

NOTES FROM THE MANAGER

GOOD AFTERNOON AND WELCOME BACK TO KENILWORTH ROAD FOR THIS LEAGUE 2 FIXTURE WITH CRAWLEY TOWN.

I'd like to begin by welcoming everyone associated with our visitors to Bedfordshire today, including their manager Mark Yates who I know well.

The past few weeks have been very productive and encouraging for us following four successive victories. I said a vital component of what we are trying to do and improve was a level of consistency and the players have certainly given me that in terms of results.

Our victory over Morecambe in our last home match was richly deserved despite the narrow scoreline, while at Leyton Orient last weekend we saw a different kind of performance where we had to dig in and defend.

PERFORMANCE

Jack Marriott has taken the plaudits for scoring the winning goal in both of our last two matches but the team performance in these matches has been terrific. I have said it quite often after games recently, but I truly have been proud of their efforts. It shows that they have been responding to what we want from them in training and in games.

While we are happy with the progress we have made it is important to recognise that we are still taking small steps towards

where we want to get to. We might have won four matches in a row but standards are important and the levels of consistency must be maintained if we are to be successful.

PROUD

The result and performance at Leyton Orient was obviously very pleasing but the support we received from the supporters in the away end was just phenomenal.

I told the media afterwards support like that fills me with even more passion and desire to bring success to this football club.

Thank you – I am proud to be associated with you.

This week we were delighted to reward Tyreeq Bakinson, a member of our successful youth team, with a professional contract. Tyreeq is a player we think a lot of and giving young players a chance is an important part of what we are trying to build here. I want to give talented young players a pathway to the first team. This club has a fine reputation for nurturing young players and the work the academy does is tremendous.

We want to make the most of that success and give you the supporters a team you can be proud of. Our youth team have certainly done that this season and congratulations to them on reaching the national final of the League Cup. We wish them well against Shrewsbury in April.

EFFORT

We are now entering a really important phase of the season. After today's game we have 10 games left and we are asking for a big effort from everyone concerned at the club. Your support plays an absolutely vital role in that so please get behind us this afternoon. It has already helped us immensely over the past few weeks and long may it continue.

From the BOARDROOM

WITH VICE CHAIRMAN **DAVID WILKINSON**

GOOD AFTERNOON EVERYONE AND A VERY WARM WELCOME TO KENILWORTH ROAD.

Today we greet all the officials, players and supporters from Crawley Town.

The Reds are, like us, around mid-table at the moment. We have played them twice at their place this season, losing 2-1 in League 2 and winning 2-1 in the FA Cup. They are always a very hospitable club and we look forward to being able to repay some of that today.

My last notes were eight weeks ago for the Cambridge game – and what a change we have seen in that time. We have picked up six wins, two draws and two defeats since Nathan took over compared to only two wins in the 10 games before he arrived. This seems to me to be an amazing result bearing in mind he has been totally changing the way we play.

PROGRESSION

Sometimes the style has not been understood, but for me the results and clear progression speak for themselves, as does the passion showed by our manager and players during and after games.

I have been away for the past week and sadly missed two league victories and a Youth team win against Swindon in the Southern Area League Cup Final. I do not enjoy listening to commentary from

afar and in my experience highlights are often not highlights, but at least I have managed to see the goals.

There have been a few changes in personnel in the past week. We have seen Mark Tyler move back to Peterborough after 297 appearances for us over six-and-a-half years. It is an opportunity for him and we couldn't stand in his way.

Mark has been a fantastic servant to our Club having been with us through all the Conference years and having helped us regain our place in the Football League and we wish him well for his future career.

I for one hope that we have a proper opportunity to say goodbye to him before the end of the season.

In a similar vein we welcome keeper Jonathan Mitchell on loan from Derby County. By all accounts he had a very impressive debut against Leyton Orient and we hope he has an enjoyable and successful time with us.

JOY

We also congratulate 17-year-old Tyreeq Bakinson, whose performances for the Under-18s this year have earned him a three-and-a-half year professional contract. It has been a joy to watch the youth team's performances this year and Tyreeq has been a major part of their success. It is very unusual



for first year scholars to be given contracts, which demonstrates the faith the management has in his ability and future potential.

PROUD

While I'm on the subject, what a fantastic performance the lads put in at Blackburn. Those of us who were there were immensely proud. I missed the Swindon game, but understand we were well in control and we now look forward to the Final against Shrewsbury.

The success of the youth team is particularly special to us because having made the decision to keep investing throughout the Conference years without support from central funding and despite the loss of a number of promising players to big clubs, we have managed to justify the investment and give us hope for the future.

Nevertheless, it is an ongoing battle. We are an EPPP3 academy and as such are always under

threat from clubs at a higher level, who can, if they wish, 'steal' our players for a song. In most cases when that happens it is short-lived and the player ends up on loan at a lower level – or worse is just discarded, but it is difficult to persuade parents that their son would be better off staying at Luton than moving to Arsenal, for example.

TALENT

We also have to be aware of other clubs' attempts to muscle in on our territory and there are many examples of other clubs trying to move in to the Bedfordshire area and compete for the available talent.

We must, therefore, do our best, all of us, to make us a Club people want to play for. Nathan has said that it was David Pleat who impressed him and made him think about management. Something about Luton Town stayed with him all those years and eventually made him decide he wanted to manage us. On the other hand, it was that grounding and enthusiasm that made us decide he was the man for us.

We talk a lot about your support, the numbers who travel and the

passion you show for our wonderful football club and Saturday at Orient was another classic example. We are so proud of you all.

Recently we had a QPR supporter with his son, Feidlim aged seven, in the Boardroom with us. We gave him a brief tour and he enjoyed the game. On the way home he asked his Dad if he could support Luton as well as QPR and could he get him a shirt. There is something about us which sucks people in and doesn't let them go.

While we are on the subject of pride, can I take this opportunity to congratulate our old boy Andre Gray on his goals and performances for Burnley, who are currently sitting on top of the Championship. I always keep an eye on our ex-players at whatever level, and hope they do well, as I believe it reflects well upon us.

Enjoy the game.

What a great past week it's been for us. Since my last set of notes we have picked up another two wins and kept two clean sheets.

The victories over Morecambe and Leyton Orient have given us a massive boost and now we really do find ourselves heading in the right direction.

Against Morecambe we dominated the game and deservedly registered back-to-back home victories thanks to Jack's finish. It was only a matter of time before we broke the deadlock in that game and I felt we were never in any serious danger on the night. Some of the football we played was excellent and Jack was unlucky not to score earlier when his shot in the first half bounced just wide.

It was another goal in the final 15 minutes of a game which once again shows we have what it takes to grind teams down and go and win matches in those important final periods of games. Good teams always keep going to the very end so it's pleasing to see that we are finishing games stronger. Earlier in the season it was the other way round.

We almost went 2-0 up in the second half when Pottsy came close to curling home with a right foot shot from the edge of the box but after that we had to defend our own penalty area as Orient threw everything they could at us. However, for all their possession

and crossing from wide positions we never felt seriously in trouble.

The game marked the debut of Jono – Jonathan Mitchell – in goal. We only met him for the first time a few hours before kick-off but he showed in the 90 minutes what a promising future he has in the game with a commanding and confident display. Not bad for a 21-year-old!

Of course the news came out this week that Tyles has left to rejoin Peterborough. He will be sadly missed on and off the pitch but I'd like to thank him on behalf of all the lads for his service both this season and for the Club in the past. He has legendary status at Kenilworth Road and we wish him all the best.

Today we welcome Crawley to Kenilworth Road. We were hugely disappointed to lose at their place in the league back in October, especially having led at half-time. But I think we're a different team now with a different mindset. We must, however, focus on what we have done well in our past four matches if we are to make it five wins on the spin. It's a horrible, really, really over-used cliché, but we really do need to take every game as it comes and mustn't get carried away with four wins on the trot.

Finally it goes without saying a huge thank you to the support we've received recently. The backing at Orient was extraordinary.



We really got the feeling that you were there on the pitch with us in the closing stages as we kept them at bay. Please keep it up again today because there will be moments when we need you.

Enjoy the game and get behind us.

TYREEQ TURNS PRO

The Hatters are delighted to confirm that first-year youth team midfielder Tyreeq Bakinson has penned a three-and-a-half year professional contract with the Club.

Central midfielder Bakinson, 17, joined the Town as an under-10 and only signed full-time scholarship terms last summer.

Although born in London, Tyreeq lives in Luton, walks to training every day and has been a regular for Paul Driver's Under-18s this season.

Bakinson has already been given experience in the Hatters' development squad this year and travelled with the first team for the League 2 fixture at AFC Wimbledon last month, where he was involved

in the pre-match warm-up.

He has scored six goals from central midfield this season and has been a driving force behind the youth team's successful campaign which has seen Driver's side reach the quarter-finals of the FA Youth Cup.

First team boss Nathan Jones told lutontown.co.uk: "Tyreeq fits the profile of the kind of player we like. He's got the ability, the fitness, the hunger, he's disciplined, he wants to learn and we feel he can get better.

"We're delighted and excited to have tied him down to a professional contract and believe if his development continues then he's a player who could jump into the first team and be an important player for us in the future.



"We want a pathway from the youth team to the first team here and he's been part and parcel of a fantastic youth team this season so this is also reward for that."

Academy and development manager Andy Awford said: "It's rare for a player in the first year of their scholarship to sign professional but in football you are rewarded for your efforts, and Tyreeq has played an important role in a successful season for the youth team."

JUSTIN RECOGNISED BY THE LFE

Town youngster James Justin has been recognised for his efforts on and off the pitch this season by being named in the League Football Education's 'The 11' competition.

'The 11' recognises both football and academic progress of Under-18 players on apprenticeships at Football League clubs, assessing such factors as community and charity involvement.

Judged by LFE's team of regional officers, this award is given on four occasions in the season to celebrate the holistic development of young players, a barometer which is also applied to the Apprentice of the Year Awards later in the season.

Justin, who has been a regular for the Under-18s and development squad – and signed a professional

contract with the Hatters earlier this season – joins players from Sheffield Wednesday, Derby County and Birmingham in the '11'.

Carl Craner, the Hatters' head of academy education and welfare, told lutontown.co.uk: "James is a fantastic character to have around the building.

"Both on and off the pitch, he has excelled this season and has been able to cope with the demands that being an apprentice brings.

"James has achieved excellent grades in the classroom and is the first second year apprentice to complete the NVQ qualification. He leads by example and shows a willingness to help and support his team mates, often staying behind in order to help them progress.



"He is a popular member of the group and is well liked by staff around the club and Central Bedfordshire College, where James is completing a BTEC (Level 3) in Sports Science.

"Away from his academic progress, James was offered an 18-month professional deal and has already been a part of

the matchday squad and a named substitute at Exeter in December.

"With numerous outings for the development squad, James has a bright future at the club and I am delighted that I have had this chance to work with such a level headed and hardworking individual."

Everyone at Kenilworth Road would like to congratulate James on his award and for his achievements this season.

signing of highly-rated 21-year-old goalkeeper Jonathan Mitchell from Derby County and made his debut in the 1-0 win at Leyton Orient.

LET'S GO

THE TOWN HIT THE ROAD NEXT WEEKEND WHEN THEY MAKE THE LONG JOURNEY SOUTH TO TAKE ON PLYMOUTH ARGYLE AT HOME PARK.

WHO? Plymouth Argyle, aka the Pilgrims, aka one of the sides also pushing for promotion from League 2 this season. Argyle, now managed by Derek Adams, have already beaten the Hatters this season when they triumphed 2-1 at Kenilworth Road back in October thanks to a late winner from ex-Hatters loanee Ryan Brunt.

HOW THEY DOING?

Very well. Argyle go into their game away at fellow promotion chasers Accrington in third place in the table, joint-second only on goal difference. The Greens have enjoyed a fine season to date and have been among the leaders for the much of the season. Last season they pipped the Town to the final Play-Off place but lost to Wycombe in the semi-finals. John Sheridan left in the summer and Adams took control after leaving Ross County. They hold a six-point cushion over fourth-placed Portsmouth with 11 matches of the season left.

HOW TO GET THERE.

The journey to Home Park is the Hatters' second longest of the season, a mere 506-mile round-trip, which should take you about four hours in the car. To get there, take the M1 south, M25 anticlockwise, M4 west and M5 south. At the end

of the motorway continue onto the A38. On entering Plymouth, turn left onto the A386, towards Plymouth. When this road splits into two, keep on the left hand side (again signposted Plymouth) and after about a mile you will see the ground on your left. The ground is well signposted. If you don't fancy driving all that way, take the Bobbers, who depart Luton train station at 8am. The fare is £33 for adults and £30 concessions.

TICKETS PLEASE.

As we typed these words out (Wednesday afternoon, that is) the Luton Town ticket office sold 332 tickets, but Hatters fans can purchase tickets on the day at Home Park. However the prices to increase by £2. Tickets are available from the ticket office until 3pm if you want to save a couple of quid, and you can choose to sit in the family stand or in the main away end. The choice is yours.

HOME COMFORTS.

Argyle have been consistent both and away this season – an obvious reason why they are one of the favourites for promotion. Only leaders Northampton (with 12) have won more games on home soil this season than Plymouth's 10. However, the Pilgrim's recent

form has been patchy: Adams' side have won three, drawn four and lost three of their last 10 games. The Greens have won three of their last six matches at Home Park, but have lost twice: to Wycombe and Northampton. The Hatters won on their last visit last season, 1-0 thanks to Andy Drury's goal. That was only the Town's eighth win in 47 visits!

CLUB CONNECTIONS.

Many-a-player has served both the Town and Argyle down the years. Dwight Marshall, Keith Allen, Milija Aleksic, Mike Harrison and Calvin Andrew to name just five. Brunt, who scored the winner against the Town in October played just six games while on-loan under Gary Brabin in 2011.

It gives us great pleasure to welcome everyone associated with Crawley Town to Kenilworth Road this afternoon, including all of those in the away end who have travelled up from West Sussex.

The Reds arrive in Bedfordshire comfortably in mid-table in League 2, vastly clear of any relegation threat in 16th place, while the 11 points separating themselves and the Play-Off places seems slightly out of grasp.

Mark Yates' side are in a period of indifferent form at present, taking two wins, two defeats and the same number of draws from their last six outings, although they did lose their three League 2 fixtures prior to that.

This year marks the first term back in the fourth tier for Crawley, who were relegated from League 1 before Yates took over at the end of that disappointing campaign.

Yates enjoyed a comprehensive 3-0 victory at Cambridge in his fourth league at the helm, but it took until the end of September for Crawley to take another three

points, with another 3-0 win, this time over Newport County.

The Reds endured some difficult results in that time though, notably 4-0 and 4-1 defeats to Mansfield and Notts County, while also suffering a 3-0 home blip to Accrington Stanley.

That was followed, however, by Crawley's best league run of the season, winning four games out of five including a 2-1 success over the Hatters at the CheckATrade.com stadium back in October.

Since then, it's been a season of consistent inconsistencies for Yates' outfit, who have yet to replicate their early-season run to sit in the wrong half of the table for much of the League 2 year.

But it seems the Reds may have off-the-field developments to excite them, with the news that the club will undergo a takeover from Ziya Eren following Football League approval.

Goals have mainly been shared around Crawley's side so far this term, with Gwion Edwards and Matt Harrold boasting seven each while Rory Deacon is hot on their heels with five League 2 strikes.

Harrold was on target the last time Crawley faced the Hatters in

league action when the Town lost a Cameron McGeehan one-goal lead to surrender 2-1 to two late strikes, with Rhys Murphy also on the scoresheet.

But the Hatters prevailed in the last meeting between the two, an FA Cup meeting in West Sussex in which Josh McQuoid delivered two wonderful strikes to send the visitors to the second round.

Previous to this season, the Town and Crawley had been limited in their meetings, playing each other just five times in their history, with four of those coming in the Conference.

A George Pilkington brace helped Luton to a 3-0 in their first ever meeting in 2009, but the Reds have had the better of the meetings at Kenilworth Road since, prevailing 2-1 in a non-league clash in 2010 before the two met in the Johnstone's Paint Trophy four years later when Gwion Edwards notched the game's only goal.

Experienced goalkeeper Paul returned to the club in early February on an emergency loan deal from Portsmouth. Originally signed for the Red Devils in 2012, we went onto make 105 appearances in his first spell.

IN DEFENCE

LANRE OYEBANJO

Summer signing Lanre only recently made his Crawley debut after returning to action after knee surgery. The attacking right-back joined the Red Devils after several seasons with York City.

SONNY BRADLEY

Hull-born centre-half Sonny penned a two-year deal with the club in the summer of 2014 after leaving Portsmouth. After a successful first season he was appointed captain at the start of the campaign.

JON ASHTON

Experienced central defender Jon signed a one-year deal in July 2015 after over 200 appearances for Stevenage. Helped Boro to win

back-to-back promotions and has previously played for Plymouth.

JOSH YORWERTH

Highly-rated young defender Josh joined the Red Devils on-loan from Ipswich in September. Signed for the Tractor Boys from Cardiff and has represented Wales at under-21 level.

CHARLES DUNNE

Left-back Charles is also on-loan, arriving at the Broadfield Stadium from Blackpool earlier this month. The London-born defender has made over 50 appearances for the Tangerines.

ACROSS THE MIDDLE

GWION EDWARDS

After a successful loan spell, attacking midfielder Gwion signed a permanent deal in July 2014 from Swansea. Started his career with Aberystwyth before turning pro. Has seven goals this season.

JIMMY SMITH

Another summer 2014 arrival, Jimmy joined the Reds from Stevenage. Came through the Chelsea academy before a move to Leyton Orient who he played 150 times for in four years.

SIMON WALTON

Experienced central midfielder Simon penned a two-year at the club at the start of the season. Spent last season at Stevenage but was previously on the books at Plymouth, Charlton, Leeds and QPR.

LYLE DELLA-VERDE

Young midfielder Lyle joined the Reds on a short-term contract in February this year after he left Fleetwood. Began his career at Southend before joining Fulham and then Fleetwood.

LEWIS YOUNG

Winger Lewis is also able to play at full-back and arrived at the Broadfield Stadium in July 2014 after a successful trial. Started his career at Watford before spells with Northampton and Burton.

UP FRONT

MATT HARROLD

Experienced frontman but only 29, centre-forward Matt joined the Red Devils from Bristol Rovers in June 2014. Scored goals wherever he's played with spells at Yeovil, Wycombe, Shrewsbury among others.

SHAMIR FENELON

Young striker Shamir signed a one-year deal in the summer. Came through Brighton's academy and went out on loan to aid his development and has represented the Republic of Ireland at under-21 level.

ANDY BOND

Forward Andy penned a deal until the end of the season in February. Recently on the books at Chorley he has previously enjoyed spells at Colchester, Chester and Stevenage.

ROARIE DEACON

Former Arsenal trainee Roarie joined the Reds this summer after leaving Stevenage. Able to play centrally or wide, he was represented England internationally at under-19 level.

From the OAK ROAD

TODAY, HOWEVER, THE PAIR MEET IN LEAGUE 2 FOR THE FIRST TIME FOLLOWING CRAWLEY'S RELEGATION LAST SEASON. RED DEVILS FAN **CRAIG BRATT** GIVES US THE INSIDE TAKE.

THE SEASON AHEAD...

After relegation from League 1 last season what were expectations for the season ahead at the Broadfield Stadium?

Whilst a push for an instant return to League 1 was a wish for many fans, consolidation was always the clubs aim for the season. After an awful League 1 season, settling things down had to be done.

Mark Yates was installed as successor to John Gregory in the summer. Have you been happy with the job he has done and what style of football are you trying to play?

Mark has done an excellent job with the resources he's been working with. He's got us playing some much better, more enjoyable football and is also great with interacting with fans which makes a huge difference.

It's been a bit of an inconsistent season for the Red Devils, what do you put that down to? Were you concerned that you might fall out of the League altogether?

One thing we as a club rely on a lot is loan signings due to a

restrained budget, and I think the high volume of player turnover this season has been the main reason for inconsistency. The instability of the squad impacted results massively, but even during our bad run early on in the season nobody really feared relegation.

You're safely in mid-table with an outside chance of the Play-Offs and well clear of the relegation scrap. What do you want to see from your team's final two months of the season? What would you think the expectation will be at the start of next season?

Personally I think the Play-Offs are out of sight, but I want to see us put a good run of form together that we can hopefully take in to next season. Play-Offs will definitely be the aim next season.

Gone are the days of the Steve Evans, Matt Tubbs and serious money being spent at the Broadfield Stadium – what is now the long-term vision of the club going forward do you think?

With the new Turkish owners hopefully taking over club in the next week or so, it should breathe new life into the club. They've set a realistic target of Championship



football within ten years, and this is something we should stick by.

Who has been your stand-out performer so far this season and why should Luton be wary of him today?

Matt Harrold has adapted well to his role as the main striker in the team, and with six goals in his last seven games, Luton should be wary of his attacking strength.

SEASONS PAST...

Tell us about you. Why do you support Crawley? When did it all start? What was your first game? What do you remember about it?

I first went to a game in 2007. We played Forest Green Rovers on a Tuesday night in November and drew 1-1. My dad's friend had been going to games previously and

asked us this particular evening if we'd like to come along. I remember it was freezing cold and one of our players waved at me as I was sitting behind the dug outs.

The back-to-back promotions between 2011 and 2012 – tell us about it. What was so special about following the club at that time? Who were the heroes on the pitch and which games in particular stood out for you?

It was an incredible two seasons. There was such an incredible vibe around the club and the atmosphere at games was second to none. In the Conference season, the stand out games were actually the ones we lost, as we only lost three all season! We'd become so used to winning that it was the norm. In League 2, the stand out game was a 4-2 win over Cheltenham as at the time they were the team chasing us for the third automatic promotion spot. Sergio Torres and Matt Tubbs were the heroes those years. Without Tubbs' 47 goals that season, who knows where we'd be now!

What's been your best memory as a Crawley fan?

As tempted as I am to say the Manchester United FA Cup tie, it's the 2-1 win over Championship Derby County two rounds previous that was the most memorable. A Monday night, torrential rain, and one of the best cup upsets there's been. The scenes when Torres' 91st minute winner went in were incredible.

LUTON AND CRAWLEY

What are your best and worst memories of Crawley and Luton clashes? Do any games in particular stick out?

Although I wasn't at the game, the 2-1 away victory in the Conference winning season was a huge win. Last season's JPT win here at Kenilworth Road was also great. The worst memory would probably have to be this season's FA Cup game at home. It was my first Crawley game since I went to university so I was gutted we lost!

What do you expect from today's game? What's your prediction? Are you looking forward to sitting in the away end?

It'll be a really tough game for us. Our away form isn't great and you've been on a great run

recently so we'll do well to get a result. I'll go for a 1-1 draw. Unfortunately I can't make today's game but I'll be cheering on the boys from my Uni halls!

Club historian ROGER WASH tells the story of the match behind today's programme cover

LUTON TOWN 3 CRAWLEY TOWN 0

1st September 2009

Much has been written about the 'minus 30' season of 2008/09 but as the campaign wore on it became sadly inevitable that we would be relegated out of the Football League.

Surprisingly and gratifyingly the supporters remained remarkably positive and felt that our stay in non-League would be of only twelve months duration and with over 4000 season tickets sold we were all looking forward to the ride.

Many changes to the playing staff were made over the summer of 2009 with the persuasive tongue of manager Mick Harford enticing players to Kenilworth Road who we would never have thought would drop down to non-League.

The publication of the fixture list threw up many away trips to places that we had never visited before and had hardly heard of bearing in mind we were in the Championship only two years before. Where do Forest Green play? Where is Histon and is Ebbsfleet north or south of the river?

The journey into the unknown began at Wimbledon (or Kingston to be more precise) on a hot day in August where a capacity crowd saw the Town stride around like thoroughbreds against newly promoted opposition but could only come away with a point following a 1-1 draw.


The disappointment was soon put to one side when Mansfield were put to the sword 4-1 in our first home

game before Gateshead returned to the north-east following a 2-1 defeat.

Next up was a mid-week trip to the depths of Gloucestershire where 869 Hatters made up half the crowd at Forest Green. The three points earned from a 1-0 victory was the only highlight of a less than inspiring performance as expectation levels failed to match the exploits on the pitch.

There then followed a 0-0 home draw with Chester in a game that was thankfully expunged later in the season and a 0-0 physical battering at Kettering where all police (and horses and helicopters) leave in a 100 mile radius was cancelled to look after the placid Luton supporters.

The league table was now beginning to take shape with the Hatters in fifth spot, five points behind leaders Oxford who were the only other unbeaten side in the division.

Crawley came to Kenilworth Road in the following mid-week and a respectable crowd of 6389 turned up to see if the Town could put on a performance to match the previous game under floodlights when Mansfield were thrashed.

The Town started brightly and went for their opponents from

the first whistle playing a 4-3-3 system that saw wide men Adam Newton and Tom Craddock run riot. For all their enterprising play the Hatters forwards could not find the net so it was left to defender George Pilkington, celebrating his Blue Square Premier Player of the Month award, to open the scoring with a tap-in on 36 minutes in a goalmouth melee following a corner.

Pilkington then registered his second double of the campaign when he netted with a powerful header from a Kevin Nicholls corner

after 61 minutes. Four minutes later the game was put to bed when Craddock headed home a delightful Claude Gnakpa cross at the far post.

After that chances were made and spurned in a one-sided contest.

Assistant manager Kevin Watson said afterwards, "Of late I don't think we have been closing down as a group. Tonight was back to the Mansfield performance for me and I think that's as positive we have been for a while."

THE PROGRAMME



The Town produced a 68 page programme for the visit of Crawley which, because of problems at the printers, was not available at the start of the game!

Mick Harford, in his manager's notes section, gave praise to his defence who had conceded only three goals at that stage in the season. He particularly praised the defending at Kettering where a team of giants bombarded us but could not find a way through.

Harford spoke of the mini injury crisis that had deprived us of Keith Keane and Liam Hatch in particular and announced the loan signing from Plymouth of George Donnelly (who went on to make four appearances all off the bench during his short stay).

It had been announced that under police advice the games against Eastbourne Borough had been reversed. Presumably this was to prevent an invading horde taking over Eastbourne just after Christmas!

DEFINING MOMENTS

FOOTBALL HISTORIAN **LEIGH EDWARDS** SELECTS EIGHT KEY MATCHES
AND EVENTS THAT HAVE SHAPED CRAWLEY TOWN'S POST-WAR ERA

1969 CRAWLEY'S PREMIER STATUS

Phil Basey was leading marksman with 17 goals as Crawley Town won promotion to the Southern League Premier Division in 1968/69. Starting with a 3-0 win at home to Wisbech Town, they underlined their promotion credentials with an exciting 14-match unbeaten run. Crawley triumphed 5-0 at Gravesend, then Phil Basey grabbed a hat-trick in a 4-2 win at home to Corby Town. They maintained their challenge with just two defeats in 19 matches, winning a home 4-0 to Bexley United and 5-2 to Merthyr Tydfil. John Leedham, John Maggs and Derek Tharme were ever-present as Crawley finished fourth with 55 points.

1984 PROMOTION WINNERS

Brian Gregory was leading marksman for the second consecutive season as Crawley Town won promotion to the Southern League Premier Division in 1983/84. The Reds were unbeaten in their opening four matches, then overcame defeats at home to Poole

and Basingstoke to emerge as pacesetters with a 13-match unbeaten run, trouncing Thanet United 6-0. Brian Gregory grabbed hat-tricks in 5-0 wins at home to Woodford and Andover as Crawley finished Southern League Southern Division runners-up. Steve Breach, Rick Collier and Brian Gregory were ever-present, while Cliff Cant and Bob Glozier were also key figures.

2003 SOUTHERN LEAGUE CUP WINNERS

The Red Devils won the Southern League Cup for the first time in 2002/03. They overcame Sittingbourne, Hastings United, Ashford Town, Burnham, Chelmsford City and King's Lynn to reach the Southern League Cup final against Halesowen Town. Warren Bagnall scored on the hour in the first-leg at The Grove on 15th April 2003 but two late goals gave Halesowen a 2-1 lead. Crawley levelled the tie with Nigel Brake's goal after 12 minutes in the second-leg at Broadfield Stadium two weeks later and leading marksman Nick McDonnell scored on 54 minutes as Crawley won 2-0 in front of 1,049 and triumphed 3-2 on aggregate.

2004 SOUTHERN LEAGUE 'DOUBLE'

Charlie Macdonald was top scorer with 19 goals as Crawley Town stormed to the Southern League title in 2003/04. The Reds were never seriously challenged after going top of the table, trouncing Hednesford 6-1 as they netted a total of 77 Southern League goals and had the equal best defensive record, finishing 12 points above runners-up Weymouth to reach the Conference for the first time. They also won the Southern League Cup, defeating Havant & Waterlooville 3-2, Welling United 1-0, Dover Athletic 1-0 and Eastleigh 2-0 en route to the final, then beating Moor Green 4-1 on aggregate to clinch a memorable double.

2007 EVANS APPOINTED MANAGER

Steve Evans was appointed manager of Crawley Town in May 2007. The Glaswegian's managerial career had started with Holbeach United and he guided Stamford to the United Counties League title in 1997/98. Appointed Boston United's boss in October 1998, he plotted their 1999-2000 Southern League Premier Division title and 2001-02 Conference title triumphs, then returned for a second stint as Boston's manager.

He steered Crawley to the Blue Square Premier title and FA Cup fifth round twice, then to within touching distance of promotion in 2011/12 before resigning in April 2012 to become Rotherham United's manager.

2011 CUP VISIT TO OLD TRAFFORD

The Red Devils reached the FA Cup fifth round for the first time in 2010/11. The epic run started with a 1-0 victory at Newport County and Crawley stormed to a 5-0 win at Guiseley in the first round proper. Ben Smith netted twice in Crawley's 3-2 victory at Swindon after extra-time in the second round replay, then Sergio Torres' injury-time goal clinched a 2-1 third round win at home to Derby County. Matt Tubbs scored to secure a 1-0 fourth round victory at Torquay and Crawley visited Manchester United in the fifth round. They lost 1-0 to Wes Brown's goal watched by 74,778 at Old Trafford on 19th February 2011.

2011 RECORD BREAKING CHAMPIONS

Crawley clinched the Blue Square Premier title with a 3-0 victory at Tamworth on 9th April 2011. Two goals by Matt Tubbs plus another from Charlie Wassmer secured promotion to the Football League in front of 1,569 at The Lamb. Steve Evans' side started with a 1-0 defeat at home to Grimsby but lost only two more matches, 2-1 at AFC Wimbledon and 3-2 at home to Newport County. The Reds were undefeated in their last 30 games including a 7-0 win over Altrincham and won the title by a 15 point margin. Tubbs was top scorer in the Blue Square Premier with 37 goals as Crawley won the title with a record 105 points.

2012 PROMOTION AT FIRST ATTEMPT

The club clinched promotion to League 1 with a 1-0 victory over Accrington Stanley at the Crown Ground on 5th May 2012. Scott Neilson's second-half winner enabled Crawley to finish third in League 2 and secure promotion at the first attempt. They had begun life in the Football League with a 2-2 draw at Port Vale and climbed to the top after losing just three of their opening 21 games. Crawley also beat Bury, Redbridge, Bristol City and Hull City en route to a 2-0 FA Cup fifth round defeat at home to Stoke City. Another 13-match unbeaten run set up promotion despite the shock departure of manager Steve Evans to Rotherham.

WHAT'S THE STORY?

Jack Marriott's goal 14 minutes from time handed the Hatters a third victory on the spin. The striker slotted home his 11th goal of the season from an acute angle following Paddy McCourt's pass to finally break Morecambe's resistance.

Marriott went close in the first half with a shot that bounced inches wide of the post but the forward made no mistake to secure the Hatters their first back-to-back home wins since September.

Goalkeeper Mark Tyler was tested in the first half when blocking Kevin Ellison's shot and then saved from Chris Doyle's header in the second.

But that was as close as the visitors came as the Town dominated possession and the chances against the Shrimps.

Craig Mackail-Smith and Marriott were both denied before the latter notched the winning goal with calm and composed finish on 74 minutes.




JONES SAID:



Hatters striker Jack Marriott believes the partnerships he is making with his fellow front men has proved pivotal in his recent run of goal-scoring form.

The 21-year-old slotted home from an acute angle in the 1-0 victory against Morecambe in our last home games, his third goal in four games at the time.

But Marriott feels the relationships with Craig Mackail-Smith and Paddy McCourt have been just as important as sticking the ball in the net himself.

He said: "When you see Paddy running at pace, you know he's going to try for that jink or through ball, and I saw Macca was in front of me and we were both looking to get in behind the Morecambe defence.

"If it had fallen to Craig it would have been great because I trust him to finish it, but I was glad to get it too and slot it home.

"It's a very enjoyable partnership with Macca, we both have a lot of energy and are both always looking to make those runs for the team.

"With someone like Paddy in the team playing in that number 10 role, you know you're going to be getting the service in and around the edge of the area and he'll give you chances between defenders."

Marriott's midweek goal was his 11th of the campaign, a tally he bettered against Leyton Orient last Saturday.

PROUD

It could have been even more if a first-half chance was converted, but the striker is proud of his goal-scoring accolades of the season so far.

"I was kicking myself at half-time for not tucking home chance, but I was glad to get a second opportunity to make up for it and ultimately get the goal that decided the game," Marriott continued.

"My touch took me too far wide on the first one, making it a bit too hard for myself but I still backed myself to score. For the goal I was running away from goal a little bit but managed to get the angle and a bit of power and get it under the keeper.



"I'm very pleased with how it's gone so far. It's my first season as a genuine first team player so I'm glad to be amongst the goals. Hopefully I can score some more over the season."

The change in manager could potentially have led to an unsettling time for a youngster enjoying a sixth club in his young career to date.

But Marriott is thankful to both John Still and Nathan Jones for the opportunities and, humbly, is just hoping he can maintain a place in the starting line-up.

"We kept knocking at the door, thankfully we managed to get through and got the goal to get us that three points," said Marriott after the Morecambe success.

"I'm just happy to be playing, it's nice to be in the team. Scoring goals is good as well, but I just like having that place and just try to push on to go from there.

"The gaffer has been brilliant, we're all really enjoying ourselves and we're playing well on the pitch. You're always going to experience changes in the manager through the game of football, I saw that at Carlisle too, and I think loan appearances like that have left me in good stead going forward."



WHAT'S THE STORY?

Jack Marriott's spectacular first-half lob proved the only goal of the game as the Hatters made it four consecutive League 2 wins with victory at Leyton Orient.

Marriott made the most of Craig Mackail-Smith's flick-on to notch his 12th goal of the season, and a fourth in five outings.

But it wasn't all plain sailing for a Town side under pressure for large periods of the second half, but a fantastic defensive display ensured the side held on for a fifth win in six, moving to 50 points and to 12th in the League 2 table.

The Hatters defence – which included new loan signing in goalkeeper Jonathan Mitchell – stood firm at Brisbane Road and the victory could have been made sweeter had Dan Potts, making his first appearance since October, seen his curling shot drift inches past the post in the second half.

BACK IN THE FRAME

LEFT-BACK GLAD FOR FIRST TEAM RETURN

Town full-back Dan Potts is hoping that his performance against Leyton Orient last Saturday can lead to a prolonged spell in the Hatters first team.

The 21-year-old featured in his first game under Nathan Jones in the 1-0 victory, his first start since the defeat to Plymouth back in October.

But now the former West Ham man is looking to make himself a feature of Jones' plans having deputised for the injured Jake Howells at Brisbane Road.

"Sometimes you need those breaks. Jake was doing well, which is credit to him, but as all players tell you, you need to be ready just in case you do personally get that bit of luck", said Potts, with a croaky voice post-match.

"I want to be playing every week, I don't want to be filling gaps, I want to be the first one on the team-sheet for my position, so it's vital that when I do get those breaks, like today, that I take them.

"I felt good in myself out there and hopefully I can push on. I've felt ready for whenever the gaffer wants me in, so that transition felt smooth. I know what to expect when coming in, and that's the sort of consistency we need.

"It's been a stop-start season personally, having had a couple of niggles with my hamstring. I'm over them, so now I just need things to run smoothly within myself and I can try and clinch that position."

Potts was not the only man making his first Hatters start under the new manager, with goalkeeper

Jonathan Mitchell arriving in the week to take his place in the starting line-up.

And Potts believes the 'keeper joined the back four in being instrumental in the Town's second consecutive clean sheet and ninth away win of the campaign.

"Mitch has come in literally today, so fair play to him. He literally rocked up at the team hotel this morning! I thought he was a different class for a guy making his league debut, but all credit to him.

"They bombarded us in the second half at times, but we dealt with it and Scott Cuthbert was different class.

"It's those sorts of performances that the manager will be happy with. We'll need more of those with some tough away games coming up."

that this was a big game, especially away from home," continued Potts.

"It was a different type of performance, but those sorts of performances and the clean sheets are the ones that will get us where we want to be, and if we keep those up we'll be there or hereabouts come the end of the season.

"Twelfth is still way off where we want to be, but with three points the gap it's really not, and we are getting there game by game. You only had to be in that dressing room after to feel the vibes, we all saw the gaffer after the game and that passion.

"He's come in and been different class for everyone. He's had one-on-one meetings with everyone, and got involved with training. Each manager has his own way of doing things, how they want to operate and that's his decision."



The success at Orient marked a fourth successive League 2 victory for the Hatters, prompting Potts to still harbour aspirations for a Play-Off place.

"We had three on the bounce before Orient, but all the lads knew

The journey

The programme

There was a page on club legend Bob Morton and later in the book there was a three-page interview with former Hatter, Matthew Spring which was worth a read. This was one of the better programmes we've had on the road this season.

Rating:

The match

TI had a feeling this would be a good game before it began and I wasn't wrong! The Town made two changes as Mark Tyler had moved on and in came new loanee Jonathan Mitchell for his debut. Dan Potts replaced the injured Jake Howells.

The match began fairly even. Orient seemed to be targeting our left-hand side but never created

too much in the early part while we looked to get after Orient on the counter with the pace of Craig Mackail-Smith and Jack Marriott combined with the passing skills of Paddy McCourt and Ollie Lee.

We had the first chance when a cross made its way to Mackail-Smith in the box. It looked like he could have hit it on the volley but decided to chest it down. The ball ran to Marriott on the other side of the box but he was squeezed out and the chance had gone.

There was a lengthy delay soon after as a cross came in and there was a collision between Mitchell and one of the Orient defenders. You could tell by the reaction it was a nasty injury for the defender and seven minutes later he was stretchered off.

Orient had to reshuffle and by the time they did they were 1-0 down. Mitchell, exuding plenty of confidence and displaying a monster kick, belted a ball down field. Mackail-Smith headed it on and Marriott got in behind. He looked up, saw the goalkeeper off his line and lobbed it over him delightfully to send 1,400 Town fans absolutely mad!

The second half was very much a back to the wall sort of 45 minutes. We had probably the best chance of the half, though. Pelly Ruddock came on and was played through and the ball broke to Potts on the edge of the box. He hit it first time right footed but it just went past the post.

The rest of the match saw us having to defend a barrage of balls into our box but really and truly we did it pretty comfortably. Orient barely saw our goal in the second half despite all their possession and when the full-time whistle went the Luton end erupted and erupted again when the manager came over showing plenty of passion.

They often say players play their best against their former clubs especially those with a point to prove and that was certainly the case for Scott Cuthbert here. The defender was absolutely immense under the weight of pressure we were under in the second half. There was barely a cross he didn't attack and clear

and not an opening that presented itself that he didn't close down. He was clearly motivated to play well back on his old stomping ground and he did just that. This was his best outing in a Town shirt.

Summary

This was one of the best away days for a while. Inside the ground the atmosphere was absolutely brilliant and outside the ground both the journey there and the one back went smooth. We were back in Luton by 6.30 which was good as I had a birthday party for my dad to get to for 7!

The win moved us to within three points of the Play-Offs and there was certainly plenty of talk about sneaking into the end of season lottery on the way home. A fourth win on the trot certainly felt good and made for a very good evening!

TYLER SAYS GOODBYE

VETERAN KEEPER CALLS TIME ON TOWN CAREER

Out-going goalkeeper Mark Tyler says it was with a heavy heart that he has agreed to leave the Hatters for former club Peterborough United.

Tyler signed for the Town in the summer of 2009 and went onto make 297 appearances for the Club across six-and-a-half years but rejoins Posh on an initial three-month loan with a view to a permanent deal.

"I wouldn't have left Luton for any other club," Tyler told lutontown.co.uk. "It's great opportunity for me at Peterborough and I couldn't turn it down.

"The Club [Luton] have been great, the manager and board realised this was something I wanted to do and for that I'd like to thank them."

Tyler made his Town debut in a 1-1 draw at AFC Wimbledon in the Club's first game in the Conference.

He said: "I remember coming down and talking to Mick Harford – the move for me was a no brainer at the time. I came to play as I wasn't for Posh.

"I remember my first game at Wimbledon and thinking 'wow'. The fans were absolutely incredible and I can still see them going crazy when we scored. I don't think I realised what I'd let myself in for but I soon came to realise how amazing the fans were.

"The club are the fans and I think we got

on really well together. I just did the best I could and I hope that made them happy."

Tyler lost in two successive Play-Off final defeats before the Hatters finally got it right under John Still and won the Conference at a canter in 2013/14 to seal a return to the Football League.

"The season we won the Conference was incredible," said Tyler. "100 points and 100 goals, 23 clean sheets. The 27-match unbeaten run...It was a magnificent season and a special year and I won't forget the celebrations in town after the season had ended."

Through good times and bad, Tyler's seen it. A 1-0 win at boyhood club Norwich in the FA Cup was followed seven days later with a 1-0 defeat at Barrow in the Conference.


"There's been plenty of ups and downs," Tyler laughs. "For me personally the win at Norwich, with all my family there, was a dream come true. The same when I went

back to Peterborough this season. It was another thing to tick off the list.

"But I will miss the fans. They've stayed with the club through thick and thin and backed us all the way.


"I'd like to thank them and everyone at Luton and hopefully I'll be back soon to say goodbye.





Luton Town in the COMMUNITY

At the Trust we are always looking for ways to use the power of football to improve and engage with our local community and especially in all of our local schools.

Children are our future is a cliché but more importantly for us they are also our future supporters and we make sure we put lots of our resources into Bedfordshire schools to get the name of Luton Town out there and also encourage the next generation of supporters to come to a game.

Premier League Reading Stars – Hatters Literacy Double Club

While our main focus of school's engagement will always be our Free School Sport project to get as many children active as possible, one of the latest ways we are engaging with local schools is through one of our newest and exciting projects, the Hatters Literacy Double Club.

Our new programme has been designed to stimulate pupils from both a Primary and High School setting ages 9-13 who have an interest in football but lack motivation to engage with and achieve in literacy and reading. The two groups we are focusing on are those often selected from an economically disadvantaged background and boys. Hatters community operations

manager, Daniel Douglas, believes getting this project out there for every primary and high school in Luton is our first target - living in one of the most vibrant multicultural towns in the country we have over 100 different languages being spoken in the town and we need to ensure the next generation all speak and read the same language. The language of football is a universal one but we need to make sure it's in English!

The Literacy Double Club is particularly successful in narrowing the gap between those who are reading at the expected level for their age and those who are underachieving. It is also particularly effective in transforming boys' attitudes towards literacy, but as you will notice, just by looking around Kenilworth Road this afternoon, we can't forget about the girls can we! We have plenty of girls taking part in the programme who are showing just as much enthusiasm as the boys engaging their passion for football to inspire a love of reading.

Our community staff are using a wide range of resources to deliver 10 regular weekly classroom based lessons which we refer to the students as their weekly fixtures for a class of up to 20 pupils. These exciting fixtures last up to 90 minutes with the pupils then taking part in their weekly one-hour practical football session at either lunchtime or as an afterschool club. The programme has made an instant impact for a lot of the children taking part already as they cannot wait



to get home to log on to their very own online 'Reading Stars' area where they get to complete challenges which involve a lot of reading comprehensions and other tasks.

The Double Club programme uses a wide range of children's texts (fiction, non-fiction and poetry) which have been highly recommended from our partners at the National Literacy Trust which the pupils get the chance to refer to and take home with them each week and many other fantastic opportunities for the young reading stars including author days at top Premier League stadiums, player reading visits and their very own 'Reading Stars' classroom equipment which includes lessons at Kenilworth Road.

Our educational team led Daniel, are keen to help as many lower achieving pupils in our town as possible and believe football can influence the way young people view reading.

Hatters through the GENERATIONS

IN THE LATEST IN OUR SERIES OF TALKING TO TOWN FANS OF THEIR EXPERIENCES OF WATCHING THE HATTERS DOWN THE YEARS, **STEVE ABBOTT** EXPLAINS HOW MUCH OF A ROLE THE CLUB PLAYS IN HIS LIFE.

Steve Abbott has enjoyed a career which has led him to living and working in some of the greatest and most iconic cities in the world.

Yet regardless of his location on the planet, his heart will always be racing for a two-hour window whenever a football match involving his beloved Luton Town is being played thousands of miles away.

"I can't imagine not knowing what's going on," says Steve, a stanch Hatter whose heart is also deeply entrenched in the music industry as a producer and A&R executive. "I fidget. A lot. I'm sure it's the same for many supporters who can't always get to Kenilworth Road."

We know the feeling. It's just that indescribable pull of Lutonia that keeps him coming back for more and flying in from around the globe to take his seat in the front row of the enclosure every other weekend.

They say home is where the heart is. Steve's love of all things Luton, including the Town, has led him to guest-curating a cultural literary festival of performance and poetry in the town which kicked off last week and will run until the start of April.

Some of Britain's best wordsmiths, musicians and actors will descend on the event which Steve has titled 'Lutonia' in honour of his hometown. It will host the likes of Dr John Cooper Clarke, his wife – and now converted Hatters fan – Cerys Matthews and Mike Garry.



"We toyed with the idea of holding a literally festival in Luton," explains Steve. "Last year we put on a Dillon Thomas poetry day. It was a great success – it sold-out straight away – I remember it well because it was the same day as Plymouth away and we won 1-0."

"The success of that got us thinking about how we could hold something authentic and dynamic that people would respond to. We wanted to host it in Luton to attract more people to town. We want people to realise there is more to Luton than meets the eye."

"We have artists attending who are recognised at the very top end

of their game. We have some of the best new talent out there and from our point of view we want to also educate people."

"That's where I see a link to football in that respect."

Being a big Luton fan and having watched so many games and worshipped the likes of Ricky Hill and Graham French, I feel as though my knowledge of the game has improved by seeing the players in close quarters. My knowledge makes the connection with the game, and with the club, stronger and that's the affect we want Lutonia to have.

▶▶▶ "It's exciting and spontaneous – very much like Luton Town! And it's all about perceptions. The Saturday after the Plymouth game I sat in the enclosure and it turned out a man I met at the Dillon Thomas event was sitting next to me! I know sport and art aren't exactly bed fellows, but there are football fans who are interested in record shops and visiting the oldest pub in Halifax – and it's all culture."

'Abbo', as he is also known following his days as the lead singer of legendary Luton punk band UK Decay, believes football and culture go hand in hand – an image cultivated during the 1970s and 80s and mirrored by the Hatters' success on the pitch in the latter decade.

"Culture defines a community," he says. "We chose the name 'Lutonia' because we felt it was synonymous when growing up in Luton in the 1970s and 1980s. We had a great football team and they were entertaining 12-15,000 people every week."

"Now there is even stronger community support, the council, the fans are all making important decisions about supporting the team and backing the town."

"Swansea is a great example. They

had always been in the shadow of Cardiff, both culturally and in football terms. But Swansea is now a real creative hub. They have a saying 'Swansea pulls together'. There are music and poetry festivals in the city and the football team are now in the Premier League playing with some panache – Swansea City are embodying the place – and that's how we want Luton to be."

Steve's passion for music, culture and making a difference, however, is probably engulfed by his thirst for Luton Town. Who else would honeymoon watching the Hatters play out a goalless draw at Bath City in the Conference?

"I get to 75 per cent of the home games and probably the same amount of away games, too," he says. "My first game was a 4-1 win over Halifax at Kenilworth Road in 1965."



"I remember getting a clout round the head from my dad, Les, for laughing at him after his coat was ripped after we'd scored one of the goals."

"There are so many amazing moments because memories in football always stay with you. I've been asked around the world 'why do you support Luton?' and the simple answer is 'there is no choice'."

"I grew up in Farley Hill and always remember the ritual of walking down to the ground. After that I never imagined not being a Luton fan. As a young boy I hated the summer, even if there was a great holiday I'd

miss the football and missed Luton." Like many Town supporters, the Littlewoods Cup win in 1988 over Arsenal at Wembley ranks highest on his all-time Hatters list of magical moments.

"It's obviously a favourite," says Steve. "It's funny, I have five kids, the eldest is 26, and they have all been told the bed-time story of the day that Luton won the cup."

"There have been a lot of great cup moments down the years but I don't think there have been any more dramatic. We really were the underdog that day. Even when I watch the game back I still don't think we're going to win!"

"But there have been plenty of other incredible memories. Ricky Hill running with the ball seemingly glued to his head against Peterborough, Steve Buckley's goal at Hereford, Wayne Turner's winner against Watford in the FA Cup. I could go on..."

The season the Town won the Conference title Abbo and UK Decay released an EP titled 'A Wonderful Town' – which included a version of the famous 'Hatters, Hatters' hit by the Barron Knights, which helped raise in excess of £6,000 for SOLYD and the Luton Foodbank.

If you haven't listened to it, we encourage you to get yourself a copy.

"In What a Wonderful Town one verse reads 'how lucky I was to be born 15 minutes up the road,'" says Steve.

"I've been a Luton fan for over 50 years, I've lived around the world, and am so proud of that. I hope people support the Lutonia initiative."

"For me it is like pulling the orange, blue and white shirt on, and despite the negatives that the rest of the world may throw against us, we are Luton, we're proud, and everything is possible for us."

A WORD FROM The Football League Paper

It's taken 11 months, 20 matches and a world of heartbreak, but Dagenham & Redbridge have finally won at home.

John Still's men beat League 2 relegation rivals York 1-0 on Saturday, their first victory at the Vic since 25th April last year.

It's been a miserable year for the Daggers, who currently sit smack bottom of the Football League, but it could have been worse. Compared to some sides, they're on a hot streak.

San Marino 65 games

Still's Daggers have got nothing on these lads, a bunch of part-timers plucked from a population of just 31,000. That's roughly the same size as Bognor Regis. Since their formation in 1990, Europe's whipping boys - and there is plenty of competition for that role - have won just once, a friendly against Liechtenstein at the 65th time of asking.

Chances are, however, that record will soon be broken. Since that glorious day in 2004, the world's

196th-best team have played a further 61 games without tasting victory.

Droylsden 47 games

During the 2013/14 season, Droylsden were locked in a battle with Lancashire neighbours Hyde over who could go the longest without winning a game. The Bloods won by a mile.

By the time they notched a 4-3 victory over Witton Albion in March 2014, NPL side Droylsden had gone 47 matches and over 11 months without pocketing three points and - by that stage - were already relegated.

Even their long-awaited victory was hard earned, the Bloods blowing a 3-0 half-time lead before rallying to net a late winner. "I said we'd have a party when we finally won a game," said manager Dave Pace. "And that's just what we did." For the record, Conference side Hyde halted their abysmal run two months earlier, stopping the clock at 29 matches.

Derby County 38 games

Promoted under Billy Davies in May 2007, the Rams were woefully

underprepared and even managed to depose Sunderland as the worst side in Premier League history. If victory over Newcastle in the sixth game of the season appeared to signal lift off, a 5-0 drubbing at Arsenal the following week swiftly extinguished the boosters. Though Davies was replaced by survival expert Paul Jewell, the Rams failed to win any of their remaining 32 matches and finished the season with just 11 points - both top flight records.

Worse yet, their run extended a further six games into the following campaign, setting an all-time record in English football. And who knows - should Derby win promotion, there's still a chance to continue that Premier League record too.

Tasmania 1900 Berlin 31 games

In 1965, during the formative years of the Bundesliga, Hertha Berlin were demoted for breaking league rules. For reasons both political and financial, it was decided that their replacement must come from the Berlin area.

Unfortunately, most of Berlin's half-decent sides wanted no part of the scheme, meaning a tiny regional outfit called Tasmania 1900 Berlin were hoisted into the top flight - with predictable results.

By the end of the campaign, they'd scored 15, conceded 108, lost 28 times, amassed just 10 points and gone on a winless streak of 31 games. All of which remain Bundesliga records.

All of a sudden the Town are in striking distance of the top seven thanks to last weekend's win at Leyton Orient and the results in midweek.

The Hatters closed the gap on Orient to three points following the 1-0 win at Brisbane Road, while AFC Wimbledon – who occupy the final Play-Off place – were beaten 3-1 at Bristol Rovers on Tuesday night.

As the table stands today it looks as though there is just one place in the top seven for grabs for a host of sides outside the top seven. Just five points separate Exeter in 14th and Wimbledon in seventh.

Northampton look as though they won't need the Play-Offs – Chris Wilder's side are 13 points clear

at the top and 19 points ahead of fourth-placed Portsmouth. Could they lift the title the day the Hatters roll into Sixfields on 30th April?

Oxford and Plymouth drew 2-2 with each other last weekend, which allowed Portsmouth and Bristol Rovers the opportunity to close the gap on the automatic promotion places. The pair are now on 59 points, six points behind Argyle who lie third on goal difference.

The Daggers then followed that up on Tuesday with a goalless draw with Carlisle. Still's side are still six points from safety, however. York also sit in the bottom two, while Hartlepool and Stevenage have been sucked into trouble – even though Pools triumphed at Barnet last weekend.
