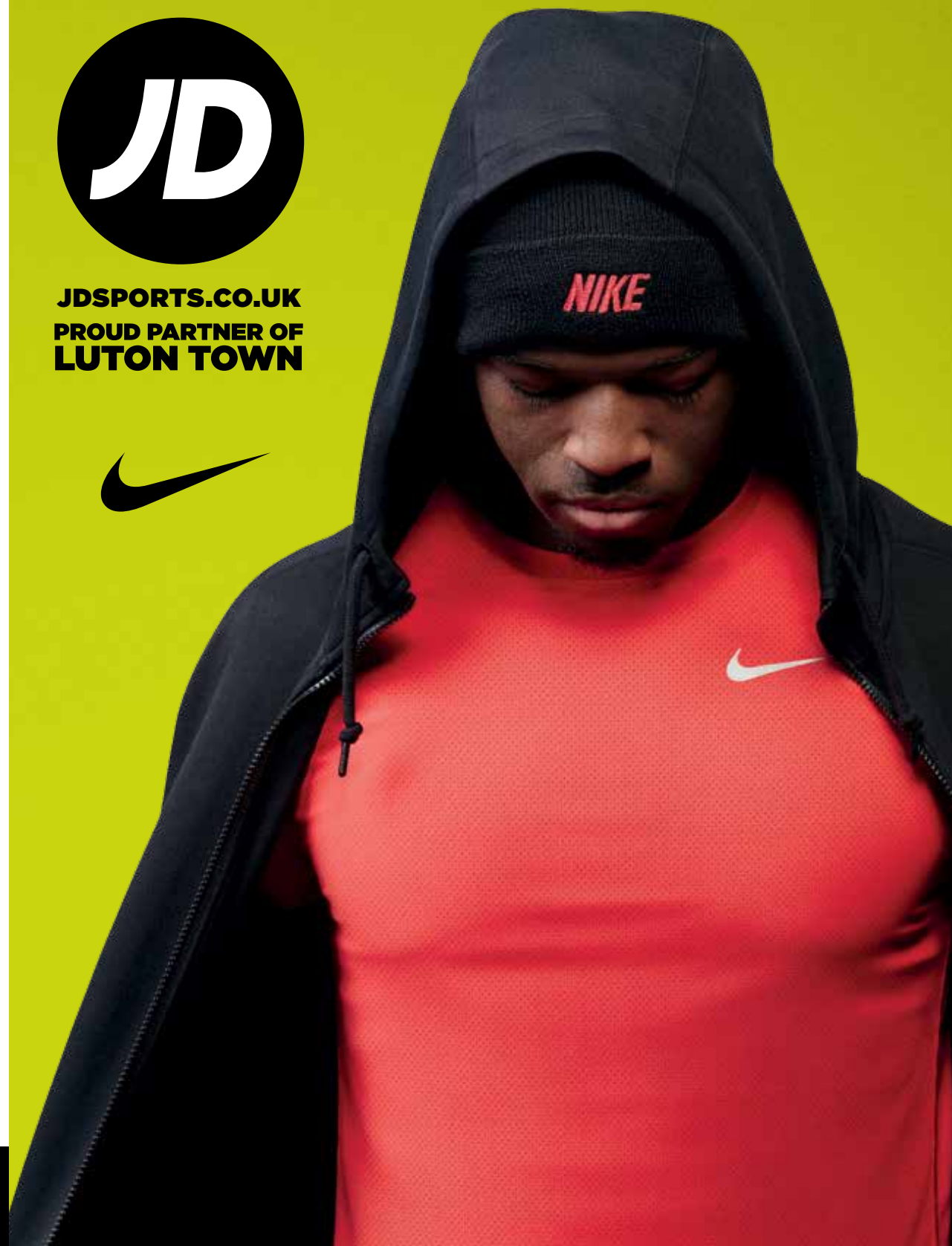
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DIRECTOR FOR A DAY

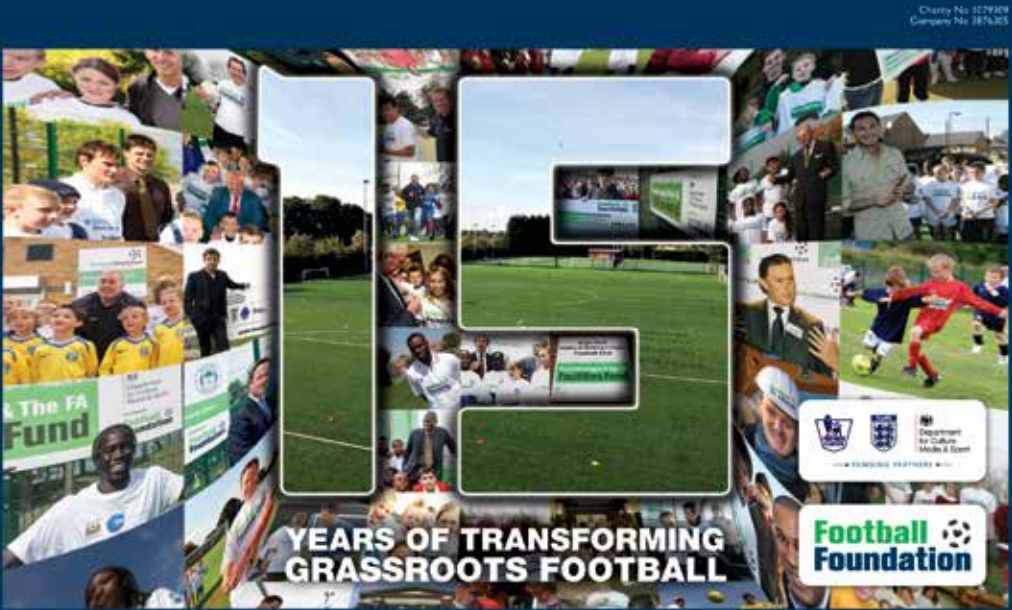

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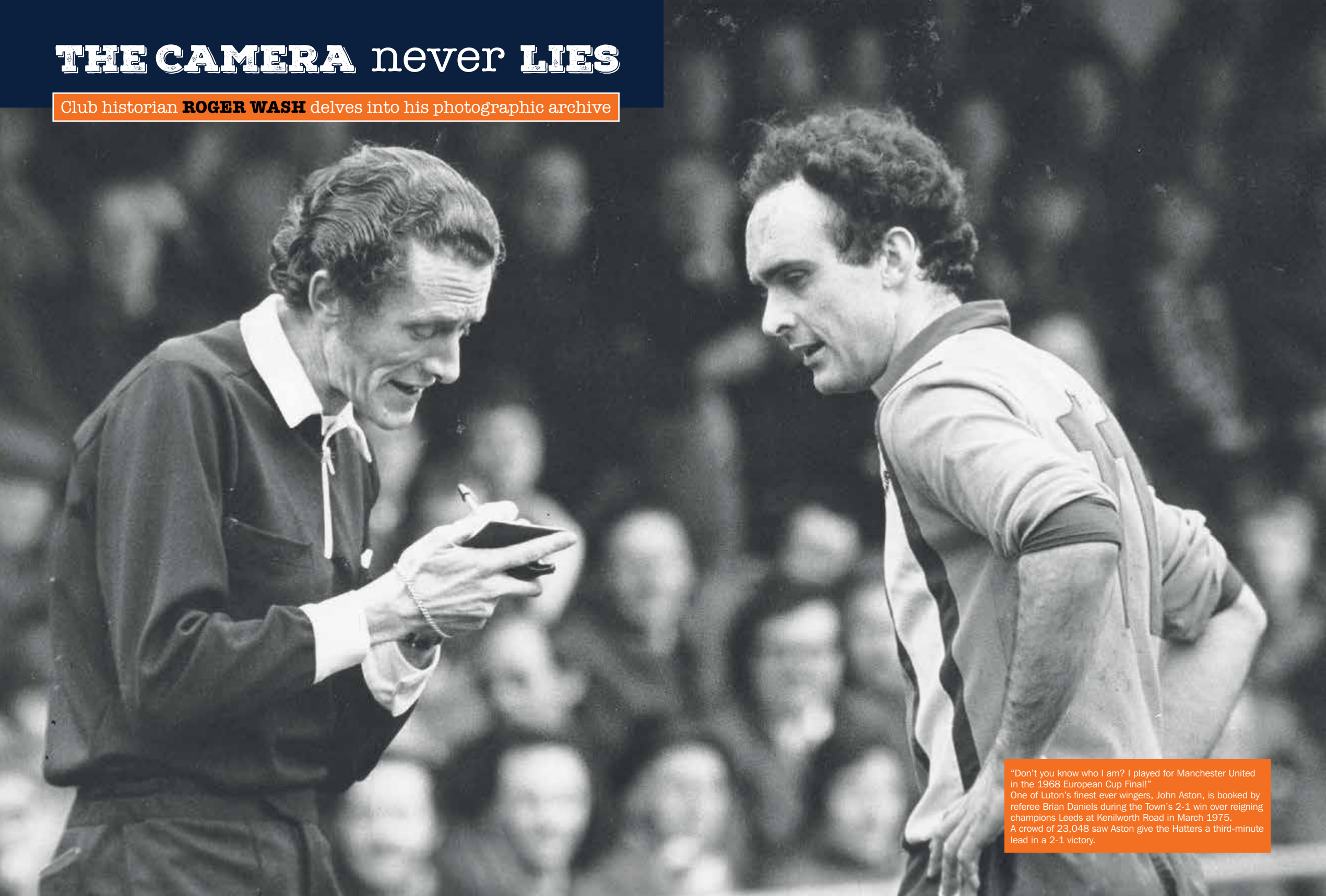

THE CAMERA never LIES

Club historian **ROGER WASH** delves into his photographic archive



"Don't you know who I am? I played for Manchester United in the 1968 European Cup Final!"
One of Luton's finest ever wingers, John Aston, is booked by referee Brian Daniels during the Town's 2-1 win over reigning champions Leeds at Kenilworth Road in March 1975.
A crowd of 23,048 saw the Hatters give the Hatters a third-minute lead in a 2-1 victory.

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IN THE HATTERS HOTSEAT

In welcoming Nathan Jones to Kenilworth Road on becoming our 31st manager, he also becomes one of the elite band of 13 who have also played for the club.

The Hatters were a little late out of the blocks when appointing their first manager as by 1925, when we selected the little known George Thompson, most clubs had a manager in place. Up until this point the directors scouted for players and picked the team but pressure from the supporters led to the Board bowing to the inevitable and appointing Thompson although they still reserved the right to pick the team!

Thompson did not last long and the Board did not hurry themselves in picking a successor, leaving it two years before appointing John McCartney who had played for the club in the 1890s and came to Kenilworth Road with a good managerial pedigree.



David Pleat, the Town's
longest serving manager

Sadly, his two years at the club were dogged by illness but his spell was only bettered in length by Harold Wightman in the period leading up to the war. It is worth pointing out that we were 'between managers' when the untried Joe Payne was picked to play against Bristol Rovers in 1936 with the 22-year-old bagging 10 goals in the 12-0 win.

After the War, Dally Duncan enjoyed 11 years at the helm, initially as player-manager, and saw the club rise to the top flight. He departed though, in October 1958 just as the club embarked on the run to Wembley for the 1959 FA Cup final. The selection of the team by 'committee' during that run caused a great deal of upset at the time and has not been repeated since.

The club plummeted through the divisions in the early 1960s and it was not until the appointing of ex-player Allan Brown did the Town show signs of rising back to their rightful place. Brown was dismissed in unfortunate circumstances with his successors Alec Stock and Harry Haslam enjoying some good times on the field, each with a promotion to their name.

After Haslam left the club for Sheffield United, the Hatters made the brave decision to



John Moore whose 12 months in charge saw the Town finish in their highest spot in their history – seventh in the top flight in 1986/87

appoint untried and untested David Pleat to the hot seat and what a masterstroke that proved. Playing free flowing and cavalier football Pleat set the Hatters up for ten years at the top and although he had left for Tottenham by the time of the unforgettable 1988 Littlewoods Cup final win over Arsenal the nucleus of the side were still Pleat signings.

Pleat returned to the club for a less successful four year spell in the 1990s to become our longest-serving manager overall and since then Joe Kinnear earned a promotion in 2002, Mike Newell did the same in 2005, Mick Harford oversaw a Wembley win in 2009 while John Still put together the side that won promotion back to the Football League in 2014.

By the time you read this Nathan Jones will no longer be the Luton Town manager in charge for the shortest period of time – Jack Crompton was appointed on 29th June 1962 but resigned a week later!

We are really encouraging everyone to come along if you want a bit of company or maybe bring along your elderly relative or neighbour for the first time to overcome any shyness or nerves. We are sure after their first visit they will want to visit the Kenny every week whether they are a football fan or not as lots of the activities we plan will have nothing to do with football.

The Ladies endured an extremely tough FA Cup away tie at Brighton & Hove Albion having won three previous ties.

The Seagulls are currently the highest ranked team in the country and they named a full strength team for the tie.

The hosts began at a high tempo playing some fine flowing football but the Town kept their shape and discipline and withstood the early onslaught with Rachel Evans making two full stretch saves pushing shots around the post.

It was proving difficult for Luton to relieve the pressure as Albion kept the ball well and were patient in their build up. Town finally conceded the opening goal after half-an-hour following a surging run down the wing and low cross which was finished from close range.

A similar second followed five minutes later but Town were unlucky not to pull a goal back following a 50-yard run and shot from Natasha Fensome. A cruel third goal arrived on the stroke of half-time when the ball bounced off the top of the crossbar back into play and was volleyed home.

The second half was another difficult one for the Town as Brighton continued their relentless pressure and in spite of a huge and determined effort from the Town players, and notably the defence, the home side ran in a further four second half goals to



record a 7-0 win. Evans made a number of saves during a busy second half including a penalty and a team with less character would have collapsed under the weight of pressure.

Manager Nikki Baker said: "Brighton are probably the strongest team we have ever played. They openly state they have Champions League ambitions within four years and with the structure and backing they have in place I would not bet against them.

"They do the simple things very well and left us chasing shadows

for much of the time.

"What I must say is that I am very proud of the way our team played and competed and our defence and in particular keeper Rachel Evans had the game of her life.

"Sometimes you just have to credit the opposition and say they were too strong on the day for us.

"The Seagulls entertain Super League Oxford United in the next round and I would be surprised if they didn't win that tie as well. We must now regroup and aim to finish our league campaign strongly."

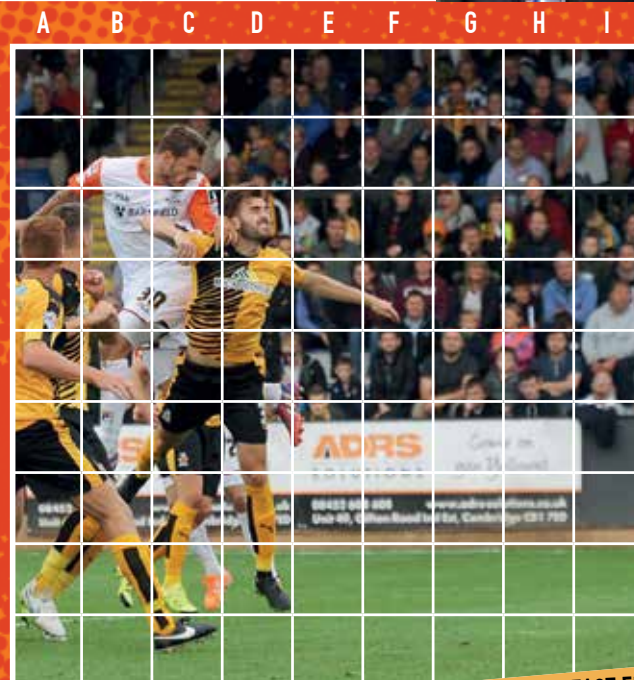

During a Swiss league match between Zurich and FC Thun in 2013, the referee was forced to stop play for almost five minutes as a pesky pine marten traversed the pitch.

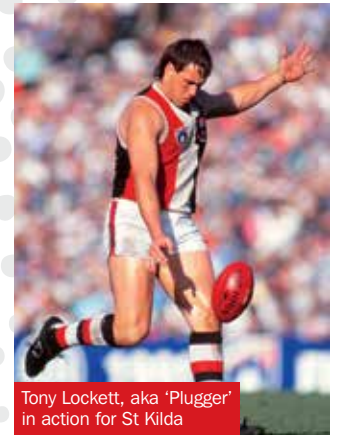

So it's a case of the king is dead, long live the king after Nathan Jones was appointed as Luton Town's new manager last week.

The former Brighton & Hove Albion first team coach was appointed as John Still's successor and then unveiled to the media just over a week ago now.

As far as first impressions go, it was a hugely impressive one from Jones during his opening press conference as he spoke intelligently, with a pretty obvious burning passion and desire to make the most of his chance at Kenilworth Road.

Although in his first managerial post, it's hard not to be impressed with Jones' extensive coaching background, from his time at Yeovil, Charlton and the Seagulls.

Despite being a proud Welshman, he's helped out with England too, assisting Under-21 boss Gareth Southgate as he prepared his side for the European Championships in the Czech Republic, and is especially highly rated within the game.

On paper it seems the ideal fit for Luton as they look to 'effectively restructure and rethink the way we do things' according to chief executive Gary Sweet, with more emphasis being paid to the technical side of things than perhaps it has been in the past.

It was also refreshing to hear Jones discuss bringing home-grown

players through, which is definitely an area Hatters have struggled with in recent seasons.

Only Zane Banton has featured in a league game, and that was back in the Conference days, during the last few moments at Woking, with Luton already 4-0 to the good.

With Hatters' current crop of Under-18s potentially some of the best the club has seen in years, reaching the FA Youth Cup fourth round and winning the title this season, Jones could be the perfect man to bring them through after spending a year in charge of the Charlton Under-21s.

Talk is cheap, though, as we all know, and it's results on the pitch that Jones will be judged on, something he is no doubt well aware of.

Automatic promotion might already be gone, but there remains a chance of a Play-Off berth, especially if Luton can sort out their wretched home form, beginning with the visit of Cambridge this afternoon.



The game might not have as much edge to it as in recent times, now a certain Richard Money has vacated the United dugout, but rest assured, there will be no quarter given by either side.

Jones hasn't promised he can deliver promotion by the end of the season, but has big plans for his tenure with the Hatters.

Bringing an attacking brand of football back to the frustrated watching faithful at Kenilworth Road would go some way to getting supporters behind him immediately though.

And you never know, if results go Town's way today, then those Play-Off places might not start to look as far away as they have been.
