

NOTES FROM THE MANAGER



GOOD AFTERNOON AND A VERY WARM WELCOME BACK TO KENILWORTH ROAD FOR THIS SKY BET LEAGUE 2 ENCOUNTER WITH YORK CITY.

I'd like to welcome Russ Wilcox, his staff, players, plus the directors and supporters of the Minstermen to Bedfordshire. They arrive here confident after an excellent win in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy over Doncaster. Like all clubs they will offer us a stern test.

After three successive away fixtures I would like to begin by saying a huge well done to the players, staff and, especially, you the supporters for the effort and determination which has seen us take six points and put in a decent display in the JPT in the last week.

TRICKY

We went to Morecambe, which now seems an eternity ago, buoyed by another win and clean sheet against Wimbledon and returned from a tricky Tuesday night trip with a fully-deserved 3-1 victory. I felt on the night we played some excellent football and restricted tough opposition to very few chances. Last season saw us beaten 3-0 there so it is heartening to see the kind of progress we are making to gain three points at a difficult place to go.

Four days later at Hartlepool we made it four wins in a row with another decent display on the road.

To score four goals away from home is tremendous at any level and we're delighted that we are now creating chances and taking them on our travels.

Hartlepool came into that game having lost their previous home game 3-0 so we knew they would be up for it and in fairness they will probably be wondering how they've lost a game 4-1 after missing a host of chances.

THRILLED

Mark Tyler made a number of good saves to keep them out while at the other end we were thrilled to take the chances that fell our way. The only dampner of the day was to see Craig Mackail-Smith pick up a slight hamstring injury.

I'm hopeful that he can return this afternoon, but Jack Marriott has shown in recent matches that he is more than capable of stepping up to the plate with four very well-taken goals.

We surpassed 1,000 miles in a week on Tuesday just gone at Gillingham where we exited the JPT. I have to admit that despite the result I was delighted with the performance, especially of those players who haven't had a lot of game time so far this season.

The likes of Dan Potts and Magnus Okuonghae are going to be benefit immensely from a full 90 minutes and slowly but surely we now have a squad fully fit that are competing fiercely for a starting place. That is exactly the kind of competition I wanted this summer and I am convinced this will stand us in good stead in the coming months.



Turning attention back to this afternoon we face a York team who we know are going to make things difficult for us.

However, we have won our last two matches here at Kenilworth Road without conceding a goal and that kind of solidity is what we need.

I'm delighted that we are scoring goals and happy that our defensive frailties which were highlighted earlier in the season have subsided.

The key now is to keep that going and do that on a consistent basis.

As ever, please get behind your team today. This is your club and believe me when I say the players which make up Luton Town Football Club are 100 per cent committed to bringing this club the success it craves.

GOOD AFTERNOON TO YOU ALL, IT'S GREAT TO BE HOME AT KENILWORTH ROAD AFTER THREE LONG AWAY TRIPS. WE WELCOME THE OFFICIALS, PLAYERS AND SUPPORTERS OF YORK CITY AND IT IS GOOD TO HAVE THIS FIXTURE ONCE AGAIN IN ITS RIGHTFUL PLACE IN THE FOOTBALL LEAGUE AFTER SOME GREAT COMPETITIVE TUSSLES AGAINST THE MINSTERMEN DURING OUR CONFERENCE DAYS.

Well they say that the tables do not lie and therefore it is most pleasing to see the progress and quality of football our team is playing over the past five weeks or so.

I recall at the end of August, after conceding a late goal at home to Portsmouth, we slipped to 22nd in the league. Prior to our game today, after four wins on the bounce we have moved up to 10th, just four points off one of the automatic promotion places.

COMMITMENT


Luton Town Football Club places much emphasis on its commitment to and working with the local community and indeed has a history of supporting numerous charitable causes throughout our 130 year history.



I knew it was only a matter of time before we turned the corner and started showing our quality with results and the past couple of weeks have now shown that.

Since I last sat down to write my notes for this page we have picked up a further three league victories to move us further up the League 2 table.

We couldn't field Paddy at Hartlepool so Guts came in and he created two goals, and after Macca came off in the first half the gaffer sent Jack on again and he scored twice. We've just got to keep going and that healthy competition is going to be a major help to us.

Confidence will be high once more this afternoon as we entertain a York side who beat Doncaster on Tuesday.

PREPARED

At home we know every game is a tad more testing because visiting teams aren't just going to roll over and let us beat them. However, you can be rest assured that we will have prepared properly and rested suitably enough to keep our winning league run going. The gap between ourselves and the top isn't

LET'S GO



THE HATTERS HIT THE ROAD AGAIN NEXT SATURDAY AS THEY MAKE THEIR FIRST TRIP TO CRAWLEY SINCE THE CONFERENCE MEETING IN APRIL 2011.

WHO? The Hatters' next port of call in League 2 is to Crawley Town, aka the Red Devils, from Crawley, West Sussex. Crawley lifted the Conference title in 2011 under Steve Evans to win promotion to the Football League for the first time in their history. The Red Devils subsequently then won promotion to League 1 the following season, but last term the club were relegated back to League 2 for the first time since 2012.

WHERE? Crawley play their home games at the Broadfield Stadium, which is also known as the Checkatrade.com Stadium. It's a 6,134 capacity ground which was opened in 1997. Hatters fans making the trip can choose from a covered, shallow terrace behind the goal, or covered seats beside the pitch. The stadium's record attendance stands at 5,880 when the Red Devils took on Reading in the FA Cup in 2013.

HOW TO GET THERE.
It is 78.3 miles from the Maple Road car park to the Broadfield Stadium which should take you just under an hour-and-a-half by car.

Take the M1 south and M25 anticlockwise. From the M25 then take the M23 southbound towards Gatwick Airport and Brighton. At the end of the M23 (before it becomes the A23) leave the motorway at the last exit, Junction 11 (sign-posted A264 Horsham, Pease Pottage Services). At the roundabout at the end of the motorway slip road turn right onto the A23 going towards Crawley. The ground is down on the left just before the next roundabout. Turn left at the roundabout and then left again for the stadium car park. The postcode for the ground is RH11 9RX.

THIS TIME ROUND.

Since their relegation from League 1 the Red Devils have continued to struggle this season under manager Mark Yates. Crawley have yet to win at the Broadfield Stadium this season, scoring just once on home turf. They go into their home game with Leyton Orient today in 21st place in the table with just nine points from 11 games. Yates' side lost 2-1 at Plymouth last weekend which was their fifth defeat in six League 2 games.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE? Next Saturday's game will be the sixth meeting between the Town and Crawley. The Hatters haven't won their last four games against the Red Devils, with their sole victory coming at Kenilworth Road in September 2009 in the Conference. That night two goals from George Pilkington and one from Tom Craddock sealed a 3-0 win. Since that victory the Hatters have drawn one and lost three. At the Broadfield Stadium the Town lost 2-1 in February 2010 before earning a 1-1 draw on the night. Crawley were presented with the Conference championship trophy in April 2011.


“Back first time” screamed the headline of the short-lived ‘Hatter’ newspaper in the summer of 1975 as the Town embarked on their first season back in Division Two (now the Championship), following their relegation from the top flight.

The squad that was so unlucky to suffer the drop was still together, and early campaign results seemed to square with the optimism shown by the club publication. Hull were seen off in the Kenilworth Road sunshine on the opening day and, although the Hatters went down narrowly at West Bromwich in the next match, they bounced back with victories over Chelsea at home and away at Portsmouth to make it a happy start.

Injuries to John Aston, Ron Futcher and Alan West in quick succession then led to a loss of form with the result that a run of six games failed to produce a victory before Fulham were beaten by the slim margin of 1-0 at Kenilworth Road.

Another run of three winless games tried the supporters’ patience to the full before York came to Kenilworth Road for the first time since 1967.

The breakthrough, and the Town's first goal in over six hours of play, finally came in the 40th minute when Jim Husband smashed the ball into the net after Peter Anderson dropped a delightful pass into space between him and the goal.

In the second half the Town's confidence surged with the fit again Aston running riot down the left flank and midfielders Brian Chambers, Andy King and Alan West providing the ammunition for Anderson and Husband. Anderson headed an Aston cross narrowly wide and then saw a fierce shot well saved by York goalkeeper Graeme Crawford.

Full-back John Ryan also joined in the attack to fire in shots that were somehow stopped by Crawford before the floodgates finally opened. West had plenty

of time and space to fire in goal number two just before the hour mark, following a cross from the dangerous Aston, and when King headed in an accurate Husband centre it began to look just a matter of how many they would score.

King had three more close shaves, and Anderson put one over the top before scoring the goal he so richly deserved thanks to an unselfish pass by Husband. Before the players went off to an understandable ovation West saw a shot cleared off the line and Chambers was desperately unlucky with an effort that rebounded off the bar.

Southampton manager Lawrie McMenemy was at Kenilworth Road ahead of the forthcoming clash between the Saints and the Hatters at the Dell and said that he had much to think about. “I saw

a lot there that could worry me. Admittedly York collapsed after a fair start but Luton showed they knew how to score goals. I still don't put them in my top eight clubs. I don't even put ourselves there at the moment. Our problem is that we can defend only when we are pushed into it. We can't do it to order. It should be one hell of a game on Saturday.”

For the record it wasn't as Southampton ran out easy 3-1 winners and were rarely troubled defensively.

THE PROGRAMME



For the visit of York to Kenilworth Road in November 1975 the Town produced their normal 16-page programme which was beginning to show signs of the financial pressures the club were under and which would be revealed to the shocked supporters within weeks.

Manager Harry Haslam, in his column, was hardly endearing himself to the Luton faithful by complaining of the lack of atmosphere at Kenilworth Road and then talking at length about the passion of all northern supporters in general and Sunderland in particular. I seem to recall this caused a bit of a storm at the time!

There was due to be a ‘Gala Firework Display’ at Kenilworth Road the following evening with special star attractions ‘The Wombles’!

DEFINING MOMENTS

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN **LEIGH EDWARDS** SELECTS EIGHT KEY MATCHES AND MOMENTS THAT HAVE SHAPED YORK CITY'S POST-WAR ERA

1959 YORK CALL THE SHOTS

York clinched promotion for the first time in their history with a 1-0 Fourth Division win over Aldershot in front of 2,862 at the Recreation Ground on 25th April 1959. Sam Bartram's side did well to survive a lively spell of Aldershot attacking in the first half and George Howe cleared the ball off the line with Tommy Forgan well beaten. York scored the vital goal after 46 minutes when Billy Hughes' centre was headed home by Terry Farmer, then Norman Wilkinson had an effort disallowed for offside a minute later. Tommy Humphrey missed a great chance to equalise for the home side as York held out to regain Third Division status at the first attempt.

1965 MARVELLOUS MINSTERMEN

The Minstermen made sure of promotion with an emphatic 4-0 Fourth Division victory over Halifax Town watched by 12,719 at Bootham Crescent on 24th April 1965. Championship hopes had been high following a stunning 4-0 win at home to promotion rivals Tranmere Rovers but disappointing defeats at Darlington and Newport County in the closing weeks proved crucial. Two goals by Paul Aimson plus others from Billy Rudd and Andy Provan swept aside Halifax in their final match and put York back on top of the Fourth Division, but with games in hand Brighton and Millwall overtook them. Tranmere, who had led virtually all the way, finished in fifth place.

1974 PROMOTION WINNERS

City secured promotion to the Second Division with a 1-1 draw with champions Oldham Athletic watched by 15,583 at Bootham Crescent on 27th April 1974. Tom Johnston's side forced a

succession of early corners but Oldham were dangerous in counter-attacks and Graeme Crawford had to make a brilliant save from George McVitie in the 24th minute. York broke the deadlock on 56 minutes when Chris Jones headed in Barry Lyons' free-kick. Ian Butler and Chris Jones hit the woodwork before Oldham equalised with Maurice Whittle's 65th minute free-kick. Crawford again saved well from McVitie as the visitors attacked strongly in the closing stages.

1974 CITY'S DREAM VILLA

The newly-promoted Minstermen began life in the Second Division with a 1-1 draw against Aston Villa in front of 9,396 at Bootham Crescent on 17th August 1974. York, with new signings Micky Cave and Peter Oliver, started well and took the lead after eight minutes

when, following a free-kick, Barry Lyons cracked a low shot through the defensive wall. Graeme Crawford twice saved well from John Gidman, then Jimmy Seal had a shot kicked off the line by Charlie Aitken at the other end. Villa drew level after 30 minutes as Ray Graydon headed in a cross from Chico Hamilton. Villa were destined to achieve a promotion and League Cup 'double' that season.

1984 FOURTH DIVISION CHAMPIONS

City clinched the Fourth Division title, the first major honour in the club's history, with a 2-0 victory over Hartlepool United watched by 6,063 at Bootham Crescent on 28th April 1984. Promotion had long since been assured and Denis Smith's side were seeking a club record 29th League win of the season. York were unlucky not to take the lead when John MacPhail headed a Brian Pollard corner against the bar. They broke the deadlock after 46 minutes as Keith Walwyn smashed the ball into the roof of the net. Walwyn doubled York's lead with a 56th minute header and City almost scored again when Eddie Blackburn turned a John Byrne shot onto the bar.

1985 ARSENAL ARE OUTGUNNED

Third Division giantkillers York gained a shock 1-0 FA Cup fourth round victory over Arsenal in front of 10,840 at Bootham Crescent on 26th January 1985. It was a match of very few chances on a bone-hard pitch liberally sprinkled with snow and looked a goalless draw all the way. But, with just seconds remaining, Keith Houchen was impeded in an off-the-ball clash with Steve Williams

as he tried to reach Martin Butler's cross and the referee pointed to the spot. Houchen stepped up, sent John Lukic to the right and coolly slotted the ball low into the opposite corner to give Denis Smith's side a dramatic last-gasp victory over the star-studded Gunners.

1993 WEMBLEY WINNERS

City defeated Crewe Alexandra in the Third Division Play-Off final watched by 22,416 at Wembley Stadium on 29th May 1993. The Minstermen had qualified for the Play-Offs in fourth place and defeated Bury 1-0 in the semi-final, with Gary Swann scoring the decisive goal in the 60th minute of the second leg to give York manager Alan Little the chance of a Wembley final along with his brother Brian, manager of Leicester City. Swann gave York the lead in extra-time but Dario Gradi's Crewe equalised through a Dave McKearney penalty in a 1-1 draw and it required a penalty shoot-out to gain promotion for York, with a 5-3 triumph on penalties.

2012 YORK'S WEMBLEY DOUBLE

Twice in a week in May 2012, York triumphed at Wembley, initially winning the FA Trophy then regaining Football League status after an absence of eight years. Gary Mills' side defeated Solihull Moors, Salisbury, Ebbsfleet United, Grimsby Town and the Hatters to face Newport County in the FA Trophy final on 12th May 2012. Second-half goals by Matty Blair and Lanre Oyebajo gave York a 2-0 victory. City finished fourth in the Blue Square Premier and beat Mansfield Town 2-1 in the Play-Off semi-finals before Ashley Chambers and Matty Blair scored in their 2-1 win over the Town in the Play-Off final on 20th May 2012.

YORK AND THE HATTERS IN NUMBERS

5-0

York have only won twice in 13 visits to Kenilworth Road, the last – a 2-1 victory – coming here in March 2012 in the Conference. Their first ever win on Bedfordshire soil came thanks to a 1-0 win in the Conference Play-Off semi-final second leg in May 2010. The Town had won the first seven meetings at home to York prior to a 1-1 draw in the Conference in October 2009.

The Hatters have not won any of the last eight meetings with York, stretching back to the 5-0 win in 2011. The Minstermen have held the upper hand in the last eight games, winning five. Three have ended in draws. Including the 5-0 win for the Hatters the Town have only won once in their last 13 meetings against City.

540

The Hatters travel to Bootham Crescent for the return game in February aiming to be the first time side since 2001 to score a goal at the Yorkshire venue. Not since a 2-1 win in September 2001 have the Town scored there – a run of six games without a goal: a run of 540 goalless minutes. Ian Hiller was the last Hatters player to net on Bootham Crescent turf.

2-1

The Hatters' last win at Bootham Crescent in 2001 is best remembered for a twice-taken penalty by striker Steve Howard. After missing the first one the referee signalled for a re-take. Desperate to score his first goal of the season Howard stepped up again despite protests from his team-mates and regular penalty taker Aaron Skelton. He missed again and was duly subbed by a rather peeved boss Joe Kinnear.

39,265

The largest gate to witness a Luton versus York fixture came in the 2012 Play-Off final at Wembley. A strong run of form saw the Hatters gatecrash the Play-Offs and after beating Wrexham on aggregate they met the Minstermen in the final. Andre Gray fired the Town in front after just 80 seconds but goals from Ashley Chambers and Matty Blair secured promotion for City.

WHAT'S THE STORY?

Two goals from substitute Jack Marriott in the final 11 minutes helped the Hatters grind out a second successive victory at Kenilworth Road over 10-man AFC Wimbledon.

The Hatters had been frustrated in their search for a breakthrough for 80 minutes against the Dons, who saw central defender Karleigh Osborne sent-off in the first half after picking up two yellow cards in the space of three minutes. But 63rd-minute introduction Marriott changed all that. His first goal arrived when sniffing in the penalty area to guide a finish into the corner on 79 minutes, before he grabbed his and the Town's second in the final minute of stoppage time to seal a victory and lift John Still's men up to within three points of a Play-Off place.

MARRIOTT AND GRIFFITHS CELEBRATE EMOTIONAL COMEBACKS

Both Jack Marriott and Scott Griffiths had extra reason to be cheerful following the home win against Wimbledon – the second for the Hatters in as many weeks.

Marriott's two goals proved to be the perfect comeback for the 21-year-old who had been sent off in the Johnstones Paint Trophy win over Leyton Orient.

But the striker is hoping to put the incident, which saw him making a gesture to the Orient fans, firmly behind him to strive for a spot in John Still's team.

"Everyone who knows me knows that the sending off was very out of character, but I served my suspension, which was rightfully so, and I'm just glad that that's over now and I can push on and keep my place in the team," he said.

Marriott highlighted disappointment at his actions after the Orient fixture, but reaffirmed his apology after his two goals helped the Hatters beat the 10-man Dons.

"I've been working really hard, trying to bounce back from it and hopefully I'm on the way to repaying the fans because of that," said Marriott.

"The three points is the most important thing, but to come on and do my bit for the team is great, and I'm really glad to have been able to do that and get the goals."

The youngster is now hoping that he and Craig Mackail-Smith can provide a decent long-term partnership, with Marriott emphasising appreciation for his team-mate's work ethic.

"Craig's work-rate today was absolutely outstanding.

"He's someone I really look up to, especially at the training ground, the way he conducts himself. He's really superb."

He added: "I think we can both play together up front. We're both willing, we both want to play, and we're both willing to do what it takes for the team, whether that means dropping off or supporting the midfield. We're both capable of doing that."

Griffiths, meanwhile, played his first game as a father against Wimbledon, and was left speechless following the Hatters' second clean sheet on the spin.

"It's been an emotional five days with the birth of my lad," said the Town left-back. "It's an incredible feeling, and I don't really know how to put it into words. The result wasn't bad either!"

The defender also reaffirmed the importance of the solid backline, which had previously been missing from the Hatters at the start of the season.

"Getting a clean sheet is the important thing, particularly for me as a defender, because all you need is one goal then, and we got that today. It means so much to all of us at the back, and that's what we've got to keep doing."

He added: "The late goals have been very disappointing, and not at all in our nature from last season and for whatever reason, we've been sloppy towards the end.

We don't believe in luck, and it's something we needed to nip in the bud quickly."


The Hatters were frustrated for most of the afternoon after AFC Wimbledon had been reduced to 10 men in the first half, but two late goals got the Town their third win of the campaign.

Griffiths almost made a goal himself, but after a busy week, came off the park to rapturous applause from the Kenilworth Road faithful.

"I came close to getting on the scoresheet, my effort was just sneaking in, but the keeper's done excellently to tip it away," Griffiths explained.

"I was getting ready to celebrate, but it wasn't to be unfortunately – that was one of a number of top saves he made in the afternoon.

"I didn't really want to be subbed off, but I definitely needed to. This week has been quite draining, but I thought I put a good shift in today and that clean sheet was a bonus for me."

McGEEHAN AND WILKINSON WELCOME RUN OF FORM

Town duo Cameron McGeehan and Luke Wilkinson told *Hatters Player* that the side's return to form was always to be expected at Kenilworth Road.

The Hatters won 3-1 at Morecambe for their third victory in as many games, after winning just one of their first seven games in League 2.

But McGeehan in particular stressed the importance of getting back to victories ways following a disappointing start.

"We had a good performance and that's given us three on the bounce now. We knew it would take time, but the season is starting to come together," he said after the Morecambe win.

"We were too sloppy in the early stages of the season. We've got the players to win this league, and we're expecting to be right up there."

McGeehan also reflected on the difficulty when coming to the Globe Arena, praising the side for grinding out a result in a tricky Tuesday night fixture.

"It was a tough second half, and the first period was some of the best football we have played all season," said the former Norwich midfielder. "We were magic tonight, and should have been more comfortable in the second half."

"Morecambe isn't the easiest place to come to, so it was a great win."

"We created loads of chances, didn't really let them in the game too much. They had to resort to long balls in the second half, but the lads at the back dealt with it and they were excellent."

McGeehan himself has not been a stranger to the scoresheet, and has developed a strong partnership with Northern Irishman Paddy McCourt, with the international passing on his influences to McGeehan.

"I've got a good relationship with Paddy on the pitch," he said. "He's such a good player and I love playing alongside him, as I can feed off him, get some chances, get some goals."

"It's great to have him on the pitch and I'm getting a good rapport with him. He's teaching a lot of the boys with some of his experience."

"I'm a central midfielder, so that's obviously where I prefer playing but if the gaffer needs me out there than that's fine, and if I can chip in with some goals then that's all the matters if the team wins."

McGeehan's goal-scoring prowess this year has been a feature of the Hatters' campaign, with defender Wilkinson believing there's more to it than the 20-year-old being in the right place at the right time.

Wilkinson said: "Cam's doing really well, he loves to attack, and he puts in that extra time shooting after training. He really deserves it, he's a great lad."

The trip to Morecambe proved fruitless last season, with the Town slipping to a 3-0 defeat in December, but Wilkinson feels John Still's team is a step up from that of 10 months ago.



"We came here last year and got played away, but we've probably got a better squad this year, no disrespect to the other lads. But if we want to be at the top, we have to come to places like Morecambe and get the points, and thankfully we have."

"We started slowly last season, too. We went on about eight or nine unbeaten, and this team is capable of doing more than that. We just have to take it game by game."

In McCourt and Craig Mackail-Smith, the Hatters have strengthened with players from higher leagues, a factor Wilkinson believes will push them right to the top of the league.

"You can see the quality in Paddy. He's a very good player, gets things going for us, and quality on the ball. He realises things on the pitch that other players at this level don't."

"I would hate to play against someone like Craig, he just never stops running. He deserved a goal tonight, and hopefully he can keep that up for the team. At the end of the day it doesn't matter who scores the goals so long as we score them and win games."



TYLER AND LEE PRAISE TWO-GOAL MARRIOTT

Both Mark Tyler and Olly Lee were full of praise for Jack Marriott after the striker netted a brace against Hartlepool last Saturday.

Marriott replaced the injured Craig Mackail-Smith in the first half, but scored twice in the space of five minutes to help the Town to a 4-1 win at Victoria Park.

While it was unfortunate for the Hatters to lose Mackail-Smith, Tyler has drawn a comparison between the two strike partners.

"The gaffer knew what Jack was about when he signed him. He's got his opportunity today, got his two goals," said the Town goalkeeper.

"You can tell with Jack that he's going to score goals, you can see him like that in training, you put the ball in the box and he'll be there to finish it, just like Craig."

The Town secured their fourth consecutive win in League 2, and their second on the road in a week, but they had their 38-year-old keeper to thank for a number of crucial saves to deny Pools forward Rakish Bingham.

"Personally I wouldn't want to have to make them saves and be able to have a quiet afternoon, but I think we were a little bit too open," said Tyler. "The gaffer mentioned that at the end, so we'll go and work on it in training."

"I'm there to make saves, and I'm playing well at the moment. Everyone's got to play well to keep their place, and we've got lots of competition for places. Every week you've got to be on top of your game."

The trip to Hartlepool proved a test for a Hatters side full of confidence, but Tyler was impressed by how

the team coped as their excellent league run continued in the North East.

He said: "We knew it was going to be a tough game. We've had a lot of travelling, but we've prepared well. We didn't start the best, they had a couple of opportunities early on but we weathered it. I'm there to save them, and Jack's there to score them, and it's not just me back there."

"We knew we could score goals and it's nice to come away with a victory. We knew that they would come out all guns blazing because they didn't have the best result on Tuesday."

Tyler is not going to rest on his laurels, however, as the Town look to build on their excellent defensive record which has seen them concede just two goals in their last four games.

"We know we're slow starters, but we're now realising what a good team we are. We put pressure on ourselves to win every game. Two away games and we're delighted to get six points."

"I'd want more clean sheets. We know we're going to score goals, and we've got a good spell of momentum at the moment. We won't take anything for granted."

Summer signing Lee also got on the scoresheet at Hartlepool, notching his first goal for the club with a stunning 25-yard strike in the closing moments of the match.

Lee said: "I was really pleased to get off the mark, a few of the



midfielders have been running away with the goals so it's time for me to try and catch them up!

"We knew it was just a matter of time before it all clicked together – we knew we were too good a team for that not to happen, and we're seeing that now, and we hope that kicks on."

The midfielder also reflected on the two-goal hero of the afternoon, as Marriott followed up his two goals against AFC Wimbledon to double his League tally for the season.

"The second half we weren't even at our best but we were clinical. Jack's been chomping at the bit to get his chance, and when he does he seems to score a brace, so it's nice to have that knack, and we're pleased he can come on and do the job," said Lee.

"It's nice to get the three points and a great performance to go with it. We knew this week was going to be a gruelling set of fixtures for the lads, but we've done really well to come out of it with six points."

After trips to Morecambe and Hartlepool in the space of five days, Lee was also quick to thank the Town support for their backing on the road.

"The fans have been magnificent in their numbers – I've not seen anything like it in the lower leagues," he said. "To bring almost 300 fans to Morecambe on a Tuesday night was brilliant, and then another 400 today is incredible."


STILL SAID:





DEVELOPMENT UPDATE


Pelly Ruddock Mpanzu got 90 minutes under his belt as the Hatters development squad made it two wins out of two in the Final Third Development League Cup thanks to a 1-0 victory at Southend on Tuesday afternoon.

Ruddock's last appearance for the Town first team came in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy win over Leyton Orient at the end of the August, but a niggling back problem has kept the former West Ham midfielder sidelined.

After beating AFC Wimbledon 3-0 two weeks ago in the same competition, a much younger dev squad saw off the Shrimpers thanks to a first-half goal from youth team midfielder Alex Atkinson. Atkinson raced onto Ruddock's pass to coolly slot beyond the Southend goalkeeper.

The Town controlled the first half against a much stronger and older Southend side but it was a different story after the break as the home side searched for an equaliser.

But the Shrimpers couldn't test Elliot Justham or his replacement Liam Gooch and the Hatters held on to secure a victory to the delight of



academy and development manager Andy Awford.

He told lutontown.co.uk: "It was a good result and a good performance from us. It was a much younger side that we have fielded in previous weeks with the first team involved at Gillingham, while Southend have a set Under-21 squad with some experienced players.

"We dominated the first half and could have scored a couple of more goals but Alex took his goal really well on the half-hour mark on the counter-attack.

"In the second period we came under a lot of pressure but we stood up to it really well. In the closing stages I thought we managed the game well. A number of the younger players will learn from an experience like this because we wanted to win and to do that we needed to be disciplined.

"It is vital for our younger players to learn this aspect of the game. When you're leading away from home with 10 minutes to go it's important to focus and manage the game.

"It's a good learning curve for all of the lads and what pleased me most was the way they all took on what we told them before the game.

The beauty of this little run so far and its familiar green shoots of autumnal recovery, is not only that it fits with Still's annual prophecy of brutal pre-season >



LEAGUE LOOK

There are new leaders of leaders of League 2 following last weekend's round of matches with Plymouth Argyle at the summit after their late 2-1 win over struggling Crawley.

The Pilgrims, who reached the Play-Offs last season, are unbeaten in five league games and have a two-point cushion at the top.

It was an 89th-minute goal from on-loan Hiram Boateng that put Crawley to the sword after the Red Devils had cancelled out Reuben Reid's first-half goal when Roarie Deacon levelled with five minutes to go.

Previous leaders Wycombe were knocked off top spot following a 3-2 home defeat to Northampton. The Cobblers, unbeaten in five, are up to ninth in the table.

Another team recently in pole position, Leyton Orient, got back to winning ways last weekend with their first win in five matches. After winning their first five League 2 games, Ian Hendon's side picked up just three points from their next five but ended that run with a comfortable 3-1 win over Notts County at Brisbane Road.

Portsmouth led the table two

games ago but saw their unbeaten run ended last Tuesday night against Exeter at Fratton Park. Last weekend they let two points slip at home to Yeovil, meaning Paul Cook's side drop to fourth place.

Oxford and Mansfield made headway into the top seven last weekend with two away wins in the space of four days. Oxford, up to fifth now, won at York in midweek and followed that up with a 3-1 victory at Accrington to inflict a first defeat in eight matches on Stanley.

THRILLER

Mansfield meanwhile won at Stevenage on the night the Town won at Morecambe, and picked up another win on the road last Saturday when coming out on top in a seven-goal thriller against struggling Dagenham. Adam Murray's side were trailing 3-1 but fought back with two late goals to win 4-3 at Victoria Road.

Just outside the Play-Off places are Carlisle, who inflicted a second successive home defeat on Stevenage with a 1-0 win at Broadhall Way last weekend.

In total there were five sides in the division that won both of their successive away matches last week: the Town, Oxford, Mansfield, Carlisle and Bristol Rovers – who beat Hartlepool on the Tuesday and then beat Morecambe 4-3 on Saturday.
