As I've already mentioned, it's been a very busy time and we've had to use most of our squad in the games so far.

I'm looking forward to being getting to the stage where I'm able to pick a settled team while getting some important time with the players on the training ground, as it seems we're playing, recovering and then preparing for game after game at the moment.

I'm not complaining though as we wouldn't have this tie to look forward

to without having experienced the euphoria of the Villa win, and success in the cups will always bring extra matches.

# FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH CHIEF EXECUTIVE **GARY SWEET**

Good evening and welcome to Kenilworth Road everyone!

Who said they were missing live football in the close season? From a footballing void to a fast and gruelling schedule taking on seven games in 22 days is a hectic schedule to kick the season off, to say the least. And even though it's tough on our small, young squad in some ways (and tough on the pocket for many supporters, too) football at Kenilworth Road is just as welcome as you are, especially under the floodlights and especially hosting Leeds United.

May I ask you to join me in welcoming Garry Monk with his staff and players and the 1,500 Leeds supporters making the long midweek journey. After an eight-year fixture gap, it's good to have the Yorkshiremen back.

We now know what Leeds went through that season we last played each other, 2007-2008. After joining us in relegation from the Championship the previous season, the Whites were issued a 15-point deduction by the Football League for exiting administration without a CVA in the same period we entered administration and got ourselves relegated again before we, 2020, took custodianship.

Our own 40-point fate is scorched markedly in our souls, not just the record books. Whilst neither club has fully recovered from that hapless era, our punishment (or "sanction" as the League put it) and the resultant forfeiture of enduring five years of rehabilitation in the Conference has since well and truly defined us. Moreover, it has fiercely ignited a purpose within our culture which fuels our ambitious desire and our current resurgence.

## DRUBBING

In October that prior season, I remember taking my usual seat in the enclosure to witness a magnificent 5-1 drubbing of Leeds putting us in a strong play-off position vying for Premier League membership. Within days, Sol Davis suffered a stroke en route to our 5-0 battering at Ipswich and our erstwhile chairman put our Club into administration leading to a continued positional decline for six seasons.

Tonight will be different, of course. In fact, we're hoping that another victory over Leeds tonight and an inspiring cup run may help springboard a continued six-year rise up the football pyramid. There's no reason why we

shouldn't adopt such an optimistic outlook with a new training ground just around the corner, a new stadium in planning, Nathan Jones at the helm and the best crop of young talent our club has probably ever seen, is there?

Of course, this next period of growth isn't just about one result but the recent histories of our two Clubs – along with significant games between us – tell a poignant story. Football is a cyclical game. Clubs fall and, if steered properly, clubs rise again. The impetus around Luton Town right now has a solid momentum which is recognised by many. Even Ladbrokes – after our 3-1 victory over Villa in the last round – offered a special on us to become Premier League members by 2021 at ridiculously short odds of 7-2. Amazing!

As you know, as a board, it isn't our style to promise Premier League football within five years; not even ironically. But we do take encouragement by the examples set by other clubs, such as Bournemouth, Swansea and Hull, who were all Football League Two competitors of ours since we last played tonight's opponents.





It's fair to say that much of the confidence in our progress originates from our sound plans for our relocation to Power Court being facilitated by our development at Newlands Park; not just the plans but the designs, detail and the noteworthy fact that our planning applications will be validated by Luton Borough Council before the end of this week.

### NOTEWORTHY

The validation of a planning application is noteworthy because, not only does it mean the Town Hall's planning department recognise that our applications contain all of the necessary reports and assessments for them to consider an approval but, more pertinently, both applications will be uploaded to the Council's website kicking-off their four-week public consultation process.

During these two fortnights you will have the opportunity to give your considered opinions to the Council based upon your considered review of our applications. Ultimately, do you think both applications together are good or bad for Luton?

Last Thursday I was asked to attend a joint supporters club meeting to explain this process and establish the best way they could give their support, if they decided that's what they would do.

It became absolutely clear that the organisations that represent your views understand the critical importance to act during this period as representatives of no less than six groups were active at the meeting.

Whilst we naturally think our own applications are both painstakingly ingenious, detailed and flawless and will regenerate our Club and our town, it is not the Club's remit to petition public support for the two applications as it wouldn't be fair to do so.

It is important to note that the extent of public opinion will ultimately help define the outcome of our relocation. If the weight of support is overwhelming, Power Court will be our new home, hopefully, by 2020. If, however, the balanced weight of public opinion is more negative than positive, Kenilworth Road will remain our home for the foreseeable future.

We know we will have strong opponents to the scheme; primarily we think from commercial objectors whose remonstrations will be professional and polished, as one would expect.

### EAGER

Supporters groups, including Luton Town Supporters Trust, Loyal Luton Supporters Club, Luton Town Disabled Supporters Club and even Bobbers Travel, Hatters Talk and Luton Outlaws, are more than eager to make their positions known and will be urging you to avoid apathy and make your thoughts known to the planning department once you can review the applications on the Council's website.

Once the material is in public domain you are free to support or object to our plans, and we would strongly encourage you to do exactly that. This is our Town, this is our time; don't waste the opportunity to make a difference.

## SELECT GROUP TWO MATCH OFFICIALS

The EFL and the Professional Game Match Officials Ltd (PGMOL) have announced details of a new group of Match Officials who will officiate across the Championship and support development of refereeing standards across England

The new group will be known as Select Group Two and include 18 referees and 36 assistants. The move has been made possible due to investment from all 24 Championship clubs as part of a new initiative in England that looks to promote honesty, integrity and positive behaviour across football from players and staff alike.

This initiative has been introduced alongside a revision of the game's laws, designed to make them easier to understand and to ensure greater consistency by officials.

Shaun Harvey, EFL Chief Executive said: "The job of a referee has always been an unforgiving one and today they face increasing scrutiny over how they perform.

"The expectations that were being placed on some officials were exceptionally unfair given that they may have been holding a full-time job during the week before being asked to referee a game at the weekend. The move to full-time officials also presents us with a more long-term opportunity

of supporting our ex-players and getting them back into the professional game by training as an official."

"The 18 Select Group 2 officials will predominantly work across the Championship, but as part of the new development programme it will allow an enhanced training programme for officials in League One and Two"

The EFL has also clarified its referee and assistant appointment policy for season 2016/17.

The restrictions mean match officials will not be eligible to participate in certain games if they:

- Reside in the same town or city as either club;
- Have played for any of the participating clubs at youth, under-21 (reserve) or senior level;
- Take an active interest in a club (season/match ticket currently or previously);
- Have personal connections with a participating club.

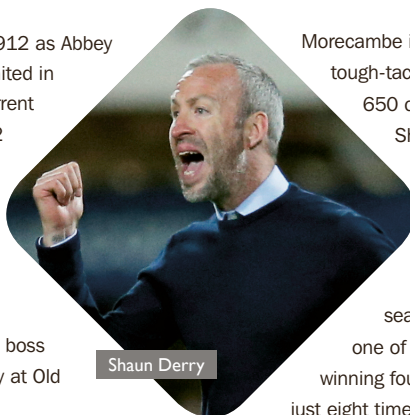
Our third Saturday away trip out of four sees us make another relatively short journey to East Anglia next week to take on Cambridge United for the 20th time in seven years

**WHO?** Cambridge were formed in 1912 as Abbey United before becoming Cambridge United in 1951. The U's have played at their current home, the Abbey Stadium, since 1932 and adopted their amber and black colours in 1920. Cambridge won promotion to the Football League the same year as Town in 2014, and current manager Shaun Derry took over from Richard Money in November 2015 after the former Town boss had guided the U's to an FA Cup replay at Old Trafford.

**TICKETS** This local clash always has some added spice and you can still buy tickets for the short trip to East Anglia (See details on opposite page).

**HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE?** Town and Cambridge have become familiar with each other over the past seven seasons, facing up 19 times. Luton have enjoyed the experiences, winning seven, whilst Cambridge have beaten the Hatters on just four occasions. With 14 of those meetings coming in the league, Town have earned three points on six occasions with seven draws, Cambridge winning just one game.

**IN CHARGE** Shaun Derry took charge at the Abbey Stadium six months after leaving his first managerial job at boyhood club Notts County. Derry was in charge at Meadow Lane for 16 months and left in March 2015. He won 25 of his 76 matches in charge of County with 14 draws and 37 losses, but won 13 of his 31 matches in 2015/16 with Cambridge, including a 7-0 demolition of

Morecambe in April. As a player, Derry was a tough-tackling central midfielder, playing over 650 career games for the likes of County, Sheffield United, Portsmouth, Crystal Palace, Nottingham Forest, Leeds, QPR and Millwall.

### PREVIOUS FORM

The U's finished the 2015/16 season on a high note as they lost just one of their last 11 games last season, winning four and drawing six. They conceded just eight times in those 11 outings. Cambridge are still waiting for their first league win of the current campaign, having drawn both home games with Barnet and Carlisle, but losing on their trips to Colchester and Doncaster. They did pull off one of the shocks of the EFL Cup first round, however, beating Championship club Sheffield Wednesday in extra-time to book a trip to Wolves.

**KNOWNG ME, KNOWNG YOU** Town star Cameron McGeehan spent time on loan at Cambridge from Norwich in 2013/14 before rejoining the Hatters, scoring three goals in six appearances. Two Cambridge players used to ply their trade in Luton colours as defender Greg Taylor, who spent a season-and-a-half with the Hatters after joining from Darlington in November 2011, is now a member of Shaun Derry's side. And one of the Hatters' 2015/16 loanees now wears the amber and black of Cambridge in the form of Joe Pigott, who scored four goals in 15 games on loan from Charlton last season before his free transfer to the U's in the summer.

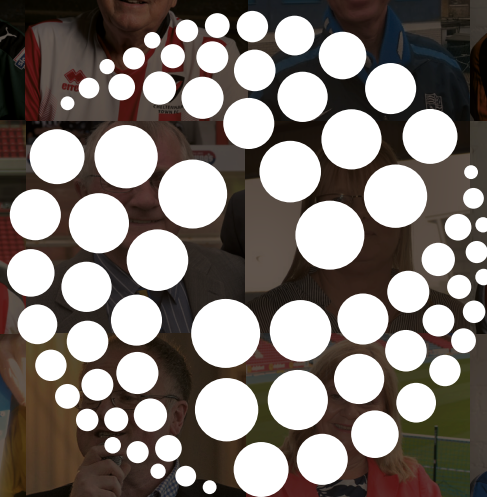

# WELCOME LEEDS UNITED

This evening we welcome the second Championship side of the season to Kenilworth Road as Leeds United make the trip south for this EFL Cup Second Round match.

Leeds reached the second round after avoiding a shock against Fleetwood after they went a goal behind as Marcus Antonsson netted his first goal in England to draw Leeds level.

Chris Wood put Leeds in front four minutes into extra time but they were pegged back once again before coming through 5-4 in a penalty shootout.

Since returning to the Championship in 2010, the Elland Road faithful have had to settle for mid-table finishes five seasons on the bounce, finishing between 13th and 15th for the previous five campaigns.

It will be the first time Town have played Leeds since the 2007/08 season, when Leeds earned four points over the Hatters en route to the play-offs, whilst Town were condemned to relegation to League Two.

Leeds scraped a 1-0 win at Elland Road thanks to a Tresor Kandol first-half strike before Sam Parkin earned Luton a point at Kenilworth Road in March 2008 with a 90th-minute equaliser after Paul Huntingdon had opened the scoring.

In charge then was Dennis Wise, but the Whites have had 14 managers in just eight and a half years since the former Chelsea and England midfielder left the Yorkshire club.

Leeds' current boss is former Swansea manager Garry Monk, who joined the club in the summer after owner Massimo Cellino chose not to extend Steve Evans' contract.

Monk was sacked by Swansea in December after a 12-year affiliation with the Welsh club, but after 270 appearances and 77 games in charge, Monk was dismissed after a run of one win in 11 that saw the Swans drop to 15th in the Premier League.

But after six months away, Monk had a new role at Elland Road.

He decided to strengthen all over the pitch this summer as former England goalkeeper Rob Green joined from QPR, whilst Monk used his contacts at Swansea to bring in Kyle Bartley and Matt Grimes on loan deals.

Former Swansea winger Pablo Hernandez also arrived on loan from Qatar club Al-Arabi, who once cost the Swans £5.5 million.

Leeds fourth loan signing was striker Hadi Sacko who was borrowed from Bordeaux, but Leeds splashed out £5 million this summer on attackers Kemar Roofe and Marcus Antonsson, who scored 40 goals between them last season.

Leeds have only come out victorious in Bedfordshire on three occasions and not since 1991, when Gary Speed and Rod Wallace goals gave the visitors a 2-0 win.

Since then, Luton have won one and drawn two of the three games at Kenilworth Road, including the 5-1 demolition of Leeds in October 2006. Carlos Edwards netted a brace and Rowan Vine and David Bell scored in consecutive minutes before Markus Heikkinen also got on the score sheet. Hayden Foxe scored Leeds' consolation.

#### GARRY MONK

The managerial merry-go-round reared its head at Leeds once again this summer and Bedford-born Garry Monk finds himself in charge at Elland Road after leaving Swansea last season.

### BETWEEN THE STICKS

#### ROBERT GREEN

Former England international Green beat off competition from Marco Silverstri and Ross Turnbull for the number one spot at Elland Road after arriving on a free transfer from QPR this summer.

#### LUKE AYLING

Versatile defender Ayling joined from Bristol City earlier in the season on a three-year deal. Ayling was promoted from League One with Bristol City in his first year after moving from Yeovil, who he played 185 games in just four seasons.

#### SOL BAMBA

At the heart of Leeds' back four is captain Bamba, a man mountain standing at 6ft 3in and over 14 stone. He spent a year at Leicester in 2011/12 before moving to Leeds in 2014, and scored four goals in 30 games last season.

#### KYLE BARTLEY

Garry Monk used his Swansea contacts to secure a loan spell for Bartley from the Welsh club. Bartley was an Arsenal academy product before dropping down to play for

Sheffield Wednesday, but has only managed 26 appearances since 2012 for the Swans.

#### CHARLIE TAYLOR

Leeds staved off interest for sought-after the left-back, who came through the club's academy. The 22-year-old made his debut in 2011 and has gone on to make 65 appearances.

### ACROSS THE MIDDLE

#### STUART DALLAS

The Northern Ireland international is one of two former Brentford men in the Leeds ranks. Winger Dallas can play on either flank and scored five goals last season.

#### TOUMANI DIAGOURAGA

The second ex-Bee at Elland Road is workhorse Diagouraga, who joined for an undisclosed fee in January. The central midfielder played 246 times in six years for Brentford, scoring seven times.

#### PABLO HERNANDEZ

Former Swansea winger Hernandez arrived in Yorkshire after spending two seasons alongside manager Monk. The Spaniard cost Swansea £5.5 million and scored five league goals in 57 Premier League appearances.

#### ALEX MOWATT

Exciting young talent who is another product of the Leeds academy. Mowatt signed his first contract in 2013, playing 101 games in three seasons since, scoring nine goals in 2014/15.

#### KEMAR ROOFE

The Yorkshire club won the race to sign Oxford forward Kemar Roofe for £3million this summer after scoring 18 goals in 40 league games last season. He joined from West Brom after scoring six goals in 16 games on loan before firing Oxford to promotion last season.

### UP FRONT

#### MARCUS ANTONSSON

Leeds splashed a reported £2million on striker Marcus Antonsson, who scored 22 goals for Swedish side Kalmar last season. The Swedish striker had scored just ten goals in four years prior to last season, but netted his first Leeds goal in the EFL Cup game against Fleetwood.

#### CHRIS WOOD

The New Zealand international has finally found a home after spells at Brighton, Birmingham, Bristol City, Millwall, Leicester and Ipswich. Wood is in his second season at Elland Road, scoring 13 times in his first year.

#### HADI SACKO

The 22-year-old is in his second loan spell away from boyhood club Bordeaux, spending the 2014/15 season at Sporting Lisbon without making an appearance. The Frenchman had never made a professional start until this season, when he started in the previous round at Fleetwood.

# FROM THE OAK ROAD

WITH ANDREW  
DALTON

Andrew Dalton, a Leeds United supporter of 25 years, gives us his thoughts on what lies in store for his team this season in Sky Bet Championship and this evening on their visit to Kenilworth Road...

## ► THE SEASON AHEAD

**You've got through a few managers in recent seasons...which one's been your favourite?**

Has to be Neil Redfearn for me and that's not because I now work with him on Radio Yorkshire! I just felt we had a period of stability and some of the youngsters performances were really encouraging, especially the likes of Charlie Taylor, Sam Byram, Lewis Cook and Alex Mowatt. I just now hope Garry Monk is given the opportunity to stamp his authority on the side.

**Monk seemed to be harshly treated at Swansea not long after seeing his name touted as a potential England manager. How has his appointment gone down?**

It seems to have gone down really well, he is a passionate guy and seems to be able to talk the talk, I just now hope he can walk the walk. As a central defender I am hoping the can sort out the leaky defence! If he can do that, we may have a chance this time around.

**He's made a few new signings this summer. Which one are you most looking forward to seeing regularly in a Leeds shirt?**

Having watched his debut at Fleetwood in the last round of this competition, it has to be Pablo Hernandez. He looks to have everything in his locker and I am hoping that he can be an important cog this season. His movement and neat little touches and his passing range were superb.

**Which one of the players who have left the club this summer were you most disappointed to lose?**

Has to be Lewis Cook. It always disappointing when you lose a player that's been brought through the academy and I have to admit will only get better with age. He may have lacked the final ball, but some of the stuff that he did last season was superb for a 19 year old.

**This is the seventh season Leeds have been in the Championship, and 13th outside the Premier League.**

**Could this be the one in which you break back into the top-flight?**

That's the million dollar question, following the opening day defeat to QPR, I would have said no, but the season is still in its embryonic stage and the Championship is such an unpredictable league, I will say I hope that we can sneak into the top six providing Monk is given time to do the job.

## ► SEASONS PAST...

**Tell us about you. Why do you support Leeds? When did it all start? What was your first game? What do you remember about it?**

My first game was way back in Season 1990-91 when the then Champions came to Elland Road and were four up at half-time! Leeds fought their way back to end up losing 5-4 thanks to a Lee Chapman hat trick. As for why I support Leeds, I think it was drummed into me from a very young age! My mum use to go in the sixties and her uncle Sidney Simon was on the board during the 1960s.

**What do you love most about Elland Road?**

I think it's the atmosphere when you have big games and Elland Road when its packed to capacity can be





a fearful sight. If we start winning games, the crowds can be like the 12th man for the side and a can create a really unique sound and can frighten the life out of sides.

**Who's your favourite Leeds United player of all-time?**

Gary McAllister, had everything as a central midfielder and won the First Division title in 1992 in the fantastic quarter of a midfield with Gary Speed, Gordon Strachan and of course David Batty. He actually turned down Brian Clough at Nottingham Forest to join Howard Wilkinson's revolution at Elland Road.

**Which is your favourite season following Leeds and why?**

As strange as it sounds our first ever season in League One, in 2007-08. When we had the 15 points deducted, it really did feel like a siege mentality and to see those points wiped out in the first five games was some achievement, it was just a shame we couldn't cap it off with promotion.

**If you could invite five former Leeds players and managers to a dinner party, who would they be?**

Nigel Martyn, Lucas Radebe, Gary McAllister, David Batty and Jimmy Floyd Hasselbaink, I think that would make a cracking five a side team and some of the stories that could be told from the different eras would be interesting to say the least.

my mate at half-time, saying we can win this. Little did I know what was in store! Two days later caretaker manager John Carver was sacked and Dennis Wise installed as the new manager.

I think I will a tight game and Luton are improving under new boss Nathan Jones, but would expect Leeds to have that extra bit of quality to book a place in round three.

**Our assistant-manager Paul Hart has a strong connection with your club. Which of his youth team graduates did you most enjoy watching in a Leeds shirt?**

Jonathan Woodgate, Alan Smith, Paul Robinson - it was great to see so many of his kids come through the academy and too win the FA Youth Cup twice in 1993 v Manchester United and v Crystal Palace in 1997, shows how highly Paul Hart is regarded at Elland Road.

# AS OTHERS SAW US

LUTON TOWN 2 LEEDS UNITED 1 | DIVISION ONE | 22ND MARCH 1975



John Aston puts the Town ahead much to the delight of the crowd.

When the Town were promoted back to the top flight in 1974 for the first time in 14 years, the fans were looking forward to rubbing shoulders with the big boys once more, none more so than Leeds United who had been at the pinnacle of English football for a decade.

As Christmas approached, the Town were all but relegated with a sorry total of only nine points, in the days of two points for a win, at that stage in the campaign. In desperation manager Harry Haslam decided to throw in the youngsters and to hell with the consequences.

Teenagers Paul Futcher and his twin brother Paul, who had been signed from Chester pre-season, together with ex-Burton Albion full-back Steve Buckley were blooded and with three straight wins over the holiday period

perhaps there was glimmer of light at the end of the tunnel.

Playing open, attacking and sometimes naïve but ultimately exciting football, the Hatters were now winning as many games as they lost and had managed to pull themselves up by the bootstraps and move off bottom place by the time of the visit of mighty Leeds in March.

Leeds, the reigning champions, had lost their manager Don Revie to England duties in the summer of 1974 and had suffered a traumatic

44 days under the management of Brian Clough as the season opened.

Ominously, they had bounced back and were now within striking distance of the top of the table following a run of 18 games without defeat and were also about to win through to the final of the European Cup.

A crowd of 23048, the second highest of the season, gathered at Kenilworth Road and were treated to an amazing opening with the Town going two up inside the first 13 minutes.

## SUNDERS

### JOHN MCGOVERN

Former Scotland U-23 midfielder John McGovern briefly played under Brian Clough at Leeds United. He was Hartlepool's youngest League player at 16 years 205 days old in May 1966 and featured in their 1967-68 promotion success before reuniting with Clough at Derby County in September 1968. He starred in their 1971-72 League Championship triumph and followed Clough to Leeds in August 1974, making four League appearances, then to Nottingham Forest in February 1975. Skipping two consecutive European Cup final triumphs, he became Bolton Wanderers player-boss and has since held various coaching and managerial posts.

### JOHN O'HARE

Scotland international centre-forward John O'Hare was a Brian Clough signing for Leeds United. Turning professional with Sunderland in October 1963, he became Clough's first signing for Derby County at £20,000 in August 1967 and was a key figure as they won the Second Division title in 1968-69 and League Championship in 1971-72. Twice leading scorer for the Rams, he reunited with Clough at Leeds in August 1974 and scored once in six League games while at Elland Road, then followed Clough to Nottingham Forest in February 1975. He helped win the League Championship and League Cup in 1977-78, then retain the European Cup in 1980.

### FRANK WORTHINGTON

Ex-England international striker Frank Worthington was capped eight times before joining Leeds United. Initially with Huddersfield, he starred in their 1969-70 Second Division title triumph and joined

Leicester City in August 1972. He was top scorer four times before reuniting with Ian Greaves at Bolton Wanderers in September 1977. Helping win the Second Division title in 1977-78, he moved via Birmingham to Leeds United in March 1982. He netted 14 goals in 32 League games prior to joining Sunderland in December 1982, then played for Southampton, Brighton, Tranmere Rovers, Preston and Stockport before several non-League clubs.

### TERRY PHELAN

Republic of Ireland international left-back Terry Phelan was capped 42 times after leaving Leeds United. He turned professional at Elland Road in August 1984 and made his League debut in Leeds' 3-1 win at Shrewsbury in September 1985, playing 14 League games



before moving to Swansea City in July 1986. Sold to Wimbledon for £100,000 in July 1987, he starred in their 1988 FA Cup final triumph, following Keith Curle to Manchester City for £2,500,000 in August 1992.

Appearing for his country in the 1994 World Cup, he joined Chelsea for £900,000 in November 1995, then played for Everton, Fulham and United States side Charleston Battery.

### JOHN MCCLELLAND

Northern Ireland international central defender John McClelland gained the last of his 53 caps while at Leeds United. Initially with Portadown, he had spells with Cardiff City and Bangor City, moving to Mansfield

Town in May 1978. He was ever-present in 1980-81 and joined Glasgow Rangers for £90,000 in May 1981. Helping twice win the Scottish League Cup, he joined Watford for £225,000 in November 1984 and played for his country in the 1982 and 1986 World Cups. He moved to Leeds for £110,000 in June 1989 and made 24 League appearances, becoming St Johnstone's player-manager in June 1992, then assisted several non-League clubs.

### MICKY THOMAS

Welsh international midfielder Micky Thomas briefly appeared in Leeds United's 1989-90 Second Division title campaign. Initially with Wrexham, he starred in successive Cup runs and was a key figure in their 1977-78 Third Division title triumph. He moved to Manchester United for £300,000 in November 1978 and featured in the 1979 FA Cup final, joining Everton in August 1981. Following spells at Brighton, Stoke City, Chelsea, West Brom and Shrewsbury Town, he moved to Leeds United in June 1989 and made three League appearances before rejoining Stoke in June 1989. He then played for Wrexham again, becoming a match summariser.

### ERIC CANTONA

French international striker Eric Cantona helped Leeds United to clinch the League Championship in 1991-92. Initially with Auxerre, he also played for Bordeaux, Marseille, Montpellier, Nimes and Sheffield Wednesday prior to joining Leeds United for £900,000 in February 1992. He scored nine times in 28 League games before his £1,200,000 transfer to Manchester United in November 1992, becoming the catalyst for Alex Ferguson's young team. Starring in four Premier League title triumphs and two FA Cup final wins, he was PFA 'Player of the Year' when Manchester United won the 'double' in 1993-94 and 'Footballer of the Year' in 1995-96.



### DAVID ROCASTLE

Former England international midfielder David Rocastle was capped 14 times before joining Leeds United. Signing professional for Arsenal in December 1984, 'Rocky' was their 'Player of the Year' in 1985-86 and featured in two League Cup finals, including the Gunners' 1987 Wembley triumph, before starring in their 1988-89 and 1990-91 League Championship successes. He joined Leeds United for £2,000,000 in August 1992 and scored twice in 25 Premier League games prior to joining Manchester City in December 1993, then had spells with Chelsea, Norwich City, Hull City and Sabah before his tragic death from cancer in March 2001.

### DAVID O'LEARY

One-time Leeds United central defender David O'Leary holds Arsenal's appearance record. Signing professional for Arsenal in July 1975, he was an important figure as they reached three successive FA Cup finals, including their 1979 Wembley triumph. The Republic of Ireland international also featured in the 1980 ECWC final and 1987 League Cup final success as well as the Gunners' 1988-89 and 1990-91 League Championship triumphs. Capped 68 times before moving to Leeds United in June 1993, he made ten League appearances and later succeeded George Graham as their manager from October 1998 until July 2002, then managed Aston Villa.

### IAN RUSH

Welsh international striker Ian Rush played for Leeds United in 1996-97. A former Chester apprentice, he turned professional in September 1979 and was sold to Liverpool for £300,000 in April 1980. He was leading marksman in successive seasons and amassed a vast collection of honours, moving to Juventus for £3,200,000 in June 1987. Returning to Liverpool a year later, he moved to Leeds United in May 1996 and netted three goals in 36 Premier League games while at Elland Road before reuniting with Kenny Dalglish at Newcastle United in August 1997. Ending his playing career at Wrexham, he has since held various coaching and managerial posts.

"I thought we did everything possible to try and win the game away from home. First half I felt we should have been out of sight, much more comfortable, but we missed chances. You have to take them and be clinical.

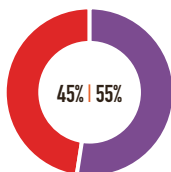
"The second half was a little bit more even. They had to change to handle us. They came out better than us and then got the goal, which was disappointing.

"We kept pushing and pushing, both sides hit the post and bar, so it was end to end. We went to try and win the game but ended up losing it, so it's a little bit disappointing.

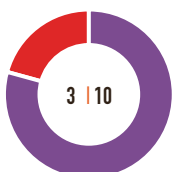
"We were going for it and we wanted to win the game. If you want to do something, you've got to win games. They've caught us with a sucker punch right at the end, and we've got caught out by it.

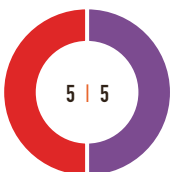

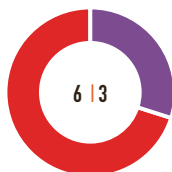

# THE HART BEAT OF BOTH CLUBS

HATTERS NO.2 PAUL ALWAYS IN LEEDS FANS' HEARTS FOR PRODUCING ELLAND ROAD HEROES

Paul Hart will always have a special place in the hearts of Leeds fans. He was, after all, the man who delivered the legendary Blueprint. Drawn up by Howard Wilkinson in the early nineties, the plan was to nurture a generation of homegrown superstars fit to conquer Europe.

Ambitious? Yes. But boy did Hart deliver. Jonathan Woodgate, Harry Kewell, Ian Harte, Paul Robinson, Alan Smith - by the time he left in 1998, the 63-year-old had bequeathed over £50m worth of talent and the guts of a side that came within 90 minutes of a Champions League final.

"They were great players and top lads," says Hart, now No.2 to Nathan Jones at Kenilworth Road after a management career taking in Nottingham Forest, Barnsley and Portsmouth. Of course, Kewell and Woodgate became the poster boys but they were just the tip of the iceberg really.

"Paul Robinson had a fantastic career. He was England's No.1 for donkey's years. Stephen McPhail was a fantastic player, regarded by all his team-mates as a dream to play alongside. I could name so many others.

"In fairness, it all started before I arrived. I came in to a ten-year plan that had already been set up by Howard and I was hired to carry on the work of a guy named Dick Bate. We won the Youth Cup against Man United in my first year. It was televised by Sky for the first time ever and

that exposure allowed us to recruit better, stronger, more talented lads.

"We had Andy Gray, Ian Harte, Mark Jackson. Mark Forde and Mark Tinkler came through. They all played in the Premiership. But it was the last group we felt could be something special and it eventually turned out that way. You can never categorically say that someone is headed for stardom but everyone could see those lads were a cut above."

Every club has tales of prodigiously talented kids whose talent at youth level failed to translate into success as a pro.

So how did so many of Leeds' youngsters make it to the side that notched a third-place finish in the Premier League, reached the 2001 Champions League semis and won hundreds of international caps?

"I think we had a programme," explains Hart. "Everybody was treated the same. No favourites, no favours. If you stepped out of line, the discipline was the same.





"We ran a tight ship with clear boundaries so that everybody knew what was acceptable. The same standards applied on the pitch, too. We had very few bookings. I can't remember anyone ever getting sent off, bar Stephen McPhail in the youth cup final which was ridiculous.

"Myself, Eddie Gray, Peter Beaglehole, Pete Gunby - we all worked on the ethos that behaviour was paramount and everything grew from that."

Sadly, Hart wouldn't be around for those crowning moments having left to join Nottingham Forest in 1998. By then, his frustrations with manager George Graham had begun to boil over and he felt that his young side's chances would be better served if he hit the road.

"The truth is, I left because I didn't feel the management at the time were going to push our players forward," he explains. "If anything, they seemed to rail against me.

"I actually like George Graham very much. He's someone I've got a lot of

time for. But I wasn't too impressed with anybody else. It just wasn't working. Nobody came to any of the youth cup games, which told me a lot.

"I don't like working in an unhappy environment and I didn't want our players to be in a situation where my relationship with the first team staff was holding them back. That's why I left.

"Obviously David O'Leary put them in and they became known as his babies. But it wasn't a difficult decision to make because they were great players by then.

## PLEASURE

"I was sad to leave, but it stopped me enjoying their progress. I actually watched them play Lazio in Rome, the night Alan Smith scored and they won 1-0. I took pleasure in seeing how far they'd come that night.

"And when everything went wrong, those players saved the club in many ways. Even though it was a fire sale, they had those players to sell and it brought in something like £50m at time when the club could have gone bust.

Hart's memories of tonight's opponents go even further back. As a player, he spent five years in the Leeds back four, scoring 16 goals in 191 games.

"My last memory of playing is actually very sad," says Hart, who also spent last season working as academy director at Elland Road. "We'd just been relegated and to be part of that was an awful experience. But I do retain great memories and great friendships. Eddie Gray is a very good friend of mine. Paul Madeley too, who is sadly very ill. Norman Hunter wasn't someone I played with but



I got to know him and still keep in touch.

"Leeds United is a massive club. Until you've worked there, you don't appreciate quite how big it is. Never mind all this talk about how much they need the Premiership. The Premiership needs Leeds. You're talking about a club that take 8,000 people away from home. It's an amazing experience being part of that.

## PROUD

"The last ten years have been hard to swallow for everybody, with the different owners and the way things have gone. You have to be disappointed. But even now, walking into Elland Road lifts you straightaway. I'm so proud to have been part of it and it'll be wonderful to welcome them here."

So would Hart rather the Hatters had come out of the hat second?

"No, much as I love being there," he says. "It's would be a difficult game wherever it was played but it's better for us at Kenilworth Road.

"The place will be full. The atmosphere will be electric. I've talked about the Leeds fans but ours are every bit as noisy and passionate. It'll be a great night against a club that's been a big part of my life."

Stevenage is pretty easy to get to so there is only one coach today rather than the two which went to Devon two weeks ago. Shortly before 1.10pm we set off on the 16.5 mile trip to Stevenage.

**1.40** – Traffic was pretty heavy all the way to Broadhall Way but we finally get parked up in the car park opposite the ground in good time. Northants going well in the cricket. Good start to the day!

**2.05** – Walk around to the away end at Broadhall Way. Looks like Northants are going to win the cricket so friends (and the many Town fans inside Broadhall Way who I'm sure support Northants) will be happy!







## THE GROUND

**2.20** – After being searched and a bit of a queue to get inside the ground I'm finally in. Fairly long queue for the refreshments which I join.

**2.35** – Time to find my seat. For the first time since we returned to the league I'm in the stand behind the goal. Front row just to the right of the goal as we look at it. Perfect. Sun is still shining – even better! Northants have won their semi-final so everything is good.

**2.50** – Players finish their warm up. I sense an extra excitement around the place from the PA and their fans to our right. This isn't one of my favourite games or places. I keep hearing how it is a local derby. I don't consider it as that. It is a game which isn't very far away that's all.

## THE MATCH

**3.01** – All the handshakes are done. Scott Cuthbert and former Town captain Ronnie Henry lead the two sides and the game kicks off. Town make two changes. Jake Gray in for Pelly-Ruddock and Glen Rea in for the suspended Johnny Mullins.

**3.16** – Town lead! After a fairly quiet start to the match Cameron McGeehan goes past a man on the edge of the box and hits a shot which takes a couple of deflections and wrong foots the keeper and finds the net. A very ironic goal given the comments in the lead up about the Town being lucky so far!

**3.35** – The inevitable shower arrives and I get soaked. I was warned! Schoolboy error.

**3.47** – Half-time. Stevenage not in the game at all. Probably our most dominant half of the entire season. How we're only 1-0 up I'm not entirely sure. Hylton and Cook both missed good chances to extend the lead. Hope we don't live to regret those misses.

**4.02** – Second half is underway. Stevenage have made a sub and begin the half brighter. Hopefully we can get our dominance back.

**4.10** – Ouch. 1-1. It was coming in truth. A cross from our left makes its way across to an unmarked left winger who would do well to miss from six yards out. He doesn't. He finds the corner and it is all square. Then comes the worst thing about modern football – goal music. Just no need for it!

**4.47** – Not sure how this is still 1-1. Both sides have hit the woodwork. Stephen O'Donnell smashed the bar for us while Stevenage have hit bar and post with the same shot



and another header has looped up onto our bar and away. Five minutes of stoppage time is signalled. Stevenage have an injured player and have used all three subs. We'll finish with an extra man.

**4.53** – Oh no. Heartache at the end. Just when Olly Lee looks to have nailed another injury time winner he sees his 25 yarder thump the bar and come clear and Stevenage are two on two on the counter. They work it well and the ball is lifted into the top corner and we're 2-1 down. Lee nearly equalises but another 20 yarder goes inches wide and our first defeat of the season is confirmed.

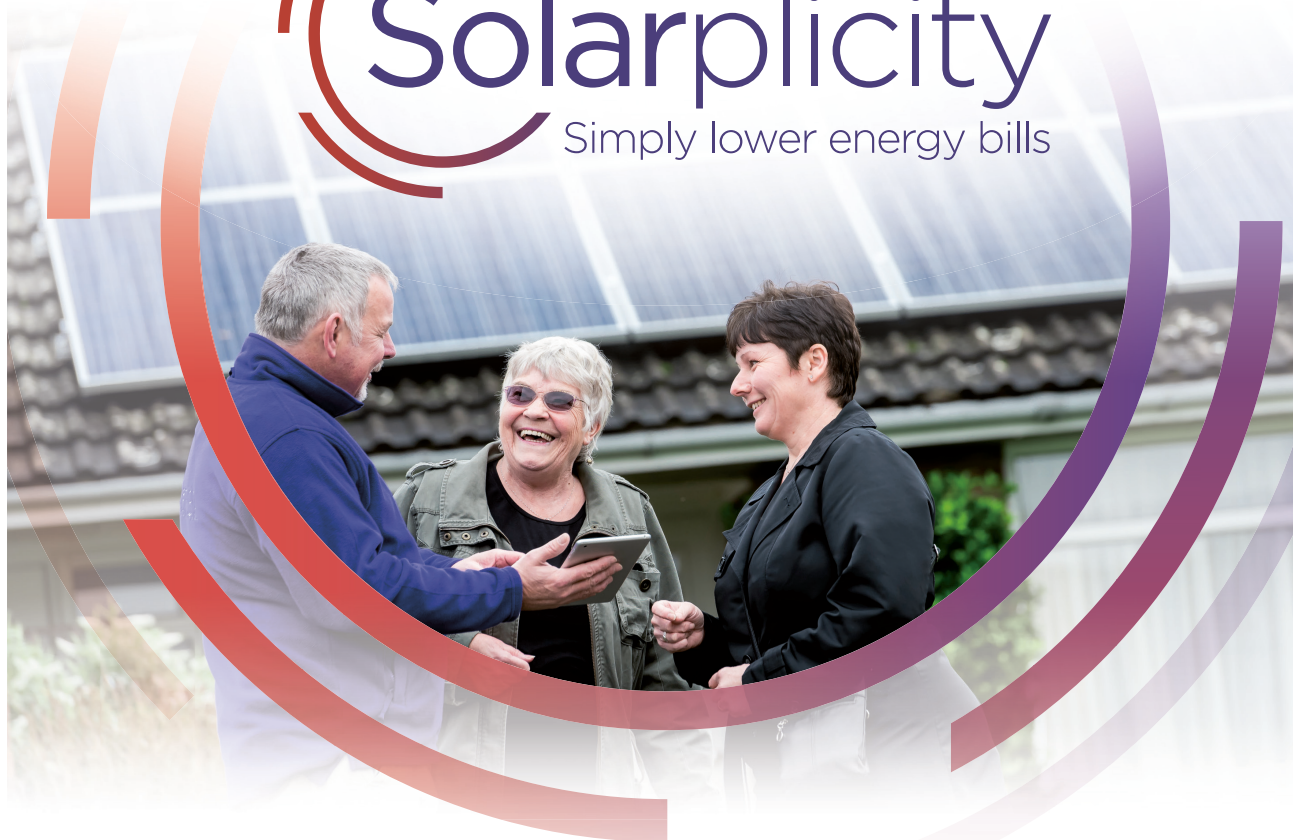
## SUMMARY

# HOW THE FOOTBALL FAMILY IS UNITING AGAINST PROSTATE CANCER

Prostate Cancer UK thank Luton Town and their supporters for helping raising over £2m to help stop prostate cancer being a killer.

Since Prostate Cancer UK's Official Charity Partnership with The EFL (formerly The Football League) was announced back in 2012 the charity has raised over £2m to help stop prostate cancer being a killer, and raised the profile of a disease not really spoken about.

Clubs and fans from across the EFL have walked, run, cycled, collected at match days and donated in the fight against prostate cancer. Over four years nearly 800 fans have put on the pitch rivalries aside cycling to Amsterdam with former England internationals Terry Butcher, Viv Anderson and Luther Blissett – who has joined the ride every year. And back in March 2016, it was difficult to ignore Sky Sports presenter Jeff Stelling marching 262 miles to Wembley from his beloved Hartlepool United to raise money for Prostate Cancer UK.

## HOW CLUBS AND FANS ARE HELPING FUND A NEW ERA OF RESEARCH

The money raised via the EFL partnership is funding innovative research projects to make a step-change in the scientific knowledge of prostate cancer.

Prostate Cancer UK's aim is to make sure men with aggressive prostate cancer are diagnosed early, before it spreads outside the prostate, so that fewer slip through the net with advanced disease.

Scientists are working on a simple genetic test for aggressive prostate cancer to help assess which men will respond best to a certain treatment. This project will make significant steps towards tailoring prostate cancer treatments towards the individual man and his cancer. It will help work out the best treatment for each man to have – or to avoid – and the right time to have it.

The money raised focuses on three key areas Prostate Cancer UK believes can make the biggest difference: prostate cancer diagnosis, treatment and prevention. Our Men United March started in Hartlepool and finished in Wembley, but the charity's march on prostate cancer has only just begun.

# THE SCIENCE OF EVERYTHING LUTON

JARED ROBERTS-SMITH JOINED NATHAN JONES' BACKROOM STAFF THIS SUMMER FROM CHARLTON ATHLETIC. HERE THE NEW HEAD OF SPORTS SCIENCE GIVES US AN INSIGHT INTO HIS WORK WITH THE HATTERS LADS...



Evening Hatters fans,

Another night under the lights here at Kenilworth Road, and let's hope the lads can put in another performance like the one that got us here against Aston Villa.

Villa was my first evening game here at Kenilworth Road and with over 7000 fans in attendance, a great performance and a big win against championship opposition... it was certainly one to remember. I thought the night was summed up by JJ's (James Justin's) performance. It was great to see and I was really pleased for him as he is a top lad and performs really well in training, and especially in my work with the players. You may have seen me hopping around on the touchline shouting at him, this was a mixture of encouragement as well as dishing him an energy gel and electrolyte/isotonic drink to help stop the onset of cramp that he had started to suffer from. This seemed to help until he got in the ice bath at the end of the game and was stranded in there as his legs started to seize up... followed by a lot of hobbling around the changing room... welcome to first team football JJ.

The boys have got off to a great start and with fixtures in abundance, the emphasis around the training ground has been focused on recovery and working on patching the lads up... ready for the next big effort! Such work consists of Daz and Simon doing a top job focused around massage and muscle release before they are handed over to me. We then do some low intensity off feet work in the gym. This ranges from active recovery work on our new spin bikes to some foam rolling, activation and mobility based exercises. We then generally head out to the pitches for some light work with either the coaches or myself focused on technical football aspects. After this it's on to the lads' favourite activity of contrast bathing (ice bath to hot bath). We actually often end up having a good laugh in there

with conversation ranging from – reflection of the game to past football memories – games, players, coaches etc and as always having a good old laugh at Glen Rea. This also serves as a window of opportunity to probe the boys on their recovery strategies and give some advice on nutrition, hydration and off feet activities.

As the manager's backroom staff we have managed to create a really good atmosphere around the training ground, which the lads have really bought in to. We are constantly looking to improve things and drive the professionalism around the building. Sports science wise, we have improved the gym facilities, the performance nutrition mindset and food served to the lads as well as our monitoring strategies such as GPS and physical tracking. We also now have a pre training preparation room where the lads do a lot of stretching and foam rolling after breakfast to set them up for the day. This has been really well supported by a lot of the good people behind the scenes who often don't get a mention (Peter Kemp – Site manager, Dickie and Roger – Groundsman, David Romans and his staff – Catering, as well as all academy staff).

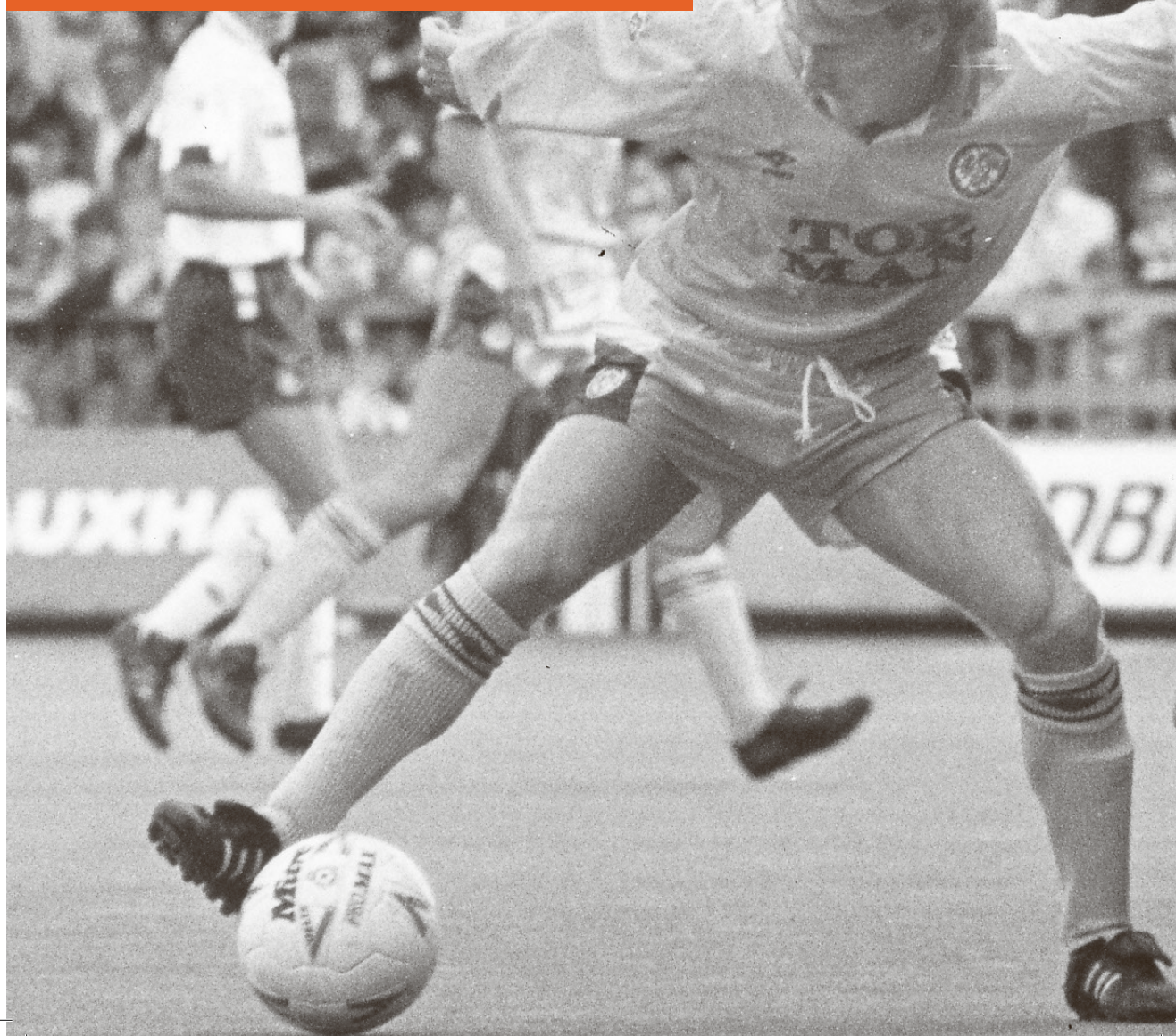

I hope you all enjoy the game, get behind the boys as you always do. Raise the roof and drive them onto the third round where we belong. #COYH

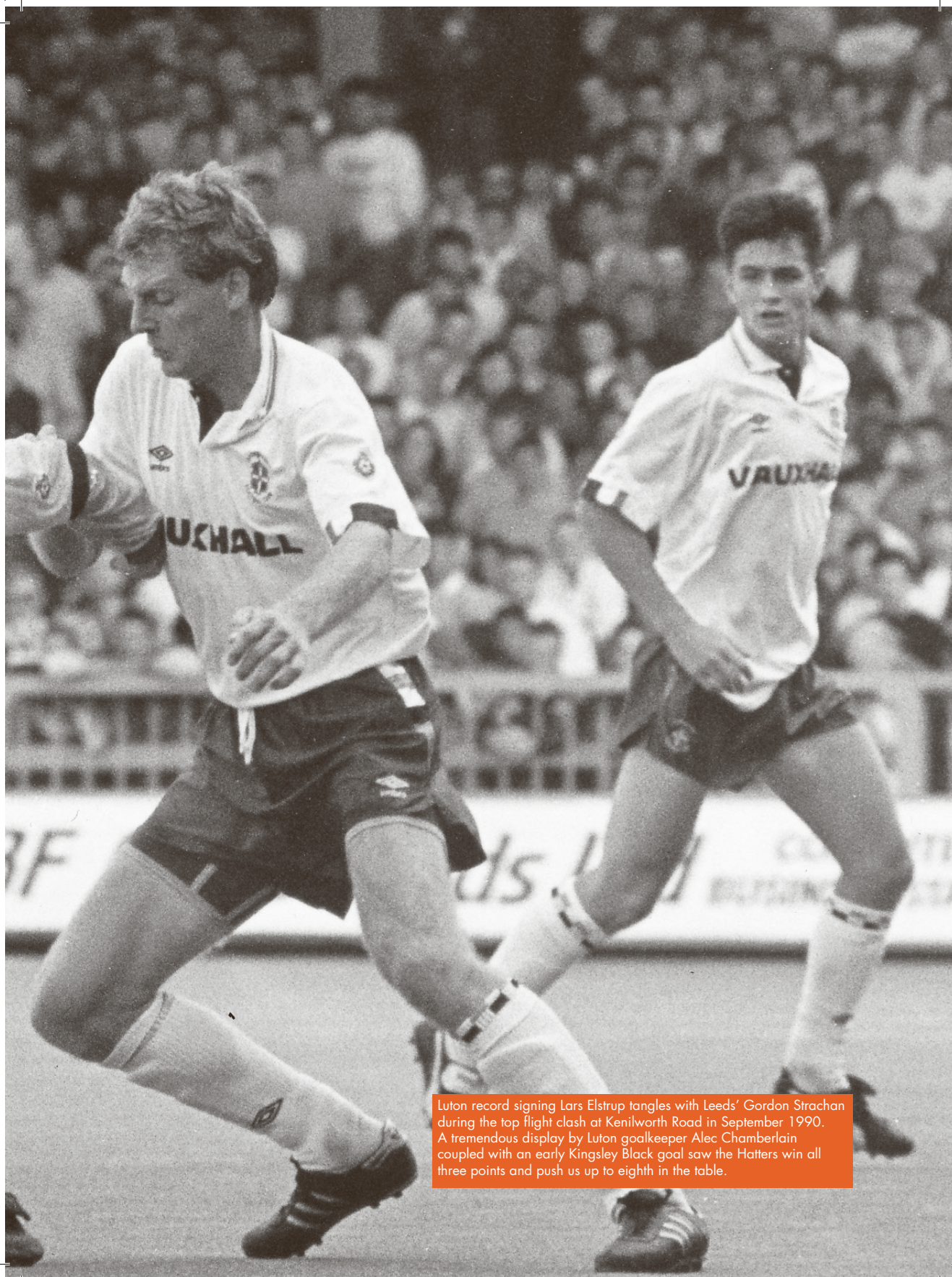

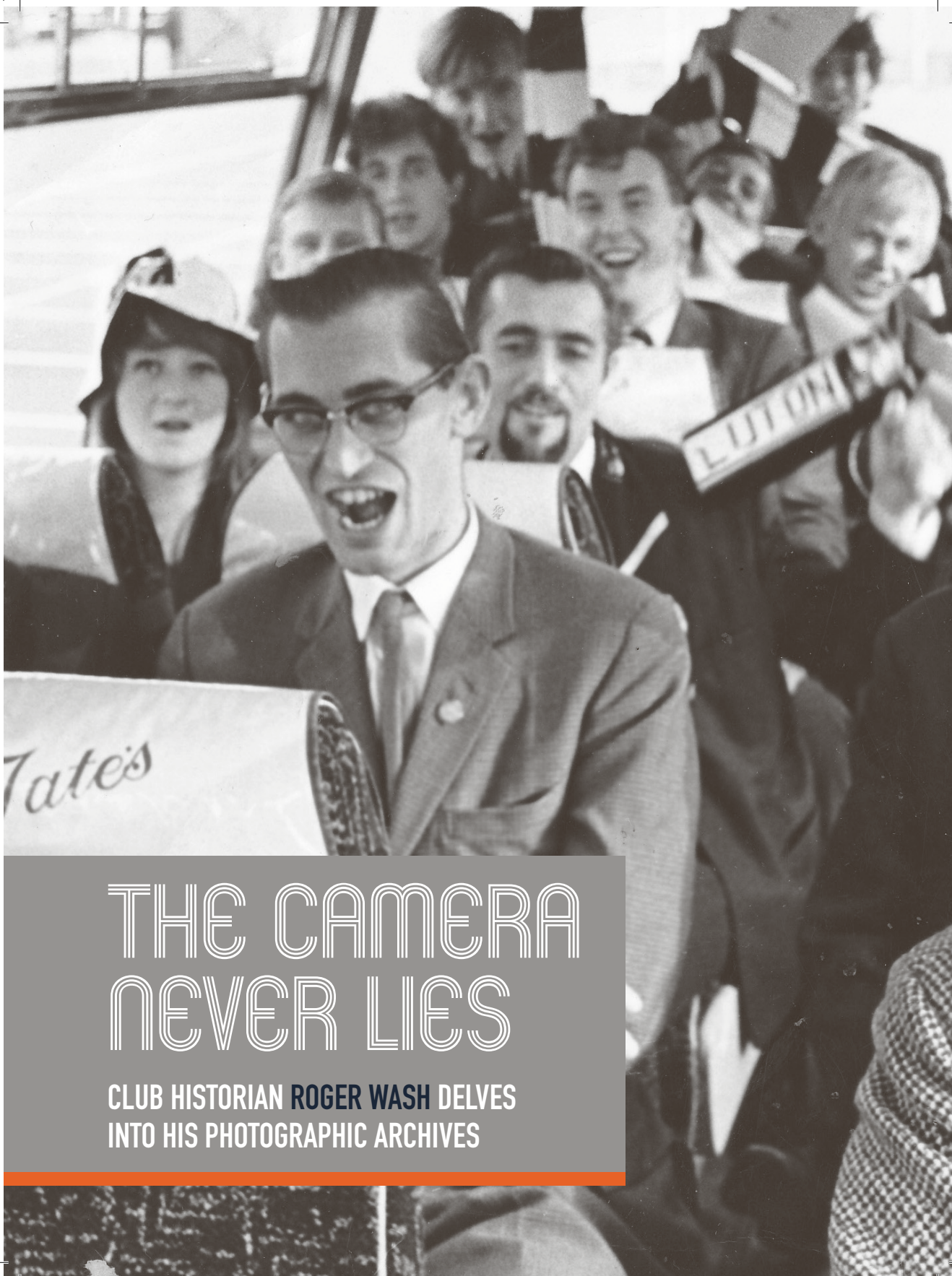

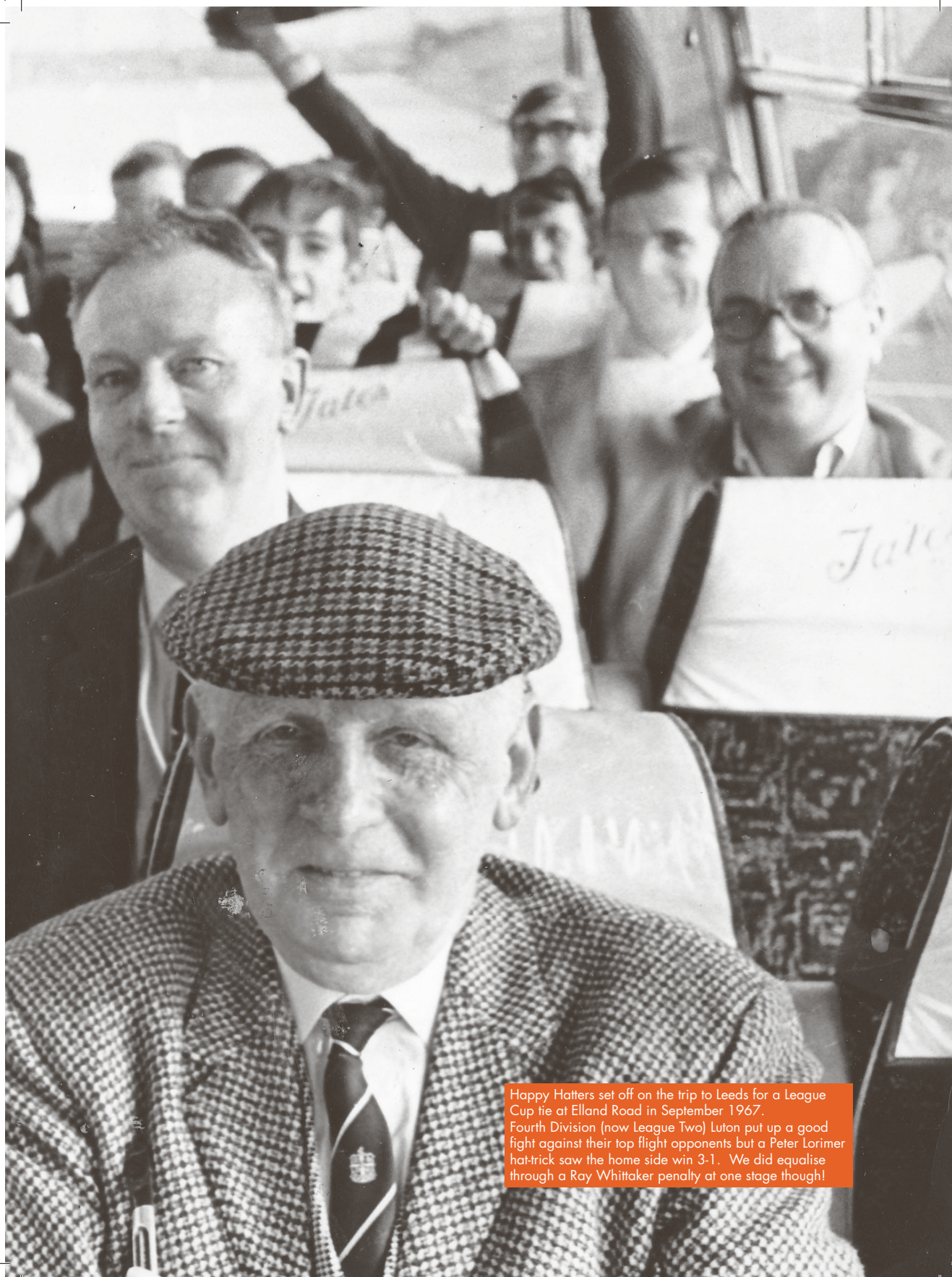

## LUTON TOWN IN THE

## COMMUNITY

Disability Football in Luton and Bedfordshire received a massive boost earlier this month with news that the Hatters Community Trust has been awarded in excess of £25,000 over the next three seasons from the Wembley National Stadium Trust (WNST) Every Player Counts programme with the EFL Trust to increase our provision of PAN Disability football coaching and multi-sports sessions for adults and children across the County through our new 'Achieving Your Goal' project.

WNST is an independent grant-making trust funded by Wembley National Stadium Ltd that makes grants to clubs and other organisations to improve the range and quality of sporting opportunities available to increase sporting opportunities for disabled people through the EFL Trusts Every Player Counts programme.

When the new stadium was built in 2007, out of the total rebuild cost for the stadium close on £800 million; a sum of £120 million was lottery funding provided through Sport England. In recognition of this generous award, a legal agreement was put in place whereby after five years of operation, the Stadium would donate 1% of its gross annual takings

into an independent charitable grant-making trust. The five year 'grace period' expired in 2012 during which time the WNST has supported a wide range of community sports activities including disability sports programmes for London's Premier League and Football League clubs to deliver a range of disability football activities.

From 2016 the focus of the WNST will be on a more England wide basis and all of the EFL Clubs were invited to apply for grant funding for the next three years. As with most grant applications the process is competitive and having met with the WNST the Hatters Trust has been chosen as one of 25 nationwide projects to receive a 3 year funding deal.

It's recognition of the work we have done over the last two years with PAN Disability football and in simple terms will allow the Trust to appoint a dedicated part-time Disability Officer to oversee and deliver football and multi-sport coaching sessions across the County every single day of the week!

Looking back over the last two years it is amazing to see how much the Trust's work has grown in the PAN Disability field. We now coach three of our very own Luton Town FC adult disability teams on a weekly basis and they are either involved in the Beds FA Disability League on Fridays or being coached on Friday mornings up at Stockwood Athletics track, depending on fixtures.







In addition, we also coach two other school teams every week at Woodlands Middle SEN School in Luton and Grange SEN Academy in Kempston. Both teams play in the Beds FA County SEN School Leagues every month and finished off last season playing their league fixtures here at the Kenny. That's five disability teams all wearing Hatters kits donated by the Trust playing regular football and experiencing the highs and lows of victory and defeat that all regular players experience.

For many football and sports an escape from daily frustrations and challenges and in particular The Trust are extremely proud of how our entire coaching staff have embraced our disability projects from the get go along with our first team playing staff with Stephen O'Donnell, Pelly Ruddock-Mpanzu, Jack Marriott and Craig Mackail-Smith all taking time out to present kits to the various teams and what an inspiration the players have proved. It's been a real joint Club effort to support our internally funded programme to date and our new WNST funding deal will now allow the Trust to do so much more in the next three seasons. Who can forget that last season our Kempston boys won the national (yes national!) FA Peoples Cup and in a strange quirk of fate we also took our men's disability squads

down to Wembley Stadium this time last year for a tour of the iconic national stadium without ever thinking the stadium would return our trip with financial support for the next 3 years. Our funded WNST project will be called 'Achieving your Goal' and is essentially a new multi-sports project delivered by the Trust adults and children with learning disabilities and will increase our provision with an additional 3 adult and 2 school children sports sessions each week from next month.



There are many different types of learning disability (classed together as PAN disability) but all include the presence of a significantly reduced ability to understand new or complex information, to learn new skills and with a reduced ability to cope independently. Individuals with learning disabilities find it harder to learn, understand and communicate which affects their health and wellbeing with the impact increasing with the severity of the person's disability. Individuals with learning disabilities are also more likely to experience common social

characteristics of poor health including poverty, poor housing, unemployment, social isolation and discrimination.

In running a wide range of coaching programmes across Luton and Bedfordshire, The Hatters Trust recognises the importance of offering, wherever possible, provision that is fully inclusive - adapting the content of sessions where necessary to ensure that everyone can take part. This provides an important learning element for all participants, understanding each person's contribution and working as a team. Our current coaching team sessions offer structured coaching for large groups of young school children and older adults with lower levels of learning disability or physical impairment, helping develop their personal as well as footballing skills.

We are now contacting various groups to make sure we share our grant funding is distributed as wide and fairly as we can over the next 3 years and in particular consulting Luton Borough Council and Bedford Borough Council who supported our bid for funds. ## COMMUNITY COACHING PROGRAMME – ARE YOU A POTENTIAL LUTON COMMUNITY CHAMPION!

The Hatters Trust are once again searching for Luton 'community champions' and have again been awarded funding from Luton Adult Learning and the Skills Funding Agency to provide 18 free spaces to local adults to learn coaching skills through successful completion of our coaching learning programme. Our champions will then aim to deliver sports activities to members of our local community and try make a real contribution at local level to the sports provision in Luton.

If you've just been reading about our disability programme then you may be wondering who delivers all of our sessions – well that person could be you. The Trust now employs around 40 full time, part time and apprentice staff to deliver the ever increasing number of social, health and educational projects we are involved in each week. Not all of our staff are simply focused on our youth development or talent identification centres which feeds our schoolboy academy – many are focused on their community contribution through school work with mentoring and educational projects as well as the increasing social cohesion work being done in some of our more deprived estates. The type of 'coaches' we need for this kind of work don't need to be budding Mourinho's or a Nathan Jones' (although it would help!) – but local people who really care about Luton and the community they live and work in and who recognise the power of football to be at the heart of all Luton's communities.

The course we are running will include the new FA Level 1 coaching certificate and Sports Leaders Award as well as First Aid and Child Safety qualifications and aims to provide training to new coaches to enable them to deliver football and multi-sport activities which will improve their health and activity levels as well as offering them genuine future work opportunities with the Trust through formal sport qualifications gained on the project. To achieve this aim, the overall project is looking to increase awareness of the benefits of sporting activity together with the benefits of increased physical fitness and healthy lifestyle choices and also deliver this message over a period of time in our local communities through becoming community role models for their local communities.

In particular (but not exclusively) we are looking for our 'community champions' from specifically targeted estates in Dallow and Biscot, Marsh Farm, Lewsey Farm and South Luton to work in areas which have large pockets of social deprivation with hard to reach young individuals

and particularly, have significant issues around crime and anti-social behaviour. These estates already benefit from our weekly late night coaching sessions as part of our KITS community integration project run in conjunction with Active Luton and the community learning project will look to feed coaches into this project to increase the Club's presence on the estates as we look to support the sports provision and cohesion activity at a very local level.

The course is open to men and women who live in Luton (LU1 to LU4) and particularly those who are unemployed or part-time employed and we also positively welcome BAME candidates who can easily represent and connect with their community group. ## THE DAYS OF JAMIE VARDY SNARLING IN FURY AND CHELSEA PLAYERS SWARMING REFEREES COULD BE A THING OF THE PAST.

A new zero-tolerance crackdown on abusing officials will see players shown a straight red card for dissent, intimidation and physical contact.

Cautions will also be dished for a series of lesser offences, such as running towards a referee to contest a decision.

The move comes after research revealed 60 per cent of grassroots officials had suffered some form of abuse - with mimicry of the pros a leading cause.

So will it work? Former Premier League referee Keith Hackett isn't convinced. "If they can stop it, that would be good for the game," he said. "But what we have seen in the past is a six week blitz and then it weakens."

The so-called clampdown on penalty-box grappling is a classic example. Announced in 2014, the initiative has gradually evaporated with defenders routinely unleashing armlocks, headlocks and even full-on rugby tackles.

Various attempts to combat diving have hit similar problems. The key to success is serious punishment even for single offences.

I've got no time for those who exalt the values of rugby over football. You don't, after all, see footballers trying to gouge each other's eyes out, tip people onto their necks or rake studs down necks and faces.

Nevertheless, when it comes to protecting officials, the 15-man game has it nailed. Zero tolerance means zero tolerance.

Examples abound. Earlier this year, Silvere Tian, an Ivorian full-back who plays for French Top 14 side Oyonnax, was sent to the sin bin for a minor offence.

When he reacted by aiming a volley of verbal abuse at ref Romain Poite, the punishment was upgraded to a red card. Tian continued hurling insults as he left the pitch, and again as Poite left the pitch at full time.



In football, such a case would be serious but not extreme. You'd imagine a 2-3 game ban. Yet governing body the Ligue Nationale de Rugby was furious and hit Tian with a 14-month ban for bringing the game into disrepute. Aged 35 and with his contract expiring, the LNR effectively forced into retirement.

Closer to home, perennial bad boy Dylan Hartley was sent off and banned for 11 weeks after calling referee Wayne Barnes a "cheat" in the 2013 Aviva Premiership final, losing his place on the Lions tour to Australia as a result.

Even for the most minor offences, the RFU 'entry point' for abusing an official is currently six weeks. That is a serious deterrent and something the FA would do well to heed if it is serious about improving standards.

Right now, though, what we need are regular dismissals. Football referees argue - as Howard Webb has this week - that a red card frenzy would ruin the spectacle, but this is a depressingly short-term view.

In the odd match, it would. The stick from the terraces would be savage. But just as with leading elbows and tackles from behind, old habits would quickly die.

Why? Defeat hurts and injustice rankles but not being on the pitch is the worst feeling for any player. They'd soon get the message



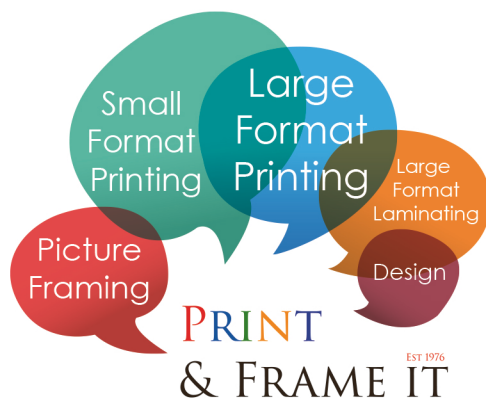

# LEAGUE LOOK

Morecambe moved onto nine points after beating Yeovil with Kevin Ellison scoring the only goal ten minutes after half-time to give Jim Bentley's men a 1-0 win at Huish Park.

good after Luke Berry's penalty. Charlie Wyke cancelled out the lead once again just over half an hour from full time.

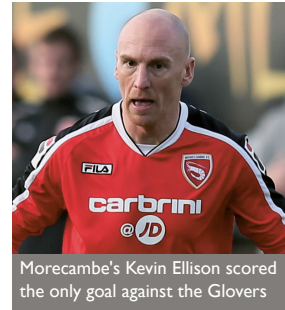
Leyton Orient moved to fourth with a win over Grimsby, leaving the Mariners with just one win from four games.
