GPS Tracking is paramount to ensuring our squad is not under or over trained. It gives us the best opportunity to maintain a balance between training and recovery, reducing the risk of overuse injuries and enabling us to monitor improvements in performance of our players.

Benefits of GPS Tracking:

Most importantly the equipment allows us to collect baseline fitness data during pre-season, allowing us to track and monitor continued improvements. In season, this equipment will allow us to monitor total distances, average speeds, number of sprints and sprint distances.

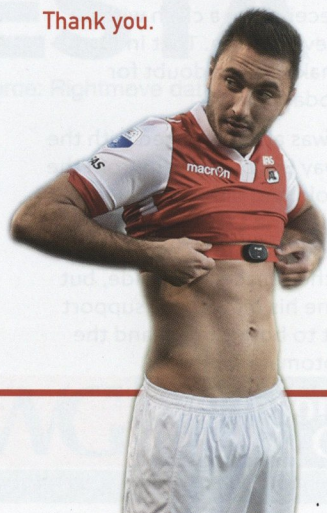
Combining GPS (External Load) with Heart Rate as a measure of Internal Load will bring us in line with the top clubs in both our league and the leagues above us, helping us to determine the relative load enabling us to adapt training accordingly.

How you can help:

Each player will be responsible for their own kit, so we'll need 30, each costing £300. If you sponsor a GPS kit for a named player or players, your name will appear in the matchday programme along with other kit sponsors. Or, you can make a donation towards the total amount.

EXETER CITY CLIMBED UP TO 19TH IN THE TABLE WITH ANOTHER IMPRESSIVE AWAY PERFORMANCE AGAINST MORECAMBE ON SATURDAY.

Paul Tisdale's side couldn't have wished for a better start with the first goal scored by David Wheeler within five minutes of kick-off.

A bad clearance from Morecambe's Alex Whitmore gave Lee Holmes a chance to stretch his legs and run at the Morecambe defence. He played an inch perfect through ball to Wheeler who finished calmly, slotting the ball in the bottom corner of the net.

City continued to attack and the second goal came after a bit of good fortune. Forward Reuben Reid held the ball up well inside the box and found Joel Grant with a simple pass and his shot got a little deflection on the way through which managed to beat the keeper.

While the referee was playing an advantage in the Grecians' favour for a late tackle on Wheeler, Lee Holmes found lots of space on the edge of the box and from a tight angle he struck the ball very cleanly with the outside of his boot into the corner of the net.

That clinical first-half attacking display, coupled with a resolute second-half defensive performance, ensured City made the long trip back to Devon with all three points.

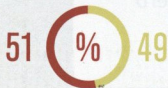

Both goals came in the opening 10 minutes of the match and, despite a late header from Joel Grant in the second half, the Grecians failed to find that crucial second goal.

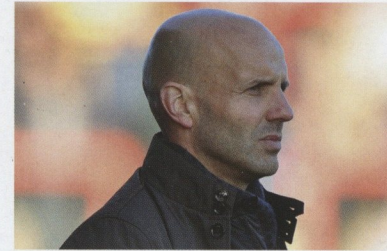
Just seven minutes into the game a mix-up between goalkeeper Chris Pym and teammate Luke Croll led to the Cambridge opener. Pym saw his attempted kick charged down and then both players failed to clear the ball at the second attempt and Berry took full advantage of the opportunity and calmly passed the ball into an empty net.

Things didn't get any better for the Grecians as moments later they conceded a soft second. City failed to deal with a long ball which landed in the centre of the box and Dunk kept his cool to volley home.

At half-time Paul Tisdale decided to make two changes bringing on Grant and Lloyd James.

City came out with the bit between their teeth, and they had a couple of chances coming from Robbie Simpson who had his shot blocked and James who hit the ball over the bar by a matter of inches.

The Grecians managed to find their way back in to the game when Grant headed in Craig Woodman's superb cross. However, despite a few last ditch attempts, City couldn't find the second.

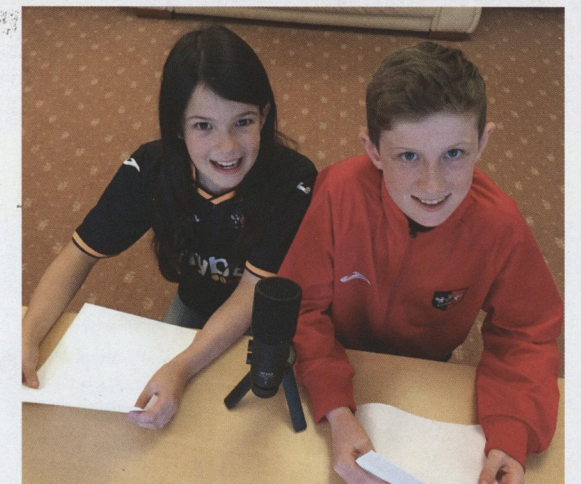
"James last recorded the safety message on his own when he was six, so, as the years have gone by, he's got more and more embarrassed about how he sounded."

FEATURE INTERVIEW

ROBBIE SIMPSON UP FOR THE CUP

Born: 15.03.85 Poole

Position: Striker

DESPITE HAVING JOINED EXETER CITY TOO LATE TO BE PART OF THEIR FA CUP HERIOCS LAST SEASON, ROBBIE SIMPSON IS NOT SHORT OF A STORY OR TWO ON THE WORLD'S MOST FAMOUS CUP COMPETITION.

The 31-year-old striker, who has a degree in sports science and mathematics, got to the second round of the competition with non-league Cambridge City in 2005 and scored a spectacular volley at Anfield for Oldham Athletic seven years later.

SIMON LARKINS talked to Robbie about what the FA Cup means to him, how he managed to balance studying for a degree with playing football full-time and what his new business – LAPS (Life After Professional Sport) – aims to achieve.

THE GRECIAN: Hello Robbie, it's Luton Town this Saturday in the FA Cup. How much do you look forward to playing in this competition?

ROBBIE: I love playing in it. Thankfully, I have some good memories from the competition and, for me, it is still the best domestic cup that there is. It provides a great chance for the smaller clubs to play the bigger sides. I watched Exeter play Liverpool last season and it can make for great occasions like that.

THE GRECIAN: I am going to take you back to the 2004/05 season now when you were at Cambridge City. What can you remember from the FA Cup run that year when your side got to the second round and played MK Dons?

ROBBIE: I was actually on the bench for the MK Dons match. I had scored in all the previous rounds, but for some reason I was dropped for the big game. I remember being very, very angry about it as we had played a match before the FA Cup tie on the Tuesday night and the manager pulled me to one side and told me I was being rested in preparation for the MK Dons tie. However, I ended up being on the bench on that Tuesday and then again on the Saturday. I was raging and then I came on when we were losing. It was a good occasion for such a small club to get to the second round and face MK Dons who were in League One at the time, but I don't have fond memories of that day if I'm honest with you.

THE GRECIAN: What do you think the key factors were to the cup run that season because a side like Cambridge City – from the Conference South at the time – aren't really expected to get to the second round of the competition.

ROBBIE: I think that underdog mentality is quite big, but we also had some good young players in that Cambridge City team who perhaps thought they should be playing at a higher level. It was a good chance for them to show everyone that they were capable of playing a few rungs up the ladder. For a good cup run you might need a positive draw to progress, but ultimately it's about getting through each round by taking it each game at a time and believing that you are capable of beating teams from higher divisions.

THE GRECIAN: You were not at the club last season when Exeter City played Liverpool in the competition, but how much has that game been mentioned as a motivating factor for doing well again in the FA Cup this season?

ROBBIE: It does get mentioned every now and then. It was a great night for the club and the city as a whole and we have spoken about that and potentially what could be the ‘Liverpool’ of this season. From my point of view, I would love it to be Arsenal. They’re one of the big clubs I haven’t played against and my favourite team as well. Those things get mentioned at this time of year and it is little things like that that create a buzz around the place for FA Cup weeks.

THE GRECIAN: You have an FA Cup memory of your own against Liverpool as you scored a spectacular volley at Anfield for Oldham Athletic in 2012. Where does that rank in terms of highlights of your career?

ROBBIE: It is, without doubt, my best moment in football. I know the (Exeter City) lads went to Anfield last year and for me it is the best place I have ever played. Listening to the fans singing ‘You’ll Never Walk Alone’ before the game makes the hairs stand up on the back of your neck and then to score to put your team 1-0 up at the Kop end is unbelievable. At the time I had had a bit of trouble getting back out to Oldham on loan from Huddersfield Town. I had to pull some strings and effectively give up some of my contract to be able to go out and play, so that moment made it all worthwhile for me.

THE GRECIAN: When Lee Holmes mentions his strike straight from a corner against Liverpool, do you bring up your goal at all?

ROBBIE: I haven’t done yet. I am waiting for the right moment to drop it in because Holmesy has mentioned his goal a few times. I have just kept quiet though because I want him to view my goal and come to me rather than me shout about it.



THE GRECIAN: While you were at Cambridge United you also studied for a degree in sports science and mathematics. How important do you think it is for young players to carry on their education to degree standard if they can?

ROBBIE: It is rare, but I played with a guy called Matt Smith at Oldham who went through the same route as I did into football. We spoke about it quite regularly and it really is the ideal way. A stat came out from the PFA the other day that 70 per cent of footballers who end up out of contract before they are 21 never play again. That stat speaks volumes and I think allowing youth team players to get better qualifications than they can at the moment is a pressing issue.

THE GRECIAN: How much did your degree help you in professional football?

ROBBIE: It helped me massively. First and foremost, going to university and living away from your parents teaches you to be independent and make life choices on your own. When I finished my degree, I left Cambridge United and signed for Coventry City and moved away from home. Some young players might not be able to handle that, but I already had three years’ experience of living away from my parents and caring for myself. So, in terms of life education it is massive. Also my sports science degree gave me an added advantage of knowing what to eat, what not to eat, the amount of sleep I needed and extra fitness things I could do to keep myself ahead.

THE GRECIAN: Was it while studying at university that you first linked up with Paul Tisdale?

ROBBIE: Yes, Tis selected me to play for England Universities team and we had a week or two’s training at Lilleshall and then we had a tournament against Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland. We won the tournament and I got the golden boot and ever since then we have kept in contact.

THE GRECIAN: You have also recently set up a business called Life After Professional Sport. I was wondering if you could tell me a bit about the company and what its aims are?



ROBBIE: It’s a career guidance platform to aid professional sports people, chiefly for when they retire and look to progress into a new career. They can get that guidance while they are still playing or if they’ve already hung up their boots. One of the big reasons for setting it up is that 70 per cent of sports people suffer from depression post-retirement. It is hard to replicate the feeling of winning in a team or scoring a goal at Anfield. Once you retire and you realise that feeling is never going to occur again, it is quite a hard thing to take. If I can help guide professionals to take that passion and get that feeling from a new career, then I think that will ease some people’s anxiety about retiring from professional sport and hopefully reduce that depression rate. And that is just one of the reasons why I have set it up. Other reasons are that I know it is hard. I speak to young players in the changing rooms and ask them what they might do once they retire and the majority of them haven’t got a clue. These are people who have only got a year left on their contract and know that it might not get renewed. The PFA are doing more and more each year, but I am hopeful LAPS can work alongside them to aid them even more and help them achieve their aims.

THE GRECIAN: The business has not been running for very long, but it has already been mentioned by Richard Branson. That must have been nice to get that recognition.

ROBBIE: Yes, Richard Branson wrote a blog towards the end of the Olympics this summer. Lots of Olympians were saying this would be their last Olympics and they had to go into the ‘real world’ after that and knew that would be tough. Richard Branson decided to write a blog about the transferable skills elite athletes have and how they could be transferred across to business. His editor messaged me and asked if Richard could mention our company Life After Professional Sport? I said: ‘Yes, that would be fine’. It was a bit of a jackpot moment for us, because he’s one of the world’s best entrepreneurs. For him to acknowledge the company I have set up was a proud moment and hopefully we can use his blog for years to come.

TEN YEARS OF TIS: THE INAUGURAL XI

ON SATURDAY, AUGUST 12, 2006, AN EXETER CITY SIDE LED BY THE NEWLY APPOINTED PAUL TISDALE MADE THE LONG TRIP NORTH TO BOOTHAM CRESCENT WHERE THEY MET YORK CITY IN THEIR CURTAIN RAISER TO THE 2006/07 CONFERENCE CAMPAIGN. WHILST MUCH HAS CHANGED OVER THE LAST 10 YEARS, TIS HAS MAINTAINED. THEREFORE AS PART OF HIS 10TH ANNIVERSARY CELEBRATIONS, WE SHALL BE TAKING A TRIP DOWN MEMORY LANE BY PROFILING HIS FIRST STARTING XI.

This week our commemoration of Paul Tisdale's first game as City boss will continue with a biography of striker Jamie Mackie, who made 91 appearances for the club between 2005 and 2008, scoring 19 goals.

Born in Dorking, Surrey, Jamie Mackie began his football career at non-league Leatherhead, before joining Wimbledon as a trainee in 2003. However, having made just 13 league appearances for the Crazy Gang, he was forced to relocate to Buckinghamshire as part of the club's controversial move to Milton Keynes.

Jamie's stay in the Midlands was, however, short lived, as he opted to join Exeter City in the summer of 2005.

Although he initially found it difficult to break into the Grecians' side, having impressed during a loan spell at Sutton United, he was promptly recalled and soon established himself as a regular starter.

Unfortunately for City, Jamie's stellar performances in the red and white quickly attracted the attention of other clubs. Eventually, after much speculation, he signed for Championship side Plymouth Argyle in January 2008 for a handsome fee of £145,000.

Whilst many former Grecians have found it difficult to win over the Green Army, Jamie took to life at Home Park like a duck to water, scoring his first goal just 11 seconds into his debut against Barnsley. Initially signed as an impact sub, his hard work once again saw him claim a starting spot. He would go on to make 89 appearances over the course of the next two seasons.

Although Argyle were relegated at the end of the 2009/10 season, his impressive performances caught

the eye of then Scotland manager Craig Levine, who offered him his first cap against the Czech Republic in October 2010. He has since made eight further appearances for Scotland, notching two goals.

His form earned him a move to Queens Park Rangers during the summer of 2010. Once again Jamie adapted quickly to new surroundings, netting seven goals in his first eight appearances for the club. Although his season was ended prematurely by a serious leg injury, he gained a Championship winners' medal as the R's gained promotion to the Premier League for the first time since 1996.

Spurred on by the club's good fortunes, Jamie soon worked his way back to full fitness, making his top-tier debut away at Fulham in October 2011. Operating primarily as a winger, he adapted well to top-flight football, notching seven goals in his first season.

Although he went in search of a new challenge at the end of the 2012/13 season, after spending a season each with Nottingham Forest and Reading, he returned to Loftus Road in the summer of 2015. His return to the R's has so far been blighted by a series of injuries, but he currently has high hopes of regaining his spot in the team's starting line up.

Scott Hiley first came through the Exeter City youth system to earn a full professional contract in August 1986, making his league debut against Burnley in October 1987.

An attacking right-back who played very much in the style of his manager, Terry Cooper, Scott formed an effective partnership on the right flank with Brian McDermott as part of City's title-winning side of 1989/90.

In March 1993 he followed Cooper to Birmingham City for a fee of £150,000, where he played 49 league matches for the Midlands club.

Impressing once again, Scott was transferred to top-flight club Manchester City in February 1996, initially on loan, and then for £250,000, however injury restricted him to just nine league outings.

Hiley signed for Southampton in August 1998, (where Terry Cooper was working in a scouting role), and spent 16 months there, playing in 32 league games.

Scott then moved across to Portsmouth in December 1999 for £200,000, captaining the side and winning the player of the year award in his first full season. He added a further 75 league matches to his career total at Fratton Park, before being given a free transfer and rejoining Exeter City in September 2002.

In his second spell at St James Park, Scott was one of the most consistent players in the side, but unfortunately he could not stop us from (temporarily) losing our Football League status in 2003. However he stayed on with the club and joined the coaching staff, whilst continuing to play in the first team.

Despite now being a senior figure at St James Park, and adding the role of assistant manager to his responsibilities, Scott still showed great quality and added a moment that will always be remembered by City fans when he 'megged' Cristiano Ronaldo in the FA Cup third round replay.

Eventually Scott ended his career with City in February of 2006, and spells for Crawley Town, Tiverton Town and Cullompton Rangers followed before he retired from the game.

Having achieved a huge amount in football, not just with City, Scott is worthy of the title 'City Legend' and this was shown in a recent poll by the Express & Echo where he was voted the club's most popular defender, beating the likes of Shaun Taylor, Rob Edwards, and Jimmy Giles.

Ask me what I did on any day last week, and chances are I won't remember. But I have vivid recall of the first time City were drawn at home to Luton Town in the FA Cup, and am horrified to realise it was nearly 56 years ago.

A tie against the Hatters was a big deal then. They were a top-tier club, and had gone all the way to Wembley in the previous season's competition, losing the final 2-1 to Nottingham Forest. We were mid-table in the old Division four and had contrived a rare inclusion in the third round draw by virtue of wins at the Park over Barnstaple Town (4-0) and Brentford (3-1).

News of our plum draw against such distinguished opposition was wildly exciting for a 15-year-old who had never seen a First Division team in action, and I had sleepless nights until I'd secured my ticket and found a safe place for it.

When the great day – Saturday, January 9, 1960 – arrived, I felt I couldn't be at the ground early enough. In fact, I was there before 9am, first to arrive at the gate at St James Road, and I was standing there at least an hour before a second chap turned up. It must have been 11.30 before our numbers could reasonably be termed a queue.

Fortunately, it was not very cold and it didn't rain, but I would have put up with a blizzard, had it been necessary. I'd resolved to be the first through that gate, and then to make the dash for my chosen spot on the halfway line in the Cowshed. And I succeeded in my aim.

But before I made my entrance, I was interviewed by

Tony Court, the Express & Echo's football writer, and the paper's photographer snapped me for the back page of that evening's edition. Court asked me a load of questions, including what I was hoping to do when I left school.

He looked a bit surprised when I said: "I want your job." I suppose that was a bit cheeky, but I was at least half-serious. As it turned out, not much more than three years later I was a sports journalist in Fleet Street, albeit writing racing rather than football.

The game that had seemed so exciting in the anticipation proved something of a let-down. Our potential match-winner, Gordon Dale, got crocked early, and we were beaten 2-1. It's high time we exacted some revenge.

Come on you Grecians!

Of course one of the problems of making your predictions on paper is that they're written down for ever more – if I'm asked for my thoughts on the radio at 2.20pm the chances are that by 4.55pm most people will have forgotten what I went for. Rest assured though that whatever the result this afternoon I won't be in the commentary box to

take responsibility – take it up with John Ayres!

When the first FA cup final took place in March 1872, football had yet to really catch on in a big way. The match, between Wanderers and Royal Engineers, was played on the cricket pitch of The Oval. There were no nets on the goal posts and only 2,000 people turned up and paid the one shilling admission in order to watch the action. There were only 15 teams in the competition.

Wanderers had played four rounds but won only one of their matches. They drew against Scottish club Queen's Park in the semi-finals but were awarded their place in the final by default as the members of Queen's Park could not afford to return to London for a replay. Wanderers won the game 1-0, the single goal coming after 15 minutes.

NATHAN JONES

Welshman Jones took charge of the Hatters in January 2016 and helped guide the club to an 11th place finish in League Two last season. Currently enjoying his first spell in management, he took the role following the departure of John Still last year. The 43-year-old learned much of his coaching trade with Brighton & Hove Albion between 2013-2016, having previously spent time as an assistant manager at Yeovil Town and under-21 boss at Charlton Athletic. As a player he represented the likes of Southend United, Brighton and Yeovil and spent a short loan stint with the Grecians in 1998. Jones also spent a year in Spain where he played in the second tier before returning to the UK to join Southend.



FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS SELECTS TEN KEY MATCHES AND EVENTS THAT HAVE SHAPED LUTON TOWN'S POST-WAR ERA

1955 – TOP-FLIGHT HATTERS

Gordon Turner scored 32 goals as Luton Town won promotion to the top-flight for the first time in 1954-55. The Hatters began with a 3-0 victory at home to Nottingham Forest and soared up the Second Division table with six straight wins. Gordon Turner grabbed a hat-trick as Luton trounced Blackburn 7-3 and they triumphed 5-1 at Nottingham Forest. Dally Duncan's side maintained their challenge, slamming four goals past Hull City, Rotherham United, Liverpool and Port Vale. Tom Aherne and Shay Dunne were ever-present as Luton pipped Rotherham to the runners-up slot on goal average with a 3-0 win at Doncaster.

1959 – FA CUP FINALISTS

Luton Town were FA Cup finalists for the first and only time in 1958-59. The Hatters were unbeaten in their opening ten First Division games, trouncing Manchester City 5-1 and scoring four goals past West Ham and Preston. They recovered from a lean spell to beat Arsenal 6-3 and Burnley 6-2, then top scorer Allan Brown netted four goals in a 5-1 demolition of Nottingham Forest but poor results over the closing weeks saw them finish below mid-table. Luton defeated Leeds 5-1, Leicester 4-1, Ipswich 5-2, Blackpool 1-0 and Norwich 1-0 in the FA Cup before Syd Owen's side lost 2-1 to Nottingham Forest in the final.

1968 – FOURTH DIVISION TITLE

Bruce Rioch netted 24 goals as Luton Town won the Fourth Division title in 1967-68. New captain Terry Branston made his debut as the Hatters kicked off with a 1-1 draw at Wrexham and Ian Buxton arrived from Derby in September. Luton lost just two of their first 18 matches and beat Charlton in the League Cup first round, scoring 27 goals in a run of eight successive wins. Allan Brown's side went top of the table with a 2-0 win at Brentford in February and Keith Allen, Max Dougan, Fred Jardine, John Moore and Ray Whittaker also starred as they remained in pole position, clinching the title with a 4-0 victory over Crewe.

1970 – PROMOTION WINNERS

Malcolm Macdonald scored 25 times as Luton Town won promotion in 1969-70. The Hatters

had narrowly missed promotion the previous season and Bruce Rioch was sold to Aston Villa for a record fee, with Alec Stock signing Malcolm Macdonald, John Ryan and John Collins. Luton were early leaders after remaining unbeaten in their opening 13 matches, recruiting Chris Nicholl from Halifax and Matt Tees from Charlton. Malcolm Macdonald grabbed hat-tricks in 5-0 wins over Bradford City and Reading, with Luton unbeaten in their last six matches and clinching promotion as Third Division runners-up with a 0-0 draw at Mansfield.

1974 – FIRST CLASS RETURN

Luton Town regained top-flight status after an absence of 14 years in 1973-74. The Hatters recovered from a 4-0 defeat at Nottingham Forest on the opening day to hammer Carlisle 6-1, embarking on an eight-match unbeaten run. Harry Haslam signed Alan West from Burnley and Jimmy Husband from Everton as Luton maintained their promotion

challenge. Husband netted a hat-trick in a 3-1 victory over rivals Orient, then leading marksman Barry Butlin scored three in a 4-2 win over Preston. Alan Garner and Bobby Thomson were ever-present and other stars included Peter Anderson and John Ryan as Luton finished runners-up.

1982 – SECOND DIVISION CHAMPIONS

David Pleat guided Luton Town to the Second Division title in 1981-82. The Hatters had narrowly missed promotion in the previous two years and Tony Grealish was swapped for Brighton's Brian Horton. They raced to the top by winning their first three games and hammered rivals Watford 4-1, then Steve White scored four times in a 6-0 demolition of Grimsby. Richard Money arrived from Liverpool and was an influential figure as Luton were unbeaten in their last 14 matches. Leading marksman Brian Stein, Mal Donaghy, Kirk Stephens and Steve White were all ever-present as Luton won the title with 88 points.

1988 – LEAGUE CUP WINNERS

Ray Harford plotted Luton Town's 1988 League Cup final triumph. Danny Wilson replaced Peter Nicholas in midfield, while Micky Weir arrived from Hibernian and Mike Newell moved to

Leicester. The Hatters won 5-2 at Oxford and Ian Allison was signed from Stoke in October, with Luton losing just twice in 12 matches including a 7-4 win in the return match against Oxford, finishing ninth in the top-flight. They defeated Wigan 5-2, Coventry 3-1, Ipswich 1-0, Bradford City 2-0 and Oxford 3-1 in the League Cup before beating Arsenal 3-2 in the final. Luton were also FA Cup semi-finalists and Simod Cup finalists.

1989 – WEMBLEY FINALISTS AGAIN

Luton Town were League Cup finalists for the second consecutive season in 1988-89. Departures were Brian Stein, Mark Stein and Andy Dibble, while newcomers included Roy Wegerle, John Dreyer and Steve Williams. Luton's first home win was 1-0 against Liverpool and they beat Southampton 6-1 in January but First Division form was generally disappointing, with the Hatters narrowly avoiding relegation by winning three of their last four games. Luton defeated Burnley 2-1, Leeds United 2-0, Manchester City 3-1, Southampton 2-1 and West Ham 5-0 in the League Cup before losing 3-1 to Nottingham Forest in the final.

2002 – THIRD DIVISION RUNNERS-UP

Steve Howard scored 24 times as Luton Town won promotion in 2001-02. Joe Kinnear's side were early leaders after winning their opening two matches and newcomer Carl Griffiths netted a hat-trick in a 5-1 win over Torquay. The Hatters briefly regained pole position after beating Darlington 5-2 in October, signing Chris Coyne from Dundee, Jean-Louis Valois from Lille, Dean Crowe from Stoke, Ahmet Brkovic from Orient and Dave Bayliss from Rochdale. A run of 12 successive wins, slamming five goals past Halifax and Mansfield, took Luton back to the top with two games remaining but they finished runners-up to Plymouth.

2005 – RECORD POINTS TOTAL

Mike Newell managed Luton Town to the League One title in 2004-05. The Hatters stormed to the top of the table, winning 10 of their first 12 games before three successive defeats. They beat Bradford City 4-0 and Wrexham 5-1, then Steve Howard netted a hat-trick in a 4-1 win at MK Dons. The 1-0 victory over Port Vale in December heralded a 14 match unbeaten run and Luton bounced back from a 3-1 defeat in the return fixture to hammer Bristol City 5-0. Briefly displaced as leaders by Hull, they triumphed 4-1 at Torquay and secured promotion with four games remaining. Luton won the title with a record 98 points.
