NOTES FROM THE MANAGER

GOOD AFTERNOON AND WELCOME BACK TO KENILWORTH ROAD TO YOU ALL FOR TODAY'S SKY BET LEAGUE 2 GAME BETWEEN OURSELVES AND MANSFIELD TOWN.

I'd like to welcome Adam Murray and his staff and players and everyone associated with the Stags to Bedfordshire today. They have started the season well with a win at Notts County and a resounding 4-0 victory over Crawley last weekend.

It has been a while since my last notes, stretching back to the Johnstone's Paint Trophy game with Leyton Orient. That night I was particularly pleased with the performance because we played some good football in what turned out to be an enjoyable, end-to-end tie.

As we did in the Capital One Cup we put in a decent performance and that led us nicely into the game at Cambridge. In my time at Luton the fixture with them is always portrayed as cup tie-type of game, probably because Richard Money is an ex-manager here. I think Richard builds that up a bit, because for me it's just another game that we try to win.

As ever, this was a keenly-contested match. Both sets of players and supporters were up for it and I thought 1-1 at half-time

was about right. We played quite well, while they had their threats from set-pieces.

ASCENDANCY

Having been pleased at the break I thought we started the second half well and we were in the ascendancy when they had their man sent-off. I was pleased with our overall performance and with the quality of our goals. Luke's strike was first class and the last goal finished by Danny was a top-drawer move. I felt we fully deserved to record our first win of the season and was pleased with the overall application and attitude of the players.


Then came Notts County last weekend. It's one of those games where I don't really know how to describe. Notts are a side who will be there or thereabouts and, like

us, they have started the season a bit slowly. On the day we found ourselves 2-0 down without doing too much wrong. However, I was delighted with our response to come back to 2-2 with goals from Cameron and Jonathan. But to lose late in the game, with what we thought was a disputed free-kick, was tough to take. We did actually appeal against Scott's red card. We all thought it was harsh but ultimately the authorities found in favour of the referee.

It was a weird feeling afterwards because having come back so strongly to equalise we looked like going on to win the game but, obviously it wasn't the case.

IMPROVEMENT

We've worked hard and spent many hours attempting to find an answer to how we can turn the corner. I've noticed there has been an improvement in our performances as the season has progressed but the bottom line is that we are conceding too many goals. Goal-scoring hasn't been a problem but defensively we have struggled, which is not a trait my



teams are usually associated with. It was a case of getting back on the training pitch and working on how to solve the problem. Scoring two goals at Notts County should be enough for a team like us not to get beat, and that is disappointing. As a whole team: the squad, the staff and myself we need to take a long look at ourselves and ask what are we doing wrong.

I must end by touching on the support that we have received in the last two away games and I must thank all of those supporters who made the trips

to Cambridge and Notts County. It was absolutely fantastic to see so many of you at both matches.

Here's hoping we can make something of our next two home games here and push on. Performances have been improving but it's vital we stop conceding goals – beginning this afternoon.

Please get behind your team, let's move forward together, up the table and here's to celebrating some good times.

From the BOARDROOM

WITH DIRECTOR **MIKE HERRICK**

A WARM WELCOME TO ALL OF YOU THIS AFTERNOON, PARTICULARLY THE OFFICIALS, PLAYERS AND SUPPORTERS WHO HAVE MADE THE INEVITABLY SLOW JOURNEY DOWN THE M1 FROM MANSFIELD (MOSTLY AT 50 MPH), AND ALSO TO OUR OWN SUPPORTERS WHOSE ENCOURAGEMENT DURING THIS RATHER STUTTERING START TO OUR SEASON IS MUCH ADMIRED AND APPRECIATED.

Regarding our current position in the League 2 table, different people react differently to certain situations

Some struggle to stay positive when things are not going as well as they would like, whereas others are able to take setbacks in their stride.

I always aim to place myself in the latter camp but I can understand both points of view. Other engagements have meant that I've had to miss a couple of recent home games but I find it more frustrating on those occasions when I'm reduced to following our progress by text or live commentary rather than actually watching in person.

It is galling to witness the goals we have conceded at the very end of games, particularly so last week at Notts County after such a strong recovery.

I know that the players themselves feel the anguish just as much as we do and I also know that they will respond in the right way to address these issues.

Defeats on the pitch may hurt us in the short term but the prizes are only awarded at the end of the season.

If Mo Farah was near the rear of the field after three-and-a-half laps of a 10,000m race (approximately the distance we've travelled so far this season) then that would not be as much of a concern as if he were near the back after 25 laps.

RISING

We can't always lead from the front and we're convinced that our team will come good given patience and support. By rising up through the field maybe our journey is destined to become that little bit more exciting!

It may be a long and arduous battle but nothing worth achieving comes easily. It does, however,



become easier if we all see it through together.

This season our aim is, and still remains, very definitely, to be promoted.

As a Board member I don't consider it my place to involve myself in selecting the team or the tactics – that is a job for those much more highly qualified than me.

DIRECTION

The Board is responsible for setting the direction of the club and giving it the best possible chance of success. We do this by investing the necessary funds each season in order to approve a budget in line with our ambitions.

This year, as you know, we have sanctioned the signing of a number of quality players who, we feel, will be able to deliver this success and move us to the next level.

Alongside this we have a massive enthusiasm for the Club and its welfare.

Many thanks to the 1,700 of you who supported the team at Notts County last Saturday

What we don't have, unfortunately, is a magic wand to make it all happen instantly.

Like us, Mansfield have managed recently to escape from the Football Conference where we each spent a number of years in the attempt to gain promotion.

CLOSE-FOUGHT

Past matches between ourselves have invariably been close-fought encounters and today's game looks to be no different.

Perhaps the most abiding memory for the 19,315 who were present at Kenilworth Road that day in 1968 was to witness 'that' goal by Graham French which is the subject of an extended article elsewhere in this programme. What price a repeat today?

Meanwhile it is with particular pleasure that today we are able to welcome as our guests June and Anne – the wives of two of our most respected former players – Bob Morton and Wally Shanks.

I was just seven months old when Bob made his debut in 1948 and he went on, of course,

to make 562 appearances in all competitions in a career with Luton spanning 15 years – a record which is likely to remain for all time.

EXPLOITS

I remember Wally not for his on-field exploits – his last game for us was just before I first visited Kenilworth Road – but as half of the double act 'Shanks & Turner, Sports Outfitters' from where I and many others of our generation bought their first pair of football boots (and the dubbin to protect them with) from their shop in Dunstable Road.

June and Anne, your husbands are part of the fabric and folklore of Luton Town and we hope you enjoy the many memories of them that we share with so much affection.

So...hold on tight and enjoy the journey.

THIS IS YOUR CAPTAIN SPEAKING...

It's been a contrasting week for us after our first league win of the season at Cambridge was followed by another last-minute sucker punch at Notts County last weekend.

At Cambridge I thought we played really well and thoroughly deserved the three points. They might have had a man sent-off but I don't think that would have made much difference in the second half. Some of the football we played, especially after half-time, was excellent and just reward for our efforts. I must also congratulate Guts for an absolutely stunning strike in the first half to get us in front. What a hit. I couldn't believe it when I heard someone else had won goal of the weekend instead!

From the highs of winning at Cambridge came the now frustrating despair of conceding yet another last minute goal to leave us pointless at Notts County last weekend. Conceding goals has not been a major issue for us since I've been at the club but it is becoming a real concern at the moment.



Looking back at the goals we have conceded so far shows that it is down to individual error. There haven't been times when teams have cut us open. In a way that is good. Why? Well because I know we have the quality and experience to cut out the mistakes and improve. We can't quite put our finger on why we are conceding goals – and especially late ones – but believe me we are all working hard in finding a way to put things right.

At the other end scoring goals has been no issue. We struggled at times last season, in particular in the second half of last season, but with the creativity and firepower we have on the books now I am not surprised. Keep clean sheets, however, is what we need to start doing. We know we have the ability in the team to score and keep it tight at the back, we just have to start putting that into practise. If you score two goals away from home you should stand a good chance of winning football matches. But we've lost 3-2 twice away from home now and we really must get our act together if we're to be successful this season.

Looking at the table it doesn't make pretty reading. I said at the start of the season that our goal is to win promotion and to do so by winning the title. That is the expectation in the dressing room and it's an expectation which hasn't changed. It doesn't put any

pressure on us because we are an experienced group of players. We have a squad, and a management team, that knows what it takes to win promotion. I believe it is only a matter of time before things click and an unbeaten run puts us in a position where we want to be.

However, there are no easy games in this league. That might sound like an over-used cliché, but there genuinely aren't any easy matches. Today we host Mansfield for the first of two must win home matches with AFC Wimbledon due here next weekend. Kenilworth Road has been a fortress for us in the past and it's time we made it one again starting this afternoon. Any team with promotion aspirations should be winning their majority of home games and it's important that we get back on track and get back to winning ways.

We can take confidence from the performance at Cambridge and the spell we had at Notts County to get back into the game at 2-2. And we can take heart from your support, too. We need a result today so get behind us.

THE HOME MATCHES HERE CONTINUE TO COME THICK AND FAST AS NEXT SATURDAY THE HATTERS WELCOME AFC WIMBLEDON TO KENILWORTH ROAD

WHO? AFC Wimbledon, aka the Wombles, the club which formed as recently as 2002 following the 'old' Wimbledon's decision to move to Milton Keynes. Their rise through the pyramid has been one of football's success stories. They began life in the Combined Counties League and won five promotions in eight seasons to reach the Football League.

DON'T REMIND US. Their final promotion came at the hands of the Hatters in 2011 when they defeated us on penalties in a shootout at the City of Manchester Stadium in the Conference Play-Off final.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?

The Town and the former Wimbledon were adversaries in the top-flight during the 1980s, including a FA Cup semi-final meeting which the Dons won on their way to lifting the trophy in 1988. However, against AFC Wimbledon, the Hatters have only won one of the seven meetings. That came at Kenilworth Road in a 3-0 win in September 2010 with George Pilkington, Zdenek Kroca and Matthew Barnes-Homer on target. The first meeting between the two clubs was the Hatters' first in the Conference (a 1-1 draw at Kingsmeadow in August 2009),

while last season the Wombles did the double over the Town; winning 1-0 at Kenilworth Road and 3-2 at Kingsmeadow.

IN CHARGE. At the helm for his second season in charge is former Wimbledon defender Neal Ardley. An England Under-21 international, Ardley played over 300 times for the old club before going onto play for Watford, Cardiff and Millwall. He took charge of AFC in October 2012, and last season he guided the Wombles to their highest Football League position of 15th.

PREVIOUS FORM. Wimbledon go into their home game against Notts County this afternoon in 13th place in the table having won two, drawn three and lost two of their first seven games this season. Ardley's side lost two of their first three matches (both at home to Plymouth and Cambridge). The Dons are, therefore, unbeaten away from Kingsmeadow. Last Saturday they drew 1-1 at Yeovil.

ONE TO WATCH.

The Wombles' talisman is none other than striker Adebayo Akinfenwa, who gave the Hatters defence a torrid time in two matches last term. He scored 15 goals in his debut season at Kingsmeadow, including a goal

against Liverpool in the FA Cup. He has two goals to his name already this season and is now just 11 short of 150 goals in the Football League in his career.

DID YOU KNOW?

Our visitors next weekend hold the record of the longest unbeaten run of league matches in English senior football, having played 78 consecutive league games without a defeat between February 2003 and December 2004.





It gives us great pleasure to welcome everyone associated with Mansfield Town to Kenilworth Road for our fourth home League 2 fixture of the season.

Tipped for a season of struggle by the bookies and pundits following a poor season last term – that saw them score just 38 goals, the fewest in the division – our visitors arrive in Bedfordshire buoyed by a fantastic start to the new campaign.

Manager Adam Murray, who spent a short spell here at Kenilworth Road in 2010, is, at 33, one of the youngest managers in the Football League. And his side have started the season in flying form, with the Stags currently occupying seventh place in the League 2 table.

Our visitors have only tasted defeat once so far this season and make the trip down the M1 today buoyed by a fantastic 4-0 win over Crawley in their last match last week. Their sole defeat so far was a 1-0 defeat at Accrington, but two of their three wins this season have been on their travels, with a 2-0 win at local rivals Notts County a 2-1 victory at York City.

Murray and the Field Mill faithful have every reason to be

optimistic of a better campaign this time around following the club's recruitment in the summer. The most exciting face to move to Mansfield over the close season was Matt Green. The prolific striker rejoined the Stags from Birmingham having left in 2013 after scoring the goals that helped the club win promotion from the Conference. He's got three goals in six games so far and was instrumental in their win over Crawley last weekend.

Green isn't the only former Stag to return to the club before this season began with midfielder Adam Chapman signing from Newport and experienced forward Chris Beardsley also back for a second spell.

With the presence of hugely experienced goalkeeper Brian Jensen between the sticks and with Green working in tandem in attack with Craig Westcarr, the Stags' confidence of a better season this time around is justified.

And the visitors in the Oak Road end this afternoon will be hoping

their side can continue their decent record against the Hatters. The Town beat the Stags in the corresponding fixture at Kenilworth Road last season, but that Hatters victory is only our win in nine matches against Mansfield.

The Town have won only eight of 30 matches against the Stags in all competitions, but prior to their defeat here last year our visitors won on their previous visit back in February 2013. A late winner gave Mansfield a 3-2 win which went a good way towards them lifting the Conference title that season.

From the OAK ROAD

Fancied for a return back to the Conference after a disappointing campaign last season, Mansfield Town are fast becoming a team to watch. Stags club historian **Paul Taylor** reveals why there's a buzz at Field Mill

THE SEASON AHEAD...

 The Stags are tipped to struggle this season by the experts and bookies. But forget that, what's the supporter expectation at Field Mill this season?

 Considering the way we finished last season, eight defeats in the last nine games, it came as little surprise when we were tipped to struggle this time around. However in the close season Adam Murray has built a new squad with the arrival of 15 new players and, particularly as one of them is Matt Green, this has buoyed the supporters' confidence. In general the performances so far this season would indicate that we will not be near the foot of the table and a much better season lies ahead.

 Adam Murray is one of the youngest managers in the Football League. What's he like, what do you expect from him and, having done so well as a player, is there less pressure on him to succeed?

 Adam is a hero in Mansfield, having played a crucial part in our promotions in 2002 and 2013. Perhaps because of this the fans have been more tolerant particularly when we were struggling towards the end of last season. However the pressure is still on to succeed, particularly now that he has brought in his own players. His post-match

interviews show that he is as disappointed as any fan when the team performance is not up to scratch but equally elated when we do succeed.

 This is your third season back in the Football League following promotion from the Conference. How happy are you to be back in among the League, and what do you miss - if anything - from playing in non-league?

 It was one of the greatest days of my life when the whistle blew at the end of our last game in the Conference and the realization that the Stags were back. On the playing side I have not missed much about non-league, even when we were at the wrong of the table last spring. However, the Conference's idea of playing back-to-back local derbies over Christmas was a good one, particularly when I look at this year's fixture list and on Boxing Day we have a long trip to Morecambe and I don't say that with any disrespect for Morecambe.

 You've started the season well, winning at Notts County must have been a real confidence booster? Has that result risen expectations going forward? Can the Stags surprise the so-called experts and mount a promotion challenge?

 The win at Notts County was exceptional, particularly for me as I live in Nottingham and some of my mates are County fans so I have the bragging rights at the moment.

ago with every game. Due to serious injury he played very little football during his two years away. A player of his quality will always score goals, this is something we sorely missed last season as our 'goals for' column showed (38 goals from 46 matches, the leading goal scorer has a meagre total of seven goals). Yes, hopes are high!

 Apart from Green, who is the one player in the Stags ranks to keep tabs on this year?

 Jack Thomas is the one to watch. The 19-year-old local lad came through the youth ranks and into the side towards the end of last season and was a breath of fresh air. He plays in centre midfield, tackles well, can pass the ball and is not afraid to take opponents on. He scored our goal of the season in the last home game of 2014/15 against Portsmouth.

 Matt Green scored the goals that fired you to promotion that year but left to join Birmingham. He's back now, though...is he the same player? Do you have high hopes of more goals this season?

 Matt is back and is looking more like the player we had two years

What do you expect from today's game? What's your prediction? Are you looking forward to the lack of leg room in the away end?

At the moment I would take a point. Luton have not made a good start but I think you will soon be rising up the table. Of course I am predicting that Mansfield will win 2-1, it will be a hard fought game. The seating in your away end is not the most comfortable but having sat in Accrington's visitors seats it is not the worst either! When I stood up there after last season's visit there I had forgotten I had a left leg. This year I stood behind the goal, at least I could still walk when I left.

We dominated the game from start to finish and over 2,700 Stags fans were there to see it too. That game certainly raised expectations as we now know what the team is capable of but we were brought down to earth the following game with a poor performance in a 1-0 defeat at Accrington. It is too early to talk of promotion or promotion challenges but in this game anything can happen so who knows...

SEASONS PAST...

 Tell us about you. Why do you support Mansfield? When did it all start? What was your first game? What do you remember about it?

Although I have lived in Nottingham for the last 40 years I am Mansfield born and bred and have been travelling back for matches over that time. I first went to Field Mill in 1968 and saw a 1-1 draw with Tranmere Rovers. I don't remember too much of the game itself but what I do remember the admission price was two shillings (10p) and the programme was 9 pence (about 4p), bring back the old days I say! My first professional game was a week earlier when my uncle took me to watch Nottingham Forest play at home to Leeds United, that was more memorable but

Club historian ROGER WASH tells the story of the match behind today's programme cover

LUTON TOWN 4 MANSFIELD TOWN 2

FOOTBALL LEAGUE DIVISION THREE
18TH SEPTEMBER 1968

Newly promoted Luton Town started the 1968/69 season just as they had finished the previous campaign – in winning form.

The huge sum of £90,000 had been spent that summer on Mike Harrison, Laurie Sheffield and Brian Lewis and the new boys made their debut in a 4-0 hammering of Oldham on the opening day. The sun shone down on the 14,747 crowd who watched Harrison, Lewis, Keith Allen and Fred Jardine score the goals that brought about a good humoured pitch invasion at the end.

A hard fought 0-0 draw at Barrow followed, which set up a home game against relegated Rotherham. Another sun drenched crowd saw Bruce Rioch score twice in the first 15 minutes to set up a sparkling 3-1 win as the Hatters became early season League leaders.


With the Town support at fever pitch the lead at the top was consolidated the following Wednesday night when Barnsley were seen off 5-1 before a crowd of 15,899. The game included a goal from Rioch, who beat four men in a run from his own half, which will be fondly remembered by those fortunate enough to be there.

The good form continued with a 3-1 win at Gillingham, a 0-0 draw at Orient and another home victory, this time against Tranmere, leading up to the long awaited home clash with second placed Mansfield.

Enthusiasm had reached a high point and a crowd of 19,315 was present to see the game open in amazing fashion when golden boy Rioch was dismissed for allegedly striking an opponent following a goalmouth melee.

The local evening newspaper carried a series of photographs in its next edition in an attempt to vindicate Rioch, but a simple reference to the 5,000 behind the Oak Road goal would have saved all the bother!

BELLIGERENT

The sense of injustice felt by the team and the crowd, who were to be deprived of a player for 87 minutes, meant that the rest of the match was played in an unreal atmosphere which bordered on the belligerent.

As so often happens in these cases, the 10 men fought like 12 and their sheer persistence was rewarded by a doubtful penalty duly tucked away by Harrison midway through the first half. The second period opened with Mansfield

determined to make the extra man tell and with the Town tiring, Doug Jones netted an equaliser. With the Town down to nine men for periods when both John Moore and Terry Branston had to leave the field for running repairs, they were beginning to look a sorry sight, but were then thrown a lifeline by the inconsistent referee.

Mansfield's Phil Waller was sent off for an innocuous tackle on Lewis and it appeared at the time that the official was attempting to level the sides up once more.

The Hatters now found fresh reserves of energy and four minutes later Sheffield headed home a Harrison cross before Lewis scored a solo goal to put the game beyond doubt.

The drama was not yet over, though, with French collecting the

ball in his own penalty area and then proceeding to lop the length of the pitch, beating three players and the goalkeeper in the process before firing home. A fantastic goal on a fantastic evening.

Many say that the goal was the finest seen on the Kenilworth Road pitch and that if the cameras were there they would still be replaying it today. Certainly I have never seen a better goal but credit should be given to Lewis who took defenders with him on a mazy decoy run.

THE PROGRAMME



Nothing much to write home about with the Town's 20-page programme which was merely an elongated version of the offering that had grown steadily worse over the previous eight years.

In the Club Notes section it is mentioned that the Town players were travelling to Brighton the following day for a bit of rest and recreation before their clash with Albion at the weekend – it did not work as we lost!

Attempts were also being made to screen the forthcoming League Cup tie at Goodison Park against Everton by closed circuit television. If it did become a definite then a 15,000 crowd would be needed to break even. In the event it was not screened and we went down 5-1 to one of the best sides I have ever seen.

One of the adverts offered the new Vauxhall Viva at £650 including purchase tax. With 'space – curve' styling and coil spring suspension, how could you refuse?

DEFINING MOMENTS

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN **LEIGH EDWARDS** SELECTS EIGHT KEY MATCHES AND MOMENTS THAT HAVE SHAPED MANSFIELD TOWN'S POST-WAR ERA

1969 FA CUP GIANTKILLERS

Mansfield Town swept to a 3-0 FA Cup fifth round victory over West Ham in front of 21,117 at Field Mill on 26th February 1969, the first time the Stags had ever defeated a top-flight side. The Hammers, including World Cup trio Bobby Moore, Geoff Hurst and Martin Peters, missed several chances before Dudley Roberts gave Mansfield the lead after 22 minutes. Ray Keeley doubled the Stags' advantage on 37 minutes and Nick Sharkey killed off the opponents four minutes into the second half. The match had been postponed five times because of heavy snowfalls and because of this the Stags appeared for the first and only time so far in the semi-final draw.

1975 STAGS IN SEVENTH HEAVEN

The Stags clinched the Fourth Division title with a thrilling 7-0 victory over Scunthorpe United at Field Mill on 21st April 1975. Dave Smith's side had lost only six games all season and went ahead with goals by Ray Clarke and Gordon Hodgson in a seven minute spell midway through the first half. Terry Eccles made it three on 49 minutes and John Lathan added another in the 73rd minute. Clarke scored Mansfield's fifth on 77 minutes and Lathan netted his second before Kevin Bird rounded off the historic occasion in the 86th minute. The Stags were the highest scorers in the Football League that season with 90 goals, gaining a then club record 68 points.

1977 THIRD DIVISION CHAMPIONS

Mansfield secured the Third Division title with a 1-0 victory over Wrexham in front of 20,706 at the Racecourse Ground on 14th May 1977. Wrexham desperately needed a win to clinch promotion at Crystal

Palace's expense and piled on the pressure but leading scorer Billy Ashcroft missed two great chances, while 'Player of the Year' Rod Arnold made brilliant saves to deny Graham Whittle and Ashcroft. Mansfield snatched the winner just 90 seconds from time when Kevin Randall crossed for his striking partner Ernie Moss to score his 20th goal of the season. The Stags had reached the Second Division for the first time in the club's history.

1986 PROMOTION WINNERS

Our visitors clinched promotion back to the Third Division with an emphatic 4-0 victory over Hartlepool United at Field Mill on 22nd April 1986. Ian Greaves' side attacked from the start and broke the deadlock on 18 minutes when Keith Cassells glanced in Paul Garner's free-kick. Mansfield doubled their lead after 29 minutes as Cassells' cross was deflected by Tom

Kelly into his own net. Paul Dobson and Tony Smith went close to reducing the deficit before Cassells scored his second goal in the 68th minute. Neville Chamberlain made it four on 81 minutes with his 20th goal of the season to wrap up promotion and start the celebrations on the terraces.

1987 WEMBLEY WINNERS

The Stags defeated holders Bristol City in the Freight Rover Trophy final watched by 58,586 at Wembley Stadium on 24th May 1987. The Stags went ahead through Kevin Kent in the 57th minute and almost scored again soon after when substitute Ian Stringfellow headed against the bar. Keith Cassells and Mark Kearney also went close, while Kevin Hitchcock brilliantly palmed away a David Moyes header. Glyn Riley snatched an equaliser with only three minutes remaining and the match went to penalties after no further goals in extra-time. Hitchcock made two great penalty saves and Tony Kenworthy's spot-kick clinched a 5-4 win in the shoot-out.

1992 FOSTER'S FAVOURITES

George Foster's side clinched promotion with a 2-1 Fourth Division victory at home to Rochdale on 2nd May 1992. The visitors started well and Jason Pearcey had to save bravely from ex-Stags midfielder John Ryan, then Gary Ford cleared Alan Reeves' header off the line. Wayne Fairclough headed against the bar at the other end. Mansfield broke the deadlock on 48 minutes when Phil Stant's shot was hacked off the line but Ian Stringfellow followed up to score. Stant rounded off a sweet four man move to double the Stags' advantage

after 73 minutes. Ford cleared a Mark Leonard shot off the line, then Mark Payne scored Rochdale's last-gasp consolation goal.

2002 WATKISS' WONDERS

Stuart Watkiss' Mansfield side secured promotion with a 2-0 Third Division win over Carlisle United at Field Mill on 20th April 2002. The Stags attacked from the start in front of 8,638, their biggest crowd of the season, taking the lead after five minutes when Wayne Corden scored following a corner. Ian Stevens fired over the bar at the other end before Mansfield doubled their lead on 30 minutes when Andy White blasted the ball home after another corner. The Stags were well on top and strolled through the second half amid a party atmosphere. At the end, thousands of fans ran onto the pitch to celebrate promotion as the defeat of rivals Cheltenham at Plymouth was confirmed.

2013 FOOTBALL LEAGUE RETURN

Mansfield regained Football League status after an absence of five years by winning the Blue Square Premier title in 2012/13. Paul Cox's side suffered a surprise defeat at Braintree with just one week of the season left which enabled Kidderminster Harriers to go a point clear at the top of the table after winning at Wrexham. But Mansfield had a priceless game in hand at Hereford United on 16th April 2013 and the chance to regain pole position. The Stags fought back to force a 2-1 victory with leading scorer Matt Green netting a late winner, giving them a two point advantage on the final day. They clinched the title with a 1-0 win at home to Wrexham.

The Stags were outside the Play-Off places at Christmas time in 2012 before a strong second half of the season saw them surge to the top to win the title

The largest attendance to watch a Luton versus Mansfield game came in September 1968. This game, that the Town won 4-2, is best remembered for the wonder goal scored by Graham French.

Following their relegation to the Conference, the Hatters' first match at Kenilworth Road in the division came against the Stags. The Town also recorded their first in the competition by winning 4-1.

DID YOU KNOW?

Both sides played out five successive draws between March 2011 and November 2012 during both clubs' tenure in the Conference. One of those was a 1-1 draw at Kenilworth Road in an FA Trophy semi-final second leg that saw the Stags win on aggregate to reach the Wembley final.



DUO REFLECT ON CAMBRIDGE VICTORY

Luke Guttridge played down his wonder strike at Cambridge after helping the Town to their first win of the season two weeks ago.

The 33-year-old former United man put the Hatters on their way to victory with a sublime 30-yard shot in the first half.

"Luckily, it has dropped kindly and I've seen the keeper backtracking," explained Guttridge to Hatters Player afterwards. "Sometimes you hit them and they go in and other times they don't. Today it has gone in."

"Instinct took over and I knew the goalkeeper was off his line so I addressed it and tried to get as solid a connection as I could."

"Thankfully I've caught it sweet as a nut and it's gone in. I don't know why the keeper bothered diving!"

Having played an instrumental role in the Hatters' 2-1 win over Leyton Orient in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy in our last home match, and with Paddy McCourt and Cameron McGeehan unavailable, Guttridge kept his place in the starting XI at the Abbey Stadium.

The appearance was the midfielder's first League start of the season and the Town goalscorer hopes his

performances can lead to a regular place in John Still's side.

"From a personal point of view it's just nice to get out and play some games," Guttridge said. "It has been frustrating. I've been 100 per cent fit, training really well and I'm disappointed I've had to wait as long as I have."

"An opportunity has arisen. Cam has been suspended, Paddy is on international duty and I've gone from being in the stands and nowhere near the team to being given a chance and hopefully it give the manager a bit of food for thought."

KICK-START

But three points were the most important aspect of the afternoon and Guttridge believes the Town can now climb the table after recording their first win in League 2.

"It's been what we've needed this season. Something to kick-start us," he said.

"Performances have been better than where the league position puts us but it's a first league win and now we've done that hopefully we can kick on."

Meanwhile, fellow goalscorer Luke Wilkinson hopes the Hatters can build on the win at the Abbey.

The 24-year-old centre-half restored the lead with a bullet header after the home side had cancelled out Guttridge's stunning early strike, before the



GUTTRIDGE'S GOALS

Luke Guttridge scored his 18th goal in Luton colours in what was his 65th appearance for the club. It was just the third time the midfielder had scored a goal away from Kenilworth Road. His two previous strikes on the road came in 5-0 wins at Alfreton and Nuneaton during 2013/14.

Hatters went onto wrap up all three points late on thanks to Danny Green's finish.

"The most disappointing thing about waiting this long for a win is knowing what talent we've got in the squad," Wilkinson told Hatters Player after the win.

"Like the gaffer says, we do tend to start a bit slowly but now's the time to pick it up, there's no more excuses. We've got to push on and climb the league now."

"This first win has been a long time coming. In the second half we came out and really showed what we're made of."





SMITH REFLECTS ON LAST-GASP NOTTS LOSS

Midfielder Jonathan Smith was left disappointed after another late goal cost the Hatters dearly in their 3-2 defeat at Notts County last week.

It was the fourth time the Town had conceded a goal in the 90th minute this season, which sunk the Hatters to a fourth defeat of the campaign.

The set-back was hard to take for Smith with County's last-minute winner harsh on a Town side who had dominated the second half.

"I'm just really disappointed," said Smith afterwards. "We've got to at least take a draw out of that, and even getting a point would have left us wanting more."

An end-to-end first-half left the Hatters going into the break one down, with Izale McLeod getting the first of his two goals just after the half-hour mark, but Smith was confident of a Town fightback.

STRONG

"We were unhappy to go into the break a goal down, but we had the confidence that we were going to be strong enough to come back – just like we did against Cambridge last week. I had a feeling we would, and we proved that, but unfortunately right at the death we've been done.

"Conceding just after half-time is not ideal, but like I said we came out stronger and fought hard to get it back to 2-2 and we were still pushing. Craig [Mackail-Smith] was running them ragged and I thought we were going to find a winner, or at least take something out of the game."

Two goals in the space of five minutes had the Town back on level

terms, with Cameron McGeehan continuing his fine goal-scoring before Smith himself fired home from 25 yards on 76 minutes to make it all square.

Smith insists, however, that he would have traded in his goal for some points from the trip to Meadow Lane.

WORKING

"That goal means nothing now that we've lost – at the time I was happy, obviously, but I would have taken not scoring and for us to have gotten something out of the game," admitted the 28-year-old. "I know I can play a lot better myself so I've got to keep trying and working hard on my game."

"It was a great lay-off from Ryan [Hall] – it set me up perfectly and it was just there to be hit really, and fortunately I caught it right and it went right in the corner. I took a chance and thankfully it paid off."

Smith's strike was all in vain as the Town fell to a Liam Noble free-kick in the third minute of injury time after Scott Cuthbert was sent off.

But Smith insists the centre-back is not the sole cause of the Town's loss.

"Scott's been an absolute warrior for us since he joined the Club," Smith said. "He's probably been our best player this season, so it's hard to have a go at him, but it's

not just down to one player, it's the team too.

"I felt the red card was harsh – there was a tangle of legs and I'm not sure what the rules exactly are, but I felt it was a bit tough."





easyJet Free Schools Visit Project & School Sport Programme

Thanks to continued support from easyjet our free schools visit project, which provides free curriculum time football coaching and PE lessons to all schools within Luton and Bedfordshire, kicked off last week for another season.

In fact this year the project is going from strength to strength thanks to our continued two year funding from the Premier League school sport programme as a result of our Football League status. With easyJet remaining as Community Trust sponsor and the additional Premier League funding this season, Luton Town Community Trust will be visiting over 40 schools and coaching over 1,500 local school children every single week during term time free of charge. That adds up to over 55,000 kids a year and over 1,500 free PE lessons for local schools!

Our free school visit project and school sport programme is designed to provide primary schools with support in improving

the provision of PE and sport and physical activities, both during curriculum and extra-curriculum time. The aim is to provide higher quality, positive experiences for the pupils, enabling positive teaching and learning, alongside increased participation opportunities and playing pathways. This support to schools includes PE curriculum lessons, planning, preparation and assessment (PPA) activities, enrichment sessions, through to breakfast clubs, lunch-time activities and after-school clubs and also a range of competitive opportunities for children, helping inter-school and district schools football programmes.

Football development officer

James Hatch, who oversees the project on behalf of the Community Trust said: "We always have a great response from local schools who have asked us to come in and help with all kinds of requests from running lunch time clubs to coaching the schools' football teams.

"This season with the continued funding from easyJet and the continued grant from the Premier League we will be able to go more schools than ever each week to promote the Club to the next generation of supporters.

"The funding is great because we can now get all of our local schools involved with the Club at no cost to them.



"We hope this project will not only help schools with providing quality PE lessons but also by getting the children involved with Luton Town provide future supporters of the Club and as well as maybe even future academy players who come in as part of our school talent identification programme.

Female Football Development

Another major Trust initiative that easyJet are supporting is our Female Football Development Programme (FFD) in partnership with the Football League Trust and both the FA and Bedfordshire FA. The FFD programme was launched in 2014 in England with a goal to inspire the future female game, aiming to play an integral role in the progression of the women's and girls' game and drive participation growth and retention through the delivery of sessions built around fun, friends, and fitness.

Last season we joined nearly every other Football League club in delivering FFD sessions aimed at 14-25 year-olds in and around Luton and South Beds. Such was the success of our project and the take up from local high schools and colleges that this season our funding has been increased by the FA which will allow us to set up new centres in local schools and colleges to engage with fresh participants in Bedford and Mid-Bedfordshire as part of the new FA women's and girls' programme.



It's a big national programme and overall £2.4m will have been invested over a three year period via Sport England in an attempt to make Women's football the second-most played team sport in England with a target of 40,000 new players.

We hope to play an important part along with all other Football League clubs in helping to account for over a third of the national target, firstly by breaking down elite barriers, so our FFD will offer the opportunity for players of all abilities to join the female football revolution.

We hope many participants will be enjoying their first real kicks, whilst for others, the sessions will aim to reignite a sporting passion, by easing back into playing - but pressure free!

Through our proposed different approaches, such as incorporating music and allowing participants ownership of sessions, we aim to bring the beautiful game to life for women and girls, taking players from disengagement to playing for a team maybe within the space of few weeks.

Of course, new participants falling in love with the game for the first time, or all over again, have numerous pathways to graduate beyond grassroots at the Club through our pro-active partnership with Luton Ladies and whether participants wish to excel in playing, become a coach that inspires the future generation, or maybe combine education with playing in the future, then we now have the opportunity to offer the same through this partnership.





Up the Town.





Forget Delhi Belly - this was Belarus Bowel, with the minnows even contemplating calling off their European Championship qualifier after 16 players were laid low.

Of course, the Luxemburgers aren't the first to suffer at the hands of a malevolent meal. Just ask Spurs, who famously succumbed to a bad batch of lasagne and subsequently lost out on a Champions League place.

TORQUAY v PORTSMOUTH (1999)

Despite several hundred years' worth of advance warning, police in Torquay had forgotten that August 11th 1999, would see Britain's first total eclipse of the sun since 1927.

It was also the date of Torquay's Worthington Cup first round match against Portsmouth. Alas, with national media broadcasting that Torquay was THE place to see the eclipse, the local constabulary decided they simply didn't have the manpower to deal with expected crowds and, unable to halt the eclipse, told Pompey to stay at home. There really was nothing they could do.

HANAU 93 v VIKTORIA BERLIN (1894)

Before the rise of Bayern Munich and Dortmund, Hanau and Viktoria were the powerhouses of German football. And on the final day of the 1983/84 season, they faced each other in a title showdown.

applied to have the tie postponed. When the Football League - pretty harshly - turned the request down, the Grecians simply refused to travel. Hit with a £5,000 fine and ordered to pay Scunthorpe over £1,000 in expenses, Exeter never did make the trip and Scunney were awarded the points. Until Blackpool's pitch invasion debacle on the final day of last season, it was the only fixture in Football League ever to remain unfulfilled.

LIVERPOOL v EVERYONE (1987)

Fresh off the back of signing John Barnes from Watford, Liverpool fans couldn't wait to see Kenny Dalglish's boys kick off the 1987/88 campaign.

Unfortunately, Anfield didn't want to play ball. The ground's antiquated sewage system collapsed on the eve of the season, flooding the pitch and forcing Liverpool to play their first three matches away from home.

Supporters had to wait until mid-September to see Barnes in action but it was worth the wait - the England winger netted 37 minutes into his home debut as Liverpool beat Oxford 2-0 - the fourth game of a 29-match unbeaten start to the season.

LEAGUE LOOK

Leyton Orient remain top of the League 2 table despite taking one point from their last two matches.

Ian Hendon's side, who the Town beat the Johnstone's Paint Trophy, lost their unbeaten record when hammered by Exeter 4-0 two weeks ago, and the O's were held to a 1-1 draw at Cambridge last weekend to stay top of the pile.

The division's top three is complete with another two fancied sides this season – Plymouth and Portsmouth. Argyle sit in second spot after a 2-1 win at Wycombe last weekend. The Greens, who come to Kenilworth Road in October, have won five of their seven matches so far.

One of Argyle's two defeats this term has come against Pompey, who sit third and remain unbeaten after coming from behind to defeat Barnet 3-1 at Fratton Park last weekend. Teenage forward Conor Chaplin scored twice.

Morecambe are up to fifth in the table and just three points off top spot after registering a third successive win. Jim Bentley's Shrimps scored a last-minute winner to secure a 2-1 win at Newport, who remain bottom of the table on just one point. Terry Butcher's Exiles have now lost five matches on the spin.

Exeter followed up their 4-0 win over Orient to win at St James Park for the second successive week with a 1-0 win over Hartlepool. Paul Tisdale's side are now sixth in the table and a point ahead of our visitors Mansfield who occupy the final Play-Off place.

LEADING

Oxford lost their unbeaten record at Northampton last weekend to slip out of the top seven, while Carlisle are up to ninth after recording their third successive win with a 2-1 victory at home to Dagenham & Redbridge with Jabo Ihhere on target once more. The Cumbrians' summer signing is League 2's leading goalscorer with eight goals.

Elsewhere, Accrington lifted themselves to 10th in the table with a 1-0 win at Bristol Rovers, while Stevenage were held to a 2-2 draw at home to York. Yeovil had to settle for a point in a 1-1 draw at home to AFC Wimbledon which saw Jake Howells make his debut for the Glovers.

In the pick of this afternoon's fixtures, unbeaten Portsmouth travel to Oxford in the game of the day, while leaders Orient take on fourth placed Wycombe at Brisbane Road. Plymouth host Bristol Rovers in a West Country clash, while Newport will be aiming for their first victory of the campaign when they make the trip to Dagenham.

How Hatters boss John Still will be wishing that his customary slow start to the season is replaced with a similar run of form that saw Luton rocket up the table as they did last term.

The beginning of the 2014/15 campaign saw Town with two wins, two draws and three defeats from their opening seven games at the same stage, giving them just three points more than they have now.

However, it was at this point where Luton finally started to click into something like top gear as a stalemate at York City preceded a stunning run of seven straight league wins, propelling Still's men into top spot.

CAPABILITIES

There's no doubting that Hatters have the capabilities of producing something similar this time around, especially with the much-improved squad in place at Kenilworth Road this time round, but as always, talk is cheap.

Although it's fair to say performances are definitely going in the right direction, with some lovely football on display at Cambridge and Notts County, the inability to keep the back door shut, most notably in injury time, is proving a major irritant.

Five points have already been frittered away in stoppage time already, with Hatters tasting that all-too familiar feeling after what had been a fine comeback at Meadow Lane last weekend.

Putting a finger on just why it's been such recurring theme is a hard one, with individual errors and a lack of concentration at crucial times looking the main issue.

Speaking to the players, they are all too aware it needs to be stubbed out if Luton are going to justify their tag of promotion favourites, something they all believe remains well within their grasp.



HEALTHY

However this term they are already almost half way to that tally, notching a healthy eight in four fixtures thus far, while the win at Cambridge was the first time Hatters had scored three goals in an away game since their return to the Football League.

As the manager is well aware though, keeping it tight at the other end is just as an important facet of the game, so he'll be desperate for his side to record a first clean sheet of the campaign, and with that a first home win, this afternoon.
