





THE MANAGER NATHAN JONES



Good afternoon and welcome back to Kenilworth Road for the final time in 2016 for today's Sky Bet League Two game against Barnet.

I would like to welcome everybody from our visitors – including supporters, directors, staff, manager Rossi Eames and his squad – and I hope they have a short and safe trip back to north London this evening.

You will have known from my interviews afterwards that I was so disappointed with the Boxing Day defeat to Colchester, more than anything by the fact that we had over 9,000 packed in here at Kenilworth Road for the first time this season and we couldn't give you the three points such backing deserves.

It's been a really upbeat week since though, because the bigger picture tells us all that Luton Town is a club going places in 2017. We have made great strides in the 12 months since I took over, and there will be even more to come in the next year.

There are so many positives when you cast your mind back to this time last year. With 22 games of last season gone – the same number of league matches we've played up to today – the team were 13th in League Two with 29 points. When I took over on 6th January, we were 15th with the same points from 25 games.

With more than half the season to go, we currently have 35 points and sit fifth – having only dropped below that placing once all season – with our eyes firmly on the automatic promotion spots. That is our goal.

We have the best defence in League Two and the third highest scorer in the division in Danny Hylton. We boast one of the top goalscoring midfielders in Cameron McGeehan, and have been trusted by two top Championship clubs to aid the development of young England internationals in Alex Gilliead and Christian Walton.

We have recently secured two of our most promising young players – one scouted from Non-League by a club legend still doing the business for the Hatters, Mick Harford, and the other produced by our renowned academy – on long-term contracts. More will follow.

We are looking forward to an FA Cup third round tie, and our young players have been the talk of the country for what they've done in taking the club to the third round of the Checkatrade Trophy.

It's been a brilliant first year for me and I've thoroughly enjoyed it.


I would like to thank you, the supporters, for your fantastic backing that makes myself and the players feel proud to wear your badge every time we walk out in front of you.

I'd like to thank the board and our chief executive, Gary Sweet, for the support I've had in being able to build an excellent squad, to assemble what I consider to be the best staff in the league, for creating an infrastructure at the club that supports us in every way, and for building some wonderful training facilities that we'll be able to use in the New Year at The Brache.

Good news will hopefully follow on Newlands Park and Power Court in the coming weeks, too.

In my view, 2016 has seen real progress for Luton Town, so let's see it out with a bang this afternoon then kick off what promises to be an exciting 2017 with a mouth-watering away trip to promotion rivals Portsmouth on Monday.

Together we are stronger, so please raise the roof today, enjoy the game and have a very happy New Year!



FROM THE BOARDROOM

WITH FINANCE DIRECTOR SIMON GIBB

Hello and welcome to Kenilworth Road for our final game of 2016. As always, it is good to have you here as your support is much appreciated.

First of all I would like to welcome the players, supporters and board from our neighbours at Barnet. They arrive today on a high, on the back of a good win away at Cheltenham last time out and are now just outside the play-off places. They, like us, also have a strong away record. We will have to be at our best to break them down today.

After a set-back on Boxing Day against Colchester United we will want to bounce back strongly today and remind our nearest challengers in League Two that we intend to be in the promotion hunt at the end of the season. I know the lads will be up for it, so please get behind them with all your New Year cheer and let's make sure we end a good year on a high.

REFLECT

Given it is the last game of 2016 we should perhaps reflect on how far we have come since this time last year. At that point we had just changed our manager after a poor run of results, and Nathan Jones was still to join. We had also just announced our plans to build a fantastic new stadium at our preferred location of Power Court.

Nathan has brought new life to the playing side of the club, introducing a new style of play to existing and new squad members, which has led to us being very difficult to beat, with the best defensive record in League Two and resulting in us being in a strong position of fifth at this stage of the season.

STATISTICS

For those who follow statistics the EFL this week issued figures showing that of teams in fifth at this stage of the season, 30 per cent go on to achieve automatic promotion whilst 70 per cent finish in either the automatic or play-off positions. If you believe the statistics, this suggests we are in a great position to push on for promotion and have an exciting second half of the season to come!

Youth development of the club has continued to reap rewards, supported by the manager and board keen to see younger players pushing for first team places. Our successful progress in the Checkatrade Trophy, with some of our quality youngsters playing a key part, is testament to our club philosophy and I hope many of you will come along to support them


again in the next round at home to Chesterfield on Tuesday 10th January.

From a financial perspective the club is in good shape and we are very grateful for the continued significant investment from our investors, which has enabled us to pursue our exciting, longer term plans. As well as using these funds to secure the Power Court and Newlands Park sites this year, we have also made a significant investment in new training facilities at The Brache.

PROGRESS

These facilities will be a major improvement on our existing training ground at Ely Way, and importantly can be further developed into full Premier League quality in due course. These investments are all part of our planned steady progress towards a financially sustainable football club, with top quality facilities for all users with the capability of holding its own at the top levels of our game.

We have continued with our quest for a new stadium and submitted our planning applications for both Power Court, but also the equally important retail and office development at Newlands Park by Junction 10 of the

M1, the latter which is essential in order to enable us to create sufficient funds to build a quality new stadium along with new, top-class facilities for the town, in and around the Power Court location.

Following the public consultation the people of Luton have given our plans overwhelming public support with 10,796 positive responses submitted, and only 33 objectors. We are extremely grateful for your support.

FUTURE

Planning permission for such a major rejuvenation project is more complicated, however, than just public opinion as the impact, environmentally and economically, on the town and its existing and future residents, the fit to the Local Plan and any impact on surrounding locations, must be considered by the local council as well as potentially the Secretary of State, before a decision can be finalised. We as a board, however, remain very confident that

our exciting plans, which we know will add enormous value economically and culturally to Luton as a town, will be passed in due course.

As with any clubs in the EFL lower divisions, we have to run to tight budgets and have to exist with a relatively tight squad and restricted wage bill.

BALANCE

This in turn means we have to work hard to try to strengthen the quality and balance of the squad within sensible financial parameters. Our philosophy as a board, which is supported by the manager, is to continue to gradually strengthen, at the right price, the quality and depth of our squad within the existing financial parameters wherever possible, whilst having the financial resources available to take up one-off exceptional player opportunities if they arise, adjust for major injuries and to protect our squad from other club interest where we feel we need to.


With potentially a good second half of the season ahead and your continued excellent support, we can continue to improve our financial health and in turn reinvest those returns in our future both in our facilities and of course a stronger team.

THE CAPTAIN'S LOG

Welcome back to Kenilworth Road for what was already set to be a big game in our fight for promotion, but has now turned into a massive match with Barnet just two points behind us as they hunt down the play-off places.

It is good that we are back here so soon after the disappointment of losing to that late sucker punch against Colchester on Boxing Day. It gives us the perfect opportunity to put it behind us and end 2016 on a high.

Of course, we wanted to do that with six points over the Christmas break to build on the decent run of form

we'd been on, especially having gone away to Blackpool – who are top seven challengers – and doing so well against them in our previous game.

The manager showed his faith in the team that produced such a convincing win up there by naming the same starting line-up for Colchester, so we were massively disappointed that we lost that game. We weren't at our best for large parts, but we never felt under pressure.

CHANCES

We felt we'd had the better chances in the game and if anyone was going to take all three points up to the goal, it was going to be us.

What we were disappointed with as a team was that we switched off at a set piece at the edge of the box, and their boy reacted first and put it in the bottom corner.

We work on that and as defenders we pride ourselves on keeping clean sheets, which we've done a lot of recently.

There are still so many positives though. We stayed fifth in the table, so are still right in the pack. We may have lost a little bit of ground on some of the teams above us, but there are plenty of games to play – today's game brings us to the halfway point of the league programme and

we believe we'll be much stronger as we go on.

In this league, the games come thick and fast and we were in for training on Tuesday and focussing solely on Barnet, who have been on a good run of form.

PRESSURE

We are up against a team who have recently lost their manager but are doing OK in the league, and we need the three points to keep them at arm's length behind us, while putting pressure on the top three before we head to Portsmouth on Monday.

It was such a shame that we had our biggest crowd of the season here on Boxing Day and couldn't give you the points. The fans' support is massive and we need you to get behind us again today, as you always do, so we can pick up a positive result.

We want to finish 2016 with a real flourish and go into 2017 primed for promotion push, so let me wish everyone here a happy New Year – and let's make it one for us all to remember!



WHO? Now in their third season in the fourth tier of English football, Portsmouth are one of Town's promotion rivals this season. Pompey came close to returning to League One last season as they made the play-offs, but were knocked out at the semi-final stage by Plymouth Argyle. The club came into existence at the end of the 19th century and have won the First Division and the FA Cup twice, the 2008 Wembley win over Cardiff City their most recent honour.

TICKETS: Tickets for Monday's match are still on sale until after today's game. Prices are on the opposite page.

HAVEN'T WE MET BEFORE? Yes, and a fair few times in fact – 80 to be precise. Town have come out on top in 33 of those fixtures, their biggest win against Pompey being a 5-1 victory in November 1908 as Herbert Moody netted four times. Portsmouth won this season's reverse fixture 3-1 at Kenilworth Road, making that their 32nd victory over the Hatters. The other 15 matches have been draws.

IN CHARGE Paul Cook took over the reins at the end of the 2014/15 season as the club parted company with current Town academy manager Andy Awford. The former Wigan Athletic, Wolverhampton Wanderers and Burnley midfielder is now in his fifth managerial role, having been in charge at the likes of Accrington Stanley, Sligo Rovers and Chesterfield. He guided Pompey to the play-offs last season in his first term in charge, and is looking to go one step better this year.



THE OPPORTUNITY TO LEAD THE FIGHT FOR AN AUTOMATIC PROMOTION SPOT IS UP FOR GRABS, AS TOWN TAKE ON POMPEY FOR THE SECOND TIME THIS SEASON.

PREVIOUS FORM Since their win over the Hatters on 22nd November, Pompey have won two, drawn one and lost one of their four league matches. They went down 2-1 at home to Stevenage in the game immediately after their trip to Bedfordshire, but followed it up with a 1-0 win at Grimsby, a goalless draw at home to Hartlepool and a 3-2 Boxing Day win at Newport County. The Hampshire club found themselves 2-0 down with almost an hour gone at Rodney Parade, but goals from former Exiles midfielder Danny Rose, Enda Stevens and an 87th-minute winner from Kal Naismith ensured they took maximum points back over the Severn Bridge.

KNOWING ME, KNOWING YOU

Currently in the Portsmouth ranks is former Town utility man Drew Talbot, who signed for Pompey in the summer. The 30-year-old made 63 appearances for the Hatters, scoring five goals in his two seasons at the club between 2007-09. Former players of both sides include ex-England international Steve Foster, who made exactly 100 appearances more than Talbot for the Town. Foster began his professional career with Pompey, before moving onto Brighton & Hove Albion and then joining the Kenilworth Road outfit in 1984. Matt Taylor, now at Northampton Town, has represented both clubs, as well as former Town loanee Jayden Stockley, who is now with Aberdeen after going out on loan ten times from his previous parent club, Bournemouth. Hatters assistant boss Paul Hart managed Pompey in the Premier League.




WELCOME BARNET

The Hatters would like to extend a warm welcome to today's visiting staff, players and fans of Barnet to Kenilworth Road.

Now in their second season back in League Two after dropping out of the Football League three years ago, Barnet have climbed the table in recent weeks and are now sat just outside the play-offs. They completed their first season back in League Two by finishing 15th last term, but that doesn't do justice to the fact they finished a full 28 points above 23rd place.

Now managed by Rossi Eames and assisted by Henry Newman after the departure of Martin Allen at the beginning of the month, the side continued on their good run of form of five unbeaten and three successive wins before losing to Darren Sarll's Stevenage a week before Christmas.

The Bees have struggled at the Hive, winning three, drawing five and losing three. However, away from home they have been in excellent form and on Boxing Day they won 2-1 against Cheltenham at Whaddon Road, making it six matches unbeaten on the road, four of which have been victories.

Former boss Allen recently returned to The Hive to sign Sam Togwell, Gavin Hoyte and James Russell for Eastleigh, with centre-half Bondz N'Gala having already switched to the National League outfit just before the manager moved south.

It's difficult to even begin to talk about today's visitors without mentioning one player in particular. Leading the line is the league's top scorer, 18-goal John Akinde. The forward has been the club's main man for the past three seasons since joining from Alfreton Town.

The former Bristol City, Crawley Town and Portsmouth striker's goals helped fire the side out of the National League and into the fourth tier, as well as maintain their place in the division last term. His goal record speaks for itself, having scored 75 times since he joined the club two-and-a-half seasons ago.

Bira Dembele has also proved an important force not only in defence, but going forward also. The former France Under-21 international has scored three goals this season, two of which have proved of great value. He scored an equaliser in their match against Notts County, and in the game before that he netted the first goal in the 2-0 win against leaders Plymouth.

Surprisingly, the sides will only be contesting their seventh match today. Town have won four of their previous meetings with the Bees, losing once and drawing the other. The first of those games came on 6th December 2008, as Paul McVeigh and Chris Martin strikes, plus a Michael Townsend own goal, gave the Hatters a 3-1 win.

Following the departure of Martin Allen, who left for Eastleigh a month ago, Under-21 coach Rossi Eames has been put in charge of the first team. He is assisted by youth team boss, Henry Newman.

BETWEEN THE STICKS

JAMIE STEPHENS

The former Liverpool youth player joined the Bees in 2015 from Newport and has been a fairly regular face in the side since. The 23-year-old made 33 appearances last season.

IN DEFENCE

BIRA DEMBELE

As a young player, the 28-year-old trained as an electrician before becoming a professional footballer with Stade Rennes. He played for Stevenage between 2014-15, departing for the Bees at the end of that season.

ELLIOT JOHNSON

The 22-year-old joined the Bees from Norwich City five years ago, and has now made over 150 appearances for the north Londoners.

MICHAEL NELSON

The vastly experienced defender counts Barnet as the ninth professional football club he has

represented, others including Norwich, Hartlepool and Hibernian.

MAURO VILHETE

Born in Portugal, the 23-year-old joined Barnet's youth set-up in 2009 and has gone onto make over 100 appearances. He has also had loan spells with Boreham Wood.

HARRY TAYLOR

The 19-year-old was part of the Chelsea youth team until 2012, when he departed for Barnet. He has had loan spells with Hampton & Richmond Borough and Staines Town.

ACROSS THE MIDDLE

LUKE GAMBIN

The winger joined Barnet in 2010 after leaving AFC Wimbledon. The Malta international made his first professional appearance for the Bees back in April 2012.

TOM CHAMPION

In his second spell with the Bees, the 30-year-old re-joined last season after he made his debut for the club back in 2004/05. His former sides include Cambridge United, Bishop's Stortford and Dartford.

CURTIS WESTON

Now in his fifth season with the Bees, Weston has made over 180 appearances for the club. He is the youngest ever player to make an appearance in an FA Cup final when he came on in the 2006 final for

Millwall against Manchester United at 17 years and 119 days.

RYAN WATSON

Left Leicester City, for whom he made just one appearance during a three-year spell, after they had won the Premier League title. His former sides include Wigan, Northampton and Accrington.

JAMAL CAMPBELL-RYCE

The Jamaica international started his career with Charlton Athletic, before going onto play for the likes of Leyton Orient, Sheffield United and Barnsley.

UP FRONT

JOHN AKINDE

He is the Bees' top scorer this season and is fighting it out with Omar Bogle for number one spot in the League Two Golden Boot race, with 18 goals so far. The 27-year-old's former sides include Bristol City, Alfreton and Ebbsfleet.

ALEX NICHOLLS

After playing for Walsall for seven years, where he made over 200 appearances, Nicholls has gone onto play for Burton Albion, Northampton Town and Exeter City.

JEAN-LOUIS AKPA AKPRO

The Frenchman began his career with Toulouse, before moving to England when he signed for Grimsby Town. He has gone onto play for Rochdale, Bury and Tranmere.

FROM THE OAK ROAD

WITH WILL EVANS

Will Evans, a Barnet supporter of 20 years (and the club's former Press Officer), gives us his thoughts on what lies in store for his team this season in Sky Bet League Two and this afternoon on their visit to Kenilworth Road...



► THE SEASON AHEAD

You've been back in League Two for a couple of seasons now after succeeding ourselves as Conference champions. Are you settled back among the country's top 92 club now? I would say so. We finished 15th last season and were never really in danger of being relegated (or promoted for that matter!). With the off the field revenue being generated at The Hive, the club will now be looking to push on and challenge for the play-offs over the coming seasons.

You've been in and around the play-off places in recent weeks. Was there any expectation of that before a ball was kicked this season?

I think there was; the general consensus would probably have been that we were an outside bet for the play-offs this season. Saying that, most supporters would probably be happy with a top half finish. As long as we finish higher than last season, at least the club will be going in the right direction.

How much of a shock was it to see Martin Allen leave at the end of November to drop back down to that level with Eastleigh?

It seems to be common knowledge that Eastleigh have an awful lot of money to spend at the moment, so it didn't come as a great surprise to me. Martin Allen previously left Barnet for Brentford and Notts County, so loyalty isn't something he's renowned for! Personally I don't blame him – football clubs aren't particularly loyal to managers when they're struggling, and the fans would have been calling for his head after a few bad results. Eastleigh must have given him a big pay rise and he'd have been mad to turn it down.

How impressed have you been with the job Rossi Eames has done since being placed in charge?

It's still early days in Rossi's tenure, so I'll reserve judgement until we've played a few more matches. He has done very well with the youth team in the past and is an exceptionally nice bloke, so I wish him all the best while he's in the hot-seat.

Which player were you most disappointed to see leave in the summer?

Andy Yiadom left for Barnsley on a free transfer and has certainly been missed. The former Bees' captain was a first class right-back or winger and seems to be doing really well up at Oakwell this year.

Which of Allen's summer signings has impressed most so far this season?

One of the criticisms of Allen's tenure was his failure to significantly improve the squad after promotion to the Football League. The players he signed while we were in the Conference were excellent, but

very few of our recent additions have really stood out. Jean-Louis Akpa Akpro has looked like a good impact sub on occasion though, and Jamal Campbell-Ryce is an excellent player when fit.



There must be a couple you are really pleased you kept hold of. Who were you most pleased to see stay?

This is one that I don't think a single Barnet fan will disagree with – getting John Akinde to sign a new three-year contract was a masterstroke by the club. He's one of the best players to pull on a Barnet shirt in recent years.

► SEASONS PAST...

Tell us about you. Why do you support Barnet? When did it all start? What was your first game? What do you remember about it?

I'm a fourth generation Barnet supporter – my great-Grandfather and my Grandad started watching Barnet in the 1920s, but I went to my first game with my Dad in 1996. It was a pre-season friendly against Queens Park Rangers, and we lost to a Hoops side just relegated from the Premier League. I was absolutely captivated by the whole event though, and couldn't wait to go back to Underhill for a competitive fixture. We went again soon after; this time the Bees beat Hartlepool United 1-0. I've been addicted to Barnet ever since!

This is your fourth season at The Hive – does it feel like home yet?

It does feel like home now, but I do miss the atmosphere of Underhill's East Terrace. Even though The Hive lacks the character of our former ground, there's no doubt

that the facility allows us to have a significantly higher playing budget.

Who's your favourite Barnet player of all-time?

I used to love watching Darren Currie when he played for the Bees. He was like a lower league David Beckham – fantastic at crosses and set pieces.

Which is your favourite season following the Bees and why?

1997-98 I think. I was my first full season watching Barnet and everything seemed so exciting. We ended up coming seventh in Division Three and losing in the play-off semi-finals to Colchester United. Sadly (along with the 1999-2000 season), that's the highest we've ever finished while I've been watching the Bees!

Giuliano Grazioli, Jimmy Greaves, Lester Finch, Edgar Davids and Barry Fry.



FOOTBALL HISTORIAN LEIGH EDWARDS PROFILES TEN BIG-NAME BARNET PLAYERS NOT USUALLY ASSOCIATED WITH THE CLUB




BOB McNAB

One-time Barnet left-back Bob McNab was an influential figure in Arsenal's 1970-71 'Double' success. Signing professional for hometown club Huddersfield in April 1962, he was ever-present in their 1965-66 promotion near-miss and moved to Arsenal for £50,000 in October 1966. The England international played in two consecutive League Cup finals, then helped the Gunners win the Fairs Cup in 1970 and was an FA Cup finalist again in 1972. He joined Wolves in July 1975 and returned from a spell with San Antonio to play for Barnet. Later coached Vancouver Whitecaps, he now has several business interests in California.

JIMMY GREAVES

Former England international striker Jimmy Greaves was capped 57 times before joining Barnet. Starting with Chelsea, he was top scorer four times and moved to AC Milan in June 1961. He joined Tottenham Hotspur five months later for £99,999 and was leading marksman as they won the FA Cup in 1962 and 1967, as well as the ECWC in 1963. Moving to West Ham as part of the Martin Peters deal in March 1970, he later had a spell with Chelmsford City prior to joining Barnet in July 1977. He was their top scorer and 'Player of the Year' in 1977-78. Later a TV soccer pundit, he has since worked in corporate hospitality.



MARTIN CHIVERS

Ex-England international striker Martin Chivers was capped 24 times before joining Barnet. He turned professional with Southampton in September 1962 and was top scorer in their 1965-66 promotion success. Moving to Tottenham Hotspur for £125,000 in January 1968, he helped win the League Cup twice and UEFA Cup in 1972. He joined Servette in July 1976, then Norwich and Brighton, before becoming Dorchester's player-manager. Following a spell with Norwegian side Vard, he joined Barnet in October 1982 and made seven Conference appearances. He later ran the Brookman's Park Hotel in Potters Bar for 18 years.

KEVIN BEATTIE

Former England international central defender Kevin Beattie briefly played for Barnet in 1985-86. He turned professional with Ipswich Town in July 1971 and was their 'Player of the Year' in two consecutive seasons and PFA 'Young Player of the Year' in 1973-74. He formed an excellent partnership with Allan Hunter and helped Ipswich to win the FA Cup in 1978 before a knee injury halted his top-flight playing career.

After unsuccessful comeback bids with Colchester United and Middlesbrough, he had spells with several Norwegian sides, then Barnet and Clacton Town. He has since worked in the licensed trade.



DION DUBLIN

Barnet's former loan striker Dion Dublin was capped four times by England. Initially with Oakham United, he moved via Norwich City to Cambridge United in August 1988. He was loaned to Barnet in December 1988, featuring as a substitute in that month's 2-1 victory at Stafford Rangers. Top scorer in Cambridge's rise under John Beck, he joined Manchester United in August 1992, then Coventry City for £2,000,000 in September 1994. He was leading marksman four times and joined Aston Villa for £5,750,000 in November 1998. An FA Cup finalist in 2000, then had spells playing for Leicester City, Celtic and Norwich again.

MARK LAWRENSON

Former Republic of Ireland international central defender Mark Lawrenson had a spell with Barnet in 1988-89. He turned professional with Preston in August 1974 and was ever-present 'Player of the Year' in 1976-77. Moving to Brighton in July 1977, he was 'Player of the Year' when they won promotion to the top-flight in 1978-79 and joined Liverpool for a record £900,000 in August 1981, amassing a vast collection of honours while at Anfield. Briefly joining Barnet in February 1989, between managing Oxford United and Peterborough, he played two Conference games for the Bees. He is now an analyst on 'Match of the Day'.

BRIAN STEIN

Our own Luton legend Brian Stein featured in Barnet's 1992-93 promotion campaign. Initially with Edgware Town, he joined the Hatters in October 1977 and was leading marksman in our 1981-82 Second Division title triumph. Also starring as the Town were twice FA Cup semi-finalists, he scored twice in our 1988 Littlewoods Cup final success (pictured below) and joined Caen in July 1988. He moved via Annecy back to Luton in July 1991 and joined Barnet in August 1992. Scoring eight goals in 40 League outings while at Underhill, he later came back to Kenilworth Road as a coach. His older brother Eddie gave Barnet lengthy service.

BRIAN MARWOOD

Former England international winger Brian Marwood played for Barnet in 1993-94. Signing professional for Hull City in February 1978, he was leading marksman in their 1982-83 promotion triumph and moved to Sheffield Wednesday for £115,000 in August 1984. He joined Arsenal for £600,000 in March 1988 and starred in their 1988-89 League Championship success, moving to Sheffield United for £350,000 in September 1990. Joining Swindon Town in March 1993, he helped clinch promotion and joined Barnet in August 1993, making 23 League appearances. He became the PFA chairman, since working in the media.

MAIK TAYLOR

Goalkeeper Maik Taylor gained 88 Northern Ireland caps after leaving Barnet. Previously at Farnborough Town, he moved to Barnet in June 1995 and missed just one match in 1995-96, making 70 Third Division appearances while at Underhill before being sold to Southampton for £500,000 in January 1997. He joined Fulham for £800,000 in November 1997 and was an important figure as they won the Second Division title in 1998-99 and First Division title in 2000-01. Joining Birmingham City for £1,500,000 in August 2003, he helped regain top-flight status at the first attempt in 2006-07, then finished his playing career with Millwall.

TONY COTTEE

Former England international striker Tony Cottee had a spell as Barnet's player-manager. He turned professional with West Ham in September 1982 and was leading marksman four times. Voted 'Hammer of the Year' as they were third in the top-flight in 1985-86, he was twice ever-present and joined Everton for £2,500,000 in August 1988. Rejoining West Ham in September 1994, he then played for Malaysian side Selangor, Leicester City and Norwich City. He was Barnet's player-boss from November 2000 until May 2001, scoring nine goals in 16 League games, then had a spell with Millwall, since working in the media.

AS OTHERS SAW US

CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH LOOKS AT PAST GAMES FROM THE EYES OF THE OPPONENTIAL AND THE 'NEUTRAL' NATIONAL PRESS...

BRENTFORD 2 LUTON TOWN 6 | 8TH FEBRUARY 1964

The Town were relegated to Division Three (now League One) in 1963, the first time they had been at that level for 26 years. It had been only a short time since they were an established top flight side and appearing in the FA Cup final, but with a team made up of over-the-hill veterans and other clubs' cast-offs, the glory years seemed far away.

There was one ace up the Hatters' sleeve though. Signed from Chester in October 1962, Ron Davies had scored 21 goals in only 29 Division Two (now Championship) League games in a poor Luton side, becoming a firm crowd favourite along the way.

Only three games into the 1963/64 campaign, though, the news that all Town supporters had been dreading was announced with Davies being sold for a pitiful £35,000 to Norwich, who had been chasing him

relentlessly since he netted six times against them the previous season.

The Hatters were obviously weaker with the sale of Davies and the goal scoring completely dried up. The mantle of leading the attack was placed firmly on the shoulders of 33-year-old Gordon Turner, who was surrounded by some pretty ordinary players.

By the time Christmas 1963 approached, the Town were struggling at the bottom of the table with a

grand total of four wins to their credit and a succession of heavy defeats, particularly at home, behind them.

A forward from Northampton, Ray Smith, had been signed for £5,000, but he lasted only a few anonymous games before disappearing off to Non-League football, while another forward, brought to Kenilworth Road just before Christmas, caused barely a ripple of enthusiasm amongst the, by now, highly cynical Luton fans.

SIX-AWAY, TOO!

BRENTFORD 2, LUTON TOWN 6

IT is a far cry from Middlesbrough to Brentford, but there is a parallel between the two places because it was in the North-East that the Town won their last League away victory over 15 long weary months ago.

This result at Griffin Park, this afternoon, really was a turn-up for the book and it was one that no-one could have forecast at half-time when the Town were a goal down and

LUTON NEW BOY SLAMS FOUR GOALS IN 16 MINS.

Brentford 2 Luton 6: by DAVID WILSON

N O'ROURKE, an 18-year-old Chelsea reject signed just before Christmas, napped four goals in a devastating 16-minute spell just after half-time to bottom-of-the-Third-Division Luton their first away win for 15 months. Luton Park crowd chanting a "Glory, Glory" theme. But for slumping Brentford there were chants of



John O'Rourke was 18 when he came to Luton having become surplus to requirements at Chelsea where Tommy Docherty was blessed with plenty of forward cover. Another cast-off we all thought, especially as O'Rourke had previously been discarded by Arsenal as well.

The striker made his debut in a 2-1 home win over Reading and immediately caught the eye with his youthful enthusiasm and no little skill, and by the time of his first goal, in a 3-1 home victory over Colchester in January 1964, he had won over the fans.

Although the Town had started to pick up a few home points, the away record was dire without a victory on opposition soil since October 1962. It was therefore understandable that only a handful of Luton supporters made their way to Griffin Park to see the still bottom of the table Town take on a Bees side that was hovering around mid-table.

The customary away defeat looked on the cards as early as the 11th minute when Brentford winger Mark Lazarus raced from his own half to set up an easy chance for Billy McAdams – a lead that was comfortably held until the interval.

Whatever was said at half-time should have been bottled and sold as what happened in the first 21 minutes of the second period created a new Luton hero, and made a complete mockery of the Town's lowly position.

On 46 minutes, winger Harry Walden equalised for the Town with a simple tap in before O'Rourke took over, scoring four goals – including a seven minute hat-trick – to turn the game on its head.

Lazarus had knocked in a consolation for Brentford in amongst O'Rourke's devastating spell, but Walden put the game beyond any doubt just before the end with his second, and the Town's sixth.

Brentford complained about an injury to goalkeeper Chick Brodie, but as the score was 4-2 in the Hatters' favour when he left the field, it hardly mattered.

O'Rourke proved a revelation that season as his 22 goals from 23 games proved, with the Town escaping relegation at the death following a run of nine games without defeat at the end of the campaign.

Tommy Docherty was left to rue his decision to let O'Rourke go, while the Town fans would never again moan about cast-offs...not for a couple of years anyway!

David Wilson in the Sunday Express confirmed that 'John O'Rourke, an 18-year-old Chelsea reject had the small but happy band of Luton supporters chanting a 'Glory, Glory' theme.'

The Daily Telegraph scribe said: 'It was an astonishing performance from struggling bottom club Luton who became the last of the Third Division clubs to get an away win this season.'

Eric Pugh (Chiltern in the Luton News) could be quite withering in his criticism of the Town at times, but even he strayed towards hyperbole in his match report. There again, watching the Hatters at that time could be depressing so any chink of light at the end of the tunnel was naturally met with wild enthusiasm even by the normally measured Chiltern.

STORY OF THE MATCH:

The Hatters suffered a Boxing Day defeat as Craig Slater struck an 83rd-minute knockout blow to send Colchester home with all three points, and the biggest Kenilworth Road crowd of the season with major disappointment.

It was a devastating blow for manager Nathan Jones and a Town side who, following a stop-start first half, had the better chances after the interval and had looked the more likely to break the deadlock with Danny Hylton and Johnny Mullins spurning great opportunities.

Man-of-the-match Scott Cuthbert's clearing header from inside his own half looked to have created a real opening seven minutes after the break when the ball flew over the U's defence and into the path of Hylton, who outmuscled defender Frankie Kent on the edge of the box but couldn't beat onrushing keeper Sam Walker.

Then, in the 68th minute, Alex Gilliead whipped in a corner from the right and the ball fell to Mullins, who connected sweetly with a half-volley from six yards, but it flew over the bar.

But seven minutes from time, Colchester midfielder Slater capitalised on a half-cleared corner to smash the ball home from just inside the box and nick a win for the U's that moved them to within five points of the fifth-placed Hatters.

Midfielder Alex Gilliead echoed manager Nathan Jones' disappointment at losing to a late Colchester goal on Boxing Day – but then spoke of his determination to help the Hatters towards the ultimate goal of promotion.

The Newcastle man's loan is due to expire on 7th January, but boss Jones has spoken in recent weeks of talks having already begun to try to extend the England Under-20 international's stay at Kenilworth Road.

As usual, Gilliead had probed for an opening against Colchester and had seen a smart shot on the turn saved by U's keeper Sam Walker, but was left "devastated" by Craig Slater's winner just two minutes after he'd been substituted.

DEVASTATED

"Obviously everyone's devastated in the changing room," said the 20-year-old. "It's their second corner of the game, the ball's fell to their lad on the edge of the box and it was a good strike, but we should have had someone on him to stop it.

"Both teams started a little bit slow and wanted to see what the other was about in the first half. There wasn't much passing or anything going on, a lot of keep ball, not really going anywhere.

"Then I thought second half, the game was a bit more open. We got at them a lot more, put a lot of balls into the box and just couldn't get on the end of them.

"On the pitch with the lads, we all thought it was going all right second

half and chances wise, we had the better of them.

"But it was one of those games where one goal was going to win it and unfortunately it wasn't for us today."

RUN

The defeat was only the third the Hatters had suffered in all competitions since mid-September, and Gilliead wants to get back on a good run in the final game of 2016.


"We'll have a debrief on today's game, work on it and see what we can do to break down teams throughout the week," he said.

"Barnet aren't too far off the play-offs. They're doing well this season, so we've got to be wary of their threat, but we'll do whatever the manager and staff have got us doing, and I'm sure they'll prepare us right for Barnet and the game afterwards at Portsmouth.

CONCENTRATE

"We're not bothered about anyone else or other results. We know how many points we are away, but we just need to concentrate on us.

"Our group of players are sure that by the end of the season, we'll be all right – we'll be right up there and go up."




"I'm learning all the time and developing as a player."

CAMERON: THIS IS MY BIG DEAL

Luton's Cameron McGeehan may have left his Christmas shopping until the last minute – but when it came to his career, the Luton midfielder wasn't prepared to hang around.

A teenage starlet at Chelsea and Norwich, McGeehan watched in dismay as promising talents like Josh McEachran disappeared into a development black hole.

Unwilling to risk a similar fate and emboldened by a Conference-winning loan spell at Luton, the straight-A student had no hesitation in ditching his cushy life for a permanent deal at ramshackle Kenilworth Road.

Eighteen months on, the 21-year-old is the Hatters' reigning player of the year with 33 goals in 109 career games for the Hatters and Cambridge, plus an EFL young player of the month award on the mantelpiece.

"I saw so many people stagnating, their careers going nowhere," says McGeehan, speaking to the FLP from a packed shopping centre in the midst of a last-minute pressie dash.

"Me and my dad had a lot of discussions about it and we also spoke to a few older players, like Josh. At Norwich it was Nathan Redmond and Bradley Johnson, who started at Arsenal. All of them said 'Don't even think about it – get out, play football and you won't regret it'.

"Now I'm sitting here on 100-plus senior games and I've learned so much more than I would have in an Under-21 side. They were completely right.

"I look at boys who signed big deals at Chelsea and think 'Yeah, if I'd done that, I could be rich now'. But my game is richer. My experience is richer. I'm loving life, meeting new people. I'm a main player at a massive club.

"A lot of these lads, they've spent that money by 22. Then they move to a League Two club, have to completely adjust their life and it's a shock to the system.

"It's also about respect. You see 18 or 19-year-olds driving round in Range Rovers and the senior players look at them and think 'You've not earned that, you've done nothing in the game'. That stuff should be for the top boys who've earned their stripes in a high pressure industry.

ACHIEVEMENTS

"Maybe it's easy for me to say because I'm from a comfortable background. I accept that I've been privileged. But, for me, football is about achievements, not about money."

McGeehan's ten goals this term have fired Nathan Jones' Hatters into promotion contention, with a top-three place a distinct possibility.

And having worked with the cream of continental coaching at Cobham, McGeehan says his manager deserves to be ranked alongside any of them.

"We're lucky to have him," says the midfielder. "He's a top level coach who nearly got the Brighton job before Chris Hughton. He should be working a lot, lot higher.

"He's really sharp, really clever. His work ethic is incredible – I think he's at work from seven in the morning to eight or nine at night most days.

"When I think of all the people I've worked with in my career, he's right up there. I guess it's similar to me. He's come down to get experience and a reputation. Hopefully we can both work our way back up."




Paul Driver will start his annual 100-day non drinking policy which then allows him to hit the Adnam's bitter in the summer. Why not enjoy it all year long?

HOWZAT HATTERS

When the Town's stars swapped football for cricket in their summer break

Back in the 1950s and early 60s, Luton Town Football Club had a close relationship with the Luton Town Cricket Club, who played at Wardown Park on a ground which many considered to be one of the finest in southern England.

One event which took place towards the end of each cricket season was a cricketers versus footballers match in aid of charity.

The footballers would raise a team as part of their pre-season training and play a Luton Town XI. The game was always played in a light-hearted manner and attracted large crowds of football and cricket supporters alike.

In addition to these events, several footballers took the red ball' game rather more seriously and regularly appeared for the Town and Bedfordshire teams.

Among these was **JOE PAYNE** (77 Appearances, 87 Goals), who was a fast bowler and hard-hitting batsman of some note. On one occasion he scored 46 in 12

minutes, hitting Ian Bedford, the Middlesex captain and spin bowler for four sixes. Joe, better known for his goal scoring feats, also played for Bedfordshire in the Minor Counties.



Another was **GORDON TURNER**

(450 Appearances, 276 Goals), who was a right arm 'slinger' of some pace and a forceful batsman. On one occasion Gordon was batting and was well set for a big score. Unfortunately, he was also booked to present

awards at an end of season soccer function at Vauxhall Motors. However, rather than miss out on a big score, he carried on batting until the game was won and then proceeded straight to the presentation, still in his whites!

Gordon teamed up with **WALLY SHANKS** (276 Games, 6 Goals), another Hatters favourite to run a sports shop, Shanks and Turner, which was located on the Dunstable Road retail park opposite Hazlebury Crescent. Gordon and Wally became firm favourites with local sportsmen and supplied sports equipment to all the local teams.

SYD OWEN (423 Appearances, 3 Goals) also played, and as you can imagine, was more of a Geoffrey Boycott-type batsman than an Ian Botham. Syd played with a straight bat and just like his centre-half activities, nothing went past him. Syd also bowled medium pace and on one occasion in a match against the MCC, he was bowling to Bill Edrich, the England number three batsman, and a wicket before lunch would have put the Town in strong position. Syd sent down one of his 'floaters' and Bill, who had never faced the Luton Town stopper before, was completely beaten and could only get a leading edge and loop the ball gently back

to Syd. Unfortunately Syd, who had been dealing with high balls through the middle all his life, got both hands to it but after some juggling, finally dropped it. This led to some hilarity in the crowd and some wag yelled, "Try heading it next time Syd!"



TERRY KELLY (149 Games, 1 Goal) was the centre-half who always stood in for Syd Owen and made many appearances in the Town colours. It has been said that whenever Terry played, the Hatters never lost. He was in the same mould as Syd, very strong in the air and a formidable tackler. Terry was

also a very good cricketer, a prolific batsman who played for both Luton Town and Bedfordshire.

Another Hatters regular to play cricket at Minor Counties level was South African **ROY DAVIES** (169 Appearances, 28 Goals), a right winger with a terrific shot. Roy was a very useful cricketer and a bowler of some pace. At a benefit game for Denis Brookes, the Northamptonshire opening batsman, Roy was asked to open the bowling for the works side. These games were supposed to be just exhibition games with the Northants batsmen scoring heavily and the works side just there to make up the numbers. However, Roy was having none of that and after two overs he effectively ended the entertainment by removing the cream of the Northants batting. Off a short run up he was deceptively fast and removed the first four batsmen with the total score still in single figures. Obviously this was not in the script and so to prolong proceedings a little longer for the large crowd, Roy was removed from the attack.

Unlike today when we seem to have football 24/7, the football season started in September and ended after the FA Cup Final. Footballers were then able to have a good summer break and enjoy other sporting activities.

Can you imagine today's professional footballers giving up their very short break and risking injury to spend time on the cricket ground at Wardown Park?

Those were the days!



THE CAMERA NEVER LIES

CLUB HISTORIAN ROGER WASH DELVES
INTO HIS PHOTOGRAPHIC ARCHIVES

Sheila Ginger, Sylvia Worby and Jean Punter arrive at Manchester Central station ready for fourth round FA Cup tie at City in January 1953. They were well rewarded for their efforts following a 1-1 draw, with the Hatters winning 5-1 in the replay.

THE BIG INTERVIEW

How did you get into commentating?

I saw an advert in the programme in 1997 and they wanted a commentator for partially sighted fans as they had just got a grant which meant those fans could listen to commentary inside the stadium. I had already done some presenting on Student and Hospital radio and saw this as a way of getting to go to games regularly and do some commentary.

Did you play much football when you were younger?

I did until the age of 13 and as I was wearing glasses by then, it got harder to play. Under the age of 13 though I played a lot of games for the school, for my club team and I think I played in just about every position possible.

Over the years, who's the best Luton player you've seen play?

When I was younger my favourite player was Brian Stein, so he'll always be up there. I remember when Paul Walsh got sold and that was the first

really good player I saw leave the club. More recently, the Frenchman Jean-Louis Valois will always be remembered, but it's difficult to pick one as there's been so many great players over the years.

What's been your most memorable match?

There's several to choose from all for different reasons. There's three that stand out for me. The Keith Keane goal against Oxford is one. Not just because of the goal but because people who didn't really know about my commentary before the game certainly did afterwards! Commentating on the play-off final at Wembley was special. We lost but Andre Gray scored, so

I've commented on a Luton goal at Wembley. Finally, the FA Cup match against Norwich. I was living on the Suffolk-Norfolk border at the time quite close to Norwich, so I

had some friends that were Norwich fans and to beat a Premier League team as a Non-League team is very memorable.

What's the strangest thing you've seen while commentating?

There's been a few strange mascots at games, one or two strange free-kick routines – but I think it's probably when the guttering above the Oak Road End fell down after a Keith Keane shot and the game had to be stopped for a few minutes while someone climbed up a ladder and pulled it down! Also, I went to Chesterfield once and we could only see half the pitch due to fog. We scored and we didn't even know we had until all the players came running back down the other end. We celebrated about 30 seconds after the ball had gone in!

You talk a lot with the players and staff so have you noticed anything different about successful teams?

It's noticeable that some of the players are more experienced and some of the younger players are less used to doing interviews. In terms of management there's very different styles. For example, under John Still we got promoted from Non-League and under Nathan Jones we've also had some success, yet they are very different characters. I don't think success is dependent on the style of a manager or team.



What's the hardest part about commentating?

The long, wet midweek trips when we're getting thrashed are always hard. I remember one match against Newport when we lost 5-2 and it was so cold, we were awful and you begin to think to yourself 'If it wasn't for those listening, I'd rather be elsewhere'. I really appreciate the support I get though and that's what gets you through those games.

Who's the best pundit you've commented with?

I've had a few ex-players with me. Paul Benson was very good. When he was out injured he did a couple of games with me. I also had Stuart Fleetwood with me for a game, and the way he celebrated us scoring was great. I'd probably have to go with Claude Gnapka though, just because

it was Claude! He sat with me on my 300th game for Diverse FM at York, so that was very special for me.

What's your normal matchday routine?

I normally do the preparation for a game on Thursday and/or Friday and then the last bit on Saturday morning. Then I travel to the game and if it's at home I'm responsible for the team sheets, so I need to get those in, printed and distributed. Then I set up all the equipment and check we're going through okay on Hatters Player, and then the match itself.

Do you think Nathan Jones is the man to get Luton promoted?

Yes!



Who is the best young player coming through the ranks at the moment?

I'm a big fan of Cameron McGeehan and I really do rate him as a player, and Jack Marriott I also rate. Younger than that, some of the youth team and development team, there's too many to name! It's really good they are coming through and great we have that quality.

And finally, where do you think Luton will finish this season?

I don't think it's going to be easy because there are some really good teams in League Two, but I think we have the potential for top three.

LUTON TOWN IN THE COMMUNITY

Another great year at the Trust which has seen further growth in both personnel and a big growth in the number of varied football and non-football projects we deliver to our local community.

As a registered charity our role is to represent the club in the wider community using the power of football to be at the heart of our community. We rely on raising our own funds through both our coaching activities and grant funding from the EFL, Premier League and PFA with support from the club and our main sponsor, easyjet.

Additional partnerships with Active Luton, Luton Adult Learning, The Princes Trust, Luton Airport's Youth Community Fund, Laureus Foundation and Streetgames has enabled us to both expand our existing activities and begin lots of new and exciting projects.

As you can see from our 'super' infographic, we now provide over 70 free PE lessons every week to over 2,000 local school children as part of the Premier League School Sport project and easyjet Free Schools Visit Project.

STRENGTHENING

Our girls-only coaching continues to increase the number of girls taking part in football and we opened our first ever girls' Player Development Centre as part of a five-year strategy of strengthening our links with Luton Town Ladies FC and offering girls the same opportunity as boys to be involved with the Hatters.

Our growing involvement in Disability Football continues to prove hugely rewarding for both staff and participants and as well as our two men's teams, the Hatters and Boaters, we also now coach weekly sessions at almost all of the special educational needs schools in Luton and Bedfordshire thanks to support from the Wembley National Stadium Trust.

Our Talent Identification Centres also continue to perform well with almost 600 recruited boys in the system, and with boys trialling and playing for the academy into double figures already this season.

We've also increased our football tournaments this year with the Hatters Cup involving 1,200 youngsters playing at Kenilworth Road in May, as well as also involving hundreds of additional youngsters in the national Kinder+Sport Girls and Kids cup.

We also have our Integration Cup for boys from Marsh Farm, Farley Hill and Lewsey Farm at the stadium, which forms an important part of our social project PL KICKS on these estates, and this season we played our first official game against QPR up at Lea Manor.

SUCCESSFUL

Our second airport-funded project has also been successful in establishing youth football teams in High Town for the first time in years, with teams ready to start playing in 2017 leagues next year.

Luton Adult Learning are also helping us to find and train 36 new community coaches to deliver our projects with two courses in 2017 for both men and women.

The Trust's work was also recognised by Bedfordshire Police at the annual community cohesion awards, and more recently the Trust were voted winners in the leisure and culture section at the Luton Best awards.


In addition, our social impact contribution was valued at a value to the local community of £2.5million by Substance, who are the leading experts in the social impact sector. It's all great feedback on the work we are involved in.

We look forward to keeping everyone updated and engaged through these pages during 2017 on all of our existing and new projects as we look to both promote Luton Town Football Club to new supporters, and also use the power of football to effect and improve the lives of as many members of our community as we can.

Thankfully for the town, the subsequent expansion of Bedfordshire on Sunday means the coverage of Luton won't be decreasing, unlike in Milton Keynes or Northampton, which are both now served by just one newspaper.

But LoS' demise does mean the end of my time as sports editor, with the decision being made that BoS will not be having a dedicated sports writer on its staff.

Don't worry, I'm not going to use my final column to bemoan this brutal time for the local press. The real shame is my departure comes just when things are about to get interesting at Kenilworth Road.

EXPECTATIONS

When I took up my position in September last year, I had my own expectations that Luton Town would be challenging for their second promotion in three seasons despite an iffy start to the campaign.

At the other end, goals aren't being leaked with the annoying regularity of a year ago and the defensive lapses that did for the previous regime have become increasingly rare under the current one.

This is a solid foundation you feel really has started on the training ground, which has had a much more focused feel about it this season.

During my time with the paper, I became more aware of the young talent that is coming through the club. This has been the main success story and the youngsters' progression has left the future looking bright.

Back in the present, Luton still have interests in three competitions – not too many clubs at this level can boast that at this stage of the season.

Accrington away wasn't the draw anyone wanted in the third round of the FA Cup, but it's certainly winnable and who knows what the reward might be if the Hatters get through that.

What lies ahead is something I'll be an interested spectator of. Being from Bedford, I've always kept an eye on Town's results and after covering them week in week out for 15 months, it's a keener interest now.


